As has been the custom of all nations and generations during the six thousand years nearly passed, of the earth's history, to preserve records of races, families and individuals. The collector of this volume holding the material herein presented, feels it his duty to the rising generation to present in book form the facts in his possession. Yet some of it may be erroneous, as all verbal records are liable to err; and some written cannot be positively proven accurate. I present this volume to the family subject to correction by any one that can give more light upon the past two hundred and fifty years of its history.

I would point to God's Holy Word as an example of records, both good and evil, and our individual responsibility and record we read, is written in eternities' volume, from which we must all give an account of the deeds done in the body. YAN HORNE.

The first authentic record of this family is found in the Documentary History of New York, volume 110, page 618, stating that Jaques Van Horne and Albert K. Burgh, committee of Board of Trade on resolutions to form a plan to colonize the Netherlands, sent a report to the West India Company of Amsterdam, in Holland, against the private complaints of the Patroons. This Document was dated June 26th, 1634.

Near the close of the same year a West India vessel came over to New York province, among its passengers were Wolford and Annaka Webber, children of Wolford Webber of Holland, who married Annaka Coch, daughter of Hendrick and Neisgen Seleyns Coch.

In the year 1633 King William the Fourth of Holland, known as William the Silent Prince of Orange, gave a grant of 27,800 acres of land in New York province, known as Harlem Flats. This original grant is written on four large skins of the finest vellum, or parchment, the writing is in deep black and as fresh and unfaded as if made but yesterday, with the best India ink; the beginning of each paragraph has one of the elaborate capitals, such as are seen in the cld Monkish transcriptions of the The four sheets or skins are connected at the top by eyelets and a purple ribbon being passed through them and the ends brought together and sealed with yellow wax, bearing the impress of the great seal of the The whole document is rolled on Kingdom of Holland. a stick of dark wood and deposited in a box of stamped Spanish leather. This description is given by Edward B. Humphrey, now living at No. 317 West Twenty-Second street, New York, 1887. This grant was given to Lord

Waldron and four others, and in 1686 the number was increased to twenty-three, the additional persons consisting of sons, daughters and sons-in-law. The entire property was willed to the fifth generation of the second grantees and the sixth generation of the first grantees. The generations are now extinct in the Van Horne family. Wolford Amant Webber, son of Wolford, came over in 1649, received a grant of 62 acres of land fronting on East River and running through Chatham street near Chatham Square. This was granted by Peter Stuyvesant. Webber afterward sold and conveyed it to his aunt Annaka Webber, then Jans. She leased it to Governor Lovelace, New York's first English Governor, by whom it was leased to the existing authorities of Trinity Church. This Wolford Amant Webber was a grandson of King William of Orange, he married Gertrude Hassing, by whom he had two daughters, Helegona and Rachel, Helegona married Philip Minthorne, in the year 1696. ford Amant Webber died in 1715, leaving a will, bequeathing his property to Helegona, and Rachel who married John Van Horne; Minthorne was made executor, but owing to the danger of sea voyages in those days, feared to cross the ocean and secure the lands here; but Bogardus, Annaka Jans' third husband, essayed the trip and was lost at sea in a storm, so the matter was dropped. Annaka Webber married a man by the name of Jans, by whom she had a daughter named Anna Maria, she afterwards married a Van Bant, and after his death married a Bogardus and had children. (Rev. Everardus Bogardus, they had a son, Cornelius, baptised Sept. 6, 1640.) This oldest daughter, Anna Maria Jans, married Cornelius Jansen Van Horne, Oct. 6, 1659. His father, Jan Corneliessen Van Horne, came over as early as 1645, and he drew money from his guardian in Holland in the year 1647; his wife's name is not known. He became a member of First Dutch Church of New York, Oct. 6, 1685. They had three sons, named Cornelius Jansen, married Anna Maria Jans, and Jan Joris married Maria Rutgers, and Garret married Altje Prophost, July 2, 1693. In the same year, (1647) Baron Resolvent Waldron came to New York from Holland, in company with Governor Stuyvesant. In 1654 the latter conveyed to the Baron and two others, a grant of all that portion of Manhattan Island lying between Eighty-Second and One Hundred and Ninth streets, extending from North to East River. In 1684 the grant was confirmed by Governor Dongan. A large part of this land was salt marsh until about 1850, when the Tweed ring devised a plan of filling it in at the expense of the city and in twenty years 1,350 acres of valuable land was reclaimed. In 1869 the Tammany ring pushed through a bill at Albany, bringing this land under taxation and subsequently it was sold in default of taxes, the members of the Ring being large purchasers. The title of this land belongs to the heirs of the Waldron estate.

On page 600 of Valentine's Manual, issued 1861, we read that Jan Corneliessen Van Horne sold a house and lot south of Marketfield street, 30 feet wide by four and one-half rods long, being part of premises patented to said Jan Corneliessen Van Horne, June 23rd, 1645.

On page 584 of Valentine's Manual of 1861, we read that on March 6th, 1653, Jan Corneliessen Van Horne sold a lot on east side of Fort Amsterdam, one and one-half rods and four and one-half inches in width by nine rods and nine feet in length, near Marketfield street. The fort stood on the Hudson River fronting the Battery, hence this lot to the east of it.

On April 14th, 1657, according to Valentine's Manual,

Jan Corneliessen Van Horne was entered in New Amsterdam as a small burgher; he must pay twenty-five guilders. Must have been a resident three years and six weeks before the date of the City charter.

In the history of Hunterdon and Somerset Counties of New Jersey, written by James P. Snell, published in Philadelphia in 1881, we find the following:

"John Van Horne bought a tract of land of 6,800 acres in Somerset County, Montgomery Township, in 1707. In 1753 Abram Van Horne, a merchant, of New York, sold 264½ acres of land in the same Township, to Jost Duryye, for £1058 or \$2,632.

On May 1, 1754, Abram Van Horne, merchant of New York and Catharine Rutgers his wife, sold to John Van Voorhees Yeoman 201½ acres of land for £806 or \$2,015, in Montgomery Township, the present Voorhees Homestead.

The above Abram Van Horne was a son of John Van Horne who married Rachel Webber, and bought the tract of land (6,800 acres,) in Somerset County, N. J. He died in New York, in the year 1735. He had also another son John Van Horne, who settled at Rocky Hills, and had 1,500 acres of land. He was a very hospitable gentleman, and a great friend of General Washington, whose headquarters were at his home, when in that neighborhood. He was Town Committeeman from 1792 until 1806. He died without heirs and his estate was divided among his relatives. The following family record of this Abram Van Horne, in his own handwriting, in the Dutch language, the birth of whose children is quaintly announced:

"In 1732, 3rd day of May, was born our first daughter, named Catharine, between 3 and 4 o'clock on Monday morning. On January 1, 1736, was born our first son,

named Abram, between 2 and 3 o'clock, Saturday morn-September 20, 1739, was born our second daughter, named Margaretta, between 10 and 11 o'clock, Thursday On April 13, 1742, our third daughter was born, named Elizabeth, between 11 and 12 o'clock, Thursday forenoon. 1745, April 4th, day time, was born our second son, named Jacobus, (afterwards James,) Thursday moon, between 1 and 2 o'clock. On 1747, September 17th, day time, was born our third son, named Harman, Thursday morning, between 6 and 7 o'clock. On 1749, October 16th, is Overleed my son Harman. On 1749, February 19th, our fourth daughter Eve, was born on Monday, 8 o'clock aforenoon. January 19, 1752, at twelve o'clock at night, departed this life, my dearly beloved son, Abram Van Horne, Jr., in the fifteenth year of his age, by an unhappy fall from the main yard-arm of the ship John L. Chevalier, Dean master, bound from this port to On March 17, 1768, departed this life, Mrs. Catharine Van Horne in ye fifty-fifth year of her age."

Jacobus, (afterwards written James Van Horne,) the second son named above was baptised on Sunday, April 21, 1745, in the old Dutch Church, corner of Fulton and William street, New York. He died in 1792, aged 47. He married Mayche Lot, December 17, 1768. They left several daughters. He was a grocer near Fly Market, now Fulton Market, New York. The above record is owned by J. V. H. Scoville of New York State, a descendant of the family.

Records of the old Dutch Reformed Church of New York, contain the marriage of Cornelius Jansen Van Horne, No. 2, son of Jan Corneliessen Van Horne, No. 1, and Anna Maria Jans, daughter of Annaka Jans, on Oct. 4, 1659. Also baptism of children.

Cornelius No. 11, Helena No. 13, Abram No. 14, emigrated from New York to Hunterdon County, New Jersey.

Abram Van Horne bought a tract of land of 3,000 acres and built the White House which is still standing and occupied by Simon W. Van Horne, of the fifth generation. It was built in the year 1752, the village and station of that name are located there. He also built a mill there, and afterward another mill a few miles north

of their home. He married Antia Covenhoven, the date is not recorded but as early as 1727. They reared a family of three sons and six daughters, whom are enumerated in his will, dated Dec. 29, 1758.

Cornelius No. 11, decided to go down to Monmouth Co, N. J., where he settled and married an English lady named Catharine Cox, who died within one year, leaving a son named Thomas. He next married Elizabeth Lawrence, who bore three children, Mathias, Catharine and Elizabeth, and then she died. He afterwards married Hannah Sebrook, born 1706, by whom he had six chil-He and his family after this last marriage, moved back to Hunterdon Co., on lands purchased near the White House plantation of his brother Abram, before Shortly afterwards these brothers bought of mentioned. a sea captain the services of a German emigrant, for a term of years in order to defray expenses of his passage This man bargained to build three houses in three successive years for his freedom, he having all the spare time. One of these was a stone house with the initials C. V. H., dated 1753 and stood one half mile west of White House station, and north of the railroad.

Captain Cornelius Van Horne made his will Dec. 24, 1743, to which he added a codicil Feb. 3, 1744, these were admitted to probate March 16, 1744, and are recorded in Will Book No. 5, page 17, in the office of Secretary of State at Trenton, New Jersey. This will is dated at Reading Town, Hunterdon Co., western division of New Jersey, and has the following bequests, viz: To wife Hannah, fifty pounds in lieu of dowry and provision for her support, so long as she shall live or remain a widow. To eldest son Thomas, all that tract of land whereon I now dwell. To son Mathias, tract of land situate in Upper Freehold, adjoining Thomas Lenara, in Monmouth

Matthew shall pay two hundred Pounds proclamation money in manner and form following: Whatever said Matthew has over and above his equal dividend of my whole estate. He shall pay one-half of that to my daughter Catharine Van Horne, when she arrives at the age of twenty-seven years. And the other half to pay my daughter Elizabeth Van Horne, when she arrives at the age of twenty-four. To son Cornelius, a certain tract of land situate upon Crossrock Creek, in Burlington Co., purchased of Matthew Walson. Cornelius shall pay the sum of five shillings, proclamation money to his younger brother Daniel, at the age of twenty-one years. After all just debts have been paid my seven sons and three daughters to have an equal division of my whole estate. I nominate my son Thomas and my brother Abram Van Horne, and Nicholas Wicoff, my executors. The codicil, after disposing of certain personal property goes on to say: I leave my wife one of the side-saddles and likewise give my son Thomas his choice of all my horse kind, except the black horse branded J. R., and I leave my son Matthew my horse branded J. R., and my saddle likewise, I leave my daughter Catharine, three Pound, ten Shillings proclamation money, and daughter Elizabeth, that side-saddle which was her mother's. And I leave my son Thomas that saddle which he usually rides upon. Among the items mentioned in the inventory, made April 5, 1744, are the following: £. S. D.

He died in 1744, and was buried in the old Van Horne graveyard at White House, where his grave is marked by a large tombstone, on which is recorded:

In memory of

CAPT. CORNELIUS VAN HORNE,

Died Feb. 12, 1744.

in ye 49th year of his age.

His widow afterward married Benjamin Drake of Hopewell, near Trenton, N. J. The following is a complete list of the children, with dates of birth. The six children by the third wife is taken from the old family Bible of Hannah Sebrook, now in the possession of Hon. Burt Van Horne of Rochester, N. Y.

Of the above family, but four of them have a record to hand down to posterity, viz:

- No. 19. Thomas, born Dec. 4, 1722, married Jane Ten Eyck. She died April 27, 1800.
- No. 24. Cornelius, born May 4, 1737, married Charity Wycoff. Made his will in 1783; still agitated.
- No. 25. Abram, called Sheriff, born Aug. 28, 1738, married Jane Ten Eyck, and second Hunnah Hoff, of Montgomery Co., N. Y.
- No. 26. James, born April 23, 1740, married Hannah Drake, located in western New York.

Thomas, No. 19, sold his land in Hunterdon Co., in the year 1757, and purchased a farm in Mansfield Tównship, Sussex (now Warren) Co., New Jersey. Here he became an Elder in the Presbyterian Church, a position he held until his death. He was elected Magistrate, and was Associate Judge of the County. In 1772 he was elected a County Representative in the State Assembly, which position he occupied until the time of his death. He became deranged and while on the road cut the arteries in both his arms above the elbows and bled to death, at the commencement of the Revolutionary War, Jan. 18, 1774. He left eight children, viz: Cornelius, born Dec. 16, 1750, married Sarah Dunn, and Catharine, Jacob, Jemima, Hannah, Thomas, Jane and Mathias.

This Cornelius, No. 29, eldest son of Thomas and grandson of Capt. Cornelius, inherited the estate. As a portion of this estate was located near Kingston Flats, in the Wyoming Valley, Penn., where emigrants from Connecticut, came and attempted to disposses those who held the land under Penn. Cornelius Van Horne with thirty men, joined Colonel Plunket, in the war against During this unpleasantness, hostilities the Yankees. having commenced between America and Great Britain, the people of Pennsylvania and Connecticut suspended their quarrel and united in the struggle for Independence. Cornelius Van Horne became a Lieutenant in the New Jersey militia and served for one year in the army. After the war closed and the dispute between Pennsylvania and Connecticut had been decided in favor of the former by a commissioner appointed by Congress in 1783, Cornelius Van Horne in company with his Uncle Jacob Ten Eyck, went to Wyoming to get possession of the lands which the Yankees had deprived him of. From those who were in possession of the lands he obtained leases.

The conditions of which were, that they should give him one third of the product they raised, and the possession of said land at the end of one year. In 1784, Cornelius with his brother Jacob, cousin John, and William Mc-Hinsey, moved upon the land which was 66 miles northeast from Easton, Northampton Co., Pa. At harvest time the Connecticut people returned and drove the Pennites from their possessions into the fort, when Cornelius returned to New Jersey, about three weeks after. He returned to Locust Ridge, 22 miles from Wyoming, where he met a number of Pennites; here he remained several days, when Colonel Moore came there from Reading, and at his request Cornelius volunteered to carry a letter to Wyoming. The letter was concealed in a button and Van Horne started. On the way he was captured by the Yankees and imprisoned. In two or three days he was released by Gen. Armstrong, who came with seven hundred men from Northampton Co. Thirty-six of the Yankees were taken to Easton and the remainder, nearly one hundred, were sent to Sunbury, in a few days they gave bail and were released and shortly after those at Easton broke jail and all returned to Wyoming, and were worse on the Pennites than before. the fall of 1786 Timothy Pickering came into the County. The people were induced to submit to the laws, and the Yankees were permitted to retain the lands at a low price. Thus was peace secured to the State at the expense of the Pennites. Having been deprived of his land he went to Philadelphia and presented his case to John Armstrong, Secretary of the Senate. He then returned to New Jersey and remained with his mother and family on the old estate, until the spring of 1788, when they emigrated to Cassewage, and settled on the East side of French Creek, and founded the town of Meadville, here he remained until the Spring of 1791, when warned by friendly Indians, they moved down to Franklin. month Van Horne and two others agreed to return, guard themselves and raise a crop of corn. On the first of May, Van Horne was captured by the Indians, but after some time he managed to escape and went to New Jersey until the next fall, when he returned to Meadville. In the summer of 1794, near Frankfort, two men were shot and scalped by the Indians, and General Gibson sent to Van Horne an Ensign's commission to enlist fifty men as a guard, which he did, and built a block house and mounted a canuon in the second story with a sentry box over all. He remained in service five months when he was discharged. In 1805 another Indian outbreak occurred. Van Horne was commissioned a Captain and organized a company for the protection of Meadville. He remained in service from June 1st to Dec. 31st, when peace was again established. These interesting facts are written from a manuscript in the possession of the Pennsylvania Historical Society, written by Cornelius Van Horne, Oct. 2, 1837, when he was eighty-seven years of age. In this manuscript he says: "I was the first Collector and second Assessor in five Counties, and had to make my returns at Pittsburg. In 1798 and '99 I was also appointed the first Sheriff in the five Counties."

On the 27th of September, 1798, he married Sarah Dunn. He had six children, Jane, James, Precilla, Harriet, Thomas, and Cornelius born March 3, 1812. He died at Meadville, July 18, 1847. In his obituary which appeared in the Meadville papers it is said of him: "He was a pure and manly relic of primitive excellence. No man more invariably practiced or more hopefully illustrated the Golden Rule, and no being is found who would whisper a word of disparagement against his memory.

Peace be to his patriarchal name. He died beloved and honored; and more, sacred sympathies he had with him, for he was a Christian and he yielded up his spirit in the faith and hope of a blessed resurrection."

Cornelius Van Horne, No. 24, married Charity Wycoff. He was born May 4, 1737, resided at Readington, Hunterdon Co., New Jersey. He accumulated a large property and owned a number of slaves. He had an artist paint full size portraits of himself and wife. children were Abram, Simon, Cornelius, William, Anna, Charity, Sarah, Margaret, Mary. He made his Will in 1783, in which four sons and five daughters are men-He also willed all his slaves their freedom, and tioned. ordered a fence built around his graveyard. He was a consistent member of the Reformed Dutch Church of Readington. No. 25, Sheriff Abram Van Horne, born Aug. 28, 1738, was the second son of Capt. Cornelius Van Horne by his third wife, Hannah Sebrook. He married Jane Ten Eyck who soon died without issue. Dec. 9, 1763, he married Hunnah, daughter of Richard Hoff of New Jersey. He emigrated about 1771, to what was then called Warrensbush, and settled on a farm in the present town of Florida, Montgomery Co., New York. He did not move his family until the following summer, when they were four days in making the voyage from New York to Albany on a sloop. He was made a member of the Tryon County Committee of Safety in June, 1775, from the Mohawk District, and continued a member for several consecutive years. He was a staunch Whig and it was rumored that an attempt was about to be made by the Tories and Indians to massacre him and his family. A neighboring Tory was appointed to go at night and shoot him in bed through the window, but providently on the fatal night their child was sick and

Hannah had got up and built a fire in the big fire place and nursed the child, but had now laid down in the front side of the bed with the child, when the neighbor came When he saw he could not shoot him to the window. without killing her, his heart failed him, as she was a noble woman and had nursed the sick even in his own This man's report leaked out and a block house was built for the immediate defense of his family and the neighborhood, which was guarded by a few soldiers. was a member of State Assembly from 1777 to 1781, and was appointed High Sheriff of Tryon County May 22, 1781. In 1783 he moved to Cansdebanak Church, near Fort Plain, and from here he afterwards moved up the Otsquaga Creek, and built a mill, which bears the name of Van Hornsville. He died there at his home March 5, 1810, aged 72 years. The following named were his children: Cornelius, James, Daniel, Richard, Thomas, Catharine, Hannah and Abram D.—six sons and two daughters.

No. 26, James born April 23, 1740, was the fifth son of Capt. Cornelius Van Horne, and the fourth child born to him by his third wife Hannah Sebrook. He married Elizabeth Sleght and had eight children named Hannah, Cornelius, John, James, Elizabeth, Abram, Jane and He was always a resident of Hunterdon Co., New Jersey. His son, Honorable James Van Horne, born March 23, 1770, the third son of the above, married Elizabeth Hall of Bound Brook, New Jersey. They had four children and she died Feb. 2, 1807, and on Dec. 19, 1807, he married Abigal Carpenter, who was born in Warwick, Orange Co., New York, Jan. 6, 1784. She was a grandchild of General Burt. They moved to Seneca Co., New York, and settled near Ovid, where he built a number of mills and carried them on successfully.

became Associate Judge of the Circuit Court. last wife he had eight children, viz: Daniel, Cornelius, Tobias, Sarah, James, Larney, Maria, John, Caroline, Elizabeth, William, and Burt the youngest, born Oct. 23, He married Charlotte T. Goodall and afterwards 1823. Abigal, daughter of Thomas Schuyler of Florida, Montgomery Co., New York. He resides on the old homestead of his father, which is known as the Hall, in Seneca Co., New York. He served one term in the Legislature of his State, and in the fall of 1860, was elected a Member of the Thirty-Seventh Congress, was re-elected to the Thirty-Ninth and afterwards to the Fortieth Con-He was appointed Aug. 1, 1877, by President Hayes, Collector of Internal Revenue for the Twentyeighth District of New York, and occupied the position until the administration of President Arthur, when he resigned.

Thus having briefly stated the leading history of the family of Capt. Cornelius Van Horne, I will also briefly follow the descendents of his brother Abram Van Horne, the founder of the White House, Hunterdon County, New Jersey.

Abram Van Horne No. 14, brother of Capt. Cornelius, and previously referred to in this history, married Antia Covenhoven, and raised a large family of children, their names were Matthew No. 30, Cornelius No. 31, Abram No. 32, Margaret No. 33, Antia No. 34, Elizabeth No. 35, Catharine No. 36, Neltia No. 37, Phidia No. 38. He made his Will Dec. 29, 1758, which is herein copied:

WILL OF ABRAHAM VAN HORNE.

White House, N. J., Dec. 29th, 1758.

In the name of God, Amen:

I, Abraham Van Horne of the County of Hunterdon, and Province of New Jersey, being in perfect health and sound memory, praise be to God, do make this my last Will and Testament as follows, *Imprimis*: I order that my just debts and funeral charges be paid out of my estate, as soon as convenience will, by my executor hereafter named,

ITEM—It is my will and I do hereby order that my dear and loving wife Antia, shall have the full possession of my dwelling house, gristmill with two hundred and forty acres of land, now in my possession, until my youngest son Abraham, comes to the full age of twenty-one years, and when my said son Abraham, comes to the age of twenty-one years, that then my will is that my loving wife Autia, to have no more of the premises during her widowhood, than the equal part of my dwelling house, the house where Samuel Covcill now liveth, with half of the orchard, and ten acres of land below the mill dam, and out of personal estate, I give and bequeath to my said wife, excepting the negro man named Cesar, and the negro woman named, his wife, as hereafter mentioned: First, I give to my said wife, the best bed in the house with all its furniture thereunto belonging, the cupboard, one dozen pewter plates, six pewter platters, three iron pots, the said negro Cesar and Bet his wife, during my said wife's life, and after her death, or the said negroes come to be past hard labor, that they then they shall be maintained by my son Abraham Van Horne, his heirs and assigns, for I positively order that they shall not be sold, to any person whatsover.

ITEM—I give to my daughter Margaret, her heirs and assigns, the sum of one hundred Pounds money, eight shillings to the Pound, and a negro girl named Maria.

ITEM—I Give to my daughter Phidia, and her assigns one negro girl named Hannah, to be her property forever. Item—I give to my daughter Antia, a negro girl Dinah, to her and assigns forever. Item—I give to my daughter Neltia, and to her assigns forever, the negro girl named Hager. Item—It is my will and I do hereby order that my son Abraham Van Horne shall have out of my personal estate, the negro boy named Peter, to him, his heirs and assigns forever, as also three milch cows, three of my best horses, my best wagon, two plows with all their tackling thereunto belonging as his property forever. Item—It is my will that the remaining part of my estate be equally divided among my three daughters, viz: Phidia, Nerltia, Antia, and my loving wife Antia. Item—It is my will and I

do hereby order that my oldest son Matthew Van Horne, shall have and enjoy the two hundred acres of land, where he now liveth, which is part of a larger tract containing four hundred acres. I say that it is my will that my said son Matthew and his wife shall possess and enjoy the same as long as he and his wife shall live. Item—It is my will that after their decease, the said two hundred acres of land to be equally divided amongst my son Matthew's youngest children, to them and their heirs and assigns. Item—It is my will and I do hereby order, that the remaining two hundred acres of said land, be divided as follows among my son Matthew Van Horne's eldest boys, viz: Abraham, William, Matthew and Cornelius, that is to say Abraham shall have fifty acres of said land, in that part wherein the sawmill is now erected, to him, his heirs assigns forever, and the other one hundred and fifty acres, the remaining parts to be equally divided among the other three boys, viz: William, Matthew and Cornelius. That is to say according quantity, quality, to belong to them, to their heirs and assigns forever. Item—It is my will and I do hereby order, that my son Matthew Van Horne shall enjoy the whole of the four hundred acres before mentioned; till the four oldest boys of my son Matthew come to the age of twenty-one years; that then it is my will that the said four boys, viz: Abraham, William, Matthew and Cornelius. have the full possession of each of these parts of the land before mentioned, and in manner aforesaid. Item—It is my will and I do hereby order that the profits arising from the sawmill, now agoing on the forementioned premises, be equally divided, that is to-say, one equal half to my oldest son Matthew and the other half to my executors until my oldest son's son Matthew, comes to the full age of twenty-one years, and to return to my said grandson Abraham, son of Item—I give and bequeath to my son Abraham, his Matthew. heirs and assigns forever all that certain tract of land supposed to contain two hundred and fifty acres, now in my possession and to stand divided by certain line of division, lately made and run by an actual survey, as a certain deed of conveyance which I gave to my son Cornelius, for the tract of land he now liveth on, bearing date the twenty sixth day of December, 1758, with the grist mills, houses, barns, privileges thereunto belonging, when he comes to the full age of twenty-one years, excepting

the privilege before given to my loving wife Antia. Item-It is my will and I do hereby order that my said son Abraham, his heirs, executors, administrators, pay to his three sisters, viz: Phidia the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds at three years after he gets possession of the land and premises before given to him; and to his sister Antia, the like sum of money, and that at two years after the first payment; and to his sister Neilta, ye said sum of money, and two years after the second payment, all money eight shillings to the pound. Item-I give and bequeath to my two sons Cornelius and Abraham, their heirs and assigns forever, all their two certain tracts of land, on the Society, so called, viz: That tract whereon John Thomas now liveth, and the other tract of land I bought of Abraham De-Witt, to be equally divided between them according to quantity and quality. Item-I give to my daughter Margaret and to her husband Herman Rulifson, during their natural life, the tract of land whereon they now live, and after their decease, my will is that it be equally divided between my daughter Margaret's children, their heirs and assigns, as their property forever. Item-I give to my daughter Neilta, to her heirs and assigns forever, all that certain tract of land along the Society, lying and being in the place commonly called the "hole," being the tract of land lately in the possession of Christian Vroom, containing two hundred and eighty acres of land. Item-It is my will that if my son Abraham should die under age without issue, that then his part or portion to be equally divided among all my children.

ITEM—It is my will that if any of my grandchildren, that is to say the children of my son Matthew, should die under age without issue, that then their portion to be equally divided among the survivors of such children, to be their property forever. Item—It is my will, and I do nereby order that all my rights in the Elizabethtown purchases, when they shall claim their rights and come to a division, I say all land as may fall to my share, shall be equally divided among all my children, except all such land which is already given away, that may fall in the said purchase, shall not be subject to any other division, only with this consideration, that my son Matthew Van Horne, my daughter Antia, and my daughter Phidia, shall have so much more than an equal division, as make up their share or

part, as my son Cornelius and my son Abraham, and my daughter Neilta, which I have already given them of the lands which I expect will fall within the said purchase.

And lastly, I do constitute, nominate and appoint my well beloved son Cornelius, my loving son Abraham, and my son-in-law Tobias Ten Eyek, my true and trusty executors of this my last Will and Testament, and I do hereby utterly disavow, revoke, disannul, all and every former or other wills, testaments, by me in any manner of ways before this named; and I do hereby confirm this and no other, to be my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty-ninth day of December, anno Domini, 1758.

Of his family we have the history and records of but two, viz: Matthew No. 30 and Abram No 32, which families we will trace.

Matthew Van Horne No. 30, and oldest son of Abram No. 14, married Nelly Crum. They had ten children, viz: Abram No. 39, William No. 40, Matthew No. 41, Cornelius No. 42, Thomas No. 43, Nellie No. 44, Anna No. 45, Henry No. 46, John No. 47, Ruluf No. 48. It will be observed by the above Will of his father Abram, that he was his oldest son, and on account of his dissipated habits his portion of the estate of his father was left to his four oldest children. Abram No. 39 the oldest, remained on the homestead with Matthew No. 41.

William No. 40, married Margaret Thomassen and afterward went to Canada. Their children were named Abram No. 49, married Elizabeth Hedrick, John No. 50, William No. 51, Matthew No. 52, Mary No. 53, married

A. Mansfield, Elizabeth No. 54 married A. Anderson—six children in all.

Cornelius Van Horne No. 42, born May 10, 1745, son of Matthew No. 30, when of age (21) emigrated to Montgomery Co., New York. He was the fourth son of Matthew No. 30. He hired out to Philip Frederick who owned a grist and sawmill on the Schoharie Creek, about five miles above its entrance into the Mohawk River, and the next year married his daughter Eve, and located on the opposite side of the creek, in the town of Glen, where after a few years his mother, who was Nelly Crum, and six of the children came and grew up and His mother spent her remaining days with him and they were buried in the Van Horne burial grounds, having large stones for himself, his wife, his mother and his brother Ruluf. Their dates will be given in the record accompanying this history. His children are named here:

He afterwards moved to Van Hornsville and after bringing his family up he moved to Schuyler's Lake near Richfield Springs, N. Y. The following are their children: Mathias No. 63, Eve No. 64, Leah No. 65, Philip No. 66, Sophia No. 67, Elenor No. 63, Anna No. 69, Cornelius No. 70, Magdalene No. 71, Elizabeth No. 72, Abram No. 73, Thomas No. 74, Mary No. 75, Francis No. 76.

Nelly No. 44, married Martinus Cline, and lived one mile down the Schoharie Creek from Frederick's Mills, in Florida. They had seven children, viz: Christian No. 77, Nelly No. 78, John No. 79, William No. 80, Anna No. 81, Lechia No. 82, Cornelius No. 83.

Nelly No. 45, married Abram Carhart and lived at White House, N. J. Of her we have no record.

Henry No. 46, married Sophia Fernicrook at the Schoharie Creek. The following are their children: Mathias No. 84, Christopher No. 85, Henry No. 86, Eve No. 87, Catharine No. 88, Hannah No. 89, Maria No. 90.

John No. 47, married Sally Everet. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, and served seven years, was at the surrender of Burgoyne and also of Lord Cornwallis. His brother's Cornelius, Thomas and Henry were all Minute Men in Montgomery Co., and took part in the battle of Oriskany in central New York. Here ends the rehearsal of the children of Matthew No. 30, and Nelly Van Horne, as far as we have statistics.

Abram Van Horne No. 32, son of Abram No. 14, brother of Capt. Cornelius. He was born at White House, New Jersey in 1740, and married Girtrude Wycoff in 1761. They had five children, viz: Matthew No. 91,

Abram No. 92, Elizabeth No. 93, Anna No. 94, Cornelius No. 95.

Matthew No. 91, married Brackie Rosabom and second Miss Electa; no record.

Abram No. 92, born 1767, at White House, N. J. was a student and studied Theology under Dr. Livingston at Queens College. He was Commissary in Washington's army. He married a lady and heiress of New Jersey, in 1785, and commenced his ministry of the Gospel at Esopus, N. Y., on the Hudson River. In a few years he was called by the Dutch Reformed Church of Fonda, Montgomery Co., N. Y., which position as Pastor he held for thirty-eight years. He was a man of great ability and extensive knowledge. During his Pastorate occurred the transition from the Dutch to the English langauge of the church services, Mr. Van Horne officiated in both languages. During his Pastorate the growth of the population in the Mohawk Valley is indicated by the formation of four new churches, in parts of the district over which his congregation was at first scattered. church records show that during his ministry he performed there fifteen hundred marriages and over two thousand three hundred baptisms. After retiring from his pastorate in 1833, he continued to live at Caughnawaga until his death in 1840, at the ripe age of seventyfive years and was buried among those he loved and served so long and faithfully. He had nine children, four sons and five daughters, viz: Mary No. 96, Gitty No. 97, Catharine No. 98, Anna No. 99, Nelly No. 100, Cornelius No. 101, Abram No. 102, William No. 103, and Matthew No. 104. Of these his son Abram's No. 102 son, G. H. F. Van Horne and his two sons Abram and John S. Van Horne, still reside at Fonda, also one daughter Hannah Jane.

Elizabeth No. 93 married William Van Horne, son of Cornelius No. 24, and grandson of Capt. Cornelius and Hannah Sebrook. Of this family we have no record.

Anna No. 94, married Abram Broadhead, also no record.

Cornelius No. 95, married Polly Suydam, they kept the old homestead and had six sons, viz: Jacob Suydam No. 105, Abram No. 106, Cornelius No. 107, Simon Wycoff No. 103, John Livingston No. 109, William Johnson No. 110.

Thus closes the history of Cornelius No. 31 and Abram No. 32. We have no records of Cornelius and the six daughters.

TRUST IN GOD.

When the joys of youth are o'er,
Faded to return no more,
When our path hath darker grown,
And our hearts are sad and lone,
When no kindred smile we see—
Father! we will trust in Thee.

When the storm cloud darkly grows And the lurid lightning glows, When no earthly voice we hear In the midnight tempest drear, And no look of love we, see—Father! we will trust in Thee.

When our friends become ingrate, And our hearth is desolate; When are fled the joys we knew Transient as the summer dew, When no dawning light we see, Father! we will trust in Thee.

When our locks are thin and white And fading eyes fortell the night, When our brow is farrowed o'er And we near the parting shore, When the vale of death we see, Father! we will trust in Thee.

The design of the compiler of this Family History is to preserve for future generations the letters, documents and correspondence which has come into his possession by the agitation of claims to the Van Horne heirship to the ninety-nine year lease of a tract of land adjoining the Trinity Church estate in New York. It was leased by Abram Van Horne in the last quarter of the last century, to the corporation of New York Province, and has now expired. They were also heirs to the Lord Waldron grant of 27,000 acres of Harlem Flats, and another heirship through Wolford Webber's great estate in Holland.

The above correspondence extends over a period of two and a half centuries, and of necessity is but a meagre history of the family, as each generation by marriage and increase must be dropped to carry down a certain branch of the name to the present tenth generation. In regard to the above mentioned fortunes, it is proper to state as a conclusion to the great excitement, that the ninety-nine year lease could not be found when the time had expired for its redemption. Although parties now living have seen and read it as fastened in the family Bible, which has probably been destroyed by parties whose interest was involved in its maturity.

The Lord Waldron grant being marshy meadows, was finally sold for taxes and thereby the title was lost to the heirs. The Webber estate in Holland created so much excitement that the Secretary of State at Washington instituted an inquiry of the Holland authorities, in regard to this claim, which resulted in the statement that the Holland Government, some thirty years prior, had adver-

against the government. After which the claims not being presented became confiscated. This proceeding was published in the Philadelphia Times and proved as a bomb shell bursting, and a thousand air castles flew up in the air as feathers and again returned to earth as mother dust. Since that date fortune is found in the hand of the diligent only. As industry and economy are the handmaids of prosperity.

The writer has visited New Amsterdam where the pioneer Jan Corneliessen Van Horne reared his family, then only a village and now the seat of Commerce and Empire City of the United States. We have visited the sacred landmark, the first Reformed Dutch Church, and found the records of the marriages of their children and also the records of their baptism, the consecration or giving back to God His most gracious gift to us, our children, to his protecting Providence. We can trace them down the centuries to the present generations and feel the spirit of the Almighty still breathing over the generations as they have descended from father to son, and may exclaim with the Psalmist: "Blessed are all they that put their trust in the Lord." We have also visited the pioneer home-of Cornelius No. 11 and Abram Van Horne No. 14, the labors of whose hands have not all yet passed away. We have slept in the old White House which gave the name to the present beautiful village near by. It is shingled down to the ground and is two stories high with two front rooms and a hall between running back to an offdock and also a wing with The doors are double and rooms low. A quaint structure indeed, with its steep gable roof. We have quenched our thirst from the old oaken bucket that descended in the well that he built, by its front door.

We visited the church-yard and stood by the graves of the departed generations, and saw the records of births and baptisms and marriages, and thought of the happy childhood, the sturdy youth and manhood and the evening twilight that preceded their journey to the mansions promised to the faithful. We trace some of their children to their pioneer home in Central New York, then a dense wilderness, but later proved a fertile, healthy and prosperous country, and many Van Horne families grew up in Montgomery Co. The writer still remembers when a child, of standing by the huge fireplace with its burning back-log, its and-irons, crane, pothooks and trammels, its bake kettle with burning coals on its lid, potatoes roasting in the ashes and apples roasting on a ledge of brick, and the big oven to bake bread and pies. At one side the fire-place, the old round table turned up against the wall, the frame making a convenient The corner cupboard and its primitive shelves of crockery and pewter dishes, the captrosh under the stairs where maple sugar and preserves were carefully stored away as luxuries, and last but not least the slawbunk that let down at night for us to sleep in, without any danger of falling out in our dreams. Then too, we heard the hum of the great and buzz of the little wheel. large one spinning the hand carded fleecy wool and deft hands knit our stockings and mittens or the stout, clumsy loom produced the gay colored coverlet and pressed cloth for the garb of women and children, or the butternut brown or black homespun for men's wear. wheel mainly drew from the twirling distaff of flax the thread that should make the fine twined linen, the glory and pride of mistress and maiden, who could show her handiwork in piles of sheets, table cloths and garments upon which was often lavished garniture of curious needlework, hemstitch, heringbone and lace stitch. Plaid linsey woolsey and linen wear, were two fields for taste to disport in. While the patient and careful toil must not go unchronicled, that from the wrecks of old and worn out clothing was produced wondrous resurrection in the hit or miss or striped rag carpet, an accessory of so much comfort, so much endurance, and often so great beauty.

Truly diligence was written on the pioneer's path, and the reward of industry has fallen on succeeding generations. Such was the past, the present we know. modes of life, in dress and equipage, in social and political habits, in locomotion, in comforts, commerce and aims one need not draw the contrast, for more wide and striking it scarce could be. We also remember the hard struggle of the husbandman to provide food and shelter and protection in a wilderness, to fell the giant trees, clear the land, build houses and barns, without suitable implements, was a giant task of many years. Not until the year eighteen hundred could be seen a very large portion of the progress in civilization, made by our race. In 1807 one might have seen Fulton's steamboat Clermont, on her trial trip up the Hudson. In 1820 one might have found the first iron plow. In 1830 he might have traveled on the first passenger car, and to-day across the continent is but a few days pleasure trip. In 1833 we might have seen the first matches, previous to that the tinderbox, flint and steel were relied on for fire. 1838 the first steamboat crossed the Atlantic. the first telegraph message was sent, and 36 years after 604,000 miles of line were in active service. We remember the first coal used for fuel and kerosene oil for light, previous to which the tallow dip was employed, and now the beautiful lamp, the brilliant gas gauge and lastly light without fire, produced by friction—the electric light, whose rays dazzle the eye as the sunbeam, and what shall we say of the sewing machine to assist the matron, and the reversible sulky plow, the horse hoe, the mowing machine, horserake, reaper and binder, horsefork, and the threshing machine and elevator. Also a convenient set of tools to make the tilling of the soil a source of pleasure, and supplies the necessaries of life to the artisan mechanic, manufacturer, merchant, millionaire, statesman, philosopher; and lastly the heralds of literature and the gospel of peace in the world. One becomes amazed at the stride history brings before us during the two and one-half centuries this family history covers, and especially during the last half century. Many are not aware that we are living in extraordinary times, and that these years of peaceful prosperity, in which we are quietly developing this continent, are the pivot on which is turning the Nation's future. And fewer still imagine that the destiny of nations for centuries to come, can be seriously moulded for good or evil by the men of this present generation, but no generation appreciates its own place in history.

Every race that has impressed itself on the world's history has developed some peculiar ideas. Egyptians cultivated the ideal life. The Persians cultivated principles of light. The Greeks beauty and the Romans law. Our Anglo-Saxons are the representatives of two great ideas which are closely related, one of them is civil liberty. Nearly all the civil liberty in the world is enjoyed by the Anglo-Saxons, the English and British colonies, and the United States. They strongly hold the idea and recognize the right of the individual to himself, and to formally declare it the foundation of civil government. The other great idea of which the Anglo-Saxon

is the exponent is that of a pure spiritual Christianity. It was no accident that the great reformation of the sixteenth century originated among a Teutonic, rather than a Latin people. It was the fire of liberty in the Saxon heart that flamed up against absoluteism of monarch and priest.

It was liberty of conscience that drove the Hollanders and Puritans from European tyranny. So that the individual heart communed with God and obeyed his Holy word and is now actively sending it over the whole earth, as a witness that the day is at hand when the dominion of sin must be destroyed by the coming presence of the Lord of glory. We have seen God's word conveyed to almost every nation of the earth, during the last half century, and the call increases for us to come and help them.

We are living, we are dwelling, in a grand and awful time. In an age on ages telling, to be living is sublime.

To live and take part in the progress that now surrounds us is truly blessed. And the Word that has been the guide of youth, the strength of manhood and the peace of declining years, is the guiding star of generations. As the generations of the family herein recorded are but as a drop of water to the ocean, or a grain of sand to the seashore, yet they fill their place in its time and their destinies are eternal. Therefore, whatsoever our hands find to do let us do it with our might, for there is no wisdom, nor knowledge, nor device in the land whither we are all hastening.
