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PREFACE.

In this volume, besides completely revised pedigrees of Thomas and Chew, and a previously unprinted pedigree of Lawrance of Philadelphia, compiled by E. S. Lawrance, Esq., I have printed a large collection of Notices of the Thomas, Lawrence, and Chew families in England, drawn from a variety of sources, and representing the labor of a number of years, spent in investigating all the available sources of information in this country. I believe that I have collected everything of value in elucidating the English pedigree of those families, to be found on this side of the Ocean, and, so far as I know, in print. Though I do not expect to print any further Genealogical matter, I shall be glad to learn of any inaccuracies or deficiencies in my present work. While my authorities in this volume have been the same as in my two previous collections of Genealogy, with such additions as are herein noted, the reader will bear in mind, that to find one brief notice, there may have been many volumes examined. I regret that it has been impossible for me to satisfactorily ascertain the English ancestry of the Lawrence family in particular, but I congratulate myself on having dissipated some of the mist surrounding this "vexed question" by disproving baseless assumptions made by previous writers on the subject, and even by correcting my own previous tentative work in my "Genealogical Notes." In the pedigree of the Thomas family I have done all that is possible, without a personal examination of English and Welsh Records still unprinted.

In conclusion, I must express my gratitude to Samuel Chew, Esq., of "Cliveden," Messrs. Beverly and John C. Chew, of New York City, William G. Thomas, of Yonkers, N. Y., Edward S. Lawrance, Esq., of Philadelphia, Philip Alex. Thomas, of London, Eng., and the late Thomas Chew Lewis, of New York, who have been of especial assistance to me in furnishing material for this volume; and also to the Long Island Historical Society, and their Librarian, Mr. Hannah and his assistants, for courtesies rendered to me on more than one occasion.

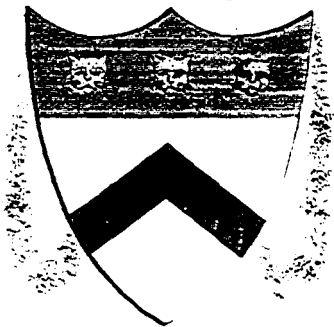

CHEW.

JOHN CHEW, said to be a cadet of the family of **CHEW** of Chewton, in Somersetshire, England, who was a member of the Virginia House of Assembly in 1623 as a Burgess from Jamestown, appears to have been the first of this name in America. In a land grant of the same year he is described as "John Chew, Merchant."

He is said to have come over in the "Charitie" and his wife **SARAH**, to have followed him in the "Sea Flower" which returned to England in 1622. He was afterward a Burgess from Hogg's Island, and was in the Assembly until 1643. **JOHN** and **SARAH CHEW** had issue: **SAMUEL** and **JOSEPH**.

JOSEPH, the second son md. Nov. 17th, 1685, in Maryland, **MARY SMITH**, and died in the same Province Feby. 12th, 1715-16. He is also said to have married a **MISS LARKIN**, of Annapolis, and to have had by her a son, **LARKIN CHEW**. (q. v.)

SAMUEL, eldest son of John and Sarah Chew, removed to Maryland before 1655, received large grants of land there, and settled at Herring Bay in Calvert County. olution took place, Chief Justice Chew sympathized with the mother country, although he took no active part in the contest. In 1777 when Congress arrested a number of prominent Philadelphia Friends and banished them to Fredericksburg, Virginia, Chief Justice Chew and his friend John Penn, the Proprietary of Pennsylvania, were also put under arrest, but were allowed to retire to Mr. Chew's property, Union Forge, New Jersey, and released from arrest the next year. In 1791 Mr. Chew was appointed President of the High Court of Errors and Appeal, of the State of Pennsylvania, and retained the position until the Court was abolished in 1806. 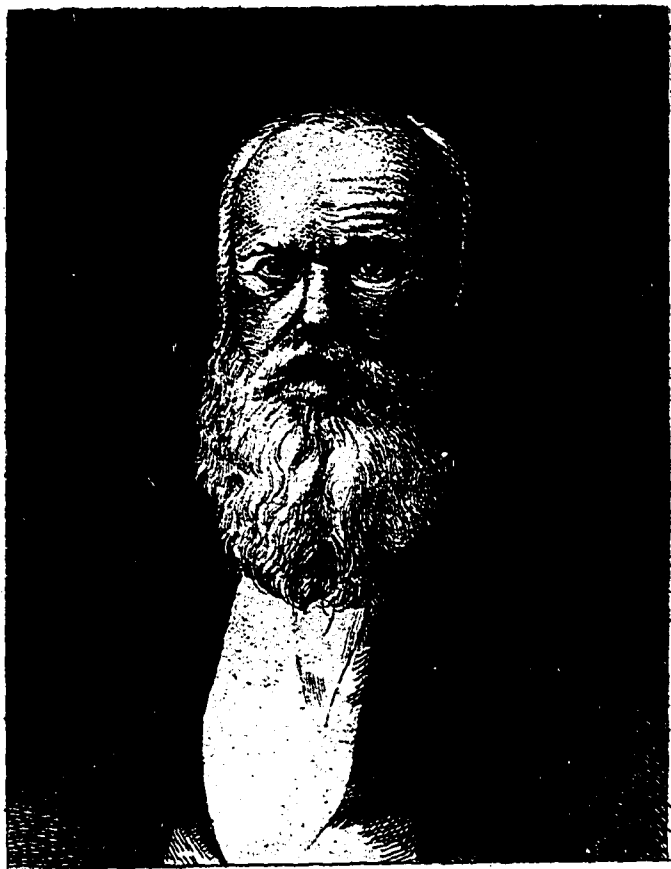

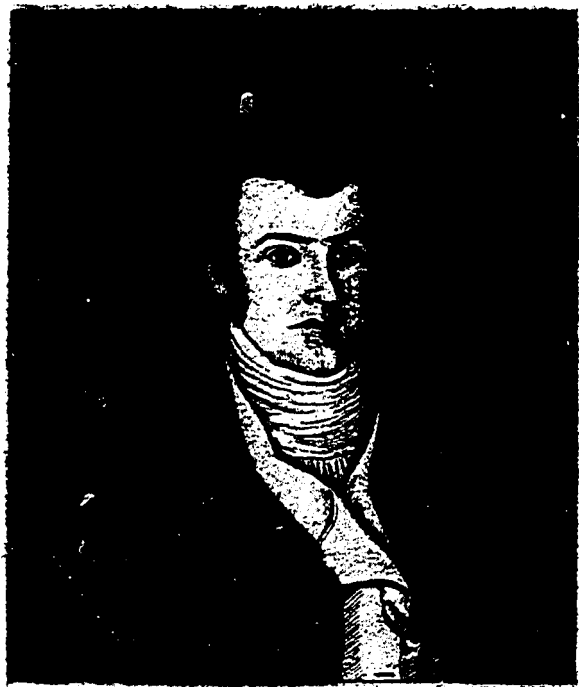

LAWRENCE.

BY EDWARD SHINN LAWRENCE, ESQ.

The name *Laurence* as applied to men, is of very early origin. The *orthography* of the word has been slightly varied in its common usage, yet the number of syllables, it is believed, has never been changed; nor the essential vowel and consonant sounds altered. Dissyllabic, with an *a* and either a single or double *u* in the first syllable, the second has always had for its vowel short *a*, or *e*, followed by *ns*, or *nce*.

If not in its application to the same person, as used in the same family for several successive generations it has been found written in at least three, if not four various, yet similar ways; namely: *Laurens*, *Laurence*, *Lawrence*, and *LAWRENCE*.

Its derivation we trace to the Latin *Laurus-Laurentius*. The latter form is that in which the name is found as first given to men. The signification of the word recorded by some one (not an indifferent scholar) on the first page of the Town Records, of Hingham, Mass., may be regarded as pretty near the truth:

"Christian names for men now most used with the signification *Lxurence*, flourishing like a Bay tree."

The *source* of the word is the *Laurus nobilis*, or true laurel, which is a native of Italy, and grows in the South of Europe and Asia, and in the North of Africa. By the Romans it was consecrated to Apollo, and used to decorate the brows of victors.

The very first application of the name to any one of the human family, found on record, was to ACCA LAURENTIA, the nurse of Romulus and Remus. This was more than seven hundred and fifty years before Christ.

The *Laurentalia* feasts, celebrated among the Romans on the tenth of the kalends of January, or 23d of December, were in memory of ACCA LAURENTIA, wife of the shepherd Faustus, and nurse of Romulus and Remus. ACCA LAURENTIA, from whom the solemnity took its name, is represented as no less remarkable for the beauty of her person, than her lasciviousness; on account of which she was nick-named, by her neighbors, *lupa*, the she-wolf; which has given rise to the tradition of Romulus and Remus being suckled by a wolf. She afterward married a very rich man, who brought her great wealth, which, at her death, she left to the Roman people; in consideration whereof they performed these honors to her memory.

The man who *immortalized* the name, was LAWRENCE, of Rome, A. D. 258. He was Archdeacon of St. Sixtus, Bishop of Rome. It was ascertained that Lawrence was the keeper of the treasure of the church, and he was arrested and ordered to produce it. He asked a day in which to collect it. All night he hurried about Rome, in and out of its poorest streets and courts; on the morrow he appeared before the Court, followed by a crowd of the poor, the halt, and the blind; said he: "These are the treasures of the Church." He was ordered to death; by cruel torture. He was to be broiled on a grid-iron; over a slow fire; the fire was made ready; he was stripped and laid on the iron bars; but he seemed insensible to the torture; he said, with a playful smile, to his tormentors: "Turn me, I am roasted on one side." The man who had the courage to say, "Turn me, I am roasted on one side;" and the charity to say, of the poor, the halt and the blind, "These are the treasures of the Church;" was indeed fit to be canonized as St. Lawrence.

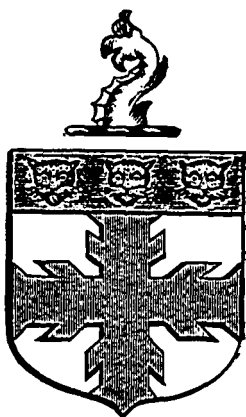
About A. D. 250, there was another distinguished Laurence. In the persecution of Decius, he was brought before Tiburtius, the Governor at Arretium, the modern Arezzo; after severely reprimanding him, as he was of noble birth, the Governor dismissed him, strictly enjoining him, as he valued his life, not to labor to convert others to his superstition, as he called the religion of Christ. As, however, he refused obedience, he ordered him to be decapitated. He also was canonized St. Laurence.

A. D., 576, St. Laurence, the Illuminator, is said to have come from Syria, with many other illustrious bishops, to Italy, in the reign of Diocletian. He was elected by the clergy, Bishop of Spoleto, and illumined his diocese with his teachings and miracles.

The first instance of an individual to whom the name belonged who lived in England, was Laurence, Archbishop of Canterbury, A. D., 619. Laurence was one of the first missionaries to the Saxons, who came over with St. Augustine, and he succeeded the Roman Apostle of England in the See of Canterbury, in 608, in which he sat eleven years. In the reign of King Eadbald, Archbishop Laurence died, and was buried in the Church of St. Peter, close beside his predecessor Augustine.

It is, however, to ROBERT LAWRENCE, of Lancashire, we are to look for the first individual of the name, whose family and circumstances entitle him to be considered the ancestor of the LAWRENCES of England.

Born, probably, as early as A. D., 1150, he accompanied his Sovereign, Richard Cœur de Lion, to the war of the Crusades, in the Holy Land, and so distinguished himself in the siege of Acre that he was knighted Sir Robert of Ashton Hall, and obtained for his Arms, "Arg. a cross raguly Gu." A. D., 1191.

These arms *Argent* a Cross raguly *Gules*, on a Chief *Azure*, three leopards heads *Or.* are borne by the name of *Lawrance* or *Lawrence*, and was given by *William Dethick* Garter, Anno Domini, 1594, to . . . LAWRENCE, of London, Goldsmith.

Goldsmiths in England, were Bankers. The company received their first charter in 1327, and are still entrusted with the assaying and stamping of all gold and silver plate manufactured in London. It is understood to be the oldest Guild in the world.

THOMAS LAWRENCE, son of Richard and Margaret Lawrence, was born in LONDON, A. D. 1707, and died in the Province of New Jersey, September 4th, 1775.

Very early he bore his testimony to the calming influence and seasoning virtue of Truth, and became a member in unity with the Society of Friends.

This action so disturbed the concord existing between him and his family, that he resolved to go to the Colonies in America.

He was thoroughly educated, being a master of the Latin and Higher Mathematics.

He married **SUSANNA VAN EMAN**, a daughter of David Van Eman, Esquire, and Eleoner, his wife.

She was born, Anno Domini, 1718, and died on the 21st of May, 1790.

3. **THOMAS LAWRANCE**, (of Philadelphia,) son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrance, of Springfield Township, Province of New Jersey, m. **HANNAH HALLOWELL**, daughter of John and Hannah Hollowell, in Friends' Meeting, at Philadelphia, 5th mo. 12th, 1768.

Witnesses: John Hollowell, Mary Hollowell, Thomas Hollowell, Elizabeth Lawrance, Jason Lawrance, Samuel Lewis, Sarah Lewis, and 47 others.

HANNAH (Hollowell) LAWRANCE, wife of **THOMAS LAWRANCE**, was born 24th of 12th mo. 1745, d. 3d mo. 1771, her age being 25 years, 3 mo. 5 days.

GENEALOGICAL NOTES

THOMAS and HANNAH (Hallowell) LAW-RANCE had one child only:

JOHN b. 14th of 4th mo., 1769, died 7th mo. 26th, 1770, aged 15 months.

HANNAH (Hallowell) LAW-RANCE was an aunt of Judge **JOHN HALLOWELL**, of Philadelphia, and a grand-aunt of Mrs. **STROUD**, widow of Judge **GEORGE M. STROUD**, of Philadelphia.

THOMAS LAW-RANCE was married again about 12th mo., 1773, to **ANN PALMER**.

In the record of burials, kept by Friends' Meeting, at 15th and Race streets, Philadelphia, appears:

"10th mo. 5th, 1778, **ELIZABETH LAW-RANCE**, daughter
"of **THOMAS LAW-RANCE**, aged 3 months.

"9th mo. 7th, 1778, **A SON** of **THOMAS LAW-RANCE**,
"aged about 5 months.

"7th mo. 14th, 1780, **MARY LAW-RANCE**, daughter of
THOMAS."

THOMAS and ANN (Palmer) LAW-RANCE had three other children:

JOHN; THOMAS; and SAMUEL.

JOHN LAW-RANCE, son of Thomas and Ann (Palmer) Lawrance, b. June 12th, 1775, m. his first cousin, **ELIZABETH GARDINER**, Sept. 23d, 1811, and died Feb. 5th, 1834.

His will is on record at Mount Holly, New Jersey, dated 9th Sept., 1833. Executors: Peter De Cou, of Springfield, and his kinsman, Jason Lawrance Fenimore, of Philadelphia. His estate was large. Beneficiaries: His house-keeper, Mary Mount, a faithful friend of the family; his niece, Eliza Gardiner Lawrance; and the rest and remainder of his estate to his only child, **ELIZABETH GARDINER LAW-RANCE**. "But in the event that my said

daughter Elizabeth should de cease before she arrives at lawful age to dispose of said real estate, by will or otherwise, and without lawful issue, it then is my will that the said real estate shall go to the surviving children of my brother Samuel Lawrance, share and share alike."

JOHN and ELIZABETH (Gardiner) LAW-RANCE had two children only: JOHN GARDINER b. June 29th, 1814, d. June 6th, 1815, aged 11 mo. 8 days. ELIZABETH GARDINER b. July 12th, 1816, d. Sept. 19th, 1841; testate and unmarried, aged 25 years, 2 mo., 7 days.

Her will is on record at Mount Holly, New Jersey, dated 5th October, 1839. Executors: William Lippincott and Joseph E. Butterworth, of Springfield. Her estate was large. Beneficiaries: To Mary Mount, the faithful friend who had been house-keeper for her father, and mother, and herself, she gave the right to live and remain in the house in which she resided, with use of furniture and appurtenances, during her life; also an annuity; at her death, the principal to go to the surviving children of her uncle, Samuel Lawrance; also, *fire-bote* off of her woodlands. To her aunt Hannah Lawrance, an annuity. To her friend Elizabeth R. Hill, a legacy. Her aunt Susan Folwell, a legacy, and grand-mother's gold sleeve buttons; her silver sugar tongs; mother's silver shoe buckles and the remainder of mother's wearing apparel. Her aunt Amy Fenimore, a legacy. Her cousin Hettie G. Fenimore, a legacy, and silver cream cup marked "E. L.," and silver soup ladle with same initials. Her cousins Ann Folwell, Susan Folwell, and Elizabeth Folwell, each a legacy. Her cousin Ann Stokes, a legacy. Her cousin Mary Lawrance, a legacy. Her cousin Edward S. Lawrance, a legacy. Her cousins, *once removed*, John F. Bryan and William H. Bryan, each a legacy. Her cousin Eliza G. Lawrance, the principal of the annuity left to her mother, Hannah Lawrance, after her

death, gold watch and chain, large walnut bureau, wearing apparel, piano, silver sugar bowl and cream cup, marked "E. G. L.," double hair mattress, bedstead and bed and curtains in front room, the best carpet and rug belonging to the parlor, the large gilt-frame looking glass and mahogany breakfast table, the desk and papers in it, carriage, harness, saddle and bridle, and horse now in possession of Joel Mount; also, the residue and remainder of the estate, both real and personal, or whatsoever nature it may be, including the dwelling house, garden, stables and furniture belonging thereto, after the death of Mary Mount.

THOMAS LAWRANCE, son of Thomas and Ann (Palmer) Lawrance, m. **ELIZABETH**, daughter of Thomas Barnes, a merchant of Philadelphia. She was a sister of Dr. John Barnes, of Philadelphia. They had no children. He died in Philadelphia, 8th mo. 30th, 1811, leaving his wife a widow, and she married again.

His will is on record at Philadelphia, dated 18th August, 1811; proved, 5th Sept., 1811. Executors: His wife, Elizabeth Lawrance, and his father-in-law, Thomas Barnes. The estate was large. Beneficiaries: "My dear brother, **JOHN LAWRANCE**, does not stand in need of any share of my property; but in token of my affection for him, I do request his acceptance of and do hereby bequeath to him my gold watch with its appurtenances." He gave to his wife, the whole of his household and kitchen furniture, as her own absolute property, of which no valuation was to be made, and one half of his entire estate. The remaining half, in trust, as to the interest or income of one-third part of such residue to be applied and appropriated to the use of the family of his brother Samuel, and the interest and income of the other two-third parts of such rest

and residue to the sole use of his wife during her life, and after her decease, then the said two-thirds parts of the said rest and residue to the use of his said brother Samuel during his natural life, if he shall survive said wife; but, otherwise then the said rest and residue to be divided equally among the legal representatives of his said brother Samuel.

SAMUEL LAWRAŃCE, son of Thomas and Ann (Palmer) Lawrance, m. **HANNAH**, daughter of John and Mary (Norton) Shinn, of Springfield, Burlington County, New Jersey.

[John Shinn, (*Third*,) b. Nov. 25th, 1757, was a great-grand son of John Shinn, (*First*,) who landed at Burlington about 1680, and was one of the proprietors of New Jersey. His will is on record at Trenton, New Jersey, dated Jan. 14th, 1711. Jacob Shinn, grand-son of John, the proprietor, and father of John, first named, left the largest estate that had ever been settled in Burlington County. His will is dated January 10th, 1792, on record at Trenton. They were called, "the silk stocking family of Burlington County." John Shinn, first named, married Mary Norton, daughter of William and Susanna Norton, of Burlington County, New Jersey, and died 13th of February, 1833. They had two sons, who were respectably conspicuous in the society which they adorned: **WILLIAM NORTON SHINN** b. 24th Oct., 1782, m. **SALLY BUDD**. He died in August, 1871. He was elected Sheriff of Burlington County in 1825; to the State Council in 1829; re-elected in 1830, and again in 1831; to Congress in 1832, and re-elected in 1834; a vacancy occurring upon the Bench of the Court of Errors and Appeals, during the administration of his kinsman, Governor Fort, the latter, without the knowledge of Mr. Shinn, nominated him for the position; but the Senate failed to confirm the nomination; he was the *first* Director of the Camden and Amboy R. R. Co., on behalf of the State; a Director

of the Mount Holly Insurance Company; the President of the Burlington County Bible Society; and for half a century, a most liberal and influential member of the Board of Trustees of the Mount Holly Church. JOHN SHINN, Jr. (*Fourth*,) b. 19th Aug. 1784, m. MARY, daughter of Dr. JOHN WHITE, of Philadelphia. He was proposed for membership in "The First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry," by Robert Wharton, Esquire, Captain of the Troop, and Mayor of the City of Philadelphia, and was elected a member on 1st of Feb., 1806; he was an active member of the Troop until 26th August, 1814, when he became "Honorary." In 1811, he was Major 156th Pa. Vol., and in 1814, Col. of 79th Pa. Vol., and in 1812 he was one of the *seven* founders of the Academy of Natural Sciences, of Philadelphia, the other six being Jacob Gilliams, M. D., C. M. Mann, N. S. Parmentier, John Speakman, Thomas Say and Gerard Troost, M. D. JOHN SHINN, Jr. died 16th October, 1825.]

SAMUEL and HANNAH (Shinn) LAWRENCE had seven children: JOHN b. Oct. 16th, 1808. ANN b. July 29th, 1810. THOMAS b. Feb. 1st, 1813. WILLIAM SHINN b. Jan. 19th, 1815. MARY SHINN b. Dec. 26th, 1819. ELIZA GARDINER b. Feb. 24th, 1822, and EDWARD SHINN b. May 17th, 1825. All deceased except ANN and EDWARD.

EDWARD SHINN LAWRENCE is now the head of the LAWRENCE family of Philadelphia, although he is the youngest son of Samuel, who was the youngest son of Thomas, of Philadelphia, who died 1 mo. 30th, 1802, at No. 19 North Water Street, Philadelphia, where he had lived many years, next door South of the residence of Stephen Girard, who was then looming up as Philadelphia's greatest merchant. The *first* Directory published in Philadelphia was for the year of 1785. It located Thomas Lawrence in Church Alley, between Second and Third Streets. The next

Directory published was for the year of 1791; it located him at No. 19 North Water Street, where he remained until his death, in 1802. In 1797 Stephen Girard moved into his house, next door to Thomas Lawrance, and continued to live there till his death, in 1831. The two houses were divided by Say's Alley, running to the river. The grounds extended to the river on each side of the Alley, as Delaware Avenue had not been opened. Stephen Girard was on the north side of the Alley, and Thomas Lawrance was on the south side of the Alley, and so they lived, next door neighbors, from 1797 to 1802. Every thing relating to Stephen Girard is interesting to Philadelphians. One cold, frosty morning, in winter, two children were playing with snow on Thomas Lawrance's porch towards the river. One was "Sam," the youngest son of Thomas Lawrance, and the other was Martha, a daughter of Richard Lawrance; they were cousins. Mr. Girard's habit was to go into his yard every morning, before breakfast, to wash his hands and face at his hydrant. He was washing as usual when "Sam" spied him across the alley, and full of childish glee and mischief, he said to Martha, "Oh! cousin Patty, there's old Steve; I'm going to snow-ball him." "Oh! no, cousin Sam, don't you do it." "Yes, I will, cousin Patty, and I'll make it hard, too," and he pressed the snow-ball in his hands between his knees and then threw it directly across the alley at Mr. Girard. At that moment Mr. Girard had finished washing and raised his head from the hydrant, his hands and face still wet, and was about to use his towel when the snow-ball hit him on the side of his head. The children were scared and scampered into the house. Mr. Girard, more surprised than hurt, cried out, "Oh! who is that trying to put my other eye out?" He had lost the sight of one of his eyes; he, however, opened the remaining one quickly enough to see "Sam" and call out to him, "Oh! you young rascal, I see you; I'll tell your father of you."

In a few moments Mr. Girard was knocking at neighbor Lawrance's front door; he complained of the unneighborly conduct of "Sam," who was properly punished for the offense, to Mr. Girard's satisfaction, according to the discipline of Friends.

"Sam" was Samuel Lawrance, father of Edward S. Lawrance, Esq., of Philadelphia.

"Patty" afterward became the wife of Seth Smith, of Philadelphia. She having participated in the above little incidents, related them with an enjoyable zest fifty years after they happened.

SAMUEL LAWRENCE was a minor when his father died in 1802. On 21st May, 1802, he petitioned the Orphan's Court, setting forth that his father, Thomas Lawrance, died some time since, leaving an estate, to a part of which he was entitled, that he was above the age of fourteen years and under the age of twenty-one years, and prayed that he might be permitted to choose a guardian to take charge of his person and estate during his minority. He made choice of Joseph Budd. and he was appointed.

THOMAS LAWRENCE'S will is on record at Philadelphia, dated 27th of 1st mo., 1802. Proved Feb. 5th, 1802. Executors: "Son **JOHN LAWRENCE** and esteemed Friend Elliston Perot." The estate was large. Beneficiaries: His nieces, Elizabeth Pearce, widow, Hannah Lawrance, Martha Lawrance, Susanna Lawrance, Sarah Lawrance, daughters of his brother Richard; his nephews Richard Lawrance, Jr. and Josiah Lawrance, sons of his brother Richard, each a legacy; his sister Mary Lawrance, a legacy; all the rest and residue of his estate to his three sons, John, Thomas, Jr., and Samuel, equally share and share alike. His son Thomas to have his household goods and kitchen furniture, his stock in trade, his horse and chaise and the harness thereto belonging. all to be appraised. "And provided lastly that notwith-

"standing anything herein before contained, my son Samuel shall be maintained, supported, educated, clothed and brought up at the cost and charge of my estate generally until he shall attain the age of twenty-one years."

[THOMAS LAWRANCE, Jr., succeeded his father at No. 19 North Water Street; the city Directories locate him there and at Say's Wharf until 1810, when he removed to No. 250 North Second Street, where he remained till his death in 1811.]

EDWARD SHINN LAWRANCE, son of Samuel and Hannah (Shinn) Lawrance, m. Nov. 20th, 1850, ARAMINTHA MARGARET ANNIE, daughter of James Peyton and Araminta (Hunter) Stuart. [James Peyton Stuart was born in Virginia, in 1780, and died in Monongahela City, Pennsylvania, 17th August, 1861. He was descended from some of the oldest and best families in "The Old Dominion." Before he was of full age, he left his father's home and became *self-reliant*, that virtue of all virtues in Anglo-American energy. He went direct to Old Red Stone Fort, on the Monongahela River, and in a short time was engaged in the flour trade down the Rivers Monongahela, Ohio and Mississippi, to New Orleans, when Louisiana was a Spanish Province. Many years before a steamboat was seen on the rivers, and when very few of the human family other than savage American Indians could be seen on their banks, he would load his "Flat-boats" with barrels of flour at "old-red-stone-fort," and let them float with the current down to New Orleans, where he would sell the flour and the boats, and return by sea to Philadelphia or New York and thence to "Old Red Stone Fort" for a new venture. After a few years, having accumulated considerable property, and Pittsburg, being still a Borough, he settled his family there and embarked largely in the dry goods trade; for nearly a quarter of a century he was the leading dry goods mer-

chant in Pittsburg. After the great fire, which consumed Pittsburg in 1845, he retired from business and spent the remainder of his life on the banks of the Monongahela River, whose bosom had yielded him his first gains, in the enjoyment of an ample fortune, honestly acquired, and the respect of all who knew him, as a man of wonderful energy and unimpeachable integrity.]

EDWARD SHINN and **ARAMINTHA M. A. (Stuart) LAWRENCE** have children:

JAMES PEYTON STUART b. Aug. 6th, 1852, a graduate of "The Lehigh University," Class of '73, in the School of Mechanical Engineering; Degree, M. E. On 22d March, 1875, commissioned an Assistant Engineer in the U. S. Navy. He wears the gold medal of the University, for the best Essay, of his class, in English. The subject being "The Lehigh Valley."

EDWARD STUART b. Jany. 25th, 1854; a matriculate of "The Lehigh University," spent his Freshman and Sophomore years there, left in June, 1873, studied surgery and medicine with the distinguished Surgeon, Dr. F. F. Maury, of Philadelphia; graduated, taking the degree of M. D. at "The Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia," in March, 1879, his subject of Thesis being "Delirium Tremens." He is a member of "The First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry," elected 5th Jan'y, 1874. He was elected a member of "The Philadelphia County Medical Society," on Oct. 20th, 1880, and, same year, elected an Assistant on the Surgical Clinic of The Jefferson Medical College Hospital.

JOSIAH RANDALL b. Sept. 17th, 1856, a matriculate of "The Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia."

WILLIAM HUNTER b. Oct. 26th, 1858, a Cadet Engineer, second class, U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, appointed October 1st, 1879.

ST. LAWRENCE JACKSON b. March 19th, 1862, a matriculate of "The University of Pennsylvania," Towne Scientific School.

EDWARD STUART LAWRENCE, M. D., m. 21st July, 1879, his first cousin, **JEANIE LETITIA**, only child of Andrew Jackson and Margaret Ann (Sampson) Stuart. They have a son **JACKSON STUART**, b. 5th June, 1880.

[From **RICHARD** of London, to **JACKSON STUART**, of Philadelphia, born in 1880, both inclusive, seven generations of males, in a direct line.]

EDWARD S. LAWRANCE, Esq., of Philadelphia, read Law with **Josiah Randall**, Esq., of Philadelphia; during his minority his uncle, the honorable **WILLIAM NORTON SHINN**, of Burlington County, New Jersey, was the guardian of his person and estate; on June 2d, 1847, on Mr. Randall's motion, he was admitted to practice in the courts of Philadelphia, and on 10th December, 1849, on motion of Mr. Randall. he was admitted to practice in The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

In 1853, The Select and Common Councils of Philadelphia, elected him a School Director, to fill the unexpired term of **Francis Wharton**, Esq., resigned.

In 1854, he was elected again by the Councils, and after the consolidation of the city in that year, he was elected to the same office by the people, for one year.

In 1855, he was elected again to the same office by the people, for a term of three years, which he resigned in October of that year.

In 1858, he was a Corporator and Treasurer of The Philadelphia College of Medicine.

On the 7th of January, 1864, he was elected a member of "The First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry," and continued active until March 6th, 1876, when his name was transferred, upon his own application, to the non-active roll of the Company.

[The First Centennial Anniversary of The Troop was 17th November, 1874. It was celebrated for three days, November 15th, 16th and 17th, in a grand and imposing manner. A beautiful and costly badge, composed of silver and gold, was conferred on each and every member who turned out with The Troop, in uniform, on those three days, to be held in perpetuity by himself and his

family, in commemoration of the event. Mr. LAW-RANCE and his son, EDWARD STUART LAW-RANCE, M. D., have two of those badges, as both, father and son, turned out together as active members in uniform. A similar circumstance could not be recalled in the history of The Troop.]

He was a Corporation Trustee and Chairman of the Board of Corporation Trustees of "The Hahnemann Medical College of Philadelphia;" *also*, a Manager and a Trustee and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of The Hospital of "The Hahnemann Medical College of Philadelphia," from 1867 until his resignation in 1878.

He was one of the *founders*, and the First Warden and a Vestryman of "The Church of The Good Shepherd," Radnor, Pennsylvania.

His most conspicuous professional labor was his conduct of the settlement of the affairs of The Honorable John Nicholson, of Philadelphia, who was the first Controller General of Pennsylvania, and who was connected with The Honorable Robert Morris, of revolutionary renown, and James Greenleaf, Esq., in the latter part of the last century, in very extended landed speculations. they had issued their negotiable paper for over two millions of dollars, which caused them to fail financially in 1798; they were all incarcerated in the Philadelphia Prison, in which Mr. Nicholson died in 1800. They had established "The North American Land Company" in 1795, with six millions of acres of land—*also*, a Trust, to secure their notes amounting to \$2,000,000; *also*, "The Aggregate Fund" Deed, which contained a large part of the land on which now stands the City of Washington, and several other land companies. These very important matters have had Mr. Lawrance's attention for a period of twenty-five years and they are still unsettled; the cases have gone from court to court and three times to The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania—See 7 Wright: 10 P. F.

Smith: and 2 Norris. They have claimed the attention of the best legal ability in Philadelphia. Mr. Lawrance is now the administrator of the estate of John Nicholson, deceased, having been appointed on the 20th of March, 1874. His offices are at No. 206 West Washington Square, where they have been continuously since 1st August, 1857.

Mr. LAWRENCE'S *four* great-grand fathers bore the surnames of Lawrance, Shinn, Norton, and Palmer. Three of them, Lawrance, Norton, and Palmer, have been ennobled and emblazoned in Heraldry, in England. The remaining one, Shinn, seems not to have been so prominent a name in England; but when New Jersey was planted, that name took deep root in her virgin soil. No family in New Jersey have for the same time, covering a period of two hundred years, been more respected, or held more wealth, power and influence, in New Jersey, than the family which sprang from the loins of John Shinn, *the proprietor*.

The LAWRENCES and the WASHINGTONS, in England, quartered their arms, and in America a LAURENS precedes the WASHINGTON in the Presidency of the country. HENRY LAURENS was our first President.

4. JOSIAH LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrance, died 7th of 9th mo., 1774, unmarried.

5. JESSE LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrance, died 27th of 9th mo., 1749, in infancy.

6. RICHARD LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrance, married REBEKAH LEWIS, daughter of Jacob Lewis, Esq., of Philadelphia. His town residence was on the South side of Walnut Street, East of Third Street; the grounds

RICHARD CHARLES LAWRENCE, Esquire, of Gloucester, Massachusetts, is now the head of the only branch of the family, bearing the name, in this country, other than that branch of Philadelphia, of which EDWARD SHINN LAWRENCE, Esquire, is now the head.

7. JASON LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrence, married MARY O'BRIEN, a beautiful Creole, of New Orleans. Louisiana being then a Province of Spain. So exuberant and luxuriant was her hair, that when let loose, it would reach down to her feet, and she would envelop her entire body in it. She was familiarly called "La belle Sauvage."

She bore him one son only: JASON O'BRIEN.

JASON, her husband, died about 1796, leaving her a widow. She afterward married Dr. FLOOD, of New Orleans.

JASON O'BRIEN, son of Jason and Mary (O'Brien) Lawrance, was born in New Orleans, in 1791, and was a minor when his father died. After his uncle David Lawrance died, in Philadelphia, he petitioned the Justices of the Orphans' Court for permission to choose a guardian, stating that by the death of his uncle David Lawrance he was entitled to certain personal estate in the City of Philadelphia, that his father was dead and his mother lived in New Orleans; he named his cousin Thomas Lawrance and he was appointed. In 1808, Thomas Lawrance renounced the office, and Chandler Price, a prominent merchant, was appointed in his place. He graduated at "The University of Pennsylvania," taking the degree of M. D. in 1815, having been six years engaged in study at the time when he received his diploma. His residence was Louisiana, and his "subject of essay" was "Fractures of the Thigh Bone." He returned to New Orleans and began the practice of medicine with his stepfather Dr. FLOOD. In 1818 Dr. LAWRENCE came back to Philadelphia. He had ambition and capacity to be a teacher; but not considering it expedient to set up in opposition to the University, he believed that there was opportunity for a successful season for private practice between the time when the University lectures closed in March, and the resumption in November. Acting upon that theory, he *founded* the Philadelphia School of Anatomy in March, 1820. He lectured six times a week, "and his personal qualities, as well as his ease and perspicuity as a lecturer, made his school a decided success." In the fall of 1820, he was made assistant to Dr. Gibson, Professor of Surgery at the University, and in 1822 also an assistant to Dr. Horner, then Adjunct Professor of Anatomy. These positions did not interfere with the anatomical school, which was a summer arrangement. In the summer of 1822, he, assisted by Drs. Harlan and Coates, members of a committee appointed by the Academy of Medicine, made upwards of ninety experiments on living

animals, in order to determine the correctness of the theory of Magendie that absorption was possible by other channels than by the absorbent vessels, especially by the veins. In 1823 he and Dr. Coates performed over one hundred experiments upon living animals for the same purpose. They also commenced experiments to determine absorption by the brain; before they were concluded Dr. **LAWRANCE** died on the 19th of August, 1823, at No. 139 South Fifth Street, Philadelphia, from the effects of typhoid fever, which he caught while attending the poor in the Ridge road district. He was surgeon to the Philadelphia Hospital. Had life been spared him, he would undoubtedly have become a great teacher. He was a perfect enthusiast, and cared nothing for personal danger. In New Orleans he had performed autopsies on the bodies of victims of yellow fever, which were pronounced reckless in their character. In 1820 he left a complete record of such examinations. It is probable that he was one of the first persons in Philadelphia to practice vivisection. He was an officer of The Phrenological Society and a member of The American Philosophical Society. In 1814-15, he was a resident Physician in the Pennsylvania Hospital. He married **MARY ROBISON MIFFLIN**, the only sister of the late Benjamin Mifflin. They had one child only: **MARY F.**, who died unmarried. Dr. **LAWRANCE** died intestate. Dr. Coates wrote an Obituary Notice of him, and Professor Samuel Jackson wrote his Eulogium; both are published at length, in the Philadelphia Jour. Med. and Phys. Sci. 1823, at pages 171 and 376. His estate went to his widow and only child, **MARY F.** The child being about two years of age, her mother was appointed her guardian. After her mother's death, Stephen Baldwin and Henry A. Boardman were, in March, 1835, appointed her guardians, she being under fourteen years of age; in August, 1836, she being then over fourteen years of age, her Uncle Benjamin Mifflin was appointed her guardian, on her petition, and Stephen

Baldwin and Henry A. Boardman were agreeably to their request discharged by the Court. She died in her minority, intestate, and her Uncle Benjamin Mifflin became her administrator; an auditor, appointed by the Court, divided her estate among her uncles: Benjamin Mifflin, Henry Mifflin, Edward Mifflin and Thomas Mifflin, and Henry Flood, a half brother, and Catherine Flood, a half sister of her father; in equal shares. No LAWRENCE appeared to make a claim to any part of it.

8. ISAAC LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrence, died 10th mo. 23d, 1753, in infancy, not one month old.

9. SAMUEL LAWRENCE, son of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrence, d. 11th mo. 11th day, 1817; testate and unmarried. His will is recorded at Mount Holly, New Jersey; dated 8th day of 10th mo., 1817. He gave his entire estate to his brother Richard and sister Mary, and named his brother Richard as sole executor.

10. MARY LAWRENCE, daughter of Thomas and Susanna (Van Eman) Lawrence, d. 2d mo. 24th, 1837; testate and unmarried. Her will is recorded at Mount Holly, New Jersey; dated 22d of 11th mo., 1836; proved March 8th, 1837. Peter De Cou, Executor. Beneficiaries: Her nieces, Amy Fenimore, Susanna Folwell, Susanna Leeds, Martha Smith (wife of Seth); grandnieces, Elizabeth Folwell, Ann Folwell, Susanna Folwell, Esther G. Fenimore, Elizabeth G. Lawrence, Caroline E. Lawrence, Mary Leeds, Margaret Leeds; grandnephews, John Folwell, Richard Lawrence, Samuel L. Smith (son of Seth).

The two brothers, Thomas and Richard, had precisely the same domestic experience in early life:

Thomas married first Hannah Hallowell, who bore him a son, named John, after his grandfather John

Hallowell. The child and his mother both died young, and Thomas married secondly Ann Palmer, by whom he had his family.

Richard married first Rebekah Lewis, who bore him a son, named Jacob Lewis, after his grandfather Jacob Lewis. The child and his mother both died young, and Richard married secondly Mary Milnor, by whom he had his family.

A remarkable coincidence.

DAVID LAWRENCE, when he was about fifty years of age, went over to London, to look after some property interest for the family. He landed at Bristol, the 7th mo. 9th, 1789, and remained in England until about 1796. He took his father's family Bible with him.

Soon after his arrival in London, he found it would be necessary to file a Bill in Chancery. A Bill was drawn, dated 26th November, 1789, and filed: "David Lawrence and others against Samuel Dixon and others," which was pending six or seven years.

The contention was for a sum of £2000 sterling. The final termination of the suit was as follows:

"Upon opening debate in the matter and hearing the same, order dated the 20th day of July, 1791, the said decree dated the 5th day of February, 1793, the said Masters report dated the 22d day of June, 1795, a letter of attorney signed Thomas Lawrence, Richard Lawrence, Samuel Lawrence and Mary Lawrence, dated the 5th day of June, 1789, an order dated the 3d day of July, 1795, a decree of attorney signed Jason Lawrence and the account of general certificate read and what was alleged by the Court on both sides. His Honor doth order that the cash in bank standing in the name of the Accountant General of this Court on the credit of this cause be paid the plaintiff David Lawrence—one-sixth part thereof in his own right and

"the remaining five-sixth parts thereof in trust for the
 "five persons, Thomas Lawrance, Richard Lawrance Jason
 "Lawrance, Samuel Lawrance and Mary Lawrance, his
 "brothers and sister, in equal shares. *And it is further*
 "*ordered* that the papers and writings deposited with the
 "said Master belonging to the plaintiff be delivered to the
 "plaintiff as belonging to him in his own right, and in
 "trust for the benefit of the said other persons, and that
 "the papers and writings deposited with the said master
 "belonging to the defendant, be delivered to the defend-
 "ant who deposited the same, and for the purpose as-
 "signed, the said Accountant General is to draw on the
 "bank, according to the form prescribed by the Act of
 "Parliament, and the General Rule and Orders of the Court
 "in that case made and provided.

"P. W."

The following letters relate to the same subject matter:

"LONDON, 2d mo. 5, 1793.

"Esteemed Friend,

"I was in hopes of seeing thee during
 "my stay here; and some days ago hearing thou had
 "called at the Poultry but an hour or two before I got
 "there from Walthamstow; I staid within in the expect-
 "tation of thy calling again. I much wish to know the
 "present situation of thy suit, and thy prospect of end-
 "ing it. A line of information left or addressed to No.
 "10 Poultry will reach me at Brighton, and be very ac-
 "ceptable. I am about returning to my family, after an
 "absence of near three weeks. They were in pretty good
 "health, and likely to continue there some months. If I
 "can in anywise serve thee, I wish thee to mention wherein
 "with freedom.

Dear Brother:

I received thy letter per the *Tiger*, dated the 9th mo., and am sorry to find thee has been obliged to have recourse to the law again for a settlement of that troublesome business; it is a most surprising thing, as our proofs have been made to satisfaction, that there should be such an astonishing delay in their giving a decree. Is there no such thing as having an interview with the Lord Chancellor, and representing the case to him? I understand Jno. Elmsley did in Hallowell's case. It has been upward of five years since thee went over and a considerable time since the proofs have been made in our favor; there seems but little for them to do in the case but to allow Dixon what they think Aunt had of Wright's estate. His conduct from the beginning has been very wide from what I should expect from an honest man: in the first place he never, that we were informed of, sent over to make any enquiry for our father, in order to remit him the £1,000 legacy, and when thee went over he would give thee no opportunity of an interview with him for years, and I believe his last proposal was for no other end than to spin out time. Thee has not informed me if he has given security, perhaps he may make away all his property, he has so many years for it. I am afraid our Attorney is deficient in his duty. There is a friend, Nicholas Waln, recommended thee to Joseph Gurney Bevan, a very capable man. I find his name as Clerk to the yearly Meeting of London's Epistle; I think it would be well to

advise with him on the case, as it is likely to take its course in law, thro' his base conduct. I hope thee will come upon no other terms with him than what he is allowed by the Court, and, as for Court charges, I think it very unjust if a dishonest man gets possession of his neighbor's property and stands a suit with him for years and is cast, he shall be at no expense, but his neighbor's property must pay all. I am informed there is an action open against him for charges. I am very sorry for our relation Borrett's misconduct, and hope his misfortune may have a tendency to reclaim him. I have desired Brother Samuel to write no more there; he informed me he did not know they had postage to pay, but he did not say he would or would not write again. If thee should be favored to get any part of the property more than the expenses, I think best of lodging it in William Dillwyn's hands, till we should draw for it. Exchange is very high here now, upward of eighty. We are, thanks to the Lord, in as good health as common; hoping these may find thee better than when thee wrote. William Lovet Smith was buried last fourth-day, he died with the colic. We are favored here with peace and a mild Government, while most part of Europe is convulsed with war and devastation; for which I hope we may be truly thankful. So conclude with hopes we may be favored to see thee in the Spring, and remain thy loving brother,

So the family record appeared in the Bible when the Bible was put in evidence, in the suit in Chancery.

The large "A," and the small (a.) (b.) (c.) and (d.), were so marked by the Master in Chancery, that he could refer to them as Exhibits, in making his Report.

THE BIBLE was brought home again by DAVID LAWRENCE, and passed into the possession of his sister MARY, who bequeathed it to her niece AMY FENIMORE, and after her death it went into the possession of her daughter Hetty, who, with great liberality, presented it to EDWARD S. LAWRENCE, as the head of the Lawrence family of Philadelphia. It has been read and highly valued by five generations.

Mr. LAWRENCE, of Philadelphia, has in his possession another book, printed in LONDON, 1740, which belonged to his great-grandfather, Thomas Lawrence, entitled "The Young Mathematician's Guide: Being a Plain and Easy Introduction to the MATHEMATICKS." In Five Parts. By JOHN WARD. Dedicated To the Honorable Sir RICHARD GROSVENOR, of Eaton, in the County Palatine of Chester, BARONET.

On its inner cover is the following inscription:—

"Thomæ" "Laurentius.)

Thomas Lawrence" . . .

***Est Verus Possessor—Hujus, Libri,
Londinensis".Anno Domini. 1751.***

Ætatis' Suae. 45.

At that time Books were very scarce in the Province of New Jersey.

JOSIAH RANDALL LAWRENCE, *third child* of Edward Shinn and Aramintha Margaret Annie (Stuart) Lawrence, studied medicine with his Brother Dr. Edward Stuart Lawrence, and graduated at The Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia,

on the 30th of March, 1882, taking the Degree of M. D. His subject of Thesis was, "Pathology of Typhoid Fever."

[**RICHARD CHARLES LAWRANCE, Jr.**, enlisted July 25th, 1864, in the Martin Guards, a New Hampshire Company, for coast defence, and was discharged Sept. 16th, 1864. He enlisted again Jan'y 26th, 1865, in Company H, 18th Reg't New Hampshire Volunteers, and served till July 28th, 1865. This Reg't was attached to the 9th Army Corps before Petersburg. At the engagement at Fort Stedman he was promoted Corporal. In 1871, he was Sergeant of Company G., 8th Reg't Infantry, Massachusetts Volunteer Militia; May 23d, 1873, promoted to Second Lieutenant, and Nov. 18th, 1874, to Captain: commissioned by Gov. Talbot, of Massachusetts. On July 29th, 1878, discharged at his own request. This Regiment received a complimentary letter of thanks from Congress. It was sent by the Governor of Massachusetts, to Philadelphia, in 1876, and is considered the best Reg't in Massachusetts.]

EDWARD SHINN LAWRANCE, second child of Dr. Edward Stuart and Jeanie Letitia (Stuart Lawrance, was born on the second of April, 1882.

He is **EDWARD S. LAWRANCE**, 3d, and from **RICHARD LAWRANCE**, of London, both inclusive, the seventh generation of males in a direct line.

LAWRENCE!—MEN, gallant in chivalry—brave in battle on land and sea—learned in art, science, law, medicine and theology—canonized in the Church for courage, charity and piety—wise in magistracy, diplomacy and Senates—successful in commerce and finance—you have given to England an Archbishop of Canterbury; a Premier; a Viceroy of India; one of her most eminent

Painters; a President of the Royal Academy; and to her Capital, Aldermen, Sheriffs and Lord Mayors. In return you have received great honors and decorations. It would be tedious to enumerate and describe the many Coats of Arms conferred upon you. Your lineage is one of the proudest in the land.

"The Lawrences were allied to all that was great and illustrious; cousins to the ambitious Dudley, Duke of Northumberland; to the Earl of Warwick; to Lord Guilford Dudley, who expiated on the scaffold the short-lived royalty of Lady Jane Gray; to the brilliant Leicester, who set two queens at variance; and to Sir Philip Sidney, who refused a throne."

THOMAS.

PHILIP THOMAS, of the mercantile firm of Thomas and Devonshire, at Bristol, England, b. about 1600, is the earliest *proven* ancestor of this family. An old tradition connects the family with the first Norman Archbishop of York, Thomas de Douvre d. 1100, whose brother Sampson was Bishop of Worcester, but it is totally without foundation. The coat of arms borne by the Emigrant ancestor (argent, a chevron chequy of or and sable between three ravens close of the last) on his gold headed cane, and service of silver, leads me rather to connect him with the celebrated Sir Rhys ap Thomas K. G. of Carew Castle, Pembrokeshire, South Wales, who bore argent, a chevron sable, between three ravens close of the last. These arms were authenticated for Philip E. Thomas by the late Sir Charles G. Young Garter King at Arms. The connection with the Knight of Carew I formerly attempted to trace through a supposed younger son of his unfortunate grandson and heir Rice ap Griffith, by the name of Thomas, but the State paper relied on to support this by mentioning him as with James ap Griffith his father's cousin, at the Court of Scotland, does not do so, and I am at present unable to say whose son he was. I find him in the latter part of the sixteenth century occupying land in the parish of Ebbernant in Caermarthenshire, Wales. He md. Sybell dau. of Philip Scidamore, and his wife Joan, widow of Walter Kyrle; and grandau. of John Scudamore, a Gentleman Usher to

K. Henry VIII. She brought him the demesne lands of Grosnant Manor, Monmouthshire, and a grist mill near by. Their son John Philip Thomas inherited this before 1585, and in 1591 was Queen's lessee of mills at Kenchurch in the same Shire. I have supposed him to be the Emigrant's grandfather by Evan Thomas of Swansea b. 1580 d. 1650, whose name begins the Pedigree of the family compiled by the late Philip E. Thomas. As his papers upon the pedigree have been lost I cannot say what authority he had for the existence and citizenship of this Evan Thomas. I find notices of an Evan Thomas who was a member of the Awennydyon or College of Bards of Glamorgan in 1620; and a Captain Evan Thomas who was one of the principal members of a Baptist Congregation, near Swansea, in 1672; but I do not know if either or both are the same with Evan of Swansea. Philip Thomas, the Emigrant, may have been the Philip Thomas in the the East India Company's service in 1621, and in London in 1638 as a Messenger of the Commissioners for Charitable Uses. He certainly emigrated to the Province of Maryland in 1651. The earliest record of a land grant to him dated February 19th, 1651-2, conveys to him 500 acres of land called "Beckley" on the west side of Chesapeake Bay "in consideration that he hath in the year 1651 transported himself, Sarah his wife, Philip, Sarah, and Elizabeth his children into this our province." Between 1658 and 1661 he had granted him 100 acres called "Thomas Towne," in 1665 a grant of 120 acres called "Fuller's Poynt," in 1668 a grant of 300 acres called "The Planes," in 1672 a grant of 200 acres called "Phillip's Addicion," and numerous other grants of unnamed tracts. This land lay mostly in Anne Arundel County and in the neighborhood of what is now known as West River. "Fuller's Poynt" between the Severn and South Rivers is now known as Thomas' Point, and in the site of a light-house. A man of character and position, he acquired considerable

influence in the affairs of the Colony, and became one of the leaders of the Puritan party. When under Capt. William Fuller, the Puritans gained possession of the Government, he was appointed a member of the Provincial Council, and when in 1658 they were compelled to resign their control, he was one of the commissioners to make the surrender.

March 20th, 1658-9, says the old Council Record Book, Liber Hh. "Messrs. Wm. Fuller, Edward Lloyd, Richard Preston, Samuel Withers, Philip Thomas, and Thomas Mears came to St. Leonards in order to the performance of the Articles of Surrender of the Government as intended and arranged between Richard Bennet and others and the Lord Proprietary's Officers, November 30th, 1657.

After this he did not take an active part in the political affairs of the Colony, and seems to have joined the Society of Friends previous to his death. The celebrated George Fox visiting Maryland, Philip Thomas may have been converted to that persuasion by his preaching. His Will was made September 9th, 1674, and probated July 10th, 1675. After her husband's death SARAH THOMAS (according to Philip E. Thomas, "born Sarah Harrison") was a prominent member and probably a minister of the Society of Friends. She d. early in 1687 having had issue:

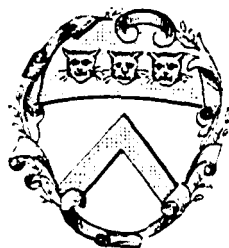

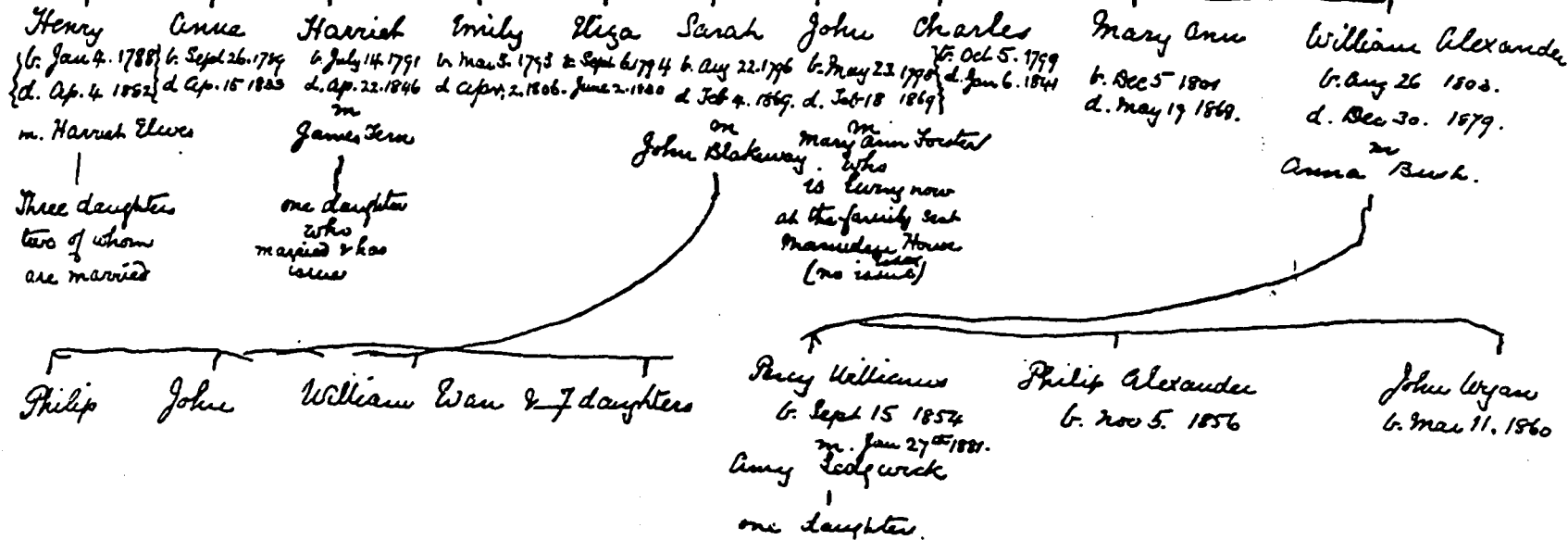

JOHN CHEW, fourth son of Samuel and Mary Thomas, b. October 15th, 1764, resided after his marriage at "Fairland," in Anne Arundel County, which place he afterwards sold for \$50,000. In early life he took an active interest in politics and was elected by the Federal party in Maryland one of their Representatives in the Congress of 1799-1801. As a member of that House he took part in the celebrated election of President in the last named year, which, after three days of intense excitement, and thirty-five ballots, resulted in the election of Thomas Jefferson. On marrying an heiress and becoming a slaveholder, he lost his membership in the Society of Friends, but February 12th, 1812, he manumitted his slaves to the number of over one hundred and was received again into membership with the Society. PHILIP EVAN, third son of Evan and Rachel (Hopkins) Thomas, b. at Mt. Radnor, in Montgomery County, Md., November 11th, 1776, was educated at the District School, under a Mr. Knox, at Bladensburg.

Arriving at manhood, he went to Baltimore, then a town of only 15,000 inhabitants, and was received into the store of his brother-in-law, Thomas Poultney. In 1800 he commenced business on his own account, as a hardware merchant, on Baltimore Street, afterwards taking into partnership his wife's brother, Wm. E. George, and finally his brother Evan. He early took an interest in municipal affairs and public charities, and was the first President of the Maryland Bible Society, and the

Mechanical Fire Company, one of the founders of the Baltimore Library Company, for many years President of the Mechanic's Bank, and advanced the first \$25,000 to begin building the Washington Monument.

During the Fall of 1826 Philip E. Thomas had his mind directed to the loss which Baltimore had sustained by the diversion of a large part of its Western trade to Philadelphia and New York through the Erie Canal, and similar facilities for internal navigation and traffic in the States of New York and Pennsylvania. Gen. Barnard's report, showing the cost of completing the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and the difficulties that lay in its way, convinced him it would not accomplish the desired end in directing the Trade to Baltimore.

At this time Evan Thomas was in Europe, and wrote from England to his brother, giving him an account of the railroad just built from Stockton to Darlington, in Durhamshire, by the enterprise of Joseph Pease of the latter place.

Philip E. Thomas at once saw the utility of railroads as a means of communication and carriers of passengers and freight, and resigning his position as a State



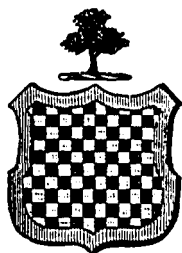

Director of the Canal Company, turned his whole attention to the projection of a railroad connecting Baltimore with the West.

February 12th, 1827, twenty-five of the most influential Merchants of Baltimore met at the residence of Mr. George Brown, pursuant to a call issued by Messrs. Thomas and Brown. At this meeting Philip E. Thomas ably presented the various advantages the railroad system had over the Canal, and the old-fashioned turnpike, in efficiency, rapidity of Carriage and ultimate economy, and a committee was appointed to further examine the subject, and report to a public meeting. This committee consisted of Philip E. Thomas, Chairman, Benjamin C. Howard, George Brown, Talbot Jones, Joseph W. Patterson, Evan Thomas and John V. L. McMahon. The following Monday, February 19th, the committee presented their report, written by their chairman, which was unanimously adopted, and ordered to be printed and widely distributed.

A charter for a Road having been obtained, largely through the instrumentality of John V. L. McMahon, and the proposed amount of stock speedily taken, and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company was duly organized April 24th, 1827, being the first one in America.

The first Board of Directors were: Philip E. Thomas, President; George Brown, Treasurer; Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, William Patterson, Robert Oliver, Alexander Brown, Isaac McKim, William Lorman, George Hoffman, Thomas Ellicott, John B. Morris, Talbot Jones and William Steuart.

A committee of Engineers was appointed to make the necessary surveys for the route of the Road, con-

sisting of Colonel Stephen H. Long and Jonathan Knight, on the part of the Company, assisted by a number from the U. S. Topographical Corps; Philip E. Thomas being its chairman. April 5th, 1828, Messrs. Long and Knight reported the completion of their surveys, and choice of a route along the Valley of the Patapsco, and thence in the direction of Linganore Creek to the Point of Rocks.

July 4th, of the same year, the "first stone" was laid by Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, with great ceremony and a magnificent procession of Associations, Trades and Professions. Before the road passed four miles from the city, it encountered a high dividing ridge, which had to be cut down fifty-four feet through a hard clay, involving an expense far beyond the estimates, and the funds prepared to meet them. The President and nine of the Directors immediately advanced \$20,000 apiece, which met the difficulty, and the road was completed to the Point of Rocks. Here it was delayed by the action of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, and it was not until after long and vexatious litigation that a compromise was effected.

In June, 1830, the road was opened for passenger travel as far as Ellicott's Mills; horse and mule power being used. Among other experiments in motive power tried during this first year, Evan Thomas constructed a car with sails, called the "Æolus," which attracted much attention, and a model of it was sent to Russia.

April 1st, 1832, the whole line was opened to the Point of Rocks. In 1831 it was decided to adopt steam as a motive power, and Locomotives replaced the horses and mules previously employed.

In 1833 the dispute with the Canal Company was adjusted, and the Rail Road was soon open to Harper's Ferry. June 30th, 1836, Philip E. Thomas, against the earnest remonstrances of the Board, resigned the Presidency of the Company, being compelled to do so by the state of his health.

In one of the resolutions passed by the Board on this occasion they say: "On the commencement of this work, of which he has been, in fact, the father and projector, everything connected with its construction was new, crude and doubtful, with little to guide the way, and that derived from distant and uncertain sources; now, such has been the increase of information and experience acquired under his auspices and direction, as to insure the completion and success of the undertaking, if prosecuted with the same zeal, assiduity and integrity which have ever marked his course."

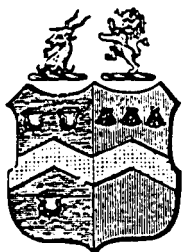
Philip E. Thomas was a prominent member of the Society of Friends, of which his father had been an eminent Minister; was much interested in the cause of the Indians, several of their young men were educated at the same school with his sons, and it was owing to his exertions that the remnant of the Six Nations, residing in Western New York, were not driven from their Reservation by the intrigues of the Ogden Land Company with their chiefs. The chiefs were deposed, and a republican form of government established. He was afterwards made a chief of the Swan tribe of Seneca Indians, by the name of "Sagouan" or bountiful giver, and represented them in their intercourse with the government at Washington. 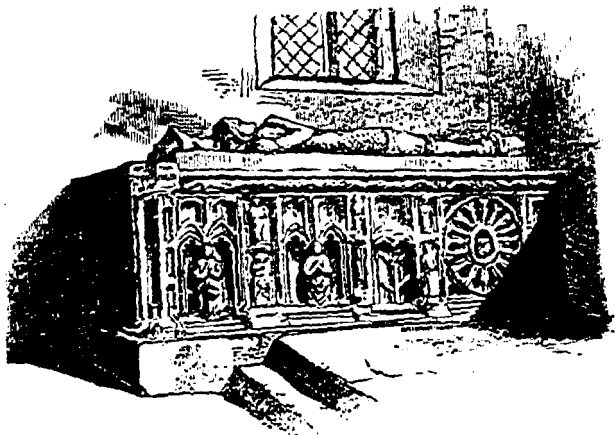

NOTICES OF SIR RHYS AP THOMAS, K. G.

August 6th, 1494, Res ap Thom's Knyght Seals a deed with a square coat of arms having a raven between two flowering plants, over the raven the letter R. His Garter plate at Windsor has the motto "*Secret et hardi.*" This badge of a raven is a boss in the vaulting of the choir.

Sir Rhys' figure on his tomb at St. Peter's Church, Caermarthen (see the engraving) is recumbent in the attitude of prayer; in mail and chain armour, armorial bearings on the breast, with the cloak and Collar of the Garter, head resting on a pillow, shield, helmet and lambrequin; the crest broken off just above the wreath; pillow, &c. curiously supported by the Dragon of Wales, lying on its back clasping the shield, his head issuing out of the wreath. At each top corner of the slab the arms are repeated. The feet rest against a couchant lion with his head twisted back. The figure of Lady Rhys is of small size in act of prayer, robes and cap temp. Henry VII. no animal at the feet. See Topographer and Genealogist 1846, page 562.

Nicholas' County families of Wales Vol. I, 241, prints the letter of Sir Rhys to Richard III, evading his request to send his son as a hostage and pledging fidelity to Richard.

Elias Ashmole's Institution, &c., of the Order of the Garter, Folio 713 gives Sir Rhys' arms.

Anstis' Memorials of the Garter has notices of him Vol. I, 237, 238, 247, 264, 279, 292, 369, &c. A biography of Sir Rhys and notice of his ancestry may be found in Vol. I, of the Cambrian Register London 1796. I have never been able to see a copy of this rare volume.

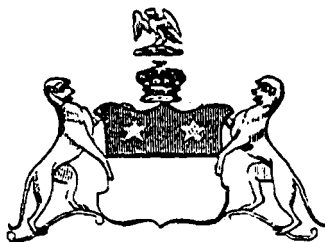

Item I will that all my plate be weyed and valued to the uttermost except suche plate as I have before bequeathed to

To be devided betwene them as by the ouerseers of this my testament shallbe thought goode trusting that they will consider that those which be (not?) married to have more to their porcions than they that be married and hath somewhat alredy. Item I geve and bequeth unto eu'ery houshold serv'nt of myn their hole wages for oon yere. And will that their horses and harneys remayn w^t them and not to be taken from any of theym. Item I will that fyue poundes in londes be surely founded to the gray freres of Kermerdyn for a Chauntry there to fynde two prests to pray for me and my wife forever. Item I geve and bequeth to the overseers of this my testament to se my will p^rfourmed for their payne an labour xx^{ll}. The Residue of my goodes and catell not bequethed I geve and grannt to my sonne Ris Griffith whom I do ordeyn and constitute to be myn executour through thadvise of the right honourable and mighty prince the Duke of Norfolks grace. So as my said sonne may ordeyn and dispose the same as he shall think goode unto the pleasure of almighty god for the welthe of my soule. Moreover I doo ordeyn and constitute to be overseers of this my will and testament my lord pryour of Kermerdyn, Doctour John Vaughan, Maister lloid Chaunter of saint David, Maister Stradling, Chauncelo^r of the same, Maister Lewis Griffith, William John ap Thomas, Thomas John's, David Lloid, Lewis Thomas ap John and howell ap Ridderch. Witnesse beinge present att the making herof Doctour David Mathvey, wardeyn of the gray freres of Kermerdyn, Maister John Lewis, Tresorer of saint David, Jem'i (?) Lloid, &c &c, with all the overseers aforenamed and many others."

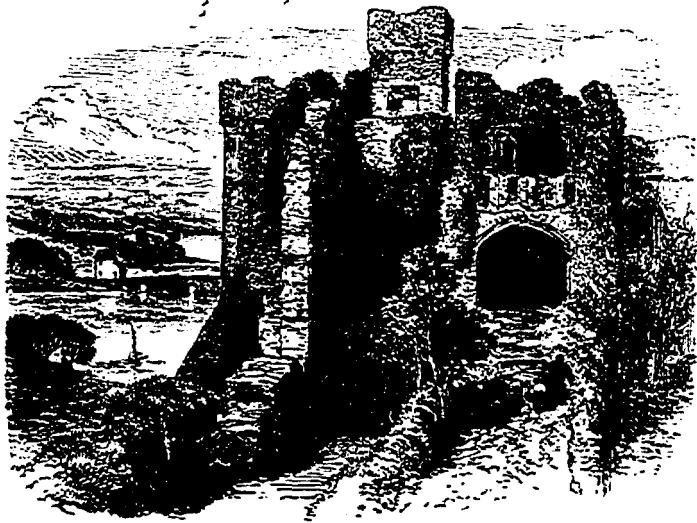

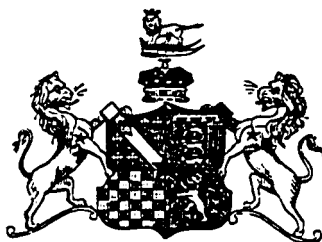

William Thomas born at Bristol in 1613, chaplain to Duke of York and Preceptor to Princess Anne, afterwards Lord Bishop of Worcestor d. 1689 was of a very ancient and noble family as appears by his pedigree taken out of the Heralds office in 1688 to prove his right to the Arms of Herbert. His father was John Thomas, Linen draper of Bristol, who lived in his own house on the Bridge in that

town, his grandfather was Recorder of Caermarthen, where the family had lived long time with great credit. The Bishop's son William b. 1670 was Rector of St. Nicholas in Worcester, in 1723 published a survey of Worcester Cathedral and other works and d. in 1728. Swansea Parish Church, St. Mary's has an East window in the decorated style in its chancel the only part of the church dates back of 1739 when the rest of the church fell down. This window is said to contain the Thomas arms.

Chew Magna, and Chewton are villages in Somersetshire England. The only arms ascribed to Chew (of London and Bedfordshire) are: Azure, a Catherine Wheel, or, between two griffin's heads erased, argent. Crest: a griffin sejant argent gutte'e de sang; beaked, legged, and winged sable, reposing his dexter foot on a catherine wheel gules. Granted Sept. 15. 1703 The arms engraved are to be found on a seal ring used by Dr. Sam'l Chew Chief

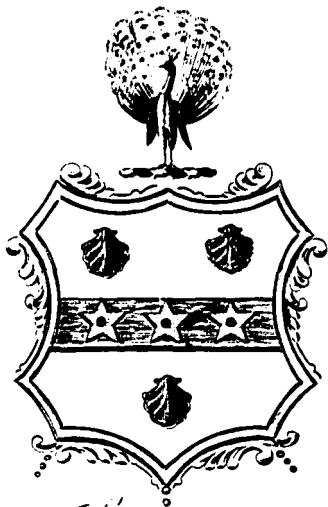

Names James Chew of Bristol, Somersetshire in a list of bankrupts; In a list of the inhabitants of Flushing Long Island in 1698. appear Richard Chew & Frances his wife, Rich'd, Henry, Tho, Hannah, Charley, Mary, and Elizabeth. In the Surrogates office New York are the Wills of Thomas Chew made Sept. 30. 1846 and of Robert Chew then in New York, made Nov. 20. 1860.

SNOWDEN.

Domestic State Papers. Richard Snowden, Merchant is taken prisoner by the rebels in Ireland in July. 1529: John Snowden who returned to England in 1591 which he left in 1582 was a priest, born in Worcester, a spy of Burleigh's, but would not "inform against a Catholic for religion but only for treason." "A mean fellow Dr. Robert Snowden made Bishop of Carlisle in 1616." George Snowden of Ashe, Co. Kent mentioned May. 7. 1622. Thomas Snowden has a grant of an almsroom in St. Stephen's Westminster Oct. 15. 1631. S. P. D. Luke Snowden aged 21 years having a certificate from the Minister of Gravesend embarked in the Primrose for Virginia. July 27. 1635. Hotten's Lists. Rutland Snoden, Justice of the Peace Co. Lincoln, June 30. 1686 S. P. D. Ditto. a delinquent Apl.

22. 1648. 7th Report Hist. Mss. Commission. John Snowden signs a testimonial of Gisborough Friends' Meeting Yorkshire 3 mo. 28th 1754. Henry Snowden of Talbot Co. Maryland in his Will dated Mch. 7. 1699 proved June 20. 1699 mentions his wife Elenor, & sons William, Henry, and child his wife was now pregnant with; and daughters Rachel and Henrietta Maria. Liber H. 267 Wills at Annapolis, Md. Friends' Testimonies London 1760 contains one to Mary Snowden of Gisborough Meeting in Yorkshire d. in 6th month 1745 in the 57th year of her age. BUCKLEY.

Domestic State Papers. Mr. Buckley a papist had a factor at Rouen in France in 1589. Sir Richard Buckley (? Bulkeley) is a justice of the peace in Cheshire suspected to be a papist in 1580. Matthew Buckley in early part of Elizabeth's reign, is accused by a servant of an intended secret departure from London. William Buckley refuses to pay money for beacons Feb. 6. 1627. Father Giles a French priest, robbed by his own servant in the house of Brandon Buckley of London Jany. 25. 1627. Richard Buckley a fellow of St. John's College Cambridge. in Oct. 1633. Thomas Buckley of Cheshire was imprisoned in 1663 for non-payment of tithes. See Besse's Sufferings of Quakers. William Buckley of Talbot Co. Maryland in his Will made Nov. 28th 1708 mentions his wife Elizabeth; children William, James, Richard, Robert Nicholas deceased & *his* wife Margaret.

Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica I. 100-212 contains a collection of tabular pedigrees of Laurence, Lawrence, Lawrance and Lorance, which need a reference to the original documents for confirmation, as some at least are incorrectly described as Visitation pedigrees of a date when no visitation was made. Ditto. I. 233-237 contains a pedigree of Lawrence of Withington Co. Gloucester, drawn up April 10th, 1840, beginning in 1558.

The anonymous author of "The Normans," recently printed at London writes "William Lorenz was in Normandy 1180-1195, see 'Magno rotuli Scaccariae Normanniae.'" John, Richard and William Laurenz were in England about 1272 see "Rotuli Hundredorum."

Herald & Genealogist VIII, 212. R. Gwynne Lawrence writes "there is a continuous line of the Laurans family in France from Arnold de Luran of Luran near Montpellier in Languedoc A. D. 1110. In 1124 Arnault de Luran and Pierre and Arnault his nephews cede the Chateau to the Compte de Beziers et Carcassone. In 1236 Peter de Luran md. Matilda dau. of Compte Amery III of Clermont-Lodere. Raymond de Luran was living in 1309." Pere Anselme's Histoire Genealogique &c. de France notices Nicholas Laurans de Noyal who md. Aliette du Cambont in Bretagne about 1440; Phillippe Laurans widow of the Seigneur d'Azay le Rideau and dau. of Nicholas Laurance Seigneur de Mamez in 1499; Jean Laurens, Seigneur de la Nouë in 1560; Jacques Laurens Seigneur de la Mothe in 1625; Louis Joseph de Laurens Compte d'Ampos, Capitaine de cavalerie, &c. in 1721 and several others of the name. Pedigrees of the French family may be found in Morel's Grand dictionnaire historique etc.

The earliest of the name in Lancashire I have discovered is William Lawrence, who held in 1311 lands at Ashton, on the Ribble near Preston, in right of his wife, who was a dau. and co-heir of Heydock or Eyedock of Haydock in the same county (this seems to dispose of the crusading

Sir Robert Laurens of Ashton Hall). William Lawrence was a Burgess in Parliament 1326, and living in 1341. His son John succeeded him in his estate in 1368. His inquisition in 1399 reads: John son of William Lawrence dec. 1368 "*feoffavit Laurencium de Myerch cap . . de omnibus terris suis in Ribbleton, Ashton, Preston, Laton et Thornton.*" *idem Johannes obiit die ante Ascensionem* 1398. William his son and heir aged 18 years, Mother, Margaret. In 1344 another William de Lawrence was seneschal, of Henry Earl of Lancaster, Steward of Blackburnshire 1351-1354. He md. Alice de Stapylton dau. of Sir Nicholas de Stapylton by Sybil dau. of Sir John de Bella Aqua, and Laderine who was dau. of Peter Brus of Skelton and Helwyse de Lancaster. William and Alice (Stapylton) Lawrence had a son and heir Sir Edmund who md. Mary ———. Had a manor "*ex dimisione*" from his grandfather, Sir Nicholas de Stapylton, and was summoned to a Parliament at Westminster in 1362 about the affairs of Ireland, as one of the heirs of Camville holding land in Ireland. As he was not again summoned, it is held that no Barony was created by this writ. His heir, apparently, was Sir Robert Lawrence, of Ashton Hall, Escheator of Lancashire in 1403, Sheriff of Lancashire 1407 and 1420 proved his arms 1419, 1427, 1429, obiit 18th, Henry VI. (1440)

According to Harleian Ms. No. 6, 159, a copy of the Visitation of Lancashire in 1567 with additional pedigrees, of which the following is one: He was the son of Edmund Lawrence and had brothers James and William, who both d. s. p.

The best supported version of this pedigree as revised by R. Gwynne Lawrence with corrections from my own researches is as follows:

Sir Robert Lawrence, who may have been Robert Lawrence, Esq., who, with two men at arms and six foot archers, was of the retinue of King Henry V, in 1417 (see Nicholas'

Agincourt, page 381); possibly md. Margaret Holden, of Lancashire. He had issue:

- i. Robert b. in 1400, of whom presently.
- ii. Edmund, who had issue: Thomas d. s. p.; Robert; John, father of John; Nicholas and James both d. s. p.
- iii. Thomas. (q. v.)

Robert, the eldest son, md. Margaret, dau. of John Lawson or Lawrence of Rixton or Raxton, and d. 1450, leaving issue: I. Sir James, Knt. of Ashton, aged 22 at his father's inquisition d. 1490, md. 1st, Cecilia Botiler; and 2d., Eleonora, dau. of Lord Welles and widow of Lord Hoo and Hastings, (Lord Hoo d. 1455,) by whom he had no issue; by his first wife he had: Sir Thomas, K. B., 1501, md. ———, and d. before 1513, having had an only son John d. s. p. abroad before his father; and John md. ——— and d. s. p. at Flodden in 1513, being the last male of the main line. II. Robert, killed at Bosworth in 1485, leaving issue: only daughters (who were co heiresses of their cousin John Lawrence of Ashton) Agnes md. ——— Skillicorne; Margaret md. ——— Rigmayden; Elizabeth md. ——— Butler of Rawcliffe; and Alice md. ——— Clyfton.

Thomas third son of Sir Robert Lawrence of Ashton Hall md. Mabilla dau. and heiress of John Redmayne of Yeland Redmayne and had issue: Edmund of whom presently; John; William; Robert; Richard; James all d. s. p.; and Elizabeth md. John Nausier and had issue: Agnes md. William Preston.

Edmund the eldest son of Thomas and Mabilla (Redmayne) Lawrence had issue at his death 6th Henry VIII: Lancelot. Lancelot Lawrence was heir male of the family and d. 26th Henry VIII leaving issue: Thomas; and Sir Oliver Knighted at the Battle of Musselburg in 1547 d. s. p. Thomas the eldest son d. 35th Henry VIII leaving an only son and heir Robert who d. in the second year of the reign of Philip and Mary possessed of Lands at Yeland

Redmain, Dylake, Heysham, Myddleton, Bolton, Warton, Skirton Hutton, Flokborow, and Sylverdale in Lancashire. He left an only dau. Anne aged 10 at her father's inquisition who was the sole heiress of the family and md. Walter third son of Sir John Sydenham of Brampton, Co. Somerset. See R. G. Lawrence's Article in the Herald & Genealogist VIII. 212 and authorities there referred to, most of which I have verified; also Record Publications, especially Ducatus Lancastriae I. 11. 28. 32. 40. &c. and Parliamentary Writs. I. 3d. 1084.

Robertus Laurence, Miles, d. 18th Henry VI. possessed of Bantheswerth and Dilacre Manors and Noteland "*terra et tenement.*" Westmoreland. (See Duc. Lancastriae. IV. 200.)

Agnes de Berton holds an acre in Canterbury given her by her son Henry de Berton which he had "*de dono Rici Laurence in libo maritalio*" with Cecilia his wife, dau. of Richard Laurence and granddaughter of Wade.

Henry & Cecilia de Berton hold land in the Parish of St. Benedict by gift of Ric. Laurence and Sabine his wife who had brothers John and. Rici Ategate. Also land in St. Botolph's Parish is given by R. L. which came to him in marriage by gift of Rici Ategate. *Placitorum Abbreviatio*. 299. Simonis Laurenz, a clerk is delivered from prison (where he had been put on account of felony.) by order of the Papal administrators of the Archdiocese of Canterbury, St. Michael's Term 1330.

Archaeologia Cambrensis 4th. I. 49. Thomas Lawrence was receiver of Huntington Manor, Hereford in 1413. *Rotuli Normanniae* 66. Petrus Laurence was perpetual chaplain of St. Peters de Cadorno in Normandy Sept. 7. 1417.

Coll. Top. et. Genealogica IV. 220. Walto Le Laurence de Stylton, Hunts. signs a charter Oct. 3. Anno Edward III "a conquestu 4th." IV. 208. John Lawrence Parson of Stavely Co. Derby, May 7. 1575. V. 86. Georgius Laurentius of London a Pilgrim to Rome Aug. 28. 1587. V. 390. Sepulchral inscription of John Laurans existed in the Church of the Grey Friars, London temp. Henry VIII. Hutchin's Dorset part IV. gives some account of the Crick or Creech Grange in Steple Parish, Family descended from Sir Oliver Lawrence Knt. who bought the Grange in 1540, called Grandson of Sir Robert Lawrence of Lancashire. It is to be noted there were Martyn, and Christopher Lawrence in that Parish in 1524 (See Herald and Gen. II. 140). The arms in Steple Church are Lawrence and Washington quarterly with a crescent for difference. These appear in the Lancashire Visitation of 1567 Harleian Ms. 891, without the crescent.

John Lawrence is a Parliamentary Captain of Horse in Norfolk Feby. 27. 1650. Henry Lawrence was paid £215.17.2d. for freight of the Elizabeth of London with provisions to the Army in Ireland Oct. 1. 1651. Col. Lawrence was of the Army in Ireland. Nov. 11. 1652. Major Richard Lawrence is to be sent to the Grand Seigneur from the Council of State Mch. 9. 1653. Is Agent of the Levant Company at Constantinople June 19. 1654. Is to be paid \$4000 and his expenses for his year there Sept. 25. 1654. William Lawrence is one of the Civil Commissioners for Justice in Oct. 1653. Henry Lawrence (the Lord President) added to the Council of State July 14. 1653. The President's first recorded ancestor was an Edmund Lawrence called 4th son of Sir Robert Lawrence of Ashton Hall (This seems merely an attempt to make a connexion with the Lancashire family as there is no evidence offered to substantiate the claim) Edmund had issue: Richard who had a son John; and John Lawrence de Wurdeboys who was Abbot of Ramsey Abbey in Huntingdonshire from 1507; in 1539 he was not only very forward in procuring his own Abbey to be surrendered to the King but influenced others to submit, for which service he obtained according to Dugdale the large pension of £266.13.6d. per annum. In his will dated in 1541 and proved in Nov. 1542 (registro Spert) he makes considerable bequests to the Churches of St. Ives, Ramsey and Burwell, leaves £10. among twenty paupers and his silver plate &c. to his cousin William Lawrence. He desires to be buried in St. Mary's Burwell and appoints William Lawrence of St. Ives one of his executors. John son of Richard and nephew of the Lord Abbot, styled in all evidences "generosus", d. in 1538, leaving by his will (registro Dingley) besides considerable donations to the church, two of his best mares to my Lord of Ramsey for supervising his will. He had issue: Emma md. Gabriel 3d. son of Richard Throckmorton of Higham Ferrers, Sen-

eschal of the Duchy of Lancaster, Agnes md. Gilbert Smyth of Fenton, and William who settled at St. Ives, was High Sheriff of Cambridge and Hunts at the death of Queen Mary, and was buried at St. Ives Dec. 20. 1572. By his will (registro Peter) he bequeathes to his son Henry his armour, the plate he inherited from his uncle the Abbot of Ramsey, and "the iron chest in the Library containing papers which had been particularly mentioned in the will of his father." He md. 1st. Frances Houston, and had by her his heir Henry of whom presently, and William; (ancestor of the Lawrences of Chichester and Aldingbourne) md. 2d. Margaret dau. of Edward Kaye of Woodson in Yorkshire and had further issue: Robert d. in 1597 (ancestor of the Lawrences of Norfolk) Henry the eldest son md. Elizabeth dau. of John Hagar of Bourne Castle Cambridgeshire and was buried at St. Ives Feby. 25. 1580-1, having had a son and heir John, Knighted by James I. in 1603 at Windsor, md. Elizabeth sole dau. and heir of Ralph Waller of Beaconsfield, who after his death md. 2d. Robert Bathurst, Sheriff of Gloucestershire. Sir John Lawrence was buried at St. Ives Feby. 10. 1604. In his will (made Jan. 10. proved Feb. 9. 1604 Registro Hayes) he mentions his two sons Henry and John. The former was then aged 3 years 2 months and 4 days. (Cole's Escheats. Harl. Ms. 760) He entered Emanuel Coll. Cambridge in 1622 as a fellow commoner, B. A. 1623, M. A. 1627. In 1641 was in Parliament as a Knight of the Shire for Westmoreland. From a preface to a work of his printed in 1646 it appears that he was abroad at the begining of the Civil War, "the warre found me abroad not sent me thither, and I have beene onely wary without a just and warrantable reason to ingage my selfe in that condition from which a providence seem'd to rescue mee." He seems to have found such reason shortly thereafter as he appears as a member of Parliament for Hertfordshire in 1653 and July 14. of that year is added to the Council of State by Cromwell, July 27. is on the Committee of Foreign Affairs was present at 17 Sittings of the Council in Nov. and Dec.

1653, and at 164 in 1654 being the only member present at all the sittings. Dec. 19. 1653 Cromwell appointed him Lord President of the Council for one month from date. Jan. 16. 1653-4 there was an order by the Protector that Hen. Lawrence be continued President of the Council until further order Feby. 2. 1654 we find him paid £300 apparently his salary. Notices of his action as Lord President may be found in Domestic State Papers for 1653-4. He was elected M. P. for Colchester and Carnarvonshire in 1656 and chose to sit for the latter Shire. In Dec. 1657 he was gazetted a Lord of the Other House, Cromwell's attempt at a life peerage. As Lord President he took the responsibility of proclaiming Richard Cromwell as his father's successor, but on the Restoration of Charles II was allowed to return to private life. He opposed the execution of Charles I. and there is in Thurloe's State Papers a letter to him from the Queen of Bohemia recommending Lord Craven to his good graces and saying she knew he had only accepted office, in order to render services to those who needed them. He published at Amsterdam in 1646 "*Militia Spiritualis*, a treatise of our Communion and Warre with Angels"; in the same year an anonymous treatise "*on Baptism*"; in 1649 "*A Vindication of the Scriptures*," and in 1652 "*Gospel Ordinances*." The author has a copy of the 3d edition of the first treatise "*on Angels*," formerly in the possession of the Woollaston-White family, heirs of the Presidents grandson Sir Edward Lawrence Bart. Afterwards in that of Capt. J. H. Lawrence-Archer who has made some Mss. memoranda relating to the Lawrence Genealogy of which I have made use in the above sketch of the Lord President's ancestry, in connexion with the Memoir written by Sir James Lawrence, Knight of Malta, and the English State Papers. Capt. Archer also had a photograph made of the unique drawing in the Queen's copy of Clarendon's Rebellion, at Windsor Castle, from which the engraved portrait of the President was facsimiled. He is called Sir Henry Lawrence tho' I have seen no record

of his ever having been Knighted. He md. Amy dau. of Sir Edward Peyton Bart. of Iselham in Cambridgeshire and d. Aug. 8. 1664 intestate. Capt. Archer says the records of the Probate Court show his widow was administratrix; but Sir James Lawrence states that his son Henry administered the estate. According to his gravestone (visible in 1802) in the Chapel at St. Margaret's Als Thele in Hertfordshire the President had issue seven sons and six daughters. Henry M. P. for Carnarvonshire in 1656 d. in 1679 leaving issue: Henry d. u., and Edward created a Baronet with remainder to his sisters son and d. May. 2. 1749; Edward M. P. for Pembrokehire in 1656 and d. in 1657; John, emigrated to Jamaica; William and Martha naturalized as born abroad Nov. 27. 1656, the latter md. Richard Earl of Barrymore; Elizabeth d. in Feb. 1662 aged 30; Theodosia d. Sept. 2. 1664 aged 20; Henrietta d. Sept. 30. 1664 aged 13; the others I have not been able to trace. John Milton is said to have assisted in the composition of the treatise on Angels, and he addressed the President's son Henry in the Sonnet beginning "Lawrence of virtuous father virtuous son."

John Lawrence brother of the Lord President d. in 1670 leaving an only son Dr. Thomas Lawrence Physician to five crowned heads. He d. in 1714 leaving a numerous issue; of whom the eldest a Captain in the Navy was father of Thomas Lawrence President of the College of Physicians and grandfather of Sir Soulden Lawrence. Of this family were the Lawrences of Hackfall, and Studley Royal with Fountain's Abbey Yorkshire.

The Irish family of the name whose members have in the last century distinguished themselves in India and the East, descends from an unknown stock, but has always claimed to have the same ancestry, and Maj. Gen. Stringer Lawrence, Sir Henry Lawrence, and Lord Lawrence, the Viceroy of India, are scions of which any family might be proud.

Gilbert Lawrence 1545. In the Library of St. Mary's College Winchester is an Explanation of the Epistles of St. Paul by James Lawrence 4°. Amsterdam 1642. Peter Lawrence executes deeds for land at Birdbroke or Badbrooke Co. Essex in 1687 and 1689. Rev. H. J. B. Nicholson Rector of Great St. Albans England writes Major J. H. Lawrence-Archer that the Parish Records of one of the Parishes were burned with the Rectory in 1745 there are however two others St. Michael and St. Peter. John Lawrence was Mayor 1567 and 1575. Of the Chief Burgesses were John Lawrence 1553 Barnaby 1574 and Thomas 1622.

Mr. G. D. Scull writes to me from England Mch. 14, 1878 "With the greatest inducement being an old ardent and experienced Genealogist I have sought for proof that my ancestor (William Lawrence of Flushing) was related to the Cromwells and Henry Lawrence his Lord President. This I have utterly failed to do, & I now believe no proof exists to justify such claims." From the authorities to which Mr. Scull refers me in the latter part of his letter, I am disposed to question his "experience" as a Genealogist. They are merely such printed Articles on the pedigree, as the veriest tyro should have examined before beginning his investigations. At the same time I must agree with him that there is no proof offered to show the connexion, while I would hesitate to say there is none extant. Mr. Scull has since the date of his letter discovered a record of the marriage of William Lawrence and Joan Brooke on the Register of St. Stephen's Church just outside of St. Albans dated Feby. 16. 1617-18. From the appropriateness of the wife's Christian name, and the date of the marriage, to the name of the mother and ages of the children who emigrated from St. Albans in the "Planter" in 1635 I have no reasonable doubt they were the ancestors of the American family, but nothing has been learned as to the pedigree of this William Lawrence of St. Albans. That he was of Gentle birth may be presumed from the use of a Seal of Arms by his son Thomas Lawrence

of Newtown in 1699. The seal attached to the original will (proved Mch. 28. 1698-9. Recorded in Liber 5, page 336.) at the Surrogate's office, New York City, is a small one of red wax, not a good impression, but certainly not the arms of Lawrence of Ashton. The Crest appears to be a wolf's head, charged in the neck with a very distinct crescent, the shield apparently has three figures, lions rampant or other animals it is impossible to say. Undoubtedly there is no cross. The crest agrees with that of Lawrence of Foxhall, Gloucester, the arms with no recorded coat.

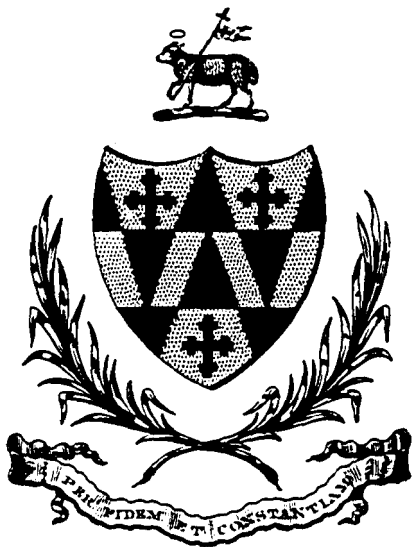

A copy of the long and elaborate Will of John Lawrence Senr. (the Emigrant) "Susanno de Widdowe" executrix, may be found in the Surrogate's office, New York. Liber 5 folio 346. Proved May, 15. 1699. The clerk reported Nov. 7, 1881 that there are no original wills of that year in the office.

An inventory of the estate of William Lawrence (the Emigrant) may be found in Liber 2. folios 212 to 228. This document dated April 9. 1680 states that he died intestate, and values his entire estate £4432.1s.10½d.

He was a buccaneering commander under Sir Henry Morgan. Rev. Richard Brisset Lawrence d. Oct. 13 1831 aged 31 years 3 mos. Hon. Col. James Lawrence of Fairfield, Jamaica buried June 15. 1756 in 47 year of his age. Note. John supposed son of President Henry Lawrence (q. v.) Emigrated

to Barbadoes and returned to Jamaica (will May 10. 1690) md. 1675 Jane (Collins) Dunn and had 3 sons and 6 daughters, the third son was Col. James, above mentioned, who md. Mary dau. of Col. 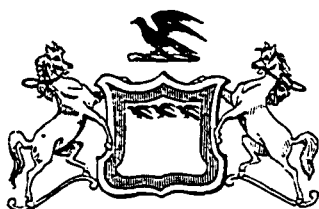
