1741-1823

VIRGINIA GENTLEMAN & KENTUCKY PIONEER

The story of SMYTH TANDY, or Smith Tandy, has been a puzzling one for genealogists for the past nineteen years, perhaps longer. In the fine article written by Mrs. P. W. Hiden from a search of the official records of Virginia and Kentucky and the article by Major General Henry T. Allen as set forth in their articles appearing Tyler's Quarterly (Vol. 14, October, 1932) and the Register of the Kentucky Historical Society (No. 28 of 1930) reference is made to Smyth Tandy as a roving individual, involved in many purchases of land, living in a number of counties, running a bleaching mill, furnishing supplies to the Revolutionary army etc. No one has been able to tell where he fits into the many Tandy lines to be found throughout the Virginia records of the 18th century.

For a period of some years a group of Tandy descendants who wished to continue the work of Mrs. Hiden and Major Allen had collected and assembled data on many Tandy lines, related through documentary evidence such as wills, deeds, church registers, etc.; there were some who were tentatively placed in a family through circumstantial evidence and repeated linking together of the names. Smyth Tandy was one of these who through circumstantial evidence only was placed in the Roger Tandy line and the William Tandy line, the descendants of whom settled and multiplied in Kentucky.

The compiler in working on other lines found in the courthouses of Green and Taylor counties, Kentucky, references to the Tandy line and upon closer observation found the name of Smyth Tandy, buying and selling land, mortgaging, making a most peculiar will---in fact, characteristics of the individual were such that they shouted the fact that they pertained to the Smyth Tandy of Virginia. Eventually through comparisons of handwriting, an early letter, family traditions, land deeds, and county histories the travels of Smyth Tandy were traced and a history of his descendants became possible. However, even yet his story is not complete, for a visit to Virginia will surely reveal more items which will make the history even more nearly complete. Further, two items, one his obituary and the other the act asking for permission to build a bleaching mill reveal that we have been on the wrong track in trying to link Smyth Tandy to the many Virginia Tandy lines, for these items show he came from Ireland and thus was the immigrant. Nevertheless, several descendants have stated hearing their grandparents relate that Smyth Tandy had said that all the Virginia Tandys were related and all related to Napper Tandy. Doubtlessly this is true, but the links are to be found in Ireland then, not in Virginia for the Roger and William Tandy lines were in America several generations before Smyth Tandy came to America.

With this in mind, the compiler offers you the data as it stands today and hopes that you enjoy learning about your people and one in particular, Smyth Tandy, immigrant from Ireland, Virginia,

gentleman, Kentucky pioneer.

It is my hope that those who come in contact with this history will read with an eye for corrections and additions. Both will be received with thanks.

SMYTH TANDY, also written Smith Tandy, Smyth Tandy, was born in Ireland in either 1741 or 1742; nothing is known of his parents or brothers and sisters. But, as later descendants relate the story Smyth Tandy stated that all Tandys were related which is doubtlessly true, so there is possibly some relationship to the many Tandy lines to be found. Smyth Tandy came to America before 1774; whether he brought his wife Joyce _____ with him or whether he married her in the colonies has not been proven.

The Virginia records of Smyth Tandy are many and are listed by years as follows:

1776, Feb. 15, Smith Tandy witnesses lease of Alexander Spotswood to James Lewis; Spotsylvania County (Va) (Deed Book I, Spots. Co. Va)

1776, Nov. 4, Monday: "A memorial of Smyth Tandy was presented to the House, and read; setting forth, that he has been regularly bred to the business of manufacturing and bleaching of linen in Ireland, and carried on the same in that kingdom for several years; that he proposes, if encouraged by the publick, to establish a bleach green, with a mill and all other necessaries, after the most proved and complete models, at his plantation within four miles of Staunton in Augusta county, which is well situated for that purpose; but as the same will be attended with considerable expense, he finds it impossible to proceed therein without the assistance of the publick, and praying for such assistance." (Journal of the House of Delegates of Virginia Anno Domini, 1776, --Richmond, Samuel Shepherd & Co, 1828, p 39).

On page 43 for Wednesday, November 6, 1776:

"Resolved, That the petition of Smyth Tandy, praying that a sum of money may be advanced to assist him in erecting proper works for manufacturing and bleaching of linen, be rejected."

1777, May 21, Deed to Smith Tandy in Augusta County from Sarah, wife of Abraham Smith, (Chalkley I, Augusta Records)

1778. May 21, Smith Tandy recommended on commission of peace, Augusta County (Chalkley I, p 199); on Nov. 18th qualified as a Justice (p 203).

1779. Nov. 19. Smith Tandy one of several recommended to be left out of commission because of non-residence in Augusta Co. (Chalkley) p211

1780. Name of Smith Tandy appears on a Virginia inventory with the

name of Westham Foundry Company for supplies.
(Adjutant-General's office, Washington, D.C.)

1781, Jan. 23: Letters of Marque were issued by Virginia to the Friendship; a Virginia Ship of 20 guns and a crew of 40, for which a bond of 20,000 pounds was posted. Witnesses on bond were Smith Tandy and William Tandy. (Naval Records of the Revolution, p 306, Library of Congress, Washington)

1781, March 9. Auditors are directed to issue warrants to Smith Tandy, 5500 pounds (probably for supplies of some kind). Journal of the Council of State of Virginia, Vol II, 10-6, 1777, 11-30 1780, p 305)

1782: Smyth Tandy listed in Fothergill Virginia Tax Payers, 1 poll 2 slaves, Augusta County.

1782, March 15: Deed of Mortgage: Smyth Tandy of Augusta County to Gabriel Penn of Amherst County for 5 shillings paid by said Penn and especially for further security on a bond from the said Smyth Tandy to Gabriel Penn dated March 14, 1782 for one thousand pounds in gold and silver coin to be paid by Jan. 1, 1785 with lawful interest conveys to said Penn one trace of land known as New Glasgow lying in Amherst County containing 317 acres being the land said Tandy purchased of Penn "the fourteenth this present instant." (March 15th) Witnesses: Wyatt Powell, Thomas Powell, James Franklin, Samuel Hill. (Deed Book E, p 337, Amherst county, Va).

1782, October 9: A copy of a Virginia court-martial record for Augusta county shows that Smith Tandy in Captain Buchanan's Company was fined 9 October 1782 (Adjutant-General's Office,) Name spelled Smith Tandy on record. Name also listed in History of Revolution of Virginia by Wethay, "Smith Tandy- Captain Buchanan's Company, Augusta."

1783. Smyth Tandy living in Amherst county in 1783: 5 whites in family and 6 blacks (Heads of Families, 1st Virginia Census).

1784: Augusta County: "Received of Mr. Smith Tandy the sum of three pounds for an acre of land condemned by the Court of Augusta County for the use of his mill dam which land was belonging to the estate of John McClenachan, October 21, 1784, Alexander S. Clair, Executor. Test. Wm. H. gginbottom and James Buchanan." "This receipt being proved by the oaths of the witnesses thereto is ordered to be recorded. 1787 October, Augusta County."

1785, October: Town of Cabellsburg* was established on the land of Smyth Tandy at a place now known as New Glasgow in Amherst County and Trustees were designated for the sale of lots, Act of Virginia Assembly, (Hennings' Statutes, XII, p 229) 50 acres set aside for this purpose: Hugh Rose, Gabriel Penn, Samuel Meredith, John Wyatt, Charles Rose, Samuel Jordan, Cabell, Gentlemen, trustees.

* New Glasgow or Cabellsburgh were former names for a tiny settlement now called Clifford, a few miles north of Amherst Court House on Route 29. Nelson County was not formed until 1806; before that date Amherst extended to the top of Afton Mt.

1785, Deed of Trust: Feb. 5, 1785: Smyth Tandy of Amherst to Samuel Meredith, Hugh Rose, Gabriel Penn and John Wiatt who have entered themselves as securitities for said Tandy in two replevin bonds in which said Smyth Tandy is principal, payable to James Currie of the city of Richmond, the one for 8,847 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of tobacco and two pounds 7 shillings currency, the other for 35,220 pounds of tobacco conveys a certain tract in this county known by the name of New Glasgow, 3 negroes, 4 Irish indentured servants, 2 horses, 4 brood mares, 13 head of cattle, 8 featherbeds and furniture with all their appurtenances. Witnesses: William Meredith, James Reed, Wm Scd. Crawford. (Deed Book E, p 630, Amherst Co. Va.)

1787, Jan. 1: Smyth Tandy bought 470 acres of land on Buffalo River from John Steward (Deed Book F, p 108, Amherst County)

1788; Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife, of Amherst county convey to William Galt, partner and factor for Irving Gold and Company, merchants, in consideration of 137 pounds 10 shillings current money one acre of land belonging to the Said Smyth Tandy. Witness: Alexander Brydie, Wiatt Powell, Alexander Mc Dowell. The mortgages of said Tandy namely Hugh Rose, S. Meredith, Gabriel Penn and John Wiatt agree to the sale of one acre of land (Deed Book F, p 263, Sept 6, 1788, Amherst Co.).

1788: Deed of Trust: Smyth Tandy gives deed of trust to Gabriel Penn as agent for James Dukey on certain personalty. Witnesses: J. Higginbotham, William Tandy. Nov. 25, 1788, (Deed Book F, p 294 Amherst County)

1788, Dec. 1. Beverly Warwick and Elizabeth, his wife to Smyth Tandy for 40 pounds current money, 400 acres on the north branches of Buffalo River adjoining Samuel Meredith (in the margin is written: "Original sent to Smyth Tandy by John Powell, son of Wiatt") (Deed Book F, p 287, Amherst Co.).

1789, Aug. 22: Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife, of Amherst to John McHenry and company, merchants of Baltimore, to secure 308 pounds 17 shillings and five pence with interest gives deed of trust on one tract of 470 acres lying on both sides of Buffalo River being the same bought by said Tandy of Captain John Steward and whereon is now a grist and sawmill, a distillery, and dwelling house, negroes, personalty, etc. Witnesses: Wiatt Powell, Thomas Wiatt, Gabriel Penn, (Deed Book F, p 370, Aug. 22, 1789, Amherst County).

1789, July 17: Mortgage deed. Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife, of Amherst county to James Campbell and Luke Wheeler of Pittsburg, Prince George County, to secure the payment of 183 pounds 15 shillings with interest which said Tandy owes for valuable consideration received to Robert Gilmer and Company, merchants in Baltimore, convey 470 acres on Buffalo River. Witnesses: W. S. Crawford, Thomas Wiatt, James Murray Brown, Gabriel Penn. (Deed Book F, p 385, Amherst Co.).

1789, July 21: Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife of Amherst County to William Cabell, a tract of 317 acres called New Glasgow, lying on the north branches of Buffalo River excepting a plot of thirty feet square in the center of which is a graveyard reserved to Gabriel Penn where some of his family are buried, and reserving to the said Smyth

Tandy ten feet square in which is a graveyard where said Tandy has a child buried. Witnesses: William Phillips, W. S. Crawford, James Franklin, Gabriel Penn, Samuel Mercedith, (DB F, p 387, Amherst Co).

1789, July 29: Mortgage: Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife, of Amherst County to John Stewart to secure 116 pounds 15 shillings which said Tandy owes to said Stewart mortgages 470 acres on Buffalo River. Witnesses: Thomas Dillon, James Ballanger, Gabriel Penn, William Tandy. (Deed Book F, p 526, Amherst County)

1791: Deed of Trust: Smyth Tandy to James Galloway, both parties of Amherst County, for the consideration of 10 shillings current money to secure to Lindsay Coleman of Amherst county the payment of 47 pounds 9 shillings 8 pence, it being the balance due on an execution issued on a judgment obtained in the county court of Amherst by John Steward, against the said Smyth Tandy dated December 21, 1790 which by written endorsement of said Steward was assigned to the use and benefit of said Coleman, conveys copper stills and other personalty. Witnesses: Edmund Tate, Thomas Crews, William Tandy. (Deed Book G, p 108. Amherst County).

1791, October: Smith Tandy had a bleaching mill near Staunton, in Augusta county. Trustees were appointed to conduct a lottery for the purpose of raising \$4,000 to be applied to the expense of repairing and completing bleacher. Act of Virginia Assembly, Oct. 1791. (Hennings Statutes, XIII, p 316.) Those delegated to raise money were Wm Foushee, Miles Selden, Alexander Montgomery, Robert Gamble, Robert Mitchell, John Barrit, Robert Pleasants, Thomas Pleasants and Samuel Parsons.

1793: Smith (yth) Tandy of Amherst County vs. Lewis and Philemon Richard, suit over contract of lease, Feb. 27, 1790. (Chalkley I, p400)

1793: District court: Gabriel Jones; vs. John Andrews, Smith Tandy. Ejection notice 5 January 1793, served on Tandy at his home in Amherst 22 March 1793, (Chalkley II).

The following letter is to be found in the Wilson Cary Nichols papers (1761-1820) at the University of Virginia Library, Charlottesville. The following is a copy of the photostat which was sent me:

Amherst Coy, 21 Sept 1796

Sir

Buffalo River is now so low that nothing can be carried out of it till it rises, and as that may not happen in time to answer my demand for money I am at a loss what to do except you would send a person here to secure the articles for being obliged to move from this place shortly. I shall _____ much from home fixing matters before I go that should there even come a tide on the river I should be unable to attend to sending them off especially the staves as they lye 4 miles from me, nor would the delay answer my necessity, but there are three boats on this River that may be hired when the water will admit, The wheat can be locked up securely, as to the stages I will either deliver them at Buffeloe at 25 pounds thousand. I mentioned to you if you take them where they lye (about 1/2 miles from it) you may have them at 20 pounds thousand which is 2 pounds less then they cost me to cut them and nothing for the timber.

An old gent'm M. Snead from the neighborhood of Wancn(?) lives near the Spot where the staves could be taken into the Boat & could take care of them.

The wheat is handy and I could set about hauling the staves whenever I know that you would take them of which you can inform me by post directed near New Glasgow---Besides the articles mentioned to you I have other to dispose of that possibly might suit you --- Viz a Spindle and other irons suit^{bl} for a Tub or geared mill---a yoke of Excellent work Oxen & Cart, a light plantation Waggon completely ironed, lock chain and & little Used.

A complete set of irons with boxes, for a pair of camp log wheels & feet 4 In high and double tired, a log chain for It, very strong and two Smaller ones. A wheat fan, some good milk cows, & some hogs--- The oxen could haul this waggon to you with the wheat fan and some other articles in it for I could send a fellow who is well acquainted with using them---Wanting to secure a sum of money by the loth of next month would wish to sell to you as far as it would suit you to purchase & and hope it will be no in convenience to you to send a person to view and receive such articles as he may agree for but my business will call me so much from home that I am not certain of being found there except from the 27 of this month until the 5th of the next

I sent you^r message to Wm Staples about the _____ I would be glad to sell you as much of this property as suits you & and make no doubt but Wm Snead would render you his services in sending them off as the impossibility of doing it at present puts it out of my power.

1798: Commission from court of Amherst County, April 30, 1798 to David Patterson, J r., and Anthony Dibrall, Jr, justices of Buckingham county to examine Joyce Tandy to obtain acknowledgement of her consent to deed made by her husband Smyth Tandy on Aug. 22, 1798 (Deed Book H, p. 335). Conveyed to McHenry and Co 470 acres land in Amherst county.

1798, May 15: Smyth and Joyce Tandy (no county listed, but possibly Buckingham), convey to James Murray Brown one and one half a lot in Cabellsburgh adjoining one sold by said Tandy to William Galt. (Deed Book H, p 514, Amherst County).

NO MORE SMYTH TANDY ITEMS AFTER 1798 TO BE FOUND IN AMHERST COUNTY, VA.

From the above we see that Smyth Tandy during the period of 1774-1782 lived in Augusta county; from 1783-1798 in Amherst county (and possibly in Buckingham county in 1798); the two counties adjoin to no great distance was involved. During the years we see Smyth Tandy serving in the Revolutionary War, buying and selling land, having business deals with men of Richmond and Baltimore, owning

a mill, a distillery, a bleaching mill. As merchant he lived close to waterways and Buffalo River and James Rivers were probably used as a way of travel.

Then in 1782 and 1783 we find land entries in Jefferson county, Kentucky, one of which, the first of 500 acres entered 12-13-1782 on Knobbs Creek was withdrawn the same year. The other three were entered as follows:

1000 acres entered Dec. 12, 1782 on Sinking Creek, Surveyed
500 acres entered March 28, 1783 on Brush Creek
500 acres entered March 28, 1783 on Knoxes Creek.

Very likely these lands were entered because of Revolutionary War service or in payment for military accommodations. Further entries in Virginia deeds do not show that he left Virginia at this time.

There is a lapse of years in which no trace of Smyth Tandy has been found, namely 1798-1804. Between these dates his wife Joyce _____ (date and place of death unknown) died. Smyth Tandy moved from Virginia to Kentucky, probably using the Cumberland Gap and the Boone Wilderness Trail, bringing his daughter Marcia (Maria) and his sons John and Joshua. In Green county (Ky) Smyth Tandy first appears on the records in a deed of Oct. 31, 1804:

"Deed of land from Thomas Edgar, James Knox and Hubbard Taylor and Smyth Tandy of Buckingham county, Virginia, Oct. 31, 1804, for the sum of 21 pounds 12 shillings. Sold to Smyth Tandy land in Green county on the Middle Fork of Pitman Creek containing 108 acres more or less., bounded as follows:

At a white oak on Cedar run corner to Daniel Kirk, thence south 45 northeast 77 poles to an ash corner to Richard Shipp, thence with his line south 13 east 101 poles to a dogwood and sugar tree corner to said Shipp in a line of George Colcs, thence with his line south 55 west 40 poles to a large white oak and gum corner to Colcs thence with another of his lines south 26½ west 12 poles to sycamore on the northwest bank of the said Middle Fork, hence down the creek with its meanders south 85 poles west 20 poles south 35 west 14 poles south 70 poles west 27 poles to a large white oak and dogwood corner to John Chandler thence with his line north 10 east 28 poles to a Spanish oak white oak and dogwood on the east bank of Cedar Run thence up said run binding these on the beginning to head. . . ."

From this date on Smyth Tandy is listed in the Green county tax lists. He accumulates land until in 1806 he has 1055 acres, but after this date he begins to dispose of the land, much of it to his son John. (See tax lists)

On June 7, 1809 Smyth Tandy remarried in Green county to one Susannah Williams, John Chandler preacher; Smyth Tandy is 68 or 69 at this time; Susannah is about 19.

For a moment let's neglect his family and review the items concerning Smyth Tandy in the Green county (Ky) records. First he appears in 1804 when he bought land, secondly his marriage record, then in 1810 is recorded a deed to Smyth Tandy by which John Adams (for Richard Adams, dec'd, of the city of Richmond, Va, by William Steel, county of Woodford, and state of Kentucky on April 6, 1807 deeded to Smyth Tandy by Attorney, _____ acres of land (p 191 OB 4) On Nov. 20, 1811, John Tandy, his son, bought 250 acres of land from him (OB 4, p 246). On April 7, 1808 an indenture was recorded in which John Chandler for and in consideration of one acre of land including Chandler's still house hath bargained and sold to Smyth Tandy 1/2 acre of land adjoining said Tandy's Mill. (Deed Book 5, p 299. Smyth Tandy appears in the Jan 27th, 1817 court as the appellant in a minor court case (OB 7, p 238).

Next as found a copy of his will, signed July 11, 1823 and probated soon after this. His obituary is to be found in The Argus as follows:

WILL OF SMYTH TANDY- Green County, Ky.

In the name of God Amen, I, Smyth Tandy of Green County of the state of Kentucky, do ordain the following as my last will and testament. First, it is my request that as soon after my decease as may be convenient, my executors or the survivors of them, or as many of them as will act, will cause a sale to be made of the whole of my property of every description, on such terms either publicly or privately as they shall judge most advisable to answer the circumstance or the estate, and to provide for the payment of my just debts which they will endeavor to ascertain in the way they think proper or by advertisement. After the payment of these debts, it is my will that the balance remaining shall be applied as follows: My wife is to have such provisions made for her as the law entitles her to and no more. Having already amply provided for my son, JOHN TANDY, he is to have no further part of my property, but of the amount remaining one half is to my daughter, Maria Benning or her children and the other half is to be equally divided between my present wife's two eldest children, JAMES EDWARD and MARY SUSAN. Her other children are left to the care of their mother, they are not to have any part of my property. Should I not be able to sell my lands during my life, my executors will please to sell it as they think best, public or private and both tracts together or separately, subject to the dower, and either make the purchasers a suitable abatement for the incumbrance of dower, or leave one third of the price in his hands during its continuance; should the latter be the case, the sum so retained by the purchaser is to be kept for the use of my present wife's two eldest children, James Edward and Mary Susan, but should my executor not think that sum to be one half of what will be coming from my estate after every debt and bequest is paid, in that case they will add as much to it as will make it up to one half, but should it be more than one half, they are to take from the amount of other sales to make up one half of all my clear estate for my daughter, Maria Benning, who being the eldest and living at a distance, is to be the first paid, and all at one time, and it is to be particularly observed that my daughter, Maria Benning is not to get less than five hundred dollars specie at least for her share, and should my estate fall short of that sum of five hundred dollars specie (or not exceed it) in

that case, my said daughter Maria Benning is to have the whole of it, and no part of it is to be given to my present wife's two eldest children as mentioned in the will, and as I have said that my daughter Maria Benning shall not have less than five hundred dollars, I also say that my present wife's two eldest children shall have not more than that sum for both. What is over (if any) is to go to my said daughter, Maria Benning. My partiality in her favor is in consideration of the merits of her deceased mother, whose moral virtues adorned the sex, and to whose blessed memory I owe this last tribute of respect. To the person in whose house I may have been a boarder at the time of my death, I bequeath the sum of one hundred dollars to be paid by my executor, if in their opinion I have been treated while a boarder in his house with the attention and care or expense on my account is deserving of this extra remuneration or such part of it as they may judge to be a just recompense for his care. Some remarks on my affairs will be found amongst my papers in my chest in a bundle endorsed Co. Robert Gamble's papers. And lastly, I appoint my esteemed friends, Elias Barbee, William Buckner, Sr., Liberty Green, James Durham and Henry Sanders executors of this my last will and testament, hoping and earnestly requesting that they will not refuse this last request of their dying friend. OBITUARY-SMYTH TANDY

OBITUARY: Died at the residence of James Murray, Esq. in Greensburg, Green county, Ky., on Friday the 12th Inst. after a lingering illness, Mr. Smyth Tandy, in the 81st or 82nd year of his age. Mr. Tandy

was a native of Ireland, he came to America in the early part of the Revolutionary War, and took a very active part in behalf of the American cause. He was a man whose heart was attached to the cause of Liberty, and full scope of republican principles in all its true and natural merits-- He has told the writer of this, he left his country in consequences of oppression, being a younger son. Mr. Tandy was connected with some of the best families of Ireland, and was a full cousin of celebrated James Napper Tandy, and was himself a polished gentleman in a very high degree; kind and hospitable to strangers. It is hoped by the writer of this, that a more able pen will undertake to do justice to this venerable sage and patriot. He has left an affectionate wife and five small children to lament his death." (From THE ARGUS, Frankfort, Kentucky, Oct. 22, 1823:- from Photoduplication Service, Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.)

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From the will we see that John Tandy (born 1785-1790-see tax list of 1806) and Marcia or Maria are children by an earlier marriage to one Joyce _____. Smyth Tandy speaks of "my present wife's two eldest children" as James Edward and Mary Susan; he further states that "her other children are left to the care of their mother" From the data assembled which follows we find that the "other children were: Ann, William and Nathan or Nathaniel E."

Piecemeal, we find that Smyth Tandy must have come to Green county after 1798 but just before 1804, there married Susannah Williams June 7, 1809 and by this marriage were born at least the following children:

1. James Edward Tandy, born 1811
2. Mary Susan Tandy, born about 1812
3. William N. Tandy born June 4, 1814
4. Nathaniel E. Tandy, born July 11, 1818
5. Ann Tandy.

Smyth Tandy's executors failed to do their duty and as a result the following court order is found:

"It appearing to the satisfaction of this court (July 1824) that Smyth Tandy late of this county departed this life more than three months ago having first made his last will and testament which has been duly proved and admitted to record and that all the executors named in said will have failed and refused to act and no person applying for administration of the estate of said testator with the will arrived (?). It is therefore ordered that the sheriff of this county do take possession of said estate and dispose of the same according to law." (Order Book 7, p 332, Green Co., Ky.)

Following this is an inventory of estate of Smith Tandy deceased which was returned in court and ordered to be recorded. At the same time "an allotment of dower to Susannah Tandy, widow of Smith Tandy deceased was returned in court and ordered to be recorded. Dec. 20, 1824 Court." (Order Book 7, p 364, Green County, Ky).

The court orders show that five of the children were bound out to individuals in the county. First, the court ordered that ANN TANDY be bound out until she is 18 to Frederick Slinker to learn the art of housewifery (Order Book 8, p 84, Oct 18, 1827). Next the court ordered that William and Nathan Tandy, children of Smith Tandy deceased be bound to David Willock until they arrive at age of 21,

"William will be of age 4 June 1835 and Nathan 11 July

1839 to learn the art of cabinet making". (Sept 17, 1827, Order Book 8, p 80. The indenture of apprenticeship binding William and Nathan Tandy to David Willock was signed Oct. 15, 1827 (OB 8, p 83)

In the July 17, 1827 court EDWARD TANDY was apprenticed to Durham Sanders; on Sept. 17, 1827 the apprenticeship papers were made as follows:

"... witness that an order of the Green County Court made at their July term 1827 directing their clerk to bind Edward Tandy to Durham Sanders until the said Edward Tandy arrived at the age of 21 years to learn the art of farming.

"Now I, said John Bost, clerk of Green County. . . place and bind . . . during the period . . . during which the said Tandy is to demean himself as a faithful, apprentice and the said Durham Sanders on his part agrees to teach or cause it to be taught him said Tandy the art of farming, and to find him in clothing and suitable for an apprentice and to teach or to cause it to be taught him reading and writing and common arithmetic, including the rule of three and at the said term to give him three pounds ten shillings and a decent suit of clothes." (OB 8, p 83)

Last of the children named in court orders was Mary Susan Tandy, "infant and orphan of Smith Tandy deceased," in which Henry Sanders was appointed guardian April 11, 1827 (Order Book 8, p 67). In the October 18, 1830 court "the report of Henry Sanders, guardian to Mary Tandy (now Landon)" was returned in which an account of money and property was examined and approved by the court. (Order Book 8, p 223).

ISSUE OF SMYTH & JOYCE () TANDY

I. MARCIA (MARIA) TANDY; she may be the daughter born between 1794-1800 listed in the 1810 census, but she had married James Bening Mar 2, 1809 in Green county by this time. Little is known of her except that in the will she is spoken of as "being the eldest and living at a distance."

II. infant spoken of in a deed from Smyth Tandy and Joyce, his wife of Amherst county to William Cabell in which a plot thirty feet square is reserved for Gabriel Penn, and reserving to Smyth Tandy ten feet square where Smyth Tandy has a child buried. (Deed Book F, p 387, Amherst County, Va. July 21, 1789).

III. JOSHUA TANDY, married Jane Hamilton between July 17, 1807 and 1807, Green county, Kentucky. Examination of original marriage record shows name of Joshua, but no other record of him is to be found in county archives. He might have died soon after marriage, or he might have incurred the wrath of his father inasmuch as he is not mentioned in the will. Too, he might be John.

IV. JOHN TANDY, born between 1785 and 1790; no marriage record is found in Green county. In the 1806 tax record Smyth Tandy is listed as having male over 21 (S.T.) and one male 16-21, which would be son John. In 1807 John is listed as having 250 acres on Pitman Creek, surveyed by S. Tandy. Smith is listed as having property of his own or sharing his father's property from 1807 to 1823 with the exception of the years 1813-1816.

V. _____ daughter, name not known. The only indication of such a daughter is to be found in the 1810 census of Green county where Smyth Tandy has a female age 10-16, which would make her birth date from 1794 to 1800. This daughter is not Marcia or Maria as Marcia is married by this time.

I. JAMES EDWARD TANDY

I. JAMES EDWARD TANDY, son of Smyth and Susannah (William) Tandy, was born _____ 1811; died about 1889 or 1891; is buried in the Tandy cemetery on the Lebanon pike north of Cambellsville, (Ky) 5.3 miles. Married about 1831 to Almira America Sullivan, daughter of William and Barbory (West) Sullivan. Almira was born March 25, 1813; and died Nov. 21, 1891, buried on Tandy land in little cemetery.

James Edward was only about 12 years old at the time of his father's death, and four years later on July 17, 1827 the Green county court ordered him apprenticed to Durham Sanders untill he arrived at the age of twenty-one, to learn the art of farming. During this time he was to demean himself as a faithful apprentice and the said Durham Sanders on his part agreed to teach or cause to be taught the said Tandy the art of farming, and to find him in clothing suitable for an apprentice, and to teach or cause to be taught him reading and writing and common arithmetic, including the rule of three, and at the end of said term to give him three pounds ten shillings and a decent suit of clothes.

After serving his apprenticeship, James Edward Tandy was chosen by the group who wished to make Cambellsville the county seat of the newly formed Taylor county to oppose Durham Sanders who favored the town of Salome for the county seat. When the faction headed by James Edward won, he was elected constable and called "Squire". James E. Tandy was appointed constable in District 5 on March, 1850 and in District 3 in 1853. He was one of the guardians appointed by the court at the May term of 1854 for infant children of Mary Sanders. He was appointed guardian of William Sullivan, Sept. 20, 1847 (OB 7, p 238, Green county). James E. was deputy assessor of county (Taylor), Feb. 11, 1865 and continued in office. In Oct. 28, 1867 he was appointed administrator of the estate of William Parrott (who had married Mary Ann Tandy, daughter of his brother Nathaniel E. Tandy).

James Edward and his wife, Almira, set up housekeeping on the land which James Edward acquired from Henry Sullivan, a brother of Almira; as shown in the will of Henry Sullivan, (W.B., 3, p 118, Aug. 2, 1847):

"It is my desire that my executors shall make to James E. Tandy a deed for the land I let him have, being one-half of the 256 acre tract of land which belonged to my father's estate and for which my brother John Sullivan and myself hold a joint deed, said deed to be made by my executors a deed for the tract of land on which Jame. E. Tandy lived containing one hundred eight acres which he traded to me in lieu of mine. "

On June 24, 1848 James Edward Tandy bought land from Easton Sanders:

"24 June, 1848, Easton Sanders and Denazio Sanders sold 98 acres of land to James E. Tandy for \$392. Being part of Alexander Reed's original survey, begin at white oak corner to Abner Bottom now corner Hardis, in the NE line of said Reed's survey, thence with

said line N 45 W 120 poles to hickory corner to William White Senior, now Elijah Hordis, thence with line S45 W130 poles to gum to White's corner, thence S45 E120 poles to hickory and poplar in said Bottom's line, thence with said line N45 E130 poles to beginning." (DB 1,p63)T.C

On September 13, 1848 James E. Tandy bought 98 acres from John Puryear, executor of estate of Henry Sullivan (DB 1, Taylor co,Ky.

James Edward Tandy was a farmer in Taylor county and in his last days served as a toll gate keeper on the Lebanon-Greensburg Pike, chose to his home.

MARY ANN TANDY, born _____ 1832 or 1833, daughter of James Edward and Almira America (Sullivan) Tandy married John Chandler Sanders Junior; the marriage record to be found in the courthouse at Campbellsville, Taylor county states: "

"John C. Sanders, Jr., and Mary Ann Tandy,
December 15, 1853; in presence of J. E. Tandy,
J.C. Sanders Senior, John and William Sullivan
and Oswald Durham."

Mary Ann died Feb. 6, 1885 and is buried in the Sanders cemetery located a few miles north of Campbellsville and very close to Saloma. John Chandler Sanders, Junior, was a farmer, owning land given him by his father just a couple of miles west of the home place on the road to Saloma. Today there are no houses or buildings standing here, but a field of corn surrounded what remains of the foundations of several building (1947). The present owner states that when he moved there many years ago there were still foundations of at least three buildings there. The spring is still there. John C. Sanders Jr., served as constable in the Saloma district, and was poisoned while collecting taxes.

"JOHN C. SANDERS, constable in the Saloma district Taylor county, was poisoned one day last week from the effects of which he died. A man charged _____ is under arrest, charged with having administered the poison. Other parties are said to be implicated and warrants are being issued for their arrest."
(from Sunday May 16, 1869, LOUISVILLE JOURNAL, p 2., column 1, found at library at Louisville, Kentucky)

Story as told me by Mrs. Ethel Laird which she had heard from her mother is that Annie was ill and on her deathbed and granddad married her; apparently she lived longer than expected. After she had left this world granddad was so low in spirits that he said he might as well dig another grave as he would not live much longer. Upon our visit to this little cemetery in 1946 we located the stone of Annie S. Killen and beside it there is a deep hole which is now rounded out due to the years passing and the weather. It may be a real grave or the "grave" that granddad dug for for himself. No issue.

John C. Sanders was the one who took the lead in conveying his father's property upon which the widow Sanders (Mary Ann Tandy) had lived and died, some 85 acres more or less, to Daniel O'Hare, March 26, 1885. Where John C. and his wife Annie S. lived from this time until her death in May 20, 1886 is not known, though the conveyances do state that they shall retain possession of said land until the first day of January, 1886.

Soon however, John C. Sanders moved to Pawnee, Illinois and there

he married Carrie Alice Plummer, daughter of Nathan and Caroline (Britton) Plummer, N. v. 3, 1887 (license in Christian county, Ill). (Carrie Alice Plummer was born July 8, 1869; d. Sept 7, 1896, age 27 years 2 months, buried at Zion cemetery, Pawnee, Illinois.) After their marriage they lived in a log cabin on the corner of the Plummer farm, some miles north and east of Pawnee, just 3/4 mile east of county line. Today the cabin is gone; also the house of Nathan Plummer. (1947). The only remains there, are the foundation of the summer kitchen and the well. A corn field or bean field surrounds it, though the house was close to the road. It was in the log cabin that my father and several of his brothers and sisters were born.

In time they moved to Litchfield (Illinois) and lived on North Van Buren street. Here granddad became a carpenter, house mover, ran concessions at fairs, picnics. Later they moved to a two story house on South State Street.

III. WILLIAM NAPOLEON TANDY

III. WILLIAM NAPOLEON TANDY, born June 4, 1814 in present day Taylor county, Kentucky, the son of Smyth and Susannah (William) Tandy. When William was only five his father died and the children were apparently taken into the mother's home. Within a few years of the father's death the mother remarried and the children were bound out as apprentices. A court order of October 18, 1827 shows that William and his brother Nathan were bound to David Willock until they arrived at age of twenty-one. "William will be of age 4 June 1835. . . to learn art of cabinet making." Each of the brothers and sisters was likewise bound out. It is not known how long William stayed in the home of David Willock, but from county histories and the obituary we find that at the age of seventeen he moved from Kentucky to Missouri after receiving a meager schooling in the log cabin school. In 1831 he took up the practice of medicine with Dr. William Torrence. From Palmyra he moved to Florida, Monroe county, Missouri and there married Elizabeth Spence on Sept. 15, 1835. To them were born ten children. Elizabeth Spence Tandy died _____ about March, 1859 and is buried at Florida, Missouri (?)

IN MEMORY OF DR. WILLIAM W. TANDY

"After Life's fitful fever he sleeps well"

On last Saturday at 3 p.m. in the Franklin cemetery was peacefully laid to rest all that was mortal of the once honored and widely known citizen whose name heads this sketch. He died at his home in Kinderhook, Illinois, Thursday March 3 at a quarter past 3 o'clock. His sickness was of brief duration. Its first approach being felt Tuesday night preceding. Up to that time had vigorously prosecuted his profession as a physician and even during the two days mortal illness, put aside his own pain long enough to prescribe for the sick. He had unusual vigor and health during a long lifetime which went beyond the allotted years of men. His life had been extremely busy and the paralysis of the heart and lungs which carried him away was not unexpected ending of an intensely active life. He was conscious and very clear in mind and spirit until about the last moment of life. Sinking out of its scenes as quietly and calmly as the sun goes down after its long pilgrimage through the skies. Six of the ten living children were present with the mother and wife, and received the parting counsel and benediction of a loving and greatly loved father. Though suffering greatly at times his patience was unwearied and endured through it all. To the question of a daughter "Are you ready to die father?" the answer came clear and strong "Yes, I am fully ready, God is my Father and the Lord Jesus Christ is my elder brother". There is not a cloud in the sky". The writer was shown after his death his last letter written to a son living in Franklin expressing his great joy in learning of his resolution to live a Christian life and breathing a spirit of tender, loving admonition and encouragement. The letter was written the day his mortal illness struck him when the loving heart was soon to be stilled. True to his life long convictions of Christian propriety he desired to be buried without parade or ostentation in a plain casket and with strict simplicity. He had committed his funeral service to some minister of the church, to which he had been, for many years, a loyal and devoted adherent, and to his brothers of the order of Odd Fellows, with whom for and for whom he had earnestly and efficiently labored. The Christian Church notwithstanding of the stormy day, was greatly crowded by the old neighbors, patients and friends of the deceased. His faults, whatever they were, were easily forgotten, and his many noble and Christian qualities were lovingly remembered.

The funeral sermon was delivered by Elder G. H. Conners of Virden from John 14, verses 1, 2, and 3. The sermon was deeply sympathetic and comforting to all who heard it. Elder Layman and Dabney the latter of Manchester were also in the pulpit. At the close of the church service the Franklin Lodge took charge of the body and laid it away in accordance with their simple and beautiful ritual. Noble Grand Hocking officiating assisted by Rev. H. H. Hamill as Chaplain.

A brief sketch of leading events of Dr. Tandy's life will be interesting. He was born in Greene county, Kentucky in 1814. Two of his brothers still survive him in their old home. At the age of 17 he moved to Palmyra, Missouri, having received a scanty education in a log cabin school in Kentucky. He was a cabinet-maker by trade and devoted himself to it in his new home, inspired, however with a

purpose and ambition to become a physician. He was married to Mary Spence of Palmyra in 1835, to whom were born ten children. Seven survive, three in Missouri, one in Kansas, two in Kinderhook and one in Franklin. He studied medicine under Dr. William Torrence and moved to Florida, Missouri with his little family to enter upon his profession. His worldly estate at this time consisted of a horse, a cow, twenty dollars a wife and four children. He prospered in business but death claimed his faithful wife. In 1859 he was married to Mrs. Jane Ely, who survives him. To them were born three children, Mrs. William Stewart and Jesse and Orin Tandy. Three of his children have died, a babe; a son 11 by drowning, and a married daughter, Mrs. Emily Martin, aged thirty-eight. Dr. Tandy was a severe sufferer by the misfortunes and depretations of war, being robbed, and marauded in Missouri again and again. This led to his removal to Franklin in May, 1865. After living three years in our town he removed to Barry for four years, but Franklin had become dear to him, and he returned to it as his home untill 1884 when he moved to Kinderhook. It was here that he cherished as his real home, and it was a fitting place for his burial.

For many years he went in and out our homes as a trusted physician and friend. The church which he loved and with which he had been identified since he joined it in 1835 under the ministry of **Elder William Brown** looked to him here as one of its trusted and loyal leaders. The happiest and most useful years of his life were spent in our midst, and it is here that his body will peacefully rest until the resurrection morn.

IV. NATHANIEL E. TANDY, son of Smyth and Susannah (Williams) Tandy, was born July 11, 1818; died March 15, 1896, buried three miles west of Finley, Kentucky at St. Mathews, Marion county. There formerly was a church at the cemetery, but not now. After his father's death the children were bound out to individuals and Nathan as the early record calls him, was bound out with his brother William to learn the art of cabinet making to David Willock (Oct. 15, 1827 court order).

Nathaniel Tandy married Angelina Rhodes Nov. 30, 1843, She was born March 4, 1824 and died Sept 2, 1891, buried St. Mathews, Marion county. He owned about 200 acres of land, had a few slaves. On the farm his mother is buried. Land was three miles west of Finley, Ky.
