



PREFACE

Perhaps there is no name of which so little was known respecting their past history as the Thorns. There are two persons at present tracing pedigrees with a view of publishing a complete genealogy of the Thorns from 1638 down, the number of which run up into the thousands. The few that are herein recorded number a total of two hundred, of which there are sixty-five that show no record of their ages or their descendants, no effort being made to obtain them, and it is doubtful if they could be obtained if an effort were made.

Of the balance, 135, there were—

- 40 that died before maturity
- 4 between 20 and 30 years of age
- 2 between 30 and 40 years of age
- 4 between 40 and 50 years of age
- 13 between 50 and 60 years of age
- 18 between 60 and 70 years of age
- 26 between 70 and 80 years of age
 - 7 between 80 and 90 years of age
 - 1 between 90 and 100 years of age
- 10 females now living
- 10 males now living

Total, 135

In the total of 200 names there were—

- 13 by name of John
- 10 by name of William
 - 7 by name of Joseph
 - 7 by name of Thomas
 - 5 by name of George

The issue from Isaac Thorn 1st and his descendants shows 25 females and 17 males. Of this total of 42 there were—

- 11 died before maturity
 - 2 between 20 and 30 years of age
 - 1 between 30 and 40 years of age
 - 2 between 40 and 50 years of age
 - 1 between 50 and 60 years of age
 - 5 between 60 and 70 years of age
- 10 between 70 and 80 years of age
- 2 between 80 and 90 years of age
- 4 males living
- 4 females living

Of these four males now living only from 2 can the name of Thorn be perpetuated. These statistics tend to show that the Thorns of this latter branch are decreasing rather than multiplying.

INTRODUCTORY NOTE

The records of families constitute the framework of history. We cannot estimate their importance too highly. They are invaluable auxiliaries to science, religion, and especially to civilization itself. They exert a potent influence in the uniting of peoples in the alliance of a common patriotism. Thus they help to assure liberty and to perpetuate institutions for its development and proper upholding. The writer of annals is a public benefactor, and the chronicler of genealogies is no less deserving. He confers a priceless boon upon those whose names and achievements are thus rescued from oblivion, and preserves the experience and wisdom of ages for the emulation and admonition of posterity. He merits the more for his labors, in that they are rendered without the hope of appreciation or the stimulus which prompts literary efforts in other fields.

The desire to know the names and history of those who have preceded us is inborn in the human constitution. The historian, Gibbon, remarking its universal prevalence, asserted that "it must depend on the influence of some common principle in the minds of men." It is a sentiment cherished by the noblest. It is one of the most hopeful and gratifying indications of the present time that our best and most useful citizens are becoming more desirous, from year to year, to learn the names and record of their ancestors. Books of genealogy have become an important element of literature. They are sought for in public libraries and are esteemed as among the most valuable sources of historical information. The service which they often render in legal and political inquiries cannot be estimated too highly.

This work has no claim for being anything more than a family record. It is left for others to compile a complete genealogy of the descendants of William Thorn from 1638 down, scattered as they are far and wide apart to the number of several thousands. A task fraught with time, labor and abundance of patience.

May a like degree of interest be found by survivors of the different branches herein recorded to whom this work may reach as was felt and enjoyed by

HISTORICAL SKETCHES

In the year 1638 the ship Confidence sailed from Southampton with emigrants for Massachusetts Bay. Doubtless, William Thorn was one of the list of passengers. He came from Dorsetshire, England, and was made a freeman at Lynn, Mass., May 2, 1638, and in the same year had thirty and ten acres of land apportioned him there. In 1640 he was in Flushing, L. I., the original patent of that town being granted by the Dutch Governor, the Hon. William Kieft, to him and seventeen others, October 17, 1645. In 1646 he was granted a plantation lot in Gravesend, L. I. His wife's name was Sarah.

JOHN THORN, son of William Thorn, married Mary Parcell May 9, 1664. He was made "freeman of Connecticut if he will have it" on May 12, 1664, having probably just come to manhood. His will is dated July 23, 1709, and recorded the same year, leaving housings, lands, meadows, goods and chattels to his wife and children, whom he names in the will.

JOHN THORN 2d, son of John, and his wife Catherine were named in the census of Flushing, L. I., in 1698. He bought 181 acres of land near Crosswicks, N. J., August 26, 1717. By the township records in 1710 he was a township officer and held various offices until his death. He was called "Carpenter John," being both carpenter and farmer. His will is dated February 16, 1735, and was proved June 14, 1737.

JOSEPH THORN, son of John 2d, succeeded his father in the occupancy of lands at or near the town of Crosswicks, N. J. In addition to farming he was also a weaver of cloth and clothing material. He held various public offices in the township from 1727 to 1753. His

latter years were during the period of the revolutionary war. It has been handed down orally that in defending his home and family from invasion by wandering Hessians that infested the country he received cuts and sword wounds the scars of which he carried to the grave. He was a faithful and consistent member of the Society of Friends (Quakers), who believed not in war, but rather in perfect friendship and good will. He was born in 1701 and died in 1774, aged 73 years, beloved by his fellow men for his integrity and upright life.

JOHN THORN 4th, son of Joseph, continued to occupy and increase the land holdings left by his father, and occupied the homestead situate at the junction of the Crosswicks, Bordentown and Recklesstown roads. He there reared a family of seven sons, five of whom lived to perpetuate the name. He was a man who believed firmly in, and followed strictly, the principles of right and justice, as instilled by his ancestors. He was blessed with remarkably good health and strength throughout his life, and died August 22, 1807, at the age of 77 years.

ISAAC THORN, son of John Thorn 4th, was a successful farmer on a large scale. In addition to the lands formerly owned by his father he added thereto large tracts adjoining the old homestead and tilled the same with successful results. During the war of 1812 he kept teams steadily employed freighting merchandise and army supplies between Philadelphia and New York. Those were the days before the advent of canals and railroads, and when freight and passengers were conveyed by the slow process of teams and stage coaches. He was a man of strong power of will, firm in the right, with judgment unimpeachable; a close adherent to the views and principles of the Friends' Society, of which he was an ardent member. He retired from active pursuits at an advanced age, and died at the home of his son Anthony in 1837, aged 78 years.

ISAAC THORN 2d, son of Isaac Thorn, son of John Thorn 4th. He succeeded his father in the extensive farming operations then carried on, in addition to which he erected a pottery for the manufacture of earthenware. The business expanded to such an extent that his wares were well known and sought for throughout the state. He was a man

of sterling character and principle, as might have been expected from an unbroken line of pious ancestry who had instilled into their children from generation to generation the highest ideals of an upright life. He maintained through life sterling integrity, was resourceful, broad-minded and inventive, ever seeking and studying how to improve upon old-time methods and usages. Like his father, he carried the principles of his religious beliefs into his daily acts. At one time a candidate for Governor of his native state (New Jersey), though defeated at the polls, he stood high in the community in which he lived, was looked up to as a good adviser, and maintained the highest respect of his fellow men. He died July 16, 1841, at the camparatively young age of 55, leaving four sons and three daughters.

ANTHONY THORN, son of Isaac Thorn, son of John Thorn 4th. Was born in Pennsylvania, where his parents resided for a brief period. In his early life, up to maturity, he was the dependable son of his father for hard work, and conducted the freighting outfits of his father during the war of 1812, carrying freight and passengers across the state between Philadelphia and New York. He knew farming better than any other occupation, and followed it upon one farm for over half a century. His farm was a part of the vast tract of land belonging to the estate of the late Joseph Bonaparte, ex-king of Spain, and from whom he purchased it. He was a genial friend of the ex-king during the period that he resided in New Jersey. He was a plain, unassuming man, devoted to his home and family, took no active part in public or political matters and never sought office of any kind. He lived a life of strict attention to his farm and paid for it in a short time from the products of the soil, and at a ripe old age retired with a competency. Vigorous, hale and hearty, he lived to see the close of his 86th year. He died December 20, 1877.

THOMAS THORN, son of Joseph, was born and lived continuously on his farm near Crosswicks. N. J. A man of sterling character, closely devoted to his farming pursuits and adherence to the beliefs and following of the Society of Friends, to which he was by birthright closely affiliated and to which he gave earnest attention up to the time of his demise in 1801, aged 68 years.

GEORGE THORN, son of Thomas, was a type of his father in nature, disposition and life pursuits. He was a well-to-do farmer, continuing life's work with honor and advancement from where his father left off. He led a quiet, unassuming life and died in 1843, aged 76 years.

EDWARD THORN, son of George, son of Thomas, was noted for his strict methodical habits in the conduct and management of the farm bequeathed to him by his father. A man of firmness, integrity, and close attachment to the faith of the orthodox religious Society of Friends, of which he was a consistent and prominent member. Though quiet and reserved in general deportment, he commanded the highest respect, confidence and trust of the community in which he lived during his entire life. Retiring from his farm to the restful quiet of village life, he lived to the age of 74. He died in March, 1880.

BARTON F. THORN, son of Edward, son of George, succeeded his father in the management of the fine farm which his father had improved to a condition of nicety and modern repair by his neat tastes and methodical management. Handed down, as it was, through three generations, he lived the major part of his life thereon. In his younger days he took some part in political matters, serving one term as a member of the New Jersey State Senate. He retired from farm life and resided at Crosswicks, N. J., for several years previous to his death, which occurred May 9, 1904.

LANGHORN BILES THORN, son of Joseph Thorn 5th, son of Thomas Thorn. In his early life his mechanical turn of mind led him to the occupation of carpenter and builder. When Joseph Bonaparte, ex-king of Spain, brother of Napoleon I., came to this country and acquired large tracts of land near Bordentown, N. J., and erected a commodious mansion thereon, the carpenter and builder found himself at the head of a permanent occupation. So well did he fulfill the desires and meet the tastes of the ex-king that he became a permanent fixture at the great mansion in the care of it and the extensive park of several hundred acres. When the Bonapartes came into power again in France, ex-King Joseph and his retinue returned to Paris and the extensive estate

was left in charge of Langhorn, who for a number of years lived with his family in a portion of the mansion and until his death, which occurred in 1843, at the age of 55 years. He was a man of gentle mien, kindly nature and tender sympathies, regarding his home life and its associations as far superior to anything else. It was his good fortune to marry a sweet and amiable woman in the person of Mary S. Warren. The sweet influence of her counsel, her gentle, forbearing nature and broad views, blending with his own placid nature, brought to them the rhythm of harmonious life. Of their children, three daughters and one son survived them. To these daughters were given the same sweet characteristics that adorned their parents. Two of them were happily married and lived to an advanced age. The son, Adolph M., died in 1863 at the age of 31 years.





The following from a Philadelphia paper:


"Many prominent Philadelphians attended the funeral of Thomas Elwood Thorn, a widely known real estate dealer, which was held today from the home, 1615 North Nineteenth street. Mr. Thorn celebrated his ninety-first birth anniversary on August 11th, 1913, and until a short time before taken ill attended to the business incident to the large real estate holdings which he had acquired since coming here in the Centennial year.


"Mr. Thorn will be buried in Bordentown, N. J. It was in this quaint New Jersey town that he was born and spent his youth and early manhood on the large estate there where Joseph Bonaparte, a brother of the Emperor Napoleon I., lived several years of his exile.

"Mr. Thorn often recalled that it must have been a pleasant exile, as there was slight indication that the expatriated king of Spain was in any fear of his life. Numerous underground tunnels can still be seen in the mammoth park, which at the time of Mr. Thorn's youth were cleverly concealed by handsome and rare plants and flowers imported from France and other foreign countries.

"Mr. Thorn was in possession of his faculties up to the time of his fatal illness, and displayed that remarkable business acumen which made him a notable figure in the real estate world of Philadelphia during the past quarter of a century. The years dealt lightly with him and he retained a hold on current topics which his increasing years failed to lessen.

"He is survived by a son and two daughters."
