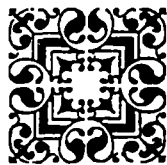


The West Family

THE WEST FAMILY

Eleazer West b. Jan. 11, 1752, is the first known ancestor in the West lineage. We have not as yet [1936] been able to ascertain his parentage. According to an old record found among the papers of Aaron Baker West we know that his wife's name was Anna _____, b. July 3, 1760. From this record, also, we know the names and birthdays of his children.

The Gazetteer of Towns, Sullivan County, N. Y., Pub. 1872 give the following:

"The New Vernon Old School Baptist Church located at New Vernon, was organized March 2, 1785, with sixteen members under the pastorate of Elder Eleazer West. The first house of worship was erected in 1800. The present one which will seat about 400 in 1853 at a cost of \$2,200. Present mem. is 80. Elder Benjamin Montonye succeeded Elder West in the pastorate May 15, 1794 and continued till his death Dec. 25, 1825. He was succeeded by Elder Beebe May 1, 1826. The church stands in Sullivan County." In 1936 Services are held in this Church but once a year. There are only three members of this church living.

In the History of Sullivan Co., by Quinlan on Page 448, we read, "During the eighty-eight years of its existence this church (New Vernon) had but three pastors, Elder Benjamin Montayne succeeded Elder West May 15, 1794 and continued in office until his death on Christmas 1825. He was followed by Eld. Gilbert Beebe whose pastorate dates from May 1, 1826. He has consequently had the oversight of this flock nearly 47 years."

There is on file at Goshen, N. Y. an indenture dated in 1799 disposing of land to children of Eleazer West, deceased. In this indenture we find, "Abial West, Anna Harding, wife of Issac Harding, Dilly West, Sally West, Eleazer West and William West, children and heirs at law of Eleazer West, deceased." From the above we know that Eleazer West Sr. died prior to 1799. In as much as his oversight of the New Vernon Church terminated on or before May 15, 1794. We surmise that he died prior to that date.

The 1790 Census gives Eleazer's residence in Wallkill, Ulster Co., N. Y. At the time the Deerpark Census was taken, Deerpark was in Ulster Co., as was most of Orange Co. It was in 1799, Oct. 1, the County of Orange was formed and set up as a separate County taking away many of towns formerly in Ulster. Rev. Eleazer West died in Oct. 1793. He was buried in the old Elijah Reeves cemetery near New Vernon.

FACTS ABOUT ELEAZER WEST from 1771 to 1784

A few meager records gleaned from the Susquehanna papers reveal to us that at the age of 19, Eleazer West was living in the Wyoming Valley near Wilkes-Barre, Pa. At the time of the Wyoming Massacre by the Indians he was at Ft. Pittston, and escaped death almost miraculously. He was wounded and for two days made his way slowly through brush and woods until he found his friends.

Eleazer married Anna _____ about 1775. His wife's parents were at Wilkes-Barre in 1778. In 1784 Eleazer and his family moved to New Vernon, Orange Co. N. Y. where he founded the New Vernon Church just across the line in Sullivan Co.

We do not yet know the following:

1. His wife's family name
2. Eleazer West's parentage
3. Eleazer West's birthplace
4. Names of brothers and sisters.

We conjecture that:

1. Abial West who signed the memorial to the Hon. General Assembly of the Colony of Connecticut on Dec. 27, 1773 was either his brother or his father.
2. Eleazer was from Connecticut as many of his closest associates are known to have come from there.
3. He was probably related to Richard West.

At the time of the Wyoming massacre, P. W. Sheaffer, Esq. in the list of Forts published in 1875 calls this Fort Brown and makes the following statement:

"Ft. Brown Date 1775 Pittston, Lucerne Co. - Capt. Jeremiah Blanchard commanded at this fort at the time of the Wyoming Massacre July 3, 1778 and the following among others were inmates at the time.

Richard West"

History of Wilkes-Barre

The History of Wilkes-Barre and Wyoming Valley by Harvey. p. 715 Vol. II names the original settlers on the Susquehanna, Dec. 1771 made up by Zebulon Butler and Stephen Fuller. "Eleazer West, Dec. 1" is found there.

Page 1690. William West Jr. 339 acres called "Purchase" on Jacobs' Plains. Richard West, Oct. 24. The Hardings and the Jenkins came from New London Co. Ct. Abraham Harding Sr. was b. in Rhode Island. P. 947, in 1777, Abraham Harding, Thomas Harding and Eleazer West are listed. Stephen Harding b. 1723 in R. I. was a brother-in-law to John Jenkins. Vol. 3 p. 1280, a bill of losses sustained by the inhabitants of the town of Westmoreland from July 1778 to May 1780, Eleazer West, 53 pounds 10 shillings, Richard West, 65 pounds 17 shillings. Vol. 3 p. 1314, is a petition for land from New York by Eleazer West and others. Vol. 3 p. 1332 A list of those who are actually settlers and own the land. Eleazer West is one of these.

A Letter Concerning Eleazer West from Elisha Harding To Hon. Charles Miner

(Vol. 7, p. 93, Wyo. Hist. & Geo.)

I will here mention the circumstance of Eleazer West of Exeter, who went to Pittston Fort, his wife's parents being in Wilkesbarre Fort. They removed to Wilkesbarre and he, West, went out with the rest to battle and on the retreat was shot in the heel and out at the foot. He said he ran until he could run no further, hid or lay down in some small brush not high enough to cover a man and another man ran in the same direction near him and was killed by an indian who scalped and stript him holding up the jacket between them until he was passed him and was not discovered and so escaped.

I consider it providential, he, West lay until dark then took to the mountains and strove to get to the shawney garrison but he being weak and lame did not reach there until the indians had possession and set fire to all. He then continued down the river until he was at the Nanticoke Falls and crossed over. He then took the woods for Wilkes-Barre but soon saw the smoke arise which told him that the indians were there. He then shifted his course for Pittston but found that all was destroyed.

He then, faint and lame, said he would go to the block house at the Parker place, so called in Pittston, but found that all was destroyed. He then returned to the woods which appeared to be his only place of safety and to his great joy soon discovered a horse which he caught and peeled some bark for a halter, mounted and got into an indian path leading from Pittston to Bethlehem and followed it until he came to where it crossed the road leading from Wilkes Barre to Stroudsburg, then taking the Stroudsburg road arrived safe at Stroudsburg or where it now stands without ever having his wounds dressed where he found his family who had for a number of days mourned for him as one slain in battle, but it appears that he was reserved for a noble purpose. He afterwards became an eminent preacher and lived for a number of years respected by those who were acquainted with him.

We the Subscribers Memorialists in the town of Pittston on the Susquehanna River within the colony, beg leave humbly to show to your honors, that the situation of this country is such, & that the remote distance we are situated from any of the counties of this colony will render the law highly responsible to have a county set up named and stated in this part of the Colony within corporate privileges both civil and military and therefore beg leave humbly to suggest to your honor that it is our opinion that the place best situated for the purpose of a County town is on the west side of the East Branch of the Susquehanna River and therefore your Hon'd memorialists pray that your honor will take the matter aforesaid under your hon'd wise consideration and grant as your honors in your wisdom shall think best and as in vestry bound your memorialists shall ever pray.

He married Dec. 26, 1853, Mary Charlotte Titus, dau. of James Ira Titus and wife, Frederica Webber. About 1865 he moved to a farm three miles west of Sylvania, Ohio. The farm was located in Whiteford, Monroe Co., Michigan. He moved to Sylvania, Ohio about 1869, and became Superintendent of the Sylvania Schools. Mr. West was justice of the Peace for many years. He attended the Congregational Church at Sylvania where for many years he was Superintendent of the Sunday school. He died at his home in Sylvania, July 19, 1896. He was

buried in the old cemetery, Whiteford, Monroe Co, Mich. Near his tombstone are the tombstones of his father, William West, and his uncle, Eleazer West.

8. Eleazer² West, Jr., son of Eleazer West, Sr., b. May 9, 1790, probably near Goshen, Orange Co., New York, and died January 28, 1868. He was buried at Whiteford, Monroe Co., Mich. When a young man, he went to Murray Genesee Co., New York, with his brother, William. We do not know the place of his marriage in 1814. LETTERS WRITTEN IN 1824

[The following letters were written by Sabrina Baker West of Murray, New York to her mother Miriam Church Baker and to her sister, Roxana Baker of Pittsfield, Mass. The original letters are in possession of E. B. Comstock, Dallas, Texas.]

Murray, N. Y., June 15, 1824.

Dear Mother and Sister,

I once more resume my long neglected pen to address you and hope that you will not censure me too severely for not writing to you before. I acknowledge I have been too negligent and I have no other excuse to make than this, that I have not had much time to write. We are well and have been most of the time since I last wrote to you. We have had considerable alteration in our situation since that time. William sold his place in Clarkson and purchased another in the west part of the town of Murray about seven miles west of where we formerly lived. We moved to this place January 28. He bought 54 acres of land with about 20 acres cleared and a saw mill on it, built a year last fall. He had to give one thousand dollars for the mill and improvements on the place and has but two years to pay it in. Lumber is in tolerable good demand and he thinks if he has his health, that he shall be able to pay for it. If it was our fortune to have things prosper in our hands like many others, I should think that our prospect was rather more favorable than it was on the place we left. There was no house on the place. We built a small plank house in January with an addition of a small frame for a bedroom and pantry. Our house is built quite in the woods [except for a small clearing that has been made this spring] on account of being near the mill, which makes it rather unpleasant. We live within a mile of the canal and the same distance from Mr. Abner Balcam. We hope to be better accommodated with a school than formerly. There is a good school house half a mile from here where they have school regularly. Our privilege of meeting on the Sabbath is not very great. There is a Free-will Baptist meeting held once a fortnight about two miles from here which is the nearest meeting there is, and the only one except occasionally a circuit preacher calls this way. Eldr. Vining has moved from Sweden to Cattaraugus County. I have flattered myself some that I should be able to visit you next fall, but I fear that I shall be disappointed. William has a payment to make out in Sept. and I suspect will not have much money for me, but perhaps I may come, I intend to come on the Canal if any way, but you must not be disappointed if you do not see me. I am in haste and must close. I wish you would write often and not wait for me. You probably have more leisure time than I do. Give my love to all inquiring friends. I remain your affectionate sister and daughter.

Dear Sister Roxana:

I received your letter of Jan. 30 sometime in February and was pleased to hear that your health had improved some. I think you must enjoy yourself well after your long absence from home, in the company of a kind mother, affectionate sisters and brother. My thoughts often wander over the vast tract that separates us from each other, and imagine myself in your company and for a moment it seems almost a reality, "but alas! recollection at hand," I find myself still in the western wilderness far from the associates of my juvenile years. You will probably be surprised to hear of the death of Isaac Harding's wife. She died the 25th of Feb. last after a short illness. Her two boys came here a few days after her death and have remained here ever since, who with one and sometimes two hired men make our family pretty large. Mr. Green who was sick when I wrote you last died the 5th of Jan. Mr. Randolph died in March. Morris Whitney of Hopewell died in March last. We heard from Hopewell a short time since, our friends were well there then. Mr. Rice was ordained a few weeks since. I perceive that I have filled my paper and have not written half what I want to. We received all the money that was sent to us last fall.

They kept her from 1689 and carried her to Canada. Thereafter gave her a priestly education, made a Catholic by Baptism. Married a Frenchman, who had by her two children before his death. Baker had been made a prisoner by the Indians and probably taken to Canada in 1704. He accompanied Col. Stoddard in 1714 to bring home prisoners from Quebec. There are many descendants in New England from this marriage, among others Hon. John Wentworth from Chicago, and formerly Mayor of that city.
