For instance, I had not realized until I compared the birthdates of the "A" John Walker children with dates in the Ainlay family and history that the Reverend John Walker and his family were living in Ainlayville at the time that my grandmother A.2 Eliza Jane and Grandfather John Ainlay were married in Ainlayville. Therefore, Reverend John Walker was one of the Ministers, probably the first, in the Methodist Church which William and Eleanor Ainlay helped to establish in Ainlayville. He was no doubt the Minister in the church which was later sold to Watson Ainlay and which became the site for Watson's home.

As you read the material within this pamphlet, consider it as a hand clasp, each with the other, across the miles and across the years.

Explanation of Numbering System

For indicating the different individuals in these family records, we have tried to formulate a plan that would be easily understood and readily followed.

Names of children are indented towards the right, and first given in a list, together, in order of age. Then, as the head of a family, their names again appear, in turn, near the margin.

The descendants of each are followed through to the end of the line before another is taken up. The children of A are A.1, A.2, etc. The children of A.1 are A.1.1, A.1.2, etc. Each number added represents another generation. The number nearest the name indicates the place, in order of age, of that child, in the family.

We wish to know, for example, who A.3.1.1 is, and we trace back in regular order to A.3.1, the parent; A.3, the grandparent; A, the great-grandparent, the first child of the common ancestor.

It is obvious that a new set of identifying numbers for the AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay family is in order, strictly speaking, for the Walker Genealogy numbering system. However, in order to save much typing, I am inserting the AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay genealogy just as it is in the Ainlay Genealogy. I think it will not be too confusing. I shall always identify the names or numbers of that family, in referring to them, as an Ainlay, in this manner - AG, meaning Ainlay Genealogy, therefore AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay. Here is an instance of one of the definite advantages of this numbering system, since a family can be omitted without affecting the correct genealogical numbering of the rest of the family. It might be an interesting occupation for a winter's evening to also number the AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay family through its rightful numbering in the Walker Genealogy.

A History of the Walker Family

The Reverend John Smith Walker was born in Ireland in 1809; and when he was still a baby, the family moved to Scotland. He came to Canada in 1840 and settled at St. Marys, Ontario. He was a farmer, and he was devoted to the Methodist Episcopal Church, which he served as a local preacher. He was also a "Circuit Rider" preacher. AG-A.2.3.6 Ben Ainlay says that he recalls hearing his mother (A.2 Eliza Jane) telling of her father's long and earnest prayers. I, too, remember that she loved her father dearly. She often spoke of his kindness and gentleness toward his family. She would say, "He was a good, kind soul, and he loved God with all his heart." "A" Reverend John Walker married Mary Dudley, who was born in Lower Canada. She was a daughter of John and Mary Dudley. She had two sisters and two brothers - Martha, Ozias, Phoebe, and James. Her father was a farmer, and he must have moved from Lower Canada to the vicinity of Brussels, Canada West, as he died there in 1879, and besides, Mary, his wife, was born in St. Marys, a town not far from Brussels. "A" Reverend John and Mary Walker had eleven children - James, Eliza Jane, Rachel, John Smith, Archibald, Mary, Phoebe Ann, William Wesley, George, Ozias Hough, and Jeremiah H. Three of them - Ozias, Phoebe, and James - were named after the Dudley side of the family. (I must explain here that it is my opinion that in our family the name Phoebe is no doubt spelled with an a. I have a personal signature of Phoebe Holmes, and it seems to me that surely her name was spelled the same as the person's for whom she was named. However, this does not always follow. But I know that my mother always insisted that her sister's name, AG-A.2.3.10 Phoebe, ended with an a. So there is some basis for the unusual spelling. I have spelled the name Phoebe in the genealogy record because, at the time I mimeographed it, I had not yet received the signature of Phoebe Holmes. I had taken the e spelling from a printed record which used the usual form of spelling the name.) Grandmother Eliza Jane Ainlay must have known the Dudley family well, probably neighboring with some of the Dudley families, at least the family of James Dudley because he lived at Brussels as a farmer and he had three children, one of whom was named Lula. This Lula is no doubt the person after whom my mother, AG-A.2.3.9 Lula, was named. The children in the AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay family who were named after the Walker and Dudley side of the family are Rachel, Mary, Phoebe, Lula, and perhaps Charles Wesley (after William Wesley).

A.1 James Walker married Emily Coker. They had nine children (see page 1, genealogy). Ada Yocum (A.1.4) is living at Cedar Rapids, not far from Fullerton, where the family lived and where her father died.

The history of A.2 Eliza Jane Ainlay is given in the AG-A.2.3 John Ainlay history which follows:

A.3 Rachel Harrison married Richard Harrison and they lived at Teeswater and later in Walkerton. They had seven children, six girls and one boy (see page 2, genealogy). A.3.2 Clara Todd writes, "I remember that Mother went to Aunt Phoebe's in Mt. Jewett and to Jerry's near there. In fact, I had a trip there myself. It seems like a century ago, though. Dad died at the age of sixty-four but Mother lived to be seventy-three. She spent most of her time with Mary (A.3.1) in Walkerton. She had gone down town one day. Suddenly she took this pain while talking to a friend on the street. They took her into a nearby drug store, but she did not recover. It was a heart attack. As I look back, I remember that Mother was very popular. She was so kind to every one. As the girls of the family grew up they took positions. But Mary and I stayed at home until we were married. All married well and were comfortable, but just Merle in Toronto and myself are left of the family of seven. A.3.1.1 Mildred Brien writes, "Mother (A.3.1 Mary Appel) was the eldest of the family of seven. I vaguely remember my Grandmother and Grandfather Harrison. My mother was very much like her mother. My mother and father were married in Walkerton where my father was a merchant. My mother passed on two years ago in Walkerton, and my father died there in 1940. I was an only child and lived in Walkerton until I went in training for a nurse in 1928 at the Toronto General Hospital and was graduated in 1931. I was on the staff there for five years, and in 1937 I married Dr. Francis Staples Brien from Windsor. We lived in Windsor until 1945 where my husband practiced medicine with his father, Dr. J. W. Brien. My husband went overseas in 1942 with #10 Canadian General Hospital. When he returned in October 1945, we moved here to London, where he became Professor of Medicine at the University of Western Ontario. We have one daughter, Mary Elizabeth, who is in her second year at London South Collegiate. Clara A.3.2 married Howard Todd and they had two children. Their daughter, Helen, lives in Essex, has one daughter, Nancy, and Helen is Principal in the school there where she enjoys teaching. Their son, Harrison, lives in Guelph, is in the automobile business, and has two nice children, Susan and Howard. Clara also lives at Guelph. A.3.3 Flo married George Lindsay and lived in Red Deer, Alberta. They had four children (see page 3). Flo died in Red Deer in 1943, and I believe her husband is still living there. A.3.4 Doll died in Albany in 1948. They had three children (page 3). A.3.5 Linus Harrison was married in Toronto where he died in 1918 during the bad "flu" epidemic. A.3.6 Maude Harrison died in 1901 at Walkerton in her seventeenth year. A.3.7 Merle was married to Mike Parsons in Toronto. He was in World War I, and I do not know what happened to him afterwards. They had one daughter, Margaret (Peg), and she is married to a Mr. Frank Mills, and they have five boys (page 4). Merle was married a second time to Andrew Hudson who has since died, and Merle is living in Toronto."

A.4 John Smith Walker married Martha Ann Carr, and they lived in Brussels where their first child, Cecile, was born. She died there at the age of nine, according to the record. However, A.4.2 Percival and A.4.3 John Hilton were born in Pennsylvania. It is not quite clear whether the family had returned to Brussels

at the time that Cecile died or if the date of her death was earlier than shown in the record. A.4.4 Pearl and A.4.5 Richard were born in Farnam. Pearl Jagelski says, "My folks left Canada for Pennsylvania when quite young. They later moved to Farnam." After A.4 Johnny Walker died, Aunt Annie lived on the hill south of Farnam in the Walker home for many years. A.4.2 Percy was a postmaster, and he died in 1953. A year or so before his death, he returned to Farnam for a visit to his old home town. A.4.3 John Hilton Walker married Mary Hodgkin and they had one daughter, Muriel, who married Loyal Warner, and they have two children. "Hilt" was a carpenter and builder. He and Mary were living at Scottsbluff at the time of his death. His wife, Mary, writes, "I have made my home with Muriel ever since Hilt left us, and have greatly enjoyed seeing Jon and Laurel grow from babies to the ages of eighteen and sixteen." A.4.4 Pearl Jagelski says, "We have lived in California for thirty-one years and think it is a grand place to live. My daughter, Irene, and her husband operate a night club in Grants Pass, Oregon. My brother Dick (A.4.5) is a plumber in California."

A.5 Archibald Walker married Sarah and they lived at Farnam for many years. They had no children of their own, and they adopted Raymond when he was about four years old after his mother died. Raymond grew to manhood at Farnam where Archie and Sarah both lived and died. Raymond attended a business school. He is, and has been for a number of years, a very successful accountant at Lincoln, Nebraska. He married Katherine Scanlar and they have five children (see page 5a). Both A.4 Johnny and A.5 Archie are buried at Farnam.

A.6 Mary Girvin and Charles, who was a carpenter and carriage maker, had nine children (page 6), the eldest, Ann Priscilla, being the only one born in Canada. They must have moved to Canada Hill, a settlement near St. Paul, Nebraska, some time between 1877 and 1879 since the second child, John David, was born at St. Paul in 1879. Charlotte, Charles, and Jane were also born there. Some time between 1885 and 1887 the family moved to Arickaree, Colorado, where Joseph, Edith, William, and Ethelyn were born. Aunt Mary (A.6) came to Farnam to visit her sister Jane (A.2). Grandmother Jane Ainlay was failing in health so Aunt Mary stayed with her for several months. At that time Aunt Mary's home was in Flagler, Colorado. A.6.3 Charlotte LeMasters writes, "Mother (A.6 Mary) gave my daughter Buelah her rolling pin. It is worn down to one half of its original size. She said that when Grandmother gave it to her she told her that Grandfather brought it from Ireland. He also brought two large red cedar chests, one of which Grandmother ("A" Mary Walker) used for her belongings when she traveled back and forth to Nebraska and Colorado. She made several trips. I do not know who has the chests - maybe no one has them now. But Buelah has the rolling pin and the pin cushion of Grandmother's that has wool from Grandmother's sheep which she raised in Canada. I recall that Mother told us that Grandfather Walker was a great church worker, a Minister in the church. One Sunday he bid them all goodbye, saying that he would not be able to meet with them again. Grand-

mother and all of the congregation were mystified. During the next week he had a pain in his big toe. The pain spread to his leg. The doctors cut his leg off twice during the week, the last time above the knee. Then the pain started in the other foot and they wanted to cut that leg off but Grandfather said 'No' - that he would rather go than be without legs. So he lived only ten days from when he took the pain first. Some years after Grandfather Walker died, Grandmother married John Mitchell. My mother (Mary) was young at the time but was soon old enough so she went to work (they did then quite young), and Phoebe A.7 got work then, too. After that, Mitchell would not let them come home to see Grandmother or the younger boys. Mother said she dreamed nights that the boys were getting hurt and one night she dreamed that one got terribly burned, and she wanted to see them the next day. But Old Mitchell (as she said they all called him) wasn't going to let her see them so she waited until she knew he was gone somewhere. Then she slipped in to see them. Mitchell lived about six years. After he died, and before, everyone called Grandmother "Grandma Walker" even while Mr. Mitchell was alive, so she just took the name of Mary Walker altogether the rest of her life. I remember my mother talked of her oldest brother, James, who married soon after Grandmother and Mitchell were married. Also, I seem to recall that Uncle James was a church worker like Grandfather. He also bid his people in church goodbye, and he took sick in a week and died of pneumonia. Everyone was puzzled as they were when Grandfather Walker bid his congregation goodbye. Of course, it was a different place. (This must have been at Fullerton.) About that red cedar chest of Grandmother's - I remember so well when she once came to us in Colorado. I was the one in the family who claimed the cats, and the next morning I found that a Tom had been there during the night and had killed three kittens. Dad found him out in his workshop and killed him, and we kids were to drag him off and bury him. Well, as kids will do, I had to give him a couple of kicks, and when I came into the house, the mother cat lit into my legs and I screamed and got on Grandmother's red cedar chest and I grabbed a cushion and beat at the mother cat. Mother asked me if I had touched the tomcat. I said, "Yes, I kicked him." So she took my shoes and cleaned them, and all was well. I will tell you of an incident that Mother used to laugh about. It was when she and Aunt Phoebe were youngsters - the style was those pantalettes. They could not afford to match each dress, so they made them so as to come above the knee and they used what they called carpet-string tied around their legs to hold the pantalettes and their stockings. And they were really dressed! Aunt Phoebe was quite a girl to dress, anyhow, as Mother said she spent so much on clothes after they got to earning their own money. Aunt Phoebe was the artist in the family, and your mother (A.2.3.9 Lula) was in the next generation, and my eldest sister and Pearl (A.4.4) are artists as are two of my girls, Beulah (A.6.3.1) and Carol (A.6.3.5). It seems there are one or two in each family, but the rest can't draw anything. As Avis (A.6.3.3) says, "It is all we can do to draw our breath." A.6.3 Charlotte married John Frisbie and five children were born to them (page 7). Some time after he passed

away, she married a Mr. Barr, who also passed away. Then in 1950 she married John LeMasters and they lived on a small acreage north of Seattle until he became ill. They then moved into Seattle where they lived until John passed away August 11, 1954. Charlotte is living there now, but may join members of her family. Her daughter Carol remained with her for several months during John's illness and during the time that Charlotte herself was incapacitated because of a broken wrist and an injured knee. Charlotte has a very fine family, and several of the members of her family were with her at the time of her husband's funeral. (I was there and I know how wonderful they all were to her and how much it meant to her to have them with her.)

A.7 Phoebe Ann Holmes married Richard Holmes in **Brussels**. They moved to Mt. Jewett, Pennsylvania, where they lived for many years. "Dick" was superintendent of the Phoenix Oil Company. Phoebe was a very fine artist. She painted many oil paintings, and she also painted china. (I believe it was her sister Rachel who also painted china when she lived at Mt. Jewett or Kane with Phoebe.) Her son, Fred, has many beautiful pieces of china that she painted. My mother used to tell us about the beautiful home of Aunt Phoebe and Uncle Dick Holmes at Mt. Jewett. She had visited them there. Great-Grandmother Mary Dudley Walker, Phoebe's mother, lived with them for some time and passed away in their home in Mt. Jewett. The following is taken from a letter written by Phoebe to Charlotte Frisbie LeMasters:

Kane, Pa.
Dec. 30, 1934

"I had such a nice card from your cousin in Canada, your Aunt Rachel's daughter, Mary Appel, of Walkerton, Ontario, - the town your Grandfather Walker founded."

Signed Aunt Phoebe Holmes

Phoebe's and Dick's son, Fred, married Olive Coulter. They live at Kane, Pa., where he went into Real Estate. He is also associated with the Poster Advertising Company at Kane. His mother lived with them at the time of her death. They have three children (page 11).

A.8 William Wesley Walker was born in Grey Township, Canada West. (Phoebe, Wesley, George, Ozias, and Jeremiah were all born in Grey Township, and that probably means Ainlayville. Phoebe is listed as being born in Brussels, but Brussels was not incorporated until 1873.) Wesley married Phoebe Hyatt of Alma, N. Y. (a teacher), and to them were born five children (page 12). He died in 1917 in the township of Bolivar, N.Y., where they had lived for twenty-five years. His wife died three years later. A.8.5 Genevieve Clark writes, "My father, Wesley Walker, went to Nebraska with Uncle Johnny Walker, Uncle Jerry Walker, and Uncle Dick Holmes. They each took up a homestead of a quarter section. It was a mile square and they each had a quarter of it. Uncle Jerry, Uncle Dick, and my father were all homesick for the East. They all came back in about two years. Uncle Johnny stayed and about thirty years later sold his place for about \$25,000.00.

Uncle Dick settled at Mt. Jewett, Pennsylvania, and Uncle Jerry settled in Hazelhurst, Pennsylvania. My father owned a big farm in the township of Bolivar, N.Y. We were close enough so we went back and forth to visit once or twice a year at least. I had a big family and I have a farm at Richburg, N.Y. My house burned down on Friday the thirteenth in 1953. I live in Wellsville now in an apartment."

A.9 George Walker was born in Grey Township in 1859. Nothing further is known of him at present.

A.10 Ozias Hough Walker never married. Aunt Charlotte (AG-A.2.3.8) writes, "Uncle Ozias lived in our home on Timber Creek, and he was just a young man when he died in our home." It is believed that Ozias was a photographer. We have a photograph taken of my mother when she was about six or eight years old which has the following inscription on the back of it : "J. H. Walker, Artist, Scenic Photographing a Specialty." Butterflies in the picture were superimposed. It may be that Ozias and Jerry were in the photography business together, or Jerry may have gone into it after his brother died. At any rate, it is a very fine photograph of my mother.

A.11 Jeremiah H. Walker married Anna McElwain, and they had four children (page 15). He was a storekeeper and he was Justice of the Peace at Hazelhurst, Pennsylvania, where they moved from Farnam some time between 1894 and 1898. Anna McElwain (or Annie McEllvaine) was a teacher and china painter of fame of Eustis, Nebraska, at the time of her marriage to Jerry. A.11.1 Myrtle and Joe Heffernan live at Rochester, N.Y. She says, "My mother lives with me since my step-father died." (Annie had married again after Jerry's death to a Mr. Houck.) Myrtle has a son living in Illinois and a daughter in Iowa. She herself attended Northwestern University here in Evanston for two years.

I should like to say, Walker Family, that, as your genealogist, I have tried to set forth the life of the family in such a way that it may be an inspiration to the youth of the family, a comfort to the elder members of the family, and a faithful record for the perusal of generations yet unborn.
