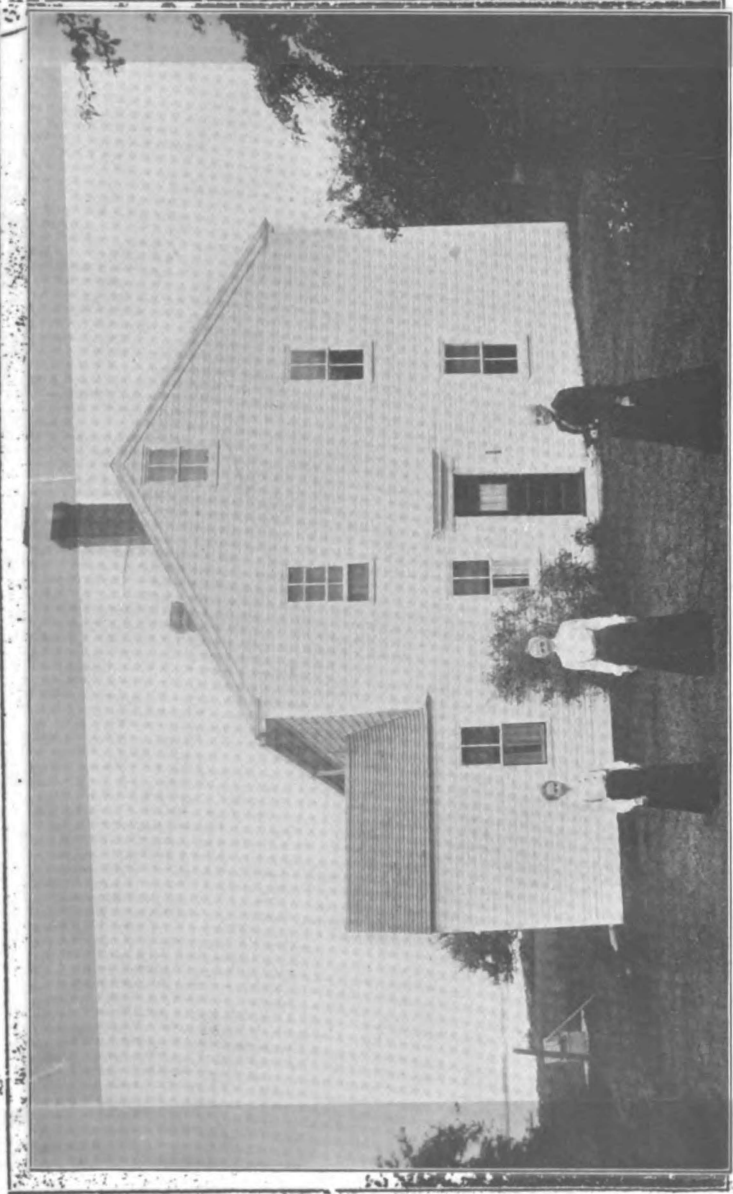

INTRODUCTION.

Richard Pinkham, the ancestor of many families in New England and the West, was at Dover Point, N. H., as early as 1640, and no doubt arrived there at an earlier date. Of all the legends in various branches of the family that he was accompanied by two brothers who settled at other points in New Hampshire, that able historian, Rev. Dr. A. H. Quint of Dover, N. H., has well said, "There is not a grain of historical evidence to support them." The writer of this book examined all these legends with care and found them with strong points of difference in various branches of the Pinkham family, many of them asserting that this band of brothers came to America a hundred years after the ancestor Richard had landed here. The ancestor stands out as a figure of clear and sturdy worth. The family traditions are quite unanimous in claiming that this ancestor, Richard Pinkham, came from the Isle of Wight. This, however, has no historical proof. If he came in the good ship *James* in 1633, he was evidently, like most of her colonists, from the west coast of England.

It seems highly probable to all who have given this matter earnest study that Richard Pinkham came with the famous colony which Captain (Richard) Wiggins (Wiggans in the old records) brought from England in 1633. He has the same sturdy characteristics of the other colonists, many of whom bore names which are famous in history. In 1631 this Captain Wiggins was sent to what is now Dover Point, N. H., to superintend the affairs of the colonists. In about a year he returned to England to secure ample means for carrying on the "plantation." "Meanwhile, the merchants of Bristol, England, had sold out their interest in these lands to Lords Say and Brooke, George Willys and William Whiting, who continued Wiggins in the agency. For the 'plantation' a number of families were procured in the west of England. 'Some of whom were of good estates and of some account for religion.' Governor Winthrop of Massachusetts gives the following description of the coming of these people to Salem, Mass., on Oct. 10, 1633: 'The good ship *James*, which was but eight weeks between Gravesend and Salem, brought Captain Wiggins and about thirty, with one Mr. Leverich, a godly minister, for the Pascataquack (which Lord Say and Lord Brooke had purchased of the Bristol men), and about forty for Virginia, and about twenty for this place, and about sixty cattle." This was one of the most God-fearing, sturdy bands of colonists which landed in America after the coming of the *Mayflower*. This Captain Wiggins was at the head of this colony for some seven years, "having the power of Governor hereabouts."

On the 22d day of October, 1640, the people of Dover, N. H., established, or renewed, a formal government. The fourth name

signed on that wonderful document is that of Richard Pinkhame. Rev. Dr. Quint designates this document as "Dover's Magna Charta." He says: "It antedated in practice by a hundred and thirty-six years the principles announced in the Declaration of Independence of 1776. A copy of this paper was found in the Public Record Office of London, England." Every Pinkham should turn with deep interest to such a record as this.

The next mention of Richard Pinkham in the old Dover, N. H., records is equally interesting: "27th of the 9th month, 1648; It is this day ordered by a publique Towne meeting that Richard Pinkham shall beat the drum on the Lord's Day to give notice for the time of meeting, and to sweepe the Meeting house, for the which he shall be allowed six bushels of Indian corn for his pay this yeare, and to be free from rates." It is evident that this religious sentry stood long at his carefully chosen post! "No sinner could assert that he knew not that it was ye Lord's Day; while the stirring drum beats were heard far and wide!" The musical ability of this man is seen in many of his descendants.

Rev. Dr. Quint has given this clear statement: "Richard Pinkham appears to have been a man of good character, and had his share of public offices. The spot where he early dwelt is said to have been the same on which stood the Pinkham garrison, which Richard afterwards made into his habitation. The precise location of this is easily pointed out, inasmuch as it continued to be a dwelling-house until one side of it fell down seven and twenty years ago; that event rendered it necessary for the family to remove, which they did as soon as possible, into a new house standing about five rods from the old one. After passing the house of Hanson-Roberts on Dover Neck the traveler will notice a lane on the west side of the road leading towards the river. On the north side of this lane is a house now occupied by Elijah Pinkham, a man of more than eighty years, who owns land once owned by his ancestor, Richard." (After the death of this Elijah Pinkham in 1862, the house was occupied by Mr. Charles Thompson, who married Rose Pinkham, daughter of Elijah. This old homestead was after this owned by those not of the Pinkham line for a short time; it has lately been purchased by Mr. De Orville L. Pinkham.) "About four rods west of this home of Elijah Pinkham was the Pinkham garrison house, half of which was taken down about two years after the wind had demolished the other half. The spot on which the fortress stood in the ancient days a few months ago presented the aspect of a flourishing cabbage yard!"

Mr. John Scales, Esq., of Dover, N. H., writes under date of Jan. 1, 1908: "The Pinkham garrison was about three-quarters of a mile north of the site of the old First Meeting house on Dover Neck; it was on the west side of the present road, which was called High Street by the early settlers; the garrison was on a street called Low Street, which ran parallel with High Street, and was about half-way between High Street and the Back River. There is no picture of the garrison; it most resembled the Drew garrison. This locality was in plain sight of the old church."

These particular descriptions of the site of the old Pinkham homestead are given in the hope that many readers of this book

will take pains to visit that beautiful spot which slopes gently towards the Bellamy River, and commands a fine view of that stream, and of many other points of interest. I first visited this place on an October day of rare beauty and shall ever keep in mind the memories of the scenes of ancient days of sturdy valor then called up; admiration of the wise choice of a "home spot" by the first Richard Pinkham; memories of the old cemetery, near the site of the First Church, whose headstones are gray and battered by the storms which have swept over them, but which have had no power over the influence for good which has extended widely over our country from these sturdy and true-hearted Pinkhams, who have long slept beneath the gray sods. The calls on all the Pinkhams who still dwell on historic Dover Neck left memories of rare kindness and sunny cheer. Linked with these precious memories are those of the evening when, a little later on, before the large gathering of the New Hampshire Club of Lynn, Mass., I tried to tell the people of what they owed to Richard Pinkham and his noble posterity.

It is well to mark some of the many strong points in the life and character of the ancestor, Richard Pinkham, which have been illustrated in his descendants through many generations.

First of all is the true Christian faith of this ancestor. It has already been noted that the colony of which he, no doubt, was a member, was chosen because the persons composing it "were of some account for religion." This implied a faith which would sustain these men on the long voyage across the Atlantic, in the midst of the many disappointments and dangers which awaited them in a long procession on the "Pascataquack," and which would not only sustain them, but impart itself by strong influence to other colonists. Hence we find the name of Richard Pinkham on that paper which advocates a belief in a God of justice and liberty. He next stands before us at the door of the old First Church in New Hampshire, beating the drum that called to service in sunshine and storm. His broom of evergreen twigs swept daintly the interior of that house of the Lord. His help for the gifted minister who came on the good ship *James* with him, and for others who followed, was clear and unwavering. His children were all of this faithful Christian type. Some of these, and many of the grandchildren and descendants of this ancestor, became the leaders in the Friends' Church, which was organized at Dover at an early date. A very large number of the Pinkhams have been members of that church through all its generations. Others of the Pinkhams have been faithful members of other churches. These instances will be clearly noted in the course of this history. It would be hard to find a family that has in its history so many devoted, humble and helpful Christians.

Some of the earlier Pinkhams were led to the Friends' Church by the earnest preaching of the missionaries which the Quakers sent to America. Others went thither because the Quakers bore with such true Christian faith the bitter persecutions which were heaped upon them. But their strong membership in that church of the Friends had its deepest roots in the fact that the ancestor's teaching had been, "Always follow where the Spirit of God and Duty leads you!" It was this principle which had led the Pink-

ham ancestor from home scenes full of brightness and joy to shores shadowed by shaggy forests and lurking Indian foes. From the first Dover Point had unfolded to its explorers many disappointments. "Martin Pring had sailed up the Piscataqua at an early date. His narrative tells us what he met there: 'We found goodly groves and woods. . . . sundry sorts of beasts. . . . But meeting no sassafras (which was then thought to be the strong remedy for many diseases), we left these waters.' In 1614 Capt. John Smith came up the river, but he also sailed away and left the shores to their loneliness. In the spring of 1623, Edward Hilton, an English gentleman, and his brother, William, established themselves on the neck of land now called Dover Point, building there two houses, and beginning the first permanent settlement in New Hampshire. But the disappointments which they met is clear from the fact that in 1630 there were but three houses in all that part of the country." In her fine article on "Old Dover, N. H." in the *New England Magazine* for September, 1897, Caroline H. Garland thus writes and has well said: "The first comers here expected to find unexhausted supplies of silver and gold. In the first grants of land a certain proportion of these is reserved to the crown for 'ores' found thereon. When no gold appeared, the settlers tried the planting of vineyards, only to find that New Hampshire is not a grape-growing country." Richard Pinkham and his neighbors met various disappointments like these, but their faith, though it flickered now and then in the strong gusts of adversity, never lost its glow. One can well think that the wise Richard Pinkham counseled again and again, "We came here at the call of duty; it was no evil voice that urged us on; here we will remain; good will come from this voyage which we have made!" And while some colonists went back to England, the Pinkhams, with the Hiltons, Waldrons and many more, staid on Dover Neck.

Out of this faith naturally grew the counsel of Richard Pinkham to his children and others in his old age, "This home is on a beautiful slope to the river, but do not forget the land from which I came when Duty called me. If Duty shall beckon you, or here or there, fall not to take your canoes at the brink of yonder stream, or to thread your way through the dark forests to the north."

Hence we find in all branches of the Pinkham family a heed to this wise precept. Many sections of the family turned to Maine from Dover Neck, or to inland towns of New Hampshire, etc. They always chose beautiful sites for their homes; here they loved to linger, but the call of Duty has been heeded so thoroughly through the generations of this strong old family that they are scattered all over our country from ocean to ocean. Today, in the midst of broad prairies, or beautiful orange groves, or by the waves that are calling them to look well on the ocean that has yielded them much wealth, many are planning a journey into the midst of disappointments which they will meet as heroically as their ancestor, Richard, met his cares on Dover Point, because their belief is firm in God and His wise leading. Other Pinkhams still abide on Dover Neck, and in other old home places, where the fathers have dwelt, and no tales of gold and gain can

lure them away; the Duty that they heed is a hand that points to the placid river, white-capped bay, or the sunny fields and mountains.

In this characteristic is traced one which has ever marked the Pinkham generations—a wise survey of all the points in any matter which has strongly appealed to them. "Slow of choice," they have often been called. This has been frequently manifest in their love stories. Hence we find many Pinkhams marrying at no early date in life, and after courtships of many moons. But the result has been the happy unions which have seen golden weddings of rare joy. The slow choice of a life-work has been marked by the same shining successes. In my native town we were admonished, "Never bother a Pinkham when he is thinking." They were on their way to great spaces of light!

In my story, "The Easter Drum," which follows this sketch, I have pointed out the keen wit which marked the Pinkham ancestor. This story is not moulded altogether on historical lines, but is given as an illustration of what has been preserved in many legends, and in the many generations of this sturdy old family. This has never been a wit which has burst out in peals of laughter. It has been that which gave a merry twinkle to the eyes of blue or gray, and the making of plans which have ended in the foiling of wily purposes and foes of desperate type. Many garrison houses on Dover Point were captured by the Indians, though wise ones guarded them well. No savage foe ever swung his tomahawk inside the garrison of Richard Pinkham. When the winds assailed it after long years a half of its strong timbers stood in place. The bulider was as witty with tools as he was in matching the plans of the Indians. In hundreds of towns all over our broad land the Pinkham wit of the ancestral type has been well known.

The ancestor was a man of learning and was constantly adding to his stores of knowledge. Among his descendants this characteristic has been clearly seen. In those who have given all their time to study, teaching, etc., there has always been grand success. On old farms and on ships that made their way to all parts of the world, Pinkhams of quiet ways have been met whose stores of knowledge have been a surprise as great as the joy and help which they have given to all neighborhoods where they have dwelt, or ports to which they have sailed. And this has ever been given without any shadow of boasting, for the true Pinkham has been like the ancestor of my story when the minister urged him to speak. "I did only what I thought was my duty;" whatever they had they counted only as a trust to be used for the helping of others.

And it is a source of deepest gratitude that, with such a willingness to share with others, the Pinkhams have been given such a numerous line of descendants with long life-leases. It was in 1671 that the ancestor, Richard Pinkham, gave the bulk of his property to his son, John, who engaged to support him. He was then an old man, and is supposed to have lived for some years after that date. His sons lived to a good old age. Among the descendants are many examples of this wonderful hardihood, and not only in the Pinkhams, but in those about them whom

they seem often to have inspired to many fresh holds on life. A Maine paper stated a few years ago: "There are about twenty people in Maine who have reached the age of 100 years, and four of these bear the name of Pinkham. Mrs. Emma Abbott Pinkham of Boothbay, Me., was 102 years old; T. D. Pinkham of Harpswell, Me., is past 100; Mrs. Eliza A. Pinkham of Millbridge, Me., celebrated her 101st birthday in January last; and now Uncle Thomas Pinkham, 104 years old, has just moved from Pittston to Gardiner, Me., and he has lately proved that he can do about as much work as the younger folks."

The sturdy patriotism of Ancestor Richard Pinkham has been well preserved among his descendants. Revolutionary and other war records are not numerous in the annals of this family. This is because of the adherence to the teaching of the Friends' Church, of which so many of them were members; but there is deep truth in the thought, "The prayers of a few Quakers are equal to a battalion of soldiers!" The records of the Pinkhams who bore arms for their country are of an exceedingly interesting character. Other strong characteristics of the Pinkham ancestor will be noted by all who study these pages, and observe the men and women who are so fortunate as to be of Pinkham descent.

(The following story was published in the *New England Magazine* for April, 1905. Many copies of this magazine were soon bought by the members of the Pinkham family, who wished for this sketch of their ancestor. The article is herewith reprinted for the sake of the scores who were unable to secure a copy of the magazine, and at the urgent request of those who had the story and wished for more copies, and for all the members of the family to have an opportunity of reading what seemed to well set forth the characteristics of the first Richard Pinkham. The editor of the *New England Magazine* kindly gave his permission for the use of this story in this family history.)

THE EASTER DRUM.

As Richard Pinkham passed under the great trees on Dover Neck, a bright flash of sunshine fell upon his pathway. But when he looked up he did not pause in his quiet, sturdy stride. There was no peering to see what evergreen branch had yielded to the strong touch of the wind, and let the dancing beams in among the dusky shadows. His glance went straight to the patch of blue sky above the treetops. His face quickly lost the faint touch of surprise which had marked it. Then the blue eyes grew darker and little twinkles of merriment challenged the sunbeams which once more glinted on his way like signals which he would do well to heed.

As he strode on, black eyes flashed messages across the ferns, which began slowly to straighten themselves where the young man's footsteps had touched them. The Indian on the right hand side of the forest trail questioned with his glances.

"Is that the paleface whom you saw land from the vessel at the mouth of the Piscataqua not long ago?"

And the nod of the head on the other side of the path answered, "The very same." And his query was, as his grasp tightened on his tomahawk, "Did I not tell you aright that he was a youth on whom we need to keep close watch?"

At this the black eyes which were interviewed flashed in harmony with the nodding head that slowly lifted itself from behind the great hemlock.

Then the two Indians whispered excitedly together as Richard Pinkham went on to see where he would improve the farm which was to bear his name from that far old year.

"He is not so sturdy as many of the palefaces who come here."

"No, but he has a way of lifting up his face so that he can look into the sky—and then he goes straight on."

"He does not talk so much as the others who came from over the seas, you said?"

"No, when he speaks his words hit the mark! But he talks best with the twinkles in his eyes, which are like the glints of the sun on the clear waters of the Cochecho. I have watched him when the other palefaces were busy with hot words, and one of those looks stopped what might have been a bitter strife."

"Yet he does not seem to be proud of his thoughts and successes?"

"Ah, no. He seems to look above, as we do when the Great Spirit helps us in our hunting. Yet he will lead the people with a strong hand."

"And he will push us from these, the hunting grounds of our fathers, if we do not watch him with tomahawks well sharpened."

"Yes; but we will not let him twinkle us about as he does the palefaces."

Then the countenances of the Indians grew hard with decision. Richard Pinkham's steps and acts must not only be watched by them, but by the keen eyes of many another brave. And this compact was steadily adhered to by the red men up and down the Cochecho and Piscataqua.

They had judged well of this stout-hearted colonist. Though he was much younger than the majority of those who came from England on the good ship *James*, he became a quiet and forceful leader in some of the most important plans and enterprises in those early days. His is the fourth name on that paper dated the 22d of October, 1640, which has well been called Dover's Magna Charta, and of which Rev. Dr. Quint has well said: "It antedated in practice by a hundred and thirty-six years, the principles announced in the Declaration of Independence in 1776." The copy of this paper in the Public Record Office of London, England, gives his name with the quaint spelling of that day, Richard Pinkhame.

In the plans for building the first church on Dover Neck he had a wise and large part. He hewed more than one of the great logs which went into its framework. In the old Dover records stands that entry which sets forth the great value which the colonists placed upon his faithfulness in the care of this important building:

"27 of the 9th month, 1648.

"It is this day ordered at a Publique Towne Meeting that

Richard Pinkham shall beat the drum on the Lord's Day to give notice of the time of meeting, and to sweep the meeting house, for the which he shall be allowed six bushels of Indian corn for his pay this year and to be free from rates."

Now, when the watching Indians saw Richard Pinkham go to the meeting-house with his, to them, mysterious drum, and when they heard its sturdy, solemn call sound far and wide, so that "no sinner might say he knew not it was the Lord's Day," their eyes flashed with indignation and wonder.

The full meaning of the music they could not understand. But they saw clearly that this call was more potent than all other messages ever given on Dover Neck. It was like the twinkles in the blue eyes of Richard Pinkham which they had marked so well.

Men and women at once came to the doors of their log houses and then made ready to go where the drumbeats summoned them. Children needed to be told but once of the mission of the faithful sentinel at the door of the meeting-house. Long before the time for service arrived, the rough benches in the church were occupied, and a little time later there was but scanty standing room left. The faint smoke curling above the settlers' houses told plainly that there was no one there to stir the fires.

Just what the people did in that quaint service the Indians could not tell. But it was clear that thither the people would continue to flock on the morning of every seventh day. It was plain to see that a happier and sturdier look was on the faces of these worshippers when they went homeward. They walked closer together. The call of the drum was helping to mould the people in strength and integrity, of which Richard Pinkham was a stronger inspiration than even the minister of learned ways.

The Indians marked well that, in their homeward walks, the worshippers glanced often at the woods and rivers. The word passed from one watching brave to another, "They mean to keep on cutting down our trees and taking our fish from the bright waters, until all these shall be under their clutch."

Some of the Indians tossed their heads in scorn as they noticed looks of anxiety on the faces of their companions, and here and there a shade of fear.

They sent scornful thoughts whizzing upon these "squaws" like vindictive arrows. "There is only one drum like that among the palefaces. And that bellowing circle is so easy for us to lift and fling into the river. Or it could be crushed with one blow from the tomahawk. An Indian could in a second snap the little sticks that roll out that mischief upon the woods and waters. And how quickly the flames could make of all this nonsense a handful of quivering ashes which the winds would blow far away over the treetops! After that the palefaces would come but little together, and their jealousies and follies would be like wedges with which they rend the great logs apart. Then the braves could more surely creep upon them unawares, and what was left of all this thieving company would be glad to hurry away again across the seas."

But still the mysterious spell of the drum grew stronger upon the settlers on Dover Neck. So, while bands of Indians agreed that it must be destroyed, and larger councils gave the same de-

cision, the weeks slipped by before the plan was made which it was judged would forever stop the call from Richard Pinkham and his sturdy drum. But this plan was thought to be so strong that grim laughter echoed along the waters where it was certain no paleface fisherman would be seen when the summer winds played with the ripples.

The plan was this: The log house of Richard Pinkham was to be carefully watched. When he was gone, his coveted drum should be taken away. But this capture had best be made on the day before the drumbeats were expected at the church door. The place of the drum was to be filled with something exactly its size, and above it spread the cloth with which Richard Pinkham always covered it so carefully. Then he would not know that it was gone until the Sabbath. The drum itself must be spared from the dusky hands which longed at once to destroy it. In sight of the church a fire should be made ready for quick kindling. Then, with a shout which would cause the palefaces to look eagerly thither, the drum would be tossed into the greedy flames, and the settlers would view in dismay the destruction of that which they prized so much. Then the news of this would be passed on and the other settlers would not plant many acres of ground that year.

And on a Saturday afternoon when Richard Pinkham went up the forest path to the church, the drum was carried away and everything made ready for the coming day.

The two braves who watched young Pinkham on his return home saw him by the glow of the logs in the fireplace, glance about the room, and lift his face towards the stars which sparkled so brightly above the roof. But the twinkle in his eyes was so much brighter than they had seen there before that one of the watchers raised himself tall and determined under the force of the thought: "He is such a crafty man that we shall never be wholly safe until his scalp dangles in some of our wigwams!"

But for the restraint of his companion the Indian would have at once taken the drummer's life. The dissatisfaction spread to the other Indians when they saw Richard Pinkham walk to the church as usual on Sunday morning. It was true that he had no drum with him, but he strode on as cheerily and sturdily as he had done on the other Lord's Days. He nodded happily to all the settlers whom he saw upon his way. His gaze sought the sky free from all shades of doubt and care. What could this mean?

And all the Indians in their hiding places, near where they expected the fire would forever quell the power of the drum, watched in wonder as Richard Pinkham lifted the great wooden latch on the meeting-house door. And when the young man came out again with a drum held firmly before him with a leather strap their excitement knew no bounds. Then, when the clear, sonorous tones rang out until it seemed that Richard was beating two drums instead of one, some of the Indians were full of fear. What strange spell was the paleface using? And where would be the end of its power?

"Break this charm at once," commanded the chief, whose word was law. Then, with yells of demons, as they saw young Pinkham and others looking towards them, they threw the drum into

the greedy blaze, and began their wild dance in a close circle about it. This was but for a moment, however. There was a quick flash in the midst of the fire and then an explosion so loud that the echoes ran rioting through the forest. Some of the Indians were caught by the red tongues of fire and others were dashed upon the rough ground. All who could do so ran for their canoes on the river's bank with such wild yells as no settler on Dover Point had heard before. They paddled across the waters in haste, and did not rest until they had plunged into the deepest forest shadows, and their lingering terror held them away from harming a settler's home or life for many months; it was a shield between Dover and many an Indian onslaught.

Meanwhile, that Sabbath morning, Richard Pinkham stood at the door of the meeting-house with the merriment flashing from his blue eyes. And louder, clearer, sounded the drumbeats which brought the people in haste from their cabins. Had not the drum been committed to his charge? Though all the trees on Dover Neck trembled in the throes of an earthquake, he knew his post and clear was his pathway of duty. And when the people led as captives what few Indians that were living by the fire, their growing wonder to know all which had happened brought them hurriedly to where the faithful drummer stood.

When the minister had communed a little with Richard Pinkham, he raised his hands and commanded silence among his restless, wide-eyed flock. After a brief prayer, he said, with strong emphasis: "In such an hour as this, our sturdy, God-fearing Richard Pinkham ought to speak, and with his own blameless tongue tell us what wonders he hath wrought by the guidance of Him who hath brought us across the seas. But he says this is the work committed unto me, though he hath charged me to be chary in my chronicle of his acts. He says his duty lies with the drum.

"And truly no man ever did such duty with more punctilious care—as if the eyes of the Almighty ever regarded him. But the story of what he hath wrought will be a growing cause of thankfulness here, as long as you river sweeps on to the sea. Truly the Almighty sent our Richard Pinkham to us. His sturdy ancestors won the noble coat-of-arms which many of you have seen in old England. But his deeds are justier than all theirs!

"Ye know well what day this is—the Easter Sabbath. On this day our Lord and Master rose from the dark tomb that we might arise from our black sins and slothfulness into lives of purity and helpful deeds. It was for this day's honor that Richard Pinkham made, in the quiet which no man's voice pierced, this drum whose call ye have heard for the first time this Lord's Day. It was made with rare skill in the sacred shadows of this house of God. Ye see how much larger it is than the drum which he hath been accustomed to beat so zealously."

And then a smile glowed on the minister's face as he went on: "He is a truly God-fearing man, and hath used all the keen wit with which the Almighty hath endowed him, for the weal of our colony. Just how he knew he hath not told me, but he was sure that the lurking savages meant to despoil his other drum. So, during the week days, he hath for a considerable space kept in it a goodly store of powder. And you have heard its voice shout out in the midst of the fire vengeance upon the bands of Amalek!"

"I strove only to do what seemed my duty," said Richard Pinkham modestly, as the faces of all the people were turned to his in wondering admiration. "And it is the strong hand of the Lord which hath rolled the burden of danger and fear from us. Praise ye Him this glad Easter Day!"

"Let all the people praise Him," said the minister. And the woods on Dover Neck echoed the deep and glad "Amen!"

(I have been asked so many questions about the Pinkhams in England, and their coat-of-arms mentioned in the foregoing story, that I have placed in the Appendix of this book some records of this nature, kindly furnished by Mr. Willabe Haskell, who for a long time was Librarian of Yale University. He has been a very faithful helper in the making of this history.)

SECTION ONE.

THE PINKHAM FAMILY ON DOVER NECK, NEW HAMPSHIRE.

(Great help in these early Records was received from
Rev. Dr. A. H. Quint.)

- (1) Ancestor Richard Pinkham; first mentioned as a resident of Dover Neck, N. H., 1640; he no doubt came there much earlier than that; in 1671 he conveyed the bulk of his property to his son, John, who engaged to support him; he is supposed to have lived for some time after that; he was one of the constables; a man of sturdy character and helpful influence; it is said that his wife, Julia, was alive in 1688, but her maiden name is not given, nor further information regarding her. Of the names of the children, Rev. Dr. Quint has well said: "We know of only three, Richard Pinkham, John Pinkham, Thomas Pinkham". He was taxed on Dover Neck, N. H., in 1647-'48, and then vanishes from the records. Nothing has been found to support the various theories which have been advanced in regard to him. It is very likely that he died soon after 1647-'48."
- (2) Richard Pinkham was a carpenter and lived on Dover Neck, N. H., owning a lot fronting on the High Street. He m. Elizabeth Leighton, daughter of the second Thomas Leighton, a noble choice. On May 2, 1699, Richard Pinkham conveyed the High Street premises to Thomas Tibbetts. On May 12, 1709, he conveyed to his nephew, Amos Pinkham, land which formerly belonged to the first Thomas Leighton. Feb. 22, 1736-'37, he conveyed land to his son, Tristram; also on Feb. 11, 1748-'49. On Dec. 2, 1730-'31, he conveyed to his son, Richard, Lot No. 70 in the first division at Rochester, N. H. On April 18, 1699, he received land from Thomas Leighton, eldest son and heir to Thomas, deceased, grandson of Thomas Leighton first, and brother to Elizabeth Leighton, wife of Richard Pinkham. Richard Pinkham and his wife, Elizabeth Leighton, had children:
 - (3) Richard. (3) Tristram.
 - (3) John Pinkham, b. Aug. 19, 1696.
- (3) Richard Pinkham; d. at Nantucket, Mass., 1718; he is said to have gone to Nantucket, Mass., in the good ship *Rochester* about 1680; m., 1683, Mary Coffin, b. Dover, N. H., April 18, 1665; d. Feb. 1, 1741; daughter of Hon. James Coffin and Mary Severance. (See the fuller records of the children and descendants in *Section Second* of this Pinkham History.)
- (3) Tristram Pinkham; his name is spelled Trestram in some of the old records; he is called a husbandman; m. Martha Hays, b. Dover, N. H., Aug. 16, 1721; daughter of Samuel Hays and Leah ——. On Dec. 2, 1730-'31, his father conveyed

land to him; also on Feb. 11, 1748-'49. "Dec. 8, 1746, Samuel Hays of Dover, N. H., husbandman, in consideration of him and the natural affection which I have and do bear unto my daughter, Martha, wife of Tristram Pinkham, by deed, give her a tract of land consisting of eight acres, being in the same Dover aforesaid, on the south side of the Bellimon's Bank River, and on the southerly side of the road that leads over West Bridge, a little to the eastward of the south bridge, etc."

No full account of the children of Tristram Pinkham could be secured. According to the best records that could be gathered, two sons of Tristram Pinkham emigrated to Steuben, Me. "A great many years ago two brothers, Tristram Pinkham and Richard Pinkham, with their wives, came to Steuben, Me., from New Hampshire." The Maine Historical Magazine, Vol. VIII, 1893: "Tristram Pinkham and his brother, Richard Pinkham, went from Boothbay to Gouldsborough Harbor, Me., and built a mill at Long Cove. It is said to have been the first mill in the eastern regions. These Pinkham brothers moved to Steuben, Me., prior to 1769, to what was called for them Pinkham's Bay, and built a tide mill on Pinkham's mill stream."

The following are all the records of the descendants of Tristram Pinkham which could be secured after long search at Steuben, Me., by Mrs. Etta G. Whittier.

 (2) John Pinkham was the son of the ancestor, Richard Pinkham, to whom he conveyed the bulk of his property in 1671, for which John agreed to support his father, and carried out his

pledge in the most careful and loving manner. He thus took possession of the old Pinkham homestead in 1671, just before the time when it became necessary for the Pinkhams to build their strong garrison house as a protection against the Indians. This was also the critical time when every man must carry his gun with him when he went to meeting. This John Pinkham was first taxed on Dover Neck, N. H., in 1665. John Pinkham m. Rose Otis, daughter of the first Richard Otis. Rose Otis⁴ had a most romantic history, being taken captive by the Indians in the capture of the Otis garrison and taken to Canada with others of the family, and later on ransomed. Her father, Richard Otis, was one of the early and influential colonists on Dover Neck; he m. as early as 1651, Rose Stoughton, daughter of Anthony Stoughton, and sister of Sir Nicholas Stoughton, Baronet. The line of Rose Otis, as traced, is as follows: (1) Richard Otis of Glastonbury, England, who made his will on Nov. 17, 1611, and mentions children, Stephen², John², Thomas², and two daughters². (2) Stephen Otis; m. Elizabeth ———; made his will in 1637; mentions, two daughters,³ and Richard,³ the father of Rose Otis,⁴ who married John Pinkham. (2) John Otis, b. Barnstable, Devonshire, England, 1581, was the ancestor of the celebrated Otis family of Massachusetts, as well as of the famous James Otis, the patriot of Revolutionary fame, who was of the 6th generation. The Stoughton line of Rose Otis, wife of John Pinkham, runs as follows: (1) Thomas Stoughton of Stoughton, Surry, England. (2) Gilbert Stoughton, who m. Mary Bambesy. (3) Lawrence Stoughton of Sussex, England, whose will was dated May 10, 1571. (4) Thomas Stoughton, b. 1521; m. Elizabeth Lewkener, daughter of Edward Lewkener. (5) Lawrence Stoughton, b. 1554; d. 1615; m. Rose Cline, daughter of Richard Cline of London, England. (6) Sir Nicholas Stoughton. (6) Rose Stoughton, b. Nov., 1629; sent to New England by her father, with Captain Stoughton, in 1643; m. Richard Otis.³ This line of illustrious families is given, as many of the Pinkham descendants know little of it, and as it is a subject which it is hoped they will study with much care, as in this is given the ample proof of their fine ancestral lines, and also of the wise choices which so many Pinkhams have made after deliberating on matrimonial affairs.

On June 19, 1714, John Pinkham gave to his oldest son, Richard Pinkham, fifty acres of land in the Cocheco swamps, lying along the Bellamy Bank Fresh River. On March 16, 1721-'22, he gave land to his son, Otis. On July 4, 1716, he gave "to my beloved son, Amos Pinkham, certain lands, on condition that he pay each of his sisters mentioned five pounds." This land and conditions Amos Pinkham conveyed to his brother, Otis Pinkham, Aug. 8, 1720. This paper may be interesting to readers of this book:

"To all Christian people to whom this deed of gift shall come and appear, John Pinkham, of the town of Dover, in the Province of New Hampshire, sendeth greeting. Now know ye that I, the above said John Pinkham, for divers causes and good considerations me thereunto moving, and as well for the

natural love, good will, and affections, which I do owe and bear my well-beloved son, Amos Pinkham, and for his paying the sum of fifteen pounds money to his sisters in the manner following—that is, to say—5 pounds to his sister Rose Canney (Kenney); and 5 pounds money to his sister, Elizabeth Pinkham, and 5 pounds money to his sister Sarah Pinkham; all to be paid in money, or other good species at money prices to their good satisfaction within two years and one day next after my decease; which I have given and granted unto my aforesaid son, Amos Pinkham; and of these presents do give, grant, bargain, sell, enfeoff, alien, assign, assure, sett over, Deltiver and Confirm, unto my aforesaid son, Amos Pinkham, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that my Messuage, or Teniment, in the which I now dwell, situate on Dover Neck, bounded on the east by the High Street; on the north by the land of Lieutenant Joseph Roberts, on the west with the Low Street; on the south by a lane lying by William Harford's land; and this land all which said Messuage, or Teniment, lying and living the aforesaid bounds, containing one dwelling house, and four acres of land by estimation more or less, together with the orchard gardens, with free liberties for his barn to stand on the land where it now is until such time as he shall cause to remove it; and all other privileges and appurtenances to the said Messuage, or Teniment, above granted shall be for and to the whole and sole use, benefit, and behoof, of my aforesaid son, Amos Pinkham, and to his heirs and assigns to have and to hold all and singular the aforegiven and granted premises, and part and parcel thereof unto my aforesaid son Amos Pinkham, and to his heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, forever, from and immediately after my decease, on the considerations above mentioned, free and clear, and fully acquitted and discharged, of and from all former gifts, grants, bargains, sales, leases, wills, entails, judgments, executions, and other encumbrances of what nature or kind soever, whereby my son Amos Pinkham, himself, his heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or any or either of them, shall or may anyways be molested, in or excepted out of the above given and granted premises, or any part or parcel thereof, by any person, or persons, whatsoever, from, by, or under me, my means, or procurement. In witness whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and seal this 19th day of June, Anno Domini, 1715.

“John Pinkham.

“Witness: Jno. Tuttle, Job Clements.”

John Pinkham gave to his son, James, July 19, 1714, land. July 19, 1714, John Pinkham sold land to his son, Solomon, as his portion of the estate. Rev. Dr. A. H. Quint of Dover, N. H., says: “John Pinkham and Rose Otis, his wife, had at least nine children,” and gives them in the following order, and each child will be considered under the appropriate number: (3) Richard. (3) Thomas. (3) Amos. (3) Rose. (3) Solomon. (3) Otis. (3) James. (3) Elizabeth, who m. March 18, 1718-19, Samuel Nute. (3) Sarah Pinkham.

(3) Richard Pinkham, who may have been the one of that name who m., at the age of 85 years, Nov. 27, 1757, Mary Welch of Kittery, Me., who was then 78 years old. The name of his first wife appears to have been Elizabeth. On May 12, 1709, he and his wife, Elizabeth, sold land to Amos Pinkham; on Nov. 28, 1718, he sold land to his brother, Otis Pinkham; on Aug. 27, 1725, he sold land to Israel Hodgdon.

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(3) Thomas Pinkham; m., Dec. 2, 1700, Marcy Allen. On July 22, 1715, his father gave him land; on May 17, 1714, he sold land to his brother, James Pinkham of Dover, N. H. (The children of Thomas Pinkham seem to have widely scattered and it was difficult to secure many records of them. The scanty records are given below. The son, Ebenezer, removed to Harpswell, Me.; the son, Benjamin, and daughter, Martha, moved to Boothbay, Me.; and the son, Joseph, to Madbury, N. H.) The children of Thomas Pinkham, baptized at a lecture at Daniel Jacob's house, by Rev. J. Cushing, Nov. 13, 1744:

(4) Sarah Pinkham.

(4) Joseph Pinkham. On Sept. 8, 1763, he and his wife, Elizabeth, bought land of Thomas Davis of Dover, N. H. He probably moved to Madbury, N. H., becoming one of the most prominent citizens there. The records of his children and descendants will be found in *Section Five* of this book, as the date of his birth shows that he was younger than his brothers, Ebenezer and Benjamin, whose names are given below.

(4) Mary Pinkham.

(4) Richard Pinkham. His father gave him property on Oct. 22, 1736, "being 20 acres in the first division of the common land." Name of his wife supposed to be Abigail, as they sold land Dec. 4, 1748, to Samuel Starbird. (No other dates of baptisms of children of Thomas Pinkham were found.)

(4) Ebenezer Pinkham, b. Dover, N. H., Nov. 14, 1712; d. Harpswell, Me., Jan. 6, 1762. (Full records in *Section Third* of this book.)

(4) Benjamin Pinkham, b. Dover, N. H., 1717; d. Boothbay, Me., March 2, 1792 (75y). (Records in *Section Fourth* of this book.)

(4) Martha Pinkham, b. April 7, 1737; d. Dec. 18, 1818; m., 1757, Joseph Giles and removed to Boothbay, Me. (Records of the family in the *History of Boothbay and Southport, Me.*, by Francis B. Greene.)

(3) Amos Pinkham. His name is among the first of those mentioned in the ancient records of the Friends' Church at Dover, N. H., the first date of the Dover meeting being 1702. Later in the records he is mentioned, "Amos Pinkham, sometimes a preacher, but afterwards disowned by the church." (This disowning was probably because he married outside the church.) He m. SECTION TWO.

RICHARD PINKHAM OF NANTUCKET, MASS., AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

His line: (1) Ancestor Richard Pinkham of Dover Neck, N. H.

H.; died Nantucket, Mass., 1718; the descendants say that he went to Nantucket about 1680 in the good sloop *Rochester*; a man of noble and sturdy character; he was no doubt a member of the Friends' Church as so many of his descendants were faithful helpers in that church; m., 1683, Mary Coffin, b. Dover, N. H., April 18, 1665; d. Nantucket, Mass., Feb. 1, 1741; the daughter of Hon. James Coffin and Mary Severance; Mary Severance was the daughter of John Severance and Abigail ——— of Salisbury, Mass., and she d. on Nantucket, Mass., July 28, 1720 (80y.). The Hon. James Coffin was the fourth son of the ancestor, Tristram Coffin of Brixton, near Plymouth, England, and of his wife, Dionis Stevens, daughter of Robert Stevens, Esq., of Brixton, England. In 1642 this ancestor, Tristram Coffin, with his wife, five small children, his widowed mother and two unmarried sisters, came to America, living in Salisbury, Haverhill and Newbury, Mass., and in 1659 he went to Nantucket, which was then under the jurisdiction of New York, and made arrangements for the purchase of the island by a company which he organized at Salisbury, Mass. In 1660 he moved to Nantucket with his family and died there, Oct. 2, 1681 (76y.). Among the descendants of this ancestor, Tristram Coffin, were some of the sturdiest and most enterprising men and women of Nantucket, etc. The family history should be studied with great interest by all descended from Richard Pinkham, who made such a wise choice of a wife in Mary Coffin. "Her father, Hon. James Coffin, removed from Nantucket to Dover Neck, N. H., about 1668, being a member of the church there in 1671. On May 31, 1671, he was made a freeman at Dover. After awhile he returned to Nantucket, which was ever after his home. He filled several important public offices at Nantucket, among them Judge of the Probate Court. He was the father of fourteen children, all but two of which grew to maturity. From him have descended, perhaps, the most remarkable representatives of the Coffin family, as doubtless the most numerous and generally scattered. Of this line was Gen. John Coffin, who had two sons who were admirals in the English navy; Admiral Sir Isaac Coffin was a brother of Gen. John Coffin. The famous Lucretia Mott was of this Coffin line." (Mrs. Mary Coffin Pinkham m. (second), James Gardner; son of Richard Gardner and wife, Sarah ———.)

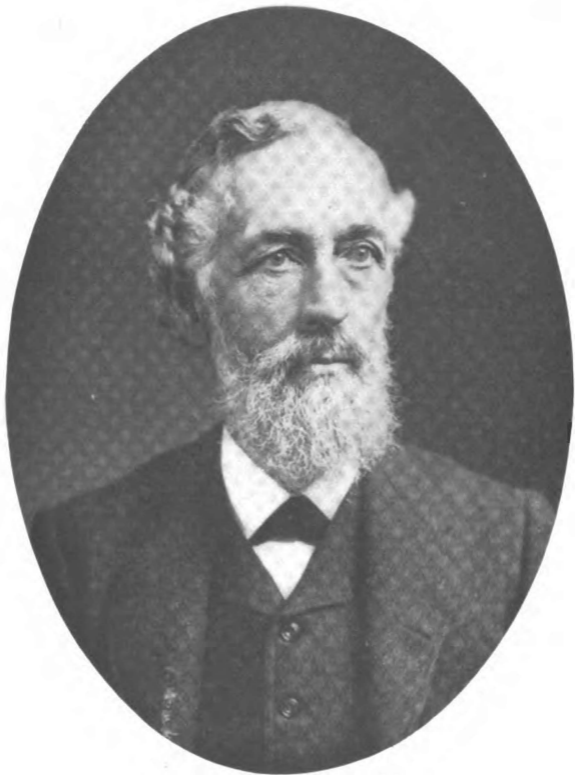

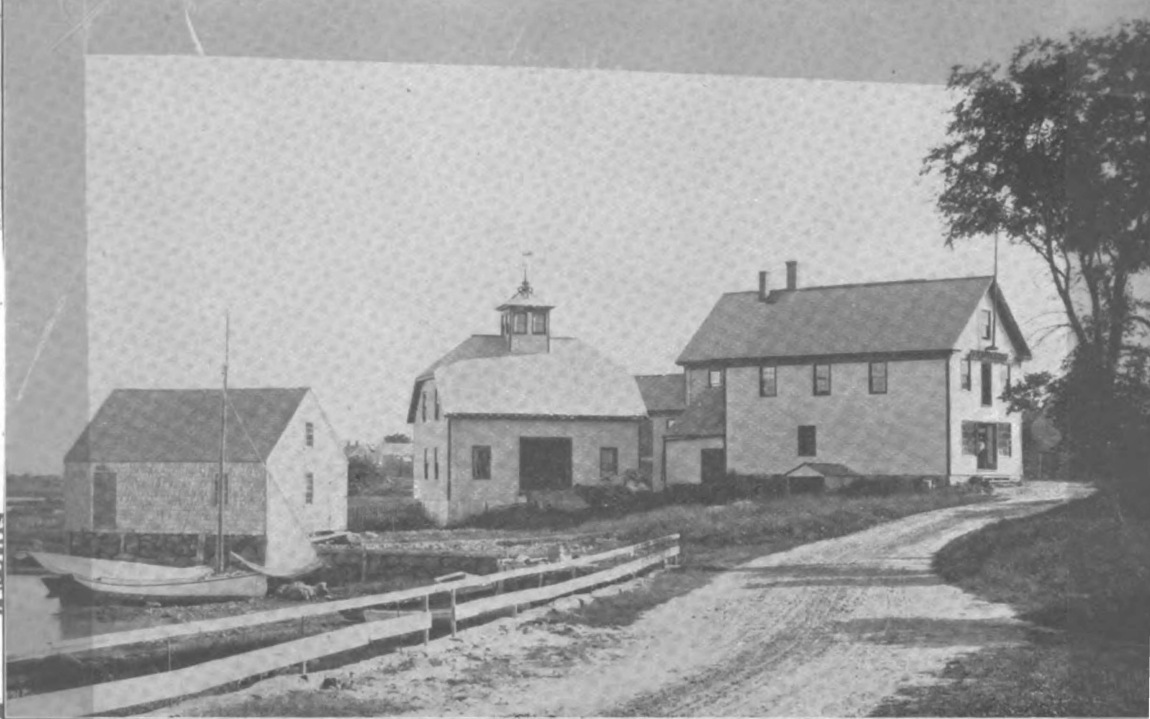

He then engaged in the coasting business and for several years ran a freighter from Alviso to San Francisco. In 1854 he returned to Kennebunkport, Me., where he engaged in trade for a year or two. He then bought Bickford's Island at Cape Porpoise, Me., and converted it into a big fish stand. He also built a large store for general merchandise, centrally located in Cape Porpoise, Me., village. In this he remained in business with his son until his death. He held various town offices at Cape Porpoise; for many years deputy inspector, town agent, selectman, representative to the Legislature from Kennebunkport, Me. He was a man of superior endowments, tall and well proportioned, with a noble and intelligent countenance. His voice was very musical. He was a man of strict integrity and he was highly respected by all his business associates. He was very kind and friendly to all. M. (first), Feb. 24, 1858. 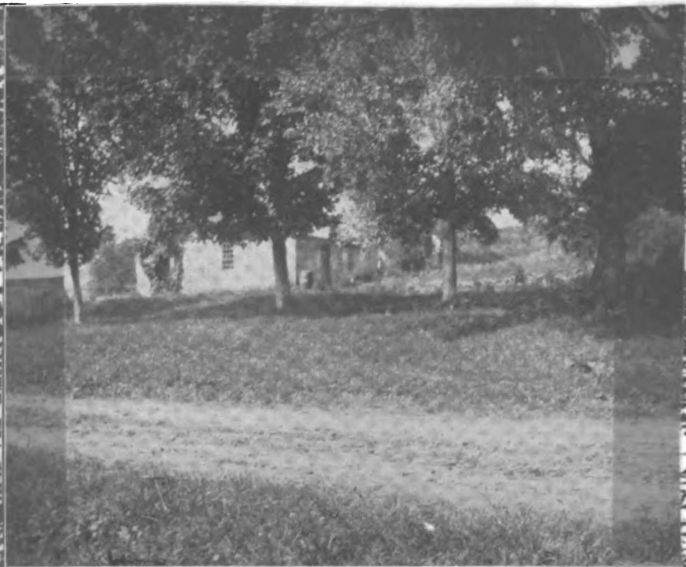

SECTION THREE.

EBENEZER PINKHAM OF HARPSWELL, ME., AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

His line of ancestry: (1) Richard Pinkham; (2) Richard Pinkham; (3) Thomas Pinkham, who m. Mercy Allen; all of Dover, N. H.

(4) Ebenezer Pinkham, b. Dover, N. H., March 31, 1712; d. Harpswell, Me., Jan. 8, 1762. A sturdy, God-fearing man, whose excellent qualities have been handed down his very long line of descendants. He was a faithful preacher in the Friends' Church, and about 1750 his good work at Portland (then Falmouth), Me., is mentioned in history. Richard Mott Pinkham of Muscatine, Iowa, wrote of him, on Oct. 2, 1871: "My grandfather, Ebenezer Pinkham, with two of his brothers, emigrated from Dover, N. H., to Maine, but I have no knowledge of the date. Grandfather settled in Harpswell, Me., while his brothers Benjamin and Solomon settled further east, in the town of Boothbay, Me. My grandfather was one of quite a number who were converted to the doctrines of the Friends through the influence of David Sands on his first visit to New England." Ebenezer Pinkham moved to Harpswell, Me., about 1750. On the map of the first settlers of that town in 1752, lots 37, 38 and 40 were owned by Mr. Pinkham, who without doubt was the ancestor Ebenezer. This land was located on the extreme south end of Harpswell Neck, and was purchased of Joseph and Clement Orr, who afterwards settled on Orr's Island, Me. The old deed which Henry Gibbs gave to the Orr brothers thus describes this land: "The south east prong of a neck of land situate, lying and being in the County of York, in Casco Bay, commonly known by the name of Merriconeag Neck, containing by estimate 200 acres, and is 580 Poles in length as by the Proprietors' deed of the same to me, and being the date of the Third day of March, 1739, on record in the County of York aforesaid, and is bounded as followeth, viz: Eastward of the north on the land of Waite Webber, 98 rods; northerly upon Merreconage Cove between the land of Waite Webber and William Magrah about 30 rods, and northerly upon Merreconage Harbor; easterly bounded upon the salt water; Westerly upon the Cove called Ash Cove; being the whole of said bounds, and being 580 Poles in length as aforesaid, as appears by the Plan hereto annexed." This land has become a part of one of the most famed summer resorts on the Maine coast, and its selection by Ebenezer Pinkham shows the clear foresight which has characterized so many of his name in their various quiet decisions and choice.

Ebenezer Pinkham m., in Dover, N. H., Nov. 27, 1736. Sarah Austin, b. Dover, N. H., the 9th month and 14th day, 1719, and d. at Harpswell, Me., Feb. 19, 1802. An old fam-

lly chart owned by Mr. Charles A. Pinkham of China, Me., states: "She died with all her proper senses, and a well-composed mind, leaving 106 persons who called her mother by relationship." She was a woman of noble faith and character. Sarah Austin was of the fourth generation from Joseph Austin¹, who was at Hampton, N. H., in 1642, and was in Dover, N. H., 1648. He is said to have m., about 1659, Mrs. Sarah (Starbuck) Story.

CHAPTER ONE.

Oct. 5, 1849, aged 92y.; she was the daughter of Joseph Woodworth⁴ (or Woodward, as the name was originally spelled), b. Scituate, Mass., July 20, 1720, and m., Oct. 7, 1745, Sarah Jones, granddaughter of Benjamin Woodworths and Ann Torrey; great-granddaughter of Joseph Woodworths and Sarah Stockbridge; great-great-granddaughter of the ancestor Walter Woodworth¹, who was at Scituate, Mass., 1635. Amy Woodworth Pinkham was thus quite closely related to Samuel Woodworth, author of the famous song, "The Old Onken Bucket."

Ebenezer Pinkham m., April 6, 1789, Mary Kemp, who was b. at Kittery, Me., and d. at Harrington, Me., in the winter of 1857, aged 88y." Her brothers were Robert, Silas and Furbish Kemp; her sister Sallie Kemp m. Ward Haskell of Harpswell, Me., and her half-sister Huldah Randall m. Norton Stover. Mary Kemp's mother's maiden name was Milbury; these Kemps moved to Harpswell, Me., at an early date.

Sketch from the *Idaho Magazine*, Feb., 1906: "In Joseph Pinkham we find a man who has given the best of his life to the service of Idaho. During most of the years he has lived here, both before and since Idaho became a state, he has been, in one capacity and another, a servant of the public. He has discharged his duties faithfully and conscientiously. Public criticism has never been able to chalk up a black mark on his record sheet. His every effort has been aimed at the betterment of Idaho, towards the advancement of the interest of her inhabitants, and towards the enforcement of her laws. He has helped to make Idaho a state desirable for homeseekers. When 14 years of age his father died, and at 17 years he left his boyhood home, went to New York, and shipped on board a sailing vessel, bound for San Francisco, around Cape Horn. The voyage was an uneventful one and consumed eight months. He arrived at his destination in the fall of 1850, and secured work in a hay market. During the following two or three years he worked as a clerk in the stores and at other employment in Sacramento, Shasta City and Yreka. In 1853 Mr. Pinkham spent several months in mining about Pitt River, Cal., later returning to Yreka and joining his brother, Ebenezer, in a trip to Oregon. They arrived at Jacksonville, Ore., on the very day when the famous Rogue River Indian War began. They remained there during the war, helped subdue the red men, and, at intervals, engaged in mining. In 1855 Mr. Pinkham engaged in packing freight from Crescent City, Cal., to various points in Oregon. In 1856 he became engaged with his brother in cattle raising. This venture turned out to be disastrous, for during the severe weather of the

spring of 1861 their herd of about 500 cattle was reduced to 35. In 1863 he went to Umatilla, where for over four years he acted as agent for the Overland Stage Company. He helped put the first stage stock on the Blue Mountains, over the same route now followed by the S. L. railroad. In 1868 the two Pinkham brothers moved to Idaho City and purchased the stage lines running between Boise and Idaho City, and across the Basin, under the name of the Boise Basin Stage Co. Mr. Pinkham was thus engaged until March 15, 1870, when he received from President Grant his first appointment as United States Marshal for Idaho. This office he held for several months, over two terms, being re-appointed at the beginning of President Grant's second term. During the Bannock Indian War and the Nez Percé Indian uprising, 1877-'78, Mr. Pinkham travelled with the regular army, and acted as purchasing agent for the boys in blue. After these disquietudes he engaged in the general mercantile business at Ketchum, a small mining camp in the Hood River country, where he remained until 1888.

"Mr. Pinkham's fearlessness, his executive ability, and the grand record he had made during his two years as U. S. Marshal created a demand that he be again entrusted with that important office. He received his third appointment as U. S. Marshal for the district of Idaho, March 3, 1891, from President Harrison, thus becoming the first U. S. Marshal for Idaho after her admission to statehood.

"Many and thrilling are the stories that might be told of the exploits and hairbreadth escapes of Joseph Pinkham during his service as U. S. Marshal, were it not for the fact that he is singularly averse to relating accounts of his own experiences. No fear of personal danger was ever known to deter him from the performance of a duty. The signal achievement of his last term as Marshal was his wholesale round-up of the notorious Coxie Army. These hoboos roamed over the state, taking possession of whole trains of cars and committing other depredations, threatening much violence and bloodshed. Marshal Pinkham, with his deputies, ran them to Montpellier, and there captured the leader of the gang and put him in irons. The hoboos captured a freight train and escaped to Green River, where the Marshal managed to have them corralled by the regular troops. The whole army, numbering 257 men, was brought to Boise, given trials, and turned over to the Marshal for imprisonment for various periods, according to his discretion, up to six months. This was all accomplished without the loss of a drop of blood. During the A. R. U. strike, shortly afterwards, Marshal Pinkham used such good judgment in handling the crisis in his territory that he was especially commended by the officials over him. Attorney General Olney remarked at one time, before a gathering of Senators, that Marshal Pinkham had handled the Coxie Army and the strike affairs with better success than any of the other U. S. Marshals in the other districts.

"After finishing his third term and several extra months as Marshal, Mr. Pinkham busied himself with his personal affairs, principally mining investments, until Feb. 17, 1905, when he was deservedly appointed Assayer of the U. S. Assay Office in Boise, which office he continues to fill creditably. He owns some valuable real estate in Boise and some valuable mining properties, being interested in a group of mines in the Smoky and Wood River countries, which are now being worked on contract by New York parties.

"Mr. Pinkham has always been an aggressive Republican, always active in political affairs and a warrior in every campaign since 1870. He has been known as a 'square fighter,' and his clean methods of warfare have made even the most staunch Democrats his friends. He has several times been at the head of the Republican State Central Committee, and the present strength of the party in Idaho is largely due to his past efforts.

"Although now 72 years of age, and notwithstanding the fact that not a few of the years of his life were strenuous indeed, Mr. Pinkham is well preserved. CHAPTER SIX.

ELIJAH PINKHAM AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

(5) Elijah Pinkham, b. Sept. 8, 1760; d. China, Me., Sept. 10, 1852, within 8 days of 92 years.

Among some of his descendants there is a belief that he was at Valley Forge with General Washington when he was but 19 years old. No proof of this was found in any old record. Mr. Charles A. Pinkham of China, Me., who has given much time to the family history, writes: "I think that is all a mistake about Elijah Pinkham being in the Revolutionary War. The story seems to have somehow grown out of the fact that when he was out in a fishing boat at Harpswell, Me., he was taken prisoner by the British. The following letter was written to his wife when he was in prison:

"Bagnaduce, Aug. 8, 1782. This is to inform you that I am well and John and David. But I know not when we shall return. We sail tomorrow for Halifax. It seems to me as if I had no friends, being in irons day and night. O, my dear wife, whom I esteem as my life, I hope that thou art well and my son, Elijah, too. No heart can conceive, nor tongue express, the love which I have for you and your welfare, not knowing that I shall ever see you again in this world. Therefore, thou must seek unto the God of Heaven, that He may be a husband unto thee and a Father unto my son. But if I shall not see you in this world I hope that we shall meet in the dear mansions where all sighing and sorrow cease. I must conclude and remain thy ever well-wishing husband.

"Elijah Pinkham."

The following deed shows that Elijah Pinkham lived at Freeport, Me., for some time. He is said to have moved from there to Gardiner, Me.:

"Know all men by these presents that I, Isnac Randall, of Freeport, in the Co. of Cumberland & State of Mass. Bay, in New England, given for & in consideration of, the sum of 40 & 5 pounds well and truly paid by Elijah Pinkham of Freeport in the said Co. of Cumberland & State of Mass. Bay in New England, yeoman, do by these presents, freely, fully, & absolutely. Grant, bargain & sell, convey & confirm unto him, the said Elijah Pinkham, his heirs & assigns forever, 70 & 5 acres of land lying in the said Freeport, bordered as follows: Beginning at the most easterly corner of the said Elijah's Pinkham's land that said Elijah Pinkham bought of Nicholas Pinkham, at a Stake Ring 60 rods north east to Elijah Douglass' land; from thence on said Douglass' line North West 200 rods; from thence south east 20 rods to the first mentioned bounds. To have & hold the same to the said Elijah Pinkham, his heirs & assigns, to his and their own use & behoof forever. And I do covenant with the same Elijah Pinkham, his heirs assigns, that I am the lawful owner, lawfully seized in full of the same premises, that they are free of all en-

Elijah Pinkham is said to have lived in Litchfield and Hallowell, Me., and for a long time in China, Me., where he died. M., 1780, Abigail Farr, b. Harpswell, Me., Sept. 27, 1760; d. Oct. 1, 1833. She was familiarly spoken of as "Little Nabby." She was the daughter of Ancestor Thomas Farr, who was born in 1732 and died at the age of 98 years at the home of his son, Noah Farr, at Hallowell, Me. He was in Harpswell, Me., at an early date and married Elizabeth Bray, daughter of John Bray, who came from Massachusetts to Harpswell, Me., at an early date. This Farr family was one of great talents and sturdy qualities.

The following letters written by him were furnished by Mr. Charles A. Pinkham of China, Me.:

"To Elijah Pinkham, Freeport, Me.: Honored Father & Mother: I take this opportunity to pen you a few lines to inform you that I am in good health, and hope these lines will find you partaking of the same blessing. I have nothing of importance to write, but will inform you that I have been to school to learn navigation. Don't look to see me until I get into some business. Your well-wishing son, Elijah Pinkham, Jr.

"Harpswell, Mass., March 26, 1801."

"To Elijah Pinkham, Freeport. Forwarded by Capt. Dennis. Salem, Aug. 29, 1802. (The beginning is as in the letter above.) I shall be glad to see you and my brothers and sisters, but I can't tell when I shall do so. I may just inform you that I have left Uncle Isaac and am now with Thaniel Merryman. I have nothing of importance to write, but as I had an opportunity to send a letter I thought I would write. Time is short and I must close.

"To Elijah Pinkham, Freeport.

"Portland, Aug. 1, 1800.

"I will just inform you that I am bound to Liverpool in the ship *Almira*, Robert Gliven, Master. I have no time to come home before we sail. I have nothing of importance to write for it is not long since I wrote to you. I hope to return in about four months. Remember me to all my friends and relatives."

"To Elijah Pinkham, in the County of Cumberland, forwarded in the ship *Bath*. Liverpool, Jan. 15, 1803.

"We arrived in Liverpool the 26th of May after a long and teagueous passage of 47 days. With sorrow I inform you that I have left the ship, and all the rest left but two men. And four

of us are now bound for Norfolk in Virginia in the ship *Ticonic* of Boston, and from thence to return as quick as possible. We hope to sail in about 20 days."

"To Elijah Pinkham.

"New York, Sept. 22.

"Thus I have been in good health since I left home, except three or four days, and I hope these lines will find you and all in good health. I will just inform you that I arrived in N. Y. 25th of Aug., and am now bound to North Carolina, and hope to return in about two months, please God that I live. I want to see you more than my pen can express, but when I shall I can't tell. O, the desolation the fever has made in this city of N. Y. this summer, from ten to fifteen dying in one day—and some days more than this, and the deaths still continuing. Time is short and I must close."

(As the beginning and ending of the above letters was the same, this part was omitted in copying. These were written in a very neat handwriting, every word clearly made with the quill pen of those days, and showed a youth of bright and scholarly mind.)

BENJAMIN PINKHAM OF BOOTHBAY, ME., AND DESCENDANTS.

Benjamin Pinkham's father gave him land at Dover Point, N. H., Aug. 26, 1736. Horace W. Pinkham, Boothbay Harbor, Me.: "Benjamin Pinkham came to Boothbay, Me., about 1759." F. B. Greene, historian of Boothbay, Me., etc.: "Benjamin Pinkham and Judith came to Townsend, Me., in 1759, and settled where the late Eben Clisby lived at East Boothbay, Me. It is claimed by some of the descendants that Benjamin Pinkham first came to Merriconeag (Harpswell), Me., which may be correct, as his brother Ebenezer settled in that town. Many visits were exchanged by the Pinkhams of Boothbay and Harpswell, Me., through the long years. Benjamin Pinkham's brother Solomon settled at Townsend, Me., at about 1759, but there is no evidence that he remained there."

Benjamin Pinkham was a man of sturdy character, modest, and faithful in all his labors for humanity. His descendants were very helpful in all lines of good work in Boothbay, Me., and in every town where they lived. They were sturdy patriots; strong helpers in the churches which were organized at early dates; owners of goodly acres; sea captains whose bravery and foresight were known in many ports; business men of care and thrift; men and women whose faithful lives were a constant inspiration to all who knew them. The proofs of this, and of many other estimable qualities, will be found in the following pages. Mr. F. B. Greene's excellent "History of Boothbay, Me.," etc., affords many illustrations of these facts. The noble traits of Benjamin Pinkham of Boothbay, Me., and of his children still shine with undimmed luster among the descendants in the old home town by the sea and wherever the tides of time have widely scattered them.

CHAPTER ONE.

RECORDS OF ICHABOD PINKHAM OF BOOTHBAY, ME.

(4) Ichabod Pinkham, b. Dover, N. H., Oct. 23 (25), 1741; d. Oct. 21, 1800; m., 1766, Mercy (Marsy in old records), Cartland (Catlin), b. Aug. 23, 1746; d. July 10, 1821 (1824).

F. B. Greene, Boothbay Harbor, Me.: "He lived where David A. Reed does; he was a leading character in the town; very active in the Revolutionary contest; held a captain's commission; had much to do in town affairs (see closing chapter of Boothbay History); his estate was estimated at \$5,200.55; by will he gave to his son Benjamin Pinkham the farm of 47 acres; this was south of B. M. Giles' house on the east side of the road, at the top of the hill; the house was burned many years ago; to Ichabod Pinkham, Jr., he gave the homestead of his father, the Cillsby place; to his son Nathan he gave the place where the late Jason Pinkham lived."

Ichabod Pinkham was one of the committee of building the first Congregational parsonage. Feb. 4, 1775, Ichabod Pinkham was chosen one of the Committee of Correspondence and Safety in regard to the impending Revolutionary War. Later on he was instructed "to arrange for the newspapers and take the best measures to have them conveyed to the town." In 1782 Ichabod Pinkham, with John Daws and William Reed, were a Committee to look after the quantity of ammunition furnished by the General Court, and also to inspect the cannon and small arms." Captain Ichabod Pinkham was commissioned first lieutenant, Captain McFarland's Company, Colonel Jones' Regiment (the Second Boothbay Company and Third Lincoln County Regiment), May 8, 1776. He was also appointed captain of a detachment at Boothbay, Me., in sea coast defense one month from March 3, 1780; paid by resolve of Oct. 2, 1781.

The will of Ichabod Pinkham, from Lincoln County, Me., probate records:

"In the name of God, Amen. I, Ichabod Pinkham, of Boothbay, in the County of Lincoln and Commonwealth of Mass., gentleman, being weak of body but of perfect mind and memory, blessed be God for the same; do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, That is to say,

"First; I bequeath to my oldest son Benjamin Pinkham, 47 acres of land where he now dwells.

"Second; I give to my son, Ichabod Pinkham, the farm where he now resides, which formerly belonged to my late father, Benjamin Pinkham, with the buildings thereon, reserving, however, a road to the highway to the saw and grist mills where the same will be most convenient, he the said Ichabod paying unto my eldest daughter, Mary Adams, or her order, \$200.00, within two years after my decease.

"Thirdly; I give unto my son Nathaniel Pinkham, the whole of the land known as the Kennedy farm, which land I purchased

of Ruth and Ann Kennedy, he, the said Nathaniel, paying within two years after my decease, \$100.00 to my beloved wife, Marcy Pinkham; the above devises of lands to my said sons, the above conditions being performed, to be to them, their heirs & assigns, forever.

"Fourthly; I give and order unto my oldest daughter, Mary Adams, one hundred dollars to be paid within one year after my decease.

"Fifthly; I give to my daughter Sally one hundred dollars to be paid her within one year after my decease.

"Sixthly; I give to my daughter Polly one hundred dollars to be paid within two years after my decease.

"Seventhly; I give to my daughter Patty one hundred dollars to be paid within four years after my decease.

"Eighthly; my will is that my youngest daughter Betsey be maintained and supported out of the remainder of my estate, during her natural life.

"Ninthly; I also give & bequeath to my sons Benjamin and Nathaniel one half of my salt marsh & upland adjoining the same, laying on Wild cat meadow creek, so called, equally between them, they the said Benjamin and Nathaniel, or either of them, keeping in good repair the fence around the whole marsh, during the natural life of my said wife, their mother.

"Tenthly; I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Marcey Pinkham, the whole, rest and residue of my whole estate, real and personal, let the same be found where it may, during her natural life, she paying my just debts, and providing for my said youngest daughter, Betsey, as aforesaid, and at the decease of my said wife my will is that the whole estate then remaining, after making provision for Betsy, as aforesaid, be equally divided amongst my surviving children.

Mrs. J. C. George of Dedham, Mass., sent a very interesting sketch of her McFarland ancestors, some of the older records being given her by a Mrs. Stowe of Stowe, Mass.: "The McFarland ancestor in Maine was John McFarland, born Dublin, Ireland, the son of a Scottish nobleman of a clan of ancient Highlanders. The family from which this John McFarland was descended emigrated to Ireland in the reign of James II, 1685-'88. History says there were 23 McFarland lairds, and that the last of these went to America in the early part of the 18th century. This may have been our Maine ancestor, who is known as Capt. John McFarland (often spelled McFarlane) of Pemaquid, Me. It is not known just when or where this ancestor, John McFarland, landed. But in the spring of 1725 a contract was made with General Waldo, at the Port of St. George, by 27 people, for the settlement of themselves and families on the Waldo lands on St. George River. The McFarlands were among these, claiming to be Scotch-Irish, and were devout Presbyterians. John McFarland probably died 1786-'88; after living for some time at Pemaquid, Me. His wife, Isabella, died Christmas Day, 1793 (95y.). The Clan McFarland is one of the oldest living, deriving their origin from the ancient Earls of Lennox."

This McFarland line is given by B. F. Greene in his History of Boothbay, Me., to which town some of the McFarlands seem to have moved at an early date: "(1) John McFarland. (2) Ephraim McFarland. (3) Benjamin McFarland, who lived for a time on his father's homestead (near Boothbay Harbor), but removed to Belfast, Me. He followed the sea." Mr. Greene states that this Benjamin McFarland married Margaret Murray. One of the

grandchildren states clearly that her name was Margaret Merry, and that she was born June 22, 1760. Mrs. J. G. George of Dedham, Mass., gives the following sketch of the romantic history of Margaret Merry:

"The great-grandparents of Margaret Merry were: (1) Dr. Henry Hunter and Margaret Stuart. Dr. Henry Hunter was surgeon on an English man-of-war. Just before he sailed for America a banquet was given in his honor on board the ship. It is said that Margaret Stuart dressed in officer's clothing and secured a place at the banquet, and was afterwards married on shipboard to Dr. Hunter. She is buried at Newport, R. I., and the stone house which the Hunters built there is still standing. After some time she was offered her position as Lady Margaret in the old country, but she preferred to remain in America. One of her daughters started to visit Scotland, but was lost on the voyage. Our line is: (1) Dr. Henry Hunter and Margaret Stuart. (2) Annie Hunter, who married a Mr. Tarp. (3) Elizabeth Tarp, who married Mr. Merry. (4) Margaret Merry, who married Benjamin McFarland of Boothbay, Me."

- "On March, 1897, Trustee B. F. Pinkham passed away. His life was so fruitful and faithful, yet so unassuming, that it may well stand for an example of how a Christian lives and dies. He sprang from the best blood in the land. When about 19 years of age, B. F. Pinkham went to sea, as did most of his family, in the West India trade. He reached the captaincy, although he sailed mostly as a mate with his brother, Capt. Nathaniel Pinkham. He was courageous, but never forward. Once he picked up a deserted vessel and brought her to port. At another time his bark was literally cut in two by a steamer, his brother being on one half and his sister-in-law on the other half, but all were saved. The brother, Nathaniel, made one more trip to take back a Spanish boy, but the ship was never heard from. But B. F. Pinkham rarely spoke of any of the brave things which he had done. In

1864 he left the sea and entered the service of the Sailors' Home, and for over thirty years he has been cashier there, caring not alone for the funds of the Marine Office, but acting as banker for the seamen who gathered there from all parts of the world. May 20, 1865, was the session which received him into membership, and often has he expressed his pleasure because he was a member of the Sea and Land longer than any one else on the roll. In 1878 he became trustee and on Jan. 7, 1878, he began his term of office as treasurer of the church, a place which he held for nearly twenty years with unqualified fidelity and a devotion which led him to merit the church's obligations even if he had to advance a part of the money from his own funds. But he never made a complaint over these things, and one satisfaction is that he lived to see the day when a considerable sum was always at the treasurer's disposal to pay every debt. Mr. Pinkham never complained of ill health, although each spring he suffered a good deal. It was like a thunderbolt when the news reached us that he was seriously ill. Although everything possible was done for him he passed away; he was ready to go. At his burial the tribute of Rev. Mr. Dennison was but one of the many for a man who had done all his work so faithfully. One of Mr. Pinkham's marked traits was his aversion to a quarrel, however small a one it might be; and yet he was never afraid to speak his mind in his unassuming way. He never made public addresses. His erect, manly form, his ruddy countenance framed by a white beard, were a familiar sight, and for a long time to come a tear will start to every eye as his friends glance to the place where he always sat. As a trustee he for years sustained the tenderest relations with his brother officers. This quiet man has had a large influence in this body. After Mr. Pinkham's death, when our church treasury was turned over to the trustees, every entry was found to be perfect, and in a few minutes the balance was made. To a cent this amount agreed with the one laid away in the safe in an envelope bearing the name of the church and containing crisp new bills that he had laid aside especially for the Lord's treasury. Mr. Pinkham was a great favorite with the young people when once they came to know him. Especially could the girls always sell him a ticket and get a kind word besides. He had a way of slipping a bill into some trusted hand for a purpose which he would designate. For the first time many of the children will know that Mr. Pinkham paid for nearly all the ice cream which was used on our annual excursions. Such a beautiful life will never cease to exert its influence among us."

He was a soldier in the 1812 War, enlisting at Boothbay, Me. With the exception of deafness and dizziness caused by the explosion of a shell in the Mexican War, the old gentleman is

quite well for one of his years. He enjoyed the muster hugely, although the soldiers of today are different from those of the early republic, yet a soldier is a soldier still all the world over."

Mrs. Hemingway, South Rumford, Me.: "When Thomas Pinkham was in the Shagadee Woods three days without food he had one of his memorable army experiences. His two companions, Brown and Foote, got tired out. Brown said to Foote, 'Let us lie down and trust in God tonight.' The answer was, 'No, I will trust in the Lord and keep on my feet.' Brown laid down and the Indians came and took him up. The two others went on and their lives were saved. The first food they got was a piece of a colt which they shot. They said they never ate anything which tasted as good as that.

"As Thomas Pinkham's mother died when he was ten years old, he went to live with his uncle, David Pinkham, who was a very stern man, and very strict for those days. He was sent to yoke some oxen when he was not tall enough to reach the yoke, so he could not help dropping the yoke on the ground, where it was broken. His uncle took him to the barn and used the ox goad on him. So that night Thomas Pinkham took the little clothing which he had, tied it in a handkerchief, threw it out of the window, and went to the barracks and asked if a soldier was wanted. He was only fifteen years old and so green that he could not say 'enlist.' But four years of army life taught him what it was to be a soldier. He went to the farm in Washington, Me., after the war and married, in 1818, Sarah A. Lewis, b. Oct. 28, 1796; d. April 25, 1883; daughter of Andrew Lewis, who came from Ohio and was of Dutch descent; her mother, Martha Chapman, lived to be nearly 101 years old."

"In a pleasant little home in Bath, Me., there lives, with his wife, the oldest coast and river pilot in active service in New England. Since he began to steer ships in the tortuous channels of Maine rivers and along the Atlantic coast, he has seen many changes in shipping. He has never met with an accident or mishap in his long career. Although he has encountered many storms at sea, while in command of vessels, he never let one go ashore or lost a man. He has seen the piloting, which was once such a prosperous business, decline to almost nothing, tugboats in a great measure have taken the place of such work. He is widely known by master mariners from Nova Scotia to the Delaware Capes. At 14 years of age, not liking the work on the pretty little farm of his father, Jonathan Pinkham, he set out for himself and went to sea. He began as cook of a fishing vessel in command of Stephen Dunton of Westport, Me. One trip convinced him that the fisherman's life was the life for him, and he kept at it, either as cook or hand-fisherman, until he was 18 years old. Then by his steady and energetic ways he became skipper of the fishing craft *Miles* of Wiscasset, and was master of her for two years, making big catches of fish in the Bay of Chaleur. He brought home some of the largest catches ever landed. He was in the Bay of Chaleur in 1844, when the terrible gale wrecked so many fishermen, and when so many lives were lost. His schooner, *Martha Jane* of Westport, Me., lost her sails, but outrode the gale. Captain Pinkham says: 'In those days there were a plenty of mackerel, and large ones, too. My best season of summer's work was at mackerelling. Though that season was a short one, my share was \$900.' At 35 years of age Capt. Jonathan Pinkham quit fishing and went into the coasting business, his first vessel being the *New England*, of 190 tons, in which he staid one year, running as a packet from the Kennebec River to Boston, Mass. He then commanded the schooner *Convoy*, a larger packet, between Bath, Me., and Boston, occasionally going to New York City. For 15 years he was master of a coaster. At the breaking out of the Civil War Captain Pinkham gave up coasting. He had obtained a large knowledge of the bays and harbors from Newfoundland to Chesapeake Bay, and in 1869 he became a regular coast and river pilot, and from 1862 he has been known to Bath (Me.) shipbuilders as one of the most careful and experienced pilots on the Maine coast. Nearly all the ships built in Bath, Me., for several years were piloted out to sea by him, many of these being piloted to distant ports."

(4) LIEUT. JOSEPH PINKHAM OF JACKSON, N. H., AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

He and his wife, Elizabeth, bought land of Thomas Davis of Dover, N. H., Sept. 8, 1763. The following records from Madbury, N. H., show that he removed there at quite an early date and was ever a prominent man of sterling worth: March 29, 1769, chosen surveyor of highways; March 28, 1771, chosen for the same work; March 30, 1772, chosen field driver; March 30, 1773, chosen surveyor of highways; March 30, 1775, chosen collector of taxes; March 28, 1777, chosen one of a committee of four to affix and settle in said parish what such goods and articles shall be sold for in said parish, agreeable to a resolve of the Honorable Council and House of Representatives in General Court assembled for this State; March 31, 1778, chosen selectman; Feb. 19, 1781, chosen one of a committee of three to hire a parish quota of Continental soldiers for three years, or during the war, at the cost of the parish; Feb. 1, 1781, chosen one of a committee of three as a standing committee to supply the state with soldiers from time to time as they shall be called for by the state.

Capt. Joseph Pinkham served in the French and Indian wars and in the Revolutionary War. The records of this service are given here in brief from the Revolutionary rolls: Joseph Pinkham, husbandman, enlisted April 24, 1758, with the men selected by Capt. Hercules Mooney for the reduction of Canada under George III. Capt. Hodgdon's company on Seavey's Island: Joseph Pinkham enlisted as first lieutenant, Nov. 5, 1775. In Capt. Moses Yeaton's company, Col. Joshua Wingate's regiment of volunteers, which joined the Continental Army of Rhode Island, Aug., 1778, Capt. Joseph Pinkham acted as sergeant. In Timothy Emerson's company, Col. Thomas Bartlett's Eighth regiment, raised for the defense of West Point, Capt. Joseph Pinkham acted as lieutenant. He received his discharge Oct. 26, 1780, at the age of 45 with the rank of captain. His tombstone in Jackson, N. H., which was erected by his son, Rufus, also bears testimony to his services in the Revolutionary War.

In the book, "The Families of the Saco," it is said that the government desired to use a sloop belonging to Capt. Joseph Pinkham and Capt. Jonathan Meserve. It was purchased and paid for by a grant of land in the White Mountains. In 1790 five fam-

lives, including those of Capt. Joseph Pinkham and his son, Joseph D. Pinkham, Capt. Jonathan Meserve and his brother, Clement Meserve, and one other family, removed from Madbury, N. H., to Jackson, N. H., which was then called New Madbury, and bore that name until 1800. Joseph Pinkham's second wife went with him to New Madbury, N. H. Joseph Pinkham settled in what is now Jackson village on the banks of the Wildcat River. His oldest son, Joseph (who was probably married when the family moved to Jackson, N. H.), went up the Wildcat River about half a mile. He built a log house on, or nearly on, the present site of the Eagle Mountain House. Then a frame house was built on the exact site of the Eagle Mountain House. A part of this old house still remains. This part has been added to and enlarged until it is now the main house. In the parlor are the old-fashioned hewed logs, pinned together with wooden pins. The old frame must be nearly 115 years old. Joseph D. Pinkham lived and died in this house. His son, Joseph T., succeeded to the farm, and he sold it to his cousin, Cyrus Pinkham, who married Catherine Johnson, and came here to live. Cyrus F. Pinkham died and left his widow with an only daughter, Helen. This widow kept the old farm, and married, as a second husband, Jonathan Gale of Vermont. After one year in Vermont they came to this old Pinkham farm to live. Her oldest child by the second husband, Jonathan Gale, was Cyrus Ervin Gale, who married Marcia Pinkham in 1877. C. E. Gale succeeded to the Pinkham farm and the parents went to live with another son in Bartlett, N. H. So this old place has been owned by a Pinkham since 1790 when it was cleared up.

Another son of Capt. Joseph Pinkham, George Pinkham, settled opposite to Joseph D. Pinkham, on the other side of the Wildcat River, and his son, Alexander Pinkham, lived on the place after him, and George Pinkham on the same place, and now his daughter, Anna Pinkham Pitman, lives on it. Rufus Pinkham, son of Captain Joseph, settled just below George Pinkham on the Wildcat River. His son, Rufus, lived on the place after him; then it passed out of the family. Another son, Daniel Pinkham, lived with Captain Joseph about half a mile below this place, and on the old homestead for awhile, but afterwards went into the woods between Jackson and Gorham, N. H., and built the carriage road from Jackson to Gorham, for which the State gave him Pinkham Grant, now known as Pinkham Notch. When this son Daniel left the old homestead it passed into the hands of strangers. A square of land in the best part of the town comprised the four farms, and I understand that all, or nearly all, of this was given Capt. Joseph Pinkham for his sloop-of-war. The two upper farms on each side of the river are still owned and occupied by the Pinkham descendants; the old home now occupied by Mrs. Pitman, and the place where Mrs. Marcia A. Gale lives. The Pinkham family, as known in Jackson, N. H., were men and women of staunch integrity, earnest convictions and broad philanthropy.

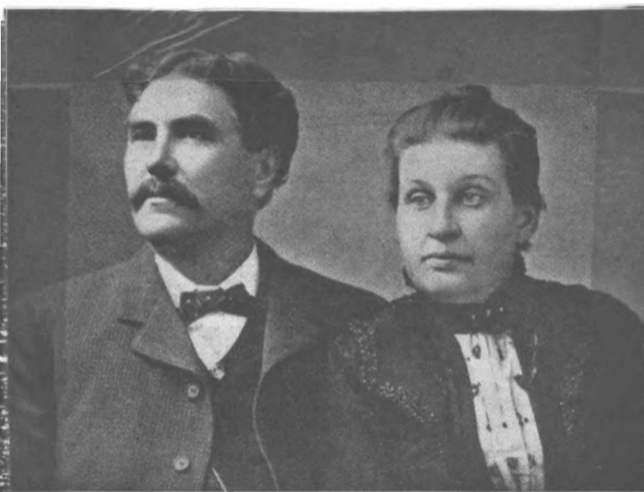

"In the passing away of George Pinkham, our town of Jackson meets with an unfortunate loss. With him has gone beyond recall a greater amount of practical knowledge than can be found in one person among ten thousand, a knowledge gained by many years of careful observation and deep thinking. Born in the same house in which he lived for more than three score years and ten allotted to man, he passed into eternity with a character as strong and staunch as the surrounding mountains, and as true as the blue sky above his dwelling. He was a noble man in every sense of the word, whose promise was considered as good as his note,

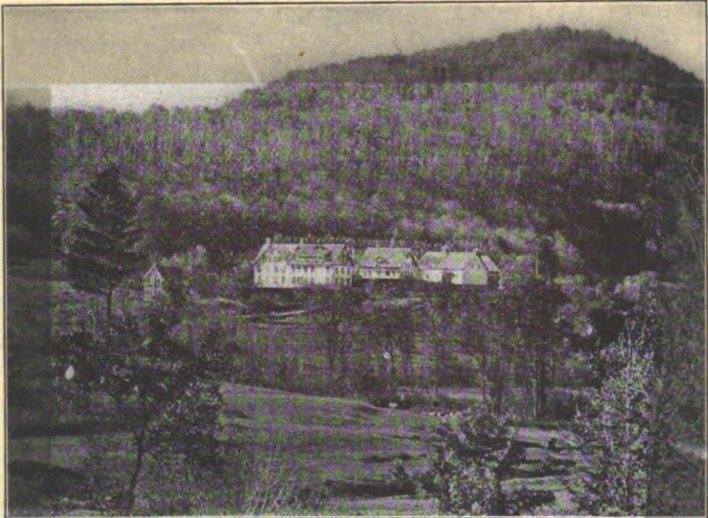
and the fulfillment of it as sure to come as the rising of the sun. One could not converse with him for half an hour without learning something of practical value. His life-long occupation, farming, became a science with him, and he solved more problems in this line than any farmer I ever met. No hindrances in the many branches of his work were too slight to receive careful thought and deep study for their removal; and to this one thing is due in large measure his wonderful success where ninety-nine men in a hundred would have utterly failed. His local weather predictions were considered of far more importance than the weather bureau reports, and it was nothing unusual for pleasure-seekers to consult him before starting on a trip if the weather seemed doubtful. But, with all his vast knowledge of nature in her varied forms, he was wholly devoid of egotism; a more modest, retiring, but yet open nature it would be hard to find. His heart one might read at a glance, for he had nothing to conceal, but much to give out freely. He was always a friend to the unfortunate, and ready to assist in every way that he could. What need is there of saying, 'He was born on such a day in the year?' Might we not better say, 'He came, he saw, he conquered.' Not only did he conquer earth and nature, and wrest from them their valued secrets, but the large number of his own townspeople, both old and young, who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to him proved beyond a doubt that he had penetrated the hidden depths of many hearts and found a friend in every one. The present generation might follow his example of moral purity, high honor and uprightness, his open-hearted generosity and fellowship with much profit, not only to themselves, but to the world at large."

"George Pinkham was twelve years old when his father died, and the oldest son. He was a large, strong boy. From the time of his father's death he was the head of the family, going ahead with the farm work, with a little help from his uncle for a year or two. He saw hard times, but he became a very successful farmer, one of the leading ones in Jackson. His wife, Emily S. Trickey, was a very superior woman."

"He constructed the Glen road for the State of New Hampshire through the Pinkham Notch, from the town of Jackson (then Adams) to Randolph (then Durand), N. H. The State lands in the Pinkham Grant were given him by the State in part payment for his services in building and opening up this mountain highway. This grant was near the base of Mount Washington. He is said to have received other lands for his great work, which is said to have been a great financial loss to himself. Prior to 1822 people in the New Hampshire towns of Lancaster, Kilkenny, Durant, Adams, Bartlett and Conway, subscribed about \$1,000, payable in labor, towards a carriage road from Adams to Durand, on the east side of the White Mountains. They gave their obligations to Daniel Pinkham of Adams, who undertook to make such a road, with bridges. In consideration of Pinkham building such a road, etc., within three years, to the satisfaction of John Pendexter, Jr., John Wilson and John Bowman, the State of New Hampshire, by a resolution passed June 16, 1824, agreed to convey to the said Daniel Pinkham all the State lands in Adams and 160 rods on each side of the said road through the unlocated lands between Adams and Durand. The construction commenced, but many obstacles arose. Time was extended by the State for three years from said June 16, 1824, by an act approved June 26, 1827. On July 3, 1829, the State Treasurer was instructed to deed, provided the road was completed one year from the first of June next. By resolution June 25, 1830, time was extended, etc. By resolution of June 27, 1833, the Treasurer was again authorized to deed, etc., and again by a resolution approved July 4, 1834. Under such authority the Treasurer executed a deed to Daniel Pinkham from the State of New Hampshire, dated June 23, 1835. Daniel Pinkham lost much money in the building of this road, but he held fast to his determination until, after many years, his grand work was accomplished. He also built the bridle path to the top of Mount Washington. He was also a very good farmer, but the work in which he took most pleasure was that of a Free Baptist minister. He was licensed to preach about 1815, and labored with great success in Bartlett, Randolph, Jefferson, Jackson, Pinkham Grant and Lancaster, N. H. He was a lay preacher of great ability, and he was widely known for the good which he did. He was eminently a thinker, and his conclusions on all subjects were always considered and ready."

- "Deacon Rufus Pinkham had the reputation of being a man of few words, but one whose every word told. He had the same quiet, even disposition possessed by the other members of the Pinkham family, and his faithful Christian character as deacon of the church made his words prevail with a double sway. His recognized good judgment in temporal matters gave a great weight to his opinions in town affairs. He was early afflicted with a disease of the spine which rendered all heavy work impossible, and placed him continually under medical treatment. But by careful management he was yet able to carry on his farm, with the aid of hired labor, and supported his large family and educated his sons in distant schools. He also lived generously among his neighbors and was unhampered by debt."

Then, as he observed the boys and girls growing up around him, with imperfect mental training for life, he felt it his duty to especially fit himself for a teacher. This he did. Returning to Jackson, N. H., he taught the children and young people in the intervals of his other work. Every pupil who became associated with him in school remembers his wonderful discipline, his strong, steady eye, and the stimulus and help he gave which prompted one to do and dare with like inspiration. He lived on the Eagle Mountain farm."

"He was a scholarly man and a very successful teacher. He early showed great promise of mental powers. He, however, owed much to the quiet scholarly training and careful oversight of his elder brother. He continued his studies in the academies of Conway, Fryeburg and Lancaster. Though he did not have a college degree, yet, by personal effort and under tutorship he read far beyond the requirements for the degree of A. B. Naturally a teacher, he taught many schools before he began to preach, and some schools in the earlier part of his ministry, as he saw the need of academic training among young men and women around him. The people of northern New Hampshire have reason to be grateful for this man on account of his educational work. For five terms he taught in the public schools and academies, and many able men and women well remember him, at Great Falls, Gorham, Whitefield and other villages and towns in the thirty years he was superintendent of schools. Several terms he served as county commissioner, lecturing and visiting the schools each year in each town in Coös County. He established libraries and schools of higher learning. He arranged institutes for teachers that they

might better become acquainted with new ideas and the best methods of teaching, and planned and labored for the progress of the children. In youth his father desired him to be a doctor and medical arts were always to him interesting studies, while doctors were most welcome visitors to his home. His public spirit, his powers of oratory, and his easy, affable address might perhaps have led him into politics. As a young man he was a member of the Legislature, and always entered enthusiastically into the political and social movements of the day. He gave up all other calls, etc., to what he considered a more imperative summons. He decided to become a preacher. His theological studies were pursued at Whitestown, N. Y., where he graduated in 1849. He was ordained in 1850. He preached in Jackson, Shelburne, Meredith, and Laconia, N. H. He seemed likely to move on to city pulpits and large congregations, when the missionary impulse which manifested itself in so many of his family, took possession of him. He determined to break new ground and build up new interests. So he turned his face northward and settled in Whitefield, N. H. For eighteen years he worked there and in the surrounding towns, and no work elsewhere could draw him away from this field. He established a large Baptist church at Whitefield, and promoted the growth of other churches in many other towns, which, from time to time, were under his care. When he gave up his work in 1876, the Whitefield church had built a fitting and commodious house of worship, and were actively allied with all progressive movements. All this brought him very close to the people of northern New Hampshire. He was often called thirty miles away to preach and lecture. Addresses before Masonic bodies, of which he was a member of the council, were always eloquent and highly appreciated. He wrote much in the magazines and pamphlets. He had many friends among the people who spent their summers among the mountains. He had a distaste for idle display and self-seeking. His last days were spent at Lewiston, Me., where he went for the education of his children. He continued preaching with the thought that he would regularly take it up again. But the end came suddenly.

Essex, ss., C. C. P., March 7, 1836: Daniel Pinkham of Saugus, Mass., in said county, represents to this court that he is the son and sole heir of Daniel Pinkham, late of Portsmouth, N. H.; that his said father was a soldier in the Revolutionary Army, and served in the regiment of the New Hampshire line; that after the war he returned to Portsmouth, N. H., and about the year 1787 or 1788, he was lost at sea; that at the time of his death he left a widow and one son, the said Daniel; that he left no other children; that the widow died in the said Portsmouth in 1822; and that now the said Daniel is the sole heir of the said Daniel Pinkham, who served in the Revolutionary Army, and that he is ready to prove to the court the facts above named, and respectfully prays the court that the same may be entered on record, etc.

"When the crisis of 1873 burst upon the City of Shoes, Isaac Pinkham had been for years one of the best known builders and real estate dealers in the city, and he had built up a large part of Wyoma, where he then lived. The length and severity of this strain was too great for anyone extensively interested in land to remain solvent, so great was the depression, particularly in that kind of property; and when the centennial year came around he saw all his property swept away and his family forced to abandon their home and to begin the world without a cent. Himself too old to battle again with life, he was fortunate in having three active sons and a daughter, who had profitable employment as a teacher in one of the city schools; and these all combined their forces to restore to their parents what they had lost, and at the same time make a worthy start for themselves in life. Some of them were not so old that they did not remember their father's earlier poverty, and had known what it was to peddle popcorn and fruit through Lynn and vicinity to help pay home expenses, and the victory which had once been won they believed could be won again. Looking about to see what they could best take up, the 'Pinkham boys,' as they were always called by the neighbors, resolved to undertake the manufacture of the now famous Pinkham compound, which their mother had been accustomed to make up on the kitchen stove in small quantities for such of her acquaintances as might be ailing. The grand success which they achieved filled with joy the last days of Isaac Pinkham and his wife, and demonstrated that the zeal, wit and sturdy valor of the Pinkham ancestor had lost none of its strong life and helpfulness."

Funeral address by Rev. Dr. J. M. Pullman:

"If sorrow over the departure of any man from these earthly scenes is reasonable, then is our sorrow today most reasonable. For there has gone away from us, apparently in the prime of his days and powers, a man so able, useful, honorable and beloved, that all classes of the community in which he lived are penetrated with a deep sense of loss and moved by a common feeling of honest and unfeigned sorrow. Under this common impulse this large assembly has gathered here to speak and think of the excellencies of our friend. It sounds like a paradox to say that a recital of the reasons for our sorrow can mitigate that sorrow, but it is certainly true that if we could not justly praise him, our grief would be without its chiefest consolation. We find in our gratitude for what we have had, a mitigation of our sorrow for what we have lost. We are all one in the wish that he could have lived on for twenty years longer. He was on the right track, and it seemed to us that he was ripening for even greater usefulness. We enter no protest against an accomplished fact, although we cannot pretend to see the reasonableness of it. Yet even while we cannot wholly keep from our thoughts the old and confessedly one-sided complaint:

'The good die first,
And they whose hearts are dry as summer dust
Burn to the socket.'

"Yet nevertheless we hold humbly and stoutly to our faith in the Infinite Reason and Love lying at the heart of the universe, which will in some great day vindicate itself to our understanding and satisfy our hearts. I do not know what other legacy our beloved friend may have left to his children, but if the old Word be true, as I believe it is, that 'a good name is rather to be chosen than great riches,' then they have a high inheritance in a father's name, unstained by any meanness, enriched by a thousand generous deeds, and honored wherever he is known among his fellow-men, as the synonym of uprightness and integrity. There is a good honesty that will not steal, a better honesty that will not lie, and a higher honesty that covers these and much more besides—an essential integrity and wholeness of character which carries veracity, sincerity and fidelity into the whole circle of human relations. All those who understand the personal forces that make for the welfare of our city know that our friend was among the strongest of these forces. Some men build their fortunes

under the protection and advantages of the community, and return nothing to it either in the way of private worth or of public duty. They do not enrich it, they even sometimes betray and impoverish it.

"To borrow an illustration: 'The great ocean out here is in a constant state of evaporation. It gives back what it receives, and sends up its waters in mists to gather into clouds; and so there is rain on the fields and storm on the mountains, and greenness and beauty everywhere. But there are many men who do not believe in evaporation. They get all they can, and keep all they get, and so we are not fertilizers of society, but only its stagnant pools.' But our friend believed in evaporation. It was a part of the soundness of his character that he should be the public-spirited citizen that he was, enterprising and wise-minded, keenly interested in the maintenance of those pillars of the social order, the home, the school, the church and broadly and quietly philanthropic and benevolent toward individuals in many ways, especially perhaps, in the matter of helping promising young men to get a right start in life. And that part of the city in which the great laboratory stands shows plain tokens of the upward economic tendency which always issues from a prosperous business conducted by an able, large-hearted and public-spirited man, who looks after his employes' interests as well as his own. There are many witnesses in this house today of our friend's justice and generosity towards those who worked for and with him. It was not in his nature to regard his work people as mere 'hands.' To him they were men and women with lives of their own to lead, apart from the shop, and towards them his conduct was paternal and unselfish in a high degree. If he found them doing short-sighted and inconsiderate things, such as mortgaging their household goods at exorbitant interest, he would point out their mistake, and, with a 'Come into the office,' he would straighten out their tangled affairs, and take upon himself the responsibilities they had assumed. He was an essentially democratic man in his tastes and instincts, a man who rated the artificial distinctions of society at their real value, a man of the people who did not in the least object to have the humblest man call him 'Charley Pinkham,' as they loved to do and did. He loved simplicity, reality and genuineness, both in business and social life. And although he met men genially everywhere, his home was the center of his affections, the place where he had 'garnered up his heart.' More and more he loved to adorn and beautify that home, and there are some happy scenes in his home-life to which we may well apply the lines of the old Russian dirge:

'We saw him in the garden, the pleasant garden,
With his companions and children, the children he loved,
His children and his companions blessed him;
His home was the shelter of happiness.
Peace be upon him!
We saw him giving food to the hungry,
And clothing the naked,
We saw him give help and succor to the aged.

And good counsel and help to the young,
Peace be upon him!"

"And so we bid our friend good-bye for the present, well knowing that we, too, shall tread the self-same road he has gone. Whoever believes that this ripened character and engaging personality has gone out like a candle, to be relighted no more, thinks narrowly and inadequately of the stupendous scheme of things of which man is the highest product. The great game is not played out yet. We dismiss our beloved friend—not without many tears—to the higher opportunities and nobler employments of the life beyond."

The following sketch of the brave work of the "Pinkham boys of Lynn" was obtained after much search, as the only reply Mr. Charles Hacker Pinkham gave was: "We simply tried to do our duty towards our parents, who had been so kind to us:"

"For many years Lydia E. Pinkham was one of the best known women in the little city of Lynn, Mass. She was one of those lovable women whose place seems always to be at some sick bed or in some house of trouble. In every town or small city there is usually some woman who is always called upon in cases of sickness and trouble, and in Lynn this woman was Lydia E. Pinkham. Among other things Mrs. Pinkham possessed was the recipe for a wonderful medicine which was known for miles around. Every woman who was troubled with the diseases peculiar to womankind sought Mrs. Pinkham's advice and received from her the medicine free. Women drove all the way from Boston and Salem to obtain it, and many were the blessings heaped on Mrs. Pinkham's head. The Pinkhams in the early days were well-to-do, but in 1876 the panic came, and with it the failing health of Mr. Pinkham.

"It was at this time, when the fortunes of the Pinkham family were at their lowest ebb, that one of Mrs. Pinkham's sons suggested the sale of his mother's remedy, and it was decided to put the medicine on the market, so the boys went to work. Charles, the eldest, secured a position as a conductor on a street car. Will became a school teacher, and Dan found work in the post-office.

"The first work done was on the smallest scale. Steeping herbs in the kitchen, gradually filling a gross of bottles, which had been ordered C. O. D., was comparatively easy, though much study and experience was necessary before the art of best compounding so many ingredients was mastered by youths entirely ignorant of pharmacy. But the next question was to sell it. Advertising is the very air of life to a new medicine, and how could slender means stand the enormous charges of metropolitan papers? It could not be done; what could? They solved the problem by getting a job printer to strike off a lot of little pamphlets, setting forth the virtues of the compound, and by going to Boston on the ten-cent workingman's trains, with bundles of them, and then all 'packing' them on their backs through the streets, distributing them to all who would take. Thus a small demand was created, and a few bottles were disposed of,

but how few at first may be inferred from the fact that for a considerable time William H. Pinkham, one of the brothers, could bring home from Boston under his arm all herbs required for a lot of medicine. Four gallons of spirits were all they felt able or needed to buy at one time, and the bottles when filled were packed for shipment in second-hand boxes bought at a neighboring grocery.

"So little faith did the trade have that such a small affair would ever be worthy of notice, that a leading drug house of Boston would not even receive a two-dozen lot on sale. The hardships of such a beginning, where the loss of income from labor at other occupations was not yet made up by any surplus from sales, when the 'bread-and-butter' question was not the least of the questions which beset the busy and aspiring firm, and the first check of only \$18, received from the leading wholesale druggist of New England, seemed an incredible piece of good fortune, almost worthy a special holiday, can only be appreciated by those who have had a like experience.

"Every cent of their earnings was turned in to the mother, and after paying the actual living expenses of the family the balance was spent for printing circulars advertising the medicine. These circulars the boys themselves distributed after business hours. The medicine Mrs. Pinkham prepared herself on the kitchen stove. The herbs were steeped and in the evening the entire family assisted in filling the bottles.

"The effort was followed with success, and soon one of the boys left his position to devote his entire time to the work. Soon after it was decided to devote the entire energies of the family to the work. The three boys, with their packs on their backs, went to Boston, New York, Brooklyn and Philadelphia and distributed circulars all over the cities. Every cent they received, save what was absolutely necessary for living expenses, went into printing more circulars. They lived in an attic in Brooklyn for awhile, cooking their own meals on an oil stove, and many and many a day tramped the whole length of Manhattan Island rather than spend five cents for carfare.

"It was during this time that the boys first met Mr. C. N. Crittenden. Mr. Crittenden, who now devotes his entire time to evangelistic work, was the head of a large wholesale drug concern, and many a time during those dark days he advanced the price of a gross of the remedy that the Pinkham boys might have the price of more circulars.

"The first newspaper advertising they ever did was shortly after this. R. M. Pulsifer, then owner of the *Boston Herald*, became interested in the Pinkhams, and asked them why they did not advertise in the newspapers. They replied that they did not have the money. Questioning developed the fact that the family owned the little home at Lynn, worth, perhaps, \$1,000, all they had saved from the wreck of their father's fortune. Mr. Pulsifer offered to give them \$1,000 worth of advertising and take in return a lien on the house.

"After consulting their mother, they agreed to do this, and the advertising was placed. But when the bill became due the business had increased to such an extent that they were enabled to pay the bill and the home was saved.

"The newspaper advertising for the company had by this time been placed in the hands of an agent, and he established a most extensive system of newspaper advertising. It was too extensive. The business could not pay for it, and one day in the '80's it was discovered that the company was \$125,000 in debt, and only Charles H. Pinkham was left to straighten matters out. Advertising was stopped and Mr. Pinkham set about to straighten matters out. At that time the business amounted to about 2,000 gross a year.

"So great was the confidence of Mr. Pinkham's business associates in him that they did not press him, but aided him in every way. He gave notes for all this indebtedness, forty-three \$1,000 notes being signed at one sitting. To Mr. Pinkham's credit it can be said that not one payment was ever missed, and in a few years he was out of debt, although the sales of the company had fallen off from 2,000 gross a year to 550.

"About the year '89, when the business was once more on a sound financial basis, arrangements were made with the Pettin-gill agency to handle all newspaper advertising. Although only a few thousand dollars were appropriated the first year, success was attained at the start, and year after year, as the sales increased, more money was expended, until the annual appropriation amounts to \$800,000."

He was possessed of a rare tenor voice and was noted as a singer in the locality where he lived. He was connected with one quartette for 25 years. He was often sought after to travel and sing, but he preferred his quiet home life, though he would certainly have procured fame and a fine income wherever he went. At one time he was associated with the celebrated baritone singer, Avon D. Saxon of England, who many times praised the fineness of Mr. Pinkham's voice. The following sketch was written by Mrs. Adelaide Cilley Waldron, who was Mr. Pinkham's organist for ten years: "In the shadow of a great affliction the soul sits dumb. Such is the feeling which rests upon many in this community in view of the unexpected death of our esteemed friend, Mr. B. F. Pinkham. Very keenly is this loss felt by those who have been his life-long companions in singing. Irreparable is the loss, for we can never find another voice of such sweetness and power, and always making melody. Was there a presentiment in his soul on Easter Sunday that he was singing his last sacred song upon earth, and did this cause him to sing with such marvelous sweetness? Perhaps such was the fact, for it is said that he expressed the fear that he should never sing so well again. His last earthly hymns of praise may have been the beginning of a more perfect heavenly song in a higher sphere. Knowing him from his early boyhood days, and from his first connection with the choir in the Congregational Church, we can say with truth that for nearly thirty years he has always been ready, and at all times willing to lend the aid of his matchless voice whenever soli-

cited, and many are the souls which have been comforted in their times of affliction by the thrilling magic of his incomparable voice. His funeral services were held in the Congregational Church at Farmington, N. H., and Revs. Darling and Adams spoke words of comfort to the sorrowing ones. It was fitting that loving friends should drape in mourning the place where he had sung for so many years, leaving the one vacant chair standing alone, for it was a time in which singers could only sit there in silence. It was a dreary, desolate day when we laid our friend away and it was all emblematical of the desolation in our hearts. Friends in Exeter and Farmington had contributed flowers to brighten the gloom which had settled on all hearts. 'Our Frank is at rest.'
