First Generation

1 EDWARD¹ PERKINS, the immigrant ancestor of this branch of the Perkins family was probably born in England about the year 1625 or 1626. The date of his arrival in this country is unknown at present.

The first appearance of his name on record is when he took the oath of fidelity, October 18, 1648, as an inhabitant of New Haven, Conn., where, perhaps, he had resided some time previous. The earliest mention of his name after this on the New Haven records is in a volume of miscellaneous transactions or "Estate Settlements," page 226, dated November 3, 1657, when as a planter he makes deposition: "That in the Spring last he sewed about 2 acres of Pease in his lott, and after they were come up Ther came in hoggs at Stendman's fence and spoyled them — so that he had not above two bushels of pease of them; but he then got the damage viewed by John Coop^r and Samuel Whitehead, who judged his loss at least six bushels of pease, which he hath demanded of Mr. Stendham."

In 1685 he and his three sons were entered as proprietors of the common lands.

February 26, 1679, he deeds to his son John 22 acres on the west side of the town bounded east on John Benham, west on John Smith, south and north on a lane at each end.

January 25, 1687-8, he makes a deed of gift to son Jonathan of a dwelling house and several parcels of land. Same date, he gives son John a house "where I lately dwelt," and several pieces of land. Same date, a deed of gift to son David of 4 acres in the suburbs quarter.

These last three conveyances seem to indicate that the patriarch, conscious that he was drawing near the close of his earthly career, deemed it best and proper to bestow upon his family what remained of his estate during life. This evidently was the only will he ever made, as none

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can be found on record and is the latest approximation to the date of his decease. Edward Perkins married March 20, 1649, Elizabeth Butcher.

2 JOHN² PERKINS, son of (1) Edward¹ was born in New Haven August 18, 1651, and died before 1730; no will or settlement of his estate, which he probably had disposed of to his children during his life, is to be found upon record while there is apparent evidence of the latter fact. He was a farmer. December 26, 1681, he sold to John Smith of New Haven the 22 acres on the west side of the town he had received from his father February 26, 1679. March 24, 1701, he conveys by deed of gift to son John 21 acres bounded on land of his brothers David and Jonathan. September 18, 1705, he gave by deed to his son Peter one-third of my father, Edward Perkins, dec'd, estate, in 3rd division; also 2 acres arable land in Sperry's Plain.

September 28, 1710, he bought of David Johnson, blacksmith, a small piece of land bounded in part on Stephen Perkins. February 24, 1715-16, he buys of his neighbor Moses Sperry five feet of land. October 23, 1718, he sells to son Nathan 4 acres in his third pitch. December 8, 1718, he conveys to his cousin (nephew) Seth Perkins (son of his brother Jonathan), weaver, three-fourths of an acre bounded on the town street, Jona Perkins, channel of the creek and heirs of Jas. Chidsey, March 26, 1722, he conveys to son Peter by deed of gift two acres adjoining land of said Peter. April

5, 1722, he also conveys to son Aaron by deed of gift one acre within the field called Yorkshire quarter, it being part of the meadow lying between my brother Jonathan and my own land; also one-half of my 5th division joining Wallingford bounds.

He married, first, May 16, 1677, Mary; second, in 1703, Rebecca, daughter of John Thompson of East Haven, and widow of Daniel Thomas. There were no children by his second wife.

In 1727, a conservator was appointed for John Perkins and his wife Rebecca.

 - June 2, 1701, he bought of Abraham Bradley three acres in the suburbs quarter. June 27, 1728, he conveyed by deed of gift all his real estate wherever found to his son Seth.

June 14, 1682, he married Mary, daughter of Anthony Ellcock, who was born July 22, 1661, and who died November 9, 1718.

He was a farmer and administration on his estate was granted to his son Daniel, but there is no record of his appointment. The inventory of his estate was taken January 9, 1732-3, and it amounted to £70, 19s, 2d.

June 14, 1703, he bought of Daniel Mason of Lebanon, attorney for John Fowler of same town, one acre of meadow and one-half acre land in Club Cove, New Haven, lately belonging to Mark Fowler.

January 23, 1709-10, he bought land of William Johnson, Jr., by way of exchange.

In 1717 he bought of William Johnson ten acres woodland in rear of the latter's second division lot, formerly Capt. Fowler's, bounded east on said Johnson, west on the highway, south on Isaac Johnson, and north on the church's lot.

November 28, 1723, a deed of gift to his only son Daniel, of twenty-five acres in the third division, it being a parcel of land laid out to my Hon'd. father, Edward Perkins, bounded east on the highway, south on Jona Perkins, west on highway or the dividend line between New Haven and Milford, and north on Peter Perkins.

The name of his first wife is not recorded.

He married second, June 8, 1682, Sarah Johnson, widow of John Wolcott and Benjamin Bradley. She was born and died November 1, 1733.

6 JOHN³ PERKINS, son of (2) John² [(1) Edward¹], was born in New Haven June 3, 1678, and died about October, 1749. He was a farmer.

May 21, 1701, he exchanged land with John Alling. April 1, 1723, while he was yet called "Junior," he bought land of Stephen Smith, a weaver, of Hadam. January 5, 1729-30, an agreement was made between him on the one part and his brothers Stephen, Peter, Nathan and Aaron on the other part, concerning eight acres of tillage land and three acres of meadow that was formerly a portion of their father John's estate, and to whom, the said brothers, John conveys his proportional part.

February 19, 1739-40, he and his second wife Elizabeth deeded land to their son John, Jr.

He married first, May 15, 1701, Sarah Warner, who was born , and died March 11, 1706. And second, February 3, 1707-8, Elizabeth Heward

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or Hayward of Enfield, Conn. She was the daughter of Thomas Hayward.

October 21, 1749, an indenture was made between the children and heirs of the above John Perkins, for the distribution of his estate, viz.: Roger Perkins of Derby, John, Azariah, Phineas and Benjamin Perkins; Jay Bishop and wife Miriam, Anna Perkins, Joseph Dickerman and wife Lois; Elisha Perkins, in behalf of his children, and Ruth Perkins, all of New Haven; John Crawfut of Derby and wife Sarah; Samuel Merriam and wife Elizabeth of Wallingford.

April 23, 1752, his widow, Elizabeth, complained to Court about her dower.

 She lived at Wallingford, New Haven, Conn., where she made her will Dec. 3, 1774, and which was entered for probate the same month. In it she names nephew Simeon, son to brother Benjamin Perkins, to whom she gives one-fifth part of her movable estate; sister Elizabeth, wife of Samuel Merriam, one-fifth part; Hannah Bishop and her sister, one-fifth part; sister Miriam, wife of Jay Bishop of New Haven, one-fifth part. To her two nieces, Sarah, wife of Josiah Hotchkiss, Jr., and Eunice, wife of Benj. Bristol, one-fifth part; and appoints her brother-in-law, Samuel Merriam, executor.

October 27, 1707, for £19 he bought of Wm. Thompson 23½ acres of land lying west of Roundhill, bounded in part on Sperry's land. May 26, 1708, he bought of Sam'l Thompson 20 acres near Roundhill, it being one-third of that lot laid out to John, father of said Sam'l Thompson.

May 12, 1707, he and John Watson exchanged five acres of land near Chestnut Hill bounding on Sperry. April 13, 1702, he and John Thompson divided and staked their several shares in third division at Roundhill. February 14, 1711-12, he bought of Daniel Johnson two rods and seven feet of land bounded partly on John Perkins. April 7, 1712, for 2s 6d he bought of Abigail Burr of Fairfield seven and one-half acres at a place called Holme's Race. June 16, 1874, he and Eben'r Lines conclude an agreement concerning a 7-acre lot at Haycock Plain, next to Peter Perkins' land. March 26, 1724, he and his brother Peter deed land from Benj. Wood.

The following items are abstracted from the Proprietors' records:

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February, 1725-6, Stephen Perkins may take in the highway against his house provided he carry the way upon good ground in his own lot and the highway to be the same width of the former. * * *

That Stephen Perkins have his right in the next division joining to Glover's lot.

March 12, 1725-6, laid out to Stephen Perkins 16½ acres, leaving 4 rods west for an highway, the whole length of said five rods.

March 14, 1726-7. Then laid out an highway and exchanged land with the proprietors and Stephen Perkins beginning a little westerly of his old house and five or six rods south * * * near the saw mill.

There appears to be no settlement of his estate on the New Haven records.

He married August 27, 1700, Elizabeth, daughter of Samuel Ford and Elizabeth (Hipkins), who was born February 19, 1679, and died

He married second, November 12, 1729, Anna How of Wallingford, Conn. In 1755 the expense for maintenance of Stephen Perkins and his wife Anna was divided between their children. The date of his death is uncertain.

December 17, 1712, John Thomas quitclaimed to him all his right in the estate of the late Sam'l Ford granted to him and his heirs begotten of the body of his late wife Mary, daughter of said Samuel Ford.

March 9, 1713-14, he bought of Joseph Baldwin, Sr., of Milford, his right of four acres in second division of Sperry's farm and Chestnut Hill, which he bought of Stephen Perkins.

January 24, 1715-16, he bought of his brother-in-law John Thomas a small lot of land formerly owned by John Watson, bounded in part on widow Beecher and Stephen Perkins.

April 10, 1727, he bought 20 acres in Potter's farm. April 28, 1727, he sold two lots of land to his brother Stephen.

He married Hannah, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Hipkins) Ford, who was born

and was living as late as 1787. He made his will June 19, 1729, and which was proved April 26, 1739, in which he bequeathed to his daughter Hannah Perkins for the particular service she has rendered in my family the gold ring which was her own mother's.

To son Samuel 2/7 parts of my estate, real and personal.

To my two youngest sons, Peter and Ichabod, 1/7 part each of my estate.

To my daughters, Hannah, Dinah and Mabel, 1/7 part each of the estate with liberty to dwell in the house — my

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sons to have the land and my daughters to have the movables.

As my daughter Mabel hath lived for some time with her uncle-in-law Abraham Tomlinson of Derby, and hath some time longer to live with him for which said Tomlinson hath promised to give her a portion of his estate. In case he so doth my will is that what sum he shall give her shall be abated from ye 1/7 part I have above given her; and what shall be abated shall go to my youngest son Ichabod.

Son Samuel was appointed executor.

The witnesses were Nathan Perkins, John Horton and Joseph Perkins.

June 19, 1729, he was one of the three witnesses to the will of his brother Peter.

August 11, 1735, Daniel Hill of Durham, Conn., for £18, quitclaims to Nathan Perkins and his wife, formerly Abigail Hill, and to Susanna Hill, all interest in the estate of his mother, Abigail Hill, dec'd, late of New Haven.

He had made a will in which his widow Abigail was appointed executrix. On its presentation for probate, the Judge, for some unknown reason, refused to accept the same, and waiving the matter for the present, appointed her administratrix of the estate, January 7, 1747-8.

The inventory of the estate was £573, 5s, 6d. Joel was then the only surviving son.

He married, May 13, 1718, Abigail Hill, who died after January 7, 1747-8. He died , 1747.

He made his will January 31, 1763, which was admitted to probate March following, and in it he mentions his wife Mary, who is to have the use of his estate during life, and "my daughters" (whose names are not given) are "to share equally in its distribution after her decease."

Timothy Ball and wife Mary were named executors. The inventory amounted to £95, 13s. His widow Mary of Amity (now Woodbridge), Conn., left her estate to her daughter Mary, wife of Nicholas Russell of Cheshire, and to the heirs of her daughter Martha Brooks.

He seems to have left no children by his first wife. He died in 1763.

April 5, 1735, he bought of John Alcock of Waterbury for £7, 21/4 acres in Pine Rock Field, New Haven. March 17, 1735-6, he bought of Wait Chatterton 4 acres in the Yorkshire quarter. August 22, 1737, he bought of John Smith 3 acres salt marsh in Club Field. cember 13, 1738. Lt. Daniel deeded from Peter Perkins. Ir., for £35, 11½ acres and 2 rods in seventh division. January 2, 1738-9, he buys of Tilley Blakslee of Woodbury, for £16, 5s, 8 acres in seventh division, New Haven, that was laid out to Samuel Blakslee, Ir. December 13, 1738, he deeds to Peter Perkins, Jr., for £28, 9½ acres in fifth division, that once was Sam'l Bradley's. April 9, 1741, he was deeded land from Sam'l Cook and wife Abigail of Stratfield. June 12, 1741, he conveyed to Benj. Wilmot the 21/4 acres in Pine Rock Field above named. December 13, 1744, Daniel, Sr., by deed of gift conveys to his son Daniel of New Haven, "as part of his portion of my estate, 8½ acres formerly laid out to my father David Perkins, dec'd, in second division of sequestered land."

January 1, 1747-8, he conveyed by deed of gift to his son Amos 8¾ acres in seventh division "which I bought of Tillie Blakslee and was laid out to Sam'l Blakslee, Sr., where said Amos lives. Also a lot of land I bought of Wilmot containing 4½ acres. Also 11½ acres I bought of Peter Perkins laid out to Ann Collins, all which I value at £185, as part of his portion of my estate, old Tenor money. Same day he deeds to son Samuel 20½ acres and 3 rods land in sixth division laid out to my father David, which I value at £102, O. T., as part of his portion. Same day he deeds to son David by gift

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 $5\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and another lot of $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres, valued at £80. O. Tenor.

May 23, 1750, he and his two sons, Amos and David, bought of Abram and James Basset for £168 14 acres and 30 rods in seventh division.

November 28, 1751, Whereas, Daniel Perkins of New Haven and the rest of ye children then living of David Perkins, dec'd, by a certain instrument dated January 8, 1733-4, did divide the estate of said David and set off to James Thomas, then a minor and only child and heir of Rebecca Thomas, then dec'd, one of the children of said David, 10 acres; also one-third of the movable estate which said James doth now conceive to be his full portion, and receives said estate in full.

April 2, 1753, deeds from Moses Sperry 10 acres in seventh division bounded on Amos Perkins. April 9, 1753, for £319, O. T., sells to Hannah, widow of Isaac Sperry, 18 acres, 4 rods in fifth division.

Lieut. Daniel Perkins married May 5, 1714, Martha, daughter of Thomas Elcock, who was born in New Haven July , 1693; administration on her estate was granted to Obadiah Hotchkiss February 1767.

He made his will May 29, 1756, and it was proven December, 1760. In it he names his wife Martha, sons Amos and David, daughters Mary Hitchcock, Martha and Mercy Perkins; grandchildren Sarah and Samuel Perkins, children of son Samuel, to whom he gives 100 oz. of silver; grandchildren Elizabeth and Jabez Perkins, children of son Daniel, 100 oz. of silver. He made his will September 20, 1776, which was proved December 2, 1776. He bequeathed to his wife Lydia one-third of his movable estate. To his daughters, Lydia, wife of Roger Alling; Sarah, wife of Jacob Sperry; Martha, Mary and Huldah, £60 each. He appoints his sons, David and Isaac, executors, who have the residue of the estate.

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June 15, 1781, David Perkins, Roger Alling and his wife Lydia, Jacob Sperry and wife Sarah, Joel Hine and wife Mary and Huldah Perkins of New Haven, convey by deed to David Baldwin and wife Martha "all our right in 4½ acres in the parish of Amity; also £8 4s. 4d.; right in the dwelling house and barn, it being part of the third of widow Lydia Perkins, late of New Haven, deceased."

March 6, 1781, David and Huldah Perkins, Roger Alling and wife Lydia, David Baldwin and wife Martha, for and in consideration of a quit claim from Jacob Sperry and wife; Joel Hine and wife, do release, quit claim, &c, unto said Jacob and Joel, all our right in the home lot of David Perkins, dec'd, bounded east on the highway, north on Amos Perkins, west on Elijah Perkins, south on David Perkins and David Baldwin, being in all six acres. Also our right in the house and barn:—it being the thirds of widow Lydia Perkins, dec'd.

He died October 3, 1776, and his widow Lydia May 7, 1781.

It is not certain at what time he removed there, but as both of his marriages and the births of all his children are recorded at Washington, it is reasonable to suppose that he became an inhabitant there before or about the time of his first marriage.

The date of Elijah's birth is entered upon the Washington town records, but the names of his parents are omitted, which involved an extensive search in several of the towns of Litchfield and New Haven Counties before his identity could be established. It is quite probable the item was entered upon record at his own suggestion. He married, first, February 13, 1782, Sarah Castle, who was born , 1760, and died August 27, 1800, in her 41st year; second, Mary Clark, December 11, 1803, who died Sept. 12, 1833, in her 63rd year (born 1771). That she was probably the widow of Samuel Clark of Washington, living in the neighborhood, may be inferred from the following deed, viz.: February 19, 1806, Elias Clark conveys to Thomas Newton Clark two parcels of

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land in Wash'n, the first being an equal half of the Castle lot, bounded east on the highway, north on Titus, west on Brinsmead, south on Perkins, containing five acres. The second piece of like amount, bounded north and west on the highway, south on land set off as dower to Mary Clark, widow of Samuel Clark, bounded on said dower, and the house and lot. December 3, 1805, Mary Perkins bought of Elias Clark ten acres bounded east on the highway, south on Woodruff, west on New Milford line and on Perkins. According to the U. S. Census of 1790, the family of Elijah Perkins of Southbury, Litchfield County, consisted of one male 16 years and upwards, three males under 16, and two females.

June 21, 1802, the date of his first deed on Washington records, he bought of John Smith 2nd., for \$2,000.00, sixty-five acres with a dwelling house and barn, and one-seventh part of a cider mill thereon, reserving the ground on which the school-house stands according to the lease thereof on the records of said Washington, given by said Smith to said district; said land bounded north on Clark, Brinsmade and Kinnee, west on Brinsmade, New Milford line and Woodruff, south on Hanford, the highway and Kinnee, and east on the highway, Woodruff and Kinnee.

December 3, 1805, he and wife Mary (second wife), for £50, sold to Daniel Clark of Washington, six acres land in Milford, bounded east and west on Bard's land, north and south on Newton and Daniel Clark.

March 17, 1815, he bought of Thomas Newton Clark twenty acres bounded north on Clark, west on McMahon, south on said Perkins, east on the highway, it being the same estate mortgaged to said Clark March 25, 1811.

March 14, 1816, he deeds to Elijah and Truman Wood-ruff twenty rods of land lying a little east of their cooper's shop, bounded south on the highway, east and north on said Perkins, and west on Woodruff.

April 28, 1818, he conveys to Jehiel Perkins five acres, "it being the northwest corner lot of my farm," bounded north on Newton Clark; west on William Fenn; south and east on me.

May 6, 1836, Elijah Perkins deeds to Samuel C. Perkins twelve acres beginning from the southwest corner of my garden, bounded north on Kinney and Clark; east on Kinney and the highway; south on the highway; west on first mentioned line.

September 15, 1836, Elijah Perkins deeds to Jehiel Perkins of Auburn, Cayuga County, N. Y., five acres in Washington, lying on Church Hill, it being the lot of land on the northwest corner of my farm, bounded west and north on Thos. N. Cole, east and south on me.

He died November 22, 1843, aged 87 years, 4 months and 5 days.

The following will of Elijah Perkins is copied verbatim from the records at Washington, Ct.:

"At a Court of Probate held at Washington, within and for the District of Washington, on the 11th day of December, A. D., 1842. Present, Ithiel Hickox, Judge.

"Samuel C. Perkins appeared in Court and presented the will of Elijah Perkins, late of Washington, deceased,

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which was proved and ordered to be recorded, and is in the words and figures following, viz.:

"I, Elijah Perkins, of Washington, in Litchfield County, do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament.

"In the first place I give and bequeath unto my sons Isaac Perkins and Jehiel Perkins one hundred and fifty dollars each; and to the heirs of my son Tyrus, deceased, the sum of one hundred dollars. I give and bequeath to my son Azariah Perkins thirty-eight dollars.

"My son Harvey Perkins and my daughter Laura Hanford have received in full their portions.

"All the real and personal estate I die possessed of, after paying the debts and the aforesaid legacies (and I hereby order the sale of the real estate to pay them if there should not be personal estate sufficient) shall be divided in the following manner (viz.): one-third part to go to Samuel C. Perkins and his heirs forever; and the remaining two-thirds to go to my sons Isaac Perkins and Jehiel Perkins and their heirs forever. I constitute and appoint Ithiel Hickox executor on this my last will and testament, and I hereby revoke all former wills and declare this to be my last will and testament, this 31st day of July, A. D. Signed and sealed with my hand in the presence of Mary W. Brinsmade, A. I. Brinsmade, S. H. Mitchell. "Elijah Perkins."

Ithiel Hickox refuses to serve as executor and Daniel G. Platt, by the wish of two of the sons, is appointed to administer upon the estate.

Also Andrew Heine, Jr., and Ira Baker are appointed to appraise the estate. At the same time the administrator represents the estate insolvent, and orders that commissioners be appointed to examine and adjust the claims of creditors.

Nathaniel Perry of New Milford, and Andrew Heine, Jr., of Washington, were chosen commissioners.

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Inventory of estate, \$958.44½.

Debts against same, \$688.34.

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in the distribution of his estate no part thereof was set to my brother Silas, but his real estate was equally divided between me and my brother Elijah and sister Hannah Thompson, the then wife of Thaddeus Thompson, and, whereas I have been at considerable expense in boarding, clothing and taking care of said Silas, and he now is and has been incapable of taking care of himself; and my will furthermore now is that one-fourth of the real estate to be in the settlement of my estate set to Silas and that after deducting from said fourth part such sum or sums as may seem reasonable and just for my expense of boarding and clothing and taking care of said Silas be and remain to him, said Silas, and sold; the avails thereof to be applied to his maintenance and support."

His education finished, he entered a Parisian bank, where he remained three years. Then, possessed of a desire for a student's life, he sought the "Quartier Latin" in Paris, where he studied law two years, when his health became impaired and he was compelled to seek a milder climate, which he found in Italy, where he also spent two years studying history and learning the language.

He was in Naples when the War of the Rebellion broke out, and his father's death about that time summoned him home, and after the settlement of family affairs he visited Washington, passed an examination in

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the State Department, and was appointed Consul and Secretary of Legation to Stockholm, to which city he accompanied General J. J. Bartlett, U. S. Minister to Sweden.

Returning to Washington during President Grant's administration, he was appointed Consul to Barcelona, Spain, where he served during the political upheaval, at which time many political prisoners appealed to him for protection, and he frequently saw a mob in control of the city.

Later he was made private secretary to Col. Charles H. Lewis, U. S. Minister to Portugal, with official residence in Lisbon.

With his resignation he ended his diplomatic career and returned to the United States, becoming a member of the Open Board of Brokers, and later a member of the New York Stock Exchange.

Improving some of the opportunities presented, he acquired a fortune, withdrew from "The Street," and, having obtained a new appointment, he returned to Europe.

While in Lisbon in his official capacity he was frequently at court, and there, under the strict court etiquette, met Her Royal Highness Dona Isabel, sister to ex-Queen Isabella of Spain, and her daughter, Princess Dona Maria Isabella Francoise de Bourbon, Countess de Gurowski, who, banished from Spain, were living in exile in Lisbon.

His marriage to the Princess, who was born at Brussels, in Belgium, June 10, 1847, under a dispensation from the Pope, took place in Lisbon November 12, 1870, at the French Roman Catholic Church of St. Louis.

While at Lisbon King Dom Luis conferred upon him two orders of knighthood, viz.: Knight of the Royal Military Order of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and Knight of the Royal Military Order of Portugal of Our Lady of the Conception Villa Vicosa.

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During his remarkable career he made one serious mistake, *i. e.*, when he expressed his disfavor for ex-Queen Isabella, or her son, being crowned, and his preference for her rival, Don Carlos, to the throne of Spain.

Alfonso, ex-Queen Isabella's son, was crowned King in December, 1874, and Mr. Perkins' name was written in the list of proscribed persons. If he had favored and espoused the cause of Alfonso, instead of Carlos, he might have held any position.

His wife, however, regained her prestige at court, and through her influence Mr. Perkins was permitted to join his family in Madrid, but he was considered a foreign interloper, was continually distrusted, and was humiliated to that extent that his self-respect prompted him to return to the United States, locating at Syracuse, N. Y., where he was professor of languages at the University and where he spent the remainder of his life. Ex-Queen Isabella remained his friend and she wrote him after returning to this country.

He was a man of many and varied accomplishments, a bon-vivant, a most entertaining and charming companion, and withal a thorough and cultured gentleman. Twenty-five years spent in different European nations had made him a cosmopolitan of great versatility, and as a linguist few in our country could equal him, while in language, history, anthropology, theology and sociology he was a devoted student.

His death occurred in Syracuse.

In 1828, when he was teaching school in New Haven, someone gave him a small printed volume, purporting to be a history or genealogy of the Perkins family.

The book was then nearly one hundred and fifty years old and gave an account of many of the name, some in England and some in America.

He kept the book until May, 1833, when he moved to Ohio, leaving it in the house he had occupied. It did not interest him at that time, as he knew nothing of his ancestors back of his grandfather.

In 1848 he returned to Waterbury, and going to the house where he left the book he failed to get any trace of it. He frequently spoke of this old book to his children and grandchildren, and it is one of the latter who furnishes this information.

Note—William Perkins wrote a pamphlet which was printed in Boston in 1682; it is very rare, and no copy, if there are any extant, has been located.

It probably was printed from an original manuscript which was later copied into the town records of Topsfield, Mass., and which is printed in the *Essex Antiquarian*, Vol. III.

This manuscript was written by "Mr." Edward Perkins of London, and his brother, Rev. William Perkins of Topsfield, Mass., added to it, so that it mentions four generations, ending with the children of the last-named person. This volume was the earliest genealogy printed in America.

The account of the ceremony was published in Paris in a court circular for private circulation among royal folk living lives of voluntary exile or compulsory expatriation there, and it states that Queen Isabella presented herself in the most graceful manner, and the Princess Isabella, her eldest daughter, accompanied Her Majesty. The Count de Gurowski represented Prince Alfonso (afterwards King of Spain), while the most distinguished members of the American colony in Paris graced the occasion.

In 1890, at the age of 17, he was preparing himself for a career at Madrid, and later, since his mother's cousin, Alfonso, succeeded to the throne of Spain, without doubt he was highly favored in court and official circles. Information relating to his subsequent career is wanting to complete this sketch of a Bourbon prince of American paternity.

DUTCH JOHNSONS IN CONNECTICUT

By Donald Lines Jacobus, M. A., of New Haven, Conn.

Among the numerous Johnson families of old Connecticut we have reason to suppose that two, at least, were of Dutch origin. There has been much speculation concerning the antecedents of William Johnson of New Haven and Wallingford, Conn., whose family is given in the REGISTER, Vol. 55, p. 369. Mr. James Shepard surmises that he might have been a son of Thomas Johnson, one of the three brothers from Yorkshire, England, who was drowned in New Haven Harbor in 1640 (REGISTER, Vol. 56, p. 133). This poor Thomas has been of inestimable value to the genealogists, who have bestowed on him as offspring a large number of stray Johnsons. In strict fact, he left two sons, Thomas of Newark, N. J., and Jeremiah of Derby, Conn. (New Haven Proprietors' Records, Vol. 2, pp. 328-330). And there is not a shadow of evidence to prove that William was his son.

Then, who was William Johnson? Perhaps the following facts will throw some light on the question. The death of a certain "Old Richard" Johnson is recorded in New Haven on March 25, 1679. His estate was administered April 1, 1679, when we find him called not Richard but "Derieke Johnson" (Probate Records, Vol. 1, p. 182), and after the payment of debts the court granted the remainder of his estate to William Johnson (County Records, vol. 1, p. 115; and Deeds, Vol. 1, p. 73). No mention is made of the relationship between them, but it is evident that they were not father and son. If, however, we remember that Richard is called Derrick, and that William himself frequently appears on record as Wingle, it is pretty safe to assume that they were of Dutch descent, and very likely stood in the relation of uncle and nephew to each other.

Much more perplexing is the origin of Walter Johnson of Wallingford, Conn., whose immediate family has been carefully

compiled by Mr. James Shepard and published in the Register, Vol. 56, p. 139. Up to the present time nothing has been known concerning him, except that he appeared in Wallingford before 1692, married a nameless daughter of Nehemiah and Hannah (Morgan) Royce, and died in 1731, leaving two sons, John and Lambert.

The following record from the Dutch Church of Flatbush, L. I., adds considerably to our meagre information: "1689, July 5, Wouter Jansen widy, of Johana Rys of N. England at Wallingford, to Tryntie Henerig, wid. of Wm. Edwards, liv. Pennu (?)." Two facts are made clear by this record of our Walter Johnson's second marriage. In the first place it discloses the full name of his first wife, Joanna Rovce. In the second place, taken in connection with his signing his name Janson in Wallingford deeds, it indicates Dutch blood. Moreover, it leads to the surmise that John was Walter's only child by the Royce alliance, and that Lambert was the offspring of this second marriage. At any rate, John is named in his grandfather Royce's will, while Lambert is not; and John deeds away Royce land, while Lambert does not. Moreover, late in life, Walter Johnson deeds a piece of land to his son Lambert, in consideration of which the latter is to maintain his father and mother for the rest of their lives. It looks very much as if this widow Tryntie was Lambert's mother. Yet, interesting as these discoveries are, they do not go very far toward lifting the veil that obscures the early life of Walter Johnson. The problem is made more complex by a power of attorney (Wallingford Deeds, Vol. 5, p. 454), granted in 1728 by John Benham of Kings County, N. Y., Lambert Johnson and wife Anna of Richmond, N. Y., Jacob Johnson and wife Sara of Richmond, and Evert Van Namen and wife Winefrut. John. Anna, Sarah, and Winifred were four of the children of Joseph Benham of Wallingford by his wife Winifred King of Boston. Lambert and Jacob Johnson and Evert Van Namen, husbands of the three Benham girls, lived on Staten Island, where they belonged to the Dutch Reformed Church. This document is surprising, as it proves that two Dutch Johnsons, of the same generation as Walter, married Wallingford girls; and one of them bore the same name of Lambert, which was also the name of

Walter's son. A natural supposition is that they were brothers of his, and met the Benham girls while visiting his home.

As is well known, the Dutch rarely bore a permanent surname, but went by a patronymic derived from the father's Christian name. Thus, Lambert Johnson and Jacob Johnson were simply Lambert and Jacob, sons of John or Jan; but before 1700 the Dutch in America had begun to retain the father's patronymic after the English fashion, so it need not surprise us to find in the Staten Island records that Lambert and Jacob Johnson were sometimes known as Lambert and Jacob Wouters. This implies that they were sons of a certain Jan Wouters (John son of Walter), and that they sometimes retained the Wouters and sometimes called themselves Jansen after their father's Christian name. This makes it all the more likely that Walter Johnson was their brother, for, as the son of Jan Wouters, he would be named after his grandfather Walter or Wouter.

Consequently, it is necessary to locate a Jan Wouters who could have been father of Walter, Lambert, and Jacob. And what is our amazement to learn that Jacob Johnson, son of John Wouters, was born in Branford, Conn., December 31, 1672 (Branford Records, Vol. 1, p. 174). Here is a Dutch Jacob Johnson who, learning the English tongue in his infancy, would be most eligible to marry an English girl. That he is identical with the Jacob of Staten Island is proved by the father's name; and his wife, Sarah Benham, was born four years later, September 6, 1676. According to Savage, Ian Wouters lived at Branford from 1667 to 1673; and, when we come to search for his antecedents we find that in 1667 he owned salt meadows in Flatbush, L. I., the very place where Walter Johnson, undoubtedly his son, married his second wife. From Branford he returned to Flatbush, where in 1678 he hired out his son Ruth (Rutgert) to his brother-in-law Laurens Jurianse. He was living in 1695, when he calls himself of New York.

Jan Wouters is by no means an uncommon name, and it will therefore require some evidence to prove that our man of that name, who was a master-shoemake by trade, was identical with Jan Wouters Van der Bosch, whose name appears in the Flatbush Church Records of this period. On May 12, 1678, were baptized

Jacobus, aged 51-2, Judith, aged 25-6, and Jan, aged 11-4, children of Jan Wouters Van der Bosch and Weintie Peters, who came from Stanford, New England. It is probable that the original record reads "Branford," and that "Stanford" is an error of the copyist who prepared these records for the press; for a limited search in Stanford, Conn., has failed to reveal the presence there of any Jan Wouters or Van der Bosches. Moreover, the age of Jacobus (the Latinized form of Jacob or James) exactly corresponds with the age of Jacob Johnson, son of Jan Wouters, who was born at Branford in December, 1672. Or the whole, it is extremely improbable that two Jan Wouters, one at Branford and the other at Stanford, each had a son Jacob born in the same month of the same year. Another proof of identity is the fact that Ian Wouter Van der Bosch married Weintie Peters, while Laurens Jurianse Haf married Kenira Peters; and we have already mentioned that Laurens Jurianse was brother-inlaw of our Ian Wouters.

With these facts established, it is possible to sketch the earlier generation of Walter Johnson's family.

1 JAN¹ WOUTERS VAN DER BOSCH, son of Wouter Van der Bosch born about 1638, resided at Flatbush, L. I., and Branford, Conn., and died after 1695. He married, first, Arente Arents, and, second, Weintie Peters, whose sister Kenira Peters married, July 5, 1676, Laurens Jurianse Haf. The Peters family came from Amersfoort.

Children by the first wife:

- 2 LAMBERT² JANSEN, baptized at New York Nov. 17, 1660.

- 2 LAMBERT² JANSEN or WOUTERS (1) Jan¹), baptized at New York November 17, 1660, settled on Staten Island. He married Anna Benham of Wallingford, who was born in 1669.

WINNIFRET3 JANSEN, baptized at Staten Island May 5, 1696. The witnesses of the christening were Jan Wauterzen (perhaps her uncle Jan Jansen) and Tryntie Hendricksen (perhaps Walter Johnson's wife, Tryntie Henerig).

AAFYE³, baptized Sept. 7, 1698. The witness was Jacob Jansen.

LAMBERT³, baptized April 22, 1707. The witness was Evert Van Namen.

SARA³, daughter of Lambert "Wouters," baptized April 19, 1709. The witnesses were Evert Van Namen and Sara Jans.

3 WOUTER² JANSEN (1) Jan¹, born probably at Flatbush, about 1666, settled at Wallingford, Conn., where he was known as Walter Johnson, and died February 6, 1731. He married, first, Joanna Royce, who was born about 1670 and died about 1688; and, second, at Flatbush, July 5, 1689, Tryntie Henerig, widow of William Edwards.

JOHANNA³, baptized April 22, 1707.

BENJAMIN⁸, son of Jacob "Wouters," baptized Oct. 23, 1711. The witnesses were Hendrick Maarlin and Antie Wouters.

5 ANTJE² JANSEN or ANNA JOHNSON (1) Jan¹, born about 1688, died after 1752, seems to belong to this family. As Antie Wouters she witnessed the christening of Benjamin Jansen. She married John Jenner or Jennes of Staten Island, and, in accordance with Dutch custom, appears on record under her maiden name of Wouters at the christening of her daughter Sara, and of Johnson at the christening of her daughter Elsje.

SARAH JENNER³, baptized June 5, 1720. The witnesses were Evert Van Namen and Jenneken Van Namen.

JOHN JENNER³, married Aeltye Marlin, and had issue—Aentje, Jan, Willem and Elsye.

ANTJE JENNER³, married Joachim Stilwell, and had issue—Richard and Jan.

WILLEM JENNER³, married Jannetye Garretse, and had issue—Antje.

ELSJE JENNER³, baptized September 1, 1734. The witnesses were Lambert Jenner and Wyntje Johnson.

6 LAMBERT³ JOHNSON [(3) Walter², (2) Jan¹], born about 1691, died November 27, 1726, lived at Wallingford. He married, March 1, 1716, Rebecca Curtis.

BENJAMIN*, born Dec. 10, 1716; married, April 11, 1751, Mary Doolittle. His family lived at Bantam, Conn., where his sons Benjamin and Lambert are buried.

7 CORNELIS⁸ JANSEN [(4) Jacob², (1) Jan¹], baptized in the Dutch Church on Staten Island April 20, 1703. He married Sarah Mambrut, evidently of French stock.

MARIA⁴, baptized Feb. 20, 1726. The witnesses were Jaques Seguin and Lady Mambrut.

8 CORNELIUS⁴ JOHNSON [(6) Lambert³, (3) Walter², (1) Jan¹], born at Wallingford February 13, 1719, removed to Waterbury, Conn., where he died about 1802. Administration was granted on his estate May 3, 1802 (Waterbury Probate Records, Vol. 3, p. 317). He married Elizabeth Lewis.

ELIZABETH⁵, born Jan. 2, 1750; died Sept. 12, 1766. ASA⁵, born about 1751; died Dec. 13, 1751. ASA⁵, born June 24, 1754; died Feb. 8, 1758. JESSE⁵, born July 27, 1756; married, Aug. 23, 1780, Hannah Beach, widow of John. CORNELIUS⁵, born Nov. 13, 1758; died June, 1762.

OTHER CONNECTICUT PERKINS FAMILIES

Besides the New Haven family there were numerous other Perkins families that settled in Connecticut at an early date. Perhaps the best known of these is the Norwich branch, founded by two brothers, Joseph³ and Jabez³, sons of Sargeant Jacob², and grandsons of John¹ Perkins, Senior, of Ipswich, Mass.

Their descendants are very numerous and are scattered all over the United States. The genealogy of the Norwich family appeared in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register for April, 1860 (Vol. XIV., No. 2), and it was reprinted in pamphlet form; the latter publication, and perhaps the former, can still be obtained from genealogical booksellers in Boston ,New York, Albany and Elizabeth, N. J.

For this reason genealogical notes concerning the Norwich branch are omitted from these pages, and preference given to other Connecticut families not so well known and which have not been exploited in the usual channels — town histories and genealogical publications.

Miss Caulkins, in her *History of Norwich*, however, mentions a 'Daniel Perkins' as being the first of the name to settle there. His name appears earliest on the town records. He married, in 1682, Dolinda, daughter of Thomas Bliss of the Town-plot. His

identity was not established by Miss Caulkins, nor have his antecedents, so far as is known, since been ascertained.

And the death of a "Mr. Joseph Perkins" in 1698 is the record of another who is still unattached to any known Perkins family. His appearance in Norwich so soon after the brothers, Matthew³, Joseph³ and Jabez³, made their extensive purchases of land in 1694 and 1695, suggests that he was a relative, but this fact has not yet been satisfactorily established.

The lesser known Perkins families now formally introduced are those settled in New London, Preston, Ashford, Canterbury and Lyme.

PERKINS FAMILY OF NEW LONDON, CONN

Luke³ Perkins, son of Quartermaster John² (John¹, senior), was born in Ipswich, Mass., in 1649, and married there April 26, 1677, Elizabeth, daughter of Henry Jaquith, who died about 1690.

About 1692, he married a second wife, Sarah whose identity has not yet been ascertained.

December, 1675, Luke Perkins states he was in a company that went out against the Indians and returned unharmed. Another company from Ipswich, however, in a great battle with the Indians (probably the Narragansetts) lost three killed and twenty-two wounded.

His father deeded to him his homestead and other lands upon certain conditions, which Luke did not fulfill to his father's satisfaction; a lawsuit resulted, and, by order of the Court, Luke was obliged to transfer the property back to his father. The suit was tried in March, 1687.

In 1688-9, he sold his house and storehouse for sixty pounds, "silver currency of New England," to Thomas Smith, taylor.

The births of two children, John⁴ and Sarah⁴, are recorded in Ipswich in 1693 and 1694 respectively; but apparently the result of the lawsuit prejudiced him against his father, and his brothers Abraham³ and Jacob³, his father's attorneys, for he left the place and settled in New London, probably in that part which, in 1705,

was set off to Groton, and where, in 1709, he purchased additional land.

Between 1709 and 1721 he deeded portions of his land to both his sons, but only to Luke⁴, Jr., after latter date. His son John evidently preferred Ipswich to Groton, as he returned there and married, January 30, 1711, Anna, daughter of John⁴ and Mary Perkins of Wenham, Mass.

Many of the records of New London were destroyed when, in September, 1781, the British troops under Benedict Arnold burned the town; so but few facts regarding Luke have been ascertained; he died in 1725, and his will is on record in Groton, and in it he mentions his wife Sarah, his sons John and Luke, and his daughters Sarah and Hannah. His wife left half her property to each of her sons, John and Luke.

The children of Luke³ and Sarah () Perkins were:

JOHN⁴, born May 14, 1693; married, Jan. 30, 1711, Mary Perkins.

SARAH⁴, born Jan. 22, 1694.

LUKE⁴, born , 1696; married, Dec. 12, 1715, Lydia Davis; died 1777.

HANNAH4, born in New London.

Luke⁴ Perkins, Jr., son of Luke³ (Quartermaster John², John¹, Senior), was born in 1696, probably in New London, where he died January 8, 1777, at the age of 81.

He married, December 12, 1715, Lydia Davis, and he, his wife and several sons and grandsons are buried in the Perkins yard in Groton, where there is also a gravestone of Henry Perkins, who died in 1750, aged 67 years, whose antecedents are unknown.

He left a will in which he only mentions children of his son James, deceased; his son Ebenezer, his granddaughter Eunice Latham, and his only daughter Lydia.

The children of Luke* and Lydia (Davis) Perkins were:

SOLOMON⁵, born in 1716; died young.

ELNATHAN⁵, born in 1718; killed at the Battle of Groton Heights Sept. 6, 1781.

ELENOR⁵, born in 1720.

LYDIA⁵, born in 1722.

EUNICE⁵, born in 1725.

SOLOMON⁵, born in 1729; wounded at the Battle of Groton Heights Sept. 6, 1781.

JAMES⁵, born in 1733; married

EBENEZER⁵, born in 17 ; wounded at the Battle of Groton Heights Sept. 6, 1781.

Elnathan⁵ Perkins, son of Luke⁴ (Luke³, Quartermaster John², John¹, Senior, of Ipswich, Mass.), was born in Groton in 1718; married Mary Phillips; and was killed in the successful storming and capture of Fort Griswold in the Battle of Groton Heights, September 6, 1781, by the British troops under the command of Benedict Arnold.

A massacre followed the capture of the fort; practically all the little garrison who bravely defended it were killed or wounded in the assault or were massacred after the fort was taken.

As a memorial to those patriots who lost their lives there an appropriate monument has been erected on the site and upon it are inscribed their names. Among the defenders were eight bearing the name of Avery and six that of Perkins. Of the six, three, Elisha, Asa and Luke were sons of Elnathan, and two other sons, Solomon and Ebenezer, were wounded; his son-in-law, Capt. John Williams, who married his daughter Theoda was also killed, leaving a widow and eight children. After the massacre Amy (or Ama) Williams, the eldest daughter of Capt. John, then a young girl, entered the fort to care for the wounded and to look for her relatives among the dead.

PERKINS FAMILY OF PRESTON, CONN.

Ebenezer⁴ Perkins, son of Samuel³ (Quartermaster John², John¹, Senior), was born in Ipswich, Mass., February 3, 1681, and married, first, August 14, 1710, Hannah Safford, at Preston, Conn., to which place he had removed from Ipswich. The name of his second wife has not been ascertained. From Preston he removed to Voluntown, Conn., where he settled upon land granted to his father, Samuel Perkins, for services in the Narragansett war. This land he subsequently sold to John Wildes of Topsfield for £26 8s. 6d., and removed to Coventry, R. I., where he died in 1754.

The children of Ebenezer* and Hannah (Safford) Perkins were:

John⁴ Perkins, son of Samuel³ (Quartermaster John², John¹, Senior), was born in Ipswich, Mass., May 12, 1692. He removed to Preston in 1719, where his brother Ebenezer had settled. He was a mariner, and died in Curacoa, West Indies, in 1753.

He left a will in which he gave to his brother Ebenezer's son John money he had left in the hands of Edward Richardson of Newbury; other money left in the hands of Jacob Perkins of Chebacco, of which he gave him four pistoles and the rest to his sister Hannah.

All his land in Ipswich, and all his interest when remitted home were to be divided between the children of his brother Ebenezer 'by his first wife." They, with the exception of Lemuel, who had previously sold his share, about nine acres, gave a power of attorney to John Harris of Boston in 1754 to sell the property.

Evidently he was unmarried.

PERKINS FAMILY OF ASHFORD, CONN.

The Perkins family located at Ashford, Conn., descended from Rev. William¹ Perkins of Topsfield, Mass.

Dr. John³ Perkins, an eminent physician of Boston, was a son of John² and grandson of Rev. William¹ Perkins, both of Topsfield.

Dr. John Perkins died in Lynnfield, Mass., in 1781, aged 83 years, and in the settlement of his estate a receipt was given by John⁵ Perkins of Ashford, Conn., acknowledging the receipt of a payment of a legacy bequeathed him by his grandfather, Dr. John Perkins of Boston.

Captain Isaac Perkins of Connecticut, who distinguished himself for his energy, activity and patriotism during the Revolution, was a descendant of this Ashford branch.

But little information regarding this family has come to the knowledge of the writer, but the following record of the family of William Perkins is taken from the Lee Genealogy, compiled by Rev. William H. Hill and published in 1851 by Weed, Parsons & Co. of Albany, N. Y.:

Isaac Perkins of Ashford, Conn., was born ; married Tamison, daughter of Deacon Benjamin and Mary () (Ross) Chaplin of Mansfield, Conn.

He served as town clerk and treasurer of Ashford, and was chosen deacon in 1789. He died in 1795.

Jacob⁵ Perkins, son of Jacob⁴ (Jacob³, Quartermaster John², John¹, Senior), was baptized in Ipswich, Mass., May 8, 1715, was published to Mary Fuller February 9, and the marriage occurred March 19, 1740.

These facts are on record in Ipswich, but information furnished by a descendant is that the name of his wife was Sarah Fuller. Whether there were two Fuller marriages, or the name was erroneously "handed down" in the family, we cannot say.

He was living in 1759, when his father mentions him in his will as having had his full share of his estate.

PERKINS FAMILY OF LYME, CONN.

James⁵ Perkins, son of Abraham⁴ (Isaac³, Quartermaster John², John¹ Perkins, Senior, of Ipswich, Mass.), was the first of the name to settle in Lyme. He followed in Ipswich the occupation of "cordwainer," and on December 14, 1732, married Margaret, daughter of Deacon John and Elizabeth Andrews of Chebacco, Ipswich.

In company with his brother-in-law, John Butler, who had married his sister Hannah, he went to Lyme, where, March 30, 1736, they purchased jointly of William Rathbun a tract of land comprising 294½ acres on the hill called "Mount Archer," with the dwelling house, barn, forest trees, fences, timber and stone, etc., for £982 1s.

Their families probably accompanied them as letters of dismission and recommendation were issued about that date to "Hannah, wife of John Butler," and to "Margaret, wife of James Perkins," dismissing them to the Third Church in Lyme.

December 9, 1736, Perkins and Butler divided this purchase, quit-claiming to each other, and each one granting the other a right of way across his farm, "a pent highway for himself and his heirs to pass and repass * * * with his creatures of all kinds, forever."

September 2, 1758, he bought of James Ely of Lyme, for £6 lawful money, one certain piece or tract of land in Lyme at the mouth of Eight Mile River (which empties into the Connecticut), which land was subject to overflow at high tide.

April 24, 1789, he sold to his son John for £541 18s. two pieces or tracts of land; one lot is where I now live, the other called the "ell" lot, containing about 50 acres, and the other lot about 96 acres, etc. Also, one other piece of land, a marsh or flat con-

taining about two acres * * * being a piece of flats or tidal land at the mouth of Eight Mile River, etc. In Lyme his occupation was farming, and this last transfer was doubtless made in anticipation of his death, which occurred a few months later. His wife's death was previous to his own.

In the "Marvin Burying Yard" may still be seen a couple of gravestones bearing the following inscriptions:

"In Memory of Mr. James Perkins, who died Sept. 27th,
1789, in the 84th year of his age."
"In Memory of Mrs. Margaret Perkins, wife of Mr.
James Perkins, who died Nov. 20th, 1781, in
the 70th year of her age."

There are three or four small stones set up by the side of the above graves bearing no inscriptions, and they may be for children of the above.

An inventory of his estate was taken and accepted by the court at New London June 14, 1790, and October 10, 1791. It showed that he died possessed of little personal property of the value of £7 4s. 9d. and a "Right of Land at Susquehanna," £4 10s.

His two oldest children, James, Jr., and Lucy, were born in Ipswich, and their births are recorded there; they are also recorded at Lyme, together with the other children.

The will is dated Aug. 20, 1776, and it was proved Sept. 21, 1784. He mentions in it his wife Lucy, his children Hannah and George Whitefield Perkins, his brothers and sisters, John, Isaac and Seth Perkins, Lucy Ely, Elizabeth Startin, Margaret Belden, Sarah Marvin, Hannah and Lydia Perkins; also his father, who resides at Lyme. The inventory shows, real estate and personal property (books). Executors, his wife, her brother William Ely, son George Whitefield Perkins, and brother-in-law Samuel Startin. Lucy Cook, late Lucy Smith, sworn as executrix.

Issac, decsd."), etc. It amounted to £123 &s. 10d., and included wearing apparel, books, furniture and utensils, part of a set of cooper's tools, cash, a wheel and a cow, besides a "debt due from James Perkins, as appears by four notes of hand he gave the Relict for £18 each for the benefit of children."

The widow Lois married, May 15, 1783, Jacob Ely of Lyme, and they probably removed to Harwinton, Conn. By her second husband she had seven sons. She died April 11, 1837, aged 81 years and 8 months. Jacob Ely died Sept. 28, 1836.

Abraham⁵ Perkins was the son of Abraham⁴ (Isaac³, Quartermaster John², John¹ Perkins, Senior, of Ipswich, Mass.) was born in Ipswich in 1708, and evidently soon followed his brother James and his sisters Hannah and Elizabeth to Lyme, as he was admitted freeman there in 1741, having previously married, February 28, 1739, Elizabeth Ely.

His first purchase of land in Lyme was July 4, 1741, and September 9, 1771, he deeded land to his son Abraham.

A genealogical paper left by Gaius Perkins of South Woodstock, Vt., who died in 1870 at the age of 91, contained the following information: "My grandfather was Abraham Perkins. He went from Ipswich in the Bay State, to Lyme, Conn., where he married Elizabeth Ely."

He mentions the children of his great-grandfather in the fol-

lowing order: Abigail, James, Isaac, Abraham, Hannah, Sarah, Elizabeth and Joseph, four of whom, James, Abraham, Hannah and Elizabeth, settled in Lyme.

After the death of his wife he married, July 15, 1759, Mary (Pearson), widow of Richard Ely, who died

Excepting their births, his sons Francis, Daniel and Benjamin are not mentioned in the Lyme records. They settled elsewhere.

He died May 10, 1786. His will is dated April 3, 1786, and was proved September 11 following. He mentions "my beloved wife," "my eldest daughter Betty Mather," "my youngest daughter Sarah Pratt," "my sons Francis Perkins, William Perkins, Daniel Perkins, Abraham Perkins, Jr., Samuel Perkins, and Joseph Perkins."

In the stirring times preceding the Revolution he was a Loyalist, and on that account found life in Lyme uncongenial, and about 1761 he and other ardent Loyalists emigrated to Horton, Kings County, Nova Scotia, where they took up or were granted lands after the expulsion of the Acadians.

He was a small man, but very active; his wife was a very large woman, as were her sisters, and her brothers were also large men. His wife died in 1820 and is buried in the old Oak burying ground in Horton. After her death he sold his property and moved to Aylesford, Kings County, Nova Scotia, where his son Ely had previously settled, and about two years later, in October, 1822 or '23, he died. He is buried in the Randal burying ground in Aylesford.

The children of Francis⁶ and Elizabeth (Peck) Perkins were: ELY⁷, born in Lyme about ; married, 1788 or '89, Sarah, youngest daughter of Nathan and (Prentice) DaWolfe of Horton Nova Section who was

He was a large man and a farmer by occupation. His father settled him on part of his farm, which Ely afterwards sold and he removed to Aylesford, Nova Scotia. Being very easy-going in business matters, he managed to let most of his property slip through his fingers.

He died suddenly of apoplexy Jan. 10, 1825, and is buried in the Randal burying ground in Aylesford.

His widow married for her second husband Toel Farnsworth, and after his death she lived in Clarence, Annapolis County, N. S., for many years. Her death was on Christmas day, 1865, when she was nearly 93.

His sons were noted for their scholastic attainments, and it is believed they continued to reside at Jamaica.

CYRUS PECK⁷, born at Horton, N. S., about 1776. There were just seven years between the ages of the first and second son, and between the second and the third son. He was educated at Kings College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, and was ordained a clergyman of the Church of England by the first Bishop Ingles, and was appointed rector of St. Luke's Parish in Annapolis County and chaplain to His Majesty's forces at Annapolis Royal.

He married, January 11, 1810, Phebe, youngest daughter of Henry Rutherford of Digby, Nova Scotia, formerly of New York, and a member of the firm of Nash & Rutherford, brokers to the British Army.

Shortly after the death of his wife, which occurred about 18 , he removed to England, where a good parish was offered to and accepted by him at Brixham, Devon.

He was drowned in Tor Bay while yachting, with two of his men whose bodies were recovered, while his own was not, although every effort was made to recover it and a reward of £500 offered.

John Perkins of Lyme, concerning whose antecedents we have been able to learn but little, had settled there prior to April, 1740, at which time he was admitted freeman. He appeared in Lyme contemporaneously with the two brothers, James and Abraham Perkins, and might have been a relative. All the early records mention him as "of Lyme," and his first purchase of land there was May 28, 1740.

He probably was the John Perkins who, May 27, 1727, married Lydia Malsworth at Montville, a village lying about midway between Norwich and New London.

He died, probably early in 1763, as March 19th of that year Lydia and Joshua Perkins, as administrators of the estate of John Perkins, deceased, sold part of his real estate. Another deed of sale bearing the same date is recorded from Lydia Perkins, Joshua Perkins, Jona Perkins, David Wood, Lydia Wood, his wife, Timothy Minard, Martha Minard, all of Lyme, aforesaid; John Perkins of Hebron in Hartford County, Isaac Lamphire and Sarah Lamphire, his wife, Mary Perkins of Coventry in Windham County, co-heirs of John Perkins, late of Lyme, etc.

PERKINS' RECORDS OF HAMPTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE

"Charlton, Mass., Nov. 2, 1881.

"Sir:

"When I was a young man and lived at home with my father "one-half mile from the old Perkins farm, it was located on the "road leading to the old tide mill, known then as Brown's mill, "but for thirty years past has been owned by the Perkins family.

"Capt. James Perkins, who now resides and lives probably on "the same spot where the first person by the name of Perkins "settled and which has continued to this day solely by the name "of 'Perkins place.'

ADDENDA

GILMAN HILL PERKINS (341) was born in Geneseo, March 4th, 1827. He died November 16th, 1898. His mother dying when he was four years of age, he was sent to his grand-mother in Bethlehem, Connecticut, in the spring of 1832. On his return to Geneseo he went to the district school and from there to the Temple Hill Academy.

Mr. Perkins came to Rochester March 19th, 1844, and entered immediately into the employ of E. F. Smith & Company, where he remained until the spring of 1847, leaving on account of ill health. In 1848 he re-entered the service of Smith & Perkins, wholesale grocers, as clerk, and was taken in as partner January 1st, 1852. A thorough business man, Mr. Perkins did not confine his abilities or energies to the grocery business alone. In addition to being President of the Smith, Perkins & Company firm, he became identified with a number of Rochester's important institutions. Since 1858 he had been an officer and director of the Union Bank; a trustee since 1879 of the Rochester Savings Bank; a trustee of the Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company since 1888; since its organization a trustee of the Security Trust Co.; a director of the Genesee Valley Railroad Company, and a director of the Rochester Gas and Electric Co.; a member of the Hemlock Water Works Commission, which built the city's first pure water supply system. He was also a trustee of the Reynolds Library; a member and one of the founders of the Genesee Valley Club, and at one time its president; treasurer of the Deaf Mute Institute since its organization; trustee of the Industrial School, and of the Board of Trustees of the City Hospital.

In religion Mr. Perkins was an Episcopalian. He was vestryman and warden in St. Luke's Church for forty years. He was married to Miss Caroline Erickson, a daughter of Aaron Erickson, July 17th, 1856.

Mr. Perkins was a staunch Democrat and though averse to public office he was in 1892 a Presidential Elector in the Cleveland-Harrison campaign.

Mr. Perkins was an ideal merchant. His probity was a tower of strength to himself and to all who dealt with him. Commercial

honor, so large an element of what is best in a commercial community, bore in him its perfect fruit. All who knew him felt he was above and beyond temptation. What was right and honest was the very law of his being. His judgment was sound and conservative. He had no taste for speculation, and was too conscientious to use his credit to any hazard of meeting his responsibilities. He did his duty to the public as a wise and faithful director in various institutions that are important to the welfare of the community.

In private life Mr. Perkins' character was of singular charm. He was warm-hearted and affectionate, most faithful in his friendships, delighting in liberal hospitality, and unswerving in his efforts to make everybody about him happy — a pleasant task, which his cheerfulness and humor made easy to him.

Mr. Perkins had been in poor health since March, 1898, and for a number of months was under a physician's care, but in the early hours of November 16th he was taken with a sudden attack of heart failure, and he gradually sank until 5 o'clock, when death came.

Quoting from the Rochester papers at the time of his death:

He may be praised as a man identified for many years with the business of Rochester, able, enterprising and upright; he may be praised as a citizen conscientious in his political convictions, active in his political duties, and yet without a touch of political ambition; he may be praised as a Christian, sincere in his belief and loyal to his church; foremost in works of charity and ready to give the prestige of his name to any good cause; he may be praised for public spirit and for private virtues; and yet, after every such well-won tribute has been paid, there remains something to be said before we touch the key to his character, the pulse of his nature, the impulse of his manhood. There was an indefinable something about him that is difficult for words to suggest, much less express — a sweetness of disposition, a considerateness in word and act; a lack of self-assertion, and appreciation of others; and this inborn gentleness was never veiled by roughness or uncouthness of manner, as happens in less fortunate men, but ever glowed the brighter through his simple and unfailing courtesy.

He saw the best in everybody; he was never harsh in his judgments, or outwardly stormy in his passion; but he was far from weakness: for with him rebuke and censure to evil lay in the beauty of his own character, not in the severity of his criticism. In his very goodness and kindliness lay the elusive element that made his personality so peculiar, original and impressive. He was not condescending, as many excellent people are, for he did not conceive of others as below him; he could not be called tolerant, for he had no idea even that the opinions of his neighbor were subject to his approval.

He was the companion of men of rare intellectual capacity, and sometimes in his praise of them he would wish for a greater share of their attainments; but the brightest and best of them would have been happy in the richer endowment that made his presence a promise of peace and a source of harmony.

The poet Donne, in speaking of the various elements that make up human life, says of certain souls, "they are those fine spirits who do tune and set this organ," and it is they that "beget wonder and love."

He was such a fine spirit.

The impression that he has left will remain long after that made by men of greater apparent brilliancy and force has passed away. What they may seek to formulate, express or advocate as to simple manhood—he was.

A close friend of Mr. Perkins has penned the following tribute:

No citizen of Rochester enjoyed wider regard or commanded more entirely the confidence of the whole country than Mr. Perkins. Possessed of a most delicate sense of honor in all the public relations of life, he was the model of uprightness and integrity, while to his family and friends his heart was a treasure-house of affection and of unfailing, inexhaustible tenderness and kindness.

Beyond all words by which they can testify their grief tears will be the silent tribute of love and sorrow which those who have known him in these closer relations of life will pay to his memory.

No one in recent years has passed out of the life of our city leaving a name more honored and a record of more useful and unselfish service. Such lives of simple truth and love and unaffected piety are beacon lights in a community and extend their beneficence far and wide in the inspiration they afford and the emulation they excite. The city is richer while they last and feels their withdrawal as a deep loss.

Another says:

Rochester has long paid heartfelt tribute for the public spirit which has never faltered and for the stainless honor which has jealously guarded the countless trusts confided to his care; but it is the sweet personality of the man, the kind heart which never knew an ungenerous throb that will hold the chief and tenderest places in memory. A high-minded Christian gentleman in every fibre of his being, of the type that makes the world better for their living; strong in his own conceptions of right as he was tolerant of weaknesses in others. His nature was as sweet as the flowers he loved so well, and he goes to his last rest "wearing the white rose of a blameless life."
