Notes taken from the "Christian's Family Bible" printed by Nuttall, Fisher, and Dixon, Duke Street, Liverpool, England in 1808, owned by William and Hannah Walters Symons.

The Bible was rebound by Thomas Symons, Book Binder, in Skaneateles, New York in 1842.

This Genealogy was printed by Samuel Eaton Symons III, Saginaw, Michigan in 1934.

Another old citizen has dropped out of the ranks. Mr. Thomas Symons died at his residence on Lapeer street at 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning, after an illness of about four weeks. Mr. Symons had a serious lung trouble last winter, but rallied from it and was in comfortable health through the early summer and until a month ago, when he was attacked suddenly with a violent hemorrhage of the lungs, which left him so debilitated that he could not rally from it. At times he seemed to be improving, but his vitality was too much exhausted to allow him to recover, and he passed peacefully into the beyond, surrounded by members of his family who have been prominent in their endeavors to make his sufferings as light as possible.

Mr. Symons was born in Montreal, Canada, in 1819, of English parents, and was the last survivor of a family of twelve children. At the age of 15, he removed with his family to northern New York. In 1842 he married Serena Eaton at Skaneateles, N. Y. Five children have been born to them—Mrs. John W. Eldridge of Burton, Captain Thomas Symons of Washington, Captain of Engineers in the U. S. army, John W. and Samuel Symons, twins, of the wholesale grocery house of Symons, Smart & Co. of Saginaw, and Mrs. W. E. Alexander of Logansport, Ind. All the children are here except Captain Symons who has been summoned by telegraph.

Thirty-two years ago the family removed to this county, and after spending the winter in Grand Blanc, removed to this place, Mr. Symons having built the house on Lapeer street, where he died and which has ever since been their home.

Soon after this he erected a frame building on the corner of Saginaw and Court streets, where E. B. Skinner's brick shop now stands, and carried on the business of book binding there for some years, having learned that trade when a boy in Montreal. In the early years of his residence here he was a member of the local band. About 1866 he built what is known as the Symons block on the west side of Saginaw street, in which he carried on the same business till within the past year, and latterly also the wall paper business until failing health compelled him to give up business altogether. He had accumulated a handsome competence by his industry and thrift and his life of unvarying rectitude. His aged father lived in his family and was cared for in his declining days, having died about 25 years ago.

Mr. Symons' family life has been singularly happy. He has had his full share of hardships, but the unity of his family has been absolute. Each has lived in a sense for the other. His death is the first break in it. The perfect accord between Mr. and Mrs. Symons through a long life has been a subject of remark among their neighbors. He was a man unusually genial and sunny disposition and his radiance was always brightest and warmest in his own home. His death will be a subject of regret in the city and in his immediate neighborhood no other man would be so much missed.

Mr. Symons was a member of the First M. E. church of this city and also of the Masonic fraternity. The funeral will be held at the family residence to-morrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, local time, under the auspices of the Masons, and will be conducted by Rev. J. E. Jackson, pastor of the church. The remains will be placed temporarily in the vault of a round church. A good man has passed to his memory.

Thomas William Symons, graduated from West Point at the head of his class in 1874, appointed into the Corps of Engineers. Sent to re-survey the Mexican Boundary between Paso del Norte on the Rio Grande to a point below San Diego, Cal. Later stationed in Portland, Ore. In 1883 ordered to Washington, D. C., where he proposed and designed the Grant Memorial Bridge. (The bridge was not built until many years later, after a more modern design.) In 1889 was again ordered to Portland, Ore., in charge of all River and Harbor Works in Washington and Oregon. In 1895 was ordered to Buffalo, New York, where he constructed the largest breakwater in the world. At the request of Gov. Theodore Roosevelt, he undertook a survey of the Erie Canal, and on the basis of his report the present Barge Canal was built. He was given leave of absence from Federal Service to become Chief Consulting Engineer for New York State, and superintendent of the building of the present Barge Canal. After Gov. Roosevelt was made President, Col. Symons was appointed Chief Military Aide, in charge of Public Buildings and Grounds in Washington.

## SYMONS BROS.

"Every man to his trade," says the old saw; which is another way of saying that a man had better do what he has been taught to do. Perhaps the success of the above named wholesale grocery house is due to the fact that they attend strictly to their own business, and that, in the words of John Wesley they are "all at it and always at it." The Symons brothers were located in Bay City prior to 1882, but believing that Saginaw offered better opportunities for success in their business, giving them a wider field and superior facilities, they moved to the latter city in the year named. Two years later the firm was increased, with a slight change of name, into a corporation under the style of Symons Bros. & Co.

Although the time of which we speak is but 12 short years ago, yet it can

truthfully be said that in 1882 Saginaw was but beginning to see her way out of the woods. She was of the woods, woody, so to speak. Her commerce was wooden to a very much greater extent than it is today, and her business was all of the backwoods order. Nothing was carried by grocers except what was absolutely necessary, such as pork, potatoes, brown sugar, and "lamp oil." Wholesale grocers dealt almost exclusively in lumbermen's supplies, a very satisfactory trade so far as per cent was concerned, but one destined in a few years to be relegated to the dusty shelves of history. The Symons brothers were quick to grasp the fact that a new order of things was being ushered in, so far as the Saginaw valley was concerned. As the all but immitable forests receded before the keen ax of the woodsman, so the crudeness and the simplicity of frontier life was giving way before the onward sweep of the tide of refinement and luxury flowing steadily westwards. The pork and molasses and brown sugar days were passing away. The "effete east" was teaching the people of the wild west some of the number of new tricks, which they were not slow to learn. Symons Bros. & Co. determined to have a share of the profits, and set themselves steadily to the task of educating the people to the use of a greater variety of groceries and of much better quality. Believing that "the best is always the cheapest," they have consistently refused to handle goods of an inferior quality, or such as were not of approved character. Merit was always, whether it be in merchandise or in men. They believed in the quality of the goods and in the good sense of the people and they were not disappointed in the result.

It is said that John W. Symons never has had dreams except after drinking a cup of poor tea, and that to him one of the best features of the "good time coming," is that only tea of the

first quality, brewed only by those whom long practice has made skilful, will be drunk. While by no means a crank on the subject, he thoroughly believes in good tea, is an expert tea taster, and has thoroughly imbued the entire house of Symons Bros. & Co. with his advanced views on tea. Perhaps this may account for the splendid reputation which the house has earned for the quality of its teas, and perhaps no jobbers in teas in the state excel them in the general excellence of the various brands of teas carried. Steadily year by year their trade is growing, and the circle of their business friends widening. Their success is due to hard work, determination, sound business ability, and admirable "staying" qualities, and to no fortuitous circumstances whatever. A word about the house and its representatives:

John W. and Samuel E. Symons are respectively president and vice-president of the corporation. They are "Wolverines," which may account for their persistence and grit. They have been educated in the hard school of experience and owe their success entirely to the possession of those qualities of mind and heart which have always commanded success. To J. W. has been committed the general supervision of the business. He does the buying, watches the house trade and keeps the boys posted.

S. E. Symons has been "on the road" for the house for more than 16 years. When he can "sell the trade" no longer he will retire to private life. He is known and respected far beyond his own territory for his push and honor with the trade.
