- 2. Phoenusa (Fenius Farsa) Founded a school in the Valley of Senaar after the confusion of tongues.
- 3. Niul. Because of his great learning, he was invited to visit Pharaoh, King of Egypt. Refined the language of Gaelic (Gaul) B.C. 1896
- 4. Goadhal, ancestor of the Glanna-Gael. Had a green scar upon his neck that marked the place where a serpent bit him and was healed by Moses. "Glas" (Irish green) was added to his name on account of the green scar which he carried all the rest of his life.

- 6. Syruth. Died on the Island of Creta (Candia)
- 7. Heber Scott. Slain in Battle by Noemus, the former king's son.
- 8. Beemain
- 9. Ogamain
- 10. Tait. King of Scythia
- 11. Agnon. Died while coasting on the Caspian Sea
- 12. Lamhfionn. Landed with his sons from wanderings at sea, at Gotha, afterwards Lydia, where Carthage was built.
- 13. Heber Glunfionn, born in Gothia; his posterity there lived for eight generations.
- 14. Agnon Fionn
- 15. Febric Glas
- 16. Nenuall
- 17. Huadhad
- 18. Alladh
- 19. Arcadh
- 20. Dead. All these lived and died kings of Gotha
- 21. Brathaus. He went to what is now Spain, and made a colony at Galicia
- 22. Breogham (Brigus). King of Galicia, Andalusia, Murcia, Castile and Portugal, all of which he took with the sword.

- 23. Bile. King of these countries after his father died and also of York, Lancaster, Durham and Westmoreland, colonies in Britain, names for Breoghan who was called Brigus.
- 24. Galamh (Milesius). After the death of Milesius, the kingdom was divided between his two sons, Neber and Heremon, who became jointly the first of 183 monarchs of Gaelic, Milesian or Scottish race that ruled Ireland for 2885 years from A.M. 3500. This invasion of Ireland took place in the year 3500 after the creation of the world. Then, next year, Solomon began the erection of the Temple at Jerusalem as Pharaoh (I Kings 3, I) gave his daughter in marriage to Solomon, and Milesius was contemporary of Solomon's. We may infer that it was the same Pharaoh who gave his daughter, Princess Scota, to Milesius in marriage.
- 25. Heremon, 7th son of Milesius, was king of Connaught, Dalriade, Leinster, Meath, Origiall, Ossory; Scotland since the 5th century Ulster since the 4th century and of England from the reign of Henry 2nd, down to the present time. He died B.C. 1698.
- 26. Irieal Faidh (Prophet reigned from 1680 to 1670 B.C. and died 1670.
- 27. Eithrial, reigned from 1670 to 1650 B.C. Slain by Conmall at the Battle of Soirreans in Leinster 1650 B.C. He wrote with his own hand a history of the Gauls.
- 28. Foll-Aich
- 29. Tighernmas. Originated the Scotch Paaid. Died 1543 B.C., at Magh Sleaght in County Leitrim as he was adoring the sun god, "Crom Cruach" which he had created.

- 32. Fiocha Labhrainn. Fell in the Battle of Bealgada in 1448 B.C.
- 33. Aongus Olmucaca. Died 1409 B.C.

- 36. Prince Drin. Gentlemen wore chain around their necks and golden helmets were given brave soldiers, during his reign.

- 1. Marcus Antonius, (143-87 B. C.), called Oritor, was praetor in 104 B.C., Governor of Cilicia in 103 B.C., and Consul in 99 B.C. He was one of the aristocrats who supported Sulla, and when Marius and Cinna seized Rome in 87, was executed by them. He figured in Cicero's De Oratore
- 2. Gaius Antonius, surnamed Hybrida, son of the above named, was expelled from the Senate in 70 B.C., but was Cicero's colleague, and praetor in 65 B.C., and, as Consul in 63. He was partisan of Catiline, but Cicero secured his loyalty to the State by yielding to him the province of Macedonia. His army defeated Catiline, although, because of friend-ship for the latter, he relinquished the command to one of his lieutenants. He plundered his province, and, in 59, was condemned for extortion, though defended by Cicero. He retired to Cephalonia, but was recalled by Caesar to Rome in 14 B.C.

He had the Salic law drawn up about the year 500. In 493, he married Clothilde of Burgundy, b. 475, d. at Tours, 545, "the Girl of the French Vineyards." It was she who led him to embrace Christianity. He was baptized at Rheims on Christmas Day in 496, with 3,000 of his followers. When Clovis first listened to the story of Christ's Crucifixion, he was so moved that he cried: "If I had been there, with my valiant Franks, I would have avenged him."
