#### PREFACE.

The present work is the outcome of a long-standing belief, that it is a duty we owe our posterity to preserve information and facts of a genealogical nature; and a desire (which has become almost a passion in me), therefore, to place before my "kith and kin" and their descendants some facts concerning our progenitors and themselves, has stimulated me in the preparation of the following pages, which, however replete they may seem to an unpracticed eye, have fallen very short of my own idea of perfection in such matters. Indeed, I cannot but reflect that the execution of my original idea has been both lame and superficial; and I feel by experience, how unequal my ability is, without the necessary assistance of others, to complete, in the manner I could wish, so extensive and arduous a task.

I regret that certain portions of the original plan of this work had to be expunged just before the following pages went to print, owing to the aggregate expense (\$203) of the printing which their appearance herein would have occasioned. I refer to several interesting articles: "Consanguinity," "The Seventeenth Century," "The Eighteenth Century" (the two last mentioned of which, being summaries of historical events, were intended to give the reader some idea of the times in which our early ancestors lived, and of the persons who were their contemporaries), beside a cluster of memorable occurrences which were originally introduced in connection with the nativity of each person herein.

Genealogical works infrequently recompense those who attempt them, are rarely appreciated, and seldom prepared, except by some interested person, as "a labor of love." I have given no inconsiderable quantity of time, labor, and money to promote this scheme. I have assumed the entire expense of gathering the information contained in these records. This I do not regret. My chief recompense is in the pleasure the preparation of this work has afforded me, and in the thought that there will be some substantial record of our family preserved for future generations, and that it may prove to be a matter of enjoyment and entertainment for those who are honestly interested in such things.

With a view to obtaining necessary information about the descendants of the original Tomkinson, and without invading their rights to privacy, carefully prepared questions were sent out to all known members of the various families bearing that name in the United States and in England.

It will be noticed that the records of some appear to be lean and meagre when compared with those of others. This is due to either indifference on the part of the respective persons about furnishing possible information or to a positive lack of data. In a work of this character, covering a period of two hundred and eighty-four years, and embracing facts of pedigree and sketches of over eight hundred persons, including alliances, doubtless errors will appear; yet, considering the lack of interest manifested in the matter and the scarcity of material, the whole is as full and attractive as possible under these unfortunate circumstances. Therefore, in anticipation of the reprinting of this work and the ultimate incorporation of its substance in a general history of the family, the reader is earnestly requested to supply omissions and to communicate any corrections or additions that he or she may be able to contribute, in order to make the records as complete as possible. Members of the Tomkinson families are particularly requested to give such facts as are within their knowledge.

I have inserted in the back of the record of each family blank pages for the purpose of the registration of future births, marriages and deaths. It is of the most vital importance that the record of each family be faithfully and religiously kept, in order that the whole may be placed in an accessible form for the research of future Tomkinsons.

My task is over. To those who have rendered me assistance and have been in sympathy with my endeavors to perfect this commendable idea, I wish to extend my sincere thanks.

#### ORIGIN OF THE NAME.

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose, By any other name would smell as sweet." Shakespeare: Romeo and Juliet, Act. 11, Sc. 2.

"Who hath not owned, with rapture-smitten frame, The power of grace, the magic of a name?" Campbell: Pl. of Hope, Pt. 11, Line 5.

"A name! If the party had a voice, What mortal would be a Bugg by choice."

The name of Tomkinson is a patronymic, and was doubtlessly derived from the Christian name Thomas.

Charles Wareing Bardsley, M. A., in his valuable work, "English Surnames" (p. 9), says: "Nothing could be more natural than that children should often pass current in the community in which they lived as the sons of 'Thomas', or 'William', or 'Richard', or 'John'; and that these several relationships should be found in our directories as distinct sobriquets only shows that there was a particular generation in these families in which this title became permanent, and passed on to future descendants as an hereditary surname."

In another part (p. 15) of the same treatise, we learn that "In early days the four diminutives in use were those of 'kin', 'cock', and the terminations of 'ot' or 'et', and 'on' or 'en'; the two latter being of Norman-French origin."

"I. Kin. The Saxon term, corresponding with the German 'chen', and the French 'on' or 'en', referred to above, and introduced, most probably, so far as the immediate practice was concerned, by the Flemings, we still preserve in such works as 'manikin', 'pipkin', 'lambkin', or 'doitkin' \* \* \* \*"

"Hence we have derived such surnames as 'Simpkins', and 'Simpkinson', 'Thompkins' and 'Tomkinson'.

Also (p. 93):

"'Called Canton his knave Curteis of speche And also Tomme Trewe-tonge'.

"Thus we see that 'Tom', as the popular form of 'Thomas', has been in vogue for many centuries. 'Thomas', like some of the above names, received an increased impulse from the Crusades. But

another circumstance also be friended it. In its numerous progeny may be read again the story of the feud that arose between the haughty archbishop and Henry II, a feud that terminated so fatally for the former, and made the spot where he fell hallowed for centuries by the pilgrimages of shrine-worshippers. Piers, in Langdon's poem. says:

'I nolde fange a ferthyng For seint Thomas shryne'.

"The surnames whose origin we must undoubtedly attribute, in the majority of cases, to the notoriety given to the sobriquet possessed by the murdered prelate are many. The patronymic is clearly marked in our 'Thomasons', 'Thomsons', and 'Thompsons'. The favored Norman diminutive is equally assured of perpetration in our 'Thomasetts', 'Thomsetts', and 'Thompsetts'; the Saxon being as fully popularized in our 'Thompkins', 'Tompkins', 'Tomkins', and 'Tomkinsons'. The softer termination is also firmly settled in our "Thomlins', 'Tomlins', and 'Tomlinsons'." [See note.]

"More abbreviated patronymics are to be met with also in our 'Thomms', 'Thoms', and 'Toms'. With so many representatives in the list of rational beings, we need not be surprised to find the lower order of creation under obligation to this title. It was with the death of St. Thomas of Canterbury, and the consequent popularity of his name arose so many sobriquets of which the same name became the component part. The cat became a 'tom-cat', a simple-natured man a 'tom-coney', a silly fellow a 'tom-noddy' or 'tom-fool', a romping girl a 'tom-boy' and a wren a 'tom-tit'.''

And again, Mark Anthony Lower, in "Patronymica Britannica"

(p. 342), says:

"Though not used here prior to the Norman conquest, this (the author referring to the Christian name Thomas) has become one of the commonest of baptismal appellatives and surnames. It has also been a most abundant source of derivatives and nicknames represented by Thomason, Thomerson, Thomson, Thompson, Tompson, Thom, Thoms, Toms, Thomaset, Thomsett, Tomset, Tompsett, Tomkin, Tompkins, Tomkinson, Thompkisson, Thomlin, Tomlin, Tomlin, Tomlinson, Tomlinson. In the north, A commonly represents O, and hence Thampsett, Tampsett, Tamlyn, Tamplin, and probably Taplin."

Turning to the title "MacCartain, Chief of Kinealarty, County Down, Ireland" in Vol. 1 of "Irish Pedigrees" by John O'Hart, we

find the following information:

Note.—"The romance form, 'Thomasine', existed till recent days, and was at the zenith of its popularity in Elizabeth's reign. It was found in every register of that period. It is found as 'Thomasing' in Worksworth Ch. (Derbyshire): 'Thomasing, filia William Sympson, buried Jan. 31, 1640.'" [See p. 93 of Bardsley's English Surnames.]

"Tomhas: ('tomhais': Irish, to measure): his son: a quo Mac-Tomhais and MacTamais, anglicised Thomas, Thom, Toms, Mac-Thomas, Tomson, Thomson, Thompson, Tomkins and Tomkinson."

Still another authority, Charlotte Yonge, in her "History of

Christian Names" (p. 22), says:

"Thomas is the accepted equivalent for the Irish Tomalhaid,

Tomaltash, and Toirdelvach, tall as a tower."

In "Derivation of Family Names," by William Arthur, M. A., we learn (p. 247) the following:

"Thomas, (Heb). A twin.

"Thomlin, and Thomlinson. From Thom and Thoms, and ing

or ling, a child or descendant—son of Thomas.

"Thoms. An abbreviation of Thomas; Tom, local, Gaelic and Welsh, a round hillock or knoll, a rising ground or eminence, any round heap, a tumulus."

"Thomson. The son of Thomas."

#### LINEAGE.

The Jodrells of Yeardsley were settled at Yeardsley, county of Chester, towards the middle of the reign of Edward III.

The first of the name on record possessed, together with his sons, land in several townships within the manor of High Peak, county of Derby, England, 14 Edward 1., A. D. 1286.

His great-grandson, William Jauderell, the immediate ancestor of the family, served as an archer with Edward the Black Prince, Earl of Chester, in the French wars. He had his pass from England dated from Bordeaux, 28 Edward III., A. D. 1355, and was possessed at his death (as appears from several authentic records) of lands in the township of Yeardsley-cum-Whaley, Disley, and Kettleshulme, county of Chester, that have been continued ever since in the family. [For complete lineage, see Burke's Landed Gentry and Thomas Helsby's Ormerod's History of Cheshire.]

#### NOTES FROM THE CHESHIRE DIRECTORY.

[Forwarded by Mr. Percy Booth Tomkinson, of London, England.]
(Page 17.)

ACTON.—This is a township village and large parish on the road from Nantwich to Chester, two miles west from Nantwich station, on the Crewe and Shrewsbury section of The London and North Western Railway. The Shropshire union canal passes through to Ellesmere for Liverpool, Birmingham, Wolverhampton and Shrewsbury. The parish of Acton now consists of twelve townships.

St. Mary's Church is a fine building of red sandstone, in the early English and perpendicular styles, with some remains (including the base of the tower) of Norman work, and alterations

of later date, of a debased character, and consists of chancel clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, and a western embattled tower with pinacles containing a clock and six bells. This tower was originally much loftier, but a portion of it having fallen during a storm on the 15th of March, 1757, it was thought advisable not to restore it to its original height. At the eastern extremity of the south aisle, there is a chapel belonging to the Wilbraham family, of Dorfold Hall, which contains an altar tomb with recumbent effigies in white marble to Richard Thomas Wilbraham and Elizabeth, his wife, with Latin inscriptions dated 1661. At the east end of the north aisle there is an interesting canopied monument with recumbent effigy to one of the Mainwarings; but the inscription is now almost obliterated. At the back of the monument, there are wall paintings of heads. The church also contains a brass, with arms to Wilbraham Spencer Tollenmache, Esq., of Dorfold Hall, (died 1890), and Ann Tomkinson, his wife (died 1871). The east and west windows and one in the south aisle are stained. Some fragments of early Norman arcading with figures were put together and placed in the Wilbraham chapel, in 1897. The whole church was completely restored in part at the expense of Mr. E. Sutton Timmins, in memory of his mother. The chancel was repaired by the patron, and the organ chamber by Henry James Tollemache, Esq., M. P., of Dorfold Hall. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £323, with eight acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Lord Tollemache, of Helmingham, who is also impropriator of the great tithes, and is held by Rev. Herbert Moore, M. A., of Keble College, Oxford. The Sir R. Wilbraham and Huxley charities, amounting to about £100 yearly, are devoted to the maintenance of eight poor widows, and to apprenticing poor girls and boys. There are also three charities—together about £16 yearly—for the distribution of bread to the poor of the parish. Some of these charities are supported by Lord Tollemache. The church lands of 24 acres, 2 rods, 37 perches, with houses, etc., yield £40 yearly, for church purposes.

Dorfold Hall was built in 1616, on the site of a former residence by Sir Ralph Wilbraham, Master of the Courts of Requests in Ireland, in the reign of James 1. It contains several oak paneled rooms, and, among them, one with the Royal arms and the inscription, "I. R. 1621" on stone. Above the mantlepiece, over the fireplace, in the drawing room, are the arms, painted on stone, of the three Knights of the Garter, who accompanied the King on his journey to Nantwich, the Earl of Burleigh, the Earl of Derby, and Sir Christopher Hatton. The drawing room contains a fine ornamental ceiling with pendants and a cornice, and is a fine specimen of Elizabethan period of work. There are also several pictures by celebrated painters, including Gainsborough and Hondekoeter; among them is a fine portrait of Mr. Tomkinson (mentioned below)

by Gainsborough, and a beautiful portrait of his two sons by the same artist. Dorfold Hall was sold, in 1754, by the Wilbrahams, and is now the property of a descendant, Henry James Tollemache, Esq., M. P., D. L., J. P., who succeeded to the property which his mother, the great-granddaughter of Mr. James Tomkinson, was the heiress. The park extends 150 acres, and contains some fine timber.

Henry James Tollemache, Esq., M. P., of 42 Halfmoon street,

London, west, is lord of the manor and principal landowner.

The soil is a good mixture, with a subsoil of sand and clay,

and is chiefly devoted to grazing for dairy produce.

The area of the township is 771 acres, ratable value £1905. The population, in 1901, was 258.

#### (Page 287.)

BOSTOCK.—This is a township and village in the parish of Davenham on the road from Middlewich to Warrington, two miles and a half northwest from Middlewich station, on the Crewe and Acton bridge branch of The London and North Western Railway, in the Middlewich section of the Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division.

The descendants of Osmerus, Lord of Bostock, in the time of William I., adopted the name of the township as their surname, and this lordship was held by them for some centuries. Another branch of the family settled at Abington, Berkshire, and built a house on the Fitzharris estate, now the property and residence of Mr. J. A. Clarke, of Boar's Hill, near Abington, in which are some paneled rooms with the Bostock arms. Several members of the family were mayors of Abington. Towards the latter part of the fifteenth century, an heiress of the Bostocks brought it in marriage to the Savages. It was afterwards vested in the Whitmores of Apsley, who sold it to William Tomkinson, Esq. It was acquired by Thomas France, Esq., in 1793.

Bostock Hall, erected in 1775, is a handsome mansion of brick, standing in an extensive and well wooded park, formerly the property of the France family, and now of Col. Charles Hoskin-France-Hayhurst, J. P. D. L. The site of the old hall, taken down in 1803, is now occupied by a farm-house. At Bostock Green, stood an ancient oak tree, now cut down, said to have been placed there to mark the centre of the county. Another oak was, however, planted in its place, in 1887, the Jubilee year of Her Late Majesty, Queen Victoria, three generations of the France-Hayhurst family being present. The area, 1150 acres of land, produces wheat, potatoes, oats, turnips, and some pasture, and there are 15 acres of water. Ratable value, £2126. Population, in 1901, was 197.

DELAMERE.—The manor belongs to the crown. The Earl

of Haddington and Major James Tomkinson, of Willington Hall, Willington, are the chief landowners.

#### (Page 616.)

WILLINGTON.—There is the village club and reading room, built in 1887, by Lieut. Col. Tomkinson, to commemorate the Jubilee of Her Late Majesty, Queen Victoria.

Willington Hall, a handsome mansion of red brick, standing in a small park, was enlarged and thoroughly restored in 1878. It is the seat of Lieut. Col. James Tomkinson, M. P., J. P., D. L., the principal landowner.

The area is 1030 acres, ratable value £1871. Population, in 1901, 146.

### (Page 628.)

WARLESTON.—The register dates from the year 1872. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £199, with residence, in the gift of Henry Richard Tomkinson, Esq., and held since 1881, by Rev. William Yates, of St. Alban's Hall, Oxford. The vicarage house, built by Mr. Tomkinson, is a red brick building with mullioned windows. Here, also, is a free Methodist Chapel, built in 1891.

Reaseheath Hall, the seat of Col. Edward Thomas Davenant Cotton-Jodrell, commanding the 2nd Cheshire R. E. (Ry.) Volunteers, (late Capt. of the R. A.), J. P., is an ancient gabled resident mansion of red brick, which was thoroughly restored in 1878 and 1892. It stands in a well-timbered park of about 200 acres, and was purchased by the Tomkinson family from the Windsors, about the year 1760. In 1881, the then owner, Henry Richard Tomkinson, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, handed the estate over to his nephew, the present occupier.

Rookery Hall, a modern residence of stone, beautifully situated on a commanding eminence, is the residence of Baron William Henry Von Schroder, D. L., J. P.

Warleston Grange is a building of brick and stone with good pleasure grounds.

The principal landowners are Baron Von Schroder and Henry Richard Tomkinson, Esq.

Area 1139 acres; 12 acres of water. Ratable value £2363. Population, in 1901, 435.

## LINEAGE OF THE TOWNE FAMILY.

On March 25, 1620, William Towne and Johanna Blessing were married at St. Nicholas Church, Yarmouth, England. They came to America in the year 1630, and settled at Salem, Mass., where their residence was known as Northfields. Later, in 1651, they moved to Topsfield, Mass., where William Towne died circa 1672. They had eight children: Rebecca, John, Susannah, Edmund, Jacob, Mary, Sarah and Joseph.

Rebecca Towne, the eldest daughter, who married Francis Nourse, was accused of being a witch, and was taken in chains to the meeting-house and formally excommunicated by Mr. Noyes, her minister, and was hung on July 19, 1692. The excommunication

was blotted from the church record in the year 1712.

Mary Towne, who married Isaac Estey, was imprisoned for five months and executed on September 22, 1692, upon a similar accusation.

A monument has been erected and dedicated to their memory near their old homestead.

Edmund Towne married Mary Browning at Topsfield, Mass., and had issue,

Joseph Towne, who married Amy Smith, March 13, 1687, and had issue,

Daniel Towne, who married Dorothy Dorman, August 29, 1721, at Topsfield, Mass., and had issue,

Thomas Towne, who married Anna Trow at Beverly, Mass., and had issue,

Amos Towne (one of the minute men at the battle of Bunker Hill), who married Lydia Porter at Peabody, Mass., and had issue,

William Towne (who, with his uncle, was in the navy with Decatur during the War of 1812-13), born April 2, 1792, at Danvers, Mass., who married Sally Fowler Norris (see "Lineage of The Norris (Norreys) Family" below), and had issue,

Samuel Pliny Towne, a captain in Company F, 126th Illinois Infantry, Union army, during the Civil War; who died April 24, 1896, at Chattanooga, Tenn., where he is buried in the National Cemetery.

Mary Butler Towne, who married Joseph Tomkinson Hunter (see Hunter family in the Tomkinson records).

### LINEAGE OF THE NORRIS (NORREYS) FAMILY.

The Norreys family for many centuries were settled at Sutton in Lancashire, England.

In the year 1311, Sir Henry Norreys, by his marriage with Joan, daughter of Sir Thomas Molyneux, acquired the manor of Speke, in Lancashire; his great-grandson, John Norreys, married the Lady Jane De Vere, daughter of the Earl of Oxford; his son, Sir Edward Norreys, of Yattenden, Berks., England, married Frideswide, daughter and coheiress of Francis, Lord Lovel and Holland. This lady was descended from two princesses of the house of Plantagenet, viz.: 1st, Eleanor, daughter of Henry, Earl of Lancaster, and wife of John, Lord Beaumont; and 2ndly, Joan, daughter of Edward I., wife of Gilbert de Clare, Earl of Clare.

Sir Edward's son, Sir Henry Norreys, who married Mary, daughter of Lord Dacre, of the South, was beheaded in 1536; but his son, Sir Henry, who married Margaret, daughter and coheiress of Lord Williams of Thame, was restored and created Lord Norreys. His eldest son, William, had a son, Francis, created Earl of Berkshire, who left an only daughter and heiress, Elizabeth, who married William Wray; and their daughter and heiress married Montague Bertie, Earl of Lindsay, ancestor of Lord Abingdon, in whom the Barony of Norreys now vests. (?).

The 2nd, 3rd and 4th sons of Lord Norreys by the co-heiress of Lord Williams of Thame died unmarried without issue; but his 5th son, Sir Thomas Norreys, left an only daughter, who married Sir John Jephson.

The families of Norris in Speke, Lancashire, and Ryecote, Berkshire, England, are descended from Alain Norreys, from whom William Norreys of Sutton was lineally descended.

William Norreys of Sutton, who married Joan, daughter of Sir John Molyneux of Sefton, was a direct ancestor of

Sir Henry Norreys, Knight of Speke, Lancaster, who married Alice Ereneis; and was succeeded by his elder son,

William Norreys, Esq., of Speke, who married Perceval Harrington, whose eldest son,

Thomas Norreys, Esq., of Speke, married Lettice, daughter and sole heiress of Thomas Norreys, Esq., of Derby, Lancashire, who had issue (among others)

Nicholas Norreys of Tarleton, who was great-grand-father of

Nicholas Norreys, Esq., of Middleforth, Lancashire, born in 1633, who married Dorothy Farrington; and was succeeded by his eldest surviving son,

Henry Norreys, Esq., of Penwortham, Lancashire, who married, 1682, Elizabeth Preston; and was succeeded by a posthumous

Henry Norreys, Esq., of Penwortham, who married Mary Blackledge.

Some of the English branches of the Norreys or Norris family were early settled in Ireland. Some lived at Armagh, and claimed descent from Sir Henry Norris of Ryecote, who was granted a peerage by Queen Elizabeth.

Nicholas Norris was a descendant of the English branch in Ireland, where he was born circa 1640. The first record of him in America is at Hampton, New Hampshire, where he married Sarah Coxe, November 21, 1663. From him was descended

Samuel Norris, born May 17, 1759, who fought in the Revolutionary War, and was with Col. Laommi Baldwin's regiment at Sewall's Point on September 25, 1775. He was mustered into service in Capt. Caleb Robinson's company, Col. Nathan Hale's regiment (which was the 2nd New Hampshire Continental Regiment) on February 4, 1777. He married Betsy Brocklebank, by whom he had a daughter, Sally Fowler Norris, born August 7, 1791, at Rowley, Mass. He is buried at Canandaigua, Ontario county, New York.

Sally Fowler Norris married William Towne (see "Lineage of The Towne Family" above) circa 1811, and died March 30, 1872, at Canandaigua, New York. William Towne died October 3, 1833, at the same place.

There were seven children of this marriage, of whom Mary Butler Towne, born February 14, 1834, who married Joseph Tomkinson Hunter (see Hunter family in the Tomkinson records) was

the youngest.

This branch is particularly remarkable for its characteristic of longevity. The eight children of Joseph Tomkinson, b. 1784, passed the 70th year; two of them the 81st. Edmund Wright Tomkinson is still living, and will be 79 on November 9, 1904. Maria Tomkinson (Hunter), the eldest of these children, had six children, four of whom also passed the 70th year, and two are still living. Edmund Scott Tomkinson (son of Edmund Wright Tomkinson, the only living representative of the third generation) had fourteen children, thirteen of whom are living.

Out of 117 descendants of John Tomkinson, b. 1758, 82, or

nearly three-fourths of them, are living.

It is suggested that, if the records of John Tomkinson (b. 1781), Samuel Tomkinson (b. 1790) and William Tomkinson (b. 1794)—now untraceable—present the same facts as the record of the posterity of their brother, Joseph Tomkinson (b. 1784), there must be probably nearly 500 descendants of John Tomkinson, b. 1758.

Note.—It is curious that the persons representing the longest and shortest lives in the fifth generation are each named Grace.

BURSLEM: This is not a modern town, for it was known at the time the Domesday Book was compiled as Bulwardslem. In the time of the Stuarts it was called the Butter Pottery, because many butter pots were manufactured here. At the end of the 17th century the making of colored dishes, jugs, etc., was commenced here. Clay articles were not introduced until even later. Josiah Wedgwood established his famous pottery at Burslem. Here, also, are the Wedgwood Memorial Schools and Museum. Population about 38,766.

# FAMILY OF JOSEPH TOMKINSON,

BORN PREVIOUS TO 1779,

PROBABLY IN CHESHIRE, ENGLAND.

JOSEPH TOMKINSON was born 17, at; died circa 1846, at Macclesfield, Cheshire, England, at the home of his daughter, Mary Ann Swindles (or Jepson). His grand-daughter, Sarah Landis (nee Tomkinson, November 2, 1840), remembers that, when a little girl, five or six years old, she saw him (at the time a very old man) while on a visit to her aunt Mary's home, in Macclesfield; and it was about the time of his death. Probably came from Cheshire, England. Married (1) Elizabeth Shakeshaft circa 1800; (2) Bailey (?), who died about the time of the birth of Joseph Tomkinson's grandson, William Tomkinson, in 1838. Issue: (1) Thomas (by the first marriage) and (2) Mary Ann (by the second marriage). Cabinetmaker. Woodworker. Contractor for woodwork on buildings.

ELIZABETH SHAKESHAFT\* was born ; died circa May, 1802 [since her son, Thomes Tomkinson, (born August 15, 1801) is said to have been but nine months old at the time of her death], probably at Middlewich, Cheshire, England. If she married at the average age of marriage [twenty to twenty-five years (?) ], and Thomas Tomkinson was born—say a year after her marriage, she was probably born circa 1775-1780. Assuming this to be the period of her birth, she was born in the age when cotton spinning was performed with the aid of the hand spinning-wheel. Pianoforte had been invented in Italy but sixtyfive years before; the French and Indian war, with its bloody and disastrous consequences, had taken place only twenty-one years before. She was eighteen years old at the time of the Reign of Terror, Robespierre and Marie Antoinette. George Washington was then in his forties, and the struggles of the Thirteen Original States for liberty were making a place in the history of the world. Descended from a French family. Probably came from Cheshire, England. Had at least a brother, Peter Shakeshaft, who died in Middlewich. Married Joseph Tomkinson circa 1800, the last year of the eighteenth century.

(I) THOMAS TOMKINSON, born Saturday, August 15, 1801, at Salford, Lancashire, England; died (of apoplexy) Friday, August 20, 1880, at No. 2039 East Sergeant street, Philadelphia, Pa. (the residence of his third son and fifth child, Joseph Tomkinson). Only son of Joseph Tomkinson and only child by his first wife, Elizabeth Shakeshaft. He spent his boyhood days in Middlewich, Cheshire, England. Taught in a night-school when he was a young man, probably about twenty to twenty-three years old, since he married Ann Hartley—one of his pupils—in 1824; another of his pupils being a farmer, who was forty years old. Married Sunday, July 4, 1824, in Eccles Church (Protestant Episcopal), Eccles, Lancashire, England, Ann Hartley (b. Thursday, October

6, 1803, at Salford, Lancashire, England), daughter and eldest child of John Hartley (b. July 6, 1779) and Elizabeth Crossley (b. June 10, 1781), having become acquainted with her while with an "ice-sliding party." Thomas Tomkinson and his wife Ann and the children (with the exception of John, the eldest son, who had come over to Hamilton, Canada, five years and a half before) took passage in the sailing vessel "Tonawanda," which left Liverpool, Lancashire, on Friday, July 16, 1852; were forty-five days on the water—they use to say "six weeks and three days"—and "three days and three nights in a terrific storm"; and landed at Walnut street wharf, Philadelphia, Penna., on Monday, August 30, 1852. John Tomkinson, the first emigrant, was then sick in Cincinnati, Ohio, and died five years and a half later in Philadelphia, Pa. At this time, also, Elizabeth Shakeshaft, the first child, had been dead over twenty-four years, having died in Altrincham, Cheshire, England; Elizabeth was in her twenty-sixth; John in his twentysecond; Thomas, junior, in his nineteenth; Joseph in his seventeenth; William in his fifteenth, and Sarah Ann in her twelfth, year of age. Before the family came to America, they lived in Ellis street, Pendleton, and Seddon street, Salford, both in Lancashire, England. Buried in Mount Peace Cemetery, Thirty-first street and Lehigh avenue, Philadelphia, Pa., in lot No. 346, sec. F, belonging to his third son and fifth child, Joseph Tomkinson. It is thought that Thomas Tomkinson had no brothers. He had, however, a half-sister, Mary Ann (daughter of his father's second marriage), who was twice married: first to David Swindles; then to Richard Jepson; and has left descendants in Australia. Had issue: Elizabeth Shakeshaft, Elizabeth, John, Thomas, Joseph, William and Teacher. Sarah Ann. Woodworker. Cabinetmaker. Bookbinder.

Note.—It will be observed that there are many curious and striking coincidences of circumstances in the family of Joseph Tomkinson, here mentioned, and in the various other families bearing the name of Tomkinson. For instance: Far back in the history of many of the families of Tomkinson, the chief business seems to have been that of pottery manufacturing; and Sarah Landis remembers having heard her father, Thomas Tomkinson, remark that the ancestors of Joseph Tomkinson, here mentioned, were in that business many ages ago. Also observe that the most of the families originated in Cheshire; that Elizabeth Shakeshaft died, and was probably buried there; that Thomas Tomkinson spent his boyhood days there (in Middlewich); and that Elizabeth Shakeshaft Tomkinson died and was buried there (in Altrincham). It is quite probable that both Joseph Tomkinson and Elizabeth Shakeshaft came from Cheshire; that soon after they were married, they went north into the next county (that of Lancaster)—

It will also be noted that some of the Tomkinsons originated in Staffordshire. Observe the number of clergymen in the family of Thomas Tomkinson, of Knightley, Stafford, born circa 1620, and that of John Tomkinson, of Kiel, Stafford, born 1758. It is certainly both plausible and colorable to theorize, that the general family of Tomkinson originated in Cheshire many ages ago; and that some moved north into the next county (that of Lancaster), while others went into the first county (that of Stafford) south. Upon landing at Liverpool, he went direct to Manchester, in Lancashire, where he resided, for awhile, with his aunt Rachel and Dr. John G. Butcher, at No. 12 Hanover street, Shudehill. While in England, he also visited and Elizabeth Hartley, grandparents John No. 5 (?) Seddon street, Salford, Lancashire; also his granduncle Benjamin Hartley, at Oldham, cashire; also his aunt Elizabeth Pickup, at No. — Seddon street, Salford, Lancashire; also his aunt Sarah Cauley, at Hulme, Lancashire; also his uncle Edmond Hartley, at Camdentown, London; and also his uncle James Hartley, at Radcliffe, or Bury, Lancashire. He was in England about a year, when his father sent for him to come back to America; returning to Philadelphia, in his seventeenth year. He was twenty-three years old when the war broke out between the North and South in the United States; and enlisting at once, was mustered into service, as a private, on Wednesday, May 29, 1861, in 4th Pennsylvania Reserves (33rd Pennsylvania Regiment of the line), U. S. Vols., Company G, Captain Thomas F. B. Tapper; the enlistment being for three years; wounded (shot in the right leg) on Wednesday, September 17, 1862, at the battle of Antietam, in Maryland; and discharged from service, on Friday, January 30, 1863, upon a surgeon's certificate. After the battle

of Antietam, he lay two or three days in a trench before he was discovered; and did not get into a hospital until over two weeks afterwards. He was taken, first to a private house at Boomsboro, Md.; then to Hagerstown, also in Maryland; then to Harrisburg, in Pennsylvania; and finally to the Episcopal Hospital, Philadelphia. He also enlisted in another regiment, the 2nd Coal (organized for emergency), Penna. Vols.; the enlistment being for only ninety days; but this body participated in no engagement. Also enlisted in the 34th New Jersey corps, Company I, Captain William Otis Blood, U. S. Vols.; enlisted as a 2nd sergeant, but acted as an orderly sergeant, while with this regiment. While with the 4th Pennsylvania Reserves, in Virginia, he was captured during a scouting expedition, and thrown into Libby prison, at Richmond, Va., where he was confined for probably four to six weeks, when he was finally exchanged. His first engagement was in the battle of Drainsville, Virginia. After he partially recovered from his wound—afflicted at Antietam—he enlisted in the navy. He was probably about two years in the army and about two years in the navy during the Rebellion. Upon going into the navy, he went on the receiving ship Princeton, at Philadelphia; from the Princeton he was transferred to the New Hampshire, at Port Royal, South Carolina; attached to the South Atlantic Blockade Squadron; from the New Hampshire to the Memphis, also at Port Royal: attached, at first, to the South Atlantic Blockade Squadron; afterwards to the West Gulf Squadron; from the Memphis to the Grand Gulf: attached to the West Gulf Squadron; and from the Grand Gulf to the sloop-of-war called the Portsmouth, at Galveston, Texas: also attached to the West Gulf Squadron. While on the Portsmouth he was rated as, and aboard the Memphis and the Grand Gulf he was, master-at-arms. He enlisted in the navy for a year; but went about seven months over his enlistment. It was while upon the Portsmouth, that he came into the Brooklyn navy yard at the close of the war. While with the 4th Pennsylvania Reserves, he fought in at least the following engagements and battles: Fair Oaks, Chickahominy, Gaines Mills, Malvern Hill, Bull Run (2nd), Fredericksburg, Bristow Station and Hatcher's Run—all in Virginia; and South Mountain, Antietam, Poplar Springs and Monocacy—all in Maryland. In the 34th New Jersey, he fought in at least one battle; that of Paducah, Kentucky. Aboard the Memphis, he participated in at least the following naval battles: Mobile Bay, Alabama; Fort Fisher, North Carolina. Ironfounder. <sup>&</sup>quot;James Pilgrim made his first appearance at the Arch Street Theatre, Philadelphia, in 1849, then under the management of the late William E. Burton, in the character of Paddy Miles, in his own farce of the "Limerick Boy," and established himself in public

favor. Since that period he has appeared with success in most of the large cities in the States, and his prolific pen has furnished our stage with a number of highly successful pieces, which Mr. and Mrs. Barney Williams, Miss Maggie Mitchell, Miss Mary Devlin (afterwards Mrs. Edwin Booth), Mr. F. S. Chanfrau, the Florences, and other eminent stars and artists have made specialties of, and which pieces still retain their position on the stage. In writing the successful comedy of "Irish Assurance and Yankee Modesty," he first introduced the features of the Irish boy and the Yankee girl to the American public. He is at present at the Front Street Theatre, Baltimore, Md."

She was also a grandniece of Hugh Lindsay, the showman,

about whom the said author in the same work wrote:

"Hugh Lindsay—familiarly known as 'Old Hontz, the Clown'—was born in Philadelphia, April, 1804. First entered the show business, in 1819, with J. H. Myers and Lewis Mestayer, in Philadelphia. Shortly afterwards entered the circus business. In 1828, he married Lydia Panley. Died in Berks county, Pa."

And a first cousin once removed of "Sam" Sanford, the old minstrel, about whom a daily newspaper had the following article

the early part of this year (1904):

"'SAM' SANFORD, OLD MINSTREL, DYING.

"Well-Known Philadelphian Had Reputation of Being Best "End Man on Stage.

### "MADE HIS DEBUT HERE.

"Sam Sanford, the old minstrel, is dying. News comes from Brooklyn that he has suffered a severe stroke of paralysis, and is now lying in a helpless condition in St. Peter's Hospital, in that city. Sanford is in his 84th year. The physicians fear that his old age will count against him, and his complete recovery is despaired of. \* \* \*

There are not many in the younger set of Philadelphians living to-day who can recall Sanford and his glorious days of minstrelsy. To the present generation Sanford is perhaps totally unknown. He has been retired from the stage for many years, and has only appeared in recent years at benefit performances, where his aged figure added a touch of sentiment to the show, and brought back to the old timers the prosperous days of the burnt-cork artist and the circus clown.

Though a native New Yorker, Sanford has always been identified with the Philadelphia stage, and it is perhaps in this city that he is best known. He has played a prominent part in local stage history, and half a century ago his figure was a prominent one on Chestnut street.

Sanford was born in New York, January 1, 1821. In his childhood he showed cleverness and ability as an entertainer, and a strong fondness for the footlights. After appearing with much success in New York at private theatricals he came to Philadelphia and made his professional debut as a singer at Dan Newman's ball-room, as some playhouses were known in those days. He met with a flattering reception, and a short time later joined hands with his uncle, Hugh Lindsay, who was playing at Allentown

and Reading.

With his uncle, Sanford appeared as a comic singer. But in 1840, at the age of 19, Sanford adopted the profession in which he afterwards became so famous. He became a minstrel and for five years toured the East, winning laurels and dollars wherever he went. In 1845 Sanford went to England, being one of the first American entertainers to invade Europe, and there he repeated the success he scored in this country. On his return from England Sanford settled in Philadelphia, and on August 1, 1853, opened the hall at Twelfth and Chestnut streets, which was known as Korponay's ball-room. He remained here for some time, and at the end of another successful tour covering a period of three years he came back to Philadelphia and inaugurated the most memorable and successful run of minstrelsy ever given in this city. In 1857 Sanford gathered about him a company of the best minstrels to be found in the country and arranged to open at the 'Old Drury,' then under the management of 'Old Joe' Foster. A hitch occurred, and Sanford found himself without a playhouse. The old City Hall at Eighth and Chestnut streets had about that time been opened and Sanford succeeded in leasing the building for three weeks. He opened to an audience that literally packed the hall, and during the three weeks did a phenomenal business.

In the later sixties he became affiliated with a circus, and for one season played the part of a clown. Minstrelsy, however, was his particular forte, and in 1870 he returned to the grand circle.

Sam Sanford to-day holds the reputation of having been the best end man minstrelsy has ever produced. He remained on the stage up to his 70th year. \* \* \* On his retirement he settled down to a quiet family life. \* \*

Note.—Sam Sanford was the son of Richard Sanford and Mary Lindsay (sister of Jane Lindsay, the maternal grandmother of Sarah Elizabeth Pilgrim). After Richard Sanford's death, Mary Sanford married Thomas Coates, son of "Squire" Coates, for whom Coates street (now Fairmount avenue), Philadelphia, was named, and died four or five years ago at the age of 103 or 104 years. I have been informed that Sam Sanford was the first actor to impersonate the character of "Uncle Tom" in Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin." N. P. T.

### HARTLEY PEDIGREE.

JOHN HARTLEY was born July 6, 1779, at

England; d. Tuesday, June 18, 1844, at No. 5 (?) Seddon street, Salford, Lancashire, England. His death is well remembered by his granddaughter, Sarah Landis (nee Tomkinson), who was at the time almost four years old, and his grandson, William Tomkinson, who was then just past his sixth year. At one time in the latter part of the eighteenth, or in the beginning of the nineteenth, century, he kept a toll-gate at Regent Road Bridge that crosses the old river Irwell, Salford, Lancashire. The first "hapenny" (half-penny) collected there was paid to him, and was afterwards exhibited in a museum in London. At different times he had the following toll-gates: Blackfriars, Cross Lane and Regent Road Bridge. Toll-gates were in those days bid for. He was born in the third year following that during which the first United States flag was used by Washington at Cambridge; two years after the adoption of the national colors of United States of America by

Congress; four years after the battle of Bunker Hill and Lexington; eight years after the birth of Sir Walter Scott; ten years after the beginning of Madam du Barry's power in France; twenty-seven years after the new style of year had been introduced in England. He was just past two years old when Lord Cornwallis surrendered to Washington at Yorktown; four when the first balloon ascended from Lyons, France; ten at the beginning of the French Revolution; fourteen at the time of the Reign of Terror, the power of Robespierre, the beheading of Louis XVI., and the execution of Marie Antoinette. Married Elizabeth ("Betty") Crossley (b. June 10, 1781). He had at least one brother, Benjamin Hartley, who owned silk and hosiery mills, and was at one time a local preacher, at Oldham, Lancashire, and who left issue. Had the following issue: Ann, Benjamin, Elizabeth, John, James, Elizabeth, Mary, Sarah, Alice, Edmond and Rachel. Buried probably at Rochdale, Lancashire, England. Elizabeth Crossley is buried, probably at Rochdale.

- (11) RACHEL HARTLEY, b. Thursday, May 29, 1823, probably at Salford, Lancashire, England. Married John G. Butcher, Physician. Last heard of, in 1853, at No. 12 Hanover street, Shudehill, Manchester, England. She had about eight or nine children, of whom Emily was the eldest.

The other daughter, FLORENCE ELIZABETH POLLARD, was born Thursday,

May 7 (not May 9), 1874, at Market Place, Burslem, Staffordshire, England.

JAMES HENRY TOMKINSON, son of Henry Tomkinson (d. 1883), was born Wednesday, March 24, 1847; d. Wednes-

day, September 4, 1850.

JOSEPH TOMKINSON, second son of Joseph Tomkinson who married Elizabeth Stevenson, was born in Hope street, Hanley, Staffordshire, England, 1823; d. Saturday, January 21 (not 23), 1893, in Liverpool road, Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire.

## NOTES AND CLUES OF OTHER TOMKINSONS.

[Preserved for future investigation.]

Tomkinson, gentleman, of Harriets Hays, county of Staffordshire, England, married Elizabeth Hill, second daughter of Edward Hill (b. February, 1725), who married Margaret Perkins, and granddaughter of Anthony Hill, Esq. (b. October 28, 1690), of Pepperhill, England.

The records of this Hill family go back to the Hylls who were in Hill-Cromb, 27 Edward I. (1299).

[See Hill, of Stallington Hall, in Burke's History of The Commoners.]

Tomkinson, who was over 80 years old at the time of his death, had at least the following issue: Samuel, William, Jabez and Mary.

Samuel Tomkinson died in August, 1900, in his 85th year. His people lived in Liverpool and in different parts of Cheshire. In his early business life he was a banker in Liverpool. At one time (circa 1848) managing director of The North and South Wales Bank, Liverpool. Left Liverpool for Australia in 1848 to manage the affairs of The Bank of Australia. Manager of this bank for 30 years(?). During the years 1878-98 he was in Parliament the most of the time. Married (1) into the Spool family of Worthington—a daughter of a well-known doctor. There were two daughters of this marriage, both having married army officers. One is still living, at Victoria, B. C. Married (2) ——— Birch, of a well-known family in Cheshire, the head of which is Sir W——, a member of the Balfour Ministry. He had at least nine (9) children, of whom the eldest son is George Arnold Tomkinson, Esq. (b. October, 1859), Lawyer, whose address is "Russettings," Westfield Park, Pinner, England.

William Tomkinson, the brother of Samuel Tomkinson, at one time owned a radical paper. Lived at Caernarvon, North Wales. Died circa 1898, having left a large family.

Bradford's Manchester Journal for October 9, 1841 records the fact that stone used in the erection of a chapel in Liverpool was from the quarry of Mr. ——— Tomkinson, of Liverpool.

There is a book entitled "Sarah Robinson, Agnes Weston, Mrs. Meredith (World's Workers)," by E. M. Tomkinson (English).
