PREFACE.

This volume is the unexpected result of an effort of three ladies to collect a few families in a connected line, to their first ancestor in America, which was Henry Tomlinson. After their labors had proceeded a few months, the materials were placed in the hands of the author of the History of Stratford, Ct., to be incorporated in that book, but they were found too voluminous for it, and a brief outline was substituted in its place. It was neither easy nor satisfactory to end the undertaking in such a manner, and a separate volume was proposed, and the material largely prepared for it, when illness caused the efforts to be laid aside for more than two years.

In the autumn of 1890, the work was resumed; a few circulars were sent out, for the purpose of completing the Henry Tomlinson line, as far as might be, and after a few weeks the returns became more than was expected, for the search revealed Tomlinsons in every direction, and that literally by the hundred instead of the score; and

it is with great regret that the author, in consequence of arrangements for other work and the expense attending a further enlargement of the book, is compelled to close the printing before all the Tomlinson families in America could be collected and put into historic form.

While, therefore, all that could be obtained of the Henry Tomlinson line is here included, numbering, with the children of Tomlinson women who married out of the family name, about one thousand, with a few other short lines, there is left two or three additional lines, numbering nearly as many persons as are herein given, for the reason that the time has been too short for the parties to complete the gathering of names so far as to make the record satisfactory when put in type. It is expected therefore, that the parties mostly interested in those remaining lines, residing largely in Delaware and Pennsylvania, will in a few months hereafter bring out another—a second volume of "Tomlinsons in America," by which the record of this very honorable family shall be well represented in a book.





COL. MATTHEW TOMLINSON.

St. James Park is replete with historical associations, not the least interesting of which is the fact of Charles First having passed through it on foot on the morning of his execution, from his bedchamber in St. James Palace to the scaffold at White Hall.

The procession was a remarkable one. On each side of the King marched a line of soldiers, while before him and behind him were a guard of halberdiers, their drums beating and colors flying. On his right hand was Bishop Juxon, and on his left hand Colonel Tomlinson, both bareheaded.

Having obtained the watch-word from Colonel Tomlinson, who commanded the guard, Herbert proceeded on a dark night to the house which the king had designated where he readily gained admission to its mistress, who placed in his hands a small cabinet, closed with three seals, which she charged him to deliver to the same person from whom he had received the ring. The next morning in Herbert's presence the king broke the seals, when the cabinet was found to contain a number of diamonds and jewels, most of them set in broken insignia of the Order of the Garter. "This," said the king, "is all the wealth I have in my power to bequeath to my children."

The following refers to the same event: "On Col. Hacker giving the final signal at the door of his apartment his two faithful attendants, Bishop Juxon and Herbert, fell on their knees before him and wept. Charles gave them his hand to kiss, and as Juxon was an old man he kindly assisted him to rise.

To Colonel Tomlinson, a republican officer, who had shown him every attention consistent with his duty to his employers, he presented his gold tooth-pick case, and requested him to attend him to the last. Then desiring that the door might be opened, and telling Hacker he was ready to follow him, he passed with a cheerful countenance through an avenue of guards which lined the galleries to the scaffold."²

THE TOMLINSON NAME.1

THOMAS of Llwyn Madoc, county of Brecknock, traces his pedigree up to that prolific source of noble and gentle blood, Elyston Glodrydd, Prince of Fferllyn; and THOMAS of Welfield, county of Radnor, springs from the same family origin.

Tomlinson and Thomlinson are from the same origin, whatever that may be.

- "Sox. An exceedingly common termination in English family nomenclature. Observe:
- I. That personal or Christian names when introduced into this country, were very likely to become perpetrated by the spirit of imitation among persons who were strangers in blood to the introducers, as well as among their own descendants.
- II. When, in process of time, hereditary names began to prevail throughout Christendom, many assumed the patronymic form, and in England Son was the affix employed. So prevalent was this custom in the XIV. century, that there was scarcely a Christian name in use that did not become a surname by this tradition, whether such name was of Saxon, French, Flemish, or Danish birth. No evidence as to race, then, can be adduced from this termination."

THOMAS. The Christian name. Though not used here [in England] prior to the Norman Conquest [1066] this has become one of the commonest of baptismal appellations and surnames. It has also been a most abundant source of derivatives and nicknames, represented in our family nomenclature by

In the North, A commonly replaces O, and hence Thampsett, Tampsett, Tampyn, Tamplin, and probably Taplin.

Some of the Welsh families of Thomas are of antiquity, though the surname is, in all cases, of comparatively recent assumption: e.g.: Thomas of Gellynwernen, county of Carmarthen, descends from Sir Hugh Treherne, one of the Welsh knights who accompanied the Black Prince to the battle of Poictiers: some members of this family have recently exchanged the name for Treherne.



The small figures at the end of each name show the generation of that name from Henry Tomlinson, the first at Stratford, Conn.

"GEORGE TOMLINSON was married to Maria Hyde, in January, 1600, at St. Peter's Church.

"Henry Tomlinson, son of George and Maria Tomlinson, was baptized at St. Peter's Church, in November, 1606."

The above records were taken from the Parish Register of St. Werburgh, in Derby, Derbyshire, England, by Messrs. William D. Bishop, Jr., and Nathaniel W. Bishop, of Bridgeport, Ct., who, for this specific purpose went to that city, while on a visit in England in 1888. They learned also, what is proved by all the best books on heraldry, that this family belonged to the "Landed Gentry" or class next below the nobility in England. It is also shown by heraldry that this branch was descended from some duke who had received a "coat-of-arms" signifying this honor, which is inherited in a historical sense by all the descendants of the person

receiving it, and that the "coat-of-arms" brought to America by Henry Tomlinson proves, by its ornamentation, the family to have been descended from some line of kings.

Tradition says, "this George Tomlinson was a native of Yorkshire, England," where the family name runs back in history several hundred years, and removed to Derby where his son Henry was bred a weaver, probably to the trade of his father.

It was customary in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries in England, for this class of families to give their sons trades, which placed them in social life the same as merchants and manufacturers, then and at the present day.

Nearly all the early settlers of New England were of the common or middle class in England, being well informed in the learning, and the religious and political discussions of the times, and came to America for the two specific objects—religious liberty and the possession of lands for an inheritance to their descendants.

[&]quot;The children of those who could afford the small entrance fees were apprenticed to trades, the rest were apprenticed to agriculture; and if children were found growing up idle, and their fathers and their friends failed to prove that they were able to secure them an ultimate maintenance, the mayors in towns and the magistrates in the country had authority to take possession of such children, and apprentice them as they saw fit, that when they grew up 'they might not be driven' by want of incapacity 'to dishonest courses.'

Such is an outline of the organization of English society under the Plantagenets and Tudors."

1. HENRY TOMLINSON, with his wife Alice, and probably two or three children, came from Derby, in Derbyshire, England, to America, and, in 1652, settled in Milford, Ct. What year he came or what ship he came in is unknown. Tradition says he came to New Haven and thence to Milford.

There was a Thomas Tomlinson who took the freeman's oath in New Haven in April, 1644, but whether he was a relative or not of Henry has not been ascertained.²

There was also a Robert Tomlinson in Milford, Ct., whose wife was dismissed from the church in that place in 1648, to unite with the church at Stratford, Ct.

Also, a William Tomlinson settled in Derby, Ct., in 1677, who, it has been said was a nephew, and came with Henry Tomlinson to this country. but of this there is room for doubt, since the will of Jonas Tomlinson shows William to have been born in 1643, and, therefore, was quite young when Henry came to Milford, Ct., in 1652. This William, for aught that appears, may have been the son of Robert, of Milford, but if he was it is a little strange that no records indicate that relation.

This Thomas Tomlinson "was in Hartford, Ct., in 1655, and died there in 1685, leaving seven daughters, and so far as can be ascertained, no son." See "Up Neck in 1825," pages 29-31; a Phamplet of Territory near Hartford, Ct., by G. W. Russell, M. D.

Having settled in Milford, Ct., the next record shows Henry Tomlinson as "Keeper of the Ordinary" at Milford, to which position he was elected by the town, as one of its most honorable offices.

The articles of agreement could not have been very clear, for at the end of two years, when Henry

"Henry Tomlinson propounded to the Court for the gift of a home lott near the water side to sit down in and improve his trade of weaving, which he is resolved to follow wherever he inhabits, which, according to his proposition to follow his trade of weaving, the towne did grant him an acre lott before or against Ensignes lott, out of the land reserved for elders, with this proviso, to follow his trade, and in case of removall from the plantation, he shall resign it to the town, they promising to give him the value of the same as two indifferent men shall Judge thereof."

It was a custom in all the plantations, if a family would settle to stay, to give them a home lot, and especially a person having a useful trade, and often further inducements were offered, as in this case, for seven days later the following record was made at Milford:

"A General Court, Dec. 16, 1652.

"Henry Tomlinson bath taken the oath of fidelity, and also Renewing his motion to the Court for some small accommodation of meadow, the Court gave him a piece of meadow in the Beaverspond meadow that was made use of by John Smith the last year, judged to be about three acres, more or less, on both sides the Creeke, for his Incouragement to dwell and follow his trade amongst us according to his resolution therein."

Here it is expressly stated that he had taken the "oath of fidelity." That meant fidelity to the plantation under New Haven Colony, which oath secured all the rights of an inhabitant as to property and protection, but not the right to vote; to secure which in that Colony it was necessary to become a member of the Church. This he does not appear to have done, but afterwards united with the Church at Stratford.

Tomlinson claimed the house as his property, both Alexander Bryan, of whom the property was obtained, and the town disputed the claim. The matter was taken to the court, where it was amicably settled.

On June 13th, 1654, Henry Tomlinson, Ensign Alexander Bryan, and Mr. East were summoned before the court of New Haven for non-payment of duties on imported wines. The two latter paid their fines, but Henry Tomlinson made decided opposition, claiming that he had paid all legal duties, and under a legal process, caused the arrest of the Governor of the New Haven Colony, believing that the Governor was acting above all law. For this he was called before the court and fined one hundred pounds, which seems to have been only a show of honor for the Governor, as payment was never demanded.

In the autumn of 1656, or the next spring, Henry Tomlinson removed with his family to Stratford, Ct., and, on April 1, 1657, purchased of Joshua Atwater the estate which Mr. Atwater had bought of William Quenby, one of the original proprietors of the township.

In 1668, he and Joseph Hawley purchased a considerable tract of land in Derby, Ct., of the Indians, and this land in whole or part he gave to his son Jonas, who, with many of his descendants, resided on it for several generations.

In 1671, he and others purchased a large tract of land of the Indians at Weantinock, now New Milford, Ct., sufficient for a township, but his sons to whom he gave it never realized much from it because of trouble with the Indians and the General Court.

The record of the town meeting of Stratford, Ct., for January 2, 1670, says: "Henry Tomlinson is chosen and desired to bee an ordinary keeper, ye which he accepts," and which he accepted several years.

Henry Tomlinson died at Stratford, Conn., March 16, 1681, leaving a widow, two sons, and five daughters, all married except Agur, his younger

son. The remains were probably buried in the first burying ground adjoining the first meeting-house near Sandy-Hollow.

In his will, which is given below, the closing paragraph contains most beautiful and perfect commendation to his children, such as is seldom seen in a will.

The Will of Henry Tomlinson copied from The Fairfield Probate Records.

"March 15, 1680-81.

"In the name of God Amen. I Henr. Tomlinson of Stratford in the county of Fairfield and in the Colloney of Conecticut being weak in body but I bless God for His mercy and goodness unto me, I am in good understanding. I doe make this my last will and Testament in maner and form as followeth:

"Imp mes. I give my soul into the hands of my Merciful Father Almighty God: and unto Jesus Christ in whom I doe believe that he hath redeemed my soul from sin death and hell by his own merits and blood shedding: notwithstanding all my unworthyness, and hath prepared a rest for my soul in heaven to live with him and remain with him in joy unto all eternity.

"Item. I give my body after death to a decent burial in the earth from whence it came and thereto remain till the great day of the resurrection.

"Item. As concerning my worldly goods I am possessed of under God at my death after my debts are payd and my funeral accomplished, I doe dispose of them as followeth:

"Item. I give unto my loving wife Allice Tomlinson and to my sonn Agur Tomlinson all my housing and buildings with all my lands in Stratford during her natural life. And yf my wife incline to live alone by herself then my will is that shee shall make her choyce which end of the house and what of the sellars she will reserve for herself. And yf my wife shall see cause to change her condition after my death then I leave her to the thirds of my estate and the other two parts to remain to my son Agur; and after the death of my wife then the land to return unto my son Agur Tomlinson for him and his heirs to enjoy forever provided as followeth:

"I have given unto all my children that are married my sonn Jonas, my daughter Harger, my daughter Mary Pierson, my daughter Tabatha Worster, my daughter Phebe Worster, and my daughter Bashua Stiles already such portions as God did enable me and as I saw cause yet this is my will that my son Agur after the death of me and my wife shall pay unto my daughter Margaret five pounds the next year after our death, and four pounds to my son Jonas Tomlinson the second year after our death, and five pounds to my daughter Mary Pierson the third year after our death, and five pounds to my daughter Tabetha Worster the fourth year after our death, and five pounds to my daughter Phebe Worster the fifth year after our death, and to my daughter Bathshua the sixth year after our death. Yf any of these my children should be taken away by death before payment be made then it shall be to the children of the deceased. Yf God in his providence should take away my son Agur by death and leave no heirs or heir to inherit this land then it is my will it shall return to Jonas my sonn and his heirs to enjoy forever my sonn Jonas paying unto Margaret Harger my daughter twenty pounds the first year, and to my daughter Tabathy Worster twenty pound the second year after his decease and to my daughter Mary Peirson twenty pound the third year; to my daughter Phebe Worster twenty pound the fourth year and to my daughter Basshua Stiles the fifth year after our decease.

"I give to my two sons and the Longer Liver of them my Indian purchases of Wyantenuck. I give to Jonas and Agur my two sons all my guns to be divided between them as they best can agree. Moreover I give to my sonn Agur a horse fit for draught, two young oxen, one bed and furniture, all husbandry Tackling, that my wife hath not occasion to use and what else my wife sees cause to give him.

"Moreover I give to my grand child Timothy Worster if he continue with my wife or Agur four years one mare, and likewise to Abigail Harger I give one mare yf she continue with my wife four years; And my wife to add what she please; and I make my wife executrix of this my last will and Testament. And I do request my loving friends Richard Blaklidg and Joseph Hawley to joyn with my son Ephraim Stiles to be my overseers of this my last will: and I declare this to be my act by subscribing my name.

Henry Tomlinson brought with him "a coat-ofarms," painted in colors according to the rules of heraldry, which is still preserved, and is in possession of Mrs. Catherine (Plant) Sterling, of Stratford, Ct. This lady, whose mother was Catharine Tomlinson, had a copy of the original, some years ago, which she supposed was the original, and gave it to Mr. William Agur Tomlinson, of Kalamazoo, Michigan. It is furthermore agreed that should Alice Tomlinson outlive John Birdsey, she shall have and enjoy the dwelling-house, garden and yard of John Birdsey. came into her possession, which in itself, and by the family who preserved it, is known to be the original one brought by Henry Tomlinson to America. Of this "coat-of-arms" a print of a carefully executed engraving is presented as "Frontispiece" in this book. For further account of the Tomlinson coat-of-arms, see introductory pages of this book. Governor Gideon Tomlinson had also a copy of the original.

"These deponents testify and say that upon the 27th of November, 1692, we heard Jonas Tomlinson, of Derby, County of New Haven in New England, say and declare as his last will, that his will and desire [was] that his wife Hannah, after his decease should have full power to dispose of any part of his estate to pay his debts, and named two parcels of land at a place called White Hills in Stratford bounds, and a parcel of land in the bounds of Derby, called the Great Hill, or any other of his land to pay his debts. He has expressed as his last will that the said Hannah, his wife, should after his decease have full power as he himself, to proportion what estate remained when his debts were paid and the children came of age, only she should give to the eldest a double portion; that the whole estate should be lawfully at her disposal. He said it over and over, for said he, she hath been a loving wife and mother.

Jonas Tomlinson's tax list in Derby in 1681, on improved land, was the fifth from the highest, but he held considerable unimproved land, both in Derby and Stratford, now Huntington, which was not taxed in those days.

Administration was granted on the estate of Hannah Tomlinson of Derby, a widow [of Jonas], to Abraham Tomlinson, her eldest son, Feb. 4, 1722-3, there being only four children. On May 6, 1723, Abraham and Samuel agree to support their mother. What her maiden name was is not known.

In the name of God, Amen. I, Isaac Tomlinson, of Derby, in the County of New Haven, in the Colony of Connecticut in New England, being weak and low in bodily estate, but of sound mind and memory (thanks be given to God for it) see cause to make this my last will and testament in manner and form as followeth:

First of all, I resign and give my soul to God, who gave it hoping and trusting in ye merits of Jesus Christ. my Redeemer, for an Inheritance incorruptable among the blessed; and as for my Body, I desire may be committed to the Earth by Christian Burial; and as for that outward estate of worldly goods which God hath blessed me with, I order and dispose of as followeth:

First of all, I order my funeral expenses and just debts to be paid out of my estate by my executors hereinafter named.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Patience Tomlinson, my dwelling house with my orchard or four acres of land adjoining to my House with all my Household movables during her natural life; and also two cows with the improvement of my Hill Side Lot during her natural life.

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter, Ann Durand, fifty pounds old Tenor to her and her Heirs forever.

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter, Patience Tomlinson, and to her Heirs forever fifty pounds old Tenor.

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter, Rachel Smith, and to her Heirs forever the sum of fifty pounds old Tenor.

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter, Mary Hawkins, and to her Heirs forever the sum of fifty pounds old Tenor.

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter, Zervia Chatfield, and to her Heirs forever fifty pounds old Tenor.

I devise, give and bequeath unto my Son, Noah Tomlinson, and his Heirs forever my Barn and Half an acre of land adjoining thereto.

I devise, give and bequeath unto my two sons, namely Isaac Tomlinson and Noah Tomlinson, them and their Heirs and Assigns forever all my estate, both real and personal, whatsoever yt might acrue to me, to be equally divided between them.

Lastly my will is, and I do hereby appoint my two sons, namely, Isaac Tomlinson and Noah Tomlinson to be Executors of this my last Will and Testament, and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other Testaments. Wills, Legacies and

Bequests and Executors, by me in any wise before named, willed and bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament. In confirmation of all that is above written, I, the sd. Isaac Tomlinson, have hereunto set my hand and seal this 9th day of January in the year 1754. &c.

He married (2d) widow Mary Holmes. She was the daughter of John Morse, of Stratford. By tradition and records in the family she was the widow of Daniel Holmes, who died in 1738. Zachariah Tomlinson died Mar. 15, 1768, aged 75 years. He was a prominent citizen of Stratford, and was the only grandson of Henry Tomlinson, resident in the town of Stratford. He was born a little over twelve years after his grandfather died, and thirtyfive years before the death of his father, Agur, and the coat-of-arms, painted in large size, is traced to his possession, as having descended to him from his grandfather, Henry Tomlinson, and hence the historical certainty that it was brought hither by the said Henry Tomlinson.

The inscriptions on the gravestones of these persons in the Stratford old cemetery are:

- "Here lyes ye Body of Mrs. Hannah Tomlinson, Wife of Mr. Zachariah Tomlinson, who departed this life Octobr 5th, 1740, in ye 37 year of her age."

The Will of Zachariah Tomlinson, of Stratford village, 1768.

" IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN.

I, Zachariah Tomlinson, of Stratford, in the County of Fairfield and Colony of Connecticut in New England, being sick and weak of body, but of sound mind and memory, and being mindful of mortality, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament.

First of all, I freely resign my soul into the hands of God who gave it, and my body to be decently buried in a Christian manner at the discretion of my executors hereafter named, hoping in the merits of Christ Jesus my Savior to receive the same at the resurrection.

AND as to the worldly goods and estate which it hath pleased God to bestow upon me in this life, I give and bestow in manner following:

Imprimis. I will that my debts and funeral charges be first paid and answered, and having heretofore in marriage articles with my beloved wife Jemima, dated the 30th of November, 1758, settled upon and given her fifty pounds lawful money and the use of two rooms in the house where I now dwell, with household furniture. the use of which she is to accept in lieu of dowry, I do hereby ratify and confirm said articles, and order that the same be punctually performed; which rooms shall be in such part of my said house as she shall choose. And I do hereby give unto my said wife over and above what I have given her in said agreement, the use and improvement of convenient room in my cellar under said house for her use, with liberty of passage for said use, and the use of two good milk cows and a horse proper for her use, and the use of the garden adjoining south of my said house, and the use of my Negro woman called Hannah, if she see cause to have her, during the time she remains my widow and lives in my said house and no longer; said two cows and horse to be provided for with hay, sheltering and pasturing, and said Negro with boarding and clothing during the time aforesaid by my executors and my grandson Jabez Huntington Tomlinson. And also, I give unto my said wife during said time necessary food and support, and firewood convenient and sufficient for her spending brought to her door, cut fit for her use during the time she remains my widow.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving son Agur Tomlinson twenty pounds out of my moveable estate over and above what I have given him in education in consideration of his being my

eldest son. And also, I give and bequeath unto my said son, over and above what I have given him by deed, all my lands and meadows southerly of the line lately called the general line inclosing what was lately called the general field south of the country road, saving two pieces of lot meadow in the Great Neck and one piece of upland of about two acres; and all my land on Clabboard hill north of said country road lately inclosed with fence; to him and his heirs forever. Also about an acre and quarter of meadow on Carting Island adjoining to what I have already given him there.

Item. I give and bequeath to my loving son, Joseph Tomlinson, over and above what I have already given him by deed, all my part of that farm and tract of land and buildings where he now lives. I having heretofore given him one-half thereof; also one acre of meadow on the upper island, it being the remains of that meadow which I have already given him by deed; also my lot of land on Long hill which I purchased of Wakelee; also all my land in Wells Hollow and Wells Hill, be it more or less; to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving son Beach Tomlinson over and above what I have already given him by deed, all my lands and buildings lying on the lower White hills, excepting Summer's lot, to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving son Zachariah Tomlinson, over and above what I have already given him by deed, one hundred acres of land lying at Bank's Wigwam or Webb's Rocks, adjoining what I have given him by deed, to lie in proper form to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my loving son Abraham Tomlinson, over and above what I have given him by deed, and over and above the three hundred pounds which I paid to the Reverend Mr. Hezekiah Gold for the house and homestead where my said son now dwells, the said three hundred pounds to be reconed and deemed as so much in partition of my estate; also my meadow in the common meadow in the Great Neck in the salt ponds; and also about two acres of upland which I bought of Josiah Beardslee.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my grand-son Jabez Huntington Tomlinson, son of my late beloved deceased son, Gideon Tomlinson, over and above what I have given by deed to my said son Gideon, in his life time, the one-half of my homestead with the one-equal half of all the buildings and appurtenances thereon standing and thereto belonging, the other equal half I have given to his said father, the said Gideon, deceased; also two acres of meadow lying

in Oronoque meadow, called Griffin's meadow, the which he is to possess when he arrives to the age of twenty-one years as is here after expressed.

My will further is that in consideration of that money I owed his father the said deceased Gideon, he have divided, and set off to him so much of my lands as shall be deemed equivalent to said sums of money, and that my said grand-son do possess the same as his own proper estate, his heirs and assigns forever, which is so to be set off out of my lands lving on Oronoque hills.

Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Sarah Olcott, the wife of Thomas Olcott, besides what I have given her already in household stuff and portion, three lots and pieces of land lying in the Society of Westbury, in the township of Waterbury and County of Newhaven, containing about one hundred acres in the whole; also ten pounds in money and ten sheep out of my movable estate, besides what household furniture may be now in my dwelling house belonging formerly to her mother, which last article shall not be reconed a part of her portion.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Kellogg, wife of Judah Kellogg, all my land, lying in the place called Scatacook in the town of Kent, which I bought of the Government, to her and her heirs forever. Also I give to my said daughter Mary, two cows with calves by their sides; also two neat kine of one year old each; also my sorrel mare now called Molly's mare; also I give to my said daughter ten sheep; and also I give her the use of that part of my dwelling house and buildings not before herein given to my said wife with the use of a garden near or adjoining thereto, for her and hers to live in until my abovesaid grandson shall arrive to the age of twenty one years, but not to lease it or let the same upon hire when she and hers shall depart from said house and not dwell there; and also the use of all my land in my said homestead in that part which I have herein given to my said grandson and the use of that meadow called Griffin's, lying in said Oronoque meadow. Also I order her to find my said wife with hay, viz: her equal proportion with my said executor grandson, for her proper use off said meadow, and also liberty to cut wood off any of my woodland which I have not heretofore disposed of and that I shall die seized of; that is, so much wood as shall be needful for fire wood to burn in the fire that my said daughter shall prudently keep in her part of said house; the said Mary doing her proportionable part in keeping said house and barn and fences in good repair.

Also I give and bequeath unto my said daughter Mary, one hundred and fifty pounds lawful money, to be paid her out of my movable estate by my executors within one year after my decease.

Also my will further is that my said daughter shall have all the things that were her own mother's, in my said house; and all the linen that she hath spun over and above not to be reconed as part of her proportion.

Also, my will is that my said daughter and wife shall have family provisions found them out of my stores one year.

Item. My will is that my executors deliver unto the Rev. Mr. Izrahiah Wetmore, our minister, two loads of walnut wood yearly, and every year for six years after my decease.

And I give and dispose of all the residue of my estate, both real and personal, to my said five sons and my said grandson, to be divided amongst them in manner following, viz.: that all the estate I have heretofore by deeds of gift and now by this my will, given them as above, be properly appraised, and that son or grandson that shall appear to have had by deed of gift, or by this my will, the greatest share and portion, his estate shall be the standard, and the rest of my sons or grandson shall have portions of their said residue so as to make them equal to him that so appears to have had the greatest share and portion, and then the rest or residue to be equally divided amongst them, so as that in the whole and final settlement all my said sons, with said grandson, shall be equal in their shares of my estate.

My will further is that my said grandson do not take possession of such estate, as I have herein bequeathed him until he shall arrive to the age of twenty-one years (he being at this time a minor) but that the same shall be improved by my executors hereafter named for the benefit of the estate in general for the payment of the debts of the estate and settlement of the same, and if it should be so ordered that my said grandson, Jabez Huntington, should decease and not arrive to the age of twenty-one years to take possession of the same that then my will is that said estate be so divided between my said five sons, Agur Tomlinson, Joseph Tomlinson, Beach Tomlinson, Zachariah Tomlinson and Abraham Tomlinson, their heirs and assigns forever.

My will further is that my said five sons and my said grandson, in equal proportions do at all times support and supply what I have herein made necessary for my said wife, except the hay for my wife which Mary is to bear her equal portion of; also, in providing the wood that I have herein ordered for the Rev. Mr. Wetmore.

Also, if it should so happen that if any of my lands herein devised, or otherwise, such lands as are not divided herein may be contested in law, my will is that my said five sons and my grandson shall in equal proportion bear the cost and expense of said determination in law, if may be.

Also, my will is, that all such estate as is herein given to my said grandson, both real and personal, shall be and remain in the hands of my said executors, to be improved by them for the use of settling my estate until he arrive at the age of twenty-one years, and that he is to receive it without the benefit of any previous improvement to that time.

And I do hereby constitute, ordain and appoint my said sons, Agur Tomlinson, Joseph Tomlinson, Beach Tomlinson, Zechariah Tomlinson and Abraham Tomlinson, executors of this my last will and Testament, revoking all other wills by me made, and confirming this to be my last will and testament.

20. AGUR' TOMLINSON, son of Abraham, (Jonas, Henry, 1) and Mary(—) Tomlinson, married Dec. 4, 1734, Sarah, daughter of Rev. Nathaniel Bowers, of Rye and Greenwich, N. Y. and of Newark. N. J. He died Feb. 7 (?) 1800, aged 87 years. He was the Agur Tomlinson referred to by J. W. Barber in his Historical Collections, as having brought up and educated Chuse, who in later years was the Indian Chief at Chusetown, afterwards Humphreysville, now Seymour, Ct. Mr. Barber says: "His father, Gideon Mauwehu, wishing to have his son brought up among the white people, sent Joe to Agur Tomlinson, of Derby, with whom he lived during his minority."

Agur Tomlinson's Will.

"IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN.

I, Agur Tomlinson, of Derby, in the County of New Haven and State of Connecticut, being advanced in age and, in my own view, drawing towards the close of life, though at present in full exercise of Reason and sound memory, would first of all commit my immortal soul to God, who gave it, hoping through divine grace to be finally accepted of him thro' Jesus Christ the great Redeemer, and would with the worldly estate God in his providence has been pleased to Bless me with make the following disposition of which is my last Will and Testament:

- 1. I would recommend that my Executors, hereafter Named, shall pay out of my estate my funeral charges and all my just debts, giving me a decent and Honorable Burial.
- 2. My Will and Testament is, and I give it in Charge, that my Executors see that my Negro man named Quosh and his wife named Rose be made free, and I hereby order my Executors to give my said

Negro man the use and improvement of one Hundred pounds worth of land to be set out to the said Quosh for him to use and improve as long as he, the said Quosh and his wife Rose may live together, with one Yoke of Oxen and one good cow, with needful farming Utensils, such as Plough, Chain, Ax, hoe, and Sythe, &c.

I give and bequeath to my three sons, Joseph Tomlinson, Web Tomlinson, and to the heirs of David Tomlinson deceased, my estate both real and personal, a double share to what either of my Daughters, viz.: Sarah Tomlinson and Hannah Hawkins, widow and relict of Freegift Hawkins deceased, shall have, that is to say, I give unto my eldest son Joseph just as much again as I give to either of my daughters of my real estate and personal estate, taking into consideration what he the said Joseph has already received of me as part of Portion, to be estimated according to its value when he received it, near as possible.

I also give unto my son Web Tomlinson, my second son, an equal share with my eldest son Joseph of my real and personal estate, taking into consideration whatever I have already given unto him, the said Web, viz.: to the avails of a piece of land lying at Squontuck so called, sold to Jonathan Lum, Jr., and to the avails of one piece of land at said Squontuck sold to Nathan Mansfield, and to the avails of one piece of land at the falls so called, to one right in Mumphrymagog, and to the avails of other lands given by me to the said Web, and also to the avails of one Negro Boy named James.

I also give and bequeath unto the heirs of my Third son David an equal share of what I give unto my other sons, viz.: Joseph and Web, that is to say, to the whole of the heirs of my son David, considered compoundedly as unto either Joseph or Web, to be distributed in manner following, viz.: David and Agur, my two grandsons, to have a double share to either of their sisters, of my estate, both real and personal, and my two grand-daughters, viz.: Nancy and Betsy Tomlinson, heirs of my son David deceased, one Half as much of my estate as either of my grandsons, viz.: David and Agur, shall have.

Also, I give of my estate unto my eldest daughter Sarah Farmer, one half as much of all my estate, real and personal, as I give unto either of my sons, taking into consideration what I have already given to my daughter Sarah, viz.: one Negro girl named Jude, and notes of hand to the amount of fifty-three pounds and other things.

And lastly, I give unto my youngest daughter, Hannah Hawkins, an equal share or right in all my estate, both real and personal, which I give unto my eldest daughter, Sarah, that is half as much as I give to either of my above-named sons, taking into consideration what she, the said Hannah, hath already received as portion.

And moreover, I do by this presents in this my last will and testament constitute and appoint my son Joseph Tomlinson to be, and he is hereby appointed and authorized to be my Executor to put this my last Will and Testament of mine in execution, as soon as may be convenient after my decease.

Before Russell Tomlinson, Justice of the Peace.

The "Negro Man named Quosh" became quite a noted character in Derby, Ct., as set forth in the *History* of that town, on page 548.

"Near the old road that winds its way through the woods above Derby Neck, there stands a rude domicile, built nearly one hundred years ago. So seeluded is the spot that its dwellers within could never see the rising sun, though surrounded by romantic, beautiful and poetic scenery. Here was born, reared and educated, the last sable governor of Connecticut, Roswell Freeman, who died October 6, 1877, aged 74 years.

His father was the slave of Agur Tomlinson, although he "bossed" the master, and when young was known only by the name of Quash. His mother, whose name was Rose, was a slave to the Rev. Thomas Yale, a minister of the Congregational Church. When the State threw off the yoke of human bondage Quash took the name of Quash Freeman, which he always retained. Tomlinson gave him with his freedom the above-named hut, a cow and the use of some thirty acres of land."

"According to the custom of the colored freemen of that time, Quash was elected their governor of the State. He held the office many years. He possessed herculian strength, a giant six-footer, and it is said of him that he could take a bull by the horns and the nose and at once prostrate him to the ground. No one ever dared to molest, or tried to make him afraid, and when he was approaching in the distance he awakened the sense of a coming thunder cloud.

"Tradition says that one dark night when he was out with his son Roswell, on the Housatonic fishing, and a party from the other side came in collision with his skiff and were much damaged, they sang out: 'There is a lot of niggers over this side, and if you don't keep your net out of our way we will come over and flax you out.' Quash coolly replied, 'Nigger this side too.' Enough was said, for

they knew his voice and dared not trouble him. Physically speaking, Quash was probably the strongest and largest man that ever shared the gubernatorial honors of this commonwealth."

"After Connecticut in 1789 or 90 made a law to free all persons born in slavery, it was required that such persons, with their ages, should be entered upon the town records, and therefore the following is on the Derby records:

"New Haven County, February 7, 1791.

Personally appeared Mr. Agur Tomlinson and made oath that he has in his possession a negro boy named Peter, belonging to David Tomlinson [Agur's son] deceased, aged five years and three months wanting one day.

Entered per John Humphreys, town clerk."

"In December, 1792, Mr. Agur Tomlinson made oath to the possession of a negro boy named Timothy, aged one year and twenty-five days."

"On April 20, 1795, Mr. Agur Tomlinson made oath that he was possessed of a negro girl named Olive, aged eight months the first day of May, 1795."

The inventory of Agur Tomlinson's estate, amounted to £1,840 12s. 4d., including "one Negro man, named Shubel Et., 22 years, at £30," and the "avails of one Negro boy named James," by which he meant the value of his time until he should be twenty-five years old, when he became free by limitation of the law at that time, concerning young persons who were slaves.

31. CAPT. JOHN' TOMLINSON, son of John, (Jonas, Henry,) and Elizabeth (Wooster) Tomlinson, married Deborah, daughter of Capt. Samuel Bassett, of Derby, Ct., April 28, 1748. Their home was on "Great Neck" (now Birmingham) in Derby, Ct.

"May, 1770. This Assembly do establish John Tomlinson to be Captain of the 18th company or trainband in the second regiment in this Colony." (Col. Rec. XIII., 297.)

The Derby History has the following concerning Captain Tomlinson in 1779, when General Tryon invaded New Haven:

"When Tryon's forces arrived at New Haven, Capt. John Tomlinson, who then lived at Derby Neck, in the old mansion now owned by Truman Piper, happened to be in that city, and, mistrusting the object of their mission, quickly mounted his horse and spurred him on in hot haste over the hills until he reached the peaceful hamlet of Derby Narrows, when he shouted at the top of his voice, 'The British are in New Haven, look out for your pork, look out for your pork'!

Now this Captain Tomlinson was a reliable man, a convert to the Whitefield doctrine, and it is said he did more praying and exhorting than half the town. He labored for the good of his fellow-men and lived to be over ninety years old. In his last sickness a neighbor was called in to watch with him, who was not particularly a religious man, and who had on a short coat, but he was soon relieved of his expected night's work. When he entered the sick chamber the Captain greeted him with the salutation, 'Be gone, thou enemy of all righteousness, the Devil never looked worse than when in a short coat.'

When the Captain brought the news to Derby Narrows concerning the British, the day was far spent, but in those times Yankee Doodle, ever on the alert, ready to fight for country and fireside. was equal to the emergency. Alarmed at the near approach of the enemy, men, women, and even boys sallied out, and soon the work of removal to a place of safety commenced. Among others, a tall, slender lad aged sixteen years, named Isaac Smith, was signaled out to assist in taking care of the military stores. His father was then an officer in the military company from Derby stationed at Danbury, and we may here mention that the old slave Quash, (of Agur Tomlinson) father of Governor Roswell Quash (colored), who died about two years ago [1880] was his body guard. Young Smith full of patriotic fire, yoked his father's oxen, hitched them to his cart, and soon the work of hauling the pork from the old building was in lively operation. Load after load was conveved up the lonely cart and cow paths, zigzag here and there among the shrub oaks, guided only by the glittering stars, and dumped into the famous hollow about a quarter of a mile below the present almshouse on the right of the main road as you now go to Seymour in West Ansonia. This hollow was dense with low shrub oaks, and furnished a capital hiding place, and ever afterwards was known as Pork Hollow."

The grave-stone inscriptions in the old cemetery at Derby, Ct., read:

" In memory of

Capt. John Tomlinson, who died Nov. 18, 1817, aged 92 years."

"In memory of

They settled in Huntington, Ct., on land given him by his father, where they resided during their lives. He possessed remarkable physical strength, memory and enterprise, which continued to the end of his life. He was a large stockholder in the Derby Turnpike, and owned considerable land in Vermont to which he went yearly on horseback, until after he was ninety years of age, to collect rents. On one of his return trips, being alone and carrying considerable money, he was pursued by robbers, from whom he escaped by jumping his horse down a steep bank into the Onion river, across which his horse swam, bringing him safely home.

Beach Tomlinson was appointed Ensign in the trainband, May, 1771, in Ripton (now Huntington,

Ct.), 4th regiment, and Lieutenant in October, 1774, and Captain according to the following record:

"This Assembly do establish Beach Tomlinson to be Captain of the Seventh Company or trainband in the 14th regiment in this Colony."—(Colonial Records, vol. XV., 343.)

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It is probable he was in the war several times with his militia company, or several men selected from it for the occasion, as were needed.

Capt. Beach Tomlinson's will was dated June 18, 1811, and proved Dec. 2, 1817. In it he first gives to his children as "advanced portion," sufficient to amount to \$4,000 to each son, and \$2,000 to each daughter, and then directs that the remainder shall be distributed in the proportion of five dollars to

each son to two dollars to each daughter. These portions included large quantities of lands in the townships of Fairfield, Berkshire and East Haven, Vermont, and "Toby's Farm," in Waterbury, Ct., to Victory, houses and lands in Huntington, Ct., and shares in the Derby turnpike and in the Phœnix Bank. In the final distribution, each of the five sons living, or their heirs, received \$10,167.59; and each of the daughters, or their heirs, received \$4,111.68; the whole amount being \$73,896.35.

The accompanying engravings of Capt. Beach and Charity Tomlinson are made from oil paintings (still most carefully preserved in the old homestead), which are now (1890) about one hundred years old, and although they are considerably faded, it is a great pleasure to many that they are so well preserved, and that copies have been secured which so definitely represent the characters of these remarkable persons. In the year eighteen hundred, it is quite doubtful if there was a farmer in Fairfield County more noted for industry, enterprise and success than Beach Tomlinson, of Huntington, Ct.

53. CAPT. GIDEON⁴ TOMLINSON, son of Zachariah⁸ (Agur, Henry, and Hannah (Beach) Tomlinson, married Mary, widow of David Welles, Oct. 9, 1757. She was the daughter of Dea. John Thompson, of Stratford, and died June 6, 1758, in childbed, aged 26 years. He married (2d) Hannah, daughter of Col. Jabez Huntington, of Windham, Ct., Jan. 17, 1760, and lived on the homestead at Oronoke, in Stratford, given him by his father, where he died Jan. 19, 1766, aged 35 years. She died in 1762, aged 27 years.

Capt. Gideon Tomlinson was an officer in the French War under Col. David Wooster.

"In March, 1756, Gideon Tomlinson was appointed First Lieutenant in the Seventh Company, in the Fourth regiment, in the forces ordered to be raised in the Colony for the French War. The captain of his company, David Lacey, died, and Tomlinson succeeded him as captain. (Col. Records, X. 473.) He was appointed Captain by the Legislature March, 1758, for the French War; also in March, 1759, and March, 1760.

In May, 1759, the Rev. Izrahiah Wetmore, of Stratford, preached a sermon to Captain Tomlinson and his company, on their departure for the northern campaign which resulted in the taking of Quebec. The sermon is still preserved by his descendants, also the Captain's chessboard, presented to him by

General Wooster, on which they had often played together, they living near neighbors.

The inscriptions of their grave-stones in Stratford burying place are as follows:

- "In memory of Capt. Gideon Tomlinson, who departed this life January 19th 1766, in ye 35th Year of His age.
- "He was an officer in ye Army and fought in ye battle at ye Narrows; was at ye taking Ticonderoga, Crown Point, La Collette and Montreal.
- "In memory of Mrs. Mary Tomlinson, who departed this life June ye 7th, 1758, in ye 26th Year of Her Age.
- "In memory of Mrs. Hannah Tomlinson and Daut^r of Colo. Jabez Huntington, of Windham, Who departed this Life December ye 26, 1762, in ye 27th Year of Her Age."

The Will of Capt. Gideon Tomlinson, dated in 1765.

"In the Name of God Amen, I Gideon Tomlinson, of Stratford, in the County of Fairfield and Colony of Connecticut in New England, being under great weakness and bodily infirmity, but of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God therefor, Do make this my last Will and Testament in the first I give and recommend my Soul into the Arms of the Almighty God who gave it, in hope of Everlasting Life in and through Christ Jesus, my exalted Redeemer And my Body to be Buried in the Earth in a Decent Christian Burial at the Discretion of my Executors hereafter named And as to what worldly estate it hath pleased God to Bless me with I Give and Dispose of the Same in the following Manuer, that after my Just Debts and Funeral Charges are first paid and Satisfied:

Item. 'I Give and Bequeath unto my loving Son Jabiz Huntington Tomlinson, the whole of my Estate both Real and Personal, to be his own forever—Excepting the legacies hereafter mentioned.

Item.—I Give unto Mary Welles, Daughter to Nathan Welles, one set of stone jewels that was my first wife's.

Item.—I Give unto my Sister Mary Tomlinson, one Brown Silk Gown.

Item.—I Give unto Hannah Tomlinson, Daughter to my brother Joseph Tomlinson, one string of Gold beads.

N. B.—My Will further is and my Executors are hereby Desired and impowered to Sell my land in Town that I Bought of Capt. Nechols, Situated near the Ferry-bridge creek, to sell it in small building lots or otherwise as may be most advantageous, if there be opportunity, and my said executors think best and the money be put to use for my said son.

My will further is, that if so be that Providence should so order that my said son Jabiz should be taken away by Death before he should arrive at the Age of twenty one Years and should leave no surviving heirs of his body, That then I give unto the Rev^d Mr. Izrahiah Wetmore and his Heirs, the sum of fifty pounds lawfull money.

My Will further is that if so be that my son Jabiz should be taken away by Death before he should arrive to the age of twenty one Years and should leave no surviving heir of his Body as aforesaid, that then I Give and Bequeath unto Nathan Welles and Stephen Welles, both of Stratford, equally to Divide Between them, my lot of land at James Farm, so called, containing about seven acres, Bounded west upon Highway, north and part east upon land of Stiles Curtiss and south and part east upon land of Daniel Booth.

My Will further is y' my said son Jabiz have a public or College education (left to the discretion of my executors hereafter named, whether he be disposed for education of a public kind), that is to say y' if my said executors find my said son prove likely and disposed for learning, that he do then have a college education.

Item.—I give unto Hannah Huntington, daughter of Mrs. Jabiz Huntington, of Windham, one pair of stone jewels that was my last wife's.

And I do constitute and appoint my Hond^d Father Mr. Zechariah Tomlinson, and my brother Joseph Tomlinson, and the Rev. Mr

Izrahiah Wetmore to be executors of this my last will and testament, hereby Revoking all other wills, Declaring this and this only to be my last Will and Testament, in Confirmation thereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal in Stratford this 28th day of December, A. Dom., 1765.

54. ABRAHAM' TOMLINSON, son of Zachariah, (Agur, Henry,) and Hannah (Beach) Tomlinson, married (1st) Rebecca, daughter of Hezekiah Gold, Dec. 1754. She died in 1774, aged 39 years. He married (2d) Anne, daughter of Samuel Folsom, Oct. 11, 1777. She was born August 19, 1740, died in 1827, aged 85 years, and was an elder sister of Gloriana Folsom, who married the son of Lord Stirling of Scotland. Abraham Tomlinson was a lawyer, a communicant in the Episcopal Church, and a strong Tory in the Revolution. A number of his children, it is said, were patriots, and the conflict on this subject was sometimes a little animated, although good harmony otherwise prevailed. After the death of his father-in-law, Gold, Abraham's

father purchased of the heirs the homestead on the corner of Main street and the highway leading to the Congregational burying-place, in Stratford, where he resided until his decease in 1821, aged 88 years.

65. CALEB' TOMLINSON, son of Jonah' (Abraham, Jonas, Henry,) and Mary (Moss) Tomlinson, was born in 1749, and is supposed to have been the young man of whom the following story is told:

Caleb Tomlinson, of Huntington, being a soldier in the Revolution, was sent by General Wooster with a dispatch to General Washington. Being from the same neighborhood as General Wooster, young Tomlinson was selected because the General knew him to be a plucky Yankee, although a little uncultivated in his manners, but one to be trusted for the discharge of duty.

Arriving at headquarters he asked to see General Washington, to which the guard replied: "You cannot see him." "But I must, I have a dispatch for him from General Wooster." The guard reported to Washington, and he was admitted to the presence of the General, who was seated at a rude table writing, when Tomlinson handed the dispatch. and Washington on reading it nodded assent and asked, "Anything more?" "Nothing," said Tomlinson, "but an answer from you." "Do you presume to tell me what I must do?" inquired the "No, General, but I'll be darned if I leave these quarters without something to show that I have discharged my duty as a soldier." Rising from his seat Washington remarked, "vou are from Connecticut, I perceive." "I am, sir," was the reply. Tapping him on the shoulder, the General said, "Young man, I wish to the God of battles I had more such soldiers as you. You shall be granted your request."

70. JOSEPH TOMLINSON, son of Agur, (Abraham, Jonas, Henry,) and Sarah (Bowers) Tomlinson, married Bethia Glover, of Newtown, Ct., Oct. 27, 1763. He died Sept. 23, 1813, in the 73d year of his age. Bethiah, his wife, died Nov. 1, 1790, in the 57th year of her age. Both are buried in Brookfield, Conn. After the death of his first wife, Bethia, Joseph Tomlinson married Jedida Wakelee, the widow of Jeremiah Hawley, of Brookfield, an aunt of Mrs. Daniel Tomlinson.

Joseph Tomlinson was a man of wealth and position, especially noted for his benevolence. He offered his four sons a collegiate education; David and Daniel availed themselves of the offer, and Agur spent two years in college.

"John L. Tomlinson was born in Derby, Ct., and read law with Josiah Dudley. His office was in one of the chambers of the ancient house, now [1880] occupied by Miss Rachel Smith and her two sisters. He succeeded Mr. Dudley; the latter, as near as can be ascertained, was the first educated lawyer located in Derby Narrows. Mr. Tomlinson was well read, and of a discriminating mind, but was not a very successful advocate at the bar. The latter years of his life were under the shadow of a great cloud, by his unfortunate connection with the Derby Bank, he being its president, which failed in 1825 through the legerdemain of Wall street brokers. The popular belief awards Mr. Tomlinson the credit of being honest in his transactions with the bank."

He was in the war of 1812, serving at New London, Ct., as lieutenant under Col. Elihu Sanford from Sept. 8, 1814 to Sept. 20, 1814, and during that time was in command of his company. About 1826 he became a Congregational clergyman, went west, where he died, aged about 70 years.

145. VICTORY TOMLINSON, son of Capt. Beach (Zachariah, Agur, Henry) and Charity (Shelton) Tomlinson, married Eunice Dunbar, of Plymouth, Ct., where he settled and became a wealthy farmer, his estate having been estimated at \$150,000. He owned, it is said, in its prosperous days "nearly all the turnpike," from New Haven to Litchfield.

He was Ensign in the Revolutionary War, being only sixteen years of age when the war began; was made nearly deaf by the explosions of cannon shot, and was sometime a prisoner of war.

His wife, Eunice, died Dec. 23, 1791, and he married (2d) Martha Warner.

The following is given as the explanation of the occasion which gave him the name of "Victory."

He was born Sept. 12, 1760. Four days before this, or on the 8th of the same month, "Montreal, Detroit, Michilimackinac, and all other places within the government of Canada were surrendered to his "Brittanic Majesty," and thus the French war came to an end.

"On a Sunday morning soon after, as this infant was being carried to the church for baptism, to receive some name that had been borne by the older members of the family, a courier from the back settlements on the Hudson, came riding up, waving a white flag and shouting Victory! Victory! Victory! For a moment he drew rein at the steps of the church, while he told the pastor and people the story of the fall of Montreal and all Canada, and the great victory of the English. To every one who heard it, the tidings seemed as if from death to life.

When the courier had vanished, the congregation gathered in the church for worship and thanksgiving, but before these could proceed the child must be baptized. The minister, an aged man, in dipping his hand into the water and placing it on the forehead of the child, apparently forgetting the family name it was intended he should bear, said, 'Victory, I baptize thee,' and thus the name came into the family, and it was perpetuated in several relative branches for many years."

158. JABEZ HUNTINGTON' TOMLIN-

SON, son of Capt. Gideon, (Zachariah, Agur, Henry, 1) and Hannah (Huntington) Tomlinson, married Rebecca, daughter of Joseph Lewis, of Old Mill, in Stratford, in January, 1780. He was a graduate of Yale college in 1780. Being left an orphan at an early age, he was reared by his grandfather Zachariah and his aunt Mary Kellogg. It is said that he had a complete genealogy of the Tomlinson family,

but it is not preserved, so far as known. He had a remarkable memory, and was noted for discriminating judgment and practical sense. He had a farm at Oronoke, in Stratford. A copy of the coatof-arms, painted in colors, has been preserved by him and his son, Governor Gideon Tomlinson, and is in a fine state of preservation. The grandfather of Jabez H. had the original, which has come down to the present day well preserved, through the family of Abraham, the uncle of Jabez H. There can be no doubt but that Jabez H. knew whether this coat-of-arms was brought to this country by Henry Tomlinson or not, for his grandfather, Zachariah, by whom he was brought up, was the grandson of Henry, the first settler here, and it is silly to suppose all these families of honorable standing have imposed on themselves a fiction or delusion, for two hundred years, for the sake of pretense.

A paper is preserved in the handwriting of Jabez H. Tomlinson, which says, "Henry Tomlinson came from Derby in England, to this country.

His grave-stone inscription says: "Jabez H. Tomlinson, Esqr., who died January 14, 1849. Æ 89. He was highly respected as a patriotic officer of the revolutionary army and an experienced, able and upright legislator and magistrate; and deservedly honored and beloved as a friend, husband, father and Christian."

The inscription for his wife's grave-stone was most probably prepared by himself, and is a model of propriety as well as elegance:

- "Rebecca Tomlinson, the wife of Jabez H. Tomlinson, who was born on the 3 day of Dec., 1761, and died on the 1 day of Jan., 1823, deeply and justly lamented by her afflicted husband and bereaved children.
- "Let those who delight to cherish the remembrance of her unwearied and constant affection, imitate the pious example of one whose active and unshaken faith in the divine Redeemer affords just ground of confidence that she has gone to possess an inheritance incorruptable and eternal in the heavens."
- "Ensign Jabez H. Tomlinson was in the army under Capt. Joseph Walker of Stratford, in the Connecticut Line," and continued as Ensign from 1777 until his resignation May 1, 1781.
- "He was a pensioner in New Haven County (?) in 1832, and also a pensioner residing at Stratford, Ct., in 1840, aged then 79 years." ¹³

Jabez H. Tomlinson as Guard to Major Andre.

NEW HAVEN, August 8, 1832.

To JEREMIAH DAY, D. D., President of Yale College.

Dear Sir:—It affords me pleasure, as the agent of Jabez H. Tomlinson, Esq. of Stratford (the father of our late Governor), and of Nathan Beers, Esq. of this city, to request your acceptance of the accompanying miniature of Major John Andre, Adjutant General of the British army during the Revolutionary war. The melancholy fate of that accomplished gentleman exerted such universal grief in the hearts of his countrymen, and such undisguised sympathy in the hearts of his foes, that it is presumed this memorial may be viewed with interest, and be deemed worthy of preservation among the historical collections of the college. Although the gift, without some explanation, might appear to be trivial, yet it possesses an incidental value that renders it truly interesting.

It is the likeness of Major Andre, seated at a table in his guard room, drawn by himself with a pen, on the morning of the day fixed for his execution. Mr. Tomlinson informs me that a respite was granted until the next day, and that this miniature was in the meantime presented to him (then acting as officer of the guard) by Major Andre himself. Mr. Tomlinson was present when the sketch was made, and says it was drawn without the aid of a glass.

The sketch subsequently passed into the hands of Deacon Beers, a fellow officer of Mr. Tomlinson on the station, and from thence was transferred to me. It has been in my possession several years.

While the high character of the officers who have preserved since the Revolution this interesting memorial of a lamented victim to the necessary usages of war, places its genuineness beyond doubt, it may be remarked that its accuracy as a likeness is rendered probable from the circumstance that Major Andre was accustomed to delineate as an amusement, the outlines of his face and person.

The London edition of Joshua Smith's narrative of Arnold's treason, and of his personal connection with Andre in his attempt to escape, has a frontispiece exhibiting the likeness of Major Andre. It is noted by the engraver as a copy from a portrait by Major Andre himself now (or then) in the possession of his relatives in England. I have compared the sketch with that engraving and thought I could discern in the outlines a striking similarity.

Mr. Tomlinson and Mr. Beers were officers in the regular line of the army at the time of Major Andre's execution. I believe they severally held the rank of Lieutenant.

179. DAVID TOMLINSON, A. M., M. D., son of Joseph, 5 (Agur, 4 Abraham, 3 Jonas, 2 Henry, 1) and Bethia (Glover) Tomlinson, was born at Derby, Connecticut, in August, 1772. He entered the classical department of Williams College, and was graduated in the year 1798, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Subsequently he studied medicine and surgery under the celebrated Dr. Wheeler, of Red Hook, Dutchess County, New York, and was licensed to practice medicine and surgery by the Connecticut State Medical Society on November 24, 1802, of which Society Dr. James Potter was then President. Doctor Tomlinson began the practice of his profession at Rhinebeck, New York. He rose rapidly into prominence, numbering among his patients the most distinguished residents of that County, among whom may be mentioned, Chancellor Livingston and General John Armstrong. was elected and served for a number of years as President of the Dutchess County Medical Society, a position only tendered to physicians of great eminence in the County.

In 1812 he was appointed by Governor Tompkins, Surgeon to the Second Regiment, and acted as such for a few years.

In the year 1819 he was elected to the Legislature of the State, as a member of Assembly from Dutchess County.

In 1825 he removed to the City of New York in order to advance the educational interests of his children. His fame in his profession had preceded him and he at once took the rank his acquirements justified.

He became an intimate personal friend and professional associate of Dr. Hoosack, Dr. Francis and the elder Dr. Mott, and while in active practice he was regarded as one of the ablest physicians in that city.

Dr. Tomlinson was a man of great learning and stood very high as a classical scholar.

In 1810 he was married at Rhinebeck, to Cornelia Adams, a granddaughter of Chief Justice Andrew Adams of the State of Connecticut, and of the Hon. John Canfield, a member of the Continental Congress.

Daniel Tomlinson was graduated at Williams' College, studied law with Chancellor Livingston at

Rhinebeck, N. Y., and was admitted to the Bar, but shortly afterwards he turned his attention to mechanical pursuits and certain numerous inventions, for which he had a peculiar genius, and which with other enterprises engrossed his efforts during his long life. A description of one of Mr. Tomlinson's inventions, was given by F. J. French, in the Bridgeport Standard, Dec. 14, 1863, as follows:

"Sixty years ago the only knife used among curriers, for shaving leather, was the old 'Coknife' of England, manufactured and stamped with the crown and arms of Great Britain. It was made of one piece of iron with the steel welded upon each edge, and of course after wear and repeated sharpening, the steel wore away and the tool was useless. Mr. Tomlinson's invention consisted in making the body of the knife in two pieces of iron, screwed together. Between the lips of the two edges was inserted a thin blade of steel forming the cutting edge, and as these wore away new ones could be obtained at a small price, so that the body of the knife with ordinary care, would last a century. It is appreciated by the trade, is simple, cheap and so perfect that it has never been improved, and is the only knife used, except splitting machines, in the United States, Great Britain, France and most other countries. Honor therefore to the memory of the man who was among the first to take the lead in that inventive march in this country, which in its progress has beaten the English all the way from a currier's knife to a monitor."

The obituary notice of Daniel Tomlinson says: "He was always a loyal citizen and served his town in both houses of the Legislature, and lived respected by all who knew him. His many acts of unostentatious benevolence will be known in the great day when all will receive their reward."

Peter Fairchild, father of Mary, was a Tory in the Revolutionary War, as most of the members of the Church of England were in those days, and he fought for the mother country, dying at his post on Long Island of a fever, shortly after the birth of Mary. At the time of her birth the house was surrounded for several days by soldiers who hoped for the return of the father so as to capture him. This house was standing in Redding, some years ago, time worn and pierced with bullets. Agur Tomlinson died June 7, 1840, aged 62 years. Mary, his widow, died Mar. 24, 1861, aged 84 years.

In early life he was engaged in the coasting trade between northern and southern ports, and on one occasion his vessel was dismasted and driven by a violent storm into mid-ocean and it was three weeks over-due when it reached port. His last work on the sea was to command a vessel owned by Lyman Osborn, of New York City. Relinquishing that he took an interest in a market, first in Stratford and afterwards in Bridgeport, Ct., during which he engaged also in buying and driving cattle to New York City.

About 1828 he removed to Kirtland, Lake County, Ohio, which was then known as the Western Reserve, or New Connecticut. Here he remained but a short time, for the Mormons had become quite numerous and were quite quarrelsome towards those who differed from them in religious belief, and he removed to Rockport, Cuyahoga County, Ohio. Soon afterward he, in connection with others, opened a market in Cleveland, and for a few years divided his time between his farm in Rockport, the market in Cleveland and buying stock for a Cleveland packing house.

In 1843 a severe drouth prevailed in Northern Ohio, and he was employed by the farmers to drive their stock to the State of New York and sell it, a commission he executed to their satisfaction.

On his return trip from New York in November, instead of taking a boat from Buffalo as he intended, he traveled in the stage to Cleveland, to avoid the dangers of the Lake. His fears were well founded,

for a gale of great severity swept over Lake Erie, wrecking many vessels and destroying many lives. His family and friends suffered great anxiety for his safety, which was happily relieved by his safe return.

In 1841, he and his wife visited Connecticut, leaving his family at home except his son, Lyman Osborn, who was safely housed at his uncle Levi Tomlinson's at Ridgeville, a neighboring township, and after a few weeks among old friends in the East they returned to Ohio, bringing with them his wife's mother, an aged lady, who after two or three years, died at the age of 84 years, and the remains were buried at Rockport.

In 1846 he went to Northern Illinois, visiting his daughter, Jane H. Andrews, in Stephenson County, and his son, John L., in Carroll County, and brought back a drove of cattle to market at Cleveland, and then in 1847 entered a partnership with General Orson M. Oviatt, of Cleveland, to deal in live stock, and returned to Illinois, delivering that year two droves in Cleveland, and with a third he started for New York, but becoming sick on the way, his son Albert took charge and successfully marketed them in New York City, there being over three hundred head, many of them driven from west of the Mississippi River.

In 1848 he delivered another drove in Cleveland from Illinois.

The next Spring, his daughter Jane H., and sons John L. and George, being residents of Illinois, and his daughters Laura C. and Sarah A., having died, he with his wife, and sons Albert D. and Lyman O., went by steamer from Cleveland to Detroit, Michigan, thence by railroad to Battle Creek, the terminus then of the Michigan Central, thence by stage to New Buffalo, thence by steamer to Chicago, and thence to Freeport, Illinois. His wife's health having been failing for some years, the journey proved too severe for her and she died at her daughter's home May 12, 1849.

In 1850 he removed to Carroll County and the following Spring built a house on his tract of land near Mount Carroll, where he resided with his son Albert D., until 1856, joining with his sons John L., and Lyman O., in dealing in and marketing stock.

While still enjoying full vigor of intellect, although somewhat infirm in body, he took a severe cold on January 1, 1864, while a wave of severe cold passed over the Northwest, which developed into pneumonia, which all skill and devotion could not relieve, and he died January 17, 1864, aged 72 years, six months and thirteen days.

Lewis Tomlinson was of medium height, with a strong, symmetrical frame, and had black eyes and abundant black hair, and maintained an erect carriage to the close of life.

Politically, he was an old time whig, then in 1844 he voted for the Liberty party, and in 1848 the Free-Soil party, and in 1856 became a Republican with energy and activity. While in Ohio his home was one of the stations of the "under-ground railroad," and scores of slaves were aided on their way to Canada.

He was a member of the Congregational Church in Rockport, and an officer in the Sunday School, and maintained his Christian life to the last.

282. GOVERNOR GIDEON⁶ TOMLIN-SON, son of Jabez H.⁵ (Capt. Gideon, Zechariah, Agur, Henry,) and Rebecca (Lewis) Tomlinson, was graduated at Yale College in 1802. He married Sarah Bradley, of Greenfield Hill, in Fairfield county, Ct., where he resided. He was elected a member of the House of Representatives in his state for May, 1817, and the next October was chosen Clerk of the same, and the next May was made Speaker of the House, which position he held two sessions. He was then, in 1819, elected member of the House of Representatives of the United States for two years, and re-elected in 1821, 1823 and 1825, serving eight years in that body, being Speaker of the House a part of the time.

In 1827 he was elected Governor of the State of Connecticut, which office he held until he was elected by the Legislature in 1831 a Senator of the United States, where he remained six years, until 1837.

In 1836 he was elected first President of the Housatonic Railroad, and served several months.

The portrait of Governor Tomlinson was painted while he was Senator in Washington, and is now in possession of the Corcoran Gallery in Washington, D. C.

The prints of that portrait, inserted herewith in this volume, were executed in Washington for this purpose, and it is a matter of much pleasure that they have been secured, and that the painting is preserved.

TOMLIN-SON, son of David, (Joseph, Agur, Abraham, Jonas, Henry,) and Cornelia (Adams) Tomlinson, the second son of Dr. David Tomlinson, was born at Rhinebeck, Dutchess County, New York, on the 25th day of December, 1817. His early studies were pursued at Rhinebeck, where he had as schoolmates, Augustus, Robert and Edward Schell. He entered the University of the City of New York, and was graduated from that college in the year 1836, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Subsequently he studied law at the Law School of Yale College, and was admitted to the bar in the year 1839, and at once began the practice of his profession in the city of New York.

In 1850 he was appointed Attorney to the Corporation of the City of New York, and filled the

office with signal ability. He acquired great prominence in his profession, and while in active practice was regarded as one of the leaders of the bar of that state. He was an intimate friend and associate of Charles O'Connor, James T. Brady, William Curtis Noyes and David Graham, ranking with them, and universally regarded as one of the most able lawyers of his day.

In politics, he was one of the most brilliant and influential representatives of the old Whig Party in that State. From 1850 to 1855 he was Chairman of the Whig State Committee, and active in all the work of that party. He was intimately associated with Henry Clay, Horace Greeley, and the prominent men of their period. His fame as an orator was national, being regarded by the Whigs of that State as second only to Henry Clay. His address upon graduating from college on "Genius and Perseverance," attracted wide attention, and gave promise of the great fame he subsequently acquired. Perhaps his speech that will be most remembered was his reply to the toast of "Woman," delivered at the New York Historical Society in 1854, which for purity of diction, delicacy of thought, and beauty of simile has few equals in specimens of American eloquence.

In 1859, Mr. Tomlinson was elected a member of the Assembly of the State of New York, and was regarded as by far the most brilliant and able debater in either House. His active interest in politics ceased with the dissolution of the Whig Party, although he followed public affairs with great interest up to the time of his death in 1888.

349. GEORGE H. TOMLINSON, son of Lewis⁶ (Capt. John L., Capt. John, John, John, John, John, Amana, Henry, and Hannah (Hawkins) Tomlinson, was born in Derby, Ct., March 30, 1819. Removed with his father's family to Ohio in 1828, and worked with his brothers in opening up a farm near Cleveland. In 1841 he accompanied his brother John on his return to Illinois, where he was employed by his father and brothers as a drover most of the time until the war of 1861, when he enlisted in the 92d Regiment of Illinois (the "Lead Mine") and served until near the close of the war, when he became almost blind.

After his discharge from the army, he married and settled in Freeport, Stephenson County, Illinois, where he still resides, receiving a pension from the government.

In person, he was below medium height, broad shoulders, erect, had dark hair and eyes, ruddy complexion, and usually the picture of health. Being of a roving disposition, the exposure and hardships of a drover's life he thought fully compensated by its freedom, variety of scenery and adventure.

Stephen Tomlinson was born in Woodbury, Ct., in 1803, came to Bridgeport at an early age, and for some years lived in the family of Mr. Eli Walker. He was early apprenticed with the firm of Carrier & Potter, then engaged in manufacturing carriages in a small shop at the corner of Middle and Wall streets. At the expiration of his time with them the business was removed to the present site of the Standard Association building, where Mr. Tomlinson entered into partnership with Mr. Jerry Judson, under the firm name of Judson & Tomlinson. He being an expert mechanic and draftsman, the firm was highly successful, and five years later removed their factory to the corner of Broad and Cannon Streets.

After several years Mr. Judson retired when Mr. Augustus Wood entered the partnership under the firm name of Tomlinson & Wood.

Mr. Russell Tomlinson, a brother, and also Mr. Frederick Wood, brother to Augustus Wood, were afterwards admitted as partners in this firm.

Stephen Tomlinson was elected the first president of the Farmers' Bank, now the First National Bank of the city of Bridgeport, and held that position for several years. At the time of his decease he was president of the Bridgeport Patent Leather Company.

Mr. Tomlinson was emphatically the pioneer of the carriage manufacturing business in Bridgeport. He built the trade, which for years was the principal manufacturing enterprise in the city, and established the reputation for his firm second to none in the United States. He was truly a self-made man, the sole architect of his own fortune. Withal he was a true Christian, and gifted by nature with rare social qualities and refined tastes as evidenced by the elegant home on Golden Hill built by him, now owned by Mrs. E. F. Bishop, where his many friends were ever cordially welcomed and hospitably entertained, and in whose hearts his memory lingers with an exceeding fragrance. He died March 26, 1872.

Russell Tomlinson was born in 1807, and his father died in 1819. After working on the farm under different employers some years, he learned the blacksmith trade, and followed it in several places, uniting with it the manufacture of wagons

in a small way. He was a pioneer in the construction of steel carriage springs, and is said to have made with his own hands the first set put to successful use in Bridgeport. He became a partner in the firm of Tomlinson and Wood about the year 1837, and remained in that connection fifteen years. The firm increased its business largely and became noted for its fine and reliable work, second to none in the country, attaining great financial success. In 1852 he sold that interest and turned his attention to the manufacture of carriage springs and axles, founding the Tomlinson Spring and Axle Company, on Cannon street.

While bearing his full share in the conduct of extensive manufacturing and business interests, he did not lack in public spirit, and few men have been oftener called to public office and positions of trust, or given more and better service therein. served in the Common Council in the years 1839 and 1840, and from that time to 1861, he served eight terms as councilman and five as alderman, and was most of the time on the important committees of finance and the street department. was selectman of the town at the period of the latewar, and active in filling the quota of recruits required of the town. He was elected town auditor in 1857, and a member of the Board of Relief in 1858, in both of which he did much service, being a member of the Board of Relief at the time of his

death. He often served as moderator of town meetings. On the resignation of Hon. Dwight Morris in 1860, he was appointed, by the State, trustee of the fund for the benefit of the remnant of the Golden Hill Indians, which he retained to the time of his decease. He was representative to the Legislature, senator from the Fourteenth District, director and president in the Naugatuck Railroad Company, director in the Bridgeport Bank, also in the first National Bank and the Mountain Grove Cemetery Association. He was a large contributor to the building of Christ Church, on Courtland Street, and was the first junior warden of the parish, and at his death was vestryman in Trinity Church, and delegate to the Diocesan Convention.

He was a man of genial, kindly and sympathetic character, of excellent business judgment, and much respected by all his fellow-citizens.

Gideon Tomlinson was in the First Company, or Capt. Nathaniel Johnson's, of Derby, in 1776, was at the battle of L. I., Aug. 27, stationed at Kips Bay 34th St. East River, and in the hurried retreat of the company from that place on September 15, he was missing.

15. BENJAMIN⁴ TOMLINSON, Jr., son of Benjamin³ (William, William) and Jehoada (Harger) Tomlinson, married Mary Harger, Nov. 15, 1768. If this was the son of Benjamin, Senior, as above, he was only a little over sixteen years of age when he was married.

Benjamin Tomlinson enlisted May 15, 1775, and marched for the relief of Boston in the Lexington Alarm, and was discharged Dec. 20, 1775. This company served at the siege of Boston that year. He was in the list of pensioners of Connecticut in 1818.

The following extract from a letter of R. G. Tomlinson, who may have been grandson of the above Benjamin, is of interest, and the information offered should be secured:

"Battle Creek, Mich., Nov. 20, 1879.

Dr. Gilead Peet,

My father's name was Vincent Tomlinson; he settled in the town of Gaines, Orleans County, N. Y., in 1814, or thereabouts, with other Tomlinsons that were cousins. My father died in 1826, and all of the older stock of Tomlinsons that came from Connecticut are dead. There are four families scattered in the State of New York and other States that I can give you their whereabouts if you desire.

My grandfather's name was Benjamin Tomlinson; he resided on what was called Bunga or Great Hill in the town of Derby, Ct., died, I think. in 1836. He was a Revolutionary soldier, and was in the old Prison Ship in New York harbor, and took great pleasure in going to Derby on the Fourth of July, in his soldier's uniform, to show the people what Independence was and should be.
