Preface

The Switzer and Stuckey families were Pennsylvania-Dutch or Pennsylvania-German, the two terms being equivalent and interchangeable.

The Pennsylvania-Dutch are descended from immigrants from Switzerland, the Palatinate and other lands of the Rhine country, other provinces of South Germany, and Alsace.

They are not Holland Dutch but on their way to America they came down the Rhine and stopped in Holland. In most cases their stay in Holland was brief.

With the exception of the members of the Swiss Reformed Church these immigrants left their homes on account of religious persecution.

The ships bearing them from Holland to America stopped in England and in many cases the immigrants remained in England for a time. Some of them went to Ireland instead of to America and others remained in England. Of the latter some joined the British army.

Nearly all the families allied to the Switzer and Stuckey families were also Pennsylvania-Dutch.

The Matter of Spelling

People were not always so careful about the spelling of their names and brothers often spelled the family name differently. John Crone, great-grandfather of the author, always wrote the name Crone but in the family Bible which he owned the name was spelled Croan. His brother spelled the name Krone and some of his more distant relatives of the same line spelled the name Krohn.

It may be said, therefore, that the spelling of names some years back was not a matter of much consequence.

The name Switzer is spelled Schweitzer, Schwitzer, Sweitzer, Switzer, Sweizer, etc. Sweetser, Swisher, etc., are variations of the same name.

The name Stuckey is spelled Stuke, Stucki, Stucky, Stukey, Stookey, Stookie. Some families of this name pronounce the name as if the first syllable was stuck. Other families pronounce the first vowel like the double-o in stoop. Our family pronounce the first syllable to rhyme with book.

Barbara Stuckey, daughter of John Stukey (1742-1818) and ancestress of the author, signed her name Barbara Stucky at least one time.

It must be remembered, too, that the names were often written by clerks and other persons.

THE SWITZER FAMILY

According to family tradition our Switzer family came from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. They settled first in Somerset County, Pennsylvania, and later in Fairfield County, Ohio. The authentic history of our family begins with Jacob Switzer who died between 1813 and 1816.

In the past we have attempted to trace our family to Peter Switzer who was one of four brothers who came from Wurtemberg about 1740. Of these brothers Peter Settled in Brecknock Township, Lancaster County, Pa., now Berks County. Another settled in Northampton County, a third in Cumberland County and the fourth in a part of Lancaster County which now belongs to Dauphin.

The will of Peter Switzer of Brecknock Township was dated June 30, 1798 and proved Aug. 9, 1798. The will mentions the widow Elizabeth whose maiden name was doubtless Hefflefinger. It is said she came over on the same ship with him. A son Frederick was given a hundred acres of land along Bernard Beler's land called the Upper Part of the Plantation. His son Peter was to receive the remainder of the plantation with all buildings and improvements. The remainder of the property was to go to the other nine children, none of whom are named except Barbara who is to inherit if she remains a widow. She had married John Zerbe, then deceased, and mention is made of her children. Among the unnamed children may be our ancestor Jacob Switzer.

The children of our Jacob Switzer who died between 1813 and 1816 signed an indenture March 18, 1816, conveying land in Fairfield County, Ohio, to Jacob Baugher, Jr. Among the children was Peter Switzer who was then living in or near Somerset, Pa. An examination of the records of Somerset County, Pa. has been made. It is evident that there were at least two Switzer families living in Somerset County. Records of both lines are given.

Peter Switzer, Sr., Somerset County, Pa.

Hay Peter Switzer, Brothers Valley Township, made a will dated July 20, 1816, probated April 30, 1817. The executors were his "trusty friends George May and George Waker (Walker?). The land consisted of 140 acres adjoining that of Ludwick Shultz, Frederick Sutter, Jacob Gibler, deceased and Nicholas Miller, deceased. The children were Peter Switzer, Jacob Switzer, Elizabeth Switzer married to David Philippi, Margaret Switzer married first to Jacob Countryman, deceased, and then to Michael Pedroy and Catherine Switzer married to Peter Mentin. *Martin - original wife*

In the Berlin Reformed cemetery are buried Peter Switzer who died at the age of 77 years and Veronica Schweizerin, age 74 years. The dates of death are not given but it may be assumed that this is the Peter Switzer who died in 1817. In that case he was born in 1740 and could not have been the father of our Jacob Switzer whose first child was born in 1776. They may have been brothers.

Peter Switzer, Sr., and wife Franey, Brothers Valley Township, deeded a farm called Petersburg to Jacob Switzer, son, for five dollars, love and affection. Warrant for this land was issued to Peter Switzer Oct. 5, 1784 and patented March 3, 1806. See patent book 56, page 354. In the tract were 166 acres. -Deed Book 7, p. 307.

Peter Switzer, Sr., deeded land to Peter Switzer, Jr., Nov. 18, 1799 for \$200. Deed recorded Oct. 9, 1815. -Deed Book 7, p. 433.

Peter Switzer and wife Francois, Brothers Valley Township, deeded land to John Hooper of Bedford County, June 6, 1792. Land in Berlin. -Deed Book 4, page 33.

Peter Switzer, Brothers Valley Township, to Peter Philippi, executor. -Deed Book 2, p. 136.

Peter Switzer, Jr., Somerset County, Pa.

Peter Switzer, Jr., deeded land received from Peter Switzer, Sr., to George Hoch and Jacob Countryman, Brothers Valley, Oct. 10, 1818. -Deed Book 8, p. 330.

The Census of 1800 shows Peter Switzer, Jr., living in Somerset Township, Somerset County, Pa. In the family were one male under ten and one sixteen to twenty-six and one female sixteen to twenty-six.

The Census of 1810 shows Peter Switzer, Jr., living in Somerset Township. In the family were three males under ten and one between twenty-six and forty-five, two females under ten and one between twenty-six and forty-five.

Peter and Margaret Switzer, Somerset County, Pa.

It seems almost certain that this Peter Switzer is Peter Switzer, Jr. The census shows only two of this name in Somerset County and the other is accounted for.

Peter Switzer and wife Margaret deeded land to John P. Finkle May 7, 1803. -Deed Book 4, p. 999

Peter Switzer and wife Margaret deeded land to John Lanning Feb. 2, 1826. -Deed Book 11, p. 287;

Peter Switzer and wife Margaret deeded land to Absalom Casebar April 2, 1814. -Deed Book 7, p. 194.

Peter Switzer and wife Margaret deeded land four miles west of Somerset to David Levan April 16, 1831. -Deed Book 14, p. 43.

Peter Switzer, son of our Jacob, Somerset County, Pa.

It has been noted that the wife of Peter Switzer, son of our Jacob who went to Fairfield County, Ohio, was named Mary. It seems evident she was the daughter of Godlieb Reaman.

Peter Switzer gave a deed of release to Godfrey Stahl Nov. 2, 1813. They were executors of the estate of Gotlip Reaman (also written Godlieb Raman, etc.). Peter Switzer was entitled to one share of the estate since his wife was a daughter of Gotlip Reaman. -Deed Book 7, page 133.

Gotlieb Reaman, Stony Creek Township, made a will dated Oct. 27, 1804, mentioning wife Feronica, children, John, George, Elizabeth married John Shank, Anna Maria married Peter Switzer. -Will Book 1, p. 222. Land was in Milford Township.

The Census of 1800 shows Peter Switzer in Somerset Township and in the family were one male between sixteen and twenty-six, one female under ten and one between sixteen and twenty-six.

The Census of 1810 shows Peter Switzer (of Jacob) living in Somerset Township. In the family were one male between twenty-six and forty-five, four females under ten and one between twenty-six and forty-five.

Peter Switzer, Somerset County, Pa.

No attempt has been made to show which Peter Switzer is meant in any case.

In 1816 Peter Switzer deeded land to Jacob Cover-Deed Book 16, p. 620.

Peter Switzer, Somerset Township, bonds recorded in 1832. George Chorpemning and Jacob Friedline, administrators.-Bond Book 3, p. 47.

Peter P. Switzer and Daniel Stahl, executors, estate of Jacob Loud, Somerset Township, April 9, 1832.

Peter P. Switzer, 1855. Jacob A. Switzer, administrator. Bond Book 1, p. 241

Jacob Switzer, son of Peter Switzer, Sr., Somerset County, Pa.

Jacob Switzer and wife Polly, Brothers Valley Tp., deeded to Jacob Alter land given by Peter and Franey Switzer June 3, 1817, for \$2500.-Deed Book 9, p. 346.

The Census of 1800 shows Jacob Switzer living in Somerset Township. It seems that some error was made in showing the number and ages of his family. He was evidently a young man.

Jacob Switzer, Northampton Township, 1856. Was he a son of Peter Switzer, Sr.? -Will Book 5, p. 92

Jacob Switzer, Alleghany Township, deeded personal effects to Philip Burroughs April 29, 1815. Which Jacob was he?

Jacob and Barbara Switzer, Somerset County, Pa.

Jacob Switzer and wife Barbara, Somerset Township, deeded land to John Marsteller and George Marsteller April 16, 1803. This tract of land consisted of 127 acres formerly in Quakening Township, Bedford County, then in Somerset County.-Deed Book 7, p. 545.

The Census of 1800 shows Jacob Switzer living in Somerset Township, Somerset County, Pa. In the family were one male between ten and sixteen, two between sixteen and twenty-six and one over forty-five, two females under ten, one ten to sixteen and one over forty-five. This corresponds pretty closely to our family.

Mrs. Rebecca (Iler) Powell said she believed her grand-parents were Frederick and Barbara Switzer. It seems they were Jacob and Barbara.

Jacob Switzer must have left Somerset County, Pa. between 1800 and 1810.

Census of 1790, Pennsylvania

The first figure shows males over sixteen, the second males under sixteen and the third figure the number of females in each family. The person named is the head of the family.

Peter Sweitzer, 107, Brecknock Township, Berks County

Jacob Sweitzer, 212, Union Township, Berks County

Peter Sweitzer, 103, Brecknock Township, Berks County.

Frederick Sweizer, 101, Brecknock Township, Berks County

Jacob Sweitzer, 125, Fallowfield Township, Chester County

Jacob Sweitzer, 132, Lampeter Township, Lancaster County

Jacob Swisher, 101, Coventry Township, Chester County.

If our Jacob Switzer is in this list and he must have been, he was the Jacob Sweitzer who lived in Lampeter Township, Lancaster County. Four sons of our Jacob were born before 1790. Since there is no record of John later, it is possible that he died young. Peter was fourteen and he may have been working for another family. Both daughters were born after 1790. That leaves a second female to be accounted for. She may have been the mother of Jacob or his wife or she may have been a domestic.

Miscellaneous

In 1790 Jacob Switzer lived in Lampeter Township, Lancaster County. In 1800 there were no Switzers in Lampeter but in that year Jacob Switzer appears in the census of 1800.

In 1800 the only Switzers in Lancaster County were the following:

a) Ludwig Switzer, Warwick Township. Males, one under ten, one ten to sixteen, one twenty-six to forty-five, females, three under ten, one ten to sixteen, and one twenty-six to forty-five.

b) Stephen Sweitzer, Lancaster town, one male over forty-five, one female over forty-five.

c) John Sweitzer, Lancaster town, one male under ten, one twenty-six to forty-five, one female under ten, one twenty-six to forty-five.

d) Widow Sweitzer, Lancaster town, one male under ten, one female under ten, one female twenty-six to forty-five, one over forty-five.

e)

In 1800 the following Switzer families were in Somerset County, Pa.

a) Peter Sweitzer, Brothers Valley Tp., one male over forty-five. He probably lived in Berlin. This may have been the Census of 1800.

b) Jacob Sweitzer, Somerset Township, a young man.

c) Jacob Sweitzer, Somerset Tp., one male ten to sixteen, two sixteen to twenty-six, one over forty-five, two females under ten, one ten to sixteen, one over forty-five.

d) Peter Sweitzer, Somerset Tp., one male sixteen to twenty-six, one over forty-five, two females under ten, one ten to sixteen, one over forty-five.

e) Peter Sweitzer, Somerset Tp., one male sixteen to twenty-six, one female under ten, one sixteen to twenty-six.

f) Peter Sweitzer, Jr., one male under ten, one sixteen to twenty-six, one female sixteen to twenty-six.

The Census of 1810 shows the following Switzers in Somerset County, Pa.

a) Peter Switzer, Brothers Valley Tp., one male over forty-five, one female over forty-five.

b) Peter Switzer, Jr., three males under ten, one twenty-six to forty-five, two females under ten, one twenty-six to forty-five.

c) Peter Switzer (of Jacob) one male twenty-six to forty-five, four females under ten, one twenty-six to forty-five.

d)

What became of Jacob Switzer, son of Peter Switzer, Sr.? Was he the Jacob Switzer who died in Fairfield County, Ohio, leaving a widow Eve and a son Henry among other children?

Number 1 First Generation Unknown

It is possible that the first ancestor of our family was Peter Switzer of Brecknock Township, Lancaster now Berks County.

Number 2 Second Generation(1) Jacob Switzer

It is very probable that our Jacob Switzer was the Jacob Sweitzer of Lampeter Township, Lancaster County, Pa., whose family is included in the Census of 1790. One male over sixteen, three males under sixteen and two females were listed.

It seems very certain that our Jacob Switzer was the Jacob Switzer who lived in Somerset Township, Somerset County, Pa. and whose wife was Barbara. In this case he must have left Somerset County between 1800 and 1810. He acquired land in Fairfield County, Ohio. This land was deeded to John Baugher, Jr. by indenture signed March 18, 1816, by Jacob Switzer, Jr., and wife Sophia, Frederick Switzer and wife Barbara of Richland County, Ohio, John Isler (Iler) and wife Polly of Licking County, William Ream and wife Betsy of Fairfield County, Peter and wife Mary of in or near Somerset, Pa. This land was granted Jacob Switzer, Sr., and Jacob Switzer, Jr. by patent dated Nov. 26, 1813 at Chillicothe. Adam and Sarah Weaver witnessed the signatures of William and Betsy Ream. Jacob Switzer, Sr., was dead at the time this indenture was signed. Evidently his wife had also died.

Since William Ream married one of the daughters of Jacob Switzer, it is interesting to note that Michael Ream of Berlin, Pa., hatmaker, moved to Berlin, Ohio, near where Jacob Switzer acquired land.

The Bible of Jacob and Barbara Switzer is in the possession of the writer. From it are taken the dates of birth of the children of Jacob and Barbara Switzer.

a) Peter, March 3, 1776. His wife was doubtless Mary Reiman, daughter of Gottlieb Reiman. In 1816 he lived at or near Somerset, Pa.

b) Jacob (32), November 13, 1779.

c) Frederick (3), February 17, 1783.

d) John, November 20, 1786. He had died, it seems, before 1816. Perhaps he died in infancy.

e) Elizabeth, April 19, 1791. She married William Ream. He may have been a son of Michael Ream of Berlin, Pa., and later of Berlin, Ohio. At Lancaster, Ohio, there is a record of the marriage of William Ream and Liddy Switzer Nov. 7, 1806. This was probably Libby Switzer. If so, she was married before she was sixteen.

f) Magdalene (48), June 27, 1794.

Number 3 Third Generation(2) Frederick Switzer

Frederick Switzer was born Feb. 17, 1783, and died May 19, 1855. From Pennsylvania he came to Fairfield County, Ohio. He married Barbara Stukeley Jan. 15, 1808. She was born August 7, 1790 and died at Lucas, Ohio, April 7, 1862. It is not known when they went to Richland County, Ohio, but they were residing there as early as March 18, 1816. The tax lists of Monroe Township for 1819 bear the names of Frederick and Jacob Switzer and John Iler.

The old farm lies a fraction of a mile from Lucas. All of the old buildings are gone but in the foundation of the new barn there is a stone bearing the inscription-"June 6, 1834. PS". The place is now owned by Arthur Leiter.

Frederick and Barbara Switzer deeded sixty acres of the N.E. quarter of section 8, township 22, range 17 and sixty acres of the N.W. quarter of section 8, township 21, range 17, to Peter Switzer retaining a life interest in the same.

Children: Catherine(4); Peter(5); Sampson(9); Samuel(31); John(10); Mary(11); Elizabeth(20); Barbara(21); Rachel(27); Frederick(28); Rebecca(29); Sarah(30).

Number 4 Fourth Generation(3) Catherine Switzer

Catherine Switzer was born at Lucas, Ohio, Feb. 27, 1821, and died at Garrett, Indiana, in 1907. She married John Crone August 26, 1839. He was born August 26, 1818, and died at Kendallville, Indiana, Dec. 11, 1898. Forten years after their marriage they lived on the farm of Cyrus Tucker near Lucas, Ohio, and in 1849 they removed to a farm near Kendallville, Indiana. Michael King and John Weaver, both of whom married sisters of Catherine Switzer Crone came with them to Indiana.

John Crone joined the Lutheran Church at Lucas, Ohio, in 1843, under the pastorate of Jacob Sidel. After coming to Indiana he joined the Methodist Protestant Church at Allen Chapel near Kendallville. Later he joined the Lutheran Church at Mt. Pleasant.

Children: Daniel died in infancy; Elizabeth(51) born Aug. 11, 1841; Barbara (53) born Jan. 15, 1843; Joseph, born May 11, 1845, died April 14, 1870; Mary Jane(62) born July 25, 1847; John Switzer(49) born August 30, 1849; William H.(65) born Aug. 11, 1851; Sarah Ann(66) born April 25, 1854; Amy R.(67) born June 6, 1855; Laura Irene(68) born Nov. 17, 1857; An infant son died June 7, 1863.

Number 5 Fourth Generation(3) Peter Switzer

Peter Switzer, farmer, born at Lancaster, Ohio, Oct. 22, 1812, died at Lucas, Ohio, Aug. 14, 1889. He married Mary Jane Hult, born May 23, 1815, and died Sept. 4, 1896. Children: Mary Jane born November, 1848, died unmarried; Elizabeth born May 4, 1851 and died March 15, 1880, married Eli Pitts; Lodema(6); Sarah Katherine(7).

Number 6 Fifth Generation(5) Lodema Switzer

Lodema Switzer, born Feb. 13, 1855, deceased, married Lyman J. Loomis, now deceased. She lived at Shelby, Ohio, with her son Royal. Children: Royal; and Jennie. Royal had a son Reeliff Lyman Loomis. Jennie married Herbert Mosher, Pittsburgh.

Number 7 Fifth Generation(5) Sarah Katherine Switzer

Sarah Katherine Switzer was born Jan. 4, 1847, and died Sept. 28, 1894. Married Charles J. Stotts, now deceased. Children: Abijah Peter(8); Elnora born in 1869 married Ira Clinker(1868-1925); Norman B. born in 1870; Charles R. born in 1873; Arthur I. born in 1875;

Mary Jane born in 1877; Anna E. born in 1879 and died in 1914; Lily M. born in 1881; John W. born in 1886; Otis R. born in 1889; Nellie E. born in 1883; Dolly R. born in 1891.

Number 8 Sixth Generation(7) Abijah Peter Stotts

Abijah Peter Stotts, farmer lives between Mansfield and Lexington, Ohio.

Number 9 Fourth Generation(3) Sampson Switzer

Sampson Switzer was born at Lucas, Ohio, Dec. 9, 1831, and died July 22, 1916. Most of his life was spent on a farm at Longley near Fostoria, Ohio. He served in the Union Army three years and three months. He was corporal in Co. H, 21st O.V.I., and for three years first lieutenant, Co. B, 57th O.V.I. Member of the Evangelical Church. Married Nancy Ellen Pennel Oct. 14, 1861.

They had seven children, four of whom lived: Laura A. married Oscar D. Eisenhard and had a daughter Jennie; Jennie Switzer married Henry L. Smith and had a daughter Cleo and four sons, Claude, Hugh, Archie and Charles; Minerva Switzer lived at home near Longley; Fred M. Switzer lives near Longley.

Cleo Smith married Orval Good and has two children, Agatha and John H. Good.

Claude Smith has a son Vincent.

Number 10 Fourth Generation(3) John Switzer

John Switzer (1812-1861) married Eliza Ann Fulkerson (1822-1903) and lived at Bucyrus, Ohio.

Children: Sarah married Thomas C. Smith and lived at Bucyrus; Barbara married E. L. Fisher. Died March 8, 1914; Frederick (1850-1919) lived at Inwood, Indiana, and had four sons, and daughters, Rella, Ora, Charles and Eliza; Frank, Spokane; Shannon, Spokane; Hattie, unmarried, died at the age of 25 or 30.

Number 11 Fourth Generation(3) Mary Switzer

Mary (Polly) Switzer (July 22, 1810-Nov. 9, 1867) died at Avilla, Indiana. She married Peter Vanscoyoc who was born in Richland County, Ohio, May 1, 1802 and died in Crawford County, Ohio, Aug. 26, 1850. After his death Mary Switzer Vanscoyoc married Abraham Young by whom she had no children.

Sarah Vanscoyoc was born in Richland County, Ohio, April 17, 1836, and died December 3, 1904. Married James M. First, born in Lancaster County, Pa., Dec. 11, 1831, and died Dec. 4, 1909. Lived near Lucas, Ohio. Children: Lizzie; Alice; Hattie; Elsworth; Clara; James; John.

Lizzie First Hamlin had three children: Howard; Guy; Alice. Alice Hamlin Black had three children, Theodora, Arthur and Miriam.

John had no children.

Alice First married Frank Guard, farmer near Friday Harbor, Washington, on San Juan Island. Children: Roy who has two boys; Gladys married Ray Madden, county auditor of San Juan County; Florence married John Douglass; Harold.

Hattie First married Dr. W. F. Culler of Lucas, Ohio. A daughter Laura.

Elsworth First married Ella Myers, Lucas, Ohio and has three children: Cardonal; Auretha; Earl.

Clara First married Harry Gates of Dayton, Ohio. A son Early Gates, mechanic, has two children, Janet and Jack.

Children: Sherman W.; Myrtilda, deceased; Marvin Peter; Mary Frances; William Melvin; Sarah Berdella; Emma Eliza died in infancy; Alice Zemma; Fred Raymond; Flossie Laurena died in infancy; James Guy; Nola Rachel.

Mary Frances born August 19, 1875, lived at home.

Sherman Wilmont Vanscoyoc, farmer, Oak Hill, was born June 24, 1871. Married Minna Lillian Sutter, 1896. One son Fred Lewis born Jan. 12, 1910.

Marvin Peter, farmer, Oak Hill, born Oct. 27, 1873. Married Hattie E. Baker in 1906. Children: Nola Ines born Nov. 7, 1906; Marvin Wendall born Sept. 23, 1909; Olive Aurel born Dec. 28, 1912; Mary Josephine born July 19, 1915.

Note: It seems very likely that Hanse Stockie who arrived Sept. 16, 1736 was the John Stucky of Elizabeth Township, Lancaster County, Pa. who died in 1786.

The Stuckey Family

The name is variously spelled Stukey, Stuky, Stuke, Stucke, Stuckey, Stookey, Steekie, etc.

When this history was begun the author had in his possession a history furnished by Jonas S. Stuckey. It was accepted without any particular investigation at the time but since then questions have arose as to the accuracy of many statements made in this history.

We know that John Stukey, who died near Sugar Grove, Ohio, August 9, 1818, at the age of seventy-six, was the ancestor of our family. The attempt to place him before he came to Ohio has been somewhat difficult. To solve these questions we shall group our facts and supposed facts under several separate heads.

The History Received from Jonas S. Stuckey

Jonas S. Stuckey was a man of some prominence in Van Wert County, Ohio. He was a great-grandson of John Stukey and was during his life president of the Stukey family organization. The following pertinent statements are cited in this history and the letter of Jonas S. Stuckey which accompanied it.

1. John Stukey was born in Canton Bern, Switzerland, August 9, 1742.

There is no reason to question the statement that John Stukey was born in Canton Bern since there are still many of the Stuke family living at Bern.

The tombstone inscription merely says John Stukey died Aug. 9, 1818, age 76. This does not indicate he died on his birthday.

2. John Stukey came to America about 1760 with his brother Simon and settled in North Carolina. From North Carolina he went to Lancaster County, Pa., and later to Ohio. He was a farmer in Pennsylvania as he was in Ohio.

Jonas S. Stuckey says in his letter that he "understands that there were two Stukey brothers who came to this country, one settling in North Carolina and the other coming to Ohio". The authority for this statement is not given.

This tradition that John and Simon Stukey settled in North Carolina is found in the family of Simon Stukey.

It happens that there are Stuckey families in North and South Carolina. The names John and Simon do appear in older generations of these families. At Windsor, Bertie, North Carolina there is a record of the marriage of Shimeon Stucky and Tabitha Doles June 16, 1777. John Doles was witness and sponsor. In one record the name is given as Sherman Stucky, evidently an error.

3. During the Revolution John Stukey was plowing when the soldiers of Washington came by, stopped, unhitched his team and rode away with them. This is doubtful to say the least.

4. In 1792 John Stukey came to Fairfield County, Ohio, and settled near Sugar Grove seven miles from Lancaster.

The authority for this statement seems to be contained in Miller's History of Fairfield County in which appears a statement that "Sugar Grove was first settled by Daniel Stukey who took up a claim of 1200 acres according to statements made by the oldest residents".

We know it was John and not Daniel Stukey who first came to Sugar Grove. The patent to this land was issued in 1802 which was doubtless the correct date of his coming.

Scott's History of Fairfield County and Wiseman's Centennial History of Lancaster, Ohio, state that the first settler in that section was Capt. Joseph Hunter who came in 1798. According to Scott Ebenezer Zane founded Lancaster in 1800.

5. Christian Stukey, the third son, was born in Lancaster County, Pa., March 2, 1779. Christian was the grandfather of Jonas S. Stukey and there is no reason to doubt this statement. As a matter of fact the Census shows that other sons and daughters of John Stukey were born in Pennsylvania.

Known Facts about John Stukey

1. He died near Sugar Grove August 9, 1818, at the age of seventy-six and is buried in the family cemetery on the old place.

Salome, his wife, died March 4, 1821, age 76 years and six months.

2. John and Salome Stukey had six sons and six daughters. We know Christian was the third son and Joseph the youngest. The sons probably named in order of birth were Peter, John, Christian, Samuel, Jacob and Joseph. The daughters named in order of birth were Elizabeth, Margaret, Anna, Salome, Catherine and Barbara.

3. John Stukey received a patent for a half section of land from Thomas Jefferson. The patent was signed April 20, 1802 and was received and registered March 28, 1807. John Stukey had deposited in the treasury a certificate of the register at Chillicothe, full payment having been made.

4. The barn now standing was built in 1809 as shown by the inscription on a stone in the foundation. The house is said to have been built in 1813. The old log house on the other side of the road no longer stands.

5. The will of John Stukey was written in German.

John Stuckey of Elizabeth Township, Lancaster County, Pa.

1. The father of John Stuckey of about the same age as our John Stuckey (b. 1742) was John Stuckey.

2. John Stuckey, Sr., took out a warrant for 100 acres Aug. 22, 1745. Again he took out a warrant for 25 and 50 acres November 9, 1750. In 1771 he lived in Elizabeth Township, Lancaster, Co. and with him was John Stucky, inmate and married man. The 1773 tax lists show John Stucky and inmate John Stucky. In the 1779 tax list John Stucky is reported as having 60 acres and John Stucky with no land. In 1782 John Stucky is reported as having 120 acres.

3. Hance Steckie, possibly John Stucky, Sr., arrived Sept. 16, 1736. On the same boat were Sebastian Caquelin, Diderot Caquelin, Jean Caquelin and Hance Zwalle. Hance Steckie was then 26 years old. Mary, daughter of John Stucky of Elizabeth Township, married a Caquelin. The Zwalle family was associated with the Stucky family in Elizabeth Township.

4. John Stucky, Sr., made a will dated August 10, 1781, which was proved July 5, 1786. The executors were John Stuckey and Martin Bear. The widow was Anna Catherine and the heirs were John, Anna Hushaar, Elizabeth Hamig or Harnig, Mary Caquelin, children, and John, Peter, Henry and Joseph Hushaar, grandchildren. All of the Christian names of the children appear in the family of our John Stuckey.

5. John Stucky, Jr., inherited 174 acres from his father. This about equals the original tract patented by John Stucky, Sr.

6. The Census of 1790 shows a John Stuckey in Elizabeth Township, Lancaster County, Pa. In this family were three males above sixteen, three males below sixteen and six females. In a general way this corresponds with the family of our John Stuckey. We haven't the dates of birth of all the children of John Stuckey but there were then six males in the family of whom probably three were above sixteen. If all the children were at home there would have been seven females providing Barbara Stuckey born in 1790 was counted. She was born in August and may not have been counted.

7. The Census of 1800 shows John Stuckey with 4 males and 5 females. He then lived in Elizabeth Township. Of the males two were between ten and sixteen, one between sixteen and twenty-six and one over forty-five. Of the females one was under ten, three were between sixteen and twenty-six, and one over forty-five. This does not exactly agree with the figures for our family but discrepancies often occurred. Margaret was already married. Some of the children may not have been at home.

8. John Stuckey of Elizabeth Township does not appear in the 1810 Census. He may have left for Ohio between 1800 and 1810. We have figured that our John Stuckey came to Ohio in 1802.

Statement of Zwingli Stukey

Zwingli Stukey lived at Sugar Grove. He was seventy-nine in 1930 when I saw him. He had a very hazy idea of the Stukey family history. He said his grandfather Joseph Stukey was born wither in Pennsylvania or Europe. He had evidently heard nothing of the North Carolina tradition. He had a Bible printed in Nuremberg in 1765 and advanced the theory that the Bible had been brought from Germany by the family and that perhaps 1765 was about the time they came.

General

1. The Stukey family seems to have belonged to the Reformed Church. At any rate Joseph Stukey did. Jonas S. Stukey said he thought the older generations were old time Lutherans.

2. German was the language spoken in the family.

3. In the Stukey cemetery near Sugar Grove besides the name Stukey appear Rudolph, Hensel, Freer.

4. Margaret Stukey who died in 1801 at the age of 26 married Samuel (or Henry White). The name was later changed to White, I am told. The White family returned to Pennsylvania. Maybe the Whites preceeded the Stukeys to Ohio.

Conclusion

I am convinced that John Stukey reached Ohio in 1800, 1801 or 1802 and that he is the John Stuckey, Jr., who lived in Elizabeth Township until after he was enumerated in the Census of 1800.

If this is correct, the soldier of the Revolution must have been the same person also.

My dear Cousin Crone:

I am in receipt of your letter of March 23rd requesting certain information relative to the Stuckey family. It will be a pleasure to me to assist you in any way I may be able.

The family have a reunion organization of which I have been acting as president for a number of years and at a meeting held in Fairfield County near, if not on, the farm of our great-grandfather, John Stuckey. I obtained some data that I am enclosing herewith that may greatly assist you in your present understanding with the request that when done with it you return the same to me. Enos Stuckey of Lima, Ohio, is the secretary of the association and I have written him for additional information. I understand there were two brothers of the Stuckey family who came to this country from Switzerland, one settling in North Carolina and the other coming to Ohio. From your letter there is no doubt in mind that your lineage on the one side traces back to our family. The will I am sending does not, I think, contain the names of all the sons.

I received the report of your speech and want to thank you for it. I find much information that should please all Americans. I was glad to learn that Congress had defeated the Senate Bill providing for independence in four years. Should you meet Judge Johnson let him know you have relatives in his old home county in Ohio. I am personally with him, a fine man. I think I will try to get in touch with your father. I am in my 75th year, a Civil War veteran. I was in the service four years, mustering out as first lieutenant, Company F, 27th O.V.V.I. Am a farmer, have occupied different positions of trust, was member of the state board of agriculture seven years, in the legislature five years, etc. I will consider it a personal favor to place you as a regular Correspondent on my list of correspondents.

I hope you will remember that when I posted that will in that old book I did not expect it would be sent to the Philippines. You will observe that there is quite a difference in the way the name is spelled. Most of the family spell it Stukey. That is the way my father's family spell it. I have added the g, the only one of our family. I find the same condition prevails back in Fairfield County. Our great-grandfather was owner of ten or twelve hundred acres of land near Sugar Grove. Some 500 acres are still in the family, some of it is not very valuable being broken while part is valley land and very fine land. I will be pleased to receive a copy of your family history and wish to congratulate you on your success in those far off possessions.

Politically I am a Republican, religiously a Methodist. I think the family originally were old school Lutherans.

A Visit to the Old Stuckey Homestead.

I visited the old homestead February 13, 1917, for the first time. The house stands as it was built except for an addition built by the father of Robert Stuckey who now lives there. The part of the old farm that contains the buildings has recently been sold and for the first time since it was acquired by John Stuckey this land is out of the family. John Stuckey died in the front room in the rear left hand corner facing the road, Salome Stuckey in the room just behind in the front right hand corner facing the road. When they came to Ohio they lived across the road from these buildings. In 1809 the barn was built and in 1813 the house. There is an old wash house with big kettles swinging from cranes as they did a century ago. On the barn there is an inscription reading "John Stucky. 1809".

The old cemetery is only a short distance from the house. It seems that a number were buried there who did not belong to the family. It is nicely fenced and most of the stones are in good condition. Only one inscription is in German, - that of Margaret Stuckey Weit.

The Stuckey Family

-This is the original history sent me by Jonas S. Stuckey of Lima, Ohio.

John Stuckey was born in Canton Bern, Switzerland, August 9, 1742, and came to America about the year 1760 with his brother Simon and settled in North Carolina. From there he moved to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, and engaged in farming. During the Revolutionary War he was plowing one day when Washington's army passed by. They stopped, unhitched his horses and rode away with them. In 1792 he moved to Fairfield County, Ohio, seven miles south-east of Lancaster in the hocking Valley. The village of Sugar Grove is built on one corner of the farm.

John Stuckey had twelve children, six boys and six girls. They were Christian, John, Peter, Samuel, Jacob, Joseph, Elizabeth who married Sanetern (Sanders), Margaret who married Samuel White (Margaret died in 1801, the first to be buried in the Stuckey graveyard), Anna who married a Freeman, Salema who married a Steinbrink, Barbara who married John Switzer and Catherine who married John Rike, a Mennonite preacher.

When Margaret White died she left two children, a boy and a girl. Some time later Samuel White decided to go back to Pennsylvania. He made two large baskets, threw them across his horse like saddle bags, put a child in each and started east.

John Stuckey died August 9, 1818, aged seventy-six. Before his death he made a will which was read in the family reunion and presented to Enos Stuckey of Lima, Ohio, August 25, 1904. The reunion was held at the old Stuckey home, that year being the one hundred twelfth year it had been in the Stuckey family. It is now owned by a grandson of Daniel Stuckey, son of Joseph Stuckey who was the youngest son of John Stuckey. The will follows.

"Through the grace of God, I, John Stuckey, who resides in Falls Township, Fairfield County and province of Ohio being of sound mind, do hereby designate how the property that I may leave behind shall be disposed of after my death. For the first part it is my testimony and last will that my third son, Christian Stuckey, who reside in Clear Creek Township, and Joseph Stuckey, the youngest son, in Falls Township and County and Province as first mentioned before should act as my executors and I so choose them."

"They shall bring all my property that I leave after my death to a fair distribution among my heirs according to my last will and testimony."

"Further it is my last will that my executors shall pay all of my just debts from my property and further it is my last will that my two sons, Samuel and Joseph, shall have the land that he now has in his possession and that place that my son Samuel now has in his possession for their own. Namely, my son Joseph shall have the old place for \$4.50 per acre but he shall have \$320 free for his equal rights with his other brothers which each one received a quarter of a section of land from their father and for the balance

he is to pay for by the acre. For the division of the balance of the old home place he shall pay the other heirs \$100 a year after my death and shall begin paying off his eldest sister Elizabeth Sanelors and yearly to my second daughter Margaret White's two sons, namely, Henry and Samuel White, he shall pay \$320 so they shall be equal with my other heirs and my third daughter Anna Freeman \$320 and my daughter Saloma Steinbrick \$320 and my daughter Barbara Switzer \$320. All my daughters mentioned and heirs mentioned shall receive \$320. And further it is my last will that my son Samuel shall have the piece of land which I bought of Abram Shaffer which place is 150 acres more or less for \$6.00 per acre. He shall also have \$320 beside said land to be equal with his other brothers and sisters and one year from my death shall pay yearly with his brother Joseph \$100 for the mentioned sums to be paid off to his sisters yearly as was mentioned before and the balance if there is any to be divided equally among all my heirs from the eldest to the youngest until all have shared alike equally. Further it is my will that my wife Saloma Stuckey for her keeping shall have one-third of all the chattel property at my death, also a bedstead and bedding which she shall select and so much of kitchen utensils and such household goods as she may want also two cows which she wants, one horse and saddle and bridle and all the linen which she now has in her possession for her keeping during her life and the room in the house in the north-west end and in the kitchen so much as she may think necessary and in the spring house and the cellar so much room as she needs, also the parlor stove with pipe and the clock and stabling for the horse and further it is my will that my wife Saloma yearly shall have for her keeping from my son Joseph 16 bushels of good wheat and 200 pounds of good meat, namely, 150 pounds of hog meat and 50 pounds of beef and 12 pounds of good hackled flax and 4 pounds of good wool and from the orchard so much for her use as she may want to use and to dry and the one-fourth part of the garden which my son Joseph shall yearly plow and so much manure shall be hauled on the garden as will make it good and my widow shall have feed and pasture for her two cows as her own."

"It is my last will that my executors after my death shall make to my son Samuel a good deed for his mentioned tract of land free from all other rights and my son Christian shall shall make a good right or deed for the tract of land which I now possess to my son Joseph free from all other deeds and rights".

"This is my last testimony and will which I today the second of June in the year of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, 1817".

Christian Stuckey, third son of John Stuckey, was born in Lancaster County, Pa., March 2, 1779, and moved with his father to Fairfield County, Ohio, in 1792, where he married Mary Margaret Harsh. He settled in Clear Creek, Fairfield County. In 1832 he entered 160 acres of land in Allen County, one mile east of Elida on Honey Run where he lived until his wife's death. He then made his home with his son Samuel Stuckey. He died October 1, 1853, age 74 years, 6 months, and 28 days. His wife Mary Margaret Harsh died June 30, 1842, age 56 years, 6 months and 18 days. To them were born eleven children. Samuel Stuckey, John Stuckey married Catherine Bressler and died March 12, 1845, age 33 years, 11 months and 9 days.

When John Stuckey came to Allen County with his father he left an interest in Piqua County in the form of Catherine Bressler and when he decided to go for her he saddled his horse and started for Piqua County for his bride March 13, 1834. Then for the wedding trip to Allen County. The railroads and interurbans were unknown and a badly cut road through the woods was the only way back. The bride rode the horse and the groom walked and led the horse and picked the way the whole length of the journey. The time the journey took is unknown. To this union were born six children, Cornelius H. of Kansas, Minerva A. Keller of Tiffin, Amos of Grover Hill, Peter who died at the age of six weeks, Louisiana who died at the age of six months and Susan Woertz of Van Wert, Ohio.

Adam Stuckey married Elizabeth Steeman. Eli Stuckey married Lucinda Ireland. Daniel Stuckey married Susan Dalsen. Barbara Ann married David Bryan. Sallie Stuckey married Mike Switzer. Susan Stuckey married Tom North. Elizabeth Stuckey married Dan Conrad. Diana Stuckey married James Bryan. Enos Stuckey married Hettie Erhman. John Stuckey, son of John Stuckey, married and moved to Hocking County near Logan. To that union were born seven children, 5 boys and two girls, David, John, Jacob, Samuel who died young, Abram, Susan, Catherine. John Stuckey died at the home near Logan and the family was scattered. Abram moved to Illinois. David died and left a wife and two children. John went to Philadelphia. Jacob came to Allen County and married Nancy Ann Bressler. To them were born seven children, Harvey who died at Washington August 31, 1864, Joseph who died July 30, 1864, John who died at the age of two, Peter who died March 9, 1859, aged 9, Caroline who married Obe Good and died May 5, 1909, aged 62, Enos who lives at Lima, Alonzo who lives at Lima, Sarah Lutes, a half sister, who died in 1908 as the result of an accident. She was thrown from a buggy while riding with her daughter. Jacob Stuckey, son of John of the second generation, married and two sons were born to him, Fred and Aaron. Fred settled in Fairfield County and had one son who died at Circleville in 1907. Aaron moved to Henry County. He had six children, all of whom died except Mary Thorn and Susan Lenseel of Defiance. Peter Stuckey, son of John and of the second generation married and moved to what is now known as Muddy Prairie in Fairfield County. He had seven children, all girls, and the name Stuckey disappeared in this branch of the family. One daughter married James Shaffer and lived in Fairfield County and one married John Kerns and still lives in Fairfield County (1911).

Samuel Stuckey, son of John Stuckey and of the second generation, married and settled on part of the old home. He had six children, four boys and two girls. The boys were John, Jesse, Noah, and Josiah. The names of the girls are not known.

John lived on part of the old home place owned by his father and he was called the best of farmers in the Hocking Valley in 1889. He had the finest orchard that could be seen. John had eleven children nearly all girls. The oldest married Frank Rower and lives in Putnam County near Fort Jennings. Two of the boys are doctors, Frank, a physician and John, a dentist, both practicing in Lancaster, Ohio. John died and his widow still (1911) lives on that part of the old home place with her son-in-law.

Jesse Stuckey lived on a part of the old farm near the homestead. He had one child, John I. Stuckey, a dentist practicing at Lancaster. He and his sons were great musicians and form what is known as the Stuckey orchestra. Nothing is known of Noah and Josiah. One is in the west and one is in the south.

Joseph Stuckey, son of John and of the second generation, married and lived in Fairfield County. It is not known how many children he had. There were three boys, Solomon and Jonas and Daniel. Solomon settled near the old home. Joseph Stuckey built the first grist mill that was built on the Hocking River. He was also one of the first associate judges of the state before a legislature was organized. These judges acted as legislators.

Daniel Stuckey, son of this Joseph Stuckey now (1911) lives on the old home place, the home and house of his grandfather where the Stuckey reunion was held in 1904. The house was built in 1813 and is what is known as a block house. The logs are hewn out 7 inches thick and matched together, then sided on the outside. There is a soft coal grate in every room except the kitchen. There is spring water from a hill 300 feet high and about 1000 feet from the house. It is piped to the back porch then through the spring house and out through the gate post into the water trough. The barn is

is a double log barn and is built on the side of a hill and thus forms a perfect bank barn. It was built in 1809 with the date on the foundation stone.

Daniel Stuckey has four children, 3 boys and one girl. Joseph M. Stuckey who is in the dray business on North Broad St., Columbus, Ohio. I. M. Stuckey who is also in the drug business in West Columbus.

AWAY BACK.

Ex-County Auditor R. F. Brown in his address before the Stuckey reunion at Crystal Springs on the 25th inst. gave a great deal of information concerning the Stuckey family that was new and exceedingly interesting to the majority of the big crowd present. In gathering his data Mr. Brown examined the county records and in the old marriage files he found the following interesting record.

"I hereby certify that I have joined in matrimony Sampson Ream and Anny Stookey on the 20th day of September last. Dec. 17, 1803. Lewis Sites"

"I have joined in marriage Christian Stookey and Peggy Hersh according to law. July 21, 1809. Lewis Sites"

"I have joined in marriage Peter Stookey and Eve Heron lawfully. Oct. 8, 1805. Lewis Sites."

"I do hereby certify that Peter Helzelboch and Kitty Stookey were married Tuesday the 25th day of September, 1806. William Trimble, J.P."

"I do hereby certify that I have joined in marriage as husband and wife John Stookey and Catherine Eckert they being personally advertised as the law directs. April 14, 1809. El Nathan Scofield, J.P."

"I do hereby certify that on the 29th day of April, 1813, I solemnized the marriage of Joseph Stookey and Molly Ream. May 1, 1813. Thomas Fricker, J.P."

"I do hereby certify that I solemnized the marriage of Jacob Stookey and Margaret Seidner agreeable to law on the 25th day of May, 1815. Adam Weaver, J.P."

"I hereby certify that I married on the 28th day of March, 1815 Samuel Stookey and Sally Rudolph. William Crooks, J.P."

"Tuesday, the 28th of June, 1814, marriage was solemnized between David Leathers and Sally Stookey, both of Fairfield County by me. William Jones."

Note: The history and accompanying notes are given exactly as they came to me. Obviously there are many errors which as far as possible have been corrected in the history as finally written.

Some Questions.

We have not been able to account for two of the Stukey women who are included in the list of marriages at Lancaster, Ohio.

Sally Stoekey married David Leathers in 1806. If she was a daughter of John Stukey, then the list of children is not complete. Could she have been a granddaughter of Christian Zwalley who died in 1835 in Lancaster County, Pa. She was a daughter of Margaret Zwalley and evidently not legitimate.

Kitty Stoekey married Peter Helelboch. Catherine Stukey, daughter of John Stukey, has been accounted for since she married John Feeman. What was Kitty Stoekey?

THE STUCKEY FAMILY

Number 1 First Generation John Stukey

We have reached the conclusion that our John Stukey was the son of John Stucky of Elizabeth Township, Lancaster County, Pa., whose will was probated in 1786. Until more conclusive proofs are found we shall consider John Stukey (b. 1742) the first ancestor. He died at Sugar Grove, Ohio, August 9, 1818, at the age of seventy-six. He probably arrived at Sugar Grove from 1800 to 1802.

His wife Salome died March 4, 1821, at the age of seventy-six and six months.

Children: Christian(2); John(3); Peter(4); Samuel(5); Jacob(6); Joseph(7); Elizabeth(8); Margaret(9); Anna(10); Salome(11); Barbara(12); Catherine(13).

Number 2 Second Generation(1) Christian Stuckey

Christian Stuckey, third son, was born in Lancaster County, Pa., March 2, 1779 and died October 1, 1853. He married Mary Margaret Harsh July 21, 1805, and settled at Clear Creek, Fairfield County, Ohio. In 1832 he entered 160 acres in Allen County, one mile west of Elida on Hooey Run. After his wife's death he made his home with his son Samuel. Mary Margaret Stuckey died June 30, 1842, age 56 years, 6 months, 18 days. Daniel Harsh, a brother of Mary Margaret Stuckey lived at Good Hope, Noble County, Indiana.

Children: Samuel(14), born September 27, 1806; John(15), born April 3, 1811; Adam(16), born April 17, 1822; Eli(17), born May 23, 1820; Daniel(18), born Sept. 27, 1813; Barbara(19), born April 20, 1810; Sally(20); Susan(21), born in 1816; Elizabeth(22), born Oct. 7, 1807, and died in 1848; Diana(23), born May 23, 1820; Enos(24), born January 16, 1815.

Number 3 Second Generation(1) John Stukey

John Stuckey married Catherine Sekert and settled near Logan, Ohio. They were married April 14, 1809.

Daniel Harsh, administrator of the estate of John Stuckey, filed report of the sale of personal property Nov. 14, 1823. Catherine Stuckey bought various articles. Joseph Stuckey was allowed a certain sum. John Stuckey signed a note to Sampson Roam and it was endorsed by Joseph Stuckey. Another note was signed by Samuel Stuckey. The signature of Joseph Stuckey appears various times in the papers at the courthouse.

Peter Stukey

Peter Stukey married Eve Heron October 6, 1805. They moved to Muddy Prairie, Fairfield County.

The Census of 1850 shows the family of Peter Stukey living in Hocking Township, -Peter, age 80, born in Pennsylvania, Eve, age 66(?), born in Pennsylvania, Catharine, age 24, born in Ohio and India, age 24(?), born in Ohio.

It is said there were seven daughters and so the name disappeared in this family. Mrs. John Shaffer(48) and Mrs. John Kerns(49) lived in Fairfield County.

Samuel Stukey

Samuel Stukey died Sept. 20, 1857, age 71. He married Sarah (Sally) Rudolph March 28, 1815 and settled on a part of the old homestead.

The Census of 1850 shows Samuel Stookekey living in Bern Township, Fairfield County, Ohio. His age is given as 60 and place of birth as Pennsylvania. This does not agree with the data given above. The other members of the family were Sarah, age 58, born in Pennsylvania, Jesse age 26, born in Ohio, Elizabeth, age 20, born in Ohio and Sarah, age 18, born in Ohio.

Children: John(50); Jesse(51); Jeremiah(53); Joshua(52); Sarah married Jacob Mathias; Elizabeth married Peter Brown.

Sarah Rudolph was a daughter of Michael and Barbara(Harsh) Hensel. Her first husband was Henry Rudolph. She was born March 25, 1792.

Michael Hensel, father of Sarah Stukey, was born Nov. 9, 1753 and died July 15, 1836. He married Barbara Harsh(May 4, 1763-June 26, 1851) in Washington County, Pa., March 17, 1778. They are buried in the Stukey cemetery near Sugar Grove. Michael Hensel was a soldier of the Revolution under Capt. William Morgan of Virginia. Mrs. Rebecca Louise Giesy of Lancaster, Ohio, is a member of the D.A.R. through Michael Hensel.

The Census of 1850 shows Joseph Stuckey living in Bern Township, Fairfield County, Ohio. In the family were Joseph, age 57, born in Pennsylvania, Mary, age 57, born in Pennsylvania, Daniel, age 23, born in Ohio, Catherine, age 16, born in Ohio.

Joseph Stuckey was a member of the Ohio legislature in 1833-4. He built the first grist mill of the Hocking River, it is said. He was one of the first associate judges and was named receiver of the Lancaster bank when it closed in 1842. He was a member of the Reformed Church.

Children: Solomon(62); John(63); Daniel(57); Kate married Edward Grabill, second husband Thomas Brooks; Rosannah(39); Joseph went to Missouri; Abel, Kirksville, Mo.; Noah, Kirksville, Mo.; Aaron went to California; Andrew Jackson.

Miller's History of Fairfield County, Ohio, says Sugar Grove was built by Samuel White. It is possible that the Whites preceded the Stukeys to Ohio.

In the author's possession is some of Margaret Stukey Weit's writing. Translated from the German it reads as follows.

"Creed is a root of evil things which seeks to push only itself forward, because it draws the heart away from God and casts man into destruction. What the hand of the Highest has bestowed upon you that use rightly and be content, be God fearing and hold to uprightness. Then great happiness is in store for you. Let love possess your heart, the love of God shall constrain you that you evil alone, that you love your neighbor as yourself, and bear your cross patiently-Signed Margaretha Stuke".

Anna Stukey

Anna Stukey(Stucky in the Fairfield County records) married Sampson Ream Sept.20,1803. In 1848 her sister Catherine Feeman wrote that "Sister Ream is in good health."

Wiseman's Pioneer Families of Fairfield County says that Sampson Ream was a son of Abraham(b.1746 in Reamstown,Pa.) and Rosannah Ream. According to Wiseman Sampson and Anna(Stukey) Ream had thirteen children,among them the following:Jonas A.;Samuel;Noah A.;Eli never married;Abesalom never married;Elizabeth married George Westenberg;Barbara married John Fartig;Martha married Jacob Peff; John Adam never married;Mary. Wiseman is in error in stating that Mary,daughter of Sampson Ream,married Joseph Stuckey for it was Mary's sister of Sampson Ream,who married Joseph Stuckey(7).

It is interesting to note in passing that William Ream married Elizabeth Switzer,sister of Frederick Switzer who married Barbara Stukey. See No.12 of this history.

Barbara Stuckey(August 7,1790-April 7,1862) married Frederick Switzer(Feb.17,1783-May 19,1855),both of Fairfield County,Jan.15, 1808. Hugh Boyle,justice of the peace,performed the ceremony.

Frederick and Barbara(Stuckey) Switzer moved to Lucas, Richland County,Ohio,where they lived and died.

I have a sort of writing sampler signed Barbara Stucky at the bottom of which appears the following,"Command you may your mind from play every hour or the day". This is signed in 1803. The pioneer families had little time for play and so made a virtue of work.

The Crone and Switzer histories contain the complete history of the descendants of Frederick and Barbara(Stuckey)Switzer.

Catherine Stukey

Catherine Stukey(March 17,1784-Jan.16,1860) married John Feeman(d.Nov.25,1862,age 74 years,2 months and 26 days. They are buried in the Ziegler cemetery near Lancaster,Ohio.

Mr.J.B.Feeman of Lancaster stated that Catherine Stukey was baptized and received into the German Presbyterian Church,as the Reformed Church is sometimes called, by the Rev.Hemp. No record has been found of Rev.Hemp. There was a Reformed minister by name of Rev.Frederick Lewis Henop who was in Pennsylvania from 1765 to 1770 and later at Frederick,Maryland.

The Census of 1850 shows John Feeman living in Pleasant Township, Fairfield County, Ohio. In the family were John, age 72 born in Pennsylvania, Catharine, age, (61?), born in Pennsylvania, Adam, age 46 born in Ohio, Elizabeth, age 44, born in Ohio, John S., age 37, born in Ohio, Ann M., 27, born in Ohio, Joseph, age 24, born in Ohio, John S., age 15, born in Ohio.

John Feeman was a son of Adam and Anna Mary Feeman and was born in West Penbury Township, Cumberland County, Pa. His grandparents were Valentine and Susannah Feeman. John Feeman was baptized by Rev. John Hindel, Lutheran preacher. The baptismal certificate translated and furnished by J. B. Feeman states that John Feeman was born at four o'clock May 9, 1778, in the morning, "in the sign of the goat." There is some error here.

John and Catherine (Stuckey) Feeman had three sons and evidently other children: Adam; Benjamin S.; John S. Adam was born July 12, 1803, at nine o'clock and fifty-three minutes in the morning in the sign of the steer and was baptized October 16. His sponsors were Rudolph and Elizabeth Pitcher. Benjamin (d. July 12, 1881, age 66 years, 7 months and 24 days) married Margaret Weaver who died Nov. 14, 1879, age 66 years, 2 months and 16 days. They had a son J. B. Feeman who lived at Lancaster, Ohio, where he died in 1935. John S. Feeman had a son Abraham.

Samuel Stuckey

Samuel Stuckey (b. Sept. 27, 1806) married Mary Peters, daughter of Daniel Peters. They lived north of Elida, Ohio. Children: Levi; Ezra; Elizabeth; Margaret; Sarah; Maria; Daniel; Christian.

The author has considerable correspondence addressed to Samuel H. Stuckey. From it it seems that Mary Peters Stuckey had the following brothers, - Michael, Samuel, Isaac, George, Daniel.

In this correspondence appear several letters from John Stinespring who in 1834 lived at Springdale, Hamilton County, Ohio. He addresses Samuel H. Stuckey as cousin. Stinespring was a devoted follower of Andrew Jackson and expresses resentment over statements made by Samuel H. Stuckey. Reference has already been made to the marriage between Salome Stuckey and a Steinbrack. Is it possible that it was a Stinespring instead?

There are letters also from William and Sarah Dickson. She may doubtless a sister of Mary (Peters) Stuckey. Letters are addressed to "Dearly beloved brother and sister". The Dickson lived at Amanda, Ohio.

Christian and Polly Whiteman address letters to "Dear cousins".

Michael and Adam Nigh were probably merely friends.

There are letters also from George and Amelia Dustman. She was probably a sister of Mary (Peters) Stuckey.

Abraham and Eve Comer address letters to "Dear nephew or brother-in-law. Eve Comer was doubtless an aunt of Samuel H. Stuckey.

Number 15 Third Generation(2) John Stuckey

John Stuckey died in Allen County, Ohio, March 12, 1845, age 33 years, 11 months and 9 days. He married Catherine Bressler of Piqua County March 13, 1834. Children: Cornelius H. (32); Minerva A. (33); Amos (34); Peter born June 10, 1841, died young; Louisiana born May 2, 1843, died young; Susan (35).

Number 16 Third Generation(2) Adam Stuckey

Adam Stuckey married Elizabeth Steeman and lived near Van Wert, Ohio. Children: Andrew; David; Jonas; Lorena; Nevada; and one other, name unknown.

Number 17 Third Generation(2) Eli Stuckey

Eli Stuckey married Lucinda Ireland. Children: Julia (64); Jonas S. (65); Silas (66); John F. (67); William E. (68); Millie (69); Mary M. died in infancy.

The second wife of Eli Stuckey was Elizabeth Castile. Children: Franz Siegel; Willis; Ira; Hetrick; Salome; Leota.

Number 18 Third Generation(2) Daniel Stuckey

Daniel Stuckey married Susan Dalsen. He started in business at an early date at Ligonier, Indiana, but finding it unprofitable, moved away. The history of Noble County, Indiana, states that he came before 1839 but we know he was certainly there before 1844.

Number 19 Third Generation(2) Barbara Stuckey

Barbara Stuckey married David Bryan. No children.

Number 20 Third Generation(2) Sallie Stuckey

Sallie Stuckey married Michael Swisher. They lived in Allen County, Ohio. Children: Jemima; Esther; Elizabeth; Nathan; Joseph; Enos; Margaret.

Number 21 Third Generation(2) Susan Stuckey

Susan Stuckey married Thomas North and lived at Van Wert. Children: Daniel; Isaac; Ira; Matilda; Christian killed in the Civil War; Enos killed in the Civil War. Mary Margaret married W.E. Ireland.

Charles North, Wheeler, Michigan, is descended from this family.

Number 22 Third Generation(2) Elizabeth Stuckey

Elizabeth Stuckey married Daniel Conrad and lived in Allen County, Ohio. Children: John; Daniel; Elizabeth.

Number 23 Third Generation(2) Diana Stuckey

Diana Stuckey married Daniel Bryan, Allen County. Children: Barbara; Nancy; James; Monroe; Mary.

Number 24 Third Generation(2) Enos Stuckey

Enos Stuckey married Hester Ernman. He died in Marshall County, Indiana, ten miles from Warsaw. Children: Ephraim; Israel; Alonzo; Enos; Caroline.

Number 25 Third Generation(3) David Stuckey

David Stuckey left a widow and two children.

Number 26 Third Generation(3) John M. Stuckey

Under date of May 7, 1836, John M. Stuckey writes from Vicksburg, Mississippi, to his cousin Samuel H. Stuckey. At that time John M. Stuckey was married and evidently he had received a letter from his brother Jacob which spoke slightingly of his wife. It seems that Samuel H. Stuckey tried to smooth this over without effect.

J. Monroe Stuckey, 346 South Fifth Street, Philadelphia, under date of Dec. 6, 1847, addresses a letter to Samuel H. Stuckey or any of the Stuckey family, Lima, Ohio. He says it has been about twelve years since he has heard from any friends in Ohio. He says the frost ruined him in Mississippi. He had a fine business, merchandising, in Philadelphia. Twelve months before writing this letter he had six children but scarlet fever took all but one. He describes himself as almost an old man who may not live another year.

Minerva Stuckey (Oct. 30, 1836-July 7, 1919) married Alfred O. Keller (May 18, 1835-Jan. 8, 1923) about 1856 or 1857. A daughter, Mrs. W. J. Neligh, 297 N. Sandusky St.,iffin, Ohio.

Number 34 Fourth Generation(15) Amos Stuckey

Amos Stuckey, born Nov. 15, 1838, lived at Grover Hill, Ohio. W. C. Stuckey, Scott, Ohio, is of this family.

Number 35 Fourth Generation(15) Susan Stuckey

Susan Stuckey Woertz lived at Van Wert, Ohio. Bart Rowland, Venedocia, Ohio, is a descendent.

Number 36 Fourth Generation(27) Harvey Stuckey

Harvey Stuckey died at Washington Aug. 31, 1864.

Number 37 Fourth Generation(27) Joseph Stuckey

Joseph Stuckey died July 30, 1864.

Number 38 Third Generation(12) Catherine Switzer

Catherine Switzer married John Crone. They lived near Kendallville, Indiana. She was born at Lucas, Ohio, Feb. 27, 1821 and died in 1907. They had: Daniel who died in infancy; Elizabeth who married Cornelius Jones; Barbara who married Silas Rawson; Joseph who died unmarried; Mary Jane married Joseph Milton Teal; John Switzer who married Ella M. Weaver; William H. married married Laura Wilson; Sarah Ann married John A. Blackman; Amy R. married Benjamin Stultz; Laura Irene who married Geo. W. Tyler.

Frank L. Crone, author of this history, is a son of John and Ella M. (Weaver) Crone. He was born July 19, 1875, and married Luetta Veta Stahl. No children. He was director of education for the Philippine Islands and director general of education in Peru. At present he represents D. C. Meath and Co. in Virginia. Address, 115 South Third Street, Richmond, Virginia.

The history of the Crone and Switzer families will give a complete account of the descendants of Catherine Switzer.

Enos Stukey lived at Lima, Ohio. He died the fall of 1916. A daughter, Mrs. Charles E. Hefner, lives at 658 S. Union St., Lima.

Alonzo Stukey lived at Lima, Ohio.

Number 43 Fourth Generation (27) Sarah Stukey

Sarah Stukey Lutes, half sister of Enos and Alonzo, died in 1908.

Fred Stuckey, Fairfield County, Ohio. One son who died 1907.

John Stukey (1816-1896) married Mary A. Friesner and lived on a part of the old Stukey place.
