***REES, THOMAS-HUNTINGTON**

Translated from "Carmarthen College History" by Dr. E. Pan Jones.

He came from Meline, Pembrokeshire. He was a member of Brynberian and there at 17 years of age he began to preach. He entered College (Presbyterian College, Carmarthen) in 1796 and he was a diligent student there for six years. There was in Huntington, a school room, erected by a zealous nonconformist who endowed it. One of the clauses in the trust was: "The school master must be a nonconformist and a preacher." When he completed his college course he was invited to Huntington to keep the school and to preach. He was ordained there June 13, 1802. He took up the work in earnest. Besides taking charge of the school, he preached every Sunday in Huntington, Gore, and the surrounding villages for which he suffered much persecution. Once in the middle of his sermon he was shot at, but He who directs the thunderbolts was at the helm and no harm came to him. He died May 14, 1858 at the age of 85 years and he was buried in the graveyard at the new chapel. He was a man,--sensible, thorough, unemotional preacher, and suitable to the conditions of the country at the time. His name sweetens the neighborhood to this day."

Professor J. Morgan Lewis, M. A. of Aberysbouth writes as follows:

"Meline is the name of the Parish which adjoins Neuern Parish. They both extend from the lower ground to the Prescelly Hills Brynberian Chapel, is on the border line, and is partly in one parish and partly in the other. The church of Meline is at the extreme end of the parish. It is said in "Geiniadur Bywgraffyddol" which means Biographical Dictionary by Joshua Thomas Jones, Volume 2-Page 447. "Little is known of his childhood, except that he had received good education. When he was but a youth, he became a member of the church of Reverend H. George. When seventeen, he began to preach and at twenty-two he entered Carmarthen College under Reverend D. Peter and D. Davies, and before the end of his course, he acted as assistant teacher. Huntington school was started and the Carmarthen Professors were asked to recommend a person suitable for the post. An appeal was made to Thomas Rees to undertake the work."

Reverend D. J. Morgan of Huntington writes as follows:

"It is on record here that Mr. Rees was born at Meline in Pembrokeshire, February 12, 1774. Twenty-two years later he entered Carmarthen College to be trained for the ministry. In June 1802 he accepted his post at Huntington, where he remained a Pastor of the church for nearly fifty-six years., and master of the school for forty-two years. There are grandchildren and Great grandchildren

still living in the neighborhood. His grave is known. It is in the churchyard belonging to the Congregational Church here. There is also a tablet erected in the church to his memory.

Graduate of Carmarthen College, where he distinguished himself by great attainments in Theology and the Classics and was said to have been master of seven different languages. So proficient was he in Mathematics that had he given himself to that branch of learning he would have risen to as great eminence it is said as some others who graduated from his College.

BARB SURPRISES 'EM

Election of Alan Williams to Honorary Society Is Startling;

All Choices Popular.

Alan G. Williams of Lincoln had, as a leader of the "barbs," or nonfraternity group, raised his voice in protest against the established order of things at the University of Nebraska so much for three years that his election to the Innocents, senior honorary society, came as a surprise Thursday.

LINCOLN, May 1.—Upsetting the traditional idea that it is not representative of the University of Nebraska student body, the Inno-

cents, senior men's honorary society, Thursday tapped 13 members for next year's society that were acclaimed by huge crowds present on the campus lawn to be the best group ever to be picked.

The biggest surprise of the Ivy day celebration came when Alan G. Williams, militant barb leader, was chosen a member. Williams is the first barb to make the Innocents in 20 years.

It was equally surprising to him when he was included, since he said: "I have had more than one fight with each of the Innocents who elected me."

Although it has been customary in years gone by that when a barb was elected he immediately affiliated himself with a fraternity following the tapping ceremonies, Williams stoutly denies that he will ever do such a thing.

"The election came as a complete surprise to me," said the barb captain. "It was not a setup or anything of that sort and therefore I am not obligated now to join any fraternity or other organization." —From Omaha Morning Bee, May 2, 1930.

IV.—Eardisley's Veteran Local Preacher.

Mr. John Saveker, of Chapel House, Eardisley, who has celebrated his 94th birthday, has been practically a life-long worker for Primitive Methodism, and though he is not now able to take services, owing to the fact that he has practically lost his sight, he is still a valuable official of the delightful little church at Eardisley.

He is descended from an old and wealthy Herefordshire family, being a son of the late Mr. William Saveker Junior, who lived at High Holborn, Brilley, some of whose charities are still in existence. His mother was a daughter of the Rev. Thomas Rees, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Huntington. He was born on September 26th, 1837, and was one of a family of nine—four sons and five daughters—of whom the only other survivor is a brother, who is in California.

When he left school, having finished his education at Kington, Mr. Saveker was married to the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Underwood, of Dilwyn. Mrs. Saveker was an excellent preacher, and was for some time a Primitive Methodist evangelist, travelling the greater part of England and Wales on religious work.

Mr. Saveker was a local preacher for over 70 years. He and his wife were the prime movers in establishing the present Primitive Methodist Church at Eardisley. He laid one of the corner stones on September 28th, 1866, and still frequently worships in the church for which he has done so much.

Mr. Saveker still lives in the house where he started. Of his six daughters, four are living. He has two grandsons and six great-grandchildren, all of whom reside at Eardisley.
