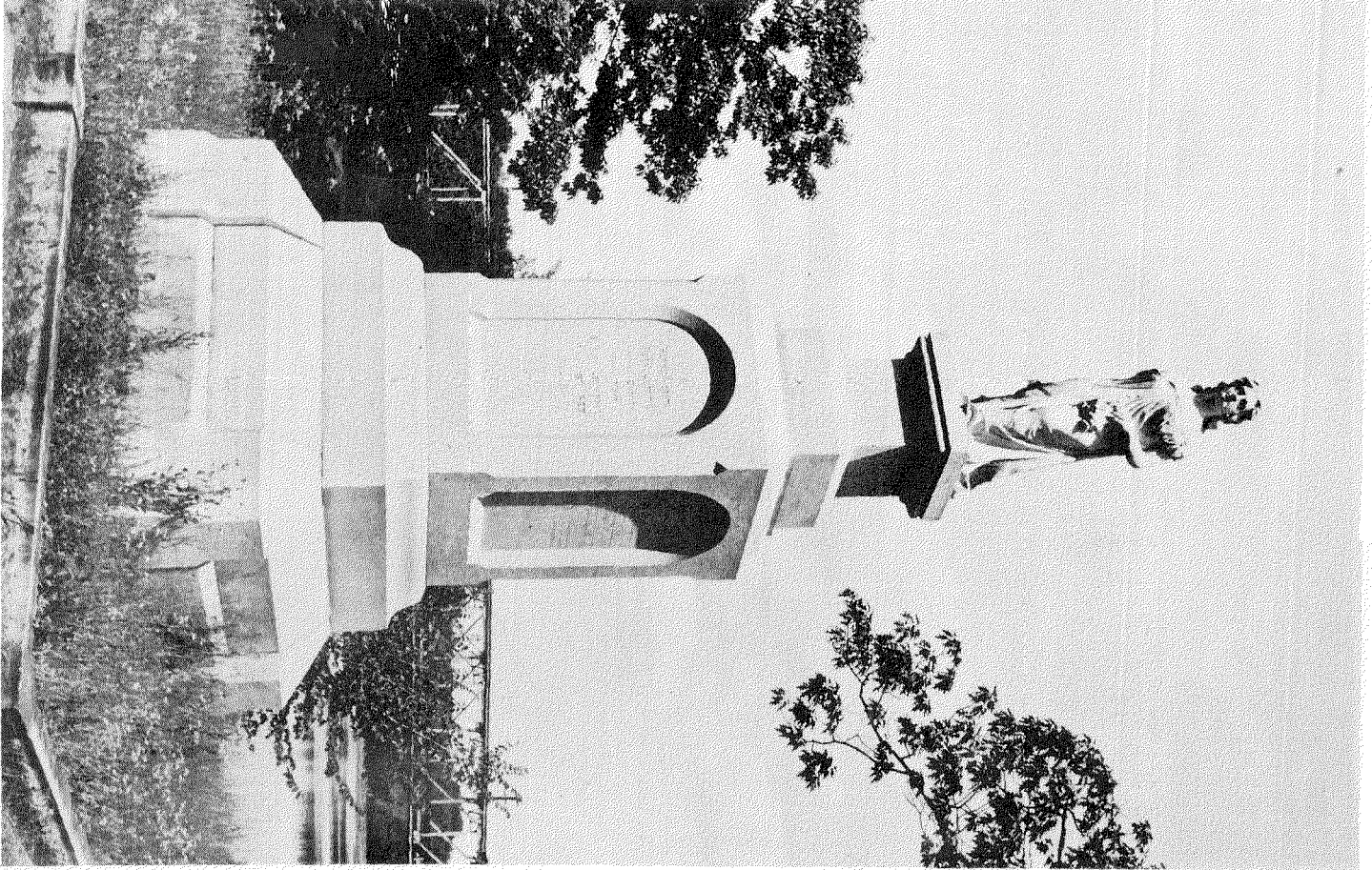

FOREWORD

This history of the Neff family is dedicated to my father, Elmer Hartshorn Neff, whose stories about the Neff family in bygone days inspired me to look into the early Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, and other state records. It has been both interesting and gratifying to find that all the things he told me (stories handed down from generation to generation) were correct by the records. An example is the story of Mary Neff's capture by the Indians.

This is the first genealogy of a Neff family of English origin. It is interesting to note that the name Neff, spelled various ways, is a very old one in England and is not necessarily, as once thought, of Swiss origin.

Work on this book began in 1947. A trip to Salem, Mass., resulted in finding the estate settlements of William Neff and of Mary (Corliss) Neff. I also found deeds in the Essex Co. Land Records at Salem which established the fact that Clement Neff was the son of William and Mary Neff of Haverhill and that Clement went first to Westerly, R.I., and then to Windham, Conn., at an early date; also that Mary, wife of Matthias Button² of Plainfield, Conn., was the daughter of William and Mary Neff of Haverhill, Mass.

The first Court record of William Neff is dated 1658, and this 300th anniversary seems an appropriate time to stop. There is, of course, much material which I have been unable to obtain because of unanswered letters, and to the disappearance of a family from the records of one town without clues for the next town.

One other story is of especial interest. One day when we were attempting to make a bureau stand straight and not tilt forward on the uneven floor of our 1760 house in Connecticut, my father suddenly laughed and said, "As my father would say, 'that thing stands comin' like old M's Masten's bureau.'" To my great surprise, I found a deed in the Windham, Conn., land records involving the widow, Mrs. Martha Masten and William Neff, dated Feb. 1746. This means, of course, that the phrase "stands comin' like old M's Masten's bureau" has been passed down as a joking remark for more than 200 years.

My thanks must go to the staff of the Connecticut State Library, especially to Mr. Burt, Miss Case, and Mr. Dennen, for their valuable assistance. My thanks must also go to the many cousins who have assisted in collecting information on various branches of the family: Mrs. Edna Hopkins, Mrs. Cassie Renner, Earl Neff, Hugh Neff and his mother in Wisconsin, Mrs. Ella Cilley in Arizona, Mrs. Margaret Sterling in Texas, Ellery Neff in Connecticut, several in New York state, and last but not least, Mrs. Marcella Neff Fisher of Iowa, whose encouragement and cross-country conversations by letter, have meant everything during the last 11 years. Many other relatives have also contributed, too numerous to mention.

It has been my purpose, whenever I could, to include material which would make people of past generations more real. Much research has been done on the allied families of Button, Dingley, Durkee, Genings or Jennings, Rowley, and Webster. More than usual space has been devoted to the descendants of Matthias and Mary (Neff) Button as the only existing Button genealogy is old and not very satisfactory. Button data includes my findings in Massachusetts and Connecticut Vital Records, and family information supplied by W.L. Campbell of Dixie, Wash. It is hoped everyone will read about these earliest Neff generations.

THE ANCESTRY OF WILLIAM NEFF

This family of Neff is of English origin. The word "nef" is an old one in the English language, meaning ship. In feudal days, the lords of the manor in England had a special gold or silver dish for serving certain foods which was shaped like a ship and called a "nef." Champlain in writing of his explorations along the coast of Maine, spoke of Monhegan Island as a "nef," meaning it looked like a ship in the water.

William Neff was in Newbury, Mass., at a very early date when the settlers there were English. The story of our English origin has been passed down from father to son in many branches of the family along with the name of William Neff, and his wife Mary Neff who was carried off by the Indians with Hannah Dustin in 1697. While it has been impossible to identify the parents of William¹ Neff, efforts have been made and several possibilities are suggested below.

One of the family stories which has been handed down was to the effect that we were related to a Sir William Neff in England, and it seems that there was a Sir William Le Neve in England (1600-1661), herald and genealogist, who lived at a time for William's father to have known him, if he was the first of the family to come to the Colonies, or for William¹ himself, to have known if he came over in his teens. Sir William Le Neve was the son and heir of William Le Neve of Aslacton, County Norfolk, by his first wife, the daughter of John Oldham of Shimpling. Le Neve was appointed Mowbray herald extraordinary under a warrant dated 24 June 1622; York herald 25 Nov. 1625; Norroy King of Arms Dec. 1633 and Clarenceaux King of Arms 23 June 1635, having previously been knighted at Whitehall on 23 April 1634 by Charles I.

Correspondence with the Royal Genealogical Soc. in London has produced the information that Neff, Neffe, Neve, Le Neve, Neave and Le Neave are variants of the same name. Mr. Sheffield Neave, a past President of the Royal Genealogical Soc. in England, wrote me that the name is a very old one in England, going back before the time of William the Conqueror and the prefix "Le" was added during the time of William the Conqueror as a courtesy, but was later dropped. Members of this Neve-Neave family had sugar plantations in the West Indies during the 1600's and 1700's, but all records of this branch of the family were lost in England during the bombings of World War II. It is entirely possible that William¹ Neff's name was spelled Neve or Neave in England and was changed by the different town or court clerks who recorded it as it is spelled in various ways even by them. There were people in New England at an early date who spelled their names Neve and Neave.

Hotten, in his "Original Lists of Persons of Quality Who Went From Great Britain to the American Plantations, 1600-1700," lists one William Nesse 23 yeres" (Possibly Neffe as s and f were written alike), among passengers July 4, 1635. "Theis underwritten names are to be transported to Virginea imbarqued in the Transport of London, Mr. Edward Walker, p." It is possible that this William Nesse or Neffe settled in Vir. or, like others, did not like it there and made his way by boat to Mass., as there was an active¹ coastwise trade by that date. Or if he was the father of William¹ Neff, William might easily have gone from Virginia to Mass. by boat.

The Essex Institute Hist. Coll. Vol. 57, p. 313, refers to the "Bilboa Merchant of Yarmouth whereof one William Neave is Master" and of a trip it made from Yarmouth, England to Boston in 1670. Perhaps this William Neave had made earlier trips to Boston and put his son ashore to try life in the Colonies.

It is also possible that William¹ Neff of this volume was a political refugee from Oliver Cromwell, whose victorious forces

were killing all supporters of the King they could find. The Neff-Neve-Neave family were all strong Royalists and many hundreds of the Kings supporters fled to the Colonies around the time William first appears in the Essex County Court records.

THE ANCESTRY OF MARY (CORLISS) NEFF

Mary Corliss was the daughter of George Corliss, who was born at or near Exeter, Devonshire, England in 1617, the son of Thomas Corliss. He settled in Newbury, Mass., about 1639, at which date he gave his age as 22 years. He moved to Haverhill, Mass., a few years later and on Oct. 26, 1645 married Joanna Davis, by whom he had one son and seven daughters. His was the second marriage to be recorded at Haverhill.

By 1645, George Corliss was one of the 32 landholders in Haverhill. He was an able and industrious man who was able to increase his land holdings very materially over the years. By 1647, he had erected a log house in the densely forested West Parish and in later years his farm was called "Poplar Lawn." He owned most of the land on both sides of the old "Spicket Path," as it was then called, for a distance of more than three miles.

George Corliss was a freeman in 1645. He ^{was} Constable of Haverhill in 1650 and a Selectman 1648, 1652, 1657, 1669 and 1679. By a strange coincidence, George Corliss and his son and grandson died while sitting in the same chair in the Corliss home. George died Oct. 19, 1686. His will dated Oct. 18, probated Nov. 23, 1686, divided his extensive farm among his children, the home farm going to his son, John Corliss, and the farm one mile east to his daughter, Mrs. Mary Neff. Administration of the estate was granted to William Neff.

Joanna Davis, wife of George Corliss, and mother of Mary (Corliss) Neff, was the daughter of Thomas Davis and his wife, Christian Coffin who were married in England before emigrating to this country. Thomas Davis was a sawyer from Marlborough, County Wiltshire, England, who came on the "James" in April 1635, arriving Boston June 3, 1635. He was a freeman June 2, 1641. He was of Newbury 1641 and seems to have settled in Haverhill in the spring of 1642. His name is signed on the deed of purchase of the Haverhill territory from the Indians. Thomas Davis was elected one of the first Selectman of Haverhill at the Town Meeting Jan. 13, 1646. He was a Constable in 1655. He was a Mason. He was born 1603 and died July 27, 1683 and his wife died April 17, 1688, both at Haverhill. Administration of Thomas Davis' estate was granted Oct. 30, 1683, to William Neffe. Another administration was granted in 1728 to his great-grandson, John Corliss. The Davis family traces its origin to Wales from whose patron saint, David, the name is derived.

1. WILLIAM¹ NEFF, born 1639-1642 (he gave his age as 24 yrs. in 1663, Essex Co. Court Rec. Vol. 3, p. 127 and his family gave his age at death as 47 yrs.); "went after ye Army & died at Penaquid (Me.) Feb. 1688/9;" married 23 Jan. 1665, Haverhill, Mass., MARY CORLISS, born 8 Sept. 1646 at Haverhill, Mass. and died there 22 Oct. 1722 (Haverhill V.R.), the daughter of George & Joanna (Davis) Corliss. Mary Neff was a famous Colonial heroine.

The name of William Neff appears in The Records and Files of the Quarterly Courts of Essex County, Mass., in a number of cases between 1658 and 1681. These cases show him to be living first in Newbury and later in Haverhill, Mass. There is enough variety in the

cases to give a rather surprisingly clear picture of life in those hard, rough days of struggle; of the tremendous effort it took to carve a home and farm and to bring up a family in the midst of a virgin forest while constantly in danger from Indian raids incited by the French; and of the various ways of adding to the family income.

William Neff appears first in the Court Records May 6, 1658 in Newbury, at which time he was working for John Knight, one of the first settlers at Newbury, who was licensed to run an Inn. Joseph Muzzey also worked at the Inn altho he had inherited a farm from his father. The Court Records show William lived at John Knight's house and altho he is referred to as his servant in one case, William was free to come and go for social affairs and on other jobs, so he could not have been a Bond Servant. (See Court Rec. in Appendix) The cases also show him to have been a hard working man and of an independent spirit.

On May 14, 1663, William Neff was made the Town Herdsman of Newbury, a position of importance and trust, as horses and cattle were of very great value and scarcity at that date. The following document is from the Essex Co. Quarterly Court Records Vol. 3, p. 126 & 127.

"The herdsmen's covenant: Agreed May 14, 1663 between the selectmen and William Neph, that the latter is to spend his whole time this somer, and to do his utmost endeavor to keep up the townes dry cattell and horses out of the cow commons, and to search the severall comons as there shalbe need, to cleare the dry cattell and horses out of the same, and also the hedge first being amended, the said William is to amend such gapps as he shall find in the hedge, and thus to continue as long as the selectmen shall see meet, and when they shall appoint, he shall bring downe all the cattell and horses also, the first time it is agreed that the said cattell shalbe brought unto their places, for the said Willaim to take them to Granell Hill, at the pound, at John Bartlet's barne & at Goodman Pilsbury where the said William is to attend & drive them up. And the said William is to have for his labour 15 shillings pr weeke, one halfe in english corne and the other halfe in Indian. The which the said William is to demand it of the severall persons which are the owners of the cattell at the end of the time, and if it be not ready he is to appoint them where to pay it in the towne, as at Abraham Tappans & Richard Doles houses, within 10 days following and if payment be not made the said William is to sue the said owners that do not pay and the selectman is to assist him in it what is meet." Copy made by Anthony Somerby.

On Dec. 6, 1664, William Neff was a witness for John Knight in Court (Vol. 3, p. 346), while on the next page William Neph won the verdict in a case against John Woolcott for an unpaid debt.

John Knight testified that "about the 6 of last March was twelmunth, and John Woolcot came to deponent's house to talk with William Neph to help him work at Posskataque and agreed to give said Neph 3^l per month and his diet, in cotton and English wool at price current. In case he did not like the wool offered, Woolcott was to pay him in boards at 40s per thousand, as he was to have such pay of Capt. Barfut. Said Neph lived at deponent's house when the bargain was made and he went away with his things and stayed about 9 weeks. Sworn in Court.

"John Wilson deposed that Neph worked with him for John Woolcott upon a saw mill above Poskataka eight weeks. Sworn in Court.

"William Neph's bill of costs for going for John Wilson to Grenland etc. l 11:17s:8d."

On Jan. 23, 1665, William Neff married Mary Corliss at Haverhill, Mass. George Corliss gave them a farm from his extensive

land holdings and William built a house on it. His name is on a list of those who had already built new houses on the common or their own land, dated 1668. Here William and Mary had six children, five boys and a daughter Mary.

People in those days saw little "hard money" and what they had was hoarded against a very special occasion. In order to buy articles of food or clothing, farm implements, etc. which could not be made at home, William, like other settlers, paid in goods. From the wonderful white oak trees he chopped down to clear farm land, he made "white oak pipe staves," "White oak hogshead staves and hogshead heading 2 ft. 3 in. in length"; also "cedar clapboards" all delivered at the Haverhill Landing (See Appendix). Other items of trade were wheat and pork. One interesting list of purchases in 1678 was: "2 yds holland 11s; stockings 9s; 2 Hatts p.Jno. Adkinson 9s 8d; Thread & Cooten 8s 9d; 17½ pd. sugar 10s 4d; cotten wooll 15s 3d; total 3 11:4s." William loved horses and bred and sold them, as did a number of his descendants.

William Neff was also a surveyor. One such job which he did with Joseph Kingsbury in Sept. 1684, was for Thomas Woodbury and Joseph Beason of Beverly (Essex Inst. Hist. Coll. Vol. 68, p. 186). Under date of 1667 appears the following interesting document in Records of the Mass. Bay Colony (Shurtleff Vol. 4, Pt. 2, p. 381):

"The bounds & Scittuation of M^r Edward Michelson farme of three hundred acres of land, granted vnto him by the honoured Generall Court, it being lajed out to the westward of Hauerill bounds, & it is bounded wth land lajed out for Jeremy Belchar, of Ipswich, vpon the north; the sajd north ljne extendeth two hundred rod; & at the west end of the sajd north ljne it is bounded wth a black oake tree marked, & wth a white oake tree marked at the east corner of the sajd north ljne, & bounded vpon the east wth land of the sajd Belchars; the east ljne extendeth two hundred twentje five rods vnto a white oake tree marked, & wth land of the sajd Belchars on y^e south, vnto a pine tree marked; the sajd south ljne rangeth two hundred rod vpon the square; the west ljne is bounded vpon the countrys land, & extendeth one hundred & sixty rod, vnto the first mentioned black oake tree; & the circular strip of land that joynes to the square conteynes about sixty acres, and it is sufficiently bounded wth heap of stones & trees marked; and at the west end of the sajd strip it is bounded wth two heaps of stones, one vpon each side of the sajd strip. The aboue mentioned farme was lajd out & bounded as is herein exprest by vs whose names are herevnto subscribed, the 23 June 1667.

The Court allowes of this returne."

In June 1683, a town meeting discussed once more the question of replacing the Meeting House which was too small for the increasing population and was also in poor condition. Apparently all agreed a new church was needed but 15 voted to tear down the present Meeting House and re-build on the same site, while 34, including William Neff and his father-in-law, George Corliss, voted to use the building they had until a new Meeting House could be built on a new site.

In Feb. 1688/9 William was drafted for the army by the much-hated Gov. Andros and went with a party of men to Maine and died at Pemaquid. At this time his youngest son, Thomas, was only 12. Thomas and his older brother John, according to family tradition, settled in Penn. and Del., but I have been unable to establish this, to date.

MARY NEFF, COLONIAL HEROINE

Mary Corliss Neff was born at Haverhill, Mass., in Sept. 1646, the daughter of George Corliss, one of the leading men in Haverhill. Mr. Corliss was a proprietor and was made a freeman in 1645, which meant that he could take part in running church and civil government affairs. He was elected Constable of Haverhill in 1650 and was elected a Town Selectman repeatedly. He was a man of means and had extensive land holdings. First he built a strong log house in the heavily forested West Parish of Haverhill and later a fine two story house, so that life was always as comfortable for the Corliss family as was possible in that frontier town.

Mary was trained in all the household arts and duties and, as the oldest of eight children, she undoubtedly had plenty of opportunity to practice all she had been taught. She grew up strong and healthy, which was fortunate in view of her later experiences. Life was relatively peaceful in her younger years, but after she had been married only a few weeks, the following document came to Haverhill which can be found now in the Rec. of the Court of Assistants of the Colony of Mass. Bay, Vol. 3, p. 158.

Court Files, Suffolk, no. 725

First paper:-

"Y^{OU} are hereby Required in his Majesties name to (sum)mon & require Mathias Button & sarah his daughter, Edward yeomans & his wife, Abraham whitacre & Elisabeth his wife, Robert swan & Elisabeth his wife, Abigaille Remington wife to John Rimington & John their sonne, Joseph Johnson & the wife of W^m Holdrige, Ephraim Davis, Willjam s symons, samuel symons & Mary the wife of Willjam Neafe all of Hauer hill to make their seuerall appearances before the next Court of Asistant^s to be held at Boston on the first tuesday in march next at eight o'clock in the morning then & there to give in their particular and seuerall evidences what they know of & concerning John Godfrey of Nubery being a witch or of any act of witchcraft done by

him he being bound over to that Court in order to his trial on the Complaint of Job Tyler & John Rimington making y^r returne hereof to the Secretary at or before the time prefixed hereof yo^u are no^t to faile dated in Boston the 6th of february 1665.

By order of the County Court Sitting in Boston
4th february 1665. Edw: Rawson Secretary

On the back is written:

"Thi^s warent wa^s serued vpon each perticular person
According to the tennor of it arest sarah butten and () lues not
in Hauerhill

by me George Browne Constable of Hauerhill.

I have no evidence that these people ever testified in a witch trial of John Godfrey, but the summons must have caused considerable excitement in town.

As the years passed, William and Mary Neff were blessed with six children. Their home was on a rise of ground on the left side of the road running from the compact part of Haverhill out to the farm where Thomas & Hannah Duston lived after their marriage in 1677. Later on, their son William enlisted in His Majesty's Army serving elsewhere in Mass. and in Nov. 1686, their only daughter, Mary Neff Jr. married Matthias Button Jr.

At this point, the relationship between the Neff, Button and Duston families should be given. Matthias Button Sr. married, as his fourth wife, the widow Elizabeth (Wheeler) Duston, on June 9, 1663. The new Mrs. Button had a young son, Thomas Duston (who later became the husband of the Hannah Duston of our story. In 1663, Thomas Duston was about 11 years old and by his mother's second marriage, he suddenly acquired five young brothers and sisters; Hannah Button also 11 years old, Daniel 9, Abigail 7, Matthias Jr. 5, Peter 3 and they all grew up together in the same household. Matthias Button Sr., being a man of some means, saw to it that Thomas Duston, along with his own sons, received a good education and he trained them all to be industrious and thrifty. The benefit of this training showed in the adult lives of Thomas Duston of Haverhill and of Matthias Button Jr. who is recorded in history as one of the leading citizens of Plainfield, Conn.

By 1697, the year of the Haverhill massacre, we find Mrs. Mary Neff all alone except for her son Joseph. Mrs. Neff's husband "went after ye Army and died in Feb. 1688/9, at Pemaquid, Me.", perhaps killed by an Indian arrow. Her oldest son, William, had also been killed by Indians in 1691 (see #2 William Neff). Her three younger sons, who were all in their twenties by 1697, had left Haverhill for life adventures elsewhere. About 1690 or 91, Matthias and Mary (Neff) Button Jr. had migrated to Plainfield, Conn. so that Mrs. Neff's only daughter was too far away to see any more. It is easy to imagine that Hannah Duston and her babies, who lived nearby, filled an empty corner in Mary's heart.

An early writer has pictured Mrs. Mary Neff as having a very cheerful disposition and as being always ready to help others. Thus we find her, on that fateful March 15th, 1697, at the Duston home taking care of Hannah Duston and her 6-day old baby, Martha. The Rev. Cotton Mather in his Magnalia, gives one of the most complete and reliable accounts of this entire affair. In it he refers to Mary Neff as Hannah's nurse and she was certainly acting in that capacity at the moment. But the relationship between Mary Neff and Hannah Duston was a lot more than that: they were neighbors and friends and Mary's daughter and Hannah were sisters-in-law.

On the morning of March 15th, Thomas Duston had taken the

older children with him when he went to work in a nearby field. He had taken his gun with him, not that he was expecting Indian trouble because there had been no incidents since the previous August, when two neighbors had been killed and their sons carried into captivity. But for years, the men of Haverhill had always kept a gun with them wherever they went as they never knew when the Indians might attack.

The English had tried to maintain friendly relations with the Indians but the French in Canada never ceased in their efforts to win the New World from the English and did all they could to incite the Indians against the English. They even offered the Indians bounties for English scalps and for live English captives who were then sold into slavery to the French in Canada. The result was that every time roving bands of Indians came near an English town, they were looking for scalps and captives. Just such a band was in the forest near Haverhill on the night of March 14th. The first warning came when Thomas Duston suddenly saw a number of Indians approaching the field where he was at work. Telling his children to hurry to the nearest garrison house, he grabbed his gun and jumped on his horse to ride home and try to save his wife and baby. But the Indians were so close he saw he could do nothing for her and returned to join his children. By means of walking behind the children while pointing his gun at the Indians, he managed to get them to the garrison house, probably that of Onesiphorus Marsh. No one will ever know why the Indians did not shoot them all.

At the Duston house, all was pandemonium and terror. Mrs. Neff picked up the baby and tried to run with her to safety. However, she was 50 years old and could not out-run the Indian warrior who soon caught her and brought her back. Meanwhile, Hannah was ordered out of bed and told to dress herself, while the Indians ransacked her house and grabbed up everything they could carry off. Then they dragged her out, minus one shoe (so it is said), and set fire to the house. A few of the Indians hustled Hannah and Mary with the baby toward the woods. Stories vary as to the cause, but suddenly an Indian snatched little Martha out of Mary Neff's arms and swung it against an apple tree, dashing out its brains. One can imagine the feelings which filled Hannah Duston's heart at this point. The Indians rushed the two women along until they reached the spot in the woods where the squaws and children had been left. Here they were joined by other warriors who had killed twenty-seven and captured thirteen inhabitants of Haverhill.

Fearing pursuit, the Indians pushed on for about 12 miles that night. Several of the weaker captives who could not keep up the rapid pace, were killed and scalped and left beside the path. Hannah Duston must surely have met this same horrible fate, since she was sick and doubtless filled with shock and grief at the wanton killing of her baby, had she not been helped along by the strong arm and encouragement of her friend, Mary Neff. The party pushed rapidly on for 150 miles or more, through dense forests and over rough, rocky ground. In March, it must have been a cold, terrible journey, with snow still on the ground and icy brooks to be crossed.

The group which claimed Mary and Hannah consisted of 12 men women and children. One of the Indian men had lived in the family of Rev. Mr. Rowlandson of Lancaster, some years before; he had learned to speak English and had been taught to pray. Later he had been converted by French priests and, strangely enough, would not let the children eat or sleep without saying their prayers. But the Indians tried to prevent Mary and Hannah from praying! With this Indian family was a 14 year old boy, named Samuel Lennardson, who had been captured at Worcester about a year and a half before.

During the march northward, the Indians told the two women that when they reached the Indian Town, they would be stripped and made to run the gantlet. They described in frightening detail how they would be forced to run between two lines of Indians, men, women and children, who would beat them with clubs, tomahawks, etc.

Spurred on by these tales, the cruel treatment they were receiving, and a desire to avenge the death of her baby, Hannah Duston is said to have planned a way of escape which she was able to tell Mary and Samuel about, secretly. Samuel, who also wanted to escape, got his master, Bampico, to tell him how he killed and scalped the English. Bampico responded with full details, little suspecting the thought behind the question.

The band of 12 Indians and their three captives parted from the other Indians and Haverhill captives, about March 30, 1697, when they reached the Indians' home on an island at the junction of the Contoocook and Merimac Rivers. This is now Penacook, N. H., about 5 miles north of Concord, N. H. Now that they were "home" and the island was surrounded by rivers full of spring flood waters, the Indians relaxed. Samuel Lennardson was considered one of the family and the two women were obviously too worn out to try to escape, so the Indians all went to sleep that night without setting a guard.

This was just the opportunity the captives had been hoping for. A little before midnight, when the Indians were all soundly asleep, Hannah, Mary and Samuel, each armed with a tomahawk or hatchet, stole silently to a position near the heads of the sleeping Indians. All three tomahawks fell as one, and so quickly and quietly did the three move along, 10 of the 12 Indians were killed, with only one severely wounded squaw, and a small boy they had intended to take home with them, escaping into the woods.

A deposition sworn to before Joshua Bayley of Haverhill, June 28, 1739, is of interest here. "The deposition of the Widow Hannah Bradley of Haverhill of full age who testifieth & saith that about forty years past the said Hannah together with the widow Mary Neff were taken prisoners by the Indians & carried together into captivity, & above penny cook the Deponent was by the Indians forced to travel farther than the rest of the Captives, and the next night but one there came to us one Squaw who said that Hannah Duston and the aforesaid Mary Neff assisted in killing the Indians of her wigwam except herself and a boy, herself escaping narrowly, shewing to myself & others seven wounds as she said with a Hatchet on her head which wounds were given her when the rest were killed, and further saith not." Hannah Bradley signed with her mark. The General Court granted Joseph Neff two hundred acres of land. (See #4 Joseph Neff for more on this).

Hannah, Mary and Samuel quickly loaded one of the canoes with some food and weapons, including the gun of Hannah's captor and the hatchet and scalping knife said to have been used by Hannah (now on view at the Duston Family Assoc. quarters in Haverhill). They hastily chopped holes in the other canoes so they could not be used for pursuit, and started out. Hannah is said to have insisted on a return to the island to secure the Indian's scalps as a proof of their story. In any event, the 10 scalps were wrapped in linen stolen from Hannah's house and taken back to Haverhill.

They traveled at night, taking turns guiding the canoe down the Merrimac river and sleeping. They hid during the day, in constant fear of pursuit and roving bands of Indians. They finally reached the home of John Lovell at what is now Nashua, N. H. A monument was erected there in 1902 commemorating the event. The next morning the weary travelers reached Bradley's Cove, leaving the canoe there and going the rest of the way to Haverhill on foot. The two women had been given up for lost, so that one can imagine the joy and excitement their return and their story created.

Although the bounty of 50 pounds on Indian scalps had been revoked in 1696, Mr. Duston felt that the two women and the boy had done a tremendous thing in destroying some of the enemies who were killing innocent women and children. So after the three had had a chance to rest and recover somewhat from their experiences, they all went to Boston with their trophies, arriving April 21, 1697.

Mr. Duston filed the following petition which was read in the House of Representatives June 8, 1697 (Mass. Archives Vol. 70, p. 350):

"To the Right Honorable the Lieut Governor & the Great & General assembly of the Province of the Massachusetts Bay now convened in Boston

The Humble Petition of Thomas Durstan of Haverhill Sheweth

That the wife of ye petitioner (with one Mary Neff) hath in her Late captivity among the Barbarous Indians, been disposed & assisted by heaven to do an extraordinary action, in the just slaughter or so many of the Barbarians, as would by the law of the Province which---- a few months ago, have entitled the actors unto considerable recompense from the Publick.

That tho the----of that good Law-----no claims to any such consideration from the publick, yet your petitioner humbly----that the merit of the action still remains the same; & it seems a matter of universall desire thro the whole Province that it should not pass unrecompensed.

And that your petitioner having lost his estate in that calamity wherein his wife was carried into her captivity render him the fitter object for what consideration the public Bounty shall judge proper for what hath been herein done, of some consequence, not only unto the persons more immediately delivered, but also unto the Generall Interest

Wherefore humbly Requesting a favorable Regard on this occasion

Your Petitioner shall pray &c

Thomus Du(r)stun."

The day the petition was read in the House of Representatives, it was voted "that the above named Thomas Durstan in behalf of his wife shall be allowed & paid out of the publick Treasury Twenty-five pounds: & Mary Neff the sum of Twelve pounds Ten Shillings, and the young man (Samuel Lenerson) concerned in the same action the like sum of Twelve pounds Ten Shillings." The larger sum granted to Mr. Duston was probably because of his "lost estate"; in other words, the burning of his house and household goods.

The unusual and astonishing exploit of Mary Neff, Hannah Duston, and Samuel Leonardson created quite a stir throughout the Colonies and the two women received many gifts. The only one which seems to have been preserved is the silver tankard presented to them by Gov. Sir Francis Nicholson of Maryland, now in the possession of the Duston Family Association at Haverhill, Mass. There are three statues commemorating these three people and their tremendous adventure. The first one was erected in 1861 at Haverhill, a block of Italian marble five feet square and 24 feet high. The second statue was erected at Penacook, N. H. in 1874 and the third stands in G.A.R. Park, Haverhill (1879).

In spite of this exciting experience, Mary Neff lived at Haverhill, in her own home, to the age of 76 years. The following inventory of her estate appears in the Essex Co., Mass., Probate Records #19221. The Inventory was taken in 1722 by Daniel Little, Phillip Hasletine and Jonathan Emerson.

The material for the story of Mary Neff was obtained from a considerable number of historical sources. The story of the capture of Mary and Hannah, Mary's attempt to carry the baby to safety and the baby's death, their rising in the night to kill and scalp their Indian captors and their escape was the same story in the records as my father had told me as a child, as grandpa had told him, and so on back thru the generations. In fact this story has been passed down with remarkable accuracy from generation to generations in all branches of the Neff family which I have been able to trace. We are proud to have this brave, strong woman for our ancestor.

2. WILLIAM² NEFF (William¹) born 5 May 1667 at Haverhill, Mass. No record of his marriage has been found, and only two incidents in connection with him in the army. He went into the regular army according to an incident in the Records of the Courts of Assistants, Colony of Massachusetts Bay, 1630-1692, Vol. I. Pages are devoted to the trial of various men involved but William was acquitted of guilt in the affair and set free. It seems that the ketch, Mary of Salem, was boarded at Falmouth in "Martyn's vinyard sound" by Thomas Pound and others. They ran up "red Flaggs from the masthead" and robbed the boat, committing an act of piracy.

Court "Adjourned to Munday the 20th of January instant 1689 at one o'clock and then met." Thomas Darforth Esq., Deputy Governor presided.

"William Neffe being imprisoned upon accusation for deserting their Ma^{ties} Garrison at Falmouth where he was posted a private Centinel, and confederating with Thomas Pound Thomas Hawkinsin their piracy, said Neffe appearing in Court and it being certified that he was enticed and deluded away from the Garrison by his Corporal And that he tooke the first Opportunity to leave the pirates, Escaping from them and applyed himselfe to the next Magistrate. The Court discharged him He paying for a Gun which he had of the Country^s Store and saith he disposed of it for his Support."

Court "Adjourned to Thursday the 23rd of January instant

at nine in the morning and then met." It was ordered that "Thomas Pound, Thomas Hawkins, Thomas Johnston William Coward and Eleazer Buck, five of the condemned prison^rs," sentenced to be hanged by their neckes, "be executed on Munday next the twenty."

In the Documentary History of Maine, Vol. 5, there is an account of an expedition to Maine, by boat, which was ambushed by the Indians on Aug. 7th, 1691. "A list of men killed and wounded in y^e late Expedytyn Estward viz^t" includes the name "William Neff" without specifying whether he was killed or wounded, but since no further record has been found of him, it is assumed that he was killed.

3. MARY² NEFF (William¹) was born 9 Nov. 1668 at Haverhill, Mass. (Haverhill Vit. Rec.); married 24 Nov. 1686, at Haverhill, MATTHIAS² BUTTON (Haverhill Vit. Rec.), born 17 May 1657/58 at Haverhill (Vit. Rec.), the son of Matthias¹ Button and his 3rd wife Teagle. Matthias² died in 1725 at Plainfield, Conn. and Mary died there at a later date.

Matthias & Mary (Neff) Button lived at Haverhill first, but soon after 1690, they, in company with his sister Sarah and her husband James² (Henry¹) Kingsbury and several other Mass. families, took the "Old Conn. Path" down to eastern Conn. where they took possession of the Quinebaug land east of the Appaquee or Little River which they had purchased from the sons of Gov. John Winthrop of Mass. This was the settlement of the town of Plainfield, Conn., the third town to be settled in Windham County. Disturbed and troubled times followed as this same tract of land was claimed by a group of Conn. men, headed by Messrs. Fitch and Tracy, who claimed the land had been given to them by the Indians. Fortunately their Indian neighbors, who were numerous, were friendly and willing to share their hunting, fishing and planting grounds with them. Eventually the claims of Mass. and Conn. men were straightened out.

Matthias Button and his wife were admitted to membership in the First Church of Stonington, Conn. May 16, 1697 (Ch. Rec. Vol. W, p. 190, Vol. 1, p. 10, etc).

At the time the town of Plainfield was granted a Town Charter in 1699, 15 men were listed as settlers there, among them Matthias Button. In 1704, Matthias Button was one of 24 proprietors who each received an allotment of 100 acres. In 1725 an epidemic of some sort hit the town and so many people were sick that neighboring towns had to be called upon for help. Many of the town's leading citizens died, including Matthias Button.

As proof that the Mary Neff who married Matthias² Button was the daughter of William & Mary (Corliss) Neff of Haverhill, we have the following deed to be found in Vol. 67, p. 205 of the Essex County Land Records at Salem, Mass.

Mathias Button to Joseph Kneff. Received on Record December 25th 1734.

"To All People to whom these Presents shall come Mathias Button of Plainfield in the County of New London and Colony of Conn. in New England Yeoman Sends Greeting. Know ye that I y^e s^d Mathias Button in Consideration of y^e Sum of thirteen pounds of payable money of New England in hand to me at & before of Ensealing and Delivery of the Presents well and truly paid by my brother Joseph Kneff of Haverhill in the County of Essex and Province of Mass. Bay in New England...have given granted Remised Released and forever quit claimed and by these Presents confirmed unto and upon the s^d Joseph Kneff and his heirs and Assigns forever all right and title and property interest...which I s^d Mathias Button and Mary my wife now have or may be thought to have...of the estate which our father

THE ANCESTRY OF MATTHIAS² BUTTON

Contrary to what some early writers would have us believe, Matthias¹ Button, born 1607, was christened 11 Oct. 1607 at the Parish Church, Harrold, England, the son of Thomas Button, an Englishman. Thomas Button was born about 1575 in England and died at Harrold, England 23 June 1617. This Thomas Button was a direct descendant of Sir Thomas Button who was appointed Bishop of Exeter, England, 25 Jan. 1292/3. (Inf. taken from Parish Reg. of Harrold, England).

Matthias¹ Button came to Salem 6 Sept. 1628 with Gov. John Endicott. He removed to Boston where he and wife Lettice had Mary, bp. 23 Feb. 1634 and Daniel bp. 22 Feb. 1635 at the 1st Church of Boston. Lettice died and Matthias¹ next appears in the Ipswich Town Records on 16 Nov. 1639 in the sale of "a house lot on High St."... "being granted at two several grants to John Thornton, deceased, and falling into the hands of the sayed Button by marriage of Joane, late wife of the sayed John Thornton"... "the sayed Matthias Button together with the consent of Joane his sayed wife doth quitt all title" etc. Matthias then moved to Haverhill where his name appears on a tax list in 1650. Mary, daughter of Matthias & Lettice married Edward Yeomans at Haverhill 6 Dec. 1652, and Sarah, presumably the daughter of Matthias' 2nd marriage, married James Kingsbury there 6 Jan. 1673 and were among the original settlers of Plainfield, Conn. No record has been found of the death of the first son Daniel nor of Matthias' marriage to his 3rd wife, Teagle but at Haverhill, Matthias & Teagle had the following children: Hannah b. 11 May 1652, Daniel b 10 April 1654 and killed at the Bloody Brook Battle 18 Sept. 1675, Abigail b. 16 June 1656, Matthias b. 17 March 1657/8, Peter b. 17 July 1660 and Patience b. 1 June 1662 and d. Oct. 1662. Teagle died 4 Feb. 1663 and Matthias then married his 4th wife, the widow Elizabeth (Wheeler) Duston, 9 June 1663. Matthias¹ Button died 13 Aug. 1672 and Elizabeth, his widow died 16 July 1690. The foregoing data is from the Haverhill Vit. Rec. This 4th marriage of Matthias Button made Thomas Duston, son of Elizabeth, and his famous wife, Hannah Duston brother and sister-in-law to Matthias² Button and his wife, Mary² Neff. It was Mary (Neff) Button's mother who was captured with Hannah Duston at the time of the Indian Massacre of 1697. (See under William¹ Neff).

More space is devoted to the descendants of Mary Neff Button than might have been, because of the six children of William¹ and Mary Neff, it has been possible to trace the descendants of only two, Mary and Clement Neff.

The will of Matthias Button of Preston, folder #2062, Conn. State Library, mentions his wife Hannah, two grandsons, Matthias and Zebulon, sons of Zebulon deceased, eldest dau. Hannah, wife of Zadock Killam, dau. Miriam, wife of Daniel Amos of Preston, dau. Biah and her husband Elnathan Maynor of Windham and dau. Zipporah Thomas and her heirs. The estate was valued at £537:04:05, including the homestead at Preston at £400, a tract of land in Stonington £48:08:00, and various farm animals and personal and household items. This would indicate that Matthias Button was a very well-to-do man for those days.

The will of his widow, dated 18 Jan. 1772 is interesting because of its provisions. She bequeathed to "my beloved daughter Hannah Killam, 1 cow, the one half of my pewter and

my Best Gown and Quilt. To my grand Daughter Zipporah Thomas Daughter of my Daughter Zipporah, one cow, five Sheep, two Beds and Bedding, Two pots, one Kettle and my Two Wheels, Side Saddle, Two Tables and a Chest and Seven pounds money. To Grand Daughter Sarah Killam one Bed & Bedding. To grand sons Matthias Button and Zebulon Button to each of them 5 shillings money. To Daughter Zipporah Thomas a Chest, my Brass Kettle and Warming pan & Single Petticoat. To Grand Daughter Zipporah Thomas the one half of my pewter, my Loom and all the Tackling Belonging to it and all the yarn she now has spun and all the yarn I have spun & all I have to make yarn of. To my Daughter Bial Maynor five Shillings. All the Remainder of my Estate I give to my two Daughters Zipporah Thomas and Miriam Tracy to be Equally divided Between them." Son-in-law, Zadock Killam appointed Executor. One of the witnesses to the will was Benjamin Tracy. This will is in folder #2052, Conn. State Library.

VIII. Zerviah³ b. 13 Sept 1708; mar. 5 Oct. 1727, Daniel Lamb, the son of Isaac & Elizabeth Lamb. (Groton V.R. Vol. 1, p. 43). The estate and will of Daniel Lamb, folder #1856, Conn. State Library, show him to have been a well-to-do man for the times. His will was dated 18 Dec. 1770 and was probated in 1783. The estate was valued at £696:17:09 and included 170 acres of land and buildings at £510. He bequeathed to his "beloved wife Zerviah Lamb, to his son Daniel £15, to son Samuel all Lands, buildings, tools, etc., to daughter Zurviah Billings £12, to daughter Eunice Lamb household goods to equal those given to daughter Freeloove Chapman and £12, to daughter Freeloove Chapman £12, to granddaughter Anne Lamb, daughter of son Nehemiah Lamb deceased, lands given to her father. Son Samuel was to have the cattle, sheep, hogs, etc. and to be the Executor of the will.

4. JOSEPH² NEFF (William¹) born 25 March 1670 at Haverhill, Mass; died 4 Feb. 1741/2. (Haverhill Vit. Rec). Joseph, so far as the records show, never married but continued to live all his life in Haverhill on the Neff farm of his parents and other lands which he acquired.

Joseph petitioned the General Court for a grant of land in consideration of his mother's services in assisting Hannah Dustin in killing "divers Indians." In his petition he declared that his mother was "kept a prisoner a considerable time" and "in their return home past through the utmost hazard of their lives and suffered distressing want, being almost starved before they could return to their dwellings." The Court granted Joseph Neff 200 acres of land in 1738 in return for Mary's heroism killing Indians.

Joseph purchased his brother Clement's share in the estate of their father, William Neff, and of their mother, Mary Neff, and also the share of his sister, Mary Neff Button, and her husband, Mathias Button. This seems to have taken years to accomplish, probably due to the difficulty of transmitting money and deeds to Haverhill, as Clement's deed was written in 1711 at Westerly, R.I., but neither this deed nor the deed from the Buttons was entered in

the Haverhill, Mass. records until Dec. 25, 1734. (Essex Co. Land Rec. Vol. 67, p. 167 and p. 205). Joseph paid Clement 14 pounds and Mary 13 pounds.

On Feb. 19, 1719/20, "Mary Neff of Haverhill, the relict and widow of William Neff late of said Town of Haverhill deceased and Joseph Neff of Haverhill son of said Mary Neff of y^e County of Essex in the Province of y^e Mass. Bay" etc. sold about 20 acres of land to "Jonathan Hasletine son of Nathaniel Hasletine." On 10 Feb. 1723, several months after his mother's death, Joseph sold for five pounds to Philip Hasletine one acre 60 rods of land "in forme of a gore." Both of these deeds were recorded at Haverhill 1 July 1724. (Land Rec. Vol. 42, p. 235).

Capt. John White sold to Joseph Neff on 20 July 1723, for "forty & three pounds & ten shillings a certain piece of land containing about fourteen acres & a halfe which Capt. White had purchased of John Merrill and which Merrill had purchased of Capt. Simon Wainright, bounded partly by land of Corp. Samuel Ayer and partly by Hawks meadow way." (Haverhill Land Rec. Vol. 41, p. 103).

That Joseph was still taking care of his mother at the time of her death is shown by the account he rendered the Court "for taking care of his mother for two years together in her old age several of the last years of her life she being very weakly and indisposed ... which made it very troublesome and costly to get nursis and wathors so that I think I cant afford it." The total sum for nurses, funeral and Court expenses paid him by the Ipswich Court on 12 March 1724 was 118 pounds 20s.

The mystery is, what happened to the more than 200 acres of land etc. which Joseph owned when he died? There is nothing in either the Land or Probate Records of Essex Co. to indicate their having been sold or willed to anyone.

5. JOHN² NEFF (William¹) b. 16 May 1672 at Haverhill, Mass. (Haverhill Vit. Rec.).

The only mention of John Neff which we have found was in the Coffin Papers Vol. 1, p. 42 (Joshua Coffin, Newbury historian). "Soldiers in the Canada Expedition - The names of such sold^{rs} y^t voluntarily listed o^rselves for y^e canada expedition out of maj^r S: regement.....John Neph. Y^e above nam^d sold. listed and was wth me from June 26 to July 4." No date given but the next date in the Coffin Papers is 1691.

6. CLEMENT² NEFF (William¹) b. 29 March 1674, Haverhill, Mass.; died 3 June 1746, Stonington, Conn.; married MARY _____, possibly Mary Button b. 6 Oct. 1689, Stonington, Conn., the daughter of Peter² Button (Matthias¹). Mrs. Neff died at Windham, Conn. in 1752.

It is interesting to speculate as to just when Clement Neff left Haverhill, Mass. Possibly he accompanied his sister, Mrs. Matthias Button (Mary Neff²) and her family to Plainfield, Conn., in 1690 or perhaps he went directly to Westerly, R.I., or Stonington with Matthias' brother, Peter Button. He was in Westerly previous to 1708 as on 5 Apr. 1708 we find in the Westerly Land Records that "Thomas Reynolds of Westerly, yeoman" sold 50 acres of land to "Clement Neff of Westerly" for 13 pounds (Vol. 2, p. 208). On 9 Sept 1711, Clement paid 1s:9d for a share in common land at Westerly (Vol. 2, p. 115). Referring to a "List of Sales of Vacant Lands in Naragansett," we find that on 2 Oct 1711 there is a General Recorder's deed quit-claiming and confirming to 31 men of Westerly, one of whom was "Clemond Neff," 5300 acres as platted & bounded southerly by the Pawcatuck river, easterly by Maxon's purchase, northerly by vacant lands and westerly by the Colony line. (Westerly L.R. Vol. 2, p. 113. See Potter's Early History of the Narragansett Country

p. 219).

An interesting deed appears in the Essex Co., Mass. Land Records, establishing beyond a doubt, the parents of the Clement Neff who went to Westerly, R. I., and Windham, Conn. (Vol. 67, p. 167).

"Clement Neff to Joseph Neff, red^d on Record December 25, 1734.

"Know All men by these presents that I Clement Neff of the Town of Westerly in the Province of Rhode Island on the consideration of fourteen pounds part in hand paid & the Rest Secured by Bill under the Hand of my brother Joseph Neff of Haverhill in Essex in New England Do hereby acquit all Manner of claime from all & every part both real & Personal of Y^e estate of my Father William Neff of Haverhill Dec^d & of my Mother Mary Neff both for myself and my Heirs forever. Witness my hand and seal this 22nd Day of October 1711.

Clement Neff was proposed as a freeman of Westerly 28 Sept. 1715. However he did not tarry long to enjoy his new privileges, as on 23 March 1716, "Clement Neff of Westerly, cordwainer, sold a total of 63 acres for 125 pounds; to James Winslow, cordwainer, of Freetown, Colony of Mass." This deed was signed by Clement and Mary Neff. He then moved his family to the part of Windham (now Hampton) which had been recently opened for settlement.

The deed of Clement's first purchase of land in Windham is preserved in silk at the Windham County Court House, Willimantic, Conn. It is dated 28 June 1715, and says in part, "To all people to whom this deed of sale shall come greeting. Know ye that I Joseph Dingley of Windham in the County of Hartford in the Colony of Conn. for in consideration of the full sum of forty-two pounds current money of New England to me in hand" received from "Clement Neff late of Westerly in the Colony of Rhode Island in New England before but now resident in Canterbury in ye County of New London" etc.... "do fully freely and absolutely give grant bargain and confirm unto the s^d Clement Neff his heirs and assigns forever all that my hundred acre lot situat lying and being in the northe easterly part of s^d Windham and is the fourth lot in the second tear and the first bound begins at a walnut tree which is the east corner from thence runs westerly by the highway a hundred rod to a white oak stake from thence northerly by a hundred acre lot of Mr. Webb's and sixty rod to a sassifax from thence easterly by a hundred acre lot of M^r Sam Whitings a hundred rod to a stake from thence southerly by Christopher Bidlakes land a hundred and sixty rod to the first mentioned bounds," etc. The deed was witnessed by John Fitch and Joshua Ripley (Windham L.R. Vol. E, p. 147). Record of a second purchase of 100 acres for 134 from William More appears in Book E, p. 195.

Land was good, and it was cheap, in this northeast section of Windham and as word spread around about it, more and more people came to settle there. By early 1717, the inhabitants felt that they were numerous enough to have a church of their own and accordingly they petitioned the General Assembly as follows: "We, inhabitants of the Northeast part of Windham, having obtained the consent of the said Windham that we should be a society distinct for the carrying on of public worship of God, do now pray your Honors to confirm

and establish us a parish," etc. There were 16 signatures, of which the ninth was Clement Neff. This petition was to create Canada Parish, April, 1717. The General Assembly acted with promptness in granting this petition. Canada Parish became the Town of Hampton, Conn., at a later date.

Three more purchases of land are recorded in 1723: 100 acres from Daniel Edward on 9 May for £27 (Bk. F, p. 77); 100 acres from Joshua Lassal on 16 July for £20 (Bk. F, p. 90); and a piece of land bordering on Merrick Brook containing 86½ acres from Joshua Lassal for £75 in the "west tear" in the "twelve hundred lot" on 10 Sept. (Bk. F, p. 105).

At the Windham Town meeting on 4 Dec 1727, Clement Neff was elected Constable. His wife, Mary Neff, was baptized in Windham Village 13 Dec. 1724, and "owned the covenant" (Hampton Cong. Ch. Red.).

Of the 486½ acres of land which Clement bought at a total cost of £198, he sold an unspecified amount to Humphrey Bullard on 8 June 1717 for £39 (Bk. E, p. 197) and 100 acres to Joshua Lassal on 10 Sept 1723 for £20 (Bk. F, p. 109). On 22 Feb 1732, "Clement Neff of Windham" gave "for love to son William my 100 acre lot on which I now dwell that is the reversion right after my decease and the decease of his mother Mary, my wife, with all the buildings fences privileges in consideration of the help and comfort in my old age & the help he shall afford to his mother Mary - except some small legacies that are to be paid to his brothers and sisters as by other instruments may appear" (Bk. G, p. 188).

In the following year, June 1733, this son William was married to Grace Webster and in May 1734 their first child was born, creating the age-old problem of two families under one roof. So on 24 Sept 1734, William deeded his father's 100 acre farm back to him, referring to him as "my Honored Father Clement Neff" and on the same date Clement gave his son William the 86½ acre farm he had bought in 1723. The deed reads in part, "Clement Neff deed of gift to dutiful son William of Windham, land near Merrick's Brook...to my son William as his full portion of my estate." (Windham Land Rec. Bk. G, p. 304). A few months later, on 25 Jan. 1735, Clement sold his 100 acre farm which he lived on, to Benjamin Bidlake for £600. This gave Clement a net profit on his purchases and sales of land in Windham of £461 plus the 86½ acre farm which he gave to his son William.

Clement then moved his family to Stonington, Conn., where on 10 Feb 1735, he purchased "for a consideration of £600," a parcel of 300 acres of land from John Potter of South Kingston & Christopher Champlin of Westerly, both of the Colony of Rhode Island, & John Williams of Stonington, Conn. (Stonington Land Rec. Vol. 4, p. 499/500). Thanks to the mention of "Breakneck Hill" in Clement's will, the farm has been located on an old map. On current road maps, the farm is to be found on route 84 from New London, Conn., to Providence, R.I., just beyond where route 2 from Westerly to Norwich intersects it, and in that part of Stonington which is now the town of North Stonington, Conn. Apparently a large number of people lived in the northern part of the town in those early days; it led to the organization of the Congregational Church of North Stonington Society and eventually to its separation into a new town.

In December 1734, Clement's youngest son, Thomas, married Mary Corey at Westerly, R. I. and in December of 1735, his son Clement Neff Jr. married Patience Brown in the North Stonington Congregational Church.

There are several mentions of Clement Neff being a cordwainer which means a "maker of shoes." He appears to have been a very industrious and able business man for the times, somewhat reminiscent of his grandfather Corliss, for he was an excellent

farmer and raised large numbers of cattle, horses, sheep and hogs in addition to having a shoe business. On 4 Feb. 1737, he sold 69 acres of his 300 acre farm for £300 to John Denison, "bounded easterly on the land of John Williams, John Potter & Christopher Champlin and northerly on my own land." (Stonington Land Rec. Vol. 4, p. 616). Thus he got back half of the money paid for the whole 300 acres. On 8 Apr. 1737, he sold another 10¹/₂ acres for £41, to Eleazer Brown, brother of his daughter-in-law (Stonington Land Rec. Vol 4, p. 618/19). On 19 Aug. 1738 there is a deed containing an agreement as to the boundary line between the land of Joshua Holmes and Clement Neff, both of Stonington, at a place called "Ashaway," whereby Clement was to have the land south of the line (Vol. 5, p. 57).

Clement Neff died at Stonington, Conn., sometime between May 17 and June 3, 1746. He was probably buried at the Cedar Swamp cemetery nearby where Thomas and Eleazer Brown were buried. The grave has no stone today.

In the name of God, Amen, I Clement Niff of Stonington in the County of New London in the Colony of Connecticut in New England, *Gordwainer, being weak and sick of body but of perfect sound mind and mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following. That is to say first and principally I give and bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it me nothing doubting that at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Almighty power of God. That gave it me in and through the merits of my most beloved Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. My body I commit hereafter to be mentioned in Decent Christian Burial and as touching such worldly goods as it hath pleased Almighty God to endow me therewith, I give demise and bequeath in manner and form the following.

Imprimis. I give devise and bequeath unto my dear and well beloved wife Mary Niff one hundred acres of land that lies together joining to the dwelling house together with the dwelling house and all my household goods and all my cattle, horses, kine, sheep, hogs and all my moveable estate of what nature of kind soever to her own proper use and benefit and behoof forever and at her own disposal forever.

Item: I give and bequeath unto my dear son, William Niff, the sum of five pounds money of ye old tenor to be paid in twelve months after my decease.

Item: I give and bequeath to my well beloved son, Clement Niff, fifty acres of land beginning at the ledge of rocks before the house thence running north east to a chestnut tree marked on Break-neck Hill thence to a white oak tree so that it may make fifty acres for the whole of his portion.

Item: I give and bequeath to my four grand-children, that my son Thomas Niff, deceased, left, five pounds old tenor to be paid out of my estate.

Item: I give devise and bequeath to my dearly beloved daughter Mary Niff fifty acres of land upon the north side of my farm, joining to Joshua J. Colins his land and Jeremiah his land.

Item: I make and ordain constitute and appoint my dear and

well beloved wife Mary Niff and my dear and well beloved daughter Mary Niff sole and whole Executrixes of this my last will and testament ratifying and confirming this and noother to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this seventeenth day of May Anno Domini 1746 and in ye nineteenth year of the reign of our sovereign Lord, George the second, king of Great Britain.

The will of Mary Neff, wife of Clement² Neff, is in folder #2826, Probate Dept., Conn. State Library.

"In the name of God Amen the thirteenth day of April Anno Domi : 1752. I Mary Neff of Windham in the County of Windham and Colony of Conectticout in New England: widow: being very Sick and weak in body out of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God therefore calling unto minde the mortality of my body & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye do make and ordain this my last will and testament that is to Say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and for my body I recommend it to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I Shall Receive the same again by the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it pleased God to bless me I give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

Item: I give to the heirs of my son Thomas Neff deceased the sum of ten shillings money in bills of the old tenner to be Raised and levied out of my estate.

Item: I give to my well beloved & only son Clement Neff whom I likewise constitute and make and ordain my only and sole executor of this my last will and testament all the Singuleir lands mortgages and tenaments together with all the household goods and moveables by him freely to be possessed and enjoyed by him, his heirs and assigns forever and I do hereby utterly disallow and disannul all and every other former testaments, wills, legacies and Executors, by me in any ways before this time named, willed and Bequeathed Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seall the day and year above written.

Jonathan Trumble, Judge, accepted the will in his Court and placed it on file 10 June 1752.

After Clement's death, his wife, Mary, and his daughter, Mary, and his son Clement, Jr. sold the Stonington property and

returned to Windham. Returning to a study of the Windham Land Records, we find that on 4 Feb. 1747 Mary Neff and Mary Neff, Jr., bought a "tract of land in Windham Township from Obadiah Johnson of Canterbury for £500." Deed also says "in ye 20th year of ye Reign of our Sovereign Lord, George ye 2nd of Great Britain." (Book I, p. 12). On 30 June 1747, Mary Neff and Mary Neff, Jr. deeded to Clement Neff 50 acres they had bought in June "in consideration of ye Love, Good Will and Affection that we have and do bear unto Clement Neff" etc. (Book I, p. 77). On the same day Mary Neff and Mary Neff Jr. bought from Zachariah Parker for £126 a tract of land on "Beaver Brook Hill." No acreage given. (Book I, p. 77).

Mary Neff Jr. married Christopher Lewis 23 Feb. 1750 at the Hampton Congregational Church, and it is presumed that the mother Mary then went to live with her son Clement, sometime within the next year. For on 23 April 1751, Mary Neff and Clement Neff Jr. sold 115 acres of land to Aaron Geer for 1500 pounds. (Book I, p. 542). On 8 June 1752, Mary and Clement Jr. sold 141 acres to Henry Farnum for 1300 pounds. (Book K, p. 102).

Mary probably died in the epidemic which took the lives of her two grandchildren, Hannah and Mathew, children of Clement Jr., in September of 1752. Mary Neff's will is filed at the Conn. State Library, No. 2826. Her will mentions "heirs of son William, heirs of son Thomas, and well-beloved and only son Clement."

On 22 Feb. 1732, William's father, Clement Neff, gave "for love to son William my 100 acre lot on which I now dwell with all buildings, fence privileges in consideration of the help and comfort in my old age and the help he shall afford his mother Mary," etc. In Sept. of 1734, William, who then had a wife and son Benjamin, deeded this farm back to his "Honored Father Clement Neff" and in return "Clement Neff by deed of gift to dutiful son William of Windham" gave him an 86½ acre piece of land bordering on Merick Brook, the "twelve hundred lot" in the "west tear to my son William as his full portion of my estate." (Windham Land Rec. Bk. G, p. 304). William did not keep the farm his father gave him very long. On 21 Dec. 1736, he sold 30 acres of it for £6 to his father-in-law, Benjamin Webster (Windham Land Rec. Bk. G, p. 305). This must have been practically a gift, considering the way land values were soaring at that time. The remaining 56½ acres, William sold to Robert Durkee for £240 on 17 June, 1737, and on the same day he bought from Robert

Durkee for £440, a tract of land on both sides of Little River, about 50 acres on one side and 60 acres on the other side. (Windham Land Rec. Bk. G, p. 439, 440).

A year later, 28 June 1738, William Neff sold for £156 in bills of Publick credit, to Jacob Preston, about 40 acres lying on both sides of the Little River. On 16 Feb. 1740, William sold 22 acres to John Bond for £300 (Windham Land Rec. Bk. H, p. 27). On 4 Feb. 1746, William bought for £340 in bills of old tenor, about 25 acres "Lying northwardly from Beaver Brook Hill in s^d Windham" and on 6 Feb. 1746 he gave "to the widow Mrs. Martha Masten of Windham" a £190 mortgage on another 25 acres "lying northwardly of Beaver Brook Hill" (Windham Land Rec. Bk. H, p. 451, 452).

N.B. This reference to the widow Masten is of especial interest as, on one day in 1940, when my father and I were trying to arrange furniture on the uneven floors of our 1760 house in Conn. and the chest of drawers insisted on tilting forward, my father laughed and said, "As my father would say, 'that bureau stands comin' like old M's Masten's bureau'". So the expression must have been a family joke handed down for 200 years!

An inventory of the estate of William Neff was taken 25 March 1749, after his death at the untimely age of 40 years. He left no will but administration was granted to "Grace Neff relict" on 11 April 1749 (See folder #2831, Probate Dept., Conn. State Library).* The Inventory taken by Simeon Robinson and Manoah Gennings is extensive and the items listed were valued at £250:16:16. No paper appears with the value of the house and farm, although at a later date, Benjamin, Thomas, Joseph and Ruth sold their share of it to their brother William Neff Jr. The inventory was extensive and included his horse @ £46 and such items of the times as Iron skillet, tramel, pewter plates and wooden dishes, a pillion, feather beds and bolsters, shoe-making implements, a warming pan, a woolin wheel, as well as many items of furniture, bedding, linens and cows and calves.

ANCESTRY OF GRACE WEBSTER NEFF

Grace Webster was a granddaughter of Benjamin Webster of Salem, Mass. who was wounded in the Great Swamp Fight against the Narraganset Indians, 19 Dec. 1675, when King Philip's power was broken. Benjamin Webster was credited under Capt. Samuel Appleton 10 Dec. 1675 for £04:16:10 (N.E. Hist. & Gen. Reg., Vol. 38, p. 441); on the roll of Maj. Appleton's Co. in the Narraganset Campaign, Jeremiah Swain of Reading Lieut. (Mass. Archives Vol. 68, p. 97) and also on Capt. Joseph Gardiner's pay roll 29 Feb. 1675/6 at £02:14:00 (Bodge p. 165). After his death, his widow Grace Webster married 2nd in 1700, Christopher Brown in the Quaker Church (Salem V.R.).

Grace Webster's father was Benjamin² Webster, son of the above, who married 28 April 1712, the widow Mrs. Ruth Hebard Gray, at Beverly, Mass. (Beverly V.R.). Ruth Hebard, b. 6 Aug. 1683, Beverly, Mass. (V.R.); d. there 29 Feb. 1711/12 (V.R.) and they had Ruth Gray b. 1704/5 and John³ Gray b. 1707 who later moved to Windham, Conn. and witnessed the will of Benjamin² Webster.

* On the same date Mrs. Grace Neff was appointed by the Court as guardian to: Ruth Neff aged 12 yrs. next May, William Neff aged 10 yrs. next May, Thomas Neff aged 4 yrs. next July, Martha Neff aged 7 yrs. next Oct. and Joseph Neff aged 3 yrs. next July, all minors and heirs to Mr. William Neff late of Windham deceased. The records concerning the estate and heirs of William Neff are to be found in the Windham County Probate Records, Special series, Vol. II, p. 215 & 222, on microfilm, Conn. State Library.

married 1st. John² Gray (John¹) 28 April, 1704, Beverly, Mass. (V.R.)

Ruth Hebard (Hibbert, etc.) was the daughter of John Hibbert who mar. Ruth Walderne (Walden) 16 Sept. 1679, Wenham, Mass. (V.R.). John Hibbert was b. 24 Jan. 1643, the son of Robert & Joan (Luff) Hibbert, of the part of Salem which became Beverly. Robert & Joan Hibbert were adm. to the Salem church 17 May 1646. Joan (Luff) Hibbert was the dau. of John Luff who came on the Mary & John, 24 May 1633, to Salem, and his wife Bridgett () who was adm. Salem Church 16 March 1647. Ruth Walderne was the daughter of Edward Walden of Wenham, Mass. who d. there June 1679 and mentioned Ruth among his children.

Benjamin² & Ruth Webster were living at Beverly, Mass. when their children were born: Grace b. 18 Aug. 1713; Martha b. 12 July 1715, Charity b. 26 Feb. 1717, and Judith bp. 8 Mar. 1719. Benjamin bp. 18 July 1725 was probably the father as no son was mentioned in his will. About 1726 or 27, the family moved to Conn. as Grace was adm. to the Hampton Cong. Church in Feb. 1728 while her parents joined the Windham 1st Congregational Church 6 Mar. 1729 (Ch. Rec. Vol. 1, p. 6) and on 10 Oct. 1736, were adm. to membership in the Hampton 1st Cong. Church on recommendation of the Windham Church (Hampton Ch. Rec. Vol. 1, p. 10). Benjamin bought for £36 from Benjamin Bidlake *24 acres in the northeasterly part of Windham and is part of the first lot in the north tear of hundred acre lots which formerly belonged to John Bradstreet, on 16 Nov. 1731 (Windham Land Rec. BK. G, p. 161) and in 1736 he bought the aforementioned 30 acres by Merick Brook from his son-in-law.

Benjamin² Webster served in the French & Indian War under Capt. Solomon Buel *on ye Alarum for Relief of Fort William Henry, Aug. 1757, for 17 days service.

WILL OF BENJAMIN WEBSTER

The will of Benjamin Webster, filed in the Probate Dept., Conn. State Library, was written 29 Jan. 1762, at Windham, Conn., and probated 1766. After the usual preliminaries, it provides:

"Imprimis I give & Bequeath to Ruth Webster my Dearly Loved wife the use and Improvement of all my lands and Real Estate together with ye use and Improvement of all my Personal and moveable estate During her natural Life.

Item. I give my Daughter Grace Neff five shillings lawfull money to be payed to her out of my estate by my executor hereafter named in one year after my Decease.

Item. I give to my Daughter Judah Coburn (Judith Webster mar. 23 June 1757 Samuel Colburn b. 29 Sept. 1728. Their ch. were Judith b. 1751/2, Samuel and Charity bp. 1755 and Esther b. 1759) five shillings lawfull money to be payed to her out of my estate by my executor hereafter named in one year after my Decease.

Item. I give to my Daughters Martha Webster and Charity Webster all my moveable Estate Both Cattel Horses and all my House Goods and every particular article that I am the owner of both with(in) Doors and out of Doors and also all my Debts both Bond notes and Book Debts to each of them together equally in every particular for ever after my wife's Decease and I Do hereby in these presences ordain and appoint Mr. Ichabod Downing of said Windham to be my sole Executor of this my last will and Testament."

Four receipts are in the folder with the will, dated 15 Apr. 1768. "Joseph Neff acknowledges 10 pence as his part of his mother's inheritance, Mrs. Grace Neff." Receipts worded in the same manner were signed by Thomas Neff, Benjamin Neff, and Martha & John Sessions..

10. CLEMENT³ NEFF, JR. (Clement², William¹), born 17 May 1711, at Westerly, R.I.; married 12 Dec. 1735, at the North Stonington, Conn. Congregational Church, PATIENCE BROWN (Ch. Rec.), daughter of Eleazer and Ann (Pendleton) Brown, born 28 Dec. 1707, Stonington, Conn. (V.R. Vol. 2, p. 2). The birth and marriage of Clement Neff Jr. are recorded in the Vital Records of Windham, Conn., Vol. 1, p. 311.

Clement Neff Jr. was a child of four when his parents moved from Westerly, R.I., to Windham, Conn. He was in his early twenties when he moved to Stonington with his father, mother and sisters Mary and Ann in 1735. In less than a year he had wooed and won the hand of Patience, daughter of their wealthy neighbor, Eleazer Brown. Clement and Patience lived in Stonington until his father's death in 1746, presumably running the farm for his father in his old age. After his father's death, he and his sister sold the land their father had given them in his will, to Eleazer Brown, his brother-in-law. The deed in the Stonington Land Records Vol. 16-17, states that "Clement Neff, Mary Neff and Anna Button, all of Stonington" sold for the sum of three hundred and forty-three pounds a parcel of land containing ninety-eight acres. One of the boundaries passed through the Cedar Swamp, one of the old (North) Stonington land marks. All three signed the deed. The appearance of the name of "Anna Button" is of interest here, showing that Clement's youngest daughter, had married her cousin Daniel Button (s. of Daniel & Anna (Bell) Button, gr.s. of Mathias & Mary (Neff) Button), whose signature is affixed, as a witness, to Clement Neff's will. Ann was not mentioned in her father's will, as he had probably provided for her when she married, but her name on the land deed cleared the title for Eleazer Brown, the purchaser.

Clement and his family, his mother and sister Mary then returned to Windham. Here Mary Neff and Mary Neff Jr., bought a tract of land for £500 in the part of Windham now known as the town of Chaplin, Conn. On 30 June, 1747, Mary Neff and Mary Neff Jr. deeded 50 acres to Clement "in consideration of ye Love, Good will and affection that we have and do bear unto Clement Neff" etc. (Book I, p. 77). On the same day, the two Marys bought an unspecified tract of land "on Beaver Brook Hill" for £126. The two purchases of land must have had considerable acreage as shown by subsequent sales of land without further purchases. It is interesting to note, also, how the value of land increased rapidly in the next few years. On 23 April 1751, Mary Neff and Clement Neff Jr. sold 115 acres to Aaron Geer for 1500 pounds. On 8 June 1752, Mary Neff and Clement Neff Jr. sold 141 acres to Henry Farnum for 1300 pounds. In July 1758, Clement Jr. sold 70 acres for 70 pounds to Samuel Andrus, in two pieces of 24 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres exclusive of a burying place, and 45 $\frac{3}{4}$ acres. Clement Neff of Windham, yeoman; for £12 paid by John Bond, sold land in Windham 1st Soc. on 30 May 1777 although deed was not entered until 21 July 1785. In a final deed dated 3 Nov. 1792, he sold to his son, John Neff, for "one hundred pounds and parental love" a

tract of land beginning at a corner of the land now belonging to David Canada Jr., eastward on Joshua Abbe Jr. to Ephraim Deans corner with the highway excepted," etc. "Mr. Clement Neff personally appeared" to enter the deed 10 July 1793. (Book U, p. 459). At this time Clement was 82 years old, so it is presumed he was turning over all his remaining property to his son John for enough cash to make him reasonably independent for the remainder of his life. These deeds show that 326 acres were sold while still retaining a considerable amount for this final sale to son John.

Clement Neff served in the French and Indian War. He is first listed in May 1755 in Capt. Slapp's Co., "in ye pay of New York in building Forts & removing Encroachments on his Majesties Lands to ye northward of Albany" (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. 9, p. 16), and again in Capt. Slapp's Co. Oct. 31 to Dec., 1755 (p. 71) and again in Capt. Slapp's 4th Co. Apr. 5 to Dec. 2, 1756 (p. 132). In the Campaign of 1757, he enlisted March 7th as a drummer, in Col. Lyman's Reg't., under Capt. Slapp. In the Campaign of 1758-61 (Vol. 10, p. 67) he again enlisted as a drummer in the Tenth Co. under Capt. Jedediah Fay.

On 12 Oct. 1757, Clement Neff deeded a piece of his farm to the Town of Windham to be used as a Burying Ground and the following deed is of interest. Windham Town Records Book L, pages 455, 456.

"To all People to Whom this deed of Gift Shall come know ye that I Clement Neff of Windham in the County of Windham in the Colony of Connecticut in New England for sundry causes and good reasons me moving thereunto have therefore granted and do by these presents Bequeath unto Ebenezer Abbee, John Bond, and Oxenbridge Davis, Inhabitance of S^d town of Windham and to the Rest of the Inhabitance of S^d town forever a certain Peice of Parcel of Land Being and Lying within the Town Ship of Windham afore S^d and contains about one Hundred and Twelve Rods of Land and is part of the Farm I now dwell on and is abutted and bounded as Followeth. The north-west corner is a stake and a heap of stones about it which Stake and heap of stones stands in the line Between my own Land and the Land of Aaron Geer then the Line runs South by S^d Geers Land Seven Rods to a white oake Stake with Stones about it then the Line turns easterly and runs fifteen Rods to a Black oake stake with stones about it then the Line turns northerly and Runs eight Rods to a white oake Stake with Stones about it then the Line turns and Runs Westerly thirteen rods to the first Mentioned Bounds Which given granted and Bargained Promises to give to the S^d Ebenezer Abbee, John Bond and Oxenbridge Davis and the Rest of the Inhabitance of the Town of Windham forEver for the use of a Burying Place to Bury their dead In and for no other use it Being a Place where there is Several persons Buried all Ready To have and To hold all the above granted premises to them the S^d Eben^r Abbee, John Bond and Oxenbridge Davis and their Successors Inhabitance of S^d Town forever for the use of a Burying Place and also free Liberty to go to S^d Burying Place to Bury the Dead when there shall be occasion I S^d Clement Neff Do by these Presents Bind myself and my heirs to warrant and Defend the above granted Premises from the Lawful Claims whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and Seal this 12th Day of October 1757.

Thanks to this deed it has been possible to locate the farm lands of Clement Neff Jr. Anyone wishing to visit the place, should take the road to the Chewink Cemetery which turns off of the main road from Williamantic, Conn. to Providence, R.I., at the State Forest in Chaplin. Shortly before coming to the Cemenetry,

one comes to a large barn on the left side of the road. Just before coming to the barn there is what looks to be an entrance road to a house well back from the road, on the right, but it is really the beginning of an old abandoned road which curves back thru the country. The road's outlines are still visible although the area is overgrown with grass and is now part of a pasture. After passing the house, the road curves to the left and slightly downhill with Beaver Brook on the left. In Clement's day, a church stood at the bend of the road, the Town Clerk tells me, and the home of Clement Neff Jr. was the first house beyond the church. Further along this road is the Burying Ground described in the foregoing deed, and next beyond that, was the farm where Clement's mother and sister lived when they first moved back from Stonington. But today, all the houses are gone and the Church and its records are gone. All but one or two of the gravestones are weathered down to stumps or have been carried off, so that the graves of Clement Neff Jr., his wife Patience, his mother Mary Neff and his children Hannah and Matthew are impossible to determine.

ANCESTRY OF PATIENCE BROWN

Patience (Brown) Neff's father was Eleazer Brown, born 4 Aug. 1670 at Lynn, Mass, the son of Thomas & Mary (Newhall) Brown. Thomas Brown was born about 1628 in England and settled at Lynn, Mass., where he married Mary Newhall who was born 1637, Lynn, Mass., the daughter of Thomas and Mary Newhall who were married in England. Thomas Newhall who came from Olney Parish, Buckinghamshire, England (Banks), landed at Salem in 1630 and, with his brother Anthony, went to Lynn in 1632 where he was a proprietor. His wife Mary d. 25 Sept. 1665. Thomas Newhall was a farmer and owned all of the lands on the eastern side of Federal St., as far north as Marion. His house stood on Federal St. He was a member of the Train Band at Lynn until 1649 and he died there 25 May 1674. His will mentions his daughter Mary's (Brown) "carfull attendance of me and great payns she has bin at with me" in his old age and he left her "a third part of the increas of my orchard for 7 years," a piece of "ground that lys on the other side of the brook at north end of my hows lott uppon condittyon that her hufsband doe build a dwelling hows uppon it," and a feather bed.

Patience Neff's father, Eleazer Brown, went to Stonington, Conn., with his brothers, Thomas Brown Jr. and John Brown, where they purchased a large tract of land. On the 18th of Oct. 1693, Eleazer Brown married Ann Pendleton (Stonington V.R. Vol. 2, p. 2) and they had 10 children: Jonathan, James, Eleazer, Annah, Ebenezer, Mary Hannah, Patience, Abigail and Ruth. Eleazer Brown was a farmer and stock raiser. He died 30 Nov. 1734 (Stonington V.R.). In his will (Folder #764, Conn. State Library) probated 1735, he left £20 to his daughter Patience.

Patience Neff's mother was Ann Pendleton, b. 12 Nov. 1667, Portsmouth, N.H. and d. 1727, the daughter of Capt. James Pendleton and his 2nd wife Hannah Goodenow (b. 28 Nov. 1639, Sudbury, Mass., dau. of Capt. Edmund & Hannah Goodenow). Capt. James Pendleton was b. in England abt. 1628, adm. fr. Watertown 10 May 1648. He lived at Sudbury, Mass. and Portsmouth, N.H., where he held many public offices and was a founder of the 1st Church of Portsmouth.

Capt. James Pendleton was the son of Maj. Brian Pendleton b. 1601/2 in England; d. 1680/1, Saco, Me.; mar. Elinor Price 22 Apr. 1619 at St. Martin's, Birmingham, England. Maj. Brian Pendleton was an eminent Puritan figure. He served as a Court Deputy, 1635, a proprietor of the Sudbury Plantations, Commander of the Sudbury (1634) and Portsmouth (1652) Train Bands, Portsmouth Selectman 1652-1662, Representative 1653-1663, Town Treasurer 1654-1663, and headed the Mass. Commission to receive the Main submissions. The Roll of the Ancient & Honorable Artillery Co. of Mass. 1637-1894

lists on page 5 Brian Pendleton as becoming a member in 1646.

Capt. James Pendleton settled on a 700 acre tract of land which his father purchased for him of John Paine of Boston, 12 June 1673, located at Westerly, R.I. The property was on the east side of the lower Pawcatucket River which later became the boundary line between R.I. and Conn. Here he was repeatedly elected Moderator of the Town Meetings. When he died 29 Nov. 1709, his will dated 9 Feb. 1702/3, mentioned his wife Hannah and 8 children. Ann and her husband Eleazer Brown received her father's home in Westerly as their share of the estate and they lived there for some years. About 1715, they moved back to Stonington and all rights which they and their children had in the Pendleton estate were sold to other members of the Pendleton family.

Vol. 1, p. 60). Samuel Kingsbury mar. Hannah Kibbe, the dau. of Joshua & Mary () Kibbe, at Plainfield, Conn. on 26 Nov. 1714 (V.R. Vol. 1, p. 15). Oliver was the grandson of James (2) Kingsbury who mar., at Haverhill, Mass., on 6 Jan. 1673, Sarah Button the dau. of Matthias Button and either his 2nd wife, the widow Joane Thornton or 3rd wife, Teagle (the record is not clear on this point). James and Sarah Kingsbury moved from Haverhill to Plainfield, Conn. before 1699 and were probably in the original group of settlers from Haverhill along with Mathias and Mary² (Neff) Button. Oliver was a great grandson of Henry Kingsbury who was of Ipswich in 1638. Oliver was a soldier in the last French and Indian War. "Oliver Kingsbury Departed this Life November y^e 27th Day, A.D. 1760, Returning Home from y^e Campaign in 1760." (Plainfield V.R. Vol. 2, p. 67). He died in the West Division, Hartford, Conn., and was bur. 28 Nov. 1760 (West Hartford Ch. Rec.). They had 3 sons b. Plainfield, Conn.
 - a. Oliver Kingsbury b. 28 Aug. 1755 (Vol. 2, p. 32). Oliver chose his uncle, James Fairman of Killingly, to be his guardian on 7 Nov. 1769. Mr. Fairman was the husband of his mother's sister, Eunice. Oliver served in the Revolutionary War. He later moved to Plainfield, N.H.

14. BENJAMIN⁴ NEFF (William³, Clement², William¹) born 16 May 1734 (Windham V.R. Vol. A, p. 145), baptized 28 July 1734, at the Hampton (Conn.) Congregational Church; died 25 May 1806 (Windham Probate Rec.); married 13 June 1754, ANNA (#21) NEFF (Hampton Cong. Ch. Rec. Vol. 1, p. 189) who was born 12 Aug. 1736, Stonington Conn. (Windham V.R. Vol. 1, p. 311) and died 11 Feb. 1814 (Probate Rec.), the daughter of Clement³ and Patience (Brown) Neff.

Benjamin Neff was on the Lexington Alarm List of 1775, from the town of Windham (Conn. Men in the Rev. p. 26 and Conn. Archives Rev. War 1763-1789, Vol. 6, p. 8). At the Windham Town Meeting on 3 Dec. 1781, Benjamin Neff was elected one of the tithing men.

Benjamin Neff and his son, Oliver Neff, of Windham, sold to James Howard of Hampton and Zebulon Tracy of Windham a certain piece of land in Windham "a few rods east of the mills formerly known by the name of Gennings Mills, for the purpose of to and from s^d mills & laying Logs and Timber Boards & Logway being butted and bounded as followeth: beginning at the north west corner of Neffs Orchard about 6 Rods south of the Saw Mill," etc. "Personally appeared M^r Benjamin Neff Signer and Sealer Mar. 16, 1792," and "Personally appeared Oliver Neff Signer & Sealer of the foregoing May 31, 1792." (Windham Land Rec. Vol. S, p. 603).

The will of Benjamin Neff and the settlement of his estate is to be found in folder #2820 at the Conn. State Library, probated 29 April 1806. The will "bequeaths to my beloved wife Anna Neff all my moveable estate after my just debts and funeral charges are paid, to be hers and her assigns forever and I give and devise the use and improvement of all my real estate during her natural life and I do make and constitute & appoint her, the said Anna, to be the sole executor of this my last will and testament."

Feb. 5, 1812: "Anna Neff of Windham, for one dollar received of David Neff of Windham" deeded to David "land in Windham with dwelling house and contains about 15 acres of land, to have and to hold the above described premises for and during the s^d Anna Neff's natural life and the s^d David Neff on his part covenants with the s^d Anna Neff that he will during her natural life maintain & support her and at all times furnish her with Drink, Food and Raiment, fire and firewood and comfort and sufficient for her support and convenience." Signed Anna Neff and David Neff (Windham Land Rec. Bk. W, p. 381). Perhaps this arrangement did not please Anna's other children, because we find that David Neff appeared in the Probate Court to complain that his mother was not capable of being the executor of his father's estate. "Anna Neff appeared in Probate Court with her attorney, Stephen Neff (her nephew) and desired to be excused." Jonah Lincoln and another were appointed to appraise and divide the estate. This distribution did not take place until 20 April, 1815, which was after Mrs. Neff's death. The real estate consisted of one acre and 53 rods valued at \$400 and another piece containing 19 acres and 26 rods with the house which was valued at \$700. It was divided among the children as follows: to Benjamin 1 1/4 A; to heirs of Aschel, deceased, 52 R; to heirs of Hannah Spalding, deceased, 2 pieces of land; to David 1A 16 R, with house thereon; to Thomas 2 3/4 A and 26 R; to Oliver 2 pieces containing 2A 9R; to Luther about 5A.

Library. William and Mary Neff were both members of the Hampton
Congregational Church at Windham, Conn.

William served in the French and Indian War, enlisting on
March 14th for the Campaign of 1757 and was a member of Col. Lyman's
Regiment, Eighth Co. under Capt. John Slapp. He also served in the
Campaign of 1758 in the 3rd Reg't. of Conn. Troops under Capt.
Durkee of Norwich, Col. Eleazer Fitch's Ninth Co. He undoubtedly
also served in the Revolution as he was but 37 years old when it
started and it is known that all able-bodied men left their Windham
farms to serve. Unfortunately, the records of many of these men
from Windham, Conn. have been lost. But a family story says that a
Neff cousin, who was a drummer, was at the Battle of Bunker Hill
with John Neff #26. It was probably this William whose drum was
later used by his son Salathiel in the Revolution.

William seems to have lived in Hampton on the farm previously owned by his father, with the exception of the part inherited by his sister Martha and husband, John Sessions. In a deed dated 28 Nov. 1769, "Wee Benj^m Neff, Thomas Neff & Joseph Neff all of Windham in the County of Windham, Colony of Conn. and Solomon Deans & Ruth Deans his wife of Stafford, Hartford County sold land jointly to their brother William Neff and brother-in-law John Sessions, both of Windham, "in equal proportion" ... "all our Right title & Interest & claim in one certain tract..of land in Windham, one equal sixth part of s^d premises, for £10." Deed dated 28 Nov. 1769 and entered 9 Apr. 1770 (Windham Land Rec. Vol. 0, p. 145).

William Neff's will, written 29 Dec. 1817, is #2832, on file at the Conn. State Library.

"In the name of God Amen. I William Neff of Hampton in the County of Windham and State of Conn. at present Laboring under some indisposition of body but being possessed of a sound and disposing mind memory and understanding through the mercy of God make and ordain this my last will and testament....and in the first place I resign my Soul to Him who gave it....and as respects my earthly estate I dispose of it in the following manner viz 1st I give to my wife Mary all of my household furniture to have and to hold the same forever
2nd I give to my Daughter Chloe Thirty dollars to be paid to her by my son Benjamin Chaplin Neff immediately after my Decease....Also a privilege of a home so long as she shall remain single.
3rd I give to Francis Grenold Five dollars to be paid to him by my son Benjamin Chaplin Neff when the s^d Francis shall arrive at the age of twenty one years...then to be on interest if not paid
4th I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin Chaplin Neff all the remainder of my estate both real and personal (he paying all of my just debts) -- to have and to hold the same to him and his heirs and assigns forever.
Lastly I constitute and appoint my son Benjamin Chaplin Neff and Daniel Burnam executors of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal and declared this to be my last will and testament this 29th day of December 1817.

July 1744, Windham, Conn.; died 23 Dec. 1817, aged 73 years,
Randolph, Vt.; married about 1770, probably Windham, Conn.; EUNICE
WALCOTT who was born 5 March 1743, Windham, Conn., and died 3 May
1835, Randolph, Vt. Mr. and Mrs. Neff are buried in the Center
Cemetery, Randolph, Vt.

Thomas Neff's father died when he was four years old. At
first his mother was his guardian but on 26 Feb. 1760, the Court
appointed Capt. William Durkee as his guardian (Special Rec. Vol.
3, p. 209). Folder #2830, Probate Dept., Conn. State Library, has
the following document on Thomas Neff of Lebanon.

"Lebanon 13 Augt. 1765.

I have Rec'd of Capt. William Durkee my Late Guardian the
sum of Ten Shillings Lawful money in full on account of his Guardian-
ship to me the Subscriber and do hereby acquit and discharge the s^d
Capt. Durkee from all further and in (?) demands on him in the
Capacity of Guardian to me as witness my hand-----

Thomas Neff

Apparently Thomas and Eunice Neff lived in Windham when
they were first married as the birth records of Randolph, Vt., gives
the birthplace and date of their first four children as "Windham,
Conn." Perhaps they lived with Eunice's parents, as in 1769 Thomas
had sold his share of his father's estate to his brother William.
Only the baptismal records of the first two children have been found
in Conn. in the records of the Lebanon First Church where they are

listed under "Nest." Eunice Neff was admitted to membership in the Congregational Church of Windham, from Lebanon, 30 Oct. 1777.

On 2 July 1774, Thomas Neff bought 8½ acres of land from James Spalding for £20, bounded on one side by land of Robert Coburn and on the 3 other sides by land of Judah Bak; also 45 acres for £59 from David Huntington, in Windham but partly on the Mansfield line (Windham Land Rec. Vol. 0, pgs 512 & 513). Here they lived until they went to Randolph, Vt., to live, perhaps in the spring of 1778. Sometime after the birth in Vt. of Amos in July 1781, the family returned to Windham to dispose of their Conn. property, returning to Randolph before 23 Aug. 1783.

While in Windham, Thomas Neff was elected a Grand Juryman at the Windham Town Meeting on 2 Dec. 1782. On 18 May 1782, Thomas Neff "sold for a consideration of £32 lawful money received from Thomas Davis of Windham a tract of land in Windham near my house where I now live containing 8½ acres and having a dwelling house thereon." On 10 April 1783, Thomas Neff of Windham sold to Nathaniel Walcott (first cousin of Mrs. Thomas Neff and father of Miriam Walcott who married #72 Joseph Neff) of Windham for £180 about 45 acres of land in the northerly part of the first Society in Windham, "being the farm on which I now dwell." This land was part of the estate of Capt. Samuel Brown, late of Norwich, given to his daughter Sarah Brown and described in Windham Land Rec. Liber M, pgs. 273 and onward, Neff having bought it from Sarah Brown (Windham Land Rec. Vol. R, p. 31).

The name of Thomas Neff first appears in the Randolph Land Records under date of 30 March 1797, as selling and also buying two small parcels of land on the same date. Under date of 9 May 1807, Thomas Neff deeded a farm of about 113 acres to Storrs Hall and in return Storrs Hall entered into an agreement with Thomas and Eunice Neff whereby the Halls (Storrs & Asenath) were to care for the Neffs during their natural lives. Later records show that Asenath Hall, widow of Storrs Hall, sold her father's farm in 1819, after the death of her father, Thomas Neff, and of her husband, Storrs Hall. Thomas Neff apparently owned land in Randolph before the Town began to keep Land Records.

ANCESTRY OF EUNICE (WALCOTT) NEFF

Eunice Walcott's maiden name presented a major problem and was learned only after a search of Randolph Land Records revealed the name of the husband of Thomas & Eunice Neff's daughter, Asenath, and a subsequent search of Vt. Vital Records tracing Asenath's three subsequent marriages. Asenath's death record at Brookfield, Vt., seems to be the only record in existence giving the maiden name of Mrs. Thomas Neff.

Eunice Walcott was the daughter of Stephen⁴ & Mary or Marcy (Broughton) Walcott who were married 15 Nov. 1737. Eunice Walcott's brother, Elijah Walcott, went to Williamstown, Vt., from Conn., to live. Their mother was with him when she died, as we find this Vt. record, "Marcy Walcott of Hampton, Conn., died Williamstown, Vt., Mar. 8, 1803, aged 92-8-15." Stephen⁴ Walcott was born at Salem, Mass., the son of Jonathan³ Walcott. Stephen was an Ensign, Second Brigade, 4th Div., Militia of Mass. 1812-1814. Stephen's wife, Marcy Broughton, was descended from John³ Broughton who married Tabitha Kingsley at Windham, Conn. in 1709, John² Broughton who married Elizabeth Woodruff in 1678, and John¹ Broughton who came on the "Thomas" from Gravesend, England in Aug. 1635, and wife Hannah Bascom.

Stephen⁴ Walcott was the son of Jonathan Walcott Jr. b. Salem Village 1 Sept. 1670 and Priscilla Bayley, dau. of Joseph &

Priscilla (Putnam) Bayley of Newbury, Mass., who was b. 31 Dec. 1676 at Newbury. Jonathan³ Walcott lived in Salem until 1713, then Boxford, Mass., until 1723 when he moved to Beaver Brook Hill, Windham, Conn., where he died 25 May 1745 (Windham Vit. Rec. Vol. 1, p. 179).

Jonathan³ Walcott was the son of Capt. Jonathan² Walcott, b. 1639/40 in England and died 16 Dec. 1699, Salem, Mass. Capt. Walcott married 11 Dec. 1664 at Salem, Mass., Mary Sibley, the daughter of John & Rachel (Leach) Sibley, bp. 28 Sept. 1644 and d. 28 Dec. 1683, AE 39. John Sibley was born 1616, Glaston, England and died 1661, Manchester, Mass.

Capt. Jonathan² Walcott was the son of John Walcott born England and died Salem, Mass., the son of Bernard & Sarah (Gibson) Walcott.

Clement Neff III served in the French & Indian War Oct. 16 to Nov. 4, 1755, in the First Reg. under Maj. General Lyman and the 6th Co. under Capt. Ezekiel Pierce (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. 9, p. 16).

Clement Neff III appears to have lived on a farm until his first wife, Susannah, died, at which time, according to Clark's Windham Families, he went to sea, was taken prisoner and was carried to Algiers where he was a captive for 24 years, during 12 of which he never saw the sun. He also lost an eye during this period. The same story appears in the History of Windham County by Larned which quotes the Windham Herald as follows:

"MARRIED, last week, in the Episcopalian form by Timothy Larrabee, Esq., Mr. Clement Neff of Hampton to Miss Patience Dean of this town.

"N.B. Mr. Neff has been a prisoner in Algiers 24 years, in 12 of which he never saw the sun. He is now in the youthful bloom of 65 and has lost an eye - his bride is a blushing maid of 28."

This obviously refers to one of the numerous incidents where the pirates who infested the Mediterranean captured American ships and imprisoned American sailors.

THE NEFF POWDERHORN STORY

The powderhorn has been preserved by the descendants of #59 Amos Neff and the story passed from generation to generation in that branch of the family. It is presumed that Nathaniel gave the powderhorn to Amos in Vermont and the family took it along when they moved to New York State.

#69 Nathaniel Neff, like his father, went to sea and was captured by the Barbary Pirates and imprisoned in Algiers for four years. At first he was placed in one of the horrible dungeons but before long, since he was a strong young man, he was removed and used as a slave working on the docks. Escape was his constant thought and hope. Eventually, he was used to help unload supplies from a Yankee ship, and, watching for an opportunity to speak to the Captain, begged to be rescued. The Captain replied, "I can do nothing without getting myself and crew into trouble, but if you can manage to hide on board, I will not see you." So Nathaniel succeeded in hiding amongst the cargo and when the Pirates hunted

over the ship for him, he was, fortunately, not discovered.

On the way home, the ship ran into a terrible storm off the coast of Maine and was shipwrecked. Nathaniel and several other sailors managed to cling to a large spar for days. The daughter of a light-house keeper is said to have dreamed for three consecutive nights about a ship-wreck and men who needed rescuing. She finally persuaded her father to take his boat and go out and look. One version of the story says only Nathaniel was found, clinging half-dead to his spar, while another version gives him two companions, all in serious condition from exposure and lack of food

Nathaniel Neff stayed at the light-house for a considerable period of time while he regained sufficient strength to return to Connecticut. He is said to have whiled away the hours, carving the Neff Powderhorn. The carving consists of what would appear to be two family crests, a three-masted sailing ship and some other items. Carved in the horn is also "N.N. June 29, 1807."

26. JOHN⁴ NEFF (Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 6 May 1746, Windham, Conn. (Windham V.R. Vol. 1, p. 311); died 1822, Windham, Conn. (Probate Rec.); married about 1768 SARAH JENNINGS (Comm. Blog. Rec. of Middlesex Co., Conn., p. 612), born Windham, Conn., 1753 and died 26 Feb. 1842, ae 89 yrs., Chaplin, Conn. (Priv. Rec. Chaplin Town Clerk's Office), the daughter of John & Sarah (Kingsbury) Jennings. Mrs. Sarah (Jennings) Neff was married 2nd on 2 July 1826, Chaplin, Conn., to Mr. Oliver Rogers by John Ross J.P. (Chaplin V.R. Vol. 1, p. 7). Mr. Rogers was a neighbor, born 14 April 1748 (Windham V.R.), the son of Jethro & Hannah (Holt) Rogers. Oliver Rogers had married first, Hannah Gubern, 11 Feb. 1770 (Windham V.R.) and he died 1 April 1829, ae 80 yrs. (Norwich Courier). Sarah's son, Samuel Neff, was on the list of those to whom Mr. Rogers owed money, when Mr. Roger's estate was settled.

John Neff served all through the War of the Revolution and came home in 1781 broken in health, according to stories passed down in the family. It is known that almost every able-bodied man did serve year after year and that the women and children had such a difficult time trying to run the farms that committees were set up to try to see that no one starved. Sarah's grandfather, Capt. Joseph Ginnings was appointed a member of the committee at the Windham Town Meeting in Dec. 1778, "for Supplying the officers' and soldiers' families with provisions." But it is unfortunate that so many of the Revolutionary War records for Conn. have been lost. All we have been able to find of John Neff's War service is contained in the Trumbull Papers (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. 12, p. 294). "Those who served in the Continental Service in the 5th Brigade of Militia 1781. John Neff, Private, July 27 to Dec. 31, from Windham."

John Neff bought a large tract of land from his father, Clement Neff Jr., on 3 Nov. 1792 and an additional seven acres for £7 a few years later. John Neff's farm was in the part of Windham which is now Chaplin, in the Cheewink section. The road to the Cheewink Cemetery goes right past this property which extended on both sides of the road.

John Neff left no will but a record of the settlement of his estate is in folder #2824, Conn. State Library Probate Dept. His wife, Mrs. Sarah Neff, made application to the Court to appoint someone to settle the estate, as was the custom, and she signed it "Sary Neff." Witnesses were her children, Stephen Neff and Mary Neff. Stephen Neff and Levi Johnson were bonded for \$800 to make the estate inventory. No heirs other than the widow were mentioned.

ANCESTRY OF SARAH GENINGS NEFF

Sarah Genings (Jennings) Neff was the daughter of John³ Genings (Jennings, Ginnings), born 30 Nov. 1728 and died 18 July 1813, at Windham, Conn. (Windham V.R.). John Ginnings married 10 Jan. 1750, Sarah Kingsbury (Hampton 1st Ch. Rec. 1-188) born Plainfield, Conn., 23 Feb. 1732, the daughter of Samuel & Dorcas (Spalding) Kingsbury.

Some other accounts of this family credit John³ Ginnings with marrying 2nd, Anna Backus in 1758 and 3rd, Mary Price in 1779. However, diligent research has shown that the John Ginnings who married these two women was the son of Joseph & Hannah (Thomas) Ginnings who moved to Windham from Middleborough, Mass. A deed dated 1760 has also been discovered in which Sarah (Kingsbury) Ginnings, wife of John³ Ginnings, sold her Kingsbury inheritance (Windham Land Rec. Vol. M, p. 182) and there is still another deed as late as 1808 which proves that John³ still had his first wife, Sarah Kingsbury, and could not possibly have married a 3rd wife in 1779. According to old deeds, when Hampton was set off from Windham in 1783, the new town line ran through John and Sarah Ginnings' property. After 1783, John is given as a resident of Hampton in land records and also in 1800 and 1810 censuses, although he appears in the 1790 census at Windham.

John and Sarah Ginnings had 4, and perhaps more, children born in Windham: Joseph born 4 Oct. 1750 (Windham V.R.), Sarah born 1753, Stephen born 1754/55 (under 45 in census 1800), Daniel born 1758 who died 31 Aug. 1830, possibly Phebe who married Samuel Kingsbury in 1778 (Windham V.R.) and others. From 1750 until long after the Revolution so much of the Vital record data is missing in the Windham records for those folks who lived in the areas which became Hampton and Chaplin, that one must rely on other sources of information.

Land records tell their story of family relationships amongst the Genings-Jennings family and their inter-relationships with the Neff and Kingsbury families. Stephen Ginnings is in the Land records from 1777 on, having some transactions with John Ginnings which look like father and son. In a deed dated 8 June 1793, Daniel Ginnings sold to Joseph Neff land, part in Windham and part in Hampton, "which I bought of my brother Stephen Ginnings, except for 6 or 7 acres of swamp already sold to John Neff" (Windham Land Rec. Bk. U, p. 323). John Neff was the husband of Daniel's sister Sarah and Joseph Neff was the oldest son of John & Sarah (Genings) Neff, returned in 1791 from service with the U.S. Army in the Ohio Indian country. Daniel Ginnings sold the above 6 or 7 acres of swamp to John Neff 8 March 1791, altho the deed was not recorded until 1795 and Joseph Neff was one of the witnesses to the deed. (Windham Land Rec. Bk. U, p. 458).

On 22 Sept. 1806, when he was 78 years old, John³ Ginnings sold, for \$80, his farm and house and 12 acres in Windham, "being all the land that I the said John Ginnings own (in Windham) to John Neff Jr.", his grandson (Windham Land Rec. Bk. Z, p. 362). Stephen Neff was the witness to this deed. John Neff Jr.'s farm was bounded by the property of Calvin Backus, David Canada and John Hunt, heirs of John Canada. David Canada was a neighbor of John Neff Sr. and John Hunt was appointed, in 1822, guardian of Mrs. Samuel Neff's son, Orrin Hartshorn, by her first husband.

On 4 March 1808, a few days before he was 80 years old, John³ Ginnings sold 22½ acres in Hampton to another grandson, Stephen Neff, for the sum of \$200 and added this proviso, "reserving the use and improvement of the premises for myself and wife Sarah for and during the natural life of us and each of us providing we or either of us improve the same according to the rules of good husbandry." Recorded 26 Nov. 1808 (Hampton Land Rec. Vol. D, p. 273). John

Ginnings died 18 July 1813, at 85 years, 7 months and 18 days.

John³ Ginnings' daughter, Sarah (Ginnings) Neff (Mrs. John Neff) followed an interesting family pattern in naming her children. She named her first son, Joseph, for her brother, grandfather and famous uncle, Capt. Joseph Ginnings. Then she named her second son for her brother, Stephen, and her first daughter for her grandmother, Dorcas (Spalding) Kingsbury, and her youngest son for her grandfather, Samuel Kingsbury. Another son was named John for her husband and father, and a daughter was named Sarah for herself, her mother and her grandmother Ginnings.

Mrs. Sarah Neff's father, John Ginnings, was the son of Joseph² Genings, born 23 Nov. 1685, Norwich, Conn.; died 11 March 1760, Scotland, Conn. (Gr. St.); married 31 Dec. 1707 (Windham V.R.) Sarah Geer, daughter of Jonathan² (George¹) & Mary () Geer. Joseph² Genings' birth is recorded at Windham, the son of Jonathan & Susannah (Wade) Geninga.

In 1700, the General Court of the Colony of Conn. granted land to the veterans of King Philip's War. The land was located at Voluntown (volunteer-town). The Court order appears on p. 1, Vol. 1 of Voluntown deeds, and on p. 2 appears a "List of Names of English volunteers in the Narraganset War." Jonathan Gennings is #72 on this list and he was #35 on the list of those who "drew Cedar Swamp lots." John Williams bought from Jonathan Genings of Windham "being a volunteer in ye former Narraganset War" all right interest and title to land granted by the General Court, dated and acknowledged at Stonington 24 June 1701, price 40 shillings (Voluntown Deeds Vol. 1, p. 113).

29. ARNOLD⁴ NEFF (Thomas³, Clement², William¹), born 25 March 1735 at Stonington, Conn. (Vit. Rec. Vol. 3, p. 99); married 30 April 1758, LOIS PALMITER, of Stonington, at Hopkinton, R.I., Hopkinton Vit. Rec.). Arnold Neff died at Burlington, Conn. in 1809.

Arnold Neff served in the French & Indian War in the Campaign of 1757 for 16 days, in Col. Avery's Reg't. and the Co. of Capt. John Baldwin of Stonington, for the relief of Fort William Henry.

Arnold and his family moved up to Bristol, Conn., where he is listed as living when the 1790 census was taken. He also owned land in Stonington where on 23 Mar. 1801, he bought 140 acres of land from Paul Palmeter (Stonington Land Rec. Vol. 14, p. 210).

Arnold Neff's will, in folder #2296 at the Conn. State Library, was written at Bristol, Conn., 15 July 1790. It bequeathed to his "well beloved wife Lo(u)is Neff the use and improvement of one-third part of my moveable estate during her life... To my daughter Eunice Crane, wife of Ebenezer Crane, 10 shillings money in addition to what has already been given.... To my grandson Nathan Grandall, my dwelling house and the rest of the estate." The home farm of about 60 acres was valued at \$420 and additional land at \$195. The executor of the estate was Jared Corey and the will

witnessed by Esther Corey, Prudence Corey and Hezekiah Newton,
the signatures being sworn to in Burlington, Hartford Co., Conn.

35. OLIVER⁵ NEFF (Benjamin⁴, William³, Clement², William¹) born 1 Sept. 1761, Windham, Conn.; died 17 Dec. 1843 (Fam. Rec.); married about 1786/7, BETSEY BUTTON (Chaplin d. rec. son Horatio & Fam. Rec.) born 26 June 1771, the daughter of Daniel⁴ and Elizabeth (Palmer) Button (see under #3 Mary Neff), of Stonington, Conn., and died 18 Dec. 1841. Both Oliver and Betsey Neff are buried at the Cheewink Cemetery, Chaplin, Conn. Their stone bears the following inscription:

"They were lovely and pleasing in their lives
And in their death they were not divided."

Oliver Neff served in the War of the Revolution, in Col. Chapman's Reg't., Capt. Rudd's Co., 2 Aug. 1778 to 12 Sept., 1778. This Regiment, under the command of the Hon. Major General Sullivan, participated in the attempt to dislodge the British at Newport, R.I. (Conn. Men in the War of the Revolution, p. 530).

In his application for a Pension (R7573), 14 June 1838, Oliver also swore to this service and 2 months in 1779 under Capt. Tinker and Col. Ephraim Storrs and another month in 1779 under Capt. Latham and Col. Ledyard. Sylvanus Colburn swore to this statement of Oliver's service, also. The pension was denied because somewhere between the ages of 19 and 77 years, Oliver had lost his discharge papers and could not prove three or more months of service.

Oliver Neff bought a house and 22 acres of land from Matthias Cory 1 April 1815 (Windham Land Rec. Vol. D, p. 520). He also sold land, with his father Benjamin Neff, near the old Gennings Mills in 1792 (Vol. 8, p. 603) and one acre 53 rods to his brother, Benjamin Neff, "on the line between Mansfield and Windham, in Mansfield, on the Natchaug River on April 28, 1806" (Vol. W, p. 235).

On 27 July 1819, David Neff sold to Elisha Chester, land in Windham bounded partly by the land of Benjamin Neff and partly by land of James Spalding for \$250. This sale included David's interest in the saw mill yard, so-called, before distribution of the estate of his father, Benjamin Neff, deceased. (Windham Land Rec. Vol. 26, p. 155). On page 158 of the same volume is a deed in which David sold more land bounded partly by that of Benjamin Neff on the east, northerly by the Spalding heirs and westerly by the Mansfield line, 27 July 1819. On 30 Mar. 1816, Appollos Button sold David the land set off to Luther Neff "lawful heir to Benjamin Neff" said land lying on the east side of the Nachaug river in Chaplin Soc. (W-445). Previous to the above sales David had bought from his mother, Anne Neff, the home farm of his father and mother "land in Windham with dwelling house and contains about 15 acres, to have and to hold the above described premises for and during my, the s^d Anne Neff's natural life and the s^d David Neff on his part covenants with the s^d Anne Neff that he will during her natural life maintain & support her and at all times furnish her with Drink, Food and Raiment, fire and firewood and comfort and sufficient for her support and convenience." Dated 5 Feb 1812. This was later set aside and the land divided.

421). He must have moved westward in N.Y. state as there is no

1848, Luther Neff bought lot # 6, 75 acres, in the town of German in
Brakel Township, Chenango Co., N.Y. (Chenango Co. Land Rec. in Co.
Clerk's Office, Bk. 78, p. 3). This land was purchased from Luther
and Patty Bowen of Otselic, N.Y., and David and Sama Smith of Pitcher,

Silence Bradley was born 20 Aug. 1762, Tolland, Conn., the daughter of Henry and Silence (Meacham) Bradley (Tolland, V.R., Vol. 2, p. 121). "Hennery Bradley" of Tolland, Conn. married Silence Meacham of Somers 20 Sept. 1750 (Somers V.R., Vol. 1, p. 20). Henry Bradley was born 3 May 1729, Tolland, Conn., the son of George and Hannah (Braman or Bryman) Bradley (Tolland V.R., Vol. 1, p. 22).

Daniel Neff enlisted as a Private in the Revolution on 3 July 1781, for 6 months, from Windham. He was in the 4th Conn. Reg't. under Col. Zebulon Butler.

Daniel Neff and family moved to Rutland, Vt. where he died either in Dec. 1795 or early Jan. 1796 as Administration of the "Estate of Daniel Neff, late of Rutland, deceased, was granted to the widow Silence Neff," (Rutland Probate Rec., Vol. 3, p. 107) when the Court met 13 Jan. 1796. Apparently things had not gone well with them in Vt., as he died at the age of 33 years and his estate was insolvent, so no heirs were mentioned except the widow. In the Rutland Prob. Rec., Vol. 3, p. 276, we find mention of his son Daniel Neff, Jr. "Daniel Neff, a minor now residing in Wallingford, Vt., chose Stephen Bradley to be his guardian on May 30, 1801."

N.B. In 1809, Daniel Neff, b. 1786, signed a petition for a tax on Mt. Tabor, Vt., for a road from Mt. Holly to Danby, via Mt. Tabor. This Daniel Neff may have migrated to Madison Co., N.Y. and been the father of Adley A. Neff who died at Bainbridge, N.Y., 21 March 1894, aged 81 years. Adley Neff married Cynthia Cotton who died at Bainbridge, 12 July 1893, aged 82 years, the daughter of Aaron Cotton. Adley and Cynthia (Cintha) had a son, Alfred D. Neff, b. 1851 and died 14 Feb. 1896, Bainbridge, N.Y.

Salathiel served as a private in the Revolution in the 4th Reg't. under Col. Zebulon Butler. He enlisted 3 June 1781 for 6 months from Windham, commenced service July 3 and was discharged 20 Dec. 1781 (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. VIII). He was 16 yrs. old at this time and enlisted as a drummer boy.

He was admitted a freeman in Hampton 1818 (V.R. Vol. TM). He was a farmer. Salathiel and Mary were living with their son, Minor Neff in 1850.

William Durgey #1, was a Catholic, Irish political prisoner,
captured and sold into slavery in Barbados by Cromwell's forces.
When freed in 1663 by King Charles II of England, the prisoners were
left without food, money or job and many sold themselves as servants
to New England merchants. William Durgey sold his services to an
Ipswich merchant named Bishop. He married Martha, dau. of Robert
Cross in spite of her parent's opposition. Because of his Catholic
faith, he was in constant trouble with the Puritans. It is not
known where he died. Martha (Cross) Durgey brought her children up
to be good Puritans. They changed their name to Durkee when they
went to Windham and here they became a wealthy, for those times, and
influential family. (See also Elizabeth Durkee who mar. David Fiske
under #73 Stephen Neff.)

William² Durkee, father of Jerusha, was one of the signers
of the petition to the General Assembly for the formation of Canada
Parish, with Clement² Neff, and also one of the signers of the Church
Covenant when the minister was ordained.

Upton and Dingley Families. Naomi Upton, wife of Deacon
William Martin, above, was the dau. of Ephraim and Mary (Dingley)
Upton who were mar. 31 Dec. 1731, Windham (V.R. Vol. 1, p. 154).

Mary Dingley was b. 12 Nov. 1712, dau. of Joseph and Katharine (Waldo) Dingley (Windham V.R. Vol. 1, p. 154) who were mar. 2 Nov. 1702 (Windham V.R. Vol. A, p. 33).

Joseph Dingley was one of the early settlers in Windham. In 1696 he occupied the allotment purchased by Capt. Josiah Standish of Duxbury in 1686 of Capt. James Fitch. An interesting note on the houses the people lived in at that early date is contained in the instructions to the committee which was to try to secure the services of a Mr. Whiting to serve as minister of Windham's first church in 1696. Among other things, they were to offer him a house, two stories high and 18 feet square, "said house in capacity like Joseph Dingley's, provided he would stay 4 years." In a town election in 1698, Joseph Dingley and Joseph Hall were elected collectors for the minister.

On 30 Jan. 1700, the front part of William Backus' homelot was purchased by Mr. Whiting and Ensign Crane for "a meeting-house plat or common." This was the beginning of Windham Green on which the first Windham Meeting house was erected soon afterwards. The church was organized in what was known as the Dingley house about a mile north of the Green. In 1704 Joseph Dingley was appointed highway surveyor, from the north end of town to the meeting house. In Feb. 1706, the Windham proprietors granted to Joseph Dingley and three others "the privilege of the stream at Willimantic Falls to build a mill or mills...north side of the river, so long as they or their heirs shall keep and maintain a good and sufficient mill, not obstructing said proprietors from granting a like privilege to others at other places on the river; also liberty of ditching and damming; also improvement of 40 acres of land near Willimantic Falls; timber free so long as ye land is left unfenced, etc." The mill was built and eventually owned by Thomas Hartshorn, millwright, of Charlestown, Mass., said to be the first white settler in Willimantic.

In 1713 a second and larger Meeting House was built in Windham. The aging Joseph Dingley was allowed to sit in the pulpit because of his deafness, while his son, Eleazer Dingley, sat in the "3rd front seat" and his wife "in the corner seat answerable thereto."

Nathaniel⁵ Hall was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and was present at the surrender of Burgoyne at Saratoga. He held the rank of Capt. of Militia.

Asenath Neff Hall married 2nd, 27 June 1820, Randolph, Vt., ISAAC S. PALMER, and was probably the 3rd wife of Deacon Isaac Plamer, who died Randolph, 1 Oct. 1820. Asenath (Neff) (Hall) (Palmer) married 3rd, 14 Dec. 1823 ABNER NICHOLS of Braintree. Abner Nichols was b. 9-Feb. 1769, Royalston, Mass., the son of Isaac and Dorcas (Sibley) Nichols. His first wife was Molly Nichols, his cousin. Abner was an older brother of Rev. Ammi Nichols, b. 1781, the first settled minister of the Braintree Congregational Church.

Abner and Asenath (Neff) Nichols resided, during their later years, at Brookfield, Vt. Abner Nichols died 16 Dec. 1854, aged 86 (Gr. St. Hill Cem., Braintree, Vt.) and Mrs. Asenath Nichols died 26 Jan. 1860 (Brookfield Town Records). This death record states that she was born at Windham, Conn., the daughter of Thomas Neff and Eunice Walcott. This is, perhaps, the only record of the maiden name of Mrs. Thomas Neff, mother of Asenath. It certainly is the only record found by the author after extensive research.

On 8 June 1821, Amos Neff sold the North half of lot #50 to William Flint although the deed was not recorded until Mar. 1827. married 5 Sept. 1824, ELIJAH FLINT (called Capt.), the son of William & Patty (Randall) Flint, grandson of Nathaniel & Mary () Hovey and great grandson of Nathaniel & Abigail (Jennings) Hovey (Abigail Jennings being a daughter of Jonathan Jennings, 2nd settler at Windham, Conn.). Elijah Flint was a farmer who lived at Braintree, Vt. He was often a member of the State Legislature.

67. BENJAMIN⁵ NEFF (Clement⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born Windham, Conn.; died before 1810, Bethel, Vt.; married SARAH CRANE born 4 Sept. 1770, Mansfield, Conn. (Mansfield V.R. Vol. D, p. 52), the daughter of Ebenezer and Sarah (Curtis) Crane. Sarah (Crane) Neff died 3 Nov. 1851, Bethel, Vt.

Benjamin Neff and his wife Sarah were living in Bethel, Vt. at an early date, by 1790 according to the History of Braintree, Vt. A deed in the Bethel Land Records refers to him as "Benjamin Neff of Bethel" in 1802. On 1 March 1802, Benjamin obtained a parcel of lease land of 100 acres under an elaborate rent agreement signed by three Selectmen of Bethel (Vol. 2, p. 250). The land he leased was "Lot #6 in Grate Gore," a triangular shaped piece of land which had been set aside for school use, at the foot of Mt. Olympus (named, so the local story goes, by Gen. Israel Putnam during a surveying expedition). The land is owned in 1951 by Mrs. Raymond Campbell. On 9 July 1804, Benjamin sold this lease to Socrates Swift for \$60 and on 12 Jan 1805 purchased for \$230, another farm in "Lot #27, in the Second Range West of the Branch, being the North half of s^d Lot." The land records show that Benjamin Neff did a good deal of buying and selling of land in Bethel and that he must have been a man of considerable means. The lands he owned were what was known as "upland" farms where the forest was not so dense and so was easy to clear, and where tremendous crops of wheat grew with very little effort on the part of the farmer.

The Crane Gen. by E.B. Crane may be consulted for the ancestry of Sarah (Crane) Neff.

68. CLEMENT⁵ NEFF IV (Clement III⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement²,

William¹) born before the Revolution, probably Hampton, Conn.; died ; married SUSANNAH ABBEE, born 15 Nov. 1760 (Windham V.R. Vol. 2, p. 74), who was the daughter of Isaac and Eunice (Church) Abbee. Isaac married Eunice Church March 1753 and died April 1788. The proof of this marriage of Clement Neff and Susannah Abbee, daughter of Isaac Abbee, appears in the Windham Land Records Vol. W, p. 91 and 92 of Apr. 12 and 23, 1798, when Clement and Susannah, his wife, and other heirs of Isaac, sold their share of "our father's estate" to Susannah's brother Isaac Abbee Jr., also in Clark's Windham families. The latter is the source of the names of their children.

See Abbe and Abbey Gen. by Abbe and Nichols.

The Census of 1810 at Braintree, Vt., credits Clement IV with two boys and four girls under 10 years of age. The names of only three are known.

72. JOSEPH⁵ NEFF (John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 2 Dec., 1769, Windham, Conn. (gr. st.); died 8 May 1862 Burlington Green, N.Y. (gr. st.); married 1791 MIRIAM WALCOTT born 4 May 1774, Windham, Conn. (Windham V.R. Vol. 2, p. 107) and died 11 Feb. 1837, Burlington Green, N.Y. (gr. st.), the daughter of Nathaniel and Lydia (Flint) Walcott. Both Joseph and Miriam were buried on their farm at Burlington Green, N.Y. with well marked stones. After Miriam's death, Joseph married 2) Sally _____ born Mass. 1795 (Census 1850).

Joseph Neff was one of the few survivors of Col. Harmar's defeat in 1790. After the Revolution, British agents kept stirring up the Indians against Americans in the Ohio country. In the spring of 1790 the trouble developed into open hostilities; efforts for a peaceful settlement had proved fruitless. Several American forces were ambushed and destroyed. Joseph Neff enlisted at Hartford, Conn. in June 1788 and served as a private in Capt. John Pratt's Co. under Lieutenant-Colonel Josiah Harmar with the 1st. United States Reg't. until Jan. 1, 1790 when he was transferred to Capt. Beatty's Co. and served in that until his discharge 4 Dec 1790 at Fort Washington, Cincinnati, Ohio. Col. Harmar was sent into the Indian country north of the present city of Cincinnati, with quite a strong force, to desolate Indian villages and crops. He succeeded, but in two battles on Oct. 17 and 22, 1790, near Ft. Wayne, Ind., he was defeated with considerable loss.

Under the act of 28 Sept 1850, Joseph Neff applied for and received Warrant 25,719 for 160 acres of Bounty land at Burlington, N.Y. because of the above service.

After his discharge, Joseph returned to Conn. where he married Miriam Walcott in 1791 and they went to Burlington, N.Y. to live. After a few years they sold this farm and bought another farm about a mile and a half south of Burlington Green, N.Y. They are buried in the old apple orchard on this farm which adjoined the farms of Elisha Pratt, Jeremiah Pratt and Theodore Uteley.

Joseph was a celebrated violinist, much in demand at the old time parties. George Neff #618, also a celebrated square dance violinist, was told a great deal about Joseph and his violin playing and his moving to New York state by his grandfather, Solomon Neff #179, when George was a young boy.

Descendants of Joseph recount the story of Joseph's going

away to fight Indians, and of how he returned and was not recognized by his mother.

"Mother, don't you know me?" Joseph asked.

"If you are my son, take off your shirt," she replied.
"When you were a baby, your shoulder was burned by the fire. If you have a scar, you are my son."

ANCESTRY OF MIRIAM WALCOTT

MIRIAM WALCOTT was the great-great granddaughter of Capt. Jonathan¹ Walcott, b. 1639/40 and d. 16 Dec. 1699, who married on 11 Dec. 1664 at Salem, Mass., Mary Sibley, dau. of John and Rachel Sibley, bp. 28 Sept., 1644 and d. 28 Dec., 1683 ae 39.

Miriam's great-grandparents were Jonathan² Walcott, b. Salem Village 1 Sept., 1670 and Priscilla Bayley, dau. of Joseph and Priscilla (Putnam) Bayley, of Newbury, Mass., b. 31 Dec. 1676 at Newbury. Jonathan lived in Salem until 1713, then Boxford, Mass. until 1723 when he moved to Beaver Brook Hill, Windham, Conn. Jonathan Walcott d. 25 May 1745 (Windham V.R. Vol. 1, p. 179).

Miriam's grandparents were Joseph³ Walcott, bp. Boxford, Mass., 31 Aug. 1718, and Sarah Walden of Windham, Conn., mar. 27 Apr. 1731 (Mansfield, Conn. V.R. Vol. D, p. 293). They lived in Mansfield until 1756 when they moved to Windham.

Miriam's parents were Nathaniel⁴ Walcott, b. 27 Oct. 1741, Mansfield, Conn., and Lydia Flint of Windham, who were mar. 4 Nov. 1764 (Windham V.R. Vol. 2, p. 107). In 1767 he bought 30 acres of land "toward Scotland", Conn. and later bought more land there and lived in Windham as late as 1790.

Nathaniel Walcott is listed as one of the "Conductors of Teams for Transporting Supplies from Conn. to the Continental Army in 1777," (Conn. Men in the War of the Rev. p. 627). A footnote on this page says: "In regard to transporting supplies to the army, Asst. Quartermaster Ralph Pomeroy at Hartford writes to Quartermaster Gen. Pickering in the field, July 15, 1781, 'There are 3 Brigades of Teams with Conductors, and another Brigade with the Provisions with orders to unload and lend wheels as occasion may be. The pieces of Artillery are drawn - six, by 8 yolk of oxen each, one by seven, and one by six; these teams will have to return for their carts which come from the North River.'"

73. STEPHEN⁵ NEFF (John⁴, Clement³, Clement², William¹) born Windham, Conn., 1773; died 20 Sept. 1849, ae 76 years (Windham V.R. Vol. 4, p. 156); married about 1801 AMELIA EMILY FISKE (called Molly) born 1784, Windham, Conn. and died Vienna, Mich., after 1860, the daughter of John & Eunice (Jennings) Fiske.

Stephen Neff served in the War of 1812 under Charles Palmer at New London, June 7 to July 7, 1813 (Conn. Men in the War of 1812). He was a cooper and farmer and from the Windham Land

records it appears that he owned a great deal of property. A descendant of his brother says that Stephen was a very well-to-do man and the owner of many fine horses. He owned a thousand acres of woodland and had a large Cooper's Shop where he always had at least 4 apprentices working, helping make barrels, cisterns etc. from the fragrant Conn. cedars. His purchases and sales of land are almost too numerous to note more than a few. However, he sold the 113 acre farm on which he lived, which was partly in Chaplin and partly in Windham, to Roger and Solomon Taintor 4 Oct. 1823. Then the older boys, William and Waterman, built the family a house in N. Windham.

ANCESTRY OF MOLLY FISKE NEFF. ALSO THE WIVES OF #77 AND #78.

FISKE FAMILY

Molly's father was John⁵ Fiske, the son of Jonathan & Elizabeth (Scott) Fiske, born 22 Jan. 1761, Windham, Conn. (Rev. Pension Papers); died 28 April 1834, Chaplin, Conn. (Chaplin V.R.); married 1 Nov. 1799, Eunice Jinnings (Pen. Papers), born abt. 1755, Wincham, Conn., the daughter of Manoah & _____ Ginnings. Eunice stated she was 83 years old in 1838 when she applied for a widow's Rev. War Pension. John seems to be the one who dropped the "e" on Fiske.

John Fisk served in Gen. Wooster's 1st Reg't., 3rd Co., May to Dec. 1775 at the Siege of Boston (Conn. Men in the Rev.) and in 1776 in Col. Burrall's Reg't. (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. viii). He also served as a private with Conn. Troops in May and June 1777 under Capt. Samuel Bingham and from the last of June 1778 as a substitute for Jonathan Fiske for four months under Capt. Ebenezer Mosely and Col. Ely. (Nation. Archives W17 900). Pension Certificate No. 17018 was issued 11 July 1833 to John Fish (altho application was signed Fisk), rate \$20 a year, Act of June 7, 1832, Conn. Agency. Certif. No. 675 was issued July 1, 1843 to Eunice Fish, widow of John Fish, Act of March 3, 1843, Conn. Agency.

John Fiske was a celebrated singer and a farmer living in the part of Windham which is now Chaplin. He lived on Parish Hill on the road from Chaplin to Windham. He was a descendant of Lord Symond Fiske, Lord of the Manor of Standhough, Parish of Laxfield, Co. Suffolk, England who lived in the reigns of Henry IV and VI (1399 - 1422). (For full details, see Fiske Gen. by F.C. Pierce). John¹ Fiske b. 1619 in England mar. 1651, Sarah Wyeth and settled Watertown, Mass. where he d. 1684. John² Fiske lived Watertown and Waltham, Mass. David³ Fiske moved to Windham, Conn. where he mar. Elizabeth Durkee in 1723, dau. of Deacon John Durkee of Gloucester, Mass. and Windham, Conn. His will, dated 10 March 1747/8, is in folder #1340, Conn. State Library. His estate was valued at £751:17, not including real estate, showing him to have been a wealthy man for those times. Jonathan⁴ Fiske b. 4 July 1731, Windham, Conn.; d. there 15 Feb. 1761; mar. 9 Aug. 1750 Elizabeth Scott, b. 4 Aug. 1726, the dau. of Henry & Mary () Scott of Canterbury (Canterbury V.R. Vol. 1, p. 216).

My father often told me about the three Neff brothers who married three Fiske sisters. The will of John Fiske, folder #1342, Conn. State Library, proves the story, as follows:

"In the name of God amen, I, John Fisk of Chaplin in the County of Windham and State of Conn., being of sound and disposing mind and memory do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following. That is to say I will that all my debts and funeral charges be paid and discharged by my executor hereinafter named. Item first I give and devise the use of all my property both real and personal to my beloved wife Eunice Fisk during her natural life for the purpose of securing to her a good

and reasonable support and after the decease of my wife Eunice, I will that my executors pay out of said property to my son Charles Fisk the sum of \$1 and to my son Vine Fisk \$1, to my oldest daughter Amelia Neff, wife of Stephen Neff, \$1, and all the rest of my property, both real and personal, to be equally divided between my son David Fisk, my daughter Sophia Neff, wife of Elkanah Neff, and my daughter Polly Neff, wife of Samuel Neff, and my grandson Clark Abbe. Lastly I appoint and constitute Mr. Matthew Smith executor of this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 21st day of April A.D. 1834.

Signed John Fisk."

Clark Abbe married Mary Neff, oldest dau. of Stephen & Amelia (Fisk) Neff. John & Eunice Fisk had four sons: David Fisk who married Polly Neff, dau of #26 John Neff; Vine Fisk mar. the widow Cynthia () Rogers (Scotland Cong. Ch. Rec. Vol. 3, p. 18); Nathan, not mentioned in his father's will, probably because he went to Vermont in 1824, and Charles. Nathan Fisk mar. Eunice Ford of Hampton on 3 Feb. 1793 and had dau. Eunice Fisk.

DURKEE FAMILY

Elizabeth³ Durkee who married David³ Fiske, 25 Dec. 1723, Windham, Conn., was born 26 Apr. 1697, Gloucester, Mass. (Gloucester V.R.). She was the daughter of Deacon John² Durkee, b. 3 Jan. 1664/5, Ipswich, Mass.; d. 1732 Windham, Conn.; mar. 22 Mar. 1669, Elizabeth Parsons (Gloucester V.R.), dau. of Jeffrey & Sarah (Vinson) Parsons of Gloucester and granddau. of William Vinson and his wife Sarah, who was the dau. of Sir Francis Paulet, and also maid of honor to Queen Anne of Denmark who became the wife of James I, King of England.

The Windham Church Covenant signed June 1723 was signed by John and William Durkee. On 19 June 1723, John Durkee and Thomas March were chosen Deacons. This was the opening of the Church at Windham Village. In his will of 6 May 1732, (Conn. State Library) Deacon John Durkee bequeathed to "my four daughters, Elizabeth, Patience, Sarah and Mary, each of them 38 pounds more than that they have received, to be paid in household goods or other moveable estate."

Deacon John² Durkee was the son of William¹ Durkee (Durge) who married at Ipswich, Mass., 20 Dec. 1664, Martha Cross, dau. of Robert & Hannah (Jordan) Cross. William Durkee was born abt. 1632 in Ireland. He was an Irish soldier captured on the battlefield by Oliver Cromwell's forces, transported to the Barbados to slave on the sugar plantations, freed under proclamation of Charles II and brought to Ipswich, Mass. by Thomas Bishop, merchant, as his servant. Since William Durkee was a Catholic, life was not easy for him among the Puritans and his marriage to Martha Cross was bitterly opposed by her parents. He is recorded at Dover, N.H., in 1684 and in Essex Co. deeds as late as 1713, but his date and place of death are unknown. His wife, Martha Durkee reared their children in Puritan faith. Martha was born 14 Feb. 1643 and died 11 Jan. 1726/7, Windham, Conn. Much of the Durkee information was supplied by E.E. Butler of Westboro, Mass.

JENNINGS OR GENINGS FAMILY

Eunice⁴ Jennings, wife of John⁵ Fiske, was born abt 1755 (she gave her age as 83 in 1838 in applying for Rev. Pens.), Windham, Conn. She was the daughter of Manoah & _____ Jennings. Manoah

Jennings was born 8 May 1717, the son of Joseph² & Sarah (Geer) Genings. Joseph² Genings was b. 23 Nov. 1685, Windham, Conn., (Windham V.R. Vol. A, p. 5); married 31 Dec. 1707, Sarah Geers¹ (Windham V.R. Vol. A, p. 47.) Joseph² was the son of Jonathan Ginnings and his wife Susannah Wade.

Jonathan¹ Ginnings is said to have been the 2nd settler in Windham and came there from Norwich, Conn. He bought land in Windham from John Birchard and took possession in 1690. He was one of the signers of the application to have Windham made a Township and in Aug. 1692, he and Jonathan Crane were directed to survey and lay out lots for settlers at the "Ponde Place" (now Mansfield), and to lay out land for John Larrabee to repay him for maintaining a ferry across the Nachaug River for seven years. He and four others built the first saw mill at Beaver Brook. He was elected a fence-viewer in 1698 and a surveyor of highways in 1719. With the continued growth of Windham, the need was felt to build a Church and obtain a minister. Early in 1695, Messers. Ginnings, Huntington, Royce and Wade were directed to "measure where the path goes and so to find the senter for a meeting-house," between the north and south boundaries of the town. In 1696, a Mr. Whiting was chosen for their pastor and as he was to be married just before coming, the town had to hurry to build a house for him and his bride. The men of the town were formed into squads for this work, each directed by a leading citizen. The second squad was led by Jonathan Ginnings and included Joseph Dingley, great grandfather of Mary Dingley Martin who married (42) Salathiel Neff.

Joseph² Genings was a signer of the petition to the General Assembly in 1716 (with Clement Neff and others) to create a new church in the north east part of Windham creating Canada Parish. When a minister was obtained in June 1723, Joseph was one of the members who signed the Church Covenant. In 1727, the Town records note that Joseph Genings and Nehemiah Ripley, having learned the art of tanning leather and "followed the trade, so that the people had a better supply of shoes, which is a public benefit," received permission to set up their tan vats on the waste land or highway below Broughton's spring.

In Book K, page 309, of the Windham Land records is a deed whereby Manoah Ginnings (grandfather of Molly Flske Neff), Stephen Tracy, Thomas Welch, James Utley Jr. and Simeon Robinson, all of Windham, each gave a strip of land about two rods wide to form a public highway, "beginning at the land of Manoah Ginnings and extending southerly through the lands of the subscribers until it comes to the highway leading from Jeremiah Welches' House to the Meeting House in the 1st Society in Windham," 18 April 1754.

In the name of God Amen, I, Manoah Ginnings of Windham in

the County of Windham, State of Conn., being of sound mind and memory, but recollecting my own frail, mortal, dying state, do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following Viz. First I commend my Soul to the mercy of God who gave it and my Body I commit to the Dust in hopes of a Glorious Resurrection and direct that my Body have a Decent burial after my decease and as to my worldly goods and estate tis my will that it be disposed of in manner following. Viz.

- 1) I give to my son Seth the House and Barn where he now lives on consideration that he pay my daughter Allice fourteen pounds upon her queting her Right to the Estate of Manoah Genings Jun^r late deceased--
- 2) I give to my Daughter Sarah one bed of furniture and one half of my indoor moveables, also three pounds lawful money to be paid by my son Ebenezer. Also one cow.
- 3) I give to my Daughter Allice one bed of furniture and the other half of my indoor moveables and also three Pounds lawfull money & one cow to be paid by my son Ebenezer.
- 4) I give to my Daughter Eunice Fisk twenty shillings to be paid by my Executor.
- 5) I give to the Heirs of my Daughter Esther Chester twenty shillings to be equally divided between them and paid by my Executor.
- 6) I give to my Daughter Mary Downing five shillings to be paid by my Executor.
- 7) I give to my Daughter Phebe Spofford twenty shillings to be paid by my Executor.
- 8) I give to my Son Ebenezer one bed of furniture and all the remainder of my estate on condition that he pay my Just Debts & the Legacies specified in this will.

I do hereby constitute my S^d son Ebenezer Executor of this my Last Will & Testament - In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & Seal this 11th February 1791.

75. JOHN⁵ NEFF JR. (John⁴, Clement³, Clement², William¹), born about 1782, Windham, Conn.; died between 1840 and 1850, Ellington, Conn.; married about 1805, MARY DEAN.

John Neff Jr. served in the War of 1812. He is listed in the John Cotton Smith papers in the 9th Co. under Seth Comstock, Sept. 16, 1813 to Nov. 1, 1813 (Conn. Hist. Soc. Coll. Vol. 26, p. 65-68).

John Neff Jr. is listed in the Census of 1810 in Windham, Conn., the next family after his father. He bought a farm from John Wesley Squier et al., of Ashford, for £29 on 20 Sept. 1813. The farm had 30 acres, part on each side of the highway and was located about 4 miles north of the Windham Court House. On 6 May 1818, John sold this farm with dwelling house and barn to his brother, Stephen Neff, and moved to Ellington. According to his great-grandson, George Neff, John Neff and his family lived in a log cabin in the woods which then covered that part of Ellington. In later years, when his son Solomon and family were occupying the house, it was burned in a forest fire.

Elkanah died at Chaplin, Conn. and the settlement of his estate is #2823 at the Conn. State Library. The heirs included his wife, Sophia Neff, Elethea Chappell, his daughter and wife of Benjamin Chappell, the heirs of Olive Neff Cullums, deceased, and his son Lucius. Billings and Mason signed quit claim deeds to Lucius for any claims they might have to their father's estate. The estate was not actually settled until after Elkanah's wife died in 1875, according to the Chaplin Town Clerk. What has been termed one of the greatest mass migrations in American history took place shortly after the American Revolution, and the various Indian skirmishes which followed. Members of the Neff family, including the descendants of Amos and Loami, were caught up into this tremendous population surge toward the west. Vermont became a state in 1791. Connecticut and Massachusetts families, including the Neffs, poured in. Many acres of New York state were given away as bounty lands to soldiers, and Neff families took advantage of these in 1790 and on. The general westward movement found Neff groups moving west (together with friends from the same town and numerous other families) by means of horseback, ox cart, the Erie Canal (opened in 1825) by boat from Buffalo, N.Y., and on into the rich, and more or less level and stoneless fields of the west. They settled early in New York, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Iowa. Sometimes the men hunted alone for new locations, and often they took with them their wives, children, and household goods. Frequently the settlers gave to the new settlements the familiar New England town names from which they came - Windham, Hartford, Salem, and Fairfield, including many Newtowns. Here and there in the Neff families faded letters have been preserved telling of early hardships and promises.

It is not possible to make sweeping statements about any family group and to have them continuously true, yet one may say that many members of the Neff family are strongly inclined to be musical. In the early days there were talented fiddlers among them. Both the early Connecticut and New York groups showed this musical ability. Present day Neff descendants are likewise talented. See #72, 362, 519, 618, 773. Earl L. Neff (under #349) is believed to have the violin used by #72 Joseph for so many years. The chin rest is deeply worn.

Fairview Cem., Bethel, Vt.). Benjamin C. Neff lived at Stockbridge (Gaysville), Vt. on road 17; was a shingle maker and farmer, owning 110 acres. (Child's Windsor Co. Gazetteer & Directory 1883-84.)

160. JAMES⁶ NEFF (Clement⁵, Clement⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born about 1791, Hampton, Conn.; died 31 March 1873, New Baltimore, Mich. (gr. st.); married 1) ANNA FLINT, his cousin, about 1814, Braintree, Vt. They parted and she married several times after that (Hist. Braintree by Bass) while James married 2) ELIZA ANNA _____ who died 30 March 1873, aged 82 years, New Baltimore, Mich. (gr. st.). James and Eliza are buried in the Oakwood Cemetery, New Baltimore, Mich. in the lot of Charles Wooddrift, whose wife, Sarah, may have been James' daughter.

James Neff took the freeman's oath at Braintree, Vt. in 1810. The census of 1820 shows him to be living at Braintree with his wife and two boys and two girls under 10 years. By 1830, census records show him in Erie Co., N.Y. in the Buffalo area and from 1850 until he died, he lived at Chesterfield, Macomb Co., Mich. (P.O. address New Baltimore, Mich.).

James Neff served in the War of 1812 and had Pension Certificate No. 15,279 (State of Vt. Roster of Soldiers in the War of 1812). His pension papers in Washington, D.C. give details of service, etc. He enlisted 17 Sept. 1812 in Capt. Wheatley's Co. of Vermont Militia and was discharged 8 Dec. 1812. He re-enlisted the same day in Capt. Wright's Co. of Vermont Militia and was discharged 17 March 1813. He enlisted for 3 months and served as a substitute for Joel Bradley for 3 months. One of the papers on James in connection with his grants of land, states that both Companies were in Col. Fildes's Regiment and that James was at Plattsburgh soon after the battle, arriving the same day of the fight. James was stationed for a time at Burlington, Vt. He received a grant of 40 acres in 1851 which he sold and then applied for another grant in 1853. This was apparently not granted as his son Nathaniel, a minor, made an application on 12 Nov. 1855. A paper dated 1871 states James was then 73 years old.

Lora and Timothy Morse lived first at Burlington and then bought a farm at Pittsfield, N.Y. about 1823. Timothy was the son of Judge Timothy Morse who was born in Mass. 1754 and died 6 April 1821, Burlington, N.Y. (Otsego Herald & Western Advertiser of Apr. 9, 1821). Judge Morse married a Miss Lee, also born in Mass. and they raised a large family of children of whom Timothy Jr. was next to the youngest.

JOSEPH⁶ NEFF (Joseph⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹), born 24 July 1796; married 17 Jan. 1826 TABITHA⁵ AYLES-WORTH (Elkanah⁴, Thomas³, Chad², Arthur¹), born 19 May 1797 and died 3 July 1866 at Garrattsville, N.Y. They were married at Burlington, N.Y. and lived there for 12 years after which they bought a farm near the Arkwright Co.'s reservoir in the town of Pittsfield, N.Y. Later Mr. Neff retired from farming and they moved to the village of

Garrattsville, N.Y. where they both died.

A member of the Aylesworth family who very kindly supplied me with the ancestry of Tabitha Aylesworth, doubts that Mr. and Mrs. Neff had any children because a nephew of Tabitha's compiled the Aylesworth genealogy, and listed no children for them. However, this nephew was very young when Harriet was of a marrying age, or she may have died shortly after the Census of 1850 was taken. Since these children appear in the census and other records, they are listed below.

165. ORRIN⁶ NEFF (Joseph⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 29 Nov. 1798, Burlington Green, N.Y.; died 3 March 1882, Oshkosh, Wis.; married 18 Jan. 1826, Burlington, N.Y. CYNTHIA (or CYNTHA) PHILLIPS, born 5 Jan. 1808, Norwich, N.Y. and died 20 Oct. 1887, Oshkosh, Wis. Both buried Riverside cemetery, Oshkosh.

Orrin Neff and his family lived in Burlington, N.Y. until after 1830. They were living at New Lisbon, N.Y. at the time of the 1840 census. The family moved west to Wisconsin about 1852, going first to Neenah, Wis. where his brother, Abel Neff, was living. Later he moved his family to Oshkosh.

Cynthia Phillips was an orphan when she married Orrin Neff at 18 years. Family accounts say that she was raised, presumably in Norwich, N.Y. by a family which treated her as a daughter. Cynthia never forgot this kindness and told members of her family that she wanted to repay it by being equally kind to others during her lifetime. She was interested in helping her neighbors in Oshkosh, and took pleasure in learning about plants and herbs used in healing during that period. She learned some of her lore, it is said, from the Indians. Mrs. Sidney O. Neff (#564) in a letter to Marcella Neff Fisher (#732) said that Cynthia was the daughter of Daniel Phillips. The History of Chenango Co., N.Y., Town of Smithville, p. 296, places a Daniel Phillips there in 1799, although other records of Daniel Phillips are lacking. No birth records for Cynthia have been found. However, word of mouth accounts of the Phillips family, as well as newspaper obituary notices, and Connecticut records, make it possible to assume that this Daniel might be the son of Barnard and Levina, Phillips, born 21 June, 1781, in Pomfret, Conn. (Pomfret, Conn. V.R.). Daniel's name disappears from the Connecticut records thereafter.

Barnard Phillips once acted as an Indian Scout. On one occasion he was captured by Indians, tied to the stake and about to be burned alive when he was rescued just in time by some passing soldiers. (Editor's note: This story might be applied more appropriately to Daniel in the forests of New York state rather than to Barnard, who apparently never left Connecticut, a state which was relatively well settled in his day. James Fenimore Cooper's Leatherstocking Tales deal with the dramatic Indian and white contacts in New York state.)

Newspaper clippings give further information about the Phillips family. See the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern, 16 March 1903, the obit. of E.M. Neff, and the Daily Northwestern of 28 Oct. 1902, the obit. of W.W. Neff. The V.R. of Rhode Island, Vol. 21, p. 471 lists Barnard Phillips Jr. as having been killed at Pomfret, Conn. in his 19th year by a fall from the steeple of the meeting house he was helping raise on 26 June 1810. An item in the Providence Gazette (R.I.) of 2 Oct. 1819 says: "Mr. ---Phillips of Chenango, N.Y. killed by lightning though he spoke and walked after being

struck." In support of the 16 March 1903 Daily Northwestern story of four of Capt. E.M. Neff's uncles being lost at sea, there is this: Phillips deaths, Bristol, R.I., V.R. Vol. 8, p. 387; Nathaniel Jr. lost at sea, Dec. 1802; Capt. Nathaniel at sea, 1 Feb. 1812; Capt. Thomas, and Samuel, at sea, 1818.

Barnard Phillips' birth is recorded in the V.R. of Conn., the son of Gillam and Abigail (Parkhurst) Phillips, b. 23 Sept. 1750 (Pomfret, V.R., Vol. 1, p. 44). Gillam apparently married 1) Mary Faneuil, niece of Peter Faneuil, of Boston, and 2) on 5 Mar. 1745, Abigail Parkhurst (Pomfret V.R. Vol. 1, p. 99). Barnard mar. 1) Levina, or Lucina Phillips and had John Lyon Phillips, b. 12 Dec. 1774; Molly, b. & d. 25 Oct. 1776; Daniel, b. 21 June 1781; William b. 26 July 1783. Mrs. Lucina Phillips d. 14 April 1785 and Barnard mar. 2) Abelena Bowman 1 Oct. 1788. Children: Ezra b. 18 Oct. 1789; d. 21 Nov. 1789; Sarah, b. 18 Sept. 1790 and d. 24 Oct. 1810; Barnard Jr. b. May 1792 and d. 26 June 1810; George b. 10 Nov. 1793 and d. 29 Sept. 1810. Mrs. Abilene Phillips d. 30 April 1809.

Barnard d. 6 Dec. 1820, ae 70, and his death is recorded on page 238, under Death Records of First Church in Births, Deaths, Baptisms & Deaths in Coventry, Conn., 1711-1844.

Another story relates to the family's connection with Anneke Jans, whose Dutch family had a large holding which included what is now Wall Street, N.Y. City. Information on the Phillips and Wendell families may be found on pp. 242-255, Vol. 36, New England Hist. & Gen. Register. Also see Bond's "Early Settlers of Watertown, Waltham, and Weston," for Phillips, Parkhurst, and Barnard.

ABEL⁶ NEFF (Joseph⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 12 Nov. 1802, Burlington Green, N.Y.; died 25 Sept. 1888, Black Creek, Outagamie Co., Wis.; married 12 Dec. 1827 at Burlington, N.Y. (Otsego Herald & Western Advertiser of 17 Dec. 1827), PHILENA STORKE, daughter John & Lucinda (Ellis) Storke, born 27 Oct. 1804; died 11 June 1878 at Oshkosh, Wis. Both are buried in the Ellenwood Cemetery near Oshkosh. See "The English Storkes in America," by C.A. Storke.

About 1837, Abel and Philena moved from New York state to Wis., where they settled first at Neenah, later moving to Oshkosh. Abel was one of the earliest settlers in Oshkosh. He built the old float bridge across the Fox river at the end of Main St. in 1847. The first team went over the bridge on 3 July 1847, and on 4 July 1847, hundreds of people walked across. Abel Neff was elected alderman in the first municipal election of 1853. "In the early days he was the monied man of the town," says the Daily Northwestern, Oshkosh newspaper, in its issue of Sept. 25, 1888. He built Neff's Hall on Kansas St., and a fine brick residence on Oregon St. He engaged in the boat business with Alonzo Leach, a son-in-law, operating as many as 11 steamboats at a time in the waters of Lake Winnebago. In those days there were no railroads running to Oshkosh. The St. Paul Railroad Co., which had a line to Berlin, purchased boats of Mr. Neff, after which it was an easy matter to ship freight to Oshkosh from Fond du Lac, Wis. At another time Mr. Neff and Mr. Leach took their boats to the Mississippi River where they operated them for some time. Mr. Neff built boats and operated them also. The steamer "Brooklyn" was one of the first boats ever built in Oshkosh. Mr. Neff was also a hardware merchant in Oshkosh.

Abel and Philena Neff had six children, the first four born at Burlington Green, N.Y., and the last two in Wisconsin:

JONATHAN W.⁶ NEFF (Joseph⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 28 Jan. 1809, Burlington Green, N.Y.; died Dec. 1885, ae 78; married June 1831, AMORET REED, daughter of Shubal Reed, who died in 1876, ae 72. Amoret Reed came from Tolland, Tolland Co., Conn. to Otsego Co., N.Y. in 1815 with her father.

Jonathan and Amoret Neff began their married life on the farm of his father, Joseph Neff, but on 4 April 1842, they moved to their own farm at New Lisbon, N.Y. Jonathan was a successful farmer, the owner of 600 acres of land besides much other property, all of which was acquired by his own industry and good management. He was considered one of the wealthiest men in the County. Both Mr. and Mrs. Neff were well educated and Mrs. Neff was a teacher in the public schools before her marriage. Mr. Neff was also a stock raiser and grazier.

He was the legal adviser for many people in Otsego Co., settled estates, adjusted differences, aided many soldiers in securing pensions, etc. Mr. Neff was a Republican and although living in a strong Democratic town was elected repeatedly to office. He increased the estate left to him by his father and owned 1000 acres of land in Otsego Co. There is a fine write-up of him in the Biographical Review of Otsego County, New York, p. 437, 438.

SAMUEL⁶ NEFF (Joseph⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 11 June 1814, Burlington Green, N.Y.; died 11 May 1878, Menasha, Wis.; married first MARY ANN PRATT born 20 Apr. 1814 at New Lisbon, N.Y. and died 28 Sept 1847, Winnebago Rapids (now Neenah) Wis., the daughter of Capt. Elisha Pratt (1790-1877) granddaughter of Jeremiah Pratt (1763-1863), and great-granddaughter of Edward Pratt (1723-1766); married second Sept. 1848, MARTHA ANN MILLER born 1830, daughter of Levi and Olive (Wright) Miller, of Dutch descent.

Samuel Neff lived on a farm south of Burlington, N.Y., at Burlington Green. One day his neighbor, Theodore Utley, returned from Wis. and promptly came over to tell Samuel about how wonderful Wis. was -- "never saw such corn, fish, etc.." Samuel is said to have set his hoe in the fence corner and gone to the house where he said to his wife, "Mary Ann, get ready! We are going to Wisconsin!" He left with his wife and little daughter, Emily, going by way of the Erie Canal and lake boats. They settled at Spring Prairie, Walworth County, Wis. Wagon trains frequently passed through Spring Prairie

on the way north and often one or more oxen lagged behind from fatigue. Samuel bought these oxen and after rest and good feed they were soon ready to be sold, at a profit, to another passing pioneer. All this was before Wis. became a state. The family lived in this place for several years and bought land.

Lewis was born while they were at Spring Prairie in 1844.

Samuel's two brothers, Orrin and Abel Neff, went north to Oshkosh to settle. Word came back to Samuel about the fertile land and the beautiful Lake Winnebago, so he decided to move up to Winnebago Rapids, as it was then called. When he arrived he had eight head of oxen. He bought a section of land bordering on Little Lake Butte des Morts (on the western outskirts of Neenah). To make his payments on his land he would borrow a pony from the Indians to ride to the Land Office at Green Bay.

In Cunningham's "History of Neenah," James Ladd writes his recollections of arrival in Neenah in 1846. He says, "We lost our way and after wandering a long time, struck on an Indian trail which brought us to Mr. Jourdan's on the Neff farm. It was late afternoon. We were tired and hungry, but here we were served to a good dinner of wild duck, etc."

Mr. Neff had on his land one of the first five houses built by the government. It was built of hewn logs, two stories high, with a large fireplace for cooking. It was located not far from the Hill of the Dead on Winnebago Rapids.

Mary Ann, Samuel's first wife, died 28 Sept. 1847. He then took Emily and Lewis and went back to Burlington, N.Y. He married Martha Ann Miller in Sept. 1848. She was small in stature, 18 years old, while Samuel was 44. She told her grandchildren many tales of the hardships and the Indians and of how frightened she had been as a young woman. She had nine children. They came west by boat to Sheboygan and north in Wis. by oxen-pulled wagons.

Samuel and Martha Ann Neff were Charter members of the Neenah Grange #109, he being elected to serve as Treasurer. They were members of the Congregational Church in Menasha.

Samuel had 2 children by his first wife and nine by his second.

Vol. 5, p. 389) who was born 30 Jan. 1811, Windham, Conn., and died 23 July 1838, Vienna Township, Mich. (gr. st. Pine Run Cem., Mich.); married 2) 3 Sept. 1840, Vienna Township, Mich., GEORGE W. HUYCK (Genesee Co. mar. rec.) who was born about 1802 in N.Y. state.

Clark Abbee was one of the earliest settlers in Vienna Township, Genesee Co., Mich., as, according to the land-office records, he purchased land from the Government at the rate of \$1.25 per acre, in Section 13, in 1833, and in Section 25, in 1834. He went back to Conn. to marry Miss Mary Neff in 1836, returning immediately to Mich. with her, to settle permanently. He purchased more land from the Government in Section 26, in 1836. At the first Township election, held at the home of Charles McLean on the first Monday in April 1837, Clark Abbee, Isaac Van Tuyl and George Sparks were elected Assessors. In 1838, Clark Abbee and Charles McLean and Grovener Vinton were elected Fence-Viewers.

George W. Huyck was born about 1802 in New York state. He was one of the early settlers in Vienna Township, arriving about 1836. In 1842 George Huyck and Humphrey McLean were elected Constables; in 1843, George Huyck and Samuel Rone elected Poor-Masters; in 1844, George Huyck, Joseph W. Metcalf and Reuben Warner were elected Highway Commissioners.

The Congregational Church of Vienna, whose house of worship was located in Pine Run, was organized in the early part of 1845 by the Rev. Orson Parker, an evangelist and resident of Burton Township, Genesee Co., Mich. There were 22 members when the church was organized and George W. Huyck and George Sparks were chosen the first deacons.

He worked in the famous sandstone quarries in Portland, Conn., on the east side of the Conn. River where his first cousin, Billings Neff, was the manager. Mr. and Mrs. Neff were members of the First Congregational Church of Cromwell.

Jason Smith owned and ran a grist mill at Canterbury, Conn. The date of his death is not recorded but one would guess about 1840.

Some sort of epidemic must have hit the family in Mich., as it will be noticed that Clarissa Fuller died Aug. 30th, Marina died Sept. 3rd, and Lura Smith died Sept. 12th, 1858.

Minnie Fuller (see below) wrote 2 very interesting letters in 1883 and 1884 to Mich. relatives telling of the construction of the first building and the opening

of the Univ. of Texas and also about the death and very elaborate funeral of a famous Texas gunman, also named Thompson, attended by all, as she said, "out of curiosity." Copies of these letters were given to the Univ. of Tex. Library.

Clarissa died 24 March 1880 (Will).

William bought a farm in Moromas 20 May 1833, jointly with Lyman R. Bailey, brother of his wife Clarissa, and in 1835 sold his share to Lyman. (Middletown Land Rec., Vol. 62 & 65). In 1858, William and Clarissa with their son Lyman and his bride, Hannah, went to Michigan, to join his brothers and sisters. Waterman Neff sold 2 lots in what is now the city of Flint. Apparently they did not care for it and after a few years returned to Connecticut. The writer has heard Hannah Neff tell with great feeling how little she liked the raw new country with all the dampness from the great forests which were then standing. In 1864, William G. Neff bought a large house and 5 acres of land in the Candlewood Hill section of the village of Higganum, town of Haddam, Conn., where he and some of his descendants have lived ever since.

174. WATERMAN WRIGHT⁶ NEFF (Stephen⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 19 July 1810, Windham, Conn.; died 3 Dec. 1870, Vienna Township, Mich.; married 12 June 1836 to LUCIA FENTON by W. Livesy, Minister of the Gospel, Norwich, Conn. Lucia Fenton was born 9 Dec. 1809, Mansfield, Conn. and died 21 Sept. 1889, Vienna Township (Glio), Mich. Both are buried in the Mt. Morris, Mich., Cemetery.

Wright Neff (as he was called) married Lucia Fenton on the same day that his sister Mary married Clark Abbee. All four went at once to Vienna Township, Mich. to settle. This was in the very early days there, when the land was covered with virgin forest and the roads were merely rough tracks through the forest. The trip was made by Erie Canal and boats across the lakes and then overland by covered wagons drawn by oxen.

In 1836, Waterman bought land in Section 6, and in 1844 he was paying taxes on property in Sections 25 and 26 and the farm on which he lived was in Section 26. (History of Genesee Co.) He later purchased a farm in Section 35 which he sold to his brother William in 1861, when William arrived from Middletown, Conn.

Mr. Neff was always very much interested in local affairs. In the first Township election, held at the house of Charles McLean (the Township's first settler), on the first Monday in April in 1837, Waterman Neff, Grover Vinton and Hiram Benjamin were elected Highway Commissioners. In 1838 he was elected 1 of 3 Constables. In 1840 he was elected Collector as well as Constable and one of five Overseers of Highways. In 1852 Waterman Neff and John Taylor were elected Commissioners of Highways. (History of Genesee Co., Mich.)

(gr. st. Clio Cem.). George Bingham was the son of Erastus Bingham (Norwich V.R.), the name of his mother not being recorded, although her death occurred 16 March 1822, at 36 years (Norwich, V.R.), but her maiden name was probably Tracy, George's middle name.

The Bingham monument in the Clio Cemetery says "Settled Vienna Township in 1833." A tax list of 1844 says his farm was in Section 26. In 1840, George T. Bingham was elected one of three Highway Commissioners; in 1842 he was elected Town Clerk; in 1843, one of two Assessors; in 1844, he was again elected Town Clerk and also in 1845, 1846 and 1848. In 1851 and 1853 he was elected School Inspector.

George Tracy Bingham was descended from Deacon Thomas¹ Bingham of Norwich who married 12 Dec. 1666, Mary Rudd, daughter of Lt. Jonathan Rudd of Saybrook; Abel² & Elizabeth (Odell) Bingham; Jonathan³ & Mary (Abbe) Bingham; Jonathan⁴ & Elizabeth (Warner) Bingham; Erastus⁵ & _____ Bingham.

Mr. Bailey was descended from John¹ Balye, or Bailey, one of the original group of white settlers who purchased Haddam from

the Indians. The original deed is at the Haddam Town Hall., Haddam Land Records, Vol. 1, p. 78, has a list of the sons of John¹ Balye, including John² Bailey who married Elizabeth Gerrard. The line continues with Ephraim³ Bailey born 1 Jan. 1691; Gideon⁴ Bailey born 1725 and died 11 May 1809 and wife Sarah (Senter) Bailey; Gideon⁵ Bailey born 17 Nov. 1751 and died 10 May 1806 who married Lydia Spencer 6 Sept. 1773; Lyman⁶ Bailey born 24 Mar. 1789 and died 22 Mar. 1868 who married 27 June 1807 Dorothy Bailey, daughter of Eleazer Bailey.

Alvin's brother, Lyman R. Bailey, seems to have brought William G. Neff to Haddam, when they purchased a farm together 20 May 1833 at Maromas. Lura (Neff) Bailey and Alvin Bailey had a farm on the main road from Hartford to Saybrook near the present Seven Falls State Park. Their barn still stands although the house was burned and the farm has a number of dwelling houses built on it. Alvin Bailey was a farmer and quarryman.

178. HENRY GLINTON⁶ NEFF (Stephen⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 9 Sept. 1824, Chaplin, Conn.; died 27 July 1907 at Higganum, Town of Haddam, Conn.; married at Franklin, Conn., 12 July 1855, EMILY JERUSHA HARTSHORN born 4 June 1837 at Plymouth

Hollow (now Thomaston), Conn., died at Jersey City, N.J. 18 April 1904, the daughter of Henry and Anna (Scott) Hartsborn.

Henry Neff and his bride went at once to Vienna Township (Cllo), Mich., where his brother Waterman and sisters Mary, Marina, Eunice and Lucia were already living with their families. They traveled by covered wagon, going by way of the Erie Canal. Even in 1855 the township was covered by virgin forest except where it had been cleared for farms and there was still no good road to near-by Flint. Their first home was a log cabin, and it was not until after the Civil War that they were able to build the fine clapboard house now occupied by Mr. Earl Montague.

He responded to Lincoln's call for volunteers and enlisted Aug. 9, 1862 at East Saginaw, Mich. and was mustered in on the 11th of Sept., a private in Co. B, 23rd Regiment Mich. Infantry. A week later the Regiment left Saginaw for Kentucky where it was assigned to the 10th division of Gen. Rosencran's army and was soon pushed forward to Bowling Green, Ky., where it remained until May 29, 1863, employed in garrisoning that post and guarding railroad trains. Henry's diaries and letters, in the possession of the writer, tell much of this, including riding on top of a freight train. This refers to a detachment in command of Lieut. E.G. Wellington in charge of a train for Nashville, "which was attacked by a superior force of guerillas who were repulsed in so gallant a manner as to receive the commendation of the commanding general in orders." This occurred at Neeley's Bend where the Cumberland River was on one side of the tracks and a steep precipice on the other.

The Regiment spent June in pursuit of the rebels under Gen. John H. Morgan, moving rapidly through Mumfordsville, Louisville, to Jeffersonville, Ind., to Cincinnati and Chillicothe, Ohio, and back to Paris, Ky., arriving there just in time to save the railroad bridge from destruction and the small union force from capture in the ensuing battle. They left Paris Aug. 4, as part of the 2d brigade, 2d division, 23d corps, Army of the Ohio, Lt. Col. Spaulding commanding the Reg't. proceeding via Lexington, Louisville, and Lebanon to New Market. Leaving there Aug. 17, it participated in the advance into east Tenn., making a forced march of 30 miles, Loudon to Knoxville Sept. 15. The diaries refer to numerous battles, people killed, etc. and once several cannon balls going thru the camp, causing more excitement than damage. Henry was in the following battles; at Paris, Ky., 29 July 1863; Huff's Ferry, Tenn., 12 Nov. 1863; Campbell's Station, Tenn., 16 Nov. 1863; siege of Knoxville, Tenn., 17 Nov to 5 Dec. 1863; Dandridge, Tenn., 14 Jan. 1864; and Strawberry Plains, Tenn., 22 Jan. 1864.

The 23d Reg't., numbering 1417 officers and men, lost 287, with 228 of them dying of disease because of hardship, lack of food, etc. On 22 Jan. 1864, after suffering severely from dysentery for almost a year thru the various campaigns, he was transferred to Co. D, 23d Reg't Veteran Reserve Corps, stationed at Jeffersonville, Ind. Remained at Jeffersonville, Ind. until he was discharged 14 Feb. 1865, on surgeon's certificate of disability. Lacking proper medical care during the year at Jeffersonville he would have died, according to all reports, had his wife not been able to slip through southern lines and nurse him until she could take him home. The discharge was on order of Maj. Gen. Thomas, and papers were signed by George W. Kingsbury, Lieut. Commanding Co. Because a heart condition developed from this, Mr. Neff received a Civil War Pension later on.

With the War over, he was able to develop the farm in Vienna Township, Mich. His special interest was a large and very fine apple orchard. By 1890, he was renting the farm and living in Flint, Mich. where they remained until 1900, at which date they purchased a home at Higganum, Conn. This home they occupied from late March to Thanksgiving, spending the winters in Jersey City with their son Elmer. Mr. Neff's brother William and sister Lura (Neff)

Bailey and their families were living in Higganum.

Emily J. Hartshorn was descended from Thomas Hartshorn, propr. of Reading, Mass. 1648, and his son (Deacon and Dr.) David Hartshorn of Norwich (West Farms), Conn. before 1700 and one of the founders and first Deacons of the West Farms Congregational Church, now Franklin, Conn. Dr. Hartshorn is buried in the Plains Cem. there. (Emily⁷, Henry⁶, Eliphalet^{5&4}, David³, David², Thomas¹). She was also descended from John Knight, one of the original settlers of Newbury, Mass., and Joseph Scott and Seth Perry who served in the Revolution from Norwich, Conn.

Mrs. Neff was the daughter of Royal Edson, veteran of the War of 1812. Royal Edson was born 10 Sept. 1793, Stafford, Conn.; died 15 Sept. 1873 at Stafford; married 1st 21 Aug. 1820, Amelia Lovina Rose (Stafford V.R.) who died at Stafford 20 Mar. 1824 ae 23 yrs. (gr. st. Stafford). Emily Edson Neff was descended from Samuel Edson bp. 5 Sept. 1613 at Fillongley, Warwickshire, England, who married Susanna Orcutt in Warwickshire in 1638 and came to Salem, Mass. in June 1639. Samuel and Susanna Edson lived at Salem until, in 1651, they joined a company from Plymouth in settling Bridgewater, Mass., where he was the local miller. Roxanna Kibbee was born 26 May 1817, Ellington, Conn.; died 21 Aug. 1893, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, the daughter of Alvin and Mary (Smith) Kibbee.

Zebulon's mother died when he was 12 or 13 years old. At that time he was apprenticed by his father to a blacksmith. Later he went to work for the Alvin Kibbee family. It was here that he grew to know the daughter, Roxanna Smith Kibbee. On April 22, 1837, he joined Class 4 of the Tolland M.E. Church.

Zebulon lived at Enfield with his family. In the History of Enfield, Conn., by Allen, Vol. 1, p. 639, Zebulon Neff appears on the tax list of 1844 and on p. 655 his name appears on a list of those who voted at a town meeting, 2 April, 1849. After the death of their son, Manvers, they moved to Springfield, Mass. on the west side of the Connecticut River, in what is now West Springfield. In 1854 they made the trip to Iowa, claiming land which Mr. Neff purchased before going west. The youngest child, Arthur, was born in Ohio in Aug. 1854 at the home of Mrs. Neff's uncle. They went on to Iowa that fall, crossing the Mississippi River at Muscatine, Iowa. Their land lay near what is now Mt. Vernon, Iowa, about one mile west of the town. Zebulon and family returned to Massachusetts for six years shortly after their arrival in the new mid-west, going to Iowa again in 1861 to stay permanently.

1820, daughter of Samuel Bartlett, and died 24 April 1869. The wedding of Mr. Neff and Miss Bartlett, Sept. 5, 1841, by Rev. Samuel M. Emery (Portland V.R. Vol. 1, p. 1), was the first to take place in the present town of Portland. Billings Neff married 2) 26 Jan. 1870 MARIA J. HOPKINS born Middletown, Conn., Jan. 1841, daughter of Russell Hopkins, a soldier in the War of 1812, died Portland, Conn., Nov. 1927. (gr. st. Center Cem., Portland).

In 1835 Billings went to Portland, Conn. to find work, as the current wages for a farm hand in the Windham area was \$50 a year. Here he found work in the famous Portland sandstone quarry at \$12 per month, working from dawn to dark. This and other Connecticut quarries furnished the material for the stylish brownstone houses in New York City. When he returned home for the winter, after his first season in Portland, he had managed to live on \$10 of his wages and he took home enough money to buy his father a yoke of oxen. During his 30 years at the quarry he rose from the lowest position at \$12 a month to that of overseer or manager at \$3.75 a day. In 1872 he retired and engaged in farming and tobacco raising. He first built a house near the Methodist Church and later, in 1881, built the fine house on Main St., Portland, occupied by his family until 1927.

Billings Neff was first elected tax collector of Portland in 1855, and from 1866 to 1888 served continuously in that position. It is interesting to note that tax collections in 1855 were less than \$7,000 and were more than \$50,000 during his last year in that position. He also served the town as constable; served in the old militia and was a lieutenant during three years of that organization; member of First Congregational Church of Portland, filling several offices in that Society; charter member I.O.O.F. in Portland. Cast his first vote in 1840 for William Henry Harrison and thereafter voted for Whig and Republican presidential candidates.

After the death of her step-son Charles, and at the age of 72 in 1913, Mrs. Maria Neff took a Cook's tour of Europe and the Holy Lands. Two years later she took a Cook's tour to California and Alaska.

Never married. He was a quarryman for 20 years, and a stockholder in the Middlesex quarry at Portland. Charles was a naturalist and made a large collection of curios, Indian relics, native birds, snakes, insects and had a special case of birds' eggs. These collections were kept in large museum type cases and filled several large rooms in the house. He gave the Wadsworth Athenaeum at Hartford, Conn. a superb collection of birds' nests. He gave his large and fine collection of native birds to Wesleyan University in Middletown, Conn. In 1901 he traveled extensively through the U.S., visiting San Francisco, Cal., Portland, Ore. and spending a week in Yellowstone Park. He was a Republican and registrar of voters in Portland for many years.

The compiler of this genealogy has many happy recollections of summer visits to the home of Maria and Charles Neff and spent many happy moments over the various collections of birds, etc. After a huge New England type dinner we were taken to the "best parlor" to hear the gramophone with its cylindrical records and the music box with its large perforated brass records. Cousin Maria kept a large vegetable and flower garden until her death at the age of 86 years in 1927.

Albert was the first of the three brothers to go to Wis. from Conn. An old history of Richland Co. says that Albert was 21 yrs. old when he settled in Milwaukee in 1842. He worked as a building contractor for two years, then moved to Watertown and engaged in the same business. In 1855 he moved to Richland Center, Wis. where he purchased a hotel, calling it "The American House." After running the hotel for six and one-half years he traded it for land in the town of Henrietta, near Woodstock, Wis. This was apparently a farm, as an old diary of Elmer H. Neff's (#378) tells of visits by himself and parents 1890/91 to Albert's family. Albert was also a lay preacher and a deeply religious man. The writer has several letters written to her grandfather both before and after his wife, Mary, died.

The only dau. of Albert and Mary died in infancy. Before leaving Richland Center they adopted Genoa Elnia and Oscar Melvin Wilson, children of James and Amelia (Price) Wilson, who were then called Genoa and Oscar Neff.

He went to Milwaukee, Wis. in Oct. 1843, intending to follow his trade there, but later that fall he went on to Waukesha County and established himself in business in the village of Waterville, in Summit Township, Waukesha Co. He resided on Sec. 36. Ox teams were used chiefly by the pioneers and, as word spread concerning the excellence of his work, he served a very large area with considerable financial success for more than 51 years.

Most of the following was told me by Ralph's youngest daughter Emma Neff Storey. Ralph Neff went to Wisconsin after his two older brothers, Albert and Charles Neff. He went via Erie Canal and the Great Lakes. He told his children about the lovely apples which they had in great quantity in Conn. and of which there were so few in Wis. He bought a 40-acre farm on Buck Creek, in or near Richland Center, Wis. but he did not like farming. He had learned, and preferred, the blacksmith trade from his brother Charles Neff at Waterville, Wis. Emma remembers that the school was 1 1/2 miles from home and how terribly cold the walk was during the 3 months of

school in winter. One of the ways in which Ralph earned money in Wis., was to cut railroad ties. When there was snow on the ground, these could be hauled on sleds for 10 miles and sold for 25¢ each.

By 1881, the family decided they had had enough of the cold Wis. winters and headed south. The son Clark had already gone to Colo. Ralph Neff traded his farm for cash and a team of mules and set forth for Iowa in a covered wagon, leading a mare and a colt. However, the colt could not keep up and had to be sold. They ferried across the Mississippi River which was an exciting ride. They lived for a few years at What Cheer, Iowa. This was a coal mining town and the first time the children had ever seen coal except for the charcoal which their father had made from wood. The schools were better here. Later they moved on to Winona, Kan., where Ralph had a blacksmith shop. Clara liked school and eventually became a teacher in Winona. Emma worked for a printing company until she was 18. Clara Neff took up a homestead on the outskirts of Winona in 1888 and here her father raised sheep. She taught in a sod school house and their home was made of sod, as were all buildings in that region at that date. The inside walls of the home were whitewashed for cheer and cleanliness. Ralph is listed in the 1895 census for Winona. Julia Neff Pritchett's daughter Ethel, lived with her aunts and grandpa.

Captain Neff was educated in the New York state schools, graduating from the Academy at Garrettsville, N.Y. at the age of 18, after which he taught school for two years. In 1849 he accompanied his parents to Wisconsin where he taught school in Oshkosh for a short time. He also tended the toll bridge which his Uncle Abel had built across the Fox River. He was the first Marshal of Oshkosh, elected at the first meeting of the common council in 1853. At about this time he began his career as a boatman, continuing this career until he was 70 years old. His first craft was a sail boat with oars which he plied between Fond du Lac and Oshkosh. He superintended the building of several boats, including the first steamer on the Mississippi River. He built several barges for the use of the Diamond Line in the wheat traffic, which he towed in a fleet through the Portage Canal to the Mississippi River. In 1850 he built a boat which ran between Neenah and Appleton on Lake Winnebago. At that time these towns had no other means of communication. He commanded the Eureka, nicknamed "The Pickerel," which went to the Mississippi River in 1861, and in 1863 he acted as pilot when the side-wheeler, Fannie Fisk, went to the Mississippi. On the Mississippi, he was Captain of the packet steamer Arizona, which was purchased by the government and remodeled for use in the Civil War. Because of rheumatism, his services as a member of the navy were rejected, and when the boat was sold he returned home.

In 1875 he entered the employment of the United States government as Captain of the Crawford, which was used at that time for conveying material for the United States Engineering Dept. in the improvement of the Fox River. He commanded the Henrietta 13 seasons, the Boscobel and Dekorsa, each several seasons. He always kept an accurate record of the boats he sailed, and this record was later the basis for many articles. He was a Republican, and active in campaign work. He was a member of Winnebago Lodge #120, I.O.O.F. See the Oshkosh Northwestern 16 March 1903 for his obituary; the Commemorative Biographical Record, J.H. Beers & Co., 1895., p. 920; the Oshkosh Northwestern 1 March, 1941 on navigation in the Fox River Valley; also 'Oshkosh, 100 Years a City, 1853-1953.'

(Ferriss) Ellenwood, and died 7 Feb. 1927, Freeport, Ill. Both are buried at Oshkosh, Wis. For Ellenwood ancestry, see under Capt. Samuel Neff #344; for Ferriss ancestry, see The Ferris Family, by Harriet Scofield.

(William Wilberforce (1759-1833) for whom the Captain was apparently named, was a celebrated English anti-slavery crusader and philanthropist).

William W. Neff came to Wisconsin with his parents when he was 12 years old. He married at Oshkosh, and spent the rest of his life there. In his youth, he served a 4-year apprenticeship at the printer's trade and for a time was a printer on the Courier, one of the early newspapers of the state. However, William was soon drawn to the boats, the cargoes, and the shipping business of his relatives. His first boats carried cargoes on the Wolf and Fox Rivers, and on Lake Winnebago. He also went to the Mississippi River, using the then new waterway down the Fox, which joined the Wisconsin at Portage, Wis. The routes often held unexpected adventure. He held a boat captain's license for more than 40 years, and for six years of that time he held a pilot's license, and served as captain on Mississippi river boats.

An account in "Oshkosh - 100 Years a City," p. 599, says that the boating firm of Neff (Abel) and Leach built the sternwheel steamer, Brooklyn, in 1865. Capt. W.W. Neff commanded the vessel which ran between Oshkosh and Green Bay. In a story about the early Fox River navigation, the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern of 1 March, 1941 cites the voyage of the Henrietta from Oshkosh to Duluth "...a long distance feat for that day.... The Henrietta was a sternwheeler and built low to the water so it was no small task to plow the angry waves of Lake Superior through the entire length of that inland sea. William Neff was in charge of the Henrietta during its perilous voyage."

He built the side-wheeler, W.W. Neff (an oil painting of which hangs in the Oshkosh museum), a large boat for that day, and at the time of his death he was owner and captain of the Evelyn. For a time it was a passenger boat and ran between Grand Rapids and other Lake Michigan ports.

W.W. Neff wrote a series of articles on boats which may be seen in the Oshkosh Public Library. He served as Chief of Police of Oshkosh in 1890 and 1891. He was a 32 degree Mason, belonging to Oshkosh Lodge #27, and was a member of the Knights of Pythias and the Odd Fellows. His obituary may be found in the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern, 28 Oct. 1902.

When the Captain was nine years old, his family moved from New York state to Wisconsin, traveling by canal boat and steamer, and settling in Oshkosh. At the age of 12, he shipped on a lake schooner, and when he was 15 years old, he was master of a freight hooker that plied on Lake Winnebago. He was once caught in a severe storm on Lake Winnebago while in a small sailboat. He couldn't make land. For a time St. Elmo's fire came to rest on his rocking mast head, but he was safe as he tacked his boat back and forth all through the long night. Five years later he gave up sail boats and began steamboating on the Mississippi River, where he remained until 1871.

Captain Sam helped take the Neff boats from the Fox and Wolf Rivers, down the Wisconsin River and thence to the upper Mississippi where they carried freight and passengers to and from various points on the river, including trips between La Crosse and St. Paul. Prairie du Chien, Wis. became his headquarters. Some of the boats used in this period were the Arizona, the Pearl, the Eureka, W.A. Knapp, and Menominee, and the barges, Menasha, Van Ness Barlow, Fly and Top.

One day young Sam took his turn at the helm of the Eureka. A group of passengers sat on deck just forward of the pilot house. Sam could not help hearing their conversation. Diamond Jo (Joe Reynolds) may have been there, as he often rode the Neff boats, and chartered some of them to carry grain. Each bag was marked with the shape of a diamond containing the name Jo to distinguish him from another Joseph Reynolds. The Diamond Jo line became well known. That day the group of men talked of many things.

"You will never see a bridge across the Mississippi," one man said. The others agreed.

Young Sam spoke up: "How would it do to build a bridge on boats?" John Lawler, one of the men, stared at Sam, and Sam thought that he must have made a foolish remark. He remembered that he wanted to sink through the pilot house deck. Mr. Lawler said: "And how would you do it, young man?"

"I would anchor the boats with their heads up stream, and build the bridge from boat to boat."

Mr. Lawler went away and came back in several hours. "How would you put the drawbridge in?" he queried. Before John Lawler left the Eureka, he showed Sam a drawing of the proposed bridge. He said to Sam: "I'm going to build that bridge." And he did. It was a railroad bridge and he charged for each car that crossed. John Lawler wanted Sam to join him in business, but Sam had other ideas.

Sam eventually became captain of his own steamer, and in the course of his career on the Wisconsin River, and the Great Lakes, owned more than 40 vessels, at one time having seven under his management. He continued as an active captain until 1899, at which time he retired to give closer attention to the shore interests of his fleet. He built several boats, some of them in his own shipyard at Oshkosh, and others in the shipyards of Manitowoc and Port Huron. Three steamers were still in his name at the time of his death, the Charles S. Neff, the Lucy Neff, and the Adella Shores. In 1903 he sold the Nebraska, Marion, Kelton, and Hale. His sons, Sidney and Charles, went into business with him, using the firm name of Samuel Neff & Sons. Later the sons formed separate companies. The Neff vessels were fortunate in never having a serious mishap. Samuel Neff achieved an enviable reputation as a wrecking engineer, raising several difficult wrecks. He was granted a patent on one of his devices for raising wrecks.

A letter dated 24 June, 1894 to Mr. E.H.N. from Mrs.

Marcella G. Neff said that "the men were running the boats to Chicago from the Straits of Mackinac. Mr. (Sam) Neff and Charles on the steam barge 'Maggie Duncan' and the tow barge, 'S.O. Neff'. Sidney runs the St. Joseph, steam barge, and tow barge, Toledo." The propeller barge, Sam Neff, was built at Oshkosh by Capt. Sam in 1881. The St. Joseph was 160 feet long and had a 29-foot beam.

An interesting story is told about Capt. Sam with regards to the superstition that Friday was an unlucky day (a sailor's superstition). To prove that Friday was not unlucky, he started building one of his boats - the Charles S. Neff - on a Friday. All major parts of the boat were started on a Friday. The boat was launched on Friday and made its maiden voyage on a Friday. The boat sailed the Great Lakes for many years and was finally sold and used on salt water, going to South America. It never suffered from bad luck of any kind.

Captain Neff was asked at one time to run for governor of Wisconsin, but refused. He likewise refused the award of a Carnegie medal offered him for saving another's life. He was a member of the Lumber Carrier's Association; a 32 degree Mason, a member of Independence Lodge, No. 80, F. & A.M., and of Ivanhoe Commandery, Knights Templar.

ELLENWOOD ANCESTRY

Two Ellenwood sisters married two Neff brothers. Mary Elizabeth⁸ Ellenwood married #343 William W. Neff, and Marcella Cynthia Ellenwood⁸ married #344 Samuel Neff. The ancestry of Benjamin⁷ Ellenwood, the father, follows:

Ralph¹ Ellenwood, planter, came to New England in the Truelove, arriving in September of 1635 when he was 28 years old. He settled first at Salem, Mass., and then went to Beverly, Mass. He married, probably as his second wife, Helen Lyn at Salem on 14 March, 1655. He helped organize the first church at Beverly in 1667. He died in 1674. Children:

David³ Ellenwood was b. in Beverly 11 Dec. 1698; mar. 1) 23 Dec. 1719 Joanna Balch, b. Beverly 30 April, 1702; mar. 2) in Beverly 6 Dec. 1725 Margaret Wallis b. Beverly 1 Nov. 1699, dau. of Nathaniel and Anna (Rich) Wallis. He d. Beverly, 1777; Margaret was bur. 16 Sept. 1778. Benjamin⁴ was the eldest of their seven children.

Benjamin⁴ Ellenwood was b. 16 Aug. 1728 and mar. in Beverly 5 June, 1747, Susanna Corning, b. 5 Nov. 1727, dau. of David and Priscilla (Thistle) Corning, of Beverly. In 1764 they went to Nova Scotia and settled near Yarmouth, where Benjamin was one of the

original grantees. His will, probated in Liverpool, N.S. 18 April 1775 lists his children as Benjamin, Nathaniel⁵, Race, Susanna, Margaret, Anna, Joanna.

Nathaniel⁵ Ellenwood b. probably early 1750s, mar. 14 Nov. 1781 Margaret Freeman, b. Liverpool, 19 May 1761, the dau. of Samuel and Mary (Doane) Freeman. Samuel Freeman, b. 8 Aug. 1715 was the son of Thomas Freeman, b. 12 Oct. 1676, Eastham, Mass. Nathaniel was a captain, and the owner, and part owner of various shallops and schooners, visiting Labrador and the Gulf of St. Lawrence on fishing voyages. He also engaged in the packet trade between Halifax, N.S., and Boston, Mass. Benjamin⁶ was the first of their four children.

Benjamin⁶ Ellenwood was b. Liverpool, 14 March 1783 and mar. on 10 Nov. 1803 Epiphany Tryphena Nickerson, b. Liverpool 25 Dec. 1785, the dau. of James and Rachael Nickerson. James Nickerson, a sea captain, was the son of Eldad and Mary (Cohon) Nickerson. (See below for the career and murder of Benjamin⁶ Ellenwood). Children b. Liverpool: David Ellenwood, b. 8 Oct. 1804 and lost at sea in 1830; Epiphany b. 10 Oct. 1809, and Benjamin⁷, b. 20 April 1813. Captain Ellenwood's widow mar. 7 June 1817; William Riggs, a Halifax school teacher, the son of Henry and Sindenia Riggs, of Eastburn, County Sussex, England. They had two children, Alfred and Michael, and migrated to Salem, Ore., along the Oregon Trail. They were pioneers in Salem, and their descendants still live there.

Benjamin⁷ Ellenwood b. 20 April 1813 at Liverpool, N.S. apparently left Nova Scotia with his brother James and went to New York state. James went into lumbering at Plattsburgh, N.Y., on Lake Champlain. The Census of 1850 lists Benjamin as living with his wife, Parmelia, and children in Peru, not far from Plattsburgh. Peru was a small agricultural village surrounded by orchards of high quality apples. Benjamin mar., probably in the early 1830s Parmelia R. Ferriss, b. 21 Sept. 1814 at Peru, one of the 10 children of William and Sally (Weston) Ferriss. Sally Weston Ferriss was the dau. of Lieut. James Weston, of Braintree, Mass. who served in the Revolution, and of Elizabeth Witherel, of Conn. Many members of the large Ferriss clan had settled in the Lake Champlain area. They were Quakers. (See the Ferriss Genealogy, by Harriet Scofield, of Cleveland, Ohio). Children of Benjamin and Parmelia were David b. 7 June, 1838, who served in the Civil war, Co. E., 2nd. Wis., and d. 16 April, 1899; Warren, b. 1840 who escaped from Libby prison during the Civil war, and d. in Calif.; Sidney, b. 1842 and d. Andersonville prison during the Civil war, 1863; Marcella Cynthia, b. 19 April 1844; Mary Elizabeth b. 18 Feb. 1847.

In May 1857 Benjamin, his wife and children went to Wisconsin, and settled in that area near Oshkosh which contains what is now the Ellenwood cemetery. Later they moved into Oshkosh. Benjamin d. 1896 and Parmelia Ellenwood on 16 Dec. 1901.

NOTES ON THE CAREER AND MURDER OF CAPT. BENJAMIN⁶ ELLENWOOD

"If revenge is sweet Thomas Freeman had a syrupy cup to sip before the year 1813 was out. Benjamin Ellenwood was one of the best of the Nova Scotia privateersman. By July he had brought in nine more prizes with the Retaliation, beside those which he had driven ashore or which had slipped through his fingers by perils of the sea and recapture by the enemy."

"Benjamin Ellenwood was promoted to a larger and finer privateer named the Shannon."

p. 242

"Schooner Shannon of Liverpool, N.S., Sept. 2nd., 1813 - (Date of letter of marque) - No better name was ever bestowed on a British fighting ship than Shannon; and after Joseph Barss, no more successful privateersman ever commanded a Nova Scotian letter-of-marque than Benjamin Ellenwood, who captained this schooner when 25 years of age. She was the captured American privateer Growler, of Salem, renamed by her purchaser, Snow Parker, of Liverpool, in honour of Capt. Broke's famous frigate and her victory of June 1st., 1813. The privateer Shannon measured 146 tons and had five guns and a crew of 50. Benjamin Ellenwood had only six men left when he manned out her 16th. prize on Nov. 2nd., 1813. In all, 19 of the prizes he made reached port safely. John Brown, one of his prize masters, succeeded to the command of the Shannon in June 1814, and made three prizes before going to the Rover....Gallant Capt. Ellenwood was murdered on Dolby's wharf, Halifax, in February, 1815, on the eve of sailing for home for Liverpool."

ELMER HARTSHORN⁷ NEFF (Henry C.⁶, Stephen⁵, John⁴, Clement Jr.³, Clement², William¹) born 6 March 1866, Vienna Township, Mich; died 26 Jan. 1946, Montclair, N.J.; married 28 June 1894, Flint, Mich., ISABELLA COTTRELL born 13 Feb. 1866, Jersey City, N.J., dau. of Copely and Catherine (Breen) Cottrell, and d. Montclair, N.J. 26 March 1926.

Elmer Neff graduated in 1884 from the Flint, Mich. High School. He received his B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering from the Univ. of Mich. in 1890 and the degree of M.E. from the Univ. of Mich. in 1901. In 1941 he received a Citation from his Alma Mater as "one whose ingenuity and executive ability, applied to the problems of the design, distribution and proper installation of machine tools, has made him an acknowledged leader in an industry which is fundamental to many others." In April 1942, he received a Navy "E" for excellence for his part in his Co.'s contribution to World War II.

In business, he was first associated with the Edward P. Allis Co. in Wis. and then the Gisholt Machine Co. in Madison, Wis. for whom he designed an entire line of turret lathes, 1891-93; Instructor in Mechanical Engineering at Purdue Univ. 1893-94; designer of gas house machinery and gas engines Western Gas Construction Co., Fort Wayne, Ind. 1894-96; An offer of a position as Designer from Brown & Sharpe Mfg. Co., of Providence, R.I., oldest and largest small tool manufacturers in the country, brought him east in 1896. From 1898 to 1940, when he retired, he was in charge of the New York office of Brown & Sharpe Mfg. Co., later Brown & Sharpe of New York Inc.

Mr. Neff was a member of the Board of Education in Montclair, N.J. 1910 to 1915 and was vice-pres. of it. His accomplishments on the Board were many, including a revision of the course of study in the schools and the building of a beautiful new High School which opened in Sept. 1915 and which still looks new in 1953. Every detail had his personal attention.

He was a Life Member of the Amer. Soc. of Mech. Engineers from 1898 on, the Soc. of American Military Engineers, and one of the organizers of the Railroad-Machinery Club of New York City, the Univ. of Mich. Club (N.Y.), also the N.J. Soc. Sons of the Amer. Rev., the Commonwealth Club, Upper Montclair Golf Club and others. He was a charter member of the Montclair Soc. of Engineers. One of the charter members and the first Sec. of Mountain Lodge 214, F. & A. M., he held most of the offices in it and was a past master. A party to present him with his 50-yr. pin had been planned for the Feb. following his passing.* He had previously been a member of Fraternity Lodge #262 at Ann Arbor, Mich. Also a member of Lebanon Commandery 31, Knights Templar; Pres. of the Upper Montclair Republican Committee for over 25 yrs. Served on the first N.J. State Park Commission 1931-32.

Mrs. Neff was the dau. of Copely Cottrell b. 25 Nov. 1825 in Ireland; d. 22 Nov. 1893, Flint, Mich.; mar. Catherine Breen b. 31 Oct. 1830, in Ireland and d. 25 Nov. 1895, Flint, Mich. The Cottrell family was among those Protestants in France who escaped to England at the time of the Massacre of St. Bartholomew. While some of the Cottrells came to R.I. at a very early date, Isabella's ancestors did not come till the 1850s. Her parents went to Flint, Mich. in 1867 in the days of corduroy roads. Isabella graduated from Flint High School in 1884 and attended the Univ. of Mich. for two yrs. in the class of 1892. She taught school in Flint, Mich. and also at Akely Institute, a select school for girls at Grand Haven, Mich. She was organist of the Court St. M.E. Church in Flint for several years and was an accomplished singer; a member of the Jersey City Woman's Club where she was active in the Music Dept. until 1907, then a member of the Woman's Club of Upper Montclair and a charter member of the College Womens' Club of Montclair. Always deeply interested in Church affairs she was a Deaconess of the

Union Congregational Church of Upper Montclair and for 5 yrs.
Corres. Sec. of the Philadelphia Branch of the Congregational
Board of Home Missions (Churches from Me. to Fla.).

ONE HUNDRED YEARS

Birthday of Mrs. Featherstone Was To-day

"But few of us have ever seen a person who has rounded out a full century of human life, and fewer of us will reach that period of life ourselves so that it becomes a matter of no little interest when the one hundredth birthday anniversary is celebrated. Such an event is being properly observed in our city today, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Cottrell, 1025 Stockton St."

"Mrs. Mary Featherstone, aunt of Mr. Cottrell, and who has been a member of his family for some years, today passes the hundredth milestone in her earthly existence, having been born near Maller, in the county of Cork, Ireland, Oct. 23, 1797. Her father's name was Joseph Cottrell, and her mother's name, before marriage, was Eliza Farmer. Mrs. Featherstone was the eldest of a family of 13 children, of whom two others are still living, Mrs. Jane Clancy, a resident of the first ward of this city, about 88 years of age, and Mrs. Eliza Leghorn, of Jersey City, N.J., aged 75 years. About 1826 she was married to John Featherstone at Blarney, Ireland, with whom she lived about 20 years. In 1846 she came to America with her parents and other members of their family, leaving her husband in Ireland, to attend to the sale of some property before coming here. They were seven weeks and three days in crossing the Atlantic in a sailing vessel. Soon after reaching this country she received the sad news of the death of her husband, who was taken sick soon after their vessel had sailed. She never raised any children and has remained a widow now about 51 years. Her father died the year following their arrival in this country, and her mother died later in this city and was buried in the old city cemetery."

"Mrs. Featherstone is in high spirits today and enjoying the notoriety she has won. She is still unusually bright and active for an old person, with her hearing acute and her eyesight good enough to thread a needle without spectacles which in fact she has never used but little. She can go up and down stairs fairly well. She has on exhibition today a woolen quilt for which she spun the wool and made it seventy years ago. She bids fair to live several years yet, reaching into the 20th century, and living in 3 different centuries, the 18th, 19th and 20th. They had her photograph taken today."

May Cottrell Featherstone was the oldest sister of my grandfather Copely Cottrell and aunt of my mother, Isabella Cottrella Neff. The picture mentioned in the newspaper used to hang over our piano in Montclair. Copely Cottrell was born Nov. 25 1825 in Ireland

and d. Nov. 22, 1893 in Flint, Mich.

C.S. Cottrell in the paper was also named Copely and his father was Richard Cottrell, a brother to my grandfather and Mary Featherstone.

Grandpa Copely, Cottrell married Catherine Breen, born in Ireland the dau. of an Irishman and a Scotch woman, in Jersey City, N.J.

Mother's brother, Thomas R. A. Cottrell, d. Nov. 24th, 1875 at the age of 8 yrs., 2 months at Flint, Mich.

The Iowa Beekeepers Assoc., as well as the Horticultural Society, of which Mr. Pellett had been president, have plaques there. Scores of visitors yearly visit the woodland site. The Iowa State Horticultural Society issued a pamphlet about Mr. Pellett at the time the memorial was dedicated. Cousin Will would pull a handle and an enormous log would begin to pump up and down while he, with the red hot bit of metal in his tongs, would turn it this way and that, shaping it into the sharp cutting edge for the hoe. Red hot sparks and bits of metal flew around, but he was well protected by gauntlets and apron. By the time a dozen of those huge hammers were pounding at the same time in the shop, the noise was terrific. After work, the hours were busy with the farm, dairy and orchard. Mr. George Neff has led a long and active life with his "old-time fiddling," his business and civic interests. His grandfather, Solomon Neff, told him stories about "Uncle Joseph" Neff's prowess as a fiddler and made George, who had inherited a real musical talent from his mother, full of longing for a violin. At the age of eight, he made himself a crude violin which would play. When he was 11, a sailor came by one day and asked for a meal. He offered to sell them his violin and George's father bought it for him for 25 cents. This violin turned out to be an excellent instrument and George, who plays entirely by ear, was able to play for his first dance in a Tolland kitchen a year later. It is this same violin which he plays today, grown more beautiful and mellow with the years. It started George on a musical career which has given pleasure to thousands and has also brought him renown and two silver trophies for being the best old-time fiddler in northern Connecticut.

When he grew up, George bought a portable saw-mill and went into the logging business, traveling over various parts of Conn. and Mass. It was while he was working in Ware, Mass. that he met and married Elsie Patrill. He had a saw mill in Blandford for eight years at the time of the Provin Mountain project when the lumber was bought standing and he was hired as sawyer.

In 1915 the saw mill was sold in Mass. and the family returned to Tolland where Mr. Neff bought the old Grover place where he now lives. Here he carried on a small dairy farm where he wintered as many as 15 head. Just to fill in any spare moments, he set up a barber shop in the summer kitchen of the 200 year old house.

George served as Selectman for the town of Tolland for 17 years. During five of these years, he was First Selectman. In 1923 he went to Hartford as Representative to the State Legislature of Conn.

Because of his saw mill interest, when he formed a dance orchestra years ago, he called it the "Saw Mill Gang." His wife and children followed the dances with him and on occasion he and his wife danced a set to show how it should be done. Since he was often off in the woods when a call came to play at a square dance, it meant getting the family ready, hitching up the horse for what was often a long jaunt over dirt roads to another town, returning in the wee, small hours of the morning. This was likely to happen three and four times a week. Later he owned one of the first Stanley Steamers which shortened the trip immensely.

The "Saw Mill Gang" today is a family affair, for all of George Neff's children have had a musical education. Ellery, the violin maker, studied harmony for three years and plays the violin in the orchestra. His son Emery plays the saxophone and another

son, Harold, also plays the saxophone and "calls off." Ellery's son, Ben, 16, plays the trumpet and drums while Harold's son, Henry, plays the accordion. Henry's wife Jean plays the piano. Back in the days when radio was young, this orchestra was one of the pioneer broadcasters over both WTIC and WDRG. Such old favorites as Fisher's Horn Pipe, Hull's Victory, Money Musk and Turkey in the Straw were popular then as now. At 83 George is still strong and he and his orchestra are to be heard every Sat. night at the Vernon, Conn. Grange Hall.

His fiddling has created a splendid philosophy of life. He says that music does a lot for mankind. It breeds peace and goodwill. It could do a lot more, for if folks laughed and danced and fiddled, there wouldn't be any hate in the world because you can't hate anyone when you're dancing and fiddling. The song in his soul and a serene outlook on life has kept George Neff young at heart.
