

#### INTRODUCTION

This work was started in a search for the parents of my own great grandmother, Betsy Tabor. In the books of the Town Clerk of Rochester, Massachusetts appears "int. of marriage of Miss Betsy Tabor of Fairhaven" and "Daniel Allen of Long Plain, Jan. 10, 1814". On her tombstone in North Collins, Erie Co., N.Y. is Nov. 30, 1840 ae 51 years, 1 month, 22 days. A discrepancy rests in a statement by their first child Louisa Allen to Dora Allen Welch, "remember that mother Betsy died in her 40's". (I have so far interpreted this as "the 40's"). We have accumulated so much data that we wish to make it available to others.

Amongst the sources searched were Vital Records of Rhode Id. (Arnold"; the many volumes of Mass.; of Vermont as found at Montpelier and Town Histories. Census reports have proved invaluable from the List of Freeman in Rhode Id. in 1747 onward. We have searched wills and land records throughout Rhode Id. and all likely counties of Mass. and Conn. In New York State, we have visited each county seat for probates and land records, and furthermore, have data from many town clerks of New Hampshire from Concord and Town Hist.

Revolutionary Records are helpful as found in many state volumes as well as in the Archives Bldg. in Washington.

As is the case with my Betsy, doubtless others have escaped us. We have data from many old cemeteries. Records from southern and western states are such as we could find or have been sent to us and are cursory and scattered. We have included whatever we could fit in from Genealogies of Related Families. Doubtless we have made mistakes as some relationships had to be based on presumptive evidence but we have striven to document the accounts we present. We have frequently thought of the confusion of numerous Philip, Thomas, Joseph, John, Gideon, Benjamin, Pardon or Peleg Tabors as a battle almost incapable of conquest, but an earnest effort has been made to separate them.

The spelling in these many deed varies for many an individual. The name Amon appears as both Amos and Amon in one deed on Long Island. Philip, Phillip, Tabor, Taber may occur in one deed; but Tabor was commonly used in Rhode Id., Taber in New Bedford. The Tabers of New Bedford were predominately Friends, those of Rhode Id. commonly Baptists and Congregationalists, and we regret that their available records are less complete than those of the Quakers.

We wish we could put into the accounts, a breath of the pleasure it was to unexpectedly come upon the will of John naming his "19 well-loved children" in Tiverton, Rhode Id. We trust that some one of you will some day come upon the parentage of those we must here leave unattached.

The stories of the first four generations will comprise Part I.

The daughters are usually given letters A B C, etc. and the discussion of their families follows immediately the family discussion of their parents. Lydia Tillinghast is given a number because the discussion of her family is so extensively given. A few exceptions will be found thus: Deborah of Phillip is numbered 116-A because her sons were Tabers and will be sought as such.

In the census reports the symbol  $\overset{?}{\circlearrowleft}$  signifies males and  $\overset{?}{\Lsh}$  females.



The name: Customarily the name today is spelt Taber, but Joseph<sup>2</sup> and Philip<sup>2</sup>lines of Rhode Island inclined to Tabor while the New Bedford lines of Thomas<sup>2</sup> preferred Taber. Other variants are: Tabour, Taybor rarely Tabbar, Tabar, Tabur, Taybear, Tiber, Tebar, Tabare. Names in deeds which are confusing are Tator, Talor, Tater, Tabble, Tabler, Tabori, Taboursky. Few if any Tabers have petitioned to have their names changed, although a few slaves have become Tabers. In one instance a Tarbox asked to become Tabor in name.

The name has not infrequently appeared as a Christian name; Tabor Ashley, Tabor Bennett, Tabor Hunt, Taber Sears, Tabor Tefft, Tabor Wilbor, and in at least six or eight other instances.

All in all Tabors or Tabers unlike Allens, Browns, Smiths, Whites and Wrights stem almost entirely from one forefather - Philip Taber of Rhode Island, Connecticut and Massachusetts. Many have had distinguished careers; a few bizarre ones like that of Ex Senator Taber of Colorado. But today, no one could ask for more noteworthy and distinguished service than that of Congressman Taber of Auburn, N. Y. or Grange Leader Taber of Ohio.

Place names: Only recently we chanced on - "A Visit to Tabor", in an old magazine of the 90's. Much to our surprise, we found it to be in Bohemia. Resorting to the old incomparable Century Cyclopedia of Names, we read "Tabor (See Taborites). A town in Bohemia situated on the Luschnitz, 48 miles south of Prague. It was founded as a stronghold by the Hussites under Ziska in 1419. It gave name to the Taborites. Population (1890) 8,440.

"Tabor (tā bor), Mount. A wooded mountain in Palestine, 6 miles east of Nazareth, on the border of the plain of Esdraelon; famous in Old Testament history. According to a tradition, it was the scene of the Transfiguration; and in the monastic ages it was peopled by hermits. Height about 1800 feet.

"Taborites - - - (So called from their great fortified encampment formed in 1419, on a hill in Bohemia named by them Mount Tabor, probably in reference both to Bohemian tabor encampment and to Mount Tabor in Palestine). The members of the more extreme party of the Hussites. They were fierce and successful warriors under their successive leaders Ziska and Procopius, causing widespread devastation, till their final defeat in 1434. See Hussites."

When Gideon<sup>5</sup> (Walter <sup>4</sup> Ebenezer<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Philip <sup>1</sup>) Tabor went to Harwich Vt., he was soon followed by his father, Walter <sup>4</sup>. In 1803, Harwich became probably the first Mount Tabor in U.S. Besides Vermont, there are today Mount Tabors in New Jersey, Oregon, South Carolina and several other states. There are several places named "Tabor" in Iowa, Minnesota, New Jersey, North Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont. In other parts of the world are found such variations as Monte Tabor, France; Tabora, Taboria in Africa.

Maps - The locale of residence of these Tabors (Lydia<sup>2</sup> John<sup>2</sup> Joseph<sup>2</sup> Philip<sup>2</sup>) is mainly eastern Rhode Island (Providence to Little Compton) with overflows into Freetown and Westport, Mass. and into New London County, Conn. These four generations were born mainly from 1640-1770. Strictly speaking we should present maps of this period but usually they are maps of the whole of New England. They lack the details of maps of the Revolutionary period and thereafter. We have chosen for the frontispiece parts of only three maps.

There are several other good maps of this region from Westport to Newport. When the Government Printing Office printed the 1790 Census of Rhode Island they reproduced Winterbotham's (1796) excellent map. To those who wish to pursue the matter farther, maps such as Benoni Lockwood's Map of 1819 (R.I.) might be useful. From our dates, 1778 to 1843, there are about 50 R.I. maps worthy of notice

Chronological synopsis of Philip<sup>1</sup> Tabor's Residences. ForPlymouth, Watertown and Martha's Vineyard dates we have not sought supporting evidence. The student may be perplexed by overlapping dates. For example when at Yarmouth 1640 he still had membership in the church in Watertown. Like Richard Arey of Martha's Vineyard, another New Londonite, he found himself in the squeeze that if you did not start building a house in six months you lost the grant of land. He probably lived first at Portsmouth 1655 but soon sought his son-in-law, Pardon Tillinghast of Providence and lived there principally where his heirs still had property in 1686. About 1667 or thereabouts he retired to Tiverton where he died 1672.

In 1699, Joseph Taber (2: 228, 229, 230) buys land in Tiverton from Edward Gray and Thomas Cook of Tiverton. 1697 Joseph Tabor of Tiverton, Hannah his wife for 170 f sell to Wm. Almy of Tiverton land in T. (2: 141); 1699/1701 Joseph Taber of Tiverton and "Hannah my now wife" sell for 300 % to Joseph Rogers of Newport 2 tracts in Tiverton. From 1705-1729/30 Joseph alone signs the deeds. first deeds (5: 118, 154; 7: 458) he signs alone are to Christopher Almy for 260 f 1705/6/7, and for 30 f to Ephraim Thomas of Little Compton 1707. Some held that Hannah died about 1707. 1701/1709 (5:507) he sells to George Wood; 1695/1709 (5:540) makes an agreement with Benjamin Church about repairing the mill of Nomquid; 1708/9 (6:17) sells to Job Briggs; 1709 (6:9) sells to Thomas Wait Jun.; 1708/9 (6:53) sells to "my cuzon (nephew) Joseph Tillinghast of Providence Town"; 1698/1709 (6:70) to Benj. Potter of Portsmouth. 1707/9 (6:216) to Philip Tabor of Dartmouth. In one instance Apr. 14, 1697 he with Jos. Tripp and Wm. Foaks is appointed to make a division of the estate of Wm Wood of Dartmouth deceased (New Eng. Reg. July 1909). One author (Mrs. Allien) remarks that from 1695-1720 he sold over 300 acres of land in Tiverton and thinks the land came to Joseph through his wife Hannah. About 1717 he makes several sales particularly to four sons -- Philip, yeoman or cordwainer; John, house carpenter or joiner; Ebenezer, cordwainer or cordwinder and Thomas: 7:435; 8:232; 8:308; 10:688; 17:120; 17:122; 19:268; 19:294 and others. Some have held that after 1717 he probably lived with his son Philip at New London. There are however two deeds (15:33) of Joseph of Tiverton to John Taber, joiner, in 1724; another of 1717, 1729/30 (19:294) to Ebenezer Taber. In Early Conn. Marriages appears a New London marriage of Joseph Taber and Mary Gladden Nov. 14, 1733. Writers have held that he was sometimes termed Job. In Joshua Hempstead's Diary, 286, "1734 Old Mr. Taber aged ( ) died Mar. 7, 1734/5. Old Mr. Taber buried in Ye Neck." Joseph Vincent of Amboy m. Mary Taber 1740. "Old French Mary -- alias Vincent, alias Taber buried 1754"- H.

4. Philip<sup>2</sup> (Philip<sup>1</sup>) bp. Feb. 1646; m. 1667 Mary Cook dau John and Sarah (Warren) Cook. Plymouth records give her birth 1657 but Edward Small (1934, pp 629:630) records it as 1651 or 1652. Plymouth. In 1667 or "early in 1668 (per Small) she m. Philip2 (Philip Tabor brother of John, Joseph and Thomas Tabor. Her father John Cook (Bristol D 10:450 recorded in 1716) July 17, 1673" for love and affection I bear my son-in-law Philip Tabor Inhabitant of Dartmouth, mason, deeds 50 acres" with Thomas Taber and Wm. Palmer witnesses. This was confirmed Feb. 27, 1692/3 wherein he gave "unto my son-in-law Philip Tabor inhabiting the aforesaid Town of Dartmouth -and Mary my daughter now wife of said Philip Tabor, fifty acres in Dartmouth with all the meadow belonging to it; and other land ---" (Plymouth Colony Deeds 3:324,339). This date is only a few days before the division (Mar. 4, 1692/3 of Philip's estate, the inventory to which Thomas Taber, Mary Davis and Philip Taber (presumably his son) swore. This statement mentions sons Philip and John and daughters Mary Earle, Sarah, Lydia, Abigail, Esther and Bethia Taber (Bristol Co. Probates 1, 100-102). Thus we see Mary Cook Taber married --Davis soon after Philip's death. The excellent genealogy of Thomas<sup>2</sup> Taber by Randall 1924 (p. 6) has Philip marrying Ester Cook as he also has Thomas<sup>2</sup> as her consort. It is doubtless a typographical slip. Observe that the Cook deed gives Mary as Philip's wife and also that Philip's first daughter is Mary, while the first of Thomas is Esther

5. Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Philip<sup>1</sup>) b. 1682; d. 1750 at 68; m. 1709 Elizabeth of Pardon and Lydia (Taber) Tillinghast. We cannot agree that she married Philip Taber son of Thomas and Mary (Thompson) Tabor (Ancestry of Edward Barber 1892 pp. 21-24 Philip<sup>3</sup>(Joseph<sup>2</sup>) is known in Bristol County deeds as Philip of Tiverton yeoman or cordwainer in contrast to his contemporaries: (1) Philip<sup>3</sup> (Philip<sup>2</sup>) of Dartmouth or "Philip Tabor of Dartmouth husbandman" or "yeoman" (2) Philip<sup>3</sup> (Thomas<sup>2</sup>) 2nd of Dartmouth. Did Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup>) leave Tiverton 1705, 1717 or 1726 for New London, Ct. where he eventually lived?

As the subsequent list reveals, there are Bristol Co. Deeds for Tiverton until 1727 as follows: In 1711 (17:380) he sells Tiverton land to Peter Larrose of Swanzey who (9:390) sells Tiverton to Philip. In 1711 (9:483) he for \$\frac{1}{2}\$ 200 buys land in Tiverton from Elias Williams of Newport. Later ((:483) he sells to "Philip" (Philip2) of Dartmouth busbandman" whose wife Margaret Tabor, Elizabeth Manchester and Martha (wife of Thomas Tabor 3 (Joseph 2) serve as witnesses. In 1713/14, he is a witness when Joseph<sup>2</sup> sells to his brother Ebenezer 60 acres in "Punkatast". In 1715 (10:122) he sells Tiverton land for f 250; the second (10:261) he also sells while for f he buys from Samuel Snoll land near Pumbsatast Out Lott". Beginning with 1717 he has many transactions. In this year, we have (1) he and his wife Elizabeth (10:663) sell; (2) he sells 36 acres to brother Ebenezer west end of 13th lot on number among sixty-one acre lots "East of Punbsasatt outlot" (10:687); (3) Rechard and Sarah Billings (15:501) of Little Compton, Benjamin Chase (L5:500) of Tiverton and Josiah Wilcox (17:121) sell land each one acre more or less to Philip. These lots are near Puncatest pond, outlet and neck. Also in 1717, Edward and Mary Gray of Tiverton (17:123) sell Philip 40 acres in the above region as does his father Joseph (17:120) who sells Philip 20 acres, Philip's brothers John and Thomas witnesses. So also his brother John (17:122) sells to him several pieces, brothers Thomas and Ebenezer witnesses. of the last deeds were not recorded until 1724,1725/26, 1726/27. The last deed after 1717 for Philip (Joseph ) in Bristol Co. (19:483) wherein Philip sells land in Tiverton 1726/27 (See Addenda 1)

The dates 1705, 1717-1720, 1726 were chosen for Philip's departure to New London for the following reasons: the year 1717 was very important to Joseph<sup>2</sup> Tabor's family when Philip bought and sold freely. The last deed after 1717 for Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup>) is Bristol Co. (19:483) where Philip sells land in Tiverton 1726/7. "Ear marks of Exeter: Philip Taber, Sept. 5, 1715." (See Addenda<sup>2</sup>)

In 1705, the "Dissenters" was formed by Rev. Valentine Wightman of North Kingston, R. I. Wightman moved to Groton, Ct. "The Fort Hill Church upon the other side of the river was organized about 1720, when Philip Tabor and Samuel Westcott removed from North Kingston and settled in that neighborhood" (Narr. Hist. Reg. 3, 274) From Caulkin's Hist. New London (1852, pp. 436-438) we have: "After 1720 they increased in numbers and influence. They were joined by --- and by Philip Taber from Rhode Island, who in 1726 purchased the farm of Capt. James Rogers on the Neck. (Philip Taber was one of the trustees of the house of worship 1729-30) --- Philip Taber, one of the pillars of this church, died Dec. 27, 1750. His religious views harmonized more particularly with the Six Principle Baptists of N. Kingston, R. I. to whom he left a legacy in his will. The doctrines of this sect are based on Hebrews VI, 1, 2."

## Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph)

From Joshua Hempstead Diary (1711-1758) we see he was a man of influence; in 1729+ he was on the neck school committee, later helping measure the beach, laying out commons, serving on freeholder's courts. Hempstead speaks of going to Groton and Mr. Tabor's; to Foggy hill for Tabor; going across the neck to Tabor's, to Tabor's at Riverhead.

On June 25, 1735, Philip writes a will and again on Aug. 2, 1750. Probate New London 1750 No. 5236 (abstract). Wife Elizabeth, 3 sons Pardon, Jeremiah, Samuel; son-in-law Josiah Taber; dau. Lydia Haines (wife of Charles dec'd) dau. Hannah Taber; 2 grandchildren Gedion Chapman and Elizabeth Chapman. Gives to Six Principle Baptist Church of North Kingston. He had property in Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island. (Sons Job and Philip died before the father) He died Dec. 30, 1750 aged 68.

In 1724, we have recorded (15:331) land sold to John<sup>3</sup> by his father Joseph<sup>2</sup>. In 1730 Ephraim Wilcox of Tiverton for £ 18, sells to John Taber of Tiverton, "house right" 1 acre lot in Late Division in Puncatest Outlet".

His will made 18 Nov. 1756. Recorded 6 Dec. 1756. Book 2, p.302 John Taber of Tiverton, wife Abigail to have use of all estate while widow for self and for bringing up my young children. 19 well loved children.

On Feb. 1, 1713 or 14 his father, Joseph the mason (10:688) for £ 100 sells him 60 acres in Punkatest. Joseph Tillinghast and Philip Tabor witnesses. In deed (11:168) he and Abigail, his wife, sell land for £ 56. In 1717, Aug. 23, his father Joseph sells to him (19:294) and in same book (19:268) he and his father sell land in Tiv. to Thomas Manchester, the deed recorded 1729/30. On Jan. 15, 1732/24 (17:123)

Edward and Mary Gray of Tiverton for £ 60 sell to Philip Tabor 4 acres in the Punbsasett outlet area Ebenezer a witness. In 1727 Ebenezer sells (17:454). On June 1, 1731, Ebenezer buys (31:447) land near the Manquit Mill Lot. In 1731/33 in mill lot region he buys from Philip Gray and Thomas Gray (21:446) of Tiverton and from Job Almy (21:447) of Newport. In 1740, Apr. 16 (Bristol 54:400) Ebenezer purchases land in Tiv. from John Springer of Dartmouth.

Ebenezer lived to 1772, but we will explore only Tiverton Land Deed Book Val. I. On Feb. 26, 1750/51 Job Almy for # 98 sells to Ebenezer Tabor of Tiv. land in Tiv. eastward end of Nomquot Mill lot one of ye tracts of ye 1/2 of ye 7th lot in Nomquot mill lot (1:88). Three years earlier (1:31) Jan 14, 1747/48 John Manchester of Tiverton for 1 290 paid by Joseph Taber, Tanner, and son of Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton sells 14 acres located on highway Nomquot to Dartmouth. On Aug. 20, 1750 (I, 242,243,244) Ebenezer, yeoman gives three deeds with his son Paul Taber and Restcome Sanford as witnesses. In the first "for love goodwill and affection" to son Thomas Taber of Tiverton blacksmith "gives land in Tiv. land where Thomas now dwells", north side of 13th lot Puncatest outlet and Dartmouth. In the second deed, Ebenezer gives to "my son Joseph Taber of Tiverton tanner" one acre "Joseph Taber's now dwelling house and farm and another tract in Tiverton. In the third deed "for love ---" to my beloved son Paul Taber" in the presence of Joseph Taber and R. Sanford. In 1763, May 20 (1:314) he for f 1000 paid by my son Joseph sells. In 1765, Mch. 9 (I -365) for love to my son Jacob Taber gives him land in Tiv. in the presence of Lydia Taber (his daughter) and R. Sanford. On Mch. 29 (I:364) for f 550 paid by Jacob Taber, he sells land. And in Book I 424, he deeds to Water (Walter) Taber, his remaining son.

The R. I. Archives give him as Freeman 1746/7, Deputy 1752, appears in Deputies and Freeman until Apr. 3, 1767.

He made his will Sept. 19, 1765 and it was executed Oct. 5, 1772. Tiverton wills pp. 179-182. He names wife Abigail; 5 sons Paul, Thomas, Joseph, Water, Jacob and daughters Hannah Hart and Lydia (unmarried) In 1752 (BCD 41:16) Abigail (Thomas Philip); Bethiah Blackwell and Mary Morton sell 3/12 parts of their father's (Thomas Philip) "estate of Thomas Taber late of Dartmouth".

Doubtless the last transaction of Philip (Philip) before his death (1694) is Bristol Co. Deed 1:189, (1693, Dec. 5) wherein he is grantee of 15 acres of upland in Dartmouth (sale really in 1682). On June 16, 1698 (BCD 12:236) his only two sons Philip3 and John3 of Dartmouth make a division. 1699/1700 Philip<sup>3</sup> (3:81) with his mother Mary Davis and his wife Margaret surrender his rights of thirds in land in Horseneck formerly owned by his father Philip. Hardly a year elapses wntil 1751 but he makes at least one transaction. A few selected items are: Apr. 25, 1699 (6:208) he buys the "27th lot in number in East Div. of Puccasatt Purchase." In deed 6:209 it is "part of 600 hundred acre Div. of Purchase of Dartmouth with 1/8 part of a whole share of upland beginning from the eight hundred acre already agreed upon by those purchasors". On Jan. 28, 1705 (2:212) he buys 60 acres of "undivided land in Dartmouth and in part of the 800th acre division", 200 acres (7:477) "out of the 800 acre division". 43 acres (8:286) of 800 acre division" to part of Dartmouth Salt Meadows (15:451). Several times he buys Cedar Swamp land eg. (15:461) "land in Cedar Swamp 5/16 of a share and 1/5 part of a quarter of a share Divided and undivided in Accusshanate Great Cedar Swamp". He bought some land in Tiverton near or about Punkatest pond, outlet, and land in Dartmouth between Punkatest and Dartmouth line"; in Tiverton near Dartmouth line" (21:243); buys land (18:217) in Dartmouth near dividing line of Little Compton and Dartmouth. He also has land near westernmost arm of "Acokset River" (18:342) or (30:420); in Watuppa near Namquit Mill Lot (31:447); 2 pieces near Noquacoak River. Philip3 (Philip2 Philip1) is designated Philip of Dartmouth after the death of his father in 1694. We doubt if there be a Taber with more than his 90 transactions in the first half of the eighteenth century, this Philip<sup>3</sup> Taber of Dartmouth yeoman or husbandman, called also Rev. Philip of Coaksit. Great care must be exercised in interpretations eg. (1) Tiverton Deeds 1:167 - Jeremiah Taber and Samuel Taber of New London, Dec. 5, 1757, sell tracts in Tiverton and Dartmouth land "executed by Philip Taber now deceased to our father Philip Taber also deceased." It is Philip<sup>3</sup> (Philip<sup>2</sup> Philip<sup>1</sup>) Taber who d. 1751. of Dartmouth to J. and S. father Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup> Philip<sup>1</sup>) who d 1750 of Tiverton and New London. (2) Westcott Hist and Gen. 1932 V. I p. 126 is wrong: IV Phebe Westcott --m. Dec. 3, 1733 Pardon Taber son of Philip of Thomas of the first Philip. should be Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup>).

In 1715 (BCD 17:20) the heirs of Philip<sup>2</sup> of Dartmouth sell to Philip<sup>3</sup> their brother: in the presence of Philip Taber, John Taber, Thomas Taber. Those who sign are Thos. Earle and wife Mary, Thomas Brownell and wife Ester of Portsmouth, Thomas Cory and Sarah Cory of Tiverton, Joseph Mosher and his wife Lidea, John Macumber and Bethia Macumber, John Taber and Abigail Taber all of Dartmouth.

Does the following incident from the Archives in Boston V. 28 F. 29 p. 195 footnote of <u>1721</u> belong with this Philip<sup>3</sup> (Philip<sup>2</sup>) the elder of Dartmough; with "Dissenter" Philip<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup>) finally of New London or with Philip<sup>3</sup> (Thomas<sup>2</sup>) who went to New Jersey?

"An odd affair happened in the house this sitting of the court. One of the members sat down in prayer time. The speaker after prayers asked him the reason of it. He said he could not join with them in calling God "our father". The house immediately res'd "that Philip Taber be expelled this house as not worthy to continue a member therof."

One must keep in mind John<sup>3</sup> (Joseph<sup>2</sup> Ph<sup>1</sup>) of Tiverton housewright 1690 - 1756; John<sup>3</sup> (Thomas<sup>2</sup> Ph<sup>1</sup>) of Dart. 1681-abt 1760; John<sup>4</sup> (Ph<sup>3</sup> Ph<sup>2</sup> Ph<sup>1</sup>) 1723-1758, and John Taber (John<sup>3</sup> Ph<sup>2</sup> Ph<sup>1</sup>) Jr. of Dartmouth, blacksmith, John's own son. We deal here with John<sup>3</sup> (Ph<sup>2</sup> Ph<sup>1</sup>) of Dartmouth (1684-1727) yeoman.

In Bristol Co. Deeds 12:65 (1717) John Teceives money from his brother Philip of Dartmouth for 1/8 part of land. This confirms the fact that Philip had eight heirs — 6 girls and 2 boys, Philip and John. In BCD 2:236, Philip and John, brothers, make a division. On Oct. 1, 1714 (LO:671) he witnesses a deed of his brother Philip. On Oct. 15, 1714 (LO:682) he "John Taber (the son of Philip Taber of Dartmouth deceased) joiner" sells land in a cedar Swamp. In 1715 (11:271) Samuel Hart of Little Compton sells to him land in Dartmouth. In 1717, May 19 (14:458) "buys land in Coxet Meadow on Sedge flatt". After 1722 until hisdeath in 1727 we see no deeds. Some idea of his homestead comes when 'm. Taberof Little Compton yeeman for 1150 f sells to "Philip Tabor of Dartmouth Gent and son of John Tabor of Dartmouth deceased" "lend that my honored father of Dartmouth left by will, "land partly in Little Compton and partly in Tiverton 80 acres. The boundaries are Philip Taber's homestead farm, Oliver Baley, John Taber's Homestead" easterly on Philip Taber's land who is otherways called Elder Taber". (Tiverton Land Deed 1,54) about 1745.

In 1729, Philip Taber of Dartmouth sells to "Susanna Taber of Dartmouth widow "land in Tiverton" she sister of William Manchester" (BCD 19:470)

A.A.W) In an inventory Aug. 28, 1727: dau. Mary heart hath had in part her portion.

From 1760 to 1820, the battle of Pardon Taber records is difficult. None of the name appears in Thomas line until 47 Apr. 1772 in a seventh generation Pardon (Humphrey Antipas Amos Joseph Thomas Ph Taber of New Bedford and Fairhaven. Early Pardon birth dates in Rhode Island are 1739, 1740 and none married before 1760. Therefor transactions from 1730-1760 are almost surely Pardon Ph Joseph Ph of New London. The starting point is where Jeremiah Tabor and Samuel Taber Dec. 5, 1757 (Tiv. Deeds 1:167) of New London sell to Pardon Taber of New London for \$\frac{1}{2}\$ CO land in Tiverton and Dartmouth "made and executed by Philip Taber now deceased to our father Philip Taber also now deceased". Four years later (Tiv. Deeds 2nd Book Land evidence No. 1 B 1:29) Pardon Tabor of New London for \$\frac{1}{2}\$ Sells 30 acres of land in T. to John Taber of Tiv. Nov. 19, 1761 (2nd Book: 44) for \$\frac{1}{2}\$ 360 from Vm. Sanford of Tiverton he sells 6 acres land bounding S on land he sold John Taber and V. on land he sold Wm. Sanford.

In 1766, 1764, 1768, he sells some of this land as follows: Tiverton 1:411 to Thomas Tabor of Tiverton, weaver, 18 acres; 1:420 to Benj. Earl of Tiverton "land where ThomasTabor son of Susannah Cory now liveth." Boundaries Thomas Taber, Restcome Sanford, Constant Hart, Peter Davel, John Wilbur; 1:422 to Wm. Sanford of Tiverton 3 acres; 1:448 to Joseph Tabor of Tiverton Apr. 9, 1768; 1:454 to Wm. Sanford of Tiverton 1767; 1:455 Restcome Sanford; 1:473 to Benj. Earl 1768; 1:448 for 105 Spanish dollars sells 3 acres to "Joseph Taber of Tiv. yecman son of Susannah Cory" Apr. 9, 1768. In Tiverton deed 1:470 Elizabeth Tabor of New London wife of Pardon Taber "for good causes" 913 Spanish dollars "received from my husband releases to Benj. Earl, John Weight, Mm. Davis, Thomas Taber, Mm. Sanford Mar. 6, 1767. On Apr. 4, 1784 (4:466) or Sept. 14, 1785 he, Pardon Taber of New London "yeeman" sells 10 acres of land in Dartmouth to Lemuel Tabor of Tiverton. In 1788 (67:504) land in Dartmouth to Eben Hart of Dartmouth. In 1791 (71:578 he conveys to Jos. Sanford of Tiverton land in T. and Dartmouth. In 1792 (71:124) heand Elizabeth his wife for #/eell to Lem. Baley of Tiverton and in 7L:125 Elizabeth forswears her rights.

From Hempstead Diary, we cull as follows: (1) On July 18, 1733 and Jan. 10, 1735/36, Jan. 19, 1744/45, Samuel Vestcote lived on the neck where Philip and Pardon Tabor were (e.g. 589 June 3, 1752. He came into the neck with Philip Taber frmm the church at North Kingston. "Pardon had select horses (481, 501 - ); (3) Mar. 21, 1744/45 "Pardon Taber's wife (Phebe) died of a consumption"; p.439. (4) Oct. 1, 1748 Pardon had an action against Jas. Rogers; (5) several times with Pardon apprising land; (6) "Went out to Nihantic --- to finish the division of Mr. Taber's Woodland by the River (621,622); (7) laying out highways (625); (8) evidence for Pardon in court (669-671); 1756; (9) Dec. 5, 1757 "I stayed al night" (695, 696); in his diary, he frequently stopped at Tabors Philip and Pardon. (10) Of the father of Pardon's 2nd wife - Elizabeth Harris he writes: Jan. 6, 1722/23 Richard Harris and Lucy Smith - Published Mar. 27, 1728/29. Richard Harris chosen new tavern keeper. Dec. 29, 1751 "Richard Harris att ye Harbour's mouth died". "Nov. 23, 1729 Ric'd. Harris a child Babtized Elizabeth".

Pardon was a spirited man, head of the New London Tabers and doubtless the actor in Caulkin's relation (1852 p. 438) of the following happening: In the latter part of Elder Gordon's tenure, the church declined. A newminiter in 1772 was secured but the Sunday he was to begin Gordon occupied the pulpit. On Sunday, June 7th, they collected together and poceeded to the house of worship where they found Mr. Gorton officiating in the pulpit; with the communion table spread before him. One of the most resolute of the party ascended the pulpit, forcibly expelled its occupant and drove him and his wife (2nd wife) and their whole company from the sacred precincts. It has been said also that as he went down the hill, they threw his Bible after him. Of this act, however, the complaint afterwards entered by the grand juror against Mr. Taber as principal in this transaction, says nothing. It accused him of collaring Mr. Gorton, beating him out of the pulpit and pushing away his wife when she came to his rescue. The indictment was for breach of the peace and profanation of the Sabbath. Mr. Taber was fined on both accounts."

In the Probate Division of State Library Hartford we analyzed briefly Pardon Tabor's Will, Waterford, Ct. 1803 No. 5235, but now through the kindness of Mrs. Myrtle Rice Haynes, a fuller analysis from Edna Miner Roger's manuscript on Tabors (Conn. Hist. Soc. Lib) is presented:

There are no land deeds forhim in Bristol County, Mass., but in Tiverton (Land Evidence I, 167) he with his brother Samuel sell to their brother Pardon of New London, land in Tiverton and Dartmouth - land from their deceased father Philip (Joseph Ph. ) executed to by now also deceased Philip (Philip Ph. ) Tabor of Dartmouth yeoman. The only Hempstead Diary note is Jan. 11, 1750?51 "I --- was prizing Mr. Tabor's Household goods etc" (Philip). Jan. 12 I was all Day apprizing att Jer. Tabers, ---".

Notes made for us by Mrs. Myrte Rice Haynes (of Ithaca, N.Y.) on the Records of EdnaMiner Rogers (Conn. Hist. Coc.) are roughly as follows:

In 1792 Jeremiah Tabor "late of New London, now of Hartford" conveys to "Mrs. Mary Tabor wife of Job Tabor land flyom my honored father".

Jeremiah had land joining Pardon Tabor's. Belowthe 1790 Census, Mrs. Rogers notes that his neighbors were David Mallory, Rufus Beebe, Jeremiah Tabor, Wm. Moore, Noah Daniels --- Jeremiah Tabor had moved to Hartford by Jan. 31, 1791 when he sold land to Manwaring and Chappel land in New London at "the Great Neck", adjoining that of Pardon Tabor.

Principally after his death (1805) we have in Tiverton Jeremiah yeoman with wife Ruth and Fairhaven Jeremiah, cooper, of lines included in Randall's Faber Book, but no confusion can result with this Jeremiah of New London, Ct.

The History of Washington N.H. (1886) remarks that Amos lived many years in the town but left no family. Since Amon (Joe. 2 Ph. 1) of L. I. was called Amos in one deed and even signed as Amos, we think it likely that Amos of Washington N. H. was Amon a brother of Joseph of Washington, N.H.

In the town papers in Sec'y State Office in Concord N.H.; he is mentioned in Vol. 2 pp. 156, 231, 278, 312, 326, 344 as of Washington N.H.

We find no deeds or transactions of Constant<sup>4</sup> (John<sup>3</sup>) in Tiverton, Little Compton or Taunton. All pertain to either Constant<sup>6</sup> (Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Stephen<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Philip<sup>1</sup>) Painter of Pawtucket with wife Weity B. or to Constant (Philip<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Ebenezer<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Philip<sup>1</sup>) of Tiverton, b. 1780

According to R. I. State Archives (D.F. 74, 76, 82) Constant Taber of Newport was on the voting list April 1765, also on voting list for town meeting April 15, 1767 as also was his son Constant Jr. Archives (Maritime Papers 84, 85, 86, 91) concern a bill of Pardon Gray to the state of R. I. July 1778, bill of P.G. for rigging, receipt in full 1778. A petition to General Treasurer R. I. 1808 must concern Constant, Jr.

In R. I. S. Archives (Public Notary Records 8) several interesting records occur: (1) p. 68 Newport R. I. April 6, 1769. Received of Constant Taber Jun. One Quarter Cask of Wine and Twelve pair Men's Leather Shoes as a Venture for Constant Taber to be disposed of at Georgia and promise to ship the Neat Proceeds by the first opportunity to Rhode Island.
(2) p. 140 Apr. 24, 1773. In presence of Constant Taber Jun.
(3) p. 165 St. John Newfoundland - Constant Tabor, Jun. February 17, 1774.

(4) p. 181 Oct. 9, 1773, Constant Taber Jun. Indorsed to him and others for 7 pounds ten shillings.

Constant 4 had a son Constant Jr. b. 1743 who died at Newport 1826. If Constant 4 died Aug. 23, 1794 as one record gives it, not 1774 as appears in another, the Census of 1774 pertains to Constant 4 not Constant 7 This implies 2 boys, one over 16 and one under 16, with Constant 5 married in 1773. Was Benjamin of East Greenwich b. 1759 (with a son Constant) another son of Constant 5?

In 1767 (Fall River Deeds A 232) Anne Taber of New London for \$\notine{10}\$ paid by Benedick Taber of Providence, cooper, all my interest in land in Tiverton, dwelling house with 3 acres" where my brother Stephen Taber dwells.

On Apr. 23, 1767 (Fall River A 233, Tiv. 2nd B. No. 1 81:18)
Benedict Taber of Providence and David Taber of Newport, cooper, for \$\forall 300 \text{ paid by Stephen Taber of Tiverton land their father's children and their sister Anna Taber inherited.

Of Revolutionary service we find only the R. I. State Library File of "Benedit Taber of Capt. Hoppin's Co. 1778, 1779 for town"

The name Stephen occurs at least 14 times in the Taber family up to the 7th generation. Of these 14, only three are positively known from the Joseph<sup>2</sup> and Philip<sup>2</sup> lines.

In the Thomas<sup>2</sup> lineage (Randall Book) we find 1 Stephen of 4th, 3 of the 5th, 4 of the 6th and 3 of 7th generations, making 11 in all apparently a favorite name.

One might wonder if "Stephen4 of Dartmouth yeoman" or "labourer" might be confused with our Stephen4 because he lived to 1791, and made 30-40 transactions (Bristol Deeds) but Stephen4 (John Joe. 2 Ph. 1) is clearly designated "Stephen Taber of Tiverton millwright" or merely "Stephen Taber of Tiverton".

There are however two confusions needing clearance:

- 1. Revolutionary service is credited in several places such as the Revolutionary file in R.I.S. Library to Stephen Taber son of Edward and Austris Taber b. Oct. 3, 1756 d. ae 76 Dec. 8, 1832". This should read (per Arnold 6:51, 105, 165) "Stephen Talbee b. Oct. 6, 1766, Little Compton d. 90 years June 22, 1846". He was the son of Edward and Mrs. Austis (Waldron) Talby married Oct. 17, 1751. Edward's wife Austris d. ae 70 years Sept. 26, 1796. His second wife Ann "Anne widow of Edward d. July 23, 1846, 95 y."
- 2. One correspondent reports two tembstones "Deacon Stephen Taber d. Nov. 21, 1812 in his 67th year. This has been credited to Stephen (John Joe. 2 Ph. 1) who doubtless was born 10-15 years before 1745.

Furthermore, the old tombstone may read 87th year instead of 67th.

Deeds: In 1767 Stephen buys of Vm. Brightman Jr. (Tiverton D. 1:415) 8th lot near Puncatest outlet. The same year (T. 1:415) "Job Almy of Newport (grandson of Job Almy deceased) sells to Stephen of Tiverton for \$f\$ 5 land in Tiverton, one acre, land in Puncatest outlet and lyeth between highway that leadeth through Tiverton and Little Compton and Puncatest Pond - 8th lot, See Benedict and David and Anne Tabor's deeds - Fall River A. 232, 233 - wherein Stephen Taber of Tiverton, house carpenter for \$f\$ 300 buys their shares in John Taber's estate, the place where he, Stephen, then resided.

In Tiverton Deed 2:190, 191 - Stephen and Ruth Taber of Tiverton sell land in Tiv. to Ephrain Gifford. (This is in 1771 when she is given as daughter of Job Briggs late of Little Compton). (This land in L.C. that Ruth had).

In 1788 (Tiv. D. 3:643) Benj. Chase and Abner Chase of Tiverton sell for f 4 land to Stephen Taber and Jacob Taber of Tiverton.

In 1792 (Tiv. D. 512) Stephen buys of Samuel Sanford all my right, title and interest in homestead of John Taber of Tiverton late deceased, Sometime afterward (Tiv. D. 2:231)

About 1809 (Tiverton D. 8:140) to Noah Palmer and wife Elizabeth (Tiv. D 8:141) land to Sanford Almy et al, land easterly of Noah Palmer's.

In Tiverton Deeds (8:47) Stephen of Tiverton, house carpenter, sells for \$2 to Marcy Taber of Tiverton, weaver, lot - "Said Mercy having rights in house adjoining as right of dower in estate of Job Taber, late of Tiverton, deceased " (Job was Stephen's son) 22 Sept. 1813.

In May 1814 for \$110 he sells property (Tiv. 8:220)
In Several deeds (8:4, 67,68,139) he receives \$1002 in four payments on mortgages.

According to D.A.R. Honor Roll data: Stephen's Revolutionary Record was: Served as a private in Capt. Cook's Comp. Col. John Cook's Ref't. R. I. Militia, and in 1778 in Col. Nathan Miller's Reg't. He lived in Tiverton R. I. and his youngest child was born there in 1782.

In the Rhode Island and Dartmouth, Mass. regions, six or seven Gideons are born from 1740-1770, but only one appears in the Census of 1790. He doubtless is Gideon (Job, Thomas, Ebenezer, Joseph, Ph.1).

Sarah Taber and Daniel Taber. In the Marriage Records (N.J. Archives) (1st Series XXII, 390) of New Jersey 1665-1800 Daniel Taber m Hannah Tallman of Shrewsbury. m 10 Oct. 1765, Sarah Webley Shrewsbury, N.J. No children.

In Public Notary Records (R.I.S. Archives 7:362 Billeting Roll of Capt. John Whiting's Co. 1757 Daniel Tabor Enlistment Mar. 29 Days Billeted 68.

In 1760 (R.I. State Archives) he is on the Tax list for the south end of Tiverton. There are no more records for R. I. except that a Paniel Taber appears as a R. I. Matross 1776 Capt. Joshua Sayer's Co. Col. Rob't Elliot's Regt. The note "No date £ 26-2-0 on list of balances due Oct. 1785." In Cowell's Spirit of 1776 - Arnold - Vol. 120 Daniel appears as a soldier of R.I.

The Daniel of 1790 Census New Bedford must be (257) in Randall. Daniel (Ben. 5, Benj. 4, Joseph 7, Thomas 2, Philip 1) who married Catherine Coggeshall in 1786.

We have vistied his grave in Lyons or "Hardscrabble" Cemetery in Madison Co., N.Y. The record reads "Philip Taber Soldier of the Revolution d. May 14, 1827 ae 80 yrs. 5.mos. 8 da." Mary Taber wife of Philip d. June 10, 1848 ae 96 yrs. 2 mos. 18 da. Lucy dau of Philip and Mary Taber died Sept. 28, 1861 ae 74 yrs. 10 days."

The N. H. Revolutionary records separate him from Philip of New Hampshire and therein they name his son Benjamin of Little Compton (b. Feb. 14, 1774) who testifies in 1837 about his father's service.

27 Feb. 1837 David of Madison Co. N.Y. testifies: He is 55 years old, son of Philip and Mary. Mary resides in Cazenovia. R.I.S. Archives we have re Philip Tabor the following: "Madison Co. N.Y. 27 Feb. 1837 before B. Beckwith Mary of Cazenovia aged 84 widow of Philip made affidavit. Both born in Little Compton R.I. In spring of 1816 moved to above town of Cazenovia, --- Letter of C. Taber Perkins Syracuse 1908. Letter of Mrs. James L. Crandall 1899.

Philip was a shoemaker.

In National Archives w 16750 Frances Wilbur of Little Compton R.I. testifies to wit: Philip and Mary were married in the Revolution and lived in Little Compton in the north part. He was "on guard service on shores of this town, as with militia, I month at a time for every alternate month until the enemy left R.I. in November 1779."

In the census of 1777 "Philip Taber b. Little Compton is 16-50 able."

(Tiv. Deed 10:8) Nowell Taber of Tiverton housewright conveys to Nowell Jr. and Nowell Jr. and his wife Ruth Taber of Tiverton convey to Nowell Taber of Tiverton 1819. In the period of 1803-1807 Daniel and Mary Dwelly and Mary his wife of Tiverton for \$76 paid by John Taber and Noel Taber labourers of Tiverton sell land (Tiv. 7:242) These are probably sons of Noel Sr. and Mary wife of Daniel <u>Dwelly</u> may be a daughter. When Noel Jr. and Ruth (Tiv. 8, 305) sell two lots in Tiverton to Daniel Dwelly, Noel Sr. must have been alive.

In 1819, Lot and Isabelle Sherman (wife) of Westport for \$1200 sell land in Dartmouth to Noel Taber of New Bedford - homestead of their honored father.

In the Revolution:

Pension book LXVIII reads: Noel -- 1777 enlists for the war in R.I. line, served 3 years, wounded battle of Springfield N.J. June 23, 1780. At battles Monmouth and Red Bank. b. 1749 or 50 res. Tiverton.

R.I. State Library Record (S. 33777) gives the following: Noel Taber R. I. Corporal 14 Apr. 1818. ae 69 resident in Tiverton. Noel enlisted circa 1777 during the war in State R.I. under Capt. Jenks in Col. Israel Angell's Reg. of Continental troops of R.I. line. Served 3 yrs. --- By law passed 7 Je. 1785 placed on Pension List of U.S. which he relinquished and that he is in reduced circumstances. 14 Apr. 1819 Noel Taber Jr. son of Noel declared he accompanied his father to the P.O. to mail letter with pension certificate. Inscribed on Pension rolls 18 Mar. 1818 at \$8 per month from 24 April 1818.

Paul lived but 58 years, and had no son named Paul, hence his record appears quite clearly. His brother Jacob's son Paul<sup>5</sup> was not born until 1774, the year of Paul<sup>4</sup>'s death.

In 1750, Aug. 20 "Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton, yeoman, for love --- gives to "my son Paul Taber cordwainer "land in Tiverton 5 acres where Paul liveth." (Tiv. D. 1:244) Thereafter in two or three deeds of his brothers or father he appears as witness.

In 1760 Tax list (R.I.S. Archives) of Tiverton appears Paul Taber and his first son Pardon Taber b. 1739.

There is also in Dartmouth Thomas Taber ye second, tanner of Dartmouth (No. 172 Randall) 1739-1801+ (Jonathan Th. Th. Ph. 1) who married Elizabeth Eldredge. In one volume (B.C.D. 72) p. 143 in 1791 Th. and Eliz. (No.172) sell, while on p. 91 in 1794 "Thomas and Hannah (No. 121) Taber of N.B. sell. Other designations such as Thomas of Rochester occur. Fortunately our Thomas4 is of Tiverton. But who is Thomas Tabor of Tiverton "weavour", Thomas 4 of John 3?

On Aug. 20, 1750 Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton yeoman, "for affection to my beloved son Thomas Taber of Tiverton" gives land in Tiverton, dwelling, where Thomas dwells -- "the 13th lot amongst six score acre lots formerly laid out between Puncatest outlet and Dartmouth (Tiv. Deed 1:242)

In 1760 tax list two different Thomas Tabors of Tiverton appears one, Thomas (Ebenezer<sup>3</sup>); the other Thomas (John<sup>3</sup> and Susanna) On Feb. 9, 1761 (Tiv. 2nd book:16) Thomas Taber of T. blacksmith and Mary his wife for f 3000 paid by Walter Cook of Tiverton, cordwainer, sell his homestead farm, "s.w. corner of Rebeckah Manchester to her n.w. corner and go on said course to lot 13 amongst the six score lots formerly laid out between head of Puncatest outlet and Partmouth line.

In 1761, on Aug. 12, Joseph Taber for # 1000 paid by Thomas Taber blacksmith sells (Tiv. 2nd book No. 1, B 1:27)

On Aug. 27, 1761 (Tiv. D 1:274) the sheriff of Newport Co. sells land of Jeremiah Manchester, mariner for # 1080 paid by Thomas Taber of Tiverton, blacksmith, "who was the highest bidder. (Jeremiah M. was Thomas' son-in-law A.A.W.)

On June 8, 1762 (Tiv. 2nd book:42) Nathaniel Crandall of T. for \$\mathcal{I}\$ 300 from Thomas Taber of T. blacksmith sells 15 acres, west end of upper part of 5th and 6th six score lots, formerly laid out between Puncatest outlet and Dartmouth line, land formerly belonging to John Manchester". Signed by Nathaniel, Sarah and Mary Crandall.

In 1792, May 25 (Tiv. D. 5:50) Thomas and Mary of Tiverton for f 9 paid by Humphrey Tabor of Tiverton, currier, sells 2 acres of land in Tiverton on highway of six score acre lots, southerly on land of Jacob Taber and partly on Joseph Taber Esq. northerly on Joseph Tabor" -- "same piece of land given to me by my father Ebenezer Taber deceased."

But in 1797, Feb. 22 (Tiv. D. 5:504) Thomas Taber of Tiverton now "yeoman" for \$5 paid by Edmund Taber of Tiverton Labourer sells "part of my homestead farm". Mary Taber signs.

On May 18, 1799, Thomas and Mary Taber (Tiv. 6:106) of Tiverton for \$37.50 paid by Wm. Cook of Tiverton yeoman and son to Walter Cook sell land in Tiverton 7-1/2 acres land adjoining land of our grandson Edmond. In Tiv. D. 6:111 same day, Edmond and Patience Taber sell for \$37.50 to Walter Cook land from grandfather Thomas Taber.

In the census of 1777 are two Thomas Tabers of Tiverton, one "50-60" unable, one "60 up". The first must be Thomas 4 (Ebenezer 3) b. Oct. 28, 1717; the second Thomas 4 (John 3 Ph. 2 Ph. 1)

On Nov. 12, 1788 in Little Compton R. I. Deacon Joseph married Mary Taber of Thomas. At the same time, two of the fifth generation must be added: 5. Joseph<sup>5</sup> (Philip<sup>4</sup>, Philip<sup>3</sup>, Philip<sup>2</sup>, Philip<sup>1</sup>) of Tiverton (Freetown) b. 1723 6. Joseph<sup>5</sup> (Benj., Joseph, Thomas, Philip) of Dartmouth (No. 109 Randall) b. 1731

We are dealing here with Joseph of Ebenezer "deacon" and "tanner".

The first deed Tiverton Jan 14, 1747/8 John Manchester of Tiverton for f 290 paid by "Joseph Taber tanner and son of Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton" sells land, 14 acres, land bought of John Thompson. It is "on the highway Nomqoit to Dartmouth.

In 1750 (T.I., 243 Aug. 20, 1750) "Ebenezer Taber of T. yeoman, for love, goodwill and affection to my son Joseph Taber of Tiverton, tanner" gives 1 acre, Joseph's "now dwelling house and farm and another tract in Tiverton. In the presence of Paul Taber and Restcome Sanford.

On Feb. 12, 1752, Joseph Taber of Tiverton, tanner, of the 1st part sells to the Trustees of the Colony 2nd part, land in Tiverton (Tiv. Deed I, in Book 1, B 1:4)

In 1763 (T. 314) Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton, yeoman, for 1 1000 paid by my son Joseph Taber, May 20, 1763, sells land in Tiverton 5 acres.

In 1765, Joseph (1:365) witnesses his father's sale to his brother Jacob.

In Tiverton Probates the will of Joseph Taber made Feb. 10, 1798 is somewhat as follows: wife Mary Taber; sons: two eldest beloved sons Lemuel and Isaac, Lemuel to have northerly part of homestead and Isaac the southerly part of homestead. Son Ichabod to have a sum of money. To grandson Joseph son of Lemuel "my loom". Also to four beloved granddaughters, children of John Stafford and my daughter Judith Stafford named Elizabeth Stafford, Alice Stafford, Hannah Stafford and Mary Stafford. Son Lemuel executor.

On page 325 appears a codicil "Joseph Taber Deacon" changes division lines of land.

In the Tax List of Tiverton 1760 Walter Taber appears (R.I. State Archives).

In Tiv. D 1:310 Water Taber of Tiv. "Curier" for f 1000 paid by Benj. Crandall sells land, homestead farm, acre in Tiverton and part of the 13th lot of six score lots in 1763, Sept. 14.

This same year "Rebeckah Manchester of Tiverton yeoman", for £ 260 sells to Water Taber (Tiv. 2nd B:59)

In 1763 Ebenezer Taber of T. yeoman for £600 paid by my son Walter Taber currier land in Tiverton. Boundaries of land Walter Tabor of Rebeckah Manchester, Water Cooke, Samuel Almy May 20, 1763 (Tiv. D. 1:424) On Sept. 14, 1763 (Tiv. D. 1:311) Benj. Crandall of T. weaver for £3000 paid by Water T. Currier sells 35 acres of land, homestead farm between Puncatest Outlet and Dartmouth.

In (Tiv. D. 1:427) Walter (Water) and Hannah for # 220 paid by Cornelius Soule sell land.

The first of the name is Jacob (Thomas 2, Philip 1) No. 16 Randall 1683-1773 of Dartmouth, his son Jacob (No. 81) 1723-1806 who went to Vassalbore, Me., then his son Jacob 1757-1846, and Jacob (Stephen, Jacob, Thomas, Philip) No. 201, and Jacob and Jacob of Fairhaven and Acushnet -- 6 in all of the Thomas line, Only 1 Jacob of the fourth generation to confuse with our Jacob4 (Ebenezer3, Joseph2, Philip1). Yet all six above were somewhat contemporary with Jacob4 of Ebenezer and his son Jacob5, Jr.

1774-1832. Jacob was a rare name in the Joseph<sup>2</sup> and Philip<sup>2</sup> lines. In deeds of the Jacobs are designated Jacob of Vassalborough, Jacob of Dartmouth, Jacob of Fairhaven, Jacob of New Bedford, though at times terms like Jacob Taber 3rd appeared.

In 1752 (Mar. 29) Ebenezer Taber of Tiverton (Tiv. D. 1:364) for £ 550 paid by his son Jacob Tabor, land in Tiverton, half of his tanyard --- his brother Joseph and sister "Lidya" present. On Mar. 9, 1755 (Tiv. D. 1:365) Ebenezer of T. yeoman for love to my son Jacob Taber land in Tiverton "part of my homestead farm."

Although 25, but not married until 1763, he does not appear on the Tiverton Tax List of 1760.

On Nov. 28, 1800 (Tiv. D. 6:192) Jacob for f 250 paid by "my son Jacob Taber of Tiverton currier" sells land in Tiverton, 5 acres. On the same day (6:193) Jacob Taber of Tiverton yeoman for \$200 paid by my son Paul Taber of Tiverton, tanner, sells land in Tiverton 1/2 interest in tanning trade. Jacob Jr. above witness.

In 1802 (Dec. 10, Tiv. 6:399) Jacob Taber sells land to John Macomber.

On Mar. 15, 1803 (Tiv. 6:502) Paul Taber of Tiverton tanner for \$200 paid by my father Jacob Taber of Tiverton "my interest in tanyard in Tiverton. On Mar. 9, 1803 (Tiv. 6:503) Jacob Taber, Jr. for \$250 paid by father Jacob Taber of Tiverton. In 1804 Sept. 7 (Tiv. 6:460) for \$400 he sells land to John Manchester.

Tiv. 7:97 - Mar. 21, 1806 Redford Dennis and Abigail his wife of Tiverton for \$2000 paid by Jacob Taber of Tiverton sell part of "my honored father's (John Dennis) farm - 100 acres.

Tiv. 7:101 - Redford Dennis Esq. for \$260 paid by Jacob Taber and Thomas Briggs both of Tiverton sells land in Tiverton.

We know not whether he had Revolutionary service. In the census of 1777 appears "Jacob Taber, Tiverton 16-50 able.

Surprisingly enough, they are not however too hard to separate.

Also in the 1790 census there were no Philip families in N. Y., Vt. or Connecticut.

Inasmuch as the Tabor or Taber family began in U.S. with Philip<sup>1</sup>, we will give a specimen series of wills or administrations of this Philip<sup>4</sup>(Ph.<sup>3</sup>, Ph.<sup>2</sup>, Ph.<sup>1</sup>) of Phebe his wife and of Phebe his daughter.

I also give and bequeath to my sd wife and two daughters all my household furnature of all sorts and every kind that is not before given and Disposed of as aforesaid. In this my last Will and Testament to be Equally Divided to my sd wife and two daughters and to each one of them their heirs and assigns for Ever --

All my wearing appairiel I give Equally to be divided between my four sons Joseph Péleg Pardon and George. The priviledges grants Gifts and bequests given to my said Wife -- being in steed of her thirds or dowry and with my two Daughters to Look after and do for my two sd Grandaughters Ruth Mosher and Phebe Shrieve till they shall arrive to a marriage state or to the age of eighteen years.

The name Jonathan does not appear in the Taber families until the fourth generation. There we have Jonathan (Thomas, Thomas, Philip, b. 24 Feb. 1702/3 d. before 31 Dec. 1770 married Lois West. No. 61 Randall and Jonathan (Ph.3, Ph.2 Ph.1) of this sketch. Two Jonathans in the 5th sons of each of the above. The son in the Thomas line married Desire Hoxie and Went to Plattskill, N.Y. No. 173 in Randall. Jonathan of our sketch had Jonathan who died 1796. At least two Jonathans appear in sixth and three appear in the seventh.

This Jonathan4 (Ph.3, Ph.2, Ph.1) and Robe his wife are contemporaneous in deeds with Jonathan4 of Thomas line (No. 61 Randall) and wife Lois (West) Taber of Dartmouth, tanner. Our Jonathan4 is dubbed "son to Elder Philip Taber late of Dartmouth deceased".

A deed of Dec. 10. 1760 (BCD 44:478) wherein Philip of John Taber deceased pays Jonathan Taber, son of Elder Philip 70 f for land in Little Compton and Dartmouth.

The transaction concerns 1 certain gristmill plus 1 sawmill plus 4 acres "scituate partly in Little Compton and partly in Dartmouth as line now runs" land belonging to the mills "southerly by mill dam as now stands, westerly partly on land of John Gifford and part on land of Benjamin Brownell, part on land now in possession of Samuel Snell, northerly on Philip Taber easterly on land Daniel Willcocks in part and part on land belonging to heirs of Elder Philip Taber late deceased until it comes to the west way and thence as the fence now stands. Jonathan and Robe Taber"

In 1784 two deeds (BCD 63:509, 63:41. 1. On Mar. 9, 1784 Jonathan Gentleman and Robe Taber of D- sell to Gardner -- 50 acres "north-westmost part of my homestead farm" (Description in next deed and in addition includes "salt meadow or sedge flat on ye west Branch or arm of Acoxet River.

In the other deed (63:41) Gardner and Susanna sell June 23, 1784 for f 156 to Constant Sisson, the 50 acres is described "A certain Tract or piece of land partly in Dartmouth --- partly in --- Tiverton --- and is the land that I bought of my hon'd father Jonathan Taber --- bounded as followeth beginning in ye Southwest corner of Poganset Pond at a Peaked Rock with a heap of stones, by the side of ye same for ye southeast corner bounds of said Lot, from thence West three and half degrees south by ye line between sd Log and George Woods Land to a Stake and heap of stones taking in its course a Red Oak Tree marked partly on Paul Mosher northerly on sd. Paul Mosher, easterly on Pogansett Pond, southerly on Land Belonging to my honored father Jonathan Taber, together with the buildings, orchard and fencing. In presence of Wm. Davis, Margaret Davis, Gardner Taber Susanna Taber."

in 1784 (BCD 62:436) Jonathan and Robe convey to their son-in-law Wm. Davis. And Jonathan or 5 with Aaron Davis with a deed (BCD 63:42) wherein Gardner and Susanna Taber of Dartmouth June 13, 1784, July 7, 1784 wherein Gardner and Susanna Taber of Dartmouth for f 156 sell to Wm. Davis, land in Dartmouth land they formerly bought of Constant Sisson.

#### Re - Revolutionary Service

Jonathans 4-6 seldom appear in the R. I. files though close to the boundary line. They are normally in census and soldier returns credited to Massachusetts. In Mass. Soldiers and Sailors XV appear these two items: Tabor Johathan (p. 347) Capt. 15th Co., Col. John Hatherway's (2nd Bristol Co.) reg't of Mass. Militia; list of officers; commissioned Aug 10, 1779: Tabor Esek, 1st Lieutenant, Capt. Jonathan's Tabor's (15th Co.) Col. Hathaway's (2nd Bristol Co.) reg't of Mass. Militia; list of Officers; commissioned Aug. 10, 1779. On page 346 we have "Taber, Jonathan Capt. John Hathaway's (2nd Bristol Co.) regt; entered service Aug. 1, 1780; discharged Aug. 7, 1780; service 7 days on an alarm of Rhode Island. Roll sworn to at Dartmouth". the same for "Esek Taber Lieutenant". Is it Jonathan and his son Esek or it could be Jonathan brother of Esek Sons Peleg and Benjamin were also in the service.

In the R. I. Archives - Maritime Papers - we have Jonathan Taber item 66, 67, 68, 72, 85, 91 Sloop Diamond, Joseph Taber 85, Sloop Diamond: Peleg Taber 33 Sloop Diamond, 67 Sloop Diamond, 85, 95, 96, 90" The last a charge to State of Rhode Island for storage of the "sloop Diamond."

A series of deeds are pertinent at this juncture: On Mar. 25, 1794 (BCD 74:252) Esek Taber of Westport yeoman buys 6 acres from Ephraim and Martha Wilcox. On May 13, 1796 (BCD 75:134) Abraham Gifford administrator of estate of "Jonathan Taber late of Westport dec'd cooper". "Sells to sum \$500 to pay debts," sells to Esek Taber of Westport yeoman "all right of property of Jonathan Taber 12 acres in Westport southerly on Edmund Mosher and George Woods westerly on Esek Taber and Daniel Devol, northerly partly on Daniel Devol and part by a pond and easterly on land set off to Elizabeth Taber widow of Jonathan as her dower." On same page (74:134) Esek Taber of Westport for £ 230 paid by Thos. Briggs of Westport sells 22 acres land west of my homestead farm." Esek Taber, Robe Taber - "land he bought of A Gifford adm. of my father Jonathan's estate." The following deed (74:135) the administrator of Jonathan's estate conveys to Esek Taber to "satisfy widow Robey Taber of Jonathan and wid. Elizabeth of Jonathan Jr."

In 1742, Dec. 5 (BCD 32:5) Benjamin Wait of Dartmouth for # 277 paid by Josiah Taber of Tiverton yeoman sells land in Little Compton, part of land of John and Rebecca Willcocks. Witnesses Meribah Devol, Philip Taber.

On Feb. 8, 1743 (BCD 32:269) Samuel Snell of Tiverton yeoman for f 370 paid by Josiah Taber of Tiverton land in Tiverton, 70 acres near Susanna Cory and others. John Taber, Philip Taber, witnesses.

In Taunton (BCD 31:219) we find that in 1742/3 Josiah of Tiverton for f 310 paid by Richard Hart Jr of Little Compton sells land in Little Compton 3/9? part set off to Rebecca Wilcox, her dowry from her husband John Wilcox.

In 1743, Feb. 23 C 32: 331, 32:325 etc.) when Susanna Cory executed Deeds to her sons, Josiah Taber is witness.

In 1744/45 Josiah Taber of New London gives "power of attorney" to Philip Taber of Dartmouth, waives everything coming to him. (BCD 34:411) Three years later 1748, (BCD 84:376) "Josiah Taber of New London for f paid by Wm. Sanford of Tiverton sells land.

In 1750/51 Hempstead (see Diary) went --- to measure 23 acres for Josiah Taber near Black Point . On April 1, 1751/52 Hempstead writes "I was att home most of the Day writing for Josiah Taber Credentials to Enable him to Request the Charity of Well Disposed people toward him to help make up ye Loss he sustained in Feb. last by fire consuming his fulling mill house etc."

On Sept 1, 1752 Hempstead (p. 594) was out to Josiah Tabers of Lyme for Evidence between Justice Raymond and Thomas Manwaring". On May 24, 1753 "I was out to Nihantick with Wm. Manwaring and Simon Smith Dividing Mr. Taber's land and Lodged at Josiah Tabers and was all next day measuring and Dividing and came home". On May 25, 1752 "he sd Taber pd. me for 5 days f 8 and f 7 10 s ye others each." Again on Jan 7, 1754 he lodged at Josiah Tabers. Besides Caulkins and Hempstead another reference is Mrs. E. M. Roger's Papers. Conn. Hist. Soc. Hartford, Conn.

On June 8, 1784 (BCD 62:401) occurs division of John<sup>5</sup>'s property between his mother and sister. It reads "Mary Taber widow of John Taber deceased of Dartmouth, she and Paul Brownell and wife Meribah interest equally in John Taber son and heir of John, and Meribah sister of John". John was half brother of Meribah.

In 1789 Dec. 16 (72:245) Mary Tabor of Westport widow for \$10 from John Wood of Westport sells land in Westport.

(See also BCD 30:240) Eleven years after his death (1791) Joseph Taber his brother of Tiverton for \$500 paid by Abner Taber of Newport "Taylor" sells land in Westport, part of land grant to Abner by last will of my "brother Philip Tabor late of Newport deceased (BCD 70:31).

In 1780 his will made May 4 is probated 2 Aug. 1780, He leaves to daughter Deborah Taber; to daughter Sarah Davis - her son Philip Davis, if Philip dies before his mother than to her male heirs excepting her son Aaron, or if no other males then to the female heirs; to grandsons - sons of Deborah, Abner and Reuben; to grand-daughters Elizabeth Davis, Susannah Davis, Mary Davis. Brother Joseph of Tiverton executor.

Who is the William Taber of Scituate, R. I. "50-60" able in the 1777 census? This Wm.4 (John<sup>3</sup>) would have been 66 yrs.

In the 1760 Tax List of Tiverton appears, "Thomas Taber son of Susannah."

In 1766 Pardon Taber (Tiv. D. 1:411) sells to Thomas Tabor of Tiverton weaver 18 acres; and in Tiverton D. 1:420 he conveys to Benj. Marl of Tiverton "land where Thomas Tabor son of Susannah Cory now liveth."

In census of 1777 appears a "Thomas Taber Tiv. 60 up". Census 1782 R. I. Tiverton 17 16-, 1750+ 1916-, 1922-50, 1950+ Census 1790 R.I. Tiverton 1716+ 1916- Census 1800 R.I. Tiverton Comfort d. May 1794, Thomas 25 Nov. 1795 but sons George and Moses are in Tiverton.

At the organization of the First Baptist Church Long Plain by Elder Daniel Hix in 1787 Thomas and Comfort members.

Thomas Taber's will (Tiv. P. 5:247) made 14 Nov. 1794 executed 2 Dec. 1795 gives a sum of money to sons George and Moses and grandson Gilbert son to son Giles deceased. Moses and Gilbert are to pay all debts. Constant Hart sole executor. Witnesses Wm. Hicks (Juner) Mary Simms, Moses Simms.

Four of the five items in Mass. soldiers and Sailors concern Dartmouth and R.I. operations and John and John may well have been one or two of these men. How can John Jr. be son of Paul? In early deeds Jr. implies son of man of same name.

The first mention of Joseph comes in the family deed of 1742/3 recorded Apr. 1744(BCD 32:332) wherein Joseph weaver appears as one of the children of John the blacksmith, dec'd. Inasmuch as the early Manchesters held considerable land around the Scituate region, it is interesting to discover an ear-mark in Exeter, Jan. 6, 1747/8 for "Joseph Taber (son of John Taber of Dartmouth deceased)". Ten years later, a Thomas Taber likely a brother has an ear-mark also recorded in Exeter, June 13, 1758 (Hist, Sketch of Baptist Church of Exeter R I. Rhode Id. Hist. Soc.)

We have noted at least 13 or 14 transactions in the Tiv. Deeds On Oct. 13, 1746 9I:46) Nicholas Mosher sells Joseph Taber of Tiverton, 6 acres on the boundaries of Joseph Taber, a William Taber being a witness. On Feb. 24, 1747/48 (L:283) "Joseph Taber of Tiverton, yeoman and son to John Taber of Dartmouth dec'd". sells land in Tiverton to Wm. Sanford. In 1750/51 (I:86) he Joseph of Tiverton "weaver" for  $\cancel{\xi}$  70 sells to Peleg Simmons. Feb. 26, 1750/51 (I:87) Peleg Simmons of Tiverton yeoman for ₹ 70 sells to Joseph Taber weaver 17 acres 14 rods in Tiverton, part of Lot 10 in six score acre lots Puncatest and Dartmouth. On June 1, 1755, Joseph Taber of Tiverton, yeoman, for ★ 60 sells to George Borden of Tiv. yeoman land near head Puncatest outlet and Dartmouth line (Tiv. 2nd Book No. 1 B 1:46) On Jan. 24, 1757 he, Joseph, yeoman, sells to William Sanford of Tiv. house carpenter 3 acres - boundaries: My homestead farm, Wm. Sandford, Pardon Taber (Tiv. 2nd B:51) In Apr. 21, 1761, Josiah Wilcox of Tiv. for Comfort Manchester sells for 150 paid by Joseph Taber of Tiv. weaver and son to Susahnah Cory, homestead farm on which Joseph Taber lives.

June 14, 1766 Joseph Taber yeoman for £15 sells to John Taber of Tiv. blacksmith (I:420) On Apr. 9, 1768, Pardon Taber of New London sells 3 acres in Tiv. and Dartmouth to Joseph Taber of Tiv. yeoman and son of Susannah. Boundaries Wm. Sanford, Thomas Taber's homestead, Thos. Durfee, Peter Davel.

In 1780 Philip Taber names brother Joseph Taber of Tiv. in his will, making him executor, 1783-1789 (BCD 68:302) or to 1791, Joseph the weaver served as guardian to Philip's grandsons Abner and Reuben Taber. A specimen deed might be (BCD 70:31) 1791 "Joseph Taber of Tiverton for \$500 paid by Abner Tabor of Newport tailor land to Abner from my late brother Philip Tabor of Newport, land partly in Newport and partly Little Compton. Witnesses Lemuel Taber, Reuben Taber, the latter Abner's brother.

Earl Tabor became guardian of Abner Oct. 1783. See Abner 6 and Reuben of Deborah Philip for more lengthy discussion.
