





# THE YOUNG GENEALOGY

#### THE YOUNG COAT OF ARMS **(B)**



COAT of Arms is an emblem or a device which is displayed by titled persons, persons of royal blood, and their descendants. Coats of Arms were originally used for purposes of identification and recognition on the field of battle as well as in civil life.

It is claimed by some writers that Coats of Arms, in a crude form, were used by Noah's sons after the flood. There are records of other Coats of Arms, in one crude form or another, at different periods of ancient history. Heraldry, however, as we know it today, did not become of much importance until soon after the invasion of England by William the Conqueror, A.D. 1066. Heraldry became of general interest at about the time of the Crusades.

The Young Coat of Arms shown in the front of this volume is the Arms of the Youngs, Baronets, of Buckinghamshire; North Dean, Co. Bucks; and Leny, Scotland. Coats of Arms very similar to it are used by the Youngs of Bailieborough; Lindbank, Scotland; and in slightly varying form by various other English, Irish and Scotch lines. The Youngs of Auldbar, Co. Forfar, and numerous other branches of the Young family use arms resembling it.

This is the most widely used of all Young Coats of Arms and has been in existence for many centuries. It is described in BURKE'S GENERAL ARMORY, BURKE'S LANDED GENTRY, BURKE'S PEERAGE AND BARONETAGE and other reliable works on heraldry, in some cases accompanied by illustrations and pedigrees. It has been used for generations by many American branches of the Young family.

SIR ARETAS WILLIAM YOUNG: (1778?-1855); soldier and colonial governor; served in Ireland. Egypt and acted as aidé-de-camp to General Fox at Gibraltar and in Sicily; lieut.-colonel in a West India regiment, 1815; received badge of the order of mint from Louis XVIII; governor of Trinidad for two years; lieut.-governor of Prince Edward's Island, 1851; knighted, 1854.

ARTHUR: (1741-1820); agriculturist and author of "Travels in France"; b. in London; wrote four novels and several articles, when at the death of his father he found himself penniless except for the farms inherited, he applied himself to agriculture. 1765-1766; published his contributions to the "Museum Rusticum". 1767; founded a monthly publication—"Annals of Agriculture". among prominent contributors was George III; in 1791 Washington and Lafayette entered into correspondence with Young; his "Travels in France appeared, 1792; secretary of board of agriculture, 1795; greatest of English.

writers on agriculture, and his principal works were translated into Russian and German.

SIR CHARLES GEORGE: (1795–1869); Garter king-of-arms; registrar of Coll. of Arms, 1822; knighted upon appointment as Garter king; in this capacity sent as a commissioner to invest the king of Saxony, sultan of Turkey and the kings of Denmark and Belgium; also conferred insignia of the Garter upon the emperor of Austria; contributed to heraldic literature; several letters upon antiquarian subjects are in the British Museum.

CHARLES MAYNE: (1777-1856); actor; b. in London; played amateur parts under assumed name; first appearance in Edinburgh, 1802; played entire season, was taken up by Scott whose friendship he retained; played Hamlet with success at the Haymarket, 1807; performances were numerous; accepted as leading English tragedian; before going to London gave promise in comedy, but his best parts were Hamlet, Lear, Macbeth, Cassius, etc.; "there were characters in which he was unrivalled and almost perfect"; possessor of an admirable voice and good presence; retired at an early age, desiring that the public remember him at his best.

EDWARD: (1683-1765); poet; educated at Oxford; first publication was an "Epistle" to George Granville, Lord Lansdowne; wrote one of the poems affixed to Addison's "Cato"; "Last Day", dedicated to the queen, published 1714; in 1725 Young began series of satires called "The Universal Passion", These show him to be Pope's nearest rival; took orders and was chaplain to the king, 1728; presented to rectory of Welwyn, 1750; in later life, after wife's death, wrote "Night Thoughts". His poetry was very popular, and his is mentioned with reverence by literary persons such as Mrs. Montagu and Mrs. Delany; had the talent of coining proverbial phrases which are still quoted; Young was especially liked in France.

George: (1777-1848); theologian, topographer, and geologist; educated at Edinburgh where he made distinguished progress in literary and philosophical studies; pastor of Whitby where he officiated and preached forty-two years: corresponding mem., Wernerian Natural History Society; honorary mem. Yorkshire and Hull Societies; wrote extensively on religion, history, geology.

SIR HENRY EDWARD Fox: (1808–1870); colonial governor; treasurer of St. Lucia, 1855, also acting as colonial secretary and puisne judge; government secretary of British Guiana, 1855; governor South Australia, 1848; governor of Tasmania which developed rapidly under his term of office; higher education was forwarded, gas introduced, mining industry founded, etc.; Young was sanguine, enthusiastic, and generous in his judgments.

JAMES: (1811-1883); chemist and originator of the paraffin industry; b. in Glasgow; went to evening lectures of Thomas Graham at Andersonian University, later being his assistant; went to University Coll., London, to help Graham in important experiments; patented process of producing paraffin from dry distillation of coal and founded a business; manufacture of paraffin spread over the south of Scotland; his fame led to exploitation of petroleum springs all over the world, and has given rise to an immense industry; vice-president of Chemical Society, 1879-1881, president Anderson's Coll., 1868-1877.

JOHN: (1514–1580); master of Pembroke Hall, Cambridge; educated at Cambridge; mem., Trinity Coll.; took part in numerous religious disputations; at Queen Mary's accession his services on behalf of religion were recognized by appointment as master of Pembroke Hall, and as canon of Ely; vice-chancellor of Cambridge, 1553–1555; regius professor of divinity, 1555.

JOHN: (1534?-1605); master of Pembroke Hall, and bishop of Rochester; b. in London; notes on his sermon at St. Paul's still extant; during his mastership at Pembroke Hall, a number of literary men, such as Spencer, Andrewes, Neville, Kirke, were his pupils; Young was vice-chancellor, 1569; canon of Windsor, 1572; held his bishopric for more than twenty-seven years.

JOHN: (17:50?–1820): professor of Greek at Glasgow; a very efficient and popular teacher; Thomas Campbell, Captain Hamilton, Wilson, Gleig and others wrote tributes to his humor, sympathy, and appreciation for the sublime pleasure his gave by his understanding of Greek passages; contributed valuable notes to Dalziel's "Collectanea Graeca Majora", 1820.

JOHN: (1755-1825); mezzotint engraver; very able, and executed about eighty portraits of contemporary personages; mezzotint engraver to Prince of Wales, 1789; keeper of British Institution, 1815, an arduous post he filled with tact and efficiency until his death; secretary Artists' Benevolent Fund.

SIR JOHN: (1807–1876); Baron Lisgar; b. at Bombay; educated at Oxford; called to the bar, 1854; mem. of parliament, supporting Sir Robert Peel, lord of the treasury, 1841; chief secretary for Ireland and a mem. of the privy council; lord high commissioner of the Ionian Islands, 1855; governor-general and commander-in-chief of New South Wales. 1861; governor-general of Canada and governor of Prince Edward's Island, leaving behind him when he left a reputation for ability and sound judgment.

JOHN: (1811–1878); Canadian economist and minister of public works; b. in Scotland; went to Quebec in fifteenth year; on the breaking out of the rebellion in 1837 he raised and commanded a regiment of volunteers; was an ardent free-trader and the deepening of Lake St. Peter's, the railroad to Maine, the line to Kingston and the Victoria Bridge are chiefly ascribed to Young; gained very high position in public eminence; became commissioner of public works, and sat in the cabinet; president of the board of trade.

JOHN RADFORD: (1799-1885); mathematician; b. in London; almost entirely self-educated; published "An Elementary Treatise on Algebra", 1823; he rendered important service to English study by familiarizing students with continental methods of analysis; professor of mathematics at Belfast Coll., 1833; by 1844 he had discovered and published a proof of Newton's rule for determining the number of imaginary roots in an equation.

Matthew: (1750-1800); bishop of Clonfert; educated at Trinity Coll., Dublin; published "An Inquiry into the Principal Phenomena of Sounds and Musical Strings", full of novel views and experiments; professor of natural philosophy at Trinity Coll., 1786; his lectures were published in 1800; when he became bishop, Bennett, bishop of Cloyne, describes him as "the ablest man I have seen in the country, with a keen and logical mind, united to exquisite taste"; Young was remarkably versatile and it is to be regretted that his life was so short.

PATRICK: (1584-1652); biblical writer; educated at St. Andrews; librarian and secretary to the bishop of Chester, 1603; chaplain of All Souls' Coll.; was one of the most proficient scholars of Greek in his time; employed at court as correspondent with foreign rulers, the diplomatic language being Latin; librarian to Prince Henry, James I, and Charles I; made Latin translation of works of King James; rector of Hayes, 1623; revised the Alexandrian codex of the Septuagint (Greek Bible), as well as other Greek manuscripts.

SIR PETER: (1544–1628); tutor to James VI; reputation as a scholar was so great that the regent Moray appointed him tutor of the infant king; he was the king's favorite counsellor until the time of the king's death; master of Almoner, 1577; sent on first embassy to Frederick II of Denmark, and on his return entered privy council; sent again to Denmark to arrange for a wife for James VI who finally m. Princess Anne; when Prince Henry was b., Young was sent to convey official information of the event; Young was one of the eight councillors to whom the king committed charge of his affairs, 1595; one of the commissioners to report on state of the Scottish Universities; accompanied king to London in 1603; tutor and "chief overseer" in the establishment of Prince Charles; master of St. Cross Hospital.

ROBERT: (1822–1888); theologian and orientalist; studied Hebrew and other oriental languages in spare time, and interested himself in various forms of religious work; literary missionary and superintendent of the mission press at Surat, 1856–1861; conducted the "Missionary Institute", 1864–1874; his best work is "Analytical Concordance to the Bible".

THOMAS: (1507-1568); archbishop of York; educated at Oxford; on Queen Mary's accession, was one of six who publicly avowed his adherence to the Reformation; fled to Germany; restored on Elizabeth's accession and sent on commission to visit Welsh cathedrals; as archbishop was immersed in work of pacifying the country, bringing it to conformity in religion and acting as royal representative in political and religious matters; visited and reformed Coll. of Manchester, 1564.

THOMAS: (1773–1829); physician, physicist and Egyptologist; could read with fluency when two, and commenced study of Latin, at six; when but fourteen became classical tutor; studied medicine, read a paper before the Royal Society and as a result became a mem. of doctor of physic, 1796; known as "Phenomenon Young" and never required to do the regular duties while at coll.; professor natural philosophy at Royal Institution and editor of the Journal, 1801; fellow Coll. of Physicians, 1809; lectured extensively on medical science and physics, later publishing his talks; superintendent of "Nautical Almanac"; twice visited Paris, met most of distinguished French scientists, and became one of the eight foreign mem. of French Academy of Science; translated inscriptions on the Rosetta stone; is justly celebrated for his article in Encyclopaedia Britannica called "Egypt".

SIR WILLIAM: (1749–1815); colonial governor; b. in Kent; educated at Oxford, also travelling through France, Italy and Sicily; published accounts of travels; mem. of parliament; fellow Royal Society, 1786; fellow Society of Antiquaries, 1791; keenly interested in exploration and in writing experiences: secretary to Association for Promoting the Discovery of the Interior Parts of Africa; governor of Tobago, 1807–1815.

SIR WILLIAM: (1799–1887); chief justice of Nova Scotia; b. in Scotland; educated at Glasgow; called to bar in Nova Scotia. 1826, and to that of Prince Edward's Island. 1855; queen's counsel, 1845; mem. legislative assembly, 1832, and speaker, 1843–1854; leader of the government, and attorney-general, 1854; president of executive council, 1859; retired from politics, was knighted and became chief justice, 1860.

#### (I) PROMINENT YOUNGS OF AMERICA, PAST GENERATIONS

ALFRED YOUNG: clergyman; b. Bristol, England, 1831; ordained Roman Catholic priest, Paris, 1856; was rector of the R. C. Church in Princeton, N. J., 1857-60, and subsequently had charge of that at Trenton.

BRIGHAM: celebrated Mormon leader; b. Whitingham, Va., 1801; converted to Mormonism. 1831; made one of the twelve apostles, 1832, and succeeded Joseph Smith as president and prophet, 1844. When the Mormons were expelled from Illinois, he led the long pilgrimage to Great Salt Lake, where he founded Salt Lake City, 1847. Later he served as Governor of the Utah Territory, founded the beautiful Mormon temple, and sponsored the many agricultural and industrial improvements made in the state.

EDWARD (bro. of Alfred): jeweler; author of "The Ladye Lillian and Other Poems" (1859).

CHARLES AUGUSTUS: astronomer; b. Hanover, N. H., 1834; studied at Dartmouth and Andover; was professor of astronomy at Dartmouth and Princeton. Made many discoveries in astronomy, including the spectrum of the corona and the presence of sulphur and strontium in the sun. Author of "Elements of Astronomy", "The Sun", etc.

GEORGE MURRAY: Ohio pioneer; b. Litchfield, Conn., 1802; s. of Dr. Hugh Murray, of Scotch-Irish parentage and descent. He was twice mayor

of Dayton, Ohio, and, later, U. S. Commissioner until his death. At one time he operated a line of boats on the Ohio and Erie canal.

GEORGE PAXTON: LL.D.; Canadian educator; b. Berwick-on-Tweed, Scotland; m. to Canada, 1848.

JAMES: Canadian M.P.; b. Galt, Ontario, 1835; served in the Legislature and in Parliament; elected president of the Reform Association of Ontario, 1878. Later he was a member of the Agriculture and Arts Association of Ontario, and was connected with various industrial and financial associations.

JOHN: agricultural writer; b. Falkirk, Scotland, 1773. He was educated in Glasgow, became a merchant, emigrated to Nova Scotia in 1814, and was the representative of Sydney in the Provincial Assembly from 1825 until his death.

JOHN RUSSELL: journalist; b. Downingtown, Pa., 1841; newspaper correspondent during Civil War. Established New York Standard, 1870, and became European correspondent for the Herald, 1871. Appointed librarian of Congress, 1897, and served until his death.

GEORGE R. (s. of John): author; b. Scotland; was a M. P. and the author of several important works, the chief of which was "Colonial Literature, Science and Education."

SIR WILLIAM (also s. of John): Canadian jurist; b. Falkirk, Stirlingshire, Scotland; became Queen's Counsel, 1843. He was Judge of Vice-Admiralty, an imperial appointment, and in 1868 was knighted by the queen. He left the greater part of his wealth to charitable and educational institutions.

CHARLES (also s. of John): Canadian jurist: b. Glasgow, Scotland, 1812. He was the first barrister in Prince Edward Island to be appointed Queen's Counsel, and later declined the dignity of knighthood which she offered him. He entered the island House of Assembly, and for 25 years sat in Legislative Council, during ten of which he was its president.

SAMUEL BALDWIN MARKS: soldier; b. Pittsburgh, Pa., 1840. Attained rank of brigadier-general during Civil war. Served under General Shafter in the campaign against Santiago, 1898, and was made military governor of part of Luzon, in the Philippines, 1901. Returned to the U. S., commanded the department of Calif., and, 1903, was made chief of staff of the army.

THOMAS LOWRY: statesman; b. Killyleagh, Ireland, 1832; elected Ohio state senator in 1871 and Lieutenant-Governor in 1875. In 1877 he was appointed Governor of Ohio, after Rutherford B. Hayes had been chosen President. He served in Congress and later was appointed a member of the board of public affairs of Cincinnati, holding the office until his death.

WILLIAM: journalist; b. Deptford, England, 1809; s. of an Admiral in the Royal Navy. He edited in New York City *The Albion*, a paper devoted to British views and interest; and also adapted several plays from the French.

# (M) RELIGIONS OF THE YOUNGS

For several centuries the Youngs lived in England, North Ireland and Scotland. Most of the British (with the exception of those living in South Ireland), and, likewise, the Youngs were and are of the Protestant faith.

There are a few Youngs of the Catholic faith in the British Isles, but it

is estimated that their number does not exceed four per cent of the entire Young population.

The Youngs who came from the British Isles to America continued in the faith of their fathers, for the most part, though their descendants in this country today will be found in the memberships of practically all the various churches. It is estimated that of all the Youngs in America who are church members, at least ninety-eight per cent are of the Protestant faith.

Biographical sketches of seventy-one Youngs appear in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA. Their religious faiths are shown as follows: BAPTIST, 4; CHRISTIAN SCIENCE, 1; CONGREGATIONALIST, 5; EPISCOPAL, 5; METHODIST EPISCOPAL, 1; PRESBYTERIAN, 11; OTHER PROTESTANTS, 2; RELIGION NOT STATED, 46.

The contents are similar in all of these books. The larger ones contain more detail, especially on the American families. All of them contain the family Coat of Arms.
