#### EXPLANATION.

ABOUT the year 1633 two persons, by the same name, viz. "JOHN PICKERIN,"\* came to this country from England. In all probability they were cousins. One of them settled in Ipswich, Mass. From him have descended the Pickerings of Salem and vicinity, among whom were the late Col. Timothy Pickering of Revolutionary fame, of that city, and his son, the late Hon. John Pickering of Boston. The other "John Pickerin" settled at "Strawberry Bank," subsequently termed Portsmouth, of the State of New Hampshire.

The accompanying Genealogy is of him and some of his descendants. To obtain a full account of all of them would be an impossible task, as traces of many are lost. Still in regard to others, data not obtained by the compiler, may be hereafter readily procured and added, especially of the Pickerings of Greenland, Newmarket, and other towns adjacent to Newington and Portsmouth, N.H.

Constant professional duties have greatly interfered with his attempts to render this Genealogy more extensive. It is believed, however, that it is sufficiently definite as to the trunk and main and many auxiliary branches of the New Hampshire "Pickering Tree," to enable most persons, now living of the race, to trace their lineage. That some errors may exist in it, is possible, for it is rare for any genealogy to be perfect, even when prepared by one of the immediate members of the family represented by it.

Many true and distinguished men and accomplished women now living, can claim "John Pickerin" as an ancestor worthy of them.

In the following pages two columns of numbers are placed in the left margin of each; the right-hand column commencing with "1," opposite the first name of the genealogy.

A number of the left column, opposite any number of the right column, refers the reader to that number where other information may be found. If it be less than the number in the right column, against which it stands, it will refer back to the parentage of the individual; if it be greater, it will refer forward to his marriage and distinct family.

## JOHN PICKERING

#### OF PORTSMOUTH, N. H.

#### AND SOME OF HIS DESCENDANTS.

1 JOHN PICKERIN<sup>1</sup> d. Jan. 18, 1669. His will is dated Nov. 11, 1668. He went to Portsmouth (then Strawberry Bank), N.H., as early as 1633, from Massachusetts, coming originally from England. He appears to have been a man of good business capacity. He was one, who in 1640, gave 50 acres of glebe land for the ministry. He had several grants of land from the town, besides his South Mill privileges, where he erected a mill. He was buried in the Point of Graves Cemetery. Part of his estate was entailed. A portion situated on Great Bay in Newington, some 500 acres in extent, was taken by his son Thomas. In 1862, 170 acres of it was occupied by James C. Pickering, who was born thereon in 1771. It descended in regular line to him, there never having been a deed of the land made since the original grant of it to "John Pickerin" in 1655. In Portsmouth, John Pickerin's estate covered the Point of Graves Cemetery and extended over the site of the South Church to the mill bridge, taking in the whole shore from the Cemetery to near the site of the Universalist Church.

Jan 10, 1665, Mary, dau. of Anthony Stanyon of Hampton. He was a man for the times in which he lived, and possessed great strength and a powerful will. He exercised much influence in matters of church and state. He gave the "Point"

of Graves Cemetery" as a public burying place, and bequeathed to the South Parish the lot on which the Old South Church was erected. He was a military man, having had a command in Portsmouth as captain, for a number of years. Was a representative from Portsmouth when John Cutt was President of New Hampshire. Was a member of the assembly called by Lieut. Governor Cranfield in 1684. During the suspension of government consequent on the impeachment of Governor Andros in 1689, Capt. Pickerin, with a company of armed men, went to the house of Richard Chamberlain, who had been Secretary of the Province, and demanded the public records. Receiving a refusal, he took them by force and concealed them. Afterwards, in 1692, he was summoned before Lieut. Gov. Usher, threatened and imprisoned, but for some time would neither deliver the books nor make known the place of their concealment, unless by order of the Assembly. Subsequently he gave them up. Upon the dissolution of Andros' government, he, in 1690, was a member of the convention for reunion with Massachusetts, and was also a representative from Portsmouth to the assembly at Boston, Mass. He was a lawyer and King's Attorney. Was a member of the Assembly from 1697 to 1709, and in 1699 was elected Speaker thereof. Was also Speaker in 1704, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9; and was counsel in the great case of Allen vs. Waldron. His will is dated June 21, 1720, and was approved May 15, 1721. He must have been about 80 years of age at his decease. His estate was appraised at £3185 and his personal at £20, 18, 0. But one child survived him, viz., his daughter Mary.

Not long after he had built his log hut on the Great Bay at Newington, N.II., and had commenced to clear the land, an | English Man of War anchored on the Piscataqua River. A press gang being sent ashore to obtain recruits, some of them met Thomas, while he was engaged in felling trees on his premises. After conversing with him and complimenting him on his muscular appearance, they informed him that he must follow them, but he declined, and on their commanding him to do so, he seized one of them by the neck and bore him to the ground with a threat to sever his head from his body, at the same time raising his axe. The fellow begged for mercy, and with his companions at once beat a retreat.

In 1681, Thomas Pickering was taxed 4 shillings and 6 pence as his part of the Province rates for Portsmouth. He was one of the signers of the petition against the Lieut. Gov. Cranfield.

After admission to the bar he opened an office at Greenland, but, shortly afterwards, moved to Portsmouth, where he soon became distinguished. He was candid and liberal in his practice, and faithful to his clients. Possessing a placid temper, and a disposition kind and benevolent, and being social in his habits, he soon acquired popularity. He was an Honorary member of the Mass. Humane Society, and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Dartmouth College conferred on him the degree of L.L.D. He was a delegate to the convention for forming the State Constitution, adopted in 1783. Was a Senator in the Legislature, and in 1790, was appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature, which office he held until 1795, when he was appointed Judge of the District Court of New Hampshire. A few years previous to his death he suffered from mental derangement, in consequence of which he was removed from office.

Mr. John Knight Pickering, in an eminent degree, possessed several of the prominent mental and physical characteristics of his ancestors, John Pickerin<sup>1</sup>, and his sons John and Thomas. His residence and place of business were principally at Portsmouth, N.II.; although, for a short period, he, with his brother-in-law, Langdon Goddard, was engaged in mercantile pursuits, in the city of New York. The following obituary notice of him, is from the *Portsmouth Journal* of Feb. 26, 1859: —

"In this city, on Monday afternoon, Feb. 21, John Knight Pickering, Esq., aged 66 years: a merchant of energy and skill, perseverance and success; in whose demise the interests of this city, as well as his own domestic circle, sustain a serious loss.

Thus, with a sad heart, are we again called upon to record the departure, from this life, of one of our most valuable and eminent merchants. The deceased was born at Newington, of highly respectable parentage, but early removed to this place, where he has ever been engaged in active business. His ancestor was the first John Pickering, whose name and deeds stand prominent in the early history of Portsmouth. For energy of character, decision, perseverance, sterling integrity, and an exact, methodical system in the transaction of business, he probably had no superior in this community. His word was indeed a bond; and from what he regarded right nothing could swerve him. In the victory he was able to make over a strength of natural temperament greater than falls to the common lot of man, he manifested, in his social and domestic life, a corresponding strength of mind. Though forewarned of the fatal disease, which would soon terminate his life, yet, until recently, he continued to move among us with a firm step and cheerful countenance; and when, at length, his physical constitution yielded, with calm submission he was prepared to resign his spirit into the hands of his Creator."

"In Newington, Thursday morning, June 29, 1876, Richard Pickering, Esq., after a long life spent on the old homestead in Newington, about one decade having been added to the allotted term of mortal existence. Although not free from the infirmities common to the lot of humanity, he was a man of more than ordinary intellectual abilities. Having entered Harvard University at a very early age, with the legal profession in view, he graduated with usual honors, but never to any extent practised the profession for which he seemed to have been by nature and diligent study especially adapted. On one occasion he conducted an important suit for himself, in which he was entirely successful. He was for many years a contributor to the Portsmouth Journal over the signature of "Publius," a forcible, ready writer on "constitutional liberty," and other topics of political interest. He attacked President Polk's administration, vigorously opposing his policy in regard to the Mexican war, and dangerous tendencies to governmental consolidation. An uncompromising foe to slavery, he loudly demanded the expurgation of the foul blot from the federal constitution, and its abolition by constitutional amendment; argued vigorously against the admission of Texas into the Union as dangerous to our amicable relations with Mexico; which danger was soon realized by the war which followed. He held that the constitution was the Palladium of our temporal liberty, as the Bible was the chart of our eternal salvation; and battled with Romish Priests when first they demanded the expulsion of this book from our public schools. With great distinctness he pointed out the true relations of capital and labor, vindicating their respective rights in a manner unselfish and impartial. Nearly forty years ago he publicly denounced the sub-Treasury scheme, jealously denying to the Executive the keys of the national treasury, the custody of which the people had wisely predetermined to retain in their own hands. Toward the close of his life he became aware that he must soon pass into the vale beyond; but he expressed no other regret than the natural unpleasantness of leaving associations long held dear, for the untried and unknown."
