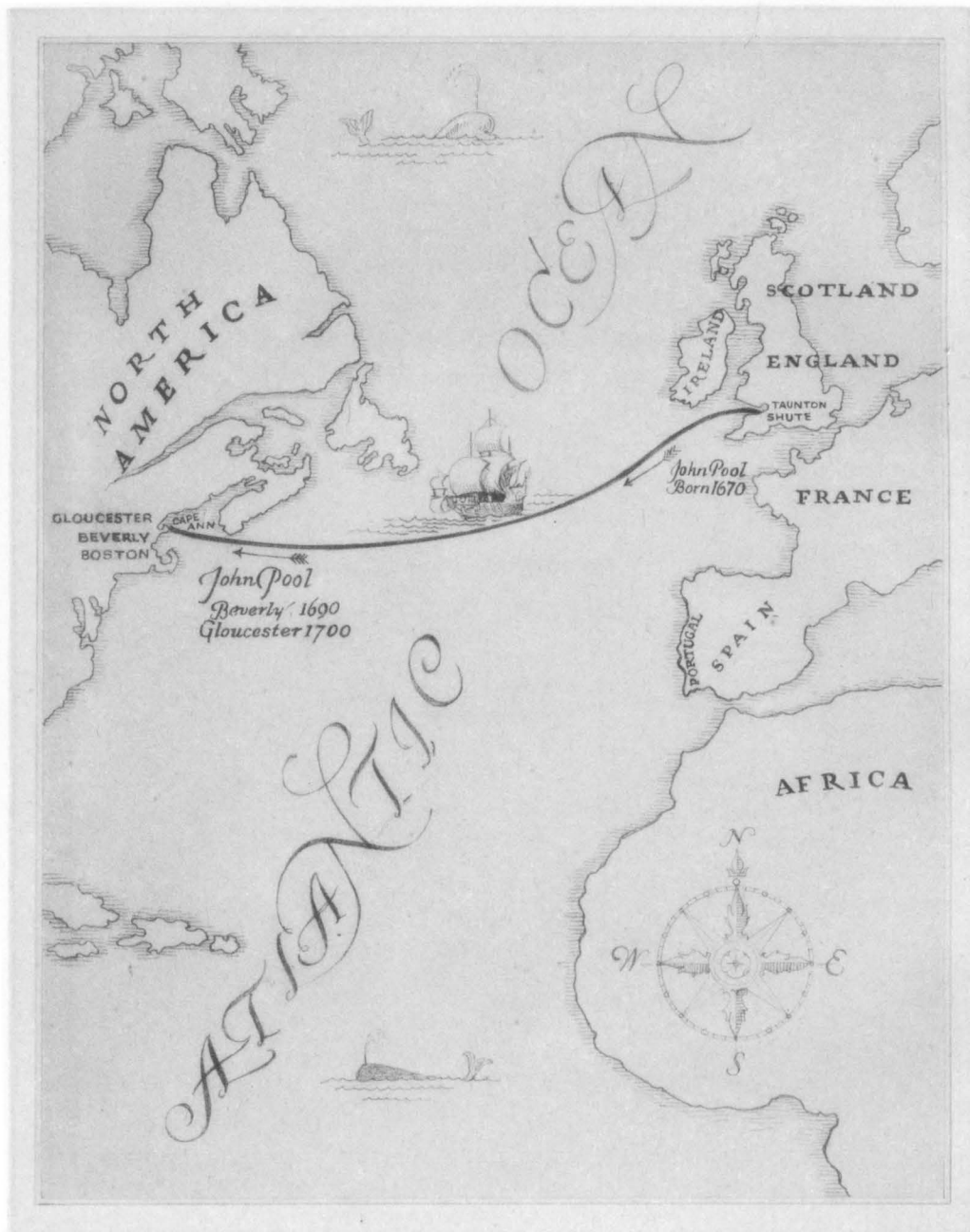

THE POOLE FAMILY

THE NAME

THE NAME

THE name of Poole has been known in England since the time of William the Conqueror in 1066. The family is of Norman origin and is believed to have settled in England about this time.

It is a place name and once signified "at the pool." Thus if John lived near a small body of water he became known first as John atte Pool and finally as John Pool. There are also towns of Pool and Poole in England, and it is possible that they are responsible for the name in some cases. The origin of the name is generally believed to be Teutonic, although some consider it Welsh.

It seems probable from consulting various records that the spelling of the name has changed somewhat in the following manner: atte Pulle, de la Pulle, de la Poule, de la Pole, Pole, Pool, Poole. Of course there are exceptions. The name appears as Poole on very early records, while there are those who today spell it Pole.

Shakespeare makes a play on the name of Pole, Duke of Suffolk, when he makes the captain who seizes Pole say:

“Pole? sir Pole? lord?
Ay, kennel, puddle, sink; whose filth and dirt
Troubles the silver spring where England drinks.”

It is difficult to account for the changes in spelling. In early English records, different spellings as Pulle, Pole, Poole, etc., seem to have been used synonymously even in the same families. In early Massachusetts records the name of the emmigrant, William Pole, of Taunton, appears as Poole, although his autograph shows that he continued to sign himself William Pole after he had settled in this country. This is undoubtedly due to the fact that in England, Pole is pronounced as Poole. This difference in pronunciations is not unusual. There are the examples of English Oates being pronounced Otis, Cholmondeley as Chumly, and so on.

It must not be thought that because of a dissimilarity in the spelling of the name families have no connection. Spelling is perhaps the smallest barrier in establishing family connections.

THE FAMILY IN AMERICA

I

BEVERLY

JOHN POOL, born in Taunton, Somerset county, England, about 1670, settled first at Beverly, Massachusetts, about 1690. Here he was known as a man of worth and integrity, and during the several years of his residence worked with Richard Woodbury at the trade of carpenter. In 1690 he served in Captain William Rayment's company in the expedition against Canada under Sir William Phipps. Woodbury was also in this company, but died shortly after his return from the expedition, November 20, 1690. He left a widow, Sarah, nee Haskell, a daughter of Roger Haskell of Beverly, who became the first wife of John Pool. They had four children born in Beverly. In 1699 the family moved to Sandy Bay, that part of Gloucester which is now Rockport, in Massachusetts.

II

ROCKPORT

JOHN POOL was the second permanent settler of Rockport, finding upon his arrival there in the autumn of 1699, only the family of Richard Tarr, living in a log cabin. During the winter he took up a temporary residence in a small, vacant house, and in April of the following year purchased "a certain farme messuage" at a place commonly called "ye Cape," for one hundred and sixty pounds. Here he erected the first frame house of Rockport and settled with his family.

III

JOHN POOL

JOHN POOL was a man of great industry and enterprise. He built the first saw mill and the first ship in Sandy Bay. In 1710 he furnished the builders of Long Wharf in Boston with their supply of hemlock timber, shipped there in his own vessel. He was not only well educated himself, but was careful to provide an education for his children. As there was no school in Sandy Bay, he sent one of his sons to school in Beverly so that he would be qualified to return and teach the other children. He served as a juryman in the court at Salem as early as 1703, and was active in the civic affairs of the community. He was a man of marked business ability, and acquired an extensive estate, about three hundred and fifty acres exclusive of wood and thatch lots. During his life he gave to each of his sons a "good, sufficient, farm."

His death came on the nineteenth of May, 1727, when he was about fifty-seven years of age. He left an estate of nearly fifteen thousand dollars, a large amount at that time, to be divided among his wife and nine children. His body was interred on his own land, and a stone bearing the following inscription marked his grave:

"HERE LYES YE BODY OF
MR. JOHN POOL,
AGED ABOUT 57 YEARS,
DEC'D MAY YE 19TH, 1727."

IV

POOLS AT ROCKPORT

THE "History of Rockport" contains abundant material on the Pool family. Following are quotations which either concern our particular branch of the family, or are of interest to us.

"In 1708, the town laid out the road from old town parish to the back side of the Cape to the seaside, from Sandy Bay Cove to the house of John Pool."

"In 1716, Pigeon Cove Road was laid out to John Pool's bridge."

"Thomas Harris, Jonathan Pool, Ebenezer Pool, Henry Witham, Edmund Grover, settled on their farms about 1720 to 1730."

"In 1743, business increasing and the fishermen needing some more convenient harbour, for larger craft and safety, than Long Cove, Ebenezer Pool, John Pool, and Benjamin Tarr petition for a grant to build a wharf at the Whirlpool, so called. This was granted by the Commoners."

"(October 21, 1754). This is the first tax levied on the village. Thirty-seven men and two estates together with their polls, making forty-four, were taxed. Two vessels were taxed, one to Ebenezer Pool, the other to the estate of Jabez Baker. The highest tax was less than \$9.00. Four Pools, with the Baker estate, pay about one-half of the tax."

"In 1766, Caleb Pool is chosen as first selectman for this parish; he served about twenty-seven years."

"Mark Pool was 1st lieutenant of Captain Rowe's company at the Battle of Bunker Hill. Francis Pool, of the same company, was killed."

"In 1796, Mr. Ebenezer Pool was the selectman for this parish, when the valuation of Sandy Bay was \$50,000 and Pigeon Cove \$20,000."

"In 1825, a postoffice was established here for the first time. Winthrop Pool was appointed postmaster."

"Deacon Solomon Pool lost his house by fire this year (1830), said to have been the first dwelling house that was ever destroyed here by fire."

"In Dock Square, the graceful and well formed elm that now adorns it, was placed there on the second day of May, 1859. It was purchased of Ebenezer Pool, Esq., at a cost of \$2.50, and was taken from his homestead lot."

"The Pool's Hill Road was laid out by the selectmen in 1885."

EXHUMATION AND RE-INTERMENT OF THE REMAINS OF
JOHN POOL AND HIS WIVES

“A small congregation of men assembled near the residence of Mr. Ephraim Nickerson, corner of Railroad Avenue and King Street, on the 22d day of October, 1878; their object was to witness the exhumation and re-interment of the remains of John Pool, the second permanent settler of Sandy Bay, and those of three of his wives, which had been buried more than one hundred and fifty years on what was then his own land; but long since this estate had passed out of the possession of his descendants; therefore the call and necessity of their removal. It was a matter of special interest to the small number there assembled to know how little there remains of a fellow mortal after so long a burial. The coffins had crumbled so that only a few small fragments remained, a few bits of rusty iron, remains of nails and metallic trimmings, some bones, soft and crumbly, with fine fibres of roots and vegetable growth twined closely about, beneath and around every part, winding even into the minutest crevices and embracing every part with their delicate tracery. Even as Bryant says:

‘Earth that nourished thee shall claim,
Thy growth to be resolved to earth again.’

“All of the remains were placed in a neat box and were re-interred in the old cemetery, and the ancient headstone was placed to mark this last resting place.”

WAR RECORD

I

REVOLUTION

IN our particular line of descent from the Pools there seems to have been no war service. Francis Pool, brother of Aaron (IV), was killed at the Battle of Bunker Hill. His brother Ebenezer also served, but evidently Aaron, the one through whom we might have had service, did not serve.

However, those desirous of membership in societies requiring war service are eligible through the service of Waffe Rand. He was a grandfather of Caroline Curtis Rand, wife of Amos (V), and served at Valley Forge.

Following is the record of his service:

WAFTE RAND, Lunenburg, Private, Capt. Daniel Carliles' Co., 8th Worcester Co., joined Capt. Smith's Co., term 3 yrs., reported sick at Fishkollak—muster roll for December, 1777, sworn to in Camp Star Valley Forge—1780—age 29 yrs., 5 ft., 9 in., complexion light (see Wharf Rand and Wiff Rand).

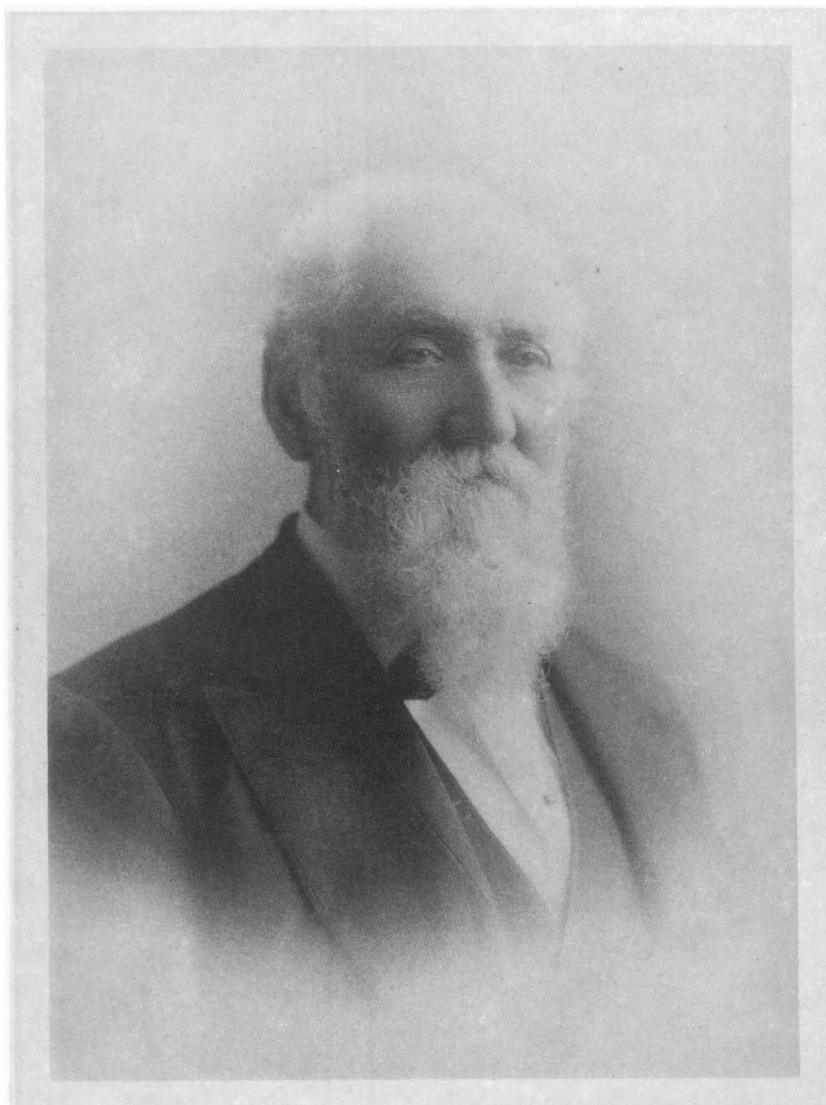

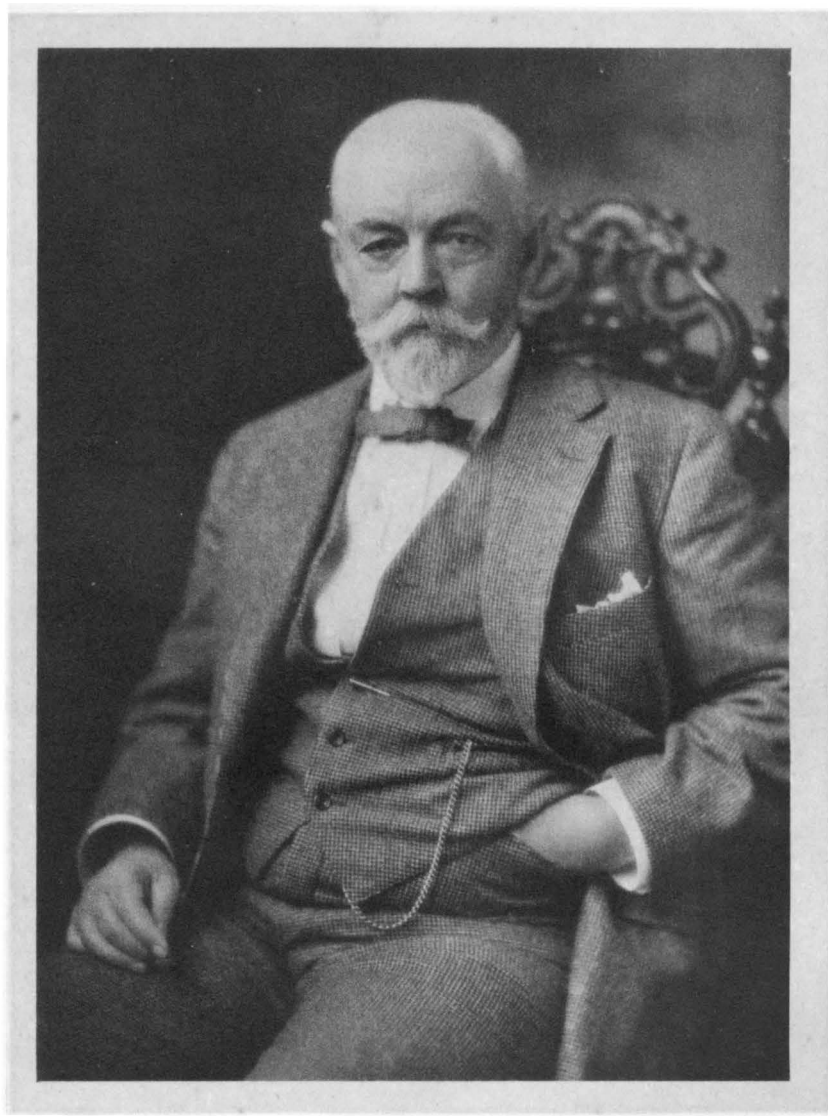
HONOURABLE AMOS POOLE

AMOS POOLE, Honourable, born September 8, 1814, at Rockport, Massachusetts; died at Cobden, Illinois, 1894. He married Caroline Curtis Rand, daughter of John Rand, at Milton, Massachusetts, October 6, 1842. He was Representative in 1856. His children were born at Milton. In about 1867 he removed to Illinois, purchasing a small estate at Cobden, where he lived, with his wife, as a gentleman farmer and fruit-grower until his death. He was buried at Milton, Massachusetts.

GEORGE AMOS POOLE, born March 20, 1843, at Milton, Massachusetts; died September 7, 1918, at his summer home near Holland, Michigan. He married July 11, 1867, Abbie Kelly Kendall, daughter of Stephen Bachelor Kendall.

"Probably the most notable characteristics of George Amos Poole were the singularly upright character of his life and his genial and kindly disposition. This combination naturally brought him many loyal friends, both within and without the circle of his business life, and doubtless was an important factor in his business success. Coupled with these qualities was a native modesty which made personal publicity of any kind most distasteful to him.

"He spent much of his youth in Milton, Massachusetts, and with the pioneering spirit of a true New Englander came west in 1866, for some years representing the clothing firm of Philip Wadsworth and Company, of Boston. His duties took him over a good part of what was then the "wild" west, much of which west of the Missouri River he was obliged to cover by the old-fashioned stage coach or by river boats when the river was high enough.

“A few years later, with his uncle, William H. Rand and Andrew McNally, he formed a partnership which purchased the job printing plant of the Chicago Tribune. This partnership was afterwards incorporated under the name of Rand McNally & Company, of which concern he was treasurer until 1879, when with his brother, William H. Poole, he established the printing house of Poole Bros. For many years the work of the firm was confined to printing for transportation companies, with a patronage that included practically every railroad in the country. The concern had the distinction of being the largest one in the United States exclusively engaged in transportation printing, but in later years the business was extended until it enjoyed a large commercial patronage as well.

“George Amos Poole was always interested in the welfare of the printing industry, as well as in the reputation and success of his own business. In 1887, together with Andrew McNally, J. M. W. Jones, D. R. Cameron, and C. A. Knight, well known Chicago printers at that time, he addressed a call to the printers of the entire United States to gather in Chicago as they considered the conditions at that time ripe for the formation of a national printers' organization. This meeting was held, and in it the United Typothetae of America had its origin.

“After his retirement from the active management of the business in 1912, he spent his time principally at his summer home near Holland, Michigan, and at his winter home in Cocoanut Grove, Florida, retaining his residence in Chicago. He was particularly interested in yachts and yachting, and was prominent in that field. He was a Mason and a member of the Union League, Flossmoor Country, Windsor Golf, and Biscayne Bay Yacht, clubs.”

His parents died soon after, and he went to Boston, Massachusetts, where he worked in the carriage and harness business. When nineteen he became interested in religion and joined the Baptist church. In 1806 he severed his connection with this church and became a preacher of the new faith. In this same year he settled in Essex, Massachusetts, and remained there for seven years. In 1814 he removed to Woodstock, Vermont, and there assisted Elder Hazen in compiling a Christian Hymn Book. He is recorded at Danville, Vermont, and at Bradford, Vermont, and in 1822 removed with his family to Milton, Massachusetts, where he and his family resided until his death. He took a deep and active interest in the cause of anti-slavery.

THE KENDALL FAMILY

I

FRANCIS KENDALL, founder of the Kendall family in America, was born in England about 1620, and died in America in 1708. He was a son of John Kendall who lived in Cambridge, England, in 1646, and who died there in 1660.

Francis came to this country about 1640 or a little before. He is recorded in Charlestown in 1640, and in Woburn, Massachusetts, the same year. He married on December 24, 1644, Mary Tidd, at Woburn. She was a daughter of Reverend John Tidd. Sewell, in his "History of Woburn," says of Francis, "He was a gentleman of great respectability and influence in the place of his residence. He served the town at different times, eighteen years on the Board of Selectmen; and was often appointed on important committees, especially on one for distributing the common lands of the town, 1667; and on another, respecting the erection of the second meeting house, 1672."

Mary Tidd, wife of Francis, died in 1705. He died in 1708, when "according to a testimony given by him in court, 1700, he must have been eighty-eight years old."

Sewell says he "was a carpenter by trade, and formerly known far and wide beyond his native place as Lieutenant Kendall, from having received a Lieutenant's commission from Governor Belcher, October 5, 1732. He was a very active, enterprising, public spirited man, often employed in town business, and much engaged in promoting both the civil and the religious prosperity of Woburn. He was an original proprietor of North Town, or Townsend, and as such, became involved in a controversy with the heirs of Major Hathorne, of Salem, who claimed a portion of the lands in that town, under a prior grant from the General Court. He was also a principal settler of Pegnoig, or Athol, in the settlement of which he and several of his sons suffered much from floods, and from the depredations of Indians during the French wars between 1744 and 1760."

Elizabeth, his wife, died January 10, 1741-2, aged fifty-four. He married, second, Mehitable Hosmer, of Concord, Massachusetts, July 6, 1751. She died August 31, 1755.
