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# Foreword

How scant is the information we have of our ancestry. And in the New World, where the family cannot go back beyond ten generations, it appears no hard task to rescue the entire family history from oblivion. ### William Sawyer, Pioneer of Our Family in America

Our English ancestors took their surnames from some distinguishing feature of the place where they lived. from their occupation; it was John Aplake (John by the Lake) or Wil the Sawyer or James the Smith. Thus our surname originated because of the occupation of the "sawyer". There is some evidence show that William Sawyer who came to America was of the same family as Wil Sawyer the popular peasant leader who in England joined with the radicals of Cromwell's day and demanded popular government.

William Sawyer was one of the 71 original settlers of old Newbury who, the monument says. "between 1635 and 1650, founded its municipal, social and religious life." He came first to Salem where he received a grant of land in 1642, which tract is spoken of in the Salem records of 1659 as "Sawyers Playne". The only record I find further of William Sawyer at Salem, is that on October 5, 1642 he witnessed the will of Samuel Smith, who lived in that part now Wenham. Betfield Sawyer (V) adopted the spelling Betfield rather than Bitfield, or Beetfield as used by his father. He was born at Newton, March 25. 1774, son of Bitfield and Sarah Colby, thus linking two old Newbury-Salisbury-Amesbury families.

From the old account book, dated 1815, we find Betfield Sawyer was a methodical man, a good penman, and carried on the trade of the town shoemaker. The account book gives the names of nearly 100 men and women of the town and surrounding towns, among them being the father of Daniel Webster who lived about seven miles away. In 1909 when I made my first pilgrimage to the home of my ancestors, the old home of Betfield built in 1800 was still standing, with most of the rooms habitable but deserted. A plain, unpainted medium sized house.
