THOMAS SKINNER (1)

Born in 1617 in Chichester, Eng. (County Sussex.) Died in Malden, Mass., March 2, 1703-4. Married (1) Mary ———, who died April 9, 1671, and then he married (2) Lydia Call (or Ball), widow, who died Dec. 17, 1723, at Malden, Mass., aet. 87 years. By Mary ——— he had these

CHILDREN

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Thomas (1) came to Malden between 1649 and 1652, with wife Mary and two sons, Thomas and Abraham. He had been a victualler in England, and on May 31, 1652, was licensed to keep an "ordinary" in Malden. (As Thomas Call was the first beer seller of Mystic Side, so to Thomas Skinner belongs the doubtful honor of being the first recorded dealer in "strong waters" in Malden.) He was admitted as freeman in Malden, May 18, 1685.

(From History of Malden, by Cory.)

"Thomas (1) and his wife, Lydia Call, gave their son Abraham in 1673-4 (Middlesex County deeds X. 531) what had been the estate of her former husband, Thomas Call. The house stood near the southeast corner of Cross and Walnut Sts. Abraham died soon after, leaving widow, Hannah, to whom his father deeded the lot numbered 75 in the 2d Division in consideration of maintenance 'with meat, drink and clothes for my life.' Abraham was one of the proprietors, (74 in number) of the tract called 'The Sheep Pastor, on the west side of ye mill brook' 3268 acres." On page 435 is the following: "Thomas Call died in November, 1678; his widow, Lydia, (Shepherdson) married Thomas Skinner, and carried the home of her former husband into the Skinner family. After her death it was in the occupancy of Abraham Skinner, (perhaps her son) and it afterwards passed into the hands of the Parkers, in some way of which I have no record. This estate, when deeded to Abraham in 1693-4, comprised three acres of land with house and barn on northerly side of road, and twelve acres on the southerly side of the road. The removal of the highway in 1729 left the house on the southerly side of new way. The old house was not standing in 1798; its cellar remained till sixty years ago, and a large rock in the field near southeast corner of present Cross and Walnut Sts., bore name of SKINNER ROCK, preserving name of former owners. It was removed in 1887."

Thomas (2) removed to Colchester, Conn., early in the eighteenth century, and was one of the Original Proprietors. He took with him his wife and sons

Richard, Benjamin, Ebenezer and Nathaniel, and his daughter Abigail. His name and that of his son Ebenezer appear frequently in the records as holding various town offices. On Jan. 21, 1702, he and his son Benjamin and others were granted a lot of land "the litel round medow" &c., and in May of the same year there was granted to Thomas Skinner a house lot 160 rods in length and 21 rods in breadth, and in addition sixty acres of land. In the trustees' deed to the original proprietors, dated April 28, 1713, appear the names of Thomas Skinner and his sons, Richard, Benjamin and Ebenezer. On March 29, 1709, he deeded land to "my son, Nathaniel Skinner." The date of his death is not in the records, but in May, 1722 the Assembly released Deacon Thomas Skinner and Joseph Gillett from "all taxes that are due to the public treasury upon account of an assessment set upon their heads by the listers of Colchester in the year 1720." In a diary kept by his son Thomas is recorded the births "of all my father's children except Abigail." Also "Mother Skinner died, March 26, 1704," which agrees with the Colchester town records.

His father-in-law, Richard Pratt, was, it is said, the youngest of nine children of John Pratt of Malden, County Essex, Eng., and was baptized there, June 29, 1615. He died in 1691.

Stephen (5) was called out at the time of the Revolutionary war, but as he had a blind father to support he was excused from service. He was a Presbyterian—or, as the tradition goes, “belonged to the standing order.” He afterwards became an Episcopalian, on account of a disagreement with a brother in the Presbyterian church. He moved from Westchester, Conn., to Sherburne, N. Y. He was three weeks on the road, with two yoke of oxen, four or five cows and a dozen sheep. He settled on a high hill in the Town of Sherburne, which took his name and has since been known as “Skinner Hill.” He bought two “lots” of land of 250 acres each, and divided one of the lots between three of his sons, Stephen, Alfred and Amasa. Stephen did not occupy his share, but Alfred made his home on his, and bought Amasa’s.

LEGENDARY HISTORY IN REGARD TO STEPHEN SKINNER'S CHILDREN.

Stephen Skinner, Jr., was a carpenter by trade, and his brothers, Amasa and Alfred, were apprenticed to him. When they were ready to start out for themselves Amasa wished Alfred to come to New York state to find work; so he came all the way on foot, with his broadax, carried partly as a weapon of defense, as there were wild animals in the woods. He came to the Unadilla River at the Five Corners, about a mile above where is now the village of New Berlin, and there he found a ferry to cross the stream. From there he found his way to Nathaniel Kinney's—an old neighbor from Connecticut, and there he spent his first night in that country. He soon found work—building a house above Sherburne at first and afterwards a house for Mr. Kinney.

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER GRAVE HERE, TO MARK

Arlington Heights, Illinois

**D. A. R. to Conduct Not-
able Ceremony Tomor-
row Afternoon**

6-12-1831

The unveiling of a boulder monument to the memory of a Revolutionary war soldier, whose body was lain in Elk Grove cemetery on S. State road, north of Higgins road, near Arlington Heights, will take place tomorrow afternoon with ceremonies and speechmaking sponsored by the Daughters of the American Revolution. The ceremony was timed to fall next to Flag Day, which is Sunday.

The Rev. H. A. Kossack of the First Presbyterian church of Arlington Heights, is among the speakers, and the Boy Scouts have been asked to take part.

Other speakers are to include Mrs. Burt T. Wheeler, retiring regent of the General Henry Dearborn chapter, D. A. R., who will preside; Mrs. Vinton E. Sisson, national vice chairman of the committee on national defense; and Miss Addie Boziene, a descendent of Aaron Miner, the soldier above whose grave the monument is set.

A new organization, the children of the Revolution is to be represented there; it is a junior group of the D. A. R.

The boulder will be of the same kind of granite as Plymouth Rock. It bears the following inscription:

Aaron Miner

Born Woodbury, Conn., March 22, 1757. Died Elk Grove, Ill. March 29, 1849. He served in the Conn. Militia during the Revolutionary War.

Distinguished himself at the following places: Lake George, Lake Champlain, St. John's and Montreal.

**General Henry Dearborn
Chapter, D. A. R.**

The body of Eli Skinner, another soldier in the Revolutionary war, was buried near by.

(Signed, among others) Ebenr Coston."

He is supposed to have had a brother named Bishop Coston, who was also a Revolutionary soldier.

Ebenezer Coston (2) enlisted in Francestown, N. H., May 7, 1782, for three years as a private in Capt. Isaac Frye's company, 1st New Hampshire Regiment, commanded by Lieut. Col. Henry Dearborn; transferred at Newburg, N. Y., June 16, 1783, to the Commander in Chief's Guard, commanded by Lieut. Commander William Colfax; discharged at West Point, N. Y., Dec. 20, 1783. While one of Washington's Guard he was barely eighteen years of age, but was over six feet tall; he went with the Guard to Mount Vernon at the close of the war, and while there was taken ill and Mrs. Washington sent delicacies to him.

In account of state bounties for Continental soldiers who enlisted in 1782 for three years or during the war, and in the list of Revolutionary soldiers whose residence is given as Francestown, N. H., is the name of EBENEZER COSTON, May 7, 1782.

WILLIAM GOFFE, of Hadley, Mass.

A Maj. Gen. in England, a member of the pretended High Court of Jus-
tice selected by the Long Parliament to sentence Charles I. to death. Ar-
rived in Boston the 27th of July, 1660; staid a short time at Cambridge, and
in February following went to New Haven; reached that town the 7th of
March in company with Lieut. Gen. Edward Whalley, (whose daughter
Frances he had married.) They lived in concealment some years, but in
October, 1664, took up permanent residence at Hadley with Rev. John Russell,
where he outlived wife some years, and died in 1679. Dr. Stiles in his his-
tory mistook the gravestone at New Haven of Gov. Matthew Gilbert, marked
M. G., 80, for his, but he was, we know, buried without any mark at the
grave with his father-in-law at Hadley, more than 100 miles off, and our
fathers probably could not have violated the sanctity and secrecy of their
resting place under an idle pretense of doing honor to their memories. In
our own days the remains have been discovered close to the foundation of
Russell house.

He was the son of Rev. Stephen, of Stanmer, in County Sussex. His
three children, Elizabeth, Ann and Francis, (if this last be not, as some-
times said, Frederic) remained in England with his excellent wife, of whom
three letters are in print. Very large and impartial story of these regicides
is in Htch. I, 213-19, and the cool judgment of modern times may ratify
what "matchless" Mitchell wrote contempora., that since he had "opportunity
to look a little into that action for which these men suffer. I could never
see that it was justifiable." Perhaps he felt that putting to death in cold
blood the sovereign with whom they had treated on equal terms as their
captive for several years was a murder unless excus. by necessity and that
coward pretense when need is easily found.

He was schoolmaster, surveyor, committee to lay out lands, selectman, deputy to the general court, &c. He was first elected representative to the general assembly in 1706, and was re-elected for 22 consecutive sessions. He died Aug. 20, 1774, aet. 92 years. His son, Nathaniel, lived to be nearly 99 years of age.
