Material on Valentine Sevier III above, the one in the third generation, (a brother of Gov. John) can be found in Am. Historical Magazine (published in Nashville) Vol. 8 page 211. He died in Clarksville, Tenn. Feb. 23, 1800. In 1792 Indians killed 3 of his sons. In 1794 (Nov.11) Indians attacked the station and killed another son, Joseph, a son-in-law Charles Snyder, a grandson, John Snyder, and scalped Valentine's daughter Rebecca, also killed his daughter Betsy. Rebecca recovered.

" Zeylonica Xavier, the oldest brother of Saint Francis Xavier, was the direct ancestor of the Seviers of this country. The place of Zelonica's nativity was Castle Xavier in the kingdom of Navarre, which is now and has been a province of France since the latter part of the 16th century, with the exception of a few years when it was under the control of the king of Spain.

"The first protestant descendant of Zeylonica Kavier, was Juan who was in the battle of the Ivy, under Henry the IV, king of France. After the revecation of the edict of Nantes, the descendants of Juan removed to Loraine and adopted the Portuguese mode of spelling the name Sevier. They soon moved to England, when Valentine Sevier, the progenitor of Tenn. family of Seviers was born about 1699. Draper in his "Kings Mountain and Its Heroes", makes the statement that Valentine Sevier and his brother William ran away from their home in England, before they were grown, took passage in a vessel for America and landed in Baltimore prior to 1740. Ramsey agrees with him. But if the late John Mathes, of Jonesboro, is correct as to when Valentine Sevier was born, and Draper is correct about the ages of the brothers when they left home, Valentine and William Sevier must have arrived in Baltimore prior to 1720. As to this brother William, the writer must confess he never heard of him until he read the mention in Draper's history.

"Valentine Sevier m Miss Jaznna Good, said to have been a native of Baltimore. They settled in that part of Augusta co., Va. that is now known as Shenandoah county, near the town of New Market, where their son John Sevier was b. Sept. 23, 1745. Valentine Sevier II was b in 1747 and Robert in 1749. Abraham and Joseph were the other two sons. If there were daughters in the family the writer has been unable to find mention of them in history or tradition.

"Valentine Sevier, Sr. came with his family to the Holston settlements in 1771. He removed in 1772 to the Watauga settlements and located on a farm on the north side of the Wataugariver, the territory now embraces and known as Hart's ford. It also included the Turkeytown settlement. Valentine Sevier sold this farm to Leonard Hart in the year 1796. Mr. Hart d in 1850. The latter was the great grandfather of Harrison Hendrix, who now lives at Watauga, 5 miles above Johnson City. Mr. Hendrix is an old man and remembers his grandfather. He says if John Sevier's first wife was living when the family came to Tenn., she is buried in the grave yard at Turkeytown. The John Sevier farm which joined his father's was bot by Peter Slagle and is now in the possession of Peter Slagle, a lineal descendant.

"Valentine Sevier, Sr. d near Elizabeth town, Tenn., in 1802, aged 103. He was buried in Greenhill grave yard on Gap Creek, Carter county, about half a mile from where that creek empties into the Watauga river.

"As to Mrs. Valentine Sevier, the writer knows nothing. No mention of her name is made in history, nor is any tradition handed down. She must have been a very superior woman to have furnished so many men of the character of the Sevier brothers.

"Robert Sevier, the 3rd son of Valentine was living on Nolachucky river when he d. He was the captain of a company of regulators, organized to protect the frontiers from the attacks of the Indians and the hands of Tories. He was a man of superior mind, and was far reaching in his plans; was prominent in the councils and wars of the settlements of Watauga and Nolachucky, Tradition says Robert planned and John executed the different companies against the Indians and Tories. We first find mention of Robert Sevier in Ramsey's annals, as one of the petitions of the state of N.Car. to annex the Watauga, Holston and Nolachucky settlements as a district of that state. This was called Washington district, and afterwards Washington county The petition was sent to the gov. of N. Car. in 1776. Subsequent mention of Robert Sevier is as "Captain" and the gov. of N. Car. As captain of the company he was monarch of all he surveyed. He was a terror to the Tories and horse thieves who infested the country at that time. By executing Halley and James Bradley, the ring leaders, he soon cleared the country of objectionable characters, and by his clear judgment and activity in tar and feathering some of the Tories he made it possible for the settlers to give assistance to N. Car. in the wat against the British. One of these Tories, who had been given a coat of tar and feathers and driven out of the country, afterwards joined Col. Ferguson, and proposed to that officer to pilot his British army across the mountain.

"In March 1780, Gen.McDowell called on the officers of Washington district for assistance against the British army. At a meeting of the militia at the fort in the Watauga settlement, Capt.Robert Sevier was among those selected to go with Colonels Sevier and Shelby to the relief of Gen.McDowell. They were in the engagement at Pacellet, when Col.Moore surrendered the fort; they were also in the fight at Cedar Creek and Musgrove Mills, where decided victories were won. This was in August 1780.

"On receiving a message from Gov. Caswell notifying them of Gen. Gate's defeat at Camden, and advising them to retreat over the mountains, Shelby and Sevier and other men returned home. In less than a month the officers of the Washington district received Ferguson's threatening message thru Mr. Phillips. Sevier, Shelby, and ColCampbell collected all the available forces they had at Sycamore Shoals on Sept. 25,1780, and marched to King's mountain, when on Oct. 7, 1780, the victory was won which eventually caused the surrender at Yorktown.

"It was in the battle that Capt. Sevier lost his life. While stooping over to pick up his ram-rod, he was shot. His brother, Joseph Sevier, assisted him to a spring at the foot of the mountain. A surgeon dressed the wound and advised Capt. Sevier not to undertake the journey home, as it would lessen his chances of recovery. But fearing that if he fell into the hands of the Tories, he would suffer a worse death, Sevier undertook the journey home but within a few days his sufferings were relieved by death. He was buried at the foot of Pine mountain at a place called "Brights". The grave of this brave here is unknown today. No stone or monument marks the place where lie his ashes.

"Capt. Sevier left a widow and two orphan boys. In 1852, Andrew Jackson introduced a bill in the house of representatives for the relief of Charles and Valentine Sevier, sons of Capt. Robert Sevier, but the bill was tabled. In 1860 a bill was introduced for aid of the descendants of the revolutionary war, and Hon. Reuben E. Flenton made a speech in its favor. He arraigned the U.S. in tather a bad light for its unredeemed pension pledges. He quoted the resolutions adopted by congress in 1778:

" Resolved, that the resolutions of May 15,1778, granting half pay for seven years 66 the officers of the army who should continue in the service to the end of the war, be extended to widow, af those officers who have died or shall hereafter die in the service; to commence from the time of such officer's death and continue for the term of seven years Or, if there be no widow, or in case of death or inter-marriage, the said half pay be given to the orphan children of the officer dying as aforesaid, if he should have left any."

"This was offered on August 24,1780 and on June 3,1784 congress declared: That interest of six percent annum shall be allowed to all creditors of the U.S. for supplies furnished of service done from the time payment became due.'

"Has the U.S. redeemed that promise? The writer does not know but if it has not been redeemed the descendants of Capt.Robert Sevier are entitled to the half pay of a captain in the Revolutionary army for seven years, and the interest on that amount for 127 years, which would amount to a considerable sum. Whom Robert Sevier m and some of his descendants will be discussed next week."

Zella Armstrong in letter to Dr. Charles Anderson Sevier 1907:

"I was particularly interested in your reference to your great grand father and his brother running away because Gov. Sevier apprenticed them to a hatter and was eruel etc. Now I have only renently heard the same tradition in a little different form and I know you will be interested. Gov. Sevier's brother, Capt. Robert Sevier, left two sons, Valentine and Charles. Valentine, strange as it may seem, has a son living now and I have recently talked to him. Valentine married a second wife when he was past 90 and this son (whose name like yours is Charles) is no more than 70. That makes it possible for the two lines to vover the period from the Revolution to the present date."

"He told me that Capt.Robert Sevier's widow, Keziah Robertson Sevier, who married a Tipton, joined this stepfather in cruelty to the children and that they ran away because of the step father. He said the resulting family discord and unpleasantness have lasted until now. She had children by the Tipton husband who would be this Charles Sevier's half uncles and aunts. The Tiptons were not friendly to Gov.Sevier you know. The Gov. was administrator of the estate and guardian of the children."

Letter from Selden Nelson of Knogville, Tenn. to Dr. Charles A. Sevier Nov. 24, 1907

"I have nearly completed the descendants of Robert Sevier"(to be published in the Sentinel of Knoxville)"who was killed at the battle of Kings Mt.Oct.7,1780, through his son, Valentine who was circuit court clerk of Greene Co., Tenn. from 1824-78 1854, but have none of Valentine's brother Charles and have been trying to get their address" ---. "My mother was Mary Jones, her mother was Keziah Sevier who married George Jones, a merchant of Greenville, Tenn. in 1825. My father was Thomas A.R.Nelson who defended Andrew Jackson in the impeachment trial.---- Uncle Robert Sevier has a son named Charles at Denver, Colo. Grandfather Valentine Sevier has two sons still living, Uncle Edward Sevier who lives at Ashville, N.C. aged 80 years, and Uncle Charles (the second of that name in that family). He is by the second wife and lives at Bristol, Tenn. He is I suppose about 60 years of age."

Capt.Robert Sevier was Brother of Gov.John Sevier

"The genealogical article of last Saturday" (see above) "discussed the Sevier family, of which Gov. John Sevier and his brother Capt. Robert Sevier were members. The year of Capt. Robert Sevier's marriage is not positively known. Descendants of his son, Major Charles Sevier, claim the latter was born in 1774; while Mrs. Henley says in the American Historical Magazine that Capt. Robert Sevier and Kezia Robertson were married about 1776, basing her calculations on the birth of Valentine Sevier, the younger son, which date is known to have been July 8,1780. She figures the difference between the birth of the children as two years. Mrs. Robert Sevier was a daughter of Major Charles Robertson, of the "Watauga' settlement.

"After Capt.Sevier's death, his widow married a Mr. Tipton, Owing to John Sevier's antagonism to that family, and learning that Tipton was not kind to his brother's children, he found a home for Valentine Sevier with John Wilson, the grandfather of A.B. Wilson of Greenville. This was about the year 1790, and the boy remained with Mr. Wilson a few years. He then went to Greeneville, living with David Deaderick and clerking in the gentlemen's store.

"The records of Greene county show that Valentine Sevier was deputy county clerk, known then as the court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions, Under David Kennedy, who died 1802. Valentine was elected by the county court as Kennedy's successor and held this office until 1810, when the circuit court was organized. He resigned and was elected circuit court clerk, defeating John Gass by one vote, and held the office until his death in 1854. Some of Sevier's political enemies daid of him:
'Old Val was as cunning as a red fox; you might run him a whole night, and then the hounds could not catch or tree him - he would always lose the dogs somehow or other.'"

"Valentine Sevier's records were perfectly kept, and it has been told the writer by some of Mr.Sevier's successors that his records are a pattern of neatness and can be read today, as it it had been written yesterday, altho some of his writing is over 100 years old. He always kept a record of the mms. left in his office. If one was missing, he knew the lawyer who had it last and would call upon him to produce it.

"While Mr. Sevier was the owner of slaves, he did not believe slavery was right. About the year 1840 the question of sending slaves to Liberia and establishing a colony in that country was suggested. ----

"In religion the Seviers have been Presbyterians with very few exceptions."

The above Valentine married Nancy Dinwiddie 1804 had 12 children

Descendants of Major Charles Robertson Sevier

Major Charles Robertson Sevier, according to the book by Zella Armstrong, was the elder son of Captain Robert and Keziah (Robertson) Sevier. He was born in what is now East Tenn., Green Co., in 1778. He went to Overton county in the early 1800's and was commissioned second Major May 13,1806 in the military department of the county.

He married Elizabeth Witt, who was born about 1786. She was the daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Kimbrough) Witt and the granddaughter of Charles and Lavinia (Harbor) Witt of Halifax, Va. The marriage took place in 1800, lorl1801 in Greene co.

It is said that about the year 1790 he went to live with his mother's brother, Charles Robertson on the Chuky river. When Western Tenn. was opened to settlers, Charles went to Madison co. and bot a farm 4 miles from Jackson, Tenn. A few years after his marriage he moved to Brownsville, Tenn. He served with Andrew Jackson He was notorious for being head strong. When his sons refused to vote for Jackson, he said, "If you can't vote for Andy after what he has done for me, you need never darken my door again," and all but John Tinturf and Valentine left for Texas. Valentine later moved to Texas also. The Major was Justice of the Peace in Jackson after the War of 1842. The Major was a large man, greatly interested in politics. It is said that he favored Hames K.Polk for president, and on the day of the election in 1844, he rode into town on a white bull stained with poke berry juice. In 1854, the Major decided to join his sons in Texas, but the long trip injured his health so that he died in 1855 at the home of Valentine, near Milford. Texas. His wife died a few weeks later. No doubt they are both buried mear Milford.

I-Robert Sevier, son of Major Charles Robertson and Elizabeth (Witt) Sevier, we know nothing about. He was married but we know nothing of his family.

II Valentine Sevier (a pronounced as in ah; called Vol), son of Charles R. and Elizabeth (Witt) Sevier, was born in Buncombe co., N.Car. (have doubts it was called that then) Sept.22,1801 or 1800. Relatives disagree on the year. His sister Madge said it was 1800. He d March 2,1894 and is buried in or near Milford, Texas.

March 5,1827, in Huntingdon, Tenn., he married Mary Amanda Murray, who was Scotchelrish. She was b Mar. 3,1813 in Shelbyville, Tenn. and d June 27,1868; is buried near Milford, Texas. Her parents were Charles Murray and Margaret (Christie) Murray. The (probably died in Tenn. before 1852.

Valentine went to California in 1848 and stayed two years. He and his wife moved to Clarksville, Texas in 1852 and to Milford, Tex. in 1852. He was a lawyer,

educated by the uncle for whom he was named. Hy mother says he was in the Tennessee legislature several times but I have not been able to verify that. He was a cultured, refined, well educated man. I have a photograph of him. He was justice of the peace in Milford. He was a practical joker and once put a pig down someone's chimney. The book Old Times in West Tennessee by Williams, a copy of which is in the Chicago Public Library, tells some of "Vol's" jokes in Tenn. Children of Valentine and Mary Amanda Sevier:

4 Charles Sevier, son of Valentine and Mary Amanda Sevier, grandson of Major Charles Sevier, was born Nov.25,1833, and m his cousin, Kitty Daynee Holt, daughter of Elizabeth Sevier Holt. The marriage took place Jan.14,1865. Children:

Amanda Sevier, was born in Huntingdon, Tenn. Dec. 30, 1836. With her parents she moved to Clarksville, Texas in 1852 and to Milford in 1854. It was there she met and married Franklin Wright Jan. 20, 1856. He was the son of Arvin and Katherine (Couter) Wright, who had lived in Salem, Ind. before moving to Milford in 1852. In 1882 Frank sold his farm near Milford and moved the family to Mico. In 1884 they went on west to Jones, Co., arriving April 14. That move was made to benefit Madge's health but proved disastrous financially because the stock died in that semi-arid country for lack of grass and there was seldom enuf rain to produce a good crop. They used to get the crop in and then travel in a covered wagon, camping out, until time to harvest. The rest always improved Madge's health, but she was never well. We think now she was probably anemic. She d June 27,1895. Her husband died April 1,1926. Both are buried in Anson, Texas. Children:

"Dr.JOHN SEVIER OF BROWNSVILLE DIES IN MEMPHIS

"Oldest Practicing Physician in Haywood County Succumbs

"Dr. John H. Sevier, 73, oldest practicing physician of Brownsville and a brother of Dr. Charles Sevier of Jackson, died at 8:50 a.m. today at the Baptist Hospital in Memphis following a stroke suffered three weeks ago.

"Dr. Sevier had been a physician at Brownsville for more than 45 years. He was a native of Brownsville and studied medicine at Nashville and in New York City.

"He was a member of the Methodist church at Brownsville and had been active in civic enterprises for a number of years. Funeral services will be conducted at Brownsville Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

"Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Lee Wagner Sevier; two sons, Dr. Jack and Dr. Charles Sevier of Denver, Colo.; two sisters, Miss Cra A. Sevier and Mrs. Julia Livingston of Brownsville, and a brother, Dr. Sevier of Jackson.

DDr. Sevier's death occasions much genuine sorrow thruout Haywood county where his patients had known to love him for his devotion to them and to his tenderness towards suffering humanity. There was scarcely a home in Haywood county where he had not served either as a family physician or a consulting physician. He was regarded as unusually well endowed by nature and by education for the practice of his profession and was outstanding among the physicians of Tenn.

"When his healthbroke a year or more ago and he was forced to remain in his room, his patients would come to his home for examinations and prescriptions, and he did a splendid practice even after he suffered his first serious illness.

"So intent was he upon the alleviation of suffering and the restoration of health to his patients that he gave little that to the question of whether or not he would ever be paid, and so kind and generous was his spirit that he did a great deal of charity work, giving as much attention to these cases as he did to any of his more substantial patients.

"Having been a visitor to the home of his brother here, Dr. Sevier was known to a number of Jacksonians, all of whom will be grieved to hear of his passing, but thankful that his life was spared for so many years and that suffering humanity was so greatly benefited by his skill and care."

"When the physical life of Dr. John H. Sevier ended, and his spirit passed from among those he loved, and to whom he gave half a century of unselfish service, this community sustained a loss that cannot be expressed in words.

"Endowed with a brilliant mind, he devoted it to his profession; and his skill in medicine, his sparkling wit, and the tender sympathy of his kindly soul, made his presence a blessing in homes that affliction touched.

"Loving God, Dr. Sevier of course loved the handiwork of his Master, and this was especially shown in his love of birds and flowers, in the knowledge of which he was a recognized authority.

"The writer who pens these lines, and who deeply regrest his inability to express the love that prompts them, enjoyed the privilege of an intimate friendship with 'Dr.John', and is grateful for the enrichment of his life because of that association.

"The day on which the tired body of this gentle man was laid to rest was a day in which his heart would have delighted. The April sun shown down as if it were a benediction from heaven, and at his home and in the eemetery his feathered friends poured out their songs from every tree.

"His passing brings sorrow to the hearts of thousands, for his gentle ministrations were a comfort alike to the high and the low, the rich and the poor.
