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FOREWORD

This small booklet is intended primarily as a Genealogy of the descendants of Edwin Mortimer Owen, the son of the immigrant, Daniel Owen, Jr., who was born in the north of Wales, but whose birthplace is not known, although it has been said that he was born at Llanberis in the North of Wales. Attempts have been made to give data of all the descendants of him and his wife, Amy Valona Warner, where same can be obtained.

Only a few generations of the Owens can be shown due to Daniel, Jr. not arriving in this country until about 1804. His father was probably called also Daniel, as the immigrant always went under the name of Daniel, Jr.

The early lineage of the Norton, Warner and Stanton families, all of early Colonial ancestry running back to the first settlement of New England, are given in almost complete detail.

Some of the prominent families shown in this pedigree also are given special mention.

In the preparation of this genealogy, inasmuch as no certain knowledge is possessed of the previous home of Daniel Owen, Jr., the immigrant, it is impossible to give any information of progenitors back of the time that he arrived in America. However, all the families that his descendants married into are old American families, mostly from Connecticut, and full lineages are given of the Norton family (Daniel's wife was a Norton), the Warners, and the Stantons. Brief accounts are also given of some of the other families allied with them, such as the Bronsons, Beach, Carrington, Lupton, Chesebrough, Gallup, Magoffin, Patterson, Gay and Denison families. The last name did not remain in this lineage long as the descent was on the female side, yet the descendants are three times descended from Captain George Denison and his wife, Anna Barodel, a prominent family of England. It is also noticeable that the descendants have the Norton family as ancestors both in the Paternal and the Maternal Side.

It has been a pleasure to accumulate what is here given. It would be a task which I cannot undertake to pursue the subject further.

To such as may desire to fill in what is lacking, to correct what is in error, or to trace still further, I trust that this information may be helpful.

In the compilation of this work I have consulted Mr. Neal F. Mears, of Mears & Mears, and Evan L. Reed of the Ancestral Publishing & Supply Co., both of Chicago.

THE OWEN FAMILY First Generation. DANIEL OWEN, JR., Immigrant from Wales.

DANIEL OWEN, JR., was born in the north part of Wales in 1785. We know nothing of his ancestry although there is some basis for the belief that he was born at Llanberis in the North of Wales. We presume that he came to this country in the early years of the nineteenth century and married Laura Norton in Sangerfield, N. Y., prior to 1807. He and his family lived there until after 1821, and then moved to LeRoy, N.Y. In 1837 he and his sons and daughters moved to McHenry, Illinois, which then and until 1844 was the county seat of McHenry County, Illinois, which then included Lake County. In 1840, according to the records in the McHenry County Recorder's Office, but probably prior to then, he purchased from the U.S. Government the Southwest Quarter of Section 26, Township 45, North, Range 8, East of the Third Principal Meridian, containing 160.6 acres, for which he paid at the rate of \$1.25 per acre. This is the land in McHenry extending onehalf mile North of Waukegan Street and one-half mile West of Elgin Road extended to Richmond Street. He also purchased the Northwest Quarter of Section 35, which contains 160 acres south of Waukegan Street and West of Elgin Road. This comprises what is known as West McHenry in McHenry proper. This quarter (or the unsold portions) was sold to George Gage prior to the extension of the railroad through the west portion of McHenry.

In the late thirties Daniel and his sons and others built a

dam across Boone Creek and erected a saw mill on the south side of the creek, directly in front of and about 300 feet east of the present Owen house. He married as second wife, Jane Baldwin, who moved to Iowa long after his death and died in Iowa City, c. 1870. They lived in the cottage now standing at the northwest corner of Elgin Road and John Street, McHenry. He died in December 1857 while walking along Elgin Road a little south of the present City Hall after being hit by a runaway team that had been frightened by a railroad train.

DANIEL OWEN was a Master Mason and all his sons were Masons.

HERMAN NORTON OWEN was a prominent man in the county affairs, and in the community from 1837 until his death. He and his father and brothers built the Owen house over 100 years ago, and it has remained in the Owen family since then. He and his brothers enlarged the dam and mill pond and built the first grist mill in this part of the country in 1854. They erected a general merchandise store and operated it, meanwhile running two farms. They entered into the business of wool carding and also built a sorghum mill where the McHenry City Hall now stands, and built a machine shop and cooper shop and entered into other business activities. In 1856 Herman, Oliver and Edwin bought the Church farm of about 140 acres, now a part of the McHenry Country Club's Golf Grounds and of various subdivisions in McHenry.

THE PAUL BROWN FAMILY Husband of Grace Alice Owen

PAUL BROWN, born December 1, 1864, at McHenry, was the son of DR. HENRY T. and MARTHA (SMITH) BROWN. After receiving what would now be considered a common school education in McHenry, he moved to Chicago in 1880. He was soon employed with Hoyne, Horton & Hoyne, at that time one of the most prominent law firms in Chicago. He was there as a typist and stenographer. He soon without further schooling applied for an examination at Springfield for permission to be a lawyer to practice in any court of law, and was given that permission, being one of the first of his class. Soon after that he formed a partnership with his older brotherin-law, CLARENCE A. KNIGHT, under the name of KNIGHT &

BROWN. They were both brilliant men. They made a specialty of corporation law and PAUL BROWN became the attorney of the Otis Elevator Company, whose headquarters were in New York City. He still remained in Chicago. He married GRACE ALICE OWEN on April 25, 1889, in McHenry, and moved to Chicago at once. She died April 25, 1911. He was a very close friend of Mayor John A. Roach of Chicago and made his will; and the author of this genealogy was also a close friend of Mayor Roach. Both in McHenry and in Chicago PAUL BROWN was the most intimate friend of the author of this genealogy. Paul Brown, in the Eighteen Eighties, was the attorney for a man named Cushmań from some place in Wisconsin, who had a patent for a telephone. They formed a corporation named "The Cushman Telephone Company", which operated in the State of Indiana, giving the regular telephone service to whomever might subscribe for it and pay his or her bills. The author of this genealogy was a stockholder in that corporation.

They were attacked in the Federal Court in Chicago by attorneys for Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the present telephone system in Chicago and elsewhere. Upon being beaten in that lawsuit, they accepted \$25,000.00 for moving out of Indiana and surrendering their charter. They had operated in Indiana as a regular telephone service for between one and two years.

Edwin Mortimer Owen in 1858 bought out his brother Oliver and thereafter became an equal partner with Herman in their various activities. Edwin operated the farms and the mill as his part until the death of Herman in 1872. The property was then divided, the heirs of Herman getting in property the mill and pond, and Edwin the remainder. Edwin afterwards sold his interest in the store to Perry and Martin. He then built a warehouse and with his son George went into the business of selling agricultural implements and operating the farm.

Edwin was the Executor or Administrator of the Estate of his father, Daniel Owen, of his wife's father, Samuel Warner, of Horace Long, husband of Lodema Owen, and of others. He held at all times a trusted, honored and respected position in the community. All of his sons were Masons, excepting Charles, Lewis attaining the 32nd Degree, Scottish Rites.



STANTON FAMILY (Staunton) First Generation

On January 2, 1635, Thomas¹ Stanton took passage from London, England, on the sailing vessel "Bonaventura" for Virginia. He was twenty years of age and was alone. His stay in Virginia was very short. He next travelled to Boston, Mass., where he was a magistrate. He mingled much with the Indians and learned their language.

He was under Governor Winthrop as Counsellor. During the Pequot War he rendered invaluable services as an interpreter and friend of the Indians. In June, 1637 he was married to Ann Lord, daughter of Dr. Thomas and Dorothy Lord, in Hartford, Conn. Dr. Lord was an M.D. in England in 1585. Dorothy was born in 1589. They were married in 1610 and came to this country from England, sailing in on April 29, 1635, on the vessel "Elizabeth." Mrs. Lord died in 1676, aged 87 years.

On November 24, 1638, Thomas Stanton was in New Haven, Conn., acting as interpreter for the Yorkshire colonists in their purchase of land where the city now stands. He subscribed to the following:

"I, Thomas Stanton, being interpreter in this treaty, do hereby profess in presence of God that I have fully acquainted the Indians with the substance of every article and truly returned their answer and consents to the same, according to the tenor of the foregoing writing, the truth of which if lawfully called, I shall readily confirm at any time."

(Signed) Thomas Stanton.

The name of Stanton is sometimes spelled as Staunton.

Due to the fact that Capt. Phineas Stanton (1719-1790) married Elizabeth Stanton (1721-1841) the Owen family is descended twice from the immigrant Thomas Stanton.

THE STANTON BOYS (By Edwin Warner).

The Stanton boys followed farming for a living. Eldridge moved to Canada in an early day and in 1812 when the war broke out Phineas and Daniel enlisted. Eldridge did not like to take up arms against his brothers, so he and two other men got into a row-boat to cross Lake Ontario. When they got started the British saw them and shot at them, but they were too far off to be hit, so they swung their hats and hurrahed for the United States. They landed safely in the United States and Eldridge went immediately to Middlebury (Wyoming Co. now) to see his brothers.

They were stationed at Eleven Mile Creek not far from Buffalo, New York. He said he would go out to see them and would make cartridges for them, but would not go into battle, for he had left his wife and seven children in Canada. His property would be confiscated if he were killed. When the British came over and burned Buffalo, he went to the rescue, and when some of our troops began to retreat he urged them on until he was overcome, and the last he was seen alive, he was fighting with the breech of his gun. His brothers buried his remains. His wife was notified and managed to save the property. She lived there many years and I saw her once at St. Charles, Illinois, where she lived with a daughter, Mrs. Wolcott.

After Buffalo was burned, our troops crossed the river into Canada and Phineas was among them. One morning, he and a few men were ordered out to reconnoiter. It was quite dark and after they had gone as far as they thought best, they started back; seeing a company advancing, Phineas halloed to them, and asked them where he should file in his men.

The officer told him he was his prisoner and he would take his implements of war. Phineas said, if he ever felt cheap it was then; taken a prisoner without firing a gun. He was taken to Toronto and after being there six weeks was let out on parole of honor. He saw a man reading a newspaper from the states, he borrowed it and learned that there had been a battle and that he was among the list killed. He wrote his wife that he was alive but a prisoner. He was next aboard a ship, he supposed to be exchanged, but after getting aboard he found it was a "man of war." He told them he would not serve on a Man of War. He then sent three messages to the head officer ashore telling him that he would not go, that he would sell his life as dear as he could if they persisted in his staying there. The third message brought word that they could put him aboard a transport bound for New York by way of Halifax. While on the voyage he and his messmates made up their minds they could take the ship and would no doubt have done so, if one of their number had not weakened and told the commanding officer. After that they were put into close confinement, and fed on bread and water until they reached New York and were exchanged. After this Phineas was in the army with my father Samuel Warner at Kingston or opposite Kingston. Then a spent fall broke a bone in his right arm near the wrist so he had to carry his sword in his left hand. The troops were stationed there some time waiting to cross the river. Peace was declared about that time and they were discharged.

Major General Phineas Stanton was born in Stonington, Conn., May 21st, 1780. Married in December 1803 Polly Thomas who was born September 12th, 1785. They removed to Skeneatelas and in 1805 to Attica, in 1808 to Middlebury, then a part of Warsau County. In 1810 he settled near the line of this town. He was an active participator in the war of 1812. He entered the army as ensign in Militia from which post he was soon by his bravery promoted to that of Brigade Major, in Porters Brigade of Volunteers. He was in the bloody battle of Chippeway and Bridgewater. In the latter he was surrounded in the darkness of night by a party of British and captured and conveyed as a prisoner of war to Halifax and there detained nearly a year. He subsequently received the Commission of Major General which he held at the time of his death, which occurred in Wyoming, March 31st, 1842. His wife died January 28th, 1860. They left ten children, Three boys. The eldest Elias died April 27th, 1842. Phineas 2nd married Emily Ingham of the Ingham University, Le Roy, N. Y. Being by nature an artist, his life was chiefly devoted to the use of his pencil, which has produced pictures scarcely surpassed in this country. On the first of July, 1867, he sailed with a party of scientific gentlemen under the auspices of William College and the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, D. C. for the purpose of exploring parts of South America and gathering treasures of science and on September 5th, 1867 he died at Quito, Ecuador. He, it was said, was the first Protestant buried in Quito. He was 50 years old.

CHESEBROUGH FAMILY

Mary Chesebrough m. Lieut. Daniel Stanton in 1712. She was a descendant of William Chesebrough (1594-1667) from England in the "Arabella", with Winthrop's Fleet to Boston, Mass. 1630, founder and first settler of Stonington, Conn.; Deputy Colony of Massachusetts Bay, and General Assembly of Conn. He m. Ann Stevenson.

Samuel Chesebrough, son of the immigrant William, married Abigail Ingraham, in 1665. He was Deputy to the General Court of Connecticut. He was born in 1627 and d. in 1673.

Elisha Chesebrough, son of Samuel, was born in 1671 and died before 1727. He married Marie Minor, daughter of Dr. Joseph Minor and Mary Avery, who was daughter of Capt. James Avery of Stonington.

Mary Chesebrough, daughter of Elisha and Marie, married Lieut. Daniel Stanton in 1712 and had son Phineas Stanton, who married Elizabeth Stanton.

GALLUP FAMILY

The emigrant ancestor was John Gallup of County Dorset, England, who came to New England in 1630 in the "Mary and John." He m. Christobel and located first in Dorchester.

John Gallup, son of John and Christobel, born in England about 1615, came to New England in 1633, and was given 100 acres of land in 1637 for services in the Pequot War. He removed to New London about 1650. He married in Boston in 1643 Hannah Lake, daughter of John and Margaret Lake. They had nine children. Benadam Gallup, third child of John and Hannah, was born at Stonington in 1655 and married 1682 Esther Prentiss.

Capt. JOSEPH GALLUP and Eunice Williams were the parents of Elisha Gallup who married Mercy Denison, daughter of the renowned Capt. George. It was their daughter Esther who married the second Phineas Stanton in 1768. Capt. Joseph was the son of Benadam.

DENISON FAMILY

Although the Denison name does not extend in the lineage previous to the fifth generation when Elisha Gallup married Mercy Denison, it should be remarked that the blood stream descends just as much as if the name had been perpetuated. The result is that any one of this descent can claim three lines running back from William, the father of Capt. George Denison, who married Ann Barodell as second wife.

Mercy was their daughter and Thankful Denison, who married Capt. Phineas Stanton, was another daughter. Barodell Denison, who married Samuel Stanton was still another daughter of Capt. George Denison.

The pretty story concerned with the romance of Capt. George Denison and Ann Barodell runs as follows:

"Capt. George Denison was born in July 1618 and came to America with his father William in 1631, and settled in Roxbury, Mass. He married about 1640 Bridget Thompson, daughter of John Thompson, Gent., of Preston, England. After three years of wedded life and the birth of two daughters, Bridget died in June, 1643. Soon after the death of Bridget, George left the two children with their grandparents and returned to England to serve as an officer under Oliver Cromwell in the Parliamentary Army. He won distinction there and was in the Battle of Marston Moor July 2, 1644, where he was taken prisoner, but later gained his freedom. In the Battle of Nasby he was wounded and taken to the home of John Barodell, a gentleman of high social rank. His daughter, Ann Barodell, acted as nurse, and this led to a romance and marriage to Capt. George Denison. The exact date is not known, but they returned to Roxbury, Mass. in 1645."

Nearly all the prominent families of Stonington, Conn. are found in this lineage.

WARNER FAMILY LINEAGE

1. WILLIAM¹ WARNER, Immigrant Ancestor, sailed on the ship "Globe" from London, England, on August 7, 1635, for the "Virginia Colonies." He went to Ipswich, Mass. in 1637. We do not know when or where he was born or anything about his wife. He brought with him his two sons, John and Daniel, and daughter Abigail. He died in Ipswich, probably before 1648.

From these children have descended the famous writers, Charles Dudley Warner and Anna Warner.

April 17, 1777; m. 2nd, Sept. 6, 1778, Rhoda, daughter of Josiah and Mary Treat, b. Aug. 16, 1753, who d. 1779; he m. 3rd, Elizabeth Norton, dates missing, and 4th, name unknown. He was a Captain in the Rev. Army. Being surrounded by Indians while on his way to Saratoga with supplies, he saved his life by secreting himself under a bridge. The exposure incident to this ultimately caused his death, as it rendered him unable to support his large family, and he lost his property due to depreciation of the Continental currency. There had been much talk of the famous "Genesee country." So his sons William and Asahel, determined to explore it and in the Spring of 1794 started with their packs on their backs, going most of the way through an unbroken wilderness by blazed trees. They remained there through the summer and by help of their uncle secured three farms of 100 acres each. In the Fall they returned home on horseback. In March, 1795, they went back to the new land bringing their father, his fourth wife, and all but two of the fourteen children. They settled first in Ontario County, and in 1811 moved to Lima, New York. They were farmers and raised flax and wool from which they made their own clothes.

Y., with his half sister, Hannah, who had married William Bostwick. He went back to Lima, N. Y. during the War of 1812 and enlisted afterward marrying the sister of the Major of his regiment, Surviah Stanton. He lived some years on a farm near his brother, Linus, at Warsaw, N. Y., then moved to Wyoming, near Buffalo, New York, for a few years. Later, and as a pioneer, he and his family moved to Richmond, McHenry County, Illinois, where he and his wife and Laura, his daughter, who married Andrew Kennedy, lie buried.

LUPTON FAMILY

Rebecca Lupton who married Lieut. William Warner in 1739 is described as a "descendant of the Saltonstalls" one of the few families in the country whose genteel standing in England is a matter of record. Inasmuch as several times she is referred to as of Boston, Mass., and in the Report of the Record Commissioners of Boston, Vol. 24, is given the birth of a Rebekah to Josiah and Rebekah Lupton, 15 July 1721, she is evidently the child of this couple. However, a Lupton family was at New Haven in 1665 where Hannah, daughter of Thomas and Hannah Lupton is reported born. It is probable that there is some relationship betwen the Boston and the New Haven family for Lieut. William Warner was at Wethersfield, Conn., and she must have been visiting in this region.

The Lupton family is seldom met with in a search of the records.

NORTON FAMILY

The Norton Family which appears for six generations in the Paternal Line is also met with in the Maternal Line in the person of Betsey (Elizabeth) Norton, who was the third wife of Capt. William Warner, b. 1740. The date of marriage is not known and neither is her ancestry, but it is surmised that she was the Elizabeth shown as the daughter of Thomas Norton and Rebecca Neil, who were married in 1701. His parents were Thomas Norton and Elizabeth Mason. His father was also Thomas, so if this lineage is correct, the family has this lineage twice, once in the Paternal Line and once in the Maternal.

BEACH FAMILY

Oliver Norton married Martha Beach who lived in Goshen, Conn., and whose family genealogy is given in the History of Goshen. The Beach family is descended from Thomas, whose date of birth is unknown. He died in 1662. He married in Milford, Conn. in 1652, Sarah Platt, daughter of Richard and Mary. His second child, John, who continues this lineage, was born in 1655. The widow of Thomas married Miles Merwin of Milford, and they had four daughters.

John, the son, by his wife Mary had seven children of which John of this lineage was the fifth. They lived in Wallingford, Conn.

John, who was born in 1690, and who married Sarah Tyler, in 1715, and who died in 1716, by his second wife, Mary Royce, daughter of Samuel and Sarah Royce, had twelve children, of which Adna, of this lineage, was the second. Adna was born in Wallingford, Conn., Jan. 11, 1718, and died in Goshen, Conn., in 1783. He married Hannah Miles, daughter of John and Sarah Bell Miles, who was born in 1721 and died in 1775. Fisk was the first of eleven children.

Fisk was born May 15, 1742, and died March 16, 1801, in Goshen, Conn. He married Martha Carrington, daughter of John Carrington of Waterbury and Farmington, Conn. and Deborah Hunn, of Massachusetts. She died in Sangerfield, N. Y. March 15, 1814. They had eight children of which Martha, who married Oliver Norton, was the second. She was born August 5, 1757. They moved to Sangerfield, N. Y. in 1794.

CARRINGTON FAMILY

Martha, daughter of Fĭsk Beach and Martha Carrington, married Oliver Norton March 15, 1757. Davis' History of Wallingford, Conn. says that the Carrington family is of great antiquity. Sir Michael Carrington, who was the standard bearer of Richard I, 1189, is the first of whom he finds any record. He mentions that John Carrington, an early settler of Farmington, was one of the eight proprietors in 1672. He died in the early part of 1690 leaving a widow who died before the inventory of his effects. His son John was the administrator.

John Carrington, son of the immigrant John, was born in 1667. He died in 1692 in Farmington. He married, 2d, Deborah Hunn, of Massachusetts. He lived on a farm at Red Stone Hill in Farmington where he died. His sixth child, Martha, m. Fisk Beach of Goshen, and had eight children.

HUNN FAMILY

The family record of the marriage of John Carrington to his second wife, Deborah Hunn, says "Of Massachusetts." This is an English family although in New York there were a number of Dutch families of that name, but the Wethersfield, Conn., History by Stiles shows that this family is descended from George of Boston. George came there in 1635.

His son Nathaniel emigrated from Boston to Wethersfield about 1673 and his son Nathaniel had a daughter Deborah, who was baptized in 1711. As the widow of Nathaniel moved to Farmington after remarrying and John Carrington lived there, considering that the name is unusual, that she was a second wife, and she married a Farmington man, it is very probable that the daughter of Nathaniel was John Carrington's second wife.

Nathaniel the second was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston.

The mother of Deborah Hunn was Martha, the daughter of Samuel Orvis. Her second husband was John Root, Jr., of Farmington. Nathaniel, Jr. died in 1712.

BIRDSEY FAMILY

Samuel Norton married in 1713 the Widow Dinah (Birdsey) Beach. The Birdseys were descendants of Deacon John Birdsey who is said to have come from Reading, Berkshire Co., England, to America in 1636. He came to Wethersfield where he married Phillipa, daughter of Rev. Henry Smith.

BRONSON FAMILY

From Cothron's History of Ancient Woodbury, Conn., it is learned that Richard Bronson, was an original settler of Farmington, and had sons, among which was Cornelius, born 1648. He came to "Ancient Woodbury" about 1690.
