


### PREFACE.

THE following paper on The Roberts Family is the result of an investigation which was commenced more than twelve years ago. Careful search has been made among the Colonial records of Massachusetts and Connecticut, the eastern counties of Massachusetts, and various towns in both States. It is with regret that we are obliged to print without giving any information regarding the parentage or birthplace of John Roberts of Simsbury, but it is impossible to identify him with any of the six or more persons of the same name, who were in the New England colonies before 1687.

The results of the search which had been made up to that date were the basis of an article written by the late Lester A. Roberts, of Brooklyn, New York, and printed in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register for July, 1888.

# THE ROBERTS FAMILY.

1.

A MONG the persons who had become residents of Simsbury, Conn., before 1690, were Christopher and John Roberts. It is suspected they may have been brothers, but nothing has been learned in regard to either of them prior to their appearance in Simsbury.

March 4, 1686-7, Christopher Roberts, then a resident of Simsbury, purchased for thirty-six shillings, of John Filler of Windsor, three acres "at or near a place commonly [called] Scotland." He held this land until November 22, 1707, when he sold it to John Roberts. (Simsbury Land Records, Vol. 2, pp. 180, 181.)

The earliest that we find concerning John Roberts is the following entry on the first volume of Town Votes:—

"At a Generall Towne meting of the Inhabitants of simsbury, May 21, 1688 there was given to John roberts ten Accres of land on that Brook y<sup>t</sup> runs by John Saxtons Alias ye Cap<sup>ts</sup> Brook for A house lott also 20 accres of land at Samon Brook lyeing above Sam<sup>1</sup> yilcoxsuns Lott near about or on a litl Brooke that comes from betwen ye hils into ye main Brooke: ye s<sup>d</sup> roberts grant is not to intrench on any former Grant. ye s<sup>d</sup> roberts is also to live in the Town five years also he is to make Improvement of said land before he shall have any liberty to Alienate said land."

These lands, which were located in the westerly portion of the present town of Simsbury near the Granby line, he sold March 3, 1693-4, to John Saxton (supposed to be his brother-in-law), and received therefor a deed of "20 Accres at Samon Brooke 10 Accres on Capt Newburys brooke and 4 Accres more on s<sup>d</sup> brook." (Simsbury Land Records, vol. 1, p. 217.)

February 5, 1696-7, he purchased for £30 of Samuel Allyn of Windsor,—

"My Meassuage or Tennament in Simsbury with the land on wh it stands with all the rights members and appurtinances buildings Fences water courses thereunto belonging with all the trees thereon of what soever . . . which sd land is situate within the precenct of the Township of Simsbury on the east side of the mountains towards Simsbury east bounds easterly of Mr Moores marsh the breadth is sixten rodds the southeast cornner markt at a walnut tree in Length eighty rodds being eight accres be it more or Less the second parcell is Twenty accres which sd land is scituate on the east syd the mountain and is southward of and adjoins too ensigne Tho. Barbur land by griswolds marsh the sd Land was forty foure Accres out of which John Matson is to have Tweenty Foure accres Twenty Accres I bought of James Miles which I do by these Presents sell and passe over to the afores dJohn Roberts. The third parcell of Land is that parcell of land lying southwardly of Mr Moores marsh the sd parcell of land was given to James Miles and John Haile. the Moiety and one half of sd parcell of land being mine by purchase." (Simsbury Land Records, vol. 1, p. 225.)

It is supposed that he removed to the eastern part of the town (now the town of Bloomfield) soon after this purchase, but owing to his many land transactions it is impossible to determine the precise date.

He held various offices in the town, being elected Fence-viewer "for the West side of the River," in December, 1692 and March, 1693-4; Inspector of the town list in January, 1702-3; Fenceviewer for the Eastern part of the town in December, 1707, 1714, 1716, and 1718; Hayward and Poundkeeper in December, 1724, 1725, 1727, and 1729.

He married, date unknown, PATIENCE SAXTON, probably daughter of Richard and Sarah (Cook) Saxton of Windsor, and therefore born June 28, 1658.

At different times he gave his sons Richard, John, and Nathaniel, tracts of land in various parts of the town, and in 1730 gave his son William as follows:—

"Know all men by these presents that I John Robarts of ye Town of Simsbury in ye County of Hartford and Colony of Conecticut in Newengland for and in Consideration of love good will and fatherly affection which I have and do bare unto my son william Robarts of ye Town County and Colony above said Have Therefore and doe by these presents for myself my heirs executors and administrators fully freely and absolutely Give grant make over Convay and Confirme unto him ye said william Robarts and to his heirs and assigns ye severall percels of land hereafter mentioned all of them lying and being in aforesaid Simsbury (viz) all ye Land that I now have in my house lot with ye buildings and orcharding Standing thereon also all ye Land that I have Lying Southerly from my house Lot also ye one half of my Land Lying at bare Hill: To have and to hold ye above mentioned Tracts or percels of Land To Him ye said William Roberts and to his heirs and assigns to his and their only use benefit and behoof forever and I ye said John Roberts for myself my heirs executors and administrators doe Covenant promise and Grant to and with ye said William Roberts his heirs and assigns for ever that at ye ensealling and

delivery of these presents I am sole seized and possed of ye above mentioned tracts of land in my own proper Right in fee simple and have in myself good Right to dispose of ye same in mannor as above said and that it is free and clear of and from all Encumbrances whatsoever and that ye said William Roberts his heirs and assigns shall and may at all times for ever hereafter by force and vertue of these presents have hold use occupy possess and Injoy ye Same and every part thereof against ye lawful claims or demands of any person or persons whomesoever promising hereby for ever hereafter to warrant secure and defend In witnes whereof I have here unto set my hand and seal this Thirteenth day of May in ye year of our Lord one Thousand seven hundred and Thirty 1730

Know all men by these presents that I William Robarts of Simsbury in Hartford County in Newengland am holden and firmely bound unto my Honoured father John Roberts of ye s<sup>d</sup> Simsbury in ye full and just sum of Three Hundred pounds currant money of Newengland to be payd unto ye s<sup>d</sup> John

Roberts his Certain Attourney Heirs executors administrators &c to ye which payment well and truly to be made I bind my self heirs executors & administrators by these presents Sealed with my seal this Thirteenth day of may Ano Dom 1730

The condition of ye above written obligation is such that whereas ye above named John Roberts hath by a deed of Gift Bareing date with these presents convayed to ye above bounden William Roberts severall percels of Land (viz) his home Lot with ye orchard & buildings Standing thereon with other percels of Land as by sd deed Relating Hereunto will appear Therefore If ye st William Robarts shall Give unto ye st John Roberts his quiet improvement of all ye new house half ye cellar and half ye barne standing on sd land Dureing ye naturall Life of ye sd John Roberts and also annually Render to ye said John Roberts ye one half of all ye product of ye Lands mentioned in s<sup>d</sup> deed — and also if afterward ye s<sup>d</sup> John Roberts should mary and by dying Leave a widdow If ye st William Roberts shall give unto her ye one third of ye product of ye lands as above mentioned so long as she Liveth John Robartses widdow then ye above written obligation shall be void otherwise stand in full force and vertue

From the foregoing deed and bond it will be seen that Patience wife of John Roberts was not living; but as her death is not on record, nor any gravestone to her memory in existence, we are unable to learn when it took place. He died some time prior to March 26, 1735, at which time ad-

ministration on his estate was granted to his son Nathaniel. (Hartford, Conn., Probate Records, vol. 12, p. 23.) The inventory of the estate (which was all personal) amounted to £34-16s. There does not appear any further action regarding the settlement of the estate.

LEMUEL ROBERTS, seventh child and fourth son of John and Patience (Saxton) Roberts, was born in Simsbury, Conn., in "May or June 1701," and was baptized Septem-

ber 7 the same year. He married November 7, 1731, ABIGAIL BEAMAN, daughter of Samuel 1 of Simsbury.

He was frequently honored by his fellow townsmen with public offices. He was elected Hayward and Poundkeeper in December, 1730, Fenceviewer December, 1738, '49, '51 and '52, Surveyor of Highways in 1742 and 1765, Grand Juror in 1735, '43, '47, '50, and 1761.

In the records of the General Assembly for the October session of 1743, we find "This Assembly do establish & confirm Mr. Lemuel Roberts to be Lieutenant of the 1st company or train band in the town of Symsbury, and do order that he be commissioned accordingly." Colonial Records of Conn., Vol. 8, p. 577.

The Simsbury records show that he dealt extensively in real estate, buying and selling lands in different sections of the original town of Simsbury.

He died September 10, 1772, and was buried in the graveyard in Bloomfield, a few rods North of the Congregational Church. The stone marking his grave is still in existence and bears the following inscription:—

### Here

lies the body
of Lieu<sup>t</sup> Lemuel Roberts
who departed this Life
Septm<sup>br</sup> the 10<sup>th</sup> 1772
in the 72<sup>d</sup> year of his age.

As you are now so once was I, As I am now so you must be, Prepare for death and follow me.

We have been unable to learn the date of the death of his wife Abigail, but it is inferred that she outlived her son, who died December 19, 1789, because in the account filed by the Administrators on the Estate of Lemuel Roberts, Esq., (3) which was presented to the Probate Court for the District of Simsbury, Sep<sup>r</sup> 24, 1791 or 1797, appears this item, "Moveables overcharged belonging to Wid Abigail Roberts and Mary Barber." 1

In the name of God Amen. I Lemuel Roberts of Simsbury in the County of Hartford and Colony of Connecticut in New England, being advanced in years & calling to mind my Fraillty and Mortality and that it is appointed for all Men to Die, do make this my last Will and testament as followeth. First I recommend my immortal Soul into the Hand of God that gave it, and my Body to ye Dust to be buried in a Christian Manner by my Executors. And as touching the worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God in his Providence to bless me, I dispose of the Same in the following Manner viz;

First I give to my well beloved Wife Abigail Roberts one Third Part of all my Moveable Estate; after my Funeral Expences & just Debts are paid. I give to my Wife Abigail the Use of one Third Part of my dwelling House and Barn during her Natural Life. I give to my Wife Abigail ye Use of one Third Part of all my Land improved and Unimproved during her natural Life, and my Will is that the Remainder of my Moveable Estate (after my just Debts and Funeral Expences are paid) be divided equally between my Three Daughters Lydia Bemon, Phebe Waters, and Lucy.

I give my Sons Lemuel Roberts and Nathaniel Roberts all my Land in the Town of Simsbury to be divided in the Following Manner, My Home Lot in Duncaster in Simsbury I give

the South Part thereof to my Son Lemuel with the House and Barn Standing thereon, and the North Part I give to my Son Nathaniel Roberts each Part to lie ye whole Length of the Lot and to be divided equally according to Quantity and Quality.

I give to my Son Nathaniel Roberts my House and Barn that Stands on the North Side of my Home Lot. My will is also that my Son Nathaniel Shall have a Road Three Rods Wide from his Land lying by the East Side, of the Orchard at the West End my Home Lot to ye Well in ye old House Lot. Also I give to my Sons Lemuel Roberts and Nathaniel Roberts, all my Land on the East Side of the Highway in Duncaster to be equally divided between them according to Quantity & Quality, and further my Will is that Lemuels Part Shall be Set out to him on the South Side of the Lot the whole Length of ye Lot, and that Nathaniel have his Part on ye North Side of the Lot ye whole Length. I give to my Sons Lemuel Roberts and Nathaniel Roberts my Land on ye East Mountains in Simsbury by Benjamin Parkers to be equally divided to them according to Quantity and Quality. I give to my Son Lemuel my Land in Hartford West-Division, which I bought of James Cadwell & his Wife.

I give to my Daughters Lydia Bemon Phebe Waters and Lucy my Land in Simsbury that lies North of Deborath Roberts East of the Highway to be divided as followeth; Phebe Waters Shall have the one half thereof and the other Half I give to my Daughters Lydia Bemon & Lucy to be divided according to Quantity and Quality. And whereas it hath pleased God in his Righteous Providence to with hold the Execise of Reason from my eldest Daughter Abigail whereby Shee is rendered altogether unable to do any Thing for her own Support my Will therefore is that Shee Shall be Supported out of ye Use of my Estate that I have given to my Children according to their Several Proportions during her Natural Life. I give to my Sons Lemuel & Nathaniel all

my undivided Land in the Town of Simsbury to be equally divided to them. And I do by these presents appoint and constitute Hezekiah Humphry Esq! Francis Barnard, Thomas Adams Jn! to be ye Executors of this my last Will and Testament in witnesses Whereof and to Signify that this is my Last Will and Testament I have hereunto Set my Hand and Seal this 9th Day of April A. D. 1770 (the Several Words interlined above were before Signing and Sealing) Signed Sealed published and declared in

LEMUEL ROBERTS (Lemuel 2, John 1), born in Wintonbury parish, Simsbury, Conn. (now the town of Bloomfield), October 2, 1742, married December 8, 1763, RUTH WOODFORD, born November 4, 1744, daughter of Samuel and Mary (Thompson) Woodford, of Northington Society in the town of Farmington, since set off as the town of Avon.

He dealt largely in real estate, and at one time owned land at Nod, in Northington Society, Farmington, which later became a part of the Wadsworth Tower property.

Like his father, Lemuel was entrusted with public office by his townsmen, only to a much greater extent. Tithingman, December, 1765 and 1773. Collector of the town rate for the east side of the mountain and Wintonbury, 1767, 1768, and 1769. Surveyor of Highways, 1769. Grand Juror, 1770 and 1780. One of the Committee of Inspection in December, 1774; and Selectman for three years from December, 1777.

In June, 1780, he was appointed one of a committee to supervise the bounty given by the town to the soldiers enlisting from Simsbury, and in November of the same year, he was appointed one of the committee to class the inhabitants in order to raise the quota of Continental soldiers according to an Act of the General Assembly. In Vol 14, page 338, of the Colonial Records we find, under date of October, 1774, "This Assembly do establish and confirm Lemuel Roberts to be Captain of the ninth company or train band in the town of Symsbury."

There is in the possession of his descendants at Sharon, Conn., a commission dated 14 June, 1779, bearing the Connecticut State seal, and signed by Jon<sup>th</sup> Trumbull, countersigned by George Wyllys, Sec., appointing him "Captain of the 9<sup>th</sup> Company or Train band in the town of Simsbury, in the 18<sup>th</sup> Regiment in this State as by your former Commission, dated October 18<sup>th</sup> 1774 appears."

At the news of the Lexington Alarm in April 1775, he marched for Boston with a portion of his company, and was paid for three days service. At the request of General Washington for troops from Connecticut to reinforce the Continental army, he went with his company to New York City, where he arrived August 24, 1776, and was discharged the 7th of the following month.

By the courtesy of the Library Committee of the Connecticut Historical Society we print a copy of a document found among its treasures.

Know all men by these Presents that whereas Jeremiah Wadsworth Deputy Quarter Master General of the State of Connecticut, hath appointed Jonathan Humphry Jun' of Simsbury in Said State, a Conductor to Raise Ten Teams to Consist of Six Good Cattle, and a good Cart well found and Strong and ye undertakers to keep their Cattle Shod, and their Carts &c. in good repair, and Perform their Duty, for which they will be allowed Twelve Shillings Lawfull Money pr Day, from the Day they are in actual Service, they are to Draw their Provisions, and one Man allowed as Cook for the whole. &c.

Therefore we the Subscribers Promise, Bind and Oblige, our Selves Severally & Respectively to Raise and Equip one good Teem for Each of us and to Enter into the above mentioned Service and perform the Same, unto him the said Jon<sup>a</sup> Humphry, or Some other person that may be apointed in

Said business for the Service of the State aforesaid for the Term of Six months unless Sooner Discharged. In witness whereof we have hereunto set our hands this 24th Day of May Anno Domini, 1777.

He was appointed one of the Justices of the Peace for Hartford County at the May session, 1782, of the General Assembly, which appointment was renewed in 1783, 1784, 1785, and 1786.

In 1787 opposition to his continuance in office had developed, and as the petitions to the General Assembly on this subject present such a delineation of his character, we print them in full.

To the honorable the general assembly of the State of Connecticut to be conveaned att hartford on the Second thursday of may A. D 1787——The prayer of the inhabitents of the town of granby the well wishers to peace and good order. whereas it was Subtlety and craft of Some Evil minded person some years past, to instance a few persons to Sign a petition that Lemuel Roberts might be justice of the peace by which means the general assembly Saw fit to honour him with that Commission as the Representitives ware not aquainted with his Carrector. but as soon as it was noised abroad the inhabi-

tants blamed the Representitives, for so doing. so they agread they would advise him not to take the oath but, before they had opertunity, he had taken it, not only this but his general Carractor is that he is not a man of Reputation that he Lives in the neglect of famely Duty. he is the Cause of great Contention and Deficulty, and further it is observed that he Doth injustice to maney of the inhabitents and that there is Suspecion of his Swaring falce from time to time, and when he hath bin charged with it, he prosecuting the a cuser. Recovered the Some of five pound, and the jurey that tried the Case, have since vued the place and Circumstances about which he Swore and find that it is impossible that he could see as he testified. and further the jury will testifie that had they had the same idea before, as they now have they never would give him any Damages in that case. and many other things which are not commendable for a justice of the piece, instances two innumerable to mention which is a great grief to many of the inhabitents, and two great and insuportable a burden altho the town is Devided yet maney of us the inhabitents of the town afores have Dealings with the people of the old town and are in some measure connected and are liable to be Sued before him whereof we the dinhabitants most humbly pray your honnors consideration of our most singular case and circumstance, and we the sd inhabitants most humbly pray your honnors that sd Roberts be Removed that people may injoy peace liberty and freedom and be freed from vexatious lawsuits which they must expect if sd Roberts sustain that post. for which we the undersigners insert our names.

The Prayer of us the Subscribers inhabitants of the Parish of Wintonbury, Humbly Sheweth, to your Honours, — that it has been Represented to us that a remonstrance has been preferd and brought before your Honours to remove & displace Lem<sup>11</sup> Roberts Esq<sup>1</sup> of Simsbury Living in said Parish of Wintonbury, from the office of Justice of the peace, on account of his firstly, being recommended to your Honours by a Petition of a few persons not belonging to s<sup>d</sup> Town of Simsbury and not acquainted with his Character, for him to be a Justice of the Peace, and that the Members, Did not know his Character and were blam'd, on account of his appointment, also that it Gives Great uneasiness

The Testimony of John Smith of Farmington in Hartford County, of Lawful age Testifies & Says—

The Testimony of Sam' Stebbins of Simsbury is as follows that having had an Intimate Acquaintance with Lem<sup>11</sup> Robarts Esq for Ten Years Last Past & so far as I am acquainted with him his Character is Good & Reputable & equal to others of his profession in office & having Lodged frequently at his house have observed him very careful in calling his family together to attend family worship & truth constrains me to add that he has ever manifested a become Zeal for keeping up & supporting Public Worship in Socy: & hath been at great Pains & Expence. in furnishing Supplies for the Pulpit in the Parish where he belongs, when Destitute & that he has ever manifested a peculiar Benevolence & Hospitality towards the Ministry & the Gospel: and a become Regard for Religion & untill the Late unhappy Controversy in sd Socy I never heard any thing unfavorable of s<sup>d</sup> Robarts Character in any respect Whatever & further the Depont Saith not

It is sufficient to say that justice prevailed and he was continued in office, by a special act of the General Assembly at the May session, 1787.

We take the account of the death of Lemuel Roberts from a letter dated January 30, 1879, written by his grand-daughter, Mrs. Melissa (Roberts) Batterson of Hartford, to Lester A. Roberts of Brooklyn, New York:—

"He was a Justice of the Peace, and held Court in the North room of the house now occupied by William Latimer (about a mile North of Bloomfield Center). A door opened at the N. E. corner, from which were stone steps without rails. One evening he rendered judgement against one Burr, who was heard to say, he would get even with Judge Roberts. There was quite a crowd, and as my Grandfather was lame, he was one of the last to leave. One of his near neighbors Michael Seger awoke his wife next morning saying, 'Judge Roberts is dead. That ugly Burr pushed him off the steps at Griswold's last night, and he lies there now. I have seen it in a dream three times this night.' Before they were through breakfast, Seger was called to the inquest. In those days of superstition and witchcraft this story made a great sensation. I have heard it spoken of by many, although it happened before I was born. Burr fell dead in the road not long after, and this I have heard spoken of by very old people in Wintonbury as in their opinion a just judgement. Grandfather lay there all night. His cane went through his hat, and entered his temple. I have often seen the hat which my Aunt Hannah always kept."

He was buried in the old graveyard in Bloomfield, where his gravemark of Connecticut freestone is still to be seen bearing this inscription:—

In memory of LEMUEL ROBERTS

Esqr

who departed this life

Decr 19th A D, 1789 in the 47th year

of his age.

No cordial to revive his heart

No one to hold his head

No friend to close his dying eyes

The ground was his deathbed.

Among the files of the Simsbury Probate Court is a bond for £5000, dated December 29, 1789, and signed by Jona-

than Pettibone, Nathaniel Roberts, and Lemuel Roberts, "all of Simsbury now appointed Administrators on the Estate of Lemuel Roberts Esq<sup>r</sup> late of Simsbury deceased." The inventory of the estate is not on record, nor is the original document among the probate files. On page 196 of Vol. 3, of the Simsbury Probate Records is a copy of the account filed by the administrators of his estate.

The decree of the judge accepting said account is dated September 24, 1791, but as in the account there are items of expense as late as March 4, 1797, it would seem as if the date 1791 should read 1797. The original account is not on file. Among the items is a charge for necessaries set out to the widow, May 2, 1791.

On page 435 of volume 32 of the Land Records of Farmington, Conn., is a deed dated June 6, 1798, whereby Jonathan Pettibone, of Simsbury, by authority from the Simsbury Probate Court, conveyed land in Farmington belonging to the estate of Lemuel Roberts, Esquire, deceased. This order cannot be found on the records of the Simsbury Probate Court.

February 25, 1792, Ruth Roberts quitclaimed to Roger Newberry, of Windsor, her right of dower in ten acres of land in Simsbury, called the McLean lot, part of the estate of Lemuel Roberts, Esq., deceased.

After her husband's death, Ruth (Woodford) Roberts resided for a few years with her son Samuel, in Sharon, Conn., but later returned to Bloomfield, where she died about 1800. We have been unable to ascertain the precise date.



EUNICE ROBERTS (Lemuel 3, Lemuel 2, John 1) was born in Wintonbury parish, town of Simsbury, Conn., August 22, 1774, and was baptized the second of October following. March 3, 1799, she was married by Rev. William F. Miller to James Goodwin, of Hartford, Connecticut. He was the only son of Jonathan and Eunice (Olcott) Goodwin, of Hartford, and was born in that town December 27, 1777. Mr. Goodwin resided on the Albany road in his native town on property inherited from his father.
