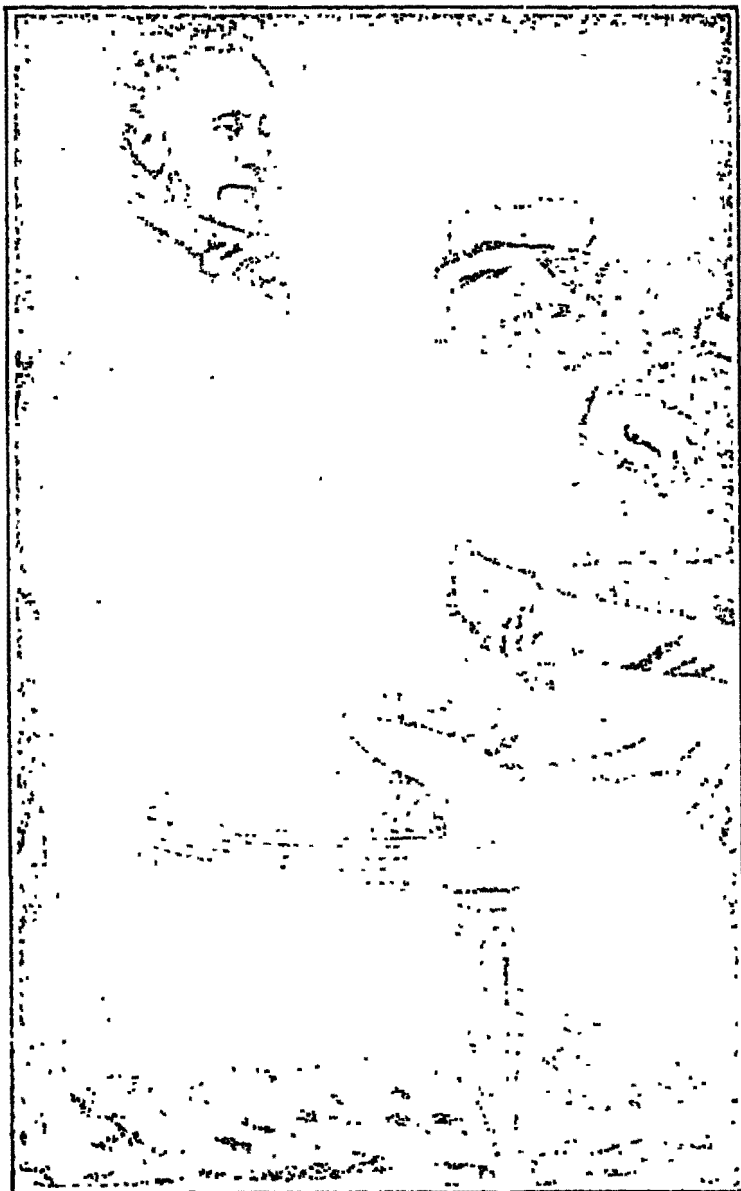

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(A) INTRODUCTION

DURING the last six centuries those bearing the name of Scott have earned honors in literature, arts and arms, and have frequently performed parts that have turned the tide even in the destiny of nations."

"Better hearts o'er the border sod

To seige or rescue never trod."

The Scott family has been prominent in the British Empire and in America, its members having played important roles in war and in peace. Family pride is a commendable trait and should be cultivated. All Scotts have just cause to be proud of their family history and traditions.

In addition to the information that will be found in Chapter (C) regarding the origin and meaning of the name SCOTT, the following is found in Reference 19:

"Old Norse—Skati (a lordly man), or Skotti (archer); German—Schotte; Dutch—Schot; French—Scotti; Swedish, Danish—Skotte.

"'Roger le Escot' or 'Maurice le Scot' represents a surname that is all but interminable, the Caledonian having ever been celebrated for his roving as well as canny propensities."

The data in this volume is gathered from reliable sources. Those desiring further information are advised to consult volumes mentioned in list of references given in the back of this volume. The writer and his associates will be glad to give their co-operation to any members of the family who may be interested in having a complete genealogy of the family published.

(C) ANCIENT SCOTT FAMILIES

PROF. INNESS, of Edinburg University, claims that "long before surnames were known, persons who wandered into England from Scotland received the distinctive appellation of Scotus or Scot, and returned to Scotland bearing the name of Scot in addition to their former name."

Other authorities assert that the name Scot originated from Scota, the daughter of Pharaoh, King of Egypt, who was drowned in the Red Sea. Gathelus, son of Cecrops, First King of Athens, went to live in Egypt. He met with such favor from Pharaoh that the latter gave his daughter Scota to him in marriage. This was in the time of Moses. In order to escape the plagues which soon after afflicted the Egyptians, the young couple landed in Portugal and later went to Spain and called the territory where they settled "Port Gathale." Gathelus called the people "Scottis," from the affection he bore to his wife, Scota. His descendants went to Ireland and afterwards, A. D. 489-503, to the northern part of Britain, which was afterward called Scotland. The Bishop of Aberdeen, who searched all the monuments of antiquity of Scotland, says all concur that the name of Scot is derived from Scota. Many descendants of Scota assumed the name Scot, usually spelling it with one "t" down to the beginning of the 17th century.

We have the testimony of Seneca that the name of Scot was known to some writer in the first century.

The first of the name of Scot to be met with in English history after surnames came into general use was John Scott, the last Earl of Chester, born A. D. 1206; Sir Peter Scott, first Mayor of Newcastle in 1251; and Sir Nicholas Scott, his son, capital Bailiff of Newcastle in 1269. The Scotts of Holden, Kent, date back to John Scott, 1442.

Scott of Great Barr

The ancient family of Scott has been seated at Great Barr, co. of Stafford, from the reign of Edward I. In 1296, the ancestor of the present baronet

(who was in the suite of John Baliol, King of Scotland, when that monarch was detained a prisoner in London, and restrained with the rest of his countrymen from passing to the north of the river Trent under pain of losing their heads), fixed himself as near that stream as the thick forest of Cannock, now stripped of its woods, would allow. See H164.

Scott of Scotts Hall, Co. Kent, and Belton

"The Scotts of Scotts Hall, Kent, trace their pedigree in an unbroken line through Dervorgille (daughter and one of the heirs of Alan, Lord of Galloway, Constable of Scotland), the mother of William Baliol Scot, to Fergus, King of Scotland, in the time of Alexander the Great, to Rollo, first duke of Normandy; Baldwin, First Count of Flanders; Henry I, Emperor of Germany; Waldimer the Great, of Russia; Romanus I. of the Greek Empire; Alfred the Great; William the Conqueror; and finally to Charlemagne; mainly through female branches; also to David I, of Scotland, and Stuard, Earl of Northumberland, of a different line. The old Norman church at Brabourne, Kent, contains many monuments of the Scotts of Scotts Hall, some of which date back to the thirteenth century. In Kent, Staffordshire, and the Scotch border, for long generations the family of Scott has been one of great wealth

and power; at one period it was said the Scotts of Scotts Hall could travel from Brabourne to London (some fifty or sixty miles) without leaving the estates of the family connections. It is an historical record that in 1665 "Lady Anna Scott was esteemed the greatest fortune and most accomplished lady of the Isle of Britain." Many of the Scotts of New England, U. S. This Henrich is given as the common ancestor of the Schotts of Schottenstein, Strassburg and Braunfels. ALEXANDER SCOTT (1525?-1584?), poet; wrote many poems marked for felicity of diction and directness of expression.

ALEXANDER JOHN S— (1768-1840), chaplain in the navy; s. of Robert S—, a retired lieutenant of the navy; b. Rotherhithe; had a remarkable knowledge of languages; served Nelson as secretary and interpreter; appointed chaplain to prince regent, 1816.

ALEXANDER JOHN S— (1805-1866), first principal of Owens College; s. Dr. John S—; educated Univ. Glasgow; obtained chair of English language and literature, 1848, in Univ. College, London; principal of Owens College, 1851.

ANDREW S— (1757-1839), Scottish poet; s. of John S—; b. Bowden, Roxburgshire; served in American War of Independence, being taken prisoner; poems depicted Scottish rural life and character.

BENJAMIN S— (1814-1892), chamberlain of London; s. Benjamin Whinnell S—; secretary to Bank of London, 1854.

CAROLINE LUCY S—, Lady Scott (1784-1857), novelist; dau. Archibald, first Baron Douglas; m. Admiral Sir George S—.

CUTHBERT SCOTT or SCOT (d. 1565), Bishop of Chester; educated Cambridge; elected fellow Cambridge, 1537.

DANIEL S—, J.L. D. (1691-1759), theological writer and lexicographer: s. Daniel S—, a London merchant; wrote appendix to Stephanus' "Thesaurus."
DAVID S— (1806-1849), painter: s. Robert S—, the engraver; b. Edinburgh; elected an associate of Scottish Academy, 1830; exhibited in the Royal Academy.

GEORGE SCOTT or SCOT, (d. 1685), writer on America: s. Sir John S— or Scot; received from proprietors of East New Jersey a grant of land in recognition of his services, but died on voyage to America to accept it.

SIR GEORGE GILBERT S— (1811-1878), architect: b. Gaweott, Buckinghamshire; s. Thomas S—; member of Royal Academy, 1861; president of Royal Institute of British Architects, 1870; received royal gold medal, 1859; professor of architecture at Royal Academy, 1868; knighted for his works, 1872; buried in Westminster Abbey.

GEORGE LEWIS S— (1708-1780), mathematician: b. Hanover, s. George S—; named his son for George I., who was his especial friend; Princess Sophia was his godmother; sub-preceptor to Prince George, 1750; commissioner of excise, 1758; celebrated for his knowledge of mathematics.

GREGORY SCOTT or SCOT (d. 1576), divine: Educated at Eton; elected scholar of King's College, Cambridge, 1550; presented by the Queen to rectory of Thimbleby, Lincolnshire, 1560; chaplain to the Bishop of Lincoln;

HARRIET ANNE, LADY S— (1819-1894), novelist: Dau. Henry Shank, of Castlerig and Gleniston; b. Bombay; wrote novels.

HENRY S—, Earl of Deloraine (1676-1730): s. James S—, Duke of Monmouth; created Viscount Hermitage and Baron of Goldclands by Queen Anne, 1706; member of parliament; vested with Order of the Bath, 1725, and appointed gentleman of the bedchamber to George I.; served in the army.

HENRY S—, third Duke of Buccleuch and fifth Duke of Queensberry (1746-1812): s. Francis, Earl of Dalkeith; educated at Eton; invested with Order of the Thistle, 1767; admitted Knight of the Garter, 1794; paid visits in disguise to the cottages of humble dependents, by whom he was praised.

HENRY YOUNG DARRACOTT S— (1822-1883), major general royal engineers: s. Edward S—, of Plymouth, Devonshire, served at Gibraltar; designed Royal Albert Hall at Kensington, 1870; elected member of a select Russian scientific society, 1875, on which occasion the Czar presented him with a snuff box set with diamonds.

HEW S— (1791-1872), annalist of the Scottish church: s. Robert S—; b. Haddington; graduated at Aberdeen; held several ministerial charges; received degree of D. D. from St. Andrew's Univ.

SIR JAMES S— (fl. 1579-1606), politician: s. William S—, of Balwearie and Strathmiglo; jailed for sympathizing and plotting with Catholic earls, but later permitted to stay in his own castle.

JAMES S— (known as Fitzroy and as Crofts), Duke of Monmouth and Buccleuch (1619-1685); b. Rotterdam, natural s. of Charles II.; m. Anne S—, Countess of Buccleuch, and assumed her name, 1663; commanded the English auxiliary force against the Dutch, 1672; taken, but pardoned for being an accomplice in plot to murder Duke of York; his followers attempted to pronounce him King of England, but he was taken to the Tower and executed on scaffold.

JAMES S—, D. D. (1733-1814), political writer: s. James S—; graduated from Trinity College, Cambridge, 1757; fellow of Trinity College, 1758; lectured and preached.

SIR JAMES S— (1790?-1872), admiral: s. Thomas S— of Glenluce, in Wigtonshire; served in many naval operations, including capture of the French frigate *Guerriere* near the Faroe Islands, 1806; reduction of Martinique in the West Indies, 1809; the siege of Cadiz, 1810, and the Chesapeake, in America, 1812.

SIR JAMES SIBBALD DAVID S— (1814-1885), bart., antiquary: s. Sir David S— of Egham; graduated from Oxford, 1835; captain in royal Sussex militia artillery, 1846-56; fellow of Society of Antiquaries and member of Royal Archaeological Institute;

SIR JOHN S— (or SCOT), (1585-1670), Scottish lawyer and statesman: s. Robert Scot; educated at St. Andrews; knighted and made privy councillor by James VI, 1617; became ordinary lord of session, 1632.

JOHN S— (1639-1695), divine: s. Thomas S—, a grazier of Chippenham, Wiltshire; educated Oxford; published many sermons.

JOHN S— (1730-1783), Quaker poet: s. Samuel S—, a Quaker linen-draper; b. Grange Walk, Bermondsey; made many literary friends, among whom were Dr. Beattie and Johnson.

JOHN S—, Earl of Clonmell (1739-1798), chief justice of the King's bench in Ireland: s. Thomas S— of Urlings, County Kilkenny; member of parliament, 1769; counsel to the revenue board, 1772; solicitor-general, 1774; privy councillor, 1777.

JOHN S— (afterwards Scott-Waring), (1747-1819), agent of Warren Hastings: b. Shrewsbury; s. Jonathan S— of Shrewsbury; major in Bengal division of East India Co.'s forces, 1766; intimate friend of Warren Hastings; member of parliament, 1784-90;

JOHN S— (1783-1821), editor of the "London Magazine": b. Aberdeen; educated at Aberdeen; Byron was his schoolfellow; an able journalist and editor of several papers; killed in duel with Jonathan Henry Christie, friend of Lockhart, who was offended by Scott's criticisms.

JOHN S— (1774-1827), engraver: b. Newcastle-on-Tyne; s. John S—; an able English animal engraver;

JOHN S—, first Earl of Eldon (1751-1838) lord chancellor: s. William S— of Newcastle-on-Tyne; member of parliament; solicitor-general, 1788; lord chief justice of common pleas, 1799; created Viscount Encombe and Earl of Eldon by George IV, 1821; governor of the Charterhouse.

JOHN S— (1798-1846), surgeon: s. James S—, a general practitioner in medicine; surgeon to Ophthalmic Hospital in Moorfields, 1826; surgeon to London Hospital, 1827; most skillful bandager in London; distinguished by general accuracy of his diagnosis.

JOHN S— (1794-1871), horse-trainer: b. Chippenham; handled the best horses in England with unrivalled skill; trained sixteen winners of the St. Leger; trained many Derby winners; trained *Velocipede* at Whitewall, one of the best horses of his generation.

JONATHAN S—, LL.D. (1754-1829), orientalist: b. Shrewsbury; s. Jonathan S—; appointed Warren Hastings' Persian secretary; published memoirs and translations of Persian history; chief work "Arabian Nights Entertainments," which he translated into English, 1811; D. C. L. conferred upon him by Univ. of Oxford, 1805.

JOSEPH NICOLL S—, M.D. (1703?-1769), dissenting minister and physician: s. Thomas S—; b. Hitchin, Hertfordshire; graduated Edinburgh, 1744.

MICHAEL S—, or SCOT (1175?-1234), mathematician, physician and scholar; educated at Oxford and Paris; attached to court of Frederick II; sent on mission to universities of Europe by Frederick II to communicate to them versions of Aristotle which he had made from Arabic.

MICHAEL S— (1789-1835), author of "Tom Cringle's Log": b. Cowairs; s. of Allan S—, a Glasgow merchant; attended Univ. of Glasgow, 1801-5;

PATRICK S—, or SCOT (fl. 1620), author: Followed James I from Scotland into England on his accession; from his works seems to have been tutor to Prince Charles.

REGINALD (or REYNOLD) S—, or SCOT (1538?-1599), writer against belief in witches: s. of Richard Scot; educated at Oxford; member of parliament;

ROBERT S—, (1777-1841), engraver: s. of Robert S—; b. Lanark; best work was in landscape.

ROBERT S—, (1811-1887), lexicographer and dean of Rochester: b. Bondleigh, Devonshire; s. of Alexander S—, rector of Bondleigh; prebendary of Exeter, 1845-66; master of Balliol College, 1854; dean of Rochester, 1876 to his death.

ROBERT BISSET S—, (1774-1841), military writer.

ROBERT EDEN S—, (1770-1811), philosopher: b. Old Aberdeen; graduated Univ. Aberdeen; graduated King's College, Aberdeen; held in co-professorship chair of natural philosophy, Greek, mathematics and moral philosophy, University of Aberdeen.

SAMUEL S—, (1710?-1772), marine painter: b. London.

SARAH S—, (d. 1795), historian and novelist: dau. of Matthew Robinson of West Layton, Yorkshire;

THOMAS S—, or SCOT, (1480?-1539), Scottish judge: s. of Sir William S— of Balwearie; great favorite with James V, by whom he was appointed justice clerk 1535

THOMAS S—, (1580?-1626), political writer: Assassinated by an English soldier, who was put to the torture.

THOMAS S—, or SCOT, (d. 1660), regicide: Member of Long parliament, 1645; appointed commissioner for trial of Charles I, signed King's death warrant; sat in Cromwell's parliament; secretary of state, 1660; persuaded to surrender himself to Sir Henry de Vic in hope of saving his life by obeying proclamation for surrender of the regicide; fled in disguise to Brussels; captured there; executed, 1660;

THOMAS S—, (1705-1775), hymn writer: s. of Thomas S—; b. at Hitchin; pastor of St. Nicholas Street Chapel, Ipswich, 1740.

THOMAS S—, (1747-1821), commentator of the Bible: s. of John S—; b. Braytoft, Lincolnshire; ordained priest in London, 1772; curate of Olney, Buckinghamshire, 1781; lectured and wrote commentations on the doctrine of the Trinity.

THOMAS S—, (1745-1842), general: s. of John S— of Malleay; served in America under Burgoyne, 1776.

THOMAS S—, (1808-1878), free-thinker: Page at court of Charles X of France; published series of articles on "free enquiry and free expression of opinion".

SIR WALTER S—, (1490?-1552), of Buccleuch and Bransholm, Scottish chieftain: s. of Sir Walter S— of Buccleuch; fourth in lineal descent from Sir Walter S— (1426-1469); who first took the territorial designation of Buccleuch and was the first to acquire the whole barony of Bransholm.

WALTER S—, first Lord S— of Buccleuch, (1565-1611): s. of Sir Walter S— of Buccleuch (d. 1574): Commissioned for the pursuit of Bothwell, 1594; renowned for his brilliant exploit in delivering Kinnmont Eilie from Carlisle Castle.

WALTER S—, (1550?-1629?), freebooter: s. of William S— of Harden; assisted Francis Stewart, Earl of Bothwell, in attack upon Falkland Palace, 1592; joined Lord Scott of Buccleuch in his famous rescue of William Armstrong of Kinnmont from Carlisle Castle, 1596.

WALTER S—, Earl of Tarras (1644-1693): s. of Sir Gideon S— of Highchester; m. by special dispensation at age of 15 to Lady Mary S—, Countess of Buccleuch in her own right, then 12 years old.

WALTER S— of Satchells (1614?-1694?), captain and genealogist: s. of Robert S— of Satchells;

SIR WALTER S—, (1771-1832), descendant of the laird of Sintur, author of the "Waverly Novels": s. of Walter S—; b. College Wynd at Edinburgh; called to the bar, 1792; elected member Speculative Society, 1791; explored every corner of the country collecting ballads and occasionally an old border war-horn; after the "Lay of the Last Minstrel" was published, in 1805, he was received in London as a literary lion; appointed secretary to parliamentary commission upon Scottish jurisprudence, 1807; contributed to "Edinburgh Annual Register," his articles were criticized by Jeffrey. "The Lady of the Lake" was published in 1810, and 20,000 copies were sold that year; and it caused a rush of visitors to Loch Katrine; from 1815-1825 he poured out a series of novels, displaying an energy and fertility of mind which made the feat one of the most remarkable recorded in literary history. He published the "Waverley Novels" anonymously and they were the delight of all readers; this secretiveness was owing to his low estimate of the literary profession; he disavowed "Waverley" to the prince regent, who entertained him at dinner in 1815; 1827 he allowed Lord Meadowbank to propose his health as author of the "Waverley Novels." "Ivanhoe" achieved great popularity, and marked the highest point of his literary career; accepted position of president, Royal Society of Scotland, 1820; founded the Bannatyne Club, 1823. At Abbotsford, his country estate, he was visited by Washington Irving and George Ticknor, Wordsworth, Moore, and Humphry Davy, and many American and English travelers of rank.

SIR WILLIAM S—, (d. 1350), judge and reputed founder of the Kentish family of Scot's Hall. Said to be s. of John S— of Brabourne, Kent; justice of common pleas, 1336-7, having been knighted when the Black Prince was created Duke of Cornwall.

SIR WILLIAM S—, or SCOT, (d. 1532), of Balwearie, Scottish judge: s. Sir William S of Balwearie; accompanied James IV's expedition into England, 1513, and was taken prisoner at the battle of Flodden; appointed lord of the articles for the barons, a rank obtained by no one else under a peer; nominated first justice, 1532.

SIR WILLIAM S—, (1674?-1725), of Thirlestane, Latin lyricist: s. Francis S—, bart., of Thirlestane, Selkirkshire; member of faculty of advocates, 1702.

WILLIAM S—, (1813-1872), divine: b. London: s. of Thomas S—, a merchant of Surrey; zealous member of Mr. Gladstone's election committees at Oxford; chairman, committee of Ellesiological Society, 1859; adviser in restoration of St. Paul's Cathedral; president of Sion College.

WILLIAM BELL S—, (1811-1890), poet, painter and miscellaneous writer: b. at St. Leonard's, Edinburgh; s. of Robert S— (1777-1841), the engraver; master in the government school of design at Newcastle-on-Tyne; associated with Rossetti; acquainted with Swinburne.

(I) PROMINENT SCOTTS OF AMERICA, PAST GENERATIONS

Following are some of the prominent Scotts in America of past generations:

CHARLES SCOTT: Soldier; b. in Cumberland County, Va., 1733; d. 1813; Colonel of the 3rd Virginia Battalion, 1776; was promoted Brigadier-General, 1777; was with General Anthony Wayne at Stony Point, in 1779, and in the following year was made prisoner of war at Charleston, and was not exchanged until near the end of the war; removed to Woodford County, Ky., 1785, and served as Brigadier-General of Kentucky Levies in General Arthur St. Clair's defeat, 1791; late that year he commanded a successful expedition to Wabash River and was in several actions with the Indians; in 1794 he led part of General Anthony Wayne's army in the battle of Fallen Timbers; was Governor of Kentucky, 1808-12, and a town and county in that State were named in his honor.

CHARLES S—: Lawyer; b. in Knoxville, Tenn. 1811; d. in Jackson, Miss., 1861; s. of Edward, lawyer (1774-1852); studied law and began practice in Nashville; formed partnership with George S. Yerger in Jackson, Miss.; elected Chancellor of Mississippi, 1852; an active Freemason.

GUSTAVUS HALL S—: Naval officer; b. in Fairfax County, Va., 1812; d. in Washington, D. C., 1882; in June, 1861, commanded the steamer "Keystone State"; commissioned Captain, 1863, and commanded the steamer "De Soto"; was senior officer of the "Canandaigua" at the surrender of Charleston, S. C., in 1865; appointed Rear-Admiral, 1873; was Commander-in-Chief of the North Atlantic squadron until 1874, when he retired.

IRVING MURRAY S—: Mechanical engineer; b. in Hebron Mills, Md., 1837; in 1858 was engaged as draughtsman at Union Iron Works, San Francisco; became a partner in the Union Iron Works, 1865, and in 1875 the business was reorganized under the title of Prescott, Scott and Co.; was president of the Mechanics' Institute and the Art Association of San Francisco.

JAMES S—: Poet; b. in Langside, Scotland, 1806; d. in Newark, N. J., 1857; studied at Glasgow and Belfast; emigrated to this country in 1832; became a licentiate in 1834 and was pastor at German Valley and Newark, N. J.; given degree of D. D. by Lafayette in 1844.

JOHN S—: Clergyman; b. in Washington County, Pa., 1820; entered ministry of the Methodist Church, 1842, and member of many general conferences of that denomination; wrote and edited several religious papers.

JOHN S—: Senator; b. in Alexandria, Pa., 1824; he was Prosecuting Attorney, 1846-9, and a member of the Board of Revenue Commissioners, 1851; served in the Legislature, 1862; sat in the U. S. Senate, 1869-75; removed to Pittsburgh, Pa., and became general counsel of the Pennsylvania Company, and later general solicitor of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in Philadelphia.

JOHN MORIN S—: Patriot; b. in New York, 1730; d. there, 1784; was an opponent of British aggression, with voice and pen; was one of the founders of the Sons of Liberty; was one of the chief members of the New York general committee in 1775; a delegate to the Provincial Congress of that year, and in 1776 was made a Brigadier-General; became Secretary of State of New York; in 1780-3 was a member of Congress.

JOHN MORIN S—: Lawyer; b. in New York City, 1789; d. in Philadelphia, 1858; served in the War of 1812 as 1st Lieutenant of Cavalry and in 1815 was chosen to the Legislature; for many years member of the Philadelphia

City Councils, a delegate to the State Constitutional Convention of 1837 and in 1841-4 served as Mayor of the city.

JOHN RUDOLPH S—: Actor; b. in Philadelphia, 1809; d. there, 1856; made his debut at the New York Park Theatre in the part of Malcolm in "Macbeth"; went to England, 1847, and played at the Princess Theatre in London; returning to New York he became a member of the New York Bowery Theatre and later joined the players at the Chatham Street National Theatre.

JULIAN S—: Artist; b. in Johnson, Vermont, 1846; entered the National Army at opening of Civil War; some of his sketches in a military hospital attracted attention; exhibited at Academy of Design, 1870, and was elected an associate, 1871; chosen a life-fellow of the American Geographical Society, 1873.

LEVI S—: M. E. Bishop; b. near Odessa, Del., 1802; d. there, 1882; member of Philadelphia Conference; appointed presiding elder, 1834; principal of Dickinson grammar school, 1840-2; agent of the Methodist Book Concern in New York City, 1848; ordained Bishop, 1852.

MARTIN S—: Soldier; b. in Bennington, Vt., 1788; d. near Molino del Rey, Mexico, 1847; Brevetted Major for gallantry at Palo Alto and Resaca de la Palma, 1846; Brevetted Lieutenant-Colonel for services at Monterey, where he led his regiment and was killed at the battle of Molino del Rey.

ORANGE S—: Clergyman; b. in Brookfield, Vt., 1800; d. in Newark, N. J., 1847; entered Methodist ministry, 1822; 1833 he became an earnest anti-slavery worker; withdrew from the Church in 1842 and in 1843 organized the Wesleyan Methodist Church in convention at Utica, N. Y., and was its president.

RICHARD S—: Colonist; b. in Glemsford, Suffolk, England, 1607; d. in Providence, R. I., about 1681; lineal descendant of John Baliol, founder of Baliol College, Oxford; Scott came to Boston in 1634 and joined Roger Williams; was co-proprietor with Williams in the latter's purchase from the Indians and a signer and supposed author of the celebrated covenant that was made among the settlers of Rhode Island.

RICHARD WILLIAMS S—: Canadian Senator; b. in Prescott, Ontario, 1825; admitted to the bar, 1848; Mayor of Ottawa, 1852; had a seat in the Canadian Assembly 1857-63, and in the Ontario Assembly 1867-73; elected speaker of the Ontario Assembly, 1871; sworn as member of the Queen's Privy Council, 1873; Secretary of State in the Mackenzie Administration, 1874-78; present in official capacity at Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia, 1876; the Canada temperance act, framed by him, is known as the "Scott Act"; became member of the Dominion Senate, 1874.

ROBERT KINGSTON S—: Soldier; b. in Armstrong County, Pa., 1826; became Colonel of the 68th Ohio Regiment, 1862; served at Fort Donelson, Shiloh and Corinth; led a brigade at Hatchie River, Tenn.; commanded the advance of Gen. John A. Logan's division on the march into Mississippi, and was engaged at Port Gibson, Raymond, and Champion Hills; was Assistant Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau in South Carolina, 1865-8; became the first Governor of the reconstructed State, as Republican, in 1868.

ROBERT NICHOLSON S—: Soldier; b. in Winchester, Tenn., 1838; d. in Washington, D. C., 1887; received a Major's Brevet for gallantry at Gaines's Mill, where he was wounded; professor of military science at Fari-

bault, Minn., 1872-3; commanded Fort Ontario, N. Y., 1873-7; in charge of publications of war records in Washington from 1877 until his death.

THOMAS ALEXANDER S—: Railroad Manager; b. in London, Pa., 1824; d. in Darby, Pa., 1881; he opened a line from Washington to Philadelphia, via Annapolis and Perrysville; given charge of all Government railways and telegraphs; Assistant Secretary of War in August, 1861, which office he was the first to hold; president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, 1874; president Union Pacific Railroad 1871-2.

THOMAS FIELDING S—: P. E. Bishop; b. in Iredell County, N. C., 1807; d. in New York City, 1867; graduated at Franklin College, Athens (now Univ. of Ga.), 1829; received degree of D. D. from Univ. of Ga. 1853; elected Missionary Bishop of Oregon and Washington Territories.

WALTER S—: Religious Leader; b. in Moffat, Dumfries-shire, Scotland, 1796; d. in Mayslick, Ky., 1861; he came of the same ancestry as the novelist; sailed to the United States, arriving 1818; forming an alliance with Thomas and Alexander Campbell, he engaged in earnest and critical examination of the Bible and the earlier writers.

WILLIAM ANDERSON S—: Clergyman; b. in Rock Creek, Tenn., 1813; d. in San Francisco, Cal., 1885; was ordained 1835; professor of mental and moral philosophy and systematic theology in the theological school of San Francisco; given degree of D. D. by Univ. of Alabama, 1844; LL. D. by Univ. of City of New York, 1872.

WILLIAM COWPER S—: Clergyman; b. in Martinsburg, Va., 1817; d. in Bethesda, Va., 1854; graduated at South Hanover Coll., Ind., 1837, and at Union Theological Seminary, Va., 1840; pastor of several churches in Virginia.

WINFIELD S—: Soldier; b. in Dinwiddie County, Va., 1786; d. at West Point, N. Y., 1866; his grandfather was a Scotchman of the Clan Buecleuch, who escaped from the field of Culloden, 1748; entered the Army as Captain of Light Artillery. 1808; in July, 1812, he was made Lieutenant-Colonel and ordered to the Canadian frontier; the affair of Queenstown Heights was won under his direction; it was lost afterward and he was taken prisoner; he was exchanged in 1813 and joined the Army under Gen. Dearborn as Adjutant-General with rank of Colonel; commanded the advance in Wilkinson's descent of the St. Lawrence, at Fort George; on July 3, 1814, his brigades crossed the Niagara River and took Fort Erie and a part of its garrison; at close of the war was offered, but declined, seat in the Cabinet as Secretary of War, and was promoted to be Major-General with the thanks of Congress and a gold medal for his services; in 1832 he commanded the Federal forces in Charleston Harbor during the nullification troubles; engaged in the Seminole War in 1835; in 1838 he was efficient in promoting the peaceful removal of the Cherokees from Georgia; became Commander-in-Chief of the Army of the United States in 1841; in 1847 he was assigned to the chief command of the Army in Mexico; the castle of San Juan d'Ulloa capitulated to him; his men drove the enemy from every point of his line, capturing five generals, 3000 men, 4500 stand of arms and 43 cannon; captured Jalapa, occupied Perote and Puebla and advanced toward the City of Mexico; he attacked and carried Contreras and Churubusco; Chapultepec was stormed and carried after fall of Molino del Rey and Scott's Army marched into the city and occupied the national palace; in 1852 Scott was Whig candidate for Presidency.

(M) RELIGIONS OF THE SCOTTS

For several centuries nearly all the Scotts lived in Scotland, England and Ireland. Most of the Scotch and, likewise, the Scotts, were and are of the Presbyterian faith. Practically all the Scotts who went from Scotland to the North of Ireland, and their descendants, remained Presbyterian.

There are a few Scotts of the Catholic faith in the British Isles, but it is estimated that their number does not exceed two per cent of the entire Scott population.

The Scotts who came from the British Isles to America continued in the faith of their fathers, for the most part, though their descendants in this country today will be found in memberships of practically all the various churches. It is estimated that of all the Scotts in America who are church members, at least ninety-seven per cent are of the Protestant faith.

Biographical sketches of Scotts appear in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA. Their religious faiths are shown as follows: Baptist, 2; Episcopal, 6; Catholic, 3; Christian, 1; Methodist Episcopal, 2; Presbyterian, 4; Congregationalist, 5; Methodist, 5; Others, 6; religion not stated, 41. Total—75.

(O) 'THE SCOTT COAT OF ARMS

A Coat of Arms is an emblem which is displayed by titled persons, persons of royal blood, and their descendants.

Coats of Arms were originally used for purposes of identification and recognition on the field of battle, as well as in civil life.

It is claimed by some writers that Coats of Arms, in a crude form, were used by Noah's sons after the flood. There are records of other Coats of Arms, in one crude form or another, at different periods of ancient history. Heraldry, however, as we know it today, did not become of much importance until soon after the invasion of England by William the Conqueror, A. D. 1066. Heraldry became of general interest at about the time of the Crusades.

The Scott Coat of Arms shown on the cover of this volume has been in use by the "main line" of the Scott Families for many centuries. Other Scott Arms which have been adopted since bear a resemblance to it.

This Coat of Arms is described in various works on heraldry (see list of References) as follows:

- ARMS: Or, on a bend az, a star between two crescents of the first
CREST: A stag trippant ppr, attired and unguled or.
MOTTO: Amo (I love).
SUPPORTERS: Two females richly attired in antique habits vert, under their robes az, the uppermost ar, and upon their heads plumes of three ostrich feathers of the last.

Sir Bernard Burke, of Heralds College, London, said: "Heraldry is prized by all who can show honorable ancestry or wish to found honorable families."
