FOREWORD

This little book is a record of a very few of the descendants of Walter Power who came to America in 1654. It has been prepared especially for the benefit of the descendants of Daniel Powers who settled in Branch County, Michigan in 1835. We have tried to list all of this latter group and hope that few, if any, have been missed. We trust that a number of these will feel that our, and in many cases their, efforts have been worth while.

Each person listed has been given a serial number. Most are shown twice, first as the child of someone, and second, using the same number, with their own biography. Thus, by following the numbers, the line of descent can be easily traced.

In most cases where information has been taken from printed records the reference is given. The data for the last three or four generations, of course, has come from family records. The old Charles Powers family Bible has been of great help. Most of the data for Walter Powers down through Ebenezer Powers has been taken from a genealogy that Edward L. Powers had prepared in 1920 by the genealogist Lawrence Brainerd. His references have been given.

We trust that the errors will be few and forgiven.

THE NAME AND FAMILY

In the book "Hudson Mohawk Genealogical and Family Memoirs, N.Y." Vol. 3, Page 1029, we find the following interesting information.

"The family name Power, or Powers, is from the old Norman name 'le Poer', and in England is as old as the time of William the Conqueror, one of whose followers bore that name at the battle of Hastings (1066 A.D.), and is found on the roll of Abbey. From that time onward the name holds an honorable place in English History. There seems to be no positive record where the American founder of the family came from. One writer says the New England family originated in Essex County, England. The name of Walter Power appears on the records of Middlesex County, Mass., of 1654, as a 'boy 14 years old', and that he married on 'ye eleventh daye of ye first month 1660', Trial, daughter of Deacon Ralph Sheppard, who came from Stepney Parish, London (in Essex), 1635 with his wife, Thanks, and first settled in Weymouth, later in Malden, where he died aged ninety years. Huge trees now grow in the raceway of the old Powers sawmill, and the site of 'old Powers graveyard' may be found, but badly treated by vandals who used the gravestones to make a fence."

1- WALTER POWERS - (1), (2), (3)

He was born, undoubtedly, in County Essex, England in 1639. Little is known of his parentage or early life. His name first appears in the Middlesex County (Mass.) Court Records in 1654 and his age is given as 14. He married Trial Shepard in Malden, Mass. March 11, 1660/1. He settled in Concord, Mass. in that part of the town known as Concord Village and later incorporated as Littleton. He built his home on the north side of Quagany Hill, about half a mile from the garrison house. In 1694 he bought from some Indians one-fourth part of the township of Nashobe. He died in Concord Feb. 22, 1707/8.

He was a man of good standing and acquired a comfortable fortune for those early days. His wife seems to have been a woman of education and from the position his sons took in the town it is likely that they were fairly well educated. His sons seem to have been the ones to add the final "s" to the original name Power.

2- WILLIAM POWERS - (1), (2), (3)

He was born in Concord, Mass. in 1661. He married Mary Bank or Bauk, and inherited the homestead and the sawmill.

3- MARY POWERS -

She was born at Concord, Mass. in 1663 and married Jan. 1, 1681 Lieut. Joseph Wheeler.

4- (Capt.) ISAAC POWERS -

He was born at Concord, Mass. in 1665. He was Captain of the Militia (train band) and held various town offices. He married Mary Poulter.

5- THOMAS POWERS -

He was born at Concord, Mass. in 1667. He married Mary Harwood.

6- DANIEL POWERS - (1), (2), (4)

He was born at Concord, (afterward Littleton) Mass. May 10, 1669. He married (1) in Concord on April 8, 1702, Elizabeth Whitcomb. He married (2) about 1711 Martha Bates. The date of his death is not upon record and there are no papers on file in connection with the settlement of his estate. He was alive as late as 1730.

He was a life-long farmer in the vicinity of Concord. It is interesting to note that his first wife was the daughter of Jonathan Whitcomb and that his great-great-great grandson also married a descendant of Jonathan Whitcomb.

7- INCREASE POWERS -

She was born at Concord, Mass. July 16, 1671. She married Hepzibah Sawyer.

8- WALTER POWERS, Jr. -

He was born at Concord, Mass. June 28, 1674. He married Rebecca Barrett.

9- JACOB POWERS -

He was born at Concord, Mass. Dec. 15, 1679. He married (1) Sarah Merriam and (2) Edith Adams.

10- SARAH POWERS -

She was born at Concord, Mass. Feb. 8, 1683 and married Moses Barron.

14- Capt. PETER POWERS - (1), (2), (3)

He was born in Concord Village, Mass. (later changed to Littleton) in 1707. When he was about 18 he went to Dunstable in what is now the southern part of Nashua, N.H. On April 20, 1728 he married Anna Keyes of Chelmsford. In the summer of 1730 he bought 37 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres in Nissitisset, about ten miles west of where they had been living. He went ahead and built a cabin and then, in January of 1731, moved his wife and two small children to it. It was the first house in what is now Hollis, N.H. He died at Hollis Aug. 27, 1757.

For many years he was Captain of the Hollis Militia company. In the summer of 1754 he led a scouting expedition of about 30 men into Northern New Hampshire. They went into the upper Connecticut Valley nearly to the Canadian line checking for a possible French fort but found none. In 1755 he was Captain of a company of Hollis men that was part of an expedition against the French forts at Crown Point. They did not see action. He was one of those most active in the organization of Hollis as a separate township. He was always a very religious man and was instrumental in the founding of the first church in Hollis. As evidence that his beliefs were passed on to his children is the fact that his first son, Peter, Jr., entered the ministry and graduated from Harvard in 1754.

Peter Powers was a great believer in the value of land and bought and sold many tracts in or near Hollis. A year or so after he settled in Hollis other pioneers began to come and he did much of the surveying for them. He often took his pay in land. A copy of the record of deed shows

that from 1735 to 1757 he sold 141 different pieces of land. He was very lax in his collections and at his death owned just three pieces of real estate, including his home, worth about \$5100.00. About three times that amount was owed him for land he had sold.

31- NAHUM POWERS - (1), (2), (3), (4)

He was born in Hollis, N.H. April 11, 1741. Feb. 7, 1769 in Plymouth, N.H. he married Sarah Wheat. He was one of the original grantees of Plymouth, N.H. and was taxed there until 1777. About 1777 or 1778 he removed to Newbury, Vermont and later to New York state. He was living in Batavia, Genesee Co., N.Y. in Nov. 1820 and perhaps as late as 1826. Plymouth, N.H. is in the territory scouted by his father in 1754.

For six days he served in Capt. Reuben Dow's Company of Hollis men at the Lexington Alarm, April 19, 1775. In the muster roll for this service his address is given as Plymouth. He later re-enlisted in this company for an eight month period and was at the Battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775. In this same company of Hollis men at Bunker Hill were his brothers Samson and Francis, who was wounded, and his uncle Jonathan Powers, who was then 72 years old. In 1776 he served eight months in Capt. Edward Everet's Co., of Col. Bedel's Regt. In 1777 he was in Capt. John Willoughby's Co. in the Northern Army under Gen. Gates. In 1778 he again enlisted, this time in Capt. Barrow's Co. of Col. Bedel's Regt. In his application for a pension he stated that he was taken prisoner by Indians near Lake Champlain Aug. 10, 1781 and exchanged May 17, 1782. His pension application was not granted.

39- EBENEZER POWERS - (2)

He was born at Plymouth, N.H. Feb. 12, 1774. His mother died when he was seven months old and after his father's removal from Plymouth he was brought up by relatives in that town. He was taxed there in 1795. In February of 1799 he married, at Plymouth, Nancy Darling. Later that year he moved to Thornton, Grafton Co., N.H. Before 1820 he moved to Chenango Co., N.Y. The 1830 census shows him there at Otselic. We have no record of his death.

"Eben", as he was called by his friends, is said to have been a tall man, six feet or more. From a family story it is probable that he made a visit to Michigan where his son, Daniel, was living. This may have been as late as 1840.

40- DANIEL POWERS - (1), (2)

He was born Nov. 16, 1802 in Thornton, Grafton Co., N.H. Before 1820 his parents moved to Chenango Co. N.Y. In February of 1830 he married Marena Hoag. She was a Mayflower descendant (See Appendix). We do not know just where this marriage took place but it was probably in Chenango Co., N.Y. for he was living there at Otselic about a year later when his first child was born. In the spring of 1835 he left New York to settle in Illinois. We do not know the route of this journey but it was probably made overland through southern New York and northern Ohio. It must have been filled with hardships for he had with him his wife and three small children, the oldest less than five years of age and the youngest a baby of about five months. When they reached the little village of Bronson, Mich. it was necessary to stop because of the illness in the family and he decided to stay there instead of going on to Illinois. As far as we know he stayed the rest of his life in or near Bronson. He died there Sept. 2, 1856.

He was a farmer all his life. The record shows that a few weeks after he settled in Bronson he bought a farm just east of the village. It is also stated that at Christmas time of 1835 his house was one of just eight in Bronson. It would look as though for a time he lived in town and commuted to his farm work. In 1839, during the administration of Martin VanBuren, he bought 80 acres of land from the government. We do not know the exact location of this but it was probably close to Bronson. Soon after he had settled at Bronson a Dr. Randall stopped there on his way to Illinois. He also decided to locate there and hired Daniel Powers to go to Chicago and bring back his furniture which had been shipped ahead. This contact was the beginning of a life-long friendship between the two men which resulted in Daniel's first grandson being named Randall. In 1867 all records of the village of Bronson were destroyed by fire so we do not know whether or not he ever held an office there. We do know that he was a much respected member of the community.

45 -CHARLES POWERS - (1), (2)

He was born at Otselic, Chenango Co., New York November 11, 1830. When he was less than five years old the family moved to Bronson, Mich. and the rest of his life was spent in or near that community. On October 6, 1858, at Coldwater, Mich., he married Theresa Armenia Whitcomb. The ceremony was performed by her grandfather, the Rev. Samuel Whitcomb. They lived on a farm east of Bronson until he was elected Sheriff of Branch Co. in 1864. He served during the years 1865 and 1866, during which time the family resided in Coldwater. Previous to this time he had recruited a company of men for the Union Forces, but ill health prevented his going with it as an officer. About 1868 he went into business in a general store in Bronson with his brother Henry. He died at Bronson, Mich. July 11, 1883 and was buried there.

46 - NANCY POWERS - (2)

She was born at Otselic, Chenango Co., New York, September 15, 1852. In 1835 the family moved to Bronson, Mich. She married George Frank Gillam at Bronson about 1858. They lived at Bronson until about 1871 and then moved to Lansing, Mich. She died at Lansing March 13, 1898.

47 - HENRY POWERS - (1), (2)

He was born at Otselic, Chenango Co., N.Y. January 8, 1835. When he was a few months old the family moved to Bronson, Mich. where he spent the rest of his life. About 1866, at Bronson, he married Mary Shepard. He died at Bronson June 29, 1889.

In 1866 he became a partner with his brother-in-law, George Gillam, in a dry goods store. The store burned in January of 1867. Later he purchased Gillam's interest and operated the store alone for about a year. For a short time he had another man as partner, but in 1868 or 1869 his brother Charles bought that man's interest. From that time until his death the business was known as C. & H. Powers. When the Billage of Bronson was incorporated in 1866 he was a member of the first Board of Trustees. He also served as a Trustee in 1870, 1872 - 3, 1877 and 1879. He was a member of Mystic Masonic Lodge at Bronson and in 1879 was Treasurer. He also belonged to the Royal Arch Chapter and was an officer in it.

48 - MARY JANE POWERS - (1)

She was born at Bronson, Mich. September 23, 1837. About 1860 she married a Mr. Parsons. She died at Bronson, January 16, 1861.

She had no children.

49 - DESIRE POWERS - (1)

She was born at Bronson, Mich. August 22, 1840 and was one of twins. She was named for her grandmother, Desire (Macomber) Hoag. She died October 3, 1846.

50 - SOPHIA POWERS - (1)

She was born at Bronson, Mich. August 22, 1840 and was one of twins. She died at Bronson November 14, 1852.

51 - BEHMAN HOAG POWERS - (1)

He was born at Bronson, Mich. December 14, 1842. He lived at Bronson but it is thought he may have spent some time in Montana. He did surveying and made the plan for the Bronson Cemetery. About 1865 he married Catherine Hibbard. He died in 1897.

52 - RANDALL DANIEL POWERS - (1), (2)

He was born at Bronson, Mich. at 11:50 P.M. November 27, 1859, and was the first son of a first son. He attended the local schools and later, at the age of 17, went to Hillsdale College for one year. The following year he began steady work in the store of Charles and Henry Powers at Bronson. He eventually purchased the business and remained in it until his death. On September 19, 1888, at Bronson, he married Nellie Parla Brown. He died July 12, 1923.

Randall Powers began his business career at an early age when his grandmother gave him an ewe. The lamb was the beginning for a small flock of sheep. In later years he bought wool from local farmers and sold it to eastern wool merchants. Following the deaths of Charles and Henry Powers their two sons carried on the store business as R.D. & F. (Frank) Powers. Later Frank died and Randall took in as partner his brother Charles. About 1908 he purchased the interest of his brother and was the sole owner of the business. The business stationery for the store listed, "Dry Goods, Groceries, Boots, Shoes, etc. Produce and Seeds a Specialty." Later Clothing and Ready to Wear was added to this heading. At various times he had an interest in several other businesses at Bronson. He was a partner in the Bronson Milling Co., and owned stock in two banks, the Douglas Manufacturing Co., and the Bronson Reel Co. He was sometimes referred to as "The Dean of Bronson's Business Men". He also invested in real estate and at the time of his death owned a store building and some lots, in addition to his home and the building housing his business.

He served two terms in the Michigan Legislature as a Representative from Branch Co. He was a member during the years 1905 through 1908.

While there he was a member of four committies, Michigan Employment, Institutions for the Blind, Railroads, Roads and Bridges, and was chairman of the committee on Mines and Minerals.

He was always interested in anything for the betterment of the community and took part in many such activities. He was a 32nd Degree Mason, a Knight Templar and a member of the Shrine. He also belonged to the Eastern Star, the Elks and the Odd Fellows. One of his favorite poems was "Abou Ben Adhem".

53 - JOHN WHITCOMB POWERS - (1)

He was born at Bronson, Mich. August 19, 1862, and attended the public schools there. He was a Registered Pharmacist and about 1885 he went to Mitchell, So. Dak. to work and about 1888 went to Armour, So. Dak. On May 5, 1890 he married, at Armour, Nellie Mary Boylan. They soon moved to Mitchell where for many years he was in a drug store and later was a salesman. He died at Mitchell November 10, 1914.

He belonged to the Masonic Lodge at Mitchell, S.D. and, after going through all the chairs, served one term as Master. He also belonged to the Odd Fellows and the Eastern Star, in which he served as Worthy Patron. He was always active in the civic affairs of Mitchell and was Secretary of the Corn Palace Committee when that observance was started.

54 - CHARLES HENRY POWERS - (1)

He was born at Coldwater, Mich. April 2, 1866. The family soon moved to Bronson, Mich. where he attended the public schools. For several years he was associated with his older brother in a department store there. On February 2, 1900 he married Hannah Hanson. About 1908 they moved to Seattle Wash. where he was in the insurance business. He died there October 6, 1922.

He had no children.

55 - NANCY MARENA POWERS - (1)

She was born December 25, 1869 at Bronson, Mich., where she attended school. In 1888 she went to Armour, So. Dak. to keep house for her brother who was employed by Crutchett & Scallin. On September 10, 1889, at Bronson, Mich. she married Henry James Crutchett. From that time on most of her life was spent at Armour. In 1922, after the death of her husband, she moved to San Diego, Calif. where she died December 6, 1941.

From her early teens she had very poor health and had to undergo major surgery at least four times. In spite of this she lived a long and active life, bearing and rearing four children. When she first went to Armour the life was that of a pioneer. The town had been started just two years before. For the first few years of her marriage much of her time was given to helping in her husband's store. In those early years many of the store's customers were Indians. Her mother lived with

her and helped care for the children. She always took an active part in the life of the community.

She had been brought up in the Baptist church and was active in the work of the Baptist church at Armour. About 1914 she joined the Episcopal church and organized and trained a children's choir for it. She was a Worthy Matron of the Eastern Star and was a Charter Member of both the Prairie Home and the Monday study clubs. She was a member of the Yankton, S. Dak. chapter of D.A.R. but took no active part. Her D.A.R. membership number was 228475. During the First World War she served as Douglas County chairman for knitting. She also gave much time and effort to the work of the Ladies Cemetery Association.

56 - EDWARD LEESON POWERS - (1)

He was born at Bronson, Mich., July 31, 1872. He attended the public schools there and later went to Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, Mich. where he majored in music. In 1891-92 and again in 1894-95 he studied with Loeschorn and Barth in Berlin, Germany. He taught privately in Joliet, Ill. and for one year at Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio. In 1896 he went to Judson College, Marion, Ala. where he taught for two years, going from there to the Denver School of Music. He was there for two years and then returned to Judson College in 1901 as Director of Music, a position which he retained until his death. On June 12, 1902, at Spencer, Ohio, he married Frances Jane Betz, in a ceremony performed by Dr. John Blackburn. While at Judson College he had further study at Chataque, N.Y. under Wm. Sherwood, and organ work at the University of Michigan, as well as a sabbatical year for study at the Hochschule in Berlin in 1908-09. He died at Marion, Ala. November 4, 1921.

At Judson College, in addition to his duties as Director of Music, he taught piano, organ and theory. He was listed in "Who's Who in Music". His published compositions included sacred choruses for Women's Voices, and one, "Still, Still With Thee", for mixed voices, which was broadcast in a church service from Cleveland, Ohio in 1950. He also composed one sacred and one secular Solo for High Voice and one secular chorus for Women's Voices, as well as two piano pieces for the Progressive Series of Music. He composed the music for the Judson College Alma Mater song. At his death a plaque, in his memory, was installed in the college auditorium by the Judson College Glee Club. It reads -

"Pure in heart, Wise in judgement,
Strong in execution, beloved and
honored as teacher, friend and citizen."

In addition to his work at Judson College he was active in community affairs of Marion. He served as Organist, Sunday School Superintendent and as a Deacon in Siloam Baptist Church.

57 - DANIEL JAY GILLAM -

He was born at Bronson, Mich. September 10, 1861. About 1871 the family moved to Lansing, Mich. where he grew up and attended the public schools. He also attended Michigan State University there. He married Susie Gillett at Lansing about 1888. He was in the Real Estate business at Lansing with his father. His first wife died in January of 1906. About 1908 he married Kathryn Kelsey. Soon afterward they moved to Polson, Mont. where she died a few months later. On January 1, 1912, at Lansing he married Sarah Drake McAlvay. They lived at Polson until his death December 31, 1917 while on a visit to San Diego, Calif.

Some time in the 1890s the Bement Stove Works at Lansing failed. The stockholders appointed him and his father, without bond, to take over and salvage what they could. This they did to the satisfaction of all concerned. At Polson he was in the Real Estate and Farm Loan business. One of his important business activities was interesting Eastern men to invest in, or loan money on, Montana land. For this purpose he usually spent part of each winter in Michigan and some time in San Diego, Calif. In the spring he would return to Polson.

58 - GLEN HARRY GILLAM -

He was born at Bronson, Mich. July 31, 1863. About 1871 the family moved to Lansing, Mich. where he attended the public schools. In 1882 he married Flora Mabelle Romans. About 1885 they moved to Minneapolis, Minn. For a short time they lived at Groton, So. Dak. and then returned to Minneapolis where he was in sales work. In 1912 he moved to San Diego, Calif. He was a painting contractor in San Diego and for a short time owned a small paint store. He died at San Diego August 2, 1928.

She was born January 6, 1872 at Lansing, Mich. She attended the public schools at Lansing and later was at Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, Mich. On October 19, 1897, at Lansing, she married Franklin Brown Holder. They lived at Lansing until 1909 when they moved to California. At first they lived at El Cajon and in 1911 moved to Santee. She died March 24, 1916 at San Diego, Calif.

60 - JENNIE POWERS -

We have little information except that she was born at Bronson, Mich. in 1866. She never married. She died in 1905.

He was born at Bronson, Mich. in 1868. About 1889, after the death of his father, he took over his father's interest in the store business as a partner with his cousin, Randall D. Powers. He never married. He died at Bronson in 1898.

62 - CHARLOTTE POWERS -

She was born at Bronson, Mich. in 1874. She was married to Bert L. Corey. She had one child which died as an infant. She died in New Mexico May 5, 1904 and was buried in Bronson.

63 - HELEN POWERS -

She was born at Bronson, Mich. in 1878. She lived at Lansing, Mich. where she was secretary to the Attorney General. She never married. She died at Lansing in 1942, and was buried at Bronson.

64 - MERRITT POWERS - (1)

He was born at Bronson, Mich. May 30, 1867. He married Mary Mayhoffer but this marriage ended in divorce. He went to Los Angeles, Calif. about 1922. He died at Hondo, Los Angeles Co., Calif. January 19, 1931. There is no record of children.

65 - INEZ LORAIN POWERS -

She was born at Bronson, Mich. June 9, 1889. She attended the Bronson public schools and graduated from Bronson High School in 1907. She spent one year in college at Western State Normal School, Kalamazoo, Mich., in 1907-1908. After that she worked as a clerk in her father's dry goods store in Bronson.

On this _____ day of June in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight hundred and Eighteen before me the Suscriber, one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for Niagara County, personally came Nahum Powers aged about Seventy Eight years a resident of the Town of Schlosser in said county, who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provisions made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary War". That the said Nahum Powers, in the month of April in the Year 1778, he enlisted as a private Soldier under Capt. Timothy Barron, at Haverhill in the state of New Hampshire. That he was attached to Col. Timothy Bedels Regiment of the New Hampshire Line. That he faithfully served the United States under the aforesaid officers for the term of one year when he was honorably discharged by Capt. Jason Wait, then commanding the regiment aforesaid in the absence of the said Col. Timothy Bedel. That in the year 1781, he again enlisted as a private soldier under Capt. Nehemiah Lovewell for the term of Eight Months and was attached to Col. Benjamin Waits Regiment of the New Hampshire line. That he faithfully Served the United States for the aforesaid Term of Eight Months and was honorably discharged. That on the 10th day of August 1781 he was taken prisoner by the Indians on Hasens Road near Lake Champlain, was taken to Quebec and exchanged on the 17th day of May following. That he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support and that he has no other evidense now in his power to produce of said services.
