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PREFACE.

THE following records have been in course of preparation for several years, under the direction of Mr. William Guile Northup of Minneapolis, Minn.

The data of the first four generations of the Northup family, together with the Congdon Notes, were collected and prepared by Mrs. Louise P. Bates, of Oak Lawn, Rhode Island, who found her material among the Vital Records of North Kingstown, and the Land and Probate Records of both North and South Kingstown, R. I.

About fifteen years ago the gathering of the records of the Tucker family was begun by General and Mrs. James Shaw, of Providence, R. I., an uncle and aunt of Mrs. Northup. Mrs. Shaw was much interested in the matter and collected much valuable data of the Fisher, Potter, Arnold and other lines, which carried the family back to the *Mayflower* and to the early Colonial families of Rhode Island. She was not successful, however, in tracing the Tucker family back to the immigrant ancestor, and that part of the work was also done by Mrs. Bates, from the records of the Rhode Island towns where the family lived for several generations.

The record of the Northup family was taken up where Mrs. Bates left it, and finished by Miss Anna J. Cleveland, of Minneapolis, Minn., from data gathered principally from living members of the family, and from letters written by other members who are long since gone.

The whole of this has been assembled and compiled by Mrs. Edward C. Chatfield, of Minneapolis.

JANUARY, 1914.

ONE BRANCH OF THE NORTHUP FAMILY OF NORTH KINGSTOWN.

On October 2, 1655, the towne meetinge of Providence, in the Colony of Rhode Island, granted to Stephen' Northup twenty-five acres of land. This is the first time his name appears upon record. Northop or Northope or Northrope, as it is interchangeably written, is supposed to indicate an ancestral residence in northern England, at one time overrun by the Danes who called their villages "thorpes." Nor-Thorpe therefore may mean a dweller in one of these northern villages or thorpes.

On August 27, 1656, at another towne meetinge, it was ordered that Stephen Northup have a home-lot laid out to him over against Christopher Smith's lot; also, that he have commonage equal to any other townsman; also, that he be allowed to vote with the other inhabitants of the town. Henceforth he was a freeman and a proprietor in the town, and held certain rights in the undivided lands. He built his house at the north end of the town, between the main street and the Moshassuck river. Old deeds show that a brook ran through his land, and that its northern boundary was a lane down which the boys of the town used to drive the cattle to water. The house was doubtless destroyed during King Philip's war, with the rest of the town's dwellings.

On June 4, 1660, Stephen' Northup was elected towne sargeant at the rate of three shillings a day, peage eight per penny. During his service John Clawson, a Dutchman, a protégé of Roger Williams, was murdered by an Indian not far from Northup's house. Northup spent one day in warning the town about the prisoner, and four days in taking the prisoner to Newport and attending his trial there, for which he received the three shillings a day.

On February 8, 1662, he sold his land in Providence, and on March 28, 1666, he witnessed a deed there. His name does not appear among the inhabitants who took the oath of allegiance to the King May 31, 1666. He probably removed to Kingstown about this time.

Pettaquamscot, the place where Stephen¹ Northup settled, was bought by Samuel Wilbour and his partners of the Indians about

1657. The land was also claimed by Humphrey Atherton and his partners as theirs by a prior mortgage from the Indians, which they had foreclosed. A settlement by arbitration was made, and in December, 1679, it was agreed that all those who had bought lands in Pettaquamscot of Samuel Wilbour and his partners should be allowed to keep them. Stephen Northup owned one hundred and twenty acres on the west side of Pettaquamscot Pond, not far from the place where the house, in which Gilbert Stuart the artist was born, now stands. A spring of water, and a nearly obliterated old burial place mark the vicinity of the early dwelling.

The name of the wife of Stephen¹ Northup is unknown. She may have been a daughter of Benjamin Harrington, a near neighbor in Providence, as one of the Northup children was named Benjamin. One of Harrington's grand-children was buried in this old Northup burial ground and another of them was brought up in the family of

a son of Stephen Northup.

In August, 1672, the Colony of Connecticut, which claimed jurisdiction over the Narragansett country, in which Pettaquamscot lay, issued an order for Northup to appear before their court to be held there. Northup was a staunch Rhode Islander, as appears by his reply to the summons: "I denie to obey any warant from ye Authority of Conecticot; if ye government of Roade Island send any I will obay them but not this warant nor any from Conecticot Collony."

The name of Stephen' Northup appears for the last time in 1687 when with the other inhabitants of Kingstown he was taxed by Gov. Andros. The destruction of the records has left no trace of a will or settlement of his estate.

STEPHEN² NORTHUP (Stephen¹), testified in 1721 that he was sixty-one years old and that he had known the Pequot path (the old Indian trail that led from Providence to New London), for forty-eight years. About 1687, he bought a tract of land on Boston Neck, known as the Middlefield farm. He also had a grist mill. Mary Northup, his wife, died after 1753.

NICHOLAS³ NORTHUP (Stephen, Stephen) was born (probably) between 1690 and 1700, at North Kingstown, R. I. In his will made in 1764, he speaks of himself as aged. He was admitted freeman of the colony, May 1, 1722. His first wife was Abigail, whose last name is unknown. He married second, on June 23, 1730, Freelove Eldred, daughter of Daniel and Mary Eldred. She was born at North Kingstown, March 29, 1701, and died there between 1755 and 1761. He married for his third wife, Sarah, supposed to be a widow Gould, who survived him. He died in 1764.

ROUSE⁴ NORTHUP (*Nicholas*, ³ Stephen, ² Stephen¹) was born at North Kingstown, R. I., March, 1734. He married about 1755 Sarah⁴ Congdon.* Her parents died in her infancy, and she was brought up by her grandparents, whose farm adjoined the Northup estate.

On December 9, 1755, Nicholas' Northup and his wife Freelove deeded to their son Rouse' Northup, yeoman, fifty-two acres of land on Boston Neck, in North Kingstown, a part of the land that had once belonged to Stephen' Northup. A part of its west boundary

was Narragansett Bay. The Northups were farmers and ferry keepers, and owned the ferry from Plum Beach to the Island of Jamestown.

The Rhode Island Census for 1774 records Rouse as living in North Kingstown, with eight in his family — one male under, and four over sixteen years of age, and one female over and two under sixteen.

In 1782, what is now known as the Baptist Church of Allentown, R. I., was formed at the house of Rouse Northup. He and his wife Sarah, with his brother Gideon, and his wife Avis, were constituent members of the church.

Sarah Northup died in 1783. Rouse Northup went to New York State and died there. He was buried in the old M. E. Church burying-ground at Kingston, N. Y. (now Gloversville).

NICHOLAS⁵ NORTHUP (Rouse, Nicholas, Stephen, Stephen) was born November 19, 1777, in Rhode Island, and died March 11, 1843, at Salisbury, N. Y. He married, May 9, 1802, Katherine Ferguson, who was born October 16, 1784, and died January 14, 1859, at Manlius, N. Y. She was the daughter of Samuel and Mary (Theirs) Ferguson. Her mother was born in Germany and came when a child to America. Her father, Samuel Ferguson, was born in Ireland of Scottish parents. Mr. Northup belonged to the Methodist Church.

Daniel A. Northur (Nicholas, Nouse, Nicholas, Stephen, Stephen) was born at Oppenheim, N. Y., June 27, 1817, and died July 14, 1875, at Salisbury Center, N. Y. WILLIAM GUILE⁷ NORTHUP (Daniel, Nicholas, Rouse, Nicholas, Stephen, Stephen) was born at Salisbury Center,

N. Y., July 21, 1851. At the age of sixteen he removed to Minneapolis, Minn., and became a member of the family of the late Rev. James H. Tuttle, whose wife, Harriet Merriman Tuttle, was a sister to the first wife of Daniel A. Northup. After various experiences in a newspaper office and a hardware store, he entered the employ of the North Star Woolen Mill Company, and, from the position of clerk, rose steadily by successive stages to the Presidency of the company. He is also closely identified with some of the leading Banks and Trust Companies of Minneapolis. He was married on November 12, 1874, at Cranston, Rhode Island, to Leila⁷ Tucker, daughter of Henry Greene and Francis Amanda (Fisher). Tucker, and their entire married life has been spent in Minneapolis.

CONGDON NOTES.

1

Benjamin' Congdon lived at Newport and at Portsmouth, Rhode Island. He was born about 1650, and died June 19, 1718. His wife was Elizabeth Albro, who was the daughter of John and Dorothy Albro. John Albro took an active part in the affairs of the colony, serving for two years as a Commissioner and for twelve years as an Assistant. At his death Elizabeth received by his will, fifty shillings in silver money, a bolster case, a pair of sheets and two pewter platters. Elizabeth (Albro) Congdon died November 15, 1720.

Benjamin Congdon was a large land owner in both North and

South Kingstown, and gave large farms to his sons.

In his will, which was made July 2, 1715, and proved December 10, 1718, he mentions his sons: William, John, Benjamin and James.

2

Benjamin² Congdon (*Benjamin*¹) was born about 1680 and died in 1756. He married, December 1st, 1701, Frances Stafford, daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Holden) Stafford of Warwick, R. I.

Benjamin Congdon lived first at South Kingstown, but later settled on a farm on Boston Neck adjoining that of Nicholas' Northup. His house occupied the site of the one built later by his son John, which is now in ruins. His wife Frances Stafford was a descendant of several families who were very prominent in colonial days, notably the Holdens and the Lathams.

Randall Holden was born in Salisbury, County Wilts, in England. He married Frances Latham Dungan in 1648. Their daughter, Sarah Holden, married Joseph Stafford, and Frances Stafford, their

daughter, married Benjamin Congdon.

Randall Holden was Corporal in 1638, Assistant to the Governor from 1647 to 1658 and in 1664-5 and 1676. He was Commissioner in 1652, '54, '55, '59, '60, '62, and '63, and Deputy in 1666, 1667, and from 1669 to 1673, also in 1675, 1680 and 1686. He was a Justice of the Court of Common Pleas in 1687-88.

STUKELEY's CONGDON (Benjamin, Benjamin'). Born December 11, 1722. In 1742, his father, Benjamin's Congdon, deeded to him land on Congdon Hill, near the old Congdon burial place. In 1744 he deeded this back to his father and received a lot of land down by the shore near his father's dwelling place. The supposition is, that the exchange of property was after the death of his wife, and that he took his children back to his father's home to be cared for. His will, which was probated in 1746, mentions his two children, Sarah and Stukeley; and his father, Benjamin, is appointed guardian of them. The name of his wife has not been found.

SARAH CONGDON' (Stukeley, Benjamin, Benjamin') was probably born in 1740, and when in 1746, she had lost both parents, she went with her brother Stukeley' to the home of her grand-parents, Benjamin' and Frances (Stafford) Congdon. This home adjoined that of Nicholas' Northup. So Rouse' Northup and Sarah' Congdon probably grew up together, and about 1755 they were married.*

TUCKER LINE.

1

MORRIS¹ TUCKER, of Salisbury, Mass., married October 14, 1661, Elizabeth Stevens.

This is the first record concerning him. He married (2), in 1663, Elizabeth Gill, daughter of John and Phebe (Buswell) Gill. He married (3), Grace ———, who survived him.

Of his sons, Benoni and Joseph remained in Massachusetts. His other sons, John, James, Jabez and Morris, went to Rhode Island, and became the progenitors of the Rhode Island Tuckers. John settled in Providence, in the part that later became Gloeester; James in Tiverton, later in Warwick; Jabez in Westerly; and Morris in Westerly and Hopkinton.

Morris¹ Tucker either accompanied or followed his sons to Providence, where he died September 23, 1711, leaving all his property to his wife Grace. He owned no real estate.

James² Tucker (*Morris*¹) was born at Salisbury, Mass., December 28, 1667. In 1669, he was still of Salisbury, but later removed to Tiverton, Mass., now Tiverton, R. I.

He sold his land at Tiverton to his brother Morris Tucker in 1718. January 17, 1726/7, the town clerk of Warwick was ordered to take bonds of "one Tucker" who had come into the town to live. In 1727, he bought of Anthony Low of Warwick, one half of a saw and grist-mill on Roaring Brook at Natick. He also bought land in Providence and Glocester, R. I., in 1733, calling himself of Warwick. He sold the Glocester land to "my brother John Tucker of Glocester." The name of his wife and the date of his death are unknown.

JOHN³ TUCKER (James, Morris¹) was probably born at Tiverton, and accompanied his father to Warwick. He married a daughter of Zachariah Rhodes* of Warwick and Smithfield, whose first

Zachariah Tucker (John, James, Morris) was born at Warwick, R. I., Aug. 4, 1734, and died at Cranston, R. I., December 19, 1801. His gravestone is still in Cranston. He married (1), after 1760, Hannah Carpenter, daughter of Jeremiah and Susannah (Palmer) Carpenter. He married (2), about 1771, Sarah (Fenner) Arnold, widow of Uriah Arnold, and daughter of Richard and Elizabeth (Arnold) Fenner.*

On April 4, 1760, Zachariah Rhodes of Smithfield, and John Tucker of Warwick, sold to Zachariah Tucker, "single man," son of said John Tucker, and grandson of said Zachariah Rhodes, "land in Cranston."

He died intestate, and his son James and son-in-law Lowry Aborn were appointed administrators of his estate, December 26, 1801. Zachariah was a sea-captain.

James Tucker (Capt.) (Zachariah, John, James, Morris) was born in 1773, and died June 13, 1855. He married, February 2, 1800, Nancy Greene, who was born in 1784, and died August 31, 1851.

†Nancy Greene? was the daughter of Rhodes Greene? (Stephen, Thomas, Peter,
James, John!) and Phebes Vaughan (Christopher, Christopher, Christopher,
George!), and had several ancestors who held important Colonial offices. John!
Greene, the first of the family in this country, received a deed of land from Roger
Williams, and was an Assistant for two years and a Commissioner for four. His son,
James, held the office of Deputy for fifteen years, and was also a Commissioner and
Assistant. James? married Elizabeth? Anthony, the daughter of John! Anthony (16071675), who came in the ship Hercules in 1634, and was a Corporal, a Deputy and a Commissioner between 1644 and 1672. James's son Peter, married Elizabeth Slocum,
born Jan. 1, 1678, a daughter of Ebenezer? Slocum (Giles, Anthony!). Anthony!
Slocum was a Deputy for seventeen years and a speaker of the House of Deputies for
two years. He often served also as Moderator, Councilman and Head Warden.
