Preface

It was two years ago today (July 31, 1906) that one of Richard Webber's great-grandsons asked me about the family. Who were they? Where did they come from? I replied that I would find out, and this little book is the result. I wrote to several people and asked many questions; the record was complete, but scattered about. I found a complete chain, back to England. Our Aunt Lucy Sykes is a strong link in this chain, for she *remembers* seeing the aunts and uncles of the *second generation*; and several of us have seen the great-grandfather, Joseph Webber, who was born in 1772, and lived more than 95 years. After my list of ancestors was made, one of the family sent me a small printed book which verified what I had found, and gave me further dates and facts, so I cannot doubt that all is correct.

At the last reunion, July 31, 1907, it was voted that I should go on and complete the record. There are seven large branches in the Webber Family Tree, claiming descent from James, of England; and, after reaching the fourth generation, I have confined myself to our own branch, which is the seventh, headed by our grandfather, Richard⁴.

This has really been a labor of love, and I have enjoyed every letter sent me, and truly thank all who have so kindly helped me to gather dates and facts for this book.

The Key

The plan of this Genealogy is the best and plainest we could find to work from. Each person *born* with the surname *Webber* has a consecutive number, placed at the left hand of the name in the table.

Those men who are married and have children are noted by a cross (+) before their number in the table. This shows that the record is carried forward to a page where the number is given in large figures in the middle of the page, and each man's record and family is given by itself.

In the female lines each daughter's record and family are given a place in her father's record, at the place where her consecutive number is given. Her sons and daughters are numbered with figures in parentheses, viz.: (1), (2), (3), etc.; the grandchildren with numerals, viz.: (I), (II), (III), etc.; the great-grandchildren with capital letters, viz.: (A), (B), (C), etc.; the great-great-grandchildren with small letters, viz.: (a), (b), (c), etc. This difference is made to distinguish them from the names in the male lines.

The small figure at the right of the Christian name shows the generation of the person. Thus, the first man is number¹, and all his children are number², and this is the *first* generation. A son of number¹ is number², and his children are all number³, and this is the *second* generation,, and so on. Each generation is called by the number of the father of it. We have seven generations, from John¹ to Marion⁸.

N. B.—The abbreviations used most are these: b. for born; m. for married; unm. for unmarried; d. for died.

JOHN WEBBER¹ (son of James Webber, London, Eng.), born about A. D. 1700; came to Rehoboth, Mass., A. D. 1722; married HANNAH ROUNDS, May 4, 1737 (171 yrs. ago today, May 4, 1908); died Sept. 25, 1759. His widow died Oct. 13, 1778, aged 67 years, 8 months. Aunt Lucy Sykes has said she was always taught that John was the first to come from England. She also said: "My great-aunt, Mary Hicks, once said that my brother, Merrill Webber, looked like the Rounds. He was a little fellow then, and did not like her to say so, is why I remember it."

RICHARD WEBBER² (John¹), son of John and Hannah (Rounds) Webber, born in Rehoboth, Mass., Oct. 7, 1739. Was married Sept. 25, 1768, to SARAH CLARK, who died March 1, 1792, aged 42 years. He had two wives after this, both named Elizabeth. ELIZABETH No. 1 (to whom he was married Oct. 29, 1792) died March 28, 1796, aged 41 yrs. ELIZABETH No. 2 (to whom he was married Jan. 11, 1798) died Dec. 8, 1804, aged 54 years. Richard died Sept. 16, 1810. His grave may be seen, even to this day, in West Stafford, Conn. There is a neat stone, marked "Richard Webber, Died Sept. 16, 1810, Aged 71 years. Elizabeth, his Wife, Died Dec. 8, 1804, Aged 54 years."

Talcott; had one daughter, who is Mrs. Hastings; she has no children. They lived in Springfield, Mass. Maryette died in 1904. Aunt Lucy knew her well. Almeda married Cady.
- 18 Lucy,³ b. April 26, 1787; m. Thaddeus Clark, and lived in Woodstock; had two sons and a daughter, Mrs. Phelps. One son, Minor Clark, was one of the first Baptist ministers in Springfield, Mass.
- 19 Hannah,³ b. Nov. 11, 1789, never married. Aunt Lucy has seen her at the homes of her sisters and brother, Richard. She spent her last days with her niece, Mrs. Phelps, and died in 1878, aged 89 years.

JOSEPH WEBBER³ (Richard², John¹). son of Richard and Sarah (Clark) Webber, was born in Rehoboth, Mass., Sept. 17, 1772; married POLLY CARPENTER, April 17, 1796. She was born in Seekonk, Mass., Dec. 18, 1774. Aunt Lucy remembers her, and says: "That Polly Carpenter was a woman of rare excellence and purity." They lived the "simple life" in Stafford, Ct., and here their children were born. In 1833 they lived near Palmer, Mass. Their eldest daughter had married a Mormon (before polygamy was practiced) and lived in New York State, so they went to visit her and investigate the Mormons. On May 6, 1833, they started from Palmer by stage to Springfield and Albany; took canal to Schenectady, arriving May 9. Arrived at Buffalo, May 16; took steamer to Dunkirk, Chaut. Co., N. Y., next day, went by wagon and on foot to Pomfret, arriving the 17th, 11 days on the way. They visited the Mormons in their log houses, attended meetings, and heard their peculiar services, also "gift of tongues," etc. The prophet, Smith, was not here, but stayed in Ohio. They returned home in the same manner they came, being 10 days on the way, and reached home June 11, having been gone 5 weeks, 1 day, at a total cost of \$51.70. Joseph decided that he "would as lief join a little small humble Methodist Society as to join the Mormons and go to Mt. Zion in the west." He was never very strong, and often let out his farm on shares and taught school. In their old age they lived with Uncle James and Aunt Mary Whitman, their youngest daughter, on a farm in Belchertown, Mass. In 1862 Polly fell on the ice and broke her hip, and never walked again. She was then in her 88th year, and Joseph in the 90th year of age. He died Dec. 12, 1866, aged 95 years. Polly died Jan. 4, 1868, aged 93 years. The writer has seen their graves in the old burying-ground in Belchertown. In 1870 she visited with Aunt Mary in the same old farm house where they lived. Their rooms were still quaintly furnished as of old, and the attic was a wonderful museum of old looms, spinning-wheels, and other ancient implements of industry.

RICHARD WEBBER⁴ (Joseph³, Richard², John¹), son of Joseph and Polly (Carpenter) Webber; was born March 13, 1800, at Stafford, Conn. (This book is named for him.) He married LOVINA BRADWAY, April 17, 1821. She was born in Stafford, April 1, 1799, and was a daughter of Abel and Naomi (Simmons) Bradway. Her grandfather was Eleazer Bradway, who married ———— Phillips. Richard and his family lived in several places in Massachusetts and Connecticut. He was a local preacher, and also a carpenter. The writer has seen a country "meeting-house" in Hampden Co., Mass., that was built by him. In A. D. 1838 he decided to move his family from Palmer, Mass., to the West; so they came in emigrant fashion, to the Western Reserve; they traveled by wagon, canal, and steamboat, and were 18 days on the way, and reached Medina Co., Ohio, in November. He settled on a farm in Hinckley Township and built a house of logs. With the help of his sons he cleared the forest and tilled the soil, and they soon had corn enough for "puddins" and for the stock. He was prospered, and a pleasant home replaced the log cabin, and the "old oaken bucket" hung at the back door. He was called "Elder Webber," and, as a local preacher, was well known all over Northern Ohio. In the fall of 1854 his youngest son, Joseph, was sick with typhoid fever, and died Sept. 6. In the absence of the expected minister he officiated at the funeral of Joseph. Then he, also, was sick with the fever, and died Oct. 17. His obituary says:

"The Rev. Richard Webber departed this life at his residence in Hinckley, Medina Co., O., Oct. 17, 1854. He was born in Stafford, Conn., March 13, 1800, embraced religion in the 18th year of his age, and was licensed to preach soon after. In the 22d year of his age he was married to Miss Lovina Bradway, and in 1838 moved to Ohio. Soon after, he joined the Wesleyan Church, where he remained until 1846, when he united with the Protestant Methodist Church, where he remained until his death. As a citizen he was esteemed by all; as a minister he was regarded as being among the first in talent. During his sickness I called twice to see him, when he told me he was resigned to the will of God; that it had been the business of his life to prepare for death; and if the Lord had anything more for him to do, and spared his life, he would do it. He died in the triumph of faith, leaving a widow and large family to mourn his loss. But few ministers were called upon more frequently to attend funerals than he was; he was peculiarly interesting upon such occasions, consequently a severe loss to the community. 'But he being dead yet speaketh. Yea, saith the Spirit, blessed are the dead that die in the Lord.'"

About this time Lovina's brothers, Olney and Wm. Harrison Bradway, and their wives, Harriet and Sally, brought their families to Hinckley, and afterward to Medina, O. They are not forgotten. Lovina lived many years in the homes of her children, and died when with her son Alfred, at Hinckley Centre, Oct. 8, 1877.

RICHARD MERRILL WEBBER³ (Richard⁴, Joseph³, Richard², John¹), commonly called "Merrill," second son of Richard and Lovina (Bradway) Webber, was born June 9, 1826, at Palmer, Mass.
