PREFACE.

The Register of the Sill Family, embraces, besides a full Genealogy, a concise history of the family from the year 1638, arranged for convenience, under nine distinct heads of families who descended from the first settler of the name of Sill, and who married and located as follows: At Lyme, Ct., neighborhood of Silltown, John, Joseph and Andrew; at Lyme, Grassy Hill, Thomas; at Lyme, North Quarter, Jabez; at Lyme, Flat Rock Hill, Zechariah; at Saybrook, Richard; at New Fairfield, Elijah, a Clergyman; at Goshen, Elisha, a Physician.

As far as practicable, I have given in this work the residence or location of all the different branches of the family, together with their respective occupations, and added many items and facts of special interest, which have been gathered in the course of years from history, manuscript records, and well authenticated facts from individuals in the Sill connection, with whom I have been acquainted within the last fifty years.

The Register, which has been some time in a course of preparation, may be considered a brief Family Biography.

Those having children and friends living in other parts of the country, and who would esteem the Register a valuable remem-

brancer of their ancestry, may now have opportunity to furnish it for their gratification.

A book of this kind, on account of the sale being limited to a comparatively small number of copies, is more expensive than one enjoying the general patronage.

The undersigned has given his services without the expectation of reward, and it is hoped that those friendly to this undertaking, will promptly subscribe for a sufficient number of copies to pay the expense of bringing out the work.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTICE.

The obituary will explain, to those who have not heard of my father's death, the cause of delay in the completion and publication of this, his last work.

In endeavoring to carry out my father's design, I have been aided by Henry A. Sill of Cuyahoga Falls, and am indebted to Melvin Lord of Boston, for some items of interest.

Hoping this work may meet the approbation of those interested, it is respectfully submitted.

Died, at Lyme, Ct., May 20, 1859, of paralysis, Rev. George G. Sill, a minister of the Reformed Dutch Church, and a member of the Classis of Albany, aged 68 years and 5 months.

In 1815 Mr. Sill emigrated to Rochester, N. Y., which was then a mere hamlet. Having pursued studies in reference to the gospel ministry, he was licensed to preach the gospel by the Presbytery of Rochester in 1821, and ordained by the same body in 1825. He preached extensively in all the new settlements in the vicinity of Rochester, and was stated preacher for a number of years in the town of Mendon, Monroe county. In 1827 he edited the *Rochester Observer*, the first religious newspaper in Western New York. In 1841 he transferred his ecclesiastical relations to the Reformed Dutch Church. In 1845 he removed to Illinois, where he labored incessantly for a number of years; and was instrumental in building up a church at Brunswick, Peoria county. He afterwards removed to Michigan, and preached at Farmington, and other places. On his return to the East, he supplied occasionally in the vicinity of Albany.

Two years ago he had a slight attack of apoplexy; since which his health and strength have been gradually declining. He was on a visit at his brother's in Lyme, when the last summons came; and it seemed a kind providence that he was permitted to die in his native town, which he loved so much, and amid a large circle of relatives and friends. He resigned his mortal breath within a short distance of where he first received it; and his body is now mingling with its kindred dust.

Mr. Sill was a man of large frame, vigorous original constitution, good mind, genial temperament, and a heart empty of selfishness, and full of warm sympathy and good-will toward all mankind. He was simple in his manners, unobtrusive, unambitious, spending and being spent for others, rather than for himself. Like Leighton, he seemed more desirous of "growing heavenwards" than of growing rich; and has, doubtless, now found a recompense better than "thousands of gold and silver." His diary, which is continuous for a long period of years, affords abundant evidence of his piety, and also of his resignation and willingness to depart when called. And so "his last end was peace."

Mr. Sill was remarkable for the powers of his memory, and for his capacity to identify names and countenances after the lapse of many years. He could wonderfully recall dates and incidents long since gone, and which to others had passed away forever. He was fond of antiquarian researches, especially in the line of families, and never lost a scrap which he had once obtained. He has left behind him in manuscript, a genealogical record of the Sill Family, from its earliest appearance in this country, with copious biographical notes attached, which is the result of much labor. While in Rochester, he compiled and published a *Verse Book of Scripture for Sabbath-schools*, which was very happily designed. And, when in Illinois, he composed and printed a small manual of the history and polity of the Reformed Dutch Church of the United States of America, for circulation among Western settlers, and which must have been of much service. But all these, his earthly works, are now closed.

He has left behind him a widow and two daughters.

SKETCH

OF THE

SILL FAMILY

First Generation from England.

JOHN SILL*

And his wife Joanna came from England in 1637, and located in Cambridge, Mass., about eighteen years after the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth, seven after the settlement of Cambridge was commenced, and the same year in which the college in that place was founded. It is supposed that they lived at Newcastle-upon-Tyne before coming to this country.

They had two children born in England: Joseph in 1636, and Elizabeth in 1637 — married Zechariah Hicks, 28th October, 1652.

Mr. Sill was admitted to the privileges of a freeman at Cambridge, in the year 1638.

* Mrs. Richard Sill of Saybrook, used to say, some forty years ago, that the Sills were of Roman descent. How she obtained this idea is not known, but it may have been suggested by the similarity of the name to that of the Roman General, Sylla.

In some old papers still existing, concerning John and Capt Joseph Sill, their names are written Schill and Syll, though both John and Joseph themselves wrote it Sill.

Both himself and wife were members of the church of which Rev. Thomas Shepard of Cambridge was pastor.

What his occupation was is not known, neither the exact place of his nativity in England.

At what particular time Mr. Sill and his wife deceased is not ascertained. The records of Cambridge show that he was living in 1645, but died before 1662, when his wife Joanna, had a grant of land. She died previous to October, 1671, at which date her will was presented for probate.

Their daughter died 12th September, 1730, aged 93, according to the inscription on the grave stone, still standing in Cambridge.

Second Generation.

JOSEPH SILL,

Only son of John of Cambridge, was born in England in 1636; married Jemima Belcher, 5th of December, 1660.

Sons.—1. Andrew, born 5th February, 1665; died 12th June, 1666.

2. Joseph, baptized 10th March, 1665.

3. Andrew.

4. Thomas.

Dau.—1. Jemima, born —, baptized 31st March, 1667.

2. Elizabeth, born 12th September, 1668; married Samuel Green, a tailor, 18th November, 1685.

Mrs. Sill, the mother of these children, died in Cambridge about the year 1675. She was the daughter of Andrew Belcher, innkeeper in that town, a niece of Lieutenant Governor Thomas Danforth, and aunt to Governor Jonathan Belcher of Massachusetts.

In regard to the children above named, the probability is, that they mostly died young, and that with the decease of Thomas, who died in May, 1709, the name of Sill became extinct in Massachusetts.

The aforesaid Joseph Sill was extensively known as captain Sill, he having been actively engaged in public service in the Indian war of 1676. He is spoken of in Hubbard's history of that war, as being engaged in several expeditions against the Indians in Massachusetts, and also on the Merrimack river, Casco bay and Ossipee in New Hampshire.

After the close of the Indian war in 1676, Capt. Sill removed from Cambridge to Lyme, in Connecticut.

The settlement of Lyme commenced in 1664; and in 1667 it was incorporated, having 30 families and able to support a minister. It was bounded by Connecticut river on the west and Long Island sound on the south, embracing about 80 square miles. How populous Lyme was at that time is not known, but as yet there was no church organized, though they had enjoyed the ministerial services of Rev. Mr. Noyes * since 1666.

On the 12th February 1677, Captain Joseph Sill married his second wife, Mrs. Sarah (widow of Lieutenant Reynold) Marvin of Lyme. Their children were,

1. Joseph,² born 6th January, 1678.
2. Zechariah, born 1st January, 1682.

He resided in Lyme nineteen years before his death, which occurred on the 6th August, 1696, in the 60th year of his age. His two sons, Joseph and Zechariah, were of the ages of eighteen and fourteen at the time of their father's decease. Mrs. Sill, his widow, survived him about nineteen years, and died 17th February, 1715, in the 74th year of her age. They were both buried near Lieutenant Reynold Marvin's, and the inscriptions on their grave stones are still standing in the Lyme burying ground.

* The Rev. Moses Noyes, a graduate of Harvard college in 1659, was the first minister of Lyme. He commenced his labors there in 1666, but there was no church organized till 1693, a period of 27 years, there not being members sufficient to constitute a church. Mr. Noyes was installed in 1693, after the church arrangements were perfected, and spent in all 63 years with his people. He died 10th November, 1729, aged 86 years. He was from Newbury, Massachusetts. (See *Trumbull's History of Connecticut.*)

Lieutenant Marvin, to whom allusion is here made was a prominent man in the town and a large landholder. He represented Lyme in the general court in 1670, and from 1672 to 1676. He died in 1676, aged 42 years. He left three sons who were the children of his widow who afterwards married Captain Sill. Their names were John, Reynold, and Samuel (see *Marvin Genealogies*).

Joseph Sill,² the father of this family of 12 children, was a farmer; and occupied the farm first settled upon in

Silltown for near thirty years, when he purchased improved lands in the North Parish of Lyme, two miles distant, his son John taking the homestead.

He was a member of the Congregational church under the ministry of Rev. Moses Noyes of Lyme, and removed to the North Parish about 1733. He died 10th November, 1765, in the 88th year of his age.

His wife, Phebe, was the daughter of Lieutenant Richard Lord of Lyme, and Elizabeth Hyde formerly of Norwich. She united with the church under the care of Rev. Jonathan Parsons in 1731, and died 4th January, 1774, aged 86.

ZECHARIAH SILL,¹

Second son of Captain Joseph was born 1st January, 1682; married Elizabeth Mather of Lyme. She was born 20th November, 1682. They were joined in marriage on the ——. Their children were,

Dau.—1. Sarah, married Robert Johnson of Middletown, 17th June, 1736; died 28th March, 1774.

Zechariah Sill was a farmer. The family appear to have been mostly members of the Congregational church, of which Rev. Jonathan Parsons was pastor, and united in the years 1731, '32, '36 and '41. Mrs. Sill was the daughter of Mr. Richard Mather of Lyme, and Rev. Increase Mather, president of Harvard college, was her great uncle.

At what period the parents of this family died we are not informed. The stones lying at the head of their graves are so defaced that their inscriptions can not be read, and we are left in uncertainty as to the time of their death.

Joseph and Zechariah Sill were in the possession of

lands lying north of Mill brook, the head of tide water on the east branch of Lieutenant's river, as early as the year 1698. Some few years subsequent to this they purchased more land in the vicinity, and settled their families, about sixty rods apart, on the north side of Mill brook, and about a mile and a half north from the centre of Lyme village.

The two families numbered eighteen children, all but two living to grow up and settle in married life.

The neighborhood has been called Silltown, from the circumstance that five of the name settled on the street half a mile north of Mill brook.

Among the neighbors in Silltown in the olden times were the Dorrs,* the Wades,† and the Matsons.‡ About the time of the revolutionary war, the Dorr connection removed to East Haddam, and subsequently portions of them to New York and Ohio, while some of the other families named remain there still.

There is now (1859) only one family of the name of Sill remaining in Silltown, that one occupying the homestead commenced in 1698. The total of families by the name of Sill living at the present time in what was originally the town of Lyme, is three. In olden times the number was eight or ten.

There were seven sons in the family of Joseph, and two in that of Zechariah Sill. For convenience I shall give separate the genealogies and histories of each branch of the family of nine sons who descended from the first settler by the name of Sill.

* Edmund Dorr was born in Roxbury, near Boston, in 1692, and was a cloth dresser. He settled in Silltown and established his business on Mill brook about 1716. He married Miss Mary Griswold of Lyme. They had five children, viz: Matthew, George, Edward, Eve, and Deborah.

† The Wades settled on the same stream and established a valuable mill seat farther up the east branch on the outlet of Great lake.

‡ Nathaniel Matson was a ship carpenter—came from Boston and settled in Silltown about 1715, and died there in 1776, aged 92 years. Had two sons and seven daughters. Some of his descendants have occupied the same farm to the present time (1859).

Lieutenant John Sill was a farmer, and spent his life in Silltown, on the farm where he was born. He was a member of the church for sixty-three years, having united with it in 1733, during the ministry of Rev. Jonathan Parsons.* He died 17th October, 1796, in the

* The Rev. Jonathan Parsons was born at West Springfield, N.Y., in 1705, graduated at Yale College in 1729, and ordained over the 1st church in Lyme, 22d March, 1730-31, having been called by a unan-

87th year of his age. His first wife deceased 27th May, 1750; his second wife in March, 1783; and his third in November, 1804. His daughter, Sarah, the widow of Ephraim Hubbell, lived many years in Silltown, and died there June, 1813, aged 67.

Fifth Generation.

DAVID FITHEN SILL,

First son of Lieutenant John, was born the 24th April, 1733; married Sarah (daughter of Deacon Thomas) Griswold of Lyme, Black Hall.

Sons.—1. Thomas, born 26th November, 1769.

2. John, born 14th June, 1773.

3. David, born 8th January, 1775; died in infancy.

Dau.—1. Mary, born 27th June, 1768; married Nathaniel Matson of Lyme in 1790, and died 9th January, 1802.

amous vote of the society to become their minister. The population of the parish at that time was about 700 persons. They voted him for settlement fourteen acres of land and house, and a yearly salary of £100, to be paid in money, or wheat at 7s per bushel; rye, 5s; corn, 4s; pork, 5d; beef, 3d per lb. His ministerial services in the parish continued about fifteen years, during which time there was an extensive and powerful revival of religion, generally known as "the great revival of 1740, '41," and large additions were made to the church—nearly 200 in about a year. Some disaffection existing, about 1745, and Mr. Parsons not choosing to remain there under such circumstances, although the mass of the people desired his continuance, he took a dismission.

He afterwards settled as pastor over the 1st Presbyterian church of Newberryport, Mass., and enjoyed there a successful and prosperous ministry for about thirty years. He was the particular and intimate friend of the celebrated evangelist from England, Rev. George Whitfield, and during his last visit attended him in many of his preaching excursions. Mr. Whitfield died suddenly at the house of Rev. Mr. Parsons, on the morning of the Sabbath he was to have preached for him (30th September, 1770), and was buried, agreeably to his own request, under the pulpit.

Rev. Mr. Parsons ended his useful labors on the 19th July, 1776 and his remains were laid by the side of his friend Whitfield, under the pulpit.

2. Louis, born 29th August, 1771; married David Matson of Lyme, and about 1820 removed to Bloomfield, Ohio.

Col. David F. Sill, the father of this family, in early life learned the trade of house joiner. In time of the French war he received a lieutenant's commission from Governor Fitch of Connecticut, in the reign of King George the Second. He was in the service in 1759, on Lake George, Crown Point, &c., and took the first French prisoner at the opening of the campaign in that year. The next spring, 1760, he went with the regulars and provincials, under Lord Amherst, up the Mohawk river and to Oswego. From thence to Oswegatchie, now Ogdensburgh. He was with Commodore Loring on board of the Onondaga, at the attack on Isle Royal (see *Knox's Campaigns*). He descended the St. Lawrence with the army to Montreal, where the French surrendered to Lord Amherst. The war closed and Lieutenant Sill returned to his native place and settled in Silltown.

At the commencement of the Revolutionary war, in 1775, he was appointed captain in Col. Tyler's Connecticut regiment. Such was the feeling in the country upon the intelligence of the Lexington fight (so called) that a hundred men were raised in Lyme in three days and marched for Roxbury, near Boston, under his command.* He rose to the post of lieutenant colonel of the first regiment of the Connecticut line and served with acceptance during the war with England.

* A hundred men raised in three days in a country town, and on their way to the seat of war, was a rare occurrence indeed. But there were many genuine patriots in those days, and conspicuous among them was Rev. Stephen Johnson of Lyme. He took up on the side of liberty about ten years before the Revolutionary war broke out, in time of the infamous stamp act. He wrote essays for the Connecticut Gazette, printed in New London, and sent them secretly to the printer, three or four of which were published, and the eyes of the people began to open. After this other writers came forward and espoused the cause, and when the war did come, Mr. Johnson had the satisfaction of seeing patriotic and faithful men engage in the service of the country, and went himself, as a chaplain, when Boston became the seat of war, in 1775.

After the war, Col. Sill was frequently elected to the legislature, and held the office of justice of the peace and town clerk for fifty years.

The following obituary appeared in the Connecticut Gazette, the week after his death:

"Died, at Lyme, 9th January, 1813, Col. David F. Sill, town clerk, aged 80 years — an officer in the army of the revolutionary war. He possessed a clear head and a sound heart, was brave almost to temerity, yet prudent as brave. Possessing the frankness of the officer and the suavity of the gentleman, with a mind peculiarly adapted to business, he received all the honors of office which his native town could bestow; and having lived a life full of usefulness to the last, is gathered to his fathers, amid the regrets and respects of numerous relatives and friends."

Mrs. Sill, the colonel's wife, died November, 1815.

JOSEPH SILL,⁴

Second son of Lieutenant John, was born 21st February, 1725, married Mrs. Elizabeth (widow of Seth) Lee of Lyme, Grassy Hill, May, 1800.

The above was known as Captain Joseph Sill — he having been engaged in the coasting trade in early life. During the French war he went as a hand on board a vessel, carrying a hundred emigrants (with their domestic animals and furniture) principally from Lyme to the Bay of Fundy, where they landed and located their farms on improvements made by the French who had been driven from Acadia. Besides this, he made several voyages to the West Indies, but his principal voyages were on our own coast. He lived for many years on the farm and in the house inherited from his father, Lieutenant Sill, and died the 2d March, 1813, in the 79th year of his age.

His wife died at Lyme in 1818.

JOHN SILL,³

Third son of Lieutenant John, was born 16th April, 1744; married 1st, Mary Anderson of East Windsor;

2d, Elizabeth (daughter of Mr. George) Griswold of Lyme, Giant's Neck, in 1785.

Sons.—1. Enoch, born 10th October, 1779; died, unmarried, 19th January, 1803.

2. Joseph, born 16th November, 1781, and died, unmarried, in 1839.

3. Henry, born 25th August, 1786.

Mr. Sill learned the trade of joiner and cabinet maker of his uncle, Jabez Sill of North Lyme. He came to Windsor and settled about the commencement of the revolutionary war, and was engaged in trade and mechanical business for many years. Subsequently he was occupied in the cultivation of a farm, and keeping a public house in Windsor street, near the Congregational church. He was an ingenious mechanic and a useful man in community. He died 27th May, 1827, in the 84th year of his age. His first wife deceased 1783; his second survived him twenty-six years, and died 5th April, 1853, aged 91 years.

SILAS SILL,¹

Fourth son of Lieutenant John, was born 17th November, 1749, married Hannah (daughter of Mr. George) Griswold of Lyme, Giant's Neck, 9th December, 1779.

Sons.—1. Richard, born 29th July, 1781.

2. George Griswold, born 26th January, 1791

3. Horace Lynde, born 5th March, 1794.

Daughters.—1. Sarah, born 5th August, 1785; married William Hall, merchant of New York city, in 1806, and died in that place in January, 1810.

2. Mary, born 10th August, 1796; resides in Lyme (1859).

Silas Sill learned the trade of shoemaker and tanner, and carried on the business in Silltown, in connection with a small farm, till within a few years of his death, which occurred 26th October, 1811, in the 62d year of his age.

His widow, with her sons and daughter, removed from

Lyme to Rochester, N. Y., in 1815, where they resided for several years. Mrs. Sill died at the residence of her youngest son, at Brooklyn, N. Y., 12th April, 1834, aged 74 years.

RICHARD SILL,

Sixth son of Lieutenant John, was born in Lyme, Silltown, 18th July, 1755; married Elizabeth (daughter of Col. Francis) Nicoll of Bethlehem, N. Y., on the 2d of May, 1785.

Sons.—1. William Nicoll, born 28th March, 1786.

2. John Lee, born 13th August, 1787.

Richard Sill graduated at Yale College in 1775. He entered the Continental army as a lieutenant, in 1776, was on Long Island at the time of the battle, and with the army at King's Bridge. He spent the winter with the army at Valley Forge, and was connected with the quarter or pay master's department, and the most of his time seems to have been employed at West Point, and towns in the vicinity of the Hudson. In 1782, he was appointed aid-de-camp to the American general, Lord Sterling. He was known as Major Sill.

After the close of the revolutionary war, Major Sill studied law in the office of Col. Aaron Burr, and settled in the practice of that profession in the city of Albany. He was favored with an extensive and successful practice for several years, till his health became impaired.

Finding his health rapidly failing, in the spring of 1790 Major Sill retired with his family to the house of his father-in-law, Colonel Nicoll. While there, the prospect of improvement as to health was so discouraging that he expressed a desire to have some of his family connexions from Lyme, Ct. visit him. For this purpose he wrote a letter with his own hand to his aged father, and an express was dispatched that morning for Lyme. Before the day had passed he was taken worse, and his eyes closed in death on the 4th June, 1790.

The following notice is from the Albany Gazette of June 7th, 1790: "On Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock, de-

parted this life, at Bethlehem, the seat of Col. Francis Nicoll, in the 34th year of his age, Richard Sill, Esquire, counsellor at law and representative to the general assembly of this state for the county of Albany, and yesterday his remains were interred in the family burying ground at that place, attended by a number of his connection and friends from this city.

However customary it may have become to bestow flattering appellations on the character of the deceased, it would be a piece of injustice not to observe on this occasion, that independent of the services of this gentleman in the army of the United States, during the late war, his good sense, affable manners and amiable disposition, added to the strictest integrity in public as well as private life, render his character in the highest degree respectable and his death a public misfortune as well as a most distressing loss to an amiable, disconsolate wife, and two lovely infants."

The widow of Major Sill married a second husband, viz, Doctor Nicoll of New York city, who died in —; also a third husband, Peter R. Ludlow of Albany. She died at Bethlehem, 1821.

Sixth Generation.

THOMAS SILL,

First son of Col. David F., was born 26th November, 1769; married Mehetable, daughter of Samuel Mather, Esq. of Lyme, on 6th November, 1799.

Sons.—1. John, born 3d September, 1800.

2. Henry Mather, born 2d October, 1803, and died at Lyme, 17th October, 1825.

In the death of this young man society is bereft of a most valuable member. His attention to business and his exemplary moral deportment, obtained him the esteem of all his acquaintances. They who knew him well will bear testimony to his worth, and long, very long, lament his loss. But a few days since he was prosperous in business and in health; now, alas, he is no more. Cut down in the morning of life, his fate brings this monition home to the minds of the thoughtless and young: 'Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the son of man cometh.'"

William N. Sill, the father of this family, settled in Bethlehem in early life, being adopted by his grandfather,* Col. Francis Nicoll, soon after the death of his father, Major Richard Sill. He made the old family mansion of the Nicolls, with their beautiful flats and uplands, eight miles below Albany, on the Hudson, the home and place of his residence till the time of his death. He died on the 17th March, 1844, in the 58th year of his age.

Though a man of modest and retiring habits, yet he

* Col. Francis Nicoll, the maternal grandfather of the late Judge William N. and John L. Sill, was of Dutch descent, born in Bethlehem, and inherited a large landed estate from his father, Rensselaer Nicoll, an early settler in the town.

He was a gentleman of the old school, of agreeable manners and excellent Christian character, given to hospitality, and delighted in the society of his friends, keeping up a friendly intercourse with the wise and good of every persuasion.

He was elected to the legislature several times from this county, and was a prominent man also in the Reformed Dutch church, and often attended the meetings of its judicatories as a delegate. He died at his seat in Bethlehem in 1817, in the 78th year of his age.

was called, both as a citizen and a Christian, to act in public life. He was one of the judges of the court of Albany county, a member of the legislature, supervisor of the town, and frequently a delegate to the different judicatories of the Reformed Dutch church, of which he was a member and a ruling elder.

The funeral of Judge Sill was attended at Bethlehem on the 20th of March. The county court being in session at Albany, adjourned over to the next day. Resolutions were adopted by the bar in reference to his death, and ordered to be transmitted to the widow of the deceased and published. His widow still survives, and resides in Albany (1859).

Giles Sill settled in Silltown, on the south side of Mill Brook, about 1773, and engaged in the business of shoe-making and tanning. About ten years after his dwelling unaccountably took fire on the night of a violent northeasterly snow storm. The house was consumed, with nearly all its contents, and three of its inmates; two being apprentice boys, named Joseph Lee Sill and Elias Huntley, and the other a girl, Hannah Reynolds, taken

to bring up in the family. This distressing calamity occurred on the 10th January, 1783.

Soon after this Mr. Sill sold his property, and removed with his family to North Lyme, where he established his business, and resided for about sixteen years.

In 1798, he purchased farm lands, a saw and grist mill, in the town of Northumberland (now Moreau), Saratoga county, N. Y., whither he removed with his numerous family, from North Lyme, in February, 1799, and located one and a half miles west of the Hudson river.

A few years after the removal of the family to their new home, they were favored with religious and educational privileges. A congregational church was organized in 1802, of which Mr. Sill and his wife soon afterwards became members. Subsequently Mr. Sill was appointed one of the deacons of the church, which office he held for many years. He died December, 1839, in the 91st year of his age. ber 16, 1851:—"We perform a painful duty in recording the death of the Hon. Seth Ely Sill, one of the judges of the supreme court of the 8th judicial district of this state, who answered to the dread messenger of death yesterday, the 15th inst., at 4 o'clock, P.M., after a very brief and painful illness of three days. His disease, we understand, was a congestive fever of the most malignant type.

"Mr. Sill was born in the town of Moreau, Saratoga county, (where his worthy parents now reside,) on the 3d of June, 1809, and was 42 years 3 months and 12 days old at the day of his death. He commenced the study of the law with the Honorable Orville Clark of Sandy Hill, and completed his legal education in the office of Sherwood & Hawley of this city, and came to the bar in 1836. At the first judicial election under the new constitution, he was chosen one of the judges of the supreme court, which position he held at the time of his death.

"Mr. Sill was, in the strictest sense, the artificer of his own fame and fortune. Possessed of a mind of unusual power and acuteness, and habits of remarkable industry, he was well adapted to the successful prosecution of his profession. There are few who at his age have achieved so much, and few whose loss would create so wide a breach in the professional, political and social circles. The ways of Providence are inscrutable.

"Pursuing, and well advanced in the path of an honorable and commendable ambition—with a reasonable promise of an extended life of usefulness—possessed of ample worldly means, the rewards of meritorious labor—surrounded by numerous friends—secured by the ties of respect and affection, he is cut down in an hour, and all the strong chords that bound him to existence in time are severed, and while we write his spirit has already entered upon an eternal life.

"None can realize, much less describe, the deep and wide spread desolation that follows this afflicting dispensation. A wife and children, brothers and sisters, an aged father and mother, who loved him and cherished

his growing and honorable fame—a profession of which he was an ornament—the Bench, which he illustrated by talent, learning and integrity of a high order, have in his death suffered a loss that can not soon be repaired.

“A breach has been made in all the circles in which he moved, that must grow wider and wider as one after another of his peers are called to hear the last stroke of the bell of time, and follow to that bourne whence no traveler returns.

“Thus passeth the world away.”

Thomas Sill was a farmer, and settled at Lyme, Grassy Hill, on lands which were obtained by his father, Joseph, and his uncle, Zechariah Sill; and which are mentioned in Lyme records as being their father's (Captain Joseph Sill) right in 2d and 3d parts of 4th division, and Joseph's head right, which allotments were probably made as early as 1716, in which year the two brothers purchased land together in other parts of the town of Lyme. As regards the price of land on Grassy Hill, two and six pence an acre is named.

* Mrs. Sterling had 8 sons and 3 daughters. Three of the sons were lawyers, and settled, Elisha in Salisbury, Ansel in Sharon, Ct., Micah in Watertown, N. Y. The two last were members of Congress in 1821 and '22.

Grassy Hill was a corner remote from the parish church of North Lyme, with very little settlement in those early times. Mr. Sill probably began his improvements as early as 1740, and permanently settled there in 1742. The increase of population in this, as in other parts of Lyme, in the olden time, was moderate, and many long years passed away before the neighborhood of Grassy Hill was favored with the stated means of grace. Since about 1810, a house of worship of the Congregational order has been erected, and more recently a parsonage house. The people now, and for several years, have been favored with regular church privileges and the services of a minister.

Mr. Sill died in 1760, in the 43d year of his age. His widow afterwards married Joseph Emmerson of North Lyme. In subsequent years she removed with that family to Northumberland, in Saratoga county, N. Y.

Jabez Sill settled in the North Quarter of Lyme, as it was formerly called, on land previously occupied by his father, and which came into his possession at the time of his father's decease in 1765. He (Joseph Sill²) had purchased this farm of Eben Mack for £300, as stated in the Lyme Records, in 1730, and in 1746 the Records state as follows: "Joseph Sill deeds the farm he lives on to his son Jabez, with the mansion house and barn — to take possession at his decease."

Mr. Sill was a house joiner and cabinet maker. In

1770 he sold out his possessions and removed with his family to Wilkesbarre, Pa., encountering the hardships of a pioneer settler. In May, 1772, there were only five white women in Wilkesbarre. Mrs. Sill was one of them. The first marriage celebrated in that town was Nathan (afterwards Colonel) Dennison to Elizabeth (daughter of Jabez) Sill. Mr. Sill built the second house erected in Wilkesbarre, on the corner now occupied by the dwelling of the late Colonel Wells.

At the early period of the settlement the people took measures to have the preaching of the gospel established among them. Mr. Sill was the moderator of the meeting which voted, 23d August, 1773, a call to Rev. Jacob Johnson of Groton, in the colony of Connecticut, to settle with them as their gospel minister. His salary to be £60 the year on the present list, and to rise annually as the list rose till it amounted to £100, Connecticut money.

Connecticut claimed what was called the Susquehanna country, and had it under its jurisdiction, hence the Connecticut forms of business.

The early settlers from Connecticut in the Wyoming valley had some severe trials to encounter besides the discomforts attending the settlement of a new country. The Pennsylvanians and Yankees both claimed title to the land and frequent disturbances arose from this source, bringing about an unpleasant state of things. So frequent had been their collisions that they were spoken of as the Pennymite and Yankee wars, and continued for some years. But the most afflictive and appalling scenes were in time of the revolutionary war in July, 1778, when the Tories and Indians attacked the Wyoming settlements. The men were massacred in great numbers, houses burned and the cattle driven off or killed, and those made widows and orphans were left without shelter or food, and distress and ruin spread over all these once flourishing settlements.

Mr. Sill and his family escaped the massacre, and after a time returned with many others of the exiles to Wilkesbarre to begin anew their labors and toils in the settlement made a desolation and a waste.

The conflicting land titles were finally adjusted, and a prosperous state of things was enjoyed throughout the valley. Mr. Sill died in 1790, in the 68th year of his age. His wife deceased about 1810.

Elisha N. Sill settled as a physician in Windsor, Ct., where he practiced medicine for many years. He died in that town 24th May, 1845, aged 84 years. Doctor Sill was town clerk twenty-eight years, justice of the peace a number of years, and representative in the Connecticut legislature two years, and a most useful man in the community.

The following is from Miner's History of Wyoming: "Elisha N. Sill came with his father's family to Wyoming, being then a lad of nine years old. In 1776, then only fifteen years old, he joined Captain Durkie's company, and was in the Millstone battle,* together with his brother Shadrach, who continued in the service till the close of the war; but his youth and extreme privations, with a severe attack of the camp distemper, brought him to the verge of the grave, and he was permitted to return home on furlough. At the time of the invasion he fled with the exiles, and in October, 1779, removed to Connecticut and prepared himself for the practice of medicine. As a physician and citizen he lived a life of usefulness, and died respected and regretted by all who knew him.

* This battle resulted in the defeat of the British, and the capture of more than a hundred of their horses and forty wagons which had been on an excursion for provisions.

Richard Sill was a shipmaster. After his marriage he settled at Ayres point, on the west bank of Connecticut river, in the town of Saybrook, and was engaged for several years in West India and foreign voyages, as well as voyages on our own coast. He afterwards gave up a sea-faring life and became a farmer.

During the revolutionary war in 1775, David Bushnell, a graduate from Yale college, became an inmate in Captain Sill's family, occupying for a long time a room called the blue bed room, about 8 by 10 feet square, where he contrived and perfected that wonderful piece of mechanism called the torpedo, for the destruction of British

ships infesting our coasts (see vol. 2, *Silliman's Journal of Science*, page 94).

Captain Sill died at his residence on the 14th March, 1795, in the 73d year of his age. His wife deceased in April, 1814, aged 82 years.

Elisha Sill settled on the farm occupied by his father at Ayres' point, and has resided there from the day of his birth till the present time (1859). He is a farmer. He has been much in public life, having officiated as a colonel of the militia, justice of the peace, selectman, member of the legislature for several sessions, and for years a deacon of the church of old Saybrook. He is now in the 88th year of his age, and retains his physical and mental powers to an unusual degree. His wife deceased 4th May, 1851, aged 77 years.

Thomas H. Sill was born in Windsor, Ct., on the 11th October, 1783, and graduated at Brown university in Rhode Island in 1804. He completed his law studies with the Hon. Jacob Burnet of Cincinnati, in 1809, and commenced practice in Lebanon, Warren county, Ohio. He afterwards changed his residence, in 1813, to Erie, Pa., where he enjoyed to an unusual degree, the confidence of his fellow citizens till his death.

Mr. Sill was appointed deputy attorney general for Warren county, in 1819, and was present at the opening of the first court, practising from that time until a recent period in the several courts of Erie, Warren and Crawford counties. In 1823 he represented his district in the state legislature at Harrisburgh. He was elected a member of congress from Pennsylvania in 1826, and again in 1828, when he declined a re-election. He was chosen president of the United States branch bank in 1837, and held the office till the close of the existence of that institution. In 1836 he was elected to the convention to amend the constitution of Pennsylvania, and in 1848 a presidential elector.

Feeble health having, in a great measure, incapacitated him for the laborious practice of his profession, he was appointed post master of Erie by President Taylor, in 1847, which office he held till June, 1853. He formally retired from practice in 1852, and died 7th February, 1856. The following is an extract from an obituary notice which appeared after his death in the Erie Gazette:

"This gentleman, who closed his earthly career at his residence, on Sixth street, last Thursday evening, was the senior member of the Erie county bar, as well as one of the best known and most esteemed citizens of northwestern Pennsylvania. He had so long and conspicuously figured in the affairs of this section of the state, and particularly of our city and county, that his name had become a household word—and seldom was that name mentioned without deep-seated respect. Aside from his qualifications as a lawyer, which were of the first order, he possessed traits of character calculated to inspire universal regard and admiration. His deportment was unassuming yet digni-

fied, his disposition kind and accommodating, his general course of conduct based upon principles of acknowledged integrity. As a husband he was attentive and affectionate, as a father kind and indulgent, as a neighbor generous and sympathizing, as a citizen active, honest and true. In short, in all the relations of life, whether as a lawyer, legislator, friend or neighbor, he exhibited a commendable spirit of interest in the welfare alike of the county, state and country, ever sustaining his endeavors to promote and secure the same by a strong and well cultivated intellect and ready and effective eloquence."

Rev. Elijah Sill was a graduate of Yale college in New Haven, in 1748. He studied theology with Rev. George Beckwith of North Lyme; was ordained pastor of the Congregational church in the north parish of New Fairfield, Ct., now known as the town of Sherman. His ordination took place in October, 1751; the sermon on the occasion was preached by Rev. Mr. Beckwith, who made a journey to that remote town for the purpose; and was accompanied by Mr. Sill's twin brothers, Jabez and Richard, from Lyme. The sermon was soon afterwards printed by T. Green of New London.

Mr. Sill continued his labors as pastor of the church at New Fairfield for near thirty years. He removed to Dorset, Vermont, about 1781; what length of time he

preached in that place is not known to the writer, but probably several years. After this he changed his location to Saratoga county, New York, and supplied the churches of Greenfield and Milton till about 1790, when he removed, with his family, to Chenango, then a new country. He died in Burlington, Otsego county, and was buried near the church at the Green, in 1792, aged 68 years.

Doctor Sill was a graduate of Yale college, in 1754. He settled as a physician, at Goshen, in early life, and was long engaged in the practice of medicine. He was one of the magistrates of Litchfield county for many years. In 1777, he was a surgeon in General Wolcott's brigade of Connecticut volunteers, and was present at the capture of Burgoyne's army at Saratoga. He died in 1808, in the 78th year of his age.

After Doctor Sill's death, his wife and youngest daughter, Mary Eaton, removed to Whitesboro, where they resided till their decease. Mrs. Sill was the daughter and only child of Rev. Stephen Heaton, the first minister of Goshen, who was born in New Haven in 1710, graduated at Yale college in 1733, ordained pastor of the Congregational church in 1740, and died in 1788, having sustained the ministerial office in that

town forty-eight years. Mrs. Sill died in 1816, aged — years. Her daughter, Mary Eaton, deceased in 1848.

Theodore Sill graduated at Yale college, in 1797; studied law with Thomas R. Gold, Esq., of Whitesboro, and after the completion of his studies was a partner in the law business with that gentleman till his death. He was known as General Sill of the state militia; was an able lawyer and a prominent business man in Oneida county, where he was an early settler, and extensively known. Andrew Sill was born and settled in Silltown. It is probable that he erected his dwelling house on the little farm he occupied in the neighborhood of his father, Zechariah Sill, about the year 1740. The house, since the recollection of the writer, was a commodious one, fronting the south, in accordance with the fashion of those times, and was two stories high in front, and one in the rear, the sides covered with shingles. The location was pleasant, being on the west side of the street, and affording a fine prospect of Long Island sound and the mouth of Connecticut river. Mr. Sill resided here many years, and until the death of his first wife.

He married for his second wife the widow Pratt of Pettapouge parish, in the town of Saybrook, and removed to that place with some of his children.

He united with the Congregational church in Lyme in 1741, during the ministry of the Rev. Jonathan Parsons, and in time of the great revival, as it was called. The date of his death is not known.

Andrew Sill, jun., was a joiner, cabinet maker and wheelwright, and established his business in his native place, where he carried it on many years, and had the reputation of being a skillful mechanic and useful man.

Mr. Sill was a descendant of the Puritans, and imbibed all their firmness in religious principles, their fortitude in enduring hardships and sufferings, with all their self-denying spirit for the interest of the Redeemer's kingdom. He united with the Congregational church in Lyme under the ministry of Rev. Stephen Johnson,* and

* Rev. Stephen Johnson was born in Newark, N. J., and graduated at Yale college, in 1743. He was ordained pastor of the first church in Lyme, 10th December, 1746, and only about 22 years old at the time of his settlement over the church, which consisted of nearly three hundred members. He was remarkably amiable and benevolent in his disposition, an acceptable preacher, and a useful man in the ministry. He sustained the ministerial office in that place for about forty years, when he was removed by death on 6th November, 1786, aged 62 years.

enjoyed the ministerial services of that excellent pastor till the close of his labors by death, 8th November, 1786, in the 62d year of his age.

About the year 1789, he made a journey of exploration from Lyme to Otsego county, New York, in company with his friend, Jedediah Peck* of North Lyme, afterwards extensively and favorably known as Judge Peck. The journey resulted in their being pleased with the country, purchasing land, and removing with their families and settling as neighbors, in the place now known as Burlington, at that time almost an entire wilderness.

Mr. Sill was a prominent member of the Congregational church in that town from an early period, held the office of deacon thirty-one years, and was a professor of religion for 70 years. In the providence of God deacon Sill was visited, in 1824, with the most severe afflictions, in the removal of his wife and four adult children; two of whom were married, and lived in the neighborhood, and two were unmarried, and lived in the family with their aged parents, together with Mrs. Sill's brother, who was a physician, and had come a distance to attend upon his sick relatives. See Appendix.

Though sorely afflicted and cast down, he was sustained, under these bereavements, through the mercy of his heavenly Father, and could say with Job, "though

* Jedediah Peck was an ingenious mechanic. Having a taste for mathematical studies, he gave instruction, when opportunity offered, to the young men of his native place, in navigation and surveying. After he came to Otsego county to reside, he was much engaged in the business of land surveying.

He obtained some notoriety in the political wars of Otsego, which excited much interest at the time. He was elected to the legislature of this state in 1798, and served as a member of assembly six years in succession, when he was called to the state senate, which place he occupied four years. He was one of the judges of Otsego county, and a useful man in the community. He was in advance of the times in which he lived, being the first to urge legislative action in favor of the establishment of the system of common schools, and the abolition of imprisonment for debt, but failed in his praiseworthy efforts for several years.

he slay me, yet will I trust in him." Deacon Sill lived about eleven years after this, till he had completed the term of 90 years six months and nine days, and died at his residence in Burlington on the 29th October, 1835. He was one of those who, during a long life, walked worthy of their high vocation.

He was not only a defender of the Christian faith, but of the liberties of his country, and when England refused to hear the plea of America, he was one of the first to arm himself for her defence, and was in her actual service for near two years, and afterwards enrolled as a minute man.

Zechariah Sill² was a blacksmith and settled on Flat rock hill, in the 1st parish of Lyme where he purchased a home in 1750. From allusion made to him by old people he appears to have prosecuted his trade skilfully, and trained apprentices in his business. His name appears in the records as one of the school committee of the first parish of Lyme in 1755. His death is noted as having occurred in 1783, which would make his age 66 years.

Mrs. Sill, his wife, removed from Flat rock hill, and also their daughter, Susannah, to West Granville, where their sons Richard and Zechariah had located themselves, but the writer is not able to ascertain the date of their removal, but probably it was between 1785 and 1790. Mrs. Sill died 23d May, 1810, aged 83 years, and Susannah, 23d February, 1827, aged 77. Both were buried at Hartford, Washington county, N. Y., where Zechariah Sill² resided for many years before, and at the time of his death.

Richard Sill was a clergyman of the Baptist denomination, and brought up in Lyme, where he married his first wife. He removed to West Granville, Washington county, N. Y., about 1780. When he began preaching the gospel as a licentiate is not known to the writer, but the history of the Baptist churches in New London county, Ct., mentions the fact of his receiving ordination at Lyme in 1783. He afterwards became pastor of the 1st Baptist church of Granville. While there his health became impaired, and he made a journey to his native place with the hope that the sea air might be beneficial to him, but returned without any improvement. He died 26th October, 1788, in the 34th year of his age. Elder Sill's first wife was Eunice Lee, who died about June, 1788. She was the sister of Elder Jason Lee, the worthy pastor of the Baptist church in East Lyme. His second wife, who was Mary Williams, afterwards married Daniel B. Hicks of Granville.

Zechariah Sill³ was a blacksmith, having acquired some knowledge also in the making and manufacturing of iron, as practised at Hall's forge* in Lyme, where contracts for various utensils were made for the state of Connecticut during the revolutionary war. He was with the American army in the vicinity of Boston, and assisted in erecting the fortifications on Dorchester Heights during the memorable night of the 4th of March, 1776.

After this he enlisted on board of an American privateer, and was captured by a British vessel, and was for some time confined on the island of Bermuda. He finally returned in safety to his native place, and resumed the employments of civil life.

About the year 1785, Mr. Sill removed from Lyme to West Granville, Washington county, N. Y., with his family, where he commenced his business again as a blacksmith, and prosecuted the same for about ten years, or till 1794. In that year he removed to Hartford in the same county, where he made his permanent home and carried on blacksmithing in connection with farming.

*The work done at Hall's forge for the state of Connecticut was such as was required for digging entrenchments, erecting walls and mounds of earth, and making excavations. The army was poorly provided with such things, and hence an urgent necessity of pushing forward the work in anticipation of a movement in the vicinity of Boston. So urgent was the case that Governor Trumbull wrote Mr. Hall to prosecute the work on Sabbath, and all hands were thus engaged one Sabbath. Mrs. Hall, one of the old ladies in the vicinity of Silltown where the forge was established, used to speak in after years of that day, and say it was the most solemn Sabbath she ever saw. There was no unnecessary talking by the men and apprentice boys, but a great solemnity seemed to pervade the minds of all, as if a crisis was approaching which anticipated events of deep and thrilling interest.

Mr. Sill was a justice of the peace for the county of Washington, and deacon of the Baptist church of Adamsville. He died 12th October, 1812, aged 54 years.

"On the 7th of the same month, and of the same fever, Miss Eliza Sill, aged 33 years. She was one of the excellent of the earth. She died glorying in the cross of Christ, by which she was crucified to the world and the world to her. To do justice to her memory would far exceed the limits of an obituary notice. Her exemplary and pious life will not soon be forgotten by the church with which she was connected, nor the society in which she was reared."

"On the 24th of March, Mrs. Helena Sill, the wife of Andrew Sill, and mother of the above deceased, of the same fever, aged 70 years. The life of Mrs. Sill has been like the path of the just, 'that shineth more and more to the perfect day.' She imbibed much of the spirit of her master, occupied a large space in the affections of her family and numerous friends, and while the church has great reason to lament that one of her brightest lights has been extinguished, her family have the consolation to believe that for her to die was gain."

"On the 30th of the same month, at the same place, and of the same fever (to which he had gone to administer medical aid), Doctor Russell Dorr of Chatham, Columbia county, youngest brother of Mrs. Sill, aged 53 years. He has left a young and numerous family to lament the removal of an indulgent and affectionate husband and father. To do justice to the memory of Doctor Dorr as a man, a father, a husband and physician would require a volume. He was one of the most affectionate and tender among men; he ranked high in his profession as a counsellor and practitioner, notwithstanding the state of his health had for years rendered him unable to pursue the practice of medicine assiduously, his counsel was sought in most difficult cases, and he was always ready at the call of the fatherless and the widow, the sick and the afflicted; his memory will long be cherished in the bosoms of an extensive connection."
