The compiler earnestly hopes that those who come in contact with this history will send in corrections and additions. It is further hoped that those who have Bible records or any pictures of any of the Shipp line from the 6th generation and earlier will send a copy of the records and pictures for the Shipp collection.

For ease in finding the various lines of the family a chart is enclosed which lists lines from Josiah Shipp of the 1st generation up to the 11th generation. In the history itself the following letters and numbers will designate the generation:

1st generation marked-----Josiah¹
2nd generation marked-----Josiah², Thomas², Richard²
3rd generation marked-----Richard³, Thomas³
4th generation marked-----Richard⁴, Thomas⁴, John⁴ (?)
5th generation marked-----I, II, III, etc
6th generation marked-----A, B, C, etc.
7th generation marked-----1, 2, 3, etc.
8th generation marked-----a, b, c, etc.
9th generation marked----- (1); (2); (3); etc.
10th generation marked----- (a); (b); (c); etc.
11th generation marked----- /1/, /2/, /3/, etc.

Various counties are mentioned and names may be confused; events took place at various times and seem to be in different counties, but in reality they might take place in same location due to the fact that a new county has been formed.

ESSEX COUNTY: was formed April 26, 1692 from Rappahannock county when this county was abolished.

SPOTSYLVANIA COUNTY: formed from Essex, King and Queen, and King William, 1720-1721

CAROLINE COUNTY: formed from Essex, King and Queen, King William in 1727-1728.

ORANGE COUNTY from Spotsylvania Sept 20, 1734

CULPEPPER FROM ORANGE March 23, 1748-1749

Much data has been gathered by various members of the family over a period of many years; much is tradition. It is hoped that those who have not yet contributed toward this history will send information to those who have worked on this and further this work.

The first of the SHIPP line came to America from England, but who was the first? Varied reports, several already in print in abbreviated form reveal the following: In Virkus Compendium of American Genealogy it is stated that William Ship who died in 1657, lived in Lower Norfolk county, Virginia, was the 1st generation; further stating that Josiah of the 2nd generation was his son. Another record states that William was married two times and that Josiah was a son possibly of this other marriage.

William Shipp, or Ship, lived in Lower Norfolk county, was appointed by the General Assembly as a tobacco viewer for the crop of 1639; was a vestryman of the colonial church; a commissioner of the county in 1639-1640 in which he signed a deed from Captain Willonglibes to Daniel Tanner (4W (2)25). Court was held at his home 6 July, 1640 (2W and M (1); p.155); and also on up to 1642 where the court considered affairs of the church.

Captain William Julian came to Virginia in 1609 and by 1625 was living at Elizabeth City at the age of 43. His will was dated April 11 1657 according to which he appears to have died childless as he leaves his property to the children of his wife SARAH by a former marriage with WILLIAM SHIPP: viz: WILLIAM, MARY, FRANCIS, MATHEW, and ANNE SHIPP (1W (1), p. 244). No Josiah is mentioned herein and no records concerning any relationship between Josiah and William Shipp have been found. Therefore, without definite proof from authentic records this writer will not consider William as the progenitor of the Shipp family who lived in Culpepper, Fauquier, Caroline, Essex counties. Further proof and documentation concerning this is desired; anything which might indicate a relationship will be welcomed.

In this period of the early 1600s and late 1600 there are several others by the name of Shipp who remain unaccounted for.

1. Richard Shipp, early Virginia emigrant of 1650, headman of John Cox, _____ county
2. Daniel Shippe, 1653 immigrant, headman of John Shephard, Northumberland County.
3. Joseph Shipp of Middlesex County whose estate was administered in 1675

FIRST GENERATION

JOSIAH¹ SHIP

JOSIAH¹ SHIPP (name first few generations written Ship),
thought by some to be the son of William Shipp and his first wife,
was born _____; married Jane _____.

Josiah Ship appears first in St. Anne's Parish records (later known as part of Essex County) as early as 1673 at which time he was appointed by Ann Bray as her loving friend and lawful attorney to acknowledge her rights to a parcel of land sold by her husband, Richard Bray to Edward Allcox, "the Quantity being 200 acres lying in Piscataway Creek", November 8th, 1673 (Deed and Will Book of Rappahannock Co, Va, 1671-76, p. 137).

In 1685 Josiah appears on a deed as follows: "To all Christian people to whom these presents shall come Greetings. Know that we, Francis Triplett and Samuel Bowen, of Sittingburn Parish in Rappahannock county, Virginia do hereby assign over all our right title and interest in this within mentioned, as also patent and all the land belonging and mentioned with said patent, we, Francis Triplett and Samuel Bowen do hereby bind ourselves to secure to Josiah Shipp, his heirs and assigns from any title claims. Therefore we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, or assigns firmly by these presents. In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands and seals this first day of August, 1685. Signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of Francis Triplett, Samuel Bowen (Rappahannock Co, Va. Book K, 1682-88, p192).

From the archives of the Virginia Library the following certificate issued by the Rappahannock court the 3d day May 1688: "Certificate according to act of assembly granted to Jos. Beckley and Mary Beckley for Two hundred and fifty acres of Land for due the Importation of five Persons by name : Fran. James, Josias Ship, John Manning, Joseph Beckley and Mary Beckley"(Old Rappahannock Co, Va, Deed and Will Book, p. 69 1686-1692).

Josiah is mentioned in a deed of release 30 April 1692, in which Francis Triplett and Samuel Bowen of Rappahannock county sold to Josiah Ship of the same county for 4,000 pounds tobo and cask for certain parcel of land being a part of a patent containing 1050 acres as by a conveyance part from then the said Triplett and Bowen to him the said Ship bearing date 1st Aug, 1685.

Joseph Beckley of Rappahannock county and parish of Siltenburn to Josias (note spelling of name as in 1688 item) Ship of same county and parish for 3,000 pounds tobo and cask 100 acres north side Rappahanock in same county and parish adjacent land of William Jett along the oldline of Joseph Beckley, 30 March, 1692 (recorded 16 May, 1692. (Deed Book, p. 6, March, 1692; Va. Col. Abstracts, V. 16. Richmond Co)

In November term of court 1697, Josiah Ship was appointed grand Juror as follows: Isaac Jackson, Edmund Roberts, Henry Gore, Josiah Ship were sworn to grand Jury for county the ensuing year. At a court held for Essex Co., 22nd day of November 1697 (Essex Order Book, 1695-99). Essex county formed from old Rappahannock county in 1692)

House of Burgesses record of 1704 shows petition of Josiah Shipp to keep a ferry on the Rappahannock Rivers, said Josiah Shipp aged and unable to do other work.

In Essex county Josiah signed his will Jan 24, 1705 and it was proved here in court 12th day of Feb 1705-06. (Deed Book 12, pp 176-7, Essex County). From the will we find that Josiah married Jane _____; died in 1705 in Essex county and left three sons: Josiah², Thomas², and Richard², who is the oldest of the three, known because of the fact that he was left the land and the system of primogeniture still existed in Virginia. The possibility of a fourth child lies in the statement "if my sd. wife would be now with Child that then her prt fall to the said Child and its heirs lawfully begotten of its body."

WILL OF JOSIAH¹ SHIP

January the 24 1705

"I Josiah Shipp being very sick and weak yett of perfect sense and memory doe make constitute and appoint this to be my Last Will and Testament Revoking all other will or Wills by me formerly made either Virbal or otherwise.

"Imprimis I give my Soule into the hands of God that gave it in hopes of a joyfull Resurrection, my body to the Earth decently to be interred with such Christian buriall as time and place will afford.

"As for my worldly wealth I give and bequeath as followeth

"Item I give my Plantation with all ye Land Appurtenances and privileges thereunto belonging unto my well beloved wife Jane and my son Richard Ship during their naturall life equally to be divided between them, and if sd. wife should be now with Child that then her part fall to the said child and its heirs lawfully begotten of its body and my Son Richards part to him and his heirs Lawfully begotten in wedlock forever. but further if my wife should not now be with Child my Will is that after her decease the Land and Plantation fall holy to my son Richard and his heirs forever as above sd. but if my son Richard should dye without issue that then the said Land and Plantation forementioned to be equally divided betwixt my son Josiah Ship and my son Thomas Ship to them and their heires forever Lawfully begotten in Wedlock.

"And further my will is that if either of them should die without issue that the whole fall to ye surviror.

"As for my Goods and Chattels I give unto my wife Jane one Gray Mare and Mare Colt with all their increase and one black stered horse and three Cows one called Pookat one Cherry one Jackpott and

one bull and one pied steere.

"Item I give to my son Thomas one young Mare wth her increase that I had of John Heale,

"Item I give to my wife Jane one feather bed & furniture and six plates and four pewter Dishes and one great bason one iron pott about six Gall and six plates more and one Tankard the biggest of ye two and the biggest of ye looking glasses and one warming pan and one pewter Chamber pott and one great Chest and one Small table and Six rush botton Chairs one table Cloath and six Napkins and one Catlaile bed with two Ruggs,

"Item I give to my son Thomas one feather bed with the furniture belonging to it and one pied heifer of my one mare and one red heifer with a Star in her forehead and one yearling heifer red I give to my sone Josiah Ship one red yearling heifer and three pewter dishes and one flore bed one blanket one sheet and a Rugg,

Item I give to my son Thomas two pewter dishes one pye plate and six small plates.

"I give to my sone Richard one two year old steer and to my son Josiah one iron pott and my sone Thomas also one iron pott and a small table.

"And therefore it is my will that my well beloved friends Thomas Meader & Wm. Garnett be joynt Executrs of this my las will and Testament as witness my hand and Seale

SECOND GENERATION

JOSIAH²THOMAS²RICHARD²

JOSIAH² SHIPP (son of Josiah¹) born _____ in Essex County, Virginia and was married by 1715 to Elizabeth Hodgson.

"John Hodgson of St. Anne Parish and Elizabeth, his wife for "love and affection for our loving son-in-law- Josiah Ship and his wife, our dear daughter Elizabeth of the said county and parish gives all land whereon Ship now lives in form of a swamp called Long Bridge Swamp adjoining land sold by Hodgson to Thomas Peatress and being 30 acres. Recorded 16 August, 1715". (Deed Book, p. 373, Essex County, 24 July, 1715).

Josiah is mentioned in a number of deeds and bonds of Essex County:

1. signed bond of Elizabeth Sky, administrator of estate of John Sky, dec'd, 20 March 1715-16.
2. witness of bond or deed of John Dudson (Hodgson) of St. Anne Parish for land on Long Bridge Swamp, also witnessed by Richard Ship, 24 July, 1715.
3. signer of bond of John Hodgson, also referred to as John Hudson, and John Huson, 10 June, 1716
4. witness to deed of Chas. Brown of St. Anne Parish 19, Sept, 1715.
5. witness bond for William Talbott 19 Sept, 1715.

THOMAS² SHIPP (son of Josiah¹) born _____ in Essex Co., and married Elizabeth _____. Removed to Orange county and died in Orange county in 1746 (?).

RICHARD² SHIPP (son of Josiah¹), born 1670 in Essex County, married Mary _____. Richard witnessed deed of John Dudson (Hodgson) of St. Anne Parish, Essex County for land on Long Bridge Swamp, 24 July, 1715 (Deed Book, p. 373, Essex Co). Also signed inventory of estate of Samuel Johnson as it was proven 14 Jan. 1715-16; Essex Co. Signed inventory of William Scott, dec'd 21 Aug, 1716, Essex Co.

The will of RICHARD² SHIPP (also spelled Ship) was signed 3 Sept, 1723 in St. Anne Parish, Essex County; names Children Richard³ and Thomas³.

WILL OF RICHARD² SHIPP

"In the name of God Amen- Sept. 3rd, 1723, I, Richard Ship, of the Parrish of St. Anne in the county of Essek being sick and weak in body but of perfect sense and memory thanks be given to God therefore, calling to mind the mortality of the body that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following:

"Imprimis, I give my soull unti the hands of God that gave it, trusting through the merits of my precious Saviour to receive the

same again and for my body I recommend it to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my executor.

"Item I, I lend to my beloved wife Mary all my land any my negro woman named Sukey during of her natural life.

"Item, I give and bequeath after my decease all my land to my son Thomas and to his heirs forever.

"Item, I give and bequeath to my son Richard my negro woman named Suckey after my wife's decease to him and his heirs forever.

"I give to my beloved wife Mary my two horses.

"Item, I give and bequeath all the rest of my estate to be divided equally between my wife and children.

"I make and ordain my beloved wife Mary my whole and sole executrix of this my las will and testament and I do utterly disannull and revoke all other wills or legacies, as witness my hand and seal this day and year above written.

Signed, Sealed, published, and pronounced by the said Richard Shipp to be his last will and testament in the presence of us ye subscribers.

This will was presented in Court by Mary Ship, Executrix within named who made oath thereto and being further proven by the oaths of James Jameson and Thomas Ship two of the witness thereto is admitted to record- - - -test- - - - Waverly C. THIRD GENERATION

RICHARD³THOMAS⁶

RICHARD³ SHIP (or Shipp), son of Richard² and Mary _____ Ship was born in _____ 1703 in Essex County, Virginia, second son of Richard² (note giving of land to Thomas in will).

A number of items in Spotsylvania county (formed from Essex in 1720-21) are found concerning Richard Ship:

1. Dec. 2, 1740: Thomas Ship of Spotsylvania county To Richard Ship of Caroline county 194 acres in Spotsylvania county for 20 pounds 5 shillings currency, land purchased by Thomas Ship 6 April 1736 from Henry Willis. (Crozier, p. 154)

2. Oct 6, 1741: guardian bonds of 150 pounds by Richard Ship guaaardian to Mary Roy, orphan of James Roy, (Crozier, p. 19)

3. Feb. 1, 1742: Richard Ship of Spotsylvania county to William Carr of Caroline county for 30 pounds currency 194 acres of land purchased of Thomas Ship. Elizabeth, wife of said Richard acknowledged her dower (could this be a clerk's error and mean Thomas?) ((Crozier, p. 161.

4. July 2, 1745: Richard Ship witness to deed of Robt Spilsbie (Crozier, p. 171).

5. In Caroline county 1756 Richard Shipp and wife Martha sell land left him by his father's will in ~~Essex~~ county to John Lee. (Deed book 27, p. 206).

The family of Richard³ Ship is quite uncertain; the data given below is gained from only letters. This branch should be corrected and added to. Richard³ born 1700-1710 (date of 1703 is already given); married Martha _____; had issue of Edmund⁴ and possibly John⁴ (whose write-up is followed later under Thomas³

Edmund⁴ Ship had issue of Captain John Shipp, born 1774 in Culpepper county, Virginia, died 1849 aged 75 yrs 6 months in Warrenton, Virginia. RICHARD⁴ SHIPP

RICHARD⁴ SHIPP, (Thomas³, Richard², Josiah¹), born about _____ 1740 (documentary proof wanted); died 1781 in Culpepper Co., Va.⁵ First married Elizabeth _____ and had issue of Ambrose⁵ born in 1756; Lucy⁵; Richard⁵ born in 1768; Josiah⁵; John⁵; Thomas⁵; Richard re-married in 1768 to Isabel _____, widow of John Martin, Senior whose will was proved 1764 in Caroline County. By this second marriage Richard⁴ had issue of Nancey. In the will of John Martin (son of Isabel and John Martin Senior), he calls "Ambrose, Richard, John, and Thomas Shipp his brothers and Nancy Shipp his sister." Whether he means "half-brothers" or whether Isabel _____ Martin was the mother of these sons is not known.

A letter of Joseph P. Shipp of Indianapolis, Ind., dated Dec. 17, 1912 states: "My grandfather Richard Shipp (who married Mary Cope-land) was but 16 years old on leaving Virginia for Kentucky with his three older brothers in 1784." By deductions we see that the three older brothers were probably born before the second marriage of Richard to Isabel.

Richard⁴ Ship or Shipp served in the Revolutionary War and is listed in the Caroline Military Record as serving in General Nelson's Corps, Light Dragoons. No record found in National Archives in Washington. Name appears on General Nelson's corps on record of that organization dated 29 July, 1778. Richard Shipp died in 1781, will proved in Culpepper County, Virginia. (Will Book B, p.435)

WILL OF RICHARD⁴ SHIPP

"In the name of God Amen: I Richard Ship of the County of Culpepper being low and weak in Body, and knowing that all flesh must yield to Death when pleases God to call, do make and Ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me made.

"Imprimisses: I give to my daughter Lucey one Good feather Bed & furniture to be by her possessed immediately after my Decease. Item 1st. I lend the Remainder of my estate of what kind soever it may be to my loving wife Isabel Ship during her natural life on which she is to raise my children & after her decease I give the remainder of my estate not already given to the remainder of my children, Ambrose, Richard, Josiah, John, Nancey and Thomas in Equal distribution.

Item 2nd. I constitute and appoint Job Popham, Joshua Shumake & George Witherall Executors of this my last Will & Testament the 9th day of February 1781.

At a Court held for Culpepper Couth the 20th day of August 1781, this Last Will and Testament of Richard Shipp deceased was Exhibited to the Court and was proved by the oaths of the Witnesses thereto and Ordered to be recorded. The Executors therein named refusing to take upon themselves the Burthen thereof. On the motion of Isabel Ship Administration with the Will annexed is granted her she having made oath thereto and given bond and security according to law.

In Fothergill, "Virginia Tax Payers of 1782, Isabel Ship is listed: 1 poll and 2 slaves, living in Culpepper Co, Va. Her daughter Nanney (Nancey) is listed as owning 2 slaves in Caroline County. In 1784 Isabel Ship, the step-mother and her sons Ambrose Richard⁵, John⁵, Thomas⁵ went to Green County, Kentucky. (In the letter previously mentioned by Joseph Peoples Shipp he mentions that Jacob is listed as a brother who came to Green County, but no reference to any Jacob has been found; nor is the name one found in this line. In the year 1784 other Shipp from Thomas⁴ line came to Kentucky (see following section).

In Green County, Kentucky the family stayed close together on farms north of present day Campbellsville and near the village of Salome. In their district was organized the Church of Christ on Pittman's Creek, a Predestinarian Baptist faith, in 1796 (first called Pittman's Creek and Robinson Creek Church). In the constitution of the church which was signed May 21, 1802 a number of the line is found. The constitution of this church was published in the Aug. 9, 1928 issue of the Western Recorder, to be found at the Filson Club in Louisville, but in the original minutes of the church, to be found in Campbellsville, one can see the handwriting of John Chandler who was one of the earliest ministers of this church. The Church in 1802 was a 30 x 30 builtind with a ground floor and was located just north of the Pittman school in the middle of a field.

Among the charter members who signed the constitution were: Isabel Shipp; Richard Ship; Thomas Shipp; Ambrose Shipp; Ruth Shipp with of Thomas; Elenor Ship, daughter of Ambrose. In 1806 a new church was proposed and the original subscription list is found in the minutes. Ambrose Ship gave twelve shillings in ~~6/0/0~~ coin; at the same time a subscription list was made to "satisfy Brother John Mulkey for attending church monthly (to preach)" and Richard Ship subscribed to \$6, Thomas Ship to \$5; and Ambrose to \$5. In 1805 the membership lists all of the above though the name is spelled SHIP;

the same is true of the September, 1813 list. However, in the May 6, 1812 list there are changes. One finds listed the following: Thomas Ship; Ambrose Ship; Eastin Ship (dec'd) {son of Ambrose; Isabella Ship; Ruth Ship (dec'd), wife of Thomas; Elenor Ship, daughter of Ambrose; James Ship, son of Richard; Betsy Ship, wife of John; Rhoda Ship, daughter of Ambrose; Mary Ship, wife of Richard; and Anna Ship, daughter of Richard.

DESCENDANTS OF RICHARD⁴ SHIP AND ELIZABETH AND ISABEL

Complete information on the fifth generation is lacking in many instances; conflicting reports of data make it inadvisable to state the exact order in which the children were born. From Richard's will on page 11 we believe that Lucy was grown as she was left "one good feather Bed and furniture to be by her possessed immediately after my Decease." One report states that Ambrose was born in 1766; Richard in 1768; John in 1770; Nancey in 1772; and Thomas in 1774; and no dates given for Josiah and Lucy-----this showing that Isabel would be the mother rather than Elizabeth. However, referring to Joseph Peoples Shipp's letter again he states his Richard came with three older brothers, and names them, to Kentucky.

WILL OF THOMAS⁵ SHIPP

(Will Book No. 2, p. 149, Greensburg, Green Co, Ky.)

"In the name of God Amen I Thomas Shipp of the State of Kentucky and county of Green being weak and sick and calling to mind the mortality of my body and the shortness and uncertainty of this mortal life but being at present of sound mind and memory do make constitute and ordain this my last will and testament revoking and disannulling all wils by me heretofore made---and first I commend my soul to God who gave it to me and my body to the earth from whence it came to be buried in a decent Christian manner at the discretion of my friends then to . . . to the moving of the resurrection and then I trust to awake by the voice of the son of God from the slumbering clay and to be raised to everlasting life, and as touching the world happiness wherewith it hath pleased God to help me It is my will and desire that they be disposed of in the following manner:

"Item 1st It is my desire at my decease that my beloved wife Betsy Ship have and enjoy the tract of land on which I now live containing 200 acres. It being the first purchase of the land which I now own during her natural life if she should so long continue my widow also one half of all the personal estate of which I may die possessed after the payment of my just debts and expenses during her natural life or widowhood, but should she choose to marry and thereby cease to be my widow then in lieu of the above provision she is to enjoy onethird of my estate both real and personal according to law as though I had died intestate.

"Item 3rd It is my will and desire that my son Easten Ship have and enjoy all the property which I have heretofore given him.

"Item 4 It is my will and desire that my daughter Nancy Sandi-pher have and enjoy all the property which I have heretofore given her

"Item 5th It is my will and desire that my sons Albert, James; Thomas, and William, my daughter Polly, my sons Washington, Samuel, and Josiah at my death each to be entitled to one hundred dollars to be made from my personal estate should there be property sufficient to produce those sums after the payments of debts and expenses and after my wife shall have taken the one half as above directed in the second item and after the payments of sums of five dollars contained in the 7 and 8 items if there should not be there those items to be made up to them at the death or marriage of my wife as the case may be or rather these sums are to be come payable to them when they may marry or may arrive at the age of 21 years.

"Item 6th It is my will and desire that my son John Shipp have and enjoy what I have already given him and which he has got in

possession and twelve month~~s~~ after my death five dollars in full of all my estate both real and personal and no more.

"Item 7th It is my will and desire that my daughter Betsy Sanders have and enjoy what I have already given her and which she has got in possession and after twelve months after my death five dollars in full of my estate both real and personal and no more.

"Item 8th It is my will and desire that my son Carter twelve month~~s~~ after my death have five dollars in full of my estate both real and personal and no more.

"Item 9th It is my will and desire that at my death all my improved land except what my wife retains to be rented and that at her death or marriage as the case may be that my executors after named or such of them as may then be alive and act shall sell and convey the whole of my and with the incumbrances of her dower should she marry as also all my personal estate which may then be on hand be sold and the money arising from the rent, sale of land and personal estate except what may be necessary to make up the sums named in 5th.

Item 10th Item be equally divided among my children Easton, Nancy, Albert, James, Thomas, William, Polly, Washington, Samuel and Josiah.

Item 11th It is my will and desire that my beloved wife Betsy Shipp and my son Easton Shipp and Horatio Chandler be the sole executors of this my last will and testament. In testimony of which I hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this 19th day of October, 1827.

WILL OF JOHN CHANDLER SANDERS
(Will Book No. 1, p. 133, Taylor County, Ky)

"I, John C. Sanders of the State of Kentucky and county of Taylor being in feeble health but of a disposing mind and memory do now make constitute and ordain this my last will and testament.

"Item 1st, it is my will and desire that all my just debts be paid.

"Item 2. It is my will and desire that my wife in case she outlives me to hold the house, tract of land and all the appurtenances thereon together with all my household property and as much stock as she may choose to retain to have, hold, and enjoy during her natural life, also to have as above described the Moore (?) place containing about fifty acres of land.

"Item 3. My wife is to have the benefit and use of our slaves so long as she may choose to keep them though should they become unmanageable she may hire them out in the family the proceeds to be for her and the minor children's benefit.

"Item 4. It is my will and desire that all my monied estate as soon as practicable at my death shall be collected and placed out at interest, said interest to be used for the clothing and schooling the minor children, Nancy Robinson, and G. Alfred Calwell, the principal of which shall not be used for any purpose whatever except for the support of my wife.

"Item 5. It is my will and desire that for the love and affection for my son-in-law Isaac Chaudoin, and my daughter Margaret Chadonis to have all that I have heretofore given them, also the fifty acres of adjoining them at six dollars per acre.

"Item 6. That my daughter Mary Jane Wright have all that I have heretofore given her and the 88 acres of land upon which she now lives, said land not to be subject to any of his, Washington G. Wright present indebtedness or hereafter at six dollars per acre.

"Item 7. That my son E.T. Sanders have all that I have heretofore given him and the tract of land upon which he now lives to be charged six dollars per acre, further if my son Thomas force the collection of a land of which my son Henry is now owner to keep the peace and especially towards his wife that in that event my son Thomas shall be charged the full amount of bond.

Item 8. That my son H.E. Sanders have all that have heretofore given him and the one hundred and twenty-five acres of land adjoining Robert Robinsons to be charged at five dollars per acre.

Item 9. That my son John C. Sanders to have all that I have heretofore given him, the tract of land upon which he now lives at six dollars per acre except a piece of land cut off by the meandering of a branch and then up to the Campbellsville and Saloma road.

Item 10. That my son Robert B. Sanders have all that I have heretofore given him and all the bordering land upon which he now

lives at five dollars per acre.

"Item 11. That my daughter Elizabeth have all that I have heretofore given her and that as soon as she may select a piece of land of which I am now possessed and not above devised the value of which shall not exceed five hundred dollars. She may have and enjoy it for a home, but in event she may see proper to remain there from she may then be entitled to any rent that may arise there of the land not to be sold during the life time of her husband if she should outlive him then she is to have the land to do as she pleases with it.

"Item 12. That my daughter Nancy and my son George Alfred Caldwell be made equal in property with the rest of my children when they went to house keeping, comprising horses, saddles, beds, and bed clothing, and etc.

I further desire that Nancy if she chooses may select any piece of land I am possessed of not already devised to be taken at a fair price or valuation if she don't choose to select land to be made equal with the rest.

"Item 13. That my son George Alfred Caldwell in addition to the above have the home tract of land at one thousand dollars together with the home place at the death of his father and mother.

"Item 14. It is my will and desire that all my children share equal in my estate those of them who have unequal amounts first to be made equal with the rest also that my grandson William Thomas Sanders at the final winding up of my estate shall receive five hundred dollars provided that he comes in and receives it in person.

"Item 15. That my executors E.G. Sanders and John C. Sanders whom I appoint shall be vested with the power to sell and convey all my lands that has not as above been disposed of upon such a credit as they may see proper and with every other power necessary to the winding up of my estate in full as set forward as herein devised.

His name appears on a roster of that regiment dated 15 Jan, 1865 with the following remark opposite his name "Prisoner of War." The date of his capture is not shown, and no later record of his has been found in the files.

The following letter written by the above indicates that he was a prisoner, but no date is to be found:

"Allegheny city, pensylvan
Mr. J.C. Sanders

"Deer sir for the second time since i have been prisner i wright to you to inform you that i am well and hope these lines will finde you and family injoying good health i never have Received a leter from you since i have been a prisner i would like very well to hear from you if you see fit to answer my leters if you dont no harme done there was a big frost here ona last sunday night i dont no what the Damage is the weather here been very dry hear and corn is sorry and i espect bit by frost i am doing very well geting plenty to eat and plenty of escercise in the way of walking about and runing jumping and pas the time of very well see to my little family all you can your I.C. Chaudoin."

(On the reverse written on letter sheet which had been trimmed on left and top: sheet was folded in three divisions. On reverse was inscription: "Direct your leter to Allegheny city pensylvania to the care of capt John burmingham Dont wright but one page of leter paper if you doe I wont get to see it." (No date on paper!)

BIOGRAPHY OF JAMES AND LUCINDA SHIPP RICHESON

On the 6th day of Nov. 1851, near Cambellsville, Taylor Co., Kentucky were born two people whose lives have been strangely parallel through all the 82 years that have passed since that time.

These were namely, James Robert Richeson, eldest son of William Richeson and Eveline Spurlin. William Richeson, his father, was the son of Jonathan Richeson and Sarah Cowherd. The other was Lucinda Shipp Richeson, daughter and seventh child of Thomas Shipp and Elizabeth Ann Preyor.

James was born in a log house of three rooms, three miles north of Cambellsville. Present on the occasion besides his mother was Dr. Sheddleworth. He was born during the night. Lucinda was born within a mile of James, also in a log house with only one room. She has lived in this same house since she was married. On the occasion of her birth there was present, her grandfather Shipp, and old Dr. Turner. Neither James' nor Lucinda's father was overly blessed with the riches of this world. They had a few acres of land on which to grow corn, sweet potatoes, and a little cotton, tobacco, and sugar cane. They also kept a few cows.

The home life of the southern people of those days was quite different from that which we enjoy today. All of their cooking, baking, heating, etc., were done by way of the fireplace. Their light was the light of the tallow candle often made by themselves. They raised their own corn and hauled it to the mill to be ground into meal as they needed it for use in making bread or mush. They raised a few sheep, sheared them of their wool, washed, carded, spun and wove it into cloth, for blankets or used the yard for knitting stocking. They also grew a little cotton, picked, seeded, carded, spun and wove it into cloth, dyed it and sewed it by hand into clothing. There is now, somewhere in the family a piece of homespun blanket that grandmother made. They kept enough cows for milk and butter; they also kept a few hogs to kill or sell, tapped trees for molasses when the sap was running, and this is the way they lived. No one would say they did not live good especially those who have partaken of the hospitality of the southern home.

They had very little schooling. James went to a school taught by his uncle, Jonathan Richeson, for a short time. Lucinda went to part of a three month's school. We can almost close our eyes and imagine a little barefoot boy in homespun pants and factory shirt. A little barefoot girl with a calico dress playing in the woods with wild blackberry stain on their lips-----.

They were ten years of age when the Civil War began. They can well remember some of the days of the great war. Lucinda had three brothers who fought in the War, and one who died while in the service. He died from the effect of a horse kick and typhoid fever. They can remember seeing thousands of soldiers camped only half a mile from

their home.

The soldiers were no respectors of persons or property. They would help themselves to the chickens, geese or pigs; they would go into the orchards and strip the trees of their fruit. A story is told of how a soldier came right into the house and took the baking bread out of the oven, but it was so hot that it burned his fingers and he dropped it and ran.

On another occasion Lucinda's mother had two turkeys and the soldiers got one of them. Rather than lose the other one, they decided to cook and eat it. While it was cooking, a soldier came into the house and took it from the oven and was about to get away with it but her mother grabbed the broom and ordered him to drop it, which he did. They can remember hearing the soldiers shoot through the woods for practice.

James sold pies by the side of the road to the soldiers for 10 cents a piece. The pies were baked by his mother and aunt. One day two soldiers rushed up the stand, took two pies and were about to leave with them when one of the officers made them come back and pay for them.

At night the soldiers camped and they turned their horses into the grain and corn fields and let them eat. Many times they have seen boys in the army marching along with the soldiers that were too small to carry a musket. There were, indeed, hard and trying days for the people of the country.

After the great war came the hardest times of all; calico sold for 50 cents a yard, and in those days it took ten yards to make a dress. Thus, it would cost five dollars for a calico dress. The price of food such as they had to buy was very high. It was next to impossible to buy shoes. They can remember going around the old soldiers camps and picking up shoes left by the men, to see if they might be worn by any member of the family. The great war wrecked the hearts and homes of many when brother fought against brother and father against son. No wonder the country was in such a state at the close of it.

When these two people were twelve years of age they met; the occasion being as follows: Lucinda had gone a mile away from home to borrow a plow from a neighbor. With this plow she was to prepare five acres of ground for planting as her father was dead and her three older brothers were all in the war. On her return trip she met a very dirty little boy. He was barefoot and was wearing ragged trousers. Dirty as he was he could see that a plow was a little too heavy a load for a twelve year old girl. So he offered to help her and carried it the rest of the way home for her. This was the first meeting of these two people. They were reared in the same country and community seeing little of each other, but at the same time knowing each other until they were about twenty years old.

The Baptist Church of their community was holding protracted meetings. At one of these Lucinda and some of her folks attended. After the meeting James walked down the hill with them and as they had to cross the creek on a rail he helped them across. She was the

last to cross and he took her arm and walked the rest of the way home with her. This was in 1871. They kept company with each other for about one year and were married August 15, 1872, in the district of Saloma, Tylor county, by a preacher whose name was Lipskin. The first house they lived in was one of logs built by themselves in the wood. James worked around for other people for awhile for wages. Thus, they met, and they married to become in time parents and grandparents of many. (Article written by one of the descendants of James and Lucinda).

Married Rachel Grant, (proof held by one descendant of another line). In will filed in the 1777-1781 court the names of his children are given. Thomas⁴ Shipp served in the Revolutionary War and was paid (Book War 22, Archives, Virginia). In same book Thomas Shipp had account of 0: 1: 3. (?) 60-67, Oct, 1778 (See Rev. Pay Accounts, also Caroline Co Minute Book, 1774-1781, p. 136) A deed from Thomas Shipp and Rachel his wife to Richard Shipp, being here proven by the oath of William Murry and Edmund Shipp (Order Book 1777-1780, Oct, 1778, p. 125, Essex Co, Va).

Richard Ship is appointed guardian of Fanny and _____ of Thomas Ship, dec'd, etc." "Slayton Stern, David Stern, Ruben Saunders, and George Alsop and William Poe or any three are appointed appraisers."

They moved with their family in 1784, in a group called "The Travelling Church," to Kentucky, and settled in the northern end of Woodford county and lived in cabins until they could get together material to build the present home which is located about four miles from Midway and seven miles from Versailles. All the lumber and brick that is in this house came from the farm. Richard Jonathan⁵ died in 1821.

(Minute Book, April court, 1776, p. 620, Caroline Co, Va).

In the administration of his father's will (Thomas⁴) he appears in the Revolutionary records in 1780 in list of specified taxes collected by Joseph Timberlake Jr., one of the collectors appointed by the commissioners of the county of Caroline, Port Royal, Mar 17, 1780. In the 1782 Virginia tax payers Edmund listed Caroline Co., 1 poll and 6 slaves. Appears in 1784 on personal property tax list with his brothers Richard, Lemuel, etc.

In August, 1799, Edmund appears in Chancery Court papers, now residing in Jefferson County, Ky and having given bond to be paid when Elizabeth, the wife of Richard Shipp (his brother) should release her right of dower in the deed given October, 1794. Daniel Conduit sued Edmund. John Shipp, agent of Edmund, resides in Berkeley or Frederick Co., Va and is about to remove to Kentucky. Edmund also lived in Frederick county at one time. On July 15, 1806, Edmund again appears in chancery court in a rather interesting case in which his brother Lemuel's heirs are involved.

Ship, Narcissa Ship, or Sophia Ship should die & leave no issue lawfully begotten my desire is that her portion should be divided among the sisters then surviving.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint my beloved wife Extrx, and W. Jonothan Fennell Executor to this my last will and Testament. In whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirteenth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty seven.

JOHN⁴ SHIPP, thought to be the son of Thomas³ (Richard², Josiah¹), but it may be that he is a son of Richard³ Ship. The evidence to date is not based on records, but upon supposition-----which even though intangible, still leads one to believe John is placed in the correct position. Letters from people many years ago indicate that their people stated the three families of Shipp who came into Kentucky were related; there is a definite similarity of names in the various generations, especially the fifth and sixth; the counties of Virginia from which the three lines came are all adjoining.

JOHN⁴ SHIPP, born _____; d Mar 4, 1778, Fauquier Co, Va; married Sally Johnson in Fauquier Co, Va _____. John's will was filed at Warrenton, Fauquier Co, Va, Will Book I, p. 324) Feb. 19, 1778; in which he names his children: Richard Wiatt⁵, Laban⁵, Colby⁵, Polly (Mary)⁵, Sukey (Susan)⁵, Betsy⁵, Nancy⁵.

WILL OF JOHN⁴ SHIPP

"I, John Shipp of the County of Fauquier in Colony of Virginia, being very sick and weak in body, but of perfect sense and memory thanks be to Almighty God for the same and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make, ordain and constitute this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say first and principally, I recommend my soul to God who gave it me and my body to the Earth from whence it was taken to be buried in such Christian like manner as my Executors hereafter mentioned shall think proper and for what wordly estate it hath pleased God to bestow on me. I dispose of the following. viz:

- "ITEM. My desire is that all my just debts and funeral charges first be paid and discharged.
- "ITEM. I give and bequeath to my son Richard Wiatt Shipp, negroes, big Lucy and Little Lucy to him and heirs and assigns.
- "ITEM. I give and bequeath to my son Laban Shipp, negroes, Sampson and Judy to him and his heirs, etc.
- "ITEM. I give and bequeath to my son Colby Shipp, negroes, Tom and Joshua, to him and his heirs, etc.
- "ITEM. I give and bequeath to my daughter Polly Shipp, negroes, Milly and Ben and to her and her heirs etc.
- "ITEM. I give and bequeath to my daughter Suckey Drummond, negroes Hannah and Lancaster to her and her heirs etc.
- "ITEM I GIVE AND BEQUEATH TO my daughter Nancy Shipp, negro Amey, to her and her heirs together with seventy-five pounds of Virginia currency.
- ITEM. I give and bequeath to my daughter Betsy Shipp, negroes, Winnie and Davie, to her and her heirs.
- ITEM. I give and bequeath the rest of my estate to be equally divided among my children before mentioned and if any of them die under age and unmarried that then their parts be equally divided among the survivors.

"ITEM. My will and desire is that my sons Richard Wiatt Shipp and Laban Shipp be my whole and sole executors of this my last will and Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my Seal, the day and year first above written

I. RICHARD WIATT⁵ SHIPP, b. April 26, 1755 in what became Fauquier county, V; died 1792 in Scott county, Kentucky; married Elizabeth Turner, March, 1778 in Fauquier Co., Va (born Feb 23, 1766). In the 1782 Virginia taxpayers Richard Wiatt is listed as 1 poll, 11 slaves, living in Fauquier Co. In 1785 Richard Wiatt and family moved to Laban Shipp's fort until they built their own homes near Georgetown, Ky. In a letter written from Georgetown, Feb. 18, 1863 this quote: "Aunt Hawkins (Mary Shipp who m Martin Hawkins, she was daughter of Richard Wiatt) told me she came to Kentucky when she was about six years old and that would make the arrival of herself and Laban and Richard in 1785; Colby also came at the same time though she says Laban and Richard emigrated to this country in the olden times. I have a small notebook of Richard Wyatt Shipp, my grand-father, in it is the date of an account which is "July 24, 1783," so this is his own evidence that he was here at that time, though they might have, probably did, come sooner for he says in a note of Laban Shipp "he also owes me 54 barrels of corn payable N v 3 next." showing that they were farming." (Sanders question: Could not this item have been written concerning farm in Virginia before they left for Ky?)

Mary Shipp Hawkins wrote also of the trip into Kentucky: "1785 I reached Kentucky with my father and mother in April, landing at Maysville. I don't think there was a building there. We dug steps up the river bank. We found a few houses at Washington. My uncle, Laban Shipp, came to Kentucky the year previous and built a fort near Haun's Mill. Colonel Johnson, came the year before Laban Shipp did and erected a fort at Great Crossing. As I passed the Blue Licks I remember well the ground was covered with the bleached bones of the slain in the battle that was fought at that place. We went to the fort near Haun's Mill and remained there until my father built a log cabin near the spring on the farm owned by Rhodes Estill, Flornoy, Bellows and Hall. I lived there nearly sixteen years. For

about three years after I came here there was not a stick amiss where Georgetown now stands. The remains of a fort were to be seen at the head of the Big Spring Branch and we used to go to Church at the Great Crossing by a blazed road. My father died seven years after we reached here. I was married on the farm named and in the first hewed log house that was covered with shingles in Fayette county. The first brick house that I remember was built by old Robert Sanders, near the Cane Run bridge, and now occupied by Prewitt. (house referred to is the one now occupied by Wm H. Graves.

Richard W and his brother Colby had 29,936 acres on Cumberland Mt taken out Oct 11, 1784 (Book 3, p 424, Ky Entries and Deeds of Jefferson Co, Ky). In the Virginia Grants of Land Richard W. Shipp is listed as having 18,520 acres in Bourbon Co., and on the Big Sandy River (Book 7, p. 136) granted Ap 26, 1787; his brothers Colby and Taban also had land close to him.

In 1792 Richard Wiatt Shipp died. Scott Co. "James Kay and David Flourroy qualified as bondsmen for Polly Shipp, Sally Shipp, William Shipp, Turner Shipp and Dudley Shipp, orphans of Richard W. Shipp, Nov 26, 1793" (Scott Co Ky Will Book B p. 88).
