She has always been interested in the welfare of her community and taught in the Public School of her home community for three years before her marriage and in later years taught Adult Schools in which she was very much interested.

Also she is interested in civic and patriotic organizations and served as an officer in D. A. R. and U. D. C. Chapters and always interested and active in Church and Denominational work and has served as president of the W. M. S., leader of Circles, leader of Sunbeams and secretary of Associational W. M. U. work and taught many years in Sunday School of Baptist Church.

Since a child of twelve years of age, she has been interested in geneology and often asked her grandmother Rush many questions pertaining to the family and planned some day to trace the Rush Geneology.

With this in view she called the first Rush Reunion August 11, 1946 and asked them to organize in order to help her collect data for compiling and publishing Rush geneology and to secure funds to erect a marker or Memorial to David Rush, a pioneer settler in upper S. C.

She assisted in every way possible to help the Organization execute its plans and as Chairman of Records, has worked untiringly to secure the information needed. She is proud to say that many of the families have been generous and co-operative in sending records promptly and sorry that others have been careless and a few antagonistic. Broadwater Hatchery. He is a Baptist and affiliated with the South Main Street Church. He has retired now.

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RUSH COAT-OF-ARMS

Gules (red) on a fesse or (gold) between three horses, courant argent, as many annulets azure (blue).

Crest: A wolf's head erased ermine.

Motto: Omnia Deo Pendant. Translated: All (things) depend upon God.

The wolf signifies strength and cunningness in time of battle.

A fesse is one of the charges depicted on the field of the escutcheon.

A band or girdle-a girdle of honor.

Running horses signify speed and swift horsemen (Cavalry).

The annulet is a mark of codeny in the fifth son of a family. It denotes wealth.

Colors represent personal characteristics of the bearer and were granted only upon merit.

Gold signifies generosity and elevation of the mind.

Silver denotes peace and sincerity.

Red signifies Military fortitude.

Blue denotes loyalty and truth.

Ermine is a bearing of great dignity and honor and has long been associated with robes and crowns of Royal and distinguished persons.

INTRODUCTION

One hundred and seventy-five years ago, approximately speaking, the face of the extreme northwest section of the newly created State of South Carolina appeared in the eyes of the first white settlers much the same as it does today and as it had to the Indians from rather remote times. That is to say, the general appearance of the country was the same although without the paved roads flowing with motor vehicles and the now thickly settled towns.

This would be especially true in the area north of the "Ancient Boundary," a line which today is the boundary between Anderson and Abbeville counties and which then had been the boundary between the colony and the Cherokee Indian lands.

South of this line the country today would present to a returning pioneer settler an aspect very different from the one he knew in that early period. The great dam built at Clark's Hill has created a vast lake where the Indian and the pioneer saw only a large river. From the Abbeville line the waters spread over the land on either side and on the south the dam itself is only about twenty miles from the city of Augusta.

The pioneer and the Indian would also both be bewildered by the truly gigantic H-Bomb plant below Augusta on the Savannah River.

All this area of western South Carolina, river valley lands, was considered highly desirable for settlement, both immediately after the Revolutionary War and earlier.

By 1782 the tide of settlers, itself like a dammed-up stream, was spreading out all through the foothills of the Piedmont section of South Carolina.

These new inhabitants came from many different sections of the so-called Thirteen Colonies which were to become a new nation, one of the most powerful and most wealthy of all countries of the world. They came in great numbers from Pennsylvania and Virginia and a part of North Carolina. They were seeking new and fresh lands, and here in South Carolina these lands were offered them at very reasonable prices. In the light of modern prices, the lands here were to be obtained almost for the asking.

In the northwestern area of South Carolina a great body of fresh land was available as a result of treaties with the Cherokees which practically eliminated the Indians as residents. All of what is now Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties were included in the new area thus opened. This was now "state land" and prospective settlers were not slow in acquiring ownership.

South Carolina not only sought to induce new settlers to come in and help develop the State but after the Revolution offered soldiers special inducements in the form of "bounty land" as some sort of financial reward for their military services.

The former soldier was allowed not only the regulation attractions in order to get the land he wanted for his future home, but to reduce the cost of the land he was also allowed a bounty provision on his services in the Revolution. The "bounty" depended in monetary value on the length of his military service and the rank of the applicant.

Patriot soldiers from a number of the other colonies had spent some of the period of their Revolutionary service in South Carolina, for important military actions had taken place here. Some of the former soldiers who had become acquainted with South Carolina in that way now came back to make their permanent home in this State.

Previous to the post-Revolutionary development which brought a rush of new settlers into the northwest corner of the State, two major real estate developments in this area had been sponsored by the State with two groups of immigrants.

The first of these was the settlement of "poor French Protestants"— Huguenots—who were sent up from Charleston in 1764 to a location centering in what came to be their town of New Bordeaux.

The other was a settlement in 1765 of "poor German Protestants" in Londonborough township on Hard Labor creek. A group of Protestants from the German Palatinate had arrived in Charleston in 1764 after many disasters—leaving their native land to seek homes and freedom in the New World, they had been robbed of their financial resources by an adventurer who falsely promised to lead them, had been stranded for a while in London, and when they finally made the voyage to America they were sadly reduced in numbers by sickness fatal to many of the band both on board the ship and after landing. It took courage, faith and hard work for them to get established in their new home.

These Palatine Germans had sold their all and started to Carolina originally under the direction of one Colonel John Henry Christian Stumpell. This man turned out to have been a rascal. He brought the band of Germans to London and there deserted them with all the cash they had turned over to him. The Germans were foolish in that they turned over their money to a man about whom they knew little. He promised much but gave nothing.

After a time in London, the poor German Protestants found friends in the English government and among London merchants through whose aid ship passage was made available, and they reached Charleston in 1764. There were about five hundred Germans—men, women and children—who made the voyage in two ships. Forty-five died from sickness on the sea voyage and after arrival in Charleston and in the new settlement. This was almost ten per cent of the total who sailed from London. South Carolina's Acting Governor William Bull sent them early in 1765 to the lands set aside for their settlement in the Up Country in an area that was called Londonborough in honor of the Londoners who had helped them.

The Germans apparently divided themselves into two bodies. One selected lands in and around the McKendree Methodist Church community in what later became Edgefield county; and the other selected a ridge east and southeast of Hard Labor creek. Mounds of earth may still be seen in the woods along the road to Powder Spring in the present Greenwood county, indicating the site of their early huts. They built a log church in the highway fork just about at the location of Winterseat. This was the Lutheran church of St. George.

Among the leaders of the German settlements were Peter Dorst (now "Durst") and Henry Adolph. When the provisions and the money of the new settlers had given out, these two were sent down to Charleston to petition the authorities for help. A visitor in 1767 in the settlement on Cuffeetown creek described the poor physical condition of the settlers whom he saw, and their appearance and symptoms indicate the group had become victims of malaria.

But despite such handicaps the flow of newcomers continued and the hardy pioneers began to make headway. Game was plentiful; some crops were planted with profit; fruit trees and vegetable gardens, sometimes planted with seed brought from the old country, were in evidence.

Into this large area of fresh land, good soil for the most part, a delightful climate and many other attractions, soon came thousands of young and ambitious men, eager to accumulate property and to make a home for themselves and families.

One of these was David Rush, who according to family tradition, as set forth in this book, came from Pennsylvania to the new settlements of western South Carolina. With him, the tradition also has it, was a brother Daniel Rush who however did not remain. Both young men, it is further said, had been of the troops under General Nathanael Greene at the siege of Ninety Six and were so pleased with the country that when the war was over and they were honorably discharged they came back to western South Carolina and received grants of land in the country they had remembered and desired for their homes.

David Rush appears to have been either of the Quaker persuasion or of a family of that great group of peace-lovers who came with William Penn to form the present great State of Pennsylvania.

The marriage of David Rush to Margheretta Rosena Adolph of the Palatinate Germans of Hard Labor and Cuffeetown creeks was for their great number of descendants a most fortunate union.

It appears most likely, as shown in the text of this family history, that Margheretta Rosena Adolph, daughter of Hendrick (Henry) and Maria Dorst-Adolph, was born in the family home in the new country. She and David Rush would appear also to have moved from one home to another as their family grew and their possessions multiplied.

To the Germans in their new homes it had all been new and strange and they had had to learn many things. In the old country they and their neighbors had lived in small villages in the Rhine valley and other valleys and would go out from their home in those villages to work their little farms as their ancestors for generations before had done. Here in the new country one man would have a piece of land as his very own with an acreage larger than a whole village and its farms in Germany.

The Germans were unfortunate in the matter of sickness and this made some of the settlers dissatisfied so that eventually they removed from the upper settlements on Hard Labor creek to sections lower down where many of their countrymen had been located for several years. Such colonies as those in Orangeburg, Lexington and a part of Newberry were almost entirely populated with Germans. The dissatisfied ones from the upper area were soon happy in the communities of their countrymen in the latter areas.

But many remained in the original areas here where land had been granted. In and around Troy, eastward in the Callison section of Greenwood county and especially in the Kirksey and McKendree Methodist Church sections there were for years families descended from the German Protestants who came into this section from Charleston and settled under the direction and oversight of the royal colony of South Carolina. Some names disappeared by intermarriage (as Adolph), but among prominent families of the original German group were Durst (Dorst), Timmerman, Ouzts (Utz), Zimmerman, Dorn, Strom, Clegg, Corley and others.

The hundreds and hundreds of descendants here, both direct and indirect by marriage with other nationalities, left a profound impress in the years that followed. They were people of sound character and sturdy bodies, honest and sound in views on public matters.

Descendants of these pioneers and patriots do well to honor their memories and to preserve the family history and traditions for the delight and benefit of those to come who should ever be proud of their forebears.

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HISTORY OF RUSH REUNION AND DAVID RUSH MEMORIAL

1946 RUSH REUNION

Several years planning for a Rush reunion became a reality the second Sunday in August, 1946. Many of the descendants were interested but World War II was in progress and it was advisable and appropriate to wait until the war was over before calling a meeting for organization, so the summer of 1946 seemed to be the opportune time to announce that there would be a reunion of the descendants of David Rush and his wife Margharetta Rosena Adolph Rush at Bold Spring Baptist Church, Aug. 11, 1946.

About three hundred enthusiastic descendants attended the meeting. The organization was perfected and by-laws adopted with working plans for projects to be undertaken.

By-laws and minutes of meeting will explain the aims of the Rush Reunion.

ROBERT MARION RUSH

Robert Marion Rush, the first President of Rush Reunion, was born December 6, 1901—the eldest son of Francis Pickens Rush and Mary Allie Pruitt Rush. He married Mary Tolbert, December 25, 1930. They have three sons: Wayne Rush, Patrick Rush and David Rush.

He had always been interested in his family tree and it was fitting that he should be the first leader of the Rush organization. He served six years in that capacity and did outstanding work—contributed generously of his means and inspired others to lend a helping hand.



RUSH REUNION

The first Rush Reunion was held at Bold Spring Baptist Church August 11, 1946, with a very fine attendance.

The meeting was called to order at 11 o'clock with G. D. Bell in the chair opening with hymn—"Faith of Our Fathers." Scripture reading from Ecclesiastes 12 and prayer was given by Mr. Bell, hymn—"Sweet Hour of Prayer" was sung by congregation with Miss Doris Rush at the piano.

G. P. Callison, a resident of the community, made a beautful welcome address to the descendants of David Rush in their first annual gathering.

Mrs. A. F. Broadwater read sketch she had prepared of David Rush and his wife Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush who lived in Edgefield County, Ninety Six district during the period of 1765 to 1840.

She also stated that the object of the meeting was to organize and work together in securing complete family records of births, deaths, and marriages of the descendants of David Rush and Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush and to erect a marker or monument to their memory at Bold Spring Baptist Church and also place a small marker to their unmarked graves at the Wren Place, now belonging to the Tom Bell family, and to raise funds for that purpose.

By-laws were presented and passed. Money was raised by voluntary contribution, amounting to \$145.00 to begin the work.

The following officers were elected: R. M. Rush, President; Kirk Rush, Vice-President; Mrs. Ralph Scurry, Secretary; Chris Dalton, Treasurer.

R. M. Rush, the president, took the chair and made the following appointments: Assistants to Secretary—Mrs. Robert S. Cothran and Miss Ida Jane Henderson. Records—Mrs. A. F. Broadwater, Mrs. Jasper Rush, Mrs. Carol Clegg, Mrs. Livy Ellison. Memorial—Mrs. Aurelia Flinn Jordan, Mrs. Nora R. Autry, Miss Mary Frances Rush. Music—Miss Doris Rush, Mrs. Marion Kemp, Miss Eunice Rush. Entertainment—John Flinn, Beauregarde Bell, O. T. Rush, Mrs. Sarah B. Rodgers, Miss Thelma Agnew. Finance—Mrs. A. B. Langley, Columbia; J. Floyd Rush, Columbia; C. C. Rush, Greenwood; Mrs. Janie Rush Aiton, Greenville; J. C. Dalton, Greenwood.

A short memorial service was held after singing "My Country Tis of Thee"—veterans of World War I, and World War II were recognized. Our dead soldiers included: Lietu. Col. Clarence King Hollingsworth, William Alge Dalton, James Bell Dorn, Albert Kemp, Bill Rush and Marion Goff.

The following members of descendants' families had passed during the last two years: Mrs. Anne Rush Henderson, Mrs. Mary Frances Rush Dalton, Mrs. Anna Dalton Rush, Mrs. Corrie Banister Rush, James Carson Rush, Mrs. Fannie Quattlebaum Rush, James Calvin Rush, Dock Bell, Milwee Bell, W. R. Cullen, Carl Rush, Mrs. Maggie Cook Clegg, Osborne Agnew, Walter Rush.

R. M. Rush played a guitar number softly and sounded taps. Mrs. Marion Kemp sang "Just for Today" accompanied by Miss Mazie Kinard. "Blest be the Tie" was sung and closing prayer by R. M. Rush. A sumptuous picnic dinner was served on the grounds under the shade of the trees.

Next meeting will be held on the second Sunday in July, 1947, at Bold Spring Baptist Church.

BY-LAWS OF RUSH REUNION

1. NAME

This organization shall be known and designated as the Rush Reunion.

2. Membership

The membership of this organization shall be limited to and composed of any and all descendants, and their consorts, of David Rush and Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush who resided in Ninety Six district, Edgefield County, State of South Carolina, during the period 1765 to 1840.

3. OBJECT

The object of this organization is to engage in genealogical research of the David Rush family record, securing all possible dates of births, marriages and deaths of the individuals of the different branches of the family, to raise funds to defray the expenses incident to such research and the publication of the record thereof in book form; to erect a monument at Bold Spring Baptist Church in memory of David Rush and Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush and their eleven children, and to provide a small marker for the unmarked grave in Wren's Cemetery of the said David Rush and Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush.

4. Officers

The officers of this organization shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall, in addition to performing the ordinary and usual duties of their respective offices, constitute the membership of an Executive Committee empowered to pass on all emergency matters affecting this organization that must be determined before the next regular meeting. Such officers to be elected by a majority of the members present at each annual meeting.

5. Meetings

The meetings of the organization shall be held annually on the 2nd Sunday in July at Bold Spring Baptist Church.

6. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

These By-laws may be changed or amended by the proposed change or amendment being submitted at a regular stated meeting and adopted by a favorable majority vote of the members present at the regular meeting next following.

300 ATTEND RUSH REUNION HELD SUNDAY (Reprinted from Greenwood Index-Journal of August, 1946)

Approximately 300 persons attended the Rush family reunion held at Bold Spring Baptist church on Sunday, August 11. Some of the older members of the Rush family were charter members of Bold Spring church, many of their descendants have worshipped there and some of the descendants are still members there.

With G. D. Bell presiding until officers were elected, the family group was organized at the meeting Sunday and plans were made to hold annual reunions hereafter following this first gathering.

Officers elected to serve for the coming year were: R. M. Rush, Troy, president; Kirk Rush, Greenwood, vice-president; Mrs. Ralph Scurry, Greenwood, secretary; and J. Chris Dalton, Greenwood, treasurer.

The reunion meeting was opened with the singing of the hymn, "Faith of Our Fathers," and a devotional was conducted by Mr. Bell.

G. P. Callison, lifelong resident of the community, welcomed the many descendants of David Rush, declaring that members of the family have resided in that locality for nearly 200 years.

MRS. BROADWATER READS SKETCH

Mrs. A. F. Broadwater read a sketch which she had prepared on David Rush and his wife Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush, who resided there in the period between 1765 and 1840.

Mrs. Broadwater also explained that the object of the organization was to secure records of births, deaths and marriages in the various branches of the family, to have such records published in book form and to erect a marker at Bold Spring church to the memory of David Rush and Margaret Rosena Audolph Rush.

The following committees were appointed:

NUMBER OF RECORDS HANDED IN

Funds were raised by voluntary contributions to begin the work of securing records and many records were handed in to the chairman that day.

The singing of "America" opened a short memorial service for war heroes of the family and other recently departed descendants. In conclusion, R. M. Rush played "Taps" on the guitar, and Mrs. Marion Kemp, accompanied by Miss Mazie Kinard, sang "Just for Today."

After singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" the meeting adjourned to convene again on the second Sunday in July, 1947.

Following the program a delightful picnic dinner was served on the grounds under the shade trees.

1947 RUSH REUNION

The second annual Rush Reunion was held Sunday, July 13th, 1947, at Bold Spring Baptist Church.

The meeting was called to order at 11 o'clock by the president, R. M. Rush. Hymns: "Stand Up for Jesus," and "Blessed Assurance" were sung.

Mrs. Aurelia Flinn Jordan gave the devotional. She read the story of Zachariah and Elizabeth, parents of John the Baptist-stressing the importance of home and home life, which was beautifully given.

Hon. W. J. Bryan Dorn was scheduled for an address but was detained in Washington on account of illness, but Howard Burns of Greenwood very graciously came to the rescue—he made appropriate remarks for the occasion and recalled that he had known many of these descendants all his life and he commended the Rush Reunion organized to honor their pioneer ancestor David Rush.

"My Country Tis of Thee" was sung. Minutes of last meeting were read by Mrs. Arthur Rush, in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Ralph Scurry, and approved. Reports were heard from officers and committees. Treasurer J. C. Dalton made report showing that \$13.00 had been expended leaving a balance of \$132.50 in the treasury. Report of Records Committee was made by Mrs. A. F. Broadwater, chairman. She told of her work compiling family records of dates of birth, marriage, and deaths of all descendants of David Rush that have been handed in and urged that every family send her a copy of their record who had not done so; she also told her plans of having a genealogist assist her in tracing records here and in Pennsylvania, and hoped to be able to give an interesting report next year.

The next reunion meeting will be held the second Sunday in July, 1948.


MEMORIAL TO RUSH FAMILY IS UNVEILED

Callison, July 11—A beautiful granite marker was unveiled here this afternoon following the annual Rush Reunion, which attracted about 500 persons to Bold Spring Baptist Church despite rainy weather.

The memorial was dedicated to the memory of David Rush, Sr., and wife, Margaret Rosena Adolph Rush, pioneers of this Greenwood County section who came to America from England in 1690.

Some of the direct descendants of the Rush family were present today for the services, a picnic and the dedication.



The eight-foot marker was erected by George T. Oglesby of Elberton, Ga., who was present for the ceremony.

Miss Alice Rush, 82, oldest person attending, pulled the cord to unveil the stone. A wreath of flowers, placed at the site, was flown from Hawaii at a cost of more than \$60. Sending the flowers was R. M. Rush, president of the Reunion Committee, who is in the Pacific. The welcome address was by G. P. Callison, unopposed candidate for the State Senate from Greenwood County.

Congressman W. J. Byran Dorn, a native of this section six miles below Greenwood, delivered the principal address.

"Let us be proud that we are Americans, that we are South Carolinians," he said. "Let us give thanks for our little churches and communities, as this one where our forefathers set the pattern for us to follow."

Miss Opal Rush of Greenwood sang several selections. She was accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Chris Dalton of Greenwood.

It was announced that Mrs. A. F. Broadwater, acting as historian for the family, is compiling a complete history which will be published in book form soon.

G. D. Bell of Callison presided over the program. Among those who gave of their time in arranging the annual event was Postmaster Grover Henderson of Greenwood.

Adjournment to churchyard at 3:30 p. m., where the 8-foot granite marker honoring our pioneer ancestors, David Rush and his wife, Margharetta Adolph Rush, was unveiled by Miss Alice Rush, assisted by Iris Wanda Miller, Eugenia Rush, Wayne Rush and Jerry Deal, and presented by Chairman of Selecting Memorial Marker Committee Mrs. A. B. (Inez Deal) Langley to the Reunion and was accepted by G. D. Bell, whose inspiring talk at this time with regard to the family's interest in their beloved ancestors was one of the high lights of the program.

MEMORIAL MARKER

The marker erected on Bold Spring Church yard to the memory of David Rush and his wife Margharetta Rosena Adolph Rush and their children was unveiled at the third annual Rush Reunion, second Sunday in July, 1948, with appropriate exercises. Over three hundred attended.

The eight-foot granite marker was erected by the George T. Oglesby Granite Co., Elberton, Ga. Mr. Oglesby was present for the ceremony.

Miss Alice Rush, 82, eldest lady present, pulled the cord to unveil the stone assisted by Miss Iris Wanda Miller, Miss Eugenia Rush, Wayne Rush and Jerry Deal.

The marker was presented to the Reunion by Mrs. Inez Deal Langley, Chairman of Memorial Marker committee, and accepted by G. D. Bell for the Reunion. His inspiring address of acceptance was one of the high lights of the program. Many went away with an aroused feeling of interest pertaining to the part that David Rush and his descendants have played in the settling of a community. He urged that we, as worthy descendants, pledge ourselves anew to continue the work they so nobly began of helping to make a great country.

The front of the marker bears the following inscription

Rush Coat-of-Arms. Motto-Omnia Deo Pendant THIS MONUMENT HAS BEEN ERECTED BY THEIR DESCENDANTS TO THE HONORED MEMORY OF DAVID RUSH SR. and his wife MARGARETTA ROSENA ADOLPH HIS FOREBEARS WERE PIONEERS FROM ENGLAND IN 1690 TO PENNSYLVANIA WHERE HE WAS BORN CIRCA 1760 AND FROM WHERE HE ENLISTED AS A SOLDIER IN THE WAR OF INDEPENDENCE. IN 1785 HE CAME TO EDGEFIELD COUNTY, S. C. AND SETTLED AT A PLANTATION, NEAR THIS SPOT, WHERE HE DIED IN NOVEMBER 1839. SHE WAS BORN IN BAVARIA IN 1764, THE DAUGHTER OF MARIA DORST AND HENRY ADOLPH. SHE CAME AS A BABE IN ARMS, WITH HER PIONEER PARENTS FROM THE PALATINATE IN 1764 TO EDGEFIELD COUNTY, S. C. WHERE SHE MARRIED DAVID RUSH SR. IN 1786 AND WHERE SHE DIED CIRCA 1829.

The Memorial marker was erected in 1948 at a cost of \$1,350.00. The following year a curbing to match the granite was placed around the marker at a cost of \$275.00 which was promptly paid by contributions from the descendants.

The needed contributions were given but the donors did not get credit for it. RUSH IN SOUTH CAROLINA

Rush families in S. C. during the Revolution: Benjamin Rush settled on Padgett's Creek in Union county among the Quakers there. He probably married in Pennsylvania before coming to S. C. It was family tradition that David Rush had a brother, Benjamin, and they were of the same family of Dr. Benjamin Rush, signer of the Declaration of Independence and noted physician.

Rush Land Grants Before the Revolution

Abraham Rush, 100 acres in Craven County, June 23, 1774. Frederick Rush in Craven County on Great Lynches Creek, Oct. 12, 1770. Herman Rush, 150 acres in Amelia of Orangeburg, Dec. 20, 1762. Herman Rush, 200 acres in Amelia in Berkeley County, Dec. 19, 1772. He was the first of the name to appear, had a wife and one child in 1762, had four more children in 1772.

Rush Land Grants After the Revolution

Abraham Rush, 137 acres, Orangeburg District, Aug. 3, 1789. Abraham Rush, 18 acres in Orangeburg on Riddlepre Branch, May 6, 1816. Absalom Rush, 177 acres on Padgett Creek in Union County, Dec. 2, 1811. David Rush, 359 acres on Curltail Creek in Abbeville County, Dec. 1, 1800. David Rush, 197 acres on Cain Creek in Pendleton District, June 4, 1804. David Rush, 28 acres on Cuffeetown Creek in Edgefield County, Aug. 5, 1808. Herman Rush, 264 acres on Santee River in Orangeburg District, Sept. 7, 1801. Matthias Rush, 840 acres, Orängeburg District, May 4, 1801. He went later to Greenville County, S. C. Matthias Rush with Alexander Mc-Grew, 784 acres in Orangeburg County, June 7, 1802. Peter Rush, 200 acres, Kershaw County, Beaverdam Creek, Feb. 7, 1803.

Revolutionary War Data

Benjamin Rush—On the trip by Col. Anderson and return to Charleston in Brandon's Regiment.

John Rush-Indent only and states John Rush was discharged Apr. 1, 1783.

Adam Rush—For services for 117 days as a foot soldier, Jan. 9, to July 8, 1774 under Capt. John Adam Summer. Major Thomas Gordon certified this record. Peter and Frederick Rush were loyal to the Crown.

John Rush, Jr. (Son of Jacob Rush, Sr. and called Jack). Will signed Dec. 18, 1854 in Abbeville county. Wife, Mary Rush to have all the Estate. Ex. Charles William Sproull. Wit. John Cothran, Hugh Moseley and Henry Rush. Dr. Joseph Rush, Colleton county. Will signed Jan. 25, 1783. Probated in Charleston Feb. 20, 1818. Wife, Catharine Rush, and she Ex. No children. Wit. Ann Stanyarne, George W. Frederick and Frederick Parker.

Mrs. Catharine Rush, widow of Dr. Joseph Rush a will, signed Oct. 29, 1825. Probated Dec. 19, 1825. She died the 17, of Dec. Left estate to relatives and friends. Her house and lot in the city of Charleston, to her brother, Benjamin Matthews and his wife Maria. Provided for the Matthews family graveyard on Johns Island and to brick in and wall the vault where she would be buried by her husband. She left legacies to the following: Benj. Deeds of Rush in South Carolina

David Rush with dower by his wife Margharetta R. Rush, a deed signed Aug. 5, 1805 to James Harrison for my original grant. Wit. John Smith and Edward Harrison before John Lyon J. P. There are many other deeds made by David Rush, Sr. and Dower by his wife Margharetta R. Rush.

The last deed made by David Rush, Sr. was dated July 7, 1837, no dower for wife was dead. It was a deed of his home place of 539 acres to two of his sons, David Rush, Jr. and John Rush. Wit. Wade Cothran, Hugh Moseley before Peter Quattlebaum J. P.

David Rush died Sept. 26, 1839 and his personal property was administered by David Rush, Jr. Citation to administer was read at Bethel Meeting House Dec. 1, 1839 by David Walker. Application to administer was made Nov. 26, 1839. Bond for David Rush, Jr. was signed by Jacob Rush, Sr. and Wade Cothran, Feb. 2, 1840. The following were appointed to appraise: William Johnson, Hugh Moseley, John Briskey, David and Peter Quattlebaum. Wit. Robert Carlisle. There was a sale of the effects in the spring of 1840. There seems to have been a division at some time but no papers to show for this first division nor for any heirs. July 5, 1852 there was a final settlement. David Rush, Jr. declined to take a share, probably because he had already been given the land, sharing equally with his brother John, by deed from David Rush, Sr.

There were other heirs but they did not sign the spaces. Margaret Steifle drew \$11.50, by that, we know she had brothers or sisters and that her mother was dead. This record will help those who like to trace their descendants.



RUSH IN PENNSYLVANIA

(Reprinted from The Pennsylvania Magazine, No. 3, Vol. XVII, Oct., 1893)

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN RUSH

[The following genealogy is taken from a chart presented to the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, in 1880, by Robert Bethell Browne, of Jeansville, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, it being a copy of a record compiled by General James Irvine in the year 1800, and placed by him in the family Bible of his cousin, Frances Bethell, mother of R. B. Browne. A few additional notes are now added.—ED.]

1. JOHN RUSH commanded a troop of horse in Cromwell's army. At the close of the war he married Susanna Lucas, at Hortun, in Oxfordshire, June 8, 1648. He embraced the principles of the Quakers in 1660, and came to Pennsylvania in 1683, with seven children and several grandchildren, and settled at Byberry, thirteen miles from Philadelphia. In 1691 he and his whole family became Keithians, and in 1697 most of them became Baptists. He died at Byberry in May, 1699. His sword is in the possession of Jacob Rush, and his watch now belongs to General William Darke, of Virginia. He had issue (as appears by a record in his own handwriting now in possession of Dr. Benjamin Rush), viz.:

2. ELIZABETH RUSH, eldest daughter of John and Susanna Rush, married Richard Collet, May 27, 1680, as appears by a certificate of a Quaker Meeting in London, now in the possession of Mary Peart. They came to Pennsylvania in the same ship with William Penn in the year 1682, and settled in Byberry upon five hundred acres of land, two hundred of which are now owned by Captain Decator and one hundred by two of his great-grandchildren, Elizabeth Messer and Mary Peart. They lost their first child, aged two years, by the fall of a tree. They had afterwards the following issue:

DR. BENJAMIN RUSH

Dr. Benjamin Rush, signer of the Declaration of Independence, was the 18th century's most distinguished American physician. He lived in Philadelphia and practiced his profession there and was very active during the Yellow Fever epidemics which visited that city several times.

He used a different treatment, which consisted of copious bleedings and purgings, sometimes several times a day, which he believed saved the lives of many. By the practice of this method he made many enemies, especially among the doctors of the city. They did not accept his method, but lost most of their patients.

During the severe epidemic of 1793, he contracted the disease and cured himself by his own method of treatment, having a light case. He was going continually among the sick and dying and with the assistance of his sister, Rebecca Rush Wallace, worked together untiringly, until she contracted the disease and died. Her death was a source of great grief to him. He erected a monument to her grave in a Presbyterian Church yard, where she was buried by her two children. She had been married twice but was a widow at her death.

Benjamin Rush had a commission in the Army of the Revolution and did much in cleaning up and establishing hospitals for the sick and wounded soldiers.

Dr. Rush was also a politician, having Republican ideas and hating monarchies. He became a member of Congress, did not serve long but long enough to sign the Declaration of Independence. He had many interests in life, was founder of Dickinson college, also the African Church of Philadelphia, taught chemistry, hated slavery, spoke his mind freely on all interested subjects, was a great letter writter.

He married Julia Stockton who was fourteen years his junior but it was a very happy union; he adored her and never found a fault. They had a lovely home life. Ten children were born to them but some died young.

He was the son of John Rush and was born Jan. 4, 1746, in Byberry township, died April, 1813.

ADOLPH

The German Colony of Palatines that settled on Hard Labor Creek were from the Rheinphalz Province in Germany on the Rhine. This province was in Bavaria and Bavaria was one of the Roman Catholic states, but this group of immigrants to England were Lutheran, called in some of the records, "The Poor German Protestants."

They had heard of America and its opportunities and two shiploads were persuaded by Col. Henry Stumpell to leave their homes and start for America. He carried them by way of England and after getting his hands on all the money they had he disappeared and left them stranded there in a strange land, without homes, money or food. Left without funds, their plight grew from bad to worse and they had to receive help from the merchants of England and in their desperate condition they finally got a hearing at Court and plans were made for their sailing. South Carolina was selected as the location for their settlement, King George giving grants of land to all who would go.

In April, 1764, two ships, the Dragon and the Union, landed in the harbor at Charleston, S. C., where they debarked and were sent to form a colony on Hard Labor Creek in the upper part of South Carolina.

Among those coming to the settlement were Henry Adolph and his family, also his brother-in-law, Peter Dorst and wife, Anna Maria Dorst. Henry Adolph brought his wife, Maria Adolph and children: Catharine Adolph, age 5, Elizabeth Adolph, age 3, and a baby supposed to be Margharetta Rosena Adolph. His land grants show that there were three children. He received his land grant of 300 acres of land in Londonborough Township, Jan. 31, 1765. He was 38 years old and she 26 when they arrived, making his birth year 1726 and hers 1738. The return of his land for taxation was made in Charleston in 1765 by Peter Dorst.

Henry Adolph and Peter Dorst seemed to be the leaders or the most outstanding members of the colony as they are mentioned several times in records as taking the lead in matters pertaining to the settlers. They landed in April and were late in getting their crops started as they had to clear the land, erect their huts, do the planting and within the year they were without money and they did not make enough from their crops to support them. In desperation, they sent two of their leaders, Henry Adolph and Peter Dorst, to Charleston to ask for help Oct. 11, 1765, but Lieut. Governor Bull denied their request and told them that they had already been helped more than any other adventurers in their situation and it was their own fault in not going to their lands promptly and planting their crops early. So no aid was forthcoming; however the General Assembly gave them thirty pounds to defray the expenses of their journey.

Peter Dorst received a grant of 150 acres of land; he was 39 years old and his wife, Anna Maria, was twenty-nine when they arrived. They later spelled their name Durst, and they are the ancestors of the Durst families in Greenwood and Edgefield Counties. Peter Dorst was probably a brother of Maria Adolph as records definitely state that he was a brother-in-law to Henry Adolph.

Records indicate that Henry Adolph could have been twice married and Maria was his second wife. He brought her and three small children over in 1764 and in 1774 we find Henry Adolph, Jr., listed as a newly arrived immigrant and receiving a grant of land. He could have been a son of Henry by a former wife and remained in Germany with his grandparents until they could come. Several of that name arrived when he did. No doubt they were related to the Adolphs already here.

Information on Adolph is scant, they having moved away, but we know that Margharetta Rosena Adolph was the daughter of Henrick Adolph, Sr., and that she married David Rush, who came in to S. C. from Pennsylvania and located on Cuffectown Creek in the Mount Vernon section of Edgefield County, *circa* 1786, and that she died Dec. 29, 1826 at the age of 62. (Bible record in hands of Mrs. Janie Rush Aiton, Greenville, S. C.)

Many of the descendants of David and Margaret Rush are still living in this same section, formerly Edgefield County, now Greenwood County, most of them "Sons of the soil." They inherited a love of farming, machinery and outdoor life, although many have gone to the cities and engaged in other vocations.

Henry Adolph, Jr., moved to Jones County, Ga. and came back to sell his land in 1814. He was the only male descendant; by moving away the name has completely disappeared from this section.

Land Grants to Adolph in South Carolina

Henrick Adolph, a land plat surveyed on order from the Council dated 24 Dec. 1764 in Charleston and surveyed for 300 acres by John Fairchild for the 300 acres of land on Cuffeytown Creek near Londonborough Township and surveyed the 26 of January, 1765 by the lands of George Schilthnecht (now it is spelled Shelnut) and other sides of land not laid out.

Henrick Adolph, a plat for 84 acres of land on Big Horse Creek and a Bounty for newly arrived immigrants by order in council dated 23 Aug. 1774 and surveyed by John Murphy 7 Nov. 1774 and all sides vacant land.

Elizabeth Adolph, by order of Council dated 7 July 1772 and a Bounty for newly arrived immigrants and surveyed 2 Oct. 1772 by Pat. Cunningham and 100 acres on Cuffeytown Creek.

Catherine Adolph, 2 plats and a Bounty for newly arrived immigrants by order of council dated 7 July 1772 and surveyed 5 Nov. 1772 by Pat. Cunningham. First plat for 77 acres on S.W. side of Reedy River and by the lands of Jacob Wright and other sides not known. Second plat for 18 acres in Craven County on Reedy River and by lands of Jacob Bowman, John Williard and on banks of Reedy River.

Council Journal 7 July 1772 lists numbers of newly arrived immigrants to join relatives, some were to join the French at new Bordeaux, some Irish and Scotch in Long Canes and in Londonborough; some were from other American Provinces, among them were Mary Adolph, Catherine Adolph, Henrick Adolph, Jr., and Elizabeth Adolph. Who were the newly arrived Adolphs? Evidently they were relatives of Henrick Adolph who came in 1764. Mary and Henrick, Jr., could have been children of Henrick, Sr., by a former wife in Germany and Caterine could have been their grandmother, mother of Henrick Sr. Elizabeth could have been a sister of Henrick Sr. This is only conjecture. We do not know.

The census of 1790 does not show the Adolph name in South Carolina. Henrick Sr. might have been dead at that time. There is no Adolph name in Revolutionary files, and no wills recorded in Edgefield and Abbeville Counties. There are deeds in Edgefield County: Samuel Carter with dower by his wife, Phoebe Carter, dated October 23, 1807; a deed to Henry Adolph for 100 acres surveyed and according to the plat made Sept. 4, 1807 by James Carson for me in a division of this land. Wit. Allen Burton and Washington Burton before John Lyon J. P.

Henry Adolph with dower by his wife, Lucy Adolph of the state of Georgia, a deed to Josiah Langley for 100 acres of land, bounded by lands of Nathaniel Rhodes and Samuel Carter, it being a part of the old Samuel Carter land grant which was deeded to me, deed signed 24 July 1816. Wit./Edward Suttle and Henry Evans before John Lyon J. P. Jones County, Georgia.

Goodson Glanton with dower by wife, Margaret Glanton 3 Oct. 1807, a deed for 100 acres of land on Cuffeytown Creek and it being the original 100 acres of land granted to Elizabeth Adolph before the Revolution, deed to Henry Adolph Wit./Ambrose Price and Stephen Thomas before John Lyon J. P.

Henry Adolph of Jones County, Ga. with dower by his wife, Lucy Adolph to David Rush, the 100 acres of land which was the original grant to Elizabeth Adolph and conveyed to me by G. Glanton and said land situate on Cuffeytown Creek, dated 30 Dec. 1814. Wit./ Josiah Langley and John Shibley before John Lyon J. P. This Henry Adolph is not the first Henry Adolph that arrived but Henry Jr. who came in 1774. They were spelling the name, Audolph, at this time and Henry, instead of Hendrick.

Elizabeth Adolph was the wife of William Rhodes (Roth) in 1806. They gave a joint deed 2 May 1806 to Goodson Glanton, it being the original grant made 23 Jan. 1773 to Elizabeth Adolph who later intermarried with the said William Rhodes. Wit./James Harrison and John Down before John Longmire J. P.

Issue of Elizabeth Adolph and William Rhodes

Elizabeth Adolph married William Rhodes (Wilhelm Roth, a German from Orangeburg Co. S. C.) Feb. 25, 1795. She died Apr. 19, 1837. He died Nov. 28, 1834. They had the following children:

William Roth, a German from Orangeburg District, took a land grant of 100 acres on Hard Labor Creek . . . Here we find him changing his name to the English form of Rhodes. He married Elizabeth Adolph.

Evidently a daughter of William Rhodes was dead, who had married a Doby and Washington Doby was her son. He was not of age and was to live in the house with the wife, Elizabeth Adolph Rhodes, and receive a child's share, but if he did not stay he would not receive the share.

What became of Mary Adolph is not definitely known. She probably married John Clark, and James Maynard second. This has not been proven.

ETHERIDGE

The Etheridge families of Edgefield County came from Currituck County, N. C. and Virginia, on the North Carolina and Virginia line. Among those coming to this section of the county were: Sampson Etheridge and his wife, Frances Etheridge. They came about 1791 and settled in the upper part of the county, near the Abbeville County line, now known as the Phoenix section of Greenwood County. Their lands were near the waters of Reedy Creek and Cuffee Town Creek.

They had six or more children. Names of the known children are:

David Rush Etheridge married Laura Burnett (their records elsewhere in book).

Martha Etheridge married James Rampey-record elsewhere in book.

They were reared in the home of their grandparents, David and M. Rush.

I. Robert Etheridge remarried a second time to Margaret Mantz and they had eight children: C. Eliza, D. Betty, E. James, F. Manly (sometimes called Mantz in records), G. William, H. Sarah, I. Sampson, J. Robert Etheridge, Jr.

Robert Etheridge died and his widow remarried to Jesse Thornton.

The estate of Robert Etheridge was administered on Nov. 9, 1829, by his brother Wade Etheridge and bond signed by Joel Etheridge, another brother. Wade E. was made Guardian of the children but by 1831 she had remarried and was asking for her second husband to be made Guardian. They had removed to Gwinnett Co., Georgia, before estate was settled. There were eight Thornton children (will be mentioned later).

C. Eliza, daughter of Robert and Margaret M. Etheridge, married —— Bradford and removed to Texas. No further record.

D. Betty Etheridge, never married.

E. James Etheridge removed to Arkansas, never married, killed in the Battle of Gettysburg.

F. Manly Etheridge married Jane Rakestraw. Children: (a) James G., (b) George Washington, (c) William M., (d) Henry Thomas, (e) Robert Alexander, (f) Sampson Gaines.

(a) James G. Etheridge married Lucy Harrison. One daughter, Maud, died young.

(b) George W. Etheridge married Mollie Hardeman. Two children died in infancy.

(c) William M. Etheridge married Susie Thornton. One child, Beulah, died young.

(d) Henry Thomas Etheridge married Gussie Hollis. Two children, one died young.

(e) Robert A. Etheridge married Harriett V. Kircus. They had eight children: 1. Myrtle, 2. William Manly, 3. B. Roy, 4. Pierce, 5. Thomas Gaines, 6. Robert Loy, 7. Hattie Lou, died young, 8. Leon Gay Etheridge.

(f) Sampson Gaines Etheridge married Alice V. Hitch. Three children: Gaines, Frank and Eleanor Etheridge.

G. William Etheridge married Caroline Willard first, one daughter, Octavia Etheridge. He remarried to Polly Hutchins, no children. Octavia married John Maughon.

H. Sarah Etheridge married Edd Thornton. Six children, three died in infancy, Joe, Warren Thomas (died in young manhood), Susie. Joe married three times and has a large family.

I. Sampson Etheridge married Nancy Bird Betts. Eleven children: Two died in infancy, Sampson Jr. died in youth, Scott, Mollie, Lou, Carrie, Lola, Ira W., Maggie and Viola.

(a) Scott Etheridge married Emma Shields. Five children: Fay, Robert Sampson (died), Nannie, Lola, Elizabeth.

(b) Mollie Etheridge married Luther F. Jackson. Fourteen children: Maud, Sampson. Two died in infancy. Paul, Fulton, "R", Lucas, Aubry, Ina, Mae, Pirkle, Dree, Leo.

(c) Lou married Judson Jackson. Five children: Bertie, Charlie, Otis, Pearl, Jewel.

SHEPHERD ETHERIDGE

(Bible Record)

V. Shepherd Etheridge was born Oct. 20, 1790, died in 1863. He was married three times. His first wife was Ginny Hamilton. They lived in the Rehoboth section of Edgefield County, S. C., and removed to Gwinnett County, Ga. They had four children: A. David Etheridge, B. John Etheridge, C. Henry Etheridge, D. Mary Etheridge.

A. David Etheridge was born Nov. 13, 1818. He was twice married, first, a Miss Hunter; second, Miss Mayfield. He had eleven children: (a) "Sister", (b) Henry Thomas, (c) Mary, (d) John, (e) William, (f) Florence, (g) Mattie, (h) Wesley, (i) Tildie, (j) Hoyt, (k) Gus. B. John Etheridge married Miss Hannah. Issue, eleven children: (a) Martha Jane, (b) Pinkney, (c) Mary Ann, (d) Shepherd, (e) Isaac, (f) William, (g) Frances, (h) Emmaline, (i) Feling, (j) John, (k) Joseph. He was born Feb. 9, 1821.

C. Henry Etheridge was born Oct. 21, 1823. He married —— Hannah. They had one son, Isaac Etheridge. Henry Etheridge died in service in Confederate Army.

D. Mary Etheridge was born May 2, 1826. She married Jeff Bowen, moved West.

V. Shepherd Etheridge, upon the death of his wife, remarried a second time to Miss Kirkland of Gwinnett Co., Ga. They had one son, Jarvis Etheridge.

E. Jarvis Etheridge was born Feb. 17, 1829, he married a Miss Hamilton and had four children: (a) Bud, (b) Mary, (c) Elizabeth, (d) Willie. Jarvis Etheridge died in service in Confederate Army.

V. Shepherd Etheridge lost his second wife and he remarried a third time to Matilda Evans and they had ten children:

F. Martha Etheridge born Sept. 22, 1830. She married — Gower. Issue: William Gower.

G. Joel Etheridge was born May 16, 1832. Married Miss Bowen. They had four children: (a) Mary Jane, (b) Bartow, (c) Cally, (d) Bennie. Joel died in Confederate service.

H. William Etheridge, born Nov. 13, 1833, married —— Griffith, had eight children: (a) Mollie, (b) Mattie, (c) Hiram, (d) Allen, (e) Charlie, (f) Janie, (g) Susie, (h) Elbert. William Etheridge was a Confederate veteran.

I. Robert Etheridge was born Aug. 11, 1835, married a Kilcrease, they had eight children: (a) William, (b) Emmaline, (c) Isiabel, (d) Mary Ella, (e) Joel, (f) Calvin, (g) Ellie, (h) Dora.

J. Sarah Ann Etheridge was born Feb. 8, 1837, married — Kilcrease, he died in the Confederate Army. She remarried a second time to — Griffith, they had five children: (a) "Sister", (b) John, (c) Tilda, (d) Etta, (e) Ida. He was in service in the Confederate Army.

K. Elizabeth Jane Etheridge was born Sept. 26, 1838, married — Bowen. They had four children: (a) Charlie, (b) Mary Ann, (c) Jimmie, (d) Hiram.

L. Charles Etheridge was born Nov. 13, 1840, married —— Rice, had two children: (a) Charlie, (b) Monk. Charles Etheridge died in Confederate service.

M. Lizzie Etheridge was born June 9, 1843, married — Phillips, seven children: (a) Willis, (b) Sarah, (c) Emma, (d) Lula, (e) Georgia, (f) Ella, (g) James. Phillips was a Confederate veteran.

N. Hiram Etheridge was born Jan. 26, 1845, he died single in Confederate Army. O. George Etheridge was born Sept. 2, 1847, married — Wages, they had eight children: (a) John, (b) Mance, (c) Charles, (d) Abbie, (e) Alma, (f) Alvin, (g) Cora, (h) Bertie. He was a Confederate veteran.

V. Shepherd Etheridge had eight sons in Confederate service, five of them did not return, also had three sons-in-law in service, one did not return.

Family Tradition

In this Etheridge family, there is a little tin box or trunk that is handed down to the youngest son of each generation. It came from Sampson Etheridge to his son, Shepherd Etheridge, and from Shepherd to his fifteenth and last son, George Washington Etheridge and now in his family. The box was used for money and other valuables.

An Etheridge Legend

It is said, there were three Etheridge brothers in England, during the reign of King George II. One was named George and a favorite of the king and received special favors and all the property. The other two brothers came to America, one settled in Ohio, the other in North Carolina.

They were very angry over the treatment they had received from their brother and the king and swore there would never be an Etheridge descendant named "George." However this agreement was broken when Shepherd Etheridge named his youngest son, George, but not for the brother or the king.

His great-grandfather Evans was with George Washington when Lord Cornwallis surrendered, so this youngest son was named in honor of the "Father of His Country" George Washington. A fact, only one other George Etheridge has been found in research for this publication, and he is living now in S. C.

This Samuel Etheridge in 1758 in Marion Co., S. C. was married and had at least four or more children under the age of sixteen.

Henry Etheridge as a sergeant under Col. Anderson 17 Nov. 1785. Henry Etheridge assigns his indent to William McCrone and this was witnessed by John Brownlea.

Lott Etheridge for service as a private under Col. Anderson.

Samuel Etheridge Jr. for service in the militia under Col. Anderson as a private 10 Sept. 1785. Samuel Etheridge Jr. assigns his indent to Bartlett Bledsoe for collection, witnessed by Solomon Pope.

Samuel Etheridge Sr. for supplies 10 Nov. 1787. He assigns his indent to Bartlett Bledsoe sworn to before Russell Wilson J. P.

Benjamin Etheridge served in Brandon's Regt. under Col. Anderson.

Etheridge in the First Census of S. C. in 1790

The first number after the name is for all men over the age of sixteen including the head of the house. The second number indicates all boys in the house under age of sixteen. The third number indicates all women and girls including the wife. All Etheridges in 1790 resided in Edgefield County.

Etheridge Wills in S. C.

Sarah Etheridge, a will in Charleston County, signed 15 June 1802, pr. 7 July 1802. No children—half the estate was left to a sister, Catherine Bedford, whom she called "My whole sister". The rest was left to Benjamin Johnson, kinship not known. Exs. Benjamin Johnson & Whitford Smith. Witnesses: Robert Bushnell Hislop, John Hislop & Dennis Magee.

Aaron Etheridge, a will signed % June 1811 and probated 25 Sept. 1821 in Edgefield Co. Exs. My son, Archibald Etheridge and step son in law, Samuel Clark. Witnesses: Joseph King, Hannah Boddie & Sampson Pope. Wife was not called by name but stated to my dear wife, I leave the home plantation as long as she lives. The children: Archibald Etheridge, Patsy Jennings, Josiah Etheridge and Sallie Thrower and she to have the plantation where Lewis Thrower lives. I give \$50.00 to each of my three step children whom my wife had by her first husband Josiah Allen and named as Mrs. Milberry Clark, Mrs. Nancy Mathis and Drury Allen.

His Estate file of 7 March 1821 shows the following men named as appraisers: Thornton Coleman, David Martin, Tyre Jennings & Valentine Corley-Josiah Etheridge Ex. For years, the widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Etheridge (not named in will) was paid an annual support from the estate for some time this was paid to Sampson Pope for her support and later it was paid to Josiah Etheridge with whom she resided-at one time she was living with her grandson, J. J. Clark. For some three or more years it was paid direct to her as Mrs. Elizabeth Edwards and she likely had wed a third time . . . In 1833 she was Mrs. Edwards but two years later she was always referred to as Mrs. Elizabeth Etheridge. She seemed to have died about 1843 for on the 3 Dec. 1843 there was held a sale of the personal estate of Aaron Etheridge, now that his widow is dead. The will stated that she was to have an income from the estate as long as she lived. 6 Mar. 1950 final payments were made to the heirs. The main payments being made to the four children: Archibald, Josiah, Sallie & Patsy, wife of Jesse Jennings. Evidently Patsy or Martha Jennings had died for the last payments of her share were made to: Martha Jennings, Josiah E. Jennings, M. Jennings, Phillip Jennings with Jesse Jennings the husband were paid portions in 1850 for the share of Martha or Patsy Jennings.

Notations state that the step children received the \$50.00 willed to them by their stepfather.

Estate of Sampson Etheridge Admst. 22 March 1826 by Robert Etheridge. Apparisers were named as David Rush Sr. Henry Zimmerman and William Walker. The widow, Mrs. Frances Etheridge dated 2 March 1826 states that she gives up her right to administer and asks Robert Etheridge be named. Hugh Mosely was witness.

1 July 1828 and 1 Jan. 1826 are receipts from Sampson Etheridge Jr. for his share of the Estate . . . the other heirs are not mentioned. Buyers at the Sale in large quantities were: Mrs. Frances Etheridge, Shephard Etheridge, Robert Etheridge, Sampson Etheridge Jr. Joel Etheridge & Wade Etheridge. Robert Etheridge died before the Estate was completely "wound up" and Joel & Wade Etheridge took over. Other buyers at the Sale were: David Rush, David Rush Jr., Jacob Rush and Henry Rush.

Robert Etheridge Estate Admst. 9 Nov. 1829 by Wade Etheridge. His bond was signed by Joel Etheridge and David Walker. Citations as to this Estate were read first at Reedy Creek on 1 Nov. 1829 and on 5 Nov. 1829 at Rehoboth Church and both citations were signed as having been read by George Slappy. The appraisers were: Henry Zimmerman, Hugh Moseley, David Rush, James Steifle and Peter Rampey.

In 1831, Mrs. Margaret Etheridge, widow of Robert Etheridge was asking that new papers of administration be made out to her and her second husband, Jesse Thornton whom she had recently married. She stated that she was the second wife of Robert Etheridge deceased and that her late husband had by his first wife, but two children and that they did not live with her. These first children were listed as: David Rush Etheridge, and Martha Etheridge. David R. Etheridge signed for his share in 1834. James Rampey, 3 Dec. 1836 signed for the share of his wife, Martha R. Rampey. Statements said in 1834 David R. Etheridge was now age twenty-one and in 1836 Martha Etheridge wife of James Rampey was aged twenty-one. These two children of Robert Etheridge were children by his first wife who was a daugher of David Rush Sr. This is proved in his Estate Settlement in 1839 when David R. Etheridge and his sister, Martha Rampey signed for the share of their deceased mother (not named).

Wade Etheridge was named Guardian Ad Litem for the minor children of Robert Etheridge deceased. Later Mrs. Margaret Etheridge, the widow, had her second husband, Jesse Thornton, named as legal guardian for her children. The following children received their share when they became twenty-one, Eliza Etheridge in 1841. William Etheridge in 1846. James Etheridge in 1846. Elizabeth Etheridge in 1846. Mantz Etheridge in 1846. Sampson Etheridge 5 Mar. 1852. Sarah Etheridge 5 Mar. 1852. Robert Etheridge Jr. 5 Mar. 1852. Wade Etheridge 5 Mar. 1852.

Estate of Mrs. Martha Etheridge admst. 4 Nov. 1822 by William Etheridge and his bond signed by Josiah & Guilford Etheridge. The appraisers named: Spears Price, William Hardy, Arthur West and Benjamin Corley.

Allen Etheridge Estate Admst. 17 May 1830 by Benjamin Corley, his bond signed by Thomas H. Pope and William Raiford. The appraisers were John Shealy, William Etheridge and Jacob Caughman. Money was paid to the estate of Allen Etheridge from the Estate of Benjamin Etheridge and it seems that Allen was an heir of Benjamin. The Estate was divided into three shares, one for the widow and one share each for the two children. Widow listed as Leathe Estheridge.

Lewis Etheridge sold all his Edgefield lands and moved away. Lewis Etheridge and no dower, sells land by deed dated 20 Nov. 1802 to Robert Christie. Wit. Lewis Matthews & Mary Christie before Elkanah Sawyer J. P. He sells his first land on 11 Sept. 1797 to Harmon Gallman (it is also spelled Harrison Galeman, Harrison Colebourne). Wit. Isaac Stephens and William Etheridge before Elkanah Sawyer J. P.

Samuel Etheridge 29 Mar. 1791 sells lands to Benjamin Etheridge. Wit. Lott Etheridge and Sarah Etheridge. No dower.

Lott Etheridge 5 Aug. 1794 sells lands to William Corley. Wit. John and Thomas Davis, Joseph Corley before Henry King J. P.

Benjamin Etheridge 21 June 1791 sells lands to John Raborn, 215 A by lands of Drury Allen and James Calk Sr., before Russell Wilson J. P.

Aaron Etheridge 28 Dec. 1818 sells lands to Jacob Pope. Wit. Jacob Rambo and Thornton Coleman.

Henry Etheridge was born 1757 in Virginia along the Currituck N. C. border and died in Edgefield, S. C. in 1846. His second wife was Jemima Whaley and by her he had a daughter: Jemima W. Etheridge who married Handcock Suddath. Their daughter, Louisa Suddath 1821-1904 married William Watkins in 1841. This record was for membership in the D. A. R. society for a daughter of Louisa Suddath Watkins. The children of Henry Etheridge by both wives: Benjamin, George, Henry Jr., Sarah, Martha and Jemima.

Shepard Etheridge, likely a son.

Sampson Etheridge, he signs receipt as a son.

Robert Etheridge, the administrator. Wade Etheridge was a brother as proved by Robert's children who called him "their uncle" when he was made their guardian.

Wade Etheridge. In a deed he calls Frances, his mother.

Joel Etheridge, known to be a brother of Wade and see "Old Roads" in Greenwood Index-Journal.

Jacob Rush, he wed Delilah Etheridge and the family know she was a sister of Joel and Wade Etheridge.

There were many other buyers at the sale but none bought as heavily as did the above. There seemed to be another daughter as shown by lands of Jacob Rush and wife, Delilah Lucy Ann Rush who was nee Delilah Etheridge.

In the settlement of the estate of Robert Etheridge, son of Sampson, there was mention of 4 tracts of land. One tract adjoined lands of Jacob Rush and of David Walker. This tract was 39¹/₂a and seemed to have come to him from the estate of Sampson Etheridge. Also note that David Walker signed the admst. bond of Wade Etheridge when he took over the estate of Sampson Etheridge after Robert Etheridge died. Joel Etheridge also signed this administration bond. (There is a good bit of evidence that a daughter of Sampson Etheridge married David Walker.)

DAVID RUSH AND HIS DESCENDANTS

DAVID RUSH, SR.

David Rush, according to family tradition, came from Pennsylvania to what later was Edgefield County. It is said he came with troops sent South to help fight the British under Greneral Greene.

He was born *circa* 1760 and died Sept. 26, 1839 (Bible record) and must have been about twenty-five years of age when he came to South Carolina. No record of his father or mother is obtainable but family tradition is that the father was massacred by the Indians at Schenectady, New York. He had a brother Daniel who also came to South Carolina, lived in the same com-

munity in Edgefield County but moved to Alabama. According to Jasper Newton Rush, a grandson, there were other brothers, he said his brother James died and was buried at sea. There is a record of James Rush, son of John IV, a cousin of Dr. Benjamin Rush, who died at sea, so he could have been a cousin of David or a nephew.

In the Revolutionary records of York County, Pennsylvania, there is a David Rush listed as a private soldier in 1781-1782. Also Daniel Rush, pvt. Phil. 1776. There were several Davids and Daniels in Pennsylvania at that time. No record to identfy the lines.

The first Rush to land on American soil was Jasper Rush who came to Dorchester, Mass., 1644. He was not free, probably sold himself for passage on a ship to the new world.

The next of the Rush family to come was the family of John Rush from whom David Rush descended.

John Rush and his wife Susanna Lucas Rush and children came from Oxfordshire, England in 1683 and settled at Byberry, thirteen miles from Philadelphia. They were Quakers and followed William Penn to America. Their eldest daughter, Elizabeth, and her husband, Richard Collet, preceded them coming to America in 1682 on the same ship with William Penn. They later became Baptist.

Ten children were born to John and Susanna Rush: Elizabeth, William, Thomas, Susanna, John, Frances, James, Joseph, Edward and Jane.

David Rush descended from one of these sons.

The earliest record we find of land deals of David Rush in South Carolina is 1788. He had grants from the State of South Carolina for vacant lands in Edgefield and Abbeville Counties. Also bought lands from other settlers who wished to sell out and move away. Some are dated 1800 and later. Also sold tracts of land to settlers coming in. He owned land on Cuffeytown Creek in the Mt. Vernon section of Edgefield County and on Curltail Creek in Abbeville County. He and his brother-in-law, Samuel Carter, seemed to be the leaders in settling this section of the county. Edgefield County records show many land deals in their names.

He married Margharetta Rosena Adolph *circa* 1786. She was the daughter of Henrick Adolph and Maria Dorst Adolph, German settlers on Hard Labor Creek who landed here in 1764 (see record of Adolph).

They are listed in the 1790 census of South Carolina as having three females in the house. Eleven or twelve children were born to them, eleven are mentioned in this record but no proof of twelve.

The last tract of land that he owned is now known as the Wren place. It adjoins lands of the late Thomas B. Bell. After the death of his wife he divided it into two tracts and deeded them to two of his sons: David, Jr. and John Rush. He and his wife died there and are buried across the road in front of the house. Their graves are not marked at this date. She died Dec. 29, 1826.

A lovely granite marker to the memory of David Rush and Margharetta Rosena Rush and their children has been erected by their descendants on the grounds of Bold Spring Baptist Church, facing the highway.

David Rush was known as a wheelwright when he lived in Pennsylvania. He brought many fine tools with him to S. C. and could do various kinds of mechanical work. The ruins of his old Grist Mill on Cuffeytown Creek are still discernable.

Upon his death, David Rush, Jr., administered on his Personal Estate. Administration papers are recorded at Edgefield, C. H. Estate File 25-914.

Family tradition was that David Rush fought as a Revolutionary soldier in South Carolina but there is no official account of his service as a soldier here, but he was a sympathizer of the Revolution as the following entry on the stub of the indent with which the account was paid shows:

He is classified as a patriot in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and his great-great-granddaughter, Mary Jane Rush Broadwater, became a member of the Society upon this certified record from the Historical Commission of South Carolina, Columbia, S. C., showing that he let the State of South Carolina have tubs and pails during the Revolution.

Another incident that happened also shows where his sympathies were: His father-in-law, Henry Adolph, was living on land granted him by the King of England and no doubt he was sympathizing or aiding the colonists when the Tories came to his home at night, seized him and carried him away under cover of darkness. However, by morning a group was organized to chase the Tories and to rescue him if possible. He was found, left hanging in a tree by the feet with head down. They had pulled down a very strong hickory sapling, split the body near the top and fastened his feet in the split, then let the tree up which left him dangling in air, head down.

It was a cold night and his feet were frostbitten, and he lost his feet later as gangrene set in. Undoubtedly David Rush assisted in numerous Tory raids as Ninety Six District was a hot spot for them during the Revolution. Probably that was the Revolutionary service that he rendered in South Carolina.

They were living in the Mt. Vernon Section of Edgefield County on Cuffeytown Creek.

II. Elizebth Rush, daughter of David and M. Rosena Adolph Rush, married John Steifle (spelled Stiefel then). Four children were born to them: Ivy, David, Sarah and one other. Ivy, David and Sarah received their part of the personal property of David Rush in 1842 and one share was unaccounted for, which shows that there was another heir.

Ivy Steifle married William Flinn, Jr., and always lived in the "Shatterfield" community. (See Flinn records for her descendants.)

David Rush Steifle moved away to Elbert County, Ga. He was married, and his half-sisters, Margaret and Mary lived with him. In 1853 he wrote his sister, Ivy Flinn, that Margaret was very much dissatisfied over there and wanted to come back to S. C. to live, probably with her; but he wanted her to know that he was willing to give her a home if she could be satisfied. He was farming and teaching school in Elbert County, Ga. In 1853 he had recently seen old aunt Ivy Rush Steifle who lived near Hartwell, Ga. and she had "broken" so much and looked so old he did not recognize her. There is no record to show that they came back to live in South Carolina.

Sarah Steifle (no record found).

III. Upon the death of Elizabeth Rush Steifle, John Steifle married a second time to her sister, Caroline Rush. Three children were born to them: Margaret, Mary and one other, name unknown. In the settlement of the David Rush personal property, Margaret received her share but the other two heirs are not mentioned although it shows there were two more shares.

IV. James Steifle, son of David Steifle, and brother of John, married Ivy Rush as his second wife. He first married Miss Watson. Three children were born to them: Margaret, Mary and George. Margaret married Aaron Ouzts, Mary married Isaac Ouzts. They had a nephew, Henry Steifle, who lost an arm in "The War Between the States." He married Jane Ouzts Collins. They had one daughter, Maggie Steifle.

James Steifle sold his farm in 1834 and he and his family moved to Hart Co., Georgia, near Hartwell. He was married to Ivy Rush then and had six children: James, Nancy, Susan, Sophie, Catharine and Lovic Ann. He died in 1864; he and his wife are buried in a country cemetery about three miles from Hartwell, Ga.


Their daughter, Lovic Ann married Caswell Leard, who was killed in "The War Between the States." They had a son, Jones Robert Leard who served as sheriff of Hart county, also filled the place of Tax Collector and Representative in the General Assembly.

Nancy Steifle married James Talbot McDowell. He was a carpenter, also taught school before the war, and was Justice of Peace. He reared his family in Hartwell, Ga. He died Mar. 31, 1891. No record of his family.

There was a Doctor George Steifle in Edgefield Co. and he could have been a son of James or John. There was a Doctor Steifle in Abbeville County, probably the same person and moved there, about Antreville, and was very much beloved by the people of the community.

WILLIAM FLINN I AND HIS DESCENDANTS IN S. C.

William Flinn I came from Virginia to South Carolina with General Nathaniel Green as a Revolutionary soldier. It is not known whether he remained here and settled down after the close of the war or returned to Virginia and came back to make his home.

He was born Oct. 30, 1760, and was twice married. His first wife was Elizabeth, her last name not known. His second wife was Nancy West, her parents came from Ireland. They brought a lovely small drop-leaf Mahogany table on shipboard with them which has been handed down in the Flinn family but recently burned when a great-great-grandson lost his home by fire.

William and Elizabeth Flinn had three children. Upon her death he administered upon her estate, children mentioned: Steven, Sarah and Mary. He had nine children by his second wife, Nancy West. She was born Dec. 6, 1774. He died Dec. 10, 1841. She lived to be very old and drew a pension from the Government until the War Between the States began, was cut off without notice. They

are buried in the Flinn burying ground on land now owned by John H. Flinn, a descendent.

SECOND WAR DEPARTMENT MARKER FOR REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER FOUND

(Reprinted from The Index-Journal, Greenwood, S. C.)

A second marker furnished by the War Department for the grave of a Revolutionary soldier in Greenwood county, has been reported to The Index-Journal, following the mention some days ago of such a marker for the grave of John Montague about a mile northeast of the city.

This second marker furnished by the War Department and different from the markers given by the D. A. R. is over the grave of William Flinn who served under General Nathaniel Greene the last years of the Revolution. William Flinn fought also in the Battle of Brandywine.

William Flinn came to South Carolina after the Revolution and settled in the Callison community with his family. His wife was Nancy West and was his second wife, the first one being known only by her first name "Elizabeth."

William Flinn was living in Virginia before the Revolution and either he or his father was an immigrant from Ireland to America. William Flinn, the Revolutionary soldier, had a son William Flinn and also a grandson William Flinn. The grandson was alive and living in the home community of Callison when the War Department marker was put up. In fact, he did the actual work of placing it. William Flinn, the Revolutionary soldier, is buried in the family burying ground located on land now owned by John Flinn, a greatgrandson of the patriot.

Mrs. Nancy West Flinn, second wife of William Flinn, continued to receive a pension as the widow of a Revolutionary soldier after the death of William Flinn but she did not receive such pension money after the beginning of the War Between the States. The services of William Flinn in the Revolution are set forth in his application for a pension.

The War Department marker for William Flinn was obtained about twentyfive years ago after Mrs. A. F. Broadwater suggested making application for it. The forms used in the application were filled out by the late Mrs. T. P. McKellar, then historian of the Kosciusko Chapter of the D. A. R. of Greenwood. This chapter is now extinct.

William Flinn, the Revolutionary patriot, has a number of descendants in the Callison community. One of these, Mrs. D. Lee Burnett, has a number of old letters and papers of this first William Flinn. If there are any other War Department markers over the graves of Revolutionary soldiers in Greenwood county, The Index-Journal would be glad to have the information.

Isaac Burnett, son of Jeremiah Burnett was born Feb. 9, 1790, and died at the age of seventy-eight years. He married Hettie Corley who was born Oct. 11, 1793, and died at the age of seventy. They are buried at their old home place and graves have markers and enclosed with an iron fence. This old place is located near the old Elbert Devore place on Cuffeetown Creek, near the Mt. Vernon section of Edgefield County. The old house burned several years ago.

It was said that the old house was "haunted" by a whistling-talking ghost. The noises came with a whistling sound first, then talking. It usually appeared overhead in the ceiling or out in a plum thicket near the house and would talk with any one who happened to be there and asked questions. The whole countryside came to hear him. He said he was not there for any harm but would be there for six months and would go from there to Virginia never to return.

Their daughter, Martha, came in from school one day and as she neared the house, the ghost said "You got a whipping at school today." She was terribly frightened as it happened to be true.

Early one morning, he appeared and informed the family that a neighbor had lost a horse during the night and upon investigation found to be true. Another day, they heard him over the hill saying "I'm coming, I'm coming" and they thought it was their negro boy coming to do his chores around the house, but he was not around and could not be found. It was the ghost. Among those who talked with him was the Rev. Nicholas Ware Hodges, Baptist minister. In conversation one day, the Rev. Hodges asked him to say "Get thee behind me, Satan" which he did, and was never heard again, probably went to Va. No satisfactory explanation was ever given to clear up this unusual affair. It is referred to as the "Hant" at the old Burnett place.

Bible originally belonged to William McDowell, "published in New York, by American Bible Society, instituted in the year MDCCCXVI, 1858," said Bible now being in the permanent possession of Mrs. J. T. McDowell, 8 Marshall Road, Greenwood, South Carolina.

The McDowell Family in Edgefield County, S. C.

John McDowell was born in Ireland in 1763. His parents and other members of the family came to America and settled in Pennsylvania about 1770. Later, John McDowell came with Wright Nicholson to Edgefield Co., S. C. Just after the close of the Revolutionary War, John McDowell married Wright Nicholson's daughter, in 1788. There was one child born to this union, a son, William McDowell, born Aug. 30, 1789. John McDowell mysteriously disappeared in the fall of 1789 or early spring of 1790, and was never heard of.





JACOB RUSH, JR.

Jacob Rush, Jr., son of Jacob and Delilah Etheridge Rush, was the fifth child of his parents. He was born and reared in the same community, married and settled within one half mile of his birthplace. He married Demaries Jane Miller of the Callison community and they reared a family of nine children. She preceded him to the grave seven years, dying at the age of seventy-nine. He lived to be ninety-two. They are buried at the old Rush

burying ground near his father's home. His father and mother are buried there but no marker was placed to mark the spot.

He was a unique man, small of stature, dark eyes, and hair (inherited from his mother) which never changed to pure white even at his advanced age, was always neat and clean in appearance and regular in his living habits. He arose at the same hour every morning, ate regular meals on the dot of the hour, dinner being served strictly at 12 o'clock and he retired between sundown and dark after winding the old clock with the weights that ran down every twenty-four hours.

Jacob, Jr., was temporate in his habits, was a small eater, he smoked a pipe after breakfast using fig leaves mixed with his home grown tobacco. One plug of chewing tobacco lasted a month. He liked a sip of whiskey, one quart would last a year. He was never drunk although it was kept in his father's home (each family distilled his own in those days) and used as medicine. Herbs and plants were brewed and mixed with whiskey to preserve them.

He was a farmer by vocation and the neatest in the community. No one could please him in the cultivation of his crops. The rows had to be perfect, hoeing and ploughing smooth and regular and no clods in sight. His vegetable garden was cultivated like a flower bed, not a track being left in the rows or middles. His fields were enclosed with rail fences and the fence corners were hoed as regular as the crops were hoed.

Hunting and fishing were his favorite sports, although he did not count it sport but a means of livelihood, he supplied his family regularly with game and fish. He was a fine marksman and taught his sons to be the same, always hunted with his rifle and brought in many squirrels, birds and wild turkeys. Always shot the turkeys in the head. On one occasion he brought in four large turkeys and was completely exhausted when he reached home as he was walking and it was several miles from home. He didn't mind sitting on the creek bank all day fishing for suckers, even if he did not get a bite. He knew every tree in the swamps of Hard Labor and Cumming's Ford Creeks and never tired of telling where he found and how he captured his game, he could tell you the habits of all the wild animals and birds of this section.

Another favorite subject was talking about the War. He went in active service for his beloved Southland, leaving his wife and five small children to do the best they could without him. He joined Capt. Hamden Brook's Company H. Seventh S. C. Reg't. and was stationed at James Island, Charleston, S. C. where he remained until stricken with rheumatism of the back and could not walk. He was at home on furlough to recuperate when the war ended and he was happy to settle down again in his log cabin in the woods and rear his children. The house is in good repair today and is owned by his granddaughter, Mamie Rush Broadwater and her husband Abe F. Broadwater, 'where they enjoy many happy week ends and vacations.

He built the home shown here in 1867, finishing it in time for the wedding of his youngest daughter, Sarah Eleanor Rush. His first home was a log house, similar to all others of this section, at that time. He and his wife were Charter members of Bold Spring Baptist Church, going out from Bethel Methodist Church. He named the new Church "Bold Spring" for the very bold spring nearby which determined the location of the Church.

Three brothers: A. Jacob, B. Michael and C. John Harling came to America from Germany, settled not far from Sleepy Creek in the beginning of the 19th century.

COOK

Henry Cook, a German immigrant, appeared in Edgefield County on Hard Labor Creek where he bought 288 acres of land. The family tradition is that when a young man, walking along a river in Germany, about 1775, he was set upon by officers, captured and carried to England to serve in the war against America.

He was already married to Susanna Lightfoot when he purchased land and settled near Horeb Church at the place now known as the Dr. Neel place. Little is known of him and his family as he seems to have moved away about 1800 but he had one son, Phillip, who remained in the neighborhood.

Philip Cook married about 1810 to Mary Irwin of Scotch-Irish descent first, and remarried second, a Miss Evans and third to Peggy Rush.

There were nine children by his first marriage: Francis Cook, Frederick Cook, Samuel, John, William, Joseph, Henry, Jacob and Sophronia.

Francis, the eldest son died in Mississippi, young and single and left \$1,000.00 to each of his brothers and sister.

Frederick Cook, the second son remained at home and purchased part of his father's land. He married Sarah Cox in 1832. Their children: Mary, Jane, Fannie, Ann (m. Robert Bryson), Frank, Agnes (died in young womanhood), Isabel, Harvey and Eliza.

Samuel Boggs Cook, the third son, married Eliza Harland and lived near the Hearst place. Their children: Jacob Phillip m. Emily Kemp, Mary H. never married, John Henry, went to Mississippi, died young, Joseph Cook went to Louisiana after the war, Martha Ann never married, Eliza Caroline m. Wesley A. Johnson, Francis A. 



JASPER NEWTON RUSH

Jasper Newton Rush, a grandson of David Rush, Sr. and son of David Rush, Jr., should have special mention in this record for being an unusual person, he was outstanding for being different and sometimes had exciting experiences along the way.

He was the first born of three sons of David and Roselia Flinn Rush, born June 9, 1839. His brothers were Franklin Pickens and William Anderson Rush. All three grew to manhood and fought with the Confederate Army in the "War Between the States." Jasper Newton enrolled in Co. H, 7th

S. C. Regt. under Capt. Hamden Brooks, was stationed in Charleston for training and later sent out of the state. He was wounded at Fort Harrison, Petersburg, Weldon Road, also had bullets to pass through his clothing, grazing the skin, on two other occasions. He seemed to have had an enchanted life. He surrendered at Appomatox C. H. but his brothers were killed in battle at Drury's Bluff, Va.

He came home alone, too soon to face the terrible horrors of Re-

construction. Almost upon arrival, footsore and weary, our returning soldiers found a company of negro soldiers stationed at every Court House town, claiming they were there to protect the newly freed slaves from their former masters. This was the beginning of Ngro rule. Northern Carpet-baggers, negroes and scalawags ruled with an iron hand, stealing from and oppressing the state until 1876 when Wade Hampton was elected governor and redeemed the state from ignominy and shame.

This exciting election was held in Nov., 1876 and in most of the polling precincts, negroes gathered in large numbers, blocking the way to prevent the whites from getting to the boxes to vote. At Edgefield Court House this was the case and something had to be done in order to get to the box. So Jasper N. Rush had a plan all his own, to scatter the black horde. He approached Dr. Bill Jennings, Mart Gary, Abe Broadwater and others, telling them that he could scatter them in short order and would do it peaceably. So he let them in on the secret.

He went to a nearby drug store and bought a cake of the best lathering soap they had, sliced off a piece, put it in his mouth and began chewing it. When the lather began running from his

mouth he began spitting and letting it run all over his clothes; then he started on the run and those in the secret started yelling: madman, hydrophobia, mad-dog bit, get out of the way, everybody run, he will bite you. Many negroes on the outer edge and some whites who were in the know, began running and at this point he headed for the dense crowd around the polls, who were so thick their heads were touching each other, he made one spring and landed on top of their heads. They began crying and screaming with fear, then he reached down and caught a negro's ear between his teeth, growling all the time like a dog, holding on until every negro had left the place.

He said it took every doctor in Edgefield to save that negro from dying of fright and all that saved him from Negrophobia or some other disease was the quantity of soap he had in his mouth.

The outcome of this spisode, which allowed the whites of the county to vote, saved the state from further negro rule. Jasper N. Rush did the job in a different way, as usual.

On another occasion, Jasper Newton came into the limelight. He was a witness in a lawsuit at Edgefield C. H. He was told by the court that his testimony would have to be what he knew to be a fact and not hearsay.

Among the first questions asked after he was scated in the witness chair was: How old are you, Mr. Rush? Ans. I do not know. Q. You don't mean to say, a man of your intelligence, doesn't know his age? Ans. I do not know, but I've often heard my mother say, but that is only hearsay.

He was always, "Hail fellow, well met," never seemed to have many worries and could always see the ridiculous side of a situation. He lived twenty miles from Edgefield C. H. and twenty-three miles from the home of his cousin, Abe Broadwater beyond the village. Any day he had a notion to go down, he would pick up his old walking stick and walk it in a day. Stay as long as he wanted to stay, then hop off suddenly and go back the same way, sometimes without saying good-bye.

He could do any kind of work: carpenter, bricklayer, machinist, well digger, brewer, miller, farmer, defend his case in court, or what not. He lived at his farm inherited from his father, until after the death of his wife when he and his daughter, Myrtle, and two younger boys removed to Greenwood, S. C. The later years of his life were spent in the home of his eldest son, Frank P. Rush and his wife, Allie Pruitt Rush.

He kept alive the "Family Tree." It was through his interest and the information he passed along about the family, that inspired the writer of this book to undertake the publishing of this family record.

He was a brave soldier, a Red Shirt wearer, a K.K.K. and a witty, humorous person, liked by people in all walks of life. We as descendants honor him now for handing down many clues that helped greatly in tracing the records we now have for publication. Peace be to his ashes.



John William Rush was born May 11, 1793, died Nov. 2, 1886, was married to Elizabeth Jane Daniel on her 15th birthday. There were fourteen children:

(7) Martha Ayer Rush, born Nov. 10, 1836, married Dec. 23, 1852B. J. Ray. (Dr. Harry Ray of Aiken, S. C. is from this line).

FREDERICK RUSH

The first Frederick Rush mentioned in S. C. had a land grant in Craven County on Great Lynches Creek, Oct. 12, 1770. He moved from Camden District to St. Augustine, Florida. His wife was Mary and minor children mentioned: Jacob Rush and Arabella Rush.

Another Frederick Rush was the noted Methodist Preacher who was born in Orangeburg District, June 4, 1802. He was converted in 1813 and admitted to preach on trial Jan. 1829. He died Aug. 8, 1858. He became a District Presiding Elder, his Circuit extended from Black River to Lynchburg, a distance of 100 miles. His home church was St. John's Methodist (still functioning). He seems to have married and had two or more children. Two sons are recalled: Asbury Rush and Frederick Rush. Their mother was Rachel Shuler, daughter of Adam Shuler. I. Asbury Rush was a local Methodist Preacher and he and his brother Frederick Rush operated a large Flour Mill in Orangeburg during slavery times. They had two trusty African slaves, Hilliard Rush and George Rush (his wife was Betsy Rose) and they hauled flour from the Mill to Columbia, S. C. for seventeen years and Hilliard handled the money for his white folks. His son, Dozier Rush is still living at an advanced age. Dozier's mother, Emma and two children were auctioned on the block and bought by Frederick Rush for \$152.00.

Asbury Rush married Margaret Rebecca Lavender, they had five children: A. Mary Jane Rush, B. Elizabeth Rush, C. John Wesley Rush, D. Annie F. R. Rush, E. Ellison W. Rush.

A. Mary Jane Rush born Oct. 7, 1850. Died Dec. 31, 1855.

B. Fannie Elizabeth Rush born July 2, 1851, married Rev. R. E. Smith, local Methodist preacher. They reared a family, those living are: (a) Dr. C. D. Smith, a retired physician, who married Effie Robinson and had four children: 1. Charlie Smith, student at Wofford College, 2. Kate Smith, 3. Jean Smith, 4. Mary Ruth Smith.

(b) R. E. Smith married Cora Younger, teacher and musician. He is a farmer.

(c) A. Bethea Smith married Flora Smith, she is a music teacher and he is a farmer and cotton buyer.

(d) Hinnott Smith, youngest son lives with his brother, Dr. Smith.

C. John Wesley Rush was born Mar. 30, 1858, died Mar. 17, 1950. He married Alice Thomas, Dec. 21, 1882. She died at the age of 80, he lived to be 92. He was a farmer all his life, began ploughing at the age of nine, with oxen and wooden beam plow, grazing his oxen at night and going out in the early dewy morning to find them. Their children: Mattie, Nettie, Eunice, J. P., W. A., and H. G.

(d) J. Pickett Rush married Olive Smith. Three children: 1. Emily Faye Rush married M. H. Davis, Norway, S. C. 2. Alice Rebecca Rush married Rev. R. W. Park, Jr. Andrews, S. C. 3. J. Pickett Rush, Jr. married June Bennett, two children: (1) J. W. Rush, (2) Beatrice Rush.

(e) W. A. Rush, youngest son of John W. Rush married Jenette Mc-Faddin. He is a farmer. Three children: 1. Mildred Rush married Duva Williamson, 2. Helen Rush married Fred Cole, Columbia, S. C. 3. Frances Rush married Furman Cole, Charleston.

(f) H. G. Rush never married.

D. Annie F. Rush was born Sept. 9, 1859 died Jan. 3, 1881.

E. Ellison W. Rush, a farmer and merchant, married Ida Carroway, he was born April 17, 1865. They reared five children: (a) Eleanor Rush married Dr. L. C. Floyd, two children: 1. Dr. L. C. Floyd, Jr. 2. Kenneth Floyd.

(b) J. Fred Rush, druggist, married Eleanor Coker. Issue 1. Carol Hope Rush.

(c) Dr. Hoyt Rush married Addie Bell Hudson. Two children: 1. Ileen Rush, 2. Tommy Rush, and an adopted daughter, Patricia Hudson.

(d) Elizabeth Rush, teacher in Georgetown schools.

(e) Carlisle Rush, farmer and banker married Merle Hudson. Two sons: 1. Dr. Berwyn Rush, interne at Roper Hospital, Charleston. 2. Richard Rush, preparing to study medicine.

G. D. Bell was born February 2, 1895 at Callison, S. C., the son of Thomas B. Bell and Kate Dorn Bell and grandson of Robert T. Bell and Caroline Rush Bell; married Josie Elizabeth Rush, daughter of John Wesley Rush and Anna Elizabeth Dalton Rush, in December, 1917; two living children, Douglas Boyce Bell of Callison and Mary Dalton Bell Scurry of Edgefield, S. C.

He attended the public schools of Bold Spring section, the University of South Carolina, and taught school several years; a member of the South Carolina Bar, admitted to the practice in the courts of this State in 1930; rural mail carrier and land owner at Callison; member of Bold Spring Baptist Church; member of the Masonic Lodge, having held many high offices, and having been a member of both the Scottish Rite and York Rite; member of the Grange.

Teacher, lawyer, farmer, and mail carrier; a public spirited citizen of this community.

Finance Chairman of the committee which raised the funds for the remodeling and modernization of Bold Spring Baptist Church; known far and

wide as a leader in many capacities, and one who gives his time to the people of his community and State.

A friend, not expecting to be rewarded for his friendship, but always ready to help those who need him in all walks of life.

MR. AND MRS. FRANCIS PICKENS RUSH

Francis Pickens Rush and his wife, Mary Allie Pruitt Rush, were the outstanding religious workers of the Bold Spring Church. They were always present on all occasions, ready with willing hearts and hands, to carry on the work necessary to keep a church alive and active. They carried their children with them and brought them up "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

He was an interested Sunday School teacher and Deacon, and in the absence of the preacher could preach a good sermon—and he occasionally did. He was generous in supporting the church and all worthy causes of the community.

Allie Pruitt Rush was outstanding as a leader from young womanhood to late in life. She received her education at G. W. C. In 1882 a Missionary Society was organized in the Church, but very little was done until several years later, when she became a member after moving her membership from the Bradley Church. She reorganized the Society and was President for many years, working against many discouragements, but undaunted.


She enjoyed helping those in need, and generously used her money to help educate deserving relatives and her home was "open house" to the children of the community, where she entertained them on week-ends, at Christmas time and various occasions, making many a child's heart glad.

The lovely old Sproull place was her home and there was ample room for all who came. They also gave a home to a number of their family—always some one living with them and sometimes two or three at a time. She was a teacher of Sunday School, also the day-school teacher of the community. Her influence continues on in the lives of those she taught as the writer of this book can testify. Many more workers are needed today like Francis P and Mary Allie Rush.

HISTORY OF BOLD SPRING BAPTIST CHURCH

Bold Spring Baptist Church was organized in 1853 and a log Meeting House was erected on the present site upon land donated by Hugh Moseley, a prominent man of the community. He lived where J. Frank Cook now lives. It is not known whether he became a member or not, but his first wife, Barbara Moseley, is buried at near by Bethel Methodist Church Cemetery, she died in 1858. He left a will, recorded at Edgefield Court House, saying that he had made an unfortunate second marriage and he wanted to be buried by his first wife, Barbara Moseley and he was leaving \$300.00 to have a brick house over his grave. If he was buried there, no brick house or tombstone marks the spot but a tombstone marks her grave, which was erected before his death.

This log Church House was used for Services until it was blown away by a tornado on Feb. 19, 1884. The builders of this church were Rev. James

Shadrack, John Rush, Henry Rush, David Rush, John Sanders. They went into the forest, felled the trees and hewed them into shape. The sawed lumber used was hauled from Talberts Mill, owned by Billy Dorn.

The organization was a unique and interesting one at that time, being organized by Rev. James Shadrack and a group of members of Bethel Methodist Church and a few Baptist members of other churches. The Rev. James Shadrack, a former "Lay-Preacher" of the Methodist Church had been baptized and ordained as a Baptist Preacher in 1850 and was called as the first pastor of the new Baptist Church. He preached 1853-1855. The Church was named Bold Spring by Henry A. Rush. There is a very bold spring on the grounds near by which inspired the name (and probably decided the location) which furnishes a generous supply of water for drinking purposes and also for Baptismal services, which were held at the pool near the spring.

The Charter members were: Henry A. Rush and wife, David Rush, Jr. and wife, John Rush and wife. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bell, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Reel, Mr. and Mrs. James Hollingsworth, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Miller, Mr. and Mrs. Christopher Worthington, and Rev. James Shadrack.

The second Pastor of Bold Spring was Rev. B. F. Corley — 1856; Revs. W. P. Hill and Watkins served as supply for balance of year 1857. Next, Rev. John Trapp who served about 20 years. He was a pioneer preacher of power and force. Rev. R. W. Seymour, Rev. B. F. Miller, Rev. Joshua Sceva Jordan—Rev. Jordan was called twice and it was during his first call, on Feb. 19, 1884 that the church was destroyed by a cyclone, but proud to say it did not destroy the faith and hope of its members. Like true warriors they went to work, each one doing his bit and rebuilt in the same year. Bethel, the neighboring Methodist Church, opened her doors to the congregation until the new Church was completed. Rev. Gaines came next, and after his pastorate, Rev. J. S. Jordan was called again and served for a number of years. Then followed Revs. J. E. Johnson, A. D. Woodle, G. C. Wells, J. G. Newton, J. A. Hunnicutt, J. W. Boggs, Jennings Johnson, G. W. Gurley. The Rev. A. D. Croft came next and is serving at the present time, 1952.

The membership steadily grew throughout the years to around three hundred and fifty members but the present membership is only 234.

The majority of the descendants of David Rush are of the Baptist faith, handed down from their faithful ancestors, the organizers of Bold Spring Baptist Church. It is a sacred spot, dear to their descendants, where so many lie sleeping in the nearby cemetery and where many more will claim their last resting places.

Henry A. Rush and his wife, Mary Harling Rush, are buried here. The graves of John Rush and wife, Sarah Berry Rush, are unmarked but are buried here. David Rush, Jr., the other Rush charter member, is buried at the Flinn Burying Ground with his wives. Jacob Rush, Sr., the fourth brother did not leave the Methodist Church; his wife Delilah Rush, was a very devout Methodist, although nearly all their descendants are Baptist. They are buried at the Rush Burying Ground.

Robert Bell and his wife, Caroline Rush Bell, are buried at Bold Spring. Alfred Reel and family are buried at the old Reel Burying Ground near the Reel home. It is not recalled where the other Charter members are buried.

In building the old church, there is a record showing funds contributed by friends toward the building of a Baptist church near Hugh Moseley's on the waters of Reedy Creek amounting to \$70.00. Forty-one names were listed and only one charter member named, Christopher Weatherington, who subscribed \$15.00 and others from one dollar to five dollars each. They were friends of nearby communities but members of other churches.

Another old record shows that some of the members of Bold Spring contributed regularly in small amounts but the old custom was to pay once per year, the head of the house being assessed according to the members in his family. Sometimes members were "turned out" when they did not pay their assessments. Systematic Contributions-In 1868-69, this group agreed to pay 10ϕ per mo. for incidental expenses of Bold Spring: Henry, Sr., John and J. H. Rush, Robert, Sr. and R. T. Bell, A. W. Reel, E. A. Rodgers, R. A. Watkins, W. C. Robinson, James Callison, A. C. Deal, James and John Goldman, J. H. Hancock, W. S. Hall. Group paying 20ϕ Thos. Rodgers, Lewis Miner, H. J. Rush. Paying 15ϕ W. H. Rush.

The first mode of transportation to this sacred spot was by horseback, wagon or on foot. Roads were bad in winter and attendance poor. Next, horse and buggy or carriages. Today every one goes by automobile. Wonder if the next change will be wings.

It was a custom, and still is, to a certain extent, for the men to occupy one side of the church and the women and children the opposite side. Young men and their girl friends usually occupied the middle row of seats and assisted with the singing.

A week of protracted meeting is always held the third Sunday in August each year. At that time members are received for baptism and there is only one baptismal service during the year. In the horse and buggy days, dinner was always served on the grounds at noon. Tables were scattered around under the trees, the same group of families using the same table each year. At one table you would find Rushes, Cooks, Clinkscales, Pruitts, Hancocks and others. At another there would be Harvleys, Daltons, Banisters, Aitons, Rodgers and Agnews. At another Powells, Polatties, Callisons, Kemps and Bells, another of Flinns and Rushes. At another, Penns and their connections, Devores and Colemans. Other families represented: Luquires, Cleggs, Duncans, Pattersons, Shaws, Goldmans, Dorns, Witts, Millers and others not recalled. Plentiful was fried chicken, ham, beef, chicken pie, salads, pies, transparent and fruit, and various kinds of cakes, especially pound cake. All visitors and strangers were invited to partake. Immediately after the tables were cleared away, the young people would drift apart from the older ones, courting couples getting together. First a visit to the spring to get a glass of cold water, which did not quench your thirst after faring so sumptuously at the table, then find a buggy in a cool shady place where they could sit and talk privately

during the intermission hour and sometimes they were known not to return to the church for the afternoon sermon. Many life decisions were made on these sacred grounds. Surely God blessed and hallowed each of them.

All families brought their children, including babies. Sometimes they were taken out and spanked when they could no longer be kept quiet. When church was first organized the mothers carried pallets to put on the floor for their babies to sleep during services. On a hot summer day, many of the older men over in the men's section would drop off to sleep during the sermon, not because they were not interested but they were hard-working farmers and the quiet relaxation produced sleep. The same was true of the women who had labored so hard, cooking and packing baskets for dinner, that they succumbed, too.

On one occasion during the protracted meeting in August, two lady members of Rush ancestry, came riding up to the church in their buggy and the young man who volunteered to hitch their horse went to the back of the buggy, raised up the lid to get the leather halter and an old setting hen jumped out and ran, "squawking" at the top of her voice, all around the church grounds much to the chagrin of the young ladies who did not know that the old hen had selected the buggy for her nest. Often there were laughable experiences at these all-day meetings.

When observing the Ordinance of the Lord's Supper, Communion was served from silver goblets, passed by the Deacons, each member partaking and passed on to the next person, fermented wine being used. Individual service with unfermented grape juice is now used.

Church weddings or marriages are rare. Miss Emma Polattie and Edward W. Callison were married in the church, also her sister, Miss Mary Lou Polattie and George Hollingsworth. Miss Mamie Rush and Abram Flynn Broadwater were married there September 14, 1905. William Edward Rush and Miss Kitty Pruitt spoke their vows in the church August 15, 1896. In recent years Miss Helen Dorn and Jack Young were united in marriage in the church. June Lester and Calhoun Brock were married there in Oct. 1951, and Doris Dorn and Gerald Brown were married there on June 20, 1952. Lee Anna Byrd and William Curtis Highsmith, Jr. July 25, 1953.

Only two members of the church have been ordained as preachers: T. E. Dorn and Hoyt Satterfield. Mr. Dorn was an educator and never accepted a pastorate but preached on many occasions. Mr. Satterfield also is a teacher and pastor of a church.

The Ladies' Aid Society, organized in 1882, was the first missionary organization of the church. In those days, the men of Baptist churches did not believe that women should be active in Church affairs and they looked askance at the new organization and did not expect it to amount to much. The late Mrs. Stanmore P. Brooks, a member of Mt. Moriah Baptist Church and president of a society there, came to Bold Spring to help organize the society. She said she had to wait quite a while in the church until all the men vacated the building as women did not speak in church before men. The following ladies were charter members: Mrs. Martha Flinn Rush, Mrs. Eliza Kemp Flinn, Mrs. Sallie Rambo Street, Mrs. Emily Kemp Cook, Mrs. Eugenia Cook Rush, Mrs. Mary Maxwell Miller, Mrs. Nannie Hollingsworth and probably a few others not recalled. There is no record of minutes being kept. Mrs. Sallie Rambo Street was the first president.

In later years, the Ladies' Aid Society was reorganized by Miss Mary Allie Pruitt (later Mrs. Frank P. Rush). She named it the Shining Lights of Bold Spring Baptist Church. She recruited the membership and served as president for many years. She was an outstanding Christian worker in all phases of church work. The organization was later known as the Women's Missionary Society. Mrs. Nelle Witt was President of the W. M. S. and served faithfully for several years, followed by Mrs. Margaret Callison Flinn, who served faithfully as president for many years. Mrs. Sarah Banister Rodgers is leading the organization at the present time.

Clinkscales, Miss Carol Jordan, Misses Lizzie Callison, Eva Aiton, Emma Polattie, Alice and Nora Clinkscales, Bertha Bell, Lucile Coleman, Lois Dalton, Edna Witt, Wynona Penn, Mrs. Eva W. Reynolds, Mrs. Harvey Rodgers, Mrs. S. A. Rodgers, Miss Martha Rodgers.

Families who first worshipped here: Tillman Harling, B. B. Harvley, George Street, Allen Banister, Jack Ward, Anthony Deal. Rushes: Henry A., John, David, Jr., Jasper, Henry J., John Wesley, John H., James H., Jacob F., William Jacob, Alex, Jas. C., John Joshua Miller, Abbie Reel, Preston B., Kemp, Lewis Miner, James Callison, William and Henry Flinn, Caleb King Dalton, Phillip Cook, James, David and Moses Witt, Eph Rodgers, Robert, Tom and Dock Bell, P. A Baptistry was installed in the church more than fifty years ago, planned by Rev. J. S. Jordan and erected by S. W. Agnew. Miss Mattie Aiton (Mrs. A. W. Rodgers) was the first person baptized inside the church. The youngest member baptized was Fannie Henderson, less than twelve years of age, something unheard of at that time. The first body interred in Bold Spring Cemetery was Trapp Aiton, son of J. W. Aiton, Sr. and Mary Jane Rush Aiton in 1860.

The builders of Bold Spring church built so well, very little repairing had been needed but the time came when paint, repairs and enlargement was badly needed, so work of remodelling was begun in April 1951. Bethel, the neighboring Methodist Church opened her doors again to the Congregation for their Services as she did in 1884. This generous offer was gladly accepted and appreciated.

The work was completed in July. Eight Sunday School rooms have been added and entire building brick veneered, new interior work, plastering, new floors, windows and heating system at a cost of more than \$38,000.00.

A large part of funds collected for remodeling was contributed by relatives, friends and former members outside of the community and are not affiliated with this church. The largest gift was \$8,500.00 contributed by John Sydney Abney, a friend, of Greenwood, S. C. in memory of his father John Pope Abney (deceased). Next came a gift of \$8,000.00 from John Henry Rush (Boozer) a relative of Greenville, S. C. in memory of his father, William Hodges Rush and his mother, Sarah Eleanor Rush, the gift to be used in adding the Sunday School rooms, also a gift of \$2,000.00 from his sister, Mrs. Janie Rush Aiton in memory of her husband Robert Samuel Aiton, to be used in furnishing these rooms. Mr. and Mrs. Rush and Mr. Aiton were former members of Bold Spring. Grover C. Henderson, a relative of Greenwood, S. C. contributed \$150.00 in memory of his late mother, Mrs. Ann Rush Henderson and sisters, Miss Ida Jane Henderson and Mrs. Fannie H. Darby. R. M. Rush contributed \$250.00, Jasper F. Rush \$100.00, Dr. Rudolph Bell of Thomasville, Ga. \$300.00, Henry E. Rush, \$100.00, G. P. Callison, \$100.00, E. P. Gulledge, \$250.00, A Friend \$250.00 and Rush Reunion, \$100.00. Quite a number of friends and former members contributed smaller amounts, less than one hundred dollars. There are so many that space does not permit listing them, although they are important and appreciated. James Neal Dalton contributed \$212.50 to cover cost of "choir seats" in memory of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Dalton.

The Finance Committee, headed by G. D. Bell and the following members: Andrew Autrey, J. A. Banister, Sr., Mrs. John Dorn, Mrs. Helen Aiton, H. C. Lester, J. T. Rush, E. C. Penn, E. L. Rodgers, E. W. Rush, J. S. Weaghington, D. L. Burnett, have done a wonderful job and deserve the praise of the entire membership. Mr. Bell's outstanding work has been a great contribution to the church and the entire community, and the members are grateful for his enthusiastic work and the accomplishment of a big job well done.

August 19, 1951, marked a high light in the existence of the church. It was Dedication Day, Home Coming Day and beginning of the Annual Protracted Meeting, Rev. A. D. Croft, the pastor, preached the Dedicatory sermon. This congregation was happy, exultant over dreams come true in remodeling the old structure so wonderfully built in 1884. This generation has wrought well and will be honored by those who come after and we pray that they will "take up the torch" and continue to go forward in the name of our Great King, Jesus Christ.

Many fine people have gone out from the old church and made good elsewhere. Let us thank God for its influence and memories, and for the struggle put forth to establish a church of Baptist faith in this community by the sturdy ancestors who came to these "back parts of South Carolina" where they could worship God according to the "dictates of their consciences". We are proud of Bold Spring. Long may she serve the Spiritual needs of this community.

JOHN HENRY (Boozer) RUSH

"Boozer" Rush, son of William Hodges Rush and Sarah Eleanor Rush, was born Sept. 11, 1868 at the homeplace of his grandfather, Henry Rush, which was later known as Rushville Post Office, S. C. He was the eldest of eight children; attended the rural schools of his community.

He removed with his parents to the Epworth section of Edgefield County, where they resided for many years, engaged in farming and kept a country store. Upon the death of his father, he and his family removed to Greenville, S. C. where his bother Benj. F. Rush had located.

He engaged in business there and became prosperous. He never married but always resided with his mother and sister. At this time (1953) he and his sister,

Janie Rush Aiton, are the only living members of the family and they reside at 117 James Street, Greenville, S. C.

When the members of Bold Spring Church began making plans for remodeling the building, he was approached by the Committee for a contribution and responded generously with a gift of \$8,000.00 to finance the erection of the Sunday School annex, in memory of his father and mother who were former members of the Church.

Without this gift, the remodeling could not have been done at this time. Surely "God provides for His own" is applicable in this instance. He prospered "Boozer" Rush, allowing him to accumulate wealth and put it into his heart to make a donation to benefit a community for generations to come. Many will "rise up and call him blessed".

REV. JOHN TRAPP

Rev. John Trapp, the beloved Baptist preacher, was born Oct. 27, 1798 in Fairfield County, S. C. and came to the Mountain Creek section of Edgefield County to teach school. He was less than twenty-five years of age when he came.

The Mountain Creek Baptist Church had been organized about 1798 and services were held in the school house, with preaching occasionally. The Rev. Nicholas Ware Hodges, missionary evangelist of Edgefield Association, came to them when convenient but they had no regular pastor. The young teacher, John Trapp, often helped out. He was converted and united with the Church July 16, 1825. His soul was on fire to preach and he was Ordained Sept. 16, 1831 and called as Pastor 1833. He served them faithfully for 42 years.

In the meantime he served other accessible Churches. He was pastor of Damascus for 15 years, Bethany 21 years, Little Stevens Creek 38 years and came to Bold Spring about 1856 and served 20 years, as their third Pastor.

He married first, Mariah Brooks. She was born Dec. 22, 1803, died July 11, 1872. His second marriage was to Mollie McCurry, one daughter, Sallie Luvenia Trapp, was born Nov. 25, 1875 to this union. His widow married Sam C. Whatley, 2nd time.

He died June 27, 1876 and is buried at Mountain Creek Cemetery by his first wife, Mariah Brooks Trapp. He preached his last Sermon at Mountain Creek, using this text: "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation". This inscription is on his tombstone.

He was very much beloved by his church members and his influence was great in these communities.

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO THE MEMORY OF THE REV. JOHN TRAPP

At a joint meeting of the Bethany, Bold Spring and Mountain Creek Churches, held at Bethany, Saturday, July 2, 1876, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, it having pleased the All-Wise Providence to visit the Church with the death of a pastor, who was not less beloved than valued as a personal friend, we feel it a duty incumbent upon us to pay a tribute of respect to the many virtues upon which the grave has closed forever.

"The Rev. John Trapp, our former Pastor, was possessed of those noble qualities of head and heart which endeared him to all, and which rendered him a marked Christian man. He was held in much honor among his brethren, being selected as Moderator of the Edgefield Baptist Association, one of the largest and most talented bodies in the state.

"He was active and fearless in the discharge of his duties connected with his exalted position and secured the confidence of all who knew him. There was no man who has done more for the Baptist cause in Edgefield, than he. He is identified with its interests and gave largely of his means for its support.

"His mind was far above mediocrity and all his talent was devoted to the Glory of God and to the honor of His great Name. His earnest appeals, his long exhortations, his eloquent discourses and his entire manner while in the pulpit will long be remembered by many who are now living. He lived up to the requirements of the blessed Gospel, which he preached, and his reward is far higher, and nobler and purer than we can bestow." (Resolutions which follows, are omitted.)

REV. JOSHUA SCEVA JORDAN

The Rev. Joshua Sceva Jordan, patriot, poet and preacher, was born Oct. 16, 1835 in Dexter, Maine. They later moved to Foxcroft, Me. where he spent his boyhood acquiring such education as furnished by the Foxcroft Academy.

Oct. 2, 1852, he was baptized and received into the membership of the Baptist Church of Foxcroft.

After leaving Foxcroft Academy he studied law and on Feb. 27, 1857, he was, by the Supreme Court of Maine, admitted to practice law in the courts of that state.

His family were intensely Republican in politics, but he had made for himself an independent study of political economy and as a result found himself a Democrat, which threatened to alienate from his relatives him and friends, so he decided to leave his boyhood home. He moved to Brownville, Texas and was admitted to practice law in the courts of that state.

In 1858 he felt the call to preach the Gospel. He united with the Baptist Church of Waco, Texas and through this church engaged in local missionary work.

When the War Between the States started, he enlisted as a private in "Edgar's Battery, Third Brigade, Army of the West," and fought through the war as a Confederate soldier. He was promoted to corporal and later appointed and served as Chaplain, also served as reporter for a newspaper "The Natchitoches Union."

He was thrice married. On Mar. 13, 1859, he was married to Mattie Johnson of Kentucky. One daughter was born, Mattie E. Jordan, who became Mrs. J. P. Barratt, of Breezewood, S. C. Second in 1868, he was called to preach at Matamora, Illinois, here he married Caroline E. Bassett. Two daughters were born to them, Olive May and Carol Lee. In 1870, he was called to Cape Girardeau, Mo. Here in 1873 his second wife died.

He then moved to Greenville, S. C. and attended the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, graduating about 1875. Here he married in 1874, Sarah Ellen Austin. Four children were born to them, a son died in infancy, Nannie, afterwards Mrs. James Goldsmith, Mary and Merril.

While attending the Seminary, Mr. Jordan supplied the Baptist Church at Easley and Standing Spring Church. In 1875 he accepted a call to the Sixth Baptist Church of Atlanta, Ga. While here he did valuable work for the "Sunny South", a literary paper.

In 1876, he was called to the Baptist Churches of Greenwood, S. C. and Beulah Church. He came to Bold Spring in 1879 and served continuously until 1888. He was called a second time, 1893 and served until 1903. He labored faithfully and well in this field and was greatly loved and respected by the congregation.

He was stricken with paralysis on Wednesday, while writing his Sunday Sermon and died Thursday night, Oct. 1, 1903. He was buried Saturday afternoon with Masonic honors at Damascus. The exercises were in charge of Dr. H. A. Bagby who was assisted by Rev. G. H. Burton, Rev. J. A. Brown, Rev. A. D. Woodle, Dr. A. T. Jamison and R. W. Humphrey.

Upon his death, a member of the "Sunny South" wrote: "The best man I ever knew, and one of the most gifted and lovable is no longer among the living. Mr. Jordan was greatly gifted with the pen. He had a singularly lucid, clear cut style—full of force and beauty. In heart and soul he was a poet. During the war, he wrote The Exile—which was really his own romantic life story, and many other poems that were never published. He was so devoted to his pulpit and parochial work that he neglected an art that might have brought him fame as an author."

THE MORNING COMETH

Isaiah 21:11-12

'Twas twilight in Araby; and on Mount Seir The sleepless guardian of a sleeping world Stood in the starless gloom.

"What of the night?" I worn with wandering cried. "what of the night?" "The morning cometh." Something else he said, But I had heard enough, or thought I had, And so the rest let slip. It was not wise, But was it not all human, thus to grasp Just what of truth I wanted to be true, And leave the rest 'till disappointment keen, Of tutors sternest, taught me with a rod! I learned a precious truth, but closed my sense Against a prior. REV. A. D. CROFT

The fifteenth pastor of Bold Spring Baptist Church, Rev. Archie David Croft, entered upon the ministry of this church in Sept., 1936. He was born in West Columbia, S. C., April 8, 1908, the son of Rev. John David Croft and Elizabeth Fulmer Croft. While still in infancy he lost the sight of his eyes, due to an eye infection.

His father having entered the Baptist Ministry, the family moved to Warrenville, S. C., and later to Union, S. C. During his childhood and early adolescence, his family moved to various parts of the State, as the duties of his father led him to various pastorates.

At the age of seven, he entered the State School for the Deaf and Blind, near Spartanburg, S. C., from which he graduated in May, 1926. The following Sept., he entered the University of South Carolina, in Columbia. His studies were interrupted for one vear, due to financial circumstances, however he completed his course of studies in June, 1931 and upon finishing was engaged in Evangelistic work for some time and in additional studies.

He was called to the Pastorate of Clearwater Baptist Church in the Aiken Association, in 1933 and served this church for about three years.

He came to the Pastorate of Bold Spring Baptist Church in

September, 1936 and has served continuously for seventeen years and is Pastor at the present time (1953). The Church has grown slowly but steadily during his tenure of residency. His services were climaxed by the remodeling of the old church and erecting a new Educational building, attached and brick-veneered, which was finished and dedicated in 1951.

Rev. Croft is also Pastor of a group of churches in Edgefield County: Mountain Creek, Gilgal, Rehoboth and Berea.

He is the third pastor of Bold Spring to serve a long term. He is very much beloved by the members and the community who hope that he will continue to serve them many more years.

BETHEL METHODIST CHURCH

The reminiscences of Mrs. W. H. Smith of Cold Water, Ga., reveal that the Methodist Church, now called Bethel, but formerly called Reedy Creek Church, was in existence in 1815 or earlier. Early records have been lost but it is known that the church was removed from its location on Reedy Creek, near the Phillip Cook home in 1839 to its present location and called Bethel.

This church is located in the Callison section of Greenwood County, formerly Edgefield County. The membership was larger when there was no Baptist church in the community than at the present time. Methodists predominated after the Lutheran church of St. George on Hard Labor and the German Protestant church, Queen Charlotte, near McKendree were abandoned by the Lutherans, Methodists taking over at both places. Between these two, Reedy Creek and Mt. Vernon were located. Bethany was the nearest Baptist church for the community. Bold Spring was organized later. Mt. Moriah and Damascus were accessible. Rehoboth M. E. church, eight miles away belonged to the same charge.

Descendants of some of the first members of Bethel still remain in the community and worship there now, supporting and promoting its work in a very creditable manner. It has been a great power for good throughout the years.

Families mentioned in the records as having belonged there are: Wren, Quattlebaum, Rhodes, Rush, Witt, Miller, Etheridge, Dorn, Penn, Jordan, Johnson, Henderson, Goff, Rearden, Moseley, Langley, Aiton, Owens, Harter.

A note in the minutes of 1867 reads: We report the death of our good old sister, Delila Rush, who departed this life on Saturday, 30th of August, 1867 in her seventy-third year. She is gone from the troubles and perplexities of this life to the Land of Rest promised to all the faithful in Christ the Lord.

Another reads: Jane Miller died Dec. 17, 1874 in the 70th year of her age, was a member of Reedy Creek when quite young, more than fifty years.

Old time Revivals were held annually during the summer, usually in August. One especially recalled by the older members was in session when the Charleston earthquake came in August, 1886. It was somewhat severe in

this section and was their first experience with an earthquake, so many didn't know what it was and were very much excited. Neighbors, white and black, began to assemble at the home of William Quattlebaum near the church. When a number had gathered there, they looked across the field and saw another group coming with lighted torches, they saw only the "lightwood" torches and not the bearers and the colored people began screaming and praying, thinking that Judgment Day had come and the world was on fire.

Needless to say, there was a great Revival next day at old Bethel with great shouting and praising the Lord. The house was running over and the churchyard was full of people. These meetings were all-day meetings with dinner on the grounds, served at tables with various groups.

Quite a number of notable "Circuit Riders" came this way and served nobly amid hardships, making their way through cold and muddy weather as well as summer heat, on horseback. They were strict in discipline and "long winded" when they preached. Sermons continued for hours instead of minutes as the present day. Members were required to attend the Classes or Quarterly meetings or be "turned out." Dancing and card playing were not allowed. Members with loose morals and of dishonest dealings were turned out after a public hearing before the church.

All preachers of all denominations preached long sermons in those days, and it is recorded that some parents severely punished their children if they dropped off to sleep during the sermon.

Some of the faithful who served Bethel during the years were: The Revs. David Walker, 1846; J. W. Wightman, 1848; William Mouzon, 1850; A. L. Smith, 1855; Geo. W. Crayton, 1875; G. T. Herbert, 1867; R. P. Franks, 1877; A. W. Walker. 1878; W. P. Meadors, 1879; Pritchard, Bodie, Attaway, Brown, Phillips, Pooser, Shell, Stokes, Way, Jones, Brown, Justus, Brabham, Wright, Copeland, Strickland and many others earlier and later than these mentioned.

In recent years, one of her sons, Howard Jordan, has gone out as a Methodist preacher, serving successfully in his chosen work.

Few marriages have taken place in the church. Robert L. Quattlebaum and Miss Paris Harling were the first couple to be married in the present building, Aug. 31, 1899. Probably there were others earlier and some later.

REMINISCENCES OF MRS. W. H. SMITH OF COLD WATER, GA.

The Southern Christian Advocate published an article written by Mrs. W. H. Smith in 1898, at the age of 90. She was born in 1808.

She writes about the Reedy Creek Methodist Church in the Callison section of Edgefield County (now Greenwood County) stating that it was in existence in 1815 or earlier. It was located near the Phillip Cook home, in his pasture on Reedy Creek. This has been verified by older members living here since this article was published. This was the former name of Bethel Methodist Church. It was removed from Reedy Creek to its present location in 1839. She says that she was a "native of Shadowfield in Edgefield Dist., S. C. and that John O. Jordan and John Morgan were leaders in the church and they bought the first copies of the Sacred Songster ever seen in the community and the year of this event was 1815. The use of this song book soon became effective in developing religious sentiment in the community. The Rev. James Donelley was the preacher on the Circuit and the Rev. Elijah Byrd was the preacher in the adjoining Circuit. Another Lay leader was Billy Rhodes and the leader among the women was Mary Shellnut, also a leader in the Settlement."

"Peggy Rush was the Patron Saint of the children in the church. She dyed eggs at Easter and gave them to the children." This is, so far as can be recalled, the earliest reference to any use of Easter eggs in this part of the state. One wonders if the influence of the early German Settlement in that part of the state had anything to do with the observance of this custom so early.

Mrs. Smith says "the children would have much fun in going about with the dyed eggs and matching hardness of their hard boiled eggs with each other. One child would hold an egg and allow another to tap his egg against the one held, if one egg cracked when tapped in this way, the cracked egg would be forfeited to the one whose egg did not crack when the ends of the two were tapped against each other. One boy, Amos Weaver, made himself a wooden egg which he dyed and won almost all the eggs in the hands of his fellow players before the trick was discovered. Thus as the old moralist would say 'boys were boys' and up to tricks even in remote rural sections more than 100 years ago."

"The greatest event in my recollection, as a little girl in that community, was when Randal Ramsey eloped with Miss Dorcas Weatherington, and 'Miss Nancy,' the mother of the eloping bride, screamed so, the slaves ran in from the fields to see what in the world was the matter."

"I recall that a Mr. Rountree kept a store in the community and a Mr. Perrin had a store at White Hall. The wealthiest man of the community was Fred Slappy (a name which has completely disappeared from the community)."

"My first teacher was Jerry Martin and he used Dilworth's Speller. Christopher Weatherington taught school at 'Stone Spring' (she did not say where Stone Spring was located, perhaps it was Bold Spring). Sam Stalnaker was constable in the neighborhood. Mrs. John Slappy had a mill on Cuffeytown Creek built by her father, John O. Jordan, the expert carpenter of the neighborhood. Prominent families in the community were Burnetts, Hardins, Hogans, Weavers, Slappys, Walkers, Moseleys and Garners." Mrs. Smith left "Shatterfield" and removed to Georgia. That this community had this name more than one hundred years ago is most interesting.

The Peggy Rush mentioned in these reminiscences was the daughter of David Rush, Sr., who married Phillip Cook, as his third wife, and left here in 1844 to go to Mississippi in a covered wagon. Her son, Absalom Rush Cook, was born enroute to their new home and she died at Heidelburg, Mississippi, before reaching their destination.

The Christopher Weatherington mentioned evidently taught school near Bold Spring. He was a Charter member of Bold Spring Baptist Church.

CALLISON AND ITS NAME

The Callison community was named for Capt. James Callison, a popular citizen who located there in 1852, and became a large land owner, farmer and merchant.

James Callison was a native of Armar County, Ireland. He was born there May 14, 1830 and came to New York as a young boy of fifteen. He lived there and worked for a cousin for two years, then sailed from New York to Charleston, S. C. hoping to find satisfactory employment. On the way the ship caught fire and the passengers had to be removed but he escaped without harm and reached his destination.

After being in Charleston a short time, young Callison heard of the new cotton mill which was being built at Graniteville, S. C. He knew about weaving linen as he had worked at that in Ireland and applied for a place and got it. He worked there several years and then moved to Tennessee with his wife, the former Miss Mary Hall of Graniteville, S. C., but they decided to return to South Carolina in 1852.

They had four children: Preston B. Callison, James W. Callison, Angie Callison and Mamie Callison.

Preston B. Callison married M. Eleanor White. Their children: Edward W. Callison, James Callison, Elizabeth Callison, T. Cleveland Callison, Margaret Callison, Mattie Callison, P. B. Callison, Jr. and Mamie Lee Callison.

James W. Callison married Amanda Hollingsworth. Their children: Clarence Callison, Claude Callison, Grady Callison, Ethel Callison, Lottie Callison, Margaret Sue Callison, Lily Callison, J. W. Callison, Jr., Marie Callison, Talmadge Callison.

Angie Callison and Mamie Callison married Preston B. Kemp (see Kemp record).

James Callison fought in the War Between the States. He organized a company and named it "Reedy Branch Boys." After the war he continued farming and had a store.

In 1876, he was elected to the Legislature from Edgefield County (the famous Wallace House) and again in 1878. He was elected State Senator from Edgefield County in 1880.

He died March 5, 1894 and is buried in the Bold Spring Cemetery.

His son, the late James W. Callison ran a store not far from the old Callison home (the site now owned and run by O. T. Rush) and he kept the mail in the store and it was known as Callison Post Office and today it is a very active P. O. with two outgoing rural routes and one from Greenwood bringing in the mail for the R.F.D. routes. Therefore the Post Office and community still retains the name of its honored citizen, Capt. James Callison.

SHATTERFIELD

More than 125 years have elapsed since the section of countryside between Hard Labor and Cuffeytown Creeks was known as "Shatterfield."

In 1770, Bartlett Satterwhite came from Northampton County, N. C. and took a grant of land in Edgefield County on waters of Hard Labor Creek, but he and his wife, Rebecca, moved to Newberry, S. C. He died in 1803 and she died in 1817.

They had two children: Jemima Satterwhite Glover, Elizabeth Satterwhite Bullock, both widows, with children. He willed them his land. In handling the Estate, this land was listed under different names.

In Newberry land deeds, it is listed "Old Man Satterwhite's Field" on Hard Labor branch waters, in Edgefield, also another "Old Man Satter's Field" and again as "Old Man Shatterfield's" land in Edgefield. When the Estate was settled, Elihu Bullock, a grandson bought out the shares of the other heirs and it was called "Old Man Satterwhite's Field."

It is recalled that there was a tavern on the road near the William Flinn home, run by a man named Satterwhite (or Satterfield) probably the same person that owned the land. This was a public place and was on the road leading to Hamburg or Augusta, Ga., which was the leading market place for this section and also farther up the adjoining counties, and provided a popular stopping place for weary travelers to be refreshed. It was known as "Shatterfield's Tavern." So the name evidently originated from "Old Man Satterwhite's Field and Tavern."

It is not known if Shatterfield was an established Post Office or not, but old letters (preserved) were sent by hand into the community, addressed Shatterfield, S. C. It is a joke, that no one ever owned that he lived in Shatterfield. Strangers passing through often wanted to know how far to Shatterfield were told that it was a little farther on. To this day, no boundary lines have been established as to its area but it was and is a very fine community in which to live.

TO THE ADVERTISER

(Taken from an old Edgefield Advertiser, May 17, 1877) Messrs. Editors,

Having recently had occasion to make a short tour among those hospitable people of Shatterfield to the upper portion of our District I thought it might not be altogether uninteresting to you and the balance of mankind to hear something about them.

But just as we begin to enter the suburbs of that place, we will find living at Shinburg, just behind Liberty Hill, Mr. W. H. Yeldell (more familiarly known as Pony Yeldell) one of Gov. Hampton's Trial Justices, who though young in years, seems to be the right man in the right place—the more so because he did not seek the office, but the office sought him, and because he is not hunting up and encouraging litigation and difficulties between neighbors but is trying to have them amicably settled. He is a son-in-law of our highly and much beloved fellow citizen, Mr. G. J. Sheppard of Liberty Hill, than whom it is said no more honest man has been made, and without detracting or wishing to detract one single iota from the honesty of our friend Sheppard, it may be truthfully said, that our friend Pony is just as honest as his fatherin-law can be, but I have digressed.

Let us return to Shatterfield. There are the Edwards, Stones, Hendersons, Miners, Handcocks, Hollingsworths, Rushes, Johnsons, Flinns and Quattlebaums and a host of other good citizens too numerous to mention, all well-to do farmers, whose farms are generally in repair, with as good small grain crops as any I have seen in the District, and the first cotton I have seen up this spring.

Although this land is not so good as it is in some other parts of the District, its owners know how to manage it, and this brings to mind the old adage which says "there is more in the man, than there is in the land," and this is literally true of the people of Shatterfield, for besides their own homemade composts, they give it just what it needs and that is plenty of good elbow grease, and are not scorching it to death with commercial fertilizers.

They also have but few if any free negroes to be bedeviled with and, like the little boy who said he had no bread and did not want any, if they have no free negroes, neither do I believe they want any. Let it be expressly understand that that little boy did neither grow up nor live in Shatterfield. They also raise their own provisions and do not keep their smoke-houses and corn cribs in Augusta or any other foreign market and their byword is "I live at home and board at the same place."

They also raise their own stock—hörses, mules, cows, sheep, etc. From one to three colts may be seen at the same farm. I have visited Shatterfield at intervals for forty years and never remember regretting that I had gone there, for those people, plain and unassuming, always have something good to eat, and have it so bountifully and are so kind and hospitable with it, if you are not a good hand to say no, and to refuse a good offer, you will eat more than you want or ought to eat before you know it.

Shatterfield is also a good place for longevity. For instance old Mr. Henry Rush and his wife, he having lived his four score and four years and she nearly four score, having lived together more than fifty years and to sce their great-grandchildren growing up around them. He is now afflicted with paralysis and dimness of sight, but she seems to be lively and cheerful and as active as many not more than half her age.

Then there is old Uncle Billy and Aunt Polly, his wife, who have long since lived out the allotted time to man on earth, being each above four score years of age, having lived together nearly if not quite, three score years. Rush and wife are Baptists, Johnson and wife are Methodists, and to find more pious and better people than these, I would not know where to go.

And there is Mr. William Flinn, although above three score and ten years of age, at times almost as sprightly as a man of twenty years and that for his gray hairs would not be judged to be over forty or fifty years of age, and his mother (by the way who was the grandmother of the youngest Mrs. Christian at Edgefield C. H. who departed this life a few years ago) was nearly, if not quite one hundred years of age at her death.

When our troubles with the Northern States were about to commence, Shatterfield withheld not her choicest sons, but sent them forth at once to the front and many of them came back home no more, but died at their posts with their armor on, fighting the battles of their country and filled soldiers' graves as all true soldiers will do.

And it is well known how nobly and how promptly Shatterfield acted when our struggle commenced last summer, for home rule and honest government, and last but not least, we all know how firm and how manly one of her leading spirits, viz., Capt. James Callison, now stands upon the watchtower of the country, at Columbia, still battling for the good of our common cause and country. So you may weigh Shatterfield in the balance, whenever you choose, and she will never be found wanting.

RUSHVILLE AND UNION

Upon the death of Henry A. Rush and his wife, Mary Harling Rush, his home place was bought by his grandson, Joseph Aiton. He kept a store nearby and was instrumental in establishing the Post Office, Rushville, which was kept in the store. He submitted the name to the government, it was approved and established in 1890 or 1891. It was continued for several years until the Rural Free Delivery system was in operation and the name passed.

The community was known as Rushville and referred to by some as Rushtown. There were nearly a dozen families by the name of Rush in the settlement. Many of the Rush women had changed their names by marriage but still resided in the community and nearly every one claimed kinship.

This community was also known as "Union," getting its name from the school in the neighborhood by that name. There were two adjoining schools, one in Edgefield county, the other in Abbeville county and they united to form one school and it was called Union. This part of the two counties was later cut off to form Greenwood county. The community is still known as Union but the school is consolidated with the Bradley school and pupils are transported by bus.

Many descendants of David Rush are still in this section. It adjoins the territory on Hard Labor Creek where the German Palatines settled and among the names found there today are: Rush, Aiton, Johnson, Dorn, Shaw, Deal, Dalton, Burnett, Moore, Arnold, Witt, Quattlebaum, Rodgers and a few years earlier there were related families of Young, Henderson, Duncan,

Pruitt, Harling and Harvley. Among those not related are Patterson, Clinkscales, Williams, McFerrin, Markham, Daniel, and Cameron. Satterfields were late comers and intermarried with the Rush family. Some of the earlier names were Street, Ellison, Steifle, Briskey, Weatherington, Alewine, Langley and others not recalled.

The Union school was the center of the social life of the community. Many fine loyal teachers came there to teach, among the first was Thomas Griffin, a Confederate soldier, very much beloved, others were the Misses Lavinia Neal (who later became an A.R.P. missionary to Mexico), Mollie Creswell, Allie Pruitt, Maude Pratt, Georgia Malone, Carrie Sheppard, Crayton Robinson, Lizzie Eubanks, Minnie Derrick, Vallie Vance Woodruff, Anna Lake, Statia Bradley, Modena Bigby, Emma Dial, Gertrude Burnett and Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Dorn, Mr. and Mrs. Elwyn Bradley, Misses Annie Farris, Adams, Geneva Milford, Veva Barnes, Margaret and Kathleen Mc-Kinney. The girls of the community who taught there were: Misses Mamie Rush, Sallie Rush, Dollie Patterson, Ora Patterson, Alice Clinkscales and Sarah Banister.

Other girls of the community who went out to teach elsewhere: Misses Eva and Josie Rush, Sallie and Mae Patterson, Nora Clinkscales, Allie Dalton, Lois Dalton, Ola and Mattie May Banister, Nell Duncan, Inez Satterfield, Ada and Rosa Markham, Eula Harling and Mr. Hoyt Satterfield.

The school house was the meeting place of the community. Sunday School for many years with services every Sunday p. m., and preaching once per month by a visiting minister. The Rev. G. H. Burton, Baptist preacher served a number of years; upon his retirement the A.R.P. ministers from Bradley came once per month. They were a blessing, especially to those who could not attend church five miles away by horse and buggy. Mrs. Rebecca Duncan was the leader in establishing the Sunday School. Soon after the earthquake of 1886, some of the residents were aroused over the religious condition of the community. Being so far away from the churches they did not attend services regularly and she saw the need and offered her home for the meeting place, which was accepted. After the school house was erected, the meetings were held there, with good attendance and as many as ninety enrolled. Some of the leaders were: George Street, Whitfield and Wesley Johnson, L. P. Harling, J. M. Garvin and Luther Banister, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Clinkscales, J. W. Rush, Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Rush, Miss Agnes Harvley. Great good was accomplished until discontinued after the automobile came into use.

POWDER SPRING

Local history would not be complete without mentioning "Powder Spring." It is located on Hard Labor Creek, in the Union section of the community. It was known and used by the German immigrants that settled on Hard Labor Creek in 1764.

Water from this spring has been generously used throughout the years for its medicinal qualities. It contains many minerals with a decided odor of sulphur. Some medical doctors in the county prescribe it for their patients, especially those with kidney ailments. It has always been free to all who come and get it.

There have been several owners of the Spring in this generation, some of them bought it for development which did not materialize. Several of the Banister family have owned it and it is now owned by Hoyt Banister, a grandson of the first Banister owner.

For two generations, it appeared to be a very small bold spring, bubbling up before your eyes and swiftly running off, but a late owner dug into it to enlarge it and found a large wooden barrel or hogshead around it that had been embedded many years. Since no one living had heard about the barrel, it is presumed that the German settlers used it that way. The barrel soon crumbled after being brought into the air, although it was in a good state of preservation when removed.

Powder Spring is a popular place for picnics and fish fries and a good meeting place for friends and others who come on Sunday afternoons for a supply of water for the week. It has been running strong for many generations and it is hoped that many more generations will take advantage of and enjoy its beneficial qualities when they feel the need of it.

WINTERSEAT

There is a homesite and plantation on Hard Labor Creek, known as Winterseat. It was named by Wade S. Cothran, a former owner, and was in Edgefield County until cut off when Greenwood County came into existence and is now in McCormick County. The original grants for land where the house now stands were Royal grants to William Perrin in 1772-1773 for 350 acres. After the Revolution, there were State grants to his daughter, Cassandra Perrin for 630 acres, and to his son Abner Perrin, for 1,000 acres.

In 1832 there was a Post Office at Winterseat, and a little later, a large store, an inn for travelers on the stage line, large lots for teams, hogs, horses and mules being driven from Tennessee and Kentucky every fall. The store was opened up by Wade S. Cothran. In 1834, he purchased $10\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land from Joseph Hearst for \$10.50 to be used for a Summer situation. This tract was farther away from the creek and mosquitoes and was used only in the summer months and he named it Summerseat. The house was completely destroyed by a tornado in 1850.

John Cothran, a brother to Wade S. Cothran, removed from the Phoenix section in 1836 to Millway, near Winterseat. He bought 2,500 acres of land.

Winterseat was the Lewis S. Simmons Estate in 1840 and was sold for a partition upon a bill of complaint from John S. Allen and wife. It was sold at public outcry, Nov. 2, 1840. The tract contained 885 acres and was bought by Wade S. Cothran for \$4,646.25.

Wade S. Cothran served as Post Master in 1840, but was succeeded by his brother, John Cothran who served until June 30, 1843, then again Wade S. Cothran served until 1947, when he sold the place to John Gaskin who took over the Post Office also, and served until 1850.

The next owner of Winterseat was John L. Harmon. He and his wife, Catherine Harmon, lived there until they were murdered in 1876 by six negroes on the place with robbery for their motive. They also used kerosene and set the house on fire but it did not burn anything except the kerosene. They were caught and after confessing the murder, they were lynched by a large mob of irate citizens. The Harmons are buried at Rehoboth Methodist Church in Greenwood County.

The next owner was Capt. Erasmus H. Youngblood, a lawyer from Edgefield Village, who moved there in 1880. The tract still contained 885 acres. The house was destroyed by fire, April 11, 1896 and Capt. Youngblood rebuilt, the following year, the house that is standing today.

It is still in the Youngblood family. A grandson, Manly B. Timmons lives there and with him, his mother, Mary Youngblood Timmons and an aunt, Miss Lellah Youngblood.

THE SPROULL PLACE

The Sproull place, containing more than 1,000 acres, is located on the old Five Notch road which formerly led from here to Hamburg and Augusta, the market place for this section, also a few miles east of Bradley.

The lovely old house was built between 1800 and 1825 by Capt. James Sproull, who married Rebecca Caldwell, daughter of James and Elizabeth Forrest Caldwell. He was a man of considerable means, ran his large plantation and kept a store.

The large two-story house was well built of best material, hand wrought nails were used and the paneled woodwork was hauled from Orangeburg, S. C., so it is said, and much other material from Charleston. It was surrounded by splendid oak trees and a tall brick wall enclosed the spacious lawn and a long evergreen hedge formed a long walk to the gate of the wall in front of the house but this has been changed in recent years.

The pigeon house on the lawn was the home of many beautiful pigeons of all colors, when this writer was a small girl, and the voices of many peafowls could be heard for many miles around. One particularly fine old fellow perched himself on top of the chimney every night and his early calls were heard by all the countryside before he came down in the mornings.

The Sproulls moved to Rome, Georgia, about 1850, then Dr. M. C. Taggart lived there for several years. It was bought by a Mr. Day who lived there a year or two, then Mr. John Marion Pruitt from near Due West, came down and bought it and lived there until his death. His widow and a daughter, Mary Allie Pruitt stayed in the old home. The daughter later married F. P. Rush and they reared their children there. After leaving their hands, it was bought by Mr. Harry Maxon of Muncie, Ind. and he repaired and improved the house inside and turned the many acres into a cattle farm.

He later sold it to Mr. David Dows of New York, the present owner. It is still the loveliest place in the Rushville section.


OLD SPROULL ANTE-BELLUM HOME

One of the Landmarks of County Bought by H. R. Maxon, of Muncie, Ind.; Restoring Handsome Old House House over One Hundred Years Old is made to look just as it was when First Built. Modern Conveniences Installed but no Changes Made in the Design of the Old House

The old Sproull house in the southwestern section of Greenwood county, about two miles southeast of Bradley, one of the few remaining ante-bellum houses of this part of the State has been bought by Harry R. Maxon, of Muncie, Indiana, and is being faithfully restored in every detail to its former beauty and dignity by Mr. Maxon. Mr. Maxon bought the house and the land early in July from the New York Life Insurance Company, owners of the property, and immediately began the work of restoration. He acquired with the house some fourteen hundred acres of land and he has within the past week placed on the place about three hundred head of white-face beef type cattle from Texas and plans to make the place not only a home for himself and family but to have it support a large herd of cattle.

Built About 1820

The place was last occupied by the late Frank P. Rush who made it his home for many years. The father of Mrs. Rush, John Pruitt, had owned

it for a long time before his death. It was built about 1820 by James Sproull, a large planter and merchant. The exact date of its erection cannot be stated but the year 1820 is approximately correct. It was probably started about 1818 when brick for use in it were made and material collected for the building. In the series of articles published under the title, "Touring Greenwood County" in The Greenwood Index in 1911 it is stated that the house was completed in 1825, the information having been supplied by older persons now dead. Owing to the size and rather elaborate finish for that period the house must have been some time in building. A lady who was connected with the Sproull family stated in 1911 that she had always heard that the cabinet work in the house, the wainscoating, doors, blinds and paneling were made in Orangeburg and hauled on wagons from that place, a distance of about one hundred and seventy-five miles and a very tedious job owing to the rough roads and primitive conveyances of the time. The nails used are all hand wrought. The finished hardware was bought in Charleston, it was said.

Mr. Sproull did not live many years after his handsome home had been completed.

The house and land remained in possession of his family until about 1850 when the remaining members of the family in the old home removed to Rome, Ga. The late Dr. M. C. Taggart lived in the house a few years before he removed to White Hall. Whether the late Mr. Pruitt was the next occupant is not known but Mr. Pruitt bought the place not long after and lived in it until his death and ownership passed to his daughter who afterwards married the late Frank P. Rush.

James Sproull's Family

James Sproull married Rebecca Caldwell who was a first cousin of John C. Calhoun and a member of the well known Caldwell family of Newberry District. Mr. Sproull himself presumably was a native of Newberry District because of the connection by marriage with other families of that part of the State. John Cothran, also a large planter and merchant about the same time, married a niece of Rebecca Caldwell Sproull, as his second wife. John Cothran finally settled just across Hard Labor Creek from the Sproull home at "Millway," the present home of his grandson, W. C. Harrison.

James Sproull, as stated above, married Rebecca Caldwell, of Newberry District, a daughter of James Caldwell and Elizabeth Forrest. James Caldwell was a brother of Martha Caldwell who married Patrick Calhoun, leader of the first settlement in the Long Canes and the father of John C. Calhoun, South Carolina's greatest statesman and whose full name was John Caldwell Calhoun.

James Caldwell, the father of Mrs. Sproull, was captain of a company of patriots under Gen. Andrew Pickens at the battle of Cowpens. He was severely wounded, being cut down by one of Tarleton's Dragoons, but recovered from his wounds and after the Revolution became a leading citizen of Newberry, serving as a member of the Legislature and then as sheriff of the District for many years. Chief Justice J. Belton O'Neall in his Annals of Newberry says of him: "Few men, in any country were as deservedly popular as James Caldwell. Everybody conceded that Uncle Jimmy Caldwell, as he was called, was like Bayard, without spot and without blemish."

Mrs. Sproull was his fifth child. She was the mother of five children who grew up and married. Her eldest daughter married Independence Pearson, who built what was known as the Thomas Place for years and located about two miles north of the Sproull home. Her second daughter, Elizabeth Sproull, married Wade Cothran, a brother of John Cothran mentioned above and they settled "Winterseat" a few miles south of the Sproull place. These were the parents of Judge James Cothran who was the father of Associate Justice Thomas P. Cothran, of the South Carolina Supreme Court. The next daughter of Mrs. Rebecca Sproull and her husband James Sproull, Frances, married the famous Presbyterian preacher, the Rev. Hugh Dickson and known all through this part of South Carolina as "Father Dickson". Mrs. Rebecca Sproull and her husband James, who married Eliza Marshall and William who married Kate Creswell.

The old Sproull Home located on the famous "Five Notch" Road, one of the main highways of travel in the western part of South Carolina, was in ante-bellum times a place of great and abundant hospitality. Located in the middle of an immense plantation, cultivated by a large group of slaves, it was a home of ease and wealth and culture. That it has been restored in every detail of its original design by Mr. and Mrs. Maxon who insist that all the old design must be preserved, is a matter of great satisfaction and pleasure to all lovers of the fine old homes—all too few now—left in this part of the State.

THE MANTZ PLACE

The ante-bellum house, formerly known as the Mantz home, in the Rushville section, is still standing and in good repair. It was built about 1800 or shortly after, supposedly by Mr. Mantz, and is located near the Sproull place which was built about that time.

It was a beautiful place with a large two-story house, situated upon a high hill, surrounded by a lovely flower garden and huge boxwood walks and many large oak trees, but alas, its former glory has departed, the flower garden and boxwood disappeared more than fifty years ago. A negro tenant cut down the boxwood to make a vegetable garden and many of the large oaks have gone into wood.

Mr. Mantz was a wealthy man and slave owner. The tradition is that he had a large sum of money in gold which was buried on the place. The iron wash-pot was missing and never found and a trusty slave foreman said he helped bury the pot in the blacksmith shop and that Mr. Mantz died without removing it. So fortune hunters came from time to time, seeking the buried treasure. The last group came about thirty years ago with a magnetic needle and is supposed to have located it. They did not fill the holes dug and the imprint showed that a container had been removed. They told people in the neighborhood they were testing the soil, but they were never heard from again.

It is recalled that the place has been owned by the following: George Young, Richard Duncan, Dr. Henry, Abbeville, S. C., Mrs. Markham, daughter of Dr. Henry, F. P. Rush, J. Pruitt Rush, Harry Maxon and David Dows, the present owner. Mr. Maxon repaired and remodeled it while in his possession. It is now occupied by W. C. Highsmith and family. Water is pumped from a very bold spring at the foot of the hill into the house.

It was in this house that Mrs. Richard Duncan provided a meeting place for a Sunday School and Prayer Meeting for the neighborhood which was used regularly until a school-house was built near by and services were held at the school-house.
