A TUBBS GENEALOGY

Much painstaking research and careful desk work remain to be done in this country and in England before a real comprehensive Tubbs genealogy can be published. Until then every personal endeavor along this line, although limited chiefly to one's own immediate circle, can be of assistance to a future compiler if only the records can be made publicly accessible. It is suggested that one way of doing this is to file a few copies of such facts with those State libraries and historical societies of national prominence and those which are in nearby localities.

This has been the intention of the author of this humble venture. He makes no claim to authority as a genealogist, nor does he claim that his facts are incontrovertible. Doubtless, there will be later corrections and additions. He desires that this small book may be one of several by various writers which shall be precursors to a Tubbs family history.

Like many others, this writer has found that not far back in a line there sometimes crops up a disconcerting blank which has a dismaying tendency to increase and widen with other blanks in a chart of ten generations. Such has occurred in this compilation with the names of Church, Henry, and Hoffman especially. Facts about these would be welcomed.

Yet, offsetting such regrettable deficiencies, there are gains in acquiring data respecting allied families which also have contributed to that broad flow of human life which makes up the family of today.

Seeking The Needed Links

Essential links needed appear among the first of one's genealogical problems. These were concerned particularly with Isaac Tubbs (as later narrated), also with some of the New Hampshire Tubbs families, and the tracing of the Hutchinsons back of Milford, N. H. to the first of this branch of the Hutchinson family to arrive in New England.

The author has in his possession a few letters of an earlier contributor to our family research. The late Hon. Charles Tubbs of Osceola, Tioga County, Penna., had an initial problem in connecting Samuel Tubbs of New London, Conn., with William Tubbs of Duxbury, Mass. This he was able to do in the fall of 1886 when he secured from Judge Davis of Plymouth a copy of the will of William Tubbs dated 20 Feby., 1677. Previously, the authority Savage had mentioned both William and Samuel Tubbs with no hint that they were related.

The will of William Tubbs contains the name of Dorothy (his second wife), and the children: Samuel, William, Bethiah, Benjamin, and Joseph. The "2nd day 3d month 1688" given as the date of death of William Tubbs, Sr., appears in later records as May 2, 1688. The same Charles Tubbs of Osceola traced his line, which was printed in "American Ancestry," Vol. VI. Evidently with good reason he said that William Tubbs of Duxbury had come from Sutton, Isle of Ely, Cambridge, Eng. About 1894 Charles made a trip to the small community which is about six miles from Ely. He found that there had been little change or progress in the village and that some houses of the sixteenth century still stood, one story with thatched roofs. Apparently, he did not come across the birthplace of William.

In later years, some question has arisen as to the correctness of the statement that William Tubbs came from Sutton. There are other possibilities which offer a field for investigation.

English Families of Tubbs

In the first place, the very surname itself deserves a word. Some persons have conjectured that it was of an occupational origin, like Cooper, or Smith. This has little or no basis. Others have thought that the name is derived from a chub which is a small fish and cite that in the Tubbs crest, there is a beaver walking with a "chub" in its mouth.

A widely accepted theory is that Tubbs, or the English alternative often met of Tubb, came from a colloquial abbreviation of the older form of Theobald. Early records have mention of Tebby, Tebb, Tub, Tubb, Tubbs and some others.

In the English counties of York, Cornwall, Berkshire and London there have been families of this name. In Yorkshire, there were a Thomas Tubb and a Matilda Tubb recorded in the year of 1379.

Some books of ancestry give the descendants of William Tubb and Robert the son of William, a Cornwall family of the late fifteenth century. A John Tubb who married Elizabeth Stratton comes in a Berkshire line.

According to Burke's "General Armory," the following are the Tubbs coats-of-arms:

> (Trengoff and Guinop) co. Cornwall; granted 1571. Argent, a chevron sable between 3 gurnets haurient gules. Crest, a beaver pass. proper, in the mouth a

gurnet gule.

(Cornwall). Argent on a chevron sable, 3 fleursde-lis or.

A good dictionary will explain these terms of heraldry.

The Remote Contacts

The indirect and remote contacts during fact-seeking can yield pleasant surprises. It was on Feb. 14, 1940 that the writer met the Rev. DeWitt C. Baldwin who had come to neighboring Brunswick to be one of the leaders in the Bowdoin College Forum of Religious Thought. As a former Methodist missionary he had known the Rt. Rev. Norman H. Tubbs, Bishop of the Diocese of Rangoon and Burma. They lived near and were good friends. Bishop Tubbs had meanwhile resigned his see and returned to England to be Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Chester. In reply to a letter from the writer, the Bishop said that he knew the Rev. Mr. Baldwin and Mrs. Baldwin very well. This led to an exchange of ideas about the Tubbs family in England.

One may ask if all who bear the name of Tubbs in this country are descended from William Tubbs of Duxbury? Probably not all are, although we welcome them and the distinction they can give the name.

This reminds the writer of a caller some years back, a representative of a great national weekly. He had come with his parents from England only recently and had settled in Cambridge, Mass. His name is Herbert Stradivarius Tubbs, and a brother named Joseph Guarneri Tubbs had previously died.

With good sense these two sons had been named after two famous makers of violins. For they were of a Tubbs family of outstanding violin bow makers and violin repairers which had engaged in that occupation in London, Eng., for two hundred years.

Mutual Help and Compensations

A collateral relative of the writer died, unmarried and intestate. It was desired to know who might be next of kin, in order to inherit.

This author submitted a detail chart of an allied family which showed that there were then living four elderly first cousins of the deceased. Soon afterwards, an identical copy of that chart was found among the personal effects, and the court recognized the relationships so that each of the nearest relatives received in due time a sizeable bequest.

Mutual help and compensations are in this genealogical pursuit, opening the way to acquaintances by correspondence and often to long friendships. Joint thought and searching can be very rewarding; besides, it may save unnecessary and duplicating endeavors.

Always, one is impressed with the fine people whose names appear in our charts, so that we want to commemorate them on pages for future generations to know in this way and esteem. We hope that you may be curious and happy to know who and what your forebears were and to meet those families into which they married.

This, then, is the prelude to what may be termed the W-S-Iapproach to the Tubbs Genealogy; that is, the first one hundred years approximately, represented by the three generations of William, Samuel and Isaac.

The family listings that follow are given by generations, to aid in locating contemporaries and in determining degrees of relationships.

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WILLIAM TUBBS OF DUXBURY, MASSACHUSETTS

William, the pioneer of the Tubbs family in America, did not leave his native land evidently for religious reasons. In England the economic conditions were not very favorable. As a young man he no doubt saw promise of fresh opportunities mixed with adventure in a new country already attracting settlers. He was one of an estimated 14,000 persons who landed on our shores between 1620 and 1640. It was in 1635 that he arrived at Plymouth and he went to Duxbury and settled there.

He came from Sutton, Isle of Ely, Cambridge, England, according to genealogical search by the Hon. Charles Tubbs. Winsor's <u>History of Duxbury</u> in mentioning London might have referred to the embarkation port of William at the outset of his journey. Tubbs families were in various parts of England, especially in Cornwall and probably Devon. It has been surmised that his parents might have been named Samuel and Bethia, from the occurrence of those names in the Colonial family.

On Jan. 2, 1637-8 William was admitted a freeman of Plymouth Colony and his name appears on the list of 1646. In order to be a freeman it was required that a man should be a church member and have a certificate from the pastor, attesting to good moral character.

He married (1) on Nov. 9, 1637 Mercy Sprague, daughter of Francis Sprague, who was an innholder and probably of Holland descent. In July, 1668 the Court granted William a divorce. His wife removed to Rhode Island and it is said, married there. William married (2) Dorothy, widow of William Soames, of Scituate, Mass. Records show that Dorothy was engaged to marry William Tubbs on or before Apr. 2, 1672. She is mentioned in William's will dated Feb. 20, 1677.

William was a volunteer to go on an expedition against the Pequot Indians, June 7, 1637, and was in a military company under the command of a neighbor, Capt. Miles Standish. In 1643, his name appears in a list of those men from 16 to 60 years of age who were able to bear arms.

The Court several times granted him land. Although one of a number of persons to receive a grant of land in Bridgewater, Mass., and thus included among the original proprietors of that place, he did not remove there. From 1678 to 1685 he was one of the surveyors of the Duxbury highways. William Tubbs died on May 2, 1688.

Early records of Duxbury are said to have become decayed and illegible and others lost. No dates of birth or death of Dorothy (Soames) Tubbs have been found. She was evidently alive at the distribution of the estate in 1688.

Those who have conducted research in the family of Tubbs were generally agreed on the names of the children of William, but not on dates of birth, which are mostly conjectural.

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While the Hon. Charles Tubbs of Osceola, Penn., thought that the two youngest children might have been by the second marriage, most authorities believe that all the children were by the first marriage, and there was no issue from the second marriage.

THE LIFE SPAN OF WILLIAM TUBBS

(This is a surmise as to the possible age of William Tubbs reckoned according to the recorded facts about his life). Strictly as a guess, one may venture as follows:

It should be remembered that the above is all conjectural, lacking further facts.

To have been admitted as a freeman might have required an age of 21 years (which fits into the above surmise). This has been regarded as the age of male independence and later the age for voting.

However, if William were of age when he contracted his first marriage, it would be pre-supposed that he was born in 1616, and his death might have been at the age of 72 years.

It is quite likely that William Tubbs was born not more than two years either side of 1617, if not indeed in that year.

THE FAMILY OF FRANCIS SPRAGUE

The ancestor of the Sprague family of Plymouth Colony, Francis, is said by one writer to have come over in "the second large wave of immigration," arriving in the ship "Anne" at Plymouth in July of 1623. There was a division of land in that year and he shared in it, as also in the division of cattle in 1627.

In July of 1627, with William Bradford and certain others, Francis essayed a start in trade for furs. He was licensed in 1638 "to keep a victualling in the Duxburrow side," and conducted a tavern until shortly before his death, when his son John took over.

Francis Sprague was taxed at Plymouth in 1632-3, but soon after he removed to Duxbury. On June 17, 1637 he was admitted freeman. As an owner of land along the North River, his name appears in a deed dated 1641. Although he was one of the proprietors or incorporators of Bridgewater, he never lived there.

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The wife of Francis is variously named by authorities. In "Descendants of John Scott of Roxbury," by Mary Lovering Holman, Francis' wife is called Lydia. In "Saints and Strangers" by George F. Willison, she appears as Anne. It is said that the daughters Anna and Mercy came over with Francis and his wife.

The Sprague children comprised: Ann or Anna, Mercy, John, and Dorcas. Ann Sprague was married to William Lawrence, to whom in 1644 Francis deeded land. Mercy Sprague and William Tubbs were married Nov. 9, 1637. About 1655, John Sprague and Ruth Bassett were married. Dorcas Sprague and Ralph Earle were married in 1659.

It is evident that differences arose between William Tubbs and his wife Mercy some years prior to the actual break between them. By a Plymouth Colony county deed dated in 1654, it is shown that William "with the free consent of Mercye his wife" sold their dwelling house to "Experience Michell." Not until 10 years afterwards, in 1664, did William publicly disown his wife's bills.

Perhaps after some trials at reconciliation, especially for the children's sake, William did not divorce Mercy until four more years had ensued, in 1668. The children of William and Mercy may have kept in communication with their respective parents in later years, but we do not know much about the mother after she had gone to Rhode Island.

It is to be noted that Mercy's father, Francis Sprague, died about the same year of 1668. His wife had died previously to then. It must have been a sad and confusing period of bereavement, sorrow, separation and the conclusion of the old life and ties in Plymouth Colony, for the two families affected. About four years later, William Tubbs entered upon his second marriage.

SAMUEL TUBBS OF NEW LONDON, CONNECTICUT

Samuel Tubbs, oldest of the five children of William and Mercy (Sprague) Tubbs, was living in Duxbury during the domestic troubles which gradually separated his parents. When his mother left Massachusetts for Rhode Island he doubtless felt the effects of all this change, and it appears that he must have gone to Connecticut before his father's second marriage.

There was rather a trend for some Massachusetts people to go to Connecticut and New London was one of the older and more prosperous places. Early American settlers were apt to be restless and some from Connecticut moved up the Connecticut Valley to points in New Hampshire, while others drifted into New York State, Pennsylvania and other places, only to take part later in another migration further westward.

It seems that Samuel participated in some riots between New London and Lyme, being on the side of the former. He was around 33 years at this time, in 1671. A couple of years afterwards in 1673 he was induced to settle permanently in New London. He passed all of 25 years of his life in New London before his death is recorded in the year of 1696.

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For his service as a soldier in King Philip's War, 1696, he received grant of land in Voluntown. He took up the occupation of farming and married Mary Willey, born 1642, a daughter of Isaac Willey of New London.

Samuel and Mary (Willey) Tubbs had ten children, as listed elsewhere. There was a difficulty in acquiring the names as the early city records gave one or two and remarked that there were other children. It has been through legal papers and by means of the Colonel Parkhurst papers that a list of the children has been made possible.

THE ISAAC WILLEY FAMILY

The so-called "Willey Country" and Willey Parish, England, are in Shropshire.

Isaac Willey was twice married. His first wife, surname unknown, had the Christian name of Joanna or Joanne. After his wife's death, Isaac married (2) Anna (----) Lester, no doubt a widow. Anna died in 1692.

Iseac Willey had settled in New London before Samuel Tubbs removed there. Iseac owned considerable land, some of it in neighboring Haddam.

A sister of Mary Willey, wife of Samuel Tubbs, was named Garah who married a Mr. Terrell. She thought **a**ffectionately about her sister Mary's children, for she mentioned them in her will which was dated March, 1711/12.

ISAAC TUBES OF NEW LONDON AND LYME, CONN.

Considerable search was made by the writer and by others in his behalf, for facts concerning Isaac Tubbs of New London and later of Lyme, Conn. In fact, the author of these notes devoted time to this matter for more then ten years, when he had the leisure to do so. He had much correspondence and later took a trip to several Connecticut towns in his recearch.

The conclusive information was secured by Mrs. Charles M. Adams of Groton, Conn., whose professional skill in genealogical matters was successful in this case. Isaac was mentioned as one of the children of Samuel Tubbs, by his aunt, Sarah (Willey) Terrell, and is also named in the famous Colonel Parkhurst papers.

Col. Parkhurst, a retired Army officer, lived in New London and devoted many years in careful research into the New London records and the records of nearby towns. He gave considerable time to the Willey family. He wrote that Isaac was one of the children, giving him fifth place in the listing of the children. Unfortunately, Col. Parkhurst was satisfied to get his information but did not take the pains of giving the source where he found it. Undoubtedly, he got much information from the Willey family. The Col. Parkhurst papers are in New London but not open to public inspection, although known genealogists have seen them.

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Another good friend who worked faithfully for the cause was Judge of Probate William Marvin of Lyme, Conn. There are these supplementary items about Isaac, although we regret that his birth record cannot be found:-

"Isaac Tubbs--Dec. 26, 1749, Isaac Tubbs of Lyme, Conn., right of land of Samuel Tubbs dec'd.--Lyme L. R. Vol. IV, page 31."

"Dec. 26, 1749. Peter Tubbs of Lyme, Conn. to Isaac Tubbs of Lyme, and Benajah Tubbs of Colchester, land in Voluntown, Conn.-- Vol. IV, page 32."

The writer had consulted years ago, Prof. Frank D. Tubbs then of Bates College, Lewiston, Maine, regarding data concerning Isaac Tubbs. Later, when the writer had the facts above given, he wrote Professor Tubbs who was then living in Urbana, Ill. In a letter dated May 2, 1936, Professor Tubbs replied:

"The evidence you have gathered proves beyond doubt that Isaac Tubbs was the son of Samuel and Mary (Willey) Tubbs of New London, Conn. I am glad not only for your sake, but for my records as well. Mine were based on what I could find in New London--now many years ago--when I was seeking knowledge of my shipbuilding ancestors, Hugh Mould and John Coit.

"It always interests me to note the use of parents' and other relatives' names in naming the children. You probably have observed this in the case of Samuel's children: The first child, Mary, named after the mother; the second, Bethiah, named from Samuel's only sister (Mary and Bethiah were twins); the third, Samuel, named from the father; the fourth, William, from the paternal grandfather; the fifth, Isaac, from the maternal grandfather; 6, 7, 8 (Joanna, John, and Dorcas), I wonder about; the ninth, Sarah, from the mother's sister; and finally, Joseph from Samuel's youngest brother."

Samuel had first cousins, John Sprague and Dorcas Sprague, which might explain Nos. 7 and 8 above. His wife's mother was named Joanna, same as 6 above.

CONCERNING MARTHA OR MARAH SMITH

From examination of the records in Lyme, Conn., Judge William Marvin wrote the writer:

"Regarding the wife of Isaac, Sr. Tubbs, I would say that I find the following data through examination of both Land and Vital records.

"Mrs. Tubbs' name appears both as Marah and Martha but there is no question both names apply to the same individual, on the whole 'Martha' being the most frequent form. Through deeds given by her in which her husband joined (as required under the law of that date) it is shown that Mrs. Tubbs inherited land from her brother Joseph Smith. Vital records show that John and Marah Smith had a son Joseph and a daughter Martha (Marah Tubbs), also other children who are mentioned as Marah Tubbs' brothers in deed later on, proving conclusively that she was the daughter of John and

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Marah Smith. Birth occurred Aug. 8, 1686 and John was married Oct. 26, 1685, maiden name of bride not being stated, a very common omission in those days.

"John and wife were both living as late as 1724 at which time they gave a deed to one of their sons, the mother's name being written 'Mary.' In one deed, John Smith refers to himself as 'house carpenter.'

"An Isaac Tubbs who I presume to be Isaac Sr. died Mar. 27, 1749. Not long before he and his wife joined in a deed and shortly after in a deed she describes herself as 'Widdow and Relict of Isaac Tubbs.'"

SKETCH OF ALVAN TUBBS OF HANOVER, N. H.

Alvan Tubbs, son of Joseph and Rhoda (Henry) Tubbs, was born in Marlow, N. H., July 5, 1797 in a family numbering four boys and three girls. His grandfather Joseph Tubbs had been one of the first settlers of Marlow and had been a selectman and a moderator at town meetings.

Probably early in his twenty's Alvan appeared around Lebanon and was married on June 16, 1825 to Cynthia Hoffman. The bride was six years younger than Alvan and at the time of her wedding was 21 years of age.

Alvan subsequently settled in Hanover and he had a small farm which was located between the junction of the two roads from Hanover to Lebanon. He is said to have had a mill near the stream on his property and there he washed and dyed silks. Also, there was at one time a small sawmill. In later years when the writer of these notes visited the place it was occupied by a family named Cilley. Only the end of the old house remained, on which a piazza was built and some of the barn was left.

In "A History of the Town of Hanover, N. H.," by Prof. John King Lord (The Dartmouth Press, 1928), it is recorded that Alvan Tubbs tried the hotel business briefly. The account reads: "In 1838, he, (Ebenezer Symmes) sold the place to Jonathan G. Currier, and he, in turn, after leasing it in succession to Joseph Barber and Alvan Tubbs, sold it to Horace Frary, who kept it for some years as the 'Hanover Inn.'"

"The place" referred to was a coffee house or tavern, and was

otherwise known as "Union House," "American House," and the "Lower Hotel." Later, it was used as a college dormitory and then it became a tenement house. It was built prior to 1795 and subsequent to use as a tenement house was briefly a tavern again and finally it was destroyed by fire, July 11, 1888.

One of the friends of Alvan Tubbs when he was proprietor was Professor Orcutt of the College, and Alvan gave the name of Orcutt as the middle name to his son Albert.

Documents of the State of New Hampshire record that Alvan Tubbs was connected with the Artillery Company of the Twenty-third Regiment, in the Sixth Brigade, Second Division of Militia, in the State of New Hampshire. His record follows:

In many parts of the country there was a great interest manifested in the formation and drilling of military companies, some of which had names like the "Greys," and with their uniforms, marching and social events, these companies were popular. This movement came to Hanover with its so-called "Cadets," and swept on to other towns.

At the time of Alvan Tubbs' military career in one such company, square dances were held in a hall which had a large figure of an eagle in the center of the floor. The guns and bayonets were stacked around the hall with oranges affixed to the bayonet points.

The dancing master then was tall, according to an account which has passed down in the family, and a contrast was offered when he had as a partner on the floor, Cynthia Tubbs, who was short and rather small. At such social affairs, the martial appearance of the men and the light colored dresses of the women were striking.

The writer some years ago consulted Dr. Gilman D. Frost, Dean of the Dartmouth Medical College, regarding some of the town records of the Alvan Tubbs family. Later, he had correspondence with Dr. Frost, who said that Alvan was always spelled as Alvin "on all our town records." However, the family has invariably followed the spelling with the "a" as Alvan.

Lebanon, N. H. town records show the marriage at Lebanon on June 16, 1825 of Alvan and Cynthia (Hoffman) Tubbs. It was probably in that town that the oldest children were born. Helen Amanda, Caroline Amelia and Albert Orcutt were born in Hanover. Edwin Eugene Tubbs was born in 1843, no doubt in Massachusetts as Alvan and his wife Cynthia removed to that State just before 1843, going to Ashburnham and Winchendon, where new factories were starting up.

Winchendon, Mass. town records certify as to the death of Alvan Tubbs on March 1, 1847; also that Cynthia (Hoffman) Tubbs married (2) on April 9, 1848, Charles C. Whitmore of Ashburnham Mass. After his death she lived in Providence, R. I., and died there Feb. 8, 1884.

Acknowledgment. The writer of these notes is indebted to Mrs. William Johnston Tubbs of Kingsport, Tenn., who showed him the photostatic copies she had secured of the commissions which were issued to Alvan Tubbs in the New Hampshire State Militia between the years of 1824 and 1831.

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THE DESCENT FROM WILLIAM TUBBS OF DUXBURY, MASS.

THROUGH ALVAN TUBBS OF HANOVER, N.H.

The number and names of the children of William Tubbs is a matter of general agreement among those who have looked into the old records. Also, the order of the birth of the children, although Bethia is sometimes listed after Benjamin.

As William was twice married, a question has been raised as to whether all the children were by his first wife Mercy, or if the last two children might have been by his second wife Dorothy. Some researchers call attention to William's will in which the last two boys were mentioned as being of tender age. Other genealogists are firmly of the opinion that there was no issue by the later marriage.

It is said that no birth dates exist for all five children, although the first child Samuel was born probably about 1638. The dates of birth for the other children, until more proofs are found, remain more conjectural.

It has been affirmed that Bethia lived unmarried with her brother Joseph in Pembroke, Mass. A record found in Marshfield, part of Plymouth in earlier days, chronicles the marriage of Bethia Tubbs and Joseph Hanmore on 24 June, 1674. By the date it might appear that the Bethia named was the daughter of William Tubbs.

There follows the descent through William, Samuel, Isaac, later through Alvan Tubbs of Hanover, N.H., with his descendants so far as it is possible to obtain them. It will be noted that sketches of several of these are in the front of this book.

*Mary Elizabeth Rugg who mar. Capt. John Henry sometimes went with her husband in the ship that he commanded, which was sailed around Cape Horn in trade with China ports. During the outbreak of the Civil War, owing to the possibility that the ship might be captured and confiscated, the route was altered so as to be between England and Africa. Mary wished to accompany her husband on the first trip but Capt. Henry thought it wiser for her not to be on that voyage. He and his ship and all aboard were lost in a great storm off the African coast. This was probably in 1862-63. Mary d. July 17, 1887.

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The author of these notes has a few small possessions which came from this Henry family. Also for several years he had the loan of two large oil portraits of Capt. John Henry and Mary Elizabeth Henry, painted in South America, and previously owned by a cousin, the late Warren Whittaker of Westboro, Mass., and then by Mrs. S. Elizabeth (Tubbs) Schouler. Subsequently, the portraits were given to another in the Rugg line, cousin Rev. Hazel Rogers Gredler, a Unitarian minister, who lives in Yarmouth Port, Mass.

BRIEF NOTES ABOUT TUBBS AND COLLATERAL LINES

<u>Arnold</u> This family was early influential in Rhode Island and produced Governors of the State. There is an Arnold coat-of-arms and the ancestry is in the descent of some well-known Americans.-- William, father of Rebecca Arnold, was one of the first settlers of Reading, and was a blacksmith. His father Joseph was in the regiment of Sir Charles Hobby in Nova Scotia during the French and Indian Wars.-- Elizabeth Arnold, whose English parents were actors, married David Poe of a Maryland family. They were parents of Edgar Allen Poe.

Bagley Orlando "was a man of considerable influence, a constable and apprehended his friend and neighbor, Susannah Martin, for a witch, bringing her to trial at Salem, Mass., where she was afterwards executed. Orlando and his wife were both living in 1663. He was not living in 1700." Between 1658 and 1663 they had five children: Orlando, Jr., John, Sarah (died young), Mary and Sarah.

Bigelow From the Anglo-Saxon "biggan," big, and "hlaew" or "hlaw," a hill, or barrow. This family enters into the ancestry of some outstanding people.-- Dr. Henry F. Bigelow was a distinguished professor of surgery at Harvard University and a writer for the American Journal of Medical Sciences around 1850.-- See notes on Garfield and Warren.

Brigham Thomas sailed from London, Eng., April 13, 1635 on the ship <u>Susan and</u> <u>Ellen</u> when he was 32 years old. He resided on the easterly corner of Brattle and Ash Streets in Cambridge, Mass., then a part of Watertown. He served as constable and selectman.

Bryant Abraham was one of the first settlers of Reading, and had a blacksmith shop just off the central square of the town.-- William Cullen Bryant was a Mayflower descendant.

Colby Anthony's name appears on the records of the First Church in Boston, Mass. "He was an industrious, hard-working man and in time became one of the largest property-holders in the town of Amesbury." He had twelve children. He died Dec. 11, 1660-1. In 1664, his widow married; in 1682 she was "infirm from age," and in 1701 the property was divided. The English family has a coat-of-arms.

Church The first known Church family in England was "John at Church," 1335-1396, of Great Parndon Parish, Manor of Geround, County of Essex, who married Catherine, daughter of Richard Winchester. They had three children. -- It is not known whether Cynthia Church, who married Joseph Hoffman, had descent from that family. Her parents were said to have been prominent and had property. Family tradition says that she married against the wishes of her family and came to America. Later, a man was entrusted with family records and sent to England to claim a share in the family estate, but was not heard from afterwards. Similar fraudulent handling of claims on estates in England occurred in many instances about that time. Fletcher The name is very old and means an archer. Three Fletcher families in England hold baronetcies and the family has a coat-of-arms.--William Fletcher, born in 1622, came from Oxford, Yorkshire County, Eng., at the age of 8 years, to Concord with his father Robert. William subsequently became prominent, wealthy, and was a selectman. It is through Samuel, brother of our ancestor William, that the former Charles Fletcher family of Worcester, Mass., was descended. Fletcher descendants have lived in the Fletcher house near the old meeting-house in Chelmsford, and Fletcher graves are in the old cemetery.-- John Fletcher rode on horseback from Chelmsford, to Lancaster to marry Hannah Phelps, who had removed to Lancaster from Chelmsford with her sister.

Frost The name is Scandinavian, going back to the Vikings, sea rovers and pirates. According to the Domesday Book, an Alwin Forst (Saxon form of Frost) held lands in County Hants, Eng., during the reign of Edward the Confessor, which was between 1042 and 1066. Henry Frost founded in 1135 at Cambridge, Eng., the Hospital (or hostelry) of the Brothers of St. John the Evangelist, which was placed under the regular canons of the Augustinian Order. From this foundation grew St. John's College, Cambridge, Eng., founded in 1509.-- Edmund Frost sailed on the ship Defence from Gravesend, Eng., Kent County, on Aug. 10, 1635, arriving Oct. 2, 1635. - See Frost Genealogies in Five Families, by Norman Seaver Frost, 1926, and The Frost Family in England and America, by Thomas G. Frost and Edward L. Frost, 1909.

<u>Garfield</u> Lt. Thomas Garfield married Mercy Bigelow (Mercy was daughter of Joshua Bigelow, who was son of John Bigelow and wife Mary Warren. See Chart 27.) From Thomas and Mercy (Bigelow) Garfield there is descent through Thomas, Jr., Solomon, Thomas III. Abram who married Elizabeth Ballou, and Gen. James Abram Garfield, President of the United States from 1880 to 1881. President Garfield, a Mayflower descendant, married Lucretia Rudolph, a descendant of William Hutchinson and wife Anne Marbury, and a descendant of James Chilton, one of the Mayflower Pilgrims.-- See Your Family Tree by Jordan and Kimball.

Gibson John had his house at the corner of Brattle and Sparks streets in Cambridge, Mass., and planted lindens by it. It is supposed that his house was referred to by Longfellow in his poem, "The Open Window."" It was called "the old house by the lindens." In the time of Governor Andros, John Gibson and George Willow, whose ages were 87 and 86 years, petitioned King James II for redress, stating that "our title is now questioned to our lands by us quietly possessed for near 60 yeres, and without which we cannot subsist."

- Hawks Adam, who married the widow Ann Hutchinson, had considerable property in Charlestown and Lynn, on which there were iron works.
- Henry A "Scotch-Irish" name. Considerable numbers of these people settled in central New England, as in Derry and Londonderry, N. H., and parts of Massachusetts.-- Rhoda Henry was born in Stoddard, N. H., living later at Alstead.

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<u>Hoffman</u> is a distinguished name in Dutch and German literature, and known also among the Swedish people. In the time of Gustavus Adolphus, 1611-1632, large numbers of Scandinavian people removed to Holland and Germany. In Scandinavian, the name is Hoppman meaning "a man of hope." Hoffman means the same in Dutch. Arthur, an authority on family names, says: "Hoffman: Dutch from Hoofdman, a captain, or director, or head or chief man. Also Hofman, from Hof, a court, the man of the court."-- It is told in the Tubbs family that "Grandfather Hoffman" who attained to great age, came from Germany to visit his son Joseph and Cynthia Hoffman and was a familiar sight as he sat by a window and read his German Bible.-- The late Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President of the United States from 1932 to 1945, was descended from Richard Church of Plymouth, Mass., and a noted Hoffman family of New York. None of the early New York Hoffmans moved to New Hampshire.

Houghton came from Hocton or "high town," in England. The pioneer in America was John Houghton, born probably at Eaton Bray, Bedfordshire, Eng., where his parents, John and Demaris (Buckmaster) Houghton lived with their ten children. John arrived in New England in 1651 or 1652. His father had come over in 1635 but had returned to England. John and wife Beatrix, son John and cousin Ralph Houghton settled on a large landed estate in Lancaster, Mass., where he died Apr. 29, 1684.

Howard The surnames of Howard and Hayward in various forms were once identical. John Howard, immigrant ancestor, was born in England. He came to Plymouth as a young man and settled later in Duxbury, Mass. He was a volunteer in the Pequot War, June 7, 1637. An ensign in 1664, he was of much influence and prominence. He had seven children and died in 1700.

Hutchinson means the son of Hutchins or Hitchins. The family is said to have originated with one Uitonensis or Urtchensis, a Norwegian who came from Normandy with William the Conqueror.-- The New England branch has for a common ancestor, Barnard Hutchinson, who lived in 1282 in Cowlam, a small parish in the East Riding of Yorkshire. The whole parish was his property. Sir Henry St. George, who died in 1644, prepared a pedigree of the Hutchinson family. Our line and that of the famed Hutchinson Singers came from the same stock.-- William Hutchinson, Anne's first husband, by whom she had children, probably died shortly after the family came to America. Edward with his mother Anne and several brothers and sisters came in 1630 in Winthrop's Fleet.

Jones is the same as John or Johns. In Hebrew it signifies "gracious." In Wales, Jones was one of the tribes of Cimbri that ruled the country when it was free. That Hugh came from Wincanton, Somersetshire, Eng., was "testified to by Thomas and John Cromwell, in 1662." A mystery surrounds his death. The Essex Collection, Vol. 2 says that he was murdered for nonpayment of a small sum, the price of a "poynt of cider."

Lawrence At least two cities, Lawrence, Mass. and Lawrence, Kansas, have been named after descendants of John Lawrence. Many of his descendants have become noted, among them Bishop William Lawrence of the Diocese of Massachusetts. Frederick Cunningham Lawrence, D.D., is Suffragan Bishop

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of that diocese at present, and William Appleton Lawrence, D. D., is retiring as Bishop of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts. Abbott Lawrence was at one time U. S. Minister to England. Lawrence Academy derives from that family and Groton School has been fostered by the Lawrences.-- In Lancashire, Eng., is the estate of Sir Robert Lawrence, Ashton Hall, in a park of 1000 acres. The last of the name to live there was Sir John Lawrence, who was killed in the Battle of Flodden Field in 1513.

<u>Mack</u> Ebenezer Mack is said to have died while bringing in a back-log. He had nine children: Phoebe, Deborah, Solomon, Hannah, Samuel,
Hepzibah, Stephen, Elisha, and Azubah, between 1729 and 1748. Solomon Mack was in the Revolutionary War in Israel Putnam's company and "experienced religion" after he was 70, becoming very active. Lucy, one of his daughters, married Joseph Smith, who kept the "Mansion House" in Nauvoo, Ill., and they had a son Joseph (born in Sharon, Vt., Dec. 23, 1805), who was the famous Mormon prophet. He was killed by a mob June 27, 1844 in prison at Carthage, Ill. His brother Hyram was also killed then under the same circumstances.-- There is still a tract of land called "the Mack land" in Lyme, Conn., with traces of the cellar to the house where John Mack is reputed to have lived.-- Hepzibath (on the Lyme records as Hepzibah) was a cousin of the wellknown "Elder" Ebenezer Mack.

Osgood John was from Andover, Hampshire County Eng., and was a founder of Andover, Mass., together with Simon Bradstreet and others, in 1645.. He was prominent and a member of the General Court. John's gravestone stands in Andover near the Simon Bradstreet house.-- The family is ancient and has a coat-of-arms.

Prescott means literally "priest's cot," or cottage. This is the same family that produced the renowned Captain Prescott of Revolutionary fame, and Prescott the historian, also other illustrious persons. From ancient days, the Prescotts were workers of metals and armorers. James Prescott in 1654 had an order from Queen Elizabeth I to have horses and armor always in readiness for her needs. The Prescott family in various English counties all have the same coat-of-arms which is ancient. John went first to Barbadoes in 1638 but soon sold his property there and by 1640 was in Watertown, where he owned extensive property. John Prescott and John Rugg took up adjoining tracts of land where the woolen mills are now situated in Clinton, and they established a trading post for negotiations with the Indians. A marker is set up at the edge of Lancaster to the memory of Prescott. The people of the town petitioned to have the place called Prescott, but the General Court refused because John was not considered quite orthodox in his religious views, and the town was called Lancaster after Lancashire, Eng., where Prescott came from. John is said to have taken with him from England armor, chain mail and helmet which he wore in warding off Indian raiders. His daughter Lydia married Jonas Fairbanks, ancestor of Charles W. Fairbanks, Vice-President of the U. S., from 1904 to 1908.

Priest Degory, b. prob. abt. 1579, was from London Eng., and was admitted and enrolled Nov. 16, 1615 as a citizen or freeman of Leyden, Holland, and called "a hatter." His only friends who enjoyed the same citizenship were Bradford and Allerton. His marriage intentions were published Oct. 4, 1611

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and he was married on Nov. 4 of that year, at Leyden to Sarah (Allerton) Vincent, a sister of Isaac Allerton. His widow married (3) Cuthbert Culbertson, a Dutchman, whose name is given in some accounts as Goddard Golbert.-- Degory's son John, who died before 1738, was married about 1664. One account gives his wife's maiden name as Ann Barker. (<u>New England Historic Genealogical Register</u>, also Families of the Pilgrims, a publication of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, 1956.)

Reynolds See the notes under the caption "Whitney and Reynolds" at the end of this section account of names.

Rogers John Rogers, immigrant ancestor, was living in Scituate, Mass., in 1647 on a lot of land lying between that of Thomas Hicks and that of John Stockbridge. Removed to Marshfield, Mass., about 1647, where he resided until early in 1661. Married Frances, who married (2) Walter Briggs of Scituate. John died in May, 1661 and his wife died in 1687. They had six children.

Rugg An ancient Family name in Norfolk County, Eng., and two men of this branch were aldermen of Norwich, Eng.-- John Rugg as a young man came from Lancashire, Eng., with John Prescott and lived with him. Later, he married a daughter of Prescott and lived on adjoining land.-- See "Prescott."

Standish Of the same family in England as Miles Standish.

Slafter The old form is Slaughter. John had much land in Mansfield and Windham, Conn., on the Willimantic River, and built a mansion called "Willington," where he lived the remainder of his life. Described as being very strong and of powerful build, he knocked out two Indians whom he found terrorizing his family. The Indians did not return. He was a magistrate, grand juror, and a tithing-man.

<u>Sprague</u> The name is from the Dutch "spraak," meaning speech or language, and denoted one with a ready tongue. The family has a coat-of-arms and has produced many prominent persons.

Stearns The coat-of-arms which hung for a long time in the old house in Watertown is the same as that of the various Stearns families in Buck's, Cambridge, Hertford, and Norfolk Counties in England. It was borne by Richard, Archbishop of York, who descended from the Stearns family of Nottinghamshire, Eng.-- Charles Stearns was a constable and tax-collector at Watertown in 1681.

Tay William was a pioneer settler of Woburn, a selectman and prominent in town affairs. Three of the family were in Revolutionary War Service, Samuel having been at Fort Ticonderoga, N. Y.

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TubbsMany descendants of William have stayed in New England, some not
having left Massachusetts, but there are many also in all parts of
the country.-- A Tubbs Manufacturing Co. of the Middle West made printers'
cabinets and supplies.-- The Norway, Maine family of Tubbs has long been prom-
inent and an account of it is in the history of the town.-- Around 1925 an "R
Tubbs" of England was a celebrated golfer.-- The Rt. Rev. Norman H. Tubbs,
D. D., who was the Anglican Bishop of Rangoon and Burma missionary diocese
and later Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Chester, Eng., later because of
age retired to a small parish.

<u>Warren</u> This well-known family has descent from De Warrens who accompanied William the Conqueror into England and became Earls of Surrey. (See notes on Bigelow and Garfield.)

WhitneyRuth Whitney was the widow of John Shattuck who was drowned in 1675andwhile crossing on a Charlestown ferry. Earlier of Watertown, RuthReynoldstook land of the family in Groton. Her mother's father, Robert
Reynolds, was a shoemaker of Watertown. His will in 1658 is printedinThe New England Historic Genealogical Register, Vol. 9, and mentions his
daughter Ruth. He was from Aylesford, Eng.

<u>Willey</u> means "willow basket," and the name denoted one who made willow work. The family has a coat-of-arms.-- Isaac Willey was in Boston in 1640 and in Charlestown by 1664. Moving to Connecticut his farm was divided by town bounds between East Haddam and Lyme.

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SOME PROMINENT PEOPLE OF THE TUBBS NAME

Arthur Tubbs, brother of John L. Tubbs who is mentioned below, was for many years a well-known dramatic critic for <u>The Philadelphia Evening</u> Bulletin.

Edward Tubbs, a corporation executive and officer in many large businesses, is listed in <u>Who's Who in America</u>, Marquis publication, Vol. 29, 1956-57. He was born in Chicago, Ill., Sept. 30, 1900, son of Frank and Ellen (Helquist) Tubbs, and married Elsie Jerrick. They have two children, Phyllis Joyce, wife of Donald Paulsen, and Ronald. Their home is at 33 Golf Road, Clarendon Hills, Ill.

Eston V. Tubbs, Ph. D., was director of curriculum of the Board of Education in Chicago, Ill., in 1930 with office in the Educational Administrative Bldg., 460 South State St. He was born in Indiana but spent nearly all his life in Illinois. A graduate of Northwestern University, he was awarded a fellowship in history at the University of Illinois.

Frank Dean Tubbs, S. T. D., was a scientist of note, a lecturer, accomplished in Spanish, and was a genealogist. He had a most interesting career in educational work; the last position which he held prior to retirement being on the faculty of Bates College, Lewiston, Maine. A book about Professor Tubbs entitled, <u>He Dared To Think</u>, outlined his liberal views in science and religion when they were much opposed in orthodox circles. The book was written by Charles Alden Magoon, published in 1951 by the Falmouth Publishing Company of Manchester, Maine, and was dedicated to Euphemia Fowler Tubbs, widow of Dr. Tubbs, and Alice Evangeline Tubbs and Katherine Tubbs Corey, his daughters. Evangeline taught music at Nasson College in Springvale, Maine, and then accepted a teaching position in the South. Dr. Frank Tubbs was of assistance in genealogy to the editor of these notes. He traced his descent in the Tubbs family as follows: (1) William, (2) William, (3) Samuel, (4) Samuel, (5) Joel, (6) Dean, (7) Lewis, (8) Frank Dean Tubbs. He had over 300 names in the collateral lines of his ancestry.

Frank H. Tubbs of Charlton, outside of Worcester, Mass., lived to the age of 84 years and was a former member of the advisory service of the New York Stock Exchange, at which time he resided in New Jersey.

Capt. George E. Tubbs, who subsequently retired to live at 152 Beckwith St., Cambridge, Mass., had a long life at sea. He took the largest deckload of lumber, 3,200,000 feet, through the Panama Canal. The full cargo was 7,500,000 feet. He was in the Navy but not in active service in the Spanish-American War. He also saw service with the Dutch fleet in World War I. While master of the freighter <u>Melrose</u>, his ship was bumped by the U. S. S. <u>Arkansas</u> in a dense fog and had to be run aground. Captain Tubbs spent his last years ashore in painting, self taught, and specialized in pictures of clipper ships.

Miss Irene E. Tubbs of Norway, Maine, a teacher in English and social studies at the Norway High School, developed her own ceramic business as a hobby and with her sister Eleanor found quick sales in their gift shop of that town, for their attractive products.

J. Herman Tubbs, Deputy Sheriff, was born in East Lyme, Conn., Sept. 14, 1859. He had a long record of exciting adventures with those who were outside the law. Before the United States entered World War I, the famous German

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undersea boat <u>Deutschland</u> was leaving New London when it rammed the tugboat <u>T. A. Scott</u> in the early hours of Nov. 7, 1916 and five lives were lost. Deputy Sheriff Tubbs immediately seized the submarine and was in charge of her while the ship remained in New London. He was tax collector for eleven years and his son Charles was tax collector at East Lyme, Conn., for over twenty years, and town clerk. A grandson, Paul Tubbs, later was graduated from Bates College. Deputy Sheriff Tubbs traced his line thus: (1) William, (2) Samuel, (3) William, (4) Peter, (5) John, (6) Job, (7) Charles Herman, (8) Job Herman.

Jerry Tubbs, "an all-state high school center from Breckenridge, Texas," as Collier's stated, went on to great and spectacular success on the University of Oklahoma football schedules. He was co-captain of the 1956 team, an All-American center in that year; six feet two inches tall, weight 205 pounds, and in ten games averaged 6.1 yards and fumbled only twice. He showed uncanny foresight about what his football adversary would do and was a tower of defense with his solid blocking. He was an honor student, majoring in economics.

John L. Tubbs, brother of the Arthur Tubbs whose name heads this article, was for 43 years editor of The Warrensburg (\mathbb{N} , Y.) News. He was also a well-known band and orchestra leader. He died at the age of 74 years.

Johnny Tubbs, of Spokane, Wash., rode his lively steed <u>Dizzy</u> <u>Dean</u> in the World's Championship Rodeo at Boston Garden when more than 200 cowboys and cowgirls competed.

Ray B. Tubbs, M. D., and daughter Miss Sibyl O. Tubbs called on the author several years ago. Miss Tubbs was then in charge of the library in McKeesport, Penna., but now lives in Omaha, Neb. Dr. Ray Tubbs was the youngest son of Judge and Mrs. L. W. Tubbs and was a graduate of Rush Medical College. He specialized in pediatrics and obstetrics and was chief of the hospital at Council Bluffs, Wash., and city physician. In 1918 he retired from active practice and moved from Emerson, Iowa to Russelville, Ark. While on a motor trip in the West with his daughter Sibyl he died peacefully in his sleep one night in July, 1951.

Hon. Tallant Tubbs was born in San Francisco, Calif., May 8, 1897, son of Austin Chapin and Anne Tallant (Brodie) Tubbs. He served in the U. S. Army in 1918; saw active duty from 1942 to 1946 in the U. S. Marine Corps and was captain on the staff of the Commander-in-chief of the Pacific Fleet in 1945. He is a director of the Tubbs Cordage Co., was a member of the California State Senate from 1925 to 1933 and was a Republican nominee for the U. S. Senate in 1936. In 1937 he was appointed by the Governor to be on the committee for the Golden State International Exposition. He has been a special writer for <u>The San Francisco Chronicle</u>, has served in political and veterans' organizations with distinction and is a member of many leading clubs as well as being listed in <u>Who's Who in America</u>, Vol. 29, 1956-57 (Marquis Publications). As a descendant of William Tubbs of Duxbury he is of the line through (2) Samuel, (3) Isaac, (4) Joseph, (5) Abisha, and (6) Dr. Mical Tubbs.

Miss Thelma Tubbs some years ago was dietitian at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston, Mass., and a writer on dietary subjects.

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Walter F. Tubbs was a veteran snowshoe manufacturer in Norway, Maine. Tubbs snowshoes and skiis were used in the Admiral Peary expedition to the North Pole. The business was sold about 1918, changing hands several times and subsequently was moved to Wallingford, Vt. With the revival of winter sports the old Tubbs factory in Norway was bought by Snocraft, Inc. which in 1955 sold to Garland Bros. of Biddeford, Maine.

William Johnston Tubbs, for many years a Y. M. C. A. secretary, and now deceased, and his wife Ruth Rennie Tubbs were members of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. (South). Of their seven boys and one girl in the family, two sons became ministers, two ruling elders and two deacons, while the daughter has been active in church work and her husband is a church deacon. This is a testimony to the quiet but effective religious training by two consecrated parents and is a witness to the continued devotion of the mother who kept the light of the eternal truths coupled with Christian service, shining in her household.

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MISCELLANEOUS GENEALOGICAL ADDENDA

ANANIAS TUBBS

There is a record of an Ananias Tubbs (1732-1825) born in Gilsum, N. H., died in Northfield, Vt. It is stated that he saw service under Capt. Benedict Arnold and was a prisoner in Quebec, where his wife went to see him.

The lineage from him is as follows: Ananias Tubbs married Hannah Hill and their son William Tubbs married Eunice Carpenter. William and Eunice had a daughter Jane Tubbs who married Reuben Marsh and they had a daughter Annie Whitney Marsh.

In the <u>New Hampshire Papers</u>, Vols. 15 and 16 in the State library at Concord, N. H., there are several references to Ananias Tubbs, which may not all refer to the same person. In one, an Ananias Tubbs was in a military company which marched from Keene; in another instance an Ananias Tubbs was in a company which marched from Winchester; both having different enlistments, different commanders and different days of discharge. Another account says that an Ananias Tubbs was 47 in 1789.

EARLY NEW HAMPSHIRE SETTLERS

1874, D. L. Guernsey publisher, is authority for the following:

"Marlow, First Settlers. This town was granted to William Noyes and sixty-nine others, October 7, 1761. Joseph Tubbs, Samuel and John Gustin, N. Royce, N. Miller, Nathan Huntley and others were the first settlers. The first town meeting was held in March, 1776.

"Milford was incorporated Jan. 11, 1794. Among the first settlers was Nathan Hutchinson."

MICAL TUBBS, M. D.

In this author's family records Mical is the form of the Christian name of Doctor Tubbs of Deering, N.H. However, it is noted that C. C. Lord in his Life and Times in Hopkinton, N. H., issued by the Republican Press Association of Concord, used the spelling of Michael.

This attractive and valuable volume refers to an epidemic known as the "throat distemper," but resembling in some ways, diptheria, which broke out in 1820. In Hopkinton there were 72 deaths from the disease, which mostly afflicted the young. Dr. Mical Tubbs is mentioned as having the greatest success in treating the disease. He had nineteen patients in Hopkinton and the only one who died had been too ill to recover when the doctor was summoned. No doubt, Dr. Mical Tubbs had epidemic patients also in Deering and the surrounding countryside at that time.

THE HUTCHINSONS OF MILFORD

The History of Milford by G. A. Ramsdell is a voluminous work of 1023 pages which is a narrative down to 1901, so that over a half century has ensued since. In that book, there are 130 separate Hutchinson entries in the index with many references in the context.

The Hutchinsons were engaged in many occupations for the period covered. Perhaps the most notable were the "Hutchinson Singers," who went on world tours and were noted for religious and other songs and their crusading efforts for noble causes. According to their successive leaders, they were termed variously as the "Tribe of Jesse," the "Tribe of John" and the "Tribe of Asa." A history of the family was compiled by a sole survivor, John W. Hutchinson.

In the professions were named: Dr. Jonas Hutchinson, Dr. Herbert S. Hutchinson; Judge Jonas Hutchinson of the Superior Court and judge exofficio of the Cook County Criminal Court, Chicago, Ill.; Atty. Oliver A. Hutchinson who later removed to California, and Atty. Eugene Hutchinson.

THE OLD ARTILLERY COMPANY IN HANOVER

The 23d Regiment with its 2d Division and 6th Brigade came into its own separate existence with the passage of the Act of Dec. 27, 1792, when changes were effected in numbering of the former regiments. Two battalions were formed with the command vested in a lieutenant-colonel and two majors. The Hanover company was in the 2d Battalion.

There was a standard for the regiment and especial insignia for the light horse and the artillery. The device for the artillery bore a figure of a uniformed cannonier standing ready beside a field gun.

The uniforms were blue coats and blue pantaloons with red facings on the coats and the pantaloons corded with gold. The hats were of the Bonaparte type, high crowned, of stiff leather and ornamented with tall red plumes and with brass shield and chains.

During the years when Alvan Tubbs was in service the Militia Act of 1829 was passed. The 23d Regiment was then made up of companies from Hanover, Lebanon and Lyme. Each company was given a field piece. The company captain was required to have a gun house built, the location to be approved by the regimental officers.

The ground for the gun house had to be deeded to the State and it consisted of a site on North Street in Hanover, the south side. The land was conveyed to the State on May 22, 1830 and the gun house was erected. Afterwards, the gun was removed to Etna and the State on June 24, 1843 sold the land. Previously, around 1841 general interest had fallen off and the company was finally disbanded.

Other attempts at military companies were made at various times in and around Hanover, among townspeople and among the Dartmouth students, but most of them were short lived excepting when some crisis of national nature for a while threatened.
