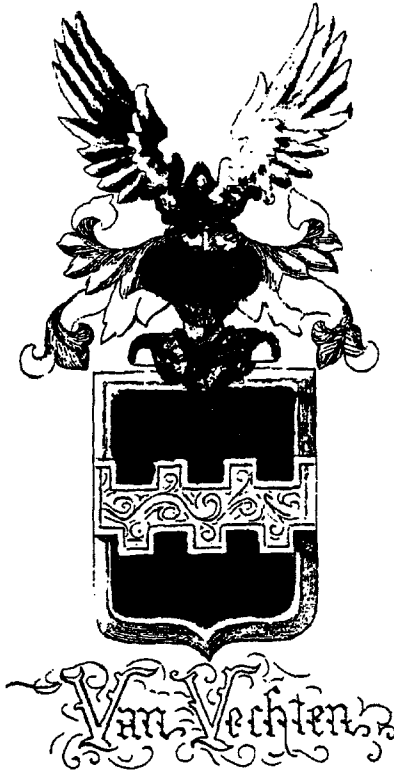

COAT OF ARMS.

This represents a copy of the Coat of Arms seen by A. V. W. Van Vechten in Utrecht, Holland, in 1886, as belonging to the ancient Van Vechtens, and has been confirmed by subsequent information. There are similar designs in possession of some of the descendants of the old family in this country. From all research I concluded this to be the most authentic.

The use of Coat of Arms dates back prior to 1147. Something by which families separated by ages could be recognized, date as far back as the Children of Israel. When families separated, they had tallies stones, which were broken and each brother took a part; in after ages their descendants traced and confirmed their lineage by the counterparts. The advancement of arts and science produced other means of recognition. Those particularly interested in tracing the origin can refer to Chamber's Encyclopaedia, page 658, 'Heraldry.' Coat of Arms originated to designate those who had rendered service to their country during a war, and their descendants were entitled to use it. They adopted a general design and the descendants who had also rendered their country service, were entitled to make some specific addition, or adopt some motto to designate their branch of the family.

The custom still obtains in our last war. Each man who bore arms thereby became entitled to a badge of his Army Corps. A. V. W. Van Vechten says: There are evidences that two kinds of mottos have been in use, "De Querre" of the War. The others, of a sentimental nature, indicating the general trait of character.

Assuming the liberty taken by others, I shall print the Coat of Arms, and place under it, *Vincit qui Patitur*, as my motto. Everyone else will be entitled to use it. I shall not enter it according to the Acts of Congress for Letters Patent, but think I am entitled to it, for if I have not endured every conceivable obstacle, and overcome them, this book would not now be before you.

PREFACE.

IN preparing this work resource to O'Callaghan's "History of New Netherlands," Professor Pearson's "First Settlers of Albany", Jephtha R. Simms' "Frontiersman of New York" and "Border War," Henry Brace's "Local Sketches of the Town of Catskill", and every other source from which any information could be found, relating to the Van Vechten, in all the various forms, in which the name has been spelled. There is not a trace that has not been followed, to obtain as perfect a records as could be made, as long as one shadow remained for a clue. Those lines of descendants that are not complete, the fault is not with me; but those who had the data and declined to give it; or where the old Bibles have been destroyed by fire. A perusal of the book will show many branches are complete.

The Van Vechten family are not one of those noted "Three brother (families) which came from Europe to America." From all the data, it is conclusive that Teunis Dircksen Van Vechten came to the New Netherlands with his wife, one child, two servants (a black man and woman, slaves), in the ship "The Arms of Norway", in 1638, settled in Greenbush, opposite Albany, and had a farm in 1648, north of the farm of his brother Teunis Cornelisen Van Vechten. O'Callaghan says of him: "He was spoken of as an old inhabitant in 1663," and that Teunis Dircksen took an active part in the councils and management of the affairs of the colonies. The same authority says of Teunis Cornelisen in 1646, he succeeded Michaelse Jansen on his farm; and as of his living in 1648 at the south end of Greenbush, Rensselaer County, N. Y.

Teunis Cornelisen's descendants seemed to have dropped out of existence and did not come to the front until 1796. I find that he came in 1637, and Gerrit Teunis born May 9th, 1796, and married Sarah Thomas, September 15th, 1818, was a descendant of Teunis Cornelisen. The two old Dutch Bibles, with the family record brought from Holland, were burned; one in the early 1700, and the other one later. The descendants can not give reliable trace beyond May, 1796. In the last part of this book I will give all I am able to find of that family.

The children of Teunis Dircksen settled first in Rensselaerwyck, on the banks of the Hudson, below Fort Orange, and some of the lands first purchased are still in the possession of some of the descendants. It is to be regretted, that the records do not give the name of Teunis Dircksen's wife, and dates of birth of the children; but so long time has elapsed that this discrepancy could not effect any title to estate or honor.

It is beyond dispute that the Van Vechten came from Vechte, two and one-half miles from Utrecht, Holland, a place where one of the Roman camps was located; at the crossing of the Rhine. The river Vecht has its origin near by. The name was first Vectum, meaning a place of fighting. The name Van Vechten has been prominent in the Roman church records, and other records in Utrecht, from 1200 down. A Fort, recently renewed, now stands at the very spot of the camp at Vechten, and hundreds of relics have been found and placed on exhibition in this Fort. A John Van Vechten was a commissioner to divide some church lands in Utrecht, and one Peter Van Vechten delivered an address and wrote an essay on being made a Bachelor of Laws at the University of Utrecht, in 1698.

They were in the seven months' siege, of 1572-73, when Don Frederick of Spain besieged Haarlem; at which time the women fought in regiments side by side with the men, and made sallies against the foe; you find them later in the famous successful siege of Leyden, from October 1573 to October 1574, when attacked by Spain. Half the citizens were lost by starvation and pestilence; notwithstanding all this, when the demand was made to surrender and open their gates, the reply to this demand was: "We are short of provisions, but after we have eaten our left arms, we will still fight you with our right. Surrender? Never!"

This book will prove conclusively, that in the settlement of the New Netherlands, the United Colonies and United States down to our late unpleasantness, that the American descendants maintained the reputation of their Holland ancestors and illustrated the adage "Blood will tell" by their record as *fighters* for equal rights and justice to all before the law.

In conversation with a Hollander about Holland and the Van Vechten family, he said:

"O. hos wel wect gij de eere uwer natie te trompetter en."

To which I replied:

"Wie heeft een eerder recht. Ik ken meer vanhun dan iemand anders."

Which means as near as can be literally translated: "How excellently you trumpet (or herald) the honor of your people."

Answer—"Who has a prior right. I know more of them than any one else."

The above refers to both our Holland and American people. We will now devote the rest of our work to the American Van's, in which we are more closely interested.

That those who read these sketches, who are not familiar with the manner in which children were named, some explanation is in order. The children were named so they could be designated by their parents. Dirck is an abbreviation of Derrick or Dedrick — Teunis indicated that he was a son of Teunis — Teunis Dirck would indicate he was a son of Derrick — Cornelius Teunis, that Cornelius was a son of Teunis. This custom has prevailed in Norway and Denmark for centuries, and is still continued there. The *se, sie, sen, tje, etc.*, at the end of a name, are pet names, like the "loving cup," endearing expressions. The first descendants of Teunis Dircksen are taken from Pearson's "First Settlers of Albany" down to 1720, but all have been compared with the original entries in the old Bibles in possession of the descendants, errors in dates corrected, and omissions added.

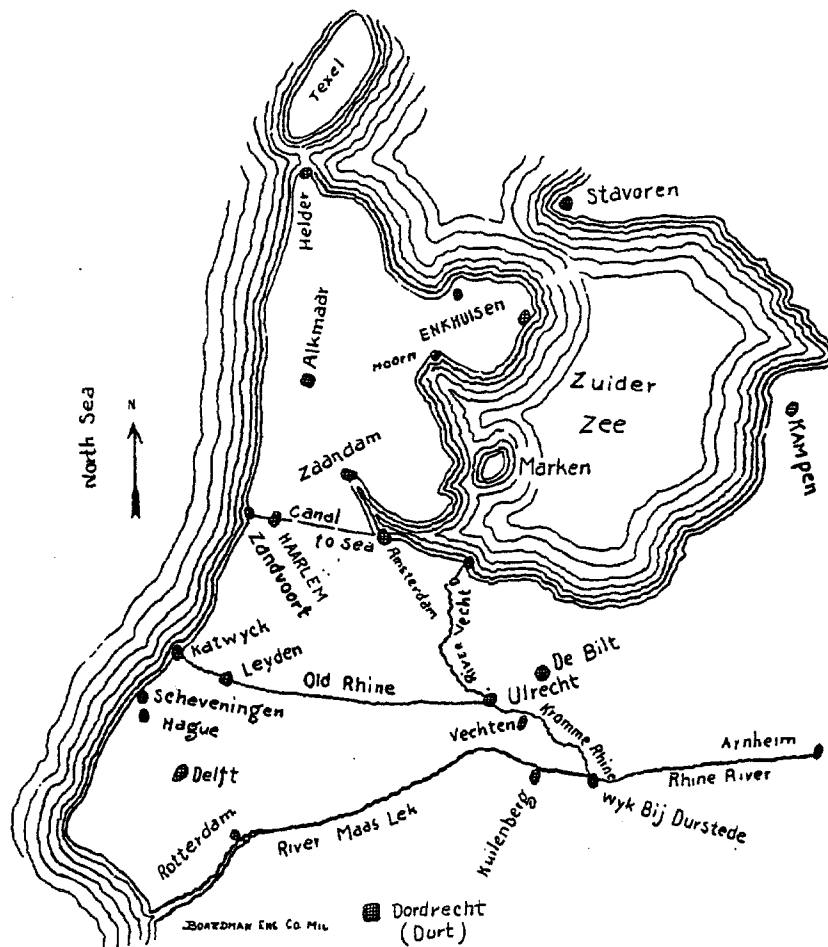
The name was originally spelled Veghten by the first settlers in the New Netherlands. The children of Teunis Van Veghten attended school in a log school house on the Snake road near Catskill, taught by Martin McGee, a Scotch linguist, or he pretended to be. He said it was not a proper translation from Holland-Dutch into English. His statement was subsequently confirmed by other linguists, and I find that as early as 1749 it was written Vechten by Teunis Van Vechten and others, since which time the descendants of Dirck Teunis and Cornelis Teunis have all adopted that orthography, with only one exception. Some of the descendants of Gerrit Teunis still adhere to the old mode Veghten. I have found the name written Vackten, Veighton, Victon, etc.

On page 5.

A. V. W. Van Vechten says: "In Holland the name has long been written Vechten as is the river Vecht near which Verhten is situated." He saw the name Van Vechten so spelled in Holland documents that were dated 1227, and it is so spelled in all histories and on Holland maps. I find Dirck Teunis' name written by himself Van Vechten on Deeds and other papers in 1686 and 1702.

THE MAP.

The map and the description accompanying it, showing a portion of Holland from which our ancestors emigrated in 1638, was outlined by A. V. W. Van Vechten, of 45 Pine Street, New York City. I give it a place in order that the descendants to whom this book will come, that are interested in antiquity, can readily locate the city of Vechten without running all over Holland, and looking at places that do not particularly interest us at this distance. Those who cannot spare the time or money to make a personal visit can in imagination travel over it and see where the plow, spade, hammer, spinning wheel and loom made music, and the means that brought our people to this land of the free.



DESCRIPTION—By the line of the Zuider Zee, and along the North Sea, being considered one continuous dike, from fifty to 100 feet wide across the top, and broader, of course at the base, running all the winding way round from the place marked "Stavoren", in Friesland, to the mouth of the river Maas, all the way up to the

shipping port Rotterdam, and beyond embracing what has been by a noble race of staunch industrious ancestors redeemed and kept from the sea and much of it 15 to 18 feet below the level thereof, and so entitled to the name Hollow Land or Holland, which sketch embraces all the territory which affects those, whom your book in this connection embraces, and shows the relations, to the other prominent points of record or history, to which the mind would wish readily to revert — without the mixture or confusion of a great many other names and places of other maps, which in the present purpose have no particular importance.

I have put down the locality of Vechten (place of the old Roman camp, the other being at Utricht, also down), these two being as early as the time of Caesar, when he was crossing the Rhine, and the *original Rhine* running from Arnheim (a beautiful place) to Wyk Bij Durstede, *where it divides one part* going under the name of *River Lek*, until where it is called *River Maas*, and so past Rotterdam to the ocean where one in transit crosses to England. *The other part* of the Rhine goes from Wyk under the name of *Kromme Rhine* (which means *crooked Rhine*), passing not far from Vechten, and so to *Utricht*. At Utricht the *stream again becomes two*, the one running westerly or northwesterly *to and through Leyden*, and so to the *North Sea at Katwyck* under the name of "Old Rhine"; the *other part* of the stream leaves *Utricht in a more northerly direction passing by Wesp* and emptying into the *Zuider Zee* (or South Sea) at *Muiden, 7 miles East of Amsterdam*. *This last part of the stream is the "River Vecht"*, which has been long occupied for country seats for residents of Amsterdam or other parts of Holland, and at Muiden is an old Fort (in which I was).

The relations of localities to Dort, so famous in history, and to the *Hague*, where the foreign *ambassadors are found*, and to the famous *island of Marker* in the *Zuider Zee*, which, though so old, *still preserves its customs of dress*, and otherwise as for centuries *Zaandam*, where Peter the Great lived, *Haarlem*, where the noted organ and the tulips are, and through which the ship canal runs from Amsterdam to the sea; *Leyden*, the place of the famous siege, where *Hollanders are called "Beggars of the Sea"*; *Alkmaar*, where cattle and butter and other dairy products are celebrated as rich and abundant.

There were so many of the same name that an Index would require too much explanation to prevent confusion, that I think this mode more easy to find the direct line.

Teunis Dircksen Van Vechten came to the New Netherlands in the ship the "Armes of Norway," with wife, one child, and two servants, (black man and women) and settled on a farm at Greenbush, opposite Albany, New York, in 1638, and he had four children. The child mentioned above named Teunis was born in Vechten, Holland, in 1634. The others were born in Greenbush, N. Y.

Dirck Teunise Van Vechten died November 25, 1702, made his will April 4th, 1687, proved March 30, 1703. He is buried in the family burying ground on the VanVechten farm.



This is a picture of Samuel VanVechten, born April 12, 1673, in Greenbush, New York. It is taken from a three-quarter life size oil painting supposed to have been painted about 1710 in Holland. It is still in existence. He made his will December 3, 1739; proved April 15, 1741. Here it is:

In the name of God, Amen, the third day of September, in the thirteenth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second, by the grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, king, defender of

the faith, etc., and in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand, seven hundred and thirty-nine, I, SAMUEL VANVEGHTEN, of Catskill, in the county of Albany and colony of New York, in America, yeoman, being weak and sickly of body, yet of perfect mind and memory, praised be Almighty God therefor, but calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing 'tis appointed for all men once to die, do therefore make, constitute, appoint and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say:

Principally and in the first place I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it, and my body to be buried in a Christian-like and decent manner; at the discretion of my executor hereafter named, nothing doubting, but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again through the sorrowful sufferings, painful death and joyful resurrection of my Blessed Saviour and Mighty Redeemer Jesus Christ, being thereby fully persuaded to obtain full pardon and remission of all my sins and to inherit everlasting life. To which the Holy Trinity one eternal Deity, be all honor, power and glory, world without end, Amen.

And, whereas, my honored father DIRCK THUNISSE VAN VEGHTEN (deceased), did on the 20th day of October, Anno Domini 1681, purchase of Stephen Van Cortland a certain tract of land in Catskill, in the county of Albany, which was afterwards confirmed by a patent under the hand and seal of his Excellency Thomas Dongan, State Governor of New York, bearing date the 21st day of March, Anno Domini 1686, and which was afterwards made over to me and my brother JOHANNES VANVEGHTEN (deceased), by my brothers, namely, MICHAEL and ABRAHAM VAN VEGHTEN (deceased), by deed bearing date the 30th day of March, Anno Domini 1715, and my brother JOHANNIS VANVEGHTEN (deceased), his part or share was made over to me by deed bearing date the 9th day of August, Anno Domini 1721, all of which premises I am seized of fee and in actual possession of and as touching all such temporal estate of lands, goods and chattels as the Lord hath been pleased (far above my deserts) to bestow upon me in this life. I give, devise, order and dispose of the same in manner and form, following:

Imprimis — It is my will and I do order that at my decease the second son of my brother THUNIS VANVEGHTEN (deceased) namely, my nephew THUNIS VANVEGHTEN, who hath been under my care from his childhood and now abiding with me, shall, hold, use occupy, possess and enjoy all my lands at Catskills wherein I am now in the possession and enjoyment of, with all the houses, out-house, grist-mill, barns, barracks, orchard garden, with all and singular the appurtenances to the premises belonging or appertaining, and all other my real estate wheresoever and of what nature and kind soever for and to the whole and sole use, benefit and improvement of him, the said THUNIS VANVEGHTEN, for and during his natural life time, and no longer without impeachment for waste.

Item — It is my will and I do bequeath and order that at the decease of him, the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, the before-mentioned estate shall come into the full possession and enjoyment of the right heir or heirs of him, the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, lawfully begotten of his own body, and thence to descend from the said lawful heir of him the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, to his heir lawfully begotten and thus to descend from heir to heir lawfully begotten of the preceeding heir, successively, to the end of the world, with this restriction that he, the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, or his said heir, and from heir to heir aforesaid, successively, shall not by any way or means whatsoever, convey or make over any part or parcel of the before-mentioned estate, but that the same shall abide, continue and remain, the visitations of Almighty God in his allwise providence, only excepted, a perpetual estate of inheritance for and to the use and uses of him, the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, during his life, and after his decease, of the heir of his body and thence from heir to heir aforesaid, successively, to the end of the world as is before expressed, he, the said THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, and his said heir, and then from heir to heir, successively, rendering and paying therefor yearly and every year for ever, on the 25th day of March, to his majesty, his heirs or successors, the Quit Rent due for the same, namely, the quantity of three bushels of good winter wheat.

Item — I give and bequeath to my said nephew, THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, his executors, administrators and assigns for ever, all my household goods, furniture, utensils and implements, namely: Beads, beading lining, woolen, iron, brass, *puter*, wooden-ware, waggons, slays, ploughs, harrows, plate, cash, money and moneys worth in hand or owing to me, together with all my personal chattels as negro slaves, male and female, horses, cows, sheep, swine, poultry, with all and every other part of my moveable and personal estate wheresoever, and whatsoever none excepted. And lastly I make, constitute, appoint and ordain my before-mentioned nephew THUNIS VAN VEGHTEN, the only and sole executor of this my last will and testament, revoking hereby all former will or wills, testament or testaments by me before this time made, willed or bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this to be my last will and testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal in my dwelling-house at Catskill, in the county of Albany, the day and year first above written

N. B. — That the rasure in the word (this) was before signing and sealing.

Be it remembered that, on the day and year above written, personally appeared before me, Myndert Schuyler, being thereunto delegated and appointed by Francis Salisbury, Abraham Salisbury and William Salisbury, the subscribing witnesses to the within written will of SAMUEL VAN VECHTEN, and made oath on the Holy Evangelist of Almighty God, that they saw the said SAMUEL VAN VECHTEN sign and seal, publish and declare the same to be his last will, and that at the time thereof he was of sound disposing mind and memory to the best of their knowledge.

NOTE. This Teunis, born May 24, 1668, died in 1707, the records say, of these parents: "beide voor den doop-dag gestorven," that is, some of the children died before they were baptized, and they did not enter them on the record, so they are lost. What a change in this as well as other sentiments. Children that died not baptized, were not admitted into the Kingdom of Heaven. It's different now, the rays are clearing up those mists.

Teunis Van Vechten, born April 1, 1707. Married Judikje (Judith) Ten-Broeck of Kingston, N. Y., daughter of Jacob Ten-Broeck, January 9, 1742. They had five children, four sons and one daughter.

Samuel, born September 28, 1742. Married Sarah Van Orden, (who was born August 15, 1758,) September 10, 1781. He died February 12, 1813.

Jacob, born September 18, 1747. Married Elsie Stadts, January 21, 1787. No children. He died April 30, 1806.

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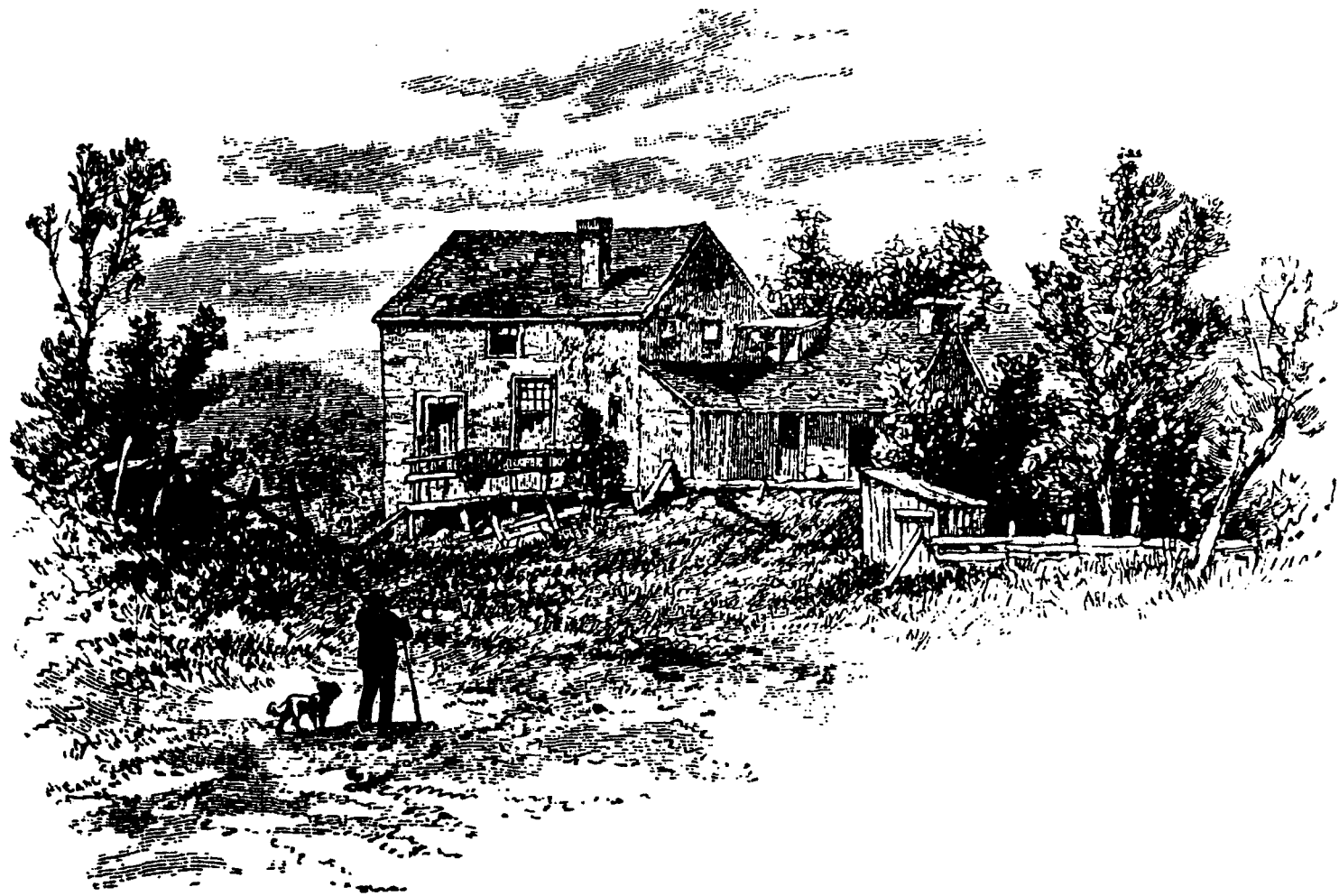
Teunis Teunissen, born April 24, 1749. Married Elizebeth DeWandelaer, January 5, 1777. He died December 7, 1817.

Foregoing represents a stone house built on the Catskill creek one and one-half miles from the Hudson river, in 1690, on lands purchased by Thunisse Van Veghten from Pemasck, the Squaw of the Catskill Indians, her son Supahoof and one Stephen Van Courtland, Oct. 20th, 1681, but the Colonial Government would not recognize the title until March 21st, 1686, at which time a deed was given signed by his Excellency Thomas Dougan, Governor of the State of New York.

The first dam on the Catskill Creek is there and a Saw Mill and Grist Mill was built there prior to 1740 and a General Store was kept in connection with it. I have Teunis Van Vechten's Account books, in which Hubartus Van Vechten and others are charged with board, plank and goods.

The lands, house etc. came into the possession of Samuel by device and purchase of his brother's interest.

In this house Dirck and Teunis, sons of Samuel's Brother Teunis were born. Dierck, who married Helen Suybrant, was given lands in Loonenberg and in the Vrooman Patent on the Mowhawk, and this house and land came to Teunis, who married Judikje Ten-Broeck, the nephew of Samuel, whose picture is printed in this book.

In this house Samuel, Jacob and Teunis Teunissen, sons of Teunis, were born. Slaves lived and were born in the smaller part of the house and lived there until liberated by the laws of New York. The last slave born in the house died in March 1891 in Catskill. There was a large fire place in this house, around which were Holland tile, representing Adam and Eve, Moses on Mount Sinai and other Scripture illustrations. They were not used when the house was rebuilt by Teunis. I have five of those old tile and nine more are in the house of William Van Orden near Catskill.



In 1750 Teunis remodeled the house, made it higher and longer, and in the rebuilt house Abraham Van Vechten, of Albany, was born Dec. 5, 1762.

The house is still standing and owned by A. V. W. Van Vechten of 45 Pine Street, New York, and the picture shows its appearance in October, 1895. I am the last one living of the Van Vechten family (white or black), that was born in the old stone house.

There was an Indian burying ground about 600 feet north-east of the house in 1834. Nate Elliott and Anthony Race of Catskill dug up several of the Indian graves and took away the bones and other things they found in them. I picked out of the dirt a tea saucer full of beads, that had been in the Indian wampum and belts.

THE MILITARY RECORD OF THIS BRANCH OF THE
FAMILY.

Derrick Teunis was a captain in colony, in 1686 and in 1689 ; he and his two sons Johannes and Teunis were at Skenesborough (now Whitehall) at the head of Lake Champlain. Johannes was 23 and Teunis 21 years old. In 1702 Teunis was commissioned as Captain, which was renewed in 1713.

Teunis, my Great Grand Father, born April 1, 1707, was in the French and Indian War of 1746. He was commissioned First Lieutenant in Capt. Kaspari's Bronk company in Col. William Johnson's Regiment in 1748. He was commissioned Captain in 1756 in Col. Anthony Van Bergen's Regiment. On the 19th of May he left Albany on horseback, reached Skenesborough on the 22nd and joined the Northern Army under General Phil. Schuyler.

His son Samuel was commissioned Captain by Cadwallader Colden Sept. 10th, 1770. He was at Ticonderoga, Skenesborough and Fort Edward. He drilled the companies of raw recruits, was the bearer of important despatches. He enforced order and discipline among the men, who built bateaux for defence of Lake Champlain and superintended the repairs at Fort George and Ticonderoga ; was in charge at Ticonderoga when the Declaration of Independence was signed.

I have his books of account with the Government and copies of his bills presented to the Government, all of which are in his own handwriting, showing he did not depend upon clerks. I have a commission and instructions given him, signed by Major General Phil. Schuyler and his account audited by Major General Horatio Gates and the military orders given him, and original Enlistment Roles and all the papers relating to his military service.

Samuel Van Vechten's son John, my father. I have a commission given him as Ensign April 17th, 1806, by Morgan Lewis, one as Lieutenant in Capt. Parsons company 1812, and commissioned as Captain Oct. 19th, 1814, and another as Captain April 9th, 1815, by Daniel D. Tompkins of New York, and all of his books and papers during the 1812 War. They have performed their part in the early settlement of the country in both civil and military matters.

In 1856 Rev. Jacob Van Vechten D. D. was in Milwaukee and while there he preached in Dutch on Sunday afternoon and evening in two Holland churches. The Hollander understood him perfectly. He was a remarkable man of strict integrity. In 1868 he had a Home in Albany, New York, for sale, which he intrusted to a Real Estate Agent, fixing the price at \$6000. The Agent sold it for \$6500. Dr. Van Vechten would not receive the extra \$500 and returned it to the purchaser. It was made the subject of a newspaper item. A reporter in Milwaukee came to me with the paper and asked me if I knew him. I said: "Certainly I do. He is my uncle." He asked me if there were any more Van Vechten's like that. I said: "They are all of that disposition." He looked at me incredulously. At his death an obituary was prepared by Rev. Samuel Gilmore Brown and published in the *Intelligencer*.

"Dr. Van Vechten, born in the village of Catskill, in the year 1788, was the son of Samuel Van Vechten, a gentleman, who was distinguished at that time for his active zeal in the Revolutionary war, and for his generous hospitality. Having pursued his preparatory studies in Catskill, Kingston, and Albany, he entered Union College 1805, the year after Dr. Nott had assumed the care of that institution as President. He graduated in 1809.

At the college commencement of 1859, by special effort of Dr. Van Vechten, nearly all the surviving members of his class met to celebrate the semi-centennial of their graduation. A class visit was made to Dr. Nott, who, in the partial decay of his physical powers, still retained nearly his full mental strength. It was difficult to decide who were the most affected, the venerable president, or his scarcely less venerable pupils.

Shortly after leaving college, Dr. Van Vechten began the study of theology in New York, under the direction of Dr. John M. Mason. He was ordained and installed pastor of the Reformed Dutch Church in Schenectady, January 8, 1815, the day on which was fought the battle of New Orleans.

In 1837 he was made a member of the Board of Trustees of Union College. In 1849 he resigned his pastoral charge in Schenectady. He afterwards took up his residence in the city of Albany, and then pre-

pared the life, in two volumes, of his theological teacher, Dr. John M. Mason. The last three years of his life were spent in Auburn, in the family of his son-in-law.

Dr. Van Vechten was eminently conscientious and faithful in attending to the various duties of his profession. His devotion to pastoral duties, his strong desire to save souls, had their fitting reward; during his pastorate of thirty-four years, nearly one thousand members were added to the church.

When intelligence of his death reached Schenectady, appropriate resolutions were passed by the Faculty of Union College, and as their representative, the President Dr. E. N. Potter, proceeded to Auburn, and at the funeral by his presence and by his words testified their respect and his own for the late Trustee.

The Rev. Samuel Van Vechten was born in the old stone house and after graduating from Union College in 1818 he went to Richmond, Va., with the intention of engaging in the mercantile business. The farm had no charms for him. After being in Richmond a short time he abandoned the idea of being a merchant, and began a course of study in Rutgers' Theological Seminary, from which he graduated in 1822. He was pastor of the Reformed Dutch Church at Bloomingberg, Sullivan County, N. Y., and from there he went to Fort Plain, Montgomery County, N. Y. He was a man of original ideas and in advance of his time. He saw that in the advancement of Arts, Science and educational facilities men were becoming free from the restraint of bigotry and dogmas of ancient Israel, and they would no longer admit or follow the

tenents of old, but to be successful the church must keep pace with progress of the world in matters relating to the church.

He left Fort Plain, removed to and died at East Fishkill, N. Y., in his eighty-seventh year.

Derrick had a farm near Loonenberg, Athens, and lived there. Hubartus who married Helen Suybrant, lived there in 1757 up to 1772 when he sold it to Teunis Van Vechten for £416. I have Teunis Van Vechten's Ledger in which an account with Hubartus was kept, the first entry February 12, 1757 and the account closed September 5, 1772, where the account is credited by Farm, £416 and cash payment the same date of £150. But I think he must have made preparations to go to the Mowhawk Valley before that time.

Hon. Teunis Van Vechten above, died at his residence in Broadway, Albany, N. Y., February 4, 1859. He was mayor of Albany city from 1837-1838. He graduated with high honors at Union College, and commenced the study of law in the office of Chancellor Lansing. He continued the practice of the profession, at different times, with Recorder Baldwin, John Davis, Daniel Cady, and Charles M. Jenkins, until his illness, in February, 1850. Upon the death of his uncle the venerable and distinguished ABRAHAM VAN VECHTEN he became the counsel and adviser of General Stephen Van Rensselaer (the Patroon) in manorial controversies. He had the deserved reputation of being a sound discriminating lawyer, and was in all respects a man of mark. He was a representative man of his race and nation, cherishing the traditional traits of his Holland ancestry, their scrupulous integrity, industry, economy, family devotion and hospitality. He was proud of his native city and true to its interests. He might have aspired to the positions due to an extended reputation and liberal fortune, but he was contented to be an Alderman or Supervisor or Mayor of the city of his birth, a director in its moneyed institutions and a manager of its charitable and religious societies.—[Albany Evening Journal.]

"This distinguished lawyer and statesman was the youngest son of TEUNIS VAN VECHTEN and JUDITH TEN BROECK. Few men have been called to so extensive a sphere of usefulness and filled it so long and well as ABRAHAM VAN VECHTEN. He entered upon the scenes of active life shortly after the Revolutionary war. He received his elementary education at a public school in Esopus, which has been the nursery of many of our distinguished men. He pursued his professional studies under the direction of the late Chancellor Lansing, and began to practice law in the county of Montgomery, but was soon invited to occupy a more extensive field in the city of Albany. The high places of the bar were then filled by a gifted race of advocates, among whom were Hamilton, Harrison, Burr, Jones and Livingston. But the brilliancy of the bar could not cast young VAN VECHTEN in the shade. He soon ranked among his illustrious seniors as an equal and a competitor for the highest professional eminence. Untiring in his efforts, the powers of his highly-gifted mind were continually developed and expanded. His intellect was formed to grapple with the most abstruse and difficult of judicial investigations, and he early inured himself to the most intense application of mental industry. In acuteness and the ready comprehension of any subject presented for his investigation, he had few equals. And nature seemed to have furnished him with powers eminently adapted to the illustration of legal principles. He made no display of legal lore, his learning seemed to be incorporated with his thoughts. What he had once read was well digested and remained ever ready for application. A large portion of his life was spent in the discussion of legal questions in our highest tribunals of law and equity; there he was always listened to with profound attention by our most eminent judges. His arguments were calculated to elucidate and instruct, and greatly to aid the tribunals to which they were addressed, in forming correct conclusions. His style was remarkable for purity, perspicuity and strength. His train of thought was unimpassioned, yet earnest and forcible. His talents were too conspicuous to allow him to confine his efforts to the bar. He was repeatedly chosen to represent his fellow citizens in both branches of the Legislature. The Senate chamber was the theatre of

some of his highest intellectual efforts. As a member of the court for the correction of errors, he has left behind him enduring monuments of his legal wisdom. For a number of years he filled the office of Attorney-General with distinguished ability. At an early period of his life a seat on the bench of the Supreme Court was offered him by Governor Jay, a similar offer was made to him a later period. He declined these proffered honors, preferring the labors of the bar as more congenial to his habits and feelings. The causes in our books of reports, in which he took part as counsel, numerous as they are, give but a faint idea of the amount of professional labor performed by him. For more than half a century his brilliant mind was constantly shedding its light over the jurisprudence of the State. The bar had long delighted to accord to him the highest honors it could bestow. To the younger members of the profession he had greatly endeared himself by his kindness and courteous manners, and by all he was venerated as an illustrious model of professional excellence. In his daily consultations with his clients he was emphatically a peacemaker. It was his constant habit to advise the settlement of disputes whenever it was practicable. He allowed no sordid motives to influence his advise nor to bias his mind in giving his opinions. He was Recorder of the city of Albany from 1797 to 1808; State Senator from 1798 to 1805, and from 1816 to 1820; member of Assembly from 1805 to 1815; Attorney-General of the State for the year 1810, and was again appointed in 1813, and served two years, and was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1821. His character as a citizen in the private walks of life afforded a model of excellence. He constantly displayed in his intercourse with his neighbors and acquaintances the most amiable social qualities which adorn the human heart. To his other traits of character was added one which is justly deemed of far the most importance, he was a sincere believer in the Saviour of the World, and a venerated member of the Dutch Reformed church. In her judicatories his paternal counsels were listened to with reverence, as eminently calculated to promote the peace and prosperity of the church. His disinterestedness was a prominent feature in his character, and was the foundation of that unbounded confidence which was reposed in him by all who knew him. In his domestic circle he was remarkable for kindness and affectionate attention to the feelings and wants of those who were dependent upon him."—[Munsell's Annals of Albany.]

Dirck Van Veghten and John Knickerbocker petitioned the council at Albany, January 8, 1708-9, to build a saw mill, and cut logs for same in the town of Schaghticoke.

His son Herman was shot by the Indians in the French and Indian war, April 25, 1746.

This is pronounced Skat-e-coke, an Algonquin Indian name, signifying The Meeting of the Waters. The waters of the Hoosic and Tomhannock meet here. The Knickerbocker mansion stands near here.

The Indians had become troublesome, and their allies, the French and Jesuit fathers, who were at the Council of the Onodaga, held in the forest, and only for the interposition of Arnaud, the interpreter, there would have been trouble then. The Indians could not be relied upon to keep their word. It was necessary for the people to form a company of reliable men from the settlers, and they selected John Knickerbocker as their leader. In 1720 among those enrolled was Wouter Quackerbusch, Ludovickus Viele, Johannes De Wandelaer, David Kittlehuyn, Diederick Van Veghten, John Hermens Visscher, Martin De La Monte, Wouter Groesbeck, Philip Livingston, Corset Voeder, David Schuyler, Peter Yates, Cornelius Van Den Berg and Ignace Kipp.

I give these names now as every one of them will appear in the genealogical record of the Van Vechten families as having married and intermarried later on.

Dirck Cornelise made his will August 17, 1739. It was proven October 17, 1752. He mentions all the children except Cornelius and Elbert, so they must have died before 1739. There seems to have been some fatality about the Philip Van Vechten to get lost or drop out of existence, and no trace. There was a Philip Van Vechten, that married Engeltje Van Deusen, June 4, 1714. She was baptized May 22, 1687, and some Philip Van Vechten's wife was buried March 17, 1734. Who can straighten this out? I have had a copy of this Dirck's will (and have now a copy of his son Benjamin's will), but I could not gain any more information from it than above.

Col. Cornelius took an active part in the military organization of the colonies. He was a man of commanding appearance, being over six feet and of that particular disposition that enlisted his energies in the struggle of this country for its independence. When 22 years old he was appointed ensign August 20, 1757, by Hon. James De Lancey, His Majesty's Lieut. Governor and commander in chief over the Province of New York and the territories therein in America. He was assigned to Capt. Knickerbocker's company. The office of ensign was one of importance in those days, (but has now been abolished in our army.) He was required to be posted in the tactics, and had charge and care of the company to drill both officers and soldiers, and they were required to obey his commands and to enforce the rules and discipline of war. The commission with the seal is in possession of his descendants. He did not remain long as ensign, but was soon promoted to higher duties and prominent positions in the army and was soon made colonel of a Regiment.

In Losseng's Field Book of the Revolution, we find Col. Van Vechten lived at Do-ve-gat or Van Vechten's cave, as it was sometimes called, the place where the British tarried from the 15th to 18th of September, while a working party repaired the roads and bridges in advance to Wilbur's Basin.

Here at Do-ve-gat was the residence of Colonel Van Vechten, of the Saratoga militia, one of Gen. Gate's staff; he was a zealous whig, and the active tories whose plans his vigilance often frustrated, were greatly embittered against him politically, while they honored him as a brave man and good neighbor. Burgoine on his retreat to Saratoga, after the battle of October 7th, ordered the dwellings of the whigs to be destroyed, and at Dovegat the buildings of Colonel Van Vechten were the first to which the torch of the invader was laid. They burned his mill, houses and barns. His family fled to Albany.

Van Vechten was at Albany on public business at the time of the first battle on Bemis Heights. He received an order from the committee of safety at this city, when Burgoine marched from Fort Edward, to remove every Tory or disaffected person from his vicinage into Connecticut. The order touched his excellent heart with grief, for many of

those included in the prescription were his neighbors, and some were his personal friends, who honestly differed from him in relation to the momentous political question at issue.

Within six hours after receiving the order he was in Albany, and pronounced its recall. The humanity, policy and sound wisdom of that step was soon illustrated by the firm support which some of these disaffected ones gave to the American cause.

George G. enlisted in Stevenson's 1st N. Y. Volunteers for Mexican War, and the Regiment sailed from New York, September 26, 1846, in the ships Thomas H. Perkins, Susan Drew and Loo Choo, reached San Francisco March 20, 1847, too late to join Fremont and Stockton, but several companies were sent to La Paz and successfully resisted the Mexican attack, August 26, 1848. The Regiment was mustered out soon after and he returned to Albany N. Y. In 1861 Governor Morgan gave him a commission as Lieutenant, April 20, 1861, and he was in the first fight of the war at Big Bethel, the 10th of June, 1861. After his time had expired he re-enlisted in the 21st N. Y. Battery in the Army under General Banks, stationed at Morganza Bend, on the Mississippi River above Port Hudson. That battery was the Signal Battery, having begun the firing at Port Hudson. In 1865, in February and March, was in the big raid of the state of Alabama. Held Spanish Fort six miles from Mobile for two weeks, and on the morning of the 9th of April, 1865, took Mobile. In July 1865 was ordered to Galveston, Texas, to back up a movement against the French in Mexico. Was ordered home, and in October 1865 the battery was discharged. He has some of the old Cornelius spirit of 1776 in him yet — could not help it, coming from that stock.

NORE. Since the above was in type I received The Daily Fredonia of New Brunswick, New Jersey, of June 1, 1896, in which was an obituary notice of George Gerrit Van Vechten's death, he having died at 1:30 o'clock the morning of June 1, 1896.

In addition to what has been already printed I state: "Mr. Van Vechten came to New Brunswick in 1866 and engaged in the Tobacco business in Neilson Street, which he conducted up to the time of his death. He was a member of the Stevenson's Regiment Association and of Kearny-Janeway Post G. A. R. of New Brunswick. He was a member of the First Methodist Episcopal church."

"The pall-bearers were two from each of the organizations to which the deceased belonged: Francis D. Clark, President of the association of survivors of Stevenson's First N. Y. Regiment (Mexican War), being Company D of that Regiment; Joseph Evans, Co. I, Secretary of the Association; Captain John T. Whittier and Samuel S. Lindsay of Kearny-Janeway Post G. A. R.; A. H. NOTE. Jellis or Giles Fonda was an interpreter for the government, he spoke several Indian languages. Jellis was Holland for Giles. He was knocked down and scalped by the Indians in one of the raids on the early settlers, and his house burned, but he was not killed. He recovered and built a house now standing on the hill at Fonda, overlooking the town. Douw came into the Van Vechten family from the Fonda family as they inter-married as early as 1689.

ANTHONY VANVECHTEN, of Tyron County, consisting of what is now known as Montgomery County, was one of the standing committee of the district; on the 29th of April, 1775, the people of that county formed a vigilance committee. They had been harrassed by the Tories and Indians, under Sir John Johnson and Buttler, to such an extent that it became necessary to form an association for their own protection. The sentiment expressed at one of their meetings: "The parliament of Great Britain say they have the right to tax or bind the Americans in all cases whatsoever. To which we answer: As we were born free, free we will be or die," and many of the members wore on their hats, Freedom or Death! on others, God and Our Rights.

Resolved, That we do hereby declare ourselves a free and independent people, are and of right ought to be, a sovereign and self-governing association, under the control of no power, other than that of our God and the general government of Congress; to maintenance of which independence we solemnly pledge to each other our mutual co-operation, our lives, our fortunes and our most sacred honor.

They formed battalions May 19, 1775. Anthony was Adjt. in Second Battalion of Palatine, of which Jacob Clock was Colonel, and Col. Nicholas Herkermer was made Chief Colonel and commander for the County of Tyron. In all the battles of which that portion of the Mowhawk Valley had, Anthony was a participant.

On the second of October, 1786, Anthony was commissioned Captain of Montgomery County militia, in Col. Volkert Veeder's regiment, by George Clinton, Governor. The commission is countersigned by Robert Harper, Secretary of State, to which is attached the Great Seal of New York, and is in possession of his descendants.

The Fonda, Douw, Vroomans and VanVechtens were so closely related and equally interested in the early settlement of the country, and the families inter-married. Col. Cornelius Vrooman was prominent in the Indian troubles.

The Vroomans were noted for their great strength. Samuel Vrooman carried 12 skipples of wheat and a harrow with iron teeth from his father's house to the field, and sat them down—a skipple is 80 pounds. His brother Cornelius carried 10 skipples of peas, the same harrow, and his brother on top of all, the same distance.

They had a sister noted for her strength. A quarrelsome man came over to her father's house, and warm words were passing between him and Cornelius. She picked the man up and sat him out doors, and told him to go home or he might get hurt. In 1770, Cornelius Fonda challenged Cornelius Vrooman to a trial of strength. Fonda lived at Mowhawk and Vrooman lived at Schoharia. A sleigh was put on bare ground and 12 men got on it. Cornelius drew it with his hand by the tongue. Fonda could not budge it.

In 1678 Gerrit Teunise Van Vechten and Jan Conell bought Capt. Jan Clute's claim in lands at Catskill. In 1680 he bought of Gerrit Van Slightenhorst a Negro man named Dick for one hundred and fifty pieces of nooten hout, also another Negro named Harry for 200 skipples of Indian corn, two loads of hay and 24 beavers in hogs. In 1697 he petitioned the governor in favor of his brother, who had accidentally killed a child of Col. Schuyler. In his will of March 8, 1680-1, he spoke of his wife, Greetje, and his two sons, Johannes, by his first wife, and Volkert, by his second wife.

(The above is from George Pearson's "First Settlers in Albany.")

N. B. I could not find which brother killed a child of Col. Schuyler, nor how it was done. I think it must have been Cornelius', as Dirck lived in Catskill at that time in the old stone house. The petition must have been successful, as there is no record of either brother having been punished.

I don't know what became of the will of March 8, 1680-1, but I have a copy of his last will, made March 8, 1700-1, translated from the records (which were in Holland-Dutch) by John Colden and Harmon Gansvoort, Sept. 20, 1759, and certified to by Abraham Yates, jr., to be a true copy, and in the hand-writing of Colden and Gansevoort. The original copy is in the possession of James D. Van Vechten at Castleton, N. Y. Those gentlemen made as near a literal translation as was possible from Dutch to English. In that will Gerrit gave all his lands, houses, barns, gold and silver, coined and uncoined, every creature or other thing to his wife without requiring her to make an inventory for the space of one year and six weeks. Then to be divided equally between Johannes, son by his first wife, and Volkert, by second wife, but Johannes to have the first choice. Then the boys were to give Greetje a share of the produce yearly and she to remain in the house as long as she lived; and to have her choice of a negro man and woman. In case she should marry again, then she must give up the house to the sons, and take a certain portion, including the two slaves.

NOTE. The "Nooten hout" is Black walnut or literally Nut wood. Beaver in hogs, means beaver skins, stretched and dried in marketable shape. A Skipple was 80 pounds, and a Schepei was 3 pecks.

A more than doubtful tradition makes Maria Bogardus marry first Peter Jacobse Borsboom, of Schenectady, but there is no record that shows it. There is one Johannes Van Vechten buried in the old burying-ground at Papsknee, June 23, 1734, and another Johannes Van Vechten buried July 15, 1742. [Pearson's Early Settlers of Albany.]

NOTE—Who can tell whose children they were? I find several other Johannes that are lost, no trace of their death, or anything beyond their birth.

I have tried in vain to find if they had any more children, or to get hold of some old bible record to find the date of Derrick's death. There are records of his taking an active part in every movement for the benefit of the early settlers, their protection, and for the government. He was particularly active about the time of the French and Indian wars of 1746, in connection with Col. John Knickerbocker and others of the Committee of Safety, and thereby incurred the enmity of the Tories and the leaders in the English and French armies and their Indian allies. Tradition says: "While at home on a furlough he caught an Indian in his cellar stealing. He was a large, powerful man and gave the Indian a good drubbing. A few days after he was in a field near his home and was shot and scalped by, it is supposed, the same In-

dian. He was literally chopped in pieces with the Tomahawk, so the pieces of the body were picked up in a corn basket and taken in a canoe down the river and buried either at Fort Edwards, or Albany." I have exhausted all resources to get date for a more full account, but shall be obliged to stop.

William D. Van Vechten, of Hoosac Falls, N. Y., writes me that he spent some time in Glenn Falls, long ago. While there he formed the acquaintance of one Solomon Van Vechten, grandson of Harmon, who had the old family bible of Derrick, in which all the records were. This Solomon lived with a family named Enos. He is dead and the Enos family gone somewhere. This bible said the daughter married Becker in Amsterdam, N. Y. This Solomon must have been a son of Harmon's son, Derrick, born in 1786. Married Miss Maygone. Had two daughters and one son. I can't find any trace of them.

Derrick inherited the patriotism from his Grand-father and father and exhibited by his zeal in the cause of the United Colonies, that the blood of those sturdy ancestors, who fought in the siege of Haarlem and Leyden, had not become extinct or contaminated. He was as active in the affairs of the nation and the military as his father. He was Major in Col. Acker's Regiment. Just before the battle of Bemis Heights and Orinskey, August 6, 1777, being familiar with the country, he and Col. Acker did the reconnoitering before the engagements. After the Jane McCrea massacre Major Derrick and Col. Acker were on a scout, and ran into an ambush on the 8th day of August, 1777. The Major was shot, the ball passing through his tobacco-box, but he was not instantly

killed. Col. Acker was not hit; the Major seeing this, said: "Colonel, I am done for, you save yourself if you can." He was scalped and the Indians escaped. The Indians seemed to have taken a fancy to the Van Vechten hair. This was the third Van Vechten scalped. First, Herman, son of Derrick and Margarete Luwas, April 25, 1746. Next Derrick, son of Johannes and Maria Bogardus, in 1746, and his son Derrick, August 8, 1777.



This picture represents the tobacco box, through which the bullet went, that killed Derrick, and is still in existence and is in the possession of Henry C. Van Vechten, of Racine, Wisconsin, the great-great Grandson of Derrick.

The Troy Telegram published July 21, 1882, the following:

"The bones of Lieut. Van Vechten were accidentally exhumed at Fort Edward yesterday by workmen in the employ of the corporation, who were

drawing sand from a bank on the road leading to Sandy Hill. Lieut. Van Vechten was a soldier in the revolution and was killed while in pursuit of the party who murdered Jane McCrea. He was buried on the brow of the hill, near the spot where he fell. A few hand-made nails and the decayed pieces of what were at one time rough boards was all that remained of the coffin, in which the gallant soldier was buried so long ago. The bones were gathered carefully and the skeleton complete is now in the hands of Deputy United States Marshall King."

I have another account, in which it was stated, the ball was still in the skull when found.

Walter Van Veghten above was appointed Ensign, October 5, 1786, when 19 years old, by Gov. George Clinton, of New York, in Col. John W. Grossbeck's regiment, and December 2, 1795, John Jay, Governor of New York, appointed him Lieutenant of a company of militia in Col. Solomon King's regiment of Washington County, New York. In 1812 and 1813, Walter sent his two sons, Derrick and Herman, as volunteers, and Isaac was drafted. Walter said: "Boys, you go; I'll take care of the farm." The office of Ensign is now not known in the regular army of the United States, but it was an office similar to that of Sergeant-Major. He drilled the new recruits, formed companies and regiments, and had charge of the color bearer. Henry C. Van, of Racine, has both commissions.

Letters of administration of the estate of Ephraim, of Middlesex County, were granted to Catherine Van Veghte, of Albany, N. Y., October 3, 1748. (Trenton Library, E, folio 213.) (Rev. Theo. Frelinghuysen Chambers, Early Germans of New Jersey.) That history also states that.

“ Benjamin, (probable son of Cornelius, the son of Teunis Dircksen, of Albany) whose will dated Raritan, Somerset County, 9 June, probated 26 June, 1747, names his wife, Sarah, and child, I, Cornelius (oldest son); II, John ; III, Ruben ; IV, Annatje ; V, Mary ; VI, Benjamin (youngest son. ”)

This is a matter, that all are entitled to a guess at, as to which family this Benjamin belonged. I can find no evidence that he was of Teunis Dirckse or his son Cornelius T. branch, but more indications, are that he was a descendant from his brother Teunis Cornelisen's family, who came over in 1637. The large tract of land purchased by Michael Van Veghten and others in 1712 (The Royce Plantation, 1470 acres), attracted the attention of all the relatives to New Jersey, and they became interested in it as an investment, even if they did not settle there. I shall give elsewhere all I have been able to find relating to Teunis Cornelisen ; and if any person who reads this book, can furnish any further evidence, I shall be most happy to chronicle it.

The General Assembly of the Colony of New York, January 24, 1756, allowed to John Van Sice, Interpreter, and Volckert Van Veghten, £112, s. 6, d. 14, (each), for services in the Seneca County, and for presents, by them made to the said Seneca Indians from October 12, 1754, to April 12, 1755.

John Van Sice was an Indian trader and interpreter. This service was during the negotiations with the Senecas.

Volckert made his will July 18, 1747, proven April 15, 1749, in which he said: "Ick ben oude van dagen." I am old in days. He mentioned his wife, two grand-children, Volckert and Agnietje, son and daughter of Gerrit Teunis and Lena Witbeck.

Michiel made one will May 20, 1734, another April 17, 1771. Probated in Trenton, N. J., February 4, 1782. His old Dutch family bible is deposited in the Bible House, New York City.

Michiel settled in Somerset County, on the Raritan River in New Jersey, in 1685, and was the first Van Vechten in New Jersey. His son, Dirck, by his second wife, Jannetje Du Mont, who was born July 15, 1699, baptized September 16, as the records of the First Church, of Raritan shows. Michiel was one of a company of eight who bought, May 3, 1712, the Royce plantation of 1470 acres in Somerset County, N. J. Michiel was one of the associate judges of Somerset County, February, 1711. He gave the land upon which the first Dutch church of Raritan was originally built, in 1721, which was near the banks of the Raritan River, about a quarter of a mile east of the present bridge near Findern Station. That church was destroyed during the Revolution. (Rev. F. Chamber's Early Germans of New Jersey.)

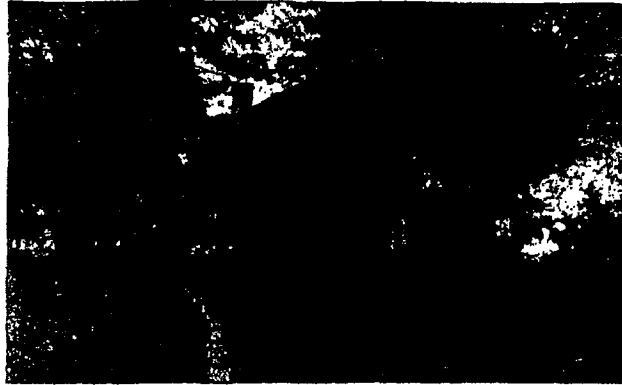

"That which precedes this is all taken from George Pearson's book, and confirmed by Mrs. E. L. Birdsall's copy from the old Dutch Bible of Michael Van Veghten which I saw August 1, 1896."

This old house was built early in the last century by Derrick Van Veghten, an eminent citizen of the county, who died November 29th, 1781, in the eighty-second year of his age. He was very patriotic and



did not complain, when, in the winter of 1778-79, an entire division of the American army was quartered upon his possessions. The valuable timber was almost entirely destroyed, being used for fuel and for the construction of log huts for the protection of officers and men. No compensation for the loss was ever demanded or given.

The house is located midway between Bound Brook and Somerville, on the banks of the Raritan river, a short distance southwest of the railroad station at Findern, about 200 yards from the historical bridge that bears the name of the first owner of this old house, described further on. This house is built entirely of brick brought from Holland by the old Dutch settlers, and although bearing many marks of age, the walls are firm and sound upon their foundation to this day, and its roof still shelters some honest tiller of the soil. It was the privilege of the writer to visit this old house during the past year, and although age has left its mark on many portions of the house, still the walls, casements, fireplaces, doors and sills are in a splendid state of preservation. The rooms are large and still have that pleasant look that attaches itself to old dwellings.

During the Revolution this homestead, which was then a very old dwelling, was the centre of a bounteous hospitality. It was occupied during the winters of 1777-78 by General Greene, and we read many descriptions of the splendid entertainments given by the young, talented and beautiful wife of one of Washington's greatest Generals.*

*NOTE. General Greene left a handsome mahogany table as a token of appreciation of kindness received at this hospitable mansion. This table is now a treasured heirloom in the family.

General and Mrs. Washington, General Wayne and many other prominent officers were guests at this old house, and a letter written by General Greene in the spring of 1779 tells us that here, on one occasion, Washington danced for three hours with Mrs. Greene without sitting down.

The owner of this old house was born in 1699, and died in 1781. He is buried near the old bridge. A group of several large trees still stand sentinel over his tomb, which is located in the middle of an otherwise treeless field. On his tomb-stone is this inscription :

In Memory of Mr Der
rick Van Veghten who died
the 29th day of Novemr
A D 1781 aged 82 Years
4 Mons & 14 Days.

Many were his friends and few his enemies,
Great was his soul and good his faculties,
Fair Health on him her blessing did bestow
And in his cheeks her ruddy charms did glow
Till Age the hand of death did deprive,
Which neither spares the great, the good or wise,
His tranquil mind composedly reclined,
And to his God his breath and soul resigned.

We cannot pass from the description of the old Van Veghten house without devoting a few lines to the bridge which now spans the Raritan



at Findern. It occupies the place of one that existed in the time of the Revolution, and was then known by that name (Van Veghten's bridge), because both ends rested upon lands owned by Derrick Van Veghten, a description of whose character we give in the preceding.

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This Van Veghten Bridge was washed away with the floods in June, 1896. I was there August 1, 1896. P. VAN VECHTEN, JR.

It was near this historical bridge that the First Reformed Church stood, which was burned by Colonel Simcoe at the head of a partisan corps, in 1776, after a preliminary skirmish at the bridge. Over the bridge marched soldiers of both sides in that great cause, with cannon and supply wagons. Washington crossed here on the march to Morristown, after the battle of Princeton. (The foregoing from Parker and Frelinghuysen's "Townsof Somerville and Raritan," by permission.)

The following, "In Days of Old," published in The Unionist-Gazette, of Somerville, N. J., Dec. 21, 1893, was sent to me by Mrs. E. L. Birdsell. Also, the copy from a Bible printed in Amsterdam, 1603, given in 1817, by Peter D. Vroom, of New Jersey, to the American Bible Society, and now in the Bible House, New York City, and a copy from the Family Bible in possession of Mrs. Jane Taylor, Somerville, New Jersey, and nearly all of the subsequent geneological records of the descendants of Michiel, for which courtesy I hereby acknowledge myself under special obligations.

The article was so appropriate and pleasing I was convinced that it would be appreciated by all to whom these may come. I therefore obtained from Mr. E. P. Roberts, manager of the Gazette, permission to use it; for which favor he also has placed me under obligations.

'Tis the morning of the twenty-fourth of December, Seventeen Hundred Seventy-Eight. The brown fields of Somerset now glisten with the sparkling new fallen snow. The bright Winter sun is not yet far above the eastern horizon as two officers, handsomely mounted and equipped, meet on the post road near the old Meldrum Tavern.

Gracefully touching his becoming military cap, Captain Livingston, aid-de-camp to General Greene, brings his steed to a halt and delivers a dainty, square-folded billet to the superior officer whose handsome face and dignified bearing proclaim him a man accustomed to command. Breaking the heavy seal the note reads: "General and Mrs. Greene beg that General and Lady Washington honor their poor quarters with their presence this evening at eight. An informal affair in honor of Miss Schuyler."

"Deliver to Mrs. Greene the compliments of Mrs. Washington and myself with the assurance that we will do ourselves the pleasure of being present at Van Veghten House this evening." With a military salute the officers pass on their ways, General Washington toward Camp Middlebrook, Captain Livingston in the direction of Pluckamini.

* * * * *

The hands of the tall eight day clock on the stairway of Van Veghten House mark the quarter before eight as several sleighs, with

merry tinkling bells and mirthful occupants, are heard to approach by the long winding avenue to the old Dutch house. Already for three-quarters of a century, and more, have its sturdy walls of Holland bricks defied the storms and ravages of time here on the bank of the treacherous Raritan. The great oak trees which surround the house have added many cubits to their stature since that long past day.

From every casement shines a welcoming light, and muffled in a great coat giving orders to the attendants, at the entrance, stands Derrick Van Veghten, the patriot owner of the mansion which is now occupied by General Greene as his headquarters. Though in his eightieth year, Derrick Van Veghten is yet hale and hearty, and strong in his sympathy for the patriot cause, he, of his abundance, has added not a little toward the comfort of officers and men. His sterling worth is acknowledged in the hearty greetings of the arriving guests.

Some little time is consumed by the ladies in the low ceilinged chambers in arranging their toilets after the frosty ride, but all have now entered the reception rooms and greeted the host and hostess and their guests. The long white wainscotted room is gaily decorated with oak and holly. The floor is polished smooth as modern parquet. A roaring wood fire blazes and snaps on the wide-open fire place. From the high mantel-piece and brass sconces about the room, innumerable candles shed their soft mellow light.

General Washington is deep in conversation with General Greene, that officer so sincerely attached to the interests of his country that the great commander-in-chief has said: "Could he but better promote these interests in the character of a corporal, he would exchange without a murmur, his epaulet for the knot. For, although he is not without ambition, that ambition has not for its object the highest rank, so much as the greatest good."

Not far from the two generals stands the fair hostess, surrounded by a bevy of bright young faces. How beautiful that face and form and how graceful her every movement! The twenty-five summers have left no mark of care upon that joyous nature. The expressive grey eyes respond to every mood, and the sweetest smile hovers ever upon the regular and animated features. Her quick perception and unusually retentive memory combine in making her conversation brilliant and her society a delight to all who come within the magic of her presence. The mass of reddish brown hair is coiled high upon the well-poised head, with dainty puffings to the front. The brilliancy of that beautiful, clear complexion is set off to wondrous advantage by the tiny bit of black court plaster placed near the dimpled chin. She wears

a superb gown of heaviest old rose brocade. The square cut neck is filled in with rare old lace and the elbow sleeves have flounces of the same cobweb-like texture. Receiving with her is the beautiful Elizabeth Schuyler, second daughter of General Philip Schuyler, a "petite brunette with good-natured lively dark eyes, which throw a beam of good temper and benevolence over her entire countenance." She wears a handsome toilet of yellow and silver brocade. Mrs. Washington, in a court costume of blue and gold brocade, is at her left.

Lord and Lady Stirling, Lady Kittie Stirling, Mrs. and Miss Lott, wife and daughter of Abraham Lott, who lives in handsome style at Beaverwyck, near Morristown, General and Mrs. Knox and many other guests have already paid their respects and are grouped about the parlors in animated conversation as two handsome young officers enter, escorted by the host, who introduces to Mrs. Greene one not already known—Major Harry Lee, the handsome dark-complexioned young Virginian, soon to become the pet of the army—the Light Horse Harry of headquarters. Thus meet two persons whose vivacious natures and merry hearts prove mutually attractive, and begins that beautiful and romantic friendship which lasts through life. Even in death they are not long parted, for side by side beneath the shade of palm and live oak in the little coquina-walled graveyard hidden in the depths of olive groves and surrounded by the tropical fruits and flowers of a Georgia sea island, in after years these friends are laid to rest.

But five years ago, Harry Lee, at 17 had graduated from Princeton, and at 20 was made captain of a calvary regiment. His bravery and soldiery qualities early attracted the attention of Washington, who at the battle of Germantown selected his troop as a personal guard. He has now been promoted to the command of three companies of light horse, composed mostly of Virginians.

Accompanying Major Lee is Col. Alexander Hamilton, aid to General Washington. Though in years but 22, "he has that dignity of bearing which insures for him all the consideration due to one who has profited by the experiences of many years."

Though slight of figure and rather under size, he possesses a most graceful carriage, courtly manners and an air of much refinement. His cheeks are rosy as a girl's and his complexion almost as fair. His amiability and agreeable presence inspires most affectionate attachment in all with whom he comes in contact. After paying his addresses to the hostess and Mrs. Washington, he is introduced to Miss Schuyler, at whose side he lingers much of the evening. The little god of love has pierced his breast, and in after years he looks back with fond recollec-

tions to that Christmas eve at Van Veghten House, where he first met the fair girl who afterward became his wife.

Lady Stirling's voice is heard above the general conversation. "How find you your quarters at Phil's Hill, Major Lee?"

"Excellent, my Lady, our hospitable host has five handsome, well bred daughters, who sing and smile and contribute not a little to the home-like air we therein find."

"I fear me your heart will not long be your own."

"Were I to look beneath, methinks even now, my lady, I would find my heart were mine no longer."

"General, I am the bearer of a request from our regiment that you assist at our morning service tomorrow, Christmas day, at Mount Pleasant." Thus dashing, daring General Wayne, the "Mad Anthony" of a later day, addressed the Commander-in-Chief.

"Will the ladies of the household be permitted to be present, General? quoth the hostess.

"Our soldiers, madam, at all times are proud to welcome in their midst the noble women who so bravely watch the progress of our cause, and I assure you that your presence with us tomorrow will be esteemed a highest favor."

"Then let us one and all attend, and shall we now make selection of such music as best becomes the day and our abilities. Here in mine own hymnal will we turn the pages down. Will you, dear General, do me the favor of using this volume at the service tomorrow."

"With pleasure, most gracious lady," was the courtly Washington's reply. And in the mellow, flickering light of many candles, on that anniversary long ago, did this festive company in accents sweet and tender, pour forth those glorious melodies in commemoration of the Holy birth.

Col. Tilghman, whose heart is far away in the sunny south, has now taken his place at the spinnet and a minuet is in progress. Gracefully the Commander-in-Chief walks with the fair hostess through the stately figures of the dance as General Greene devotes himself to Mrs. Washington, Col. Hamilton and Miss Schuyler, Captain Livingston and Miss Lott, Captain Colfax and Lady Kitty Stirling, Lord Stirling and Mrs. Knox, Baron Steuben and Lady Stirling, Major Lee and Miss Livingston—did ever a more graceful or more distinguished company honor Van Veghten house?

Echoes of the music had died away and the good cheer of the house has been placed before the guests. The great fire on the hearth is now one mass of glowing embers that give forth the mellow glow of light

and warmth. List! 'Tis the chime of the tall clock on the stair striking the midnight hour. There is a moment of supremest silence. Then the clear silvery voice of her so fondly loved, breaks forth in exquisite song:

O holy night! the stars are brightly shining,
 It is the night of the dear Saviour's birth;
 Long lay the world in sin and error pining,
 'Till He appeared and the soul felt its worth.
 A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices,
 For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn;
 Fall on your knees! O hear the angel voices!
 O night divine! O night when Christ was born!
 O night divine! O night, O night divine!

"The death of Mrs. Jane Taylor at Somerville, N. J., August 1, 1894, in her 90th year, reminds us of the interesting domestic circle of which she was a part. Michael Van Vechten, who died in the early part of this century, had five daughters. Margaret, the eldest, married David Magie, a merchant of this city, but died young, leaving only one child. Elizabeth, the next, married Gen. John Frelinghuysen, who served his country in the second war with Britain as his father had done in the Revolution. Maria La Grange married Peter Z. Elmendorf, and her oldest daughter is the wife of Mr. Sloan, President of the D., L. & W. Railroad Co. The fourth, Sophia, married Thomas Talmage, an uncle of the distinguished missionary who closed his useful life two years ago. The youngest, Jane, married first William Wilson, and some years after his death, James Taylor, a useful and respected citizen, whom she survived a long time. It is not often that we meet with a family of sisters who all enter into the married state, and with a single exception live many years, illustrating in their career every womanly excellence. This quintette of godly women won the respect and confidence of all who knew them, and their memory is still fragrant in a very wide circle. The youngest of them reached almost fourscore and ten, and suffered much in her closing years; but grace triumphed over weakness and pain, and she has gone to join those who went before. All are now before the throne, receiving the recompense of reward."

The Condition of this obligation is Such that if the above bounden Johannes van veghten and Samuel van veghten their heirs Executors or administrators shall & do well and truly pay or cause to be paid to the above Named Michiel van veghten for the behoof of the Children of the above named Teunis van veghten his Certain attorney Executor administrator or assigns the full and full sum of fifty Pounds Current money afores^d on or before y^e day which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand Seven hundred twentythree when this obligation to be void and of none Effect Else to be and Remain in full force and vertue.

The same day another receipt, written in Dutch, given by Abraham Van Veghten for the sum of Eighteen Pounds, Two Shillings, for the eighth part due me, and for one horse. I say to have received said sum and one horse.

ABRAHAM VAN VEGHTEN.

Nearly all the receipts given at that time had at the bottom, before the signature: "I say have received" in Dutch, and in fact the custom remained many years after, and was still used by many old men in the rural districts in New York as late as 1868.

The receipt for Abraham's one-eighth interest is conclusive that his sisters, Jannetje, Antje and Gaertie, were dead at the time the receipt was given.

I am the last person of the Van Veghten family born in the old stone house, and the last one living that was born there. In reverie, I see those sturdy old Hollanders sitting before the old fire-place, wearing wigs, dressed in knee-breeches, silver buckles, long blue woolen stockings and silver buckles on their shoes. The long clay pipes lit. They discussed the current topics of the day. The large silver tankard, holding one-half gallon, filled with cider, on the table; and on the side-board handy by stood a square bottle of Holland Gin (Schedam Snaps), another with Jamaica Rum, and one of St. Croix Rum. The dress the same as that of Samuel Van Veghten, whose picture is on page 10. Judge Abraham, of Albany, retained the old style dress until his death. I saw him in 1836, sitting in his office chair, smoking a long clay pipe.

I have a large collection of receipts in Dutch and English, all the old account books, several full setts of the old knee and shoe buckles. The silver tankard above mentioned is my property. There was but one stove in the house until 1834. That was an old box stove used in the room up stairs where the shoemaker and tailor in the fall or early winter made the year's supply for the family and slaves.

Pietertje's marriage and children, Wyntje and Frytje, are all taken from Pearson's Early Settlers of Albany. As I shall not carry their descendants any further, I put them all in here. If any one wishes to continue their record they will have to hunt up their descendants.

Here is a mystery that I have been trying to solve since March, 1894, and have been unable to find, who this Abraham Van Vechten was. Walter D. Tigert of Louisville, Ky., whose address I obtained from Walter Van Veghten of Brooklyn, March 20, 1894, referred me to his brother, Rev. Jno. J. Tigert, D. D., Kansas City, Mo. I wrote him March 23, 1894, and soon after received the "Constitutional History of American Episcopal Methodism", a pamphlet printed by Barbee & Smith, Agents, Nashville, Tenn., issued by Jno J. Tigert, D. D., in 1894, on the fly-leaf of which was written verbatim as I give it below without date :

I have written to him four times since June 1, 1894; not one word in reply. A nice thing for a genealogical record.

But from W. D. Tigert, of Louisville, I found that his Aunt Nancy, wife of Harmon, lived in Cobalt, Conn., and from her I received, under date of March 28, 1894, the following information: Harmon William was born in Barkley street, N. Y., June 15, 1815; his father, Abraham, moved to Louisville, Ky., about 1818, and died of Cholera away from home. She married Harmon August 27, 1843, had no children, and he died May 22, 1882. She says: "An aunt of my husband, whose maiden name was Hetty Van Veghten, married a man named Wilson; they had two sons, William, died in Savanah, Ga. Not married. Geo. Burr Wilson, lived in Troy in 1854. She thought her husband's grandfather's name was Abraham, and lived at Buskirk's Bridge, or Schaghticoke. Another uncle whose name she did not know lived in

New York, and died leaving three children, Wallace, Sarah, and Julia. Sarah, when she last knew her, was the widow of George Powell and lived at Morrisanna, N. Y., and had one son.

Mary married James Coggshall and lived in New York.

I have been unable to find either of them.

Walter, born in Louisville, Ky., Nov. 27, 1823. Married May Edwards, and they had one son, Walter D. Van Veghten, born May 6, 1849. Married Sarah L. Gill, June 1, 1893. She was born Nov. 13, 1850, in England. No children, March, 1896. Lived 110 Johnson street, Brooklyn, N. Y.

That is all I have been able to find of that family. Walter cannot give me anymore than I have published. It may be someone else can.

Here is another :

Mrs. Catherine A. Bradbury, of 4115 Drexel Boulevard, Chicago, informs me that they cannot go any further back than 1796, because the two old Holland bibles were destroyed by two different fires. They claim to be descendants of Teunis Cornelisen, a brother of Teunis Dircksen, and that their ancestors came over in 1637, and settled on a farm near Greenbush, and in 1646, he succeeded Michaelse Jansen on his farm at the south end of Greenbush, and he was called an old inhabitant in 1663. I think she is correct, and that the indications are that they are the descendants of Teunis Cornelisen.

On Page 96. There is a Benjamin who made his will June 9, 1747, in Raritan, New Jersey. Had six children. Can't find anything more of them.

Segar Van Voorhoudt, third son of Cornelius Segar Van Voorhoudt, married Jannetje Tennissen Van Vechten.—Van Voorhoudt was killed by Andries Hubertsen in a quarrel in 1662. See

O'Callahan's History of New Netherlands, Vol. I, Page 440. No further trace of her: she must be a descendant from Teunis Cornelisen.

Albert Van Vechten was killed by the Indians June 7, 1663, in front of his house in Esopus. O'Callahan's History of New Netherlands, Vol. II, Page 475.

I think all the above are descendants of Teunis Cornelisen. I wish some one could give some light on the above. I think their descendants must have died out.
