PREFACE.

THE Richardson Memorial which was so ably edited by the late Rev. John Adams Vinton, is highly appreciated by the compilers of this supplement; but while we gratefully acknowledge the general accuracy of his, to us, invaluable work, we find that our line of ancestry and their several branches of posterity are but partially represented, though doubtless through no fault of the above-named author. And at quite an expenditure of time, and by the assistance of family relatives we are enabled to present the following history or record of the members of the Richardson family who left Royalston, Mass., about the year 1800, some a little earlier, and others a little later.

But as the supplement which will appear in the volume, the Richardson Memorial, is also bound in separate form, we wish to quote, or copy, from the original volume to some extent for the benefit of those members of the family who may not possess the large work, which was edited and compiled by Rev. John Adams Vinton, except the "Newbury

Richardson" family, which, owing to the feeble health of Mr. Vinton, was prepared by Mr. Brown Thurston of Portland, Maine [his sister married Rev. Henry Richardson of that branch], who also prepared the indexes and printed the volume, to each of whom we wish to give due credit.

RICHARDSON MEMORIAL SUPPLEMENT

Preliminary Remarks.

Quoting from Prof. Vinton: "Surnames are of high antiquity. It soon became necessary to distinguish a man from others of the same name, to prevent confusion and mistake. The name of the man's father, or the place where he lived, or his occupation, was used for this purpose. There were four principal ways in which surnames originated.

"1. From some ancestor. 2. From the place of one's birth, residence, or achievements. 3. From one's trade or profession. 4. From some personal attribute or condition in life.

"In Camden's Remains concerning Brittain is the following statement: WILLIAM BELWARD, Lord of the moiety of Malpasse, soon after the Norman Conquest, had two sons; the younger named, from his small size, Richard the Little. One of the sons of the last named Richard, was called JOHN RICHARDSON, taking his father's name with the addition of son for his surname. Hence came the name and family of Richardson.

"Richard was a favorite name among the Normans, and the surname Richardson unquestionably originated with them. We find it among no other

people. They made themselves masters of a large part of France in the ninth century, which they called Normandy. After the conquest of England by that remarkable people, several kings of that country bore that name. The name was also borne by several of the leading men of England and has descended in uninterrupted succession to our own times. The transition from Richard to Richardson was a matter of course and is well illustrated by Camden in the passage already quoted.

“Richardson has been a name widely spread in our fatherland as well as in our own country. It might not be easy to find a county in England where the name has not gained a footing. The family is doubtless of Norman origin.”

We find the name numerically strong in America at different and distant points. The family has included many persons of great eminence in all the departments of human life, civil, military, literary and ecclesiastical. For a more extended history of noted persons bearing the name, we refer the reader to the opening pages of Prof. Vinton's great work, Richardson Memorial. He says he has found no Richardson on these shores earlier than 1630.

THE RICHARDSON MEMORIAL SUPPLEMENT.

In the large volume we have quite conclusive proof that Ezekiel Richardson and his brothers, Samuel and Thomas, came from the south of England, Ezekiel with Winthrop's fleet in 1630; himself and wife, Susanna, became members of the church gathered in Charlestown, August 27, 1630, which afterwards became the first church in Boston. And both were dismissed from it with thirty-eight others, October 14, 1632, to form the present first church of Charlestown.

We now come to the subject of this little volume, the history of the posterity of

SAMUEL RICHARDSON

SAMUEL RICHARDSON¹ the second of the brothers of that name who united in the settlement of Woburn, Mass., was born about 1610. The first notice we find of Samuel Richardson in this country is dated July 1, 1636, when he and his brother Thomas, with others, were on a committee to lay out lots for hay. In May, 1640, the town of Charlestown petitioned the General Court for an enlargement of her territory. The petition was granted, and an addition made to her territory of two miles square and afterwards increased to four miles square. But as early as the fifth of November, 1640, the church of Charlestown chose seven men, among whom were the three Richardson brothers, Ezekiel, Samuel and Thomas, as commissioners, or agents for the erection of a

new church and town upon the land thus granted, to be entirely distinct and separate from Charlestown. A beginning was made in the erection of houses (log houses, doubtless) during the year 1641, at and near the center of the new town which at its incorporation in September, 1642, received the name of Woburn, from Woburn in Herefordshire, Eng. Seven persons were embodied in a church state, viz., John Moussall, Edward Convers, Edward Johnson, William Learned, Ezekiel Richardson, Samuel Richardson and Thomas Richardson. These persons stood forth one by one and declared their religious faith and Christian experience. These seven men were the "seven pillars" Proverbs 1 : 1 ; they were the nucleus of the new church. It was their duty to lay out the new town to be formed in connection with the new church, and make all needful arrangements for this purpose.

The fact that the three Richardson brothers were appointed on so important a service is conclusive proof of their general excellence of character and of the confidence reposed in their wisdom and integrity. The three brothers, after their removal to Woburn, lived near each other on the same street, which from its having been their residence and that of many of their posterity, has been known from time immemorial as "Richardson's Row." It was laid out by the town as a street in 1647, and the three Richardsons are in the town book, represented as living upon it at that time. The brothers lived near the present line of Woburn, but a short distance north of the present village of Winchester.

Their descendants bearing the name of Richardson, long have been, and still are, more numerous than persons of any other name in Woburn ; and among them have been found some of the most useful and valued members of the church and community. For a more full and complete history of the Richardson brothers and families, we refer the reader to Prof. J. A. Vinton's Richardson Memorial, from which we have borrowed the preceding. It is now our province to

take up the history of the second brother, Samuel Richardson and his lineal descendants, of our own particular branch as given below. The first three generations being quoted from the above-named work, our written authentic family record, beginning at 1714, furnishing data for the completion of the same.

POSTERITY OF SAMUEL RICHARDSON

First Generation.

SAMUEL RICHARDSON¹ was born in England about 1610. He was a man of sterling integrity, was one of the pillars of the church constituted in Woburn, Mass., Aug. 14, 1642. His wife was Joanna —. It should have been mentioned that she united with the church in Charlestown, Sept. 9, 1639. He was selectman of Woburn in 1644, 1645, 1646, 1649, 1650, 1651. In 1645, he paid the highest tax of any man in Woburn. He died intestate March 23, 1658. The inventory is dated March 29, 1658. The will of Joanna Richardson, widow of Samuel, is dated June 20, 1666. She probably died soon after, though the will was not proved till 1677. She gives her real estate to her eldest son John, and sons Joseph, Samuel and Stephen, and her clothing to her daughter Elizabeth. She mentions Mary Mousall as her daughter.

In this generation, as in all others following, it is our purpose to bring out in this small work only our direct line, which we find is by the way of Stephen,² fourth son of Samuel¹ and Joanna Richardson, born in Woburn, Aug. 15, 1649, married, in Billerica, Jan. 2, 1674-5, Abigail Wyman, daughter of Francis¹ and Abigail (Read) Wyman of Woburn. He resided in Woburn, which then included Burlington and a part of Wilmington. His land extended into Billerica, which then joined Woburn. He was freeman 1690, and died March 22, 1717-8, aged 69. His will is dated Aug. 15, 1713, proved April 22, 1718; recorded Midd. Prob. Record XV, 157-163. It is very long, occupying six folio pages. In it he mentions as living wife Abigail, daughters Abigail Vinton and Prudence Kendall, sons Stephen, William, Francis, Timothy, Seth, Daniel and Solomon. His widow Abigail died Sept. 17, 1720, aged 60. [Gravestone.]

TIMOTHY RICHARDSON⁴ (*Timothy*,³ *Stephen*,² *Samuel*¹), son of Timothy³ and Susanna (Holden) Richardson, born in Attleborough, Oct. 18, 1714; married ALICE WYMAN,⁴ born in Woburn, Nov. 12, 1717, second daughter of Timothy Wyman,³ born April 5, 1691, who was eldest son of Timothy,² who was third son of Francis Wyman.¹ He lived in Attleborough. Abijah, Eliphalet and two others of the above-named brothers were soldiers for five or more years during the Revolutionary War for independence, and all returned.

Fifth Generation.

(New Work.)

The record of our ancestors we have thus far copied from the Richardson Memorial, in which we find (grandfather) Isaac Richardson mentioned in paragraph 5368, page 569, also name of his wife, — Towne. This paragraph we know to be incorrect, as also paragraph 5666, page 613. It is true that the four brothers, "Abiel, Isaac, Lot and Timothy," removed to Vermont from Royalston, Mass., where they were born; but their father's name was Timothy, son of Timothy, who was born 1741, son of Timothy, born 1714, and Alice (Wyman) Richardson. All this from our family record proves conclusively that the connecting link between our record and the early records contained in the Richardson Memorial, attaches at paragraph 1594, page 206, and finally at paragraph 1785, page 240, and that we are the posterity of Samuel, not of Thomas, Richardson.

Before proceeding a few words in explanation may be in order, more especially for the benefit of those persons who have only this small work. The figures before a name quoted from the Memorial indicate the number in regular order bearing the name. The last and highest number at close of record of Thomas Richardson's posterity, is 7035; if a + is placed before the number it indicates that the name following the number has a paragraph in the next generation. But as the Richardson Memorial contains record of others bearing the name beside that of the three brothers, Ezekiel, Samuel and Thomas, and their posterity, swelling the number to 8586, to avoid confusion we commence numbering the new work at 8587, and accordingly as last paragraph in the Richardson Memorial by Vinton is 8381, we number our first paragraph 8382.

ISAAC RICHARDSON⁶ (*Timothy*,⁵ *Timothy*,⁴ *Timothy*,³ *Stephen*,² *Samuel*¹), son of Timothy⁵ and Sarah (Easty) Richardson, was born in Royalston, Mass., Oct. 23, 1777 ; married THANKFUL TOWNE. In the year 1800 he went to Waterford, Vt., and secured a piece of forest land. The following summer he and his young wife commenced their life labor of carving out a farm home from the wilderness. The compilers of these records, grandsons of the above, well recollect their many tales of privations and hardships which they seemed to cheerfully endure in those early days. We were especially impressed with grandmother's fund of bear stories. One will suffice. Upon going a few hundred rods from their log cabin to milk the cow, in a small field near by, she heard what seemed to be a hog breaking down the corn

and crunching the ears; but when she rushed into the field to drive away the intruder it proved to be a big black bear. Grandfather notified the few neighbors, and a bear hunt resulted in the capture and death of bruin.

During the war of 1812 the subject of this sketch was summoned to join the forces at Burlington. He and many others who were hastening to battle were met by a courier, carrying the news of the battle of Plattsburgh and surrender of the British. He died in Waterford, March 31, 1862. His wife died on the original homestead, July, 1853.
