INTRODUCTION TO THIRD EDITION

JOSEPH Ware, the Immigrant, came to this country from Monmouthshire, Wales, in 1675, as a member of John Fenwick's Colony. They settled in southwestern New Jersey along the Delaware River in what are now Salem and Cumberland Counties.

Personal knowledge and all available records indicate that Joseph's first descendant to settle in Florida was Lambert Milbank Ware, one of the seventh generation in direct line of descent. Lambert settled on St. Andrew Bay, Florida in 1880, and was followed in less than three years by two brothers and a sister.

This limited edition of the *Descendants of Joseph Ware* is a revision of the Second Edition of 1922, which was an updating of the original published in 1891. The first two editions were compiled principally to trace one direct line from Joseph — that of Maskell Ware. As its subtitle suggests, this edition is an attempt to trace and record all collateral descendants of Joseph in Florida. It may therefore be correctly inferred that none of these editions is comprehensive or all-inclusive. To list all of Joseph's descendants through the tenth generation would indeed produce a monumental volume.

The writer, being well aware of his own limitations of time, energy, and resources, intentionally directed his inquiries and research to the Wares of Florida. To have attempted such research on a nationwide scale would have gone far beyond his capabilities. To the end, therefore, of tracing all of Joseph's descendants of Florida, some two hundred and seventy-five letters seeking information were mailed. Of this number, many were returned as unclaimed, address unknown, deceased, or for others of the many reasons listed by the postal service. Of the replies received, many indicated there was no known connection with the original Joseph, while a still smaller number clearly established relationship and thus provided useful information.

Certain Bible records, grave markers, and the 1882 diary of Francis Hand Ware were sought and used to help fill in the gaps. Along the research trail information on certain of Joseph's out-of-state descendants was received by the writer. Naturally, this information was welcomed and the names of such descendants were proudly included along with the others.

The writer was extremely fortunate that certain family records and books were handed down to him by an elderly cousin, Caroline Ware Bushfield, of Stanton, N. J. Without these, it is certain that this revision could never have been completed, if indeed it would ever have been started. Because of her foresight and the interest of a few who graciously answered the writer's inquiries, this revision was made possible.

This first effort has proven to the writer that genealogical research can be at once a very rewarding yet frustrating endeavor — much like a jig-saw puzzle. The rewards, for the most part, are in the friendships formed and in the personal satisfaction of accomplishment.

The frustrations, in general, lie in the missing links and the dead-end trails, occasioned to no small degree by the sheer indifference of the majority to their genealogical background. The writer is of the opinion that almost everyone enjoys thumbing through a book tracing his genealogical line and, moreover, swells with pride when his own name appears. Yet only a few care enough to answer a letter and provide the information necessary to make the foregoing possible. It is to these few that the writer is deeply indebted.

It will be noted by owners of the Second Edition of *Descendants of Joseph Ware* that the only omission herein are the two pages setting forth the direct line of descent from Joseph to Maskell Ware. Inasmuch as this Third Edition was broadened in scope to include other collateral lines, this section was considered superfluous, if not inappropriate. Nothing else was changed, except in those rare instances where obvious errors were disclosed or where additional relevant material was provided.

This revision therefore consists of additions and insertions in the appropriate generations, and without doubt appears as a rather disorganized work. Nevertheless, apart from the exceptions noted above, the writer has not taken the liberty to edit or significantly modify the painstaking work of his predecessors. In order to facilitate tracing a particular name or line, however, an index has been added.

If it appears to the reader that certain individuals were given more coverage than others, please be assured that it was unintentional, with two exceptions. The information on Lambert Milbank Ware, presumed to have been the first descendant of Joseph in Florida, includes a biographical sketch and a eulogy taken from a contemporary newspaper shortly after his death. A biographical sketch of John Haines Ware, Jr., the first of his line to reside in Florida, is also included. All other information was placed in this volume just as it was provided. Neither has there been any attempt to aggrandize any member of the Ware family. Every effort was made to verify all additions to this edition, including the biographical sketches and all items in Leaves from the Florida Branch.

The numerical key provides a fast and easy method of tracing a direct line of descent back to Joseph, the Immigrant. In this connection, it will be noted that the names of the principals of each generation, both male and female, have been listed in bold-faced capital letters beneath a bold-faced numeral. The names of their children preceded by a numeral follow, both in regular type. In those instances where the records clearly indicated that the offspring did not reach majority or did not marry, no numeral was assigned to this child. His particular line therefore stopped with him, and he was not carried over as a principal into the next generation.

To trace one's lineage back to Joseph, the Immigrant, a descendant whose line is included in this book simply finds his name or that of a known direct ancestor in the index. Referring to the appropriate page, one notes the numeral in front of or above the name in question. In tracing any particular branch, one is advised to start with the

smaller numeral preceding his name as it appears as a child. For example: In the 10th generation, No. 830, Amy Louise Cooper, is the child of No. 682, Jacquelyn Ware Murray. Referring to the 9th generation, one finds that No. 682 is the child of No. 512, Helen Catherine Ware. Turning to the 8th generation, No. 512 is found to be the daughter of No. 315, Charles Burton Ware, and so on back to Joseph, the Immigrant. In like manner, any other included line may be traced back to its origin in this country.

The writer and compiler is particularly indebted to Caroline Ware Bushfield, who died July 3, 1966, in her 96th year; to her son, the late George Irving Bushfield, both of Stanton, N. J.; and to Mrs. Willard M. Ware, Miami Beach, Florida. He is also indebted to Mrs. Mary E. Cave, St. Petersburg, Mrs. Leo M. Mozley, Newton F. Ware, and Clarence L. Ware, Panama City, all residents of Florida. With all due credit and appreciation to these gracious contributors, the responsibility for any errors or omissions remains with the writer and compiler.

FOREWORD TO SECOND EDITION

FOR several years Arthur Melville Ware, of Wayne, Pa., had planned to re-edit and bring up to date this "Genealogy of the Descendants of Joseph Ware," but pressure of business had prevented him from giving the time he knew the work would require. It was not until the summer of 1921 that, having so arranged his affairs as to secure more leisure, he began to collect the material to make the genealogy complete. The extent of the new matter compiled by Mr. Ware may be known when it is considered that in the earlier edition only 180 direct descendants were recorded, while the present edition includes the records of over 500.

On New Year's Day, 1922, the revision having been completed to his satisfaction, Mr. Ware wrote the "Preface to the Second Edition," which appears in this volume, and a few days afterward handed the manuscript to the printer. Before the book could be put into type Mr. Ware died suddenly, on March 20, 1922, at Flemington, N. J., where he was visiting his daughter, Mrs. A. S. Case. He did not have the satisfaction of seeing even the proof sheets of the book to which he had given so much of his time, and in the publication and distribution of which he had anticipated so much pleasure.

As it goes out to the "Descendants of Joseph Ware," for whom it is intended, we feel that the book, aside from its intrinsic interest to these persons, will also appeal to them as a memorial of him whose kindly thought and peculiar abilities made possible this little volume.

PREFACE TO SECOND EDITION

It has been thirty years since the first edition of this book has been published, and during the past year we have been gathering statistics from every branch of the family known to us. With this assistance, received from every section of the country, we are glad to be able to bring the records of so many of our family down to the present day. The first edition recorded 180 direct descendants. We now give records for over 500. Ten generations are represented.

The original drawing from which the frontispiece was produced is in the writer's possession. It is 14 x 20 inches and was made by the celebrated portrait artist, Aug. Tholey, of Philadelphia. The photographs were collected and arranged by I. D. Ware. At the same time, Gutekunst, the photographer, produced 100 photogravure copies from the original, full size, and they are now in the possession of members of the family, and, as no surplus copies are to be had, each year they become more valuable to preserve.

In September, 1858, I. D. Ware, the father of the writer, had a home gathering of the Maskell Ware family at the old homestead in Roadstown, at which about three hundred relatives, neighbors and State dignitaries helped to make it a great community event.

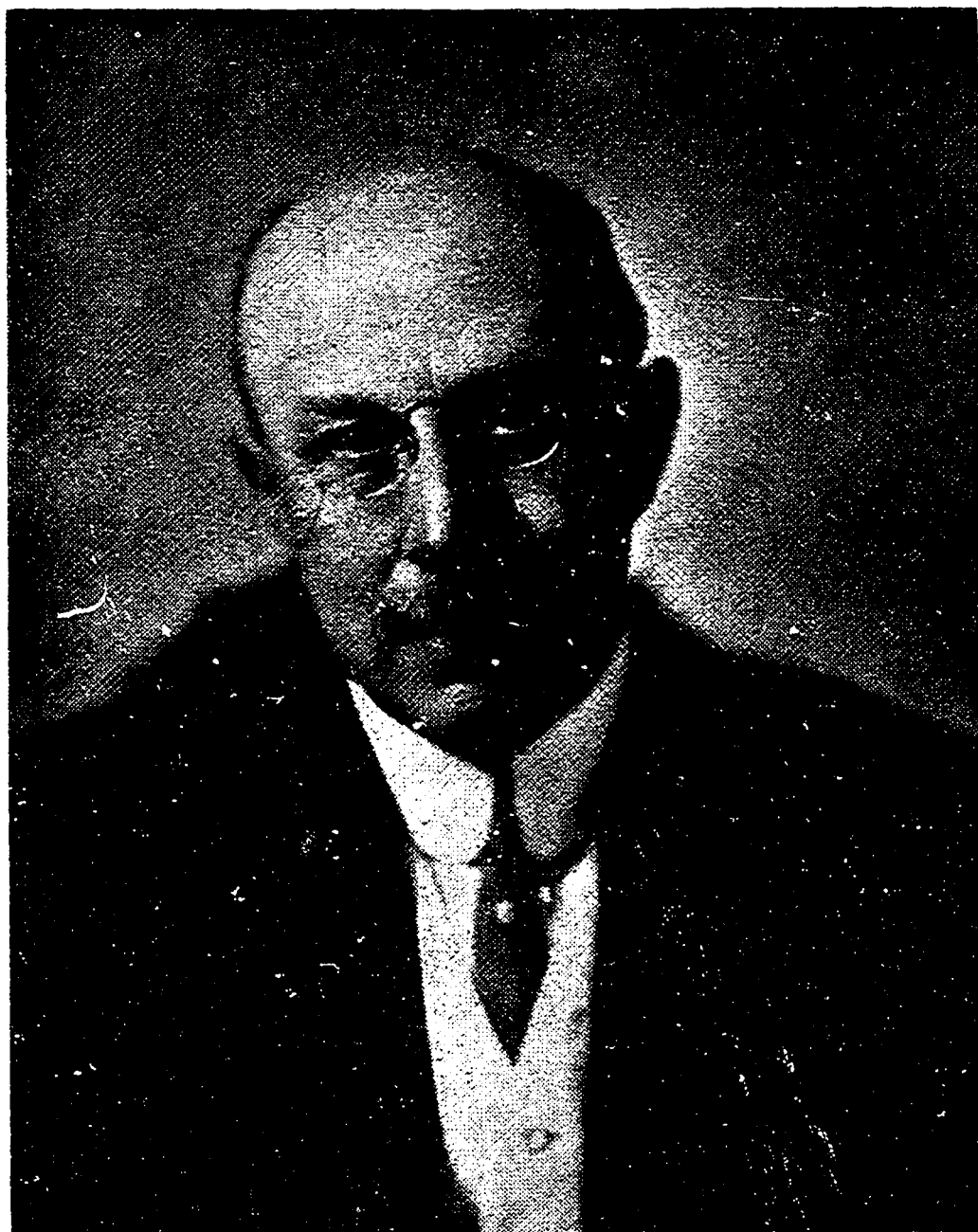

She died the following year. I still possess the little cap I wore on that occasion. It was made by hand from a silk skirt that was part of my mother's wedding outfit.

PREFACE TO FIRST EDITION

IT has been more than thirteen years since the writer began the difficult task of compiling these records—difficult because in most cases such family records as may have been kept were lost beyond recovery. In this connection it may be said that it is inexplicable that none of the grandsons of Elnathan Ware have preserved any record of his birth and death, and inquiries and searches in every direction have been utterly in vain. The old books at Trenton contain no will of his making, and the only thing to reward a long search there was the curious document filed just before his marriage, which appears in its proper place in the following pages. It is, perhaps, scarcely necessary to say that the greatest care has been exercised in this work. In doubtful cases, wherever possible, the original sources of information were visited and carefully examined—Books of Wills, of Marriage Licenses, of Executors and Administrators, of Guardians, and of Court Records. The records of the Friends at Salem—now more than two hundred years old—with various time-stained paper in the keeping of Thomas Shourds, have been very helpful; indeed, it may be said that but for the old books of the Friends, the early history of the Ware family in West New Jersey would be much like the tale of the Three Men of Gotham.

Thanks are due to Thomas Shourds for valuable suggestions and help received at different times, and it is due to him to say that some portions of this record could not have been written but for his own previous researches into the records of some branches of the family. Various friends and relatives have sent their mites in the shape of fragmentary records, all of which have been factors in producing the result.

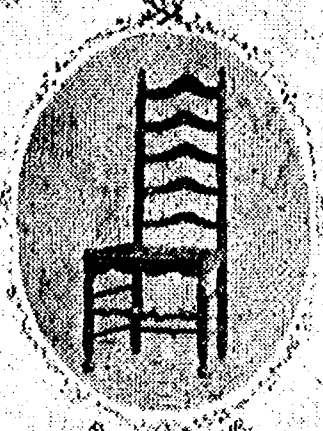
This history would have been incomplete without some special account of Maskell Ware—born 1766—a man of stern integrity and of unusual strength of character. After earnest solicitation, a paper was prepared by and appears in these pages, as the contribution of Dan Ware, Woodstown, N. J.

It has been generally supposed that the Wares of Camden were of the same family as those of Salem, Cumberland, and Cape May, but examination does not show this to be the case. A short account of that branch is given, and the defective record, so characteristic of the Ware tribes, indicates that they are neither as proud of their ancestry nor as careful of their family history as were certain more ancient tribes whose fathers bore some of the same names.

To those of the family who are interested in its history, the compiler commends this work. If it is unsatisfactory, be sparing of criticism—it was a “making of bricks without straw”—a compassing of what was called the “impossible.” There was much groping in the dark; much threading of labyrinths without clues, and the wonder is not that the work was done imperfectly, but that it was done at all.

The Old Homestead at Roadstown, N. J., in the lower right-hand corner, was built by Maskell Ware, where his children were born and raised. The high-back, rush-bottom chair was made by Maskell Ware.

Three of this set of chairs made in 1790 are still in use and in possession of the families of Dan and Richard Ware, and are in perfect condition at this date, January, 1922.

Descendants of Joseph Ware

IMMIGRANT, 1675

On the fifth day of October, 1675, a goodly company from England—principally members of the Society of Friends—disembarked from the ship “Griffith,”¹ which had brought them from their native land, with its intolerance and persecutions, to find a home in West New Jersey. The master spirit of the enterprise, and the owner of the lands included in what are now known as Salem and Cumberland Counties, was John Fenwick, from whom the Colony received its name. The landing place, being considered by Fenwick a good location for a town, was called by him New Salem.

Among those who came with Fenwick, was Joseph Ware², of Monmouthshire, Wales. Thomas Shourds, in his history and genealogy of this Colony, says that Joseph came as a “servant” to Edward Wade, but, as Smith in his history of New Jersey says that the daughters of Fenwick, Elizabeth and Anne, married two of his “servants,” Samuel Hedge and John Adams, it would seem that the servants, so-called, were simply pioneers who worked for hire, and occupied a much higher social position than those who are called servants in this day.

Be that as it may, Joseph soon became a man of importance in the Colony, and his name appears a number of times in the Court Records as a member of, and sometimes the foreman of the Grand Jury. Within a few years he had purchased of Anthony Page 250 acres of land, and of Edward Wade, 250 acres more. These lands are situated in Lower Alloways Creek, and a house built thereon by Joseph’s son, Joseph the second, in 1730, is now the residence of Thomas Shourds, whose mother was a daughter of Jacob Ware, great-grandson of Joseph the immigrant. A facsimile of a receipt for consideration money, which follows, is worth noting.

On May 30, 1683, Joseph was married to Martha Becket³, daughter of John Becket, of Essex, near Kingston, on Thames.

After his wife's death he married again and had one child—a daughter named Patience, born November 12, 1705. He died March 30, 1711. Below is given a copy of his will and inventory as filed among the old records in Trenton.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN.

I, Joseph Ware, Senior, of Alloways Creek in the County of Salem & Province of Novasarea, alias New Jersey, and in the Western Division, yeoman, being sick & weak in body but of Sound & Perfect mind, memory & Judgment, Thanks be Therefore to Almighty God for the same, calling to mind of the uncertainty of This Life & the certainty of Death do make and ordain this my Last Will & Testament in manner following, Revoking all others either Will or Testament by mee formerly made or Done.

1st. I give & bequeath my Soul into the hands of God my Creator & my body to the Earth to be Buried in a Decent manner as Executors shall think fitt.

2ly. I Give & Bequeath to my Dear & Beloved Wife Mary Ware one-third pt. of all & singular my personall estate & the new End of the house now affinishing with free corse & Recorse to the halfe seller that is under the old House and the use and bennifitt and Proffitt of the Garden Dureing her Widowhood and that my son Joseph Ware shall pay to her the sum of four pounds in money or in other pay of the Country produce at the Common Markett price yearly and every year Dureing the time that she Remaineth my Widow.

3dly. I give and bequeath to my son-in-law William Williams one 2 year old heiffer and to my son-in-law Nathaniell Williams one 2 year old heiffer, and to Sarah Williams 2 yews.

4th. I give & Bequeath to my Daughter Patience Ware 2 cows & 2 calves and one-third part of my personall Estate when she shall attaine to the age of Eighteen or Day of marriage, but if she should dye before marriage or Eighteen that then her share should be equally Divided betwixt my son Joseph Ware & my Wife Mary Ware.

5thly. I Give & Bequeath to my Son Joseph Ware one-Third part of all my Personall Estate and The plantation and all my lands with the houseing and out Housing orchard, fields & ffencing only what is before expresed to him the said Joseph Ware his heirs Executors or Assigns for Ever and all my clothing with working geare and tools for Plowing or any other business I give to my son Joseph Ware.

6thly. I give to the Repairing of Alloways Creek meeting House and the bureing ground fencing the sum of one pound and after all my above said Legaceys and Debts with ffunirall charges be paid and discharged the remainder to be equally divided as abovesaid Betwixt my son Joseph & my Wife Mary & my Daughter Patience Ware. I do hereby make, nominate and appointe my son Joseph Ware and my Wife Mary Ware ass Executor and Executrix of this my last Will & Testament Revoaking all other Will or Wills Testament or Testaments ass Witness my hand and seall this 28th day of 1st month and in the year 1711.

Editor's Note:

John Ware, "Yeoman, Cohansey," first appears in the record of Hopewell Township as a township officer of North Cohansey. According to Webster's New Twentieth Century Dictionary the term "yeoman" has several definitions, among which is: "A man possessed of a small estate in land." The last Will and Testament of John, on the following page, indicates that he was a substantial landowner and therefore suggests that it was within the meaning of the above definition that he was so characterized.

John D. Ware

WILL of JOHN WARE of Cohansie, in County of Salem and in the Province of New Jersey.

In the name of God, Amen. I, John Ware, of Cohansie in the County of Salem & in the Province of New Jersey, Yeoman, being sick and weak in body, but of sound & perfect mind, memory & understanding (blessed be God) do make & declare my last Will and Testament in manner and fform following (that is to say).

First and Principally, I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it & my body to be buried decently at the discretion of my executors hereafter named, hoping for a joyful resurrection thro' the alone merits of my ascended Lord & Savior Jesus Christ. And touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased the Lord to bless me with, I give, devise & bequeath in manner and fform as follows:

Imprimis. I give, devise and bequeath to my loving wife Bathsheba, all & singular my plantation, lands, buildings &c. with the appurtenances situate & being in Cohansie above s'd in the County of Salem to be by her held, used, & enjoyed until my son John Ware shall arrive at the age of Twenty-one years. Then I give the same to my son John Ware his heirs & assigns forever, except what is hereafter mentioned.

Item. In case my said wife Bathsheba should continue my widow then I give unto her an equal third part of all and singular my Plantation, Land, Buildings, &c. to be by her held used & enjoyed by her during the time of her widowhood.

Item. In case the said Bathsheba should think fit to marry, then I give and bequeath to her the use of half the house above & below, also the use of ten acres of land & privilege for keeping six head of cattle, either horses or neat kind.

Item. I give and bequeath to my said wife Bathsheba an equal third of my moveable estate to her the said Bathsheba her heirs & assigns forever.

Item. I give & bequeath the other two-thirds to the rest of my children, (viz.) Hannah, Roda, Elnathan, Mary & Abigail Ware, equally, to be divided between them all and in case my son John should lose or be deprived of the said Plantation, my will & desire is that he should have an equal share of my moveable estate among my other children.

Item. I give & bequeath to my son Elnathan Ware 25 acres of that land with the appurtenances which I purchased of Abiel Carle, Jun., to him, his heirs & assigns forever, and it is my will & desire that my son John above s'd pay or cause to be paid to the said Elnathan Ten pounds current lawful money of America at the age of 21.

Item. I give & bequeath to my son Elnathan all that eleven acres of Marsh which I purchased of Isaac Davis adjoining to John Bacon to him and his heirs & assigns forever.

Item. I give & bequeath the residue & remainder of that land which I purchased of Abiel Carle above said to my son John his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give all and singular the lands belonging to me or that I am any ways interested in or entitled to with all their appurtenances on Long Island in case the same be ever recovered unto my children, viz. John, Hannah & Roda Ware, to be equally divided between them.

Item. It is my will and desire that in case my wife should marry that then the two-thirds of my moveable estate should be taken out of her hands and put out at the discretion of my executors hereafter named for the use, benefit and advantage of my abovesaid children to whom it is bequeathed already, and to be paid to them as they come of age.

Item. I will and desire my sons John & Elnathan be bound out to trades at the discretion of my executors & I do hereby nominate, constitute & appoint my loving wife Bathsheba together with my trusty & faithful friend Abraham Reeves, Blacksmith of Cohansie, executrix and executor to this my last will & testament & revoking all former wills grants gifts or bequests whatsoever, do acknowledge this to be my last will & testament and no other & in witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & thirty-four.

It is singular that none of the grandsons have preserved any record of the birth and death of Elnathan, the only one of all the family bearing that name. It is probable that the early records of the first Greenwich Presbyterian Church, which were destroyed by fire, might have thrown some light upon the subject. After the mention in his father's will, the only record found of him after years of searching, was on the bond which he gave to the State when he obtained "License of Marriage," 1760, to "Marcy Moore." They were married April 30, 1760 at Greenwich, N. J.

document, showing unusual confidence of father and mother in
an entire family of ten children.

I, Maskell Ware, of the County of Cumberland, and State of New Jersey, being of sound mind and memory, do make this my last Will and Testament, and *First*, I leave all my just Debts and Charges to be paid by my Executors hereafter mentioned; I leave all my Movable property to be sold, except so much of it as my Wife Hannah, shall want to furnish one room, which I leave to her, with one Cow, and one Hog, her choice. I leave to my Daughter Ruth Appelgate, one hundred and fifty dollars. I leave to my son Maskell, one hundred and ten dollars, for money expended on Minor Appelgate and family, if not paid to him before that time. I leave my land where I now live, and my barren land in Salem County, to be sold by my Executors hereafter mentioned, at any time when a majority of my sons shall think it will sell to the best advantage at Public or Private Sale, as they may think best, and the money arising from the sales, of my land, movables, after paying my debt, and what is already gave, I leave to be equally divided between my ten children if then living, their heirs, to take their share. And it is my will that my Wife, Hannah, have the Interest of all the moneys arising from the Sales, after paying the debts and what is already gave, and the profits of the place until sold. And it is my Will that my Wife, Hannah, have the Interest of the moneys aforesaid, in this way; the money to be paid to my ten Children, when collected, and every one except Ruth, to give to my wife, Hannah, their obligations for the lawful interest, yearly during her life, of their respected share, and made safe to her satisfaction. I leave to my son William, in addition to his equal share as before mentioned, fifty dollars, for services done to me. And lastly, I do appoint my two oldest sons, Thomas and John, my Executors.

Many of the entries were made in the same hand, presumably that of Charles H. Ware. This Bible was published by John H. Perry, 1852, in Philadelphia, Pa.

According to Mary E. Cave, daughter of Charles Byron and granddaughter of Charles H., her grandfather was in the grain business on the Chester River near Crumpton, Md. He bought grain from the nearby farmers for storage in his granary, shipping it in his own vessel to Baltimore, Md. His vessel was later taken by the Federal Government and served as a water boat for the Union Forces during the Civil War.

Mrs. Cave was interviewed May 23, 1967, at her home in St. Petersburg, Florida. At this time she was in her 85th year and was alert and of sound mind and memory, although her sight was failing her.

LAMBERT MILBANK WARE, 1852 - 1905.

*A Biographical Sketch**by* JOHN D. WARE

Lambert Milbank Ware was born February 9, 1852, in Delaware City, Delaware, one of nine children of Charles and Caroline Cleaver Ware.

At an early age Lambert sailed on his father's schooner on Chesapeake Bay, serving in various capacities, including cook. Because of this, he probably progressed no further than the fourth grade of school. According to his son, Otway, when Lambert asked his father when he would be able to return to school, he was told that he could not be spared from his job. Lambert therefore had little opportunity for formal education. During the Civil War he was rejected for service in the Union forces because he was under age.

About 1879, Lambert first entered St. Andrew Bay, Florida, as a member of the crew of the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey vessel *Gedney*. Presumably because of his favorable initial impression, he returned early the following year, sailing from Delaware in his own twenty-foot sloop, the *Hope*. His companion on this voyage along the Atlantic seaboard, around the tip of Florida and along Florida's Gulf coast, was one Alfred Ludwig, thought to be a member of the lesser German nobility.

On March 20, 1880, Lambert married Lillia A. Gwaltney, a member of a pioneer family of St. Andrew Bay.

Lambert took an active part in the economic and civic affairs of the village of St. Andrew and by 1882 owned a general store and a small schooner, the *William Crawford* of nearly 9 tons burden. He later acquired substantial real estate holdings on the Bay and owned an interest in a sawmill on what is now known as Panama Bayou. From this mill came the lumber to build a home on Buena Vista Point, known locally then and now as Ware's Point. This home was considered a show place on St. Andrew Bay at the time. Lambert had by this time acquired and was operating two additional schooners, the *Nettie* of 32 tons and the *Cleopatra* of about 12 tons. These vessels plied variously between Apalachicola, St. Andrew Bay, Pensacola, and New Orleans, carrying salt, salt fish and roe, lumber, live gophers (land turtles), and other miscellaneous cargo on the voyage westward, returning to the eastward and St. Andrew Bay with general cargo and passengers. The *Nettie* was considered the main means of transportation for travelers to and from the St. Andrew Bay area until the advent of the steamers *Alpha* and *Tarpon*, the first such vessels to serve this part of the Florida coast. This fleet of sailing vessels supplied most of the needs of a second and larger general store which Lambert built about 1890.

On June 13, 1888, his wife passed away at age 29, leaving Lambert with three sons, Lambert, aged seven; Harold, three; and Otway, one and one-half years. Harold died on December 19 of the same

year, just seven days short of his fourth birthday. The care of these small boys was very largely entrusted to Adeline Gautier, the Negro housekeeper, until Lambert's second marriage.

On June 26, 1897, he married Lydia E. Day of Franconia, Minnesota. The ceremony was performed at Cromanton, Florida, a small community (now non-existent) on the east arm of St. Andrew Bay. Lambert's second wife bore him two daughters, Dorothy Margaret and Grace Day Ware, both born in St. Andrew.

Captain L. M. Ware, as he was known, was highly respected by his contemporaries. Despite his lack of a formal education, he was considered to be a well-informed individual and a successful business man. He served on the Washington County School Commission and represented that county in the 1903 Florida Legislature. Although he was the lone Republican Legislator, the House Journal reflects that he took an active part in legislative deliberations, having introduced five bills and one resolution. He served on the committees of Commerce and Navigation, Education, and Public Lands.

In 1905, L. M. Ware went out west to Socorro, New Mexico, in a vain attempt to arrest an active case of pulmonary tuberculosis. Perhaps realizing the hopelessness of his condition, he returned to St. Andrew Bay some months later and died July 4, 1905.

JOHN HAINES WARE, JR. 1888 - 1963*A Biographical Sketch*

by RHODA C. WARE

John Haines Ware, Jr. was born April 12, 1888, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This was the year of the "Great Blizzard" and the story was often told that the doctor had to come in the second story window over the snow drifts to make the delivery. John came to Florida on vacation as a boy and told his sons how he would go rowing on the St. Johns River near Jacksonville. He also spent some summers in Cape May, New Jersey, where he helped his father run a merry-go-round. In later years he built a fine small sized carrousel for his grandchildren at Oxford, Pa. This was at the house that he startled his friends and neighbors by moving from one hill top to another in November 1931. Invitations were sent to a "mysterious party" and on this Indian summer day while forty guests dined, the whistle blew and the guests watched the trees go by as the house started on its half mile journey. This three story, 20 room, brick home did not complete the trip until several months and several snow storms later, but when completed was facing a different direction on a beautifully landscaped site with hundred-year-old boxwood, large elm trees, rock garden and wooded hillside view. The house was still called "The Woods," but it was a different woods!

John H. Ware, Jr. was the second son of the three born to John and Alice Van Meter Ware. While still in his early teens he earned \$100 by installing the second alternating-current motor in Philadelphia. He left high school to go into business on a full time basis, continuing his studies at Drexel Institute in evening classes. He read constantly—hundreds of books—often far into the night. His managerial skills in the utilities field eventually resulted in his becoming Chairman of the Board of American Water Works, Co., Inc., the

largest privately owned water-works system in the world. He was a recipient of the Horatio Alger Award in 1957.

In 1922, John and Clara Ware brought their two sons to Miami for the winter. They rented a home in Miami on NE 20th Terrace and on the Beach for several years and in 1925 purchased a Spanish type home at 11 Star Island which they named "El Paraiso." This home, too, underwent a great change. When it was discovered that termites had invaded it, the house was torn down to the marble flooring on the first floor and rebuilt in a modern style in 1951. They watched the royal palms grow from head height to a towering row of trees on their driveway. They weathered the 1926 hurricane but lost their cruiser "*The Wanderjax*" when it was beaten against the causeway by the wind and waves. Here at "El Paraiso" John and Clara Ware ended their days. Each Sunday children and grandchildren came for a bountiful Sunday dinner which Clara had planned and John would usually bring out a mechanical toy to delight the children or show the family a beautiful picture he had photographed as the sun set across Biscayne Bay.

Leaves from the Florida Branch

Ware Mercantile Company, founded by Lambert Milbank Ware about 1881 at St. Andrew, Florida, on the bay of the same name, had one of the three telephones in this area in 1896-97. His store at Bay Head, on the north arm of this bay, also had a telephone. These phones were connected with the Chipley, Florida exchange.

The Last Will and Testament of L. M. Ware, signed March 18, 1905, just three months and sixteen days before his death, indicated that he left a substantial estate.

Francis Hand Ware came to St. Andrew Bay in 1882, two years after his brother Lambert settled there. The diary of Francis for that year indicated that he left Crumpton, Md., January 12 on a schooner loaded with grain bound for Baltimore. On January 16, he took the Baltimore and Ohio train for Pensacola, Florida, via Cincinnati, Louisville, Ky., and Nashville, Tennessee. Arriving at Pensacola the morning of January 19, he "spoke" passage for Point Washington on Choctawhatchee Bay on the Schooner *Katie Maria*. The vessel was delayed until January 28 awaiting discharge of cargo into the Bark *Jenny Cobb* of Boston. Francis arrived at Point Washington at noon January 29, and from here he set out on horseback for West Bay, Florida. From this point he departed for the village of St. Andrew in a small boat, landing above Dyer's Point on St. Andrew Bay. He walked the remaining three miles to his brother Lambert's house on Buena Vista Point, arriving at 10 A.M. January 21, 1882. He spent just 20 days on this Odyssey which can now be made by jet plane in less than two hours. His train fare from Baltimore to Pensacola was \$30.40.

Shortly after Francis' arrival he was serving on the Schooner *William Wallace*, running between Apalachicola, Florida and New Orleans, Louisiana with intermittent stops at St. Andrew Bay and Pensacola. His brother Lambert was captain of the vessel.

Charles Byron Ware, a third brother, accompanied by his second wife, children, and Annie Rebecca Ware, one of two sisters then living, followed Lambert and Francis to St. Andrew Bay, settling there in August 1883. Charles moved on to Clearwater one year later and in May 1885 bought an orange grove in what is now St. Petersburg. Hillsborough County Florida County Commissioner Minute Books "G" and "H" disclose that Charles served in that body representing District 1 from January 6, 1903, until his last two-year term expired in 1907. This district in general was comprised of what is now Pinellas County.

Annie Rebecca Ware came to St. Andrew Bay with her older brother Charles Byron in 1883. They made the final part of the trip from Pensacola to St. Andrew on her brother Lambert's Schooner, the *William Crawford*.

The Florida House of Representatives Journal for 1903, shows that Lambert Milbank Ware was sworn in April 7 of that year as State Representative for Washington County. By an odd coincidence of timing, his brother Charles was serving as County Commissioner for Hillsborough this same year.

The lure of the sea has exerted a strong influence on certain of the Wares. Lambert Milbank, son of John D. and Marjorie M. Ware, is of the fourth consecutive generation of known seafarers. His great grandfather, Lambert Milbank, was master and owner of his own schooners, and his great, great uncle, Thomas C. Ware, held a license as Pilot on Chesapeake Bay and Master of Steam vessels, dated October 12, 1882. His grandfather, Otway, and great uncle, Lambert Milbank, Jr., were both pilots on St. Andrew Bay. His father, John D. was a shipmaster and is a pilot on Tampa Bay, Florida.

Perhaps it was only coincidental, but over the years certain of these same Wares demonstrated an affinity for the same school of higher learning. Otway attended East Florida Seminary which later became the University of Florida. One of his sons, Charles Edward, and two of his grandsons, Lambert Milbank and John Frederick, also attended this university, the latter more than half a century later.

When John H. Ware, Jr. brought his family to Miami in 1922 the train ride from Philadelphia to Miami was scheduled for 56 hours but usually took much longer. After Eastern Airlines started passenger service to Washington, D. C. in 1932, with the eighteen passenger Curtiss Condor planes, the seven hour trip appealed to the family and they took to the air. The jet trips to Philadelphia take less than three hours, a far cry from the train trip of 47 years ago.

Willard Myers Ware was named for Willard G. Myers of Philadelphia, Pa., a lifelong friend of his father. When Willard Ware was about sixteen years of age, he became the first winner of the coveted three-foot high silver cup, "Star Island Trophy," given by Colonel E. H. R. Green for the world's record in class "A" outboard motor-boat racing.

Frank Mulford Ware moved to St. Petersburg on October 2, 1958, and retired from the Pennsylvania Railroad as General Passenger Agent on January 1, 1959, after 36 years of service. His father,

Frank Riley Ware, and his uncle, George Sloan Ware, were the last of the four generations of chairmakers. The business was handed down from father to son and today the chairs are considered collector's items. The following item recording this event appeared in the New York Herald Tribune:

LAST OF 4 GENERATIONS OF CHAIR MAKERS TO QUIT
No Heirs Left to Carry On at Jersey
Handicraft Plant

MAYS LANDING, N. J., Feb. 27, 1934 (UP) — The rush-bottom chair factory at Roadstown, which has been operated by members of the same family since the days of the original English settlers, will be abandoned.

George S. Ware, octogenarian, is the present owner of the factory. He plans to retire soon. The owner has no children and no apprentices and since none but a Ware has operated the firm since its founding more than 150 years ago, the plant will be closed down.

Since its existence, the factory has turned out the same product, in the original pattern and by the same processes. It is one of the few businesses that is still conducted in the self-sufficient manner of the pioneers.

Ware obtains his own wood from nearby woodlands, gathers his rushes from the marshes, forms the frames on a lathe (the only machine in the factory) and glues them together, weaves the rush bottom, applies the stains and varnishes and acts as his own salesman.

The plant, which in turn has been operated by the son, grandson and great-grandson of the founder, stands but twelve miles from the spot where the immigrant ancestor of the family landed 259 years ago.

The following eulogy was written by Francis H. Sheppard and published in the St. Andrews Buoy of July 13, 1905:

FAREWELL

A TRIBUTE TO THE MEMORY OF CAPT. L. M. WARE

There is a saying that "No man is necessary" and another one like it, that "No man is missed long." Both are usually true; but neither is true in the case of our friend and leader, Lambert M. Ware. He will be missed as long as those who knew him shall live, and it is hard to see how our community is going to conduct its affairs without him.

This good and able man was easily our best, not only in the vulgar sense of being our strongest, but in the higher sense which we revere in our hearts. He had the first essential to manhood, bravery; but it was so quiet that a stranger would never have taken him for the very soul of courage. He told the truth when he saw fit to speak; and he who heard his words knew that it was truth. He had a deep self-respect that made him prefer honor to money; and his simple spoken promise was known to be sure. No security was wanted when

he made his promise; we knew that he valued the fulfillment of his work above gold. He was a very kind man, though his avoidance of talk and brag prevented many from seeing his goodness. He sympathized with the weak and he helped them, hiding his generosity as if it were a crime. In this day of lubricity, his purity was like a star shining through clouds in a dark night. He was clean in word and thought and deed. A striking particular of his manly soul was his avoidance of slander and back-biting; he seemed to think that it was cowardly to talk about those who could not defend themselves. Yet he was quite capable of telling any man just what he thought about him and of making good his speech.

The mentality of Lambert M. Ware accorded with his fine morality. If he had had early training and the advantage of a better field for his talents, he might have become in the Nation what he made himself in our community. Starting with nothing but his own self he achieved an honorable fortune, he built up a town where he had found only the vacant beauty of the day; he has numerous enterprises in business going forward successfully at the same time; he was the working head of his political party; he was informed in the affairs of his state, his country, and of foreign lands. Though he received but little training in schools, he died an educated man; for he never ceased to reflect, to study, to assimilate the knowledge that he met. Such was his character that the men of the party opposed to him dropped their own candidate and elected him to represent them in the legislature of the state, where he had the singular honor of standing alone. He was the solitary in that hostile crowd, and he seemed to feel that on him alone lay the burden of doing half the work of the state. His success was a striking proof of his value; he won the liking and the aid of his political enemies and using them as his instruments he accomplished more than any other one man. It sometimes appeared to the unprejudiced observer that he was actually doing his half of all the work of the legislature.

He succeeded there by adhering to his own nature. His most prominent point of character, strong common sense, did not fail him there; for he knew how to appeal to the best among the men with whom he worked. They were willing to assist a man who was so fair, so honest, so courageous, so polite, so ready to acknowledge the good that was in them.

Alas he is gone, and we shall see his like no more. None of us is his equal in manhood. How shall we live without him?

We need not live without him, for though he has died he remains among us. We cannot forget him, we have his example by which to guide our steps. Let us try to imitate him.

Leaves from the Family Tree — First and Second Editions

The collating and editing of this book was a hard job. If there are any errors in your immediate branch, please bear with us. We have done the best we know how.

We, who had the final responsibility for completing the new edition, knew very little about the family in general when we took up the work. Our education along this line has been improved greatly, but in our ignorance we have probably blundered in many instances.

In passing sentence, please remember we were working without the aid of the originator of this new edition, Arthur Melville Ware, of Wayne, Pa., who died suddenly before the work of collating had been completed. Also, his sister and chief assistant in this work, Mrs. Clara Lentner McCall, the only other Family Statistician we know of, moved to Coronado, California just about the time we started to ask questions about the family history.

We have not attempted to give addresses in this book, although the original questionnaire requested them. However, should any members of the family desire to communicate with any other members whose present whereabouts are unknown to them, Ware Bros. Company, 1010 Arch Street, Philadelphia, will be glad to furnish the desired information.

We believe the following excerpt from a letter written by Howard F. Ware, president of E. M. & H. F. Ware, Inc., St. Paul, Minnesota, and received just before going to press, will be of interest to the entire family:

"Sunday, March 12th, I was in Greenwich, New Jersey, and for the first time saw the gravestones of Maskell and Hannah Ware, our great-grandparents. I am now able to go to the grave of Maskell Ware, my great-grandfather, John F. Ware, my grandfather, and Edwin M. Ware, my father. The first of the above being in the cemetery of the Presbyterian Church at Greenwich, New Jersey, the other two in the Broad Street Cemetery in Bridgeton, New Jersey."

The descendants of Joseph Ware were well represented in the World War. Prominent on our Honor Roll are the names of Lieut. Loring Woart Batten, Jr., U. S. N., his brother, Richard Ware Batten, and Joseph Moore Tatem.

Lieut. Batten served on the U. S. S. *Wyoming* during the time that ship was a unit of the Grand Fleet, from November, 1917, to December, 1918.

Richard Ware Batten served in France with the Tenth Engineers from September, 1917, to February, 1919.

Joseph Moore Tatem entered the American Field Service with the French Army in May, 1917, as transport driver. Until November of that year he saw service in the Aisne region and along the famous Chemin-des-Dames. In June, 1918, he obtained his discharge to re-enlist in the U. S. Naval Reserve force. He was in training at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station when the Armistice was signed.

It is of interest to note that Joseph Fithian Tatem, father of Joseph Moore Tatem, served as Ensign in the United States Navy during the Spanish-American War and participated in the battles of Santiago and Manzanillo.

There are many others who distinguished themselves as units of Uncle Sam's fighting forces, as nurses, doughboys, gobs, and officers. We would like to make a special mention of each and every one, but lack of sufficient data handicaps us.

Dismissing the military vein, we wish to boast of our representative in the world of music. You all have heard of Helen Ware, the violinist. She is now Mrs. Laszlo Schwartz. Wherever there is a discussion of the merits of Ysaye, Kreisler, Kubelik, Heifetz, Powell, etc. the name of Helen Ware is always prominent. She ranks with the best.

Speaking merely from an academic standpoint, we call attention to the fact that throughout the entire genealogy there does not appear a single set of twins.

Another item: Christmas Week is very popular in the family for weddings. No less than a score of marriages took place during this week, the preference being given to Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, although some of the weddings were solemnized on New Year's Eve.

The mortality rate for the Fourth of July is high. Almost a dozen deaths occurred on Independence Day. During these later years, what with the new laws and so forth, this day is not observed so fatally among the descendants.

We would like to ramble on indefinitely, gossiping and chatting about the various members. But we have to leave a few blank pages in the back of this book so that future records may be kept. Don't overlook these pages. We want to get out a new edition every ten years at least. Put down dates and full names promptly. Your descendants will want better service than our ancestors gave us in this matter of record-keeping.

Take it all in all, it is a pretty good record at that. It's a good family to belong to. And we expect to be able to say the same thing ten years from now when the next record is due to be printed.

The family of Wares living in Camden are not descendants of Joseph Ware, the immigrant, 1675, as has been generally supposed, but of Jacob Ware, born in England in 1674. He was a Captain in the army under Queen Anne, and died about 1775, a little more than a hundred years old. Among his descendants was the Rev. Thomas Ware, formerly well known in Salem and Cumberland Counties, and the dates and facts given in this paragraph are from "The Life of Rev. Thomas Ware," written by himself and published in 1831.

Don't miss reading the will of Joseph Ware. We started to read it merely because it was part of the copy. After passing the preamble we became so interested that it went like a novel, so that after finishing we had to read copy on it all over again, as we had failed to pay attention to making the corrections. According to present-day standards, Joseph Ware was indeed a wealthy man.

The following contribution from Dan Ware, written from his home in Woodstown, N. J., March 3, 1888, should also be read carefully. It is of much interest to members of the family, and, in addition, is an absorbing narrative in itself.

WOODSTOWN, N. J., March 3, 1888.

Maskell Ware was born in Cumberland County, N. J., near Roadstown, December 13, 1766, and died February 13, 1846. He was the oldest son of Elnathan Ware and Mercy Ware, whose maiden name was Moore. He had only a common school education which would compare unfavorably with that of today; consequently he was a lifelong advocate of public education.

He learned the trade of chair-making in Salem, N. J., with John Lanning, a Quaker. I have often heard him speak of the family in terms of the highest

praise. He was an apprentice when the old town was taken possession of by the British forces, some time during the Revolutionary struggle, probably 1780 or 1781. I have heard him speak of it frequently.

A family of seven sons and four daughters was the result of his marriage to Hannah Simpkins, of Roadstown, who survived him fourteen years, she living to be eighty-four and he eighty years old.

He was appointed Justice of the Peace about the year 1796 and held the office up to the time of his death without intermission, a period of fifty years. I have often heard it remarked that his judgments were rendered without fear or favor, and *rarely if ever reversed*.

Both himself and wife were members of the old Presbyterian Church at Greenwich, but it never washed out of him a great many of his Quaker ideas, which he imbibed in old Mr. Lanning's family during his term of apprenticeship. He always cherished a high regard for the Christian graces of the Friends Society of that day.

Notwithstanding he was possessed by a strong and vigorous constitution, death was the result of but three or four days' illness of what today would be called pneumonia or inflammation of the lungs.

I think no lessons were given with greater emphasis by my father than those in reference to the priceless value of time. So impressive were they, that when I wasted it, which was not infrequent, I felt condemned even if I escaped his reproof. He said, "Time lost was forever lost, and could never be regained." I never knew him to use a profane word. He said profane language had not only a demoralizing tendency, but that in all cases it weakened rather than strengthened an assertion, and caused suspicion of falsehood.

Once in crossing with my father a small piece of timber lying directly in the rear of the old homestead we came suddenly upon an old colored woman well known by all the boys as Aunt Sally Williams. She was brandishing in a most fearful manner a fence stake, and had about finished a huge blacksnake. My father cried out, "Don't; don't hurt him, Sall! Don't kill him!" The old woman seemed completely bewildered, and was at least three shades blacker than I had ever before seen her, and as soon as she had breath to speak she said: "Squia, de Scriptor ses de seed of de woman shall bruise de serpent's head, and I killed him, and I'll kill 'em all." "But," said my father, "it is very wrong, Sall, to kill those of your own color. See now what you have done, committed a murder in broad daylight, and I will have to witness against you. Just look at the poor thing, he is almost as black as you are," and as the faintest apology for a smile crept over her ebony face, she said: "Mr. Squia Ware, you just don't believe what you ses, and I knows you don't."

My father often took apples to Bridgeton in the early summer and fall, and sometimes would take me along to drive, and it was his invariable custom to have a bushel or two of bruised ones to throw out to the little boys who, in droves, followed after the wagon. He would throw out a half a peck at a time, and laugh to see them tumble over each other picking them up.

He used tobacco both by smoking and chewing, moderately, until his boys commenced picking up his old stumps, and I heard him say that he felt compelled either to give it up or raise a family of smokers and chewers; so, for the sake of his boys, he gave it up and never used it in any shape for over fifty years prior to his death, and the consequence was that none of his sons ever used it.

Five acres of the old homestead was by him planted as an apple orchard, much of the fruit being manufactured into cider, and the old red barrel was generally filled in the fall with apple whisky. We boys had free access to both, but through his example and strong precepts to be careful to take but very little, together with that of our good old mother, who always expressed her disapproval of the practice, we all escaped the fate which so frequently befalls poor human nature.

My father had a most holy horror of the institution of slavery, which was intensified by its interference with his duties as an officer of the law. In my early days (some sixty years ago) many fugitive slaves were kidnapped from towns near Greenwich by men from Maryland hired by their owners. The law empowered a Justice of the Peace, upon sufficient proof, to grant a permit to take them out of the State into captivity. Many such cases came before my father. The agent or

"kidnapper," as he was called, always brought with him a hireling ready to swear that the slave owed service to Major ——— Hugh Frasure, or whoever they pleased to represent, but in every case my father found some legal defect, dismissed the action, and sent the negro scot free, and he would soon be hid in the pines of Cape May or Atlantic until he felt it safe to return home. He would not take the oath of a stranger without proof that he was a man worthy of belief, and that proof they could never offer, as he well knew. The agent was willing to substantiate his good character, but that was objected to, he being an interested party. My father claimed that this was a free State for all classes of people, and nothing but the most positive proof was sufficient to deprive a man of his liberty. Threats of impeachment did not intimidate him. He told them on one occasion, "I would as soon send that boy (pointing to one of us) into slavery as that negro."

A man by the name of Henry Parker, who frequently worked for us, was kidnapped and brought before him. He had a wife and children in Springtown, *but the agents did not get him*. He was afterward captured and taken before another justice, who granted a permit, and he was taken down into Maryland. In his capture they broke his leg, and when it got so he could hobble about, they chained a heavy iron ball to him to keep him from running away again. One day he got an old file, cut off the chain and tramped through woods, marsh and swamp to the Delaware, crossed over in a boat, came to our house, and to his family in Springtown, and finally became a waiter in a hotel in Philadelphia, where he served many years. He would occasionally walk down to see his family, a distance of about 40 miles. I remember him well. He was a short, thick-set man, good looking and as black as ebony. His wife and family were natives of New Jersey, therefore free. Quite a number of the fugitives brought before my father had been married by him, and some had large families of children.

My father despised cruelty of every form. In those days scores of boys were bound out to farmers. They would get them both from poorhouses and from Philadelphia; also from families unable to provide for them. They were frequently the victims of cruelty of various kinds, want of sufficient food and clothing, and, in numerous cases, of severe beating. If complaint was made to a Justice of the Peace that a boy was abused, it was the duty of such Justice to examine the boy, and if in the opinion of two Justices the boy was the subject of cruelty or abuse, it was their duty to cancel such indenture and place the boy under the care of a more kind and humane master. Many Justices would shirk their duty, but *my father never did*. I can name half a score that he took away, and have forgotten others. When two Justices could not agree, they would call a third.

I remember one instance particularly, of a man who whipped, with an ox goad, a boy for not being able to drive an unruly pair of steers over a very stumpy field, without striking the stumps. His back was cut into shreds and turned green and black. The associate Justice wanted to return the boy to his master, as the man promised never to whip him again, but my father said never would he consent to it, and asked the associate Justice if he would trust one of his boys with such a brute. Whereupon he consented to cancel the indenture. My father made many enemies among this class of people, but he said he did not want their friendship.

A very amusing incident occurred in Cumberland Court. He was a witness in a case of fraud, the only important witness by which the fraud could be proved, and a young lawyer tried to badger him. A man who was engaged largely in the lumber business, in order to defraud his creditors, assigned his property, or made a bogus sale to someone and left for parts unknown. The night he left he came to see my father, and in conversation said sufficient to show the fraudulent transaction. My father would not keep the secret to cheat the creditors. Consequently he was subpoenaed to testify, and commenced by saying that Mr. ——— came to his house late the night of his departure, and said that he was all packed up and ready to start for the West. My father asked him what disposition he had made of his property. The lawyer remarked sharply, "We don't want to know *what you said to him*, but what he said to you."

"I asked him what—"

"I tell you that it is what he said to you, and not what you said or asked him, that we want to know about. Tell what Mr. ——— said to you."

"He told me that he had the matter all arranged."

"What else did he tell you?"

"He said that he didn't know it soon enough."

"Did he tell you anything else?"

"Oh, yes, a good deal else."

"Well, what?"

"He said he hadn't time."

"Anything else?"

"He said he was not certain, but thought he should" — and so on. The Court was in a roar of laughter. The attorney asked:

"What did he mean by all this?"

"That was what *he said*; you can make the most of it."

The lawyer was completely nonplussed. The interview was colloquial and the lawyer, very much to his chagrin, was compelled to let him tell the story in his own way. *He had got hold of a Tartar*. His evidence was all-important and proved the fraud conclusively, to the benefit of the honest creditors.

Directly after I came to Woodstown, in 1839, my father came up to see me. I was boarding at the hotel. Politics was at a white heat. It was the Harrison and Van Buren campaign. My father was a Whig and I a Democrat. I introduced him to Esquire Nixon, an old Whig, and he remarked to my father, *patting me on the back*, that he wished I was as good a man as my father, probably meaning politically. My father answered that he would not be at all satisfied with that. He wanted me to be a very much better man than he was."

"I mean," said Nixon, "that if he would only take you as his pattern."

"A very poor pattern, indeed; I want him to look for a much better one."

I thought the people standing around would split themselves laughing at old Nixon, who was a great flatterer.

During his stay with me a sparring match took place between a couple of fellows, and one of them got mad and was about to commence a fair fight. My father, putting his hand on him, said, "Hold on!" The man said, "Who the ----- are you? I have a right to do as I please, I want you to know."

"That depends on circumstances, my friend. A man has a right to do as he pleases only when he pleases to do right."

The fellow backed down. My father was kindness and generosity personified, and at the same time he was stern and unyielding where principle and propriety were involved.

As an instance, he had filled an order for a load of chairs for a man in Salem, who sent his team down for them late on Saturday afternoon to have them loaded so that he could start back with them early on Sunday morning. *Not a bit of it*. My father would not let him drive out of the yard with them until Monday morning, saying it was no day to parade merchandise through the country.

And yet he was free to say that he considered it a duty to save from waste, even on Sunday, that which otherwise would be destroyed.

In a political discussion with one of his neighbors, who was an avowed Federalist—my father being a Jeffersonian Democrat—politics were raging high, and they were discussing the old English law requiring a voter to be worth fifty pounds proclamation money. Thomas Jefferson and his party, the Democrats were opposed to this property qualification. His neighbor no doubt honestly thought that persons having no property had nothing at stake, therefore should not be permitted to vote. In fact, he thought they would be a dangerous element in the political field, and might vote away the rights of property holders without having any interest at stake themselves, etc.

My father answered that they had their living to get, which to them was of as much consequence as all his dirty acres were to him, which would seem to be a clincher.

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NOTE

This second revision by John D. Ware covers a period of 47 years and was the result of much correspondence with the heads of the many branches, who only, possessed the data required.

The difficulty experienced in compiling these records should convince the members of the present generation that it is very desirable to keep a correct account of births, deaths and marriages, and in the hope that something may be done in this direction, the following blank pages are inserted.

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
