

Abraham Wise

From records at Romney, West Virginia dated 1761

Abraham Wise and wife Margaret Wise Hampshire County, Virginia, now West Virginia Their Children John, Adam, Abraham, and others.

From the Records of Wills and Deeds, dated Sept. 8, 1761, at Romney, Va., (now West Virginia): Abraham Wise and his wife Margaret brought 203 acres of land from Mary Creamer.

The Wise's are Scotch and English. According to tradition Abraham, Sr., and Abraham, Jr., were both in the Revolutionary War.

Abraham, Jr., was born at Romney, Sept. 6, 1767, and married Dorthy (Dolly) Day and owned property there, selling it in 1795; they moved to Mason County, Kentucky; then about 1818, they moved to Washington, Indiana, Daviess County, where they are both buried.

Abraham Wise was Vice President of the first Temperance Society in Daviess County, Indiana (*Ilistory of Knox and Daviess County*, page 700-701), organized in 1832 by Rev. Ransom Hawley of Washington, Indiana, and named "Washington Temperance Society."

Ebenezer Jones, father of Deborah Jones Wise

Libenezer Jones enlisted in the Revolutionary War, January 20, 1776 at Dover, Delaware. (Roll call of Captain Nat. Adams.) Libenezer was a very large man—over six feet tall and quite broad. His wife, Mary, was a small woman just a little over five feet tall and very beautiful. They were Welch.

They moved from Dover, Delaware to Salisbury, North Carolina about 1784-1785. Ebenezer was a large land owner near Salisbury, where he was a teacher and a preacher (Methodist). They moved to Washington, Indiana, about 1808 where he bought a large farm. His farm was used as a fort against the Indians in 1812 (History of Knox and Daviess Counties—page 573.)

Ebenezer married most of the couples married at Washington, Indiana, in its early history.

In June 1817 Ebenezer Jones was appointed County Treasurer and was thus the first treasurer in the County (*History of Knox and Daviess Counties*, page 608 and 618.)

John Hobson, age 25, sailed on the good ship Safety for Virginia in August 1635. Capt. John Hobson, Esquire of the Council of State in Virginia, granted a tract of land extending from Pagan Point Creek, hereafter to be called Hampstead's Point, into Warrick-squeake River, to a place to be called hereafter New Town Haven, which land is in Isle of Wight County. Due to him as a share of his adventure in the time of the treasurer and company. Dated, May 16, 1836.

Elizabeth Hobson married Sherwood Bugg.

Richmond County was known in the Colonial Days as St. Pauls Parrish. The first settlement was at Augusta which was named by Oglethorp in honor of one of the royal princesses. It was laid out in 1735 by the trustees of the then infant colony of Georgia, and garrisoned in 1736.

Sherwood Bugg was captain of infantry in Jackson's Legion. He served in Georgia and the Carolinas, enduring many privations.

The Marshall Line

The Marshall Line is as follows:

John Marshall, "of the forest," born about 1700 in Westmorland County, Virginia, died in April 1752. He was married in 1722 to Elizabeth Markham, born 1704, died 1755. They had 10 children, one being Thomas, father of the first Chief Justice of the United States, John Marshall. (Making Elizabeth Marshall Martin the aunt of the first Chief Justice.) In The Life of John Marshall by Beveridge it mentions a copy of a letter (manuscript) to Thomas Marshall from his sister, Elizabeth Marshall Martin, dated June 15, 1755, referring to Braddeck's Expedition.) Will of John Marshall, "of the forest." made April 1, 1752, probated May 26, 1752, Records of Westmorland County, Deeds and Wills, Vol. 2, page 419.

Reference: page 281 and 282, Vol. 1, Jos. Habersham's *Historical Collections*, is a letter from Mary Isham Key Martin, widow of Marshall Martin, dated 1817, and a notation from the old family Bible, dated 1784, are reproduced:

Copy of letter—

"My dear Mrs. Peel: I find in the Sunday Constitution of March 17, a list of members of Capt. Lamar's Company who enlisted in the Revolutionary War in 1775. Among whom are James, John, and George Martin. The brothers, with four others were the sons to whom Elizabeth Marshall Martin so proudly referred when questioned by a Torry officer as to how many sons she had in the war. "Seven of them are engaged in the service of their Country." "Really, Madam," observed the officer sneeringly, "You have enough of them." "No, sir," said the matron proudly, "I wish I had fifty."

"James rose to rank of Colonel. John became a General. William was Captain of an artillery company, the only one in Gen. Clark's command in the memorable seige of Augusta when he (Capt. Martin) lost his life. It is of

him the Tory speaks 'to gratify his hatred to the Whigs by carrying the fatal news to the Mother of her gallant young son' saying 'that he had seen his brains blown out on the field of battle.' After the first shock the dreadful intelligence occasioned, this 'daughter of a hundred soldiers,' wife of a gallant officer, and mother of seven brave distinguished soldiers, calmly answered, 'He could not have died in a noblier cause.'

"All of these sons distinguished themselves in the Revolutionary War. But how could they do otherwise with such a patriotic mother who dedicated them to the service of their country with this inspiring injunction, 'Go, boys, fight for your country, fight till death if you must, but never let your country be dishonored. Were I a man I would go with you'.

'The wife of Col. James Martin. with several small children, the youngest being only a few weeks old, were put in a wagon and made to leave Augusta, simply because she was the wife of an American officer. She took refuge with her husband's mother at *Ninety Six.

The following was printed as a part of the same article and can be found on page 282, Vol. 1, Jos. Habersham's *Historical Collection*.

"At the seige of Augusta, when the captain was shot down but not yet dead, he, Marshall Martin, then a Lieutenanz, defended the dying soldier from a brutal assault by a party of Tories who tried to shoot and cut him lying on the ground. Marshall pulled off his hat and covered the

head of his fallen captain and standing bare-headed, fought for his and his captain's life until sudden relief came with the appearance of Gen. Elijah Clark with assistance. It was found that Marshall was wounded in the shoulder and the second finger of the left hand had been shot off. The captain died and Gen. Clark appointed Marshall in command of his company. Dated, May 9, 1784."

Under date of October 3, 1817, appears:

"Marshall Martin was captured by the British and imprisoned in Fort Galpin, but escaped through the aid of Fleet Foot, an Indian boy Marshall had saved from death several times. When the last gun was fired over Marshall's grave by his own company, Fleet Foot drew his bow and shot an arrow across his grave that held an eagle feather. Fleet Foot came home with me and stayed with us four days, but would not eat. That night we went to bed and have never seen him since. We loved him like a brother and our children must do the same.

"The family of Martins in Edgefield were remarkable during the Revolutionary War for being united in the cause of Independence. They were all Whigs and brave men. There were seven brothers and all took active parts and all made good soldiers. All survived the War except one, William who was the oldest. He was captain of artillery and was killed at the seige of Augusta. He was one of the oldest captains in service. These brothers were: Wiliam, Barkley, James, John, Edmund, Marshall and Matthew. The wives of these men were about as good and true soldiers as their husbands if the following story be correct of which there can be no doubt:

orning that important dispatches were being sent

up the country by the enemy, Mrs. William Martin and Mrs. Barclay Martin determined to waylay the courier and capture the papers. They dressed themselves in their husbands' clothes, took position near the road where the express must pass. Directly the courier appeared with a guard of two British officers. As they came up, the young women presented their muskets and demanded their instant surrender. The officers, panic-stricken, surrendered and were paroled at once. The ladies then took the dispatches, hastened home through the woods, and without loss of time, sent their prize to Gen. Green."

Both Martin and Marshall families have Coat of Arms. (Mackenzies' Colonial Families of the United States, Vol. 1.)

William Wade owned a big farm in what is now the heart of Kansas City. Uncle LeRoy Wade went there once and saw the old deed still in their records. When William Wade died the children did not know what to do. Nancy Jane was blind from birth. She was not William's daughter, but I do not know who her father was. They called her a woods colt. But William raised her as one of his cwn, and Grandfather took care of her till she died at a ripe old age. I remember her well. It was remarkable how she got around among the stock, and nothing ever hurt her.

When Grandfather's father died the children all walked to their grandparent's. John Boyle, living in the country around Cynthiana, Indiana. There they stayed until they were big enough to take care of themselves. Grandfather always took care of Aunt Jane. No one ever looked after the children's interest in their farm in Missouri; therefore it was lost.
