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# INTRODUCTORY NOTE.





The pedigree of "Tomes of Marston Sicca" was made out in 1860 by Sir Thomas Phillipps from papers placed at his disposal by Fisher Tomes, and privately printed by S ir Thomas, with the note appended, "T. P. 1860 (To be rerified)." It has since been corrected and extended from public records, and from papers in the prosession of members of the family not accessible to Sir Thos. Phillipps in 1860; still the maiden names of Amy, and of Anne the wife of Thomas, require co. ufirmation, and the parentage of the wife of Christopher is quite unknown.





### NOTES TO THE PEDIGREE OF TOMES.

The family of Tomes or Tombes has been located in or near the eastern part of the county of Gloucester from an early date, as will be seen by the following scattered notices of the name.

In the Subsidy Roll of Edward III., 1327-8, there is mention of a John Thommes and a Walter Thommes living at Stoke, a John Thommes at Aston Somerville, a William Thommen at Clopton, a Peter Thommen at Pebworth, and a Richard Thommen at Ullington, a hamlet in the parish of Pebworth. All these places are in the eastern extremity of the county of Gloucester, and in the Hundred of Kiftsgate.

Again, in the Subsidy of the 15th of Edward III., 1341-2, the following names appear—Robert Tommes living at Slaughter, John Thommes at Turksdeane, and Robert Tommes at Swell,—all parishes on or amongst the Gloucestershire Hills, and in the eastern part of the county.


In the following century scattered notices occur of individuals of the name at various localities not far distant, but who, like the foregoing persons, have not hitherto been identified as members of the Long Marston family. A William Thommes was Rector of Whichford, near Moreton in Marsh, in 1414, and in an official catalogue of the gentry of the adjoining county of Oxford in the reign of Hen. VI., 1422-60, the name of William Tommys appears.

At Whitchurch in the county of Warwick, but scarcely more than a mile from the borders of Gloucestershire, a William Thommes was Rector in June, 1462. Another William Tommes, alias Thommys, was in 1460 Rector of Binton in the co. of Warwick, but divided only by the river Avon from the co. Glouc., and not three miles from Marston Sicca.

Early in the sixteenth century (1504) there was a Nicholas Tommys Rector of Arrow, near Alcester, and a William Tomys resigned the Vicarage of Stow-on-the-Wold in favour of William Wylles in 1532.

Some of the foregoing persons were most likely directly connected with the Long Marston family. But the earliest direct connection of the family of Tomes with Marston Sicca which has yet been ascertained from research amongst the public records may be seen in the Subsidy Roll of the 2nd or 4th year of the reign of Richard II., 1378-80, the entries being as follows:—



INDENTURE between John, Abbot of the Monastry of Wynchecombe and the Convent of the same name on the one part, and William Tommys, Margaret his wife, Robert and Geoffrey their sons, on the other part. Lease to the said William, Margaret, Robert, and Geoffrey, and to the eldest son, or Robert, or Geoffrey, of the site of the Abbey, Manor of Merston, with its houses, demesnes, lands, pastures, and meadows, during their natural lives in survivorship, at the yearly rent of £8, and 13s. 4d. for tithes, with power to distrain. The lessees to repair and maintain. When the steward or cellarer shall come there to hold Court or to collect rent, they shall have lodging there, with meat and drink for their men and horses, at the expense of the lessees. The said William, or who ever of them shall be tenant, shall have one coat (togam) at the Abbot's pleasure.

Dated at Wynchecombe, in the Chapter House, 29th September, 18th year of Edward IV. (1479). From the Latin original.



Thomas Tomys of Marston Sicca, by will dated Dec. 12, 1537, leaves his effects to his wife Margaret Tomys, who is named his executrix.

# APPENDIX.

In early times the letters h and y, one or both with a second m, were commonly used in writing the name, and legal draughtsmen often varied the spelling in different parts of the same document. Aimy in her signatures to legal papers spelt the name in four different ways: Toms, 1654; Tombs, 1658; Tombes, 1660; Tomes, 1663; and her son Thomas varied his signatures both in the spelling and in the formation of the initial letters.

The use of the y was discontinued after the sixteenth century, and the introduction of the b took place about the time of the Commonwealth. The change might possibly have been adopted with the hope of evading threatened persecution as known royalists. Thomas, who died 1694, was the last to use the letter b. But notwithstanding the uninterrupted use by seven generations of the name spelt Tomes, strangers, even to the present day, in addressing letters to members of the family, occasionally insert in the name the long abandoned b, and now and then the h, or a second m.

Members of the Marston family of Tomes were from a very early period copyholders under the Monastery of Winchecombe down to the time when the Marston property was seized by the Crown; and they then held under the Crown until the ownership passed into other hands. In 1566, the manor and lands, lately the property of the Monastery, were granted by Elizabeth to Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester (patent, 8 Eliz. p. 7 m.), from whom the freehold of certain lands, houses, etc., was purchased by John Kecke and John Toms of Marston Sicca, yeomen, for the sum of £1180 and 58s. 4d. Indenture dated 8 Feb. 1577-8. Close Roll, 20 Eliz. p. 9.

In 1567, land with appurtenances were conceded and given by John Tamworth, Thomas Blunt, and John Dudley, Esquires, to Alice Holtam, with remainder to her son John Toms, his heirs, etc. See Inquisition, held 1625.

Old deeds, recording purchases and sales of land, are in the possession of the family, and also papers shewing that an estate with a residence at Marston has been held without a break or change of name by members of the family, having passed from father to son, or in default of a son, to a brother, or nephew, or in the last

case to a daughter, from the fifteenth century to the present time.

The family house, known in the district as King Charles's House, and as such much visited by strangers, had till very lately all the characteristics of a sixteenth century domestic residence. Old villagers talked of portions having been long since pulled down, and the presence of foundations continuous with the walls of the existing building, together with non-existing rooms mentioned in old inventories of effects, clearly shew that the house in times past covered a larger area than it does at the present time. But the ancient characters of the remaining parts were not materially injured by the removal of the lost portions. In a deed dated Sept. 22nd, 1596, Thos. Green agrees to pay in 1600 the sum of £100 to John Tommes "at the now Mansion house of John Tommes in Merston."

In 1820, the then John Tomes of Marston, who at no time had taken any interest in the preservation of the ancestral home, who had indeed by preference resided in a new house built by himself within a hundred yards of the old one, on gaining the Littleton property, by the death of his uncle Thomas Bennett, removed to a residence built by his deceased relative on the latter property; and the Marston old house, after an uninterrupted occupation of centuries, ceased to be the family residence of the Tomes's. For it was shortly afterwards given over to the tenant of the farm, who used it partly as a cellar and partly as a granary, or allowed it to be occupied by a farm labourer. Forsaken and neglected with the lapse of years, the picturesque old grey roof of Snowshill slate fell into disorder. To carry the heavy colitic slates, the roof-tree or ridge-piece was formed out of several trees, as straight as could be found, no doubt, but still somewhat crooked, and wrought by the axe only; and the rafters were of like character. As a constructive result, the ridge, though strong and enduring, was far from straight, and the slopes of the roof far from level. Holes and displaced slates, consequent upon the decay of the more perishable laths associated with the irregular form of the roof, gave the appearance of great dilapidation. About three years since the builder was called in, and with the usual result. The characteristic old grey stone roof with its waved lines was demolished, and a trim deal one, covered with Staffordshire tiles, substituted. The south side of the house was broken into by a new entrance door, and the interior divided into two parts; the one converted into a superior cottage; the other, consisting of the hall, in which still remains the jack reputed to have been wound up by the King at the bidding of the cook when spending the night there on his journey to the coast, disguised as the personal attendant of Jane Lane. This and the room over it are retained for the use of the occupant of the farm; the hall, as heretofore, as a cellar; the upper chamber as a store-room for farm produce.

The ground the house covers, the walls, the chimney-stacks, and some of the stone-mullioned windows, remain; all else is altered. The restoration in this, as in most other cases entrusted to a builder, amounts to a destruction of the uncient character and, in great part, of the historical interest of the "mansion bonse of




