FOREWORD.

The genealogical sketch of The Andrew Putnam Family, contained in the following pages, was compiled by Judge Job Barnard, of Washington, D. C., in response to a request by the President of the Chautauqua County (N. Y.) Historical Society. It was not undertaken with a view to writing a biography, but brief biographical mention has been made concerning a few members of the family.

Much time and extensive correspondence was necessary and inevitable delay encountered by the compiler in obtaining this data relating to the persons comprising the many branches now extending out from the parent trunk—in some families to the sixth generation—and spreading throughout the United States and into Canada. It was, too, inevitable that in numerous instances inadequate and erroneous data would be supplied the compiler relative to some branches and individuals of this now extensive family.

Judge Barnard moved from Indiana to Washington in 1873, where for more than twenty years he practiced law, until in 1899 he was appointed by President McKinley a Judge of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, which position he ably filled until he had reached the age of retirement from the bench in 1914.

NOTE

The matter contained in this pamphlet was compiled before the United States entered the war against Germany. It would be interesting to know who of the family were in the service, and where, but it is not practicable to ascertain such data at this time.

The Andrew Putnam Family

Among the pioneers of Chautauqua County, New York, was Andrew Putnam, who came to that part of the county which was afterward known as the town of Stockton, on the 20th day of February, 1817. He came directly from Brookfield, Madison County, New York, on sleds, with one span of horses, four yoke of oxen, and thirteen head of cows and young cattle. His wife and their eight sons came with him. Their only daughter, Harriet, who was married to Jonathan Bugbee, February 14, 1813, had moved with her husband to Chautauqua County in January, 1814, where they made their home in a log cabin which he had erected. It was to this daughter's home that her father and mother came on a visit in the fall of 1816, when they became so well pleased with the country that they returned to Brookfield, sold their farm there and moved to this new county the following year. Chautauqua County had been created out of a part of Genesee County, in 1808, but it was not to be completely organized until it should contain such number of inhabitants as would be deemed expedient. It was ascertained that the county had five hundred voters in 1810, and it was completely organized by the appointment of the usual county officers, by a commission, February 9, 1811. The town of Stockton was created out of part of the large town of Chautauqua, in 1821.

Captain Andrew Putnam was a descendant of the first Putnam immigrant, John Putnam, who came from Aston Abbots, County of Bucks, England, in 1634, to Salem, Mass., and settled in what is now known as Danvers, Mass., on the farm which has been of late years called "Oak Knoll," where John Greenleaf Whittier had a home with relatives at the

time of his death. John Putnam was born about 1580, and died December 30, 1662. He was married in England to Priscilla Gould.

Their son, Thomas Putnam, born March 7, 1614, in England, married Ann Holyoke, at Lynn, Mass., August 17, 1643. She died July 1, 1665. He then married, September 14, 1666, Mary Veren, widow of Nathaniel Veren. He had eight children by his first marriage, and one, Joseph, by the second, who was the father of General Israel Putnam, of Revolutionary fame.

Edward Putnam, son of Thomas and Ann (Holyoke) Putnam, born in Salem, Mass., in 1654, married Mary Hale, June 14, 1681. He was an uncle of the half-blood to General Israel Putnam.

Their son, Elisha Putnam, born November 3, 1686, died June 10, 1745, was married February 15, 1713, to Susanna Fuller. He was known as Deacon Elisha Putnam, and was a representative in the General Court of Massachusetts. He was the father of General Rufus Putnam.

Their son, Elisha Putnam, born in Topsfield, Mass., December 2, 1715, died in 1758, while a soldier in the provincial army, in the assault on Ticonderoga. He married Lydia Chase, March 3, 1742. He was a brother of General Rufus Putnam, the founder of Marietta, Ohio.

Their son, Andrew Putnam, born May 2, 1742, died about 1812, was married January 10, 1764, to Lucy Parks, of Sutton, Mass. She was born December 30, 1744. They were the father and mother of Captain Andrew Putnam, the head of the family which is the subject of this genealogical sketch, and they had twelve children, the seven first named born in Winchester, Mass., the other five born in Greenfield, Mass., as follows: Lydia, born April 20, 1765, died March 13, 1787; Eunice, born May 25, 1767; Andrew, Jr., born March 11, 1769, died June 14, 1828; Lucy, born February 28, 1771; Malachi, born October 14, 1772; Sarah, born July 28, 1774, died August 30, 1776; Peter, born August 5, 1776; Stephan, born April 8, 1778; Sarah, 2nd, born January 31, 1780; David, born January 17, 1783; a pair of twins, not named, born August 23, 1785, died the following day.

Captain Andrew Putnam was properly called Captain Putnam because of the fact that he held that rank in a militia company while he was a resident of Madison County, New York. He was born in Winchester, Mass., March 11, 1769, and was the oldest son of Andrew and Lucy (Parks) Putnam. He was a grand nephew of General Rufus Putnam. When he was about eight years of age his parents moved to Greenfield, Mass., where his father owned and cultivated a farm, and also fitted young men for college. Here he continued to live until after his majority. On December 7, 1791, he was married to Azuba Stanhope. She was born November 25, 1770. Her parents were Samuel Stanhope and Elizabeth Angier. They were married November 6, 1755, in Framingham, Mass. Andrew and Azuba lived in Greenfield until February, 1796, when with their two children, Harriet and Newell, they moved to Brookfield, New York. This journey was made in February with ox team and sled. In this new home he had two hundred acres of wild land, and he continued to reside upon it until 1817. Here all his other children were born, and here his son, Lovell, died January 31, 1815. His children were ten in number, one daughter and nine sons, in the following named order:

Harriet, born October 28, 1792, died October 7, 1880;
Newell, born February 28, 1795, died March 12, 1890;
Gilbert, born June 21, 1797, died May 20, 1859;
Lovell, born December 4, 1799, died January 31, 1815;
Hiram, born March 30, 1802, died December 30, 1892;
Olvin, born July 27, 1804, died January 22, 1863;
Oren, born January 5, 1807, died August 6, 1894;
Royal, born June 6, 1809, died May 8, 1881;
Union, born June 6, 1809, died January 6, 1884;
Worthy, born October 22, 1811, died April 10, 1887.

Captain Putnam, on his arrival in Chautauqua County, lived in a log cabin, but within the next year, 1818, he built the large two-story frame dwelling that for many years afterwards was known as the "old yellow house," in which he resided until his death on June 14, 1828. His widow survived him many years and died January 18, 1864. His death was the result of a slight cut in the knee with a draw-knife,

which occurred in May. Through neglect and exposure afterward his knee became inflamed and he died in June, probably from blood poisoning. The draw-knife was a family relic in possession of his granddaughter, Mrs. Maria Strunk, but was destroyed or lost when her home was burned early in the present century.

Andrew and Azuba Putnam are both interred in the Stockton village cemetery. The inscription on their tombstone reads as follows:

"Sacrum Memori"

ANDREW PUTNAM,

who died in the triumph of faith,
June 14, 1828, in the 60th year of his age.

The stroke of death has laid my head
Down in this dark and lonesome bed;
Here to rest till from the skies
The last Trump bids me arise.

AZUBA,

wife of Andrew Putnam, died January 18, 1864,
in the 94th year of her age.

Captain Putnam, as described by his grandson, Judge Lovell Bugbee, in his historical sketches of the early settlers of Chautauqua County, was a little over six feet in height, bald-headed, with only a skirt of hair around the neck from the top of the ears; had light blue eyes, a rather large mouth, a broad nose, prominent chin; was spare built and straight and soldier-like in his step. He was a member of the Baptist church and very zealous in his devotion to its doctrines.

Something will now be said of the children of Captain Putnam, for with one exception they were all pioneers of Chautauqua County, and of the descendants of each of these children in genealogical order.

Harriet Putnam, the first child, born October 28, 1792, married Jonathan Bugbee, February 14, 1813, and in January, 1814, they came to their new home on lot 32, in the south-east part of what afterwards was set off as the town of Stockton. Her husband was born May 11, 1789, and died October 19, 1829. She survived him more than fifty years and died October 8, 1880, at the age of 88 years. They had eight children, all born in Stockton, as follows:

1. **Andrew Putnam Bugbee**, born August 5, 1816, died August 12, 1890, at Chandlers Valley, Pa. He married **Diana Gregory**. No children survive.

2. **Judge Lovell Bugbee**, born February 10, 1818, died June 6, 1888. He married **Mary Ann Flagg**, May 2, 1841. She died February 9, 1898. He succeeded to his father's farm and lived there most of his life. He was a teacher, writer, farmer, and prominent citizen. He contributed interesting historical data to the county papers and wrote some well-received poems. They had two children:

1. **Florence E. Bugbee**, born April 21, 1849. She married **Walter B. Horton**, of Jamestown, N. Y., September 29, 1868, and died November 22, 1882, at Jamestown, without having children.

2. **Judge Eugene Bugbee**, born October 24, 1853, died November 22, 1914. He married **Laura Elizabeth Hess**, September 3, 1879, and they continued to live on the old homestead, where their three children were born:

Judge Hess Bugbee, born August 8, 1880, died August 12, 1880.

Edward Hart Bugbee, born December 11, 1887, married **Ethel Ophelia Bargar**, September 20, 1911. They live in Williamsport, Pa., and have two children, **Cynthia Jaenette Bugbee**, born May 1, 1915, and **Laura Eugenie Bugbee**, born November 23, 1916.

Clara Eugenie Bugbee, born September 7, 1900, died May 7, 1901.

3. **Charity Bugbee**, born January 17, 1820, died October 17, 1907, at Crestone, Colo. She married **Israel M. Strong**, March 14, 1844, who died February 17, 1866. They had one child:

Emma R. Strong, born December 16, 1844, in Stockton, N. Y. She married **Lewis L. Walrath**, July 2, 1862. He was born in Mohawk Valley, N. Y., June 12, 1838, and died in Jamestown, N. Y., May 31, 1881. They had six children: (**Emma R. (Strong) Walrath** married a second time, to **Daniel Seger**, in 1891.)

Alice M. Walrath, born October 1, 1865, at Jamestown, N. Y., married **Charles H. Emerson**, May 20, 1886. He was born February 6, 1865, at Dorchester, Mass., and died January 21,

1895, at Alamosa, Colo. They had three children: Mary Alice, Charles H., Jr., and Nellie R. Emerson.

Mary Alice Emerson, born March 8, 1887, at Alamosa, Colo., married Edward H. Irvin, December 21, 1904, at Crestone, Colo. He was born May 28, 1878, at Philadelphia, Pa. They have three children: Charles Strong Irvin, born December 25, 1905, at Creede, Colo.; Eldred Kennith Irvin, born August 4, 1909, and Alice Mildred Irvin, born August 18, 1913, both at Crestone, Colo.

Charles M. Walrath, born September 3, 1870, at Jamestown, N. Y., married Mrs. Ellen F. (Emerson) Stout, July 18, 1912. She was born September 2, 1874, at Paterson, N. J. They have no children.

Emmett L. Walrath, born July 28, 1872, at Leetonia, Ohio, married Lena Lawrence, December 23, 1895. She was born August 2, 1874, at Carthage, Mo. They have had three children: Emma L. May Walrath, born March 7, 1897, at Salida, Colo., died August 9, 1897; Hazel May Walrath, born September 25, 1899, at Crestone, Colo.; Elma Strong Walrath, born June 19, 1906, at Crestone, Colo.

Harriet Emma Walrath, born January 15, 1875, at Jamestown, N. Y., married John L. Charles, November 25, 1896, at Cottonwood, Colo. He was born June 10, 1867, at Quincy, Cal. They have had five children: John Levin Charles, Jr., born May 29, 1898, at Crestone, Colo., died February 6, 1902; Harriet Clementine Charles, born October 12, 1902; Levin Lewis Charles, born June 21, 1908; Carroll Christian Charles, born October 9, 1910, died December 26, 1910; Dorothy Emma Charles, born February 8, 1912, died the day of her birth.

5. Lois Walrath, born April 4, 1876, at Jamestown, N. Y., died August 2, 1876.

Nellie Amanda Walrath, born November 16, 1878, at Jamestown, N. Y., married Walter S. Parker, January 22, 1901, at Crestone, Colo. He was born January 22, 1871, at Hiawatha, Kansas. They have two children: Raymond W. Parker, born January 5, 1902; and Irma Harriet Parker, born June 25, 1912, both at Crestone, Colo.

4. Damaris Bugbee, born May 24, 1821, in Stockton, N. Y., died June 3, 1881. She married William Manley DeJane, March 14, 1840. He was born in 1817, and died September 3, 1892. They had five children:

1. Charles DeJane married and has children. He lives at Washingtonville, O.

2. William DeJane married Mary Jane Nichols. He died February 10, 1915. They had one child:

William C. DeJane, born May 13, 1872, married to Lena Miller, June 1, 1898. She was born December 25, 1876. They live in Los Angeles, Cal., and have one child, William M. DeJane, born June 22, 1901.

3. Arvilla DeJane was born June 20, 1841, and died in August, 1907. She married Elliott Kimball Ross, November 28, 1860. He was born July 6, 1834, died October 15, 1915. They had two children:

Benjamin Maurley Ross, born September 15, 1861, died Jan-

uary 2, 1902. He married Georgiana Peterson, October 14, 1891. They had one child, Carrie Adela Ross, born November 12, 1900.

Emma Arabelle Ross, born May 13, 1862, died January 5, 1900. She married Gen. E. R. Hampton, of Sylva, N. C., September 4, 1894. He died March 8, 1908, at Bryson City, N. C. They had three children: Levi Ross Hampton, born October 22, 1895, died August 20, 1896; Georgia Ann Hampton, born July 13, 1897, at Sylva, N. C., and Clara Belle Hampton, born December 27, 1899.

4. Millard DeJane is also married and has children.

5. Clayton DeJane died without issue.

5. Minerva Bugbee, born March 8, 1823, died December 15, 1870. She married Spencer Shears, March 14, 1844. After his death she married William Warner, in 1869. She had two children by her first husband:

1. Mary Shears, who married Abner Lewis.

2. Charles Shears, who married Almira Bertelot.

6. Eliza Jane Bugbee, born December 29, 1825, died May 28, 1889. She married Corydon P. Stoughton, August 17, 1845. He was born May 2, 1820, died September 23, 1881. They had two children:

1. Hosea Spencer Stoughton, born July 4, 1848, married Claricy Anne Johnson, September 29, 1870. They live in Conewango Valley, N. Y. They have had nine children:

Blanche J. Stoughton, born September 26, 1871, married Marion Herrick, May 13, 1894. They live at Little Valley, N. Y. They have four children: Mabel Herrick, born April 19, 1895, married William H. Benson, April 19, 1914. They have had one child, Bertran Benson, born August 3, 1915, died October 17, 1915. Genevieve Herrick, born January 13, 1899. Kenneth Herrick, born September 25, 1904. Beatrice Herrick, born January 9, 1907.

Lula A. Stoughton, born November 18, 1872, married Webster Cowley, December 23, 1892. They live at East Randolph, N. Y. They have three children: Victor Cowley, born August 15, 1895; Wilma Cowley, born May 27, 1900; Harlen Cowley, born March 18, 1912.

Mattie J. Stoughton, born September 8, 1875, married William Simpson, February 6, 1898. They live at East Randolph, N. Y. They have one child: Lena Simpson, born June 1, 1899.

Coryden D. Stoughton, born July 23, 1877, married Lulu Kilburn, November 11, 1903. They live at Conewango Valley, N. Y. They have had two children: Manley Spencer Stoughton, born June 17, 1908, died December 28, 1910; and Ruth Stoughton, born March 30, 1911.

Grace M. Stoughton, born December 13, 1879, married Truman Culver, December 14, 1903. They live at East Randolph, N. Y. They have one child, Clifford Culver, born September 1, 1904.

Lynn P. Stoughton, born September 15, 1884, married Marie Tobin, September 19, 1911. They live at Kennedy, N. Y.

Bessie Stoughton, born December 20, 1885, died April 29, 1910. She married Alva Wilcox, March 17, 1907. There are two children: Cleon Wilcox, born October 11, 1908; and Velma Wilcox, born March 31, 1910.

Mildred Stoughton, born February 24, 1888. She lives at Randolph, N. Y.

Pearl Stoughton, born June 14, 1891, married Deforest Lake, August 19, 1915. They reside at Randolph, N. Y.

2. Mary Adelia Stoughton, born March 28, 1854. She married Bradford Verrill, September 7, 1873. They live in Brooklyn, N. Y., and have had three children:

Arthur E. Verrill, born May 27, 1876, died in the same year.

Lottie A. Verrill, born July 14, 1878, married Henry Fleckenstein, September 22, 1902. They have two children: John H. Fleckenstein, born June 28, 1907, and Marie M. Fleckenstein, born October 16, 1910.

Clarence D. Verrill, born March 1, 1882, married Carolina Mueller, July 3, 1915.

7. Delight Bugbee, born January 13, 1827, married Loring E. Gates, November 23, 1845. She died September 16, 1870. There were several children born to them, but the compiler of this genealogical sketch has been unable to obtain any data relating to the family, except that one daughter,

Alice Gates, married a Mr. Brown, and they lived in Oil City, Pa.

8. Harriet Bugbee, born March 8, 1830, died July 10, 1908. She married Jacob Gerrish Chamberlain, December 31, 1852, who was born September 11, 1829, and died May 31, 1897. Mr. Chamberlain was interested in the production of steel and in other enterprises; a man of much influence and culture. He lived at Unionville, Canfield, and Leetonia, Ohio; then at Sheffield, Ala., and afterwards at Los Angeles, Cal., where he died. Mrs. Chamberlain, after the death of her husband, lived with her daughter, Harriet, in Philadelphia, Pa., and later in Windber, Pa., where she died. Their bodies both lie in Rosedale cemetery, Los Angeles. They had six children:

1. Samuel Gerrish Chamberlain, born December 25, 1855. He never married.

2. Infant daughter, born in 1857, died on the day of birth.

3. Orville Messer Chamberlain, born April 7, 1860, died October 27, 1888. He married Mary Leavitt, in 1886. They had no children.

4. Charles Bugbee Chamberlain. (No information as to date of birth and death.)

5. William Mathers Chamberlain, born April 24, 1868, died November 1, 1895.

6. Harriet Chamberlain, born August 7, 1869, married George Anthony Smith, April 11, 1894. He was born March 18, 1867. They have one child, Harriet Dorothy Smith, born December 22, 1897. They live in Windber, Pa.

Newell Putnam was born February 28, 1795. He was a soldier in the War of 1812, for a period of six months in 1814, stationed in barracks at Sacketts Harbor, N. Y., to defend it against attacks from British soldiers and hostile Indians. He married first, Tacy Fenner, January 19, 1817, at Brookfield, N. Y., and their wedding journey was taken on ox-drawn sleds, together with his father's family, to their new home in Chautauqua County, the trek beginning February 1st and ending on the 20th. He took up 100 acres of forest land about three-fourths of a mile west of his father's place and erected a log cabin into which he moved in June, 1817. Here he resided fifty years, in due time supplanting the humble log house with a substantial and commodious frame dwelling. He held several of the public offices of the town of Stockton, being Justice of the Peace two terms. In politics he was first a Whig and later an intense abolitionist and Republican. His wife, Tacy, died January 24, 1833, and September 10, 1833, he married, second, Lucy Winchell, born March 15, 1806. In 1867 he sold the farm to his son, Welcome, and removed to Conneaut, Ohio, where he resided nineteen years. His wife, Lucy, died January 12, 1887, at Dewittville, N. Y., at the home of their daughter, Tacy, with whom they had gone to live the preceding year. He later removed again with his daughter's family to Newark, N. Y., where he died March 13, 1890, at the advanced age of 95 years. He and both his wives are interred in the little neighborhood cemetery at Centralia, (in Stockton township) N. Y., which was set off many years ago from one corner of his old homestead. He had one son, Welcome Putnam, by his first wife, and one daughter, Tacy Victoria Putnam, by his second wife.

1. Welcome Putnam, born August 31, 1820, died October 28, 1871, and was interred in the family lot in the cemetery on the farm at Centralia, N. Y., where he was born and

had resided continuously all his life. He married Maria Louisa (Flagg) Putnam (widow of James R. Putnam), May 31, 1853. She was born May 31, 1821, in Vermont, and died February 20, 1892, at Jamestown, N. Y. Two children were born to them:

1. Charles Sumner Putnam, born May 27, 1859, married Laura Eliza Stone, March 8, 1878. She was born June 23, 1858, died December 30, 1918. His home is at Conneaut, Ohio, where he was postmaster fifteen years. He is now auditor of railroad accounts for the Tax Commission of Ohio. There are two children:

Eppie May Putnam, born June 3, 1879. She married Karl List, October 30, 1912. He was born August 19, 1886. They have one child, Lura List, born May 6, 1914.

Walter Edward Putnam, born February 14, 1886. Unmarried. He is general manager of The Conneaut Printing Co., publishers of the daily "Conneaut News-Herald."

2. May Victoria Putnam, born May 8, 1861, married Walter B. Horton, December 1, 1883. He was born August 8, 1842. They live in Jamestown, N. Y., and have had two children:

Hazel Horton, born October 27, 1884, died August 21, 1886.
Ednah Putnam Horton, born October 9, 1895.

2. Tacy Victoria Putnam, born January 25, 1839, died November 5, 1913. She married Rev. Orrin T. Wyman, a minister of the Christian church, September 7, 1859. He was born August 25, 1836, at Millville, N. Y., died December 6, 1912. Both are interred in the Sinclairville, N. Y., cemetery, in which village they resided several years prior to their death. They have one child:

Rev. Benson Newell Wyman, born June 17, 1863. He married Ada Walters, August 25, 1915. She was born December 13, 1878. They live in Lenox, Mass., where he is pastor of the Congregational church. They have two sons: Newell, born October 11, 1916, and Arthur Harvey Wyman, born January 5, 1919.

Gilbert Putnam, born June 21, 1797, died May 20, 1859. He married Thankful Rogers, January 24, 1819. They lived on lot 33 in Stockton, on a farm adjacent to that of his brother, Newell. They had nine children:

1. Angeline Putnam, born September 10, 1820, died July 30, 1872. She married Madison Flagg, December 21, 1840. He was born April 14, 1811, at Clarendon, Vt., and died January 18, 1880. They had seven children:

1. Rozilla Flagg, born January 31, 1843, in Ellicott, N. Y., died October 19, 1909, at Jamestown, N. Y. She married Alonzo Z. Pickard, June 16, 1864. They had three children:

Clare A. Pickard, born September 9, 1866. He married Rachel Giles, February 25, 1896. She was born December 6, 1868. They have three children: Clarence Giles Pickard, born November 11, 1899; Rachael Longshore Pickard, born June 9, 1905; Rozilla Putnam Pickard, born September 27, 1910.

Ray Flagg Pickard, born April 27, 1868. He married Blanch Lounsberry, June 14, 1899. She was born June 26, 1876. They have one daughter, Jean Helen Pickard, born July 24, 1905.

Fern Pickard, born September 26, 1872. She married Edwin W. Stevens, December 19, 1899. They have no children.

2. Byron M. Flagg, born September 10, 1845, at Busti, N. Y., died May 20, 1865, from disease contracted in the service during the Civil War.

3. Eleazer G. Flagg, born June 23, 1847, at Glade, Pa., died October 25, 1847.

4. James R. Flagg, born October 22, 1849, at Glade, Pa. He married Eva Watson, October 29, 1874. They have one daughter:

Floy Flagg, born November 13, 1881.

5. Martin P. Flagg, born June 16, 1851, at Glade, Pa., died October 2, 1893, at Jamestown, N. Y. He married Lily Button, at Busti, N. Y., June 16, 1874. They had one son:

Albert Flagg. (No data relative to him.) He lives in California and is married.

6. Franklin Emmett Flagg, born October 27, 1856, at Glade, Pa., died August 8, 1907. He married Flora Gould, October 24, 1880, at Frewsburg, N. Y. They had one daughter:

Mildred Flagg, born December 13, 1884. She married Earl Jones, August 15, 1906, and they have two children: Flora Jones, born January 20, 1908, and Roger Jones, born September 1, 1911.

7. Rollin A. Flagg, born January 10, 1859, at Chautauqua, N. Y. He married Charlotte Griswold, at Albion, N. Y., June 25, 1890. They have three children:

Worthy Putnam, the youngest of the ten children of Capt. Andrew Putnam, had little opportunity for education in schools, but he was so devoted to books that he was fitted to teach school at the age of seventeen, when his father died. At the age of thirty-two years, and after he had had the experience of a trip to the territories of Wisconsin and Iowa, and work and illness there, he was appointed Superintendent of Schools of Chautauqua County, in which position he did notable work for four years. He began studying

law at the age of thirty-one, but when he became Superintendent of Schools that work took most of his time and energies. He acquired a practical knowledge of elocution and oratory, and taught and lectured and gave readings, traveling much. At thirty-six he married, and the office of Superintendent of Schools was abolished by a change in the school law, so that he devoted more time to elocution, publishing a book in 1854, entitled the "Science and Art of Elocution and Oratory," which became popular in the schools, and a second edition was issued in 1858. His wife died in 1855, while he was away from home with his horse and buggy on his business as teacher and speaker, and that event so affected him that he gave up traveling and again took up law. The remainder of his life was devoted to the law, although he taught elocution in schools, and gave an occasional lecture in addition.

In 1860 he moved from Sinclairville, Chautauqua Co., to Valparaiso, Ind., where he practiced law, and taught elocution in the Valparaiso Male and Female College, at which institution the writer of this paper was a student. In 1864, he again moved, to the quiet village of Berrien Springs, Mich., on the St. Joe River, then the county seat of Berrien County, where he remained until his death in 1887. He wrote a great deal for the papers in his later life, until about five years before he died, when he became blind. He was appointed Judge by the Governor of Michigan to fill the vacancy in the Circuit Court where he had long practiced, caused by the death of Judge Bacon. He was much given to matters of local interest; made a park out of a few acres of ground near the village, called "The Indian Fields", and in many ways endeared himself to all his neighbors. His body is laid in the village cemetery and his monument bears this inscription:

WORTHY PUTNAM

Born

Oct. 22, 1811

Died, April 10, 1887

The motto of his life was,

Love to Father God, and brother man;

Adoration of the good, the beautiful and true

Body to its mother earth!

Soul to its brighter home!
