RESIDENCE OF DEA. JOHN SLAFTER, NORWICH, VT., 1786.

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THE design of this volume is to give a family record of John Slafter, the emigrant ancestor of all who bear his surname in this country, and of his descendants, extending to eight generations. It has been made as full in dates of births, marriages and deaths as patient and extensive research could make it. No work of this kind can be made absolutely complete. The records of towns are all more or less imperfect, and those of families still more so, and few of the latter are preserved after one or two generations. Lettered gravestones are only occasionally found of a date earlier than 1700, and only a small number of the persons who died during the next hundred years were honored with an inscription. There are, therefore, births, deaths and marriages in all families, of which there is no record existing, and their dates can never be accurately ascertained. Circumstances however often enable us to establish the approximate period, and in such cases I have used some expression indicative of this fact.

In addition to the items of information above stated, some other prominent facts have been recorded, such as the offices held, the military service rendered, the Collegiate course of education pursued, and the learned professions filled. In the carlier generations other facts have been stated which might illustrate standing and character, but I have rarely indulged in anything like personal eulogy. The narrative of Dea. John

Slafter, the first settler of Norwich, Vt., is fuller than any others. but as he presents a fair type of the New-England pioneer, of which the family furnishes many examples, the writer trusts to be excused for exceeding in this instance the limits of his general plan. It would have been agreeable, both to his feelings and taste, to write out full narratives of all the adult members of the family; but this would have been a life-long labor, and would have swollen the volume to an impracticable size. Bearing in mind that the primary aim of the work is to give a simple family record, laying the foundation on which fuller narratives may be constructed by any who desire it, the writer hopes his labors will be satisfactory to those for whom alone the compilation has been made.

The arrangement, it is presumed, will be found to be obvious and simple. Ordinal or consecutive numbers are placed against those who bear the name of Slafter, under some of its varied spellings; and also against the names of those whose mother had the same patronymic. If the name against which the ordinal stands is other than Slafter, that of the father immediately precedes it, so that there can be no misapprehension.

Some of the names appear twice. In all such cases the ordinal number at which the name will again occur is placed in brackets immediately following the name. This reference will be obvious as soon as the eye falls upon the page.

If it be desired to trace the line of descent, look in the Index for the name you wish to trace; against it will stand an ordinal number. Turn to this number in the body of the work, where you will find the name, and above it will be found the name of the parent; at the right of the parent's name, in brackets, will be a number, for which look in the ordinals, and above this number, when found among the ordinals, will be the names of the grandparents; and so continue until the line is traced to the

emigrant ancestor. But the pedigree of each member of the family may be seen at a glance. Immediately after each head of a family will be seen, included in a parenthesis, the pedigree in the Slafter line; the first name in the parenthesis being either the father or the mother, as the case may be, the second the grandfather, and so on to John, the emigrant ancestor.

It will be proper to say a few words respecting the family name, which in some of the branches has passed through the usual mutations in spelling. A change of spelling is common in the history of New-England names. In some families important changes have taken place, in others they have been slight, while few have withstood all mutation whatever. The earliest records in which our family name is found are in Lynn, Mass., and it there occurs five times, in all of which it is written Slafter.

After the family removed to Connecticut, in the records of deeds and in the town records in Mansfield, Willington and Tolland, the name is generally written Slafter, but in a few instances, Slaughter. Of the five sons of the emigrant ancestor, Anthony had only daughters, and Benjamin had no children. The name has been transmitted by the three sons, Samuel, Moses and Joseph. The descendants of Samuel have all, down to the present time, written it Slafter. The descendants of Moses also have retained the same spelling down to the present generation, but some of them, a few years since, began to drop the f, under the erroneous impression that the name was originally Slater. Joseph, who stands at the head of the third branch, wrote his name Slafter, in a "petition" to the General Court, dated May, 1718, being then an inhabitant of Tolland (see Waldo's History of Tolland, p. 18), and likewise in the same way in the conveyance of land in the same town, as appears by the record in 1764. But in Killingly, where he resided,

and in Scituate, R. I., where some of his children were settled, the name in the town records is variously written, sometimes Slaughter, but generally in other ways, as Slatter, Slauter, Slatar and Slater, for which variations it is evident that the clerk of the town is responsible.

Joseph, the eldest son of the above Joseph, and grandson of the emigrant ancestor, resided in Scituate, R. I. He was admitted a freeman at Newport, April 3, 1745, on which occasion his name is written Slaughter. In 1774, when a census was taken in Rhode Island, there were residing in Scituate, as heads of families, Joseph, above mentioned, and three of his sons, viz., Joseph, Jr., who afterward removed to Guilford, Vt. (see No. 299), Abner, who removed to the State of New York (see No. 292), and Abial, who continued in Scituate, afterward Foster, R. I. (see No. 314.) Of the above four families, the name in the census was written Slaughter, and a part of the descendants of Abner still retain this spelling, but the bulk of those descended from these families now write the name Slater.

But while the name was written Slafter in Willington, Mansfield, Ellington and Tolland, in legal documents and on gravestones, there is a uniform tradition that it was commonly pronounced Slaughter, and in the early Church records in Mansfield it is, without any exception, written Slaughter.

Slaughter is an old English name, often met with in all catalogues of English surnames. It was the name of one of the colonial governors of Virginia.

From all the facts which we have been able to collect we do not doubt that the original spelling of the emigrant ancestor's name was Slaughter. After the most careful and patient search, we have not found the name Slafter in any of the lists of English surnames, either ancient or modern. The three letters ugh,

coming together, often, in English, have the sound of f, as in cough, tough, rough, laugh, draught, enough. And in the records of Lynn, Mass., and of Mansfield, Conn., and we presume in those of other towns at that period, though not following precisely the same analogy, daughter was often written dafter. and persons advanced in age now remember to have heard it pronounced as if so written. It was not therefore unnatural, that the ugh should be changed into f, and that Slaughter should come to be written Slafter. The historical facts, as we have seen, appear to corroborate this supposition. The changed spelling, viz., Slafter, appears to have been employed by the emigrant ancestor and by all his children in deeds and legal documents, where the greatest care would naturally be exercised, while in church records, where the name was probably written by the clergyman from the sound, as he commonly heard it pronounced, it was generally written Slaughter. We find no evidence that the name was originally Slater. The tendency in the changes in names, as they grew up gradually in New-England, was to abbreviate and render them more simple in orthography. This end was attained by changing three letters in Slaughter into one in Slafter. But if the name was originally Slater, it must have been changed to Slafter or Slaughter by adding in the one case one letter, and in the other three, thus rendering a short name longer, and more difficult both to write and to pronounce. Such a supposition does not seem to us natural, and moreover is not sustained by the early records. That it was originally the old English name Slaughter, and that the ugh was abbreviated into f, as a matter of convenience. and without probably any distinct intention of changing the name, we see no good reason to doubt. This explains all the facts in the case, and accords with the tendency of that period to the change of names.

The members of the family, down through all the generations, have been, for the most part, landholders, and the vocation of the bulk of them has been that of tilling the soil and of mechanics. Where there has been any important variation from this it has been indicated in the personal record.

In ecclesiastical relations there is the usual variety found in all New-England families. These are so subject to change, that it is difficult, in many cases, to be specific and at the same time accurate. No attempt therefore has been made to indicate the ecclesiastic relations of individuals, except in the case of those who have held some official station.

The author begs to state that in a compilation like this, containing so many thousands of facts, it is impossible not to fall into some errors. No pains have been spared to render the work as accurate as possible, and, while he does not doubt that errors will appear, he flatters himself that as few will be found as in most works of a similar character.

In preparing this Memorial the author has received valuable and essential aid from many of the family, and from others, especially from members of the New-England Historic-Genealogical Society, whose rich stores of local and family history have always been at his service. He begs to express his grateful appreciation of the uniform courtesy displayed by those members of the family, who have so readily taken a part in the voluminous correspondence which it has been necessary to carry on, and to tender to them in this explicit manner his most cordial thanks.

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THE SLAFTER MEMORIAL.

1. JOHN SLAFTER.

The emigrant ancestor of the family, which is the subject of these pages, whose name we give above, came to this country from Great Britain, a vague tradition says from Wales, as near as can be ascertained not far from 1680. He appears to have settled at Lynn, Mass., and to have reared a family of at least ten children. The records of Lynn are exceedingly meagre, and his name has not been found in them. His residence in Lynn is a matter of direct tradition from his grandchildren, who were born before his death, and who could hardly be misinformed on this point; and, moreover, this tradition is corroborated by the record of the marriage of several of his children in that town.

As early as 1716, he removed to Connecticut, and purchased that year a hundred acres of land on the Willimantic River, in the town of Mansfield. Two years later, he united with others in the joint purchase of a tract of land containing about twenty-eight thousand acres, in the north part of the same town. At the expiration of four years this property was sold. On the second of May, 1721, he made another joint purchase of land on the same stream, about a mile and a quarter beyond the northern limits of Mansfield, being a tract of land included, or supposed to be, in the old township of Windham, where the deed is found recorded. In 1724, the General Court of the Colony of Connecticut was petitioned to set off this tract, together with a part of Ashford, into a new town. His name appears among the petitioners, with those also of his two sons, Joseph and Benjamin. This being unsuccessful, another petition was preferred in 1727. On this appears his own name, and those of his sons, Moses and Benjamin. The ground of the petition is alleged to be the inconvenience and dangerous consequences of being too remote from any place of public worship. "Being sensible," say the petitioners, "of the great loss and unspeakable we are under, by reason of dwelling so remote from the public worship of God, as also of what fatal and destroying consequence our so continuing may be to our posterity, we do, therefore, with an eye to our present comfort and future everlasting felicity, of us and ours, with a desire, also, to advance the interests, and enlarge the kingdom of our blessed Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, in this wilderness, and chiefly aiming in all these, at the glory of God, humbly address ourselves to your

honors, begging that your honors would so far consider our deplorable state and condition as to find out some way for our relief." This appeal had the desired effect, and the town of Willington was incorporated.

Immediately after the incorporation of the town, he received a deed of his portion of the joint purchase of 1721, which is found recorded among the earliest records of the town. The boundaries as laid down are specially stated to include the "mansion-house of the said Slafter." On this estate he appears to have lived the remainder of his life. The farm is situated on the eastern bank of the Willimantic River, and is about a mile and a quarter above the southern limits of the town. This river runs from north to south, and forms the boundary between Tolland and Willington. Half a mile above the northern limits of the farm, this charming little stream deflects to the east, sweeping round in a graceful curve, forming a complete semicircle, and then resumes its southern course. The railway, which runs along the eastern bank of the river, passes over the river on covered bridges, both at the northern and southern extremity of the semicircle. The lower end of the southernmost bridge rests on the ancient Slafter estate. Easterly from the river's bank, the land rises abruptly, forming an elevation of a hundred and fifty feet in height, as measured by the eye, and then becoming depressed, passes into an undulating plateau. A few rods east of the summit was the "mansion-house" referred to in the deed. It stood in a sunny and protected spot, looking out upon the waters of the nimble Willimantic in their lively flow around the semicircle at the north. The writer visited the spot in 1862. The estate was then owned by Mr. Henry C. Gurley. The "mansion-house" had disappeared, but the walls of the ancient cellar were still in their place. Near by was the decayed trunk of an ancient apple tree, still standing, but in the last stages of decay, the veteran sentinel of more than a hundred years. Its broad base and time-worn aspect indicated that it was planted in the time, and probably by the hand of the emigrant ancestor himself. A few branches were springing from the roots, from which was selected a walking stick, as a memento of the revered ancestor who had the courage and energy to seek a home in the wilderness of America.

At the organization of the town of Willington, soon after its incorporation in 1727, John Slafter was appointed its first grand juror, to which office he was re-elected several years in succession. He was, also, by a vote of his fellow citizens, as appears from the record, clothed with the office of tithingman, an inferior magistracy which has now gone entirely into disuse; but in New England, for a hundred and fitty years, it was esteemed of great local importance. To this officer was committed the guardianship of the Lord's day. His jurisdiction extended over the township, and it was his duty to suppress all secular labor, or travelling except in passing to and from places of public worship. Sometimes, however, he was restricted to the oversight of a certain number of families designated by name. Such persons, therefore, were placed in the office, as, by their wisdom, moderation, dignity and age, we eable to exercise a controlling moral influence, irrespective of the legal authority with which they were invested. Among the early enterprises of the new town of Willington was the settlement of a clergyman. At a public meeting, a vote was passed inviting a certain clergyman to officiate for the term of three months. To this Mr. Slafter took the lead in entering a protest. The ground of his opposition was, doubtless, either a want of satisfaction with the candidate, or disapprobation of any temporary arrangement. For, afterward, at the same meeting, an order was passed for the immediate and permanent settlement of a parish minister. This order, to which he appears to have made no opposition, was carried into effect, and the incumbent remained in the useful discharge of his office till the termination of his life.

Our emigrant ancestor, now probably becoming advanced in years, does not appear again in the records of the town, except as paying taxes for the support of the parish minister.

In 1739, he transferred his estate in equal parts to his two sons, Moses and Benjamin, that part on which the "mansion house" stood being assigned to Moses. Nine years afterward the sons exchanged estates, and a year later Moses disposed of his portion and removed to Ellington, then a part of Windsor, Ct., and Benjamin became proprietor of the homestead. It is presumed that, in the transfer of his estate to his sons, he retained a life interest in it, agreeably to a very general custom in New England, thus securing to the last the home of his earlier years, with the tender ministrations which filial affection alone can render.

In person the emigrant ancestor is said, by tradition, to have been not above ordinary height, with broad shoulders, a powerful osseous frame, overlaid and knit together with strong elastic muscles.

On one occasion, at least, he is reputed to have made proof both of his personal courage and physical strength. During his abode in Massachusetts, the forests were infested with Indians, who made frequent incursions upon the English settlements, often carrying terror and death to the cottages of the emigrants. Returning on one occasion after a brief absence, he found his home invaded by two athletic savages, whose insolent threats and gestures had put his whole household in fear of instant death. Assuming the authority which belongs to the lord of the castle, they were at once ordered to leave. Obedience to this command was haughtily refused. Fastening his eye upon the leader, the second injunction was followed, with the quickness almost of lightning, by a blow from his clenched hand, put forth with all the energy of his powerful frame, which laid the savage prostrate at his feet. The other, awed by this lesson, showed only signs of fear, and with humble promises on the part of both they were permitted to depart, and never afterward ventured to repeat their visit.

The time of his death is not known. As his son Benjamin sold, in 1754, the estate which he had received from him, it is conjectured that his death occurred anterior to that date. He was probably buried in the ancient cometery in Willington. There are very few inscriptions on the headstones of the early burials, and none is to be found bearing his name. There is a very clear and direct tradition of his great age, of his last illness and death, and of the veneration and esteem in which he was held in Willington, long after he had passed away. Of his wife we find no record whatever. The date of the birth of his children, with the exception of Mary and Samuel, is conjectural, and whether they are arranged in the order of birth in the following list, is uncertain. That he had ten children is evident from the fact, that his son Benjamin left in his will, the residue of his property, after the decease of his wife, to his "nine brothers and sisters," or their heirs. The names of nine of the ten children, with some historical notice, are contained in this memorial. The tenth child may have had no family, and have left no record. There are, however, many circumstaces which point to James Shafter, the ancestor of the Hon. Judge Shafter, of California, as the tenth child, but the evidence is not absolute, and his genealogy is not contained in the body of this work.

The children of John Slafter were as follows. The place of their birth was probably Lynn, Mass. :---

He was grandson of Thomas Wellman, who was in Lynn as early as 1640, and was the emigrant ancestor of the family bearing this name in New England. Isaac Wellman resided in Lynn for about six years after his marriage, when he removed to Norton, Mass., north precinct, where he purchased a hundred and eighteen acres of land for the sum of £236, lawful currency of the province of Massachusetts Bay, the deed bearing date of "this twenty-third day of May, Anno Domini, 1723, in the ninth year of the reign of our Sovreign Lord George, of Great Britain," &c. In this deed he is styled Isaac Wellman, Jr., of Lynn precinct. The first meeting for the organization of the north precinct of Norton, now Mansfield, was held at his house on Tuesday, August 31, 1731, and the parish continued to meet there, from time to time, for two or three years, until a place of worship was erected.

On the 17th of June, 1740, Mary Wellman, widow, was appointed administratrix of the estate of Isaac Wellman, "lately deceased," and the division of the property was subsequently made to the widow and the four children hereafter named. She continued to reside on her estate in Mansfield, Mass., to the close of her life. In the Mansfield records is the following entry: "Mary Wellman died January 12, 1793, in the 105th year of her age; a religious woman." This is the only personal comment which we have found in the records, and seems to have been called forth by the extraordinary age and exemplary char-

acter of this lady. Her age was 104 years and two months. A greatgranddaughter of hers is now living, (1869,) Mrs. Jesse George of Wrentham, who, when a child, resided in the same family, and remembers her well, being ten years of age at the time of her death. There are, probably, very few now living, who, with like experience, have seen a person born in 1688. She had five children at the time of her husband's death, one of which died soon after, and the name has not been preserved. Her children, the eldest two born in Lynn, the others in Mansfield, with their descendants, are as follows :--

On the 24th of June, the father, Thomas Hutchinson, appeared and forbade the bans; the reason is not assigned. [See Fenton Genealogy.] His first purchase of land in Conn. was, so far as I can ascertain, in Tolland, July 4, 1720. In 1723, he appears to have disposed of his lands in Tolland, amounting to 260 acres, and to have purchased others in Mansfield, the same year, where he continued to reside the remainder of his life. His first purchase in Mansfield was a sixty acre lot, of Robert Fenton, his father-in-law, June 13, 1723, for the sum of $\pounds 29$, lawful money of New England. Another purchase was of the Rev. Eleazer Williams, bearing date of March 13, 1727, and "13th of the reign of our Sovreign, Lord George, King of Great Britain," &c., &c. Other small purchases were made, until his farm reached the dimensions of about a hundred and twelve acres. It was situated in the north part of the town, and occupied the south-west angle of what is now known as Mansfield Four Corners. Among the three hundred and eleven tax payers in Mansfield, in 1753, he was among the twentytwo who paid the largest taxes. He was one of the original proprietors of the town of Norwich, Vt., and was the first Treasurer of the Corporation, which office he held several years. He and his wife early became members of the Congregational church in Mansfield, and in its faith his family were carefully educated. His wife was born, probably, in Woburn, Mass., where her father resided several years before he removed to Conn. They were both interred in the ancient cemetery in North Mansfield, and the headstones, now in complete preservation, bear the following inscriptions :-

"Here lies ye body of Mr. Samuel Slafter. He departed this life July 31, A. D. 1770, in the 75th year of his age.

Death is a debt to nature due, Which I have paid, and so must you."

"In memory of Mrs. Dorothy Slafter, wife of Mr. Samuel Slafter, who died Sept. 29, 1783, aged 83 years.

"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

36. JOSEPH,⁹[6] (John,¹) b. perhaps 1698; d. probably about 1787; m. Esther --; no record of his marriage has been found. The earliest notice we find of him is in 1718, when he was one of twentyfive who subscribed a document sent to the General Assembly of Connecticut, denominated a "petition of us the subscribers, inhabitants of

Tolland, relative to Coventry lands." [See Waldo's Hist. of Tolland, p. 18.] After this he resided sometime in Wilmington, and was a signer of a petition for the incorporation of that town, May 14, 1724. The birth of his daughter Esther was recorded in Willington. On the 24th of Sept., 1724, he purchased a tract of land in Mansfield, Ct., adjoining Samuel Slafter's land on the west, and lying on both sides of the great Cedar Swamp Brook. He sold this property about two years afterward, and removed to Killingly, Ct., where he purchased land in 1735, adjoining land already in his possession. Additions were made in 1742 and 1745. He sold an estate in Tolland in 1764; the deed bears the signature of "Joseph Slafter." At how early a period he came into possession of it, has not been ascertained. No date of his death has been found, but his heirs sign acquittance to title in his real estate, June 16, 1788, and he probably died about that time. His farm was in Killingly, near the line of Scituate, now Foster, R. I. A small burial ground near by, bears the family name, where he, and many of his descendants were, doubtless, buried, but no headstones of the early burials are inscribed. Killingly, Ct.

Her death is recorded in Tolland, as having occurred May 3, 1744, and she is denominated a widow. Samuel Paulk was one of the fifty-one grantees in the deed of the first proprietors of Tolland. He had an allotment of land made to him, May 18, 1719, also Jan. 12, 1721. In 1722, he conveyed a tract of land, situated near Skungamug River, to John Paulk, who is supposed to have been his brother. 51. Moses,²[8] (John,¹) b. perhaps about 1702; d. about 1778; m. Jemima, dau. of John and Abigail (Utley) Scripture of Coventry, May 13, 1743. She was born March 10, 1724. Moses Slafter signed a petition to the General Court of Connecticut, asking for the incorporation of the town of Willington, in May, 1727. He was chosen collector in Willington, Dec. 18, 1740. His father, John Slafter, deeded to him, Feb. 9, 1739, half of his farm, "with mansion house and barn." With him, it is probable, the father continued to reside until he removed from the homestead. He exchanged farms, Jan. 28, 1748, with his brother Benjamin, whose estate was contiguous. The next year, March 6, 1749, he sold the farm obtained from his brother Benjamin, and purchased an estate in Windsor, now Ellington, in "the equivalent," bounded "north on the Stafford lower line, and south on a highway." Here he continued to reside till his death, which occurred not far from 1778. His children were probably born in Willington, except Moses, who appears to have been born after he removed to Ellington.

62. BENJAMIN,²[10] (John,¹) b. perhaps about 1706; d. about 1760; m. Bethia, dau. of William and Mary (Burnet) Eaton of Tolland, Ct., Nov. 11, 1744. She was b. in Lynn, Mass., Nov. 3, 1708; d. about 1764. She was the youngest of her father's family, and was the only sister of the wife of Anthony Slafter. His name is found with that of his brothers, Joseph, in 1724, and Moses, in 1727, on the petitions for the charter of the town of Willington. To him his father conveyed half of his farm in Willington, in 1739. After the exchange of farms with his brother Moses, in 1748, he appears to have continued on the homestead till 1754, when he exchanged it for an estate in Tolland. His will was made Oct. 20, 1756. In this instrument he leaves his personal estate to his wife Bethia, and his real estate, also, so much of it, at least, as she should need for a comfortable subsistence; and, at her death, the residue was to be divided equally among his nine brothers and sisters, and their heirs. In 1760, his estate was appraised, his death having occurred, probably, a short time previously. The following articles in the invoice, indicate the simple habits, as well as the intelligence and religious tastes of a plain Connecticut farmer of that day. The list is as follows: "2 Bibles; Books on Divinity; Powderhorn and Ammunition; Several pairs of leather britches; Warming pan; Pewter; Saddle, bridle and pillion; 2 Wheels for spinning, turning tools and lathe, et cetera." Most of these utensils would hardly be found, at the present day, in the house of a New England farmer. His wife appears to have survived him about four years. The farm was sold by his heirs, May 21, 1764. He left no children. Tolland, Ct.

May 31, 1787. He was brother of Hezekiah Johnson, who m. Dorothy Slafter, and was descended through William,⁴ William,⁹ Major William,² from Capt. Edward Johnson,¹ the renewned author of the History of Massachusetts Bay, printed in London, 1654, commonly entitled, "Wonder-working Providence of Sion's Saviour, in New England." William Johnson sold his estate in Woburn, and removed to Mansfield, Ct., where he died, possessed of a considerable landed property. The children of Joseph and Abigail (Slafter) Johnson, born in Mansfield, were as follows:—

He was descended through Eliezer,* Eliezer,* Jeremiah,* and Joseph,* who came to this country in 1638, and settled in Rowley, Mass., and who is said to have been the son of Edward' Jewett of Lincolnshire, England. He resided in Norwich, Conn., till 1769, when he removed to Pownal, Vt., and late in life removed to Bennington, Vt. He was very active in public affairs in the early history of that State. He was a member of its first Legislature, which met at Windsor, March 12, 1778, and of its adjourned meeting at Bennington, June 4, of the same year, and was placed upon several important committees. He was likewise returned by Pownal, in 1783, 1787, 1788, 1789, 1790, 1791. He was a member of the Convention held at Bennington, Jan. 10, 1791, which ratified the act of Congress admitting Vermont into union with the United States. He was also a member of the Convention of 1793. He was a Justice of the Peace, and was Judge for the shire of Bennington in 1778. He was a Lieut. in the Militia, and was in active service at the battle of Bennington. It is said that, in the midst of the fight, it was announced that the cartridges had given out, whereupon Lieut. Jewett seized a camp kettle, and filling it with powder, dealt it out in a dipper, with his own hand, to the soldiers. At the close of the action he found an unfortunate officer of the enemy wounded and expiring on the field; he gently placed him against a tree, but his cap, belt and sword, no longer useful to him, he bore away. He afterwards learned that the unfortunate officer was the Hessian, Col. Baum, the commander of the expedition. Mrs. Eunice (Slafter) Jewett was a "woman of superior intellect, a Christian in word and deed, of fine manners and of remarkable strength of character." Thus writes her grand-daughter. 

John Slafter was born on his father's estate, which comprised the south-west angle of Mansfield Four Corners. His early education was such as could be afforded by the limited opportunities of a new and thinly settled country. At the age of sixteen, on the breaking out of what is now called the "Old French War," he enlisted as "drummer boy" in a company of Lyman's Regiment, raised and commanded by Capt. Israel Putnam, afterward a Major-General of the Revolutionary Army. He belonged to the party of Rangers under Putnam and the partisan Rogers, which did excellent service in the campaign undertaken for the reduction of Crown Point in 1755. Discharged with the Provincial troops in the autumn, he returned to Connecticut, but the next year enlisted again in the 1st Regiment, 6th Company, Connecticut Volunteers, commanded by Capt. Aaron Hitchcock. He continued in the service, enlisting from year to year, and was at last present at the capitulation of the French at Montreal, Sept. 8, 1760. Three English armies, moving from different points, and from great distances, had most fortunately been able to reach the city at the same time, agreeably to the plan of the commander. Arriving on the 6th of September, on the morning of the 7th, preparations were going forward for a regular investment of the city. The Marquis Vaudreuil, the Governor of Canada, finding himself encompassed by powerful armies, immediately offered a capitulation. While several communications were passing between the commanders, and doubt brooded over the issue, the most intense excitement pervaded the investing army. General Amherst was on the field, and the subject of this notice used to relate that he was so near to him, that he could observe the play of his features, as he gazed upon his watch, and awaited the moment after which, if his terms were not complied with, active operations would immediately commence. And when at length the signal was given that the French had surrendered, such a shout went up from the whole army, reiterated and prolonged, as made the welkin ring again. This was indeed one of the grandest events that had taken place on the Western Continent. An empire was on that day transferred from the French to the English nation.

The town of Norwich (now of Vermont) was chartered by Benning Wentworth, governor of New Hampshire, July 4, 1761. Samuel Slatter, the father of John, being an original proprietor, and being at the first meeting chosen Treasurer of the Corporation, took a deep interest in the settlement of the town. At his suggestion his son John made a journey through the forests of New Hampshire, in 1762, to

examine the territory, and report upon the advantages it might offer as a place of settlement. He found it pleasantly situated on the western banks of the Connecticut, with a good soil, but for the most part of an uneven, hilly surface. He reported it well watered, not only by the Connecticut, but by several small, sweet, clear streams, and by one more important one, called the Ompompanoosuc, an Indian name, signifying "the place of very white stones," whose waters emptied themselves into the Connecticut at the north-eastern part of the town. As he was inclined to engage in the settlement of the new town, the next year (June 7, 1763,) his father transferred to him, as a "token of his affection," all his rights "as proprietor of Norwich." He immediately set out for the new scene of his labors, in company with Mr. Jacob Fenton, his maternal uncle, and Mr. Ebenezer Smith, both of them original proprietors. They took with them a horse, and such implements as were indispensable in beginning a settlement. On arriving at their new possessions, they found themselves alone in an unbroken forest, where the echo of the woodman's axe had perhaps never yet been heard. He first commenced to fell the trees on the river lot, No. 17, which had been assigned to his father's right in the division of the proprietors, which was a mile and a quarter north from the southern boundary of the town. This lot, unlike most others, proved to be a high rocky elevation, reaching to the very shore of the river, difficult of cultivation, unsuitable as a homestead, and was immediately abandoned. A permanent settlement was fixed upon further up the river, opposite the farm of Mr. Timothy Smith, in Hanover, about four miles north of the present seat of Dartmouth College, and where the well-known "rope ferry" was for many years maintained. Here the first "clearing" was commenced, and the first human habitation in the town was constructed. The summer was passed in felling the forest, in burning the wood, and preparing the soil for future culture. In the autumn, when the cold season approached, and nothing more could be accomplished, he returned to his home in Connecticut, and this was repeated four summers, until he married and brought his young wife to his forest home.

An incident occurred during the first summer, worthy of record in itself, and important also as fixing the date of the first settlement of the town. On Wednesday, the 13th of July, Messrs, Slafter, Fenton and Smith left their homes to lend their services for a few days to some friends, who were making a settlement at Lebanon, six or eight miles below. Recent rains had swollen the Connecticut, and Mr. Fenton's horse, in crossing, was compelled to swim for a short distance in the deepest part of the river, which was near the shore to which he was approaching. The horse was carried down the current, and passed under the trunk of a tree, which had fallen into the river, the roots still clinging to the shore. In passing under the trunk of the tree, while leaning forward to avoid being carried from his seat, his horse, rising at the instant, forced him with great violence upon the pommel of the saddle, causing a serious injury of the chest. It was soon found necessary for Mr. Fenton to return, and Mr. Smith and a young Mr. Hovey, who had joined them, accompanied him to his camp in Norwich. They remained with him, doing what they could for him, but the injury proved so serious that he died on Friday of the same week. On Saturday the two young men proceeded down the river on the Vermont side, and endeavored by hallooing, and discharging their muskets, to attract the attention of their friends at Lebanon, and thus communicate with Mr. Slafter, but in this they were unsuccessful. However, on their regaining the camp before night fall, they found that Mr. Slafter had already returned, and been apprised of the sad and unexpected event of his uncle's death. On Sunday morning, assisted by his companions, he proceeded to make preparations for the burial. They peeled the bark from a bass-wood of suitable size, and, with reverent hands and sorrowing hearts, placed their companion within its pure white inner surface, closing it up and making it fast with thongs twisted from the tough bark of the young elm. On the bank of the Connecticut, near to its quiet waters, they placed him in the clean earth to await the resurrection day. A monument of stone was erected, and an inscription placed upon it by Mr. Slafter. This monument remained in its place about eighty years. At length it became broken and some-what defaced. A portion of it is, however, still preserved, and is now in the possession of one of the grand-children of Mr. Slatter. The date of 1763 is so far preserved as to be clearly identified. The 1 is complete; the upper part of the 7 is gone, so is likewise the perpendicular part of the 6, but the 3 is as distinct as when first chiseled upon the stone. This monument still bears testimony to the year in which this death occurred. But if this evidence were wanting, there is yet another record made at the time, which establishes the date of this occurrence beyond the possibility of doubt. In the book of records of births and deaths in the town of Mansfield, Connecticut, is the following entry:

"Mr. Jacob Fenton* of Mansfield departed this life at Norwich in New Hampshire on ye 15th day of July, A. D., 1763."

The grantees or original proprietors held meetings from time to time, for some years after the incorporation of the town, to make such arrangements as the early settlement of the town, and division of their lands, required. These meetings were entirely distinct from the meetings of the "Town," and their doings were made the subject of a separate record, and are still preserved. At one of these meetings "of the Proprietors of the town of Norwich," held on the 17th day of September, 1770, the following vote was passed :-

"Voted, That Mr. John Slafter shall have the privilege of pitching seven rights in the lower meadow, on Ompompanoosuc River; and also Capt. Hezekiah Johnson to pitch six rights in the lower meadow on said river; and Mr. Peter Thatcher to pitch one right and one-half in said meadow; and Mr. Daniel Waterman to pitch four rights in said meadow, on said river; and Mr. James Huntington to pitch one right in said meadow, as a consideration for first coming into the town, and for the burden of first settling said town, being proprietors or purchased."

The inscription upon the monument of Jacob Fenton, the date of his death recorded in the town of Mansfield, and the vote of the proprie-

tors, plainly prove, first, that the settlement of the town was commenced in the summer of 1763; and, in the second place, that Mr. John Slafter was regarded, by the proprietors, in 1770, as the first among the first settlers of the town. This subject has been here referred to somewhat at length, as there seems to have been some confusion on this point introduced by the author of "Sketches of the Coos Country."

Mr. Ebenezer Smith does not appear to have continued in his efforts at a settlement. Mr. Fenton died the first year, while Mr. Slafter passed the remainder of his life in Norwich, and must therefore be regarded as the pioneer in the settlement of the town.

He was married in Mansfield, Ct., in the spring of 1767, and a month after departed with his young wife to his home in the New Hampshire A journey from Connecticut, with a family, was at that grants. time an undertaking of no small moment. The distance was a hundred and fifty miles, mostly through the primitive forest, and the road, for fifty miles at least, was scarcely passable, except for footmen and packhorses. Several families from the same neighborhood were at this time emigrating to the Coos Country, and they accordingly joined together, and "made up a pleasant party." It was decided to "navigate" the Connecticut rather than to encounter the difficulties of an "overland route." Having provided themselves with log canoes, they embarked with their "goods," probably at Windsor, Ct. They left Mansfield on Thursday, the 23d of April, and arrived at their home in Norwich on the 10th of May. Against the current of the river, which was very strong at that period of the year, they were not able to make more than eight or nine miles a day. On Saturday evenings they moored their craft in some sheltered spot, where they remained till Monday morning, devoting the day to rest, diversifying its consecrated hours by reading together the Holy Scriptures, and singing sacred psalms.

In several places in the river the rapids, or falls, could not be passed, and they were obliged to unship their goods and carry them and their boats around, and reload before they could pursue their journey. It was, as we may well imagine, a joyful moment when they arrived at their destination, and were at home in their rude habitations. These were the same as had served during the preceding summers. But preparations had already been made, and before the frosts of winter approached, Mr. Slafter had built, on the banks of the Connecticut, a comfortable and substantial dwelling. As mills for sawing timber had not then been erected within practical distance, the material was fashioned with the axe, without the use of plane or jointer. Small trees, of not more than a foot in diameter, were carefully hewed, halved together at the intersections, and placed upon a foundation, and tier upon tier added, until a suitable height had been attained for receiving the roof. This was formed by placing upon proper rafters, bound together at frequent intervals by ribs or small beams, the thick, impervious bark of the hemlock, or other trees. In this way a covering was made, giving complete protection from the rains of summer and the snows of winter. The floors were formed of plank, hewed and fitted with the axe alone. Their furniture was of the rudest kind. Their tables and chairs were puncheons of basswood, a split log having its faces a little smoothed with an axe, with legs inserted of suitable length. Such was the rude abode of the pioneer. And who shall say, that of a winter's evening,

when under an intense cold, the expanding ice was heard opening its wide seams, reverberating far up and down the Connecticut, or when the north wind was raging furiously without, whistling its dreary dirge over the chimney top, and piling the falling snow in high banks about his cottage door, who shall say that as he sat, with his young wife, before his ample fireplace, with its blazing maple and hickory, that he did not enjoy as pure a happiness as, in after years, when in affluence, he occupied a spacious mansion, and saw his numerous herds and flocks, and his barns bursting with the harvest of his many productive acres?

On the 4th of May, 1784, Mr. Slafter removed from the structure we have here described, on the banks of the Connecticut, to another part of his estate, two miles inland, where, two years afterwards, on the 8th of June, 1786, he raised the frame of the spacious house, which he occupied the remainder of his days, and which is now (1869) the property of Mr. Peter Johnson.

This house, a drawing of which, by Master Theodore S. Slafter, we have given (see No. 586), was built in the style of the more commodious and expensive houses of that day. Its chimney was an immense structure, in the centre of the house, having three ovens, where the family bread and meats were cooked for the table. About the year 1850 it was modernized by removing the chimney and erecting smaller ones, and by removing the "square roof" and replacing it by the more common "gable." The lofty elm represented in the drawing was planted by Mrs. Elizabeth (Hovey) Slafter, a little before, or soon after the erection of the house. In 1867 this tree measured, at one foot from the ground, 16 feet in circumference; at 6 feet the circumference was 104 feet; its branches began to spring at 14 feet from the base; the spread of the limbs, as measured on a line drawn through the centre of the trunk, was 80 feet, or 40 feet on each side. It is an unusually fine specimen of the noble elm, which is undisputably the queen of ornamental trees in New England.

The first meeting for the organization of the town was held in Mansfield, Ct., in 1761, and the annual meetings of the town were held there each year until 1768. At the meeting of 1765 he was chosen selectman for civil affairs. To this office he was repeatedly chosen, the last year he held the office being in 1805, just forty years after his first election to it. He was in some office, by the choice of his fellow-townsmen, in each of the first twenty-five years after the organization, with a single exception. On an average he was elected to one office every year for the period of forty years, and to two offices every other year on an average for the same space of time.

He was entrusted, as one of a committee, by the grantees in 1765, with the duty of allotting and dividing the lands among the proprietors, and laying out highways for the convenience of the settlers, and in 1770 was again appointed to lay out the remaining undivided lands.

When the revolutionary war broke out new and important responsibilities were laid upon him. He was appointed by the "Council of Safety" at Bennington, to take possession of, and confiscate the property of "tories." Hewas commissioned also to procure a quantity of snowshoes, and hold them in readiness for scouting parties, when it should be necessary to send them out. He laid in powder and other amunition, and had provisions stored at his own house "against an alarm." He was one of the Committee of Safety in 1776. In 1782, when a difficulty arose between the inhabitants in the eastern and those in the western part of the state in regard to jurisdiction, he was appointed one of a committee to meet committees of other towns at Thetford, to ascertain whether a union of the territory west of the Connecticut river could be effected with the state of New Hampshire, and on what terms, and to consult upon measures of defence against the enemy.

He was much employed in the administration of justice. As an arbitrator he was frequently called upon, in connection with one or two other persons, to settle disputes, and by the confidence reposed in his judgment, and his conciliating manners, he usually succeeded in establishing "justice" and "peace" where a civil magistrate would have inevitably failed.

In ecclesiastical affairs he held from the beginning a prominent position. We first find him charged with the duty of levying a tax for the support of the first minister. Soon after the erection of the first "meeting-house," he was appointed (in 1782) on a committee to act, as the agent of the town, in making a settlement with the building committee. And in 1801, when a severance of the pastoral relation of the Rev. Lyman Potter, after a long ministry, became necessary, he was called upon to conduct the delicate negotiation. He became a member of the church at its organization, in 1770, and was early elected a deacon, which office he discharged for many years, only withdrawing from it near the close of his life.

In looking over the records of the town, and of the original proprietors, we find him associated in some responsible way, by the suffrage of his fellow townsmen, with nearly every important measure relating to education, religion, or prudential affairs, for a period of more than forty years.

In the settlement of the town there were difficulties to encounter which at this distance of time we cannot well appreciate. The early settler had not only to level the forest, and remove the heavy timber from the soil by burning or otherwise, but he had to do everything with the simplest implements. There was no blacksmith or carpenter to call in for repairs. Even the mill for grinding the "family grist" was at first at Charlestown, a distance of forty miles, and afterwards at Hartland, about half that distance. This journey cost several days of severe labor, in navigating the Connecticut with their log canoes, with several "carrying places" to pass.

The first potatoes raised in Windsor county were the product of "quarter of a bushel" carried by Mr. Slafter on a foot journey from Charlestown to Norwich. After a few years these trials gradually diminished, but others soon took their place. When sheep were introduced they became the prey of wild beasts. To abate this nuisance the state offered a bounty of eight pounds for the destruction of a wolf or panther, and half the amount for that of the young of either of these animals. Mr. Slafter constructed pits for taking the wolf, which proved eminently successful. An excavation was made in the earth with walls inclining inward, and so deep that the animal could not leap from the bottom to the top. It was surrounded by a fence including a small additional space at one end, on which a lamb was secured, the fence being very high at the end where the decoy was fastened. The hungry wolf, frenzied by the scent of his fancied prey, leaping the fence where it was low, fell to the bottom of the pit, and being unable to extricate himself was compelled to await the approach of his captor in the morning. By this and other means of destruction, the farmers of Vermont removed this obstacle to the raising of sheep, for which this state has now become so distinguished.

On the breaking out of the revolutionary war the settlers of the New Hampshire grants were greatly alarmed by the expectation of Indian raids from the north. Memory summoned at once the names of myriads of kindred and neighbors on the frontiers of New England, who in the past had been victims of the scalping knife, or of the more cruel fate of a hopeless captivity. That these barbarities would be again enacted, there could be little doubt. Mr. Slafter did not therefore deem it prudent that his little family should remain, where, under the cover of the forest, the insidious approach of the Indian could not be foreseen, and which was sure to be followed by the most painful, if not fatal results. It was decided therefore that his wife and two children should retire for safety to Connecticut, where both his and her parents were ready to receive them under their hospitable roofs. On the 5th of July, 1776, the day after the declaration of American Independence was read from the window of the old State House in Philadelphia, the three set forth on the lonely and even perilous journey. The distance was a hundred and fifty miles, mostly through the forests, with numerous streams to ford, and temporary, frail and dangerous bridges to pass. Mr. Slafter himself was compelled to stay behind to gather in the harvest; his noble wife was ready to undertake the journey alone for the safety of the dear ones committed to her care. The Mizpah of that morning prayer, "the Lord watch between me and thee, when we are absent one from another," as the patriarch stood up and gave his parting blessing to his little family, was tender, carnest and affecting. They were set across the Connecticut in their little canoe, and as carriages were impracticable and unknown to use in the forests of New Hampshire, the sturdy horse was brought up, caparisoned with saddle and pillion, and numerous packages of clothing, utensils and food for the way, strapped here and there as best they could be for poise and safety. Behind, on the pillion, was placed the little girl, eight years of age, and the little boy, not quite four, on such a seat as could be arranged in front, and so they set forward on their weary journey. But the two that had been joined as one were not separated, but their hearts were still bound up in each other, her memory reverting to her happy home on the banks of the Connecticut, and he in imagination following her hour by hour through all the stages of that painful journey, and both hearts rejoiced together, and put up the oft repeated thanksgiving to God, that every hour placed their dear ones farther and farther from the threatened danger which they desired to escape. When Mr. Slafter returned to his deserted home, he made this entry: "Norwich, July 5, 1776, Elizabeth, Christiana and Farwell set out for Mansfield, driven off by the fear of Indians." The journey was safely accomplished, and on the 31st of October following she gave birth to a son, the only one

of her children not born at her home on the banks of the Connecticut in Norwich.

In 1777, when General Burgoyne made his appearance at Crown Point, the frontiers of Vermont were seriously threatened, and, after the skirmish at Hubbardton, the inhabitants in the western part of the state were left without any protection. The general government had not the means, or was not disposed to offer any assistance. It became a matter of vital importance for the people of the "New Hampshire grants" to raise and support a regiment for their own protection. At this time the state was not fully organized. The civil power was lodged for the time being in the "Council of Safety," appointed by a convention held at Windsor, July 4, 1777. As it was not feasible for the "Council" to levy a tax upon the people generally, the plan was conceived and put into execution by them, of appointing "Commissioners of Sequestration," who seized the goods and chattels of all who had joined the common enemy, and, selling them at public auction, the proceeds were paid to the Treasurer of the Council of Safety, and from a fund thus formed a regiment of Rangers was supported, commanded by Col. Samuel Henrick. In pursuance of these measures Mr. Slafter was charged with the execution of the plan in a district of which the town in which he resided was a part, viz., Norwich, Thetford, Strafford, Hartford, and perhaps one or two other towns. While a considerable revenue by his agency was thus obtained, he executed this unenviable office with so much prudence and moderation, that he did not gain the permanent ill will even of those who were the victims of this severe but necessary measure. He appears, however, on one occasion, to have been in serious danger, though unconscious of it himself at the time. While collecting together the property of one of his "tory" neighbors, the owner was still concealed near the premises, and related afterward, that he levelled his gun at him and was ready to discharge it, but the thought providentially occurred to him, that in case of failure he should sacrifice his own life, as he observed that the Commissioner was himself armed.

The town of Royalton, Vt., though chartered in 1779, had been settled some time previous to that period, and in 1780 had a thriving population, with well stocked farms and comfortable dwellings. On the 16th of October of that year a "raid" was made upon this little settlement by about three hundred Indians from Canada, commanded by Lieutenant Horton, a British officer. Their object was plunder, and a malicious disturbance of the unoffending inhabitants. Besides killing three or four persons, they burned twenty-one dwellings, sixteen barns filled with the year's harvest, destroyed about a hundred and fifty cattle, with many sheep and swine, and took away with them thirty horses, and twenty-six prisoners of war. They made a complete destruction of all the furniture and provisions which they could not carry away. The inhabitants who remained, being mostly women and children, were consequently left entirely destitute of food and shelter. As soon as the intelligence of this calamity to a neighboring settlement reached him, Mr. Slafter, true to the instincts of his generous nature, set about furnishing immediate relief. The family oven was heated, and the whole night was consumed in baking batch after batch of bread, and at earliest dawn he packed it, together with cured meats from his cellar, upon his horse, and led him thus loaded through the forests, over hills and valleys, and streams, for a distance of fifteen or twenty miles, and at the termination of his weary march had the satisfaction, as a good Samaritan, of ministering to these unfortunate victims of Anglo-savage cruelty.

The invasion of Vermont by a detachment of Burgoyne's army under Colonel Baum, which resulted in the battle of Bennington on the 16th of August, 1777, created a general alarm throughout the New Hampshire grants. The citizens flocked with patriotic zeal to the standard of Stark and Warner. Mr. Slafter left his fields, ripening for the harvest, and hastened to give every possible aid in his power, and is said to have acted as an Adjutant in Stark's regiment. He returned to his home after this battle, but again joined the army, and was present at the capitulation of Burgoyne on the 17th of October. He was accustomed to relate that in the French war the king's troops often played Yankee Doodle in derision, and that it gave him a peculiar gratification on this occasion to see his Majesty's troops march to the same tune and lay down their arms.

Mr. Slafter took a deep and practical interest in the subject of education. On the 13th of Dec., 1769, Dartmouth College was chartered by John Wentworth, Governor of New Hampshire, and its location was fixed at Hanover, only four miles from Mr. Slafter's residence. In addition to generous contributions for the erection of the first buildings, he transferred, on the 13th day of Nov., 1770, a tract of land to the Trustees of the College. After referring to the noble franchises and privileges of the Charter, and the generous donations of the Governor, he says, "In consideration of the extensive charity of the design, and in addition to said fund, I, John Slafter of Norwich, in the province of New York, have given, and granted, and by these presents do absolutely give, grant, consign, and confirm to the Trustees of said Dartmouth College, and to their successors in that trust, for the use and benefit of said College, one half of the hundred acre lot drawn to the original of Samuel Slafter, in the 2nd Division of the hundred acres in said Norwich, it being the 16th east of the four mile and a half highway, to have and to hold." This gift to the College must have comprised one-tenth of his landed estate. In private charity he was never found wanting, From his ample stock of provisions the destitute were not sent away unsupplied. The widow and the orphan found in him a sympathizing friend. In business his word was as sacred as his bond. In private and public duties he was prompt and efficient. And while he contributed largely to the happiness of others, Providence conferred upon him that most desirable of gifts, a serene, sunny old age. He was executor of his own will, and had the luxury of seeing his children and grandchildren in the rational enjoyment of his own accumulations. He gave a farm of ample dimensions to each of his four sons, and an equivalent sum of money to his only daughter. Soon after he reached fourscore years his constitution began to yield, and although on the Sunday preceding he was in his place in church, on Friday, the 8th of October, 1819, he passed to the "better land," and on Sunday he was placed in the little cemetery near the mouth of the Ompompanoosuc, and a simple stone marks the place of his rest. The following is a fac-simile of his signature, at the age of 55 years:

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

He resided for many years on a farm near the centre of the town of Thetford, given him by his father, where all his children, with the exception of two, were born. Late in life he sold this estate, and purchased another in the eastern part of the town, containing 130 acres, and including that given by the town to the Rev. Asa Burton, D. D.. and known as the "Old Parsonage." On the settlement of Dr. Burton, the parish, then comprising the whole town, gave to him fifty acres of land, and contributed fifty pounds towards the erection of a house. The "Old Parsonage," now standing and in good preservation, was the result of the contributions of the parishoners, mostly by their personal labor, and was erected in the summer of 1779. Mr. Slafter remodelled it in many of its internal arrangements, but preserved intact one room in it for his own use, and in memory of the distinguished divine for whom it was erected, and whom he greatly revered. He occupied this apartment in his declining years, and enjoyed without weariness the beautiful scenery, which it commands, stretching along the valley of the Connecticut. The exterior of the old parsonage has not been changed. The trees, however, by which it is surrounded, were planted by Mr. Slafter. The drawing from which the engraving, which we here present, was made, was by his grandson, Master Theodore S. Slafter, sketched in the summer of 1867, and is very accurate: see No. 585. Most of the sixty or eighty clergymen, educated by Dr. Burton, found an agreeable home in the old parsonage. We give a fac-simile of Mr. Slafter's handwriting at the age of 60 years. Thetford, Vt.



SUMMARY.

The number of the descendants of John Slafter, whose names ar recorded on the foregoing pages, is THREE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDREI AND SEVENTY-SEVEN.

Of these TWELVE are graduates of Colleges. TEN are under-grad uates of Colleges, eight of whom did not complete their course, and two are now (1869) members.

SIXTEEN were in the early wars of the country.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIVE enrolled themselves and took part in the defence of the government in the war of the great rebellion.

The number of those who have married descendants of the emigrant ancestor, whose names may be found in this volume, is ONE THOUSAND AND TWENTY.

APPENDIX.

JAMES SHAFTER.

By the will of Benjamin Slafter, of the second generation, it appears that his father, the emigrant ancestor, had ten children, and at the time the will was made, 1756, they were either living, or were supposed to have living issue, as he left the reversion of his estate to his nine brothers and sisters and their heirs. In the body of this work, as will appear on page 4th, we have only included nine children, not having found absolute evidence to identify the tenth. Many circumstances, however, point to James Shafter, the ancestor of the Hon. Oscar-Lovell and the Hon. James-McMellen Shafter, of San Francisco, as the son of John Slafter, our emigrant ancestor. The tradition in relation to the origin of this family, is, that James Shafter came to this country, or was here, early in the 18th Century, that he and his wife died leaving two young children, a son named after his father, James, and a daughter, Mary. The two children were adopted by a farmer residing in or near Framingham, Mass. The daughter in the process of time became the wife of a Mr. Chubb, and removed to Vermont. The son married Miss Esther McMellen, and became a resident of Dudley, Mass. Here tradition begins to be supported by the public records. In Dudley the name of James Shafter is found on a tax bill in 1763. About this time he removed to Richmond, N. H. He was soon after, probably in 1766, killed by the fall of a tree. His son James afterwards settled in Athens, Vermont. As we shall give the names more fully in the several generations hereafter, we need not enter into any farther details at this time.

Among the circumstances which indicate that James Shafter was the son of John Slafter may be mentioned the similarity of the name.

In the extensive and exhaustive researches which we have made among English surnames, we do not find anywhere the name of Shafter, nor do we find it in this country except as belonging to this family. From this circumstance we infer that in its present form it is of modern origin. The names Shafter and Slafter are so near alike that they are frequently confounded. The writer has often been addressed by those not entirely familiar with his name, as if it were spelled with an h instead of an l. James Shafter, being left without father or mother when a small child, might easily have had the l of his father's name changed to h, especially as his guardian may have been an entire stranger to his father. There is another circumstance which renders the supposed connection of the families not improbable. The second James Shafter, who was left an orphan as before stated, was born not far from 1730, and, if our theory be correct, was the grandson of John Slafter. By turning to the record of the birth of John Slafter's grand-children, it will be seen that the first was born in 1714 and the last in 1747, so that his birth in 1730 was about midway between the first and the last, and therefore the time of his birth renders it not inconsistent that his father should have been the son, as we have supposed, of John Slafter. The theory or supposition of this connection harmonizes with all the known facts. The reasons may be briefly re-stated as follows:

1. The similarity of the names is such that the h might easily have been substituted for l, especially in the case of orphan children, where there was no one to correct the error.

2. The name Shafter not being found in England or this country, except in this case, would indicate that it may have been first applied in its present form of spelling to James Shafter of Dudley, and that the name of his ancestors probably had a different spelling.

3. John Slafter is known to have had ten children, only nine of whom can be otherwise accounted for.

4. James Shafter of Dudley, the first of the Shafter family of whom we have any distinct knowledge, was a contemporary of the grandchildren of John Slafter, and might therefore have been his grandson.

From the above facts it seems to us that there is a very strong probability that James Shafter of Dudley was the grandson of John Slafter. The evidence is not absolute, and therefore we have not introduced the genealogy of his family into the body of this work. As the local and family history of New-England shall come to be more generally developed, records which have thus far eluded our search, may, and we trust will come to light, that will clear up the question and leave upon it no shadow of doubt.

The following is an outline of the descendants of James Shafter; a more thorough investigation would undoubtedly give many dates and facts which are here wanting. The following were obtained from the late Hon. William-R. Shafter of Townshend, Vermont:
