DESCENDANTS OF EDWARD TRE(A)DWELL THROUGH HIS SON JOHN

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The genealogy of all the Tre(a)dwells in America was begun more than twenty years ago by Mrs. Elizabeth Ellen (Schnebly) Treadwell, widow of the late Major George Hooker Treadwell of Albany, New York, who devoted several years to tireless search for Tre(a)dwell data, wherever the name could be found, until failing health compelled her to relinquish the work. Thereupon, the mass of material, including a great number of letters, which she had collected, was turned over to the present compiler for the purpose of continuing the work, in hopes that, when completed, sufficient interest would be found to have the family history printed in book form. The result is now published in this magazine to arouse, if possible, such an interest.

With the exception of one or two instances, the material thus received relating to the Long Island branch was carefully verified by the compiler from the original sources, wherever the same had been obtained from public records. Much other data has since been added. The author's work, however, has been confined almost entirely to the examination of public and church records, cemetery inscriptions, and entries in old Bibles, and practically no attention has been paid to the field of correspondence, which had been well

covered by Mrs. Treadwell.

Acknowledgments are also due to Professor George A. Treadwell of the City of New York, and to Mr. Smith R. Treadwell, now of Boston, Mass., for

much material assistance.

This genealogy will be found incomplete, particularly as to late generations. But the lines of descent given are believed to be absolutely correct. Doubtless there are some inaccuracies in the dates, but that is unavoidable in any extended work of this character. However, these are few, and all doubts of every nature are indicated. In order to make this genealogy as perfect and complete as possible, it is hoped that every error that may be discovered and everything of interest that can be added, will be made known to the author.

Edward' Tre(a) dwell died probably in the town of Huntington, Suffolk County, New York, between 12th May, 1660, and 28th January, 1660-1; married Sarah —. She married, secondly, probably before 1st May, 1661, Henry Whelpley, who, at one time, resided in Stratford, Connecticut, and died before 6th June, 1662. She married, thirdly, after 6th June, 1662, Ralph Keeler of Norwalk, Connecticut, who was born about 1613, and died between 20th August, and 10th September, 1672. She then married, fourthly, Thomas Skidmore of Fairfield, Connecticut, who died between 20th April, and 13th November, 1684. His widow, Sarah, died 14 days after his death.* Edward' Tre(a) dwell resided in Ipswich, Massachusetts; Branford, Connecticut; Hashamommuck and Huntington, Suffolk County, New York. His occupation is unknown. Nor has it been discovered where he or his wife was buried.

The antecedents of Edward' Tre(a)dwell and wife, as well as their history previous to the year 1637, remain unknown. But,

by reason of the Bacheller connection of Thomas Treadwell (see "Thomas Treadwell of Ipswich, Mass., and Some of His Descendants," published by the author in volume 60 of the New England Historical and Genealogical Register) it is believed that the early Tre(a) dwell settlers came from some place near, if not

in, the county of Kent, England.

Edward' Tre(a)dwell's name first appears in this country upon the town records of Ipswich, Massachusetts, under date the 5th of February, 1637, when he was granted "six acres for planting."* A subsequent entry therein of the 20th of August, 1638, shows that he was then the owner of a "house lott" in that town, on "the lower syde of the High Street," the easterly side adjoining Richard Jacob's lot.† Although he had other real estate in Ipswich, no record of any conveyance by him of his property there has been discovered. (See note 1.)

The last time his name is mentioned on these records is under

date the 11th of March, 1639. (See note 2.)

He is supposed to have left Massachusetts about that time and moved to Connecticut, where an Edward Tredwell appears as a witness in a law suit brought in the Colony of New Haven, the record of which bears date the 2nd of February, 1646. (See note 3.) Undoubtedly this refers to the Ipswich settler, but nothing positive has yet been found to make the identity complete.

According to a record of a town meeting at Branford, Connecticut, held on the 16th of September, 1646, Edward' Tredwell is one of thirty-four persons mentioned in regard to a general

fence to be built around the town.

In the meeting of the 8th of November, 1646, in the same town he united with thirty-two others in voting for the imposition of a fine for people who did not attend town meetings, and for a reward for the killing of wolves.\$

The last time his name appears on these records relates to a meeting held on the 4th day of April, 1648, when he and twenty-

eight others voted for an allotment of land.

The author has not examined these records himself, nor do the extracts therefrom in his possession disclose where the land to be taken up lay, or even that Edward' Tredwell actually

took up any pursuant to these orders.

He is next found dwelling upon a neck of land called Hashamommuck in the town of Southold, Long Island, which was then in the jurisdiction of the Colony of New Haven. The records of the latter town contain a copy of a deed of conveyance of land at the place mentioned, dated the 8th of October, 1649, and in which he is named as one of the grantees. (See note 4.)

Hashamommuck lies just east of Southold, Mill Creek separ-

ating the two places.

In the transfer of his interest in this property, it is seen that he signed by making his mark, thus showing that he was unable to write his name.

The Southold records make it clear that Edward Tredwell lived at Hashamommuck at one time, but how long, it cannot

be determined. (See note 5.)

Next, in 1660, we find him a resident of the town of Huntington, Long Island (then under the jurisdiction of the Hartford Colony), which is made apparent by the record of his appointment as one of the appraisers of the estate of Edward Higbee, deceased. (See note 6.)

Probably it was here that the Tredwell, Highee and Skidmore families first met as neighbors, and thus arose the interest which

soon developed into relationship through marriages.

Edward' Tredwell was residing in Huntington at the time of his death. This occurred sometime between the date of his appointment as appraiser just mentioned and the date of the deed to his widow of land in the town of Hempstead, Long Island, set forth later.

No record has been found showing whether he died intestate or leaving a will; but, fortunately, upon the Huntington records has been preserved the following memoranda in relation to his estate:

"(1661, Jan. 30.)

The 30th of January, 1661.

An Inventory of the goods & estate of Edward Tredwell late of Huntington Deceased; given in by his Wife beeing upon Oath; And valewed by ffoure Men Chosen, and appointed by Authority, (viz) William Smith, Thomas Weekes, John Conklin, & John Titus, The vallew where of amounteth to two hundred eighty five pounds, (sterling)

The Widow having a third part thereof, commeth to Ninety five pounds, And the six Children having the rest divided among them, each Childs portion cometh to thirty one pound, thirteen shillings foure pence his oldest Sonne having had som thing given

him by his ffather in his life tiem,

Doth in this estate but share equally with ye rest of the Children."

(Court Rec. p. 50.)*

The foregoing is valuable because, besides mentioning a widow, it is the only record known of the number of his children. Unfortunately, their names do not appear. From other sources, however, it is possible to determine three of these. Evidently at least two of the children were sons, and it is quite certain that some of them were then minors. The three unknown children probably died young without marrying, or, what is less likely, were daughters who married, and trace of them was thus lost.

The maiden name of Edward' Tredwell's widow remains unknown, but the following deed of conveyance found on the

town records of Hempstead,* New York, shows that her given name was Sarah.

"January the 28th. 1660. This writing witneseth that I thomas Hicks of Hempstead Juner have bargined with and sold unto Sarah Treadwell of Huntington late wife of Edward Treadwell decesed my hous barne & orchard home Lot with all the priviledges belonging there unto (viz) all meadowing hollows plain Lands and wood Land with fowre ox gats in the east oxe pasture with sd hous barne orchard home Lote and meadowing hollows & upland weare late William Smiths of Hempstead afore sd with all the rights Priviledges accomodations and appurtinances there unto belonging whether given to the said William Smith by the sd Town of Hempstead or other wise Purchesed with his money, and also what privileges ye sd William Smith had in the north neck for gats for Young Cattle also twelve gats for pastrege at Rockaway all which sd hous barn orchard home Lot meadowing and hollows Plaine & Wood lands with all privileges and appurtinanses thereunto belonging exsepting a small parsell of meadow or Lotment being upon the necke commonly colled Hixes neck I ye sd Thomas Hicks do here by engage my self to give full & free possession to ye sd Sarah Treadwell or her assigns at or before ye tenth day of march nex enseuing the date here of

The deed from Thomas Hicksto Sarah Tre(a) dwell was recorded twice in the Hempstead town books. Only the second record is given here, the difference between the two records seeming to be merely a matter of the orthography of a few words, and of the surname of one of the witnesses. This deed was probably rerecorded to have a true copy upon the town books, or, more likely, because the assignment of Henry Whelpley's interest had been endorsed upon the deed of conveyance to Sarah Tre(a) dwell and, in order to record this assignment, it was deemed advisable to copy the whole paper. This endorsement indicates that Sarah Tre(a) dwell had married Henry Whelpley before the date of the assignment. Such a marriage is made certain by the following, taken from the Hartford, Connecticut, probate records:

"Whelpsley, Henry. Invt. £280-10-03. Taken by Ephraim Wheeler, Michael Fry, Henry Rowland.

Court Record, page 173—6 June 1662: This Court orders unto the Relict of Henry Whelpsley the sum of ± 300 of ye estate of her former husband Treadwell, and what is wanting in that is to be made up out of Whelpsley's estate. Also ± 20 more as widow to Whelpsley, and this to be effected by Mr. Hill, Cornelius Hull, Michael Fry and Alexander Knowles. And the rest of Whelpsley's estate to be divided amongst his children according to the discretion of those men who are impowered to administer to ye Estate and to dispose of the children that are not under guardians."*

Henry Whelpley was a resident of Stratford, Connecticut, in 1645, soon after which date he moved to the adjoining town of Fairfield, where he was living at the time his death occurred.

Sarah (Tredwell) Whelpley's next marriage was to Ralph Keeler of Norwalk, Connecticut. This is given upon the authority of Savage,† Schenck's History of Fair field, Connecticut,‡ and the Rockwell and Keeler Genealogy.§

Ralph Keeler appears to have left a will dated the 20th of August, 1672, which was probated the same year in the probate court for the district of Fairfield, Connecticut, and starts out by

saying he is fifty-nine years of age. One-third of his property was thereby left to his wife, Sarah. The probate records for the Fairfield district have not been examined in person by the com-

piler of this genealogy.

Her next and final matrimonial venture was with Thomas Skidmore of Fairfield, Connecticut, as is made evident by the latter's will dated the 20th of April, 1684, in which he mentions his wife, Sarah, and grandchild, John Higbee, who married his wife's daughter, and designates Samuel Tredwell one of the executors.* The inventory of the estate of Thomas Skidmore is dated the 13th day of November, 1684, and the papers in connection therewith show that his widow survived him only fourteen days.

Whether Edward Tredwell's widow had any children through

her subsequent marriages is uncertain.

TREDWELL CHILDREN:

Although there can be little doubt that Sarah was the mother of all the six children left by Edward Tredwell, yet no record has been found to substantiate its assertion, except in the case of Rebecca. The actual order of birth of the children is unknown.

Likewise the said Willm Salmon doth give liberty unto the aforesaid parties to fence in for themselves a corne field begininge at the backside of the now dwellinge house of Thomas Benedick and to runn to the neerest cutt to the North Sea where they shall find most convenient web Peece of Land being so fenced in is to remaine theire owne proper land, to them theire heires & assignes for ever, with three parts of all his other Lands by what name or names Soever called (except before excepted) with warrantie against the said Willm Salmon his heires & assignes & only them, peaceably & quietly to enjoy the same without any molestacon or disturbance — the aforesaid Henry Whitney, Edward Tredwell & Thomas Benedick paying to William Salmon thirty pounds for the same.

Likewise the aforesaid Willm Salmon doth except so much liberty to himselfe that when hee shall see fit to fence in the meadowe, he my take in so much upland as that he may in some measure runn straight from meadowe to meadowe. Provided neverthelesse that when the other parties shall have occasion to carry or recarry any thing by sea they shall have the liberty of the waterside att any tyme: to all web premises the aforesaid Wm Salmon hath sett his hand & seale the 8th day of October 1649. Wm (his mark) Salmon

Sealed and delivered in the p'sence of John Corey Ann Corey

I Thomas Benidick doe assigne my wholl right in this deede to Thomas Rider.

SECOND GENERATION.

2. John² Tredwell (Edward¹), born before 7th December, 1644; died between 12th January, 1712, and 25th January, 1719-20; married, first, in Queens county, New York, upon a license issued 6th March, 1666, to Elizabeth Starr, of Hempstead, New York, died before 5th July, 1682, probably daughter of Thomas Starr of Charlestown, Massachusetts; married, secondly, before 5th July, 1682, Hannah Smith, living 3rd October, 1706, died probably before her husband, daughter of John (Rock) and Hannah (Murry) Smith of Hempstead, New York. John² Tredwell possibly resided in the town of Huntington, Suffolk county, removing early to the town of Hempstead, Queens county, New York, where he was living up to the time of his death.

He was prominent in the affairs of his county and town, having been returned once to the Colonial Assembly as a representative from Queens county, although not permitted to serve; for a period of years was a county justice, and sat, at least once, as one of the justices of the Court of Sessions at Jamaica, Long Island; was, probably, a justice of the peace for many years; was frequently commissioned to choose the county treasurer; and acted as a county assessor. He was elected to many local town offices, such as assessor, collector, constable, overseer, and surveyor of high-ways. Many times he was chosen as a trustee of his town to represent it in business transactions in New York City; also to audit the town's accounts; and to agree upon and defend the town's boundary lines. His business occupation is not disclosed, but he seems to have been extensively engaged in planting or farming. Upon the records he was called "Mr.," "Gentleman," and "Esquire." It is not known where he or his wives were buried.

The time John's Tredwell settled in Hempstead is uncertain, but it was as early as the 7th of December, 1665, when, as grantor, he described himself of that place in a deed of conveyance bearing that date. (See note 1.) Probably he had moved there even earlier, in 1662, as he was a witness with Jonas Houldsworth to an indenture of apprenticeship dated the 21st of August, 1662,

and made between Anna Wood, wife of John Wood, formerly of Rhode Island, and John Smith of Hempstead, Long Island.*

The preceding record is the earliest found relating to John's Tredwell. From this date on, his name appears frequently in various capacities in the early Hempstead town books. Only once is it to be found on the records of Huntington, and then as a witness with Simon Lanne to an agreement dated the 15th of June, 1665, and made between John Scott (of Setauket) and George Wood (of Newtown, Long Island,) settling differences arising out of an inability to carry out the terms of a lease.

He also acted as a witness to many other instruments at various times.

Since he must have been at least twenty-one years of age to have made a valid conveyance of real property, the time of his birth can be fixed as sometime prior to the 7th of December, 1644, which is twenty-one years before the date of his conveyance to Nathaniel Coles already mentioned. It was doubtless near that time, as he was probably around twenty years of age when he first married. The license for this marriage is dated the 6th of March, 1666, and the record of it is found at page 134 of a book now in the State Library at Albany, New York, marked "Orders, Warrants, and Letters, vol. ii."

No further mention has been found of this first wife, Elizabeth Starre, and nothing positive is known as to her parentage. The Starr genealogy, published in 1879, states that she may have been the daughter, Elizabeth, born to Dr. Thomas Starr of Charlestown, Massachusetts. (See note 2.) Although, at that period, it was most unusual for a person to be given a second or middle name, yet a grandson of John's Tredwell bore the name, Thomas Star Tredwell. This circumstance is significant and, together with the fact that John's Tredwell named one of his sons Thomas, naturally leads to the conclusion that the name of the father of Elizabeth (Starre) Tredwell was Thomas Starr(e). But which one was he? Dr. Thomas Starr of Charlestown, Massachusetts, died on the 26th day of October, 1658, and is said to have left a widow, Rachel, and a son, Josiah, of whom the latter is known to have settled in Hempstead, New York. On the records of this town the name of Starr occurs for the first time under date the 22nd of January, 1662, in an agreement "betwixt John Hickes of Hempstead . . . And Rachell Starre of Oysterbay before they enter or joyne in Marriage estate, about the settling of their Estates, and for the preventing of Differences betwixt the Children of the said John Hickes and Rachell Starres children, etc."§

Elizabeth (Starre) Tredwell must have died before the 5th of July, 1682, for, on this date, a Hannah Tredwell is found testifying with John' Tredwell in a lawsuit between Richard Valintin and Abraham Smith. (See note 3.)

This Hannah Tredwell was the daughter of John (Rock) Smith of Hempstead, New York. John Smith left a will dated the 10th of May, 1695, which was probated the 3rd of April, 1706, and recorded at page 306 of Liber 7 of Wills in the Surrogate's Office of New York county.* An inventory of his estate was exhibited in court by Hannah Tredwell the 3rd of October, 1706.† In this will he mentions his daughter Hannah, wife of John Tredwell, appointing her one of the executrices thereof. A John Tredwell was one of the witnesses. This testament shows that about the 24th of April, 1694, the testator had delivered some cows and other cattle into the hands of John Tredwell.

The Hempstead town books contain a record of a conveyance of certain meadow lands from John Smith to his son in law, John² Tredwell, on the 20th of February, 1688. (See note 4.)

Two other records of Hannah (Smith) Tredwell have been found. One is in the 1698 census of the town of Hempstead filed among the state papers at Albany, New York, In this list the names of the heads of families are given first. All the Tredwell names found therein are in the order which follows:

Mr John Tredwell
Mrs Hannah Tredwell
Thomas Tredwell
Hannah Tredwell
John Tredwell
Elizabeth Tredwell

Three other names of a different family follow here, and then are given

John Tredwell Phebe Tredwell.

In those times the titles, "Mr." and "Mrs.," were not used so freely as now-a-days, but were applied to certain persons of prominence in the social or business scale. This census indicates that, at the time it was taken, John' Tredwell and wife, Hannah, were living under the same roof with his son Thomas. The third John Tredwell mentioned in this list will be seen later on to have been another son of John' Tredwell.

The other record of Hannah (Smith) Tredwell mentioned is found in the office of the county clerk of Queens county, New York, in connection with a deed of conveyance dated the 10th day of December, 1701, from John Tredwell, Sr., of Hempstead, Gentleman, and wife, Hannah, to Theodorus Van Wake, of 172 acres of land in Hempstead, situated on both sides of the highway leading to the neck, and bounded on lands of John Robinson,

Thomas Rushmore and Judge Hicks; also of an interest in a

patent to fifty acres.*

A list has been preserved on the Hempstead records giving a description of the several horses owned by John's Tredwell between the 14th of June, 1665, and the 29th of January, 1666-.7† And there is also an entry thereon of a sale by John Smith (Rock) to him of a heifer on the 21st of June, 1665.‡

By a deed dated the 22nd of February, 1666, John Weascote conveyed to John² Tredwell the house, lot, buildings and meadows

sold to the grantor by John Ashman.§

A memorandum on the Hempstead town records shows that John' Tredwell bought two oxen of Mr. Hickes on the 24th of February, 1667.

On the 26th of April, 1667, Thomas Southward bought land on

Fordam's Neck, west of John' Tredwell's land.

In the division into bands to draw lots for lands for planting, ordered at a full town meeting held at Hempstead the 11th of January, 1668, John' Tredwell fell to "Company No. 2," together with Mr. Hicks, Mr. Gildersleve, John Eleson, Thomas Eleson and Richard Gildersleve.**

On the 17th of November, 1668, George Hewlette and William Osbon, both of Hempstead, conveyed to John Hubs of Mad Nan's Neck, 18 acres on said Neck that had been laid out to John's Tredwell.††

On the 2nd of December, 1668, an action on the case was entered in a Court of Constable and Overseers by Martha Rushmor, wife of Thomas Rushmor, against John's Tredwell for abusing her swine. The disposition of this action does not appear.

On account of his shoulder having been dislocated, John's Tredwell was temporarily excused by the Governor, on the 16th of

May, 1669, from general and town trainings.§§

The records of the Court of Burgomasters and Schepens held in New Amsterdam (New York City) show that, between the 25th of January, and the 1st of March, 1669-70, he had sued in that court, and recovered judgment against Jurian de Kouper for the price of a cow. (See note 5.)

By a deed dated the 5th of May, 1670, William Yeats "of ffleshin" conveyed to John' Tredwell all right, title and interest to any lands within the limits of Hempstead "as hollow upon ye plains meddow at ye necke at South Comonly Caled ye greate neck, with all Cominage, &c."

A year afterwards, on the 9th of May, John Chew of Hemp-stead conveyed to John² Tredwell 12 acres of meadow land at

Hungry Harbor, sold to the grantor by John Williams of Hempstead.*

On the 22nd of July, 1671, Timothy Halstead of Hempstead conveyed to John' Tredwell 6 acres of meadow land in Hempstead upon "Coe's little Neck" (to the south of Hempstead), bounded, westwardly, by Thomas Rushmure's meadow and, eastwardly, by the creek.

On the Hempstead records, volume i, pages 333-334, as printed,

is the following:

"At a Cort Held in Hempsted by the Magestrates this —

day of March in the yere of our Lord 1673-4.

Joseph Junnins Plaintive Enters an action of debt against John tredwell defendant the defendant Pleds he is not Provided to answer an so it is Refered till the next Cort

at a Cort held in Hempsted by the scout(?) and MaJestrats the 5 of Aprell in the yeare of our Lord 1674 in the Ceas depending betwen Joseph Junius Plaintive and John tredwell defendant the Cort finds for the Plaintive and also orders that the defendant shall Pay that mony of the Remainer of the bill that is in differanc to the Plaintive in ten dayes with this Proviser that if when Rafe keler esteate is decided an this mony that is in diferance doth then fall to John tredwell Portion that then the said Joseph Junnius shall Repay the mony to John tredwell again without further troubell an that the defendant shall Pay all the Charges."

The foregoing is given in full, because it is the most direct piece of evidence yet found connecting John² Tredwell with Edward¹ Tredwell.

The record shows that John² Tredwell had some unusual interest in the estate of Ralph Keeler, which can be explained only on the supposition of a near relationship existing between them. Such a relationship could have arisen only through marriage. It is known that Ralph Keeler did marry, secondly, widow Sarah Whelpley, the widow of Edward¹ Tredwell, and hence the connection between Ralph Keeler and John² Tredwell, and the inevitable conclusion that the latter was one of the sons of Edward¹ Tredwell.

On the 5th of January, 1675, John' Tredwell testified in an action brought by Cornelus Mott against Timothy Hallsted to recover his interest in a transaction relating to tobacco and rails. (See note 6.)

At a general town meeting held in Hempstead the 4th of March, 1675-6, "John tredwell" was given about ½ an acre of land in said town, adjoining his own lot;‡ and, at a like meeting held on the 1st of November following, he was given 4 acres of land adjoining the north end of "fearfeld;" and, also, at the meeting held the 9th of April, 1677, he was number 42 in the list of proprietors empowered to take up 100 acres of wood land apiece.

At a town meeting held the 5th of June, 1678, lot number 36 was drawn by him for fencing the Plains;* and at the meeting held the same year, on the 25th of December, he was number 14 in the lots drawn for laying out the "Medow at Rocoaway."† Sometime during this year he sued Adam Mott in an action on the case.‡

A record of the lands laid out by Nath! Pearsall in 1679, shows that John' Tredwell received 172 acres, made up of a 100, a 22, and a 50 acre lot, "bounded on the East with house bay swamp," on west side of Madnan's Neck path; and so running south and east. Following this is the entry of his cattle mark, which was "a latch marke on the fore side of boath ears."

At a town meeting held the 1st of April, 1679, he was chosen constable, which office he held also in 1702,** and, perhaps, other years.

At a town meeting held the 2nd of April, 1681, he was chosen an overseer for two years, † at the expiration of which term he was again elected to the office. ‡‡

At a court held in Hempstead by the Constable and Overseers, on the 3rd of January, 1682, he was called upon to testify in an action brought by Mathew Bedle against William Lee.§§

By deed dated the 1st of May, 1682, Abraham Smith of Hempstead conveyed to John' Tredwell 6 acres of meadow land at "Nere Rockaway," bounded on the east side by Samuel Denton's land and on the west side by John Pine's lot.

In an agreement bearing date the 24th of May, 1682, by the inhabitants of the town of Hempstead to maintain Jeremy Hubard as a minister, John' Tredwell promised to pay £1.10.0 in corn or cattle yearly towards the expense.

Both John' and Hannah Tredwell were called as witnesses on the 5th of July, 1682, in the suit brought by Richard Valentine against Abraham Smith. (See note 3.)

By deed dated the 15th of February, 1682-3, John's Tredwell "of Hemsted on Long Iland in the north riding of new yorksher" conveyed to Jonathan Smith, Jr., of the same place, 12 acres and 79 rods of meadow land at Hungry Harbor, originally laid out to Jeremiah Wood, Sr., bounded, westerly, by Thomas Ireland's land; easterly, along a creek; thence, southeasterly, to another creek and along said creek to Thomas Ireland's lot.***

On the 12th of February, 1683, John's Tredwell was chosen with Jonathan Smith, Sr., a representative of Hempstead for the purpose of assessing and making a rate for the county's charge. ††† This same office he held in 1686, ‡‡ 1687, §§§ 1688, || || || and, probably,

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other years. In conjunction with this office for the year, 1686, he was to go to Jamaica, Long Island, and choose a county treasurer; likewise in 1867, besides taking an account of money already

spent; and again in 1688.

At the town meeting held the 16th of February, 1683, he and two others were delegated to go to New York City to obtain "A pattaine for the whoale bounds of ye Towne" according to the first purchase and draft drawn; and the next year he was again sent there on the same business.

A valuation list among the state archives at Albany, New York, shows that in 1683, John' Tredwell's property was valued at

£250. (See note 7.)

In the last will of Richard Ellison, Sr., of Hempstead, bearing no date, but probated the 13th of June, 1683, reference is made to 22 acres of land transferred by him to John² Tredwell.

William Osburne of Gravesend, L. I., appointed him one of the overseers in his last will, dated the 10th of February, 1682.

By a deed dated the 16th of November, 1683, Thomas Ellison of Hempstead conveyed to John's Tredwell certain meadow land on the west side of Coe's Neck, bounded on the south by Begle's land and on the west by the creek between Hick's Neck and said meadow land.

By an entry of the 8th of April, 1684, in the Hempstead town books, it appears that John² Tredwell had exchanged some meadow land with Edmond Titus for upland at "Johnson

Brooke," going to Madnan's Neck.

By a town meeting held at Hempstead the 24th of May, 1684, he was chosen with three others to agree upon the boundary lines between the said town and the towns of Flushing, Jamaica and Oyster Bay.**

According to Thompson's *History of Long Island*, printed in 1843,†† John' Tredwell was the owner or 350 acres of land in 1685. The authority for this statement cannot be discovered by

the compiler.

By deed dated the 15th of January, 1686, Thomas Hickes, Sr., of Cornebery, Queens county, N. Y., conveyed to John's Tredwell a certain "hollow," known as "faire feld hollow," being on the

southeast side of Hempstead. !!

By deed dated the 18th of January, 1686, Samuel Rainer of Hempstead, son of Edward Rainer, deceased, conveyed to John' Tredwell certain meadow land at Rockaway, situated on the western side of Long Neck, at the entrance thereof, bounded on the south by land of John' Tredwell and on the west by William Thickston's land.

An entry in the Hempstead town books states that at a town meeting held the 14th of February, 1686, John² Tredwell was granted the liberty to exchange with the town the 3 acre home lot bought from Obadiah Vollintine, situated on the southeast side of Hempstead and on the north side of Samuel Rainer's lot, for a lot on the east side of his own field.* The sale of the above mentioned lot from Obadiah Vollintine to John² Tredwell was recorded in these books through a memorandum thereof dated the 28th of September, 1687, but the property is therein described as on the south side of Ephraim Vollintin's lot on the south side of the town.†

In confirmation of a bargain made between John Carman and John' Tredwell, said Carman's sons, John and Caleb, of Hempstead, conveyed to John' Tredwell, by deed dated the 18th day of March, 1686, certain meadow land lying "in ye Est fli" of Hick's Neck, bounded by a creek on the east side; and, at the same time, in furtherance of said bargain, John' Tredwell conveyed to the said two Carman grantors, 17 acres of meadow land on Hick's Neck, bounded, easterly, by Robert Jackson's land, and, on the north, by land of the said John and Caleb Carman; also 1 acre off the south end of John' Tredwell's fresh meadow.

At a town meeting held at Hempstead the 1st of April, 1686, John' Tredwell was chosen a commissioner for the year. He was again chosen for the same office in 1688.

At the meeting held the 2nd of June, 1686, he was delegated with others to protect the town's boundary lines, and lands against all claimants;** and, at the meeting held the 2nd of November, the same year, he with others was directed to appear at a court of "asises" in Jamaica, on the first Wednesday of that month, to defend the town's title to land in Rockaway against Judge Pelmas or any other person.††

By deed dated the 13th of January, 1687, John' Tredwell conveyed to John Ellison, Sr., of Hempstead 12½ acres of meadow land at Hungry Harbor laid out to Jeremiah Wood, Sr.; also 6 acres of meadow land late belonging to Jonathan Smith (Rock) of Hempstead, in exchange for meadow land laid out to Ambrose Sutten and sold by John Smith to John Ellison, lying on the westerly side of Coe's Neck and bounded, on the west, by a creek dividing Coe's Neck and Hick's Neck.!!

By deed dated the 6th of June, 1687, Thomas Hickes, Sr., of Cornbery, Long Island, conveyed to John' Tredwell one-half the meadow land on Hick's Neck formerly possessed by the grantor's father, John Hickes, bounded, easterly, by the East Creek and cove; westerly, by Nathaniell Persell's land; northerly, by woods; and, southerly, by said cove or bay.§§

At a town meeting held in Hempstead the 18th of February, 1687-8, John' Tredwell was one of the men chosen to audit a bill of costs.*

By the said town records, John's Tredwell appears as one of the owners of land on Cow Neck on the 6th of March, 1687-8.†

By deed dated the 9th of March, 1687-8, John' Tredwell conveyed to Edmon Tites of Hempstead 4 acres of meadow land on the great neck eastward, bounded, easterly, by Rock Smith's land; westerly, by the land of John Ellison, Sr.; also, "one adition Lying in ye west flie" of said neck, bounded, northerly, by lot laid out to James Pine, and, southerly, by lot laid out to John Ellison, Sr., and, on the same date, Edmon Tites conveyed to John' Tredwell 22 acres of woodland with right of commonage.

On the 26th of March, 1688, John's Tredwell had entered upon the Hempstead town books a memorandum of 44 acres laid out to him by Nathaniell Persall on the east side of "ye flie of meddoe" bought of John Ellison at Coe's Neck, being 70 poles in length and 50 poles in width.

On the 13th of December, 1689, John's Tredwell was appointed a justice for Queens county, and he appears as one of the justices holding a Court of Sessions in Jamaica, on the 4th of February, 1689-90.**

On the 18th of January, 1690, a commission was issued to John's Tredwell and six others to hold a Court of Oyer and Terminer and general jail delivery in Queens county.

In the office of the county clerk of Queens county at Jamaica, Long Island, is a memorandum dated the 13th day of April, 1691, stating that John's Tredwell had been chosen Burgess (representative) for Queens county to attend his Majesty's service upon the 14th of April, at Fort William Henry. While on his way there, he was arrested by the "under-sheriff of the city and county of New York" on some charge, the nature of which does not appear. The Assembly, after an examination, sustained it and refused to seat him. (See note 8.) It was not such a "scandalous" matter, however, as to destroy the faith and confidence of his constituents, or even to prevent subsequent appointments at the hands of the Colonial Executive, since, thereafter, he was frequently chosen by both to fill offices of trust and of great importance.

By deed dated the 9th of May, 1691, John' Tredwell conveyed to John Mott all his rights to the lands described in some other deed, of which no record can be found.*

At a town meeting held in Hempstead on the 1st day of July, 1691, John² Tredwell was chosen to decide what would be sufficient for a fence; what liberty swine should have on the streets and elsewhere on the town's commons; also to build a pound.†

The name of John's Tredwell appears in the list of proprietors and freeholders of Hempstead to whom John Stuard addressed his petition, dated the 11th of July, 1691.

On the 17th of March, 1691-2, John² Tredwell delivered to Robert Williams some oats he held belonging to George Fowler.§

At a town meeting held the 23rd day of February, 1696, "Mr. tredwell" was chosen to vindicate the town's interest and to apply for a warrant to run the town's line.

By deed dated the 15th of April, 1696, and recorded the next day in the office of the county clerk of Queens county, New York, John Kissam of Madnan's Neck, Hempstead, conveyed to John' Tredwell, gentleman, his dwelling, barns, lands, etc., on said Neck, bounded, westerly, by Mill Creek; northerly, by the bay; easterly, by a creek and highway running southerly; then, westerly, to Mill River brook. John Smith (Rock) evidently had some interest in this property at the time, for, on the same date, he quitclaimed all his rights therein to John' Tredwell through John Kissam.** Both of these deeds are now in the possession of Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell of East Williston, New York. farm appears to be the one on which John's Tredwell was living at the time of his decease, and the same one which was occupied as a homestead during the next one hundred years by he son and grandson, in turn, and whereon were buried many of the Tredwells and their connections.

On the records in the office of the county clerk of Queens county is a memorandum bearing date the 7th of June, 1697, that "Justice Tredwell" was given certain liberties in connection with the land he had bought of Studwell.†† This, doubtless, refers to John's Tredwell. From this time on, many allusions to a John Tredwell as a justice of the peace can be found on the public records, but, until the 25th of January, 1719-20, when it is clear that John's Tredwell was deceased, the data, in many instances, is too uncertain to enable one to decide to which of the two John Tredwells then living these records relate, as it is a fact that both of them held this office sometime

during their life. A like difficulty is experienced in settling the question as to which one was the incumbent of certain town offices during the same time.

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 31st of July, 1710, the trustees of the town of Hempstead, viz., William Nicoll, Thomas Hickes, and John Jackson, released to John' Tredwell all the town's interest in a certain tract of land on Madnan's Neck, bounded by the sound or creek and said Tredwell's fence; also nearly one acre of undivided land running from the Red brook westerly to the elbow of said Tredwell's fence on the top of the hill. This instrument was witnessed by William Willis and Andrew Gibb and was acknowledged on the 22nd of January, 1713-14.*

In one of the Hempstead town books are found the entries of several undated patents which, doubtless, were laid out to John' Tredwell. (See Note 9.)

John' Tredwell resided in the town of Hempstead, New York, which, in his time, comprised not only the present town of the same name, but also the existing town of North Hempstead. Just whereabouts in the town he dwelt, however, is uncertain; but the compiler's impression is that, until as late as April, 1696, his home was in "the town spot," or that part which is now the present village of Hempstead; while, at the time of his demise, as already stated, it is believed that he was living on Great Neck, which is in that part now North Hempstead.

His decease must have occurred between the 12th of January, 1712, and the 25th of January, 1719-20, for, on the former date, John' Tredwell united in executing a deed as one of the proprietors and trustees of the town of Hempstead to a John Monfort (but see deed, Symon Searing to John Tredwell, Jr., described under John' Tredwell); while, in a deed of the latter date between his two sons set out further on in more detail, it is recited that their father was then deceased.

It is probable that John' Tredwell, if not also his second wife, Hannah, was buried in the old Tredwell burial ground on Great Neck. This yard is described under Thomas' Tredwell.

TREDWELL CHILDREN:

Direct evidence is lacking, but it seems certain that Elizabeth (Starre) Tredwell was the mother of both of the children named below, the facts in the case of the son, Thomas, being almost conclusive. The following order of birth may be incorrect:

- 3. Rebecca' Tredwell (Edward') died in Middletown, Connecticut, before 1st March, 1707-8; married in Middletown, 1st

May, 1679, John Higby,* born about 1658, died probably in 1688, (before 28th December), son of Edward and (?) Lydia Higby, of New London and Middletown, Connecticut, Huntington and Jamaica, New York. John Higby resided in Middletown, Connecticut.

Two inventories of the estate of John Higby are found on the records in the probate office of the district of Hartford, Connecticut, the first dated the 28th of December, 1688, and the second, the 4th of December, 1693. His widow, Rebecca, had been granted letters of administration upon his estate, but, upon her death, letters were issued to their son, Edward, bearing date the 1st of March, 1707-8.†

Edward Higby, Sr., left a will dated the 27th of October, 1694, and probated the 21st of September, 1699, in which he gave twelve shillings "to Rebecca Higbie, relict of John Higbee."

HIGBY CHILDREN:

The probate records of the Hartford district referred to show that John and Rebecca (Tredwell) Higby had more than one son, but the name of only the following child has been found:

i. Edward, bapt. in Middletown, Conn., 24th Aug., 1684, d. in Westfield, Conn., 21st Nov., 1775; mar. 29th Nov., 1706, Rebecca Wheeler d. in Middletown, 22nd Oct., 1771. Both were of Stratfield, now Bridgeport, Conn., at time of marriage. In 1700, he chose his uncle Samuel Tredwell of Fairfield Village as his guardian. He and wife joined the church in Middletown on the 26th April, 1713. Residence, Middletown and Westfield, Conn. 8 children.

John's Tredwell (John's, Edward') born probably in Hempstead, New York, between December, 1667, and 4th June, 1668, died probably in Hempstead, testate, November, 1747, (after 11th); married before 12th January, 1696-7, Phebe Platt, born 19th March, 1669,* died between 30th August and 21st October, 1748, daughter of Epenetus and Phebe (Wood) Platt of Huntington, New York. Residence, Town of Hempstead, New York. Where John's Tredwell and wife were buried, is unknown.

John's Tredwell was a colonel in the militia. In the civil list he appears as a justice of the peace, and as filling several local offices, such as a trustee of his town, supervisor, constable, collector, and assessor, besides serving his town in other minor capacities, such as looking after the town's lands, laying out and taking care of the highways and fences, running the town's lines, keeping the town's moneys, adjusting its accounts, and letting out its sheep. He was also one of the vestrymen and wardens of St. George's Church, Hempstead. His business is unknown, but was, doubtless, farming. Upon the records he is variously described as "junior," "captain," "colonel," "justice," "esquire," and "gentleman."

The earliest record of John's Tredwell found bears date the 4th of June, 1689, when he registered his cattle mark as "a Latch in ye fore Side of Each Eare and a half peny under ye neare Eare."† This same mark was entered as John Jackson's on the 12th of February, 1710-11,‡ at or about which time John's Tredwell took the mark of Jonathan Smith (black), which was "a latch marke on the uper side of the Right Ear."

As John's Tredwell was, doubtless, not under twenty-one years of age when he registered his first cattle mark, the time of his birth, therefore, can be placed within six months, showing that he was the elder child.

In the three records mentioned John's Tredwell is described as junior.

Phebe Plat, widow of Epenetus Plat of Huntington, New York, left a will dated the 12th of January, 1696-7, which was probated the 24th of July, 1697, and in it she bequeathed her "own bible" to her "well beloved daughter Phebe Tredwell," adding that the said daughter had received more than a double portion at the time of her marriage and by her father's will.

Her father's will, dated the 1st of September, 1693, was probated the 13th of November, 1693, and in it his daughters are mentioned only by their first names.* On the 12th of March, 1697, Phebe (Platt) Tredwell, by making her mark, and her husband, by writing his name, acknowledged the receipt of £43. 9s. from Epenetus Platt in full of the legacy bequeathed to her in her father's will.†

It was probably John's Tredwell to whom the oaths of supremacy and objuration were to be administered under the "Dedimus potestatem" issued the 15th of July, 1703, under Governor Cornbury; and to whom the test oath was administered as a justice of Queens county the 2nd of August, 1704.

At a town meeting held in Hempstead the 14th of January, 1706-7, John's Tredwell was chosen a vestryman of St. George's Church in Hempstead for the current year. And, at the parish meeting held a year thereafter, he was again chosen as such for the ensuing year. He also appears in the list of wardens and vestrymen of that parish for the years 1720, 1722, and 1728-9.** He was one of the subscribers who held a meeting on the 11th of October, 1733, to provide for the construction of a new church in Hempstead. † An entry on the Hempstead town books, dated the 8th of the following April, shows that ½ an acre was laid out for that purpose, "the first Bounds being 15 foot west from ye old Church or meeting house by the side of Collonel John Tredwels fence & thence westward along the side of said Tredwels fence 18 rods which comes to the south west corner of said Collonel Tredwells Lott," &c.11 The survey was made on the order of John' Tredwell.

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 28th of November, 1706, Thomas Pearsall, Jr., of Hempstead, in consideration of £127, conveyed to John Tredwell, Jr., the grantor's homestead of 4 acres in Hempstead, situate on the south side of the highway running west between John Marvin's house and said homestead, bounded, on the east, north, and west, by highways and by Justice Smith's and Abram Southward's lands; also three other tracts, respectively consisting of 2½ acres, 6 acres "in the folly," and 3 acres. The witnesses were William Willis and John Rushmur.§§

At the town meeting held the 1st of April, 1708, John's Tredwell was chosen to take care of all highways in Hempstead and also to keep a pound for the term of seven years.* Each year thereafter, he was chosen to look after the highways and fences, until, in 1711, he asked to be excused from serving longer.† The records also show that he was the keeper of a pound for the years 1716,‡ 1738,§ 1739, 1744, 1745,** and 1747.††

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 13th of May, 1709, Adam Mott of Hempstead conveyed to John Tredwell, Jr., gentleman, 10 acres of woodland to be laid out in Hempstead, the witnesses

being Joseph Smith and Andrew Gibb. ##

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 20th of March, 1710-11, Abraham Smith of Hempstead, in consideration of £11, conveyed to John Tredwell, Jr., about 6 acres of meadow land on the south side of Hempstead, "at a neck called havebridg," bounded, westerly, by Justice Tredwell's meadows. Obadiah Volantine, Isaac Smith, and Jacob Smith were the witnesses.!!

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 29th of June, 1713, Moses Embree of Hempstead conveyed to John's Tredwell, Jr., 6-7 acres of meadow land on the south side, on "hay bridge necke," bounded, westerly, by said John's Tredwell's meadow bought of Isaac Smith. The witnesses were Jonathan Smith, Mordecai Lester, and (name not legible.);

Thomas Jones of Fort Neck, in the township of Oyster Bay, New York, named his "well beloved" friend, John's Tredwell, as one of the overseers of his last will dated the 7th of December,

1713, and probated the 2nd of February, 1713-14. The state of the 2nd of February, 1713-14.

In 1715, John's Tredwell appears as lieutenant in Capt. Timothy Bagley's company of Horse in Queen's county.*****

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At the town meeting held the 3rd of April, 1716, John' Tredwell was also chosen a constable and a collector for that year,* as well as to look after the town's land laid out for firewood and

grazing.†

The Hempstead town records contain a copy of a deed dated the 12th of August, 1717, from Symon Searing of Hempstead to John Tredwell, junior, yeoman, conveying 34 acres at Herricks; also 8½ acres on the hills above the head of Cow Neck. It is not certain whether this grantee was John's Tredwell or was his nephew; but, at least, a part of the land conveyed by this deed appears to be the same which was later devised by John's Tredwell to Sarah Lawrence and Tredwell Waters. If so, it follows that John's Tredwell was still living as late as the 12th of August, 1717.

At the town meeting held the 10th of March, 1717-18, it was voted that "Cap. John Tredwell" with others represent the town in running its lines and boundaries. He was chosen again for

that purpose in 1721 and 1727.

It is not known when John's Tredwell became a captain in the militia, but the earliest mention of him as such is found in the preceding record for the year 1718. From this time until the 31st of July, 1725,** he is frequently referred to by that rank. Between the latter date and the 13th of November, 1727, he was advanced to the rank of colonel.†

At the town meeting held the 1st of April, 1718, he was chosen an assessor, ‡‡ but three months thereafter, Thomas Carman was

elected in his place.§§

By indenture (unrecorded) dated the 1st of May, 1718, John Smith of Hempstead conveyed certain lands to Dennis Wright and endorsed thereon is the transfer of the grantee's interest to

Capt. John Tredwell.

By a deed dated the 30th of March, 1719, John Searing and Jeams Searing of Hempstead and another quitclaimed to Jonathan Searing of Hempstead land near "Hearicks" in Hempstead, bounded, southerly, by lands partly of John's Tredwell and partly of Isaac Smith; also another parcel, bounded, westerly, by land of John's Tredwell.

By deed (unrecorded) dated the 15th of May, 1719, Joseph Pine of Hempstead, in consideration of £60, conveyed to Capt. John Tredwell, gentleman, salt medow on Haybridge Neck on the south side of Hempstead, bounded, westerly, by said John' Tredwell's meadow. Mordecai Lester, James Searing, William Willis, Samuel Pine, and John Smith were the witnesses.

By a deed dated the 25th of January, 1719-20, Capt. John Tredwell quitclaimed to his brother, Capt. Thomas Tredwell, his interest in certain lands of which their father, John's Tredwell, died seized. The original document is now owned by Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell. (See note 1.)

In 1721, John' Tredwell was one of the trustees representing the town of Hempstead.*

Just when John's Tredwell was first commissioned a justice of the peace cannot be determined, for the reasons already explained under John's Tredwell, but the justice mentioned in a record of the 3rd of April, 1722, certainly refers to the former.* After this date, his name often appears as "Justice John Tredwell" or "Justice Tredwell."

On the said last mentioned date, the freeholders of the town of Hempstead voted to John's Tredwell 3 acres that were given for a school at the rear of Joseph Pettes "Seners Lott."

At the town meeting held the 6th of August, 1722, John's Tredwell was chosen to let out the town's sheep. Again he was chosen for that purpose in 1724; also in the years 1725 (when he was directed to receive the money for them), 1730, and 1732.**

Two persons were appointed at the meeting held the 2nd of April, 1723, to adjust an account with "Justes" John Tredwell for folding the sheep; while, at the meeting held the 9th of August, 1726, he with others was chosen to prevent the town's sheep being folded.

At the town meeting held the 30th of April, 1723, John's Tredwell was chosen to take account of the town's lands.****

The Hempstead town books show that the town's money, on the 14th of October, 1723, was lodged in John's Tredwell's hands;††† and that, at a town meeting in 1725, he was chosen to see about granting the town's lands for a mill.‡‡‡‡

John's Tredwell was one of the executors named in the last will of John Jackson of Hempstead. This testament bears date the 26th of August, 1724, and was probated the 6th of December,

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1725.* He was also one of the executors designated in the last will of John Thomas, Rector of St. George's Church in Hempstead, which bears date the 17th of March, 1724-5, and was probated the 3rd of December, 1726.†

By a deed dated the 7th of June, 1725, John' Tredwell and others conveyed to Capt. Jacob Hicks of Rockaway in Hempstead

all their interest in a certain beach at Rockaway. I

The record of the town meeting held in Hempstead the 20th of January, 1726-7, mentions, among other things, the "patin rate

that is in the hands of Justice John Tredwel."§

Samuel Embree of Hempstead named his "trusty and loving" friend, Col. John Tredwell, one of the executors of his last will (unrecorded) dated the 11th of January, 1727-8, and probated the 4th of August, 1729.

The records of St. George's Church in Hempstead contain the entries of baptisms from the 9th of March, 1730-1, to 1747, of

several slaves belonging to John's Tredwell.

At the town meeting held in Hempstead the 7th of April, 1730, John' Tredwell was given the liberty "to fence in and stop the way that was known by the name of Southards Lain;" and, at the meeting held the 21st of July, that year, he and others were also granted the liberty "to fence in the Lains following first the Laine betwen the buring Pase and Collo'n John Treadwell Lott."**

At the town meeting held the 4th of April, 1732, the town

school lot was let to John' Tredwell. ††

According to an early number of the New York Gazette, on Wednesday, the 23rd of April, 1735, the Governor of the Colony of New York was entertained in a splendid manner by Col. Tredwell, commander of the regiment.

By deed dated the 30th of December, 1736, and witnessed by John Tredwell, Jr., Isaac Germond, Sr., of Hempstead, conveyed to John's Tredwell, land on Hick's Neck. This land was later devised by said grantee to his nephew, Benjamin's Tredwell.

At the town meeting held the 5th of April, 1737, it was voted that John Thuston have the town's old sheep-pens on the south

side of "Collonels Treadwells Land."

By deed dated the 2nd of May, 1739, John Lester and wife, Phebe, of Hempstead, conveyed to his creditors land in the "Town Spot" of Hempstead, bounded, westerly, by lands of John"

Tredwell.* And by indenture (unrecorded) dated the 19th of July, 1744, the surviving creditors of John Lester, seventeen in number, conveyed to John's Tredwell 7 acres "in town spot of Hempstead." †

By deed dated the 29th of March, 1744, John Pine and wife, Grace, of Cow Neck, Hempstead, conveyed to Minne Schenck of the same place, land on Cow Neck, bounded, northerly, by "Coll."

Tredwell's land.

By deed dated the 10th of May, 1745, John Smith of Hempstead conveyed to Valentine Hewlett Peters of the same place land in Hempstead, bounded, westerly, by a lot belonging to Col.

Tredwell.§

By deed dated the 6th of August, 1747, Joseph Latham and William Latham of Cow Neck, Hempstead, conveyed to Joseph Kissam of the same place land on Cow Neck, bounded, easterly, by lands of Nath'l Pearsall, of John's Tredwell, and of Lewes Hewlett. The land of John's Tredwell therein referred to is again mentioned in a deed dated the 20th of March, 1759, from Thomas Pearsall, Israll Pearsall of Oyster Bay, and Samuel Latham of Cow Neck to James Hewlett of Cow Neck.

By deed dated the 11th of November, 1747. John's Tredwell, "in ye Consideration of ye perternal Love & affection which I Do Bear towards My Nephew Benjamin Tredwell," conveyed to his said nephew all his right to lands on Madnan's Neck and all other rights of lands he then had excepting "in the Township of Hempstead besides . . . Madnan's Neck." The execution of this deed was proved on the 11th of January, 1748-9, by Valentine Hewlett Peters, one of the subscribing witnesses.** The original instrument has been preserved and is now among the papers of Mr. Henry H. Tredwell.

On the Hempstead town records are entered the following undated patent rights which were laid out to John's Tredwell:

22 acres in the South Woods above Coes Neck, in the proprie-

tary right of Timothy Wood.

Neck, between Hick's Neck Path and Coes Neck Swamp, in the proprietary right of William Thorne.

29 acres above Coes Neck, in the South Woods, part of 50 acre lot, the remainder under the patent right of John Tredwell in folio 47, valued at £30, in the patent right of Samuel Denton. §§

12 acres at south end of Samuel Bedel's farm, part of the north

end of a card of $47\frac{3}{4}$ acres, valued at £6.

John's Tredwell left a last will dated the 23rd of July, 1745, which was probated the 2nd of December, 1747, and recorded in

Liber 16 of Wills, page 210, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.* The original will is still to be seen on file in the Surrogate's office, while the original letters testamentary issued thereon, dated the 2nd of December, 1747, have been preserved among the papers that have come down to Mr. Henry H. Tredwell.

In his will John's Tredwell mentioned his wife, Phebe, to whom he gave the use of his lands for life; his nephew, Samuel Tredel, to whom he devised lands on Cow Neck and on Hicks Neck, formerly his father's; his nephew, Benjamin Tredel, to whom he devised his lands, houses, and barns in the "Town-Spott" of Hempstead, lands on Hick's Neck, lands between Daniel Pine's river and Carman's river, and all rights in the undivided lands of the town of Hempstead, besides leaving his military arms; his kinsman, Thomas Tredel, son of his nephew, John Tredel, to whom he devised his right of land between the Merrick river and Daniel Pine's river; his kinswoman, Mary Tredel, daughter of his said nephew, John Tredel, to whom he bequeathed his silver punch bowl; Sarah Lawrence, wife of Adam Lawrence, Esq., and Tredel Waters, son of his friend, Anthony Waters, to whom he devised jointly land at Searingtown; William Totten, Hannah Bedle, daughter of his friend, Jeremiah Bedle of Hempstead, and his friend, Jacob Smith of Herricks in Hempstead. His wife, nephew. Samuel Tredwell, and friend, David Jones, were named the executors.

His widow, Phebe, subsequently released to these two nephews her interest in the lands thus devised to them, as appears by two deeds, one, dated the 31st of December, 1747, and signed by the said Phebe Tredwell by a mark;† the other, a quitclaim to the widow and heirs of the said Samuel Tredwell, dated the 12th of April, 1748, and signed in the same manner as the preceding deed.‡ In consideration of the latter release, the executors of of Samuel Tredwell's estate executed a bond to pay the said Phebe Tredwell £26. 10s., yearly, during her lifetime.‡

Phebe Tredwell, the widow of John's Tredwell, left a last will dated the 30th of August, 1748, which was probated the 21st of October, 1748, and recorded in Liber 16 of Wills, page 352, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. The original testament can still be found on file in that office.

The will of Phebe Tredwell, "widow of Colonel John Tredwell of Hempstead," shows that she was ill at the time it was made. It reads, in part, as follows: "If Collonell Benjaman Tredwell shall pay the Sum of \pounds_{14} in lew of a mare which he detains from me, and . . . \pounds_6 which my attorneys paid him . . . which . . . ought not to have been paid . . . then . . . his wife Sarah Tredwell shall have my silver tea pot." \pounds_{10}

was left for the repair of the Presbyterian meeting house at Hempstead. All the other legacies mentioned in her will seem to have been given to her own blood relatives or friends. Adam Lawrence and Jacob Smith were named the executors.

The place where John's Tredwell resided in Hempstead remains unsettled, but it was, probably, in "the town spot," that

part now the village of Hempstead.

John's Tredwell must have died between the time he executed the deed to his nephew, Benjamin's Tredwell, already described, and, at least, a couple of days before his will was probated; while his wife's death must have occurred the year following, between the time she made her will and the date of its probate.

It is not known where John's Tredwell or his wife was buried, but it was, probably, either in the old town cemetery, which is now covered over and forms the park in the present village of

Hempstead, or nearby, within St. George's church-yard.

John' Tredwell left no issue.

5. Thomas' Tredwell (John', Edward') died intestate, 1722, (before 25th May); married before 1698, Hannah Denton, died 17th August, 1748, aged 75 years, buried Sunk Meadow (Fort Salonga), Smithtown, New York, daughter of Samuel Denton of Hempstead, New York. Thomas' Tredwell resided on Madnan's Neck (Great Neck), town of Hempstead. His place of burial is uncertain. His widow moved to Smithtown, where she resided with her son, Timothy' Tredwell, until her decease.

Thomas' Tredwell was a captain in the militia of his county. Besides the title "capt.," he is frequently mentioned upon the public records as "gentleman" and "esquire." Apparently he did not seek political office like his brother, for he is found holding but one or two minor local town offices, such as surveyor of highways, and to take account of the town's money. He was one of the vestrymen and wardens of St. George's Church. Hempstead. His business was probably farming, as he was described as "yeoman."

The earliest record of Thomas' Tredwell discovered is as a witness with a John Tredwell to a deed from Thomas Lester and wife. Dorcis, of Hempstead, to Samuel Denton, Jr., of the same

place, dated the 25th of May, 1691.*

The next time his name appears, is as a witness on two deeds to Peter Titus of Hempstead, each bearing date the 28th of May, 1695, one from Hope Willis of Hempstead, and the other from

Thomas Rushmore of Madnan's Neck.1

On the 25th of January, 1697, the Governor of the Province of New York appointed Thomas' Tredwell to the captaincy of a Company of Foot in Col. Thomas Willet's regiment, vice Capt. John Jackson, who had been made a major. Mr. Herman E. Platt of Albany, New York, has the original commission. (See note 2.) It is in bad condition and immediate steps should be

taken to minimize, as far as possible, through photographic copies, the loss of this valuable and interesting document, of which there is no record in the state archives.

In a Queen's county regiment, in 1700, commanded by Lieut. Col. John Jackson, Thomas' Tredwell is given as the captain of

the Company of Foot in Hempstead.*

On the 19th of March, 1702-3, Thomas' Tredwell took the required oath as captain of a company of foot in the militia in the town of Hempstead; and, on the and of December, 1703, the oath of abjuration was administered to him as such officer.

In the archives of the State of New York in the State Library at Albany, before the fire, was a muster-roll "of the train Souldiers" under the command of Thomas' Tredwell dated at

Hempstead the 17th of September, 1715.§

On the 28th of June, 1722, Joseph Thorn was commissioned a captain of militia for Hempstead in the place of Thomas' Tredwell.

As it is not likely that the rank of captain was given to a man under twenty-one years of age, it is evident that Thomas' Tred-

well was born before the year 1676.

As stated under John's Tredwell, (page 186,) Thomas' Tredwell's name appears on the Hempstead census dated the 31st of August, 1698, together with the names of his wife, Hannah, and two children. Papers on file in the office of the clerk of the Court of Appeals in Albany, New York, in connection with the settlement of the estate of Samuel Denton of Hempstead, who died intestate, mention his daughter, Hannah Tredwell, wife of Thomas Tredwell. She was the granddaughter of the Rev. Richard Denton.

Thomas' Tredwell was one of the witnesses to the deed of conveyance from John Lingninton of Hempstead to Timothy Carele of the same place dated the 15th of March, 1699-1700; also, to the deed from Richard Totten, Sr., of Hempstead to his son, William Totten, of the same place dated the 6th of March, 1702-3.**

On the 17th of January, 1706-7, Thomas' Tredwell entered the following on the Hempstead town records as his ear-mark: "a latch one ye fore sid of ye left eare and a slip one ye under sid ye

right eare."

He was one of the subscribing witnesses to the last will of Richard Smith of Hempstead, dated the 23rd of March, 1710-11, and probated the 17th of May, 1711.

He was also one of the witnesses to the release of land on Madnan's Neck executed by John Tredwell, Esq., (which one?) and others as trustees of Hempstead to John Monfort of Madnan's Neck by deed dated the 12th of January, 1712.*

According to a memorandum on the Hempstead town records dated the 18th of February, 1712-13, there was laid out to "Justis John Tredwell Samuel Embry Captt Thomas Tredwell and John Rushmor" a "Parsel of Swomp lying to Pine mill with the upland A Joining to it."

Capt. Thomas Tredwell is given by Onderdonk as a warden and vestryman of St. George's church, Hempstead, for the years 1713-32. "32" is doubtless an error for 22, the year when

Thomas' Tredwell died.‡

At the town meeting held in Hempstead the 2nd of April, 1717, Thomas' Tredwell was chosen a surveyor of the highways for the ensuing year; and, the next year, he was again chosen to the office.

As already seen, John's Tredwell, by deed dated the 25th of January, 1719-20, quitclaimed to his brother, Thomas's Tredwell, the interest he had in certain property left by their father. (See Note 1.)

On the next day, Thomas' Tredwell of Hempstead, "Esqr," in consideration of "paternall Love . . . unto his beloved Eldest Son John Tredwell Junor of the Town . . . aforesaid Yeoman," and for other considerations, conveyed to his said son the farm he owned at "Fanefield," in the southeastern part of Hempstead; also, all the land he had on Coes Great Neck and the half part of all proprietary and patent rights of land in the South Woods and the Plains that Justice John Tredwell, late of Hempstead, deceased, died seized of; also, salt and fresh meadow on Haybridge Neck, bounded, easterly, by the meadow possessed by Capt. John Tredwell.

At the town meeting held the 5th of April, 1720, "Cap" Thomas Tredwell was chosen to take account of the town's money.**

In the office of the city clerk of Portchester, New York, is a copy of a deed bearing the date last mentioned from Silas Titus and wife, Sarah, to Thomas' Tredwell, conveying 151½ acres of land in the township of Rye, Harrison's Purchase, Westchester county, New York, bounded, westerly, by Mamaroneck River, southerly and easterly, by land of Richard Griffin, and, northerly, by lands of David Eustace.††

Soon thereafter, David Eustace and wife, Mary, by deed dated the 20th of May, 1720, conveyed to Thomas' Tredwell 170 acres in the said town of Rye, bounded, northerly, by Rye Pond, easterly, by lands of Richard Griffin, southerly, by the land conveyed by the said Titus deed, and, westerly, by Mamaroneck River.*

Thomas' Tredwell died intestate before the 25th of May, 1722, as appears by the inventory of his estate, which still exists in fair condition among the family papers which have descended to Henry Hewlett Tredwell. (See note 3.) Probably he died in May, that year, and was buried on his homestead, in one of the graves marked by field stones in the old Tredwell burial ground mentioned in the description which follows below.

The records in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York show that letters of administration on his estate were granted to his widow, Hannah Tredwell, on the 23rd of August, 1722.† The memorandum of her oath, taken on the same day in qualifying as administratrix, is on file in the office of the clerk of the Court of Appeals at Albany, New York.

By an instrument (unrecorded), Hannah Tredwell, widow of Thomas' Tredwell, released to her son, Benjamin' Tredwell, her interest in the property on Great Neck whereon her husband was residing at the time of his decease. (See Note 4.)

This homestead comprised 250 acres lying in the northeasterly part of Great Neck (formerly Madnan's Neck) in the present town of North Hempstead and running along the westerly side of Manhasset Bay, overlooking which, to the north, is a view of Long Island Sound and the distant shores of Connecticut. A part of this farm is now owned and occupied by Alphonse H. Alker, Esq.

A few paces back of the present Alker mansion, in an open field near the meadow and the shore of the bay, is the old Tredwell burying ground, a square shaped plot consisting of not more than ¼ acre, if that.

At the time of the compiler's last visit to this spot, on the 13th of October, 1905, it was so overgrown with briers, vines, bushes, and trees, that the gravestones were hardly discernable from the fence line. Probably it was due to the protection thus afforded that these stones were so well preserved.

Forty-three head-stones were found, twenty-two of Tredwells, fifteen of Kissams, two of Platts, two of Woolleys, one of Townsend, and one of Verity. Besides these, there were in the row of the oldest stones, at least two graves marked only by rough field stones, without inscription.

The oldest stone was slate, the most recent ones were marble, the others, brown stone. One was badly broken and crumbling. Several had already fallen. Some of the latter (of the Kissams) seemed to have been purposely levelled and buried.

This plot had once been inclosed by a wooden fence, but, at the time of the visit mentioned, it was down, apparently having fallen through decay.

This sacred spot should receive attention from the descendants of those buried there, or, in the course of a few more years, it may be ruthlessly obliterated in the same manner as other private burial grounds in that section.

Probably it was about the time Hannah Tredwell executed the above mentioned release that she went to Smithtown, Long Island, to live with her son, Timothy' Tredwell, with whom she was living when she died.

Hannah Tredwell left a last will dated the 20th of December, 1744, which was probated in the City of New York on the 26th of August, 1748, and recorded in Liber 16 of Wills, page 308, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.* original remains on file in the Surrogate's office. Throughout the name is spelled Treadwell. The will, signed by her by making a mark, recites that the testatrix is the widow of Thomas Treadwell and that she is "now of Smithtown," living with her son, Timothy Treadwell, to whom she devises all her interest in the buildings on the farm where he lives at Sunken Meadow. mentions her eldest daughter, Elizabeth Halstead; Phebe Treadwell, the child of her daughter, Charity; her granddaughter, Mary Smith, the other daughter of her said daughter, Charity; her daughter, Hannah Sands; her son, Thomas Star Treadwell; her sons, Benjamin and Samuel Treadwell; her grandchildren, Thomas, John, Samuel, and Mary Treadwell, children of her son, John Treadwell, deceased; her son-in-law, Benjamin Smith. The executors named are her two sons, Benjamin and Timothy.

The farm mentioned, whereon she lived at Sunken Meadow, was, in 1905, owned by Mr. Edward Thompson of Northport, Long Island, and, before him, by a Mr. Bryant.

A few steps northwest of the barn on this place, away from the road, and on the top of a hill commanding a superb view of Long Island Sound and the surrounding county, but unprotected against the wintry blasts, is a small, unfenced burial plot containing several graves marked only with rough, unlettered field stones. One grave, however, has a head and a foot stone of thin slate. This head stone, rounded at the top, with the customary Death's head and wings of that period, beneath which is a square border surrounding an inscription, the right edge being somewhat broken off, was, on the 14th of August, 1910, found broken in half, the upper part, containing the full inscription, lying on the ground face downward. On being raised, the following was disclosed:

Here Lyes Buried | The Body of | M^{rs}. Hannah Tredwell | who Died Aug^t y² 17th | 1748. In the 75th year | of Her Age.

The lettering was uninjured and remarkably clear. On the foot-stone was inscribed, Hannah Tredwell. This head-stone should be repaired and reset, or the location of the grave will

FOURTH GENERATION.

6. John' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward) born before 31st August, 1698, died between 26th December, 1740, and 2nd March, 1740-1; married Mary Mott, died after 7th March, 1737, predeceasing husband, daughter of Richbell and Elizabeth (Thorne) Mott of Hempstead, New York.* John' Tredwell resided in the town of Hempstead (probably south side), New York. He was a farmer; a lieutenant in the local militia; vestryman and warden of St. George's Church, Hempstead. The only local offices he seems to have held were that of assessor and that of fence viewer. On the records he is designated as "junior" and described as "yeoman" and "Mr." It is not known where he or his wife was buried.

The earliest mention of John Tredwell is found in the 1698 census, the part quoted under John's Tredwell (p. 186.)

By deed dated the 18th of June, 1722, John' Tredwell, "eldest son and heir to Thomas Tredwell late of Hempstead, Gent, deceased," conveyed to his two brothers, Thomas' Tredwell and Timothy' Tredwell, the two younger sons of said Thomas Tredwell, deceased, his interest in the 1511/2 acres in the township of Rye, Harrison's precinct, Westchester county, New York, which his father bought from Silas Titus (see p. 316); also the 170 acres adjoining the preceding tract, which his father purchased of David Eustace† (p. 317.)

On the same date, John' Tredwell, yeoman, conveyed to "his brother," Benjamin' Tredwell, "Second Son of . . . Thomas Tredwell Deceased," the homestead on Madnans Neck where their father died. This deed is among the family papers belonging to Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell.

The Act of the New York legislature that was passed the 17th of June, 1726, empowered and directed John Tredwell, Jr., and Capt. John Tredwell, with others, to stop the practice of setting fire to the old grass on Hempstead Plains.*

In Onderdonk's list of the wardens and vestrymen of St. George's Church, Hempstead, John' Tredwell's name appears for

the years 1728 and 1729.†

At the town meeting held in Hempstead on the 1st of April, 1729, "Mr. John Treadwell Juner" was chosen a fence-viewer for that year. This office he continued to hold for the next three years.

John Kearle, Jr., of Hempstead, New York, named John Tredwell one of the executors in his last will, dated the 6th of February, 1730-1, and probated the 6th of March, 1730-1.

In the Hempstead town records for the years 1731 and 1732,

John' Tredwell is mentioned as lieutenant.

He was chosen an assessor for the year 1732, and again for

the year 1734.**

Mary Tredwell, the wife of John' Tredwell, is mentioned in both the will of her father, dated the 22nd of September, 1734,†† and the will of her mother, dated the 7th of March, 1737, 11 al-

though in neither case by her last name.

John' Tredwell left a last will dated the 26th of December, 1740, which was probated in Queens county, the 2nd of March, 1740-1, and recorded in Liber 14 of Wills, page 34, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. \$\\$\\$ The original testament is still to be seen on file in said Surrogate's office. It was signed by the testator making a mark, notwithstanding he wrote an excellent hand, as is shown by the deed from him now in the possession of Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell.

In his will, John' Tredwell mentioned his son Thomas, to whom he devised all his real estate; his sons, John and Samuel, not of age, to each of whom was bequeathed £100; his daughter, Mary Tredwell, not 18 years of age, to whom was bequeathed £10, testator's tankard, "and all things that were her mothers." The executors named were testator's brother, Benjamin' Tred-

well, and his brother-in-law, Joseph Mott.

The receipts given by John' Tredwell's children upon the settlement of his estate have been preserved among the papers belonging to Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell.

TREDWELL CHILDREN:

The receipts last mentioned show that Thomas' was the oldest, and Samuel, the youngest son. The following order may be incorrect as to the daughter. According to the records of St. George's Church, Hempstead, all four children were baptized on the 7th of June, 1739, the three sons being entered as adults.*

It is not known where John's Tredwell or wife was buried.

In the receipt dated 21st Sept., 1745, for the legacy left him by his father, John's Tredwell described himself as a carpenter. As he must have been of age then, it is apparent his birth occurred before 21st Sept., 1724.

In a certificate dated 30th July, 1746, John's Tredwell is given as a lieutenant in Capt. Peter Wraxall's company.**

On the 20th Oct., 1750, a highway to the salt water, to facilitate the transportation of produce, was certified to have been laid out upon the petition of John' Tredwell and others.

He was one of the witnesses to the last will of Peter Titus of Hempstead, dated 18th Oct., 1753, and probated 5th Feb., 1754. L Also he and wife witnessed the last will of Peter Titus' son, Robert Titus of Hempstead, dated 26th Sept., 1756, and probated

16th Oct., 1756;* and he witnessed the codicil made by John Titus of Westbury, Hempstead, dated 17th May, 1757, and probated 27th June, 1757.†

John's Tredwell left a last will dated 16th Oct., 1758, and a codicil thereto dated 7th May, 1759, which were probated in the City of New York, 8th June, 1759, and recorded in Liber 21 of Wills, p. 330, office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. The originals are on file in said Surrogate's office. The will mentions the testator's wife, Phebe; his brother, Thomas Tredwell; his cousin (nephew), John Tredwell, son of his said brother, Thomas Tredwell; and that his property, real and personal, should be sold at public vendue. Patrick Mott, Samuel Clowes, 3rd, and Timothy Clowes were named the executors.

John⁵ Tredwell left no issue.

She was one of the legatees under the last will of her grandmother, Elizabeth Mott of Hempstead, dated 7th March, 1737, and probated 16th April, 1739.§ John's Tredwell devised to her his silver

punch-bowl.

7. Elizabeth Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward) born before 31st August, 1698, living 11th March, 1749-50; married, first, Jonathan Smith of Hempstead, New York, who died in 1733; secondly, in Hempstead, 15 May, 1736 (marriage bond dated 27th April), Joseph Halstead of Hempstead, who died March, 1749-50.

Jonathan Smith left a last will dated the 22nd of February, 1731, which was probated the 3rd of April, 1733, and recorded in Liber 11 of Wills, at page 504, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.** It was made while he was sick and

in it he directed his grist mill at Herricks to be sold. It mentions his wife, Elizabeth; his four sons, Richard, Jonathan, William, and Elijah; and his daughters, Hannah, Elizabeth and

Joseph Halstead left a last will dated the 11th of March, 1749, which was probated 21st of March, 1749-50, and recorded in Liber 17 of Wills, at page 80, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.* It was made while he was sick and in it are mentioned testator's wife, Elizabeth; his four sons, Lawrence, Joseph, Jonah, and John; his daughters, Sarah Penney and Mary; and his brother, Robert Marvin.

Elizabeth (Tredwell) Halstead probably left no issue through

her second marriage.

Benjamin' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward) born 27th September, 1702, died on his farm on Great Neck, town of Hempstead, Tuesday, 27th August, 1782, buried on his farm; married, first, Huntington, Suffolk county, New York, 25th August, 1727,** Phebe Platt, died 18th January, 1738-9, aged 28 years, 4 months, and 18 days, buried same plot where husband is buried, daughter of Epenetus and Elizabeth (Smith) Platt of Huntington; married, secondly, Hempstead, Queens county, New York, 6th January, 1739-40, †† Sarah Allen, born 8th August, 1717, ‡‡ died

11th April, 1782, buried in the said Tredwell plot, daughter of Henry and Mary Allen of Great Neck. Benjamin' Tredwell resided on Great Neck, town of Hempstead (part now the town of North Hempstead), New York.

He was a colonel in the militia; vestryman of St. George's Church, Hempstead, 1739-1744;* apparently held only two local offices, that of assessor (year 1757†), and of overseer of highways (years 1747,‡ 1757,§ 1758, 1759, and 1763**). His business was farming.

The name of Benjamin' Tredwell appears in the list of William Mott's neighbors on Mad Nan's Neck to whom he addressed the petition to hang a "gate on ye high way yt leads towards my neighbour Treadwells," which was granted the 15th of January, 1724.††

On the 11th of April, 1724, Benjamin' Tredwell registered his cattle mark as follows, "a latch on ye fore side of the neor ear & a hole in ye same & a slipe under ye of ear." ‡‡

He was one of the subscribers in 1733 towards building a new church in Hempstead.§§

In the list of militia officers for Queens county, New York, for the year 1738, Benjamin' Tredwell appears as major in Col. John Cornell's regiment. This rank he held until, at least, the 7th of April, 1747. A survey "made for Coll. Benjamin Tredwell," in the possession of Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell, bears date, 10th of April, 1750. But, according to one of the compiler's unverified memoranda, Benjamin' Tredwell held that rank as early as August, 1748.

Benjamin' Tredwell's first wife was buried a little north of the center of the family burying ground on Great Neck described on page 317, a slate stone marking the grave. It is the oldest inscribed stone in this plot. The inscription on it is:

Here lyes the Body of Phebe Tredwell wife of Major Benjamin Tred | well & Dau^r to M^r Epenetus | Platt att Huntington | Dyed January 18th 1738-9 | aged 28 years 4^{ms} & 18 D^s. (Then follows an epitaph.)

Epenetus Platt left a last will dated the 17th of January, 1741-2, probated the 31st of August, 1745, in which he left £100 to his son-in-law, Benjamin' Tredwell, and ½ of his residuary estate to the four children of his daughter, Phebe.*

Robert Mitchell of Hempstead made his "friend," Benjamin' Tredwell, one of the executors of his last will dated the 8th of October, 1746, and probated the 22nd of April, 1748.†

Benjamin' Tredwell's wife, Sarah, is mentioned as daughter in the will of Mary Allen, widow of Henry Allen of Great Neck, dated the 22nd of December, 1746, and probated the 22nd of June, 1747.‡

The New York Mercury of the 5th of April, 1756, and of the 22nd of December, 1762, contains, respectively, an item describing the large cattle raised by Col. Benjamin Tredwell, which had

just been killed in the City of New York for market.§

On the 24th of December, 1756, Thomas Star' Tredwell executed a mortgage to Benjamin' Tredwell on certain lands in Harrison's Purchase, Westchester county, New York. This mortgage was discharged on the 6th of October, 1759.

The Hempstead town records contain a memorandum dated the 14th of December, 1759, of the satisfaction by Benjamin' Tredwell of a mortgage made in 1706 by Peter Vergereau, Sr., to Thomas Jones, which had been assigned by the latter's son, David Jones, to Benjamin' Tredwell on or about the 25th of May, 1752.

In 1767, Benjamin' Tredwell recovered a judgment in the Inferior Court of Common Pleas at Jamaica, Queens county, New York, for £440, besides costs, against the estate of John Forbus, the Elder, and the property left by the latter was sold by the Sheriff to satisfy the same, the deed bearing date the 17th of June, 1767.**

The second wife of Benjamin' Tredwell was buried in the central row of graves in the old family burying ground, the third grave from the northerly line of the plot. The inscription on the head stone is as follows:

In | memory of | Sarah Tredwell | wife of Col. Benjamin Tredwell. | She died April 11th 1782 | in the 65th year of her | age.

Benjamin' Tredwell lies buried between his two wives, and the head stone marking his grave contains the following inscription:

In | memory of | Col. Benjamin Tredwell | who departed this Life | August 27th 1782 | aged 79 years | and 11 months.

His demise elicited the writing of the following words of esteem dated the 4th of September, 1782:

"Died, Tuesday sennight, at his house, at Great Neck, in the eightieth year of his age, Colonel Benjamin Tredwell, a gentleman who ever supported an unblemished character and was remarkable for his hospitality, cheerfulness and affability."*

Benjamin' Tredwell left a last will dated the 3rd of August, 1782, which was probated the 2nd of September, 1782, and recorded in Liber 35 of Wills, page 72, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original remains on file.†

The will of "Benjamin Tredwell, the elder, of Madnans Neck, otherwise Great Neck . . . in . . . perfect health" mentions his son Benjamin, to whom was devised, upon certain conditions, the homestead farm whereon the testator was then living; his son William, to which two sons were devised testator's other lands, meadows, marsh, and beach, and rights in the undivided lands in the township of Hempstead or elsewhere; his grandchildren, Thomas, Benjamin, Phebe Wooley, Sarah Tredwell, John, Elizabeth, and Richard, children of his deceased son John; William, Elizabeth, and Susanna Tredwell, children of his deceased son, Samuel; his daughters, Peggy, Phebe, and Sarah, to whom he left his plate in addition to other legacies; Abigail Bennet, who lived in testator's home many years. His son, Benjamin, his sonin-law, Hendrick Onderdonck, and his friends, William Thorne and John Allen, Jr., son of Henry Allen, deceased, were named the executors.

A release from the executors recorded in the office of the county clerk of Queens county shows that the conditions mentioned were duly fulfilled by Benjamin' Tredwell.

TREDWELL CHILDREN:

The dates of birth of Benjamin' Tredwell and of his children are taken from the Bible formerly belonging to his son William' Tredwell. The same record is also in the old Floyd-Jones' Bible now owned by Mr. Thomas Floyd-Jones of Nutley, New Jersey. See also the Onderdonk record.

9. Samuel' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward) born after 1702, died between 4th September, 1747† (? January, 1747-8‡), and 19th April, 1748; married Margaret Thomas, died 1789, between 20th January, and 21st March, daughter of Rev. John Thomas, Rector of St. George's Church, Hempstead, New York. Margaret (Thomas) Tredwell married, secondly, Judge David Jones of Fort Neck, Queens county, New York, born 16th September, 1699, died 11th October, 1775. Samuel' Tredwell resided in the town of Rye (part now town of Harrison), Westchester county, New York, where his widow was residing at the time of her decease. The place of burial of neither Samuel' Tredwell nor his wife is known.

Samuel' Tredwell held the following local offices: assessor, 1726; surveyor of highways for Harrison, 1732; justice of the peace, 1738–1745 (probably longer); commissioner of highways, 1747; supervisor, 1747. He was also one of the commissioners to look after the public highways in Rye and White Plains for 1744 and for 1745; westryman, 1728, 1734, 1741, and 1744, and warden, 1745 and 1746, of Christ's Church, Rye, New York; on committee to repair the church, 1727; and also on committee to repair the public buildings, 1740. On the records he is described as "yeoman" and "gentleman."

Samuel' Tredwell entered his cattle mark on the Rye town records the 27th of January, 1723-4, as follows: "a Step on the

fore side of each ere."

The late Mrs. Susan Amelia (Lay) Treadwell of Jamaica, Queens county, New York, widow of Joseph Augustus Treadwell,

had, in 1890, many old papers relating to Samuel' Treadwell and his descendants and, among them, were the following:

Four bills of sale of slaves to Samuel' Tredwell, (1) from Jeremiah Gonong of Rye, dated 15th of March, 1730; (2) from Jane Stevenson, widow, of Rye, dated 14th of August, 1732; (3) from William Fowler of Rye, dated 6th of June, 1737; (4) from Thomas Hatfield of Rye, dated 26th of January, 1740. Bond in the sum of £2,100, dated 2nd of November, 1732, from Thomas Esmond and Jeremiah Fowler, both of Rye, to Samuel' Tredwell and Samuel Thorn, both of said town, to save the obligees harmless as sureties for the payment of said Esmond's debt to Isaac Willett of the Borough of Westchester, Westchester county. of attorney, dated 21st of May, 1733, from Benjamin Smith of Hempstead, Queens county, yeoman, to his "trusty friend," Samuel' Tredwell, yeoman, to sue on bond from John Minthorne to said Smith. Deed, dated 20th of March, 1734, from Thomas Esmond and wife, Elizabeth, of Rye, yeoman, in consideration of £255, to Samuel' Tredwell, Gent., conveying a farm in Harrison's Purchase in Rye, part of the tract grantor bought of Isaac Willett, bounded, easterly, by the middle line of Harrison's purchase; southerly, partly by land of Christopher Isinghartt and partly by grantor's land; westerly, by Mamaroneck River; northerly, to grantor's land, making 100 acres. Bond in the sum of £313, 10s, dated 14th of May, 1742, from Edward Stevenson and Samuel Tredwell, both of Westchester county, to secure to Johannes Clook of Amwell township, Hunterdon county, New Jersey, upon the payment of £156, 158, the conveyance of 234 acres in said township, excepting 16 acres sold to John Mullen, bounded, westerly, by land formerly Benjamin Hields, now Herman Dorotes and Johannes Shavers; easterly, by land formerly Edward (?) ---, now Timothy Roses; northerly, by land of Johannes and Jery Behtelseymer; southerly, by said John Mullen's land. Deed, dated the 3rd of November, 1742, from Joseph Merritt of Rye, yeoman, in consideration of £10, to Samuel' Tredwell, conveying 1/3 of an 18th share in the ledges or ledge ground within "pening Neck purchase" in Rye, including all the salt meadows in grantor's possession, bounded, southerly, by Roger Park's meadow and running northerly to David Haight's and John Clap's meadow purchased from George Lanesen, deceased, as appears by his deed dated the 9th of April, 1723. Award by Samuel Purdy, John Lyon, and Samuel' Tredwell, arbitrators, dated 6th of August, 1743, reciting that Thomas Carpenter, in behalf of his son, Stephen Carpenter, and Samuel Thorn, in behalf of Hannah Chement, had bound themselves to abide by the judgment of said arbitrators that the said Stephen Carpenter should bring up the male child of which the said Hannah Chement and Stephen Carpenter were the parents. Warrant, dated at Rye, the 15th of May, 1730, which seems to have been signed by Samuel' Tredwell,—part of the signature having been torn off,—directing the constable of White Plains to bring Paterek Sherrard and wife Catherine (maiden name, Ward), lately married, before him, to give security for the maintenance of the

child the said Catherine had while single, of which Thomas Warren, the schoolmaster, was the father, both being of Rye. Deed, dated the 27th of May, 1746, from John Budd, proprietor in the township of Rye, "formerly belonging to the Colony of Connecticut now under the province of New York," quit-claiming all grantor's rights belonging or descending to him by virtue of the grant of the general court held at Hartford, Connecticut, to the ancient proprietors of Rye, in two parcels of land in Rye, on the west side of Blind Brook, part of the ten lots released by the other proprietors of Rye unto Daniel Purdy, Joseph Kniffin, Samuel Brown, and Jonathan Brown, and commonly called Harrison's Purchase; one piece of 200 acres lying on the east side of the Middle Line (so called) of said Harrison's Purchase, bounded, northerly, by land of James and Nathaniel Stevenson; easterly, by said Blind Brook to William Willet's land; southerly, by said Willet's land; westerly, by said Middle Line; the other piece, containing 174 acres, lying on the west side of said Middle Line, bounded, easterly, by said Middle Line; southerly, by said William Willet's land; westerly, by Mamaroneck River; northerly, by land of Christopher Isinghart. Deed, dated 20th of August, 1747, from John Reynolds of Dutchess county, New York, yeoman, quit-claiming to Col. Willit and Samuel' Tredwell grantor's rights unto lands taken in Mr. Adolph Phillips' upper patent in Dutchess county. Deed from Phebe Tredwell, widow of John's Tredwell, dated the 12th of April, 1748, and the bond executed in consideration thereof, already mentioned under John's Tredwell (page 31).

Samuel' Tredwell was one of the executors named in the last will of Samuel Hitt of Harrison's Purchase, dated the 17th of

August, 1742, and probated the 22nd of November, 1742.*
"Being sick," Samuel Tredwell made his will bearing date the 4th of January, 1747, which was probated in Westchester county the 11th of April, 1748, and recorded in Liber 16 of Wills, page 242, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original is still on file.

In this will are mentioned testator's wife, Margaret, to whom was given the use of all his real estate in Rye until their son Samuel became of age, then the use of one-third thereof, and, upon her death, the property to go to Samuel; his three daughters, each under eighteen and unmarried, namely, Gloriana (eldest), Margaret (second), and Mary (youngest), to whom were given the proceeds of the sale of the two pieces of land his uncle Col. John's Tredwell left him. The will further mentions the continuance of testator's indisposition at the time of said uncle's death and names testator's wife, brother Benjamin Tredwell, and brother-in-law, John Thomas, as the executors.

One of the papers in the possession of the late Mrs. Joseph Augustus Treadwell, was the inventory of "the Goods and

Chattels . . . of Samuel Tredwell Esq Late of the Town of Rye," dated the 19th of April, 1748, and made by Jeremiah Fowler and Joseph Isinghartt, who appraised the personal estate left by Samuel' Tredwell at £714-58.-2d. Among other things it mentions his Bible, books, many horses and cattle, farming

implements, and six slaves.

In Liber E, page 276, of the Hempstead town records, is a copy of a deed dated the 27th of April, 1748, from John Thomas and Margaret Tredwell, widow, both of Rye, executors of the last will of Samuel' Tredwell, conveying to Thomas' Tredwell of Hempstead, gentleman, 45 acres of upland and meadow on the east side of Hicks' Neck, on the south side of Hempstead; also 20 acres of upland and meadow on the same neck. Benjamin Tredwell was one of the subscribing witnesses.*

Samuel' Tredwell's widow married Judge David Jones. In his will dated the 28th of November, 1755 (?1765), William Willett, Jr., of Rye, mentions her as sister Margaret, wife of David

Jones, Esq.

This has prompted the claim that the maiden name of Margaret (Tredwell) Jones was Willett. But, in this will, the testator also mentions Gloriana, the wife of Edward Stevenson, as his sister, and John Thomas as his brother. Edward Stevenson is known to have married Gloriana Thomas. The explanation is, Col. William Willett, the father of William Willett, Jr., married Margaret, the widow of the Rev. John Thomas and the mother of the said Margaret Jones and Gloriana Stevenson.

His wife Margaret is mentioned in Judge David Jones' will dated the 26th of July, 1768, and also in the codicil thereto, both of which were probated the 27th of October, 1775, and recorded in Liber 30 of Wills, page 31, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.§

Margaret (Tredwell) Jones left a last will dated at Harrison, the 20th of January, 1789, which was probated the 21st of March, 1789, and recorded in Liber A of Wills, page 113, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of Westchester, New York. It mentions her son, Samuel Tredwell; her daughter-in-law, Dorothy Tredwell; her grandson, John Augustus Tredwell; her three daughters, Gloriana Pell, Margaret Ogden and Mary Stevenson; her grandchildren, Nancy Stevenson, Alexander Stevenson and Samuel Stevenson; and her son-in-law, Benjamin Stevenson. The executors named were her daughter Margaret and her son Samuel, besides two others. In September, 1794, Isaac Sniffen of Mamaroneck, Westchester county, seems to have been the only acting executor.

10. Thomas Star' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward), born after 1703, living 19th October, 1769, died before 5th July, 1772; married before October, 1738, Elizabeth Lyon, born Greenwich, Connecticut, 12th January, 1717/8, living 5th July, 1772, daughter of John and Hannah (widow of Joseph Banks) Lyont of Greenwich, Conn., and Rye, (Byram Neck), New York. Residence, town of Rye (part now town of Harrison), as late as October, 1759, soon after which, Burling Slip, City of New York. It is not known where either Thomas Star' Tredwell or his wife is buried.

He was an overseer of highways in the town of Rye (Harrison) for the years 1744‡ and 1757;§ vestryman of Christ's Church, Rye, New York, 1752. On the public records he is described as "gentleman."

Thomas Star' Tredwell witnessed the deed from Jonathan Whitehead and wife, Sarah, of Hempstead, New York, to Joseph

Kissam of same place, dated the 11th of March, 1727.

By deed dated the 7th of March, 1737, Timothy' Tredwell of Suffolk county, New York, yeoman, conveyed to Thomas Star' Tredwell of Rye all his interest in the lands in Harrison conveyed to him by his brother John' Tredwell, Benjamin Tredwell acting as one of the witnesses.** The latter conveyance has been described under John' Tredwell (page 40.)

Thomas Star' Tredwell was one of the witnesses to the will of Thomas Weden of Rye, dated the 11th of March, 1745, and

probated the 15th of May, 1746.ft

The will of John Lyon of Rye, dated the 14th of July, 1749, and probated the 16th of August, 1749, mentions his daughter Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Star' Tredwell, and names her an executrix.!!

On the 15th of June, 1751, Thomas Star' Tredwell had the following ear mark entered on the Rye town book, "a Step on

the foreside of the near Ear and a Slipe on the underside of the off ear."*

He was also one of the witnesses to the will of Isaac Burdsell of Rye, dated the 13th of August, 1757, and probated the 2nd of

April, 1761.†

By deed dated the 4th of October, 1759, Thomas Star' Tredwell of Rye, his wife Elizabeth joining, conveyed to Thomas Vail the farm of 320 acres whereon he was then living in Harrison, bounded by land of Isaac Birdsell and the highway leading through Purchase, and by land of John Cromwell and John Clap, and the northwest corner being on the west side of the cove of Rye Pond, the highway running through the middle to White Plains.

An advertisement dated the 17th of September, 1766, in the Supplement to the New York Gazette or Weekly Post Boy for said month shows that Thomas Star' Tredwell was then either living or doing business on Burling Slip, City of New York. And in the New York Journal or General Advertiser for the 19th of October, 1769, is an advertisement of raccoon skins for sale by Thomas Tredwell on Burling Slip, New York, and by Matthias Halsted in Elizabeth Town.

Charity' Tredwell (Thomas,' John,' Edward'), died probably before 20th December, 1744 (date of mother's will); married Benjamin Smith of Hempstead, New York, died between 19th March, 1766 (date of his will), and 17th May, 1768 (date of probate). He married, secondly, before 1750. Amy Spragg, living 19th March, Residence, Town of Hempstead, probably south side.

Benjamin Smith left a will dated the 19th of March, 1766, which was probated the 17th of May, 1768, and recorded in Liber 26 of Wills, page 303, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.* In it is mentioned his wife Amy; his daughter Amy, wife of Amos Smith; his three sons, Benjamin, Samuel and John; the sons of his daughter, Phebe Tredwell, wife of Thomas Tredwell, namely, John and Benjamin Tredwell; the children John Jackson, Jr., had by his granddaughter, Charity; the children of his daughter, Mary Titus, deceased, namely, Austin, James and Phebe Titus; his daughter-in-law, Millicent Betts.

December, 1738,* (license dated 14th Decembert), Mary Platt, died between 14th September, 1773 (date of a receipt to her), and 13th May, 1774 (date of probate of her will), daughter of Epenetus and Elizabeth (Smith) Platt of Huntington. uncertain where either Timothy' Tredwell or his wife was buried, but, presumably, they were interred in the same plot on his homestead at Sunk Meadows, where his mother had been buried (see page 36). Residence, town of Hempstead to about 1735, soon after which he moved to Sunk Meadows, Smithtown, Suffolk county, New York (see page 36). Pelletreau says the home of this family was on Tredwell's Neck, west of Sunk Meadows! Smithtown. By trade he was a carpenter; yeoman, 1737.

Timothy Tredwell was a witness to the will of Jemima Denton of Hempstead, dated the 8th of June, 1734, and probated

the 24th of July, 1734.

By deed dated the 7th of April, 1735, Abel Smith and wife conveyed to Timothy' Tredwell of Hempstead, carpenter, 450 acres bordering on the Sound, being on Sunken Meadow Neck in Smithtown, Suffolk County, New York. And, the next day, Abel Smith of Bergen township, Bergen county, New Jersey, conveyed to him 200 acres also on Sunken Meadow Neck.

On the 10th of November, 1736, Timothy' Tredwell entered his ear mark on the Smithtown books as follows: "a latch on the fore side of the left ear and a slope on the under side of the

right ear."**

By his will, Epenetus Platt left froo to his son-in-law, Timothy Tredwell, and one-third of his residuary estate to his daughter, Mary Tredwell. Timothy Tredwell was one of the executors thereof. ††

Moses Vail of Huntington made his "friend," Timothy' Tredwell, an executor of his will, dated the 24th of August, 1749, which was probated the 3rd of April, 1750. TOn the last mentioned date there was also probated the will of Isaiah Rogers of Huntington, dated the 26th of August, 1749, in which Timothy' Tredwell was likewise named one of the executors.

The Ulster county, New York, records contain a copy of a deed dated the 20th of October, 1729, from Uri Waygant and wife, Jean, to Timothy' Tredwell of Smithtown, Long Island, conveying part of a tract of land near "Blew Hills" in Ulster county and called "Tenston Medow," which had been granted to said Waygant's father, Capt. William Bond. This deed was recorded many years after its date at the request of Thomas' Tredwell, Esquire.*

Timothy' Tredwell "of Smithtown" left a will dated the 2nd of June, 1747, which was probated the 28th of February, 1749/50, and recorded in Liber 17 of Wills, page 72, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York,† where the original remains on file. Therein testator mentions his wife, to whom he left the use of his dwelling house and real estate in Smithtown for life, with remainder over to his "eldest son," Thomas, then not of age; also other children. His wife, brother Benjamin' Tredwell, and Zophar Platt were named the executors. The original letters testamentary are now in the possession of Mrs. Charles Hilton Brown of the City of New York.

About 1768, a controversy arose over the real property left by Timothy' Tredwell, and to settle this an action was commenced in the Supreme Court in New York City and, later, moved into the Court of Chancery. The details are set forth in the Records of Smithtown, Long Island, N. Y., by W. S. Pelletreau, at pages 375 to 388. Therein (p. 389) will be found a copy of an agreement dated the 11th of February, 1768, between Mary Tredwell, Philetus Smith and wife Phebe, and Hannah Tredwell, all of Smithtown.

Mary Tredwell "of Smithtown . . . widow of Timothy Tredwell being infirm and weak," made her will dated the 29th of February, 1772, which was probated the 13th of May, 1774, and recorded in Liber 30 of Wills, page 245, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. The original testament remains on file there. It mentions her son Thomas, to whom she devised the tract of land purchased of Floyd Smith; her daughter, Phebe Smith, to whom was devised testatrix's interest in lands in the Patent of Winnecomac and the right of lands and meadows on Sumpwam's Neck (Babylon) and on South Beach; and her son-in-law, Mr. Phenix. On the second page is an inventory dated at Hempstead, 1st of October, 1750, "of the Goods and Chattles of mary Treadwell Daughter of John Treadwell Deceased of the Township of heampsted," consisting principally of bedding and clothing, also a silver tankard, six silver spoons, and a trunk. Following this is a receipt of the said articles "By the Hands of Benjamin Treadwell Esqr," "Being In full of all The Goods and Chattels Left att the house of the Said Benjamin Treadwell by Mary Treadwell Daughter of John Treadwell," bearing the same date and signed by George Manlove, following which is a certificate signed by Joseph Kissam, John Touffey and Richard Smith, stating that they saw the said "Benjamin Treadwell deliver the said goods to George Manlove."

FIFTH GENERATION:

14. Thomas' Tredwell (John, 'Thomas,' John,' Edward'), baptized Hempstead, New York, 7th June, 1739, died between first Tuesday in April, 1780 (chosen overseer of highways), and 25th July, 1781 (date of probate of his will); married, by license, Hempstead, 12th March, 1739, Phebe Smith,* his cousin, survived husband, probably the Phebe Tredwell mentioned in 1790 United States Census as living alone, daughter of Benjamin and Charity' (Tredwell) Smith of Hempstead. Residence, Coe's Neck, southerly side of town of Hempstead, New York; in 1774, on the north side of highway leading from Daniel Pine's land to "house of the late Capt. Benjamin Smith." The place of burial of Thomas' Tredwell and wife is unknown. Locally, he was chosen a fence viewer, 1747, 1748, 1750-1752; overseer of highways, 1753-1764, 1776, 1778-1780; on committee "to fence the Plains belonging to" Hempstead, 1757.

Thomas' Tredwell was probably the church warden and vestryman by that name of St. George's Church, Hempstead, 1750-1761. On the public records he is described as "yeoman,"

"gentleman," and "farmer."

He was appointed an executor of the will of Jonathan Balding of Hempstead, dated the 19th of November, 1757; likewise of the will of Lucas Coovert of Hempstead, dated the 10th of May, 1758.

In 1776, he was ordered to remove his cattle to a place in the

country out of reach of the British.

Thomas' Tredwell left a will dated the 28th of June, 1779, which was probated the 25th of July, 1781, and recorded in Liber 34 of Wills, page 253, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original document is still on file. It mentions testator's wife Phebe, to whom he bequeathed, among other things, his silver plate; his grandson John Tredwell, son of his son Benjamin, to whom was left, among other things, his silver tankard; his grandsons, Tredwell Jackson and Samuel Jackson; his granddaughter Charity Tredwell, daughter of his son John, and not 18 years of age; his son Benjamin Tredwell, who, with testator's brother-in-law, Benjamin Smith, and friend, Isaac Denton, all of Hempstead, was appointed an executor.

Samuel Tredwell (John, Thomas, John, Edward), baptized in Hempstead, New York, 7th June, 1739, died 20th December, 1803, aged 76 years and 9 months, buried in St. Paul's churchyard, south of the church, town of Eastchester, Westchester county, New York; married, by license, in Hempstead, 20th January, 1750/1, Hannah Sands of Hempstead,* born Cow Neck, present town of North Hempstead, New York, 18th December, 1731,† living 5th February, 1800 (date of husband's will), may be 1821, probably buried near or in same grave with husband, daughter of Edward Sands of Sands' Point, North Hempstead. Until, at least, March, 1749, Tamuel Tredwell resided in town of Hempstead, in 1748, the part called Cow Neck; before June, 1751, moved to northern part of town of Eastchester, dwelling on east side of White Plains road, near junction of road to New Rochelle. He was a carpenter, 1748-1749:‡ in Eastchester, an overseer of roads, 1756 and 1766;§ viewer of damages, 1757-1759, when also of fences; assessor, 1760 and 1765. On the county records he is described as "yeoman."

During the Revolution his dwelling became the headquarters of Lord Howe when the British army lay encamped in the vicinity. In 1836 the homestead was owned by Capt. Joseph Skinner who had married one of Samuel' Tredwell's grand-

daughters.

In 1790 the family of Samuel' Tredwell consisted of 3 males over and 2 males under 16 years of age, 7 white females, and 1 free person.

Samuel' Tredwell left a will dated the 5th of February, 1800, which was probated the 5th of January, 1804, and recorded in Liber F of Wills, page 22, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of Westchester, New York. It recites testator being "in a middling state of health," and mentions his wife Hannah, to whom was left the use of the homestead and 4 acres for life; his son John, to whom was devised his storehouse, mill, and all real estate; his two daughters, Mary Townsend and Phebe Morgan; his grandson, not yet 21, son of his son Edward. His son John Tredwell, John Bennett of Scarsdale, and Jonathan Wood of Eastchester, were named the executors. Letters testamentary were issued to his said son John Tredwell on the 10th of March, 1804.

The inscription on Samuel' Tredwell's headstone is as follows:

"Sacred | to the memory of | Samuel Tredwell | of East Chester formerly of Hempstead | Long Island | who departed this life 20th December | 1804* Aged 76 years and 9 months."

baptized 4th February, 1728,* died 4th August, 1782, buried next north of wife, son of Daniel and Ann (Mott) Kissam.† In his father's will, Daniel Kissam is mentioned as "Joseph," but, after his father's death, he bore the former name, Daniel, as christened. He resided at Manhasset, in the present town of North Hempstead, New York. He was a vestryman of St. George's Church, Hempstead, 1752-1754; justice of the peace under the crown; member of Assembly, 1764-1775; county treasurer, 1759-1782.

On account of his loyalty during the Revolution, his homestead, consisting of 330 acres, was confiscated and sold at auction,

his widow bidding it in for £2,000 sterling.

Both Daniel Kissam and his widow left a will. His testament, dated the 17th of October, 1781, was probated the 28th (13th?) of September, 1782, and recorded in Liber 35 of Wills, page 109, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. Her will was probated the 11th of October, 1813, and recorded in Liber C of Wills, page 292, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of Queens, New York.

was chosen an overseer of highways in Hempstead for years 1773 and 1774.

On the 8th of December, 1747, he entered the following earmark on the Hempstead records, "a Latch the fore Side of the off Eare."

His marriage bond was signed by Benjamin Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and by Benjamin Kissam, Esq., and it recites that the license was obtained by John Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and Peggy Cornell, of same place, spinster.

The father of Peggy (Cornell) Tredwell mentions her only by first name in his will dated the 24th of December, 1763, which was probated the 9th of April, 1764, and recorded in Liber 24 of Wills, page 376, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. In her will dated the 15th of May, 1765, probated the 16th of May, 1769, and recorded in Liber 27 of Wills, page 46, in said Surrogate's office. Sarah Cornell of Hempstead speaks of her granddaughters, Phebe and Sarah Tredwell, the children of her daughter Peggy Tredwell.

John's Tredwell left a will dated the 1st of December, 1779, which was probated the 4th of February, 1780, and recorded in Liber 34 of Wills, page 76, in said Surrogate's office. It mentions testator's wife Margaret, and his children named hereafter, the sons, Thomas and John, receiving the homestead farm on Great Neck. The executors designated were testator's brother Benjamin Tredwell, his brother-in-law William Thorne, and his wife.

The inscriptions on the head-stones marking the graves of John' Tredwell and wife are as follows:

"In | memory of | John Tredwell | who departed this life | Dec. 11th 1779 | Aged 47 years 4 mº & 8 Ds."

"In | memory of | Peggy | wife of John Tredwell | who departed this life | October 12th 1781 | Aged 45 years 4 mos & 6 Days."

Benjamin' Tredwell (Benjamin, Thomas, John, Edward), born 11th May, 1735, baptized in Hempstead, New York, 10th August, 1735, died in town of North Hempstead, New York, Saturday, 19th June, 1830, buried 21st June, in row D, (west of church), Christ's churchyard, Manhasset, Long Island; married by Rev. Samuel Seabury in Hempstead, 7th December, (bond dated 24th November, 1762, to Elizabeth Seabury, born 14th October, 1743, baptized 16th October, 1743, died 7th April, 1818, buried 9th April, ** beside (north) husband, daughter of Rev. Samuel and Elizabeth (Powell) Seabury of Hempstead. Benjamin' Tredwell resided on Great Neck in present town of North Hempstead up to 1764 and, probably, later; then, Westbury, part now East Williston. He was a physician and surgeon.

A power of attorney dated the 19th of November, 1756, from Benjamin' Tredwell "of Great Neck . . . Surgeon" to his father recites, "Whereas I the said Benjamin Tredwell Junior am bound on a Privateering Voyage against the French on board the Ship called the Hercules, commanded by Cap' Sam'l Bayard in the Character of Surgeon . . . I Do Authorize and Impower the Said Benjamin Tredwell in my name and to my Use to Ask Demand Sue for Levy Recover and Receive of and from the Agent or Agents of the said Voyage and Every other person or persons whomsoever into whose hands the same Shall come and be, all and Singular the prize money that shall become Due to me in upon or by reason of the said Cruise or privateering Voyage."†

His marriage bond was signed by Benjamin Tredwell of Queens county, surgeon, and by Benjamin Kissam, Esq., of New York City, and recites that the license was obtained by said Benjamin Tredwell and Elizabeth Seabury of Queens county, spinster.

14th April, 1764, James Hicks and wife, Deborah, conveyed to "Benjamin Tredwell, Junor, of Mad Nans Neck . . . practitioner of Physic" a farm of 513/4 acres and dwelling in the North Woods on road from Success to Cow Neck. !!

27th May, 1766, Benjamin' Tredwell entered the following earmark on the Hempstead records, "a Crop of Each Ear & a slitt in Each Ear."

He was one of the signers from Queens county of the Declaration of loyalty to the King, dated the 21st of October, 1776.*

Michael Rodgers of Hempstead designated Benjamin' Tredwell as one of the executors of his will dated the 5th of April, 1777.† He was, likewise, named by Silas Carman of Oyster Bay, New York, in his will dated the 21st of May, 1783.‡

On Saturday night, the 2nd of August, 1780, while returning with her son Adam from New York City in a chaise, Benjamin' Tredwell's wife was robbed of her horse and personal effects to the value of £30 by some rebels, according to the Rivington Gazette. Dr. Tredwell met with a similar experience at the hands of a party of British Dragoons. Jones' History of New York, volume I, page 114, has an account at length of this affair, in the course of which Dr. Tredwell is spoken of "as warm and steady a Loyalist as ever had an existence."

In the Spring of 1781, Parmenas Jackson was cruelly murdered by three privates from Delancey's Brigade, and Drs. Tredwell and Searing were called in the case.

Among the ancient family papers in the possession of Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell, is an unrecorded deed dated the 7th of May, 1784, from Stephen Titus and wife, Phebe, of Westbury, to Dr. Benjamin Tredwell.

In 1785, Benjamin' Tredwell and three others made a loan to Joshua Carman, Jr., secured by the latter's bond and mortgage upon real property in Beekman's Precinct, Dutchess county, N. Y.

According to the United States census for 1790, Dr. Tredwell's family, that year, comprised 2 males over 16 years of age; 3 males under 16 years; four females; and 13 slaves.

By a deed dated the 1st of May, 1792, Benjamin' Tredwell and wife, Elizabeth, conveyed to David Allen, for £3,000, the homestead farm of 160 acres whereon grantor's father died, reserving the "Burying ground Thereon . . . to be used as and for A Family Burying Ground" and "Road or highway leading from the Said Barn to the Said Landing place."** On the 11th of the same month, an agreement was entered into by the same parties relative to the land thereby conveyed. † The title to the part reserved seems to be still in the descendants of Benjamin' Tredwell.

His account-book, kept from 1776 to 1783, has been preserved among the family papers and is now owned by his great-great-grandson Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell. His case of surgeon's instruments has been deposited in a public museum.

Benjamin Tredwell left a will dated the 21st of September, 1829, which was probated in Queens county, New York, the 30th of August, 1830, and recorded in Liber G of Wills, page 29, in the office of the Surrogate of said county. In it are mentioned his son Benjamin, to whom he left all his real estate; his sons Adam, John, Seabury, George, and grandson Timothy Tredwell; children of his deceased son Samuel; children of his deceased daughter Elizabeth Kissam; his granddaughter Phebe Peggy Kissam, the representative of her deceased mother, Phebe Allen; his son-in-law, William Allen. Among the family papers have been preserved many of the receipts given by those receiving a share of his estate.

Following are the inscriptions on the headstones marking the graves of Benjamin' Tredwell and wife:

"In Memory of | Doct. Benjamin Tredwell | departed this Life | June 19, 1830 | aged 95 years | 1 month 8 days."

"In Memory | of | Elizabeth Tredwell | wife of Doct. Benjamin Tredwell | departed this life | April 7th, 1818 | in the 75th year of her age."

She was said to have been "a woman much beloved and remarkable for her hospitality."

The obituary notice of Benjamin' Tredwell in the Long Island Telegraph and General Advertiser, issue of the 24th of June, 1830, is, in part, as follows:*

"Such is said to have been the esteem and confidence of the community in this aged Physician, that to the last, he retained a large portion of the practice in the neighborhood where he resided."

Family tradition says that at the birth of each of his children Dr. Tredwell planted an evergreen tree in front of his house. A majority of these trees, now aged, are still standing. His old dwelling, greatly enlarged a few years ago, is now owned and occupied by his great-great-grandson, Henry Hewlett Tredwell. It is filled with many heirlooms, old furniture, books, papers and cabinets containing curios and mementos of former days gathered here and abroad, while the walls are covered with prizes won at early county fairs and elsewhere.

The descendants of Benjamin' and Elizabeth (Seabury) Tredwell are eligible to membership in the Society of Mayflower Descendants and also in the Huguenot Society.

Susannah (Hewlett) Tredwell was married, secondly, in Hempstead, by Rev. Thomas L. Moore, 14th May, 1787, to Daniel Stevenson of North Hempstead.

Samuel' Tredwell resided at Success, town of North Hempstead. It is not known where he was buried. He was a farmer;

chosen overseer of highways, 1769 and 1770.*

The marriage bond, signed by Samuel Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and Samuel Kissam of same county, physician, recites that the license was obtained by said Samuel Tredwell and Susannah Hewlett of Queens county, spinster.

On Christmas day, 1766, Samuel' Tredwell entered his earmark on the Hempstead town book as follows, "a slope the

fore side the near ear & a hole in same."

21st May, 1768, James Cornell and wife, Margaret, of Hempstead, conveyed to Samuel' Tredwell 140 acre farm and dwelling (particularly described) at Success, Dutch Church, lane, and burying ground excepted; also land adjoining the Great Pond used for a whitening yard, smoke-house, cider mill and mill house; also 6 acres at Hungry Harbor; and the patent right in Hempstead the said grantor purchased of James Smith, late of Dutchess county.

Samuel' Tredwell's Bible was, a few years ago, in the possession of his great-grandson, William Tredwell Van Nostrand. On one of the pages is written, "Samuel Tredwell his Book, given him by his mother Sarah Tredwell."

Samuel Tredwell left a will dated the 28th of August, 1781, which was probated the 20th of June, 1782, and recorded in Liber 35 of Wills, page 30, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original remains on file. His will, made while he was "sick and weak in body," mentions his son William, to whom was devised testator's real estate; his wife (name not given); his daughters Elizabeth and Susannah. His father-in-law Benjamin Hewlett, his brother Benjamin Tredwell, and his brother-in-law Uriah Platt were named the executors.

It was probably Samuel Tredwell's widow who, in 1787, was allowed £,3 for taking care of an Indian woman.

According to the record of a satisfaction of a mortgage in the office of the clerk of the county of Queens, New York, the name of Susannah (Hewlett) Tredwell's second husband was spelled Stevenson, but, in Samuel Tredwell's Bible and on her gravestone, this name is spelled Stephenson. In 1897, the gravestones in the cemetery where she was buried, were levelled and covered over, and the place was turned into a park. One of these

stones was in memory of "Susannah Stephenson, wife of Daniel Stephenson, who died 4th July, 1808, aged 64 years and 5 months."* Her son Henry Tredwell Stevenson was baptized in North Hempstead, 20th of February, 1788.†

The Revolution compelled him to flee from Long Island to Goshen, Orange county, New York. On 8th of April, 1780, he petitioned for permission to return to Long Island, on the ground that his brother had lately died and his father was ill.

days later, Col. Isaac Nicol! and Henry Wisner wrote from Goshen to Gov. Clinton in behalf of the petition, Wisner stating that he was Tredwell's neighbor.* And on the 10th of the following November, Wisner wrote again, this time in behalf of Mrs. Tredwell going to New York City and thence to Long Island.

In 1783, George Carr mortgaged certain real property in Orange county, New York, to William' Tredwell "of Great Neck, Queens county, gentleman." The records in that county also show a mortgage from Stephen Gilbert to him; \$ and in 1788, as one of the executors of his father-in-law's will, his name again appears thereon as a mortgagee. This will is dated the 29th of November, 1783, and was probated in New York county on the 23rd of October, 1786.

On the records in the office of the Register of Deeds for the county of New York is a copy of a deed dated the 2nd of October, 1784, from John Leary to William Tredwell "of New York City, merchant," conveying a lot, 26 x 110 feet, on south side of Cortlandt street, in the West Ward of said city.** This lot William. Tredwell, in 1793, conveyed to George Gosman. ††

According to the United States census taken in 1790 (printed), the household of William' Tredwell comprised 2 males over 16 years of age; 1 male under 16 years; 3 white females; and 6 slaves.

Mrs. Alfred T. Slausson of Plainfield, N. J., now owns the William' Tredwell Bible. It was printed in 1766, and in it are entered the dates of birth and death of himself, wife and children, as well as of the birth of his father and the latter's family.

Subsequently Samuel' Tredwell married Dorothy Anderson "of Queens county, spinster" (marriage bondt dated 8th October, 1762, signed by Joseph Bull of New York City, shopkeeper, and James Breasted of same place, merchant, states that license was obtained by "Samuel Treddle of Westchester county, farmer"), living 22nd September, 1820. Samuel' Tredwell resided in town of Rye (part now town of Harrisons), New York, the homestead, consisting of 200 acres, being on east side of road from Rye through Harrisons. He was a farmer; Captain of Troop, mentioned on the rolls, dated 21st February, 1776, as Captain from Harrisons' Purchase of a cavalry company in the 2nd regiment, Westchester county, Thomas Thomas, Colonel; § vestryman of Christ's Church in Rye, 1770. On the public records he is styled "yeoman," "Esq.," "gentleman."

His commission as Captain of Troop of Horse in Westchester county, James Van Cortlandt, Colonel, dated the 15th of June, 1772, was (1890) among the family papers possessed by the widow of his great-grandson Joseph Augustus Tredwell. Other original

papers consisted principally of bonds and receipts.

In 1780, Samuel' Tredwell let for one year two rooms and an upper chamber in his dwelling to Lewis Jacobs of Saw Pitts,

Harrisons' Township.

For some reason, Samuel⁵ Tredwell became unable to pay his debts, so, on the 10th of February, 1787, he gave a bill of sale of his slaves and household chattels as security to a William Anderson, and on the 5th of November, 1788, his mother bound herself to give him £400. Soon afterwards he quitclaimed his interest in his 200 acre farm in Harrisons to Thomas Burling. above mentioned bill of sale was held by William Anderson at

the time of his death, and he bequeathed the same in his will (dated 26th January, 1796, codicil 20th November, 1801,) to Jonathan Anderson of Province of Nova Scotia, Jeremiah Anderson, and William Anderson, both of town of Harrisons, who assigned their rights therein to Dorothy Tredwell, widow of Samuel' Tredwell.

In the office of the Register of Deeds for Westchester county, New York, are records of several mortgages from Samuel' Tredwell,* besides conveyances.

In the list of confiscated estates mentioned in the Supplement (page 258) to New York in the Revolution is the name of a Samuel Tredwell. This is probably Samuel Tredwell of Harrisons. The loss of his property might explain his financial troubles in late life.

The United States census for 1790 shows that his family then consisted of 5 males over 16 years of age; 1 white female; and 4 slaves.

In January, 1795, he brought suit in the New York Supreme Court against Benjamin Stevenson for trespass on the case.†

His widow, Dorothy, conveyed to Jesse Park, Jr., ½ interest in certain islands nearly opposite Byram Point in Connecticut, by deed dated the 26th of July, and acknowledged the 22nd of September, 1820.‡

He was a signer of Articles of Association at Smithtown, 1775; delegate to the four Provincial Congresses (New York), 1775-1777;

member New York Assembly, 1777-1783; Council of Safety, while New York State Constitution was being organized, 1777, being last surviving member thereof; member State Senate, 1786-1789, 1804-1807; delegate to State convention to ratify United States Constitution, voting against ratification; representative in Congress for Kings, Queens and Suffolk counties, 1791-1795; delegate from Clinton and Essex counties to State Constitutional Convention, 1801; judge (first) of Court of Probate, 1778-1787, when made surrogate of Suffolk county, serving until 1791; surrogate of Clinton county, 1807-1831; also of Essex county, 1807.

The marriage bond was signed by Thomas Tredwell of Suffolk county, yeoman, and Joseph Hallett of City of New York, iron monger, and states that the marriage license was obtained by said Tredwell and Ann Hazard of City of New York, spinster.

According to the census of Suffolk county taken in 1776, the household of Thomas' Tredwell consisted of 1 male over 16 and under 50 years of age; 2 males under 16 years; 2 females over and 4 females under 16 years; 6 male and 6 female negroes.*

While living at Smithtown, his wife Ann was stricken with paralysis. Upon the occupation of Long Island by the British during the Revolution, Thomas' Tredwell was obliged to abandon his home there and seek safety in Connecticut.

His mansion at Beekmantown was only a few rods from the bay which it faced. In 1812, the English forces passed through his farm. After his decease, the homestead was sold to Abram Miller; and in 1870, or 1871, the dwelling was taken down and its timbers used in another building. Several of the inside panels were saved and upon them a coat-of-arms with the Treadwell name have been carved. No authentic record, however, has been found of any grant of a coat-of-arms to this family.

Some forty slaves accompanied the family to their new home in Clinton county. These subsequently were emancipated and colonized by Judge Tredwell on the high ground a few miles northwest called "Richland," now known as "Dudy" or "Nigger Hill."

12th July, 1788, letters of administration were issued in Ulster county. New York, to Thomas' Tredwell on the estate of his brother-in-law, Samuel Hazard.

According to the United States census for 1790 (printed), Judge Tredwell's family consisted of 1 male over 16 and 1 under 16 years of age; 5 females; and 12 slaves.

He was very fond of horseback riding, even in late life. Once, when riding through woods, his left eye was pierced by a twig, which destroyed the sight thereof. An oil portrait of Judge Tredwell was, a few years ago, in the possession of his grand-daughter, Mrs. Anna Maria Redfield; and several letters from him and his daughters have been preserved and are now owned by Mrs. Charles Hilton Brown of the City of New York.

The Hempstead Inquirer for 2nd February, 1832, contains an obituary notice of "Hon. Thomas Tredwell," and quotes a long

account of his life taken from the Plattsburgh Republican.

About 1/4 mile back from the lake and a few rods East of the state road, on the old homestead at Beekmantown, lies the small family burial ground containing five inscribed stones. Near the grave of her former master was buried "Old Phillis."

The following are said to be the inscriptions on the headstones. marking the graves of Judge Tredwell and his first wife:

"Sacred to the memory of the Hon. Thomas Tredwell who departed this life Dec. 30, 1831, aged 87."

"Sacred to the memory of Mrs. Ann Tredwell, wife of Hon. Thomas Tredwell, who departed this life, Jan. 5, 1798, aged 56 years."
