THE WAUGH FAMILY

After long research in ancient literature and the ancient Norse language, Clarence H. Waugh of Pittsfield, Mass. finds the Waughs are of pure Norman blood.

Norse in the Norse language means North, hence Northmen. In A.D. 912, this race was living in Scandinavia and in the Isles of Orkney and they came from their northern home and conquered a province of France called "Neustria," under Rolf, the brother of the Scandinavian Earl of Orkney. These Norsemen named the province "Normandy" and from that time this powerful tribe were called Normans. In the next century they conquered England and some of them settled there and some in Scotland. Most of the Waugh clan settled in Scotland.

Among the ancient names in the old Norse language is found the name of Waugh. It means Mound, Mound people, and so we trace the Waughs down thru the Norman conquest and find them civil and military engineers. Nowhere does the history record the Waughs as fighters. They were a peaceable people. In Scotland there were powerful clans of Morrisons and many others who foraged and stole from other clans, but the Waughs always lived in "mixed clans." Even today you cannot find any place or country where any great numbers of Waughs are living in the same community.

The Waughs did fight for their religion and went to Ireland as early as 1648 and later they were at the seige of Londonderry, Ireland, where William the Prince of Orange, triumphed and established the supremacy of the Protestant cause.

The Waughs and many other Scotch people then lived at Aghaway Parish, 40 miles from the city of Londonderry, which was the shire town of that county. But after that conquest, the Scotch colony was greatly oppressed by the government and the Church of England. They held to their religious faith with a tenacity that did not accord with the popular faith of Ireland nor that of their English masters. Disliking the institution of tithe and rent, being subjected to the Church of England, they resolved to emigrate to America. In 1718 large numbers of these people landed on our shores, some of them near Boston and others near Casco Bay, Maine. The latter settled in New Hampshire and Maine and they named a place in New Hampshire, Londonderry, in honor of that place in Ireland.

There were three brothers Waugh. William Waugh settled in New Hamp-shire. Robert Waugh was a Baptist minister. His descendants live in Maine today.

John Waugh, our ancestor, lived in eastern Massachusetts, in Windham county, Conn. and Litchfield. The town of Litchfield was divided into 60 shares. John Marsh of Hartford owned one-half and John Buel of Lebanon, Conn. one-half. John Waugh made his purchase of the old "Waugh Farm" of said John Buel, where said John Waugh came and settled June 19, 1745.

John Waugh was born in the north of England, near the Scottish border, in 1687. He died at South Farms, Litchfield, Conn., in 1781. His wife's name was Margaret. Children:

Joseph born 1726

Married July 1754 to Eliz. Minor of Woodbury, Conn., daughter of John and Elizabeth Minor. He was in the French and Indian War and the American Revolution.

Thomas born 1727
Alexander born 1729

Joseph Waugh (son of Joseph born 1726) was born in Litchfield, Conn. Dec. 4, 1763 and died Jan. 12, 1849 in Ross County, Ohio, aged 76 years. Joseph Waugh left Litchfield, Conn. in the year 1789 with his father Joseph Waugh (born 1726). They stopped for a time near Pittsburgh, Penna. where Joseph Waugh was married to Mary Hopkins Jan. 18, 1791. She was born in Pennsylvania Dec. 29, 1773 and died in Ross county, Ohio Aug. 1, 1861, aged 87 years, 7 months, 2 days. Mary Hopkins was a descendant of Stephen Hopkins, who came to America with the Puritans on the Mayflower. This is where our Mayflower membership is possible.

Joseph Waugh (b. 1763) made application for a pension on Oct. 19, 1832 at which time he was 69 years of age and residing in Ross county, Ohio, and his pension was allowed for 15 months actual service as a private in the Connecticut troops, Revolutionary War. A part of the time he served under Capt. Watson and Colonel Cooper. He enlisted at Litchfield, Conn. His wife Mary made application and received a pension for the service of her husband.

To the General Assembly to be holden in New Haven the 2nd Thursday of October 1775. We the subscribers, inhabitants of the Southfarms society and all of us living about a mile west of the Meeting House stake would now humbly beg leave to signify to this honorable assembly that if a mile of land should be taken off of the east end of our Society and the land which lyeth west should be put on, which would naturally bring the meeting house nearer to us, but notwithstanding that conveniency we have considered the reasons and objections which the Societye's committee give against it and are of the opinion that it would be destructive to the Society and hurtful to us, therefore we desire earnestly that there might not be any land taken off from the east end of the Society.
