

EXPLANATION.

Each individual is numbered in order of birth from 1 up, and to this number is prefixed the number of all his ancestors in order of each ancestor's birth. For instance Nathaniel's number: he is third child of Asahel, therefore 3 is his number. Asahel is third child of Samuel so 3 is prefixed; Samuel is the sixth child of James so 6 is prefixed; James is the sixth child of Benjamin so 6 is again prefixed; Benjamin is the fourth child of Benjamin so 4 is prefixed and Benjamin is the third son of Walter so 3 is prefixed, making Nathaniel's number 3-4-6-6-3-3. These numbers show Nathaniel's number in order of his birth, his father, his grandfather, his great grandfather, and back to Walter, who came from Kent Co., England, 1635.

Nathaniel is the third child of the third child of the sixth child of the sixth child of the fourth child of the third child of Walter, who landed in Scituate, Mass., in 1635.

WALTER WOODWORTH came from Kent Co., England, to Scituate, Mass., 1635. Was assigned the third lot on Kent St., which runs along the ocean front, at the corner of Meeting House Lane, and there he built a house. In that year he owned other land, a tract on the First Herring Brook not far below Stockbridge Mill, where afterwards stood the residence of the poet Samuel Woodworth, and another tract on Walnut Tree Hill, just west of the present Greenbush or South Scituate R. R. Station, which was in early times called Walter Woodworth's Hill, and in 1666 he became a purchaser of sixty acres at Weymouth. In 1640 Walter was assessed nine shillings for the public use, and March 2, 1641, freeman; and in June 4, 1645, he was appointed surveyor of highways in Scituate, and again in 1646 and 1656. His name appears frequently on the town records of Scituate as juror, etc. In 1654 he was a member of the First Church, which ordained Charles Chauncy as their minister.

Extract from will of Walter Woodward of Scituate of New Plymouth, in New England. (Plymouth Co. Probate.)

I give and bequeath unto Thomas Woodward, my oldest son, upland containing acres lying in Scituate.

To my two sons Thomas and Joseph acres of marsh land to

be equally divided between them which lyeth in Scituate. To Thomas Woodward, my son, one-third part of all my land at Seconet which I purchased. The other two-thirds to Benjamin and Isaac Woodward to be equally divided between them excepting 25 acres of which I do give to my son Joseph. Ten acres of which I do give to my daughter Martha of which two quantities of land are to be deducted out of the two-thirds of my land lying at Seconet given to my sons Benjamin and Isaac aforesaid. All the rest of my land at Seconet which is yet to be purchased I give unto my two sons Thomas and Joseph Woodward to be equally divided between them.

I give to Benjamin my son, my dwelling house, barn and other out housing, with all my land both upland and marsh land; 20 acres of upland, six acres of marsh land, the commons and privileges thereunto belonging. Benjamin to pay seventy pounds unto my son Joseph and my six daughters, Sarah, Elizabeth, Mary, Martha, Mehitable and Abigail ten pounds apiece. Benjamin to allow my two daughters Mehitable and Abigail the lower room or parlor at the northeasterly end of my dwelling house for their use during the time that they live unmarried.

I give and bequeath to my two daughters Mehitable and Abigail my feather bed with the furniture thereunto belonging and all the rest of my household goods I give unto my six daughters to be equally divided among them.

The rest of my estate undisposed of by this my last will and testament I give and bequeath to all my children, debts and funeral expenses being first paid, to be equally divided amongst them, Benjamin sole executor. And my two sons, Joseph and Thomas Woodward, overseers.

INVENTORY.

BENJAMIN WOODWORTH appeared before the court and gave oath on inventory of estate of his late father Walter Woodworth deceased March 2, 1685-6.

It will be seen that all through the will and signature it is Woodward but that Benjamin in oath of inventory spelled the name Woodworth. Part of this family kept the name of Woodward, and the others Woodworth.

This ancient name of Woodward is derived from the forest keepers, the Woodwards of the Hundred Rolls in the reign of Edward 1st.

THE ARMS USED BY THE WOODWARD FAMILY OF KENT, ENGLAND.
Richard Woodward of Woodmarsh and his son William Woodward of Ashford, Kent Co., used the old arms and crest of the family in England.

ARMS: ar. a chev. Sa. betw. three grasshoppers Vert.

CREST: A demi Woodman couped at the knees. Vested gu, hair dishevelled or in his dexter hand a honeysuckle of the ppr., stalked and leaved Vert.

(Note) Benjamin Woodworth (3) born in Scituate. In 1703 bought for 250 pounds from Phillip Smith a large tract of land in Lebanon, Ct., where many of the Scituate people settled. He moved soon after to Lebanon with his family; was admitted inhabitant Dec. 22, 1704. In deeds of lands at Lebanon he is described as Benjamin Woodworth of Little Compton, R. I.

Benjamin's (3-4) father Benjamin, is found in Lebanon, Conn. as early as 1701. Town of Lebanon, Conn. records vol. 2, page 469 says:

Moses Woodworth of Norwich, Conn. to Benjamin Woodworth of Lebanon, Conn.—5 acres—in Little Compton, Bristol Co.—colony of Massachusetts Bay,—being one-third part of a fifteen acre lot which originally was Walter Woodworth's Nov. 4, 1714.

Benjamin's farm was in the northeast part of the town. In 1714 among twenty-four signers for a new church the names of Benjamin, Ezekiel, Benjamin, Jr., Ebenezer and Mary appear. In 1716 a new church was formed called Lebanon, North Parish,

YOU being by the General Affembly of this State accepted to be Consign of the fourth Company in Fraenband in the IN Regiment in this fall.

Reposing special Trust and Considence in your Fidelity; Courage, and good Conduct, I do, by Virtue of the Laws of this State, Me thereunto enabling; appoint and impower you to take the said Company into your Care and Charge, as their Consign carefully and diligently to dicharge that Trust; exercising your inferior Officers and folders in the Use of their Arms, according to the Discipline of War: keeping them in good Order and Government, and commanding them to obey you as their Consign for the service of this state. And you are to observe all such Orders and Directions as from Time to Time you shall receive either from me, or from other your superior Officer, pursuant to the Trust hereby reposed in you.

and in 1804 this parish was cut off from Lebanon and made town of Columbia. The farm of Benjamin is now in the possession of the Kingsley family.

The will of Benjamin Woodworth of Lebanon was executed Jan. 21, 1726-7, containing legacies to his sons Benjamin, Ichabod, Ebenezer, Amos, Ezekiel and Caleb, and daughters Deborah Sprague, Hannah Walter, Ruth Fitch, Judith Newcomb, Margaret Owen and Priscilla Fuller. He disposes of his real and personal estate in Lebanon and in Town of Seconet, Mass. Bay (now R. I.), his son Benjamin executor.

Will proved June 20, 1728.

(Note) Benjamin, Sr., soldier King Philips war, lands were assigned to him in 1676 as he applied to be paid in land.

(Note) James Woodworth, Sr., (3-4-6) born Lebanon, Ct., d Columbia, Ct., was commissioned Ensign of militia Dec. 25, 1776. Was private of the continental line 1777 to 1778.

James and his two wives buried in Columbia burying ground. His wife Hannah, "Amiable and beloved consort of Ensign James" d May 1, 1765, aged 27 years.

(Note) Archives State of Conn. vol. 1776 to 1780, Dec. 25, 1776 for notice of his commission, as Ensign. Conn. Revolutionary Archives, printed by the State of Conn. under the supervision of Adj. Gen. of the State, p 179 "James Woodworth, private Capt. Edward Eells Co. Enlisted Feb. 28, 1777 for 3 yrs. Discharged April 1778."

Capt. Eells Company was a part of Col. Samuel Wylly's regiment. The regiment in part assisted in repelling the enemy at Danbury, Ct. April 26-7, 1777. Went to camp at Peekskill in May 1777 and served in Parsons First Brigade under Putnam along the Hudson, when the Brigadier took post at West Point and later began the construction of heavy works, then Fort Wyllys.

Y. where he owned a large farm (now called the Woodworth farm) and for a time at Centre Lisle, N. Y. with his son Asahel (3-4-6-6-3). Spring 1843 went with his wife to Otsego, Steuben Co., Ind. and lived with his son Barzilliel and his daughter Sally who m Levi Gates.

Lovina's mother's maiden name was Janes and came from Pitts-field, Mass. She married Wm. Babcock against her parents' wishes—(a run-away match) and her parents never forgave her. It is supposed they located in East Haddam, Conn. where Lovina was born and later m Samuel Woodworth (3-4-6-6) and located for a time at Hebron, Conn. where Samuel (3-4-6-6-2) and Asahel (3-4-6-6-3) were born. The Samuel Woodworth bible is in possession of Elizabeth Dolly, Hamilton, Steuben Co., Ind.

Lovina's (Lovina (Babcock) Woodworth) grandchild Nancy Adelia Lobdell (3-4-6-6-3-6) writing, says:—"I do not know where grandfather and grandmother went, but I remember very well the morning they started from Centre Lisle, N. Y. Brother Niles (3-4-6-6-3-1) carried them and what goods they wished to take, in a lumber wagon to Ithaca, N. Y. where they went on a boat of some kind across Cayuga Lake, then by canal as far as it would take them on their journey. It was in the month of May and I think in 1843. I well remember what grandmother said, as father (Asahel 3-4-6-3) helped her in and tucked the blanket around her. She grasped his hand and said: 'Farewell till we meet at the Judgment, I have buried my five boys. I shall never see them again,' the tears running down her cheeks and father and Niles and all of us crying too. She did not want to go I think. She died that summer."

Cabinet maker by trade. He was very industrious, working day and long into the night at his trade as cabinet maker and undertaker. He worked many nights making coffins, as in those days they were not kept in stock, and were made only as needed, so he was compelled at times, like Adam Bede, to work all night long; truly not a pleasant night's work.

He was universally respected by all who knew him,—"an honest man, the noblest work of God." In his younger days he was straight as an Indian. As age advanced he became somewhat bowed, but enjoyed very good health, never being confined to his bed except in his last sickness. Rosander F. Lobdell enlisted at Lisle, Broome Co., New York, the 25th day of April, 1861. The company that he joined was organized at Binghamton, N. Y. with Peter Jay, captain. The company was ordered to Elmira, N. Y. and made a part of the 27th regiment, and was Company F, N. Y. Infantry, H. W. Slocum of Syracuse, colonel. Mr. Lobdell was in the first battle of Bull Run, July 21, 1861. It was his regiment that broke the Rebel line near the Stone house and it is said, had the brigade supported them, the history of that battle would have been a victory for the Union Army. His company was the last to leave the field in good order. Col. Slocum was wounded and taken to Washington, D. C. and later was made a general and his (Mr. Lobdell's) company assigned to his brigade. In the spring of 1862 he went to Yorktown, Va. with McClellan; was in the second Bull Run battle; in the battle of West Point, Va., and the seven days battle before Richmond; the Maryland campaign, and the battles of South Mountain and Antietam.

His second enlistment was Company E, 50th regiment, N. Y. Engineers. He was an artificer and assigned to the 6th corps. The regiment had charge of the pontoon bridges of the army;

also the fortifications of the army. He went through the Grant campaign from the wilderness to the Appomattox to the surrender of Gen. Lee; went with Sheridan to North Carolina to head off Johnson who surrendered to Sherman before they reached him; marched back to Washington, D. C.; was reviewed by President Johnson and discharged at Fort Barry, Va., June 15, 1865.

THE OLD OAKEN BUCKET.

How dear to this heart are the scenes of my childhood. When fond recollection presents them to view. The orchard, the meadow, the deep tangled wildwood, And every loved spot which my infancy knew; The wide spreading pond and the mill that stood near it, The bridge and the rock where the cataract fell; The cot of my father, the dairy house nigh it, And e'en the rude bucket which hung in the well. The old oaken bucket, the iron bound bucket The moss covered bucket which hung in the well.

The moss covered vessel, I hail as a treasure;

I found it the source of an exquisite pleasure,

And now, far removed from the loved situation,
The tears of regret will intrusively swell,
As fancy reverts to my father's plantation,
And sighs for the bucket which hung in the well;
The old oaken bucket, the iron bound bucket,
The moss covered bucket, which hung in the well.

He wrote other poems which Scribner & Co., of New York published in book form.

He and N. P. Willis published the "New York Mirror." His old home at Scituate, Mass., is in possession of the Northey family, a short distance from the R. R. station. It is said the old oaken bucket, having been displaced by more modern improve-

ments, went into the hands of Rev. Daniel Wright of South Scituate, Mass., who died in South Natick, Mass.

This Genealogy, also Hyde Genealogy shows that James Woodworth (3-4-6) married Mehitable Hyde referred to above.

It may interest some to know that Mehitable (9) daughter of Walter of Scituate, Mass., was unfortunate as to her health. She was afflicted with some nervous disorder which in those superstitious days was synonymous with being "possessed with the devil;" in other words she was under the influence of witchcraft and Mary Ingham was charged with being the witch. On Mar. 6, 1676 she was indicted in the following language:—

Mary Ingham, thou art indicted by the name of Mary Ingham of the town of Scituate, in the Jurisdiction of New Plymouth, for that, thou, having not the fear of God before thine eyes, hast by the help of the devil in a witchcraft or sorcery, maliciously procured much hurt, mischief and pains unto the body of Mehitabel Woodworth, the daughter of Walter Woodworth of Scituate,

aforesaid, and some others; particularly causing her, the said Mehitabel to fall into violent fits, and causing great pains unto several parts of her body, at several times so as she, the said Mehitabel Woodworth hath almost been bereft of her senses and hath greatly languished to her much suffering thereby, and the procuring of great grief, sorrow and charge to her parents—all which thou hast procured and done against the law of God and to His great dishonor, and contrary to our Sovereign Lord the King, His Crown and dignity.

Mary was tried and acquitted and thus an end was put to the nonsense of witchcraft in the town of Scituate.

Solomon Woodworth is described in Stone's "Life of Brant," pages 68 and 69.

"Among the prisoners taken by the Tories who two years before had returned from Canada for their families, and who had most unaccountably been suffered to depart unmolested, was a very brave fellow by the name of Solomon Woodworth. He was intrusted to a party of Indians acting in concert with the Tories on their arrival at the Sacondaga, from whom he effected his escape on the following day. These Indians it appeared, mortified at his successful flight, had resolved, either upon his recapture or his destruction. Woodworth, in the winter or spring of 1780, was occupying, alone, a block house situated about eight miles north of Johnstown. While thus solitary, his castle was attacked in the dead of night by a small party of Indians, who set fire to it. Regardless of danger, however, he ran out amidst a shower of bullets, extinguished the fire, and retreated within the walls again before the Indians, who had withdrawn some distance from the block house could re-approach sufficiently near to seize him. As the night was not very dark, Woodworth saw a group of the savages through the port holes, upon whom he fired not without effect, one of their number as it subsequently appeared, being severely wounded. This disaster caused the Indians to retire. But Woodworth was not satisfied. Collecting half a dozen kindred spirits, the next morning, he gave chase to the intruders and, after following their trail three days, overtook them-they having halted to dress the wound of their companion. The pursuers came so suddenly upon them, as to succeed in dispatching the whole number without allowing them time to offer resistance. The little band returned to Johnstown in triumph;

and their leader was immediately commissioned a lieutenant in a regiment of nine months men, in which service he had again an opportunity of showing his prowess, as will be seen hereafter.

He was commissioned a captain, for the purpose of raising a company of rangers to traverse the wooded country north of Fort Dayton, and the German Flats. He succeeded in enlisting a company of forty brave and kindred spirits; at the head of whom, well armed and provided, he marched from Fort Dayton, striking in the direction of the Royal Grand for purposes of observation. After a few hours march, one of Woodworth's men, being a short distance in advance, discovered an Indian, evidently in ambuscade, upon whom he immediately fired. Instantly the forest resounded with the war-whoop, and Woodworth with his little band was surrounded by double his own number. A furious and bloody engagement followed, in which the Rangers and Indians fought hand to hand with great desperation; and for the numbers engaged there was cruel slaughter. A fiercer engagement probably did not occur during the war. Woodworth fell dead. The savages were victors; and of the Rangers only fifteen escaped to tell the melancholy fate of their comrades. Several were taken captives and subsequently exchanged.

Descendants of James Woodworth, (3-4-6) and his grand-father Benjamin, (3-4) are entitled to membership in Society of Colonial Wars and Sons or Daughters of the Revolution. Benjamin (3) and Benjamin (3-4) were in King Philips war and James (3-4-6) in the Revolutionary War.

Bodge's "King Philip's War" describes Benjamin (3) of Scituate, Mass. and Benjamin (3-4) of Lebanon, Conn., as serving in the Colonial wars.

The photographs in this book show the signatures of six generations—all the generations, (except the two Benjamins) back to Walter who landed in Scituate, Mass. in 1635.

Chauncy C. Woodworth, the Rochester, N. Y. perfumer, Artimus B. Woodworth, of Lowell, Mass.; his brothers E. B. Woodworth and Albert B. Woodworth, the extensive wholesale grocers of Concord, N. H. are descendants of Ebenezer (3-6).

William Woodworth is the inventor of the Woodworth Cylinder Planing Machine.
