Twelve years ago I prepared and published the "WYNKOOP FAMILY," a pamphlet of 29 pages and 304 names, and the same was distributed gratuitously, the expense having been borne by myself and four associates. In addition to giving some permanence to such information as I had obtained up to that time, I had in view the securing of material for a fuller Genealogy.

The latter purpose has been accomplished, and I now offer, to all of kindred blood, the "WYNKOOP GENEALOGY in the United States of America": an octavo book of 126 pages, cloth, of which 94 constitute the Genealogy, and the remainder consist of the Index, and of a table of Dutch Given Names with English Equivalents, carefully prepared, and more full than any which I have seen elsewhere. Eight hundred and sixty-seven names are included, appropriately arranged and numbered, beside descendants bearing other surnames, appropriately placed, but not numbered.

To cover the expense of publication only, the book is 12.50 each for face react corpus offered for sale at \$3.00 per copy; and a copy will be mailed to any given address on receipt of the money.

Preface.

I HAD no purpose to write a book; but from the year 1849 onward, copying whatever I came upon, in general reading, concerning the Wynkoop surname, I found myself, at length, seeking such information, and finally in possession of considerable, but disconnected, material. To give this permanence, and to secure missing links, in 1866, I published a pamphlet, crude, and, in some instances, self-contradictory, because it was not possible to distinguish between conflicting authorities. The pamphlet served the purpose I had in view, and enabled me to prepare this book. Some of the family blood assisted me to meet the expense of the pamphlet, and so many persons have contributed the information within their reach, that individual acknowledgment here would make a tedious text, and this general recognition of aid will probably be acceptable

This book, then, is not the foreseen result of a purpose at the beginning of the work of which this is the product. The labor has given me agreeable employment, perhaps in excessive measure as to quantity. And now I dedicate it to all of kindred blood with me; judging that it will be interesting to them, but not to other persons, except as it may aid their own genealogical researches.

Only one effort, and that ineffectual, has been made to trace the name to its origin in the old country, although it is manifestly there still. Henry J. Wynkoop, of Rochester, and after ward of Bath, Steuben Co., New York, was born of Amsterdam parents.

The labor has proved sufficient, in amount and perplexity, without any effort to follow up the descendants from female members of the family. Therefore, the children only of such

persons have been here given. The remoter descendants might be included in another edition.

It has been my aim to observe just relative proportion in the accounts of the individual members. Sometimes the record is more extended in one case than in another of equal importance, because in the former case the material in my possession has been more ample.

Criticism, which aims to correct, to fill out, or to supplement, is invited. I would be pleased to be the repositary of information, as to future events affecting members of the family, so that the record may be continued in manuscript, for future publication.

I would like to make a collection of family portraits, and have obtained some already; and would be glad to have them from as many members of the family as are willing to appear in such a collection, and will contribute their card photographs for that purpose.

My resort to copyright is prompted by no thought of profit; but by a desire to keep control of material which has cost me some money, and many years of labor.

Introduction to the Genealogy.

THE first trace of the name which has been discovered in the United States of America, is in 1639, when Peter Wynkoop appears in certain court proceedings. It is assumed that he was the founder of the family in this country, and the father of Cornelius, who settled in Esopus, Ulster County; for Peter was a settler at Albany, and Cornelius went thence to Esopus, and a comparison of dates leads to the conclusion that they bore the relation of father and son.

Tradition says that Cornelius C. Wynkoop, a young bachelor, came to this country, from Utrecht, in the United Dutch Netherlands, and settled at *Vest Oranje* (Fort Orange), which is now included within the city of Albany, that he erected there certain waterworks, which were destroyed by a freshets and that he removed thence to Hurley, Ulster County.¹

The name appears to be a contraction of Wynkooper, which, in the Dutch language, signifies wine merchant.²

A curious and suggestive engraving, upon copper-plate, came into the possession of the Compiler, from his grandfather, Peter Wynkoop, of which a lithograph is here given. It appears to be designed as a coat of arms, yet the crest is the only part which savors of heraldry. Two distinct prints, identical in substance, but differing circumstantially, have been preserved in as many branches of the family; one with female supporters to the shield, and the name of either Cornelius C. Wynkoop or Augustus Wynkoop associated with it; the other having the name of Peter Wynkoop.

Our motto, Virtutem Hilaritate Colere—To adorn excellence with joyousness—has been preserved upon a piece of silver ware in the possession of Mrs. Leonard Mortimer Thorne, a descendant of Mrs. James Roguet, No. "215." Thence it has been produced in the lithograph; taking the place of the name "Peter Wynkoop," which was in the copper-plate when it cameinto the hands of the Compiler.

The family name is borne by a bay in the southerly coast ' of Java, near the westerly end of the island. This must be a memento of some navigator, or merchant, or landed proprietor.

WYNKOOP GENEALOGY.

First Generation.

1. Peter.—Born 1616. This appears from his statement, in a declaration made by him, March 9, 1640,¹ that he was then twenty-four years old.

His name is first mentioned in certain court proceedings, February 10, 1639, Fiscaal against Peter Wynkoop, for smuggling; the liquors were confiscated and the defendant was fined twelve guilders.³ This was a bad begiuning; but the after record of him indicates a substantial and trusted citizen.

In the following year he made a declaration as to the ownership of hay, which was in the possession of Barent Dircksen.¹

Two years later he is mentioned as Commissary Superintendent of Wares and Merchandise for the Patroon Van Rensselaer, and as a settler at Rensselaerwyck, now Albany.³

In 1644 he was commissioned by the Patroon to purchase land about Catskill, from the natives, and, in connection with the Commissary-General, Arendt Van Curler, to recover land and other property, which was alleged to have been purchased and misappropriated by Adriaan Vander Donck, a former agent.⁴

In the same year Peter Wynkoop was supercargo of the vessel "The Arms of Rensselaerwyck," and arrived with her at Manhattan, now New York, she having been dispatched the previous autumn by the Patroon to his colony. Kieft, the Governor, demanded from him shoes for the soldiers, who were then fighting the Indians of the neighbor-

hood of Hempstead, Long Island. Wynkoop refused to supply them. Kieft seized the shoes and ordered the vessel to be searched, and finding powder and guns, which were not manifested, he declared them contraband, and seized both cargo and vessel. Wynkoop protested. He also sued the Fiscaal at Fort Amsterdam. The vessel and cargo were released, however. and the case was referred for settlement to the Directors in Holland. She soon after sailed.¹

March 10, 1644. Court proceedings. Adriaen Willemsen against Peter Wynkoop, on complaint that the defendant had stated that the plaintiff gave information that there were prohibited goods on board; defendant says it was the boatswain, who is ordered to appear, and Wynkoop is discharged. March 17, 1644, Adriaen Willemsen against Andrew, the boatswain, for having reported that plaintiff had informed against Rensselaer's ship, for having contraband goods on board; defendant says Lubbert Jansen told him so. Lubbert Jansen declares that what he reported about the ship is untrue; that he knows nothing of the plaintiff but what is honorable and virtuous; is sorry for what he said, and begs plaintiff's pardon. Lubbert Jansen to pay costs.²

March 18, 1644. Protest. Peter Wynkoop, Supercargo of the ship "The Arms of Rensselaerwyck," against Fiscaal Vander Huyghens, for discharging that vessel. March 22, 1644. Answer of Fiscaal Vander Huyghens to the above. March 23, 1644. Receipt: Peter Wynkoop, for 18 kegs of gunpowder from the Fiscaal. October 27, 1644. Court proceedings. Fiscaal against Peter Wynkoop, Supercargo of the ship "The Arms of Reusselaerwyck," smuggling, on petition of Arendt Van Curler. Case referred to the Directors of the West India Company in Amsterdam, as the vessel is old and leaky.³

May 31, 1646. Court proceedings. Hillegond Joris against Peter Wynkoop, on an order to show cause why defendant had arrested plaintiff's husband in the colony Rensselaerwyck. Defendant says for debt; and that the case having originated in Rensselaerwyck, must be determined there.⁴

June 8, 1646. Court proceedings. Peter Wynkoop against Adriaen Vander Donck. Action on a note signed by Anthony de Hooges. De Hooges promising payment, judgment is given against him.¹

Second Generation.

2. Cornelius.—No positive evidence has been found of relationship between this Cornelius, and the Peter who has been already mentioned. But Peter's name is recorded at Albany as settled there in 1642, and in an instrument executed by him at that place, in 1640, he is described as twenty-four years old; and the name of Cornelius appears at the same place as a resident, and as making contracts there, in 1657. It is therefore probable that Cornelius was son of Peter.

The first record found of Cornelius is an agreement, dated January 29, 1657, for the purchase of a house at Albany from Marcellus Janssen (Van Bommel), for 911 guilders, equal to \$364.40. And on the 19th of September of the same year he was surety for William Brouwer.²

On the 1st of May, 1658, he brought an action of debt, at Albany, against Cornelius Teunnissen, for his share of the expense of foddering and taking care of the town bull during the winter. Judgment for plaintiff, ten guilders, equal to \$4.00.³

On the 25th of November of the year following, an order was made, upon his request, for the appointment of curators over the estate at Esopus, left by Gysbert Philipsen, who had been murdered by the Indians at that place.³

He made a lease, May 30, 1662, to Lambert Huybertse, of lots one and sixteen at Esopus.⁴

On the 25th of April, 1663, Cornelius obtained a grant of twelve morgens of land at Esopus,⁵ Ulster County. This

land was at Hurley, and contained nearly twenty-six acres. In the Book of Patents, in the Secretary of State's office, is a confirmatory patent to Cornelius Wynkoop, dated June 28, 1667, of a parcel of land at Esopus, near the new village, to the west of Nicholas Varlett, on the west side of the creek, containing about twenty-four acres; also a lot west of the highway, and west of Lambert Huybertse'sall granted originally by Director Stuyvesant. This "new village" is now Hurley.' On the 30th of March, 1670, the Commissioners for laying out land at Esopus, allowed Cornelius to lay out his two parcels of land at Hurley in one farm, on condition that he set off five morgens for the assistance of Marbletown. In the annexed Register of Patents to inhabitants of the town of Hurley, there is for Cornelius Wynkoop twenty-four acres and forty-eight acres."

The place at Hurley, now owned and occupied by George, No. "275," has been for a long series of years in the continuous occupation of a male line of the family; and it is believed to be the original homestead. Part of the present house is reputed to be one hundred and fifty years old. A painting of the same, by William H. Snyder, of Brooklyn, under the name of "Wynkoop House," was on exhibition at the Academy of Design a few years since.

Cornelius seems to have been a resident of Albany as late as October 19, 1665, for he is recorded in the Deacon's Book of that date, as giving, for alms, 17 guilders 10 stivers.³

In 1671 he was elected an Elder of the Refermed Protestant Dutch Church at Kingston. Hermanus Blom was at this time, or had been recently, Pastor.⁴

On the 10th of June, 1672, he was appointed one of the two new Commissaries of Kingston. He was again appointed October 6, 1673, and served until August 14, 1674.⁵

He was Schepen of Hurley in 1673.¹ On the 5th of July, 1674, he was witness to the renewal of a treaty with the Indians.²

Cornelius, on the 11th of August, 1676, appeared before William La Montagne, Secretary for the Honorable Justices at Kingston, and made his will, "leaving behind his lawful wife and seven children." On the 16th of May, 1679, "Maria, widow of Cornelius Wynkoop"-signing herself "Maria Langedyck, widow of Cornelius Wynkoop"---made her will, appointing "for tutors or guardians of her minor children, Wessel Ten Brook and William De Meyer." She declared that her "oldest son Johannes shall first have the silver piece from the fleet of Port Heen." She called Marytje her oldest daughter, and Benjamin her youngest son.³ The record at Kingston of the baptism of her children Catharine and Benjamin, call her simply Marytje Jans.⁴ In March, 1660, among the immigrants by the "Love," was Marytje Jansen, maiden, and in the same month, in the "Gilded Beaver," was Maria Jans, orphan daughter.^{*}

An inventory of the property sold at auction, of Cornelius, was made in 1677. The guardians under Mrs. Wynkoop's will were, on the 8th of February, 1681, ordered to account for the property by Spring. The Administrators let her property in 1681.

No information has been obtained as to the dates of birth or of baptism of their children Marytje, Johannes, or Gerrit. But the descriptions in Mrs. Wynkoop's will, and a comparison of the given dates of birth or of baptism, with the order of sequence of the names in two deeds, make it seem probable that Marytje or Johannes was the oldest child, that Evert was third and Gerrit fourth. Then followed the others, Nicholas, Catharine, and Benjamin. Nicholas and Catharine disappear from view, after the record of their baptism, and their inclusion in the "seven children" specified in their father's will. It is probable that they died before majority.

A deed was made September 1, 1697, by Johannes, Evert, Gerrit, and Benjamin, and Moses Dupuis, to Jacob Rutse, of lands whereof Cornelius Wynkoop, deceased, late of Kingston, was in possession. And a partition deed was executed April 26, 1715, by Major Johannes, Captain Gerrit, and Benjamin, and Moses Dupuis, to Evert Wynkoop.¹

Third Generation.

Children of Cornelius No. 2 and of Maria Jans Langedyck.

- 3. Maria (Marytje).—She was the elder daughter, and probably the oldest or second child. Her husband's name was Moses Du Puy, written also Du Puite and Du Puis. Baptisms of their children are recorded at Kingston, as follows: Cornelius, January 1, 1688; Benjamin, October 13, 1695; Jacobus, Sept. 19, 1703.
- 4. Johannes, Major.—Born at Albany. He was probably the oldest son, and perhaps the oldest child. On the 27th of June, 1679, he was bound to Benjamin Provoost, to learn the blacksmith's trade; but the indentures were canceled, and in November he was bound to Bruyn Hager, of Hurley, to learn the same trade.²

His first wife was Judith Bloodgood, as appears from the baptismal records of their children. They were married June 7, 1687, the record describing him as born at Albany, and her at Flushing, Zealand, and calling her Judith Franse.³

He took the oath of allegiance to the British in 1689, in Ulster County.

Cornelia Ten Broeck was his second wife. Their marriage license was dated June 9, 1696.⁶ She was daughter of Major Dirk Wesselse Ten Broeck and of Christina Cornelise Van Buren.⁶

In 1728 he was recognized as a freeholder of Kingston,

and as a Major. And in the same year, in a "List of Commanding Officers, as well Military as Civil," he is classed with "Old officers.and old men."

His last will was dated June 9, 1730, and he died shortly thereafter.

A deed, dated September 13, 1733, was executed by Capt. Cornelius, of Hurley, blacksmith, Derick, of the same place and trade, Johannes, of Kingston, cordwainer, Jacob Ten Broeck and Elizabeth his wife, Johannes De Lamater, cordwainer, and Christina his wife, to Thomas Beekman, joiner, and Marytje his wife. It referred to Major Johannes as deceased.²

Another deed, never recorded, and now in the possession of the Compiler, dated September 30, 1737, was executed by Cornelius and Derick, of Hurley, blacksmiths, Johannes, of Kingston, Esquire, Thomas Beekman, of the same place, joiner, and Marytje his wife, Johannes De Lamater, of Kingston, cordwainer, and Christina his wife, to Jacob Ten Broeck, Esquire, of Kingston, and Elizabeth his wife. It recited that Cornelius, Derick, Johannes, Thomas Beekman and wife, and Johannes De Lamater and wife, were heirs of Johannes Wynkoop, lately of Kingston, and possessed of land in Kingston, by assignment to Johannes Wynkoop, deceased, dated July 16, 1713–14,³ endorsed upon the back of deed dated February 13, 1688, from the Trustees of Kingston to Humphrey Davenport.

And still another deed is found, dated October 1, 1737, executed by Cornelius, eldest son, Derick, another son, Elizabeth, eldest daughter, and Jacob Ten Broeck her husband, Marytje, another daughter, and Thomas Beekman her husband, Christina, youngest daughter, and Johannes De Lamater her husband, children of the late Major Johannes, conveying lands to Johannes Wynkoop, High Sheriff of the county, youngest son of said Major Johannes. It mentioned the Major's will as dated June 9, 1730.⁴

5. Evert.—Born March 24, 1665, died July 31, 1746.⁵ On the 26th of August, 1688, he intermarried with Ger-

trude Elmendorf. The record describes him as born at Albany and living at Kingston.¹

He took the oath of allegiance to the British in 1689, in Ulster County.²

His second wife was Annetje (or Antje) Kiersted. She was daughter of Roelof Kiersted and Eyke Roosa, and a descendant of Annetje Webber, wife of Roelof Jansen, and afterward of Rev. Everardus Bogardus, who is famitiarly and expensively known to her descendants, to Trinity. Church, and to the courts of New York, as Anneke Janse. Roelof Jansen and wife had a daughter, Sarah Roeloffe, who was married to Hans Kiersted, and their son Roelof Kiersted was husband of Eyke Roosa.³

The ancestor of the Kiersteds was killed in France for his religion, and his dead body was dragged through the street by the hair of his head. His son, who was a weaver of fine fabrics, was stripped of his property. His wife peddled needles and other small things. Both were industrious, and they got together considerable money, which they invested in black broadcloth, and bringing the cloth with them to New Amsterdam, they found profitable sale, for some conspicuous man had recently died, and black goods were in demand, while the supply was short. The sale of the cloth gave them such a start that they were in possession of a large property at the time of their death.⁴

Evert is mentioned as a freeholder at Kingston in 1728, and his widow is recorded as a slaveholder at Hurley, in 1755.

The Caatsbaan church, about three miles above the village of Saugerties, which was built in 1732, and enlarged in 1816, had the initials E. W. K. engraved upon one of the stones in its front wall, along with the initials of other persons. This was a memorial of this Evert.⁶ He does not seem to have been a member of that church, but his son, Johannes E., was, in 1738, and his grandson, Evert, in 1759. The church was rebuilt in 1867, and the stone above mentioned was inserted in the rear wall. It

seems to have been broken at that time, for the letter E does not now appear with the other initials.

Evert's last will, dated Beaverkill of Kingston, June 2, 1746, mentions his wife, Antje; his grandchildren Evert and Tjaatje, children of Cornelius; his son Tobias; his grandchildren Evert and Catharine, children of Hezekiah; his sons Jacobus and Johannes; his daughter Antje; and his granddaughter Geertje Decker. This will was never proven nor recorded, and is in possession of the Compiler,who received it from Judge Henry Wynkoop, of Catskill, No. "320."

6. Gerrit.—On the Sth of July, 1679, he was apprenticed to Heyman Albert, for five years, to learn shoemaking. His wife was daughter of Gerrit Fokker and Jakomyntje Slecht. Her mother afterward was married to Jan Eltinge, and was mother of a family of that name.¹

The name of Gerrit's wife appears in the baptismal records of Kingston and Albany as Hilletje (Maria?), with the surname Fokker. But the name is preserved, by the descendants in Pennsylvania, as Helena Eltinge, and she was therefore probably known by that name, taking her stepfather's surname.

Gerrit took the oath of allegiance to the British in 1689, in Ulster County. In the year 1700 he was Ensign of a foot company in the counties of Ulster and Dutchess, under Coenraad Elmendorf, Captain. In 1712 he was Deacon in the Dutch church at Kingston, and as such joined in a petition for its incorporation.²

He was known as Gerardus at Esopus, where he was engaged in farming until 1717, when he sold his land in Ulster County, and removed to the township of Moreland, then Philadelphia, now Montgomery, County, Pennsylvania, where his name was transformed to Gerrit. His family then consisted of his wife, Helena Eltinge, and children, Cornelius, Gerrit, Nicholas, Henry, Philip, Mary, Jemima, and Ann.³ Jemima, in the baptismal record, is called Jakomyntje, (Anglice, Jamesina).

Gerrit Wynkoop was an Elder, January 1, 1744-5, of the Church of North and South Hampton, Pa.

His descendants now own and occupy land in Northampton Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. which is said to have been in continuous possession of the family

since it was purchased by this Gerrit, from whom it passed to his son Gerrit.

- 7. Nicholas.—Baptized October 15, 1668, recorded Claus.⁴ The correct Dutch would have been Klaas. He must have been one of the "seven" children specified in his father's will, 1676, but no subsequent trace has been found.
- 8. Catharine.—Baptized June 18, 1671.¹ She has not been traced beyond her mother's will, 1679, in which Marytje is called *oldest* daughter.
- 9. Benjamin. Baptized November 5, 1673.⁴ He intermarried with Femmetje (Phebe?) Vander Huil, October 20, 1697. The record described him as from Kingston, and her as of New York.² She was daughter of Abraham Vander Heul³ and of Tryntje Hendricks Kip, and was baptized August 6, 1671.⁴ She is called Effonio Vander Hule in licence of marriage, recorded in Record of Wills, N. Y., Vol. 5, p. 259.

Benjamin was a goldsmith.⁵ He voted in the South Ward, New York, September 29, 1701. And on the 15th of June, 1724, he appears, with other inhabitants of the South Ward, in a remonstrance against leasing the ground on which the market formerly stood.⁶ He and his wife were both living, in December, 1737.⁷ In April, 1741, his slave, London, a Spanish Indian, was indicted, with others, for a conspiracy to burn the city.⁸

Fourth Generation.

Children of Major Johannes, No. 4, and of Judith Bloodgood.

10. Cornelius. – Baptized June 4, 1688. He intermarried with Hendrika Newkirk, Dec. 14, 1711. The record calls her Hendrickjen, and describes both as born and living at

Marbletown.¹ The proper English would be Henrietta or Harriet, but she seems to have retained the spelling Hendrika. (In the Preliminary Genealogy she was recorded as the wife of the namesake and cousin of this Cornelius, in deference to an opinion other than that of the Compiler. Subsequent investigation has confirmed the Compiler inhis own opinion, and he therefore has followed it here.)

In 1733 and 1737 he is described in deeds as a blacksmith of Hurley.

His last will, as of Hurley, Sept. 19. 1739, mentions ten children, Judith, Elizabeth, Cornelia, Johannes, Catharina, Lea, Adriaan, Cornelius, Petrus, and Maria. He names his wife one of the executors, but as letters of administration were granted April 3, 1747, to the "surviving executors" by the Surrogate of Ulster County, and she is not included among them, she must then have been dead.²

- Elizabeth.—She was described as oldest daughter in a partition deed. Was married to Jacob Ten Broeck, of Kingston, January 17, 1712. Their child Wessel was baptized Dec. 7, 1712.¹
- Maria.—Baptized April 23, 1693. She was married Jan. 14, 1715, to Thomas Beekman, both of them described as living at Kingston. He was son of Johannes Beekman and Aletta Lawrence.³ Their child Judickjen (or Judith) was baptized Dec. 11, 1715.¹

Children of Major Johannes, No. 4, and of Cornelia Ten Broeck.

13. Christina.—Baptized March 14, 1697. She was married May 12, 1723, to Johannes De Lamater, both of them born and living at Kingston.

Johannes De Lamater, baptized Kingston, July 4, 1697, son of Abraham De Lamater, by his second wife Elsie Tappen, was Trustee of Kingston 1727-1740. Johannes' second wife was Maria Decker.

His children were: Cornelius, baptized March 1, 1724; Abraham John, baptized about 1730; Sarah Ten Broeck; Margretje Ten Broeck; Elsie, baptized April 3, 1726; Annetje, baptized Nov. 1, 1736.⁺ A transcript from the church

records at Kingston, furnished to the Compiler, gives the baptism of a child Cornelia, Feb. 23. 1724.

- Derick¹ (Richard).—Born Nov. 1, 1698, intermarried with Gertrude Kool, July 3, 1725, died March 30, 1763. They removed to Hurley April 20, 1732.²
- He was baptized Nov. 6, 1698. In the marriage record he is described as born and living at Kingston, and she as born at Hurley.³ She was youngest daughter of Cornelius Cole.⁴
- 15. Catharina.—Baptized January 19, 1701.³ She probably died young, for she is not mentioned in the partition deeds of her father's property in 1733 and 1737, and her sister Christina is called youngest daughter.
- 16. Johannes.—Sheriff. Born October 7, 1702, died August 8, 1791.⁵ Baptized October 14, 1702.³

He intermarried December 19, 1728, with Maria Bogardus, both of them described as living at Kingston.³ She was a descendant of Rev. Everardus Bogardus, by his wife Annetje or Anneke. Their son William, born 1638, intermarried August 29, 1659, with Wyntje Sybrant. Everardus, son of William, born November 2, 1660, intermarried with Tjaatje Hoffman, June 9, 1697. Maria, daughter of the second Everardus, born April 13, 1709, was the Maria above mentioned.

Among the settlers at Rensselaerwyck, 1630, were Roelof Jansen Van Maasterlandt and his wife and family. He came out as a farmer to the Patroon, at \$72 per year. Five or six years later, the family were found at New Amsterdam, where Jansen received a patent in 1636 for thirty-one morgens of land lying along the North River. (One of their descendants was married to Evert Wynkoop, already mentioned). Jansen died, and his widow was married in 1637 or 1638 to Rev. Everardus Bogardus, who was the first settled minister at New Amsterdam. Bogardus died 1647, and his widow returned to Albany, where she died in 1663.⁵ He had been Pastor at New Amster-

dam, 1633 to 1647, and was lost with the ship "Princess" on a voyage to Holland.¹ This widow of Roelof Jansen, and of Rev. Everardus Bogardus, born Ann Webber, has since been well known as Anneke Jans.

John Wynkoop was described as a cordwainer in 1733, and as Esquire in 1737. In 1731 he was Sheriff of Ulster County.²

His tombstone is standing in the yard of the First Reformed Church, Kingston.

His heirs are named in a deed June 9, 1795, as follows: Petrus, Jr.; Joseph Gasherie and Catharine his wife; Benjamin De Meyer and Elizabeth his wife; Christopher Tappen and Annetje his wife; Christina, Lydia, Geertruy, all of Kingston; Peter of New York; and Henry (born) Schoonmaker, of Poughkeepsie.³

17. Lydia.—Baptized Feb. 21, 1714.⁴ She probably died young, as she is not mentioned in the deeds relative to her father's estate, in 1733 and 1737, and Christina is there called youngest daughter.

Children of Evert, No. 5, and of Gertrude Elmendorf.

- 18. Cornelius.—Baptized October 13, 1689. His wife, in the record of baptism of their children, is called Barbara Mattysen⁵ and Matthysen.⁴ Her name is said to have been Van Keuren.⁶ They left but two children, who are mentioned in the will of Evert, the grandfather. Cornelius seems to have died young.
- 19. Jacobus (Jacob or James).—Baptized May 26, 1691.⁴ He is mentioned in his father's will in 1746. His wife seems to have been Jannetjen Bogardus. He was probably a resident of Rochester, *Ulster* County. See deed by Jacobus, of Rochester, to Matthys Duboys and Evert Wynkoop of Kingston, August 29, 1726.⁷
- 20. Nicholas.—Baptized April 28, 1693.4 He is not mentioned in his father's will.
- 21. Grietje (Margaret).-Baptized January 2, 1695.4

- 22. Marytje (Maria).—Baptized September 11, 1697.¹
- 23. Catharina.—Baptized December 17, 1699.¹ By the name of Catharina Evertse she was married to Johannes Decker, December 29, 1720; both of them described as born at Kingston.¹ Her father's will mentions his granddaughter, Geertje Decker.
- 24. Ann.—Baptized April 26, 1702.¹ She is mentioned as Antje in the will of her father. She was married to Johannes Swart, October 30, 1724. Their children were Evert Wynkoop, baptized February 16, 1734, husband of Maria Persen; and Elizabeth, baptized April 14, 1745.³
- 25. Teola or Teold, (possibly Yeola).—Baptized February 18, 1705.² No trace of this name, subsequent to the baptism, has been found. Perhaps the record is a contraction of Theobold.

Children of Evert, No. 5, and of Ann Kiersted.

- 26. Johannes Everts.³—Born October 12, 1707. Baptized Johannes, October 28, 1707. He intermarried with Catharina Schut, May 18, 1730. The marriage record describes him as living at Hackensack, and her as born and living at Saugerties.¹ In 1738 they are recorded as members of the Caatsbaan church, near Saugerties, her name being written Schot. In the baptismal records of their children the mother's name is spelled sometimes the one way, sometimes the other.
- 27. Tobias.—Baptized May 7, 1710.¹ He died in infancy. (See another son of the same name.)
- 28. Maria.—Baptized Marytje, August 10, 1712.¹ She is not mentioned in her father's will, 1746.
- 29. Hezekiah. Born January 16, 1715. Died November 22, 1745.⁴ He was baptized January 23, 1715.⁴ Intermarried with Marytje Davenport, February 13, 1741. She was born September 27, 1717, died February 1, 1785.⁴ Hezekiah is recorded as a member of the Caatsbaan church in 1743.
- **30.** Tobias.—Baptized April 28, 1717.¹ Intermarried with Leah Legg, November 11, 1741. Their children resided in the town of Saugerties. They were men of wealth,

and were among the principal supporters of the Caatsbaan church.¹

November 10, 1785. Last will of Tobias, of Blue Mountains, Ulster County, mentions his wife Leah, his sons Hezekiah, Tobias, Petrus, and William, and his daughters Leah and Annetje. Proven September 8, 1786. Filed in the office of the Clerk of the Court of Appeals, Albany.²

Children of Gerrit, No. 6, and of Helena Eltinge.

- 31. Maria. Baptized Marytje, January 3, 1694.³ She was wife of Abraham Vandegrift, of Bensalem, N. J.⁴
- 32. Jemima.—Baptized Jakomyntje (Jamesina), March 22, 1696.³ She was wife of George Buskirk, of Moreland, Penn.⁴ She is also called Jakomina.
- 33. Ann.—Baptized Annetje, August 21, 1698.³ She was wife of Isaac Van Meter, of Salem, N. J., who afterward removed to the South Branch of the Potomac, in Virginia.
- 34. Cornelius.—Born December 27, 1700; intermarried with Helena Vandegrift, November 2, 1726. Died October 26, 1754. Baptized January 1, 1701.³
- **35.** Gerrit.—Baptized November 29, 1702.³ It seems that he was father of Gerardus, Adrian, and James, hereinafter mentioned; and Garrett, No. "430," claims him as his great grandfather; but the name of his wife has not been discovered.
- 36. Nicholas.—Born February 9, 1705; intermarried with Ann Kuypers, September 29, 1732; died August 3, 1759. She was daughter of Henry Kuypers, of Harsimus, Bergen County, New Jersey: was born March 20, 1712, and died March 21, 1773.⁴ Baptized February 18, 1705.³ May 22, 1750, he was dismissed from the Presbyterian Church of Abingdon, Pa., to "the Low Dutch Presbyterian" Church, of North and South Hampton, Pa.
- 37. Henry.—Baptized Hendrikus, October 19, 1707.³ Died a bachelor at Salem, N. J.⁶
- 38. Philip.—Baptized Philippus, February 11, 1709.³ Died

July 14, 1771. His wife, Mary or Margaret Conover, of Monmouth, N. J., died 1775, aged 61.

39. Tobias.—Baptized May 3, 1713.¹ No further trace of him has been found.

Children of Benjamin, No. 9, and of Femmetje Vander Heul.

- 40. Cornelius.—Baptized December 1, 1699.² Died in infancy. See another son of the same name.
- 41. Cornelius.—Baptized June 22, 1701; intermarried with-Elizabeth Van der Spiegel, May 9, 1724.² Cornelius was a goldsmith, and so was his father-in-law. Elizabeth was daughter of Jacobus and Anna.³
- 42. Abraham.—Born July 1, 1703; intermarried with Esther, daughter of Thomas Fisher and Margery Maud.⁴ The mother was daughter of Joshua Maud and Elizabeth Parr; the latter of the family of Catharine Parr. Thomas was son of John Fisher, who accompanied William Penn on his first voyage to America, October, 1682.⁵ Abraham was baptized July 4, 1703.²
- 43. Benjamin.—Baptized May 23, 1705.² He was admitted to church membership at Fairfield, Conn., October 6, 1734, on recommendation of the Dutch Church, New York.⁹ This Benjamin seems to have been the one whose wife was Eunice Burr, baptized July 2, 1710,⁶ daughter of Judge Peter Burr and Sarah —, and cousin of Aaron Burr, President of the College of Princeton.⁷
- 44. Catharina.—Baptized June 29, 1707.*
- 45. Johannes.-Baptized September 14, 1712.*
- 46. Maria.—Baptized August 29, 1714.

Children of Cornelius No. 10 and of Hendrika Newkirk.

47. Judith.—Baptized August 31, 1712. Married December 14, 1736, to Johannes Du Bois. The record describes both as born and living at Hurley.¹

- 51. Catharina.—Baptized Catrina, February 11, 1722.² She also is mentioned in her father's will. Was married to Lucas Elmendorf June 20, 1747.
- 52. Leah.—Baptized May 31, 1724.² She must have died in infancy, for another child had the same name.
- 53. Adrian, Major.-Baptized August 24, 1726.² His wife was Catharine Low.

He is mentioned May 11. 1775, as one of the Committee of Hurley to choose deputies to the New York Provincial Convention; and again November 7, 1775, when they chose among others Dirck Wynkoop, Jr., No. "156." Was Chairman of the Associators of Hurley, July 6, 1775. As Chairman of the Hurley Committee, he notified the Provincial Congress of the election of militia officers. There was a dispute as to the field officers of the Northern Regiment of Ulster County, and in response to the Provincial Convention, he was nominated for Major.³

Was Major of the First Regiment, Ulster County, say October 25, 1775, and May 1, 1776. At the instance of the Field officers of Ulster County, he was, in October, 1776, placed in command of 200 men to guard the passes of the Hudson. Major Adrian's bill, for ± 16 . 1s. 43d., for pay and subsistence of 200 men raised in Ulster County, for 27 days guarding the passes of the Hudson, was al-

lowed January 18, 1777.¹ The appointment was for two months' service.²

His last will, describing him as of Hurley, dated April 22, 1795, proven Aug. 21, 1795, gave his whole estate to his wife Catharine, and his nephew, John C. Wynkoop. It mentioned his brother Dirk, and Cornelius Dumond, son of his sister Elizabeth.³ Perhaps Dirk was a brotherin-law, or half-brother.

His widow in her will, dated November 13, 1796, proven January 2, 1797, mentions her brother Cornelius Low.³

54. Leah.—Baptized December 26, 1727.4

55. Cornelius C.—Lawyer. Baptized Cornelius, November 5, 1732.⁴ He intermarried with Maria Catharina Roel. April 24, 1760.⁵ In Book 3, p. 112, of "New York Marriages," printed by order of the Secretary of State, 1860, their marriage bond is indexed April 17, 1760, and her name is spelled Ruehle. The bonds were given when the Secretary issued licences, and the two were a substitute for publication of bans. The bonds were conditioned to be void if no impediment to the marriage existed. The wife's name is also spelled Ruhl, elsewhere.

Cornelius was an attorney-at-law, as appears by the description of him, 1795, in several conveyances,⁶ and was a resident of the City of New York. He was admitted "freeman" of the city in 1770, described as "shop-keeper."⁷

- 56. Petrus.—A twin. Baptized November 15, 1734.⁴ His wife was Janneke Hardenburgh, according to the baptismal records of their children, although the name is otherwise given as Anneke.
- 57. Maria.—A twin. Baptized as above.

Children of Derick, No. 14, and of Gertrude Cole.

58. Catharine.—Baptized Catrina, April 22, 1726.⁴ According to another statement, she was born May 20, 1726, and died aged twenty years, four months, and four days.^{*}

- 59: Jane.—Born May 21, 1728, died aged twelve years, four months, and thirteen days.¹ Baptized Janneken, May 26, 1728.²
- 60. Cornelia.—Born June 30, 1730, died aged one year, five months, and twenty-four days.¹
- 61. Cornelia.—Born May 13, 1732.¹ Baptized May 14, 1732. She was married December 21, 1752, to Matthew Ten Eyck. The record describes her as a young woman of Hurley, and him as a young man, and his name as Matthys.² He was born in 1728.³ His death was in 1809. Their son Abraham was born June 23, 1754; intermarried with Sarah Elmendorf, December 26, 1790; died in 1812, at Troy. Sarah Elmendorf was born at Kingston, July 11, 1766; died in 1821. Their son, Rev. J. B. Ten Eyck, was born March 4, 1797.

Richard, another son of Cornelia and Matthew, a physician, intermarried with Janet Baker. John, another son, died unmarried. <u>Catharine</u>, another child, was married to <u>Gerrit De Witt</u>. Jane, another daughter, baptized Janneke, May 13, 1759,² was married to Gerrit Veeder. Another child, Maria, was married to Col. Albert Pawling. Blandina, another daughter, died unmarried.

62. Cornelius D., Colonel.—Born March 5, 1734. Baptized March 10, 1734. He intermarried with Leah Du Bois, May 23, 1762. The record describes both as living in Ulster County.² Leah was the seventh child of Cornelius Du Bois, of New Paltz, and of Margaret Hoogteyling (now Houghtaling), of Kingston.⁴ Cornelius D. intermarried with Anna Gansevoort. January 9, 1778.⁵ She died a "relict," August 9, 1794, aged forty-nine years, ten months, and three days.⁶ Cornelius D. was killed by a negro, who mistook him for his son, whom he meant to kill. Anna was daughter of Harmen Gansevoort and Margaret Douw.

Cornelius D. was appointed Major of the Third Regiment, June 30, 1775, under Colonel James Clinton, raised in Ulster and Dutchess Counties. He was promoted to the Lieutenant-Colonelcy of the same regiment, August 2, 1775, and was ordered to muster the companies of Captains Hasbrouck and Brown. He was made Colonel

April 11, 1776. He was one of the Associators of Hurley July 6, 1775.¹ A list of officers of his regiment is given in Force's American Archives.²

His last will, as of Hurley, dated May 2, 1776, was proven June 13, 1793.³

- 63. Johannes.—Born January 30, 1735. Died aged fortyseven years and ten months.⁴ Baptized February 5, 1736.⁵ He intermarried with Margaret, daughter of Johannes Jansen. They had no issue.
- 64. Derick D.—Born February 23, 1738.⁶ Baptized February 26, 1738.⁵ He intermarried with Sarah Eltinge, November 15, 1765, both described as living at Kingston.⁵ She was daughter of Noah Eltinge, and granddaughter of Jan Eltinge, who was the first of the name in this country.⁷ (See Gerrit, No. "6.") His second wife was Anna, daughter of Noah Eltinge.⁸

Dirk Wynkoop was one of the persons present, in 1767, at the organization of the second Reformed Dutch Church at New Paltz, under Rev. Isaac Rysdyck. He seems to have been then resident at New Paltz, but in connection with the Kingston church.⁹

Derick D. was an Associator of New Paltz, May 10, 1775.¹⁰

The will of Anna, of New Paltz, widow of Derick Wynkoop dated July 23, 1827, was proven Nov. 15, 1829."

- 65. Ephraim. Born March 10, 1740; died aged three months and sixteen days.⁶ Baptized May 9, 1740.⁵
- 66. Hendrikus.—Born October 18, 1741; died aged five years and eighteen days.^{*} Baptized November 4, 1741.^{*}
- 67. Jane.—Born May 11, 1744.⁶ Baptized Jannetjen, May 13, 1744.⁵ She was married January 27, 1778, to Cornelius Jansen, widower, both of them described as born and living at Kingston.⁵ Their child, Margaret, was baptized Margritje, August 25, 1781.⁵

68. Catharine.—Born October 16, 1747.¹ Baptized October 18, 1747.² She was wife of Matthew Persen, and died January 3, 1797, as shown by tombstone in the Kingston churchyard.

Children of Johannes, No. 16, and of Maria Bogardus.

- 69. Johannes.—Born July 3, 1729; died August 29, 1794.³ Baptized July 6, 1729.² He is said to have intermarried late in life with a Ten Broeck of Flatbush, and to have died childless.⁴ This Flatbush was perhaps the hamlet of that name in Ulster County.
- 70. Tjaatje.⁵—Pronounced Chauchee, or Yawtyeh (Charity). Born Nov. 19, 1731; married Nov. 1, 1754, to Dirck Wynkoop, No. "156"; died Nov. 17, 1757. She seems to have been known only by the Dutch name.
- 71. Cornelia.—Born April 22, 1734; died Oct. 6, 1759.³ Was married October 29, 1757, to Edward Schoonmaker.² The record describes him as a young man born and living at Kingston. Their son Henry was baptized Henrikus, April 30, 1758. This Henry is enumerated with the other heirs of Sheriff Johannes in a deed dated June 9, 1795.³
- 72. Mary.-Born March 26, 1736; died January 20, 1762.³ Baptized Maria, May 28, 1736.³
- 73. Christina.—Born January 2, 1738; died September 18, 1806.^a Baptized January 8, 1738.^a Her last will, as Christina Wynkoop, of Kingston, dated June 21, 1803, was proven January 20, 1807.^a
- 74. Catharine.—Born April 23. 1739; died March 5, 1813.³ She was wife of Joseph Gasherie. Marriage bond was dated October 14, 1767.³ See Joseph Gasherie, mentioned in connection with Dirck, No. "156."
- 75. Anne.—Born May 11, 1741: died May 26, 1815.³ Baptized Annetje, May 18, 1741.² Marriage bond Annetje Wyn-

koop and Christopher Tappen, April 16, 1761.¹ (See Tappen, mentioned with Dirck, No. "156," and under No. "\$1.")

- 76. Elizabeth.—A twin. Born April 18, 1744. Died August 31, 1822.² Marriage bond, Elizabeth Wynkoop and Benjamin De Myer, January 26, 1767.³ She survived her husband and died as above stated.⁴ Their son John was baptized February 13, 1771,⁵ and their daughter Maria September 25, 1776.⁶
- 77. Petrus Born' April 18, 1744.² Died February 3, 1818.⁴ His wife, Mary Van Alstyne, was born July 18, 1753. Died April 21, 1837.² The family Bible has Petrus' death January 23, 1819.² The widow's will, dated September 3, 1831, was proven April 30, 1838.⁷ They lived at Clermont, afterwards at Kinderhoek; removed to Kingston in 1796.³
- 78. Lydia.—Born February 15, 1748.² By her maiden name she joined with the other heirs of her father in the deed in 1795, mentioned above.
- 79. Gertrude (Geertje).—Born May 23, 1752. Died December 18, 1837.² By the name of Geertrui Wynkoop she joined with the other heirs in the deed in 1795. Her sister Christina's will, in 1803, calis her Gitty.

Children of Cornelius, Jr., No. 18, and of Barbara Matthyssen Van Keuren.

80. Evert, Captain.—Born January 29, 1709. Died Septembr 16, 1757. Intermarried May 3, 1730, with Arriaantje Schepmoes. She was daughter of Dierryk and Margrietje Schepmoes. Was born November 12, 1706. Died March 26, 1779. Her mother died March 3, 1743, and her father February 21, 1724–5.^o The latter was a descendant of Jan I. Schepmoes, who took a lot of land in New Amsterdam, May 18, 1643.¹⁰

Evert was a Captain in the Old French War, and returned home, sick of camp fever, of which he died. His tombstone is in the yard of the First Reformed Church of Kingston. His last will, dated December 19, 1750, describing him as a brewer, is in the possession of the Compiler. Arriaantje is commonly Anglicised Harriet.
81. Tjaatje (Charity.)—Baptized October 8, 1710.⁴ She was married July 2, 1736, to Petrus Tappen. The record describes both as born and living at Kingston. His last will, dated December 7, 1747, describes him as a mariner; and mentions his wife Tjaatje, his children Christopher and Cornelia, and his brother-in-law Evert Wynkoop.

Their son Peter, was baptized September 10, 1738.² (See Christopher Tappen, under No. "75.")

Children of Jacobus, No. 19, and of Jane Bogardus.

82. Cornelius.—Baptized January 25, 1711, or May 25; intermarried with Ann Schoonmaker, October 12, 1729. The record calls her Antje, and describes both as born and living at Rochester [Ulster County.] In a deed to Cornelius Hornbeek, dated January 3, 1733, he is described as a cordwainer at Rochester.³ His wife was daughter of Joachim Schoonmaker and Antjen Hussey.⁴

Children of Johannes E., No. 26, and of Catharine Schut.

- 83. Evert.—Said to have been born about 1732.⁵ He intermarried with Sarah Decker, August 12, 1754, at Saugerties. The record describes both as living at Kingston, styles him a young man, calls her Saartje, and the name of the place Sagertje.² They were members of the Caatsbaan church, near Saugerties 1759, and the baptism of six of their children is there recorded. (See the initials E. W. K., under No. "5.")

- Sarah.—Baptized April 21, 1747.¹ Married William Larreway June 12, 1772.² Son David baptized November 13, 1779; father's name, La Roe.¹ Child Catharine born Oct. 12, 1781.³

Children of Hezekiah, No. 29, and of Maria Davenport.

- 89. Catharine.—Born November 24, 1741. Married to Benjamin Post. Removed to Hilleburgh, Albany County. They had a daughter who was married to ——Sevesen.⁴ Baptism of their daughter Marytje is recorded October 29, 1765.⁴
- 90. Evert.—Born September 8, 1743. Intermarried with Aaltje (Alice) Myer, May 29, 1765. Was commissioned lieutenant of militia December 7, 1772.⁴ He was an Associator of Kingston, May and June, 1775, and first lieutenant of the third beat or district of Kingston, October 25, 1775.⁵ The venerable William H. Dederick, of Kingston, said of him: "He was one of those who willingly obeyed the command, 'Be still, and know that I am God.' He was three years confined to his bed, and in all that time, according to testimony, not a murmur escaped his lips."

Evert in his last will, of Saugerties, dated June 6, 1829, proven June 29, 1830, mentioned his children William, Hezekiah, Jr., Catharine, Sarah, and Henry deceased; and the children of Henry, viz., Evert, Tjerck, Hezekiah, Allie, Annetje, Henry H.; and his grandson Evert living with him.⁶

Children of Tobias, No. 30, and of Leah Legg.

- 91. Cornelius.—Baptized April 25, 1742.⁷ Died young and unmarried.⁵
- 92. Ann.—Baptized Annetje October 31, 1743.¹ Died in infancy.
- 93. Ann.—Baptized Annetje November 11, 1744.7 Commonly

called Hannah. Her husband was Christian Meyers.¹ Record of baptism of their children is found as follows: Cornelius, November 14, 1764; Hendrikus, September 27, 1768; Leah, October 24, 1770; Sarah, February 3, 1773; Hezekiah, July 15, 1775; Catharina, September 9, 1777; Marytje, January 27, 1780; Annetje, August 11, 1782; Jannetje, July 3, 1785; Benjamin, January 5, 1788;² Jonathan, is also mentioned.³

- 94. Hezekiah.—Baptized June 3, 1750.⁴ His wife was Maria Meyers, sister of Christian Meyers. He died, aged about 87.
- 95. William.—Baptized December 26, 1751.² Died in infancy.
- 96. William, Major.—Baptized March 4, 1753. According to one account he died aged 80, but another gives his age as 89.

Alonzo Ilus Wynkoop, of Chemung, made the following statement in 1868: "Major William Wynkoop, my grandfather on my mother's side, settled in Chemung in 1788 or 1789, and was married to the widow Charity Schermerhorn. They had two daughters, Hannah and Jane. All of them are now dead.

"I recollect hearing my mother relate the incidents of a journey from Esopus to Wilkesbarre by wagon, through a wilderness, and from Wilkesbarre to Tioga Point, now Athens, Penn., up the north branch of the Susquehanna, more than 100 miles, by a flat-boat, and up the Chemung, by canoes, to a neighborhood of Indians, who used to bring venison in abundance, and treated them kindly. She said that deer were then very plentiful. A hunter, who lived with them, thought it a small matter to go and kill and bring one in before breakfast. Fish were also very abundant. But there were no mills, and she said that the first wheat that grandfather raised, he took in a canoe down the river to Wilkesbarre to mill, and pushed it home up stream, more than 100 miles. The second year, grandfather built a mill on Wynkoop's Creek, where I now reside. The mill-stones were worked from rocks near Towanda, Bradford County, Penn. The early settlers came more than 100 miles to this mill."

Certificates of survey of land in Chemung County, were granted as follows: November 4, 1788, of survey for

William Wynkoop, of lot No. 1, in the Town of Chemung, on the north side of the Tioga River, 515 acres of land; November 5, 1788, of survey for Nathan Denniston, William Wynkoop, and eight others, of lot No. 138 in the Town of Chemung, containing 6,400 acres—Baldwin, Chemung County. February 22, 1792, certificate of James Clinton, that lot No. 138 was laid out for the persons above named.¹

- 97. Leah.—Baptized March 31, 1755.^{*} She was married to Peter Britt. Baptisms of their children have been found as follows: Catharina, October 27, 1776; Marytje, April 25, 1778; Petrus, April 8, 1781; Maria, June 6, 1784; Annnetje, August 12, 1786; Jannetje, November 1, 1788; Tobias, March 14, 1791; Nicolaas, October 27, 1793; and William, July 31, 1796, born July 14, 1796." They are They are otherwise enumerated as follows: Peter, who died in infancy; Katy, who was married to William Dederick; Peggy, who was married to Philip Bear; Peter, who intermarried with Margaret Bear; Polly, who was married to William Ramsey; Hannah, who was married to Isaac Fulton; Jane, who was married to Benjamin Peck; Tobias, who was married and died; Nicholas, who was married; Leab, who died unmarried; and William, who intermarried with Katy Fiero.³
- 98. Catharine.—Baptized Catharina, February 23, 1757.²
- 99. Tobias.—Baptized August 13, 1758.4 He intermarried with Jannetje Schermerhorn, January 11, 1781. The record describes him as a young man born and living at Kingston, and her as a young woman born and living at Albany.² In his last will, of Saugerties, dated July 9, 1823, proven October 20, 1827, he mentioned his wife, Jannetje, and his children, Cornelius, and Nelly, wife of John Kiersted.⁵
- 100. Petrus.—Born in Catskill, August 4, 1760.³ Intermarried with Helena Bear, of Kingston, February 25, 1784. The record has her name Beer.² The baptismal records at Saugerties of seven of her children, also call her Helena, but she seems to have been subsequently known by the name of Magdalene. She was born December 15, 1766, died March 26, 1842.

 For nineteen successive years he was a member of the House of General Assembly of Pennsylvania, and for a series of years its Speaker. His wife was Elizabeth Ben-
- net. He died about 1812 or 1813.³
- 110. Adrian.—He intermarried with Sarah Randell, in Bucks County, Penn. Settled in Berkeley County, Va. At that time Berkeley and Jefferson were parts of Frederick County. He purchased land about three miles south of the Potomac.⁴
- III. James.—A physician. He intermarried with Hester Peterson, of Middletown, Del., April 3, 1777, and settled in that place. In his latter days he lived at Baltimore, Md., where he had a large practice.⁵

112. Helena.—Born February 8, 1734. Married to Rev. Jonathan Du Bois.

Rev. Jonathan Du Bois was pastor of the Reformed

Dutch Church of North and South Hampton, Pennsylvania. He died December 15, 1772, leaving children: Abraham, d. 1797; Sarah; Henry, d. 1806; Ann, m. Leffert Lefferts; Helena, m. David Taggart; Susannah; Isaac; Nicholas, d. November 4, 1815, aged 44.

Jonathan, b. December 3, 1727, was fifth child of Barent Du Bois, b. May 3, 1693, and of Jakomyntje (born) Du Bois, his cousin. His wife was Eleanor, d. of Nicholas Wynkoop, of Bucks County, Penn. He was educated at the Classical Academy of the Synod of Philadelphia, at New London, Chester County, Penn. He seems to have been licensed to preach, and to have settled at North Hampton, Bucks County, shortly previous to November $22, 1750.^4$

113. Henry, Judge.—Born March 2, O. S., 1737. He intermarried September 10, 1761, with Susannah Wanshaer, only daughter of John Wanshaer and Christina Egberts, in the county of Essex, New Jersey. She was born October 29, 1742. and died August 26, 1776. His second wife, by marriage in 1777, was Miss Maria Cummings, also of New Jersey. She died in 1781. He intermarried April 21, 1782, with Sarah Newkirk, daughter of Cornelius Newkirk and Rachel Forsyth, of Pittsgrove, in the county of Salem, New Jersey. She died June 28, 1813, aged 71 years. (According to another account, the third marriage was in 1792, and the name of the wife's mother was Rachel Ten Eyck.) cs.

Henry was a lieutenant in the Revolutionary army.² He was an Associate Judge of the Common Pleas of Bucks County, Penn. He died March 25, 1816. In 1789 he resigned the Eldership of the church of North and South Hampton, Pa., because of his absence as Representative in Congress.

The Pennsylvania Convention, July 23, 1776, chose by ballot a Council of Safety for the State, among others Henry Wynkoop for Bucks County. In Council of Safety, August 7, 1776, Mr. Henry Wynkoop appeared, and took and subscribed the qualification directed by the Convention. In the same, August 8, two orders were drawn for £250 each, in favor of Henry Wynkoop, for the families of the poor Associators of Bucks County, and for equipping the militia of that county.³

Mr. W. B. Whitaker of Philadelphia wrote of him in the following terms:--"Judge Henry Wynkoop, of Bucks-County, in this State, greatly distinguished himself by the active and determined part he took in favor of our struggle for independence. He served as a member of the First Provincial Conference of Pennsylvania, which convened in Carpenter's Hall, Philadelphia, on the 18th of June, 1776. He was elected a member of the First Congress, which assembled at New York,' on the 4th of March, 1789. Judge Wynkoop's house was distinguished as the home of Col. Monroe, afterward President, during the time he was disabled by a wound received at the battle of Tren-It was the letter of General Washington, addressed ton. to his friend Wynkoop, that procured these hospitable quarters for Col. Monroe, and for which kind attention from the family of Judge Wynkoop, President Monroe, as late as the 26th of March, 1834, in a letter now before me, expressed the most lively gratitude, for the 'kindness received, during an interesting period of our Revolutionary War." " 2

General Alexander Hamilton and Judge Wynkoop were members of the First Continental Congress. On one occasion, while walking on Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, the General was urging very strongly the claims of a bill before the House, for which he wished to secure his friend's support. But the Judge, desiring to avoid the discussion, because he was averse to the measure, changed the subject, by calling the General's attention to two very beautiful women, who had just passed them. The conversation was not resumed; but forty-eight hours afterward Mrs. Wynkoop arrived quite unexpectedly, from her home in Bucks County, having traveled all night, in consequence of a letter received from General Hamilton, requesting her immediate presence, as her husband was in a very dangerous condition. The joke was well taken, and it was succeeded by another. The Judge prepared a similar letter, imputing danger to the General, and sent it to Mrs. Hamilton at New York. This caused a similar response, in the hurried presence of Mrs. Hamilton, who showed the Judge's letter. The affair caused great merriment, and the ladies had a gay and pleasant visit to their husbands; the only evil being the anxiety of the ladies respectively while on their way to Philadelphia.³

General Washington was in favor of styling the President, High Mightiness, and asked General Muhlenburgh's opinion. Henry Wynkoop was standing by. General Muhlenburgh replied : It all the incumbents were to have the commanding size and presence of yourself, or of my friend Wynkoop, the title might be appropriate, but if applied to some lesser men it would provoke ridicule.¹

- 114. Mary.—Wife of George Hogeland; died 1789 aged 52.4
- 115. Gerrit.—He died in 1822 aged 78 years. His wife Ann Van Horn died in 1837, aged 86.²
- 116. Henry.—He died July 9, 1771, in his 24th year, about the same time with his father, leaving no issue.²
- 117. Philip.—Who died about 1814, aged 58. His wife was Caty Van Horn.²
- 118. Cornelius.—Who removed to Loudon County, Va. Probably this was the "Cornel" Wynkoop who joined in a certificate as to an experiment with James Rumsey's boat (steam), dated Berkeley County, Va., December 13, 1787.³
- 119. Lena. Wife of Titus.²
- 120. ———. Wife of ——— Van Sickler.²

Children of Cornelius, No. 41, and of Elizabeth Van der Spiegel.

121. Jacobus, Captain.—Baptized March 3, 1725.⁴ He was born at about that time, for in a letter to the Provincial Congress of New York, August 15, 1775, he describes himself as 51 years old;³ yet the records of his family and his tomb inscription make his birth to have been in 1721. His wife, according to the baptismal records in New York of their children, was Alida Koens, but the family have her name as Alida Myers. Probably she was daughter of Koenraad
Myers. She was of Curaçoa, and was born October 11, 1736, and died October 16, 1794. Jacobus died May 4, 1795, according to tomb inscription.³

Jacobus removed from Kingston to Albany, two weeks before the British burned the former place.

He was commissioned, on the 28th of June, 1775, eighth Captain of the 4th N. Y. Continental Regiment, commanded by Col. Holmes.' August 15, 1775, he wrote to the Provincial Congress, complaining of his position; setting forth that he was 51 years old, had served in the last two wars by sea and land, and been in many engagements; had been specially honored and trusted by General Gage, who had given him command of a company to which his baggage was entrusted; and had been offered a commission in the Royal Americans.² March 8, 1776, General Philip Schuyler, in a letter to Nathaniel Woodhull, expressed a high opinion of Jacobus' fitness to command certain vessels.³

April 13, 1776, it was ordered, in Committee of Safety, New York, that Jacobus Wynkoop enlist the number of mariners desired by Maj. Gen. Schuyler, for service on the lakes, and proceed with them to Albany, and take Schuyler's orders as to vessels on the lakes, until the Continental Congress shall appoint him, or some other gentleman shall arrive at the lakes authorized to command.⁴

April 29, 1776, Committee of Safety communicated with our delegate at Philadelphia, urging the appointment of Capt. Wynkoop to command on the lakes, referring to him as follows : Bred a mariner; had been frequently master of mercantile vessels; had served with reputation in the last war, both in the land and sea service; and was an officer of merit.⁵

May 7, 1776, General Schuyler to Capt. Wynkoop, at Fort George, ordered him to repair to Ticonderoga, and take command of all the vessels on the lakes.⁶

August 6, 1776, letter from Jacobus Wynkoop to Council of Safety, informed them that on April 18th, agreeably with the order of the Council of Safety, he took command as Commodore of the vessels on Lake Champlain. By advice of the commander of the Northern Department, he requested aid of the Council. Letter was referred to the Governor.⁷

August 17, 1776, General Benedict Arnold ordered two schooners of the fleet down the lake; the Commodore

brought them to; Arnold went on board and satisfied Wynkoop of the necessity, and Wynkoop ordered them under sail. The former made report of the facts the same day, from Crown Point to General Horatio Gates at Ticonderoga. Wynkoop also reported the facts the same day to General Gates, and maintained that Arnold should not have issued orders to the captains directly; that himself was to be independent of all, except the Commander-in-Chief.¹

August 18, 1776. General Gates ordered Arnold to put Wynkoop under arrest, and send him prisoner to headquarters at Ticonderoga. The same day he wrote to General Schuyler urging the dismissal of Wynkcop from the service. And the day following he wrote again to General Arnold, urging no longer delay in the arrest of Wynkoop.²

Meanwhile, on the 19th, General Arnold had written to General Gates, that he had ordered Wynkoop to headquarters, and he wished it might be considered proper to permit him to return home, without being cashiered. On the following day Gates wrote to Schuyler that he had given a pass to Wynkoop to Albany; and that he must, on no account, be sent to Ticonderoga. Schuyler replied from Albany, that Wynkoop was to remain there.³

On the 27th, Wynkoop memorialized Congress, and Schuyler transmitted the memorial two days later, saying that Wynkoop was brave and industrious, and equal to the command of the vessels on the lakes when he had recommended him; but he did not know him sufficiently to judge whether he was equal to the present command, and he had therefore heard of General Arnold's appointment with great satisfaction.⁴

On the same day Schuyler wrote to Gates in the same sense.⁵

Wynkoop is said to have been reinstated in the command in March, 1777, and to have retained it until the evacuation of Ticonderoga.⁶

August 6, 1777, Wynkoop communicated with the Council of Safety, with regard to arrangement of accounts

of himself, and of the men serving under him as Commodore.¹

October 12, 1777, he was ordered to take command of the cannon at Kingston; and in the fall of that year and the spring following, he was employed in raising the Lady Washington galley, which had sunk at Kingston. In May, 1778, he was ordered, by General Conway, to Coeyman's, to rig out and put in readiness the sloops and batteaux destined for defense of Hudson's River.²

In May, 1779, his pay was declared to be that of a Captain of a Continental frigate. July 25, 1780, his pay was stopped. January 24, 1783, he claimed that there was due him a balance of £956 6s. 8d. Resolution of the Continental Congress, April 19, 1782, referred the matter to the State of New York.²

Captain Wynkoop obtained from the State of New York in 1790, 500 acres in lot 51, township of Manlius; 500 acres in lot 53, township of Locke; 500 acres in lot 59, township of Ovid. Petition dated Kingston, January 24, 1783.²

In 1787 he was the master of the brig Esopus, plying between Kingston and the West Indies, and belonging to Dirck Wynkoop, No. "156."

- 123. Benjamin.—A twin. Baptized December 21, 1729.³ Intermarried with Catharine Boel, September 25, 1755.⁴
- 124. Cornelius.—Baptized December 21, 1729.³ He intermarried with Abigail Osburne, of Fairfield, Conn., March 12, 1758.³
- 125. Anna.—Baptized July 29, 1733.³

Children of Abraham, No. 42, and of Esther Fisher.

126. Phebe.—Born October 28, 1729; was married to John Vining. He was of Delaware, a gentleman of distinction under the proprietory government.^{*} They left two children; Mary, possessed of more than ordinary wit

and beauty, a celebrated belle of the last century, who died unmarried in 1821; and John, who was for many years a Representative in Congress. He intermarried with Mary, daughter of William Seaton, of New York; and left four sons, all of whom died young.⁴

127. Benjamin.—Born November 23, 1734; intermarried with Sarah Wooddrop Sims, daughter of Joseph and Ann Sims, May 18, 1767. He died September 2, 1803. and his wife December 31, 1814, aged 63. He was buried, with several of his children, at the corner of Pine and Third streets Philadelphia.

In 1788, Benjamin was a member of the Rumseian Society, Philadelphia, and of its committee of correspondence.² This society had for its subject, the invention of James Rumsey, in connection with steam engines.

Children of Benjamin, No. 43, and of Eunice Burr.

128. Benjamin.—Baptized April 9, 1732.³ He intermarried with Grissel Frost, March 6, 1754, at Fairfield, Conn.⁴ (Diminutive of Griselda).

Of Benjamin, Alonzo Ilus Wynkoop, No. "466," says: "My grandfather was married at Fairfield, Conn., where grandmother's friends lived. His wife was Grissel, daughter of Jabez Frost. Grandfather evidently settled in Fairfield, as my father's record is that all his brothers and sisters were living there at the time of the Revolution. Grandfather was drowned during that period, 1782."

- 129: Catharine.—Baptized September 21, 1735.⁴ Was married May 1, 1754, to Gideon Wellis.⁴ Alonzo said that one of his own great aunts was married to a Mr. Wells.
- 130. Eunice.—Baptized April 8, 1739.* Of her, Alonzo said:
 "I think one of my great aunts was married to a Mr. Smedley; that they lived at Canandaigua, and had but one child, a daughter." There was a James Smedley, one of the distributors of the estate of Judge Peter Burr, grandfather of this Eunice.

131. John C.—Baptized January 21. 1761.⁴ Died July 25, 1796.² His wife was Lydia Silvester. He was an Attorney-at-Law at Kingston, and .was Postmaster there June 30, 1796, as appears by his signature in a newspaper, to a list of letters. He was blind before his death.

In his will dated June 30, 1796, proven May 13, 1797, he mentioned his children Peter, Adrian, Henry, Catharine, Ann Maria; his father-in-law Peter Silvester; and his brothers-in-law Francis and Cornelius Silvester.³ Maria — Bartized July 4, 1762⁻¹

- 132. Maria.-Baptized July 4, 1762.1
- 133. Catharina.-Baptized November 20, 1763.⁴ Wife of Jonathan Hasbrouck. Their daughter Catharina was baptized September 2, 1787; and their son Abraham Bruyn, December 18, 1791. The latter was President of Ratgers College, New Brunswick, from 1840 until 1850. Another son, Augustus, was baptized October 5, 1795.⁴ Jonathan Hasbrouck had a brother Abraham, whose daughter Helen was married to Henry Sharpe, son of Abraham Sharpe; and the son of Henry and Helen is General George Henry Sharpe, late Surveyor of the Port of New York.
- 134. George Pietersen.—Baptized July 17, 1765.¹ He was named after a physician of Montgomery, N. Y.
- 135. Anna Sabina. Baptized July 13, 1766.¹ She was named after Sabine, a physician in New York. She was wife of Henry H. Schoonmaker. (See No. "71.") Baptisms of their children are recorded as follows: Hezekiah, March 27, 1791; Cornelius, May 23, 1794; Jonathan, November 12, 1796; Augustus, May 2, 1799; Henry, August 21, 1802; John Wynkoop, November 3, 1805; Jesse, March 5, 1809.⁴
- 136. Elizabeth.—Baptized December 3, 1769.1
- 137. Cornelius,-Baptized May 24, 1772.¹ Died single.
- 138. Henrietta.—Baptized March 23, 1775.⁴ She was married to Dr. Henry Van Solingen, and died about 1862.
- 139. Augustus.—B. September 10, 1777; d. July 3, 1836; m. January 27, 1808, Ann Maria Sylvester, who was born February 26, 1780, died May 1, 1825.³

- 140: Jane.—Baptized September 22, 1776.¹ The record calls her Janueke.
- 141. Peter P.—Baptized January 25, 1779. His wife was Anna Roosa. His last will, as of Hurley, dated September 7, 1846, was proven June 12, 1848.²

Children of Cornelius D., No. 62, and of Leah Du Bois.

- 142. Derick C.—Born April 4, 1763; died October 5, 1838. His wife was Elizabeth Sparling. His last will, of Hurley, dated September 24, 1838, was proven December 27, 1838.³
- 143. Leah.—Born April 9, 1766.¹ She was the wife of Abraham Ten Eyck De Witt, M.D., son of Andries De Witt, of Marbletown. They had children, Jane, wife of H. C. Hornbeck, and Blandina, wife of Alexander Storey.

Children of Cornelius D., No. 62, and of Anne Gansevoort.

- 144. Gertrude.—Born December 26, 1781. She died in infancy. (See Gertrude below.)
- 145 Herman Gansevoort.—Born December 16, 1785. He is mentioned as a druggist, at 124 Market street, Albany, in 1813.⁴ He died at Albany, March 3, 1854.⁴
- 146. Gertrude Magdalene.—Baptized November 29, 1788.³ She probably died in infancy.

Children of Derick D., No. 54, and of Sarah Eltinge.

- 147. Gertrude.—Married November, 1790. David Colden, sixth child of Cadwallader Colden and Elizabeth Ellison. After his death, she became wife of his brother Alexander, fourth child. They lived at Coldenham.³
- 148. Cornelia.—Wife of Peter Eltinge. They were parents of Edmund Eltinge, of New Paltz.

149. John.—Born August 11, 1779; died September 2, 1799,^s of yellow fever, at Philadelphia. Unmarried.

- 150. Martin.—Born January 31. 1781; diéd Juné 28, 1821.¹ He was unmarried, and died at Kingston, where his tombstone stands.
- 151. Peter.—Born August 28, 1783;¹ died at New Orleans, unmarried.
- 152. Abram. Born March 26, 1786; died at Kingston, March 23, 1868.⁴ He intermarried with Maria Van Steenburgh, January 10, 1838.
- 153. Catharine.—Born October 9, 1788; died March, 1862.¹ Unmarried.
- 154. Benjamin.—Born July 16. 1791; died August 15, 1821.¹ His tombstone is in the Kingston graveyard.

Children of Evert, No. 80, and of Arriaantje Schepmoes.

155. Cornelius.—Born March 1. 1731; died April 21, 1741.

156. Dirck, Judge.—Born October 15, 1732: married Tjaatje (No. "70"), November 1, 1754, and died December 9, 1796. Tjaatje, (Charity), was born November 19, 1731; died November 17, 1757. December 13, 1760, he intermarried with Sarah, born December 8, 1737, daughter of Petrus Smedes.

Dirk seems to be the proper spelling of this name. The Judge, however, uniformly wrote his name with the "c," and he was so addressed by his friends and compatriots. But in this family the spelling has been usually Derick, as to other members of the same name, down to the present time.

He was an Associator of Kingston, May 29, 1775.³ On the 5th of November, of the same year, he was chosen Deputy to the New York Provincial Convention.³ In Committee of Safety, October 11, 1776, he was appointed Inspector of Flour, at Kingston.⁴

Judge Wynkoop was an estimable gentleman, and one of the most active and noted persons in Ulster County during the Revolution. He was a member of the Committee of Safety, and of the Second Provincial Congress, which met at New York, November 14, 1775. By an ordinance of the Convention of 1777, he was appointed a Judge of the Common Pleas of Ulster County, associate of Levi Pawling, First Judge. He was a member of the New York Assembly, 1789-1. From 1783, he was for ten

years First Judge of the county. In 1788 he was a member of the State Convention to which was submitted the Federal Constitution.¹

The New York Convention, October 15, 1776, adopted a preamble, reciting that the records of the city and county of New York, and of the county and borough of Westchester, were in private hands in the county of Westchester, and unsafe because of the enemy having landed in that county, and appointed William Miller, Theodore Bartow, and John Cozine commissioners, to remove, with all possible expedition, the records to Kingston, Ulster county, and there place them in care of Direk Wynkoop, Abram Hasbrouck, and Christopher Tappen, (see No. "75"); and empowered them to call for a guard to protect the removal.²

The Committee of Safety, through order signed John McKesson, Fishkill, October 17, 1776, sent the papers of the late Receiver-General's office, to the same persons, at Kingston, with instructions to take care equal to, or even greater than, that used with the other public records.³

On the 10th of October of the following year, the Committee of Safety directed Abram Hasbrouck, Joseph Gasherie, Direk Wynkoop, Jr., Christopher Tappen, and Samuel Bayard, Jr., who had charge of the public records of the Colony, which had been deposited at Kingston in June, 1776, to remove the property in their custody to Rochester [Ulster county]. In case of necessity, Judge Wynkoop and Oke Suydam were to impress teams. On the 16th of the same month, the British burned Kingston, in revenge, because the Convention had met there, in April, 1777, and adopted a Constitution. Some of the public papers, in Mr. Bancker's charge, at Judge Wynkoop's house, on the corner of Pearl and Fair streets, were removed only a few minutes before a party of the Redcoats began to plunder the buildings.

Governor George Clinton, Poughkeepsie, May 4, 1778, wrote to Judge Wynkoop, of a contribution from Charleston, S. C., of £927 17s. 16d., for the Kingston sufferers, and of his own purpose to grant exemptions to mechanics from ordinary militia service, when they would work at reasonable wages in rebuilding.³

Dirk was Assistant State Agent in 1781, as appears from documents in possession of the Compiler.

In 1787-89, Judge Wynkoop was owner of the brig Esopus, trading between Kingston and the West Indies, of which Jacobus Wynkoop, (No. "121"), was at one time master.

J. Van Rensselaer, Chairman of Republican Committee, Albany, April 23, 1789, wrote to Joseph Gasherie, Dirck Wynkoop, and Christopher Tappen, Kingston Republican Committee, urging efforts for the re-election of Governor Clinton.¹

William H. Dederick, of Kingston, says of Judge Wynkoop: "He was a member of the Consistory of the First Reformed Church of Kingston, a number of times. This seems to have been a characteristic of the family. In the many records I have examined, I can not forbear saying, I have found no parallel."

His last will, dated August 28, 1794, was proven February 18, 1797, and is recorded at Kingston, Book B, p. 382.

His tombstone, in good preservation, stands beside that of his father, in the yard of the First Reformed Church, Kingston.

His silver box, for smoking tobacco, embossed with the representation of a Holland feast, descended to the Compiler.

- 157. Peter.—Born November 16, 1739; died August 10, 1746.² Another son was born August 22; died August 27, 1743.²
- 158. Cornelius E.—Born July 4, 1746. Intermarried with Cornelia Manscius, August 22, 1766.° Died September 19, 1795, and was buried at the new church at Marbletown.

He was, April 7, 1775, member of the Committee from Marbletown to choose Deputies to the Provincial Convention of New York; was an Associator of Marbletown in June, 1775, and Captain of the South East District, first company, town of Marbletown, September 19, 1775; was Second Major of the Minute Men of Ulster, under commission issued October 25, 1775.4

In 1778, the Legislature of New York passed an Act for the detection and defeat of conspiracies. Under this Act Cornelius E. Wynkoop was appointed with Messrs. Platt,

Harper, and Cantine as Commissioners. On the 3d of August in that year, in a communication to Lieutenant-Colonel Aaron Burr, they speak of the bearer, Cornelius E. Wynkoop, as one of the board, to whom they refer for such particulars as it may be necessary to adjust, to enable them, the more effectually, to convey unfriendly persons within the enemy's lines in future.⁴

His house at Stone Ridge, Marbletown, Ulster County, is at the present time a handsome and commodious building, and was superior to the houses of its date, 1772.

 168. Joshua.—Born September 19, 1770. Intermarried with Margaret Arnout or Arnold. who was born June 10, 1770. He lived and died at Bethlehem, Albany County.

- 169. Hezekiah.—Born June 9, 1766 Intermarried with Elizabeth Dederick. Died February 28, 1856. His will, of Saugerties, 1753, proven May 12, 1756, mentions his daughters, Sally; Elsje, deceased, wife of John P. Kemple; and Maria; and his sons Henry and Everett H.²

The "Press," of Kingston, under date November 26, 1868, attributed to Mr. Reynolds a practical turn of mind; familiarity with business; wisdom in counsel; deeds of benevolence in private; a Christian spirit; giftedness in prayer; and the liberal use of ample pecuniary means, in works of beneficence. A few weeks before his death, he had been chosen President of the State of New York National Bank, with which he had been connected from its beginning. This genealogy enlisted his hearty interest, and directly and indirectly he contributed material liberally.

They had three children: Augustus W., Francis W., and Sarah B. Francis W. enlisted in the first call for three-months men; returned; reinlisted for the war; received a wound at Chancellorsville, from the effects of which he never recovered. He died, in 1870, as he had lived, a faithful Christian.

During his ministry in the latter church, it returned to its old connection with the Associated Reformed body; a suit in chancery ensued, he prepared his own answer, and obtained leave of the Vice-Chancellor to be heard personally on behalf also of the other defendants, the ruling elders, but the suit was never ready for hearing, on the part of the complainants. His widow returned to New Brunswick in 1843. A more extended account of him (of which the dates, however, are not all of them exact), and an appreciative description of his characteristics, may be found in Vol. IX., Annals Amer. Pulpit. Brief mention of him is also made in a Historical Sermon. by Rev. W. J. Cumming, of the Yorktown Church.

A course of law study has been erroneously attributed to him. His brother's legal education has been somewhat currently transferred to himself.

He found the church at Yorktown in chronic trouble of many years' standing. Under the influence of a former pastor, congregational views of church polity had been inculcated; the functions of the eldership had been ignored; vacancies in that office were purposely left unfilled, and finally the remaining elder and nine other members of the church were excommunicated in 1806. These expelled Presbyterians reorganized, and on the petition of thirty-three persons were constituted a church, June 10, 1806, under the care of the Presbytery of Hudson. They had been reincorporated, March 4, 1806, as the "First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown, settled upon the plan of the Church of Scotland." The Congregationalists had been also reincorporated, on the 5th of March, 1806, under the same name with the Presbyterians, and they chose two "elders," under a resolution, which left their functions and powers vague. They remained in connection with the Associated Presbytery of Westches-They were ejected in a law suit, May 18, 1807, and ter. subsequently came out in their true colors, as Congregationalists.

While Mr. Wynkoop was pastor of this Presbyterian Church, which was now connected with the Presbytery of Bedford, another minister of the same Presbytery administered sealing ordinances to the Congregational Church of Yorktown. Charges against him were laid before the Presbytery, under Mr. Wynkoop's auspices, but he was acquitted. The Synod of New York reversed the decis-This action of the pastor has been criticised as sion. having widened the breach, and postponed the day of restoration. No wholesome restoration could have been effected; it is doubtful whether even a troublous one could have been made, until the active participants, and interested spectators of the earlier strife should have passed away, and until the seceders could fully abandon their congregationalism. These results coincided in May. 1866, when the Congregational Church dissolved itself, voted to sell its property, and gave certificates of good standing to its members. On the 5th of Angust, of the same year, the Presbyterian Church received such certified members to its membership, and thus the long and bitter strife, accompanied by social and family antagonism was happily closed. The church appears now to be quiet, contented, and prosperous. Mr. Wynkoop had laid the foundation for this long before, by the able presentation to both churches, and to the community, of the origin of the strife, and of the chief motive of the antagonists, and of the resulting status of the churches respectively. Congregationalism made the breach; re-adoption of Presbyterian principles by the straying portion of the flock, brought them back.

The genial and earnest friend of Mr. Wynkoop, who communicated a paper to Dr. Sprague for the Annals of the American Pulpit, in which he gave appreciative and ample description of his moral, intellectual, and physical characteristics, nevertheless withheld his approval from Mr. Wynkoop's course with reference to the difficulties in the Hagerstown church, and was "far from denying that his peculiar constitution may have sometimes led him into mistakes on this and on other occasions." This may have the more weight, as coming from a firm friend, and there-. fore, to keep the criticism within its just proportions, over against it should be stated the fact, that the writer was an attendant on the services of the church, but not enrolled as a member, and, from his attitude, as well as his temperament, could not sympathize with any uncomfortable proceedings to maintain its order and discipline.

This Genealogy, the amusement of leisure hours in 1850, became afterward very exacting of his time, and he commends a similar task to any one who is suffering from idleness or from an excess of petty cash.

He sometimes "drops into poetry," e. g., 1873:

THE ACHING HEART.

Say you that yonder is a happy man? Your view is superficial. True, he wears A cheerful face and has a mirthful voice; He's free to make or hear a droll remark; He laughs at others' mischief, and, in turn, Can play at pranks himself; he seems quite gay;

Shafts wound him not, his senses are so dull! He nothing cares for censure, nor applause. And you conclude that this is happiness! Let's look a little closer : he but wears A coat of mail, which turns aside the blow And hides the bruise. His mirthful ways are like A curtain to the window of his soul, To shut out idle gazers, lest they see The grief he hides within. They also serve -Like purpose with preservers made of cork, Which keep above the wave the heavy weight; The presence of the cork suggests the need Of borrowed buoyancy; were it withdrawn, The gravity would weigh the body down. Or, let us take another simile : His soul is like a riven ship, which feels The wound, though hid from sight, and finds the need. Of extra effort, to be kept afloat. But, "What's his grief ?" 'Tis naught to you nor me; He suffers-that's enough to make us kind. But "Who's the man of whom these things are true?" Ther'e many such-I've shown you but the type.

He was graduated in 1829 at Union College, Schenectady, N. Y. On leaving college he was employed in teaching, first at Albany, N. Y., and afterward in Ohio. He then accompanied Rev. John Leighton Wilson to Africa, upon a tour of investigation, undertaken on behalf of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, exploring the western coast in 1833-4. He entered Princeton Seminary in the fall of 1834, and spent there a little over two years in study. His health had been impaired by fever taken in Africa. He was licensed by the Presbytery of New Brunswick, Feb. 8, 1837. In July, 1838, he was invited to supply the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church at Wilmington, Del., and accepted the invitation. Aug. 7, 1838, he was or-dained by the Presbytery of New Brunswick, and on the second Sabbath in August began to preach at Wil-The First Church was at that time in a mington. very low condition, temporally and spiritually, but under his labors it soon began to show signs of growth and prosperity. On Nov. 19, 1838, a formal call to the pastorate was made out, and having been dismissed Dec. 18, 1838, by the Presbytery of New Branswick to the Presbytery of New Castle, he was installed Jan. 22, 1839, by the latter Presbytery. The relation thus constituted proved to be a very happy one, continuing in unbroken harmony and great usefulness for very nearly twenty years, in which period constant and numerous additions were made to the church to which he ministered with fervor and success as a preacher, and with remarkable fidelity as a pastor.

In the fall of 1857 his health had become feeble, and he

felt constrained to go to the South for the winter. He offered his resignation to the church, which declined it, with strong expressions of attachment to their pastor, but granted him leave of absence for a year. He then went to Florida, but, in the spring following, finding his health not improved, and his voice incapable of preaching service, he again presented his resignation and was released by his Presbytery, April 13, 1858, from his pastoral charge. The three years following were spent by him in New Haven, where his sons were in college. The years from 1862 to 1868 were chiefly spent in travel, with sojourns in many places of interest. both in this country and in Europe. In 1869 he removed to Princeton, N. J., which was his residence thenceforth to the end of his life. His son, the Rev. Theodore S. Wynkoop, having become a missionary to Northern India, the father and mother left home for India in August, 1870, and made a visit to their son in his missionary field, where they spent more than a year, reaching their home again in August, 1872.

He was a modest, true, kind-hearted man, instructive as a preacher, faithful and beloved as a pastor, honored by his brethren, and successful in the whole work of the ministry. He died in peace. (Necrological Rep. Alumni Ass'n, Princeton Theo. Sem., 1877.)
