Savage, M.D., of New York city, a descendant of Josiah Savage of the fourth generation, for his aid in researches among the ancient records of Middletown, and also to Geo. A. Gordon, A.M., secretary of the N. E. Historic Genealogical Society, whose helpful suggestions and kind and courteous assistance in the preparation thereof are impressed upon these pages.

# FAMILY OF JOHN SAVAGE, MIDDLETOWN, CONN. 1652.

THE earliest information concerning John Savage, who settled in 1652 in Middletown, Conn.—then known by the Indian name Mattabesett or Mattabeseck.—is that contained in Hartford, Conn. records, as follows:

"John Savage of Hartford was married to Elizabeth Dubbin ye tenth

day of febru: one thousand six hundred and fifty two."

The name of his wife is Dublin in Middletown Land Records and the Family Records; by the marriage record it appears as Dubbin. Presumably, this is a corruption of D'Aubin, to-day commonly written Aubin, one of the many patronymics derived from the name of Ste. Aubin (latine Albinus), bishop of Antwerp. In 1707, John Dublin petitioned the General Assembly of Rhode Island that he might receive some allowance for the shot he received in his head while engaged with Col. John Wanton, in the capture of French privateers. He alleges that by this wound he lost one of his eyes. The Assembly "seriously considering his condition and willing to encourage such that are willing to defend Her Majesty's interest in this Colony" voted him four pounds a year for five years; and, in 1720, the Assembly voted him the same pension during his natural life. This is in evidence of the spelling of the name, as John was contemporary with Mrs. Savage, and might have been a nephew.

Whence John Savage came, where and when he landed in America, are alike unknown to his descendants. As few besides Englishmen were then in New England, it is probable that he came from England to the Massachusetts Bay Colony and thence removed to Hartford. The spelling of the name is various. Hon. R. R. Hinman, long Secretary of State in Connecticut, and well informed as to the early settlers, says: "Savage, Savidge, Savadge, John of Middletown was made free at Hartford, 18 May 1654."

His will is signed "John Sauidg" though, in the declaration with which that instrument opens, it is written "Sauedg." The same uncertainty exists elsewhere. In England, the common spelling is Savage, from the time of Henry V. In France, at Bayeux, Normandy, and at Poictiers, Sauvage prevails. In Canada, where a numerous population of aboriginal extraction exists, the French spelling is followed. Little significance, however, in this case, attaches to difference in spelling, as, in the seventeenth century, the name applied to members of the Massachusetts family, in the public records of that Colony, was written Savadge, Savidge, Savige, and Sauage, as well as Savage. A very old blazon of arms, whose history is unknown, identical with the arms of Savage, of Rock Savage, County of Chester, England, is preserved in the family, members of which, like the Massachusetts branch, have inherited a tradition of kinship to the titled family in Cheshire.

He was "mayd free" 18 May. 1654. In 1674, he possessed 1207 acres of land, 441 acres being on the east side of the Connecticut river. His name is seventh in the list of members, who organized. 4 September, 1668, the First Congregational Church of Middletown. He was one of three Townsmen of Middletown in 1657, and held the military rank of Sergeant, as appears by "An Inventory of the Estate of Sarg<sup>nt</sup> John Sauidg. deceased March 6, 1684-5," filed with Hartford Probate Records, where his will may be found as follows:

# November 22d 1684

Know all men by these presents that I John Sauedg senior dwelling in Middleton in the County of Hartford & Collony of Conecticutt being under considerable weakness of bodie butt Haveing the use of my understanding as formerly yet not knowing the Day of my Death and Desirus to Leave peace amoust those of mine I Leave behind mee Doe Leave Thes as my last will and testament after the committing my soull to God who gave it And my bodie to a Desent buriall I Doe dispose of that outward estate which god hath bestowed on me as followeth

Imprimis That all Just Debts being first payd out I give to my Louing wife Elizabeth Sauedg my now Dwelling hous & hom lott with all the housing thereon with all my household goods and all my stock of Cattle & Swine of all sorts During her nattuerall Life as also my Long meadow Lott the use of it her life time and all that Land I bought of Anthony Martin & adjoying to my home Lott and to that which was Anthony Martins home Lott all to that which I gave to my son John by a deed of gift that is for her life time by this last I meane all that was my own swampe as well as that I bought & all the meadow which was William Blumfield's saving a small peice which I formerly gave to my son John and all Wongonk meadow on the south side the little brook all these during natuerall Life and one peice of upland adjoining to Israll Willcocks land being about seaven acres to have it for her use till my son William coms of age to inherit it. Provided and it is here intended and is my will herein that in case my wife should see caus to chang her condition by marriag that then neither my stock of cattle or household goods shall be disposed of to any butt my chilldren.

It I give to my eldest son John beside what I have formerly given him I give him my Long meadow Lott with the Swamp at end of it moreover I give to my said son my six acres of upland by the could spring three of it was my own Lott & three I bought of Sarnt John Warner and also my Round meadow Lott containing five acres and on halfe and halfe my Lott in the north west quarter and my Lott on the north sid the towne lying between land which was Deacon Stockings & land that was Anthony Martins on the east sid the way to Wethersfield moreover I give him my said son on acre of meadow at Wongonk lying on the north sid the little brook.

It I give to my son William one peice of upland adiovning to Israell Willcocks containing seaven acres moreover I give him my sd son my meadow which I bought of Anthony Martin that is after his mothers Deseas moreover I give him my Lott on the north sid the Dead swamp containing about 38 acres that when he come of age and my two acres & a quarter & 36 rods in the Round meadow Swamp as all so my other halfe of my lott in the north west quarter moreover I give to my said son William the on halfe of my swampe land between that which was Anthony Martins hous Lott and the land I gave to my son John to ly at the east end of it the other halfe of that swamp land I give to my son John.

It. I give to my son Nathanill after his mothers Desease my home Lott with all the housing thereon and my meadow land at Wongonk on the south sid the Little brooke and one parcel of upland on the east sid the Great River of twenty four acres Lying between Thomas Ranys Land and Left<sup>nt</sup> White's land and all so my halfe mile Lott on that sid the River and on small parcell of swampe in the Dead Swampe containing three acres and a quarter Lying between John Kirbys swampe and a highway

farther more my will is that my two Great Lotts on at the plains & the other on the east sid the Great River together with all my houshould goods & chattels be Left in my Louing Wive's hands to Despose of to all my Daughters according to her best Descrection & the advice of my overseers notwithstanding my will is which was before forgot that my two Coults if they com to hand be the bigest to William & the youngest to Nathanill

and to poses them as sone as they can find them

Allso it is my will that if any of my children Dye before they come of age to inherit that then his or her portion be equally Divided Amongst the survivers. My will is to leave my Louing wife Elizibeth Sauedg executrix of this my Last will and testament and Doe request my Louing son John to be Assistant to her in it I Doe allso request my Louing freinds and breathren Nath: White and Samuel Hall senor to be the overseers of this my last will and testament which that itt may be so in all the premises there of I Test by subscribing my owne hand

[The document is in the hand-writing of Capt. Nathaniel White, long the most important citizen of Upper Middletown, who witnessed the signature, was nominated one of the overseers in the will, and served as an appraiser of the estate mentioned in the inventory.]

# REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS.

In the war between the United Colonies and Great Britain, which culminated in American independence, this family of Savage sustained an honorable part, which is worthy of mention and will be of interest to its present members. There were living at the opening of hostilities in 1775, as far as it appears of record, twenty-eight males between the ages of fifteen and sixty years, and thirty-nine males between the ages of eleven and sixty Of this latter number sixteen had not attained the age of twenty The State records of Connecticut, Massachusetts and Vermont and the United States pension rolls bear the names of twenty-eight, and published histories and family papers the names of three others, constituting a combined list of thirty-one members of the family, who were Revolutionary Some may have rendered service to the American cause, concerning which no information has been obtained, and whereof, it may be, no public records exist; while others by age, infirmity, sickness or other cause may have been incapable of military duty. The list is prepared without special effort, from materials already at hand, and might

doubtless be lengthened by further search and correspondence.

At Bunker Hill, Quebec, Long Island, the Evacuation of New York, White Plains, in the campaign against Burgoyne, at Brandywine, Germantown, Bemis Heights, Saratoga, Valley Forge, Monmouth and elsewhere during the struggle, the family was represented with a creditable record of service. Captain Abijah Savage, a soldier of the French and Indian War, was among the first to respond to the call to arms. As lieutenant, he was in Arnold's expedition against Canada, for a time commander of his company, was taken prisoner and exchanged, re-entered the army, was made captain, and served nearly to the end of the war refusing further promotion. He was an officer in the guard of Lafayette, and, on the visit of that illustrious general to this country, entertained him as his guest. Nathaniel Savage and Jacob Savage were both captured by the enemy; the former escaped from the Jersey prison ship across the ice on Long Island Sound. Josiah Savage, a mere youth, was also a prisoner and escaped, being aided and directed to the American lines by a compassionate British officer. The experience of Joel Savage was marked by thrilling adventure. serving about three years, while on the way to Fort Stanwix up the Mohawk Valley, he was taken captive by the Indians in a fight wherein only two American soldiers escaped with life, and compelled to run the gauntlet. He was then made a prisoner by the British and carried to Canada, and kept fifteen months till the close of the contest. The journal of Corporal Gideon Savage at Valley Forge, in the possession of descendants; the exploits of Captain Samuel Stow Savage, who headed his countrymen against invaders in Vermont; the incidents of the ministry of Dr. Solomon Savage to the invalid and wounded; the narration of the duties, hardships, valor and patriotism of others; these would form an interesting chapter of the family story.

The names, with year of birth for identification, official rank and State service, are hereto appended. A star indicates pensioners.

The ancient town, church and parish records of Middletown and neighborhood contain many entries referring to its members, some of which are given and may be of interest. The material in hand pertaining to the earlier generations is by no means exhausted, and much has been accumulated relating to later generations, some lines being nearly complete, all of which would be available to the genealogist.

This little volume, in two parts, an outline with little detail, the result of much research and labor, may, perhaps, be deemed worthy to be of service in the compilation.

THOMAS SAVAGE, of the ancient and noble Norman family of Savage, or Le Sauvage, as the Normans wrote it, came into England with the army of the Conqueror A. D. 1066 and settled in Derbyshire. His name appears in the lists of the Normans, who survived the Battle of Hastings. From Derbyshire the family branched out into several English counties, and, in 1177, into Ulster, Ireland, in the person of William Savage, one of twentytwo Knights in the train of De Courcy.

"In England the Savages became the owners of extensive estates, held high offices, contracted noble alliances, distinguished themselves at decisive political conjunctures, amassed great wealth, attached themselves to successive monarchs, were advanced to various dignities, and the Viscounts Savage and Earls Rivers transmitted royal blood to their descendants. The family contributed its share of illustrious men to the state, to arms, to the church, to literature. Their names are found among the Crusaders, among the warriors knighted at the Siege of Caerlaverock, among the

Knights and Esquires who fought at Agincourt.
"Sir Arnold Savage, in Henry IV's time, was twice speaker of the English House of Commons; Sir John Savage, commanding the left wing of Richmond's army at the victory of Bosworth Field, helped very materially to establish the House of Tudor on the English throne; Thomas Savage, in the following reign, was Bishop of Rochester, of London, and ultimately Archbishop of York; and the world of letters has been enriched from the Savage stock by the poet, Richard Savage, the poet, Walter Savage Landor

and the poet, Alfred Lord Tennyson."

"The armorial bearings of the family of Savage, (Scarcliffe, Stainesby and Rock Savage) were six lioncels (or lions) rampant sable, three, two and one, armed and langued gules, on a field argent." 'The crest, a lion's jambe armed gules, ppr. rising out of a ducal coronet, or."

"The supporters of the Savage shield are, Dexter, a falcon billed, or; Sinister, an unicorn argent. These supporters are interesting, for, according to Sir Bernard Burke, Ulster King-of-Arms, the Savages of Cheshire are one of the few distinguished houses that, as commoners, are by prescriptive right entitled to use supporters to their coat of arms. The motto of the Cheshire Savages is 'A te pro te.' "
