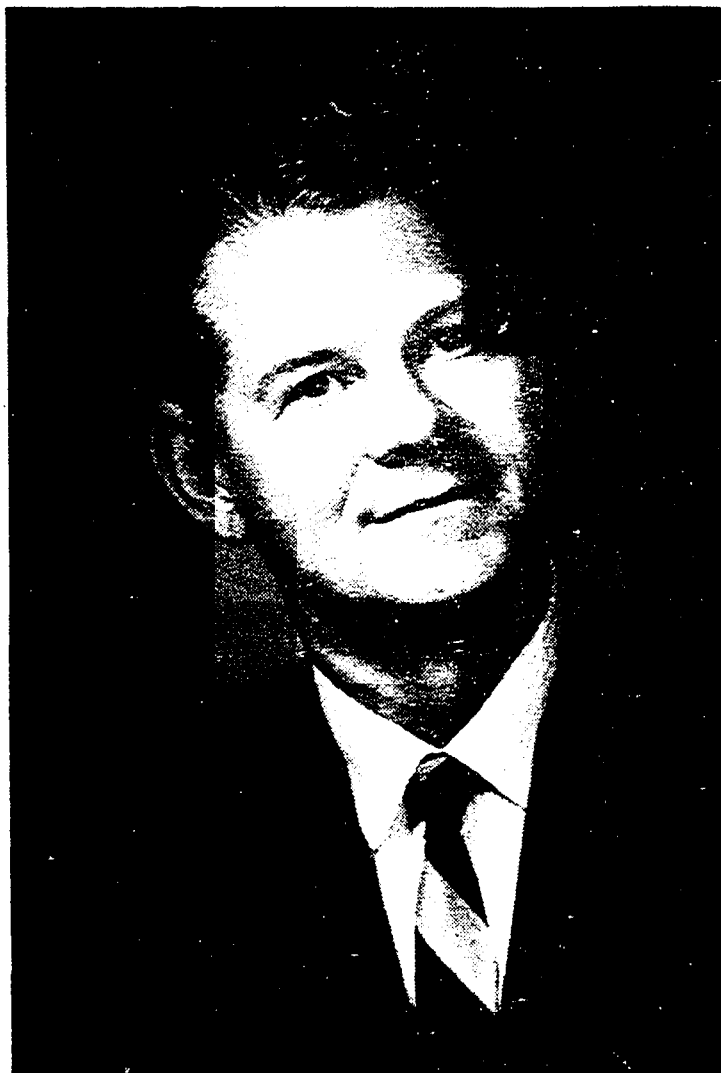

INTRODUCTION

"The first settler on the Eastern Shores was an Englishman and so were practically all the others who followed. Thus, as compared with other parts of our country, the Eastern Shore was homogeneous in its beginnings. It had an old culture as a foundation for that which was slowly erected upon it.

The 'Eastern Shore' comprises that peninsula lying between Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean. More than 300 years ago the first white settlers in Virginia and Maryland established themselves on the western shore of the Bay and called the land on the other side 'Eastern Shore'.

The Eastern Shoreman had been strongly influenced by his proximity to the water. Every boy on the Shore had been brought up with boats. They had always been a seafaring people. The great planters frequently owned a ship or two. Some of the finest ships built by man hailed from the Eastern Shore. In the old days, it was their ships that prevented them from becoming too narrow and provincial. On the Eastern Shores they were always aware of the great world outside." *

With this background, we are not surprised to find, as you will later read, the Pell family turning to the rivers in search of a livelihood and as a means of travel into the interior to seek land on which to build their homes.

We wish we really knew how they came this way from

Maryland and Virginia -- by boat -- over the mountains by wagon and horseback -- how they protected themselves from Pirates, Indians and wild animals. We have an idea of how they dressed from the few old pictures that have been included in this book, and we know from records in the Court Houses that they brought slaves with them. We feel certain part of their journey was by boat as they settled at many points along the Ohio River and built or helped settle small communities. But with all their problems of survival, there was not much time for recording their history. However, with deeds, marriage records, old Bibles, a few pictures, a letter here and there, land grants, wills, tax records, census records, funeral home records, visits to old cemeteries, and memories handed down through the generations, together with a little imagination, we have tried to give a glimpse of their trek down the Ohio River from the "Eastern Shores".

And now we begin the story of William Pell, Sr. of Kent County, Maryland, and hope you will find it interesting. Needless to say, as careful as we have tried to be with dates and information, we are sure errors will be found, and we regret each and every one that occurs.

William Pell, Sr. was born January 1, 1760 in Kent County, Maryland. As of this time, his parents are not known, but from information obtained from descendants and various family histories, it seems his family came to this country many years before the Revolutionary War, and settled in Virginia.

William Pell, Sr. had one brother of whom we are sure, John Pell, born sometime before 1765, in Virginia. According to tradition, there may have been one or two more brothers.

Both William Pell, Sr. and John Pell fought in the Revolutionary War, and in later years, William Pell, Sr. traveled down the Ohio River and into Kentucky, coming through Bracken County, and John Pell's descendants settled in Lewis County, Kentucky.

William Pell, Sr. died in Harrison County, Indiana on January 17, 1839. John Pell died in Fairfax County, Virginia on July 13, 1810.

It is certain that this family came from England, as all Pells are of English descent.

The following affidavit of William Pell, Sr., applying for a pension as a soldier of the Revolution was obtained from records in Washington, D. C.:

"State of Indiana)
Harrison County)

On this 9th day of April, 1833, personally appeared in open court before the judges of the circuit court for the county of Harrison and State of Indiana, it being a court of record, and now sitting William Pell, a resident of Boone township in the county and state aforesaid, aged seventy three years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832. That he, the said Pell, entered into the service of the United States in the army of the American Revolution as a private soldier, on the first day of July, 1778, at the county of Hampshire, state of Virginia, and served a tour of six months, as a substitute for one Jacob Doll, ending on the first of January 1779, in a company commanded by Capt. Abraham Johnson belonging to the 13th Virginia regiment, which regiment was at that time commanded by Majors Vonmeter and Scott. This applicant states further, that his company with the other companies composing the aforesaid regiment marched under command of the above named field officers until after they had arrived at the west side of the Alleghany Mountains when this applicant was placed in a company commanded by Capt. Robert Cunningham. Here, this applicant states, the regiment to which he belonged, namely, the 13th Virginia Regiment, joined the Monongahela Militia under command of Colonels Crawford and Stinson. We then continued our march together until we joined the regulars under General McIntosh and Colonels Broadhead, Gibson and McIntosh (son of the Gen.) on the bank of the Ohio River one mile below the mouth of Big Beaver where we built Fort McIntosh in the month of October, 1778. We then left the fort and went in pursuit of the Indians residing between the Ohio River and the lakes with the intention of burning and destroying their towns, and after crossing the Tuscarouas River, in a large prairie, we met the Indians who were coming to meet us with a flag of truce; we effected a treaty with them and passed on to the Muskingum, and a few miles down it, we halted and built Fort Lawrence in the latter part of November, 1778. After building Fort Lawrence, we directed our march back to Fort McIntosh and on our way lost many of our men who perished with hun-

ger, fatigue and cold.

This applicant states that he, with the troop, reached Fort McIntosh in the last of December between Christmas and New Year, where he received his discharge signed by Capt. Robert Cunningham and went home to Hampshire County, Virginia, where he then resided.

About the first of June 1781 at the county of Hampshire, State of Virginia, this applicant states that he again entered the service of the United States as a volunteer in a company commanded by Capt. Thomas Neill and served a six months tour commencing as aforesaid and ending the first of December 1781. His field officers during this term of service were Col. Edwards and Major McGuire. During the former part of this term of service, he, the said William Pell, with the company and regiment to which he belonged, was employed in watching the motions of and opposing Col. Tarlton, who was then committing depredations in different parts of Virginia, and laying waste the country. About the middle of October, he states that they began to direct their march towards General Washington's headquarters then at Little York, and on their way thither, passed through Winchester, Falmouth, Fredericksburg and Williamsburg, but before they reached Little York they met General Washington's main army returning from the surrender of Lord Cornwallis, and were ordered back over nearly the same route as a guard over several thousand of Cornwallis' prisoners who were sent to different posts for safe keeping and that he assisted in guarding some of said prisoners to Winchester Barracks in Frederick Co., Virginia where he remained until he received his discharge at the time above mentioned, signed by Capt. Neill and returned home to Hampshire County, Virginia. This applicant states that he was born in Kent County in the State of Maryland on the 1st day of January, 1760 as he had been informed by his parents but he had no record of his age; during the Revolutionary War he resided in Hampshire County in the State of Virginia and until the year 1790 when he removed to Kentucky and resided until about the year 1819 when he moved to the State of Indiana in which state he resided until the year 1831 when he again moved to the state

of Kentucky and resided there until the 3rd day of March 1833 when he removed back to Harrison County, State of Indiana where he now resides. He states also that he received written discharges from the respective captains under whom he served as above stated, but that they are now lost or destroyed and that he has no documentary evidence of any part of his services, nor does he know of any person now living by whom he can prove the same. He states here to the court the names of John Madden and (vacant) gentlemen of his vicinity to whom he is known and who can testify as to his character for veracity and their belief of his services as a soldier of the Revolution. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the agency of any state.

We, Jonathan Paddocks, clergyman, residing in Boone township, Harrison County and State of Indiana, and John Madden, residing in the same place, hereby certify that we are well acquainted with William Pell, who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration, that we believe him to be seventy-three years of age; that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the Revolution and that we concur in that opinion.

And the said court do hereby declare their opinion, after the investigation of the matter, and after putting the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department, that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary soldier and served as he states.

And the court further certifies, that it appears to them that Jonathan Paddocks who has signed the preceding certificate is a clergyman resident in Boone township Harrison county, and that John Madden who has also signed the same is a resident in the same township and county and is a credible person and that their statement is entitled to credit.

I, Henry W. Heth, clerk of the circuit court for the county of Harrison and state of Indiana do hereby certify that the foregoing contains the original proceedings of the said court in the matter of the application of William Pell for a pension.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal of office this 9th day of April AD 1833.

After the Revolutionary War ended, and at the end of his last tour of duty, which ended December 1st, 1781, William Pell, Sr. returned to his home in Hampshire Co., Virginia, where he had resided during the war.

In 1792, the following land grant was issued to William Pell, Sr. by the State of Virginia:

"Henry Lee, Esq., Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia:

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, Greeting:

Know Ye, That by virtue of a warrant issued from the late Lord proprietor's office of the Northern Neck and in consideration of the ancient composition of two pounds sterling paid by William Pell into the Treasury of this Commonwealth, there is granted by the said Commonwealth unto the said William Pell a certain tract or parcel of land containing four hundred and two acres by survey bearing date the 20th day of January, 1781. Lying and being in the County of Hampshire and bounded as followeth to wit - Beginning at two Chestnut oaks on the side of a hill near a drain of Muddy Run and in a line of Charles Queen's survey and running thence S 66 E 200 poles to a white oak and chestnut oak on the side of a hill near Bullitt's

line and on the south line of a drain leading into Muddy Run, thence N. 45 E. 320 poles to two pines on a ridge; thence N. 50 W 185 poles to two chestnut oaks and white oak, corner to John Plum, thence with said Plum and Charles Queen S 45 W. 373 poles to the beginning with its appurtenances.

To Have and to Hold the said tract or parcel of land, with its appurtenances, to the said William Pell and his heirs forever.

In Witness whereof, the said Henry Lee, Esq., Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, hath set his hand and caused the Lesser Seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed, at Richmond, on the 2nd day of March in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hundred and ninety two and of the Commonwealth the 16th.

and in 1795, he was issued another land grant, as follows:

"JAMES WOOD, Esq., Lt. Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia:

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, Greeting:

Know Ye, That by virtue of a land office treasury warrant No. 9020 issued the 16th day of November, 1781, there is granted by the said Commonwealth with William Pell assignee of Richard Aires, a certain tract or parcel of land containing 100 acres by survey bearing date the 25th day of October, 1792. Lying and being in the County of Hampshire on the Drains of Cabbin Run adjoining Thomas Buffington and Jacob Purget and is bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at two pines in Buffington line, thence north 120 poles to three pines and the west side of hill, thence N 60 degrees E 54 poles to a chestnut oak in Jacob Purget's line; thence with it S 75 degrees E 98 poles to a white oak and hickory corner to Purget on the Horse Sho ridge; thence with another of said Purget's line N. 60 degrees E. 80 poles to a stake; thence S 42 poles thence S 60 degrees W 240 poles with Buffington's line to the beginning with its appurtenances.

To Have and to Hold the said Tract or Parcel of Land, with its appurtenances to the said William Pell, and his heirs forever.

In Witness whereof, the said James Wood, Esq., Lt. Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia has hereunto set his hand and caused the Lesser Seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed, at Richmond, on the 23rd day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety five and of the Commonwealth the 20th.

On the 2nd day of October, 1797, William Pell and wife, Margaret, deeded to Richard Aires for the sum of Fifty pounds current money of Virginia, and on the 6th day of November, 1797, William Pell and wife, Margaret, deeded to Henry Protzman for the sum of one hundred pounds current money of Virginia, the aforesaid two tracts of land received by land grant from the State of Virginia. It is not known when William Pell was married but the first record of his wife's name, Margaret, was on the two above deeds recorded in Hampshire Co., Virginia in 1797.

William Pell, Sr. was shown on the tax records of Bracken County, Kentucky for the years 1797 through 1817, along with James Pell, John Pell and William Pell, Jr. In 1821, Samuel Pell's name was also listed on the tax list and in succeeding years until 1832, after which time no Pells were listed.

The 1800 census of Augusta, Bracken Co., Kentucky, showed only William Pell, however, the 1810 census showed the following listing:

William Pell, Jr. and Louvisa Weatherington had 3 children born in Bracken County, Kentucky, namely, Elizabeth, Mary and Joseph Barber.

James, William Pell, Jr. and Sr. bought and sold land while in Bracken County, Ky., the last deed being recorded on January 12th, 1818 from William Pell, Sr. and

Margaret, to Michael Dillman, 52 acres on the waters of the Ohio for \$312.00; and on the same date, 100 acres on the waters of the Ohio to William Ware for \$600.00.

James Pell is not listed on the tax records of Bracken County, Kentucky after the year 1810 and the next record we find of him is in Harrison County, Indiana in 1815 as evidenced by various deeds of record, and as shown from the Indiana Historical Collections, Volume XXIV, The John Tipton Papers, Vol. I, 1809-1827, as follows:

Sept. 16, 1816 - James Pell was one who went on the bond of John Tipton for Sheriff of Harrison Co., Ind. territory, p. 20;

Sept. 1816 - James Pell paid \$2.00 levy to operate a ferry in Harrison Co., p. 123

June 17, 1819 - James Pell is mentioned in a letter from Ebenezer MacDonald to John Tipton, pps. 158 and 159.

Beginning in the year 1818, we find that the whole Pell family, with the possible exception of Samuel, has moved to Laconia, Boone Twp., (Harrison Co., Indiana, on the Ohio River) as evidenced by the purchase and selling of lots as follows:

William Pell, Sr.'s first wife, Margaret died in Harrison Co., Indiana, and is buried there. He married Elizabeth Craig on March 11, 1830.

On January 17, 1839, Mr. Pell died and also was buried in Harrison County, Indiana. Before Mr. Pell's death, his sons had begun to leave Indiana and settle farther down the Ohio River.

John Pell settled in Metropolis, Illinois; James Pell is next found to have bought land in Pope County, Illinois, along with William Pell, in December 1834. About 1836, James Pell settled in Paducah, Kentucky.

William Pell, Jr. settled in Hardin County, Ill. in March 1831, which was known as "Pell's Landing", later called Rosiclare.

Jesse Pell settled in Smithland, Livingston County, Kentucky, in 1828.

Abraham Pell came to Paducah, Kentucky.

Mitchell Pell moved to Rosiclare, Hardin County, Illinois, but in 1850, he moved to Pellonia (named after Mr. Pell) later called Brooklyn, and presently Brookport, Illinois.

Charles Pell settled in Paducah, McCracken County, Kentucky, about 1833.

Samuel Pell settled in Lewisport, Kentucky in 1839.

Cindrilla Pell Madden died in Harrison County, Ind. in 1833 at age 27.

Nancy Pell Baker was in Harrison County, Indiana in 1823; later settled in Mt. Vernon (Posey County) Ind., on the Ohio River, where she was living as late as 1858.

Of Elizabeth and Thomas Pell, very little information was found except marriage licenses in Harrison County, Indiana.

Most of the above named Pells, and some of their sons and grandsons, were steam boat pilots on the Ohio, Tennessee and Mississippi Rivers. In Irvin S. Cobb's book, EXIT LAUGHING, he writes as follows:

"So it went. If you were a Rollins or a Pell or a Cable or a Beard, you almost inevitably were destined to be a pilot. There were 11 Pells who had held pilots papers, including 'Yankee' Pell, who against his private principles, had been pressed to steer a Federal gunboat, and 'Rebel' Pell, who quit his wheelhouse to fight under Forrest. Slick Pell, who was smooth-shaven and Curly Pell, who wasn't; Big Ed and Little Ed, Old Charley and Young Charley and Young Charley's Charley, all sizes and ages, but all Pells. * * "

It is said that Capt. Pell, when he was old and sick, called his sons together and asked them to try to find a good honorable vocation and not to follow the river and piloting as he had done, because it would lead to trouble.

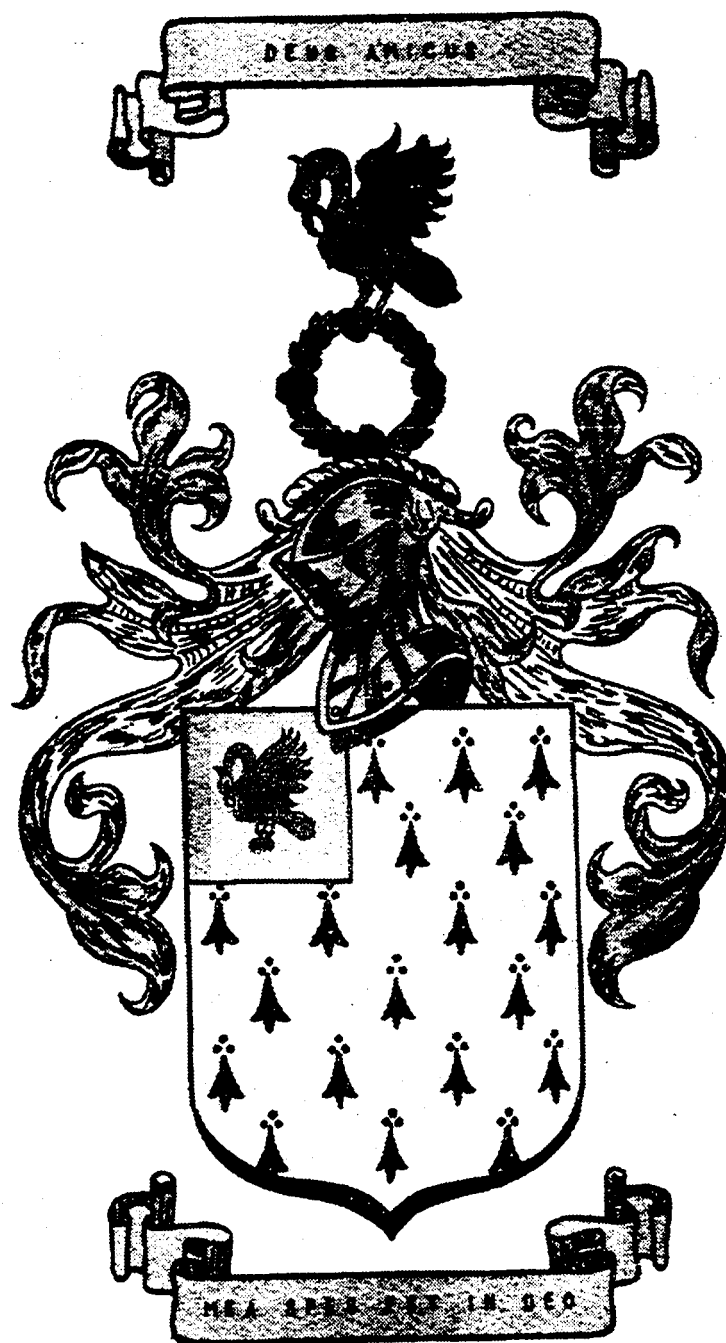

HERALDIC DESCRIPTION OF THE ARMS OF PELL (granted 19 October 1594)

ARMS - Ermine, on a canton azure, a pelican or, vulning herself gules

CREST - On a chaplet vert, flowered or, a pelican of the last, vulned gules.

MOTTOES - (Above the Crest) "DEUS AMICUS" God, Our Friends, Ourselves
(Below the Bearing) - "MEA SPES EST IN DEO"

AUTHORITY - Crozier - "General Armory"; Matthews - "American Armoury"

JOHN PELL

Oldest son of William and Margaret Pell, born 1785 in Virginia. The 1810 census showed him living in Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky, married with three children. The tax records of Bracken County, Kentucky, listed him through the years 1807 through 1815 as owning 105 acres on the Ohio River.

Later, about 1818, he moved to Harrison County, Ind. with the rest of the Pell family, where he remained until about 1840. He then moved to Pope County, Illinois, and around 1845 moved on to Massac County, Illinois, where records show that he and his wife, Mary, deeded land on March 5, 1849 to Elizabeth Pell, Mary Ellen Pell, Lydia Ann Pell, John Paisley and Thomas Desouchet of Massac County, Ill.

The 1850 census of Massac County, Illinois shows children living with them at that time as Nancy E., Lydia A., and Jane Paisley.

Mary Ellen Pell married Lewis Atwell on August 26, 1857; Lydia Ann Pell married Thomas Desouchet sometime between 1855 and 1858; and Margaret Jane Pell married John Paisley. Jane and John Paisley had one child as is shown by the following deed recorded in the Massac Co., Illinois courthouse in Deed Book N, page 317, on the 4th day of March, 1867;

Maria Paisley, only child and heir of John
Paisley, deceased, of Golconda, Pope County,

Illinois, deeded to James L. Dallam of Paducah, Kentucky, property which was conveyed to her father, John Paisley, by her grandfather and grandmother, John Pell and wife, on March 5th, 1849.

John Pell died on February 17, 1855 at the age of 70, and his daughter, Lydia Ann Pell, was appointed administratrix. On June 21, 1858, Lydia A. Pell, (then Lydia Desouchet) administratrix, was cited into court to show why she should not be removed and another appointed. Lydia Ann Pell, sometime between 1855 and 1858, married Thomas Desouchet, a widower with four children. The 1880 census of Massac County, Illinois shows Lydia Desouchet with five children, and since she was at least 27 when she married, we know that only the two youngest could have been hers.

JAMES P. PELL

James P. Pell was probably the second son of William Sr. and Margaret Pell, and was born in either Maryland or Virginia. The first record found of him was on the tax records of Bracken County, Kentucky in 1808 through 1811. He is also shown on deeds as grantor and grantee during this period.

In 1815, James Pell was in Harrison County, Indiana, as evidenced by deeds recorded there. One deed showed the following:

"President Andrew Jackson to James Pell and heirs -- 160 acres of land. James Pell, having deposited in the Genl. Land office a certificate of the Register of the land office at Jeffersonville, whereby it appears that full payment has been made for the SW quarter of Sect. 29 T 5 S of R. 4 E cont. 160 acres of land directed to be sold at Jeffersonville."

He left Harrison County, Indiana about 1834 and bought land, together with William Pell, Jr. in Pope Co., Illinois, but later, in 1838, James Pell sold his 1/2 interest to William Pell, Jr. However, at his death in 1839 he still owned 160 acres in Pope County.

James Pell came to Paducah, Kentucky about 1836 and in November of that year, bought the Tennessee Island and other land from Francis A. Harrison, as shown by the following deed:

"Know all men by these Presents: That I, Francis A. Harrison of the County of McCracken and State of

Kentucky, have this day sold to James Pell of the County and state aforesaid, two certain lots or parcels of ground situated in the old or original town of Paducah known and designated in the plan thereof as numbers 133 and 134, being the lots now occupied by the said Harrison, together with all and singular the appurtenances thereunto belonging.

Also a certain tract or parcel of land situated, lying and being in the County of Livingston and state aforesaid, situated in the Tennessee or Ohio Rivers at the mouth of the former and known as the Tennessee Island containing 229 acres (being the same more or less) and the appurtenances thereunto belonging, for which the same James Pell agrees to pay the sum of \$5,000. in four payments as follows, to wit:

Four Hundred payable in sixty days from the date hereof, two thousand on or before the first day of January 1838, thirteen hundred on or before the 1st day of January, 1839, and thirteen hundred on or before the 1st of January, 1841, the last payment to bear interest from the first day of January, 1840, for which said several sums of money the said James Pell has this day executed his notes to the said Harrison, payable as aforesaid, and the said Francis A. Harrison binds himself, his heirs, executors and administrators to execute to this said James Pell, his heirs and assigns, a deed or deeds with clause of general warrantee to said lots and land as soon as the said purchase money shall be fully paid and discharged.

In witness whereof the said Francis A. Harrison hath hereunto set his hand and seal this 21st day of November, 1836.

/s/ Francis A. Harrison"

On April 29, 1837, in McCracken County, Kentucky, he bought land from Charles and Priscilla Pell. On other occasions, he bought land until his death in 1839.

He was married to Elizabeth _____, (born 1799 in Kentucky) and had three children, namely, Elizabeth, Allen and James A. Pell.

On Monday, January 14, 1839, in Order Book A, McCracken Co. Court House, the following order was issued:

"Ordered that James Pell be appointed surveyor of that part of the road leading from Paducah to Smithland Waidsboro, which lies from town half mile out and that he together with all the hands living in said town above the courthouse street, keep the same in repair 30 feet wide, clean and smooth as the law directs."

On Monday, July 8th, 1839, this order was issued:

"Ordered that all the hands living in the town of Paducah above the street leading out by the Courthouse be allotted to James Pell instead of the hands heretofore allotted to him to keep in repair the road of which he is surveyor."

On Monday, November 11, 1839:

"Elizabeth Pell, widow of James Pell, late of this County, died by writing, waived his right to administration, therefore on the motion of Allen Pell and Charles Pell, ordered that letters of administration be granted them on the estate of said decedent, whereupon they took the oath required by law and together with Parson M. Woods, Francis A. Harrison and Simon B. Halsell, their securities, entered into and acknowledged bond in the penalty of \$4,000., conditioned as the law directs.

On the motion of the administrators of James Pell, deceased, ordered that George Dunn, Geo. Woolfolk, James B. Husbands, Eli Houston and Francis A. Harrison, or any 3 of them (being first sworn) be appointed to appraise the personal estate of said decedent. And that they set apart the property not subject to administration and make report."

On November 23, 1839, the following appraisement bill of James Pell's estate was filed, showing his personal property:

On Monday, December 9, 1839, another order appeared
as follows:

"An inventory and appraisement and list of the prop-
erty not subject to administration of the estate
of James Pell, deceased, was this day returned and
ordered to be recorded."

So it appears that James P. Pell died between July
and November, 1839, but his age is unknown as no record
was found of his birth or marriage.

On May 21, 1842, in Deed Book C, page 37, Allen Pell,
Administrator of James P., deceased, filed suit for guard-
ian ad litem for James Pell, an infant heir, as follows:

"Allen Pell, admr. of James Pell, decd.

vs

Allen Pell, Elizabeth McConnell and James Pell,
heirs of James Pell, deceased, Wesley Sloan, Esq.,
and it appearing there is an infant heir of said
James Pell, decd., to wit: James Pell, it is
therefore ordered that George W. Waters be ap-
pointed guardian ad litem of said infant heir."

Elizabeth C. Pell, widow of James P. Pell, died in
Paducah, Kentucky, in 1876 at 77 years of age. She left

the following will: (Recorded in Will Book B, McCracken Co. Court Clerk's Office)

"In the name of God, Amen

I, Elizabeth C. Pell, of Paducah in the County of McCracken in State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following:

I give to my son, James Pell, and my daughter, Elizabeth McConnell, my house and lot situated in the town of Paducah, County of McCracken in State of Kentucky, to be equally divided between them. I wish all sums of money owing to me to be collected and I give the same to my son, James Pell. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal on the 7th day of January in the year of our Lord, 1873.

The above instrument of one sheet at the date thereof declared to us by the Testator, Elizabeth C. Pell, to be her last will and testament and she then acknowledged to each of us that she had subscribed the same and we, at her request, signed our names in presence of each other as witnesses.

Answer to 1st interrogatory states: My name is Margaret Lawson, age 68 years, my residence is Louisville, Ky.

Answer to 2nd interrogatory: I live between 200 and 250 miles from the McCracken County Court House.

Answer to 3rd interrogatory: I have examined the paper referred to and my signature thereto is my true and genuine signature signed by me.

Answer to 4th interrogatory: I was.

Answer to 5th interrogatory: Yes, she did.

Answer to 6th interrogatory: I do not now remember whether I saw her sign her name to it or not but she and myself and my daughter, Mrs. Emma Hawley, talked the matter over and she then told us it was her will and she wanted us to witness it. We lived on the opposite side of the street from where Mrs. Pell was visiting her son on Main Street below 19th St., this city, and Mrs. Pell sent for us to come and witness her will and we went. And it was stated by her to be her will. She was a very sensible woman and talked the whole matter before us and to us.

Answer to 7th interrogatory: Indeed she was of sound and disposing memory. At the time she knew fully what she was doing.

Answer to 8th interrogatory: I did. It was witnessed by us both at the same time and in presence and at the request of Mrs. Elizabeth C. Pell.

ALLEN PELL, older son of James P. and Elizabeth C. Pell, was born in Harrison County, Indiana in 1815. He was married in Paducah, Kentucky on May 9, 1838 to Mary Ann Smedley. Mary Ann Smedley was born in Pennsylvania and was one of five children, as follows:

Mary Ann Smedley's mother and father were George Frederick Smedley and Christina Smedley (b. 10/27/1801). They were married on August 6, 1819. Later, Christina Smedley married a second time to Leamon Jacob on October 15, 1847.

During the Civil War, it was said that Allen Pell went south looking for one of his sons. Yellow fever was prevalent at that time and he never returned, and no one knows what happened to him.

ELIZABETH PELL, born Harrison County, Indiana, married Robert B. McConnell, born December 28, 1812, died June 22, 1865 (both buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Paducah, Ky.) They were the parents of six children:

In Deed Book 73, page 542, McCracken County Court House, the following deed is found, which sets forth the heirs of Robert B. and Elizabeth (Pell) McConnell:

"This indenture made and entered into this 26th day of April, 1897, between Mrs. Sallie McCune, widow of Alexander McCune, deceased, Mrs. Bettie Petter and husband, Joseph Petter, and Matilda McConnell of Paducah, Kentucky; Lyda Garrett of Hickman, Kentucky, and Maxwell Garrett of St. Louis, Missouri, only children and heirs-at-law of Florence McConnell Garrett and Samuel Garrett, deceased; all of said above named persons being heirs-at-law of Robert B. McConnell, who recently died in McCracken County, Kentucky, intestate, of the first part, and Alexander S. McConnell of Crawford County, State of Ark., second part;

That for and in consideration of the party of the second part having paid and assumed to pay the expenses of the last sickness and burial expenses of the said Robert McConnell, deceased, and the further consideration of the maternal love and affection which we have and bear for our brother and uncle, said party of the second part, the parties of the first part have bargained and sold, given and granted and by these presents, etc., 10 acres of ground * * *."

JAMES A. PELL, youngest son of James P. and Elizabeth C. Pell, was born in Harrison County, Indiana, about 1831. He enlisted in September 1861 in Col. Clay King's

Battalion. He was in the 1st Co. B. Claiborne's Regiment of Cavalry (Civil War). He was a prisoner at Rock Island, Illinois; Camp Close, Ohio, and Fort Delaware, Delaware. He later was exchanged at Charleston, South Carolina on May 31, 1864. He served until the end of the war and was present at the surrender. He was paroled in Paducah, Kentucky on May 3, 1865, took the amnesty oath. He took the oath of allegiance on May 3, 1854. He was a river pilot, described as fair complexion, dark hair, blue eyes, 5 feet 9 inches in height. On September 27, 1866, he obtained a marriage license to marry Emma Sebastian and they were married by George C. Lorimer at Louisville, Kentucky, in the presence of Will P. Thomasson and H. M. Burford.

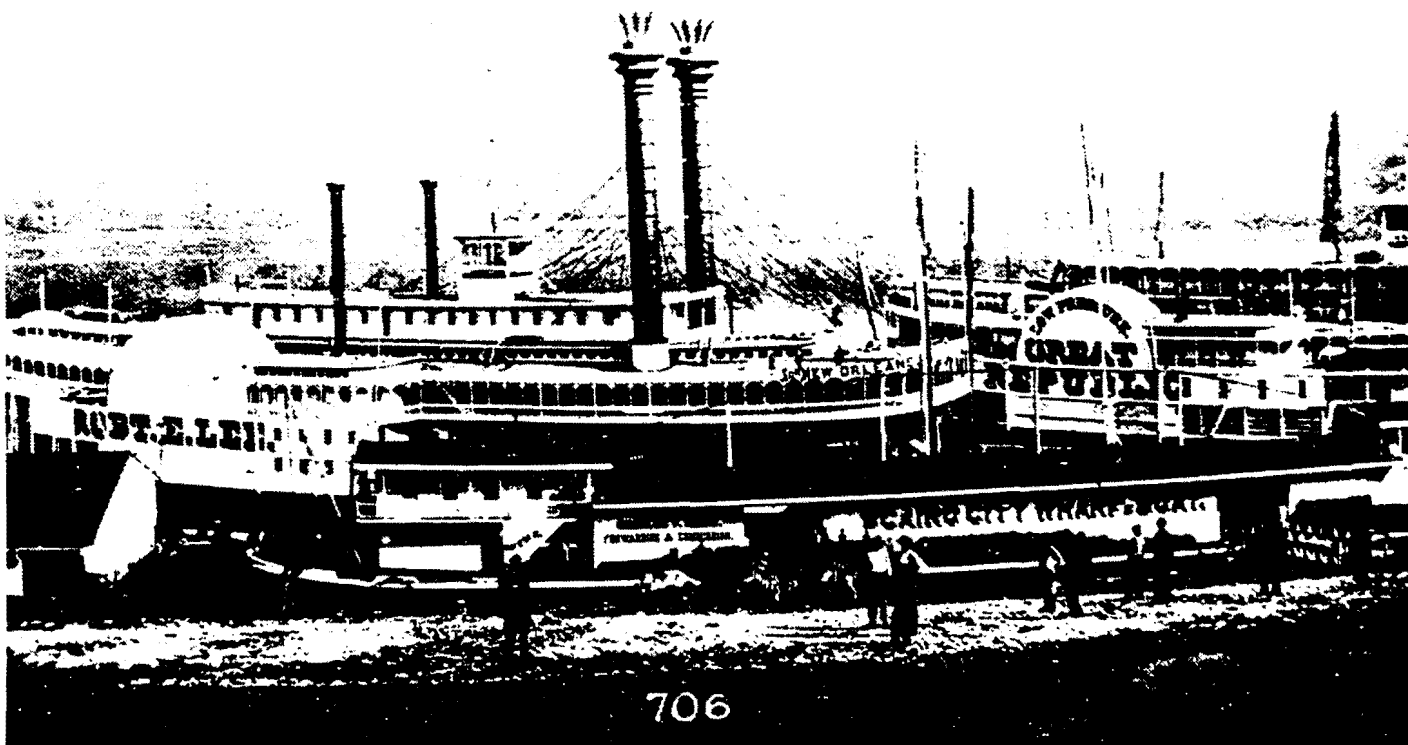
They were the parents of two sons and three daughters.

James A. Pell was a pilot on the Robert E. Lee when it made its famous race with the Natchez in 1870. It was said the race was won largely because James Pell, the pilot from Cairo to St. Louis, knew that stretch of the river so well he kept the Lee at full speed in the fog that caused the Natchez to slow down. The crew on the Robert E. Lee was Capt. John W. Cannon, Master; James Pell and J. Wess Connor, pilots. Way's Directory of Western Rivers Steam Towboats, '54 and '55 Edition had the following to say about the race:

"The rivals left New Orleans on the afternoon of June 30, 1870 shortly after 5 p.m. They didn't get off to an even start; the Lee was a few minutes in the lead, a lead which she maintained and gradually increased. At no time were the two boats side by side, contrary to Currier and Ives Art. The Frank Pargoud met the Lee in midstream at Lake Washington with fuel flats and ran alongside, moored to the Lee while the fuel was transferred. This act raised a hue and cry from the Natchez camp, who considered the Frank Pargoud

rendered aid to the Lee's speed. At Helena, the boats were about an hour apart. At Memphis, they were 1 hour and 3 minutes apart. At Cairo, they were 1 hour, 10-1/4 minutes apart. At 11:25 a.m. on July 4, 1870, the Robert E. Lee landed at St. Louis. At 6 o'clock that evening, the Natchez limped in having been detained by fog and minor engine breakdowns. Gold watches were snapped shut and the official time was set at 3 days, 18 hours, 14 minutes for the victorious Robert E. Lee, a record no commercial boat since has beaten. Lee burned about 12,000 bushels of coal on the run."

James Pell was also pilot on the NEW MARY HOUSTON.

James A. Pell died June 23, 1916 at Covington, Ky. His wife, Emma, died January 4, 1927 of apoplexy at 11 Sterrate Avenue, Covington, Kentucky.

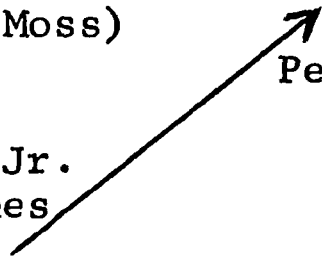

WILLIAM PELL, JR.

Third son of William, Sr. and Margaret Pell, born 1790 in Virginia. He moved with his parents to Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky, and was married there on January 18, 1812, to Louvisa (or Luvicia) Weatherington. Three of his children were born there, Elizabeth, Mary and Joseph Barber. In 1818, he moved to Harrison County, Indiana, where he resided until about the year 1832, at which time he and his family settled in Rosiclare, Hardin County, Ill.

When he came to Illinois, this was new country. In 1842, he discovered fluorspar and lead on his land, and he started the Rosiclare Fluorspar and Lead Mining Co. For many years, the town was known as "Pell's Landing", where he operated a wood yard, supplying wood for fuel for steamboats. He and his sons flatboated and loaded boats with farm products from the South.

Rosiclare is on the Ohio River, and it was said that Mr. Pell often took young men into his home that had come down the river on the flatboats and gave them a home. Once, on a trading trip to Metropolis, Illinois, he met a young man by the name of Kibler, and becoming interested in him, asked him to go home with him, which he did. Later, this young man married into the family.

William Pell, Jr. died at the age of 72 on August 16, 1862. His wife, Louvisa, was born in 1795 and died in

1865 at age 70. Both are buried in the cemetery, located on Pell Street, in Rosiclare, Illinois.

William Pell, Jr.'s will is as follows:

"I, William Pell, being sound in mind, do make this my last will and testament. It is my desire that out of the personal property I possess that the sum of Ten dollars be given to each of my children (to wit) Elizabeth Downey, Barber Pell, Margaret Madden, Timothy Pell and Jane Kenney. Then the balance to be equally divided between my wife, Louvice Pell, and my son, Daniel W. Pell.

It is also my desire that my wife will always live with my son, Webster, and he shall be her agent and hold any property she may have forever.

In testimony whereof, I have set my hand and seal this 7th day of August, 1862.

HOW ROSICLARE DERIVED ITS NAME

The following article was clipped from a former issue of the Sentinel and shows how Rosiclare derived its name:

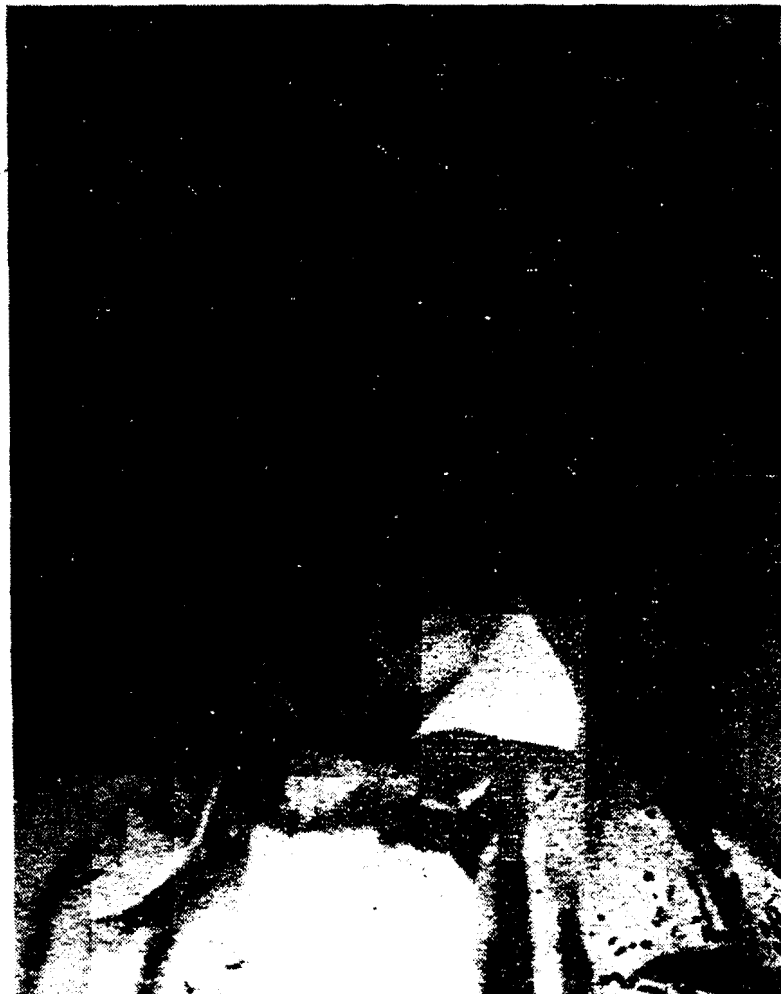
Mrs. Sarah Woods, widow of the late Alfred Woods of this place, is lying dangerously ill at the home of Mr. Howard, her son-in-law. At this writing she is some better and the prospects are she will recover. We trust she may for our little community can ill afford to lose such worthy people. The best years of her life have been passed in Rosiclare. She has witnessed the town blossom from a woodyard to a thriving village and remembers distinctly the day when the first boulder of spar or lump of lead was exhumed from the ground; when the Chateaux, the Valleys and the La Graffs of St. Louis started their first shaft, the era of mine operations in Rosiclare began. She remembers when a party given at the home of William Pell, in those early days of the village, when the Barbours, the Chateaux, the Valleys, and other distinguished company was present, the honor of giving the place a name was by unanimous consent, bestowed upon the prettiest lady in the house, and the lot fell to handsome "Polly Pell" (Mary Pell) and she bequeathed to posterity Rosi Clare, Rosi (RED) and Clare (EARTH) red earth. Rosi Clare is a Spanish name and means 'red earth'. Later, the two words have been combined and now we have Rosiclare.

No doubt Major Howe was given a wrong 'scent' when he wrote his French bride how the town was named."

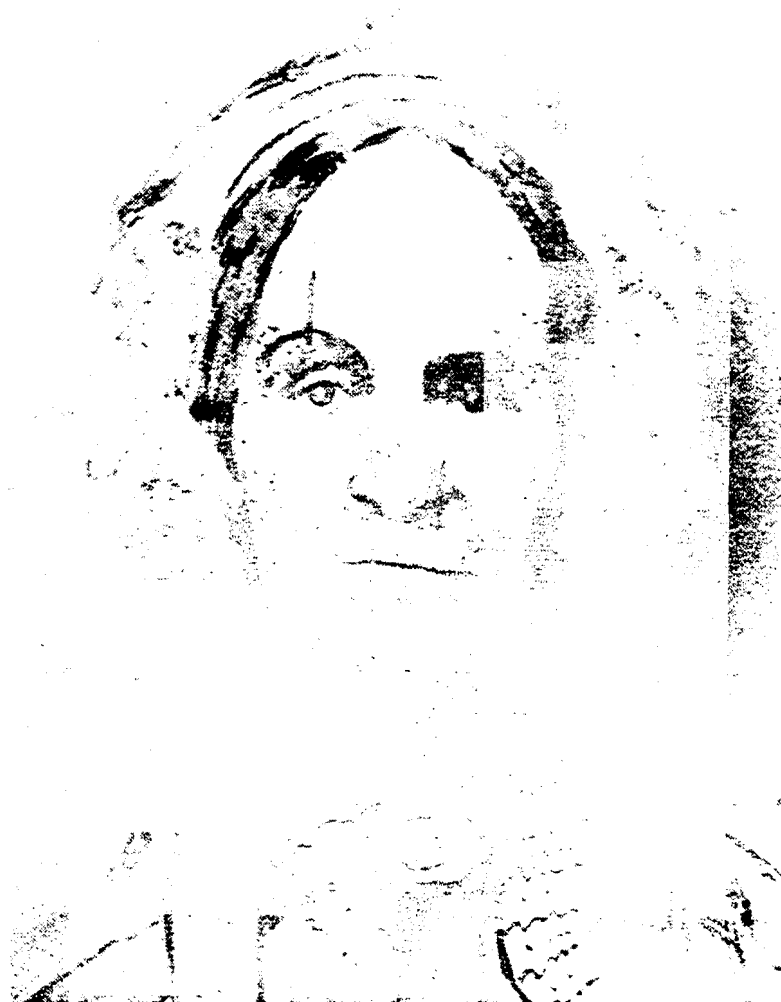

NANCY PELL

The first record we have of Nancy Pell is in Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky, where the records show her marriage to Aaron Baker on December 17, 1811. She was born in Virginia, probably about 1793. Aaron Baker was shown on tax records of Bracken County from 1797 through 1816.

On July 1, 1823, property was deeded from Pell to Aaron Baker in Harrison County, Indiana, so it is certain that Nancy and her husband journeyed down the Ohio River with the rest of the Pell family when it left Augusta, Ky. In 1830, the U. S. census listed them in Mt. Vernon (Posey County), Indiana.

The following will of Aaron Baker is recorded in the Posey County, Indiana court house in Will Book 1:

"In the Name of God, Amen.

I, Aaron Baker, of the town of Mount Vernon, Posey County, in the State of Indiana, do make, declare and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, hereby revoking and making void all former wills by me at any time heretofore made.

First, I resign my soul into the hands of Almighty God, hoping and believing in a remitian of sins by the merrits and mediations of Jesus Christ and my boddy I commit to the earth to be decently interred and that my funeral be conducted in a manner corresponding with my estate and situation in life and as to such worldly estate as it has pleased God to intrust me with, I dispose of the same in the following manner, namely, I direct first that all my just

debts and funeral expenses be paid as soon after my decease as possible out of the first moneys that shall come to the hands of my executor from any portion of my estate.

I also give and bequeath unto my son, John Baker, and to his heirs and assigns forever, one-third part of lot No. Eleven commencing at the ally and running northwest with Main Street twenty-four feet - running westwardly one hundred and forty feet to the ally being the south part of the said lot adjoining to the Parker Store house in Williams Part of the town of Mount Vernon. Also lots No. 41, 42 and 43 with all the improvements thereon, also the steam mill and all lands attached to it with all the machinery thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining thereunto. Subject nevertheless to the following annuity, he, the said John Baker is to furnish my wife, Nancy Baker, with a sufficiency of flour and meal for the consumption of her family during the time the said mill may remain in his possession.

Also, I give and bequeath unto my daughter, Elizabeth Craig and her heirs after her, one-third part of Lot No. 11 in Williams part of the town of Mount Vernon beginning on Main Street at the corner adjoining the property now owned by W. Park, running with Main St. twenty-four feet toward the river and running westwardly one hundred and forty feet to the ally. Also Lot No. 74 in said town and four hundred dollars in cash or cash notes at the option of my executor within 13 months after this takes effect.

I also give and bequeath to my daughter, Jane Wathel (Walthall) and her heirs after her, all that tract or parcel of land lying and being and adjoining to Big Creek known as the Walls tract and adjoining the Black Mill land containing two hundred and twenty four acres with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging.

Also, I give and bequeath to my daughter, Mary Baker and her heirs, the north half of Lot No. 23 in Williams part of the town of Mt. Vernon with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining.

Also, I give and bequeath to my daughter, Nancy Baker, and her heirs, one-third of Lot No. 11, being that part of said lot lying between John Baker's and

Elizabeth Craig's part of said lot No. 11, being 24 feet on Main Street and running 140 feet back to the ally, also fifteen acres of land lying and being in Posey County and State of Indiana and known as the Trafford Land being one and $\frac{1}{2}$ miles North of Mt. Vernon and on the west side of the Harmony Road, also the east half of Lot No. 27 in the town of Mt. Vernon and also eight hundred dollars in cash to be paid to her on the day she arrives to years of eighteen. Nevertheless, if said Nancy Baker should enter into a marriage contract with such a man as my executor or Nancy Baker, my wife, should think unsafe to have the management of said eight hundred dollars, in that case, the said John Baker is to invest said money in real estate to be deeded to her and her heirs.

Also, I give and bequeath unto my daughter, Matilda Baker, and to her heirs, the north half of Lot #26 in Williams part of Mt. Vernon, with all improvements thereon, and also \$700 in cash to be paid to her at the day she arrives at years of 18. Nevertheless, if said Matilda Baker should enter into a marriage contract with such a man as my executor or Nancy Baker, my wife, should think unsafe to have the management of said seven hundred dollars, in that case, the said John Baker is to invest said money in real estate to be deeded to her and her heirs.

Also, I give and bequeath to my friend, William Daniels, a certain sorrel saddle horse, saddle and bridle, the horse known by the name of Paddy.

Also I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Nancy Baker, the use of all the real estate bequeathed unto Mary, Nancy and Matilda Baker during her life or widowhood. Also, my household and kitchen furniture of whatever nature; also she is to receive from my executor \$700 in cash from any money belonging to my estate.

All the rest and residue of my estate whatsoever and wheresoever of what nature, kind and quality soever the same may be, and not hereinbefore given and disposed of after payment of my debts, legacies and funeral expenses, I do give and bequeath unto my wife, Nancy Baker, and my son, John Baker, and to their executors, administrators and assigns, to and for their own proper use and benefit absolutely, to be equally divided between them, share and share.

Nevertheless that part of my personal estate that may remain in the hands of my wife, Nancy Baker, at the time of her death is to be equally divided among the forenamed legatees (William Daniels only excepted). Also the said John Baker is to settle up the said estate as executor, free of any charge for his personal services, and I do hereby constitute and appoint my son, John Baker, sole executor of this my last will and testament, and I do hereby expressly declare that my said executor, his executor or executors, shall not be charged or chargeable with or accountable for more of the aforesaid monies or estate than he shall actually receive or come to his respective hands by virtue of this my will, or with or for any lap which may happen so as such lap happen without default or neglect, and also that it shall be lawful for him, my said executor, out of the residue of my personal estate to deduct and reimburse himself for all costs, charges and expenses as he may sustain, expend or be put into for or by reason of the performance of this my will, or the management or execution thereof respectively, or any other thing in anywise relating thereto.

In witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 28th day of June in the year of our Lord, 1842.

(Will recorded 3/21/1863)

John Baker, son of Aaron Baker, also left a will, which was recorded in Will Book 2, page 313, Posey County, Indiana, and was presented for probate on June 30th, 1852. It is as follows:

"I, John Baker, of Mount Vernon, Posey Co., Indiana, do make this my last will and testament.

First, I give and bequeath to my wife, America Baker, the real property on which I now live, including my dwelling and the grist mill situated on the Bank of the River near the mouth of Mill -- with the engines, machinery, furniture, fixtures and all tools and apparatus pertaining to the same and also all my household property and furniture and the cow and calf now used by my family, to have and to hold the same during her natural life with full permission to use and dispose of such personal property for her own use and comfort as she may see fit and I hereby declare that this provision is not in any way to interfere with her right of dower or share in the distribution of my property but she is in all other matters pertaining to my estate to be endowed in the same manner as if this will was not made.

It is my wish that Noble Craig shall take the mill and put it in repair and use and occupy the same free from any other charge except the taxes thereon until my oldest or one of my children shall arrive at the age of twenty-one years.

I give and bequeath to my mother an annuity of one hundred dollars per year during her life in full of all claims or demands she may have against my estate.

I give to my natural son, James Baker, one thousand dollars to be paid to him by my executor at the age of 21 years if my executor shall think his conduct and habits are such that he can be entrusted with the same. If not, then the said sum to be divided as my other property among my wife and children. Provided that my executor shall pay all necessary charges of said James that may accrue from sickness or disability of body. I order and direct that my executor shall keep the lower mill in operation until the present stock of grain materials and hogs are worked off and then to lease or sell said mill and any part or all the land and houses connected with the said mill property as he may think most advisable, giving him full discretion and power to sell and convey the same as he may think best.

I hereby appoint my friend, Noble Craig, of Mount Vernon, executor of this my last will.

Witness my hand and seal this 15th day of June, 1852.

Codicil to this my will made at the same time
with my will.

I authorize, empower and direct my said executor to
make a quitclaim deed to any property devised to my

The following is a will of another of Nancy and
Aaron's children, Elizabeth Craig:

"In the name of God, Amen.

I, Elizabeth Craig, of Mt. Vernon, County of Posey
and State of Indiana, do make and publish this my
last will and testament, hereby revoking all and
every will heretofore made by me.

I do give, devise and bequeath all of the property,
real, personal and mixed which I have inherited or
I am entitled to receive from my Uncle Abram Baker
of Augusta, Bracken County, State of Kentucky, de-
ceased, and all such interest in the property owned
by said Abram Baker at the time of his death which
I have purchased or may own or be entitled to at
the time of my death by inheritance, devise, pur-
chase or deed, to my beloved husband, Noble Craig,
absolutely and in fee simple in case he should sur-
vive me, and in case I should survive him, then I
do give, devise, and bequeath all the property a-
bove mentioned to my beloved friends, Fannie Boat-
wright and Louis Farrar, absolutely and in fee sim-
ple.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand
and seal on the 16th day of March, 1887.

In Deed Book F, page 629, Massac County, Illinois,
on the 5th day of January, 1858, a mortgage is recorded

from Mitchell Pell of Massac County, Illinois, to Mrs. Nancy Baker (his sister) of Mount Vernon, Indiana, in the amount of \$700.00 on one brick house and lot in Brooklyn, Illinois, so Nancy Pell Baker was still living as late as 1858, at about age 65.

An old picture of Nancy Pell found in the possession of William Pell, Jr.'s great-granddaughter, Ruth Pell Lamar, of Rosiclare, Illinois, bore this remark on the back:

"Nancy Baker, sister of Grandpa William Pell"

SAMUEL B. PELL

Son of William Pell, Sr. and Margaret Pell, born in Virginia in 1796.

Samuel B. Pell went to Kentucky with his father and mother when a small child and grew to manhood in Bracken County, Kentucky. In 1814, he married Elizabeth Curtis, who was born in the State of New Jersey in 1796 of Welsh descent. Her father was a Quaker and a civil engineer.

After his marriage, Samuel B. Pell turned his attention to boating and in 1839, settled in Lewisport, Ky. He also served as Sheriff of Hancock County for 14 years and represented that County in the Legislature in 1855 and 1856.

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The City of Pellville, Kentucky was named after Mr. Pell. Although no Pells lived there, he rode often through the town when Sheriff and also started the Post Office there, and the town was named after him.

Elizabeth Pell died in 1844 and on April 1st, 1847, Samuel B. Pell married Sarah Deane Howe. He was the father of 9 children, Nancy Pell (Schoolfield), M. C. Pell, Joseph Curtis Pell, William Curt Pell, George Washington Pell, (marriage records in Hancock Co. Court House show Jane Pell married to Craig L. Harris on August 30, 1853, brother, Jesse Pell, married at Samuel B. Pell's) and since the marriage date is the same year as William C. Pell, we

assume that Jane and Jesse are also children of Samuel B. and Elizabeth Curtis Pell. By Sarah D. Howe, he had a son, Charles G. Pell, who died at the age of 4 years. Of the ninth child, we have no record. The 1850 census of Hancock County shows a Mollie Pell, age 25, with one son, Sam, age 4, but we do not know to which son of Samuel she was married.

Samuel Pell died in 1864 while holding the office of Sheriff. The following will is recorded in Hawesville, county seat of Hancock County, Kentucky:

"I, Samuel B. Pell, of County of Hancock and State of Kentucky, do make, publish and declare this as my last will and testament:

First: I give and bequeath to Nancy Schoolfield, my only daughter now living, the sum of (\$200.00) which will be paid to her in eight installments (\$25.00) each yearly. The first payment to be made on the first day of the second month succeeding my death and each succeeding payment to be made on the same day of the same month in each succeeding year until she has received the above named sum of \$200.00.

Second: I now give to Sarah Pell, my wife, all of my remaining personal property which she is to hold and use as her own as long as she may live, and at her death, I hereby give and bequeath to William C. Pell, Jr., my grandson, whatever she may leave to keep and hold as his own, provided that he remains with his grandmother (Sarah Pell) and takes care of her as long as she may live.

At Lewisport, Hancock Co., Ky. July 20, 1864.

/s/ Samuel B. Pell"

The other child possibly was John D. Pell.

They were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

Ann Caroline Blincoe Pell's will is recorded in Hawesville, county seat of Hancock County, Kentucky, and

is as follows:

"First: I give entirely to my two sons, Tom B. and Jo C. all the notes I hold against them, principal and any accumulated interest or any hereafter held.

Second: Any bank stock, money or any other property whatever I may have at my death, I want enough used to pay any debts I may owe and my burial expenses, the remainder to be divided into six equal parts:

one part to Tom B. Pell

one part to Jo C. Pell

one part to Ed D. Pell's children

one part to Ida P. White

one part to Carrie A. Patterson

one part to Louisa J. Brown

My object in doing this is to make my children as nearly equal in their father's estate as I can.

April 16th, 1898.

Joseph Curtis Pell wrote a brief history of the City of Lewisport, Kentucky, of the years from 1839 to 1939, which gives an interesting story of the settling and growth of this town. It is as follows:

"Shortly after the Revolutionary War, the Colonial States were much perturbed over the great migration of the people to the great unknown Western Country beyond the mountains. The main artery of travel was from the Eastern states to Fort Pitt at the head of the Ohio River, known now as Pittsburg. At this point, hundreds of scows or flat boats were built and the people started west by the way of the Ohio, encountering the dangers of an unknown river and the hostile Indians along the shores. At this point in our writing, how we wish our forefathers had left us an authentic account of the pioneer days, giving us accurate dates, locations, etc. But they were not concerned with history -- only their safety and welfare was uppermost in their minds. For this oversight, we shall have to relate from memory what our forefathers have told us of how we became citi-

zens of this great country and just how we came to be here on the banks of the Ohio River.

The record, of which we are sure, is to be found in the County Clerk's office at Hawesville, Hancock County, Kentucky. This record states that a charter was granted to our small settlement on September 15, 1839, and the name of the town was to be Lewisport, so called from the early owners of the land, which was owned at that time by the Lewis and Prentis families. Some wanted the town to be named Prentisport, as James Prentis was the first settler in Lewisport. He was closely followed by Dr. Lewis, for whom the town was named. The old family tradition is that, because of the warm friendship existing between James Prentis and Dr. Lewis, Mr. Prentis insisted that the new town be called Lewisport instead of Prentisport.

Before the town was surveyed and laid out into streets and lots, the early name was Little Yellow Banks, so called because of the river bank being so yellow and high which caused the settlers to select the site above high water. Owensboro was then called Big Yellow Banks.

Lewisport was beautifully laid out with a front main street located about 100 yards from the bluff bank. A large number of trees was directly in front of town with a race-course for horse-racing up and down in front of the town.

In these early days, there was no such thing as a steam-boat, but hundreds of flat-boats were on their way down the river to the great southern metropolis, New Orleans. The flatboats were loaded with all kinds of products such as livestock, bacon or other meat products, hay, lime, hoop-poles, and hundreds of families -- all going South and into the great unknown West.

The front of Main Street in Lewisport was built up mostly with two-story houses. About 1849, the town was destroyed by fire. Every house on front street was burned except one store building belonging to Jo C. Pell.

The town was surrounded by a vast primeval forest of immense trees. Naturally, this led to the people engaging in the lumber business. The principal

industry was the falling of the trees and logging, shipping the logs in immense rafts by floating them to the Southern markets.

Then came the whipsaw mills, and lumber was hand sawn from the logs. A great era of building flat-boats was carried on here, and shipments of local produce from Lewisport was started and continued until the coming of the steamboat. The only well defined road was the old Indian Trail starting from the Troy landing and running down to Blackford Creek where it joined the Shawnee Town and Vincennes Trail over which Tom Lincoln made his first trip with his son, Abe, to Indiana in 1816. In later years, the river was supplied with all kinds of steamboats and steam tow-boats. The business was so great the boats could hardly handle the great traffic. The passenger boats developed into beautiful and palatial steamers, which plied the Ohio, Mississippi and other great Western waters. Steamers made regular trips running from Pittsburg to New Orleans, and as far up the Mississippi as St. Paul.

The only mode of travel was by water; and the only wagons were the immense ox-drawn wagons. Horse-back riding was practiced by everyone. While this transition was coming about, the small hamlet of Lewisport was being settled by many strangers, mostly from Virginia. The hamlet began to assume the appearance of a town, with the many inhabitants following their trades, such as shoe-shop owners, cabinet workers, coffin builders, and spinning and weaving their own clothes. All of the clothing was homemade.

We can hardly give a graphic description of the town without having something to relate of the early personnel of the town, giving an account of many characters, and their quaint ways and sayings which have become classic to the people of the present generation. We can remember Uncle Willy Colbert, Judge Kinchelea Patterson, Mose Bollington, Dean Robinson, James W. Haywood, George Jones and Phil Lott. The witty Frank Bollington (old Bollie) and George Winters (old geese) are good matches for Mark Twain's Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn. These are boyhood memories and shall never be forgotten. Few people can remember that at one time in early history, we had a Queens Ware factory here, run by an Englishman named Boston. (The

old factory was here as long as the '80's). A chair shop where home-made furniture was made was run by the Inman family and located in the western part of town on Front Street.

Candle molds were in every home. The first kerosene lamp brought to Lewisport was in 1858 and is owned by Jo C. Pell. At one time we had a coal railroad run in from the mines south of the town to the river to load boats with coal, for all the steamboats used wood, and there were numerous woodyards along the river. One run by the Emmick family.

The first permanent store was a log cabin store run by Jo C. Pell, one of the pioneer merchants, having had started in 1841, and run continuously until 1896. W. Curt Pell was at one time associated with Jo C. Pell, but he died at an early age. He was married and had a family. His sons were William Pell, Jefferson and Sam B. Pell. Edward Gregory was one of our largest tobacco merchants. He had a large family and was the father of J. Sam, Henry, Eli, Clebourne, and Mrs. Una Higdon; all residents of our town except Eli and Clebourne.

The first merchants were Ray and Hambleton, Jo C. Pell, I. B. Hayden & Son, Thaddens Dulin, and Ab Howe. James W. Haywood, Charles Martin, William Pate, H. L. Meyers and J. W. Patterson were among our early druggists. Two of the pioneer school teachers were Mr. John Clark and Mrs. Annie Morton. The Lewisport Band and Orchestra were organized in 1892 and were well known musical organizations until 1913. Our music teachers were Mrs. K. Smith, Mrs. Annie Morton, Mrs. Ida White and Mrs. Annie Hayden.

The first meeting place of worship was down at Uncle Jimmy Morris', near where Waitman Station now stands, where the traveling preachers came two or three times a year. The people of Lewisport went over the old Indian Trail to the home to worship. One of the preachers, Rev. John Daviess, was the great-grandfather of the writer. Later a church was erected where the Abe Callendar's black smith shop once stood on the McClain-Reynolds' home lot. This church was used by all denominations. In 1858 the old brick Methodist Church was built. This old brick church had a celebrated bell.

It was very sweet with its silver tones. This bell was from the sunken steamer 'Church' and was presented to the church by old Mrs. Lowry, sister to Gov. Helm. The Baptist Church was organized October 1, 1859, with the following members: Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Callander, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Prentis, Mr. and Mrs. Elias McDonald, Rachael Teasley, Mr. and Mrs. Kinchelea Patterson. They elected as their first pastor, Rev. Hardin Haynes Ellis. The present Baptist Church was erected in 1872 and dedicated September 1882. One month Mrs. Bettie Lambert joined the church. She is now the only member living who was a member at the time of the dedication. Later, the colored people erected Methodist and Baptist churches. The Catholic Church has been here since the Civil War, a new one being erected in 1939. The Presbyterian Church was built about 50 years ago, having for their first pastor, Rev. Morrison.

Among our early doctors were Dr. Stapp, who later became a celebrated physician in St. Louis, Missouri. Others were Dr. Slaughter, Dr. Lewis, the two Knoxes, Dr. Walker Brown, Dr. Prentis, Dr. Ireland, Dr. Bright and Dr. Martin. Later there were Drs. J. W. Griffin, Plitt, F. M. Sherman, P. L. Berkshire and Dr. Ashby.

In 1882, the beautiful Front Street began to crumble and cave into the river until, finally we have but four of the original houses left on the front street. The town gradually began to move to other back streets, making Fourth Street the principal business street of the town."

In Lewisport, Kentucky, at the corner of 4th and Pell Streets, stands a huge old Cypress tree in the yard of Rose Pell Henderson, granddaughter of the original owner of the home, Jo C. Pell. The following is a history of that landmark, as told by Mrs. Henderson:

"When the cruel guns of the Civil War were silenced in the swamps of Louisiana, a weary soldier by the name of Prentice turned his tired horse toward home. Home to him was a landing on the banks of the Ohio: we call it Lewisport.

Suddenly, he realized he had no presents for the

loved ones he had left behind. Without money, the situation seemed hopeless. Then he noticed the small trees in the black stinking mud where he was leaving so many buddies.

It was not difficult to extract two small Cypresses, roots and all, from the odorous soil. Now, he had gifts and he was going where his heart had never left.

Prentice gave one small sprout to Caroline. She loved and watered it -- now, one block from a street sign that bears her name, a living monument remembers her."

Also, the following two stories are told by Mrs. Henderson about her grandmother, Caroline Pell:

"There was no great battle at Lewisport during the Civil War, but armies and guerrillas who lived off the land left nothing as they advanced and retreated. Caroline and her young husband, Jo, saw what little they had acquired, leaving.

So far the gold had not been found, but horses, furniture and everything else was gone. To add to her troubles, the bumble bees had taken over Caroline's hop vines, so how was she to make yeast? She noticed that even the soldiers avoided that part of the yard, and suddenly, an idea came to her mind. One morning before the family was awake, Caroline dug a deep hole just under the bumble bee nest. Again and again she was stung, but she did not hesitate until the gold was safely under ground. When the family came to breakfast, her blue eyes were closing and the two weeks she spent in bed recovering were painful.

The vigorous old vine yet comes up each spring, however, no one will harvest its buds. Yeast has been purchased at the grocery store since that time."

* * * * *

"The supper was over and Venie had washed the dishes. Caroline came into the warm spacious kitchen with its log burning cheerfully. Joe had gone back to the general store on the river. His hours were from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m.

After the young husband had left, Caroline was

always restless. The war was over, but there were so many men with no place to go. Just a week before, as she stood at the gate waiting for him to come home, she had seen a man following him.

Caroline walked out the kitchen door and stood looking across the cornfield that came close to the back of the house. Her attention was drawn to something like a moan coming from the field.

Suffering had always drawn her, so she did not hesitate to follow the sound. This small woman was soon leaning over a large unconscious young negro man. The negro ex-slaves who had never left and were living in the cabins in the back yard, soon had this stranger into a warm house.

Caroline soon recognized pneumonia. Night after night, she worked over this tragic figure. At last, he opened his eyes, eyes that showed sorrow. Charlie did not recover quickly; he seemed tired. Garden time came and at last, Charlie showed interest in something. He asked if he might help, and soon it became his garden. It was evident that he knew what he was doing. Caroline's children, and years later, her grandchildren, loved him. He stayed on, working at any job where he was needed, mostly finding his own jobs.

When Jo next paid the farm hands their wages, he offered Charlie his pay, but Charlie asked Jo to keep his money for him. Several years went by and one spring morning, Charlie asked for his accumulated wages. For the first time, it was learned that his wife and small daughter had been sold down the river just before the war ended. Pneumonia had stopped his first search.

Charlie was gone nearly a year, looking for his loved ones, but he came back alone. As long as Charlie was able to make the trip every few years, he traveled down the river, but all in vain. He never complained, but his eyes told his suffering and it became evident that this kind old man's long search for his loved ones here on earth was coming to an end. But, Charlie was restless. Caroline and Jo were dead, but the old negro had stayed on at the old home with their son, Joe, and his family.

One day, this son, Joe, stood beside the tired

old man's bed and insisted on knowing what was troubling him. He learned that Charlie was a Catholic and was afraid to die without seeing a priest. As there was no church in Lewisport, Joe made his way to Owensboro and went into the first Catholic Church he saw. There he told his story and soon he and a priest were on their way back to Lewisport. The priest stayed several days with the Pells. Death came quietly to Charlie after his visit. I like to imagine two people were waiting for him."

* * * * *

The following is the will of Thos. Blincoe Pell, one of the sons of Joseph Curtis Pell, recorded in Hawesville, Hancock County, Kentucky:

"It is my will that all of my estate, both real and personal, shall go to my son, Tom B. Pell, Jr., after all of my debts and obligations are paid.

I also want Miss Flora M. Blincoe to be provided for out of the earnings of my estate as long as she and my son, Tom B. Pell, are living together, and in the event that my son, Tom B. Pell, should not survive her, I want her to share equally with the next heirs to my estate. It is my wish that any expenses incurred by Flora M. Blincoe in raising my son, Tom B. Pell, Jr. shall be paid to her out of my estate.

The interest I hold in the firm of Pell Bros. I wish to remain as it is, unless it is seen best to dispose of it for the interest of my estate.

In the event I should not survive my son and he is still an infant, and my brother, J. C. Pell, survives, I do not want him to be appointed as guardian over my son, Tom B. Pell, Jr., as he is so under the influence of his wife that I would fear for the interest of my son, so it is my wish and will that some good, honest and capable person be appointed to act as his guardian.

I wish that a sufficient amount of funds of my estate be reserved to erect a suitable monument to my wife's grave and my own grave if such has not been erected to my wife's grave before my death.

All of my personal property, such as bank stock,

mining stock, interests in patents, stock of merchandise, store fixtures, cash and other stocks and holdings are to be appraised so the guardian can keep accurate account of same.

I. Nancy A. Pell, daughter of Samuel, married William B. Schoolfield. They were the parents of at least 5 children: Isaac, J. B., Mary Jane, Laura and Lucy C. The graves of William B. Schoolfield and Isaac Schoolfield are found in the Lewisport Cemetery, Lewisport, Kentucky, but no markers were found of the others. After William B. Schoolfield died, the children wanted their mother, Nancy, to move to Spencer County, Indiana, to live with one of her daughters, and at her death, they would bring her back to Lewisport for burial. Records were found of marriages of three of these children in Spencer County (Rockport), Indiana.

II. M. C. Pell, born February 23, 1820, died January 27th, 1857. This information on monument in cemetery at Lewisport, Kentucky.

III. Joseph Curtis Pell, third child of Samuel and Elizabeth Curtis Pell, was born in Bracken County, Kentucky, on June 5, 1822. He was the third of a family of nine children. He received his education in Trimble County, Kentucky and turned to boating for a living which he followed for 10 years. After this, he entered the merchandising business in Lewisport with his brother, William Curt Pell. He was married to Ann Caroline Blincoe on June 6, 1848. She was the daughter of B. B. and Louisa J. (Daviess) Blincoe. Her father was from Virginia, her mother a niece of Col. Joe Daviess for whom Daviess County was named. She was born in Daviess County July 18th, 1832. They were the parents of 10 children:

IV. William Curt Pell, another son, was married to Elizabeth Ruth Howe, (who was a daughter of Sarah Howe, second wife of William Curt Pell's father, Samuel B. Pell), and by her had two sons, Thomas Jefferson Pell and William Curtis Pell, and a daughter, Sarah E. Pell, who died at one year. Elizabeth Howe Pell died in Lewisport, Kentucky in 1852 of the measles at the age of 25. On June 13, 1853, William Curt Pell married Mary Boldof (Bauldauf) and to this marriage was born one son, Samuel B. Pell. William Curt Pell died at an early age and his widow married I. B. Hayden. In deed book 17, page 433, the following is recorded:

"Deed by and between Samuel B. Pell, one of the heirs and representatives of William C. Pell, deceased, of Hancock County, Ky., I. B. Hayden and wife, Mary (Pell) Hayden, his wife, and I. B. Hayden, as guardian for S. B. Pell, infant under 21 years of age, land conveyed on the 25th of January, 1858, to William C. Pell (now deceased) the father of the said S. B. Pell, Mary Hayden, late widow of said William C. Pell, deceased."

V. George Washington Pell, another son of Samuel, married Sarah F. Blincoe and had one daughter, Jennie Joe, and a son, George W. Pell, who died at 2 years of age. Jennie Joe married Dr. James William Knox, and to this marriage were born two children, Lila Rose Knox and Beulah Ethel Knox. Beulah Ethel Knox died at age 5.

VI. Jane Pell, married to Craig L. Harris on August 30th, 1853, at the home of Samuel B. Pell, in company of her brother, Jesse Pell.

ABRAHAM PELL

This son of William and Margaret Pell was born in 1797 in Augusta County, Ky. He moved with his family to Harrison County, Indiana, and records in the Court House show that he was married to Matilda Madden on October 27, 1822. They were still living in Harrison County, Indiana, town of Laconia, as late as 1838. A deed was dated July 20th, 1837 and recorded as of April 3, 1838, from James Pell and Elizabeth Pell of the County of McCracken, to Abraham Pell of County of Harrison, State of Indiana.

Abraham Pell died January 7, 1861 -- 64 years of age, in Paducah, Kentucky. His funeral was held at the residence of C. W. Harrison. James Pell and C. W. Harrison were appointed administrators of his estate in McCracken County Court on January 14, 1861. On January 17, 1861, on motion of James Pell, it was ordered that W. W. Herndon, John W. Sauver and John Farrar be appointed appraisers of Abraham Pell's estate. Final settlement was made by the administrators on March 9, 1863.

It is not known where Matilda Madden Pell is buried or when she died. There is a Madden cemetery in Laconia, Harrison County, Indiana, but time has destroyed all monuments and there are no death records.

There is no record of the children of Abraham and Matilda Pell, however, one of his granddaughters, Florence

Pell, who died June 25, 1967 at the age of 87 years, thought there were about 11, but most died with tuberculosis.

We are certain of four children, however, Isaac Newton Pell, James Pell, Marinda Pell Harrison and Caroline Pell Slaughter.

Isaac Newton Pell was born in Harrison County, Ind. in 1832. He was married in Paducah, Kentucky on April 5th, 1876 to Ella Yeiser, and the following is a record of their marriage license:

Mr. D. A. Yeiser was surety on their marriage bond.

Isaac Newton Pell was a steamboat captain from Louisville to New Orleans. He died in April 1939. Ella Yeiser was born June 12, 1851 and died February 3, 1938 at 87 years. Both are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Paducah, Ky. They were the parents of 2 children, Florence Pell, born 1881, died June 25, 1967 in Paducah, Kentucky, buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, and Isaac Newton Pell, Sr.

Another son of Abraham and Matilda Pell, James Pell, was born in 1828 in Indiana. He was supposed to have been on a Confederate gunboat during the Civil War. He was married on August 14, 1856 to Rebecca Thomas. She died in

1863 of childbed fever, and James Pell died in 1865. They left two small children, Ella and Henry, who lived with their grandmother Thomas from 1860 to 1875, until she died. R. M. Harding was appointed guardian of the children in 1868. After Mrs. Thomas died, they went to live with their "Aunt Minnie" Harrison, (Marinda Pell Harrison). Later they went to Dyersburg, Tennessee, to live with their Uncle Beverly Thomas.

Ella Pell was born February 13, 1860. She married Thomas Lee Wells on February 26, 1879. They were the parents of 5 children. Ella Pell Wells died July 2, 1939 and Mr. Wells died August 24, 1925. They are buried in Dyersburg, Tenn.

Henry J. Pell, born 5/7/1857 and died ?, never married. He is buried in the old City Cemetery, Dyersburg, Tenn.

Marinda Pell, daughter of Abraham and Matilda Pell, was born in Indiana in 1831. She married Charles W. Harrison, who was a steamboat captain. She was known as "Aunt Minnie". They were the parents of a daughter, Caroline, who married a Dr. Allen. Caroline and Dr. Allen had a daughter, Marinda, who never married as far as is known.

The records indicate Abraham and Matilda Pell had another daughter, Caroline, who was married to William W. Slaughter, and that they had a son, Jim Slaughter, but there is no positive proof if Caroline was Abraham's daughter.

THOMAS M. PELL

Records show he was married in Harrison County, Indiana to Elizabeth Boone on February 10, 1830.

On August 5th, 1830, James Pell and Elizabeth, his wife, deeded to Elizabeth Pell, (formerly Elizabeth Boone) property in Harrison County, Indiana.

In Dyersburg, Tennessee, in 1962, during a visit in the home of Mrs. S. R. Blakeman, great-granddaughter of Abraham Pell, an old wallet was displayed, bearing the inscription "Thos. M. Pell, August 17, 1829".

No other deeds or records have been found concerning him.

ELIZABETH PELL

Elizabeth Pell was listed in Harrison County, Indiana, marriage licenses as having married Daniel Lockhart on October 15, 1826. Since several other marriages of the Pell family took place in Harrison County, Indiana between the years 1822 and 1830, we feel certain Elizabeth Pell was a sister to the others written of in this book.

CHARLES PELL

Son of William Pell, Sr. and Margaret Pell, born in Kentucky, possibly Augusta, Bracken County, about 1805.

In 1818, his family moved to Laconia, in Harrison County, Indiana, which is about 2 miles off the Ohio River.

He was married the first time to Priscilla Cable on February 13, 1827, by Lyman Leslie, J. P. in Laconia, Harrison County, Indiana, both lawful age, celebrated on February 15, 1827. They had one child born in Indiana, Ella, born May 28, 1827.

Priscilla and Charles Pell came to Paducah from Harrison Co., Ind. sometime around 1833. The following article found in Kentucky, a History of the State by Battle (B) gives a clue as to when they first arrived here:

"On May 2, 1831, the first election for Trustees was held at the home of George Dunn. The minutes of the council session of May 5, 1831 contain these items: 'All persons be required to move their fences and houses out of the streets, their keel boats to be prohibited from landing in front of the town.' 'Gen. Clark, having given the town several lots, was exempted from taxation.' 'Value of taxable property, real and personal, including slaves, for the year 1831, \$29,270; tax levied for all purposes, 18-3/4¢ on \$100; poll tax 50¢. The assessor was allowed the services as clerk and assessor for the year, \$2.50; the collector for his services, \$3.80. Total expenses for assessor, clerk and collector, \$6.30. Total tax \$45.50.' Henry Burnett's report: 'The value on which the Richmond House now stands was sold for \$40 and the

one on the southeast side of Broadway opposite the Richmond House brought \$24.00.'

As showing the jealousy with which the early citizens of Paducah watched the actions of their officials, the following memorial in 1833, when the entire revenue of the town was but \$113.48 is inserted:

'To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Town of Paducah: It is with feelings of regret that your memorialists approach the character and standing of any public official; but being compelled by the highest obligations which can operate upon freemen, by daring usurpations and strides of power of your supervisor, in withholding the public revenue and property of your citizens from the treasurer, their lawful place of deposit, and placing same in local banks or private mercantile houses; the solvency or insolvency of which the good people of the town of Paducah cannot from the nature of those private institutions ascertain, thereby endangering the liberty and property of your memorialists; assuming power and authority not delegated by the Board of Trustees, and trampling upon the rights and sovereignty of your citizens; breaking down all corporate powers and capacities and concentrating in the hands of one man the power of supervisor and trustee, contrary to all precedent in the history of town corporations and adopting the rules of the administration of our present government and extending it down through every avenue of constitution and law, down to town corporations and bodies politic; and further, your memorialists would recommend an investigation into the conduct and acts of your supervisor and inquire of your president whether the public monies were placed in local receptacles or banks upon the president's own responsibility, making use of the supervisor as the sure agent by which it was done, thereby violating all law and precedent, and transmitting down to posterity precedents of a dangerous character and destructive to the best interests of a free, highminded and patriotic people; and further, your memorialists would recommend the public monies to be withdrawn from these private banks and placed in the hands of the treasurer, the only lawful depository of the same and your memorialists will ever pray.

The following excerpt, taken from the Poll Book of 1834, is also helpful in arriving at the year Priscilla and Charles Pell came into Paducah:

"The early settlers in and around Paducah embrace such well known families as Davies's, etc., and Pells * * *."

Their second child, Charles Alexander Pell, was born March 4, 1834 in Paducah, and according to an old newspaper clipping, was the second native born white citizen born in Paducah.

Charles Pell was a steamboat pilot. He owned much land in McCracken County and several lots in Paducah. He also owned about 1,500 acres in Massac County, Illinois, just across the river from Paducah. Quite a few deeds are recorded in the Court House in Metropolis, Massac County, Illinois, pertaining to land he owned.

On October 20, 1850, Charles Pell and Thos. G. D. Davis entered into an agreement to partition lands in Brookport and Charles Pell had the lands platted by S. B. Caldwell of Paducah in August 1850. He also operated a ferry between Paducah and Brookport and in 1865 granted one-half interest to Benjamin Harris.

It is also told that he and another man supposedly went on a note for a friend of theirs in the amount of \$60,000. Both defaulted, leaving Mr. Pell liable for payment of the note.

He owned a boat worth about \$30,000.00, which was completely destroyed by fire on the Ohio River. He also owned a nice home at 6th and Harrison Streets in Paducah, which was said to have had one of the outstanding libraries in the area. During the Civil War, his home, along with all records and his library, were burned.

By Priscilla Cable, he had eight children:

- I. Ella V. Pell, born May 28, 1827, died August 5, 1855. She married Edward N. Larmon on January 17, 1855. They had no children.
- II. Charles Alexander Pell, born March 4, 1834 in Paducah, Ky. Died June 2, 1903. He was married on August 12, 1867 to Anna Maria Stephens of Kevil, Ky. She was born April 18, 1847 and died April 20, 1928. They had six children. Married at the Broadway Methodist Church by E. C. Slater.
- III. William Pell, born in Paducah, Ky. Married Anna Townsend of St. Louis, Mo. They had one child, who died in infancy.
- IV. Mary Ann Pell, born in Paducah, Ky. Married to Dr. M. C. Woodson on October 18, 1866. Later they moved to California. They had three children.
- V. Louis Pell, born in Paducah, Ky. Married to Sally Ashbrook. They had one child, Jim Pell, who died in infancy.
- VI. Frances Pell, (known as Fanny), born in Paducah, Ky. She was married twice; the first time to Jacob Davis and the second time to Marion Boyd. They had no children.
- VII. Jesse F. Pell, born in Paducah. Married on Sept. 16, 1875 to Mary E. Price. They also lived in St. Louis, Mo. and had three children.

VIII. George Pell - Not much is known of him except that he is remembered to have been in a wheel chair and cared for by a colored man. Possibly lived to be grown.

Priscilla Cable Pell was buried in St. Louis, Mo. in Bellfontaine Cemetery.

After her death, Charles Pell married again on October 9th, 1870 to Ann Eliza Carroll of Indiana. They were married in ME Church South by W. T. Harris. She was 22 years of age and he was about 65. To this marriage were born two children:

IX. Edwin Carroll Pell, born in Paducah, Ky., died 1941, unmarried.

X. Addie Josephine Pell, born in Paducah, Ky., married George Bradshaw and moved to New York City, where she died. They had one child.

Charles Pell died December 26, 1874. He was buried from Mattil Funeral Home in Paducah, Ky. and the records show the following interesting facts: his funeral cost \$30.00 and his coffin had handles. His lot is No. 122, Section 8, in Oak Grove Cemetery. There is no marker on his grave.

After Mr. Pell's death, his second wife left Paducah and went back to Indiana with her two children but it is not known where in Indiana she is buried or anything further about her. The two children, Ed and Josephine, were brought back to Paducah when in their teens, and lived with Mrs. Fannie Boyd, their half-sister.

The following information about the children of Charles and Priscilla Pell has been gathered from relatives and old records:

I. Ella V. Pell, born in Harrison Co., Indiana on May 28, 1827. She was married in Paducah, Kentucky on January 17,

1855, to Edward N. Larmon. She died in Chicago, Illinois on August 5, 1855, but is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Paducah, Ky. She once taught the 6th grade at Lee School in Paducah. They had no children.

II. Charles Alexander Pell, born in Paducah, Kentucky, Mar. 4, 1834. He married Anna Maria Stephens of Kevil on August 12, 1867. He supposedly met her during the Civil War, when as refugees, his family stayed at the home of her uncle, Mr. Ike Davis, approximately 18 miles from Paducah. The following article appeared in the News-Democrat, newspaper of Paducah, on March 4, 1902:

"Capt. Chas. Pell, the oldest living native-born white citizen of Paducah and one of the oldest steamboat pilots on the Ohio and Tennessee Rivers,

had six children: Arthur, Walter Stewart, Ernest Howe, Florence, Edna Earl and Ethel Lowber.

1. Arthur Pell, born Paducah, Ky., 8/6/1868. When about 16 years of age, he went to Austin, Texas. He was a tinner by trade. He married while there and upon arriving home one night, was informed by his wife of improper advances by another man. Arthur, being hot-headed, went out after the man, but was shot. He died several days later at the age of 27 on April 7, 1895. The following are two old letters written to his parents from Austin, Texas concerning his death and arrangements for burial:

"Austin, Texas, June 9, 1895

Mr. Chas. A. Pell
Paducah, Ky.

Dear Sir:

Your letter came to hand and I would of answered it before this time but having gone to the Republic of Mexico on business and only got back last night, hence the delay. I desire to say that there has been an unusual delay in getting the death proof papers made out and sworn to by the proper parties here, as the most of them have been out of the city on business, and the papers had to be held on that account, and I presume by this time they are at Paducah to be completely filled out, as in this case where shipment is made of the remains of a person, there is more proof than necessary to be filled out and more red tape work to be gone through with. I'm sorry of the long delay in getting your money but a little while longer and you will get the full amount of the policy.

I had the pleasure of meeting J. C. Root, the founder of our order in this city before I left for Mexico. He expressed a desire for your claim to be hastily paid and asked me if I would go to your city and institute a camp and dedicate the monument that will be erected over Sovereign Arthur's grave on last resting place. I have received a letter from a monument firm in your city and in a few days will answer the letter. I will also send them photos of the monuments erected by us here and if they will dupli-

cate any of them, allowing you and Mrs. Pell to make the selection, we will give them the order if recommended by you to us to do so.

Mr. Pell, although 61 years of age, and having journeyed through the Forest, would it be too much to ask you, if you think it could be done and you felt young enough for the occasion to get up a Charter list of say ten or 15 members to institute a Camp of the W.O.W. I would come there and institute the Camp and dedicate the monument. The dedication ceremonies are beautiful and imposing. To organize, the cost would be \$10.00 ten dollars each person joining. I have the entire Ritual committed to memory and can perform the work creditably. But I must close. I have got together the most of the bills you asked me to attend to and in a few days will send you a copy of same and make statements in regard to them.

You asked me in regards to the last hours of My Brother Arthur. Yes. He was conscious almost to death. He suffered intensely. Opiates were administered shortly before he died to quiet him. He remarked 'I can't die until I see my mother'. I said 'Arthur, don't worry. You will rest until Mother comes'. His thoughts for home and family were paramount on his mind until he died. 'Boys, write to them for me, et. etc.' I shook his hand first of all in our order. Last of all in death. First in meeting. Last in parting. I shall never forget the ordeal. To his Mother: There has been plucked from the Tree a Rose that shall bloom in that Forest not made by hands but Eternal in the Heavens. God grant that we will meet again.

"Austin, Texas,
April 12, 1895

Mrs. Pell:

Your letter of 8th received and I thank you for your good and kind words. But no one that knew Arthur could have been other than his friend. All of my men did all they could for him and felt exceedingly sorry at his death.

His wife called in today and wanted to know if she

might to go and see you. I told her I did not know.

But you might want to see her. She is Swedish and as I said, beautiful, low and heavy set, blue eyes. I will be plain with you and say she has no means, and I guess would expect you to pay her way. Of this, I am not sure. I also think she thinks she ought to have some of the insurance money. I, of course, think so too, that any man ought to leave his wife some means of support, although his wife has her father. I will say that her father told me that she was in the family way. I told her I would ask you whether you wanted her to come to see you and would let her know.

In regard to the order you have sent me, it is not what I want and what the Lodge will accept. I have sent you a power of attorney to sign, gotten up by a notary of our Lodge which is correct and legal. Please sign and return at once and everything will be paid and balance remitted you soon as paid. This must be done as I suggest and hope you will sign and return at once, I hope. Arthur looked natural when he arrived at P_____ and had that lovely smile that he bore here.

Your letter says impracticability of giving the order. Of course you will get lots of advice, but if I can get the power of attorney, the insurance will be collected and paid as above stated."

2. Walter Stewart Pell, born in Paducah, Kentucky, on July 26, 1870. He was a well-known painting contractor, was small of stature; quiet, studious and well-informed. He was married to Nell Elizabeth Hymarsh and the father of 8 children. He died in Paducah, Kentucky on January 11, 1936 of pneumonia and is buried on the Pell lot in Oak Grove Cemetery. Mrs. Pell (who later married David Flatt) died November 10, 1963, and is buried in Maplelawn Cemetery, Paducah, Kentucky, on her son, Ernest's, lot.

3. Ernest Howe Pell, born Paducah, Kentucky, April, 1872,

known to everyone as "Polly". He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War, and later, for many years, ran a saloon and later a grocery store on No. 8th Street, Paducah, Ky. He was a large man and wore size 14 shoes. He never married, died at the age of 75 years in 1947, and is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Paducah, Ky.

4. Florence Pell, born Paducah, Kentucky on September 13, 1875. On October 25, 1893, she was married to Julian Duperrieu at Metropolis, Illinois and they were the parents of 5 children. She died September 6, 1904, at the age of 29 in childbirth, and is also buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Paducah on the Pell lot.

5. Edna Earl Pell, fifth child of Charles and Anna Maria Stephens, born in Paducah, Kentucky on July 27, 1878. She was married to Robert C. McMahan on August 6, 1903 at Paducah, Ky. Mr. McMahan was a building contractor by trade. He died July 1, 1954 and is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Paducah, Ky. Mrs. McMahan died October 16, 1961. They were the parents of 7 children.

6. Ethel Lowber Pell, was born in 1887 in Paducah, Ky. She was a very respected and well-known woman in Paducah and did much political work in the Democratic Party. At one time she was matron of the Reformatory for Women at LaGrange, Ky. She was married to George A. Hannin, who ran a sheet metal business in Paducah. Mr. Hannin was alderman, councilman and commissioner for the City of Paducah, and held office for many years. Mr. Hannin was born in 1882 and died in 1958. Mrs. Hannin died in 1946. Though she knew her days were limited if she kept up her many activities, she never consented to sit idly by and was active up until her death. They were the parents of four children.

During the year 1937, when Paducah was completely covered by waters of the Ohio River, Mrs. Hannin was living at 2503 Park Avenue, Paducah, and wrote the following letter to her niece, Doris Settle, who lived in Michigan:

"Paducah, Ky., January 23, 1937

"Dear Doris:

We are water-bound. Will have to move upstairs by night fall. Have a boat tied on the front porch so we can make a quick getaway. The temperature is down to 18 degrees. We are all grouped around the fireplace as this is the only fire we can have. All work is suspended. The Ritz Hotel is inundated. All guests are on the second floor. The refugees are housed in the school houses but without any heat. We are all well so far I am thankful to say. Fannie and Ann and both Georges are both here at home. Lights just went out. We are in a very serious condition. It may be ten days before I get to mail this letter as the streets are all flooded and martial law has been declared. We had the heaviest sleet yesterday all day that I ever saw and you know I am 50 years old in June. We were awake all night last night, watching the water climb. We have no heat upstairs so may freeze to death before this is over. I have been at home two whole days and no telephone, either. No radio, no lights, no passing - only in boats.

We have plenty to eat on hand. Enough to last for two weeks by using care. We will have to cook on the grate as I am cooking on an electric store.

January 24, 1937

We are living next door now as our neighbors have heat on the second floor - a little laundry stove. It is raining hard and the water is at the front door, rising about seven inches in 8 hours. George has gone to town in a boat. He had to go to see about Aunt Sally, Linda and also Zoi. They are both in deep water.

We had sardines and crackers for breakfast. We have a cook as she could not get home. She weighs about 300, so could not ride in the john boat which George made. We are looking out on dozens of cars

and trucks nearly submerged in water. All we can see is a small portion of the tops. Anne Estelle and Manley have had to move in with the family upstairs, but have no fuel. There are 14 of us grouped around the fire. We are eating soup beans (cooked over the grate) and boiled ham for dinner. None of us have had a bath since Tuesday and may not get one for a couple of weeks. George, Jr. fell three times in the icy water yesterday coming from town. He went after some supplies. He was nearly frozen when he finally reached home. The Coast Guard boats are here rescuing the people. We are still very comfortable, although we are all huddled together in one room.

The Red Cross has a hospital established at 32nd and Broadway. They are calling for volunteer workers to help with the sick. I think I am going out this afternoon and offer my services as a Red Cross worker.

January 27, 1937

Everyone has had to take typhoid shots, so we will have mighty sore arms. A man or two men came by in a boat last night about 11 o'clock, looking for a woman with a dead baby, who was reported to be standing by the side of the road. I saw some dresser drawers floating by this morning. Also some filing cabinets. We could not get out of bed this morning until George and Mr. Coltharp could chisel a hole in the brick wall and build a chimney, so we could have a fire as our stove smoked something awful.

January 29, 1937

This is the eighth day of the flood. We are still alive, but all so dirty as our clothes were all at the laundry when the flood came, and of course, we cannot get them for several days -- maybe two weeks or more. Dollie and Harry are high and dry; so is Frank and family. Anne Estelle and family we cannot hear from as the current is so swift between here and there that we cannot make it in a row boat. I have had on the same dress for a whole week. Wish I could take a good hot bath and had a clean house-dress to put on. I feel real lousy. It will be a month or six weeks before we get back to normal. We heard your telegram read over the radio today. Are answering collect as they will not accept the

payment here.

January 30, 1937

My ink has run out so I will use a pencil. This is George, Sr.'s birthday. We are going to have chicken and dumpling for a 3 o'clock dinner; also peas and slaw and a rice pudding. So you see we are not hungry. We are making pictures of the flood so will send you some of the scenes just as soon as we can have them developed. Our cooking pans and tea kettle are as black as coal. The Hopwoods are living in the attic. They are coming over to eat with us today. There will be 18 of us for dinner today. Our floors will all have to be done over. Also the woodwork. Some of the furniture will have to be replaced. We have a religious service every day."

Charles Alexander Pell died at the age of 69 of bronchitis and was buried in Paducah, Ky. on the Pell lot. Mattil Funeral Home had charge of the funeral and according to the records, his funeral cost \$89.00 with five carriages. His wife, Mrs. Ann Pell, died at the age of 81 at Paducah, Ky. on April 20, 1928 of heart trouble. She is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Paducah.

III. William Pell, born in Paducah, Ky., was married to Anna Townsend of St. Louis, Missouri. They also had one child, who died in infancy. He was a river pilot and owned the MARY F. GOLDEN, a river boat. He was also on the boat CLYDE. William Pell fought in the Civil War and one old letter was found written by him as follows:

"Paris, Tenn.
Sept. 29, 1865

Cousin Winn:

I have been in Paris several days but have heard no news from home and wish you would send word to father to come to Paris if he possibly can as I want to hear from home. I will be in Paris or vicinity for sometime and if he can possibly come out I am very anxious to see him and if he does

come tell him to inquire for me in Paris. I have been sick but am now well. I went all through the present campaign from Dothan to Atlanta and was in every battle, but escaped unhurt.

I have no news worth writing. If father can't come, please send me word and I will go back. I have not heard from Newton for sometime. Rice is well and all of the Paducah boys generally. I have been waiting to get a chance to go back but if I can see father, I will stay. Butler Boyd is with us. He is well. Billy Wilcox also. I must close. Good bye from your cousin.

IV. Mary Ann Pell, born in Paducah, Kentucky, married in Paducah at the Broadway Methodist Church by E. C. Slater, to Dr. Marshall C. Woodson on October 18, 1866, in the presence of C. W. Harrison and Charles A. Pell. They left Paducah in the early spring of 1874. They lived in San Francisco, Calif. for several years, then to Visalia, Cal. a few months and later to San Diego, where Dr. Woodson bought a farm and where they lived until he died in June of 1900. They had 3 children.

V. Louis Pell, born in Paducah, Ky., was married to Sally Ashbrook. Mrs. Ashbrook had one daughter by a former marriage, Linda, who married a Mr. Townsend and they had one son. Louis Pell and Sally Ashbrook had one child, Jim, who died in infancy. Mr. Pell fought in the Civil War for the South in Co. D - 3rd Regiment Mounted Cavalry.

VI. Frances Pell, fondly called "Aunt Fanny", was married twice; the first marriage to Jacob Davis on January 19th, 1881, and the second time to Marion Boyd. She had no children by either marriage, but later in life, she raised a half-brother and a half-sister, Ed and Josephine Pell.

VII. Jesse F. Pell, born in Paducah, Ky. He was married on

September 16, 1875 to Mary E. Price. They moved to St. Louis, Mo. and were the parents of 3 children, William H. Pell, Sr., Maggie Mae Pell and Blanche Pell.

VIII. George Pell -- as stated before, not much is known of him.

IX. Edwin Carroll Pell, born in Paducah, Ky., baptized at the Broadway Methodist Church by R. H. Mahan, minister, on 12/11/1874. He was a steamboat pilot. For many years, he was engaged to a lady named Belle Beard, but they never married. As a pilot, he had a good income but when he died he hardly had enough to bury him. He was known as "Dude" Pell and was quite a dapper dresser. He was born in 1873 and died Oct. 29, 1941 at age 68. He dropped dead at the pilot wheel on the tow boat, MILDRED, at Savannah, Tenn. He is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Paducah, Kentucky.

Some of the boats on which he was pilot were CITY OF SALTILLO, the JOHN BARRETT on the Cumberland River; the M. T. BRYAN, the DICK FOWLER and the NOKOMIS in 1922; the GORDON C. GREEN; pilot-partner with Capt. Chas. W. Biederman on the COLBERT in 1913; the TOMAHAWK; the JACOB HEATHERINGTON, the NORMAN CRAWFORD, and the RUSSELL LORD.

X. Addie Josephine Pell, born Paducah, Kentucky, on January 28, 1875; died November 30, 1954. She was married to Geo. Bradshaw and moved to New York City. They had one child, Kathleen, born May 5, 1896. Josephine always resented the fact that her father married her mother when he was so old and left her with two small children. Both children were under 3 years of age. Kathleen married Van D. Hunt, and they had one child, Richard B. Hunt.

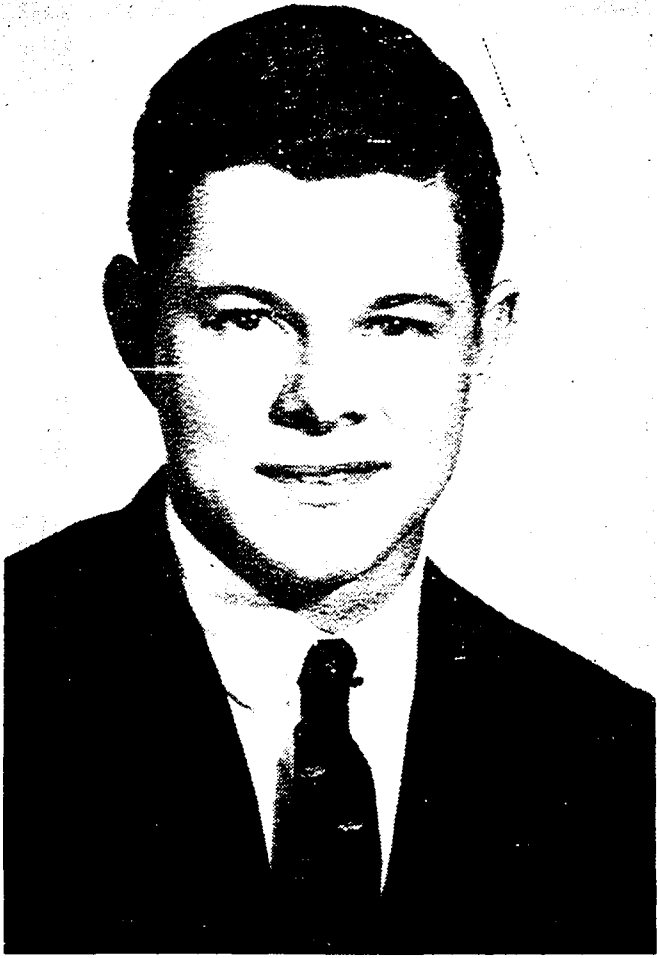

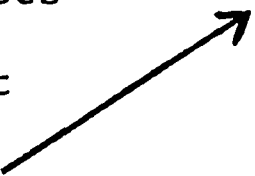

CINDRILLA PELL

Born in Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky, in 1806. She was married to Bonham Madden in Harrison County, Ind. on November 4, 1828, and died on March 20, 1833 at age 27 years, 5 months and 7 days. She is buried in Marsh Cemetery, 1 mile southwest, Laconia, Harrison County, Indiana.

It is not known if there were any children born to this marriage.

JESSE PELL

This son of William and Margaret Pell settled in Livingston County, Kentucky, on the Ohio River. He was married to Rebecca M. J. Smart (daughter of John Smart and granddaughter of James Smart, both of Franklin County, Ky.) on March 12th, 1828 in Livingston County, Kentucky. The first record of any deed transactions between Jesse Pell and others in Livingston County, Kentucky, was on July 8th, 1834.

Rebecca Pell was born January 24, 1807 and died January 29th, 1846. She is buried in the Smithland Cemetery at Smithland, Livingston County, Kentucky.

Jesse Pell died in the early part of 1854. No record was found of his burial place, however, Craig S. Harris was appointed administrator of his estate on April 3, 1854 in Livingston County, Kentucky. Tom M. Davis, James Price and Samuel H. Piles were appointed to appraise his personal property and slaves, if any. It is therefore certain that Jesse Pell is buried in Livingston County, Ky.

As far as is known, he left no heirs.

MITCHELL PELL

Son of William and Margaret Pell, was born in 1812 in Augusta, Bracken County, Ky. He later moved to Harrison County, Indiana and then to Rosiclare, Illinois, where he lived until about 1850, at which time he moved to Brooklyn, (Brookport), Illinois. (The town was first known as Pellonia, was later changed to Brooklyn and then to Brookport). He was a merchant and one of the early citizens of Brooklyn, and aided materially in the development of the village. He was a Methodist and republican. When he first came to Brooklyn, his health was very poor. Later he improved and opened a general store which he conducted over 15 years. His name is preserved in the postoffice -- "Pellonia".

On October 20, 1836, Mitchell Pell married Susan (or Sarah) J. Badger in McCracken County, Kentucky. She died in August of 1840. They had one child, Eliza M. Pell.

On December 7th, 1841, he was married to Miss E. A. Badger. Several children were born to this marriage but died early. One child, however, Elizabeth Josephine, was born at Rosiclare, Illinois, on January 8th, 1844. The second Mrs. Pell died December 31st, 1845.

Mr. Pell married again on April 8th, 1847 to Mary Ann Steele and they were the parents of two children, Henryetta L. and Sarah J. (Jennie). Mr. Pell again lost his wife on March 30th, 1851.

On June 27, 1858, Mr. Pell was married to Swilla Ann Shimm, but they were divorced in 1860.

On March 24, 1861, Mr. Pell married Rebecca Louise Patterson and they were the parents of four children: William Henry Clay Pell, James Grant Pell, Alma Alice Pell and Mitchell Pell, Jr.

On January 24, 1871, when Mr. Pell went to Metropolis to invoice a cargo of meat purchased there for him preparatory to its being sent down the river, his horse was at the home of his son-in-law, Captain Samuel Atwell, and while going from the wharf to the house, he was stricken with paralysis and died. He was 59 years old when he died. Mrs. Rebecca Pell died August 3, 1901, at the age of 70 years, 8 months and 12 days.

Mitchell Pell and his wife are buried in the Pell Cemetery in Brookport, Illinois, which land was given by the Pell family.

The following is the will of Mitchell Pell, recorded in the Court House at Metropolis, Illinois:

"I, Mitchell Pell, of County of Massac and State of Illinois, now fifty seven years of age and approaching the end of this mortal life, but being of sound mind and memory and in the full possession and enjoyment of my reasoning faculties, do hereby make, publish and declare this my last will and testament in manner following:

It is my will that my funeral expenses and all my just debts be fully paid.

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Rebecca L. Pell, \$1,000. in money or its equivalent in personal property. Also a life estate so long as she remains single and unmarried, in the following lots and premises situated in the town of Brooklyn in said county, more particularly described in 3 certain deeds from C. Pell and wife to me of record in said county, said lots being numbered 19, 20, 41

and 42 respectively in block numbers 4, which said lots, including the improvements thereon, are probably worth the sum of \$6,000., and upon the death or marriage of said Rebecca L. Pell, the said real estate shall become vested in and belong to our youngest two children, William H. C. Pell and Alma A. Pell.

I give and bequeath to my oldest daughter, now Elizabeth J. Atwell, the sum of \$1,000 or its equivalent in personal property. Also lot #58 in Block #1 in the town of Brooklyn in said county, worth about \$150.00.

I give and bequeath to my two daughters, Henrietta L. and Sarah J. Pell, \$1.00 each, and should they remain single and unmarried till after my death, or marry agreeably to my advice and wishes, each so remaining or so conducting, shall have the further sum of \$1,000. or its equivalent in personal property.

I give and bequeath to my son, William H. C. Pell, now six years old, 20 acres of land in said county, particularly designated in a certain deed from J. L.
