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PREFACE.

It is most gratifying to be able to state that every facility has been afforded to the writer, in seeking authentic information in the preparation of this work, and to cordially acknowledge the kindness of a number of individuals who have cheerfully assisted him in his investigations, and especially is it due to Dr. John G. Ryerson, from whom the incentive was received and also his kindly patronage. While it would be injudicious to state that the work is accurate in every particular, yet the greater part is verified by family and church records.

The line of inquiry is extended to the males of direct descent, the females being noted only in their births, marriages, or deaths; had the collateral branches been included, the work might have been too voluminous. The record, for the greater part, is brought down to a date sufficiently near, and will enable any interested in the subject to easily trace his lineage.

To assist in studying the record, two columns of figures are given, the first column to each name in succession, and the second column shows where the individual appears at birth, or marriage.

THE NAME.

While preparing this record and sketch of the RYERSON FAMILY, it has not been our privilege to trace the name in the libraries of Europe back to the period it may first have appeared in history, or old documents. Such a research, undoubtedly, would have been highly interesting, and if pursued strictly in the line of facts and dates, and as far as practicable away from the "too much antiquity," could not have been otherwise than most satisfactory.

During the time a certain kinsman of the writer was tracing the pedigree of his ancestry, he relates that he met in London an estimable and cultured lady of his family name, whose father was the president of the "National Musical and Poetical Association of Wales." In reply to his query as to how far back her family history extended, she replied that "it was not considered authentic more than six centuries before Christ." There is also a story of a Welsh pedigree, which contained a tremendous list of Morgans, Owens, etc., and half way down the list was a side note, "About this time, the world was created."

The name Ryerson is, however, of considerable antiquity, being noticed in the history of Holland during the latter part of the twelfth century. At the date of 1390, one Wilhelmus Reyerszen was Burgomaster of Amsterdam, and a Claes Symon Reyerszen was Burgomaster in 1414, and Wilhelmus Reyerszen again in 1418, and so on until about 1585. The Reyerszens took an active part in the expulsion of the Spanish

from Holland, and two of them were banished by the Spaniards for heresy, and one Albertus Reyerszen, with two other burghers, was beheaded, on 12 April, 1537, for the same offence. In 1567 one Baldwin Ryerszen is mentioned, whom the magistrate of Amsterdam proposed to displace from his position as lieutenant under a Captain William Pouwells, as a favor to a certain duchess. It is traditional that the family were French Huguenots, and sought a refuge in Holland from persecutions waged against that sect. This is hardly probable, as the family were living in Holland before the Huguenots were known. It is also a tradition that the original and proper surname of the family was "Van der Licht" (from or of the Light), and that the name Ryerson is patronimic, signifying "Son of Ryer." We question also the probability of this idea, as we have found no corroboration of it in tracing the history of the family, and because the earliest spelling of the name we have noticed—Reyerszen, 1390—is the same as we find in the Dutch Reformed Church Records, 1706, and in pronunciation practically that of the present day. It is curious and interesting to note the many different ways the name has been written.

The immigrant Martin signed his name Marten Reyersen, and his sons generally followed their father's orthography (1646-1700). But there are instances of the same person spelling his name differently at different times, in signing documents, etc. On the records of the Dutch Reformed Church we find the name written 1706, Reyerszen; 1741, Reyers; 1745, Reyersen; 1753, Ryerse; 1755, Reyerse; 1775, Reyse; 1777, Reyse; 1781, Ryrsson; 1783, Reyerson; 1794, Rierson; but from about 1800 the name has been uniformly written Ryerson.

The first of the name we find in the early records and history of America is that of Marten Reyersen, who, with his brother, Adrian Reyerson, came from Amsterdam in 1946, and settled on Long Island. Adrian Reyersen married Annetje Schenck, 29th July, 1659, and from him are descended

the "Adriance," and through his son Marten the "Martense" families. Marten Reyersen settled at Flatbush, Long Island, and on the 14th May, 1663, married Annetje Rapalje, at the Dutch Reformed Church of Breucklen (Brooklyn). Catarina Jeronymus was a recorded witness to the marriage ceremony.

Annetje (Rapalje) Ryerson was born 8th February, 1646, and was the sixth daughter of Joris Jansen Rapalje, who, with his wife Catalyntie—the daughter of Jeremiah or Joris Trico. of Paris—emigrated from Amsterdam in 1623, and first settled at Port Orange (Albany), where they remained three years, and where their first child, Sara, was born. On their removal to New Amsterdam, Joris Jansen Rapalje was, for a time at least, an inn keeper, and lived on the north side of the River Road—now Pearl street—and on the south side of the Fort. In 1637 he bought 325 acres of land near the "Waalboght" (well bought), Wallabout. (The first recorded transfer of land in Brooklyn having taken place the year before, namely, 1636.) He was one of the twelve men who represented the New Netherlands in 1641. He removed from New Amsterdam to Brooklyn, or rather the Wallabout, in 1654, and was a magistrate of Brooklyn 1655, '56, '57, '60 and '62. He died about 1665.

In a petition to the Governor and Council, asking for certain meadow land, Sara (Rapalje) Bogert stated, "she was the first Christian child born in the New Netherlands." This being dated at the Wallabout, led historians to believe she was born on Long Island. Her statement was confirmed by her mother, who was living in 1688. There is no record of the family ever writing the name de Rapalje.

Marten Reyersen was piously educated, for we have evidence of his being a church attendant, and also a church member previous to his marriage. About the time of his marriage he was received as a member into the church of Brooklyn, from the church of Flatbush, and from that time

on, he probably continued to reside at Brooklyn, or the Wallabout.

In the assessment roll on file in the States General Offices, Amsterdam, Holland, of the "Real and personal property of the inhabitants of Breucklen, 20th August, 1675," is found: "Maerten Ryerse, I poll, 4 horses, I do. of 3 years, 2 do. of 2 years, I do. of 1 year, I hog, £115 10s. Three and one-half morgens of land and valley, £63. Total, £178. 10s."

In 1676 he was assessed for sixty-three acres of land, and his property valued at £180.— the third highest on the list. In 1683 he was assessed for thirty-eight acres, and his property valued at £122. 10s. He was twice a deacon in the Brooklyn Church, the last time in 1677. He was a magistrate in 1679, and named in a patent of Flatbush in 1685. He probably died between this date and 1687, as his name does not appear among those who in that year took the oath of allegiance to England, while we do find on the list the name of his eldest son, Joris.

His widow, Annetje (Rapalje) Ryerson, married on 30th January, 1692, Jost France, or Frans, or Francis Joost, or Joost the Frenchman, who had come from Amsterdam in 1654.

4. B. Joris (George) Reversen—the eldest son of 23. Marten Regersen and Annetje Rapalje was born or baptized 19 Sept., 1666. He was one of the first purchasers of land in the Pompton Valley. It may be interesting to notice here some facts regarding the early history of this valley. Although few traditions are left respecting the Indians formerly occupying it, yet it is presumed they belonged to the great and powerful tribe of the "Minsi," who held their counsel seat at Minising, in the Delaware. The particular branch of the tribe residing here were undoubtedly what were called the "Pomptans," so named from the river and which was said to mean "crooked mouthed." The name Pequannock was said to mean "Dark River," and Ramapo "Round Pond." In the early days the Indians are said to have been numerous and that some of the white inhabitants learned their language. Tradition says they cultivated a few acres of land near "Schuyler's Basin," and also that there was an Indian orchard at Paquanack, near the residence of the late Squire Abm. Ryerson. This valley was on one of their routes in traveling from the coast to the West. There was a path called the "Minising Path," running through the "Great Notch," crossing the Passaic near Little Falls, and so along the foot hills on the eastern side of the valley to Pompton, and from there, following up the Pequannock River, westerly toward the Delaware. The first purchase of land was made in 1695. In that year Major Anthony Brockholst, Captain Arent Schuyler, Samuel Bayard, George Reyersa, John Meit, Samuel Berrie, David Mandeville and Hendrick Mandeville, mutually agreed to purchase of the proprietors of East Jersey 5,500 acres of land at Pequannock, in what was then the County of Essex, and on the East side of the Pequannock or Pompton River. As the Indians claimed the whole valley on both sides of the river, it was necessary first to purchase their right. This was accomplished by Arent Schuyler on the 6th June, 1695, for himself and his associates, in the name of the proprietors, by the payment of two hundred and fifty pounds or a certain quantity of wampum, and other goods and merchandise of that value. The Indians were unwilling to sell the limited quantity of 5,500 acres, but sold all the tract lying between the Passaic on the south, Pompton on the north, and between the foot hills on the east and west, and described in their Deed of Conveyance to said Arent Schuyler as follows: "All that certain piece, tract or parcel of Land "lying and being on both sides of the Poquaneck "Creek. Beginning at the mouth of a small "Creek in the Indian language called Sinkank, "which said small Creek is a branch that "falls into Poquaneck Creeke, and lays opposite "the great hill called by the Indians 'Meelo-"nagkas,' extending from the said mouth of Sin-"kank Creeke Northward along the said small "Creeke, as farr until itt meets with the Indian "Path that gowes toward Pomptan called the "'Minising Path,' and so along said Path to-"ward Pomptan Creeke, and then running again "Northward along the East side of said Creeke,

"taking in a stroke of land on said East side, "till it meets with the Falls, in the Indian Lan-"guage called 'Arrarigh,' and from said Fall, "westward, comprehending all the Lowland "there to the hills called by the Indians 'Hack-"aeckonck,' and then southward, along the foot "of said hills to the great Hill by the Indians "called 'Simpeck,' and from said hill 'Simpeck' "Eastward, to Poquanick Creeke, and then all "along down the same Creeke, till it Comes to "the first station called the mouth of Sinkank "Creeke, before mentioned, as more plainly may "appear by a Mapp or Card made by the De-"scriptions of the said native's Deed, and may "more fully and at large appear: together with "all the meadows, woodlands," etc., etc.

The grantors of the above described tract by name were "Tapgan," "Ovanap," "Maumin," "Wickwam," "Rookham," "Pauken," "Siekaak," "Wawcigin," "Onageponck," "Neskeglawitt" of "Poquanick" and "Pomptan" and "Iarapagh," Sachem of Minising, for themselves, and as being empowered by "Pagween," the wife of "Great Claes" and "Keshogamak."

Anthony Brockholst and Arent Schuyler, on behalf of themselves and associates, obtained a patent from the Proprietors on the 1st of November, 1695, for 5,500 acres on the East side of the Pequannock River, with the understanding that 3,500 acres of this were to be for the sole and only use of the said Brockholst Schuyler and Bayard, and the remaining 2,000 acres for the use of said Reyerson, Meet, Berrie and

David and Hendrick Mandeville, and for which they paid two hundred pounds.

After this general division, it is probable the respective parties divided in an equitable manner the tracts between them, for farms. Some of this land has remained in their families through succeeding generations down to the present time.

In the Spring of 1696, or '97, it is probable that Anthony Brockholst, and Arent Schuyler, settled in the Pompton valley, on the East side of the river, just below where are located now the Pompton Steel Works. Brockholst, on the spot where the late Major William W. Colfax resided, and Schuyler, as near as can be ascertained, on the site of the residence of the late Doctor William Colfax. Colonel Nicholas Bayard, who was a merchant in New York, and associated also in the purchase of the Pompton Patent, never resided in this valley. It is much more than probable that Captain Arent Schuyler first explored this valley, and was the leading spirit in its purchase and settlement. Joris Reversen, in addition to the land that fell to him in the general division of the lower Pacquanac Patent, also secured the share of David Mandeville, who never removed to New Jersey, and also by Indenture dated 26 March, 1696, purchased from Brockholst, Schuyler, and Bayard, for £300, the one-third of their half of this Patent, having his portion laid off to him, next to that he had acquired in the first division, thus giving him possession of about 1,200 acres, besides what he had in the Pompton Patent.

Joris Reyersen, previous to his removal to New Jersey, was a Planter in New York. He was living there in 1698, and 7th December, 1701. But in an instrument of writing dated 17th December, 1701, he is mentioned as a resident of New Jersey. It is probable that his family remained in New York, while he was part of the time at Pacquanac, clearing up his lands and preparing for settlement. Since Samuel Berrie and Hendrick Mandeville settled at Pacquanac about the beginning of the year 1702, it may have been that Joris Reversen removed here, remained a few years, and returned to New York, and in 1710 removed again to the banks of the Pacquanac, it being a family tradition that he settled here in that year.

The spot on which his log house was erected was on the West side of the road, about forty yards Northwest of the residence oi Abm. Ryerson, son of Nicholas Ryerson, and South East of the residence of the late George J. Ryerson. This vicinity, formerly called "Pacquanac," is now "Wayne," and the property on the West side of the public road is owned by the Laslin & Rand Powder Company, they having purchased it from the late George J. Ryerson and others about 1872. Joris Reyersen was a Deacon in the Dutch Reformed Church of Acquacknonk (Passaic), in 1716. He was also one of the King's Justices for the County of Bergen in 1725. He probably died about the beginning of the year 1749. His will was dated 21st July, 1744, and proved 4th Apr., 1749. His will, written on parchment, and signed "Jooris reversen" —"the Proof of the will," and a certified copy of the same, also the original parchment, "Indentures of the Conveyances," above referred to, are in possession of Dr. John G. Ryerson, of Boonton, N. J., and through whose courtesy were inspected.

Joris Reyerson is the person mentioned in the proceedings of the New Jersey Council, which was sitting at Perth Amboy 31st May, 1720, and before whom he had been summoned to appear and answer the application of a number of persons, for the laying out of a road through his land. A return made by the Justices and Surveyors showed that it would go through seven of Joris Reyersen's fences, take "in fourteen of his apple trees, his cellar, and his well." After deliberation the decree of the Council was: "It is the Advice of this Board, that the President reprimand the persons concerned in laying out said highway."—N. J. Archives, Vol. XV., p. 142.

Johannis and Cathalyna (Berry) Ryerson, was born 14 Nov., 1751, and died 19 Aug., 1839. He resided at the paternal homestead until his marriage in 1778, when he removed to the "Yellow Cottage," at Pompton. This cottage stood at the corner, where the public road going from the "Steel Works" northward to the Pompton railroad station is joined by the road coming from Pompton Church. The curve in the first mentioned road near their junction, passes over the spot where the cottage with its old Lombardy Poplars stood. During the Revolutionary War, the cottage being the line of travel between Morristown. West Point, etc., was a convenient stopping place for travelers or bands of troops, and in consequence of frequent annovances by such wayfarers, Martin Ryerson returned to his father's home, near "the Ponds," and remained there until the close of the war. He then then came again to Pompton, and built his residence, known as the "Ryerson Place," and now occupied by Mr. Jno. J. McDavid. He also erected the iron furnace and rolling mills at Pompton, on the site of the present "Steel Works." On 18 March, 1807, he purchased the iron mines and furnaces at Ringwood, which had previous to the Revolution been operated by the "London Company" and of which Gen. Robert Erskine, the geographer or surveyorgeneral to Washington, was the last superintendent. During the war of 1812, or subsequently. Martin Ryerson's iron works and employees were subject to a requisition by the Government, as the following "order"—the original of which is still preserved—plainly indicates:

"Head Quarters, Q. M. D.

Sept. 9, 1814.

"Such persons as are employed by Martin I. Ry"erson in Making Shot will continue in that
"employ until further orders. The names of the
"same to be attached to this order, and a copy
"of same transmitted to this office."

"By order,

A. Hamilton, A-de-camp."

Persons names:

Martin Ryerson wrote his name Martin I. Ryerson, the "I" or "J" being for his father's Christian or given name, to wit: "Johannis," it being the custom to adopt the father's name or its initial letter for a middle name, as a means of identification. He held a commission as captain of a company of infantry, in the Second Battalion, Third Regiment, of the Bergen County militia, issued by Gov. Howell and dated 24 June, 1794. He was a judge of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Bergen. He was also the prime mover in organizing and building the Reformed Dutch Church at Pompton, having donated the land, \$300 cash, and a large part of the material, his wife giving the bell and communion service. The certificate of incorporation of the church is dated 8th June, 1812, and its corporate name is, the "Pompton Church of Pompton." There were 20,000 bricks used in its construction, and it was completed and furnished 24th Dec., 1814, at a total cost of \$5,943.15. A beautiful "Memorial Window," given by the descendants of Martin I. Ryerson and his wife has recently been placed in the church (1899). He married Frouche (Sophronia) Van Winkle, 16 Aug., 1778.

He was born in the "Yellow Cottage," at Pompton, before mentioned as the early home of his grandfather, Martin I. Ryerson, and continued to reside there with his widowed mother and sisters until after his grandfather's death in 1839, when they removed to Bloomingdale, two miles west of Pompton, which remained his home during his lifetime. Bloomingdale was named by the early settlers after the Holland village, "Bloemendal," and its appropriateness was undoubtedly suggested by the luxuriant growth of laurel, that formerly covered the sides of the hills, along the Pequannock river. Martin John Ryerson was a large property owner, and was for a long time engaged in the manufacture of wrought or charcoal iron. He labored for many years to obtain a railroad to his village, and his efforts were finally crowned with success in 1871, when the New Jersey Midland Railway was completed, and to which he gave several miles of "right of way" through his property without consideration. He was one of the first directors of this railway and also vicepresident. He was for many years a member

of the New Jersey Historical and Agricultural Societies, and also one of the early members of the Holland Society of New York. He was a firm supporter and regular attendant at the Pompton Church, and served repeatedly as elder. He was buried in the vault North of the church, in which the members of the family have been interred since 1821. He married 1st, Mary Ann Concklin, 26 Sept., 1843, and 2d, Anna E. He was an ardent supporter and repeatedly an elder in the church, and was ever ready to take the lead in anything proposed for the advancement of the church or the comfort of the pastor. He remained at Pompton until about 1858-'9, when he removed to Newark, and on the breaking out of the Civil War organized Company "A" Eighth Regiment, N. J. Vols., and obtained through his popularity the full quota of men in three days. He was mustered in as the captain of his company for three vears. The regiment left New Jersey, 1st Oct., 1861, and with the 5th, 6th and 7th N. J. regiments, were known as the First Brigade in the Second Division of Hooker's Corps. Captain Ryerson had been commissioned major, 24 Feb., 1862, and at the battle of Williamsburg, 5th May, 1862, Col. Johnson, of the 8th N. J. Reg., having been wounded, the command devolved on Major Ryerson, and while standing in front of the forces, trying to animate his men, who were short of ammunition, he was struck in the side by a bullet and mortally wounded. He was buried with military honors in the family vault at Pompton Church.

K. Frans Reyersen, the tenth child of Marten and 562.
