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EXPLANATION

A casual observation will show the reader that the contents of this work are arranged by generations; viz., Richard, the FIRST, and from that in regular succession to the ELEVENTH generation. In each case, to show the descent, the number of the generation in small figures follows the name, as, Richard,¹ John,² Phineas,³ Abraham,⁴ Elijah,⁵ Ezra,⁶ Abraham,⁷ Achatias Cornelius,⁸ Thomas Alvin,⁹ page 235, where this example appears in reverse order. A number also precedes the name of each Towner descendant, which number is permanent, and accompanies the person throughout the book, so that by observing this number any descent is easily traced either forward or backward.

FOREWORD

TO compile the Genealogy of a stock or family, even for a couple of hundred years, is by no means an easy task. Especially is this the case when there has been no systematic attempt to make and preserve a record of the family during the time covered by the history. In 1880 on visiting my birthplace after forty years' absence, I became interested in the Towner genealogy. Then I had not seen and knew nothing of any one of the name of Towner, except my paternal grandfather, and the families of my father, and of his only brother, Eneas; though I was then fifty-seven years old, and had lived in the states of New York, Ohio and Iowa, and had been in the army over four years during the civil war.

Yet, strange as it may seem, my great-grandfather (see No. 39) Zacheus, had lived for some years and had died in Charlotte, Vt., within ten miles of where I was born, but on the opposite side of Lake Champlain. In 1838 my father with his family began moving West, finally in 1864 bringing up in Michigan. When a lad I knew of his visiting the widow of his uncle Erasmus in Vermont, and heard him speak of some of his cousins. His grandfather (39) Zacheus spent most of his life in New Fairfield, Conn., and the only thing I remember his (my father) saying of his ancestry is that his grandfather was a native of Ireland and that he emigrated to Connecticut before the Revolution.

In 1880 I went to Charlotte and there in an old cemetery I found a gravestone which showed that Zacheus was not an emigrant from Ireland, but was born in Connecticut in 1729; and following some clews obtained, down into Connecticut, I learned that his father was Samuel (see No. 7) and his (Zacheus') birthplace the town of Wallingford and county of New Haven. I heard there were Towners still living in Branford and went there and in the town records found that Samuel was the youngest son of Richard, our first ancestor in America, as herein set forth. Within the next two years I visited Oxford, Haddam, Killingworth, Westbrook, Goshen, New Fairfield, and other places in Conn. and N. Y., whither Richard's descendants had scattered, and searched town and church records, also the Colonial records in the State libraries, with the results herein given.

At first my thought was to write the Genealogy of Samuel and his family only, but when I had done this, my research had brought me so much material as to Richard, Jr., John, and Benjamin and their descendants, that I decided to compile the whole from Richard, Sr., down; and this has been done, and the latest facts obtainable even to this year are included. See note A, page 241. Many who could give information have failed to respond, and lenient judgment is craved for all such deficiencies or imperfections. Other Towners have been found who cannot be connected with Richard and his stock; some in Ohio, Illinois, Colorado, New Mexico, Iowa and Kansas; quite a number in the cities of New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Cleveland; many of whom have come into the country since 1840 from the neighborhood of

Brighton, England; and as to all of whom the author has much information which is not given in this book.

Hoping that reasonable satisfaction will be found in his work, he now commends it to his friends and patrons.

FIRST GENERATION IN AMERICA.

1 RICHARD TOWNER SETTLED IN THE TOWN OF GUILFORD, CONN., on or about Feb. 17, 1686. There is a grant of land of that date on the record of the town meetings at page 105, though the grant was not put on the land records till May 2, 1712, when the town ordered it to be recorded as ten acres "formerly granted to Richard Towner, now living in Branford," marked at the corners by stones graven with the letters "R. T." He lived in Guilford some three years and then removed to Branford, where there is a record of him in 1689. From whence he emigrated to this country has not been ascertained with certainty, but probably from Sussex Co., England. The family has been there for generations, and nowhere else. Some others of the name have come from that locality during the period from 1830 to 1850 to N. Y. City, and others are yet in Sussex.

In the southeast part of Branford there is a swamp, and at the beach a cave in the rocks, which have long been known as "Towner's Swamp" and "Towner's Cave." The grant made to him in Guilford apparently includes this swamp, and it is conjectured that for some reason he lived for awhile in this cave, but he first settled on "Towner's Hill," and the following year built a house at a place three miles east known as "Short Rocks" and put

down a well; and traces of the cellar wall of the house and of the well are still to be seen there, and are identified by descendants of his living in Branford.

A tradition related in the towns of Oxford, Haddam and Killingworth, Conn., by descendants of Richard, is that he was impressed into the British navy from the Isle of Man, and that after some years' service on the American coast, he was put ashore at Savannah, Ga., to die of yellow fever; but recovered and married his nurse, and with her went to Charleston, S. C., and engaged in the grocery business; that afterwards to escape a threatened bombardment by a Spanish man-of-war, he and others, provisioning a small vessel from his store, sailed for the North and landed on the shore of Connecticut, settling at Branford..

In Bradford Co., Pa., a tradition exists among the descendants of Elijah, who settled in that county, that five brothers came together from England; that two of them, Richard and Abraham, settled in Connecticut, and the others, Gershom, Enoch and Daniel, in Steuben Co., N. Y., Nova Scotia, and Virginia, respectively. There is reason for believing that this tradition has foundation in fact except as to Abraham.

Richard and Abraham could not have been brothers. Abraham was born 75 to 80 years later than Richard, and very likely was his great-grandson. (See Phineas Towner, son of John, 2nd son of Richard; page 23.

The writer notes these traditions for the reason that, like folk-lore in general, they furnish much ground for believing that the different branches of the family throughout the country are descended from the same stock.

The date of Richard's birth is unknown. However, in his will, made in 1725, he speaks of himself as "aged and weak in body," and his birth was probably 1650-55 or earlier. Neither is the name of his first wife certainly known, but there is a Mary Towner on the church record who likely was his wife; in the will, his wife is called Deborah, but she was a second wife, Deborah Crane, whom he married in Haddam Mar. 6, 1716-17, O. S.

The original town records of Branford still exist and are well preserved. In Vol. 2, at page 56, of date May 27, 1689, is the following:

"The town have given to Richard Towner twelve acres of land lying upon the hill that is situated eastward from the brook that is called Beaver brook and lying eastward from the highway that runs by Thomas and Nath'l Harrison's feild unto Jno. Butler and John Swain's feild near the head of the furnace pond, which twelve acres is granted with this proviso, that he, the said Richard Towner, do build a tenantable house upon that land and settle upon it within six years from the date hereof, otherwise to returne to the towne againe, and Mr. Wm. Maltbye, John ffrissbe and John Butler are apoynted to lay it out." The location is now known as "Towner's Hill," before mentioned.

At page 62, dated Apr. 8, 1690, is this: "The Towne haue agreed to exchange land with Richard Towner, viz., the towne haue given unto him 14 acres of land joyning or near the land of Bartholomew Goodrich lying upon the old mill brook, provided he do relinquish and resigne up unto the towne, the twelve acres the towne formerly granted to him, neer Thomas and Nath'l Harrison's

feild—always provided that he do build upon and improve it according to the former Injunction upon the first grant and Jo: n ffrissbe, Bartholomew Goodrich and John Butler are appointed to lay out the above 14 acres.”

He became a landowner also in Haddam, one of his sons, Benjamin, having settled there. In the town records of Haddam is a deed from Richard Towner of Branford “to my son Benjamin Towner of Haddam.” Consideration, £30; date, Dec. 31, 1723.

In 1724 he made a deed which says, among other things, “I, Richard Towner, senior, of the town of Branford, county of N. Haven & Collony of Connecticut in New England, for divers good considerations & especially for & in consideration of a bond now given to secure my subsistence during my natural life have given, granted—* * * * to my son Richard Towner of town and county aforesaid, all my lands * * * in the township of Branford aforesaid,” etc., etc., with the usual covenants and warranties of a deed in fee simple of those days. The attestation is as follows: “In confirmation of all and every part of ye above Instrument, I have hereto set my hand and affixed my seal, this first day of May in the tenth year of the reign of our Sovereigne Lord George of Great Britain, King, defender of the faith, &c. Annoque Domini 1724.” This deed has been preserved and is in the possession of the writer hereof. In 1882, he found it in the hands of Harriet Towner, of Branford, a descendant of Richard, Jr.,² who kindly gave it to him. It is very well written and legible.

He must have been a man of some dignity of character and entitled to respect, for at a Branford town meeting,

Nov. 2, 1692, the selectmen were instructed "to desire Richard Towner to have the oversight of the youth to keep them from playing during the exercises of worship."

The Branford record of births, deaths, etc., says: "Richard Towner, Sen'r, departed this life, August 22nd, 1727."

He had nine children. The dates of their births and deaths cannot all be given with certainty. The three first likely born in England. The record of baptisms is an indication that they were born in the order named in it, which is this: "March, 1700, (baptism), Richard, Sarah, John, Joseph, Benjamin, Samuel and Hannah Towner."

2 Richard,² Jr., m. Elizabeth Tyler, Branford, Sept. 28, 1720; d. Branford, Feb. 28, 1753.

3 Sarah,² m. 1st, Samuel Frost of Branford, Aug. 8, 1706; 2nd, Henry Cook in 1690, of Litchfield. He was one of the three first settlers in Plymouth, Conn.

4 John,² d. in Derby, Conn., some time after 1741.

5 Joseph,² b. in Guilford; d. in Derby, Conn., 1725 or thereabout.

6 Benjamin,² b. Guilford, 1688; d. in Killingworth, Conn., Jan. 9, 1761; his gravestone was standing there in 1882, a valuable find.

7 Samuel,² b. in Branford, 1692; m. Rebecca Barns of North Haven, Conn., Jan. 25, 1716, and 2nd, Amy Ward, daughter of Capt. William Ward of Wallingford, Conn.; d. about 1785, Goshen, Conn., though some of his descendants say at Patterson, N. Y., where his son Samuel settled.

8 Hannah,² b. Branford; the church records in Branford show that she became a member in 1713; m. — Hitt; d. 1759.

9 Mary,² b. Branford; m. Samuel Tyler, Branford, Oct. 22, 1713; no record of death.

10 Thankful,² b. Branford; bap. 1701; d. 1758; unm.

Richard Towner's will, made May 6, 1725, was probated in Guilford, Conn., Sept. 30, 1727. In it these children are all mentioned with portions given, except to Joseph. Of him he says, like Jacob of old, "And Joseph is not." Richard was a husbandman and also worked at ship carpentry, and evidently well to do; his estate amounting to at least £140, which was three times the average fortune for those days.

SECOND GENERATION.

2 RICHARD² TOWNER, (Richard¹) was likely born in England, the baptismal record made in Branford, 1700, (see Richard, 1st) of seven children, names him first, and his birth must have been about 1680-5; he married in Branford, Elizabeth Tyler, Sept. 28, 1720. In a deed recorded in Branford town records, dated Feb. 6, 1720-21, O. S., given by him to Samuel, "his brother," he is described as "a husbandman." Several deeds to him are on record between 1712 and 1737, from which it appears he was a man of thrift. A great-grandchild of his, Harriet Towner, living in Branford in 1882, had some of these ancient deeds in her possession, and gave the writer several. He died in Branford, Feb. 28, 1753, and his wife died May 11, 1778. His children were:

11 Jonathan,³ b. Branford, Nov. 16, 1721; d. there, Apr. 19, 1804.

12 Sarah,³ b. Branford, Nov. 29, 1723; d. there, after 1776, date not known.

13 Jacob,³ b. Branford, Mar. 29, 1726; d. there, after 1776, date not known.

14 Richard,³ b. Branford, Oct. 9, 1730; d. there June, 1772.

15 Mercy,³ b. Branford, Jan. 4, 1733; was twice married; 1st to John Robbins, 2nd to Uzziel Cook, both of Branford; nothing further can be learned.

4 JOHN² TOWNER, (Richard¹) was likely born in England about 1685, there being a baptismal record

in Branford, of the baptism in 1700, of Richard's children, to-wit: "Richard, Sarah, John, Joseph, Benjamin, Samuel, and Hannah Towner."

John went to the part of Derby township which afterwards became Oxford and there settled. He was there in 1718, and was rated on the tax list at 48 pounds sterling.

In Vol. 8, p. 394, Colonial Records, it is stated that "John Towner in 1741 was in the northwest part of Derby, then called Derby Woods." His name is signed to a petition for "society privileges," which was presented to the General Court of Conn. in 1740 and which is on file in the state library at Hartford.

He married Jane French in Derby, Aug. 13, 1707. She died May 4, 1759. He had the following children:

16 Phineas,³ b. Derby, 1708; in 1763 was on Phillips Patent, N. Y.

17 Elizabeth,³ b. Derby, Mar. 23, 1710; m. Samuel Bronson.

18 Joseph,³ b. Derby, Apr. 22, 1712; m. Abigail Bissell.

19 John,³ b. Derby, Jan. 29, 1714; m. Sarah Wildman.

20 Martha Eunice,³ b. Derby; m. Israel Curtis.

21 22 There were two other daughters, Rebecca³ and Jane³; both died unmarried.

5 JOSEPH² TOWNER, (Richard¹) b. in Branford, Conn. (See baptismal record above); with his brother John he went to Derby and settled, but does not appear to have married; in his father's will made May 6th, 1725, and which was admitted to probate in Guilford, Sept. 27, 1727, there is this clause: "and Joseph is not." There are provisions in this will for Richard's widow, Deborah,

and for all the other sons and daughters, which facts naturally lead to the conclusion that Joseph was then deceased.

6 BENJAMIN² TOWNER, (Richard¹) was born in Branford, Conn., in 1688; prior to 1719, he went to Haddam, Conn. His father conveyed land to him in that town in 1716, and 1723, and the deeds say "to my son Benjamin Towner." He was one of the 100 original proprietors of the town, his name standing 21st on the recorded list. Land was set off to him by the town in 1719, and 1722, 35 acres. He purchased other lands afterwards on several occasions and appears to have acquired much property. In 1727, he was appointed executor of his father's will which was probated in Guilford. He married in Haddam, Abia Shaler. He lived in Haddam till 1738 and then moved to Killingworth, where his wife, Abia, joined the church by letter from Haddam, and where they resided, save for a few of the later years which they spent in Saybrook, till he died Jan. 9, 1761, 73 years of age. His gravestone was standing in 1882, in the burial ground of Killingworth and was seen by the writer. His children were as follows:

23 Jerusha,³ b. Oct. 17, 1720, in Haddam; d. Apr. 18, 1797.

24 Benjamin, Jr.,³ b. 1721; in 1747, a deed from his father says: "to my eldest son."

25 Daniel,³ b. 1723; a deed to him, 1747, says: "to my second son;" he died Apr. 4, 1809, aged 86.

26 Sarah,³ m. Abraham Pierson, of Killingworth.

27 Timothy,³ deed to him in 1752, from father, says: "to my 3rd son."

28 Abraham,³ b. July 1, 1732; deed, 1752, from father, says: "to my 4th son."

29 Lydia,³ m. ——— Stillman, of Middletown, Conn.

30 Thankful,³ m. Beaman, of Saybrook.

31 Samuel,³ named in his father's will as his 5th son; we have no more.

32 Nathaniel,³ (See page 29 for more about him).

33 Mary,³ m. ——— Bell, of Haddam.

34 Ruth,³ d. in 1762, in Killingworth, unm.

Such other information as can be given as to any of these children will be given hereafter under their respective names.

7 SAMUEL² TOWNER, (Richard¹) b. in Branford, Conn., the exact date not being shown. He married Rebecca Barnes, Jan. 25, 1716, who was born at North Haven, Conn., Dec. 12, 1691, and who was a granddaughter of Thomas Barnes, of East Haven, Conn., who was one of the signers of the constitution of the colony of Connecticut in 1644. Samuel had by her five children; she died at Wallingford, Conn., Jan. 31, 1728. He married again, June 27, 1728, Amy Ward, daughter of Capt. William Ward, of Wallingford.

The Branford town records show that he became a proprietor of lands there, Feb. 6, 1717, and afterwards owned much realty. Deeds of exchange between him and Richard Towner, Jr., describe them as brothers. The writer has an original deed from Samuel to Richard, dated Feb. 6, 1720-21, O. S. Samuel lived in Branford and Wallingford, Conn., till about 1731, when he moved to Waterbury, Conn., and settled in the part now called Watertown, and moved the next year into the part now

Plymouth, where he lived till 1738. During this period his name appears several times on petitions for "winter privileges," i. e., the privilege of hiring a minister during the winter months, by reason of the petitioners living so far from the center of the town, 9 or 10 miles, and at the same time have exemption from paying parish rates to the church at the center, which rates all were in those times required to pay, to support the minister. In the "List of Polls and ratable Estates" of Waterbury, for the year 1737, his name appears, rated at £88. In 1737, he purchased at public sale at New Haven, one of the original town rights of the town of Goshen, Conn., being one fifty-third part of the same. The sale was on condition that he should build a house (there were 200 acres), fence six acres and reside thereon three years. At a proprietor's meeting, in Feb., 1741, he was made one of a committee "to take care of and adjust ye proprietors' affairs," and one of the five selectmen who organized the town.

He appears to have acquired property in Newtown, for in 1750 he sold real estate there for £2000, a large sum for that time, and moved to New Fairfield, and afterwards, about 1762, went with his family, except some of the older children, to Dutchess county, N. Y., and lived in the town of Patterson, now a part of Putnam Co. In 1766, his name appears in a list of the tenants on "Phillips Patent." No record of the date or place of his death has been found. One of his grandsons, John Towner, told his son Samuel, from whom the writer, in 1882, got the account, that he (John) remembered his grandfather living in Patterson in 1785, and that in 1786-7 he moved again back to Goshen, but considering his great age (about 95) this seems quite doubtful.

He had a large family, and the dates and places of the birth and death of his children are here given with substantial accuracy. By his first wife he had:

36 Samuel,² b. Branford, about 1720-1. A deed was recorded, in 1742, in Waterbury, made by Samuel Towner of Goshen, to his beloved son, Samuel, of Waterbury. No other record of him has been found, and he probably died soon after.

37 David,² b. Wallingford, March 3rd, 1724; d. New Fairfield, Conn., 1772.

38 Ephraim,² b. Wallingford, Nov. 8, 1727; d. Goshen, Conn., Dec. 25, 1760.

By second wife he had:

THIRD GENERATION.

11 JONATHAN³ TOWNER, (Richard,² Richard¹) was born in Branford, Conn., Nov. 16, 1721, and married there Mary Darrow, Nov. 10, 1743. He spent his life in Branford and appears by the property records to have been a man of considerable substance. His name appears in a recorded list of those who took the oath of fidelity in 1781. He died Apr. 19, 1804, and his wife died Feb. 15, 1806.

12 SARAH³ TOWNER, (Richard,² Richard¹) was born in Branford, Conn., Nov. 29, 1723, and married there Jan. 17, 1756, Abel Page, a farmer and considerable landholder. They were both living as late as 1776, which ap-

pears from deed record, but date of decease is not known. They had children, three at least:

13 JACOB³ TOWNER, (Richard,² Richard¹) born in Branford, Conn., Mar. 29, 1726; he married there, wife's first name was Diana; he was living there as late at 1776, but the date of death is not obtainable, the record being unusually deficient. He had eight children:

14 RICHARD³ TOWNER, (Richard,² Richard¹) was born in Branford, Conn., Oct. 9, 1730, and married June 2, 1763, Bathsheba Goodrich, of North Haven, Conn. Little can be gathered of his life beyond the fact that he enlisted in the British army in the French and Indian War, in which he contracted pneumonia, and died in June, 1772. His children were:

69 Mercy,⁴ b. Branford, May, 1764.

70 Samuel,⁴ b. Branford, Nov. 2, 1766; young as he was, he served in the patriot forces in the latter part of the Revolution, and died soon after, unmarried.

71 Abigail,⁴ b. Branford, 1768; married a man named

Bull; had two children, who afterward lived in Warren, Conn., where she died, in 1830.

72 Orphan^y,⁴ b. Branford, Sept. 17, 1772; d. in Woodbury, in 1876.

16 PHINEAS³ TOWNER, (John,² Richard¹) was born in Derby, Conn., in the year 1708, Apr. 28; in 1732 he was a land owner in Waterbury, and in 1737 moved with his wife, Eunice, to New Milford; when he was married, or what was her surname, cannot be stated; from the record of a deed there it appears that he sold land in 1738, the deed stating that he had moved to Danbury. There he lived till about 1763, in which year he was at Fredericksburg, Phillips Patent, now Patterson, Putnam Co., N. Y. The record shows that his uncle, Samuel, 5th son of Richard, was there with him, on leased land. This fixes his identity, but he cannot be traced afterwards. The records of Danbury were mostly destroyed when the British burned the town in 1776, which makes it difficult to get information of him or his family. But there is little, if any, reason to doubt that he was father of Abraham, called "Abraham of Danbury," both being mentioned in the records which remain, and no other Towners, except Eunice Towner, who married, 1772, William Combs, and who was likely daughter of Phineas.

A clear and well-defined tradition exists with the descendants of Elijah Towner, son of "Abraham of Danbury," who settled in Bradford Co., Pa., in 1794-5, that Abraham had three brothers and a sister, and this tradition is no doubt pretty well founded. From this the children of Phineas were:

73 Abraham,⁴ b. about 1729-30, probably in Waterbury; d. Danbury, 1760.

74 Gershom,⁴ who settled in Steuben Co., N. Y.

75 Enoch,⁴ who went to Nova Scotia and lived and died there, unm., and is said to have acquired large wealth, which was confiscated by the government.

32 NATHANIEL³ TOWNER, (Benjamin,² Richard¹) was born in Haddam, Conn., about 1739-40; was there as late as 1766, when he sold and conveyed lands there, which he had from his father's estate, and went to New Milford, Conn., and married there Sarah Bennett, daughter of Benjamin Bennett of New Fairfield, and where he resided and bought and sold numerous tracts of land, some of them being in Brookfield, Newbury and Woodbury. His name appears in the census of 1790, in Brookfield, and on other records as late as 1792, and so his wife's. He was called Dr. Nathaniel Towner, and whether an M.D. or D.D. is not certain, but the latter is slightly

indicated. The census of 1790 shows that then there was in his family one male and two females under 16 years of age.

35 PHEBE³ TOWNER, (Samuel,² Richard¹) born in Branford, Conn., Sept. 14, 1717; when her father moved to Goshen, it seems likely she went with him; she married there Arah Ward, Aug. 13, 1740. They afterwards moved to Waterbury. From the records of Wallingford, it appears that Capt. William Ward had a son named Arah, born July 15, 1718, whom Phebe married. He was a Tory and died in Albany, a prisoner. He was a mill builder and wealthy. They had two children, 131 Diantha⁴ Ward, b. Waterbury; 131½ Eunice Ward,⁴ b. Goshen, Aug. 9, 1741.

38 EPHRAIM³ TOWNER, (Samuel,² Richard¹) born in Wallingford, Conn., Nov. 8, 1727. He married in Goshen, Oct. 3, 1750, Sarah Willcox, and died there, Dec. 25, 1760. In a record of the early settlers of that town, made by Dea. Norton of Goshen, Ephraim Towner is highly spoken of, and said to be "a clever, steady man." He became a land proprietor in 1750. His widow lived to the age of 90 years, and died in Lexington, Green Co., N. Y., whither she moved with her son, Elijah, in 1805. So said Reuben Towner, third son of Elijah, in 1882, who was then living in Greene Co. Theron W. Towner, great-grandson of Ephraim, doubted his (Ephraim's) being grandson of Richard of Branford and desired, if possible, record evidence thereof, and made research on the point, and succeeded in finding a town record in Wallingford, Conn., which showed him to be a son of Samuel, by

his first wife, Rebecca, as above stated. And to him (The-ron W.) the writer is indebted for many corrections and additions set down herein. Ephraim's children were:

The following from the church records of the North Society of that town, furnish all the information of him and his family that has been obtained:

"May 23, 1752, Mary Towner, wife of David Towner, was admitted a member by letter from the Church of Christ in Durham."

137 "Bap. Jan. 19, 1753, Mary,⁴ dau. of David Towner." She married Reuben Crane, New Fairfield, Jan. 26, 1773. No children.

39 ZACHEUS³ TOWNER, (Samuel,² Richard¹) was born in Wallingford, Conn., March 3, 1729, and married in New Fairfield, Conn., Sarah Vaughn, 1755, daughter of Dr. Benj. Vaughn, and lived in the northern part, now the town of Sherman. The locality where he and Capt. Dan Towner resided is elevated, and still called "Towner's Hill." He represented New Fairfield in the General Assembly in the years 1771-2, 1774, and again in 1790-1. He was an ardent patriot in the revolutionary times, and came into sharp conflict by reason thereof with some of his relatives, especially with two nephews, Benjamin and Wait Vaughn, sons of his sister Rebecca, who were as ardently on the Tory side. But after peace came, reconciliation took place between them. In 1793 he moved to Charlotte, Vt., where he died Feb. 14, 1814. In 1882 his gravestone was still standing. His wife also died there, Sept. 6, 1806, aged 78 years. His occupation was principally surveying, for which he had good reputation abroad; the State of New York employing him to survey the region about Lake George. He took great pains for the education of his children, and four of his sons graduated in medicine. His children were:

40 DAN³ TOWNER, (Samuel,² Richard¹) was born in Wallingford, Conn., Mar. 25, 1731; married Marcia or Mercy Barnes; when or where does not appear, but on a church record in New Fairfield, Conn., is this: "Lord's Day, June 25, 1756. Then Mary, wife of Capt. Dan Towner, made a Public Profession of 'ligion' and was admitted a member of this Church." Whether this was a second wife, or a mistake was made in her given name, cannot be told. He went from Goshen to New Fairfield before 1752, and resided in the part of the town now named Sherman. Was ensign in 1756, made so by the General Assembly. He was a man of positive influence, representing New Fairfield in the Legislature in the years 1766-7-8 and 1775. He served in the Patriot forces in the revolution with the rank of captain, and was one of the sufferers from poison at Horse Neck, where it was alleged the British poisoned the wells. His recovery was for a long time doubtful and it was due to the great care and devotion of his wife that he was saved. He was much beloved in New Fairfield; later in life he moved to

New Milford, Conn., where he died in 1796. His wife died in Sherman in 1806. None of his descendants have survived. They were:

In 1763 he was living on Phillips Patent with his father; was in the French war, sergt. of company. One of his descendants says that he moved to Vermont; another that he went to Crown Point, N. Y., and owned a large property there. On the breaking out of the war of revolution he remained loyal to the Crown, and for this his property was confiscated and he was seized by the "Continentalists" and imprisoned in Fort Ticonderoga, but made his escape and, making his way down the lake, he went to St. Johns, Canada, before 1776, and with his family permanently settled there. He received grants of land from the Crown, a large portion of which remain in the family to this day, having been entailed to his sons William and Ithiel Crosby and their eldest male heirs. He carried on farming and butchering extensively, had contract for furnishing beef to the British army, and was noted for industry and thrift, and highly respected in the social relations. He died at St. Johns, July 26, 1810. His wife died Apr. 16, 1825, at the age of 78. His descendants constitute a large, if not the largest, branch of RICHARD'S' descendants, many of them being in the States of the Middle West and in New England. His children were:

194 Annie Fowler,⁵ was living in 1872 in North Guilford, Conn., at an advanced age.

195 Isaac Fowler,⁵ who went to Ohio and settled; was living in 1872.

72 ORPHANY⁴ TOWNER, (Richard,³ Richard,² Richard¹) was born in Branford, Conn., Sept. 15, 1772; her father died three months before her birth, in service in the French and Indian war; this caused her being named Orphan-y. She lived with an aunt at Wallingford, Conn., till five years old, then with Elnathan Beach in Branford till nineteen. Then, Nov. 5, 1791, she was married to Luke Teeple, who was a saddle and harness maker. In Jan., 1801, they moved to Roxbury, Conn., and lived there till his death at the age of 85. Thereafter she lived mainly in Woodbury, where she died in 1876, aged 104 years. The 100th anniversary of her birth was celebrated in Sept., 1872, in Woodbury, an extended account of which was published at the time in pamphlet form at New Haven, compiled by Rev. A. N. Lewis. She was a notable instance of the longevity of the Towner family. At the age of 80 she became totally blind, and occupied much of her time in quiet contemplation and making simple verses. On the anniversary occasion mentioned above she repeated, in a strong voice which filled the church, some verses composed at the age of 94, of which the following is a specimen:

"Now I am blind, all things appear dark here below,
But there is a bright world to which I hope soon to go,
For Jesus my guiding star will see me safe through,
If I put my trust in Him, which I hope I do."

73 ABRAHAM⁴ TOWNER, (Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) was born about 1729-30; married at Newtown, Conn., Aug. 7, 1750, Hannah Foote, sometimes called Anna. He lived in New Milford awhile and afterwards in Danbury, and is mentioned in the records that remained after the burning of Danbury by the British, as "Abraham of Daubury." He died in Danbury in 1760, and left an estate of sixty pounds, of personal property only, which estate was settled by his widow in Feb. and April, 1761. She married again one Ebenezer Weed, and

he was appointed guardian of Abraham's two sons, Enos or Enoch, and Elijah. His children were:

Tradition has said that Abraham died on Lake Champlain during the French war, 1755; but a probate record in Danbury shows this to be an error.

74 GERSHOM⁴ TOWNER, (Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) born in Danbury, Conn., about 1732; married in Danbury, Tamar Knapp, an elder sister of Mary, whom his nephew, Elijah,⁵ married, about 1753. Tradition among the descendants of Elijah⁵ states that about revolutionary times Gershom, uncle of Elijah, settled in the county of Steuben, N. Y., and this seems credible, because it is certain that Towners belonging to several generations have lived in that county, in Bath, Avoca, and other localities, and numerous others are found in the Western States whose ancestors moved from that part of the State. Before going to Steuben, it seems probable that he was

in Columbia Co. for a time, as a son, Gershom, lived there and had children born, one, Daniel,⁶ in 1774; this son, 210, Gershom, afterward went to Steuben. His nephew, Elijah, went from Columbia Co. to Pa., and it is traditionally said that some of Gershom Sr.'s family visited Elijah and his descendants in Rome, Pa., as relatives. No further definite information of him has been obtained.

76 DANIEL⁴ TOWNER, (Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) was born in Danbury, Conn., about 1734; went from there to the State of New York and remained for awhile; then moved to the State of New Jersey, and finally to Virginia, where he settled and is said to have raised a large family. This is according to a tradition existing among the descendants of Elijah, son of Abraham of Danbury, Daniel's brother, but it gives nothing of his marriage or residence more than the above.

1174, Austin Towner, grandson of Elijah, informed the writer in 1886 that before the war of 1861, at Bloomington, Mo., he visited one Judge Minor Mandeville Towner, a man then prominent there in railroading and politics. That Judge Towner at the time of this visit showed him quite a complete written genealogy of his family, in which he traced the same back to the early years of the settlement of America, and his own descent from Daniel of Virginia. Unfortunately he (Austin) did not get a copy of that manuscript. My informant was a very intelligent man and his statements are no doubt reliable. He also said that soon after the war he again went to Bloomington and sought to find Judge Towner and family so as to secure this record, but failed.

It has since been learned that Judge Minor M. Towner was born in Va., near Fairfax, C. H., and went to Missouri and married at Palmyra, Marion Co., Ann Shekells, in 1837; that his father was Adam Towner, who lived at Leesburg, Loudon Co., in an early day and afterwards moved into Shenandoah Valley; that Adam had two brothers, John and Jacob, and one sister, Eve, who lived thereabout in Va.; that Adam had four sons and two daughters, viz., Minor Mandeville, Francis, John, George L., Eliza and Mary Jane, all born in Va.; George L. came to Macon, Mo., in 1838, was merchant and police justice there, and in the confederate service; lived unmarried, was large owner of property, but lost all and died at Macon, 1894. Mary Jane married Richard Cromwell, came to Macon in 1838 and was living there a few years ago.

Judge T. had by his wife Ann a son, Oscar Minor, and four daughters. This son, Oscar M., married and went to North Dakota and was prominent in business and politics, was a member of the Legislature, Towner Co., on the N. line of the State, was named after him; he founded a town on the R. R. west of Grand Forks called Larimore, and died there some years ago. He had a son, Terry Towner, who lived awhile in Montana, and is said to have gone to Chicago.

Judge T.'s wife dying, he married again and had two daughters; Mary married Percival Phelan and is living in St. Louis, Mo.; and Mildred married Richard Reynolds, lives in Chillicothe, Mo.

After the war Judge T. moved to St. Louis and was engaged many years in shipping tobacco to Europe and in banking, and acquired much wealth, and died there in

1883. I have deemed it proper to note these facts as to this family at this point on account of their evident relation to 76 Daniel, said to have settled in Va., and as verifying Austin Towner's statement.

85 JOHN⁴ TOWNER, (John,³ John,² Richard¹) born in Derby, 1750; married Rachel Bronson of Southbury, May 9, 1774; was a farmer, and prosperous in his calling; spent his life in Oxford, where he died in 1810, leaving, as the probate records show, quite a large estate. His children were:

She had a daughter, who married Samuel Leister and lived in Albany, N. Y., when last known.

125 ABRAHAM⁴ TOWNER, Jr., (Abraham,³ Benjamin,² Richard¹) was born in Killingworth, Conn., July 12, 1773; went to Westbrook when a child with his parents, and married there Azubah Bushnell, daughter of Ebenezer Bushnell. He was a farmer and resided in Goshen throughout life, dying there July 8, 1835, full of years and highly esteemed. His wife also died in Goshen, Jan. 23, 1837, at an advanced age, much beloved. He studied medicine with the distinguished Dr. Bird of Litchfield, Conn., was in the revolutionary army, Capt. Starr's Co., 4th Regt. In 1781, or soon after, he went to the West and it was reported that in his journeying he set out to go down the Ohio river and through some mishap was drowned. Nothing more was ever heard about him and it is believed that with brilliant prospects of a useful career before him, he thus met an untimely end. He probably married, as deeds of record in Goshen show that he left a son, Ezekiel.⁵

134 LABAN⁴ TOWNER, (Ephraim,³ Samuel,² Richard¹) born in Goshen, Conn., Feb. 2, 1754, and married, in 1776, Abby Beach, daughter of Deacon John Beach, of that place. His widow afterwards went from Poultney with two of her sons, John Morse and Jesse, to Monticello, Sullivan Co., N. Y., in 1810, or thereabouts. She died there between 1830 and 1835. He resided in Goshen till Feb., 1805, and then moved to Lexington, Greene Co., N. Y., taking his mother with him, who died there at the age of 90 years. He had a farm in the part called Hunter, now Jewett. He died there Apr. 11, 1848. His children were:

his wife, as administratrix of his estate, made a deed of land sold by an order of the Probate Court. No knowledge is had of any children, and the settlement of his estate in Litchfield mentions none.

138 WILLIAM⁴ TOWNER, (Zacheus,³ Samuel,² Richard¹) was born in New Fairfield, Conn., in 1756. He married (1st) Betsey, or Elizabeth, Ramsdell, who died in Williamstown, Mass., Dec. 19, 1795; and (2nd) Lurana Chadwick, b. Oct. 26, 1773, and d. Aug. 26, 1841. He lived in Cheshire, Mass., at Stafford Hill, several years, and in Adams also, for a while, and finally moved to Williamstown about 1786-7.

He was a physician and surgeon by profession, and became very eminent therein, practicing over a large extent of country, both in and out of the state, and wherever known was regarded as an authority in the profession. He was successful in the treatment of hydrophobia, and even in those early days discarded bleeding in fevers and typhoid pneumonia.

In 1781, he was made surgeon's mate of Col. Simons' Regiment, and later was commissioned General of Brigade by the State. He was a man of graceful exterior and pleasing manners, large and well-proportioned, a courtly gentleman of the olden time, fond of society and always deeply interested in education and politics. He greatly aided in the work of establishing the free school provided for in the will of Col. Ephraim Williams, which was incorporated in 1785, and which, in 1793, became Williams College.

He served in the State Legislature, both as Representative and Senator. During the time of Shay's rebellion

Gen. Townner became very obnoxious to Shay's adherents, and on one occasion was shot in one foot severely with buckshot. He was a democrat and many of his federal acquaintances tried to run him out of practice as a doctor, yet when their own families were sick they would send for him. His office building in Williamstown, a not large, but peculiarly high-roofed structure, was still standing but a few years ago. Though it was customary in those days for the doctor, wherever he was called, to help himself from the decanter on the sideboard, he became convinced that abstinence was his safety, and adopted and strictly practiced it.

In 1812, a destructive epidemic, a veritable plague, broke out in Vermont, especially in Pownal and vicinity, just north of Williamstown, and whither he went to assist in combating it. While thus engaged he was himself seized with it and, exhausted by his incessant labors, he succumbed to the fatal illness and died there, Jan. 12, 1813. One indication of the disease was that the patient lapsed into a state of coma, and he had strictly charged that should he be attacked by it he should not be bled, but notwithstanding his injunction, the physician who attended him violated it and bled him, perhaps thereby insuring a fatal result. He thus passed on in the midst of usefulness and popularity, mourned by many who had shared in his ministrations as doctor, and nurse as well—the poor and humble equally with the rich upholding him in grateful remembrance. He was buried in Williamstown with Masonic and military honors.

Notwithstanding his successful practice and large income therefrom, he left a devoted wife and a large family

of children, many of them young, well-nigh destitute. By reason of his having been on the bond of the State Treasurer, one Gen. Skinner, his property was sold to satisfy some breach of the Treasurer's bond. In many respects but meager information has been obtained of the family he left. Religiously, he was a churchman and often went to Lanesborough to attend service, the then nearest point of his chosen form of worship. Later in life he was dismissed from church for rejection of the doctrine of infant damnation. From a granddaughter, Hannah E. S. Day, of Brooklyn, N. Y., the writer has had some brief notes of her youthful recollections of her grandfather's family, her childhood and youth having been spent in familiar intercourse with them. graduated in New Haven from Yale. Soon after he commenced practice and, being quite successful, acquired a wide and well-earned reputation. In January, 1785, he married Sarah Upson, of Southington, Conn., and soon after moved to Bridport, Addison Co., Vt.; about 1798 he moved from Bridport to Willsboro, Essex Co., N. Y., where he passed the rest of his life, practicing his profession in that county and the adjoining country. He died there in 1830, and his wife, born Jan. 20, 1761, died there also, in 1842.

At the time of his death, the writer was seven years old, at which time Grandfather Truman and Grandmother Sarah were living with his (the writer's) father. Grandfather Towner is well remembered as a very pleasant, kindly old gentleman, tall and fair in form, genial with the grandchildren; and also remembers seeing him extract teeth with the turnkey, and tap his patient's veins with the lancet, and take away the life blood in the olden way for their relief. In these later years he was afflicted with occasional epileptic attacks, which made a sorrowful impression. Grandmother is also borne in memory as a gentle and loving woman, in word and deed. When her grandson, "Jimmy," (the writer) at twelve years, badly cut and maimed his left foot with an axe, the tenderness with which she dressed the wound and cared for him cannot be forgotten. daughter of John McNeil, who came from Litchfield in 1783 to Charlotte and established a ferry across the lake, long known as McNeil's Ferry. Erasmus, like his older brothers, William and Truman, studied medicine, graduated and became a very successful practitioner. He lived for some years on the opposite side of the lake from Charlotte, in Essex, N. Y., following his profession, and was highly respected as a citizen, as well as a professional man. Moving back to Charlotte, he resided there till his death, Jan 22, 1813. His widow married again — Williams, of Charlotte. They moved to the West, and she died at DuPage, Will Co., Ill., Sept. 15, 1855, much beloved. Erasmus' children were:

extant, written to his brother, Truman, at Bridport, Vt., dated Williamstown, Sept. 15, 1796, it appears that he taught school during vacations. After his graduation he was some time a member of a Quaker community at Quaker Hill, N. Y., and afterwards went to Ohio and died in 1817, at or near Miami Bend. There was a vague report that he perished somehow in the Ohio River. He is supposed not to have married; nothing has ever been heard of any descendants from him.

That letter indicates a sober mind and loving spirit, and it is pleasing to have such a relic from which to quote. He said:

"It will be impossible for me to pay you a visit this vacation, as a horse is not to be procured upon any condition. I was not able to return here in time to engage a horse, they being all taken by the students, and William is, at present, destitute of them; he has scarcely horses sufficient to perform his daily business. * * * I suppose you have heard before this of the death of our much respected friend and relative, Capt. Dan Towner. * * * New Fairfield, our native place, which but a few years ago saw our family and that of Capt. Towner numerous, flourishing and happy, can now show scarcely a trace that we ever existed. * * * Some curious eye, some years hence, may chance to read the names of our little sisters who lie buried there, and say, who were they. I never heard the name before! * * * What a mortifying instance of the mutability of human affairs! * * * Our beloved parents, now stooping with age, seem to be left by all their children, you I presume need not be solicited to visit them as often as possible, and render their declining days as happy as casualties incident to this life will permit."

147 MARY⁴ TOWNER, (Dan,³ Samuel,² Richard¹) born in New Fairfield, Conn., in 1758; and married there, Josiah Buck, in 1780. He was a Lieutenant in the Continental Army, serving till 1782. Y., written in 1876, from which I have taken many facts concerning Richard Jr. and his descendants.

Like his brothers Elijah and Enoch, he was a Patriot, and a soldier. His name is on the rolls of the 10th Regt., Conn., line, as clerk of the 8th Co. in 1775. Joseph Towner^r of Hornbrook, Pa., grandson of Elijah, has related that when

he was a little boy (he was born in 1828) he heard his grandfather say that "the last he heard from his brother William was that he was with the 'cowboys' in the revolution." It is hardly probable that one of so patriotic a family ever joined those marauding "Tories."

210 GERSHOM^s TOWNER, (Gershom,⁴ Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) was born in Danbury, Conn., about 1753; married and went to Columbia Co., N. Y., where he had children. In 1809 he moved to Steuben Co. and settled in Bath township on the Cohocton river. Soon after his settlement he erected the first hotel in that region in what is now the town of Avoca, and was noted for his hospitality and liberality in supplying his patrons with the necessities of life; it is also said that he built and ran the first sawmill within the limits of the town. He died in Avoca Feb. 4, 1829. His children were:

207 ENOCH^s TOWNER, (Abraham,⁴ Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) was born Danbury, Conn.; was still a minor in

1761, as after his father's decease he was put under a guardian with his brother Elijah. He was also a soldier of the revolution, as appears from the rolls of the 5th Regt., 10th Co., Conn. line, in 1775. After the war he went to Nova Scotia, whither his uncle Enoch* had preceded him before the revolution, and lived and died there, unmarried. He was a Baptist preacher and theological writer of considerable note, according to traditionary accounts.

208 ELIJAH³ TOWNER, (Abraham,⁴ Phineas,³ John,² Richard¹) was born in Danbury, Conn., Aug. 20, 1759, according to a family record in his Bible, now in possession of Joseph Forbes, a grandson living in Oklahoma. Elijah married in Danbury, Mary Knapp, Dec. 17, 1778. He was in the revolutionary service, his name being on the rolls of Capt. John St. John's Co. in the 5th Regt., Conn. line, Col. Philip Bradley, in 1780. Tradition says he was taken prisoner by the British, paroled and returned home, but afterwards served as teamster till the close of the war, and later was pensioned for his service. He moved from Danbury to New Lebanon, Columbia Co., N. Y., where he lived for some years. In 1793 he thought to go West and, with his son Enoch, went to Sheshequin, Pa., returned for removal, and crossed the Catskill mountains with his family, then consisting of wife and nine children, the eldest but fourteen; and continuing his journey through Southern New York, reached the Susquehannah river at Watles ferry. There he built a boat, some have said a raft, upon which he loaded the family and their goods and went down the Susquehannah with the current, and land-

ing purchased 400 acres of land of one Thayre, paying therefor 400 Spanish milled dollars. This he located at the center of the so-called Connecticut town of Thayres, named Watertown. His title, however, proved worthless and he abandoned the place, and commenced to clear up another on Oak Hill, three miles from the river. He cleared 100 acres, put up a distillery, operated it several years, and then traded his improvements for 300 acres on what is now known as Towner's Hill. There he lived from 1806 until his death, Oct. 7, 1840. His wife survived him and died Feb. 21, 1841. His descendants are many, the stock appearing to have great vitality, and have spread through the West, even to the Pacific Coast and Washington. A goodly number still remain in and about Bradford Co., and an organization exists which occasionally holds a reunion. In Sept., 1906, the centennial of Elijah Towner's settlement on Towner's Hill was celebrated there, over 200 being present at the reunion, an enjoyable time with music and addresses appropriate to the occasion. Beginning the next winter, he taught school winters, and worked summers for wages, at farming, or sailing on Lake Erie. He went from St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., in the spring of 1844, to Cleveland, O., having during the previous winter taught a country school of 40 scholars four months at \$9.00 a month, so scarce was money and low were wages in those days. For the next four years his reading was mainly theological and in 1849 he entered the Universalist ministry, settling at Westfield, Medina Co., O., and from there itinerating in the northern part of the State. He took the anti-slavery side of the issues then forming on that subject, which caused division in his church, and this, with failing lungs, led him to discontinue stated public speaking. In Dec., 1854, he went westward nearly to the frontier of settlement in Fayette Co., Iowa, and engaged there in the lumber business, building, with others, a steam sawmill. About that time he began to read law for business and political information, but which resulted in his admission to the bar of Iowa in June, 1859, and his entering into practice of the profession at West Union in that county. On the breaking out of the war he was among the first who enlisted for three years, and went into camp at Dubuque, Iowa, in Aug., 1861, where the 9th

Iowa Vol. Infantry was organizing, and was chosen captain of Co. F of that regiment. He went to the field with his regiment in Sept. following and served in Missouri and Arkansas till the battle of Pea Ridge, Mar. 5-7, 1862. While recovering he was absent on leave till July, then rejoined the regiment at Helena, Ark., and was in the actions at Chickasaw Bayou, Miss., Dec. 30, 1862, and Arkansas Post, Ark., Jan. 12, 1863. Becoming disabled for field service, he was discharged in Feb., 1863, at Young's Point, La., and returned home. On leaving Co. F near Vicksburg, all its members who were present, 56 in number, signed and presented to him a letter saying: "Learning with regret that you are about to leave us we, your old company who have shared with you the hardships of the march, and the dangers of the battlefield, would tender you our warmest regards, and assure you that you will hold a place in our hearts around which will cluster the brightest memories. You have, captain, our prayers and best wishes."

This is still held, after 47 years, by the writer, as one of the most valued of life's mementos. On October, 1863, he was commissioned captain in the Invalid Corps by President Lincoln (afterwards named the Veteran Reserve Corps), in which he served with Co. B, 2nd Regiment, doing garrison and post duty till July, 1866.

In Nov. of that year he went to Cleveland, O., and resumed there the practice of the law, serving one term as judge of the city criminal court. In 1874 he went to New York, and being engaged in important patent and other cases, spent the next eight years in that State and Connecticut, chiefly in his profession; and in September, 1882,

moved to Santa Ana., Cal., then in Los Angeles Co., in which county he pursued the profession till 1889, when, the new county of Orange having been formed out of Los Angeles Co., he was elected judge of the Superior Court of the State for Orange Co., and held that office till Jan., 1897. *d. Nov 19, 1913*

On Nov. 9, 1894, he was married to Mrs. Emilie M. Van Scotten of Denver, Colo., and is now living at Santa Ana. His children are:

Recovering so as to be able to make herself useful, she spent her life largely in helpful service to others. In 1844 she went to Ohio with her parents, from St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., living thereafter mostly with some of her relatives. On Jan. 1, 1852, at the home of her brother James W., in Westfield, O., she was suddenly taken with epileptic convulsions, and died within a few hours, deeply loved and lamented.

"Sister, thou wast mild and lively,

546 DELIGHT⁶ TOWNER, (Samuel U.,⁵ Truman,⁴ Zacheus,³ Samuel,² Richard¹) was born in Willsboro, Essex Co., N. Y., Jan. 28, 1830; went to Ohio in 1844, and July 1, 1847, was married to John S. Levake of Cleveland, O., who was a machinist by trade, and for some years followed steamboat engineering. They lived in Cleveland and also in Buffalo, N. Here she remained, the project was not carried out. In the fall of 1856, ambitious for higher education, she entered school at Ypsilanti, Mich., for a

regular course, but health failing, she returned to Iowa, and died suddenly at her brother's home, Mar. 26, 1857. She had a deep interest in the higher development of woman, and left many friends with naught but pleasant memories of her lovable character, to mourn her early departure.

548 MARTHA SOPHIA^a TOWNER, (Samuel U.,⁵ Truman,⁴ Zacheus,³ Samuel,² Richard¹) born in Willsboro, N. Y., July 20, 1834, and married, Aug. 20, 1855, Alvah A. Brooks of Eaton, Lorain Co., O., with whom she soon after went to Iowa and lived in Iowa and Missouri till he enlisted in an Iowa regiment for three years, War of 1861-5, and who died in the service in hospital at Memphis, Tenn., in 1862. She returned to Ohio and married Gaylord W. Reeve at Berlin, O., and lived there and in Cleveland, O., till 1874, when she went to the State of New York, and soon after to Wallingford, Conn. While in Conn., she was divorced from Mr. Reeve, and afterwards married to Edwin S. Nash, and with him moved to Santa Ana, Cal., engaged in raising fruit, poultry, and in butter-making. In the spring of 1862, threatened with conscription into the rebel army, he hired as wagonmaster in a Texas cavalry regiment and served with it, as such, in Arkansas the following summer and fall. Toward the last of December, while with a scouting party near the Union lines, an opportunity offered for him to leave, which he improved, and came into the Union camp near Helena, Ark., where, to their great joy, he found his brother James W., captain in the 9th Iowa Inf., and taking the required oath of allegiance, went to his father's home in Ohio, where he remained till the spring of 1864, when he enlisted in the 103rd Ohio Vol. Inf., in which his brother Augustus was then serving in Tennessee. Church, and later, without changing his residence, he was employed to conduct the music for the same denomination in Covington, Ky. It was while in this latter place in 1884 that he was chosen to conduct a chorus choir, consisting of one thousand voices, for the D. L. Moody meetings, and which resulted in an invitation from Mr. Moody to join him permanently in his evangelistic work, which he did. In 1894 he was offered, and accepted, the superintendency of and the chair of theory and composition in the music department of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago, at a salary of \$4000 per year, which position he still occupies at this writing, April, 1910. He has twice visited Europe, assisting in evangelistic meetings in London, Manchester and Oxford, England; in Dundee, Glasgow and Edinburgh, Scotland, and in Dublin and Belfast, Ireland, in each of which places he was received with great enthusiasm. He is the editor wholly or in part of fourteen music books, and is regarded as the most prolific living writer of gospel hymn music, being the author of about 2000 hymns and anthems, and now at the age of sixty, holds the distinction of being the world's greatest gospel singer. Y., and constructed and carried on extensive iron works there. Some of his grandchildren are in Kansas and elsewhere in the West; some in and about Crown Point and nearby in Vermont. At first it was doubtful whether they were descendants of Rich-

ard, Sr., but late information from correspondence with these grandchildren and records obtained from the old Family Bible make it reasonably probable that this first Ephraim was a grandson of 6 Benjamin,² and he is numbered herein 107, page 27. And it being too late to put what I have learned in the body of the work, I state the genealogy obtained in this note.

107 EPHRAIM¹ TOWNER, (Benjamin, Jr.,³ Benjamin,² Richard¹) was born in Haddam, Conn., July 26, 1743; married; wife's name, Hepzibah, maiden name not learned; lived in Newport, Sullivan Co., N. H., after marriage until his death, which occurred July 12, 1791. His wife lived till June 29, 1830. Had these children:

I. Asa Lyman⁵ Towner, b. Newport, N. H., Aug. 12, 1775; d. Jan. 24, 1800.

II. Benjamin⁵ Towner, b. Newport, Oct. 2, 1776; d. Sept. 1, 1834.

III. Ephraim⁵ Towner, Jr., b. Newport, Apr. 6, 1778; d. Crown Point, N. Y., Sept. 10, 1872, 94 years.

IV. Joseph⁵ Towner, b. Newport. Apr. 27, 1781; d. Berlin, Mich., Apr. 15, 1850.

V. Hepzibah⁵ Towner, b. Newport, July 7, 1783; death not recorded.

VI. Ichabod A.⁵ Towner, b. Newport, Apr. 14, 1785; d. Jan. 18, 1845.

VII. Zacheus⁵ Towner, b. Newport, N. H., Aug. 5, 1791; d. Oct. 29, 1819.

EPHRAIM⁶ TOWNER, Jr., (Ephraim,⁴ Benjamin, Jr.,³ Benjamin,² Richard¹) was born in Newport, N. H., Apr. 6, 1778; married Rhoda Taft, of Uxbridge, Mass., b. 1780; with her he went to Crown Point, N. Y., settled and passed his life engaged in making iron; owned a large

foundry. He died in 1872; she in 1858. He was one of the first to settle in Crown Point; settled on a hill which was called Towner Hill, and is so known to this day. His children were:

I. Loren,⁶ b. Crown Point, Feb. 14, 1816; d. Shoreham, Vt., Oct. 27, 1901.

II. Ira,⁶ who died in Ticonderoga, N. Y.

III. Benjamin,⁶ who lived and died in Schroon, N. Y.

IV. Daniel,⁶ who always lived at Crown Point; a son. Orville,⁷ lives at Bridport, Vt.

V. Ephraim,⁶ lived at Crown Point; a son, John,⁷ now living there, at Ironville; another son, Joseph,⁷ left two sons, Park,⁸ and Rollin,⁸ who live at Fargo, N. D.

VI. John,⁶ b. Jan. 20, 1824, Crown Point; is living at Olathe, Kan.

LOREN⁶ TOWNER, (Ephraim,⁵ Ephraim,⁴ Benjamin Jr.,³ Benjamin,² Richard¹) was born Crown Point, N. Y., Feb. 14, 1816; married; wife's first name, Laura; lived in Vermont and died at Shoreham, Oct. 27, 1901. He had children as follows: Alanson J.,⁷ now living in Shoreham; George L.,⁷ lately deceased in Shoreham; Frank,⁷ Marion,⁷ Emma,⁷ Ella⁷ and Ida.⁷

JOHN⁶ TOWNER, (same descent as Loren⁶) was born at Crown Point, Jan. 20, 1824; went when a young man to Pontiac, Ill.; there married Catharine Williams, Apr. 22, 1853; later on he moved from Illinois to Kansas and settled at Olathe, and there has lived many years. His children are:
