Foreword.

The primary object of this pamphlet has been to set forth the relevant data gathered by others and to bring down to date the record of the descendants of Colonel William Rice, of Worthington, Mass., and Wealthy Cottrell, his wife. The data hereinafter set forth regarding the ancestors of William Rice, of Boemar, Buckinghamshire, England, is based on pedigrees prepared some years ago by Charles K. Winslow, supplemented to some extent by information regarding the maternal ancestors of that William Rice contained in pedigrees compiled by Moncure C. Carpenter and those in the interesting volume, entitled *Your Family Tree*, by David Starr Jordan and Sarah Louise Kimball (New York, 1929). No attempt has been made to utilize or to verify all the data available from these sources. To set forth the family tree of William Rice of Boemar with all its ramifications is beyond the scope of this pamphlet. It is, however, of interest to note that *Your Family Tree* points out that Alfred the Great and Charlemagne are among the ancestors of most American families of English descent.

A Genealogical History of the Rice Family, by Andrew Henshaw Ward (Boston, 1858), regarding the American ancestors of Colonel William Rice of Worthington and his earlier descendants, and manuscripts long since given the compiler by Mrs. Thomas Olcott and Mrs. Nathan F. Dixon regarding the ancestors of Wealthy Cottrell, have been relied on and followed without independent genealogical research. Data contained in *By the Name of Rice*, by Charles Elmer Rice (Alliance, Ohio, 1911), and in *Descendants of Joseph Rice of Conway, Massachusetts*, by Rev. Edwin B. Rice (New York, 1904), also has been utilized. It has been possible to continue these earlier records only through the aid cheerfully given by many living members of the descendants of Colonel William Rice of Worthington.

RICE ANCESTORS.

The name of Rice is derived from the Welsh *Rhys* or *Rees*, meaning “red-haired.” The Anglo-Saxon meaning given to the name is “power” or “dominion.”

The following data regarding the ancestors of Colonel William Rice, of Worthington, Mass., extends over so many generations and includes so many names that it has been deemed advisable in the interests of clarity to use separate headings under which to list his ancestors. Colonel William Rice of Worthington was a descendant, in the sixth generation, of Deacon Edmund Rice who emigrated to America in 1638, and the latter was a grandson of William Rice, of Boemar, Buckinghamshire, England. William Rice of Boemar was a son of Sir Rice ap Griffith and Lady Katharine Howard, his wife. There is herein set forth, separately: (one) paternal ancestors of William Rice of Boemar; (two) maternal ancestors of William Rice of Boemar; and (three) line of descent of Colonel William Rice of Worthington from William Rice of Boemar.

ONE: PATERNAL ANCESTORS OF
WILLIAM RICE, OF BOEMAR, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE, ENGLAND.

I.

Uryan Reged, who was fifth in descent from Coel Codevog, King of the Britons. He married **Margaret La Faye**, daughter of Gerolus, or Gerlois, Duke of Cornwall.

Uryan Reged was by birth a Cambro-Briton, and in the sixth century was Prince of North Briton. He was expelled by the Saxons and fled to Wales, where he was Prince of Reged, and Lord of Kidwelly, Carunllou and Iskennen, in South Wales. He built the castle of Carrey Cermin in Carmarthenshire.

II.

Pasgen, son of (I) Uryan Reged and Margaret La Faye, his wife.

III.

Morr, son of (II) Pasgen.

IV.

Llarch, son of (III) Morr.

V.

Rhyne, son of (IV) Llarch.

VI.

Cecilt, son of (V) Rhyne.

VII.

Gurwarded, son of (VI) Cecilt.

VIII.

Kynbathwye, son of (VII) Gurwarded.

IX.

Lloarch, son of (VIII) Kynbathwye.

X.

Eynion, Lord of Kidwelly, son of (IX) Lloarch.

XI.

Gronwey, Lord of Kidwelly and Iskennen, son of (X) Eynion.

XII.

Rice, Lord of Iskennen, son of (XI) Gronwey. He married **Margaret**, daughter and co-heir of Griffith, of Kiddz, Lord of Gwynvay.

XIII.

Elider ap Rice, of Iskennen, son of (XII) Rice, Lord of Iskennen, and Margaret, his wife. He married **Gladis**, daughter of Phillip, son of Bah, who was a son of Gwath Voed, Lord of Efginwriath.

XIV.

Sir **Elider Ddy**, Knight of the Sepulchre, son of (XIII) Elider ap Rice and Gladis, his wife. He married **Cicely**, daughter of Siscilte ap Hyn, son of Morithigne, Lord of Cantresclife.

XV.

Phillip ap Elider Fitz Uryan, son of (XIV) Sir Elider Ddy and Cicely, his wife. He married **Gladis**, daughter of David Uras.

XVI.

Nicholas ap Phillip Fitz Uryan, son of (XV) Phillip ap Elider Fitz Uryan and Gladis, his wife. He married **Joan**, daughter of Griffith ap Llewellyn Voythes.

XVII.

Griffith ap Nicholas Fitz Uryan, son of (XVI) Nicholas ap Phillip Fitz Uryan and Joan, his wife. He married, first, **Mabel**, daughter of Meredith ap Henry Dune, of Kidwelly, Wales.

Griffith ap Nicholas was a Yorkist and was slain at Wakefield.

XVIII.

Thomas ap Griffith Fitz Uryan, son of (XVII) Griffith ap Nicholas Fitz Uryan and Mabel, his first wife. He married, first, **Elizabeth**, daughter of Sir John Griffith, of North Wales, a descendant of Howell ap Griffith, Lord of Lansadorne, who was a great-great-grandson of Yerworth, Lord of Krickheath, in North Wales.

XIX.

Sir **Rice ap Thomas Fitz Uryan**, of Elmalin, Carmarthenshire, Wales, son of (XVIII) Thomas ap Griffith Fitz Uryan and Elizabeth, his first wife. He married, first, **Eva**, daughter and heiress of Henry ap Gwilliam.

To King Henry VII. (then Henry, Earl of Richmond), on his landing with a small force at Milford Haven in 1485, Sir Rice ap Thomas repaired with a considerable accession of choice soldiers, marching with them to Bosworth Field. King Henry VII. made him a Knight Banneret for his valuable aid at the battle of Bosworth, and in 1506 Sir Rice was elected a Knight of the Garter. In the following reign, at the battle of Therouenne and at the siege of Tournay, in 1513, he was Captain of the Light Horse. It is stated that while he was never more than a knight, he was considered little less than a prince in his own country. Sir Rice was the proprietor of large estates in the counties of Pembroke, Carmarthen, Glamorgan and Cardigan, Wales.

XX.

Sir **Griffith Rice**, son of (XIX) Sir Rice ap Thomas Fitz Uryan and Eva, his first wife. He married **Katherine**, daughter of Sir John St. John.

Sir Griffith Rice was made a Knight of the Bath at the marriage of Arthur, Prince of Wales, in 1501.

XXI.

Sir **Rice ap Griffith**, also written **Rice ap Griffith Fitz Uryan**, son of (XX) Sir Griffith Rice and Katherine, his wife, was born probably in 1500. He married Lady **Katharine Howard** (see XV, page 15).

Sir Rice ap Griffith was beheaded, in public, on Tower Hill, January 4, 1531/2, during the reign of Henry VIII., for a political offense.

XXII.

William Rice, of Boemar, Buckinghamshire, England (see I, page 17), was a son of (XXI) Sir Rice ap Griffith and Lady Katharine Howard (see XV, page 15), his wife.

TWO: MATERNAL ANCESTORS OF
WILLIAM RICE, of BOEMAR, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE, ENGLAND.

I.

William I., the Conqueror, King of England, illegitimate son of Robert I., sixth Duke of Normandy (a descendant of the Emperor Charlemagne), and Arletta, daughter of a tanner at Falaise, was born in 1027 or 1028. He married, in 1053, **Matilda**, daughter of Baldwin V., seventh Count of Flanders (a descendant of the Emperor Charlemagne, of Alfred the Great, King of England, and of Lyderic, Count of Harlebek, the first hereditary Governor of Flanders), and his wife Adela, sister of Henry I. and daughter of Robert II., King of France, a great-great-grandson of Robert the Strong, of France.

William the Conqueror died at Rouen, September 9, 1087. Matilda, his wife, died November 2, 1083. Both were buried at Caen, in Normandy.

II.

Henry I., King of England, youngest son of (I) William the Conqueror and Matilda, his wife, was born at Selby, Yorkshire, in 1068. He married, first, in 1100, **Matilda**, daughter of Malcolm III., King of Scotland (a descendant of Fergus Mor Mac Earca, first absolute King of Scotland of the Milesian race), and his wife Margaret, daughter of Edward the Exile, son of Edmund II., King of England, a descendant of Alfred the Great.

King Henry I. died near Gisors, December 1, 1135, and was buried in the abbey of Reading. Matilda, his first wife, was born in 1080 and died in 1118.

III.

Matilda, Queen of England, only surviving child of (II) King Henry I. and Matilda, his first wife, was born in 1102. After the death of her first husband, Emperor Henry V. of Germany, she married, second, in 1129, **Geoffrey Plantagenet**, Count of Anjou, son of Fulco V., Count of Anjou, King of Jerusalem, and his first wife, Ermengard, daughter and heiress of Helias, Count of Maine.

Geoffrey Plantagenet died September 7, 1151, and was buried in St. Julian's Church at Le Mans. Matilda, his widow, died January 30, 1164.

IV.

Henry II., King of England, son of (III) Queen Matilda and Geoffrey Plantagenet, her second husband, was born at Le Mans, March 25, 1133. He married, in 1152, **Eleanor**, Duchess of Aquitaine, daughter and heiress of William V., Duke of Aquitaine, and the divorced wife of Louis VII., King of France.

King Henry II. died at Chinon, July 6, 1189, and was buried at Fontevraud. Eleanor, his widow, died in 1202.

V.

John, King of England, youngest son of (IV) King Henry II. and Eleanor, his wife, was born at Oxford, December 24, 1167. He married, second, in August, 1200, **Isabel**, daughter and heiress of Aymer de Taillefer, Count d'Angoulême, and his wife, Lady Alice de Courte-

ney, a great-great-granddaughter of Henry I., King of France, and his wife Anne, of Russia.

King John died October 19, 1216, and was buried at Worcester. Isabel, his second wife, died in 1246 and was buried at Fontevraud.

VI.

Henry III., King of England, eldest son of (V) King John and Isabel, his second wife, was born at Winchester, October 1, 1207. He married, January 14, 1236, **Eleanor**, daughter and heiress of Raymond Berenger IV., Count of Provence (a descendant of Sancho III., the Great, King of Castile, Navarre and Aragon), and his wife Beatrix, daughter of Thomas, Count of Savoy, a great-grandson of Humbert II., Count of Maurienne.

King Henry III. died at Westminster, November 16, 1272. Eleanor, his widow, died at Amesbury, June 25, 1291.

VII.

Edward I., King of England, eldest son of (VI) King Henry III. and Eleanor, his wife, was born at Westminster, June 17, 1239. He married, second, September 8, 1299, **Margaret**, daughter of Philip III., King of France (a descendant of Robert the Strong, of France), and his wife Mary, daughter of Henry III., Duke of Brabant, a descendant of the Emperor Charlemagne.

King Edward I. died at Burgh-on-Sands, near Carlisle, July 7, 1307, and was buried at Westminster. Margaret, his second wife, was born about 1282 and died in 1318.

VIII.

Thomas Plantagenet, Earl of Norfolk, Earl Marshal of England, son of (VII) King Edward I. and Margaret, his second wife, was born at Brotherton, Yorkshire, June 1, 1300. He married, first, **Alice**, daughter of Sir Roger de Hales, coroner of Norfolk.

Thomas Plantagenet died in August, 1338, and was buried in the abbey of Bury St. Edmunds. Alice, his first wife, died about 1330.

IX.

Margaret Plantagenet, Duchess of Norfolk, elder daughter of (VIII) Thomas Plantagenet and Alice, his first wife, was born about 1320. She married, first, in 1337 or 1338, **John de Segrave**, third Lord Segrave.

John, third Lord Segrave, died in 1353. Margaret Plantagenet, his widow, was created Duchess of Norfolk in 1397. She died in 1399, and was buried in the choir of the Grey Friars', London.

X.

Elizabeth de Segrave, only child of (IX) Margaret Plantagenet and John, third Lord Segrave, her first husband. She married **John de Mowbray**, fourth Lord Mowbray, son of John, third Lord Mowbray, and his wife Joan, daughter of Henry Plantagenet, third Earl of Lancaster, a grandson of Henry III., King of England. John, third Lord Mowbray, was a son of John, second Lord Mowbray, Sheriff of Yorkshire and Governor of the city of York, who in 1321 was hanged at York after the battle of Boroughbridge. John, second Lord Mowbray, was a

son of Roger, the first of the family summoned to Parliament as Baron Mowbray of Axholme, by writ dated June 23, 1295.

John, fourth Lord Mowbray, was born about 1328. He was a crusader and was killed in conflict with the Turks, in 1368, in Thrace. Elizabeth de Segrave, his widow, died about 1375.

XI.

Thomas Mowbray, Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal of England, son of (X) Lady Elizabeth de Segrave and John, fourth Lord Mowbray, her husband, was born in 1366. He married, second, in July, 1384, **Elizabeth**, daughter of Richard Fitz Alan, tenth Earl of Arundel (a descendant of Henry I., King of France, and his wife Anne, of Russia), and his first wife, Elizabeth, daughter of William de Bohun, Earl of Northampton. William de Bohun was a son of Humphrey de Bohun, fourth Earl of Hereford and Essex (a descendant of Henry I., King of France, and his wife Anne, of Russia), and his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Edward I., King of England, and his first wife, Princess Eleanor of Castile.

Thomas Mowbray was created Earl Marshal of England in 1386, and Duke of Norfolk in 1397. He died of the plague at Venice, September 22 (or 27), 1399. Elizabeth, his second wife, died July 8, 1425.

XII.

Margaret Mowbray, elder daughter of (XI) Thomas Mowbray and Elizabeth, his second wife. She married Sir **Robert Howard**, of Stoke Neyland, Suffolk, son of Sir John Howard (a descendant of Robert Howard,

the owner of Wigenhall and other estates in Norfolk) and his second wife, Alice, daughter of Sir William Tendring, of Tendring, Norfolk.

Sir Robert Howard died in 1436.

XIII.

John Howard, Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal of England, son of (XII) Lady Margaret Mowbray and Sir Robert Howard, her husband. He married, first, **Catherine**, daughter of Sir William de Moleyns.

John Howard was an eminent Yorkist and filled various offices and places of high trust during the reigns of Edward IV. and Richard III., and was by the latter created Duke of Norfolk and Earl Marshal of England, June 28, 1483. While supporting Richard III. he was slain, August 22, 1485, on Bosworth Field, and thereafter attainted by Parliament. Catherine, his first wife, died at Stoke Neyland, Suffolk, November 3, 1465.

XIV.

Thomas Howard, second Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal of England, Earl of Surrey, son of (XIII) John Howard and Catherine, his first wife, was born at Stoke Neyland, Suffolk, in 1443. He married, second, **Agnes**, sister of Sir Philip Tilney and daughter of Hugh Tilney, of Skirbeck and Boston, Lincolnshire.

Thomas Howard was created Earl of Surrey, June 28, 1483. Taken prisoner at the battle of Bosworth and attainted by Parliament, he spent three years in the Tower, after which he was released and restored to his earldom. In 1510 he was created Earl Marshal of England. He was

the victor at Flodden Field, September 9, 1513, and was rewarded by being created Duke of Norfolk on February 1, 1514, with precedence as of the creation of 1483. He died at Framlingham Castle, May 21, 1524, and was buried in Thetford Abbey.

XV.

Katharine Howard, daughter of (XIV) Thomas Howard and Agnes, his second wife. She married, first, Sir **Rice ap Griffith**, also written **Rice ap Griffith Fitz Uryan** (see XXI, page 7). She was buried May 11, 1554.

XVI.

William Rice, of Boemar, Buckinghamshire, England (see I, page 17), was a son of (XV) Lady Katharine Howard and Sir Rice ap Griffith (see XXI, page 7), her first husband.

THREE: LINE OF DESCENT OF
COLONEL WILLIAM RICE, OF WORTHINGTON, MASSACHUSETTS,
FROM WILLIAM RICE, OF BOEMAR, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE,
ENGLAND.

I.

William Rice, of Boemar, Buckinghamshire, England, son of Sir Rice ap Griffith (see XXI, page 7) and Lady Katharine Howard (see XV, page 15), his wife, was born in 1522. He was granted a coat of arms in 1555.

II.

Thomas Rice, son of (I) William Rice, was born probably in 1555.

III.

Deacon **Edmund Rice**, son of (II) Thomas Rice, was born in Buckinghamshire, England, about 1594. He married, first, **Tamazine** (or **Thomasine**) ——. In 1627 he was living in Berkhamstead, Hertfordshire, England, and from there he came with his wife and seven children, and another child born during the voyage, to America, landing in Massachusetts in 1638. The first mention of him after his arrival is at Sudbury, Mass., where he shared in three divisions of land, the first of which was made in 1639. That settlement, called “the plantation lying near unto Concord,” was incorporated in 1639

under the name of Sudbury. Edmund Rice was one of the committee appointed by the Colonial Court on September 4, 1639, to apportion land to the inhabitants. He owned lands in and out of the town, and some of these properties formed part of the old Rice homestead, which remained in the family for generations, and which was situated not far from the "Five Paths." He was admitted a freeman May 13, 1640. From 1639 to 1644 he served as a Selectman, and in 1648 became a Deacon in the church. He was a Deputy to the General Court, for the town of Sudbury, in 1640, 1643, 1652, 1653 and 1654.

Deacon Edmund Rice was one of thirteen residents of Sudbury who, in 1656, petitioned the General Court for a new plantation, which was granted to them and subsequently incorporated under the name of Marlborough in 1660. The Deacon removed there with his family and had a house lot of fifty acres granted to him by the proprietors of the town. This lot, on which he built and resided, was in the westerly part of Marlborough. He was intrusted with various important duties by the General Court, which he discharged with a fidelity that occasioned repeated calls for his services. The records of Sudbury and Marlborough contain ample evidence of his vigilant and fatherly care in promoting the welfare of those infant settlements, the destruction of which by the Indians occurred after his death.

Tamazine, the first wife of Deacon Edmund Rice, died in Sudbury, Mass., June 13, 1654; and he afterwards married again. In 1858 a chronology was published which listed at least 1,400 families and about 7,000 individuals having one common ancestor in the person of Edmund Rice.

Deacon Edmund Rice died in Marlborough, Mass., May 3, 1663, and was buried at Sudbury. A deposition of his in the court files at Cambridge, Mass., made April 3, 1656, stated his age to be "about sixty-two years." His estate was inventoried May 15, 1663, and appraised at £ 743.8.4.

IV.

Benjamin Rice, son and tenth child of (III) Deacon Edmund Rice and Tamazine, his first wife, was born in Sudbury, Mass., May 31, 1640, being the first child of Deacon Edmund Rice born in America. Benjamin Rice resided in Sudbury, and married, about 1662, **Mary Brown**. On May 23, 1685, he sued Dr. William Avery, of Boston, for malpractice. Verdict, however, was rendered for the defendant, one Daniel Pond having testified that "ten years ago Benjamin Rice, of Sudbury, came to my house, in Dedham, with his feet frozen, and lodged there. Dr. William Avery's son, Benjamin, cut off one foot at the lowest joint, and staunched the blood with a musquash skin." Dr. William Avery did not appear, by the evidence in the case, to have been present at the operation. Benjamin Rice died in Sudbury, Mass., December 19, 1713.

Mary Brown, wife of Benjamin Rice, was born May 18, 1642, and died January 3, 1690/1. She was a daughter of Deacon William Brown, of Sudbury, and his wife Mary, daughter of Thomas Besbeth, of Sudbury.

V.

Ebenezer Rice, only child of (IV) Benjamin Rice and Mary Brown, his wife, was born May 1, 1671, and married, May 17, 1698, **Bethia Williams**. He resided in Sudbury,

Mass., where he died on June 21, 1724. His estate was inventoried July 10, 1724, and appraised at £337, including a meadow on the west side of the river.

Bethia Williams, wife of Ebenezer Rice, was born in Roxbury, Mass., April 26, 1676, and died July 6, 1721. She was descended from:

1. **Robert Williams**, of West Somerton, Norfolk, England. He was a well-to-do husbandman, and was Churchwarden in 1600 and 1602. He died between February 12, 1606, the date of his will, and March 28, 1609, the date of its probate.

2. **Stephen Williams**, son of (1) Robert Williams. He resided in Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, England, and married there, September 22, 1605, **Margaret Cooke**. He was a cordwainer (*i.e.*, a worker in Cordovan leather, a shoemaker). In 1625 Stephen, his wife and their son Thomas died of the plague within a few days of each other. Stephen Williams was buried September 19, 1625.

Margaret Cooke, wife of (2) Stephen Williams, was buried at Yarmouth, September 13, 1625. She was a daughter of Nicholas Cooke, of North Repps, Norfolk, England, and Winifred Webster, his wife.

3. **Robert Williams**, son of (2) Stephen Williams and Margaret Cooke, his wife. He was born probably in July, 1607, and was baptized in the St. Nicholas Parish Church at Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, England, December 11, 1608. He married, first, probably before 1630, **Elizabeth Stalham**. He was a cordwainer's apprentice at Norwich, Norfolk, from 1623 to 1630, when he was admitted a freeman of Norwich. In 1635 he was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of London, Warden of the Guild of Cordwainers, and Sealer of Leather for the City of Norwich. With his wife, four children, and two servants, he came to America, possibly in the "John and Dorothy" of Ipswich or possibly in the "Rose" of Yarmouth, arriving at Boston in the summer of 1637. He was a husbandman in Roxbury, Mass., in 1637, and was admitted a freeman on May 2, 1638. He has been called "the common ancestor of the divines, civilians, and warriors of this name who have honored the country of their birth." In 1644 he became

a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts. The homestead of Robert Williams at Roxbury, in which five generations of the family lived and died, remained standing until 1794. Robert Williams was for some time Town Clerk of Roxbury. He received for his services two acres of land near Dorchester Brook, and it is said he subsequently petitioned the town to take them back as they occasioned him "too much worldly care." He was one of the original subscribers who endowed the Roxbury Free School. He died in Roxbury, Mass., September 1, 1693. His great-grandson, Colonel Ephraim Williams, was the founder of Williams College.

Elizabeth Stalham, the first wife of (3) Robert Williams, was probably a daughter of John Stalham, of St. George, Tombland, Norwich, England, and Alicia Gibson, his wife. She died in Roxbury, Mass., July 27 (or 28), 1674, possibly "aged 80 years."

4. **Stephen Williams**, son of (3) Robert Williams and Elizabeth Stalham, his first wife. He was born in Roxbury, Mass., November 8, 1640, and married, in April, 1666, **Sarah Wise**. He was a farmer, and inherited from his father, with whom he lived, the family homestead in Roxbury. He was Captain of a troop serving at the eastward, 1704-1705, and Captain of the Red Troop of Horse, in command of the frontier, 1707-1712, serving in the summer of 1710 as guard to Colonel Schuyler and the Maqua Indians. Stephen Williams died February 15, 1719/20.

Sarah Wise, wife of (4) Stephen Williams, was born December 19, 1647, and died in 1728. She was a daughter of Joseph Wise, of Roxbury, and Mary Thomson (or Thompson), his wife, who were married December 3, 1641. Joseph Wise died September 12, 1684, and his widow died August 4, 1693.

Bethia Williams, wife of (V) Ebenezer Rice, was a daughter of (4) Stephen Williams and Sarah Wise, his wife.

VI.

Ebenezer Rice, only son of (V) Ebenezer Rice and Bethia Williams, his wife, was born probably in Sudbury, Mass., November 24, 1709, and married, March 23, 1743,

Anna Rice. He resided in Westborough, Mass., where all his children were born, and later removed to Conway, Mass.

Anna Rice, wife of Ebenezer Rice, was born May 6, 1722. She was descended from:

1. **William Rice** of Boemar (see I, page 17).
2. **Thomas Rice** (see II, page 17).
3. Deacon **Edmund Rice** (see III, page 17) and **Tamazine**, his first wife.
4. **Thomas Rice**, son of (3) Deacon Edmund Rice and Tamazine, his first wife. He was born in England, about 1622, and came to America with his parents in 1638. He married **Mary King**, and resided in Sudbury and Marlborough, Mass., removing to the latter town about 1664. He became a freeman in 1660. Thomas Rice died in Marlborough, November 16, 1681.
5. **Thomas Rice**, son of (4) Thomas Rice and Mary King, his wife. He was born in Sudbury, June 30, 1654, and resided in Marlborough, Mass. He married, second, the 10th of the 11th month, 1681, **Anna Rice**. For several years he represented Marlborough in the General Court. By a division of Marlborough in 1717 his residence was in Westborough, where in 1724 he was one of the original members of the church. His death is not found on record.

Anna Rice, the second wife of (5) Thomas Rice, was born November 19, 1661, and died in Westborough, Mass., May 2, 1731. She was descended from:

- (a) **William Rice** of Boemar (see I, page 17).
- (b) **Thomas Rice** (see II, page 17).
- (c) Deacon **Edmund Rice** (see III, page 17) and **Tamazine**, his first wife.
- (d) **Edward Rice**, son of (c) Deacon Edmund Rice and Tamazine, his first wife. He was born in England, about 1619, and came to America with his parents in 1638. He married **Agnes** (sometimes written Annis or Anne) **Bent**; and possibly married, second, Anna ——. In 1664 he removed from Sudbury to Marlborough,

Mass., where he was a Deacon in the church. On October 2, 1666, he deposed that he was forty-seven years old. He died in Marlborough, August 15, 1712, and his widow died there on June 4, 1713, aged eighty-three.

Anna Rice, the second wife of (5) Thomas Rice, was a daughter of (d) Edward Rice.

6. **Charles Rice**, son of (5) Thomas Rice and Anna Rice, his second wife. He was born July 7, 1684, and married, April 26, 1711, at Marlborough, Mass., **Rachel Wheeler**. He later resided in Westborough, Mass., where on August 24, 1729, he and his wife were admitted as members of the church.

Anna Rice, wife of (VI) Ebenezer Rice, was a daughter of (6) Charles Rice and Rachel Wheeler, his wife.

VII.

Joseph Rice, son of (VI) Ebenezer Rice and Anna Rice, his wife, was born in Westborough, Mass., February 12, 1745. He married, first, June 18, 1772, **Mary Green**. (Joseph Rice's twin brother Benjamin married Sarah Green, younger sister of Joseph Rice's wife, Mary Green.) Several years after his marriage Joseph Rice removed from Westborough to Conway, Mass., where he carried on a prosperous blacksmithing business. He marched from Conway on the alarm from Lexington, April 19, 1775, under Captain Robert Oliver and Colonel Samuel Williams, serving nine days. On May 1, 1775, he enlisted in the eight months' service, in Captain Oliver's Company, Colonel Doolittle's Regiment, serving three months and eight days, and also served under the same command at Winter Hill in October and November, 1775. Joseph Rice became largely identified with the social, political and religious interests of Conway. He died in Conway on March 9, 1826.

Mary Green, the first wife of Joseph Rice, was born in Westborough, February 1, 1746, and died in Conway, Mass., about 1786. She was descended from:

1. **Joseph Green.**
2. **Joseph Green**, son of (1) Joseph Green. He married **Abigail** ———, who died January 14, 1770.
3. **Joseph Green**, son of (2) Joseph Green and Abigail, his wife. He married, in Westborough, Mass., December 25, 1740, **Mary Wright**, and died in 1794. His will was probated August 20, 1794.

Mary Green, the first wife of (VII) Joseph Rice, was a daughter of (3) Joseph Green and Mary Wright, his wife.

VIII.

Colonel **William Rice** (see 1, page 39), of Worthington, Mass., was a son of (VII) Joseph Rice and Mary Green, his first wife.

COTTRELL ANCESTORS.

ONE: PATERNAL ANCESTORS OF WEALTHY COTTRELL.

The family name of Cottrell is also variously spelled Cotterill, Cottrill, Cotterell, Cotterel, Cottrelle, and Cottrel.

I.

Nicholas Cottrell, who is first mentioned at Newport, R. I., in 1638 or 1639. He was a freeman there in 1655. In June, 1660, he was one of a company of some seventy-six Rhode Island men who purchased Westerly, then called Misquamicut by the Indians, of Sosoia, the Indian owner of the tract. In 1669 he was a freeman at Westerly, R. I., and in 1670 a Deputy. He was twice married. He died in 1680 or 1681, leaving a widow whose first name was Martha and who was then thirty-six years old. His will, made in February, 1680, described him as living by the Taunton River, and mentioned eight children.

II.

Nicholas Cottrell, son of (I) Nicholas Cottrell, was admitted a freeman at Westerly, R. I., on October 29, 1668. He served in King Philip's War in 1675. On June 8, 1681, he bought two hundred acres of land for £30. In 1688 he was Constable, and in 1696 Deputy. On October 2, 1711, he and thirty-three others bought over five thousand acres of vacant lands in Narragansett which had been ordered sold by the Assembly. The date of his marriage and the name of his wife, who predeceased him, are unknown. He died in Westerly, R. I., intestate, in December, 1715, leaving five children. His property was inventoried January 11, 1716, and appraised at £114.8.0.

III.

Nicholas Cottrell, son of (II) Nicholas Cottrell, was born about 1658, and married, in March, 1706, **Dorothy Pendleton**. He had the title of Ensign, and in 1675 served in King Philip's War. He probably removed to Stonington, Conn. He died in 1727.

On her father's side Dorothy Pendleton was descended from:

1. **Brian Pendleton**, who was born in England in 1599, and married **Eleanor** ——. He was an early settler of Watertown, Mass., and became a freeman there on September 3, 1634. In 1638 he was one of the petitioners for a plantation at Sudbury, Mass., and his name is on the town records as one of the foremost business men of that place. He returned to Watertown, which town he represented as Deputy to the General Court in 1636, 1637, 1638, 1647 and 1648. He also served as one of the early Selectmen in both towns. He then went to Ipswich, Mass., and about 1651 to Portsmouth, N. H., where he was Deputy for five years. He purchased two hundred acres of land near Winter Harbor, Saco, Me., and also acquired considerable other lands in Maine. He removed to Saco, but later returned to Portsmouth. He held the rank of Captain and Major for many years, and belonged to the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts. He was an eminent man in his day. His will, made at Portsmouth, August 9, 1677, was probated April 5, 1681.

2. **James Pendleton**, only son of (1) Brian Pendleton and Eleanor, his wife. He was born November 1, 1630; and married, second, in Sudbury, Mass., April 29, 1656, **Hannah Goodenow** (see 2, page 27). He later resided in Stonington, Conn., and Westerly, R. I. He was a Captain, and in 1676 served in King Philip's War. He died November 29, 1709.

Dorothy Pendleton, wife of (III) Nicholas Cottrell, was a daughter of (2) James Pendleton and Hannah Goodenow, his second wife.

On her mother's side Dorothy Pendleton was descended from:

1. **Edmund Goodenow**, of Donhead, Wiltshire, England. He married **Ann** ——. With his wife and several children he came to New England in the ship "Confidence" in 1638, at the age of twenty-seven, and settled in Sudbury, Mass. On May 13, 1640, he became a freeman. He served as Deputy to the General Court in 1645, 1649, 1650, 1660, 1673, 1674, 1680 and 1681. He became an Ensign, August 12, 1645; Lieutenant in 1651; Captain, Foot Company at Sudbury, May 27, 1674. He died April 6, 1688. Ann, his wife, died March 9, 1675.

2. **Hannah Goodenow**, daughter of (1) Edmund Goodenow and Ann, his wife. She was born November 28, 1639, and married **James Pendleton** (see 2, page 26).

Dorothy Pendleton, wife of (III) Nicholas Cottrell, was a daughter of (2) Hannah Goodenow and James Pendleton, her husband.

IV.

Nicholas Cottrell, son of (III) Nicholas Cottrell and Dorothy Pendleton, his wife, was born July 7, 1717, and married, October 3, 1735, **Rebecca Randall**. He resided in Stonington, Conn., and died there before 1767.

Rebecca Randall, wife of Nicholas Cottrell, was born July 31, 1717. She survived her husband and was in Stonington as late as March, 1783.

On her father's side Rebecca Randall was descended from:

1. **John Randall**, who married **Elizabeth** ——. He is first mentioned at Newport, R. I. About 1667 he removed to Westerly, R. I., where the remainder of his life was spent. In 1669 and 1670 he served as a Deputy. He died in 1685, and in that year his widow petitioned the authorities to be allowed to improve her deceased husband's lands.

2. **John Randall, Jr.**, son of (1) John Randall and Elizabeth, his wife. He was born in 1666; and married, second, November 25, 1706, **Mary Baldwin** (see 5, page 29). He lived with his father in Westerly until he reached manhood, and then removed to Stonington, Conn., where he bought large tracts of land. He was an industrious and successful farmer. He died in Stonington at an advanced age.

Rebecca Randall, wife of (IV) Nicholas Cottrell, was a daughter of (2) John Randall, Jr., and Mary Baldwin, his second wife.

On her mother's side Rebecca Randall was descended from:

1. **Henry Baldwin**, of Dundridge Manor, in Aston-Clinton, Buckinghamshire, England.

2. **Sylvester Baldwin**, son of (1) Henry Baldwin. He married, in 1590, **Jane Willis**, and died previous to 1632.

3. **Sylvester Baldwin**, son of (2) Sylvester Baldwin and Jane Willis, his wife. He was born in Aston-Clinton, Buckinghamshire, England, a little before 1600, and married, early in 1620, **Sarah Bryan**. He resided at St. Leonards in Aston-Clinton. In 1638, with his wife and six children, he sailed for America in the ship "Martin," as members of the New Haven Company. Sylvester Baldwin died on shipboard, "in mid-ocean," July 21, 1638. By his will, which was admitted to probate in Boston, he left a large estate. His widow and children settled with the rest of the emigrating company in New Haven, Conn. In 1643 his widow remarried and removed to Milford, Conn., where she died in 1669.

4. **John Baldwin**, son of (3) Sylvester Baldwin and Sarah Bryan, his wife. He was born or baptized in England in 1635, and came to America with his parents in 1638. In 1656 there was assigned to John Baldwin a house lot in Milford, Conn. In 1664 he removed to New London, Conn. He married, second, July 24, 1672, **Rebecca Palmer**, widow of Elisha Chesebrough, and settled permanently in Stonington, Conn., where they owned an extensive tract of land. He died August 19, 1683.

Rebecca Palmer, the second wife of (4) John Baldwin, was born in Stonington, Conn., and died May 2, 1713. She was a daughter of Walter Palmer and Rebecca Short, his second wife. Walter Palmer was born in London, England, in 1585. With his brother, Abraham Palmer, a merchant of London, and nine associates, he came to New England as early as 1628. They went from Salem, Mass., through a pathless wilderness to a place called by the Indians Mishawam. The following year they were joined by nearly a hundred people from Salem and organized, June 24, 1629, the town of Charlestown. It is claimed that Walter Palmer built the first dwelling house in Charlestown after it was organized as a township, on the two acres of land assigned to him. He was admitted a freeman on May 18, 1631. He married, second, June 1, 1633, Rebecca Short, who came to New England in 1632. Walter Palmer engaged in stock raising and farming, and purchased additional land for that purpose. He resided in Charlestown until 1643, when he removed to the Plymouth Colony and joined in the organization of the town of Rehoboth. He was elected the first Representative from Rehoboth to the General Court of Plymouth Colony, was subsequently re-elected to that office, and also served as Selectman many times and held other local offices. In 1653 Walter Palmer removed to Stonington, Conn. He died November 10, 1661, and was buried in the old Wequetequock burial ground.

5. **Mary Baldwin**, daughter of (4) John Baldwin and Rebecca Palmer, his second wife. She was born February 24, 1675, and married **John Randall, Jr.** (see 2, page 28).

Rebecca Randall, wife of (IV) Nicholas Cottrell, was a daughter of (5) Mary Baldwin and John Randall, Jr., her husband.

V.

Asa Cottrell, son of (IV) Nicholas Cottrell and Rebecca Randall, his wife, was born in Stonington, Conn., in November, 1746. He removed to Worthington, Mass., and married, December 6, 1770, **Lucinda Otis Clapp** (see VII, page 38). He served in the Revolutionary War, enlisting August 11, 1777, in Lieutenant Constant Web-

ster's Company, from which he was discharged August 22, 1777. From September 20, 1777, to October 14, 1777, he served in Captain Ebenezer Webber's Company, Colonel Ezra May's Regiment. He died in Worthington, Mass., June 15, 1833.

VI.

Wealthy Cottrell was a daughter of (V) Asa Cottrell and Lucinda Otis Clapp (see VII, page 38), his wife. She married Colonel **William Rice** (see 1, page 39).

TWO: MATERNAL ANCESTORS OF WEALTHY COTTRELL.

Clapa, Clap, or Clápp, is an ancient Danish name. There was a Danish nobleman named Osgod Clapa at the court of Canute, King of England.

I.

Richard Clapp, of Dorchester, Dorsetshire, England.

II.

Thomas Clapp, son of (I) Richard Clapp, was born in Dorchester, Dorsetshire, England, in 1597, and came to New England probably in the ship which arrived from Weymouth, England, on July 24, 1633, and whose passengers settled in Dorchester, Mass. His name appears, in 1634, in the town records of Dorchester, Mass. He married, in 1637, **Abigail** —— (possibly Sharp). On March 13, 1638/9, he was admitted a freeman at Dorchester. From there he removed to Weymouth, Mass., and in 1640 settled in Scituate, Mass., where he was a Deacon in the church in 1647, a Deputy to the General Court in 1649, and one of the first overseers of the poor chosen in 1667. Thomas Clapp died in Scituate, Mass., “greatly respected,” April 20, 1684.

III.

Samuel Clapp, son of (II) Thomas Clapp and Abigail, his wife, was born probably in Scituate, Mass., and married, June 14, 1666, **Hannah Gill**. He resided in Scituate, on his father's lands, and was a distinguished man

of his time. He was a Deputy to the General Court of Plymouth Colony from 1680 to 1686, and again in 1690 and 1691; and a Representative to the General Court of Massachusetts in the years 1692, 1693, 1695, 1696, 1699, 1703 to 1705, 1707 to 1709, 1714 and 1715. In 1682 he was one of the commissioners appointed to settle the boundary between Scituate and Marshfield; also to divide the line between Conihassett grant and Scituate. The date of his death is not known.

Hannah Gill, wife of Samuel Clapp, was born November 10, 1645, and died February 27, 1722. She was a daughter of Thomas Gill and Hannah Otis, his wife. Thomas Gill was born in England in 1616, and came to New England probably in 1635, when he received a grant of a house lot in Hingham, Mass. He died in September, 1678. Hannah Otis, his wife, was baptized at Glastonbury, England, August 16, 1618, came to Hingham, Mass., with her parents in 1635, and died January 24, 1676. She was a daughter of John Otis (see 2, page 35) and Margaret, his first wife.

IV.

Stephen Clapp, son of (III) Samuel Clapp and Hannah Gill, his wife, was born March 4, 1670, and married, December 24, 1696, **Temperance Gorham**. He resided in Scituate, Mass., and was a Deacon in the church, and a Lieutenant of the military company. In 1706 he was one of the committee for building the meeting-house, and in 1720 served as Representative to the General Court. He died December 11, 1756.

Temperance Gorham, wife of Stephen Clapp, was born August 2, 1678.

On her father's side Temperance Gorham was descended from :

1. **John Gorham**, who is believed to have been a descendant of the Gorham family that, soon after the Norman Conquest, became established at Westwick, subsequently called Gorhambury, in Hertfordshire, England. This family had previously lived near Gorram, in Brittany, from whence the name Gorham originated.

2. **James Gorham**, son of (1) John Gorham. He was born in 1550, and married, in 1572, **Agnes Bernington**. He resided in Benefield, Northamptonshire, England.

3. **Ralph Gorham**, son of (2) James Gorham and Agnes Bernington, his wife. He was born in 1575, and resided in Benefield, England. In 1637 he was in Duxbury, Mass. In March of that year he brought suit against Francis Sprague for £20, for two pigs; and on October 2, 1637, he was granted land on which to erect a house and for a garden. Two years later he was fined 10 shillings for beating Webb Adey. After a few years' residence in Duxbury he is supposed to have returned to England.

4. **John Gorham**, son of (3) Ralph Gorham. He was baptized at Benefield, England, January 28, 1621, and married, about 1643, in Plymouth, Mass., **Desire Howland**. In 1643 he was enrolled for military service at Plymouth. In 1648 he was Constable at Marshfield, Mass.; in 1651 was on the Grand Jury at Barnstable, Mass.; in 1653 was in Yarmouth, Mass., and served as one of the committee on military affairs, and in 1654 as Surveyor of Highways. In 1673 and several succeeding years he was a Selectman at Yarmouth. In 1675 he was Captain of the second expedition sent from Yarmouth to Narragansett, in King Philip's War, and on December 19th of that year participated in the great Swamp Fight with the Indians. The colonists marched eighteen miles to the scene of the conflict, and it is related that "General Winslow with Plymouth forces under Major Bradford and Captain Gorham marched in the center" of the combined forces of Massachusetts, Plymouth and Connecticut. John Gorham died in Swansea, Mass., of fever contracted in military service, and was buried there on February 5, 1675/6.

Desire Howland, wife of (4) John Gorham, was born in Plymouth, Mass., and died in Barnstable, Mass., probably on October 13, 1683. She was the eldest child of Pilgrim John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley, his wife, who were married at Plymouth, Mass., before 1624. John Howland was born about 1593. (It has been claimed by some authorities that he was a son of John Howland and his wife, Emma Revell, daughter and heiress of Nicholas Revell, of London; and that the last named John Howland was the second son of John Howland, of London, a salter, and his wife, Ann Grenway. It has also been stated that Pilgrim John Howland was a son of Humphrey Howland, a citizen and draper of London.) He came to New England in the "Mayflower" in 1620, and during a "mighty storm" fell into the sea, but "caught hold of the topsail halliards, which hung overboard, and ran out at length; yet he held his hold (though he was sundry fathoms under water) till he was hauled up by the same rope to the brim of the water, and then with a boat hook and other means got into the ship again." He was the thirteenth signer of the Compact, and was a member of the third exploring party which set out from the "Mayflower" on December 6, 1620, and took part in the first encounter with the Indians. John Howland settled in Plymouth, Mass. He was Assistant from 1633 to 1635, had command of the trading post on the Kennebec in 1634, and was Deputy to the General Court in 1641, 1645, 1646, 1648 to 1658, 1661, 1663, 1666, 1667 and 1670. He resided at Rocky Nook in Plymouth, and died February 23, 1672/3.

Elizabeth Tilley, wife of Pilgrim John Howland, was born about 1607, came with her parents to Plymouth in the "Mayflower," and died in Swansea, Mass., December 21, 1687. She was a daughter of Pilgrim John Tilley and —, his wife. John Tilley was the sixteenth signer of the Compact, and a member of the third exploring party. Both he and his wife died in Plymouth, Mass., "a little after they came ashore."

5. **John Gorham, Jr.**, son of (4) John Gorham and Desire Howland, his wife. He was born in Barnstable, Mass., February 20, 1652, and married, February 24, 1675, **Mary Otis** (see 4, page 35). He was Deputy in the years 1688 to 1690 and 1692 to 1694. In 1690 he was Captain in the expedition to Canada. In 1696 he served as Captain in King William's War, and in 1709 as Lieutenant Colonel of militia.

He died in Nantucket, Mass., November 11, 1716. His estate was inventoried and valued at £2,452.10.11.

Temperance Gorham, wife of (IV) Stephen Clapp, was a daughter of (5) John Gorham, Jr., and Mary Otis, his wife.

On her mother's side Temperance Gorham was descended from:

1. **Richard Otis**, of Glastonbury, Somersetshire, England. His will was dated November 17, 1611.

2. **John Otis**, son of (1) Richard Otis. He was born in England about 1581, and resided there in Glastonbury. He married, first, **Margaret** ——. In 1635, with his wife and children, he came to Hingham, Mass. He was admitted a freeman there in 1636, and served often as a Selectman. In 1647 he received the last of several grants of land in Hingham. Margaret, his first wife, died in Hingham, Mass., June 28, 1653. In the same year John Otis removed to Weymouth, Mass., and died there on May 31, 1657.

3. **John Otis, Jr.**, son of (2) John Otis and Margaret, his first wife. He was born in Glastonbury, England, and baptized there January 14, 1621. He came to Hingham, Mass., with his parents in 1635, and married, about 1652, **Mary Jacob**. In 1661 he settled in Scituate, Mass. In 1678 he was in Barnstable, Mass., but later returned to Scituate, where he died January 16, 1684. He left a good-sized estate.

Mary Jacob, wife of (3) John Otis, Jr., was a daughter of Nicholas Jacob and Mary ——, his wife. Nicholas Jacob, with his wife and several children, came from England to America in 1633, and for three years resided in Watertown, Mass. In 1636 he removed to Hingham, Mass., where he was admitted a freeman in the same year, and on October 7, 1640, was allowed to keep an ordinary. In 1648 and 1649 he was a Deputy. He died June 12, 1657. His estate was inventoried and valued at £393.8.6.

4. **Mary Otis**, daughter of (3) John Otis, Jr., and Mary Jacob, his wife. She was born March 14, 1654, and married **John Gorham, Jr.** (see 5, page 34). She died April 1, 1732.

Temperance Gorham, wife of (IV) Stephen Clapp, was a daughter of (4) Mary Otis and John Gorham, Jr., her husband.

V.

John Clapp, son of (IV) Stephen Clapp and Temperance Gorham, his wife, was born October 14, 1697, and married, November 5, 1724, **Mercy Otis**. He resided in Scituate, Mass., and was a Captain. He died January 24, 1762.

Mercy Otis, wife of John Clapp, was born in 1700 and died January 15, 1761.

On her father's side Mercy Otis was descended from:

1. **Richard Otis** (see 1, page 35).
2. **John Otis** (see 2, page 35) and **Margaret**, his first wife.
3. **John Otis, Jr.** (see 3, page 35) and **Mary Jacob**, his wife.
4. **Job Otis**, son of (3) John Otis, Jr., and Mary Jacob, his wife. He was born March 20, 1677, and married **Mercy Little** (see 3, page 37). He resided in Scituate, Mass., and died there in 1758.

Mercy Otis, wife of (V) John Clapp, was a daughter of (4) Job Otis and Mercy Little, his wife.

On her mother's side Mercy Otis was descended from:

1. **Thomas Little**, who came from England to America about 1630, and settled first in Plymouth, Mass. He was taxed there on January 2, 1632/3. He married, April 19, 1633, **Anna Warren**. In August, 1643, he was enrolled for military service at Plymouth. He removed to Marshfield, Mass., before August 2, 1652, when he sold the house and land at Eel River in Plymouth "whereon the said Thomas Little formerly lived." Thomas Little was a lawyer. He was buried at Marshfield, Mass., March 12, 1671/2.

Anna Warren, wife of (1) Thomas Little, was born in England about 1612, came to Plymouth, Mass., in the "Anne" in 1623, and died after February 19, 1675/6, when she was mentioned in her son Thomas's will. She was the second daughter of Richard Warren and Elizabeth —, his

wife, who were married in England before 1611. Richard Warren came to Plymouth, Mass., with the Pilgrims in the "Mayflower" in 1620, having joined from London, England. He was the twelfth signer of the Compact, and one of the few designated by the honorable prefix of "Mr." He was among the ten principal men aboard the "Mayflower" who, on December 6, 1620, with some seamen, set out in a shallop on the third voyage of discovery and took part in the first encounter with the Indians. Richard Warren's wife and five daughters followed him to Plymouth in the "Anne" in 1623. He is mentioned by Nathaniel Morton as "a useful instrument, and during his life bore a deep share in the difficulties and troubles of the first settlement of the plantation." He died in Plymouth, Mass., in 1628. Elizabeth, his widow, died there on October 2, 1673, "aged above ninety years."

2. **Ephraim Little**, son of (1) Thomas Little and Anna Warren, his wife. He was born in Plymouth, Mass., May 17, 1650, and married, November 22, 1672, **Mary Sturtevant**. He resided in Marshfield, Mass., but died in Scituate, Mass., November 24, 1717.

Mary Sturtevant, wife of (2) Ephraim Little, was born in Plymouth, Mass., December 7, 1651, and died in Scituate, Mass., February 10, 1717. Archibald McClure, son of Archibald McClure and Elizabeth Craigmiles, his wife, who came to America from Ulster, Ireland, in 1801, was born in Hamilton Factory (now Guilderland), Albany County, N. Y., August 5, 1806. In 1821 he removed to Albany, N. Y., and entered the employ of Thomas & Joseph Russell, dealers in paints, etc., remaining there until the spring of 1829 when, in partnership with his elder brother James McClure, he bought out the wholesale drug and paint establishment of Sylvanus J. General **James Clay Rice**, son of (1) Colonel William Rice and Wealthy Cottrell, his wife, was born in Worthington, Mass., December 27, 1828; married, December 10, 1862, **Josephine Thorp**, daughter of George B. Thorp, of New York City, and Julia Eliza Amos, his second wife; no children.

James Clay Rice was graduated from Yale University in 1854. While in college he wrote a history of Worthington, Mass. He took charge of a seminary at Natchez, Miss., and also studied law; then came to New York City and continued the study of law, was admitted to the bar in 1856, and practiced in that city. On May 10, 1861, he was mustered in as First Lieutenant of the Thirty-ninth New York Volunteers, or "Garibaldi Guards," and was present with that regiment at the battle of First Bull Run. He was discharged from the Thirty-ninth Regiment on September 12, 1861, and the following day was commissioned Lieutenant Colonel of the Forty-fourth New York Volunteers. The Forty-fourth Regiment, also called the "Ellsworth Avengers," organized in Albany, N. Y., was mustered into service on September 24, 1861, and participated with distinction in the Peninsular campaign. It was at the siege of Yorktown and Hanover Court House, and in the Seven Days' Battles—Mechanicsville, Gaines's Mill, White Oak Swamp and Malvern Hill. Lieutenant Colonel Rice commanded the regiment at Malvern Hill and three days later, on July 4, 1862, he became its Colonel. The Forty-fourth Regiment also fought in the battle of Second Bull Run and in the Chancellorsville campaign.

Colonel Rice's best-remembered service in the Civil War was rendered at Little Round Top, in Gettysburg, July 2, 1863. In the afternoon of that day the Forty-fourth New York and the other three regiments of the Third Brigade, First Division, Fifth Army Corps, under command of Colonel Vincent, took possession of Little Round Top. A few minutes after their arrival they were confronted by seven Confederate regiments, and repeated assaults were made by the Southern troops on the key position occupied by Colonel Vincent's command. After a time the Union forces were reinforced by a battery, and by a regiment from General Weed's Brigade, the other three regiments of which arrived a little later. The battle at Little Round Top, lasting a couple of hours, was spectacular as well as destructive, and before it was secured for the Union army the losses on both sides reached high totals. Colonel Vincent fell early in the fighting and the command of the Third Brigade devolved on Colonel Rice.

On August 17, 1863, for his bravery at Gettysburg, Colonel Rice was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General of volunteers. He was transferred from the Fifth Corps to the First Corps, and assigned to the command of the Second Brigade of General Meredith's Division. The regiments of his new command were the Seventy-sixth, Eighty-fourth and One hundred and forty-seventh New York. General Rice participated in some of the actions incident to the operations in Virginia in the fall of 1863, including those at Gainesville and Haymarket, October 19, and the Mine Run campaign at the end of November and the beginning of December. In March, 1864, the First Corps was merged in the Fifth, and General Rice's Brigade was included in General Wadsworth's Division. His regiments took part in the opening battles

at the Wilderness, May 5 and 6, 1864, and at Spotsylvania four days later. About noon on May 10, 1864, following an encounter at Laurel Hill, near Spotsylvania Court House, as General Rice was superintending arrangements for having his regiments relieved he was struck by a sharpshooter's bullet and mortally wounded. His last words were: "Turn my face to the enemy." His body was taken to Albany, N. Y., and there interred in the Rural Cemetery with civic and military honors.

Josephine Thorp, widow of General James Clay Rice, was born July 1, 1836, and died at Norwalk, Conn., November 22, 1876. She was buried in the Rural Cemetery, Albany, N. Y.
