CUTRIGHT, PETER

PENSION NUMBER S 32,164 VIRGINIA

THIS SOLDIER APPLIED FOR PENSION IN SANGAMON COUNTY ILLINOIS DECEMBER 2ND 1833, AT THE AGE OF 74. HE STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN 1759 IN HAMPSHIRE COUNTY VIRGINIA AND IN 1785 REMOVED TO FAYETTE COUNTY KY, INTO THAT PART WHICH AFTERWARDS BECAME BOURBON COUNTY KENTUCKY. IN 1788 REMOVED TO MONTGOMERY COUNTY KENTUCKY WHERE HE RESIDED UNTIL 1803, WHEN HE REMOVED TO MADISON COUNTY OHIO, AND IN 1822 REMOVED TO SANGAMON COUNTY, ILLINOIS AND IN 1831 REMOVED TO PUTNAM COUNTY ILLINOIS, IN 1832 RETURNED TO SANGAMON COUNTY AND ABOUT FOUR WEEKS PRIOR TO MAKING THE APPLICATION FOR PENSION REMOVED TO MACON COUNTY WHERE HE WAS RESIDING.

ON THE FIRST TOUR IN THE YEAR 1780, SEPTEMBER 1ST ENLISTED IN HAMPSHIRE COUNTY VIRGINIA AS A VOLUNTEER PRIVATE IN A COMPANY OF MILITIA COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN DANIEL RETITIAN? AND SERVED SIX MONTHS. FROM HAMPSHIRE CO, VA WAS MARCHED TO HILLSBORO N.C. WHERE HE JOINED CAPT GREEN. THEIR REGIMENTAL OFFICERS WERE COL ROBERT STEVENS AND MAJOR GEO. STUBBLEFIELD, -WERE DISCHARGED 1781 BY STUBBLEFIELD.

THE WITNESSES WHO WERE ACQUAINTED WITH HIM WERE AARON VANDEVER AND MR. DANIEL CUTRIGHT OF SANGAMON CO, ILL.

ALLEN, DAVID

PENSION NUMBER S 35,172 VIRGINIA

HE STATES THAT HE IS A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY, THAT HE IS AGE 63 THAT HE ENLISTED IN AUGUST 1776, DISCHARGED AUGUST 1779. THAT HE ENLISTED IN HANOVER COUNTY, VIRGINIA, THAT HE HAS SERVED UNDER CAPT CRUMP, AND IN THE REGIMENT FIRST COMMANDED BY COL. REED? OR RICHARD? THEN BY COL RICHARD PARKER -THAT HE WAS FIRST IN THE BATTLE OF THE WHITE PLAINS DEC 1776 AT PRINCETOWN AND ALSO BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE AND GERMANTOWN, STATES THAT HE HAS RESIDED IN KENTUCKY FOR TWENTY YEARS.

DAVID ALLEN PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, JUNE TERM 1820 AGE 65. HE SAID HE SERVED FIRST IN JOHN SEARS COMPANY AND THEN IN CAPTAIN GUTHRIDGE CRUMP'S COMPANY, FIRST VIRGINIA REGIMENT, COMMANDED IN 1776 BY COL REED IN GENERAL MUHLENBERG'S BRIGADE ON CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT, THE ORIGINAL DECLARATION MADE IN 1818 APRIL 18TH.

HE STATES THAT HE HAS NO FAMILY LIVING WITH HIM, THAT HE HAS EIGHT CHILDREN, ALL OF WHOM HAVE LEFT HIM.

A LETTER IN THE FILES AS FOLLOWS: McCREDIE, Mo. APR 15-1910, ADDRESSED TO THE PENSION DEPARTMENT; DEAR SIR: "CAN YOU TELL ME IF DAVID ALLEN OR ANY OF HIS HEIRS APPLIED FOR A PENSION FROM THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR FROM SOUTH CAROLINA OR MONTGOMERY COUNTY KENTUCKY AND OBLIGE. SIGNED MRS GRACE BOYD McCREDIE, Mo."

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ANDREWS, THOMAS & MARGARET

PENSION NUMBER W2985 VIRGINIA.

ON OCTOBER 10TH 1832 THE ABOVE NAMED SOLDIER APPEARED IN COURT AND STATES THAT HE IS A RESIDENT OF FAYETTER COUNTY, AGED 74, THE 4TH OF APRIL, WHO BEING FIRST DULY SWORN ACCORDING TO LAW, DOTH ON HIS OATH MAKE THE FOLLOWING;

DECLARATION IN ORDER TO OBTAIN THE BENEFIT OF THE ACT OF CONGRESS PASSED JUNE 7TH 1832. STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN DINWIDDIE COUNTY VIRGINIA APRIL 4TH 1758 THAT NEXTRE THE RECORD OF HIS AGE IS SET DOWN IN A BOOK IN HIS POSSESSION. HE LIVED IN LUNENBURG COUNTY VIRGINIA WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE, WHERE HE RESIDED DURING THE REVOLUTION, WHEN HE REMOVED TO FRANKLIN COUNTY VIRGINIA, FROM WHENCE HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY, IN THE SPRING OF 1815 TO FAYETTE COUNTY, WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE. HE ENTERED THE SERVICE AS HE BELIEVES IN THE YEAR 1775 IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN THOMAS THRELKELD IN LUNENBURG COUNTY VIRGINIA, UNDER WHOM HE SERVED ABOUT NINE MONTHS. HE REMAINED IN SERVICE DURING HIS FIRST TOUR EIGHTEEN MONTHS, DURING THAT TOUR HE MARCHED TO SLEEPY HOLLOW? WHERE THEY REMAINED A SHORT TIME AND THEN MARCHED TO LONG BRIDGE WHERE HE WAS ENGAGED IN BATTLE AGAINST THE SCOTCH TORIES UNDER McDONALD. AFTERWARD THEY WENT TO THE TANYARD FURTHER NORTH FROM WHERE HE RETURNED HOME TO LUNENBURG - HE REMAINED AT HOME BUT THREE DAYS, WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE AGAIN. HE DOES NOT RECOLLECT WHO WAS HIS OFFICER THEN, NOR HIS SERVICES, WITH SUFFICIENT DISTINCTNESS TO GIVE THE PARTICULARS, BUT IN THAT AND THE SUBSEQUENT YEARS, BEFORE 1781, HE WAS OCCASIONALLY SERVING IN NORTH AND SOUTH CAROLINA AND GEORGIA. HE SERVED UNDER CAPTAIN MOORE IN GEORGIA AND ON HIS RETURN FROM THAT STATE IN COMPANY WITH OTHER TROOPS. HE REMEMBERS OF SEEING A COMPANY OF FORTY TORIES TAKEN PRISONERS BY THE TROOPS, NINETEEN OF WHOM WERE HUNG, THAT HE WAS ALSO UNDER GENERAL MEADE AND GEN. LAWSON AND THERE WERE COL DOWNMAN AND MAJOR ROYCE, CAPTAIN ANDREW STREET, CAPT HAYS, AS WELL AS GENERAL WASHINGTON AND MARQUIS LAFAYETTE, WHO WERE WITH THE ARMY DURING HIS SERVICES PRIOR TO 1781. IN THAT YEAR HE WAS IN THE SERVICE AT THE BATTLE OF THE COWPENS, WHERE GENERAL MORGAN COMMANDED, AND WAS IN CAPTAIN SMITH'S COMPANY. AFTER THAT HE MARCHED UNDER CAPTAIN KNIGHT AND JOINED GENERAL GREEN'S ARMY BEFORE THE BATTLE OF GUILFORD IN WHICH BATTLE HE WAS ENGAGED BEING IN THE VIRGINIA MILITIA, WHERE HE WAS IN GREAT DANGER, HAVING BEEN IN HOT ACTION, UNTIL HIS GUN WAS SO HOT IN THAT HE COULD SCARCELY HOLD IT. HE CONTINUED IN THE SERVICE UNTIL THE BEIGE OF YORKTOWN, AND THE CAPTURE OF LORD CORNWALLIS. AFTER WHICH HE RETURNED HOME - HE STATES THAT HE WAS IN THE SERVICE NEARLY THE WHOLE WAR, AS HE PREFERRED BEING IN THE ARMY, TO ANY OTHER PURSUIT, BESIDES THE BATTLE AT LONG BRIDGE -THE COWPENS, GUILFORD AND YORKTOWN. HE WAS ENGAGED IN SEVERAL SKIRMISHES IN ALL OF WHICH HE ESCAPED UNHURT. ALTHOUGH EXPOSED TO GREAT DANGER, AND UNDER GOING GREAT HARDSHIPS FROM SEVERAL CAUSES, HIS HEALTH CONTINUED PERFECTLY GOOD. HE SAYS THAT HE SERVED MORE THAN TWICE TWO YEARS DURING THE WAR.

HE REFERS TO DR. INNIS, COL INNIS, GENERAL RUSSELL, THOMAS A RUSSELL, CAPT HURST, JAMES HURST AND CAPT. MOORE, AS WELL AS MANY OTHERS NEAR HIM FOR TESTIMONY AS TO HIS CHARACTER, AND REPUTATION AS A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTION. THOMAS ALLEN, A CLERGYMAN RESIDING IN THE SAME NEIGHBORHOOD AND JAMES HURST WERE WELL ACQUAINTED WITH THOMAS ANDREWS AND THAT THEY BELIEVE HIM TO BE AGE 74. MARGARET ANDREWS OF FAYETTE CO, KY 12-12- 1832 AGE 77 SAYS THAT SHE IS THE WIDOW OF THOMAS ANDREWS AND STATES THAT HE DIED 1-22-1833; THAT HE WAS A CITIZEN OF VIRGINIA AND THAT SHE WAS MARRIED TO HIM MARCH 31-1791, IN MECKLENBERG CO, VA AND MAKES THIS AFFIDAVIT AT THE RESIDENCE OF HER SON, A ANDREWS, SHE BEING UNABLE TO ATTEND COURT, ON ACCOUNT OF HER AGE AND HEALTH.

ABRAHAM ANDREWS APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, FAYETTE CO, KY, SAYS THAT HE IS THE SON OF MRS. MARGARET ANDREWS, WHO IS AN APPLICANT FOR A PENSION AS WIDOW OF THOMAS ANDREWS; THAT HE WAS BORN AS HE UNDERSTANDS JUNE 2-1793 AND THAT HE WAS THE 2ND CHILD OF HIS PARENTS. HE HAS IN HIS POSSESSION AN OLD BOOK, PART OF A NEW TESTAMENT IN WHICH IS A RECORD OF HIS AGE AND AGES OF HIS BROTHERS AND SISTERS AS WELL AS HIS OWN CHILDREN. HE DOES NOT KNOW HOW LONG IT IS SINCE HE COPIED THE ENTRIES IN RELATIVE TO THE AGES OF HIS BROTHERS AND SISTERS BUT HE BELIEVES THAT IT IS AT LEAST TWENTY YEARS AGO AND HE HAS NO DOUBT THAT HE PUT THEIR AGES DOWN FROM THE DIRECTION OF HIS PARENTS, OR FROM THEIR BOOK FOR THEY HAD ONE.

HE HAS NO DOUBT OF HIS PARENTS HAVING OFTEN SEEN THESE ENTRIES AND SANCTIONED THEM AS CORRECT. HE HERE SHOWED TO THE COURT THE LEAVES IN SAID BOOK WHICH CONTAINS SAID ENTRIES AND GIVES THEM UP TO BE ATTACHED TO THEIR DEPOSITION, BEING THREE LEAVES BROUGHT FOR THIS PURPOSE. NANCY ANDREWS BORN 2-18-1792, ABRAHAM ANDREWS 6-2-1793, NELLY ANDREWS BORN JULY 9TH 1796, POLLY ANDREWS BORN 9-8-1798, REBECCA ANDREWS BORN 3-29-1802.

THIS IS THE AGES OF THE SONS AND DAUGHTERS OF THOMAS AND MARGARET ANDREWS.

ABRAHAM ANDREWS WAS MARRIED MAY 28- 1818, DANIEL? _____ WAS BORN 7-9-1815.

PRALLEY? ANDREWS BORN 5-17-1797.

GEORGE W. ANDREWS BORN 3-15-1819. SELLIZA? J ANDREWS BORN 10-5- 1820

WILLIAM H ANDREWS BORN 5-10-1822, HANNAH E ANDREWS BORN 1-22- 1824

MARGARET B ANDREWS BORN 2-8-1826, THOMAS D. ANDREWS BORN 6-27-1827.

THERE WAS NOTHING THAT THE CLERK COULD FIND IN MECKLENBERG CO, VA REGARDING THEIR MARRIAGE. SHE WAS AGE 87 AND STILL A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, KY IN 1848, OCT 14.

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ADAMS, PETER B/F, ON DATE OF DEC 7 1833 PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, BEFORE C HUNT, MAYOR OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON.

PETER ADAMS WAS A RESIDENT OF WASHINGTON CO, KY. HE WAS BORN IN ROWAN CO, N.C. 3-11- 1759, HE HAD A BROTHER JOHN ADAMS, A RESIDENT OF NORTH CAROLINA.

HE LIVED AT THE PLACE OF HIS BIRTH UNTIL 1779 WHEN HE CAME TO KENTUCKY WITH HIS UNCLE JACOB HUNTER AND REMAINED AT BOONES STATION UNTIL HE SETTLED IN WHAT IS NOW WASHINGTON COUNTY KENTUCKY, WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE.

HE RESIDED AT BOONE'S STATION WHEN HE FIRST ENTERED THE SERVICE AS A VOLUNTEER UNDER CAPTAIN HAYS WHO WAS A SON IN LAW OF COL DANIEL BOONE IN COL. LOGAN'S REGIMENT AND WITH THAT REGIMENT HE MARCHED TO THE MOUTH OF LICKING, WHERE HE WAS JOINED BY OTHER TROOPS UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL GEORGE ROGERS CLARK, WHO ASCENDED THE OHIO IN BOATS FROM LOUISVILLE, TO THE PLACE OF RENDEZVOUZ, COL MORGAN WAS WITH THE TROOPS, BUT WHETHER HE COMMANDED THE OTHER REGIMENT WHICH WAS IN THE EXPEDITION HE DOES NOT REMEMBER. THE ARMY UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL CLARK CROSSED THE OHIO AT THE POINT AND MARCHED TO THE OLD PHILLICOTHE TOWN. THE ENEMY MET THE TROOPS AT PICKAWAY TOWN ON MAD RIVER WHERE A SEVERE BATTLE WAS FOUGHT IN WHICH THIS AFFIANT SHARED. HE WAS NOT WOUNDED THEN NOR SINCE. THE EXPEDITION DID NOT LEAVE THE INDIAN COUNTRY UNTIL THE TOWNS WERE ALL DESTROYED AND THEIR CORN CUT DOWN WHEN THE TROOPS RETURNED TO THE MOUTH OF LICKING, AT THAT POINT, THE TWO REGIMENTS SEPARATED, GENERAL CLARK DESCENDED THE RIVER TO LOUISVILLE AND COL. LOGAN'S REGIMENT RETURNED TO BOONE'S STATION AND OTHER STATIONS FROM WHENCE IT HAD BEEN COLLECTED. ON THAT EXPEDITION HE SERVED TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION AND BELIEF AT LEAST FOUR MONTHS. THE TROOPS MARCHED ABOUT THE FIRST OF JUNE 1780 ON THE ABOVE EXPEDITION. AS THE AFFIANT WAS FIRST ENROLLED IN CAPTAIN HAY'S COMPANY, HE WAS ALWAYS TIABLE? TO BE CALLED ON TO DO MILITARY DUTY ACCORDINGLY DURING THE REMAINDER OF THE YEAR 1780. HE WAS FREQUENTLY CALLED ON TO GO ON DETACHMENTS FOR VARIOUS PURPOSES AND SERVED ON THE FRONTIER STATIONS AS A GUARD AMOUNTING TO AT LEAST ONE & 1/2 MONTHS IN THAT YEAR, MAKING 5 1/2 MONTHS OF SERVICE IN THE YEAR 1780. IN THE YEAR 1780, YOUR AFFIANT WAS NOT ENGAGED IN ANY BATTLES BUT WAS FREQUENTLY CALLED OUT ON SIMILAR SERVICES TO THAT DETAILED ABOVE AMOUNTING IN TIME TO AT LEAST 3 MONTHS. HE WAS ORDERED IN THE BEGINNING OF THE YEAR 1782 TO BRYANT'S STATION WHERE HE REMAINED AS A GUARD UNTIL THE SEIGE OF THAT STATION BY THE INDIANS IN AUGUST OF THAT YEAR. HE REMEMBERS ALL THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE SEIGE WHICH CONTINUED UNTIL THE 3RD DAY WHEN THE ENEMY RETREATED, BUT HE REFRAINS FROM OTHER DETAIL AS BEING UNNECESSARY HERE. DURING THE SEIGE,

DURING THE SEIGE, A REINFORCEMENT OF ABOUT 40 MEN CAME TO THE STATION FROM LEXINGTON, WHO REMAINED IN IT UNTIL IT WAS RAISED, CAPTAIN McCRAIG COMMANDED IN THE STATION BY THE REQUEST OF THE GARRISON ALTHOUGH HE HAD NO COMMISSION AS AN OFFICER IN CONSEQUENCE OF THE BUSINESS OF ALL OF THE SUPERIOR OFFICERS, WHO WERE ATTACHED TO THE STATION IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE SEIGE WAS RAISED, A BODY OF TROOPS OF ABOUT 180 MEN UNDER COLONELS LOGAN, TODD, TRIGG, BOONE, McCGARY AND OTHER OFFICERS CAME UP AND IMMEDIATELY PURSUED THE ENEMY TO THE BLUE LICKS, WHEN THE UNFORTUNATE BATTLE WHICH TOOK IT'S NAME FROM THAT SPOT WAS FOUGHT. YOUR AFFIANT WAS NOT IN THAT EXPEDITION IN CONSEQUENCE OF NOT BEING ABLE TO PROCURE A HORSE IN A FEW DAYS A BODY OF ABOUT 400 MEN WERE CALLED TO BURY THE DEAD ON THE BATTLE GROUND IN WHICH NUMBER HE WAS ONE AND THEY MARCHED TO THE GROUND AND PERFORMED THAT PAINFUL DUTY AND RETURNED TO BRYANT'S STATION. AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AFTER THAT GENERAL CLARK ISSUED HIS ORDERS TO COL LOGAN TO COLLECT ALL THE MEN WHO COULD BE SPARED IN THE INTERIOR STATIONS AND MEET HIM AGAIN AT THE MOUTH OF LICKING, WHICH ACCORDINGLY WAS DONE ABOUT THE LATER PART OF AUGUST. ON THAT OCCASION, YOUR AFFIANT MARCHED IN CAPTAIN CHARLES HAZELRIGG'S COMPANY IN COL LOGAN'S REGIMENT, COL BOONE WAS ALONG AND GENERAL CLARK COMMANDED IN CHIEF. THE ARMY ACROSSED THE OHIO AGAIN AT THAT POINT AND MARCHED THENCE TO THE NEW CHILLICOTHE, TOWNS, BETWEEN THE MIAMI AND WHITE WATER RIVERS WHERE HE DID NOT FIND ANY ENEMY EXCEPT ABOUT 300 SQUAWS AND CHILDREN WHO WERE TAKEN PRISONERS BY US. WE DESTROYED THE TOWNS AND CROPS OF THE INDIANS AND RETURNED AGAIN TO THE MOUTH OF LICKING, WHERE THE TROOPS AGAIN SEPARATED AND RETURNED TO THEIR RESPECTIVE RESIDENCES DURING THAT YEAR YOUR AFFIANT SERVED AT LEAST NINE MONTHS INCLUDING A PART OF 1783 UP TO THE THE PEACE BETWEEN THIS COUNTRY AND GREAT BRITTAAN. THAT THIS AFFIANT SERVED AT LEAST SEVENTEEN AND ONE HALF MONTHS, NEVER SERVED HIGHER RANK THAN A PRIVATE, ALL THE TIME IN THE MILITIA. HE HAS ONE LIVING WITNESS; JOHN HUNTER WHO WITH HIS COUSIN AND WHOSE DEPOSITION IS GIVEN HEREWITH AND WHO LIVES IN JESSAMINE COUNTY AND WHO CAME WITH HIM TO LEXINGTON TO OBTAIN SUCH AID IN PREPARING HIS CLAIM. IN HIS OWN NEIGHBORHOOD OR HIS OWN, IS KNOWN BY PETER HIGDON, JAMES THOMPSON, ROBERT MITCHEL, JUDGE BOOKER,

AFFIDAVIT OF L B SMITH, FORMERLY OF WASHINGTON CO, KY, AND DAVID STUCKER JESSAMINE CO, KY SAY THEY ARE WELL ACQUAINTED WITH PETER B/F ADAMS. JOHN HUNTER MADE AFFIDAVIT THAT HE IS WELL ACQUAINTED WITH THE AFFIANT PETER B/F ADAMS, BEING HIS NEAR RELATIVE AND HAVING BEEN LIVING WITH HIM IN HIS FATHER'S FAMILY UNTIL AFTER THE REVOLUTION AND HAVING SERVED WITH HIM IN ALMOST EVERY INSTANCE REFERRED TO IN HIS DECLARATION, HE HAS NO DOUBT OF THE ENTIRE TRUTH OF HIS STATEMENTS BEING A PERSONAL WITNESS OF MOST OF THEM AND THAT IN THE TWO CAMPAIGNS TO THE INDIAN TOWNS HE WAS A PRIVATE IN THE SAME COMPANY WITH SAID ADAMS, BUT WAS NOT WITH HIM AT THE SEIGE OF BRYANT'S STATION.

SEPTEMBER 24TH 1832 BEFORE THOMAS M HICKEY

CIRCUIT JUDGE. A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, KY AGE 72, SAYS HE ENLISTED ABOUT 3 YEARS BEFORE CORNWALLIS SURRENDERED, ENLISTED UNDER O P DAVENPORT, AS CAPTAIN OF COL PORTERFIELD COMMANDING THE STATE OF VIRGINIA GARRISON AT OLD WILLIAMSBURG AND SERVED 3 YEARS IN SAID REGIMENT, ENCLUDONG A SHORT TIME HE WAS A PRISONER, HAVING BEEN TAKEN BY THE BRITISH WHILE GUARDING THE MILITARY STORES AT WOODSON'S MILLS, ON THE SOUTH PRONG OF JAMES RIVER ABOUT TWENTY MILES FROM THE POINT OF FORKS OF SAID RIVER. WAS DISCHARGED IN JULY OF THE SAME YEAR, THAT SAID LORD CORNWALLIS WAS SURRENDERED. HE WAS ON THE GLOUSTER SIDE UNDER MAJOR BAYLESS? HE WAS LIVING IN ESSEX CO, VA WHEN HE ENLISTED AND MARCHED TO OLD WILLIAMSBURG. HE OBTAINED A DISCHARGE AND SOLD IT TO FRANK GRAVES OF THE SAME REGIMENT TO ENABLE HIM TO DRAW BIG LAND. ENLISTED IN 17__? FOR 3 YEARS, AS PRIVATE UNDER CAPT. DAVENPORT, COL. PORTERFIELD

WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE, HE RESIDED NEAR PRINCETON, N J IN HUNTERTON, CO, HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP. HE ENTERED AS A VOLUNTEER. HE WENT ALONE FROM HIS RESIDENCE TO LONG ISLAND WHERE HE JOINED HIS FATHER AND THE ARMY THEN UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL WASHINGTON WHO WAS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK. LORD LORD STERLING AND GENERAL SULLIVAN COMMANDED IN PERSON UPON THE ISLAND. AFTER BEING UPON THE ISLAND A FEW DAYS, THE AMERICAN ARMY WAS ATTACKED BY THE BRITISH COMMANDED BY HOWE OR CLINTON, AFTER SUSTAINING THE ATTACK A FEW HOURS OUR TROOPS WERE DRIVEN BACK BEHIND A CREEK LAID BETWEEN THE BATTLE GROUND AND OUR WORKS WHICH WE SWAM IN ATTEMPT WHICH MANY WERE DROWN. AFTER SEARCHING THE WORKS WE MAINTAINED OUR POSITION UNTIL THE NEXT DAY WHEN GENERAL WASHINGTON CAME OVER AND ORDERED US ACROSS THE RIVER DURING THE NIGHT. WE MARCHED FROM NEW YORK TO THE WHITE PLAINS, THE ENEMY IN PURSUIT, WE TOOK OUR POSITION BEIND THE WORKS AT THE WHITE PLAINS UNTIL THE BRITISH DREW NEAR.

I LEFT STANTS ABOUT DAY LIGHT TO VISIT MY MOTHER WHO LIVED TWO MILES OFF AND WITH THE INTENTION OF RUNNING TO BRADFORD, AN INFANTRY REGIMENT OF 500 BRITISH HAD COME OUT INTO THE NEIGHBORHOOD THE NIGHT PREVIOUS TO CAPTURE AND PLUNDER US I WAS RIDING THROUGH A FIELD AND SAW ME TO THE MOST OF THEM STATIONED THEMSELVES QBT THE ENTRANCE OF A LANE, TOWARDS WHICH I WAS RIDING AND SOME 20 OR 30 NEAR A BAR OF BARS THAT LED FROM THE FIELD INTO THE LANE. AS SOON AS MY HORSE JUMPED THE BARS, THE PARTY STATIONED THERE ROSE AND PRESENTED THEIR MUSKETS AND ORDERED ME TO SURRENDER. I TURNED MY HORSE UP THE LANE TO MAKE MY ESCAPE AND THEY ALL SCRAPPED THEIR GUNS AT ME WHICH REFUSED FIRE BECAUSE THE POWDER WAS OUT OF A VIOLENT HAIL STORM WHICH HAD TROT? AGAINST ME AND I APPROACHED THE LANE AND MY HAT BEING DRAWN DOWN, TO PROTECT MY SEEING THE ENEMY UNTIL I WAS UPON THEM, I THEN GALLOPED UP THE LANE IN THE HOPE OF MAKING MY ESCAPE, BUT DISCOVERED THEIR TROOPS FRAMED ACROSS IT AND THEN WHO WERE AT THE BARS ADVANCING UPON ME, I DISMOUNTED, JUMPED OVER INTO A FIELD AND ENDEAVORED TO ESCAPE TO A WOOD THAT GIRCLED IT, BUT WAS MUCH IMPEDED BY THE WRIGHT OF MY CLOTHING AND WAS FINALLY OVER TAKEN AND KNOCKED DOWN WITH THE BUTTS OF THE MUSKETS AND WHILE DOWN WAS STABBED SEVEN TIMES WITH THEIR BAYONETTS AND STILL BEARS UPON MY PERSON THE SCARS FROM THE WOUNDS. AN IRISH SERGEANT OR CORPOAL COME UP AND MADE THEM DESIST AND I WAS TAKEN TO COL ABERCROMBIE? WHO SWORE THEY WOULD HANG ME; SO AS SOON AS THEY REACHED A LARGE TREE IN THE ROAD. WHEN WE GOT THERE THE CANNON WERE HEARD THAT WERE FIRING AT TRENTON UPON DEC 26 1777, AND THEY UPON HEARING THEM PROCEEDED RAPIDLY TO PRINCETON AND COULD NOT TAKE TIME TO HANG ME. THEY DETERMINED TO HANG ME UPON INFORMATION GIVEN THEM BY SOME OF THE TORIES, THAT I HAD KILLED A TORY WHICH WAS UNTRUE DR. DECAMP AN AMERICAN IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD WHO WAS IN NOT INTERRUPTED BECAUSE

HE ATTENDED A TORY FAMILY BY THE NAME OF STOCKTON, TOLD COL ABRACOMB TO LEAVE ME OR I WOULD DIE FROM MY WOUNDS, HE SWORE THAT HE WOULD NOT THAT HE HAD SEEN MORE WOUNDED NOW THAN THE DOCTOR AND IF HE SHOULD LE ME I WOULD BE IN WASHINGTON'S CAMP IN 24 HOURS. I WAS THEN TAKEN IN COMPANY WITH SOME OTHER AMERICANS AS A PRISONER TO NEW YORK AND CONF WITH 300 OTHERS IN A SUGAR HOUSE UNTIL OVERTAKEN BY SICKNESS WHEN I WAS PLACED IN THE HOSPITAL AND KEPT THERE ABOUT A MONTH WHEN I WAS RECOVERED AND RETURNED TO THE SUGAR HOUSE AFTER IMPRISONMENT OF SIX MONTHS IN THE NIGHT OF JUNE 26TH 1777, SIX OF US MADE OUR ESCAPE FROM A GUARD WHO HAD BEEN SENT TO THE COUNTRY WITH US TO MAKE US MOVE FOR THE COMMISSARY GENERAL DEPARTMENT, WE ESCAPED TO THE ADVANCE OF THE AMERICAN ARMY COMMANDED COL COURTLAND, WHO GAVE US PERMISSION TO GO HOME. I HAD THEN BEEN IN SERVICE ABOUT TEN MONTHS. HE DID NOT JOIN THE ARMY AGAIN BUT WAS TAKEN TO A TROOP OF HORSE AND WAS CALLED OUT FOR SHORT PERIODS DURING THE CONTINUANCE OF THE WAR.

WHENEVER THE ENEMY WERE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD, THE ONLY REGULAR OFFICERS HE KNEW WHILE IN THE SERVICE WERE GENERAL WASHINGTON, SULLIVAN, STERLINGS AND PUTNAM.

HE WAS BORN IN HUNTERTON CO, N JERSEY, DEC 21- 1755 AND WAS LIVING IN THIS COUNTY WHEN CALLED INTO SERVICE AND CONTINUED TO LIVE THERE EVER UNTIL 1788 WHEN HE MOVED TO FAYETTE CO, KY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE. THE FOLLOWING PERSONS ARE ACQUAINTED WITH HIM; ABRAHAM FURGER SON, GEO WARE, WM SCOTT, ANDREW SCOTT, FREDK SHRYOCK.

THAT HE WAS BORN MARCH 21-1758 ON YADKIN RIVER, NORTH CAROLINA; THAT HE HAS A RECORD OF HIS AGE, BEING A TRANSCRIPT OF HIS FATHER'S ENTRY IN A BOOK WHICH HE KEPT FOR THE PURPOSE OF REGISTERING THE AGES OF HIS CHILDREN, BUT DOES NOT KNOW WHERE THE BOOK IS, THOUGH HE STILL HAS THE PAPER ON WHICH THE TRANSCRIPT THE ENTRY OF HIS OWN AGE FROM HIS FATHER'S BOOK AFORESAID. THAT HE WAS LIVING IN SOUTH CAROLINA IN CAMDEN DISTRICT ON CONGOREE RIVER WHEN HE FIRST ENTERED THE SERVICE AS A MILITIAMAN FOR A TOUR AND SERVED THREE MONTHS AND UPWARDS, THAT HE SERVED SAID TOUR UNDER JOHN COOK AS CAPTAIN AND MALACHI WISTON AS LIEUT IN THE REGIMENT OF COL ROBERT GOODWIN, COL JOHN RUSSELL COMMANDING; THAT HE WAS DRAFTED ABOUT THE LATER PART OF SEPTEMBER, OR FIRST PART OF THE YEAR 1775. I WAS NOT DRAFTED FOR THIS BUT MY FATHER SAMUEL BOONE (WHO HAS LONG SINCE DIED) HAD BEEN DRAFTED AND I WENT ON THE TOUR AS HIS SUBSTITUTE. WE WERE MARCHED TO THE UPPER PART OF THE STATE TO A PLACE CALLED 96 IN PURSUIT OF THE TORIES AND HAD A BATTLE WITH THEM AND TOOK 300 PRISONERS. WE RENDEZVOUED AT THE NEW STORE? ON THE SIDE CONGEREE RIVER, ABOUT THE FIRST JULY 1776 I WAS DRAFTED AS A MILITIAMAN UNDER WILLIAM MCGUIRE. WE WERE MARCHED TO CHARLESTOWN AND SERVED AT THE 3 MONTHS TOUR BUT WE WERE MARCHED TO BEAUFORT ISLAND WHEN THE TOUR HAD HALF EXPIRED, BUT WE WERE NOT ENGAGED IN ANY BATTLE. WE WERE COMMANDED BY COL ROBERT GOODWIN UNDER GENERAL JOSEPH KENSHAW AFTER WE ARRIVED AT BEAUFORT ISLAND BUT WHILE AT CHARESTON OUR COMMANDING GENERAL WAS RICHARD RICHARDSON WHO COMMANDED US ON MY FIRST TOUR WHEN I WENT OUT AS MY FATHER'S SUBSTITUTE.

I NEXT ENTERED SERVICE AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR MY FATHER WHO HAD BEEN AGAIN DRAFTED FOR A TOUR WHICH WAS EARLY IN THE FALL OF THE YEAR 1778 SAID COOK COMMANDED SAID COMPANY DURING SAID TOUR UNDER SAID GOODWIN AS COLONEL AND GENERAL LINCOLN A REGULAR OFFICER COMMANDED THE WHOLE OF US. WE RENDEZVOUED, FRIDAY'S FERRY ON THE CONGREE RIVER, WERE MARCHED TO THE QUARTER HOUSE SIX MILES FROM CHARLESTOWN WHERE WE LAY SOMETIME AND BRITISH FORCES ABOUT THAT TIME LANDED IN SAVANNAH AND WE WERE THERE ORDERED AND ACCORDINGLY MARCHED TO SAVANNAH BUT DID NOT REACH THERE BUT REACHED PURVISBURG ON THE SAVANNAH RIVER AND THERE STAYED UNTIL WE WERE DISCHARGED AND ON THIS TOUR WE WERE NOT ENGAGED IN A BATTLE. VERY EARLY IN THE YEAR 1779 I AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE AS A MILITIAMAN, BEING DRAFTED FOR A TOUR OF 3 MONTHS IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN JOHN MCLEHARD IN THE REGIMENT OF COL ROBERT GOODWIN AND UNDER GENERAL WILLIAMSON. WE RENDEZVOUED AT THE PLACE CALLED THE NEW STORE? THE ARMY MARCHED FROM THERE TO AUGUSTA BUT I WAS LEFT AS A PART OF A DETACHMENT TO GUARD NEW STORE WHERE SOME PUBLIC STORES AND PROPERTY HAD BEEN DEPOSITED AND I HAD SERVED AS A MILITIAMAN FOR A PERIOD OF OVER ONE YEAR. I WAS RESIDING IN CAMDEN DISTRICT, S.C. ON THE CONGEREE RIVER AND FOR THE LAST TOUR I RECEIVED A REGULAR DISCHARGE FROM MY CAPTAIN AND SHORTLY AFTER IN THE MONTH OF MARCH 1779 I LEFT SOUTH CAROLINA TO MOVE TO KENTUCKY WHERE I ARRIVED IN THE FALL OF THE YEAR 1779 HAVING STOPPED A WHILE IN NORTH CAROLINA AND I HAVE LIVED IN FAYETTE CO, KY SINCE THE FALL OF THE YEAR 1779 UNTIL THE MONTH OF MARCH 1829 WHEN I MOVED TO CLARK CO, KENTUCKY WHERE I HAVE EVER SINCE LIVED, EXCEPT THAT I HAVE LIVED IN MADISON CO, KY TWO YEARS, AND THEN SETTLED IN FAYETTE CO, KY.

I KNOW OF NO PERSON WHO CAN PROVE MY SERVICES IN THE ARMY, EXCEPT MY TWO SISTERS, ELIZABETH WHITE AND REBECCA JONES, WHOSE AFFIDAVITS ARE HEREWITH ATTACHED. I HAVE TWO OTHER SISTERS, SARAH MONTGOMERY AND MARY BRADLEY THE FORMER LIVING IN THE STATE OF OHIO AND THE LATER LIVING IN MISSOURI WHO COULD PROVE MY SERVICES AS ABOVE FOR I COULD PROCURE THEIR TESTIMONY. I AM KNOWN IN MY NEIGHBORHOOD TO WILLIAM MORTON, CAPT JOHN MARTIN OR MORTON, DENNIS BRADLEY, WILLIAM BERKLEY, JOHN HAMPTON, JESSE FISHBACK, AND HUBBARD TAYLOR, SR. WHO CAN TESTIFY TO MY CHARACTER FOR TRUTH AND ETC. HE SIGNED HIS NAME SAMUEL BOONE, - WILLIAM MARTIN WAS A CLERGYMAN IN CLARK COUNTY, KY.

REBECCA JONES, OF FAYETTE CO, KY MADE AFFIDAVIT. SAYS SHE IS THE SISTER OF SAMUEL BOONE, WHO NOW LIVES IN CLARK CO, KY; THAT SHE WAS BORN APRIL 1768 ON SANTEE RIVER, SOUTH CAROLINA; THAT SHE CAME FROM SOUTH CAROLINA TO KY WITH HER FATHER SAMUEL BOONE IN THE YEAR 1779 AND THAT SHE KNOWS IN SOUTH CAROLINA HER BROTHER SAMUEL BOONE JR, WHEN HE WENT ON TWO DIFFERENT TOURS AS A MILITIAMAN IN THE SOUTH CAROLINA TROOPS, BUT HOW LONG HE SERVED AT EITHER TIME AND WHETHER HE SERVED AT ALL, SHE KNOWS NOT PERSONALLY, EXCEPT THAT SHE KNOWS HE MARCHED IN THE SERVICE TWICE AS A MILITIAMAN AND ~~HEXIXSX~~ ON HIS RETURN SHE HEARD FROM HIM AND THERE AND OTHERS THAT HE HAD BEEN ENG IN THOSE TOURS, HE SERVED AND THAT SHE THEN BELIEVES AND HAS EVER SINCE BELIEVED AND SUCH WAS THE REPUTATION AMONG HIS ACQUAINTANCES AND RELATIVES SOUTH CAROLINA AND IN THIS STATE; THAT SAID SAMUEL BOONE HER BROTHER SERVED IN SOUTH CAROLINA AS A MILITIAMAN, THIS 1832 SEPT 26TH.

AFFIDAVIT OF ELIZABETH WHITE, CLARK CO, KY STATES THAT SHE NOW LIVES IN MADISON CO, KY WHERE SHE HAS RESIDED FOR SEVERAL YEARS; THAT SHE IS OVER 81 YEARS OF AGE AND THE WIDOW OF WILLIAM WHITE, DECEASED; THAT I AM THE SISTER OF SAMUEL BOONE WHO NOW RESIDES IN CLARK CO, KY, WHO FORMERLY RESIDED IN FAYETTE, AND THAT REBECCA JONES, WHO NOW RESIDES IN FAYETTE IS ALSO THE SISTER OF SAID SAMUEL BOONE; THAT SAMUEL BOONE IS OVER 74 YEARS OF AGE; THAT DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, SAID BOONE LIVED ON CONGAREE RIVER, CAMDEN DISTRICT, S.C. IN HIS SAID BOONE'S FATHER'S FAMILY AND THAT SHE WAS THERE AN INMATE OF SAID FAMILY AND SHE WELL REMEMBERS THAT DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR THAT HE WAS DRAFFED FOUR DIFFERENT TIMES TO SERVE FOUR DISTINCT TOURS OF DUTY.

IN NOVEMBER 14- 1833 FAYETTE CO, KY, SAMUEL BOONE MADE APPLICATION FOR INCREASE IN PENSION ON ACCOUNT OF HIS HAVING SERVED AS A MILITIAMAN IN THE STATE OF KENTUCKY THREE YEARS.. THAT HE REMOVED TO SAID STATE FROM SOUTH CAROLINA, FALL OF 1779 AND FROM SPRING 1780 HE WAS IN THE SERVICE UNTIL THE SPRING OF 1783 AND THAT HE SERVED UNDER CAPTAINS WILLIAM HAYS, CHARLES HAZELRIGG, JAMES STEVENSON, JOHN CONSTANT, AND WAS PERSONALLY EMPLOYED IN GUARDING GUARDING THE FORTS ALTERNATELY AT BRYANTS STATION, BOONES, STRODE'S AND MCGEE'S AND THE LEXINGTON STATIONS AND WAS SEVERAL TIMES EMPLOYED IN THE CAPACITY OF SPY AND ENGAGED IN SCOURING THE COUNTRY ON THE LICKING AND OHIO RIVERS, FOR SOME 30 DAYS EACH TOUR, UNDER ORDERS OF COL LEVI TODD AND DANIEL BOONE, AND WAS IN THE BATTLE WITH THE INDIANS NEAR THE UPPER BLUE LICKS WHEN EACH COL JOHN HOLDER WAS DEFEATED, HE THINKS, ON AUG 5- 1782 AT WHICH TIME HE WAS UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPT JOHN CONSTANT.

AFFIDAVIT OF TIMOTHY LOGAN AGE 74 RESIDENT OF GARRARD CO, KY STATES HE BECAME ACQUAINTED WITH SAMUEL BOONE IN THE SPRING OF 1781, AT WHICH TIME SAMUEL BOONE WAS ENGAGED IN THE SERVICE AND CONTINUED THERE IN DURING THE SPRING OF 1783. THIS AFFIDANT STATES THAT HE SERVED A TOUR WITH HIM, THE THE SAID BOONE IN THE CAPACITY OF A SPY AND KNOWS THE ABOVE APPLICANT TO BE THE IDENTICAL PERSON HAVING KNOWN HIM EVER SINCE 1781. AGAIN SAMUEL BOONE APPEARED IN THE FAYETTE CIRCUIT COURT IN OPEN COURT, 1834 IN MARCH, AGE 76 AT THAT TIME A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE COUNTY FOR INCREASE OF A PENSION, HE STATES THAT HE HEARD HIS UNCLE DANIEL BOONE WAS RAISING A VOLUNTEER COMPANY IN NORTH CAROLINA TO GO TO KENTUCKY TO FIGHT THE INDIANS, HE OBTAINED A DISMISSION FROM THE SERVICE IN SOUTH CAROLINA IN MARCH 1779 AND WENT TO SAID NORTH CAROLINA, JOINED THE COMPANY UNDER COMMAND OF DANIEL BOONE AND MARCHED FROM THENCE THE 15TH SEPT IN SAID YEAR ARRIVED AT BOONESBOROUGH FORT, THE LAST WEEK IN OCTOBER IN SAID YEAR. THE NEXT DAY AFTER OUR ARRIVAL, COL BOONE ORDERED THE SMALL DETACHMENT OF US TO GO TO BRYANT'S (WHERE SOME FAMILIES HAD SETTLED, IN ORDER TO DEFEND THEM, AT WHICH PLACE, I WAS PUT UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPTAIN WILLIAM HAYS WHO KEPT US EMPLOYED IN BUILDING A FORT AT SAID PLACE. WE COMMENCED BUILDING IN THE SAID FALL, BUT DID NOT COMPLETE IT UNTIL THE SUCCEEDING SPRING ON THE 9TH DAY OF MARCH THE INDIANS

KILLED ONE OF OUR COMPANY, STOLE NEARLY ALL OF OUR HORSES. I REMAINED IN SAID FORT UNDER THE COMMAND OF SAID HAYS IN ORDER TO DEFEND IT UNTIL OCTOBER 1780 THEN CAPTAIN HAYS RECEIVED ORDERS FROM COL DANIEL BOONE, FROM BOONE'S STATION TO COME WITH ALL THE MEN THAT COULD BE SPARED FROM THAT STATION TO AID HIM IN THE DEFENSE OF SAID BOONE'S STATION WHICH ORDERS WE OBEYED AND REMAINED DEFENDING SAID STATION UNTIL 1781, THEN WE WERE SENT DOWN THE KENTUCKY RIVER WITH CAPTAIN HAYS TO BUILD CANOES TO TAKE CORN TO GENERAL CLARK'S ARMY AT THE FALLS OF THE OHIO RIVER. AFTER AN EXAMINANG WHICH WE RETURNED TO SAID STATION IN TWO WEEKS WHERE WE REMAINED DEFENDING THE STATIONS UNTIL APRIL 1782. IN SAID APRIL COL. DANIEL BOONE SENT A SMALL DETACHMENT ALL OF US TO STRODE'S STATION, WHICH WAS COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN JOHN CONSTANT AND AFTER OUR ARRIVAL CAPTAIN CONSTANT REQUESTED SOME OF US TO VOLUNTEER AS SPIES AND ANDREW RULE AND MYSELF, SERVED AS SUCH 30 DAYS, THEN WE WERE ORDERED BACK TO BOONE'S STATION WHERE WE ARRIVED THE 15TH DAY OF MAY AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL THE MIDDLE OF JUNE IN THE DEFENSE OF THE FORT, THEN WE WERE ORDERED OUT BY COL LEVI TODD UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPT. JAMES STEVENSON AS A COMPANY OF SPIES AND SERVED 30 DAYS RANGING THE COUNTRY AND FROM LICKING RIVER TO THE BIG BOONE LICK, AFTER WHICH WE RETURNED TO BOONE'S STATION AND CONTINUED IN IT'S DEFENSE UNTIL THE 2ND DAY OF AUGUST WHEN I WAS SENT OUT IN A COMPANY COMMANDED BY MAJOR JOHN HOLDER TO RETAKE TWO WHITE BOYS THAT WERE STOLEN BY THE INDIANS AND WE OVERTOOK THE INDIANS AT THE UPPER BLUE LICKS AT WHICH PLACE WE HAD A BATTLE AND BEING DEFEATED, WE RETURNED TO BOONE'S STATION. A FEW DAYS AFTER MY ARRIVAL THERE WERE SOME SICK AND WOUNDED BROUGHT TO THE FORT FROM THE BATTLE OF LOWER BLUE LICKS AND I WAS ORDERED TO REMAIN AND TAKE CARE OF THEM, WHICH I DID UNTIL THE 16TH DAY OF APRIL 1783, MAKING AMOUNT OF SERVICE THREE YEARS, AND 7 MONTHS. HE STATES HE DID NOT KNOW WHEN HE FIRST APPLIED FOR PENSION THAT THE ACT EMBRACED SERVICE AGAINST THE INDIANS. HE SAID THAT TIMOTHY LOGAN WAS NOW DRAWING A PENSION, AFOR LIKE SERVICES, ALSO A CERTAIN OSWALD TOWNSEND IS A SIMILAR SITUATION.

IT WAS IN ROWAN CO, N.C. THAT DANIEL BOONE WAS RAISING HIS COMPANY IN WHICH SAMUEL WENT TO ENLIST WITH HIM, THEY MARCHED ON THE 15TH SEPTEMBER 1779 AND ARRIVED AT BOONESBORO OCT OF THE SAME YEAR. THEY DID NOT COMPLETE BRYANT'S STATION UNTIL THE SPRING OF 1780. HE AIDED IN ERECTING NEARLY ALL THE BUILDINGS THERE. HE REMAINED THERE IN GARRISON UNTIL OCT. 1780 WHEN ORDERS WERE RECEIVED FROM COL BOONE TO FORWARD A DETACHMENT TO REINFORCE BOONE'S STATION WHERE HE MARCHED AS ONE OF THEM AND REMAINED IN GARRISON UNTIL 1781 IN THE SPRING WHEN HE WAS SENT WITH OTHERS UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPT. HAYS TO AID IN BUILDING CANOES FOR GENERAL CLARK'S ARMY, TO CONVEY CORN TO HIM THEN AT THE FALLS OF THE OHIO, AFTER THAT SERVICE WHICH ONLY LASTED TWO WEEKS, HE RETURNED TO THE FORT OF BOONE'S STATION WHERE HE REMAINED IN GARRISON, DEFENDING IT UNTIL APRIL 1782, IN WHICH MONTH, COL BOONE SENT A DETACHMENT TO STRODE'S STATION, WHICH THEY THEN COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN JOHN CONSTANT, THERE AT THE REQUEST OF SAID CONSTANT, HE IN COMPANY WITH ANDREW RULE VOLUNTEERED AS A SPY AND SERVED 30 DAYS. AFTER THAT HE RETURNED TO BOONE'S STATION WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL THE MIDDLE OF JUNE WHERE HE SERVED A TOUR OF 30 DAYS AS A SPY UNDER COMMAND OF JAMES STEVENSON CAPTAIN, RANGING THE COUNTRY FROM LICKING RIVER TO BIG BOONE LICK, AFTER WHICH HE RETURNED TO THE STATION. HE REMAINED IN GARRISON UNTIL THE 2ND OF AUGUST WHEN HE WAS AGAIN DETACKED UNDER THE COMMAND OF MAJOR JOHN HOLDER IN PURSUIT OF A PARTY OF INDIANS WHO HAD TAKEN 2 BOYS NAMED JONES HOY? OR HAY? SON OF MAJOR HAY OR HOY? AND JOHN CALLOWAY, SON OF COL RICHARD CALLOWAY. THEY OVERTOOK THE INDIANS AT THE UPPER BLUE LICKS AND IN THE BATTLE WHICH ENSUED THEY WERE DEFEATED AND RETURNED TO BOONE'S STATION.

THERE HE REMAINED AND IN A FEW DAYS, SEVERAL OF THE WOUNDED WHO WERE IN THE BATTLE OF THE LOWER BLUE LICKS WERE BROUGHT IN AND HE AIDED IN TAKING CARE OF THEM. HE REMAINED IN GARRISON DOING DUTY UNTIL 1783 THE CLOSE OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR IN APRIL 1783.

MAJOR OSWALD TOWNSEND AGE 75 RESIDED IN MADISON CO, KY, WHO HAS BEEN PERSONALLY ACQUAINTED WITH SAMUEL BOONE SINCE 1779 TO THE PRESENT SAW THE COMPANY THAT SAID BOONE WAS IN ON IT'S MARCH TO KENTUCKY UNDER COL DANIEL BOONE AND IN THE SPRING OF 1780 [WENT TO BRYANT'S STATION AND THERE FOUND SAID SAMUEL BOONE IN THE SERVICE AS A SOLDIER.

THENCE TO FORT ERIE, AND AFTER PEACE OUT TO BENHALOR? THENCE TO ST. LOUIS, THENCE TO CINCINNATI THENCE TO DETROIT, THENCE TO FORT HARRISON WHERE HE WAS DISCHRGED BY MAJ C CHINN. THAT THIS REGIMENT WAS COMMANDED BY COL MILLER, THAT WHILE IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. AND IN THE LINE OF HIS DUTY FROM COLD AND INJURIES, HE WAS AFFECTED AND DISABLED AND LOSS THE USE OF HIS RIGHT ARM AND A S NECK AND TO HAVE BONES TAKEN FROM HIS NECK.

RICHARD KINNEY MADE AFFIDAVIT, STATES THAT HE ENTERED AS A REGULAR SOLDIER IN CAPTAIN BENJ W SANDERS COMPANY IN THE 17TH REGIMENT OF INFANTRY IN 1817, THAT HE WELL KNOWS JOHN BAKER WHO BELONGED TO CAPTAIN HOLDER'S COMPANY OF THE SAME REGIMENT; THAT IN 1817 WAS HEALTHY AND STOUT AND SOUND MAN WHEN HE FIRST ENLISTED, BUT HAS BEEN RENDERED A INVALID BECAUSE OF HIS EXPOSURE AND ETC IN THE SERVICE.

UNDER DATE OF FEB 9-1858 PERSONALLY APPEARED CYNTHIA BAKER A RESIDENT OF THE COUNTY OF FAYETTE AND STATE AFORESAID, AGED 73, A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE COUNTY, WIDOW OF JOHN BAKER AND HAS RECEIVED BENEFIT OF THE

WIDOW'S PENSION THAT WAS DUE UP TO HIS DEATH. BY THE ORDERS OF LAFAYETTE, WE RETREATED TO CULPEPPER CITY UNDER THE BLUE MOUNTAINS WHEN WE WERE JOINED BY THE ARMY COMMANDED BY GENERAL WAYNE. THE BRITISH HAD PURSUED US BUT AFTER WE WERE JOINED BY GENERAL WAYNE, THEY RETREATED. WE FOLLOWED THEM AS FAR AS DUNCASTLE. WE THEN STARTED AT DAY BREAK AND WENT

TO THE GREEN SPRINGS AT JAMESTOWN, OLD FIELDS, WHERE WE ENGAGED A BRITISH, WE UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL WAYNE, 200 OF WHOM AFFIANT WAS ONE BROUGHT ON THE ACTION. AFTER FIGHTING ABOUT TWO-THIRDS OF THE DAY, WE DROVE IN THE PICKET GUARDS OF THE BRITISH. GENERAL WAYNE CAME UP TO OUR RELIEF AND WE CONTINUED IN LINE UNTIL HE FORMED THE ORDERS OF BATTLE, WHEN HE JOINED HIS LEFT WING. WAYNE'S ARMY CONSISTED OF ABOUT 2,000 MEN, AFTER FIRING 45 SHOTS WAYNE RETIRED. HE LIVED IN HANOVER COUNTY WHICH TIME THAT HE ENLISTED IN THE SERVICE.

AFFIANT WAS BORN IN HANOVER COUNTY VIRGINIA 17TH MARCH 1761 HE HAS THE RECORD OF HIS AGE IN HIS BIBLE, WHICH HE TOOK FROM HIS FATHER'S BIBLE. HE MOVED FROM SAID COUNTY WHEN HE WAS ABOUT 25 TO AMELIA CO, FROM THENCE FOR 5 OR 6 YEARS TO PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY AFTER LIVING THERE TWENTY YEARS, MOVED TO FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE. HE IS KNOWN AND ACQUAINTED WITH GEORGE BOONE, JOHN HUDSON, DUDLEY HUDSON, TURNER? CHRISTIAN, CHARLES CAR, AND MAJOR WILLIAM BOONE.

HE RECEIVED A DISCHARGE FROM CAPTAIN PARKER GOODALL, AT GUILFORD COURT HOUSE, WHICH HE HAS LOST. MRS. JUDITH CHRISTIAN THE WIDOW OF HIS BROTHER KNOWS OF HIS SERVICES BUT SHE IS ABOUT 87 YEARS OF AGE AND LIVES ABOUT 7 MILES FROM THIS PLACE WHOSE TESTIMONY THIS AFFIANT HOPES WILL BE DISPENSED THAT IN CONSEQUENCE OF HER GREAT AGE, HE KNOWS OF NO ONE ELSE IN FAYETTE COUNTY BY WHOM HE CAN PROVE HIS SERVICES.

GEORGE G BOONE CLERGYMAN MADE AFFIDAVIT IN HIS BEHALF.

HIS WIDOW, MARY CHRISTIAN, THEN RESIDING IN BRACKEN CO, KY, ON THE 13TH DAY OF JUNE 1843 AGE 70, STATES THAT SHE WAS MARRIED TO ANDREW CHRISTIAN IN AMELIA COUNTY VIRGINIA 1788; THAT HE DIED DEC 13- 1837 IN FAYETTE CO, KY. THAT THEY WERE NOT MARRIED PRIOR TO HIS LEAVING THE SERVICE, BUT PREVIOUS TO THE FIRST OF JANUARY 1794, AND STATES THAT SHE HAS RAISED TWELVE CHILDREN, HER FAMILY RECORD HAS GOTTEN MISPLACED; THAT HER CHILDREN RESIDES IN KENTUCKY, INDIANA ILLINOIS AND MISSOURI AND THAT SOME OF THEM MAY HAVE IT.

IN ANOTHER LETTER DATED 1843 FROM LEWIS C SUGGETT, HE SAID I FORWARDED YOU THE DECLARATION OF WILLIAM G DOTSON ABOUT WHICH I HAVE HAD NO REPLY.

STATE OF KENTUCKY, FAYETTE COUNTY, DECEMBER 1-1832 PERSONALLY APPEARED JOHN CHRISTIAN, A RESIDENT OF LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY AGE 80; THAT HE WAS BORN IN IRE IN THE YEAR 1752, CAME TO AMERICAN 1760; THAT HIS FATHER HAD A RECORD OF HIS AGE BUT HE DOES NOT KNOW WHAT HAS BECOME OF IT, THAT HE RESIDED ON CLYNN RIVER IN FINCASTLE AND AFTERWARDS IN WASHINGTON COUNTY WHEN HE WAS CALLED INTO SERVICE; THAT AFTER THE WAR, TERMINATED, HE LIVED SOME YEARS IN EAST TENN, AND THEN REMOVED TO KENTUCKY, WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE. ARTHUR CAMPBELL COMMANDED THE MILITIA OF THE COMPANY DURING THE WHOLE TIME. CAPTAIN SMITH WAS AFTERWARDS PROMOTED TO BE COL. OR LIEUT COL AND JOHN KINCAID WAS MADE CAPTAIN, WM BOWEN WAS ALSO LIEUT IN THE COMPANY. DURING MONROE ADMINISTRATION, HE FILED APPLICATION FOR PENSION, WITH THE TESTIMONY OF CAPT JOHN KINKEAD. HE REFERS ALSO TO M M McCALL, DR. PINDELL, JOHN MARTON, ROBERT FRAZER, W.T. BARRY, WHO TESTIFY AS TO HIS VERACITY AND ETC. IN A LETTER FROM HIS REPRESENTATIVE WHO WAS HANDLING THE CASE MR. M. M. McCALLA, IN 1832 FROM LEXINGTON SAYS THAT MR. CHRISTIAN'S WIFE WAS THEN LIVING; STATES THAT HE WOULD HAVE BEEN SENT TO THE POOR HOUSE IF IT HAD NOT BEEN FOR AN OLD LADY WHO WAS REALLY NOT ABLE TO TAKE CARE OF THEM FINANCIALLY.

DISTRICT OF KENTUCKY, 15TH AUG 1818 PERSONALLY APPEARED THE ABOVE SOLDIER AGED 60 OF FAYETTE CO, KY. SAID WILLIAM CHRISTIAN ENLISTED IN HANOVER CO, VA IN COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN DABNEY, 1ST VA, REGIMENT, UNDER THE COMMAND A COLONEL WHOSE NAME HE DOES NOT NOW RECOLLECT IN THE FALL OF 1775 AND THAT HE CONTINUED TO SERVE UNTIL THE FALL OF 1776. THIS WAS AFTER HE MOVED TO FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY WHERE HE HAS EVER SINCE RESIDED. THAT HE HAS NO WRITTEN EVIDENCE IN HIS POSSESSION, EXCEPT THE ENCLOSED DEED FROM MESSRS TAYLOR CROGHAN AND TERRALL FOR LAND. ONE THOMAS GRAVES, STATES THAT HE WAS IN THE SAME DETACHMENT WITH SAID COOK AND KNOWS OF HIS WOUNDS AT THE RIVER RAISIN ON THE 22ND JAN 1813. HE SAID " I WAS A PRISONER TO THE SAME INDIAN WITH HIM AND KNOW THAT COOK DID HIS DUTY. HE HAS SINCE RETURNED TO HIS RESIDENCE IN SCOTT Co, KY.

AFFIDAVIT BY JULIUS TURNER, BEING ONE OF THE PRIVATES IN CAPT. JOSEPH REDINGS COMPANY, WHO WAS IN THE DETACHMENT AT THE RIVER RAISIN IN THE BATTLE 22ND JAN 1813, SAID THAT WM COOK WAS THEN WOUNDED AND TAKEN PRISONER BY THE INDIANS, THAT HE WAS WOUNDED IN THE ARM AND VERY SEVERE. IN AN AFFIDAVIT BY HENRY WARFIELD AND JOHN C RICHARDSON. STATES THAT THE REGIMENT TO WHICH WM SCOTT BELONGED WAS COMMANDED BY COL SCOTT.

A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, KY, AGE 72. STATES THAT HE ENLISTED IN 1776 IN THE SPRING, WITH CAPTAIN AMBROSE DUDLEY, AND SERVED IN THE 2ND REGIMENT OF THE STATE OF VIRGINIA LINE, UNDER CAPTAIN AMBROSE DUDLEY, LIEUT. NAT. WELSH, ENSIGN BUSH AND HE THINKS MUHLENBERGH, WAS THE COLONEL. HE LEFT THE SERVICE IN THE SPRING OF 1777 AFTER SERVING TWELVE OR ? OR TWELVE MONTHS. WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICES, HE LIVED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY, VIRGINIA, MARCHED TO WILLIAMSBURG, THROUGH THE COUNTIES OF CAROLINE, HANOVER, KING WILLIAM AND KING AND QUEEN COUNTIES, VIRGINIA, WAS STATIONED AT WILLIAMSBURG, ABOUT TEN MONTHS, WHEN HE WAS TAKEN ILL OF FEEVER AND PLACED IN HOSPITAL, WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL HIS NEIGHBOR JAMES TRUE, CAME TO WILLIAMSBURG TO SEE HIS BROTHER, WHO WAS A SOLDIER AND SICK. DEPONENT WAS INSENSIBLE AND WAS CARRIED HOME BY THE AUTHORITY OF HIS OFFICERS, AS TRUE AFTERWARDS INFORMED HIM. HE WAS IN SUCH A SITUATION AS TO KNOW NOTHING OF THE JOURNEY HOME AND REMAINED SICK UNTIL HIS FURLOUGH EXPIRED AND JAMES SMITH, HIS FRIEND WENT TO FIELDING LEWIS, THE COLONEL OF SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY AND GOT IT EXTENDED. HE ENTERED THE SERVICE WITHOUT ANY BOUNTY AND WAS TO CONTINUE TWO YEARS IF DUDLEY CONTINUED TO COMMAND THE COMPANY, BUT BEFORE HIS RECOVERY, DUDLEY HAD RESIGNED.

AS SOON AS HE GOT WELL IN THE FALL OF THE YEAR 1777, HE THINKS GENERAL BURGoyNE'S TROOPS WERE TAKEN TO ALBEMARLE AND KEPT AS PRISONERS IN BARRACKS, HE ENTERED THE SERVICES AS A WAGONER, UNDER WM CRITTENDEN THE WAGON MASTER, DROVE A WAGON FROM SPOTTSYLVANIA, TO ALBEMARLE LOADED WITH WHISKEY FOR THE ARMY, CONTINUED AT ALBEMARLE BARRACKS FOR ABOUT TWO YEARS WAGONING FLOUR, WHISKEY, BRANDY, FORAGE, CORN, OATS AND ETC. FROM THE COUNTY AROUND. HE WAS COMMANDED BY THOMAS STANLEY, QUARTERMASTER GENERAL AND WILLIAM CRITTENDEN, WAGONMASTER, THEN WENT TO FREDERICKSBURG TO GET A WAGON REPAIRED AND RICHARD YOUNG A QUARTERMASTER GENERAL DIRECTED HIM AND 3 OTHER WAGONS TO TAKE SOME PUBLIC PAPERS AND CARRIED THEM BEYOND THE REACH OF CORNWALLIS, WHO WAS APPROACHING ALBEMARLE. THEY CARRIED THE PAPERS TO HAGERSTOWN MARYLAND, KEPT THEM IN THE WAGON TEN DAYS TO AWAIT THE

MOVEMENT OF THE BRITISH, THEN TOOK THEM INTO THE COUNTRY AND PUT THEM INTO A HOUSE BY THE DIRECTION OF COL. PARKER, WHO HAD CHARGE OF THE PUBLIC PAPERS. HE RETURNED TO FREDERICKSBURG AND CONTINUED UNDER YOUNG'S COMMAND UNTIL HE CONVEYED BAGGAGE TO THE TROOPS AT WINCHESTER, WHO WERE TAKEN AT YORKTOWN, LEFT THE SERVICE IN OCTOBER OR NOVEMBER 1781. HE WAS ENGAGED IN NO BATTLES, HE DURING HIS FIRST TERM OF SERVICE, SERVED WITH CAPTAIN SMITH'S AND CAPTAIN THOMAS MINOR'S COMPANIES.

HE WAS ACQUAINTED WHILE IN THE SERVICE WITH CAPTAIN TOLLS, AND STUBBLEFIELD, MAJOR WILLIS, LT. R. O. DUDLEY, GENERAL WEEDEN. HE HAS NO DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE OF HIS SERVICE. HE WAS BORN IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY, VA. ON THE 27TH JUNE 1760. HIS MOTHER, WHILE IN VIRGINIA MANY YEARS AGO, WHILE IN VIRGINIA TOLD HIM HIS AGE, HE THEN SET IT DOWN ON A PIECE OF PAPER AND HAS ENTERED IT IN A BOOK IN WHICH HE RECORDS BIRTHS AND DEATHS IN HIS FAMILY. HE LIVED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, VA, WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE - HE LIVED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, VA ABOUT A YEAR AFTER HE LEFT THE SERVICE. WHEN HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY AND LIVED IN LINCOLN COUNTY KY ABOUT A YEAR AND THEN REMOVED TO FAYETTE COUNTY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE - HE ENTERED THE SERVICE VOLUNTARILY AS A REGULAR SOLDIER. HE NEVER RECEIVED A DISCHARGE FROM THE SERVICE.

HE REFERS TO THE FOLLOWING PERSONS, WHO ARE HIS NEIGHBORS AND CAN TESTIFY AS TO HIS CHARACTER AND REV. THOMAS DUDLEY, GEN. JAMES DUDLEY, WILLIAM E. DUDLEY, DR. BEN. W. DUDLEY, SONS OF HIS CAPTAIN AMBROSE DUDLEY, JOHN BRYANT, CAPTAIN J C RICHARDSON, CAPT. WILLIAM ELLIS, GENERAL WILLIAM C. PREWITT, ISAAC WEBB, RHEUBIN TAYLOR, HUBBARD TAYLOR. HE REFERS TO HON. WM T. BARRY AND JOSEPH FICKLIN?

AFFIDAVIT: JESSE BRYANT, STATES THAT HE LIVED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY VIRGINIA, DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, HE RECOLLECTS, THAT JOHN DARNABY WHO HAS SIGNED THE FOREGOING DECLARATION ENTERED THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN AMBROSE DUDLEY, AS ALREADY LIKEWISE A BROTHER OF THE AFFIANT. THE COMPANY WAS STATIONED IN CAPTAIN DUDLEY'S BARN ABOUT TWO WEEKS BEFORE THEY MARCHED INTO SERVICE AND SAID DARNABY MARCHED WITH THEM. DUDLEY'S BARN WAS THEN A MILE OF AFFIANT'S FATHER'S. BARTLETT COLLINS WAS SERGEANT OF THE COMPANY. AFFIANT WAS AT THAT TIME ABOUT AGE TEN. AFFIANT'S BROTHER WAS TAKEN SICK AND BROUGHT HOME BY JAMES TRUE AT THE SAME TIME HE BROUGHT DARNABY HOME.

AFFIDAVIT: EDWARD DARNABY, SR. STATES THAT HE RECOLLECTS THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF HIS BROTHER JOHN DARNABY HAVING ENLISTED IN THE REGULAR ARMY UNDER CAPTAIN AMBROSE DUDLEY. HE WAS NOT PRESENT AT THE ENLISTMENT BUT WAS 20 MILES DISTANT. HE HEARD AT THE TIME OF HIS ENLISTMENT OF HIM HAVING DONE SO. AFFIANT WAS ABOUT TEN YEARS OLD AT THE TIME OF THE ENLISTMENT. DURING SEVERAL YEARS AFTERWARDS, AFFIANT UNDERSTOOD THAT HIS BROTHER WAS ENGAGED IN THE WAGON SERVICE.

AFFIDAVIT: JAMES SMITH, STATES THAT HE IS THE STEP FATHER OF THE ABOVE JOHN DARNABY. HE KNOWS THAT HE ENTERED THE SERVICE IN CAPT. AMBROSE DUDLEY'S COMPANY. SAID JOHN WAS BROUGHT TO AFFIANT VERY ILL FROM THE ARMY WHEN HE CONTINUED ILL FOR SOME MONTHS AND AFFIANT WENT TO FIELDING LEWIS AND GOT HIS FURLOUGH EXTENDED.

STATE OF KENTUCKY: FAYETTE COUNTY. ON THIS 13TH DAY OF AUGUST 1832, PERSONALLY APPEARED THE ABOVE SOLDIER, AGED 90, WHO STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN LOUISA COUNTY VIRGINIA AND IS NOW AGE 80; THAT HE HAD A RECORD OF HIS AGE IN AN OLD POCKET BOOK, WHICH HE LOST NOT LONG SINCE WHILE LIVING ON EAGLE CREEK; THAT HE RESIDED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, VA, AT ONE TIME WHEN HE WAS CALLED INTO THE SERVICE AND NOT NEARLY ALL OF HIS TOURS HE WENT FROM THAT COUNTY, ALSO ONCE FROM HANOVER COUNTY, THAT SINCE THE REVOLUTION HE HAS RESIDED IN KENTUCKY WHERE HE NOW LIVES IN FAYETTE COUNTY.

HE STATES HE ENTERED THE SERVICE FROM SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY AS A VOLUNTEER MINUTE MAN IN 1775, AND MARCHED TO RAPPAHANNOCK, SEVEN MILES BELOW FREDERICKSBURG. COL WILLIAM WASHINGTON, HE THINKS WAS THERE. HE SERVED TWO MONTHS THEN. HE SERVED A TOUR OF 3 MONTHS UNDER CAPT. CRAIG AT WILLIAMSBURG AND AFTERWARDS, A SIX MONTHS TOUR, COMMANDED BY COL. MATHEWS, DURING WHICH TIME, HE WAS IN A SKIRMISH WITH THE BRITISH GUARD. MAJOR ARMSTEAD BEAT US FOR 100 VOLUNTEERS FOR THAT PURPOSE AND HE WS ONE - WE HAD TWO MEN KILLED AND ONE WOUNDED AND HE BELIEVES THE BRITISH LOST SEVEN OR EIGHT KILLED. THIS WAS AS HE THINKS IN 1776. IN 1777 AND 1778 HE SERVED EIGHT MONTHS, PART OF THE TIME UNDER COL. DANDRIDGE IN CAPT. ANDERSON'S COMPANY FROM HANOVER. THEY WERE CALLED THE RELIEF MEN AND WERE RELIEVED EVERY FORTY DAYS. HE SERVED TWO TOURS AT A TIME AND ALL TOGETHER, 3 OR 4 TOURS. HE SERVED ALSO AT NORFOLK AND PORTSMOUTH, UNDER CAPTAIN DAZEL, OF HANOVER DURING THAT TIME. IN THE YEAR IN WHICH GATES WAS DEFEATED AT CAMDEN, S.C. HE MARCHED FROM SPOTTSYLVANIA IN CAPTAIN THOMAS MINOR'S COMPANY UNDER WHO RESIGNED AT HILLSBORO, N.C. AND RETURNED HOME. CAPTAIN JOHN HOLLOWAY TOOK COMMAND. THE COMPANY WAS IN COL GEORGE STUBBLEFIELD'S REGIMENT AND CROSSED JAMES RIVER AT RICHMOND AND MARCHED TO THE SOUTH AND WAS IN GATE'S DEFEAT IN WHICH HIS CAPTAIN HOLLADAY WAS KILLED. HE RETURNED HOME HE THINKS IN ABOUT OCTOBER OF THAT YEAR.

IN 1781, HE SERVED A TOUR OF 3 MONTHS AT WILLIAMSBURG AND AFTER RETURNING HOME, HE THINKS, ABOUT JUNE HE JOINED GENERAL LAFAYETTE'S ARMY UNDER CAPTAIN MINOR. AND MARCHED UNDER HIS COMMAND UNTIL FINALLY IT ARRIVED BEFORE YORK WHERE HE REMAINED IN SERVICE UNTIL THE SURRENDER OF THE BRITISH ARMY WHICH WAS ON THE 17TH OCTOBER 1781. HE SERVED IN ALL ABOUT TWO YEARS AND ELEVEN MONTHS. IN ALL HIS SERVICES HE WAS EITHER A VOLUNTEER OR DRAFT AND NEVER RECEIVED A DISCHARGE NOR HAS HE ANY DOCUMENTS TO PROVE HIS SERVICE, NOR DOES HE KNOW OF ANY LIVING WITNESSES WHO ARE WITHIN REACH, EXCEPT THE TESTIMONY OF JOHN AND JAMES GRAVES OR GROVES? ANNEXED HERETO. FOR HIS CHARACTER AND ETC HE REFERS TO WILLIAM FISHER, HENRY JAMES, AND MARTIN SIDNOR HIS NEIGHBORS. HE KNEW GENERAL WASHINGTON, LAFAYETTE, COL DARK BALL, GASKINS, INNIS, GENERAL GATES AND ETC.

AFFIDAVIT OF JOHN GRAVES, WHO PERSONALLY APPEARED IN FAYETTE COUNTY, WHO SAYS HE WAS A RESIDENT OF SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, VA, AT THE BEGINNING OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, THAT JAMES DAVENPORT, WHO IS NOW APPLYING FOR A PENSION FROM THE GOVERNMENT. SAID DAVENPORT AND THIS DEPONENT SERVED TOGETHER IN THE SAME COMPANY AFTER THAT TOUR OF DUTY WHICH THEY SERVED OUT TOGETHER, THIS DEPONENT LEFT THE COUNTY AND WAS NOT AGAIN A CITIZEN OF THAT COUNTY. WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE HE LIVED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, VA. HE WAS DRAFTED. HE WAS IN AN ACTION AT WILLIAMSBURG AGAINST THE BRITISH. HE WAS COMMANDED BY MAJOR ARMSTEAD IN THE ACTION WHO WAS ADJUTANT OF THE REGIMENT. HE MARCHED THROUGH THE COUNTIES OF CAROLINE, HANOVER AND NEW KENT TO WILLIAMSBURG WHERE HE REMAINED OVER TWO MONTHS. HE WAS THEN MARCHED TO SPRINGFIELD, ON JAMES RIVER, AT BURRILL'S FERRY, WHERE HE CONTINUED A FEW WEEKS AND WAS THEN MARCHED TO THE NEW MAGAZINE ABOVE WILLIAMSBURG WHERE HE RECEIVED A WRITTEN DISCHARGE SIGNED BY COL. HOLT, RICHARDSON, WHICH HE LOST ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO. HE WAS AGAIN DRAFTED IN JULY 1781, AND RESIDED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA CO, AND SERVED UNDER JOHN TANKURST, CAPTAIN COL MERRIWEATHER AND MAJOR JOHN HARDMAN, HE MARCHED TO WILLIAMSBURG THROUGH THE SAME COUNTIES AS ABOVE WHERE HE REMAINED EIGHT WEEKS AS ORDERLY SERGEANT TO A HOSPITAL IN CONSEQUENCE OF BEING QUALIFIED TO BLEED, HE THEN MARCHED TO YORK WHERE CORNWALLIS WAS BESEIGED BY GENERAL WASHINGTON AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL THE 17TH OCTOBER 1781, WHERE HE WAS DISCHARGED. DURING THE SEIGE HE WAS OCCUPIED DIGGING TRENCHES. HE WAS BORN IN CAROLINE COUNTY VIRGINIA FEBRUARY 15TH 1747. THERE IS A REGISTER OF HIS AGE LEFT BY HIS FATHER, TOGETHER WITH THE AGES OF HIS BROTHER'S AND SISTERS IN A POCKET BOOK, WHICH IS IN THE POSSESSION OF A SON OF HIS DECEASED BROTHER TILBY IN CLARK COUNTY KENTUCKY.

WHEN HE WAS CALLED INTO SERVICE, HE WAS LIVING IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY VIRGINIA, AFTER THE REVOLUTION, HE LIVED IN CAROLINE CO, VA, UNTIL

MONTH DIED IN NOVEMBER 1836 LEAVING A WIDOW. THIS WIDOW IS ANXIOUS TO KNOW WHETHER SHE IS ENTITLED TO THE BENEFIT OF THE OTHER SECTION OF THE ACT PASSED JULY 4 1836. IT IS ASSERTED THAT THE MARRIAGE TOOK PLACE PREVIOUS TO HIS ENTERING THE SERVICE, AS ALL THE NECESSARY EVIDENCE OF THE DECEASES CLAIM TO A PENSION IS ON RECORD IN YOUR OFFICE, WOULD SHE BE REQUIRED TO PROOVE MORE THAN HER RELATIONSHIP TO THE FACT AND DATE OF HER HUSBAND'S DEATH ALSO THE DATE AND LEGALITY OF HER MARRIAGE.

I, ABRAHAM BOWMAN, AGED 79, AND 10 MONTHS AND 20 DAYS, DECLARE, THAT IN THE WINTER OF 1775, OR SPRING OF 1776, I WAS APPOINTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF VIRGINIA, LIEUTENANT COLONEL OF THE VIRGINIA STATE REGIMENT AND PETER MUMLENBERG COLONEL OF THE SAME, THAT IN THE MONTH OF MAY OR JUNE 1776, THE SAID REGIMENT WAS TAKEN INTO CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT; THAT UPON THE PROMOTION OF COLONEL MUMLENBERG, TO A BRIGADIER GENERAL, I WAS PROMOTED TO THE COMMAND OF SAID REGIMENT AND THAT I CONTINUED TO SERVICE IN THE SAID REGIMENT FROM THE TIME OF MY APPOINTMENT UNTIL AFTER THE BATTLE OF MONMOUTH IN JUNE 1778 WHEN A CONSOLIDATION OF REGIMENTS TOOK PLACE AND MANY OF THE JUNIOR OFFICERS BECAME SUPERNUMARY. I THEN REMAINED AN OFFICER DURING THE WAR WITHOUT BEING AGAIN CALLED INTO SERVICE. I FURTHER DECLARE THAT I HAVE NEVER AT ANY TIME RECEIVED A WARRANT FROM THE U.S. FOR THE BOUNTY LAND DUE ME AS AN OFFICER AFORESAID NOR HAVE I EVER AT ANY TIME TRANSFERRED OR SOLD THE SAME TO ANY PERSON. THEREFORE, KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENCE, THAT I, ABRAHAM BOWMAN DO HEREBY CONSTITUTE AND APPOINT GEO. H BOWMAN, MY TRUE AND LAWFUL ATTORNEY FOR ME AND IN MY NAME TO ASK, DEMAND AND RECEIVE FROM THE SECRETARY OF WAR OF THE U.S. A WARRANT FOR THE QUANTITY OF LAND DUE ME AS AFORESAID AND MY SAID ATTORNEY IS AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED TO DO AND PERFORM ALL THINGS NECESSARY TO BE DONE IN AND ABOUT THE BUSINESS AND TO CONSTITUTE AND APPOINT AND ONE OR MORE SUBSTITUTES OR ATTORNEYS UNDER WHOM FOR THE SPECIFIC PURPOSE ABOVE NAMED AND THE SAME TO REVOKE AT WILL. IN WITNESS WHEREOF I HAVE HEREUNTO SET MY HAND AND SEAL THIS 7TH SEPTEMBER 1829. SIGNED

ABRAHAM BOWMAN. WITNESS H. CLAY.

IN THE SAME COUNTY, APPEARED COL ABRAHAM BUFORD, COL JOHN MCDOWELL, AND CAPTAIN JOHN NELSON, REVOLUTIONARY WAR OFFICERS, SAY THAT THEY ARE PERSONS ACQUAINTED WITH COL ABRAHAM BOWMAN WHO IS MAKING APPLICATION FOR PENSION. GEORGE H BOWMAN WAS THE ATTORNEY THEREIN NAMED.

A LETTER FROM THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE AT RICHMOND, VA, 1829 OCT - IT APPEARS FROM THE LIST OF WARRANTS ISSUED BY THE REGISTER THAT BOWMAN ABRAHAM IS STATED TO HAVE BEEN A COLONEL FOR SIX YEARS AND TEN MONTHS AND HAS SUCH WARRANTS TO THE AMOUNT OF 759 2/3 ACRES OF LAND HAVE BEEN ISSUED.

IN A LETTER DATED AS FOLLOWS: WASHINGTON, D.C. OCT 29-1829 TO HON. SAMUL D. INGHAM, SECY OF TREASURY, -SIR. I ENCLOSE YOU THE AFFIDAVIT OF MY FATHER COL ABRAHAM BOWMAN, FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE ACT OF CONGRESS, OF THE 15TH MAY 1828, I AM SIR, VERY RESPECTFULLY - GEORGE H BOWMAN.

STATE OF KENTUCKY, FAYETTE COUNTY. ON THE 19TH DAY OF MARCH 1839, PERSONALLY APPEARED BEFORE ME, ONE OF THE COMMONWEALTH'S JUSTICES, OF THE PEACE, AFORESAID, MRS SARAH BOWMAN, A RESIDENT OF SAID COUNTY, AGED 81 LAST SEPTEMBER, WHO BEING DULY SWORN, ACCORDING TO LAW, MAKES THE FOLLOWING DECLARATION.

WITNESS GEORGE H BOWMAN.

SHE RESIDED SIX MILES FROM THE COURT HOUSE OF LEXINGTON, KY

AFFIDAVIT OF ELIJAH FOLEY: FAYETTE CO, KENTUCKY. STATES BEFORE THE UNDERSIGNED A JUSTICE OF PEACE, PERSONALLY APPEARED ELIJAH FOLEY, A RESIDENT OF SAID COUNTY, STATES HE WAS PRESENT AT THE MARRIAGE OF COLONEL ABRAHAM BOWMAN AND SARAH BRYON, IN THE THEN COUNTY OF LINCOLN (NOW MERCER COUNTY, KENTUCKY) ON HE THINKS IN THE SUMMER OF 1782. WOOLFOLK, MRS ELIZABETH BOWMAN A DAUGHTER WHO DIED PRIOR TO HER FATHER, LEAVING THE FOLLOWING NAMED CHILDREN: VIZ; ABRAHAM B BOWMAN, WHO HAS SINCE DIED; MRS NANCY STANHOPE, WIFE OF WILLIAM STANHOPE, CANARAN? DALNEY? WIFE OF RICHARD DALNEY? THAT HE THE SAID ABRAHAM BOWMAN, EXECUTOR OF ABRAHAM BOWMAN DECD MAKES THIS HIS DECLARATION FOR THE PURPOSE OF OBTAINING THE ONE YEAR PAY THAT WAS DUE TO HIS FATHER, THE SAID COL ABRAHAM BOWMAN, DECD; THAT INTEREST FROM THE TIME IT WAS DUE UNDER ACT OF CONGRESS, JUNE 3 1784, HE REFERS TO THE DECISION OF DR. ABSOLOM BEARD'S HEIRS, INTEREST WAS PAID.

JAMES W. SULLIVAN AND WILLIAM BRYAN WHO SAY THEY KNEW THEM FOR MANY YEARS, STATE THAT THE NAMES OF THEIR CHILDREN WERE MRS POLLY KEEN, WIFE OF JOHN KEEN, DECD, ABRAHAM BOWMAN, THE EXECUTOR, JOHN BOWMAN, GEORGE H BOWMAN, MRS SARAH WOOLFOLK, WIFE OF SAWYER? WOOLFOLK, WM BOWMAN, WHO IS SINCE DIED LEAVING CHILDREN NAMED; JOHN AND ROBERT BOWMAN AND MRS ELIZABETH BOWMAN, DECD, WIFE OF JOSEPH BOWMAN, DECD, WHO DIED PRIOR TO HER OTHER COL ABRAHAM BOWMAN, LEAVING CHILDREN NAMED ISAAC, SARAH, ABRAHAM B, NANCY, MARY ANN, AND CATHARINE BOWMAN ALL OF WHOM ARE OF LAWFUL AGES.

TO THE HON. LEWIS CASS, SECRETARY OF WAR.

YOUR PETITIONER WOULD RESPECTFULLY SHOW, THAT HE VOLUNTEERED IN CAPTAIN HART'S COMPANY OF LIGHT INFANTRY, IN 1812 WAR AT LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY THAT HE WAS ELECTED A SERGEANT AND SERVED AS SUCH IN SAID COMPANY FROM AUG 14-1812 UNTIL ABOUT MARCH 10-1813; THAT DURING THE CAMPAIGN WHICH WAS CARRIED ON IN THE NORTHWEST - HE REMAINED DURING THE WAR IN SERVICE WAS IN BOTH BATTLES AT THE RIVER RAISIN, WHICH WERE FOUGHT ON THE 18TH AND 22ND JANUARY 1813 IN THE LAST OF WHICH HE WAS WOUNDED BY A BALL WHICH STRUCK HIM ACROSS THE BACK OF HIS HEAD AND PARTIALLY AFFECTED THE SKULL AND BRAIN. NEXT HE HAS SINCE THAT TIME REFRAINED FROM ASKING AID FROM GOVERNMENT AS LONG AS HE COULD WELL WITHOUT IT ALTHOUGH ALWAYS SUFFERING AT SHORT INTERVALS, THE EFFECTS OF SAID WOUND, BUT HE IS NOW GETTING OLD AND MORE INFIRM SUFFERS MORE FROM IT AND IS LESS ABLE TO WORK, HE FREQUENTLY CANNOT RAISE UP OR STOOP, DOWN, WITHOUT EXTREME PAIN THROUGH HIS BRAIN AND HIS PHYSICIANS HAVE TOLD HIM, AND WHICH HE HIMSELF BELIEVES RESULT FROM THE INJURY SUFFERED BY HIS WOUNDS, HE THEREFORE PRAYS TO BE PLACED ON THE PENSION ROLL OF THE STATE AND AS IN DUTY BOUND, HE HAS PRAYED. SIGNED THOMAS CHAMBERLIN.

IN A STATEMENT MADE BY MOSES M. MCCALLA, LEVI L TODD, JAMES L HICKMAN, AND THOMAS CHAMBERLAIN SAYING THAT SAID CHAMBERLAIN VOLUNTEERED IN CAPTAIN HART'S LIGHT INFANTRY COMPANY 5TH REGIMENT OF KY VOLUNTEERS MILITIA IN THE U.S. SERVICE, THAT HE WAS ELECTED A SERGEANT OF SAID COMPANY AND SERVED AS SUCH FROM AUGUST 1812 UNTIL MARCH 1813 AFTER HIS RETURN FROM CAPTIVITY IN MARCH 1813.

SAID MCCALLA SERVED AS ADJUTANT, OF THE REGIMENT TO WHICH CHAMBERLAIN BELONGED AND WAS NEAR HIM WHEN WOUNDED AND SAW HIM A FEW MONTHS AFTERWARDS. SAID TODD WAS THE ORDERLY SERGEANT OF CAPTAIN HART'S COMPANY AND ALSO WAS NEAR HIM AND SAW HIM WHILST IN THAT SITUATION. THOMAS H SATTERWHITE, WAS AN M.D. IN FAYETTE COUNTY AND W. M. WHITNEY M.D. IN FAYETTE CO, ALSO ATTENDED THE SOLDIER.

THOMAS CHAMBERLAIN BELONGED TO CAPTAIN NATHANIEL G S HART'S COMPANY OF LEXINGTON, LIGHT INFANTRY IN THE 5TH REGIMENT OF KENTUCKY VOLUNTEERS IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. AND RECEIVED INJURY ACROSS THE BACK OF THE HEAD WHILE IN THE LINE OF HIS DUTY AND IN THE SAID SERVICE ON THE 22ND OF JAN. 1813. IN THE LAST BATTLE OF THE RIVER RAISIN IN THE STATE OF MICHIGAN.

DECLARATION MADE FAYETTE CO, KENTUCKY AUG 26- 1840

PERSONALLY APPEARED THOMAS CLARK, A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, KY, AGED 85 ON THE 28TH INSTANT WHO BEING DULY SWORN ACCORDING TO LAW, STATS THAT IN THE YEAR 1775 HE WAS RESIDING IN THE COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER, CO, VA AND WAS AN APPRENTICE TO THE SHIP CARPENTERS TRADE BEING THEN ABOUT 20 YEARS OLD, THAT DURING THE SUMMER OR FALL OF SAID YEAR 1775 UPON A RUMOR OR APPREHENSION, THAT LORD DUNMORE ENTENDED TO RETURN TO WILLIAMSBURG AND BURN THE CITY, HE VOLUNTEERED UNDER COL BUCKNER, AND MARCHED TO WILLIAMSBURG AFTER THEIR ARRIVAL. THEY CONTINUED THERE UNTIL RELIEVED BY COL. JEFFERSON, THAT AS WAS SAID 500 MEN. HOW LONG THIS AFFIANT WAS IN SERVICE AT THIS TIME, HE CANNOT STATE, BUT THIS PROBABLY TWO MONTHS, AFTER THE RETURN OF APPLICANT FROM WILLIAMSBURG, HE RETURNED TO HIS FATHER'S RESIDENCE IN FAIRFAX CO, VA, AND DURING THE SPRING OR SUMMER OF 1776 ON THE ASCENT OF THE BRITISH FLEET UP THE POTOMAC HE AGAIN VOLUNTEERED UNDER CAPT DENEAL AND MARCHED TO MT. VERNON TO PROTECT THE PROPERTY OF GENERAL WASHINGTON - THE LENGTH OF SERVICE AT THIS TIME, HE CANNOT DISTINCTLY STATE, BUT THINKS IT OUGHT NOT EXCEED ONE MONTH. THAT IN THE LATER PART OF THE FALL OF THE SAME YEAR 1776, THE MONTH, NOT RECOLLECTED, HE ENLISTED IN THE ARMY OF THE U.S. FOR THREE YEARS, OR DURING THE WAR AND SERVED IN THE 10TH REGIMENT OF THE VA LINE UNDER THE FOLLOWING NAMED OFFICERS, VIZ: COL EDWARD STEPHENS, MAJOR GEORGE NICHOLS, CAPTAIN THOMAS WEST, LT. JOHN COFER, CHARLES S BROGDWATER, AND ENSIGN THOMAS PIERSON, SAID ENLISTMENT TOOK PLACE IN THE COUNTY OF FAIRFAX VA, HE MARCHED FROM THERE TO BALTIMORE, THENCE TO PHILADELPHIA, THENCE TO NEW JERSEY, WHERE IN THE SPRING OF 1777, HE JOINED THE MAIN ARMY UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL GEORGE WASHINGTON AND THERE REMAINED UNDER THE SAME OFFICERS UNTIL HE WAS WOUNDED AT THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE, PREVIOUS TO WHICH TIME, HE WAS MARCHED THROUGH VARIOUS PARTS OF NEW JERSEY TO TRENTON, PRINCETON, MORRISTOWN, AND AT ONE TIME THE ARMY MADE A MOVE TO THE NORTH PERHAPS TO BOSTON BUT UPON THE ARRIVAL OF THE ARMY IN OR NEAR THE STATE OF NEW YORK, INFORMATION WAS RECEIVED THAT THE BRITISH WERE APPROACHING CHESEPEAKE WHICH CHANGED THE MOVEMENT AND THE ARMY RETURNED AND AFTERWARDS WAS FOUGHT THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE, WHERE THIS

AFFIDAVIT OF L BROADWATER, AN OFFICER AND SOLDIER IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR AGED 88 STATES HE WAS WELL ACQUAINTED WITH THOMAS CLARK AND AS HE IS NOW LIVING IN KENTUCKY AND THAT HE WAS FORMERLY AN NATIVE OF FAIRFAX COUNTY VIRGINIA AND ENLISTED HERE AS A SOLDIER IN THE REVOLUTION, TO THE BEST OF HIS KNOWLEDGE 1776, THE DEPONENT WAS FIRST LIEUT AND THOMAS CLARK WAS IN ACTIVE SERVICE AND WAS WOUNDED AT THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE.

DECLARATION OF MRS JANE CLARK WAS MADE JUNE 7-1843 AGED 75 WIDOW OF THOMAS CLARK.

IN A LETTER FROM JAMES L HICKMAN OF LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY DATED 9-12-1840, ONE CONCERNING THOMAS CLARK, HE WROTE A POSTSCRIPT AS FOLLOWS:

TO THE PENSION DEPARTMENT: MY GRAND FATHER LIEUTENANT JOHN WILSON OF THE REVOLUTIONARY ARMY WAS KILLED IN THE BATTLE AT THE EUTAW SPRINGS, LEAVING TWO ORPHANED CHILDREN. MY MOTHER IS THE ONLY ONE NOW LIVING. HER BROTHER HAVING DIED IN 1815. THEY WERE PLACED UPON THE PENSION LIST IN THE STATE OF VIRGINIA AT THE RATE OF 20 L. PER ANNUM TO COMMENCE ON THE 1ST JANUARY 1788 ABOUT WHICH TIME MY MOTHER MOVED TO KENTUCKY BRINGING WITH HER THE CERTIFICATE OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE PENSION. SHE HAS NEVER RECEIVED ONE DOLLAR OF THE PENSION, THE OBJECT OF THIS NOTE IS TO INQUIRE WHETHER THE GOVERNMENT OF THE U.S. HAS EVER ALLOWED PENSION TO PERSONS ENTITLED TO PENSIONS FROM VIRGINIA. APPLICATION WAS MADE TO VIRGINIA SOME TEN YEARS SINCE FOR THE PENSION, WHICH WAS REFUSED. RESPECTFULLY. JAMES L HICKMAN.

IN AN INTERVIEW BETWEEN JAMES L HICKMAN AND THOMAS CLARK, THE OLD GENTLEMAN TOLD MR. HICKMAN TO TELL MR. EDWARDS (THE PENSION COMMISSIONER) TO TAKE HIS HORSE AND RIDE OVER TO FAIRFAX, ABOUT 10 OR 12 MILES FROM WASHINGTON AND SEE CHARLES BROADWATER, WHO MADE AFFIDAVIT ABOUT THE SERVICE OF THE SAID THOMAS CLARK. A LETTER IS FILED WITH THE PAPERS FROM NATIONAL SOLDIER'S HOME, CALIFORNIA. 8-9-1906. SIGNED W.D. CLARK, GRAND SON OF THOMAS M. CLARK, - DEAR SIR: ASKING FOR RECORDS OF THOMAS N. CLARK, WHO I AM INFORMED SERVED SIX YEARS IN OUR WAR WITH ENGLAND, BUT AFTER THAT WAR HE SETTLED IN WHAT IS NOW ANDERSON COUNTY KENTUCKY AND I THINK WAS REWARDED WITH 140 ACRES OF LAND IN ANDERSON COUNTY KENTUCKY.

POST SCRIPT. REFERRING TO THE ABOVE, YOU SAY THAT THOMAS M. CLARK, MIGHT HAVE ENLISTED UNDER NAME OF THOMAS CLARK, OMITTING THE "M" AS HIS OLDEST SON OFTEN DID, WHO SERVED UNDER HARRISON, 1812 - HIS STATE WOULD BE EITHER VIRGINIA, MARYLAND OR NEW JERSEY. SIGNED W.D. CLARK.

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DARNELL, SPENCER (1812 WAR)

I DO CERTIFY THAT SPENCER DARNELL WAS A PRIVATE IN THE 13TH REGIMENT DETACHED KENTUCKY MILITIA KILLED IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. ON THE 29TH MARCH 1813 UNDER COMMAND OF LATE LT. COL. WILLIAM DUDLEY AND WITH THE SAID DARNELL WHILST, ACTING IN THE CAPACITY OF A PRIVATE SOLDIER IN HIS COUNTRY'S SERVICE IN THE ACTION WITH THE BRITISH AND INDIANS OPPOSITE TO FORT MEIGS ON THE 5TH OF MAY DID THEN AND THERE RECEIVE A GUN SHOT WOUND IN HIS RIGHT SHOULDER WHICH HAS RENDERED HIS RIGHT ARM FOREVER WHOLLY USELESS - HE WAS TAKEN PRISONER AND PAYROLLED AT THE MOUTH OF HURON RIVER ON LAKE ERIE THE 10TH OF MAY 1813. THIS APRIL 14-1814. SIGNED J.S. SHELBY, LATE MAJOR 13TH REGIMENT, D.K.M.

FAYETTE CO, KENTUCKY. PERSONALLY CAME BEFORE ME AS COMMISSIONER, JAMES SHELBY, WHO DECLARES ACCORDING TO LAW, THAT THE FACTS SET FORTH IN THE ABOVE CERTIFICATE RELATIVE TO SPENCER DARNELL IS TRUE.

THIS CERTIFICATE THAT SPENCER DARNELL, A SOLDIER BELONGING TO THE KENTUCKY MILITIA UNDER THE COMMAND OF BRIGADIER GENERAL CLAY WAS WOUNDED AT THE SEIGE OF FORT MEIGS AND TAKEN PRISONER BY THE BRITISH OR INDIANS AND FROM THENCE BROUGHT TO THIS PLACE. DRAFTED IN CAPTAIN BENJAMIN LOGAN'S COMPANY UNDER THE COMMAND OF COLONEL GEORGE ROGERS CLARK. THE OBJECT OF THE AMERICANS WAS TO CROSS THE OHIO RIVER AND DRIVE THE INDIANS FROM THEIR SETTLEMENTS IN WHAT WAS CALLED THE MIAMI COUNTRY. THAT THE ARMY RENDEZVOUED AT BRYANT'S STATION AND PROCEEDED IN THE DIRECTION OF THE MOUTH OF LICKING AND ON THE 2ND DAY'S MARCH, IT BEING REPRESENTED TO THE OFFICERS THAT CRAIG'S STATION HAD BEEN LEFT WITHOUT A GUARD BEING BUT TWO OLD MEN AND ~~XXX~~ NOT A HUNTER? OF HUMAN? LEFT IN THE FORT. YOUR AFFIANT TOGETHER WITH JOHN YOUNG AND ANDREW HAMPTON WERE DETACHED TO GUARD THE FORT AND TO HUNT FOR THE EXHISTENCE? OF WHATEVER INHABITANTS AT THE RETURN OF THE ARMY THAT HE WAS ACTUALLY ENGAGED DURING THE WHOLE TIME OF THE CAMPAIGN IN DISCHARGING DUTIES ASSIGNED HIM. TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION, THE EXPEDITION LASTED BETWEEN TWO OR THREE MONTHS, THE PRECISE TIME HE CANNOT AT PRESENT STATE; THAT ON THE RETURN OF THE ARMY, HE WAS DISCHARGED, THAT IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE ABOVE SERVICES WERE PERFORMED AND IN THE SAME YEAR, HE WAS ONE OF THE 60 MEN WHO VOLUNTEERED THEIR SERVICES TO ACT AS RANGERS AND INDIANS SPIES FOR THE TERM OF SIX MONTHS; THAT HE WAS PLACED UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPTAIN CHARLES GATLIFF AT BRYANT'S STATION; THAT HE CONTINUED IN ACTUAL SERVICE DURING THE SAID SIX MONTHS, FREQUENTLY MAKING EXCURSIONS THROUGH THE COUNTRY IN DIFFERENT DIRECTIONS AND PERFORMING THE DUTIES ASSIGNED HIM; THAT AT THE EXPIRATION OF THE TERM HE WAS DISCHARGED THAT AMONG ALL THE INDIVIDUALS WITH WHOM HE ACTED IN THE SAID SERVICE OF SIX MONTHS, HE KNOWS OF BUT ONE THAT IS NOW LIVING; DANIEL WILCOX, OF SHELBY COUNTY, ALL HE BELIEVES WAS A LIEUTENANT IN CAPTAIN RO JOHNSON'S COMPANY IN MARCH 1781. HE MOVED FROM CRAIG'S STATION TO GILBERT CREEK STATION IN LINCOLN COUNTY; THAT IN JUNE OF THAT YEAR, TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION, HE WAS CALLED OUT UNDER A REQUISITION MADE BY COLONEL BENJAMIN LOGAN FOR SIXTY DAYS AND WAS PLACED AT BRIGG'S STATION ON SALT RIVER IN THE NOW COUNTY OF (IT LOOKS LIKE MERCER?) UNDER THE COMMAND OF BRIG'S THAT HE CONTINUED IN ACTUAL SERVICE FOR THE SAID SIXTY DAYS AND WAS DISCHARGED. HE FURTHER STATES THAT IN AUGUST 1782 TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION, THE INDIANS HAVING BESEIGED BRYANT'S STATION, NEAR LEXINGTON, HE WAS CALLED OUT UNDER CAPTAIN BENJAMIN CRAIG BY ORDER OF SAID LOGAN TO GO TO THE ASSISTANCE OF THE FORT, THAT THE PART OF THE ARMY TO WHICH HE WAS ATTACHED HAVING TO MARCH FROM LINCOLN COUNTY DID NOT ARRIVE UNTIL THE SEIGE WAS RAISED AND AFTER THE BATTLE AT THE BLUE LICKS; THAT HE PROCEEDED UNDER THE COMMAND OF THE SAID LOGAN TO THE BATTLE GROUND AT THE BLUE LICKS AND ASSISTED IN THE BURYING THE DEAD AFTER WHICH THEY RETURNED HOME AND WAS DISCHARGED. HE BELIEVES HE WAS IN SERVICE AT THIS TIME FOR THE SPACE OF THREE WEEKS.

THAT SHORTLY AFTER THIS TIME, IN THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER OF THE SAME YEAR, TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION, HE WAS DRAFTED IN CAPTAIN BENKEND'S COMPANY, HUGH MCGARY BEING THE MAJOR AND BENJAMIN LOGAN THE COLONEL ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ TO GO A TOUR OF 3 MONTHS AGAINST THE INDIANS, THAT HE THEN LIVED AT GILBERT CREEK STATION IN LINCOLN COUNTY, THAT THE PLACE OF RENDEZVOUZ WAS AT BRYANT'S STATION; THAT THEY PROCEEDED FROM BRYANT'S STATION TO THE MOUTH OF LICKING AND THEN CROSSED THE OHIO RIVER AND WENT UP THROUGH THE MIAMI COUNTRY AND DESTROYED THE INDIAN TOWNS AND VILLAGES AND CORN AND RETURNED HOME AGAIN, THAT HE WAS PRESENT WHEN THE SAID MCGARY ASSASINATED THE INDIAN CHIEF WHO HAD BEEN TAKEN PRISONER. THAT HE BELIEVES HE WAS IN ACTUAL SERVICE DURING THIS CAMPAIGN FOR THE SPACE OF THREE MONTHS AND WAS DISCHARGED. THAT IN THE SPRING OF THE YEAR 1783, HE WAS DRAFTED IN CAPTAIN ESTELL'S COMPANY UNDER THE COMMAND OF COLONEL LOGAN AND WAS PLACED AT THE ESTELL'S SIXT STATION AND WAS FREQUENTLY OUT IN VARIOUS DIRECTIONS DURING THE SAID SIX MONTHS AND WAS DISCHARGED, THAT IN THE SUMMER OF THE YEAR 1784, HE THEN HAVING

MOVED FROM GILBERT'S CREEK STATION IN LINCOLN COUNTY TO CRAIG'S STATION NEAR LEXINGTON IN FAYETTE COUNTY, HE VOLUNTEERED AS AN INDIAN SPY AND RANGER UNDER CAPTAIN WILLIAM STEEL AND WAS STATIONED AT THE BLOCK HOUSE FRANKFORT, THE PRESENT SEAT OF GOVERNMENT OF KENTUCKY AND WAS IN THE COMMAND AND ACTIVE DISCHARGE OF HIS DUTIES, DURING THE SAID TIME AND AT THE EXPIRATION THEREOF WAS DISCHARGED. AND THAT HE PERFORMED SEVERAL SUBSEQUENT OF DUTY WHICH HE IS INFORMED IS UNNECESSARY, TO STATE.

HE KNOWS OF NO WITNESSES NOW LIVING BY WHOM HE CAN PROVE THIS SERVICE, WHO IS ONE DAN WILCOX OF SHELBY CO, KY WHO WAS WITH HIM AT THE TIME, THAT HE SERVED AS A RANGER AND SPY IN 1780 AND BENJAMIN ROOF OF FAYETTE COUNTY, WHO WAS WITH HIM IN CAPTAIN KINGAID'S COMPANY IN 1781. YOUR AFFIANT STATES THAT HE HAS LIVED IN FAYETTE COUNTY NEAR LEXINGTON SINCE 1784 THAT HE IS WELL ACQUAINTED WITH THE HONORABLE H CLAY, COL RIC M. JOHNSON, HONORABLE WILLIAM T. BARRY, GENERAL THOMAS BODLEY, CAPTAIN JOHN FOWLER, WHO WILL CERTIFY TO HIS GOOD CHARACTER.

HIS WIDOW APPLIED FOR PENSION UNDER DATE OF DECEMBER 11 1838 IN FAYETTE COUNTY. FRANCES FAULCONER AGED 78 THAT SHE WAS MARRIED TO THE SAID JOSEPH FAULCONER BY THE REV. PARSON YANCY IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY VIRGINIA ON THE 13TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER 1776; THAT HE DIED JUNE 26- 1833. DEPOSITION OF NELSON FAULCONER OF FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY DECEMBER 1-1838 AGED 53. STATES ON OATH THAT HE IS THE 5TH CHILD OF JOSEPH FAULCONER AND WIFE FRANCIS FAULCONER, WHO HAS MADE THE FOREGOING DECLARATION; THAT HE WAS AGE 53 ON THE 20TH DAY OF OCTOBER LAST. STATES THAT HIS FATHER WAS PUT UPON THE PENSION ROLL BUT DIED BEFORE HE DREW ANY OF THE SAID PENSION MONEY - HIS MOTHER DREW FROM THE LEXINGTON AGENCY AFTER HIS FATHER'S DEATH THE AMOUNT TO WHICH HE WAS ENTITLED, AND THAT HIS FATHER DIED 26TH JUNE 1833 WITH CHOLERA, THAT HIS MOTHER HAS EVER SINCE REMAINED SINGLE AND ETC.

ALSO THE DEPOSITION OF ANN PATTY, A RESIDENT OF BRACKEN COUNTY KENTUCKY BUT NOW ON A VISIT TO FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY, AGED 84, STATES THAT SHE WAS BORN AND RAISED IN SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY VIRGINIA WELL ACQUAINTED WITH FRANCIS FAULCONER WIDOW OF JOSEPH FAULCONER DECEASED LATE OF FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY, FROM THE TIME SHE WAS A SINGLE GIRL TO THE PRESENT. SHE WAS NOT PRESENT AT THE MARRIAGE OF SAID JOSEPH AND FRANCIS FAULCONER NOR IS HER RECOLLECTION AS TO DATE SUFFICIENTLY DISTINCT TO STATE PRECISELY AT WHAT TIME SAID MARRIAGE TOOK PLACE, BUT IT MUST HAVE TAKEN PLACE IN THE EARLY PART OF THE REVOLUTION, FOR THEY WERE MARRIED SOME TIME BEFORE THEY CAME TO KENTUCKY AND THAT SAID FAULCONER AND HIS SAID WIFE WENT OUT TO KENTUCKY BEFORE DEPONENT MOVED TO KENTUCKY, WHICH TOOK PLACE IN THE YEAR 1781. SHE SAYS, EVEN THO SHE WAS NOT PRESENT AT THE MARRIAGE SAID, SHE HAS NOT THE LEAST DOUBT THEY WERE LEGALLY MARRIED. THEY LIVED TOGETHER AS MAN AND WIFE IN GOOD REPUTE UNTIL THE DEATH OF JOSEPH FAULCONER WITHOUT THE LEAST DOUBT HAVING BEEN EXTENDED AS TO THE LEGALITY OF THE MARRIAGE, THAT AFTER SHE MOVED TO KENTUCKY IN 1781, SHE LIVED IN CRAIG'S STATION WHERE JOSEPH FAULCONER AND HIS WIFE LIVED; AT THAT TIME THE SAID DEPONENT WAS THE OLDEST CHILD, SHE WOULD SUPPOSE FROM IT'S APPEARANCE WAS ABOUT THE AGE OF 10 YEARS. SWORN TO THIS 11TH DAY OF DECEMBER 1838. SIGNED ANN PATTY.

FROM THE TIME DEPONENT FIRST KNEW SAID JOSEPH AND FRANCIS FAULCONER UNTIL THE DEATH OF SAID JOSEPH IN JUNE 1833 THEY LIVED TOGETHER AS MAN AND WIFE IN GOOD REPUTE, UNIVERSALLY RECOGNIZED AS SUCH, THAT THE LEGALITY OF THEIR MARRIAGE WAS EVER HAVING BEEN ACQUAINTED SO FAR AS

DEPONENT HAS HEARD, - SWORN TO THIS DEC 11- 1838 BY BENJAMIN WHORTON. IN A LETTER DATED AT HARRODSBURG KENTUCKY 2-8-1839 TO THE PENSION DEPARTMENT SAYING I AM ENCLOSING PAPERS OF MRS.FRANCES FAULCONER AND MRS.DINAH CAMPERS.

IT WOULD SEEM THAT THE PENSION WAS ALLOWED TO THE CHILDREN OF FRANGES FAULCONER BY CERTIFICATE IN THE PAPERS DATED OCTOBER 6- 1853 AT THE RATE OF \$62. PER ANNUM. [INSCRIBED ON THE ROLL OF KENTUCKY AT \$62.33 MARCH 4TH 1831, (ON THE 5TH AUDITORS DEPARTMENT, PENSION DEPARTMENT, N.W.)

STATE OF KENTUCKY: TRIMBLE COUNTY. JULY 14-1845. THE SOLDIER THEN AGE 82. BEING A RESIDENT OF SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY VIRGINIA STATES THAT HE WAS DRAFTED INTO THE SERVICE IN THE MONTH OF MARCH 1780 FOR A TERM OF EIGHT MONTHS; THAT HE WAS ATTACHED TO A COMPANY AND WAS MUSTERED INTO SERVICE IMMEDIATELY AND ATTACHED TO THE REGIMENT OF COL. HE WAS A COMMON LABORER BUT AT THE TIME OF MAKING THE APPLICATION WAS A BAR TENDER AT A COUNTRY TAVERN AND FROM A WOUND RECEIVED IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR AND IT DIFFICULT FOR HIM TO FOLLOW ANY KIND OF BUSINESS AND THAT HE HAS NO WIFE NOR CHILDREN.

STATE OF KENTUCKY: FAYETTE COUNTY. ON 17TH SEPTEMBER 1832 PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, BUT THE HON. THOMAS M HICKEY, JUDGE OF THE FAYETTE CIRCUIT COURT, NOW SITTING JOHN FOWLER, A RESIDENT OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON IN THE COUNTY AFORESAID AGED 76, THAT HE WAS BORN IN CHESTERFIELD COUNTY VIRGINIA, APRIL 27TH 1756 AS APPEARS BY THE REGISTER OF BIRTHS KEPT BY HIS FATHER WHICH IS NOT NOW IN HIS POSSESSION; THAT HE RESIDED IN CHESTERFIELD COUNTY WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE, HE RESIDED IN VIRGINIA UNTIL THE CLOSE OF THE WAR IN 1783 WHEN HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY, WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE HE ENLISTED 1777 IN THE EARLY PART OF THE WAR, BEING COMMISSIONED LIEUTENANT IN CAPTAIN PETERSON'S COMPANY IN COL. GOODE'S REGIMENT OF MILITIA IN WHICH STATION HE REMAINED DURING THE WAR. IN THE SPRING OF THE YEAR 1781 ON THE INVASION OF VIRGINIA BY GENERAL MATHEWS GOODE'S REGIMENT WAS ORDERED INTO ACTIVE SERVICE AND MARCHED THROUGH PETERSBURG, TOWARDS PORTSMOUTH THE ENEMY HAVING DESTROYED THE STORES AND IN THE VICINITY AND EVACUATED PORTSMOUTH, THE REGIMENT RETURNED FOR A TOUR, THE TIME NOT RECOLLECTED UNTIL THE FIRST OF JANUARY 1781, THE MILITIA WAS AGAIN EMBODIED. HE WAS STATIONED AT HIS FORMER POST. HIS REGIMENT WAS ORDERED TO MANCHESTER AND THENCE TO MEET GENERAL ARNOID, WHOSE ARMY MARCHED TO RICHMOND AND RETURNED, CROSSING THE RIVER AT WESTOVER, THENCE THROUGH SMITHFIELD, TO PORTSMOUTH, GOODE'S REGIMENT FOLLOWED UNDER THE BARON STEUBEN OR GENERAL W LAWSON AND APPROACHED NEAR THE LINE OF THE ENEMY OF THE ARRIVAL OF GENERAL PHILLIPS IN MARCH WHO TOOK

COMMAND OF THE ENEMY, THE BRITISH ARMY MARCHED TO MANCHESTER, THE MILITIA RETREATING THE WHOLE WAY WITHOUT A SKIRMISH, THE WAREHOUSE OF TOBACCO, WERE BURNED BY THE ENEMY, WHEN THEY RETURNED TO HOG ISLAND AND THENCE TO PETERSBURG WHERE THEY JOINED LORD CORNWALLIS, WHO IMMEDIATELY ADVANCED TOWARDS RICHMOND, LAFAYETTE RETREATED BEFORE HIM, 70 OR 80 MILES ON THE NORTH SIDE OF JAMES RIVER ABOVE RICHMOND. COL GOODE'S REGIMENT UNDER BARON STEUBEN WAS ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF JAMES RIVER AND MARCHED UP TO POINT OF FORK. UPON THE APPROACH OF THE ENEMY TO THAT PLACE, THE BARON EVACUATED IT RETREATED. THE ENEMY AFTER DESTROYING THE PUBLIC STORES RETURNED TO RICHMOND, A PART OF HIS ARMY BEING IN MANCHESTER, A SKIRMISH TOOK PLACE NEAR MANCHESTER IN AN OLD FIELD BELONGING TO SAMUEL BRAMEL BETWEEN COL. LYMCO'S LEGION OF THE BRITISH AND A PART OF GOODE'S REGIMENT IN WHICH HE WAS SEVERAL WOUNDED ON THE HEAD BY A BROAD SWORD OF THE ENEMY AND WAS TAKEN PRISONER ALONG WITH COL GOODE'S AND MAJOR LANGBURN AID TO MARQUIS LAFAYETTE AND SEVERAL PRIVATES. HE WAS TAKEN TO RICHMOND COVERED WITH BLOOD AND SOON BECAME ENSENSIBLE FROM THE LOSS OF BLOOD AND REMAINED SO FOR SEVERAL DAYS. HE REFERS TO FRANCIS SMITH, LEAVING FIVE OR SIX MILES FROM MANCHESTER AND THE SISTER OF THE APPLICANT LEAVING ABOUT SEVEN MILES FROM MANCHESTER WHO CAN PROVE THEM.

STATE OF KENTUCKY; FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY 1832, SEPTEMBER 17TH. ON THIS 15TH DAY OF DECEMBER 1832, PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT. C. HUNTER, ESQUIRE, MAYOR OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON AFORESAID, WILSON HUNT A RESIDENT OF SAID COUNTY, AGED 79 YEARS, STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN NORTH CAROLINA IN ROWAN IN THE YEAR 1754. HE HAS A RECORD OF HIS AGE NOW IN HIS POSSESSION, HE WAS IN SAID ROWAN COUNTY WHEN CALLED INTO SERVICE AND DURING THE WAR AND UNTIL THE YEAR 1785 WHEN HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY TO SAID FAYETTE COUNTY WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE. HE VOLUNTEERED ON ALL OF THE TOURS WHICH HE SERVED, HE NEVER RECEIVED A DISCHARGE FROM SERVICE WHEN ONE CENT OF PAY. FIRST SERVED IN CAPTAIN JOHNSON'S MINUTE MEN, A TOUR OF NEARLY FOUR MONTHS IN 1780 AGAINST THE CHEROKEE TOWNS UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL RUTHERFORD, ON HIS RETURN HE REMAINED IN SAME COUNTY AND WAS CALLED OUT DURING THAT YEAR OFTEN AND IN 1781 AND 1782 AGAINST THE TORIES UNDER SEVERAL OFFICERS COL. LOCK COMMANDED THE REGIMENT. HE WAS GENERALLY EMPLOYED AGAINST THE TORIES, HE REFERS TO THE ACCOMPANYING PAPERS MARKED AS A SETTLEMENT OF THE PARTICULARS OF HIS SERVICES. HE SAYS THAT HE FULLY BELIEVES THAT HE SERVED TWO YEARS IN ALL HIS TOURS, ALTHOUGH FROM HIS AGE AND CONSEQUENT WEEKNESS OF MEMORY HE CANNOT BE POSITIVE INCLUDING THE TIME HE WAS IN AN ORGANIZED COMPANY READY TO BE CALLED OUT, HE WAS PERHAPS MUCH LONGER IN SERVICE, HE HAS NO DUCUMENTARY EVIDENCE NOR DOES HE

KNOW OF ANY LIVING WITNESS OF HIS SERVICES HE REFERS TO THOMAS MONTAGUE, GEORGE BERRY, JOHN WASHINGTON, JOSEPH BRYANT, AND LEWIS BRYANT, HIS NEIGHBORS WHO CAN TESTIFY TO HIS CHARACTER FOR VERACITY. HE HEREBY RELINQUISHES HIS CLAIM TO A PENSION OR ANNUITY EXCEPT THE PRESENT AND DECLARES THAT HIS NAME IS NOT ON THE PENSION ROLL OF ANY STATE. SIGNED WILSON HUNT.

THAT WILLIAM STANHOPE AND ABRAHAM WALKER RESIDED IN FAYETTE COUNTY, STATE OF KY. THAT THEY ARE WELL ACQUAINTED WITH SAID WILSON HUNT.

HE STATES IN ANOTHER PAPER AS FOLLOWS: I DIED IN THE YEAR (1780) UNDER CAPTAIN JOHN JOHNSON WENT OUT TO GUARD THE FRONTIERS OF NORTH CAROLINA, NEAR THE HEAD OF THE CATAWBA RIVER FROM THERE I WENT OUT A CAMPAIGN UNDER CAPTAIN JOHNSON AND GENERAL RUTHERFORD AGAINST THE INDIANS AT THE CHEROKEE TOWNS, WHICH SERVICE I WAS IN THREE OR FOUR MONTHS WHERE MYSELF AND 69 OTHER MEN PERSUED THE COMPANY BY TRADERS, TWO DAYS AND NIGHTS AND OVERTOOK THEM JUST AT BREAK OF DAY ON THEIR RETURNING AND TOOK SEVEN PRISONERS AND THEIR PLUNDER AND AFTER THAT I RETURNED HOME AND WAS AT HOME A SHORT TIME, THEN THE TORIERS SO AGREED TO RAGE ON A CERTAIN DAY AND TO TAKE ALL THE LEADING MEN OF THE SETTLEMENT PRISONERS OF WHICH I WAS ONE AND THE BRITISH OF THE WHIG PARTY AND WE GOT WORD OF IT AND THE NIGHT BEFORE AND THAT ALL TURNED OUT THAT NIGHT AND GOT TOGETHER IN THE NIGHT, WENT TO THE HOUSE OF THE WHIGS AND SO THEY GOT IN ONE OF OUR SETTLEMENTS AND DAYS AFTERWARDS WE HAD KILLED ALL WE COULD, WHICH NUMBER WAS ABOUT 70 MEN, MYSELF AND MY BROTHER WERE SENT TO VIEW THE TORIERS CAMP WHICH WAS ABOUT FIVE MILES DISTANCE AT THE BIG LICK TO SEE WHETHER WE WERE ABLE TO FIGHT THEM OR NOT JUST AS WE GOT IN SIGHT OF THEIR CAMP THEY HAD BEGUN TO MARCH RIGHT TOWARDS OUR MEN, THEN WE HAD TO GO AROUND THEM AND HAD TO RIDE AS HARD AS HORSES COULD GO TO GET TO OUR MEN BUT THEY WENT ON TO MY FATHERS AND TO EVERY HORSE THERE WAS ON THE FARM AND ONE OF MY RIDING HORSES, THE BEST EVER OWNED AND A FEW DAYS AFTERWARDS THEY CAME AS IF THEY WERE GOING TO ATTACK US AND CAME WITHIN TWO MILES OF US AND THEN MADE A SHORT ATTACK ACCROSS TO GO TO THE BRITISH ARMY WHERE WE JOINED COL. DAVIS AND PERSUED TWO DAYS AND NIGHTS AND THE LAST NIGHT WE HAD A DECEITFUL PILOT, WHICH LED US NINE OR TEN MILES OUT OF THE WAY. WE FOUND THEN WE COULD NOT OVERTAKE THEM AND FOLLOWED THEM NO FURTHER. I WAS IN SEVERAL SKIRMISHES IN A SHORT TIME, AT MOSSES FERRY ON THE ADKIN, WE WERE FORMED AT COLSTON'S TO FIGHT THE BRITISH WHEN THEIR TROOPS CAME IN SITE AND FOUND WE WERE PREPARED TO FIGHT THEY RETREATED WITH ALL THEIR MIGHT I WAS THEN IN A SKIRMISH WITH THE TORIERS AT RICHMOND IN SEARCH COMPANY WHEN THE TORIERS PROVED TOO HARD FOR US AND WE HAD TO RETREAT. THE TORIERS HAD ABOUT 300 MEN WHEN WE HAD ONLY ABOUT 20 AND 30 MEN WHIGS. WE HAD A SKIRMISH WITH THE SAME BODY OF TORIERS NEAR MOROVIAN TOWNS AND DRIVE ADVANCED PARTY BACK BUT THEY SPREAD OUT AND WOULD LIKED TO HAVE TAKEN US PRISONERS, BUT WE RETREATED WITH ALL OUR MIGHT, THEY TOOK BUT ONE OF OUR MEN PRISONERS. OUR COMPANY WAS CALLED MINUTE COMPANY AND WAS VERY OFTEN CALLED OUT ON ALMOST EVERY OCCASION UNTIL THE BATTLE OF GUILFORD WHERE GENERAL GREEN WAS OBLIGED TO RETREAT.

MARGARET HUNT, THE WIDOW MADE APPLICATION FOR PENSION IN 1855 SEPTEMBER 5TH. SHE WAS A RESIDENT OF OWEN COUNTY KENTUCKY IN 1855 SHE STATES SHE WAS MARRIED TO SAID WILSON HUNT IN FAYETTE CO, KY NOVEMBER 24 1793 BY JOHN PRICE, AND HER MAIDEN NAME WAS MARGARET SHOTWELL, THAT HER HUSBAND DIED IN FAYETTE COUNTY 1833 JANUARY 28TH. WHEN THE WAR WAS OVER, HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY WHERE HE HAS RESIDED FOR LAST 43 OR 44 YEARS. HIS FIRST TERM HE SERVED AS A VOLUNTEER, HIS TWO AS A DRAFT. STATE OF MISSOURI, COUNTY OF LINCOLN. SEPT 1832 HE MADE APPLICATION FOR PENSION; STATES HE WAS A RESIDENT OF MONTGOMERY Co, MISSOURI, AGE 85. HE WAS A REBEL ENLISTED AT CULPEPPER Co, VA WITH COL JOHN THORN, AND OTHERS WITHOUT ORDERS OR OFFICERS AND MARCHED AGAINST LORD DUNMORE THEN GOVERNOR OF VIRGINIA. HE WAS ORDERLY SERGEANT UNDER CAPT BOHANNON AND ORDER SERGT, UNDER CAPT HILL, WITH FOUR COMPANIES FROM CULPEPPER

HE HAD TWO YOUNGER BROTHERS WHEN HE WAS DISCHARGED WHO CAME INTO CAMP AND ONE WAS TAKEN SICK AND WROTE TO HIM TO HIRE A MAN TO TAKE HIS PLACE, BUT HE COULD NOT DO SO, THEREFORE TOOK HIS PLACE HIMSELF.

HE WAS BORN IN CULPEPPER Co VA 1747 AND WAS LIVING THERE WHEN CALLED INTO SERVICE. HE CAME TO KENTUCKY ABOUT 1812 AND REMAINED THERE ABOUT 12 YEARS, THEN MOVED TO MONTGOMERY Co, MO WHERE HE NOW LIVED. HE SERVED AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR HIS BROTHER LEWIS GRAVES. HE WAS UNDER GEN. ATTACHED TO THE N. WESTERN ARMY COMMANDED BY GENERAL HARRISON, THAT THE REGIMENT TO WHICH HE BELONGED WITH OTHERS WERE DETACHED UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL CAMPBELL AGAINST THE INDIAN TOWNS OF MASSISSANIWA? AND PARTICIPATED IN THE BATTLE OF THAT PLACE. NEXT ON HIS WAY OUT HE HAD THE MISFORTUNE TO BE WOUNDED BY A BALL PASSING THROUGH IT IN CONSEQUENCE OF WHICH - TOGETHER WITH THE EXPOSURE HE WAS UNNECESSARILY SUBJECTED TO AS THAT (ILLEGIBLE) HE HAS BEEN SO FAR DISABLED AS TO BE ENTIRELY UNABLE TO EARN A SUBSISTENCE. BE IT KNOWN THAT JOHN DISHMAN, LATE A CORNET IN THE TROOP OF CAVALRY COMMANDED BY CAPT. GEO TROTTER, JR, IN THE REGIMENT COMMANDED BY COL JAMES SIMRALL, ATTACHED TO THE ARMY OF THE N.W. COMMANDED BY MAJOR GENERAL HARRISON, IN THE LATE WAR TO WHICH SAID TROOP MICHAEL FISHEL WAS ATTACHED AS FIRST LIEUT MAKES THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT ON OATH.

THAT THE SAID FISHEL DISCHARGED HIS DUTIES OF FIRST LT. AFORESAID WITH GREAT FAITHFULNESS AND ADVANTAGE TO THE CAUSE IN WHICH HE WAS ENGAGED, THAT HE THE DEPONENT WAS PRESENT AND VERY NEAR HIM WHEN HE RECEIVED THE WOUND IN THE RIGHT HAND, WHICH HAS DISABLED THAT MEMBER AND FROM WHICH HE SUFFERED SEVERLY AND THAT HE FIRMLY BELIEVES THAT FROM THE HARDSHIPS AND SUFFERING FROM THE COALD WAS THE CAUSE OF HIS BEING ATTACKED BY THE RHEUMATISM AND FROM WHICH HE HAS NEVER SINCE BEEN FREE AND WHICH HAS RENDERED HIM UNABLE ENTIRELY TO SUPPORT HIMSELF BY LABOR. AFFIDAVIT OF COL JAMES McDOWELL OF FLEMING CO, KY APPEARED IN THE FAYETTE CO, KY AND MADE AFFIDAVIT AND STATES THAT HE WAS A MAJOR IN THE NORTH WESTERN ARMY UNDER GENERAL HARRISON IN THE LATE WAR; THAT HE HAS FOR MANY YEAR BEEN WELL ACQUAINTED WITH MICHAEL FISHEL WHO WAS LT. HE WAS A PRIVATE AND ALTHOUGH HE WAS ON SERVICE LONGER THAN TWO MONTHS, YET AS HE CANNOT REMEMBER HOW MUCH LONGER, HE ONLY CLAIMS FOR TWO MONTHS. WHICH HE DOES REMEMBER, HE RESIDED AT THE TIME IN THE COUNTY OF FAYETTE PENNSYLVANIA. HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE IN 1781. HE ENTERED AS A VOLUNTEER UNDER CAPT. JOHN VANMETER, THE COL WAS BENJAMIN OGLE, THE COMPANY WAS ALSO RAISED IN FAYETTE CO, PA AND MARCHED FROM THAT COUNTY TO BLACK BOTTOM STATION ON THE OHIO BELOW PITTSBURGH. THE COMPANY WAS RAISED TO PROTECT THAT STATION AGAINST THE INDIANS. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME TWO MONTHS.

HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. ABOUT THE CLOSE OF THE SAME YEAR AS A VOLUNTEER UNDER CAPTAIN JOHN VANMETER, AND COL PROCTOR, THE COMPANY WAS RAISED IN FAYETTE PA AND MARCHED TO WALLACE'S STATION ON THE WATER OF CANGREMAUGH OR BLACK LICK, BRANCH OF THE ALLEGANIES? TO PROTECT THE STATION AGAINST THE INDIANS. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME FOUR MONTHS. HE WAS IN NO BATTLE THIS TIME. HE WAS A PRIVATE, HE REMEMBERS THE NAME OF NO OTHER OFFICER ATTACHED TO THE COMPANY. HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE SOME TWO OR 3 MONTHS AFTERWARDS AS A VOLUNTEER IN THE COMPANY OF CAPT. THOMAS MORTON. THE COL WAS JAMES SMITH. THIS COMPANY WAS RAISED IN FAYETTE CO, PA, AND MARCHED TO THE MOUTH OF FRENCH CREEK AT AN OLD PLACE OR TOWN CALLED VANANGAIN? PENN. THIS WAS A CAMPAIGN AGAINST THE INDIANS. HE THINKS THAT PHILLIP HOWELL WAS LIEUT. HE REMEMBERS THE NAME OF NO OTHER OFFICER. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME SIX WEEKS. HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. SOME SHORT TIME AFTERWARDS AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR JAMES WILSON IN THE COMMAND OF LT. SPERINGER. HE THINKS THAT PROCTOR WAS THE COLONEL, THE COMPANY WAS RAISED IN THE SAME COUNTY AND MARCHED TO LEGARDENS OLD MILL ABOUT TWENTY-FIVE MILES ABOVE PITTSBURGH TO PROTECT IT AGAINST THE INDIANS. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME TWO MONTHS, DOES NOT REMEMBER THE NAMES OF THE CAPTAIN OR OF ANY OTHER OFFICER.

HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE SOME SHORT TIME AFTERWARDS IN A COMPANY OF SPIES, --- 15 IN THE COMPANY --- JOHN SHERAR WAS CAPT, GIBSON WAS LIEUT, HE SERVED THIS TIME IN THIS COMPANY SIX MONTHS, THE SERVICE WAS THAT OF PROTECTING AND GUARDING THE PENNSYLVANIA FRONTIERS, AGAINST THE INDIANS, HE STILL RESIDED IN FAYETTE PA. HE WAS BORN IN BERKS CO, PENN, AND MOVED FROM THERE TO CECIL COUNTY MARYLAND AND FROM THERE TO BARCLAY CO, VA, (BERKLEY CO?) AND FROM THERE TO FAYETTE CO, PENNSYLVANIA. HE WAS BORN IN DEC 1763, HE MOVED FROM FAYETTE COUNTY PENNSYLVANIA TO FAYETTE CO, KY, 41 YEARS AGO AND HAS LIVED IN IT EVER SINCE. HE LIVES IN THE SAME NEIGHBORHOOD WITH COL H B CARD, DR. SHEPHARD, JAMES HEADLEY, HE KNOWS HON. W. T. BARRY. HIS TOURS ARE AS FOLLOWS:

IN 1819 APRIL 23RD, HE MADE A DECLARATION IN FAYETTE CO, KY AS FOLLOWS THAT HE ENLISTED ABOUT 1776 BY CAPTAIN MOSES MCCLARA, FOR ONE YEAR HE WAS ATTACHED TO THE 6TH REGIMENT OF THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE, COMMANDED BY COL WILLIAM IRVINE, FORMERLY OF CAROLISLE, THOMAS HARTLEY, AND LT. COL. MAJOR SAMUEL HAYS, HE WAS THEN ATTACHED TO THE BRIGADE COMMANDED BY COL WILLIAM THOMPSON AND WENT ON THE EXPEDITION TOWARD QUEBEC AND THE REGIMENT WAS DEFEATED AT THE 3 RIVERS ABOUT 45 MILES FROM SAID PLACE, HE WAS HONORABLY DISCHARGED, BY LT. COL HARTLEY, - AGAIN ENLISTED 1777 FOR THE TERM OF 3 YEARS, UNDER CAPT WM MILLER, RESIDING AT CARLISLE, THEN AT PHILADELPHIA PENN, THAT HE WAS THEN ATTACHED TO THE 7TH REGIMENT OF THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE COMMANDED BY THE SAME COL IRVINE AS THE 6TH REGIMENT HAD BEEN COMPLETELY BROKEN AND WAS THEN UNITED WITH THE 7TH - ALSO THE SAME LT. COL HARTLEY BELONGED THEN TO THE 7TH REGIMENT, AS WELL AS MAJOR HAYS, THOMPSON CONTINUED TO SERVE OUT THE 3 YEARS, WAS HONORABLY DISCHARGED

MILLSTONE CREEK, WITHIN 12 MILES OF BRUNSWICK IN NEW JERSEY, BY A DISCHARGE HANDED TO HIM BY CAPTAIN MILLER, SIGNED BY COL HARTLEY, WHICH DISCHARGE HE KEPT A LONG TIME AND ETC. HE HAD A FAMILY TO SUPPORT AND STOOD IN NEED OF A AID OF THE COUNTRY. AFFIDAVIT OF WILLIAM BARKER, SAID HE WAS ACQUAINTED WITH SAID DANIEL HICKEY WHEN HE WAS A SOLDIER IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, IN THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE; THAT HE CONTINUED IN THE ARMY AFORESAID WHILE HE KNEW HIM AS A PRIVATE SOLDIER, AS THIS DEPONENT BELIEVES FOR FULLY THE TIME OF 3 YEARS, BUT TO WHAT REGIMENT IN THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE HE WAS ATTACHED THIS DEPONENT CANNOT TELL. AND THAT SAID HICKEY IS HIS NEIGHBOR.

AFFIDAVIT: DISTRICT OF KENTUCKY. JOHN McDOWELL STATED THAT HE WAS LIEUTENANT IN THE 8TH VA REGIMENT, COMMANDED BY COL JAMES WOOD AND THAT IN THE YEAR 1780 IN THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, HE COMMANDED A DETACHMENT OF VA TROOPS ON CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL ABRAHAM BUFORD, AS THE VIRGINIA REGIMENT WAS SO----- TO SPIES AND TAKEN BY THE ENEMY AT CHARLESTOWN, HE DOES NOT KNOW WHAT REGIMENT, HE WAS AT THAT TIME ATTACHED TO BUT THAT IN THE SUMMER 1780 IN THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, THE WITHIN NAMED DANIEL HICKEY WAS ENLISTED IN THE DETACHMENT AND THAT THE SAID HICKEY CONTINUED IN SAID DETACHMENT OR IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. UNTIL THE YEAR 1781 IN AUGUST, OR SEPTEMBER, MAKING TWELVE MONTHS OR UPWARDS. THIS OCTOBER 6- 1819. SIGNED JOHN McDOWELL.

AFFIDAVIT, CLARK Co, KY BEFORE THE UNDERSTIGNED, J.F. FRANCIS F JACKSON STATES THAT HE WAS ACQUAINTED WITH BENJAMIN RANKINS. THE DEPONENT STATES THAT BENJ. RANKIN WAS REPUTED TO HAVE BEEN THE SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR AND OFTEN HEARD BENJ. RANKINS SPEAK OF BEING IN THE SAID WAR IN THE CAVALRY - DEPONENT STATES THAT BENJ. RANKIN MOVED A NEIGHBOR TO HIM WHEN HE LIVED AT OR NEAR THE KENTUCKY RIVER AT HOLDER'S BOAT YARD, AND REMAINED THERE TWO YEARS. THIS TOOK PLACE IN THE YEAR 1789 OR 1790. THE DEPONENT STATES HE KNEW OF BENJAMIN RANKIN AND JANE HICKEY WIDOW OF DANIEL DECD, LIVING TOGETHER AS MAN AND WIFE FROM 12 TO 15 YEARS AND PART OF THE TIME LIVED ON THE DEPONENT'S FATHER'S FARM AND WORKED WITH THE DEPONENT AND AT THAT TIME HAD SEVERAL CHILDREN, WITH WHOM THE DEPONENT WAS ACQUAINTED AS FOLLOWS: SARAH, WILLIAM, FRANCES, JOHN, JAMES AND THOMAS, SARAH, THE OLDEST OF SAID FAMILY MARRIED WITH ONE CHARLES HALL AND LIVED IN BURBOUN Co, KY, FOR A SHORT TIME, - THE DEPONENT STATES THAT BENJAMIN RANKINS FAMILY CONSISTED OF MORE CHILDREN THAN THE ABOVE STATEMENT BUT THE DEPONENT WAS NOT ACQUAINTED WITH THEM AND THAT THE SAID JANE HICKEY AS DEPONENT BELIEVES NOW RESIDES IN THE STATE OF INDIANA.

JOHN HUNTER WAS A RESIDENT OF JESSAMINE CO, KY ABOUT 74 YEARS OLD. STATES HE WAS BORN IN ROWAN CO, N.C. AUGUST 1760, STATES THAT THERE WAS A FAMILY RECORD TAKEN BY ONE OF HIS BROTHERS, BUT THAT HE HAS NO DOUBT THAT THE AGE GIVEN ABOVE IS TRUE AND CORRECT, - HE REMOVED FROM NORTH CAROLINA IN 1779 OR 1789 (IT IS IMPOSSIBLE TO DISTINGUISH WHICH DATE IS CORRECT, BEING ILLEGIBLE AND SEVEN IS WRITTEN OVER THE EIGHT.) TO B BOONES STATION, KY WITH HIS FATHER'S FAMILY WHERE HE REMAINED AND AT OTHER STATIONS, UNTIL PEACE WITH THE BRITISH AND INDIANS WHEN HE SETTLED IN WHAT IS NOW CALLED JESSAMINE COUNTY, WHERE HE HAS REMAINED. HE RESIDED AT BOONE STATION WHEN HE FIRST ENTERED THE SERVICE IN CAPTAIN HAYS COMPANY IN 1780 MARCHED UNDER HIM ON THE EXPEDITION UNDER GENERAL GEO. ROGERS CLARK TO THE OLD CHILLICOTHE TOWNS, HE SERVED ON THAT OCCASION FOUR MONTHS AND IN ALL THE PARTICULARS OF THE EXPEDITION HE AGREES WITH THE STATEMENT GIVEN BY PETER B/F ADAMS IN HIS APPLICATION FOR A PENSION OF THE STATE HEREOF, WHO WAS A COUSIN AND COMRADE IN THAT EXPEDITION AND IN HIS SUBSEQUENT SERVICE, GENERALLY HE SERVED AT LEAST FIVE MONTHS IN THE YEARS 1780 1780 AND 1781. IN ALL THE SERVICES NAMED BY SAID ADAMS IN 1782 HE PARTICIPATED WITH THE EXPEDITION ALREADY GIVEN AND IN ADDITION THERETO HE REPEATEDLY CROSSED THE OHIO RIVER ON SCOUTING EXPEDITIONS OF THE MOST HAZARDOUS KINDS UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL ROBERT TODD AND COL WILL RUSSELL. THAT HER HUSBAND DIED MARCH 23 1838.

THIS MUCH I CAN REMEMBER, THAT WHETHER HE WAS A PRIVATE SOLDIER OR SURGEON'S MATE, HE HAD A TASTE FOR THE SERVICE AND WOULD RATHER BE IN THE ARMY THAN IN ANY WHERE ELSE. HE WAS AT THE BATTLE OF GERMANTOWN AND IT IS MY IMPRESSION THAT HE WAS OUT WHEN GENERAL LAFAYETTE WAS WOUNDED AT BRANDYWINE.

HE FURTHER STATES AND DECLARES, THAT BEING STILL A RESIDENT OF CUMBERLAND COUNTY VA, HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. AS A PRIVATE VOLUNTEER SOLDIER IN THE EARLY PART OF THE MONTH OF JANUARY 1781 UPON A TOUR OF THREE MONTHS IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN HASKINS, THAT HE RENDEZVOUED WITH HIS FATHER AT PETERSBURG, VA AND WAS MARCHED FROM THENCE TO CABIN POINT; THENCE TO SMITHFIELD, THENCE TO STONY MILL, THENCE TO SUFFOLK, WHERE HE CONTINUED UNTIL THE EXPIRATION OF HIS TERM, OF ENGAGEMENT AS A GUARD FOR THE PLACE, HE STATES THAT HE WAS IN THIS TOUR UNDER AN OFFICER OF NO HIGHER GRADE THAN CAPTAIN AND AT THE TERMINATION OF HIS SAID ENGAGEMENT THAT IS TO SAY IN THE MONTH OF APRIL 1781, WITHOUT RETURNING HOME, HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. AS A PRIVATE VOLUNTEER SOLDIER UPON A TOUR OF 3 MONTHS IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN CHARLES YEARLY, THAT HE WAS MARCHED BY HIS SAID CAPTAIN TO THE COURT HOUSE IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY WHERE HE WAS KEPT STATIONED UNDER THE COMMAND OF HIS SAID CAPTAIN AS A GUARD FOR PUBLIC STORES, DEPOSITED AT THAT PLACE DURING THE WHOLE PERIOD OF HIS SAID LAST ENGAGEMENT AND HAVING FULLY AND ACTUALLY SERVED OUT THE SAME HE WAS DISCHARGED AND WITHOUT HAVING THE BARRACKS HE AGAIN IMMEDIATELY TO WIT IN THE MONTH OF JULY 1781 AS WELL AS HE REMEMBERS ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR ONE RICHARD PHILIPS WHO HAD BEEN DRAFTED UPON A TOUR OF THREE MONTHS IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN ALEXANDER GUTHRIE; THAT HE SERVED OUT THE WHOLE OF THE AID TOUR AS HE THE SUBSTITUTE OF THE SAID PHILIPS FAITHFULLY, THAT HE WAS ATTACHED TO A REGIMENT COMMANDED BY COL HOLCOMB AND WAS MARCHED FROM PRINCE EDWARD CO, VA TO AMELIA CO, VA; THENCE WAS MARCHED AND JOINED THE ARMY OF GENERAL LAFAYETTE AND WAS ATTACHED TO THE BRIGADE OF GENERAL LAWSON, THAT HE CONTINUED WITH THE ARMY FOR A SHORT TIME IN IT'S OPERATION AGAINST THE BRITISH UNDER CORNWALLIS AND WAS THEN DETAILED UNDER A CAPTAIN DAVIS AS A PART OF THE GUARD FOR SOME PUBLIC STORES AND PROVISION, WHICH WERE DEPOSITED AT A BARN BELONGING TO ONE HENDERSON NEAR BROCK'S BRIDGE IN ORANGE CO, VA WHERE HE WAS KEPT STATIONED DURING THE WHOLE OF THE RESIDUE OF HIS SAID TOUR AND AT THE TERMINATION THERE OF A COMPANY OF MILITIA UNDER CAPTAIN JAMES UPSHAW, CAME AS A GUARD FOR THE SAME PLACE AND THIS DECLARANT AGAIN IMMEDIATELY ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. IN THE SAID COMPANY OF CAPTAIN UPSHAW, AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR ONE ----- WILLIAMS, WHO HAD BEEN DRAFTED INTO SAID COMPANY AS A PRIVATE SOLDIER UPON A TWO MONTHS TOUR. THIS DECLARANT STATES THAT HE ACCORDINGLY REMAINED AT SAID PLACE UNDER THE COMMAND OF THE SAID CAPTAIN UPSHAW AS THE SUBSTITUTE OF THE SAID WILLIAMS DURING THE WHOLE PERIOD OF THE ENGAGEMENT OF THE SAID WILLIAMS AND AT THE TERMINATION OF SAID TOUR HAVING FULLY SERVED OUT THE SAME, HE WAS DISCHARGED AND THEN WENT TO HIS FATHER'S HOUSE IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY VA, TO WHICH COUNTY HIS FATHER HAD REMOVED DURING THE ABSENCE OF THIS DECLARANT IN THE SERVICE. HE STATES THAT HE HAS NO DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

AND THAT HE KNOWS OF NO PERSON WHOSE TESTIMONY HE CAN PROCURE WHO CAN TESTIFY TO HIS SERVICES. HE HEREBY RELINQUISHES EVERY CLAIM WHATEVER TO A PENSION OF ANNUITY EXCEPT THE PRESENT AND DECLARES THAT HIS NAME IS NOT ON THE PENSION ROLL OF ANY OTHER STATE.

PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT FOR THE COUNTY AFORESAID, THE ABOVE NAMED SOLDIER AGED 82, STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN CHESTER Co,PA MARCH 1750 OLD STYLE AND WAS LIVING THERE WHEN CALLED INTO SERVICE; THAT THE MILITIA WAS CLASSED AND HE WAS EMBRACED IN ONE OF THE CLASSES WHO WERE SUBJECT TO BE CALLED ON ANY ROTATION AS IT WERE THAT IS IF THERE WERE EIGHT CLASSES IN THE COMPANY, SOMETIMES THE CALL ONLY EMBRACED EIGHT MEN IN THE COMPANY; THAT HE WAS FREQUENTLY CALLED ON DURING THE ENTIRE WAR FOR SHORT TERMS OF SERVICE ACCORDING TO THE NECESSITY, THAT HIS MEMORY IS NOW VERY DEFECTIVE AND HE CANNOT NOW STATE THE PRECISE TERMS OF SERVICE, BUT HE RECOLLECTS THAT HE WAS CALLED OUT WITH THE FOLLOWING OFFICERS, CAPTAIN JOHN TRAVIS, CAPTAIN JOHN RIPPY? THAT HE ENLISTED ABOUT THE BEGINNING OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR IN THE STATE OF VIRGINIA FOR THREE YEARS IN THE COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN JONATHAN LANGHIN IN THE 12TH REGIMENT, COMMANDED BY COL, JAMES WOODS, IN THE CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT, THAT HE CONTINUED TO SERVE IN SAID CORPS UNTIL UNTIL CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHING THE SAID 3 YEARS WHEN HE AGAIN REENLISTED DURING THE WAR AND SERVED UNTIL AFTER THE CAPTURE OF CORNWALLIS AND RECEIVED HIS DISCHARGE AT MIDDLEBROOK IN THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY IN THE BATTLES OF GERMANTOWN, BRANDYWINE, AND MONMOTH AND THE CAPTURE OF LORD CORNWALLIS.

(CIRCUIT COURT) HE BEING A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE COUNTY, AGE 80, STATES THAT HE WAS BORN 7TH DAY OF APRIL 1752 IN FAIRFAX CO, VA, BETWEEN ALEXANDER AND GEORGETOWN; THAT HE RESIDED ON PAMPHIN RIVER IN NORTH CAROLINA WHEN HE ENTERED THE SERVICE; THAT IN 1779 HE REMOVED TO KENTUCKY WHERE HE RESIDED DURING THE REMAINDER OF THE REVOLUTION AND WAS CONTINUED TO RESIDE NEAR THE TOWN OF LEXINGTON EVER SINCE. HE FIRST ENTERED THE SERVICE UNDER CAPTAIN KEYS AT BATHTOWN ON THE PAMPHLEO? PAMPLICO? RIVER IN NORTH CAROLINA AT THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE REVOLUTION AND IMMEDIATELY MARCHED TO NEWBERRY IN THE SAME STATE WHERE THE COMPANY REMAINED DURING THE SIX MONTHS. IN WHICH TIME, THEY BUILT A FORT, AT HANGINS POINT, 3 MILES BELOW NEWBERN AFTER THE SIX MONTHS EXPIRED, LT. CASWELL, SON OF GOVERNOR RICHARD CASWELL WAS APPOINTED CAPTAIN AND HE ENLISTED OR RATHER VOLUNTEERED IN HIS COMPANY AND SERVED WITH HIM THREE MONTHS, THE COMPANY MARCHED TO WILMINGTON ACCOMPANIED BY THE GOVERNOR AND ENCAMPED JUST BELOW TOWN ON THE BLUFF WHERE HE REMAINED 3 MONTHS AND THEN HE RETURNED HOME. HE OBTAINED DISCHARGE FROM BOTH TOURS BUT HAS LOST THEM. DURING HIS SERVICES THE CAPTAIN KEYS. THE BATTLE WITH THE SCOTCH TORIES UNDER McDONALD WAS THAT AT THE LONG BRIDGE AND KEYS COMPANY WAS ENGAGED IN IT, BUT HE WAS NOT IN IT IN CONSEQUENCE OF ILLNESS HE WAS ENCAMPED AT WILMINGTON WHEN THE NEWS WAS RECEIVED OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE AND A GREAT REJOICING TOOK PLACE. HIS NEXT TOUR TOOK PLACE IN THE SAME YEAR, AS AN ENSIGN IN CAPTAIN FELLOWS COMPANY UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL BRYANT AND MARCHED TO WILMINGTON AND BRUNSWICK ON CAPE FEAR RIVER, WHILST THE BRITISH WERE AT FORT JOHNSON. A BRITISH VESSEL, THE SCARPION WAS BURNED NEAR BRUNSWICH AT THE TIME. HE SERVED ON THAT OCCASION 3 MONTHS. HE HAD A COMMISSION FROM GOVERNOR CASWELL WHICH HE HAS LOST, AS ENSIGN ON THAT TOUR. HIS NEXT TOUR WAS AS AN ENSIGN IN CAPTAIN WHITLEY'S COMPANY IN COL WILLIAM CASWELL'S REGIMENT, THEN UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL ASH OR NASH. HE WAS COMMISSIONED AS ENSIGN BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA, ON DECEMBER 1 OR EARLIER ON THAT OCCASION WHICH WAS DEC. 1778 WHICH COMMISSION HE HAS ALSO LOST. ON XMAS DAY HE MARCHED FROM KINGSTON TO CHARLESTON, S.C. AND THENCE UP THE SAVANNAH RIVER TO AUGUSTA GA. COL ARMSTRONG COMMAND OF REGULATIONS JOINED AT KINGSTON AND GENERAL BRYANT ON THE SAVANNAH RIVER. HE SERVED 2 1/2 MONTHS ON THAT TOUR AND RECEIVED AT AUGUSTA AND RETURNED HOME IN FEBRUARY 1779. - THE ORIGINAL RETURN OF CAPTAIN WHITLEY'S COMPANY DATED DECEMBER 1- 1778 IS ATTACHED HERETO IN WHICH IT APPEARS THAT HE WAS AN ENSIGN THERE IN. HE HAS NO OTHER WRITTEN DOCUMENT IN HIS POSSESSION OR CONTROL TO PROVE HIS SERVICES, NOR ANY LIVING WITNESSES THAT HE KNOWS.

ABOUT THE MONTH OF MAY IN THAT YEAR HE CAME TO KENTUCKY AND ARRIVED AT BOONESBOROUGH, WHENCE HE WENT TO BRYANT'S STATION AND THEN TO LEXINGTON, WHERE AT THAT TIME THERE WERE ONLY ONE BLOCK HOUSE AND TWO CABINS AND ONLY ONE WHITE WOMAN IN THE PLACE. HE REMAINED THERE UNTIL THE FALL, WHEN HE RETURNED TO NORTH CAROLINA. WHEN RETURNING SOON AFTER TO KENTUCKY HE WAS OVERTAKEN BY THE HARD WINTER IN POWELL'S VALLEY WHERE HE REMAINED ENCAMPED UNTIL THE SPRING OF 1780 WHEN HE RETURNED TO LEXINGTON WHERE AND IN ITS VICINITY HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE.

IMMEDIATELY ON HIS ARRIVAL IN KENTUCKY, HE WAS ENROLLED AND AS A SPY AGAINST THE INDIANS IN WHICH SERVICE HE CONTINUED UNTIL THE END OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR. NEXT ON ONE OCCASION HE MARCHED WITH A DETACHMENT ON A TOUR UP THE OHIO RIVER WITH A GALLEY COMMANDED BY CAPT. GEORGE, TO BUILD A FORT AT THE MOUTH OF BIG MIAMI BUT THEY COULD GO NO FURTHER THAN THE MOUTH OF SUN? PROWDER? CREEK. HE WAS ON DUTY FROM THE 25TH JUNE 1782 TO JULY 24TH ONE MONTH. HE IS POSITIVELY THAT HE SERVED FULLY AND INDEED MORE THAN SIX MONTHS IN THAT SERVICE AT THE SEIGE OF BRYANT'S STATION. HE WAS ONE OF 16 WHO FORCED THEIR WAY THROUGH THE INDIAN LINES INTO THE STATION AND RETURNED NEXT DAY TO LEXINGTON TO ENFORCE THE INHABITANTS THAT THE SEIGE WAS RAISED. THIS WAS IN 1782. HE HAS NO DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE TO SHOW HIS SERVICES IN KENTUCKY, NOR ARE THERE ANY LIVING WITNESSES WITHIN HIS REACH, BUT HE REFERS TO ALL THE OLD SETTLERS NOW REMAINING HERE FOR THE GENERAL BELIEF OF HIS SERVICES AS WELL AS THE CHARACTER MORE PARTICULARLY COL JAMES McDOWELL, GENERAL THOMAS BODLEY, JOHN PARKER, WALLER BULLOCK AND DANIEL BRADFORD, ESQ. ALL OF FAYETTE CO.

IN AN AMENDED PETITION MADE IN FAYETTE CO, IN 1835, HE STATES THAT HE SERVED FROM THE TIME HE ARRIVED IN KENTUCKY TO THE END OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, A PERIOD OF MORE THAN 3 YEARS, AS AN MINUTE MAN, THAT IS TO SAY HE WAS ENROLLED IN A COMPANY UNDER COMMAND PART OF THE TIME BY COL JOHN TODD, WHO WAS KILLED AT THE BATTLE OF BLUE LICKS AND THAT DURING THAT DURING THAT WHOLE TIME HE WAS CONTINUALLY LIABLE TO BE CALLED OUT AT A MOMENTS WARNINGS WHENEVER AN ALARM OF AN ENEMY TOOK PLACE AND THAT IN FACT HE WAS VERY SELDOM PERMITTED TO REMAIN AT HOME MANY WEEKS AT A TIME, WITHOUT SUCH A CALL. BEING THUS UNDER THE NECESSITY OF GOING OUT AT ALL TIMES, HE CONSIDERED HIMSELF AS JUSTLY ENTITLED TO CREDIT UNDER SAID ACT OF CONGRESS FOR SERVICES DURING THAT WHOLE PERIOD AND THEREFORE ASKS THAT HIS PENSION MAY BE INCREASED ACCORDINGLY. HE ALWAYS SERVED AS A SPY WHILST IN KENTUCKY. HE REFERS TO THE EVIDENCE ON FILE AND TO THE DEPOSITION OF WILLIAM W. MARTIN ANNEXED HERETO.

THE DEPOSITION OF WILLIAM MARTIN WHO RESIDES IN WOODFORD CO, KY TAKEN IN THE CITY OF LEXINGTON BEFORE JAMES E DAVIS, ESQUIRE, MAYOR OF LEXINGTON STATES THAT HE EMIGRATED TO KENTUCKY IN 1779 AND IN THE SPRING FOLLOWING BECAME ACQUAINTED WITH JAMES MASTERSON WHO IS NOW PRESENT IN PERSON AND THAT HE KNOWS SAID MASTERSON WELL DURING THE REMAINDER OF THE WAR OF THE REVOLUTION AND THAT HE SERVED AS A SPY WHENEVER CALLED ON DURING THE WHOLE TIME AND FOR MANY YEARS AFTERWARDS. HE AND SAID MASTERSON WERE ENROLLED IN THE SAME COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPT ROBERT PATTERSON AND COL. JOHN TODD AND THAT BOTH OF THEM WERE FREQUENTLY CALLED INTO THE FIELD. THEY WERE DURING THAT TIME ALWAYS ENROLLED AND ACTING AS MINUTE MEN FREQUENTLY BEING COMPELLED TO ARM AND MARCH AT AN HOUR'S WARNING. HE SERVED ONE TOUR WITH SAID MASTERSON IN 1782 AT THE OHIO RIVER WITH A ~~MBREXKROQ~~ PARTY FROM THE FALLS OF OHIO IN A ROW GALLEY WHICH LASTED THIRTY-SIX DAYS. THERE WERE HOWEVER, MANY TIMES WHEN SAID MASTERSON WAS ABSENT ON SERVICE TO THE KNOWLEDGE OF THE DEPONENT. HE STATES THAT THE MEN WHO WERE ENROLLED AS HE AND SAID MASTERSON WERE, WERE CONSIDERED AS BEING ALWAYS IN SERVICE AND WERE CONTINUALLY HARRASSED BY CALLS FOR SERVICE WHENEVER AN ALARM FROM THE INDIANS WAS MADE AND THAT WAS DONE VERY OFTEN THE DEPONENT IS ~~INEN~~ WITHIN DAYS BEING 73 YEARS OF AGE. SIGNED WILLIAM MARTIN. 3-4-1835.

I THEN REMOVED TO CAROLINE COUNTY WHERE I LIVED ONLY IN TH SUMMER OF 1781 I WAS DRAFTED AND SERVED UNDER CAPTAIN SUTTON AND MARCHED THROUGH THE SAME COUNTIES AS ABOVE TO SOUELS OLD FIELD WHERE WE WERE ATTACHED TO THE REGIMENT, COMMANDED BY COL MATHEWS AND BOSWELL MAJOR, WE THEN RETREATED BEFORE THE ENEMY COMMANDED BY COL TARLTON, THROUGH CAROLINE AND SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTIES TO RACCOON FORD IN THE ~~EDGE~~ OF ORANGE WHERE THE AMERICAN ARMY MET US UNDER GENERAL WAYNE. WE THEN TURNED IN PURSUIT OF TARLTON AND FOLLOWED HIM TO THE RIVER YORK UPON THE GLOUCESTER SIDE OF WHICH HE ENTRENCHED HIMSELF. CORNWALLIS WAS UPON THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE RIVER. I HAD THEN BEEN IN SERVICE SIX WEEKS WHEN I OBTAINED FROM COL MATHEWS, A FURLOUGH TO GO HOME AND SAVE MY CROP. IN SEPTEMBER 1781 WHO I WAS AGAIN DRAFTED STILL LIVING IN CAROLINE COUNTY AND WENT TO JOIN THE ARMY THEN BESEIGED -ING YORKTOWN, BUT WAS ORDERED TO REMAIN AT AN OLD BARRACKS ABOUT TWO MILES FROM GLOUCESTER, WITH ABOUT TWELVE OTHERS, TO KEEP THE NEGROES WHO WERE IN IT WITH THE SMALL POX, FROM AND DISSEMINATING? THE DISEASES F THROUGH THE COUNTRY. A FEW DAYS BEFORE THE SURRENDER, HE JOINED THE ARMY AND WAS DETACHED TO GUARD TARLTON, REGIMENT TO THE BARRACKS IN ALBEMARLE COUNTY, BUT WHILST ON THE WAY HE RECEIVED AN INJURY IN HIS LEG AND WAS DISCHARGED AFTER SERVING, TEN WEEKS. ACCORDING TO HIS BEST RECOLLECTION, THE TOUR WAS EXTENDED BEYOND TWO MONTHS BECAUSE, THE EXPECTED SURRENDER OF THE BRITISH RENDERED IT UNNECESSARY TO SEND OUT A RELIEF HE KNOWS THAT THOMAS SMITH WHO RESIDES ABOUT FIFTY MILES FROM HIM KNOWS OF HIS SERVICES. AFFIANT WAS BORN IN CULPEPPER Co, VA, AUG 12 1762. AFTER THE REVOLUTION, HE LIVED IN CAROLINE Co, VA, FOR FOUR YEARS AND THEN MOVED TO SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY WHERE HE LIVED TWO YEARS AND THEN MOVED TO FAYETTE Co, KY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE.

ON THE 13TH MAY 1833, PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, THE ABOVE SOLDIER AGED 73, STATES THAT HE WAS CALLED OUT IN THE MILITIA IN OCTOBER OR NOVEMBER 1776 AT ONE TIME THAT THE BRITISH UNDER GENERAL HOWE WERE PURSUING GENERAL WASHINGTON THROUGH NEW JERSEY, ON THE WAY TO TRENTON, AT WHICH TIME THERE WAS A GENERAL CALL FOR THE JERSEY MILITIA. HE LIVED AT THAT TIME AT HOPEWELL, HUNTERTON COUNTY, NEW JERSEY, ISAAC HOUTON, WAS THE CAPTAIN OF THE COMPANY IN WHICH AFFIANT ENTERED, BUT HE WAS OUT IN SERVICE AND DID NOT RETURN UNTIL THE COMPANY MARCHED LIEUT RALPH GYLE COM ANDED, BENJAMIN STOUT WAS THE ENSIGN OF THE COMPANY BUT DID NOT GO OUT. THERE WAS AN ARTILLERY COMPANY WITH US BUT THE FERRY UNDER THE COMMAND OF CAPTAIN NEIL. WE WERE GUARDING ABOUT TWO MILES ALONG THE RIVER WITH SENTINELS, STATIONED NIGHT AND DAY. A FEW MEN WERE TAKEN FROM OUR REGIMENT TO ACT AS GUIDES FOR WASHINGTON WHEN HE ATTACKED THE BRITISH AT TRENTON UPON THE 26TH DECEMBER. THEY RETURNED AND WE WERE OCCUPIED IN LAYING UP OUR BOATS IN THE DELAWARE IN A PLACE OF SAFETY. WE CONTINUED AT THE TIME UNTIL THE LAST OF JANUARY 1777 WHEN HE WAS DISCHARGED AND RETURNED HOME, HAVING BEEN IN THE SERVICE ABOUT TWO MONTHS. LATE IN MARCH 1777 AFFIANT STILL LIVING IN HUNTERTON COUNTY WAS CALLED OUT INTO THE MILITIA UNDER CAPTAIN RALPH GYLE? LYLE? LT. WILLIAM PARK, ENSIGN TIMOTHY BRUSH, JOSEPH PHILLIPS COLONEL, BENJ BRAYLEY MAJOR AND JACOB HOUTON LIEUT COL. HE WAS MARCHED THROUGH SOMERSET COUNTY TO OLD HADISON RIVER WHERE WE WERE ENGAGED IN GUARDING THE COUNTRY AGAINST THE ENEMY STATIONED AT BRUNSWICK. HE REMAINED THERE ABOUT SIX WEEKS AND WAS DISCHARGED, ABOUT THE LAST OF MAY OR JUNE 1777 WHEN THE BRITISH LEFT NEW BRUNSWICK TO GO TO PHILADELPHIA, AFFIANT STILL LIVING IN HUNTERTON COUNTY, HE WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT IN THE MILITIA UNDER CAPTAIN RALPH GYLE? LT. WILLIAM PARK, ENSIGN TIMOTHY BRUSH, COL JOSEPH PHILLIPS, LT. COL JACOB HUNTON AND MAJOR BRAYLEY. WE RENDEZVOUED AT MAIDENHEAD TOWNSHIP, HUNTERTON COUNTY AND MARCHED TO AMBELL TOWNSHIP AND ON TO SOURLAND MOUNTAIN IN FRONT OF THE BRITISH. THE MILITIA WHO HAD PREVIOUSLY TAKEN PROTECTION UNDER THE BRITISH NOW RETURNED TO THEIR ALLEGIANCE TO THE U.S. AND JOINED THE ARMY IN GREAT NUMBERS. GENERAL WASHINGTON WAS AT MIDDLEBROOK UPON THE REAR AND FLANK OF THE ENEMY WHO ENDEAVORED TO PREVENT OUR JOINING THE MAIN ARMY UNDER WASHINGTON, BUT WE MADE OUR WAY SURELY TO THE POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN IMMEDIATELY OPPOSITE TO MIDDLEBROOK AND ETC (TORN HERE)

THERE WE LAY SEVERAL DAYS UNTIL THE ENEMY TOOK UP THEIR LINE OF MARCH FROM BRUNSWICK TO NEW YORK, THE LIGHT TROOPS TO WHOM I BELONGED WITH SOME CONDITIONAL TROOPS PURSUED THEM UPON THEIR LEFT FLANK THROUGH BOTVNBROOK AND KEPT NEAR THEM FOR SEVERAL DAYS SOMETIMES IN SIGHT AND FIRING UPON EACH OTHER. WE PURSUED THEM NEARLY TO WOODBRIDGE WHEN WE WERE RELIEVED BY TROOPS SENT BY WASHINGTON AND WAS THEN DISCHARGED AFTER BEING OUT ABOUT A MONTH. ABOUT THE MONTH OF AUGUST OR SEPTEMBER 1777 AFFIANT WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT IN THE MILITIA UNDER THE SAME OFFICERS AS ABOVE IN THE BRIGADE COMMANDED BY GENERAL HEARD, WE RENDEZVOUED AT TRENTON AND MARCHED TO ELIZABETH TO MEET THE BRITISH WHO HAD MARCHED THERE TO PREVENT THE MILITIA OF JERSEY FROM JOINING GENERAL WASHINGTON WHO HAD GONE TO MEET THE BRITISH ARMY THAT HAD LANDED AT ELKTON. BEFORE WE REACHED ELIZABETHTOWN, THE ENEMY HAD RETREATED. WE REMAINED THERE A FEW DAYS AND THEN WERE ORDERED BACK TO TRENTON AND OUR BRIGADE WAS SENT IMMEDIATELY BACK TO ELIZABETHTOWN, FOR FEAR THE ENEMY SHOULD AGAIN MARCH DOWN UPON IT, THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE HAVING BEEN FOUGHT A SHORT TIME BEFORE. WE REMAINED THERE UNTIL LATE IN OCTOBER OR THE FIRST OF NOVEMBER, WHEN THE FORTS ALONG THE DELAWARE WERE TAKEN BY THE BRITISH AND THEIR SHIPPING PASSED UP TO PHILADELPHIA WHEN AFFIANT WAS DISCHARGED. IT BEING ABOUT TWO MONTHS FROM HIS ENTERING WITH THE EXCEPTION OF 3 WEEKS THAT HE WAS ALLOWED TO VISIT HOME, WHILST STATIONED AT ELIZABETHTOWN.

ABOUT THE LAST OF JANUARY OR THE FIRST OF FEBRUARY 1778 HE WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT AND HIS ENSIGN TIMOTHY BRUSH COMMANDED PORTION OF THE COMPANY THAT WAS CALLED OUT. SEELY WAS COLONEL, WE WERE SENT TO ELIZABETHTOWN TO GUARD THE COAST AND WE REMAINING A MONTH WERE DISCHARGED.

IN THE MONTH OF _____? AFFIANT WENT OUT WITH SOME LIGHT TROOPS. IN JUNE 1778 THE WHOLE MILITIA OF NEW JERSEY WERE CALLED OUT UPON THE EVACUATION OF PHILADELPHIA BY GENERAL CLINTON WHO TOOK UP HIS LINE OF MARCH FOR NEW YORK. AFFIANT ENTERED UNDER CAPTAIN GYLE, LT. PARK, ENSIGN BRUSH, COL PHILIPS, COL HOUTTON AND MAJOR BRAYLEY, WE MARCHED DOWN AND MET THE BRITISH AT MT. HOLLY AND CONTINUED IN THEIR FORT OR UPON THEIR FLANK UNTIL WE REACHED MONMOUTH COURT HOUSE, WHEN AN ACTION TOOK PLACE, WHICH CONTINUED DURING THE BETTER PART OF THE DAY BUT THE MAIN ACTION WAS FOUGHT BETWEEN 12 AND 2 O'CLOCK. AFFIANT FIRED HIS GUN SEVERAL TIMES DURING THE ENGAGEMENT. WE DROVE THE BRITISH TO THEIR FIELD AND WE THEN DISCHARGED HAVING SERVED ABOUT A MONTH.

IN THE SPRING OF 1779, MOST OF THE ENEMY HAD GONE TO THE SOUTH FROM NEW YORK AND GENERAL SULLIVAN WAS LEFT TO GUARD THE COUNTRY FROM AMBOY, TO PASSAIC FALLS, BUT HE WAS SENT AGAINST THE SIX NATIONS OF INDIANS IN THE GENESSEE? TEN NESSEE? COUNTRY AND EVERY 10TH MAN WAS REQUIRED TO ENTER THE SERVICE FOR SIX MONTHS. AFFIANT ENLISTED 1779 UNDER CAPTAIN JOSEPH CHIN? CLUN? TAYLOR WAS COLONEL, WE MARCHED TO ELIZABETHTOWN WHERE WE REMAINED SIX MONTHS AND WE THEN WERE DISCHARGED UNDER THE MANAGEMENT OF ARTILLERY AND HIS COMPANY _____.

IN JUNE 1780 HE WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT IN THE MILITIA AND MARCHED TO SPRINGFIELD FROM WHENCE THE BRITISH WERE DRIVEN TO ELIZABETHTOWN BY GENERAL GREEN, WHO HAD GONE THERE WITH A STRONG DETACHMENT FROM THE MAIN ARMY AND ETC. (PAPER TORN)

HE LIVED IN HUNTERTON COUNTY WHEN HE ENLISTED, - HE KNOWS OF NO ONE BUT JOHN BARTON BY WHOM HE CAN PROVE HIS SERVICES. HE WAS BORN IN HOPWELL, HUNTERTON COUNTY NEW JERSEY ON DECEMBER 11- 1759. HE REMAINED IN HUNTERTOWN UNTIL HE CAME TO LEXINGTON KY 1787 WHERE HE REMAINED A YEAR AND THEN REMOVED TO JERSEY WHERE HE STAYED UNTIL 1790 WHEN HE REMOVED TO CHARLESTON, S.C. AND LIVED THERE UNTIL 1805 WHEN HE RETURNED TO FAYETTE CO, KY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE.

AFFIDAVIT OF JOHN BARTON, SAYS THAT HE IS WELL ACQUAINTED WITH BENJAMIN MERRILL, HE WAS BORN, RAISED AND LIVED IN THE SAME NEIGHBORHOOD WITHIN TWO MILES OF HIM DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR IN HUNTERTON COUNTY, NEW JERSEY AND UNDERSTOOD THAT DURING THE WAR SAID BENJAMIN MERRILL WAS IN THE SERVICE

UPON SEVERAL DIFFERENT OCCASIONS AND SAW HIM WHILE ON A FURLOUGH AT ELIZABETHTOWN ONE TIME AND BELIEVES THAT HE WAS A SOLDIER BUT IN CONSEQUENCE OF BEING A PRISONER FOR SIX MONTHS HIMSELF, HE NEVER SERVED IN THE SAME CORPS WITH HIM. THEY BOTH LIVED IN HUNTERTON COUNTY, NEW JERSEY, UNTIL 1787.

MOSBY: JOSEPH PENSION NUMBER S15539 NORTH CAROLINA STATE OF KENTUCKY, FAYETTE COUNTY. ON FEBRUARY 17TH 1834, PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, BEFORE CHARTON HUNT ESQUIRE, MAYOR OF LEXINGTON, THE ABOVE SOLDIER, RESIDENT OF SAID COUNTY, AGED 76. SAID JOSEPH MOSBY WAS BORN IN GOOCHLAND COUNTY VA, JAN 28- 1758, FROM WHENCE HE REMOVED TO ROWAN COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA IN THE 1766, HE HAS NEVER HAD A FAMILY RECORD OF HIS BIRTH. [IN A FEW YEARS AFTER HIS FATHER REMOVED TO ROWAN COUNTY IT WAS DIVIDED AND HIS RESIDENCE WAS INCLUDED IN SURRY COUNTY. HE RESIDED THERE UNTIL HE WAS AGE 16 AT WHICH TIME HE WAS ENROLLED AS A VOLUNTEER IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN SAMUEL MOSBY IN THE YEAR 1776. IN THE LATER PART OF AUGUST IN THAT YEAR, HE MARCHED ON A CAMPAIGN AGAINST THE CHEROKEE INDIANS ON THE TENNESSEE RIVER IN SAID COMPANY THERE BEING ABOUT 300 MEN UNDER THE COMMAND OF JOSEPH WILLIAMS, MAJOR JOSEPH WINSTON BEING SECOND IN COMMAND. THE TROOP MARCHED TO THE LONG ISLAND OF HOLSTEIN RIVER WHERE WE JOINED THE VIRGINIA TROOPS UNDER COL WILL CHRISTIE HERE THE TROOPS WERE DETAINED SOMETIME PREPARING PACK HORSES TO CARRY THEIR BAGGAGE AS THE BAGGAGE WAGONS COULD GO NO FURTHER. WHILST THE TROOPS REMAINED AT THAT PLACE, HE WITH OTHERS, WERE ORDERED OVER THE RIVER ON A SCOUT IN SUCH OF INDIAN CAMPS, AND HAVING TRAVELED UNTIL LATE IN THE NIGHT THEY FOUND A WHITE MAN WHO HAD JUST ESCAPED FROM THE INDIANS BY WHOM THEY WERE INFORMED THAT THE INDIANS HAD REMOVED UPON WHICH THE PARTY RETURNED TO CAMP, THE TROOPS HAVING CROSSED THE RIVER, MARCHED TO FRENCH BROAD RIVER WHERE THEY MET MAJOR GUESS, WHO INFORMED THEM HE EXPECTED THAT THE INDIANS WOULD TAKE THEM IN CROSSING THE RIVER. IN CONSEQUENCE OF THAT INFORMATION, A DETACHMENT WAS SENT OFF IN THE NIGHT IN WHICH HE WENT, WHICH CROSSED THE RIVER TWO MILES BELOW AND HAVING MARCHED UP THE RIVER TO A POINT OPPOSITE TO THE ARMY, REMAINED ON THEIR ARMS UNTIL DAY BREAK. NO INDIANS, HOWEVER, WERE SEEN AND THE REMAINDER OF THE TROOPS CROSSED OVER WITHOUT INTERRUPTION AND PROCEEDED TO THE INDIAN TOWNS AND VILLAGES, WHICH THEY DESTROYED, TOGETHER WITH THEIR CROPS OF CORN. AFTER WHICH THE ARMY RETURNED HOME, HAVING CAPTURED SOME HORSES AND CATTLE, BUT NOT HAVING MET AN ENEMY. ON THIS CAMPAIGN HE SERVED MORE THAN 3 MONTHS. TO PROVE THE GENERAL STATEMENT ABOVE GIVEN, HE HERE REFERS TO AN AFFIDAVIT OF GEO. BRYAN WHO IS THE ONLY LIVING WITNESS THAT HE KNOWS OF BY WHOM HE CAN PROVE ANY OF HIS SERVICES AND WHICH ANNEXED TO THIS DECLARATION. HIS NEXT SERVICES WERE IN 1780 AGAINST THE TORIES WHO RAISED A BODY OF 500 MEN UNDER COL SAMUEL BRYAN AND ENCAMPED NEAR HIS RESIDENCE AT OLD JOHNATHAN HUNT'S. THIS TOOK PLACE VERY SOON AFTER THE CAPTURE OF CHARLESTON AND GENERAL LINCOLN'S ARMY. THESE TORIES HAVING PLUNDERED THE WHIGS OF A GOOD MANY HORSES AND ARMS, THEN CROSSED THE YADKIN AND MOVED OFF, THE WHIGS COLLECTED IN SMALL BODIES IN VARIOUS PARTS AND AMONG OTHERS CAPTAIN SAMUEL MOSBY WITH WHAT FORCES HE COULD COLLECT, AMONG WHOM WAS THIS APPLICANT, MARCHED TO SUNNY COURT HOUSE WHERE THEY WERE JOINED BY OTHERS AND WENT IN PURSUIT OF THE TORIES, FALLING IN WITH OTHER TROOPS UNTIL THE WHOLE AMOUNTED TO OVER 400 MEN. IN A COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN PEANE. THIS APPLICANT'S BROTHER DANIEL MOSBY BEING ENSIGN. THE COMPANY WHILST ON THE MARCH TO JOHN GENERAL GATES ARMY IN SOUTH CAROLINA MADE THE REMAINS OF THAT ARMY RETREATING AFTER GATES DEFEAT UNDER GENERAL SUMNER WITH WHOM THEY UNITED AND MADE A STAND AT THE TRADING FORD OF YACKIN, WHILST THERE, INFORMATION WAS RECEIVED BY EXPRESS THAT THE TORIES HAD ~~BEEN~~ AGAIN EMBODIED IN THE VACINITY IN CONSEQUENCE OF 1300 MEN WERE DETACHED UNDER COL PEASLEY TO RELIEVE THE SETTLEMENT BUT BEFORE HE REACHED IT THE TORIES WERE DEFEATED BY OTHER TROOPS LOOSING 10 OR MORE KILLED, AMONG WHOM HE RECOGNIZED SEVERAL OF HIS ACQUAINTANCES. HAS LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR 20 DAYS, GIVEN UNDER MY HAND THIS JULY 16TH 1776.

AFFIDAVIT - STATE OF KENTUCKY, WOODFORD COUNTY. I, RAWLEIGH HUDSON OF SAID COUNTY AND STATE AGED 74 STATE ON OATH THAT I ENLISTED IN RICHMOND CO, VA IN COL WOODFORD'S REGIMENT BEING THE 2ND VA REGIMENT, CHARLES SCOTT, LT. COL. I WELL KNEW CHARLES NORWOOD WHO WAS IN SAID REGIMENT, AND IN THE SAME COMPANY AND MESS WITH ME, SAY CAPT DICK PARKER'S. WE SERVED TOGETHER FOR A YEAR IN SAID REGIMENT AND COMPANY; THAT I AND SAID NORWOOD WERE IN THE FOLLOWING BATTLES AND AND THE HISTORY OF THE TIMES WILL ? I HAVE THEIR DATES - IN AS MUCH AS I DO NOT RECOLLECT THEM; VIZ: AT LONG OR GREAT BRIDGE NEAR THE DISMAL SWAMP BUT BETWEEN THAT AND NORFOLK, CAPT. FORDICE COMMANDED THE BRITISH THAT ATTACKED OUR BREAST WORKS AND WAS THERE KILLED. THE BRITISH COMMANDED THE TOWNS OF NORFOLK, DURING NEXT WINTER AFTER OUR ENLISTMENT, WHEN LORD DUNSMORE LAY THERE OR NEAR THERE. I HAVE NEVER APPLIED FOR PENSION AS MY CIRCUMSTANCES ARE SAID TO BE TO GET TO DO SO, BUT I HAVE NEVER BEEN ABLE TO UNDERSTAND WHY THE LAZY FELLOW GETS A PENSION AND THOSE WHO WORK AND ARE INDUSTRIOUS RECEIVE NOTHING. THIS MARCH 23RD 1827. SIGNED RAWLEY HUDSON? WITNESS JAMES BOOTH.

AFFIDAVIT OF JAMES BOOTH WOODFORD CO. KY: STATES THAT IN 1775, HE LIVED IN VA, RICHMOND COUNTY, AND A NEAR NEIGHBOR TO CHARLES NORWOOD, WHO IS NOW A CITIZEN OF LEXINGTON AND IS AN APPLICANT FOR A PENSION AS A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTION. HE STATES FURTHER THAT HE KNOWS THAT SAID NORWOOD ENLISTED IN COL WOODFORD'S REGIMENT OF REGULARS, FOR ONE YEAR. SOMETIME IN SEPTEMBER 1775 AND THAT HE JOINED CAPTAIN PARKER'S COMPANY IN THAT MONTH AT SELF'S CAMP. HE IS INFORMED AND BELIEVES THAT SAID COMPANY WAS DISMISSED FOR A FEW DAYS TO PREPARE FOR MARCHING AND AGAIN ASSEMBLED AT RICHMOND ON THE 1ST MONDAY OF OCTOBER AT WHICH TIME THIS DEPONENT EXAMINED SAID NORWOOD TO THAT CITY. HE FURTHER STATES THAT HE KNOWS OF SAID NORWOOD FOLLOWING CONTINUED IN SAID REGIMENT DURING THE TERM OF HIS ENLISTMENT AT THE END WHERE OF HE WAS REGULARLY DISCHARGED. THIS 1830.

PLUNKETT: REUBEN PENSION NUMBER S25,752. CONTINENTAL VIRGINIA. STATE OF KENTUCKY: FAYETTE COUNTY. IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED THAT REUBEN PLUNKETT FORMERLY A SERGEANT OF CAPTAIN CHURCHILL JONES COMPANY IN THE 3RD U.S. REGIMENT DRAGOONS, COMMANDED BY COL GEO BAYLOR AND WHO IS ON THE PENSION ROLL FOR THE KENTUCKY AGENCY HAS APPEARS BY HIS TRANSFER? AND WHO RECEIVED AS HE STATES WOUND VIS; ONE IN THE ABDOMIN AND ETC. AND HAS SUFFERED THE PERISHING OF HIS LEFT ARM WHILE IN THE LINE OF HIS DUTY AND IN SAID SERVICE AND ABOUT THE 28TH SEPTEMBER 1778, IN NEW JERSEY AT A PLACE CALLED HUNINGTON IN COL BAYLOR'S CAMPAIGN BY THE ENEMY IS NOT ONLY STILL DISABLED IN CONSEQUENCE OF SAID INJURY OR WOUNDS BUT IN OUR OPINION IS ENTITLED TO THE PROPORTION OF TWICE HIS PAY AND ETC. HE MADE APPLICATION FOR PENSION JULY 13- 1824. IN FAYETTE CO, KY PERSONALLY APPEARED THE ABOVE NAMED SOLDIER, SAYS HE BELONGED TO A COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN CHURCHILL JONES, IN THE REGIMENT COMMANDED BY COL GEO, BAYLOR, IN THE THIRD REGIMENT OF LIGHT DRAGOONS, IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. ON THE VA CONTINENTAL LINE, THAT HIS NAME WAS PLACED ON THE PENSION ROLL OF THE STATE OF VA AND TRANSFERRED TO KENTUCKY, BUT HAS NEVER RECEIVED A FORMAL CERTIFICATE AND NOW WISHES TO OBTAIN ONE. SIGNED REUBEN PLUNKETT.

REUBEN PLUNKETT WAS A SERGEANT, PRIVATE- 3RD VA REGIMENT, DRAGOONS, CAPT JONES COMPANY AND COL BAYLOR U.S. ARMY REGULAR WAR VA. REGIMENT.

PARKER: JOHN PENSION NO. S14081 PENNSYLVANIA VIRGINIA.

STATE OF KENTUCKY: LEXINGTON. ON NOV 26TH, 1832, PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT BEFORE CHARLTON HUNT, MAYOR OF THE CITY THE ABOVE NAMED SOLDIER, AGED 75 - STATES THAT HE WAS BORN NEAR VALLEY FORGE ABOVE PHILADELPHIA ON SEPT. 3 1753

AS IS SHOWN BY THE FAMILY RECORD OF HIS FATHER'S FAMILY, WHICH IS NOW IN HIS POSSESSION; THAT HE WENT TO LOUIZA CO, VA IN THE YEAR 1774, WHERE HE REMAINED WITH HIS UNCLE, THE REV. WM. TODD, UNTILL FEB 1776 WHEN HE JOINED THE REGIMENT OF MINUTE MEN UNDER COL SAMUEL MEREDITH, WHICH WAS ON SUNDAY AFTER A SERMON FROM HIS UNCLE OF A PATRIOTIC CHARACTER, THAT HE ENLISTED TOGETHER WITH MANY OTHERS OF THE CONGREGATION. HE REMEMBERS THAT ONE OF THE ELDERS, BY THE NAME OF TERRILL ENLISTED AT THE SAMETIME. IN A FEW DAYS HE MARCHED TO WILLIAMSBURG WHERE THE REGIMENT WAS FORMED UNDER THE COLONEL. THE REGIMENT HAD BEEN RAISED TO GO TO CAROLINA TO QUELL THE TORIES, BUT BEFORE THEY ARRIVED AT WILLIAMSBURG OTHER TROOPS HAD BEEN SENT AND HIS REGIMENT WAS ORDERED TO HAMPTON TO GUARD THAT PLACE AS THE BRITISH THEN LAY AT QUINNS ISLAND? QUEENS ISLAND. HERE THE REGIMENT REMAINED SEVERAL MONTHS WHEN IT WAS ORDERED TO PORTSMOUTH AND NORFOLK WHERE IT REMAINED UNTIL ABOUT THE FIRST OF JANUARY 1777 WHEN IT WAS REGULARLY DISCHARGED. HE HAS LONG SINCE LOST HIS DISCHARGE. HIS SERVICES AT THAT TIME WAS NEARLY ELEVEN MONTHS. HE THEN WENT TO PHILADELPHIA TO HIS FRIEND, WHERE IN A FEW WEEKS HE WAS COMMISSIONED AS A CAPTAIN OF ARTIFICERS BY GENERAL JOHN BULL OF MORRISTOWN, HE HAVING THE CHARGE OF ERECTING TWO FORTS ON THE BANK OF THE DELAWARE FOR THE PROTECTION OF PHILADELPHIA. HE IMMEDIATELY RAISED A COMPANY OF 40 MEN FOR THE PURPOSE AND COMMENCED ABOUT THE FIRST OF MARCH 1777 AT BILLINGSPORT, WHERE THEY BUILT A SMALL FORT AND MOUNTED FOUR COMPANIES OF CANNON IN IT, ONE OF WHICH WAS MOUNTED HIGHER, AS AN ALARM GUN, TO GIVE NOTICE UP THE RIVER OF THE APPROACH OF THE ENEMY AT THE MOUTH. A FEW DAYS AFTER THEY WERE ORDERED UP THE RIVER TO RED BANK OPPOSITE TO MID-ISLAND FORT, NEAR TO WHER MANY HANDS WERE EMPLOYED IN SINKING CHEVEAUX DE FRIZE. THEY THERE BUILT A STRONG FORT TO PROTECT THAT PLACE SHOULD THE ENEMY ATTACK IT BY LAND. THIS WORK BEING NEARLY COMPLETED AND HIS HEALTH HAVING VERY MUCH DECLINED, HE WENT UP THE SIDE, SETTLED HIS ACCOUNTS AND RESIGNED HAVING RECOGNIZED MR. ROBERT MEGOWAN AS HIS SUCCESSOR, WHICH WAS GRANTED. DURING HIS SERVICES AS CAPTAIN OF THE ARTIFICERS, HE AND HIS MEN CONSTANTLY PRACISED AS A ARTILLERY MEN AND WERE INTENDED TO ACT AS SUCH IN CASE OF AN ATTACK BEING MADE. THERE WAS CAPTAIN CONNELLY FROM THE SIDE WHO FREQUENTLY DRILLED THEM AT THE GUNS. HE KNEW AT THE FORTS CAPTAIN ANDERSON AND MAJOR ZRIEGLER, GENERAL BULL LAID OFF THE FORTS AND BEFORE MR. ARMSTRONG WAS THE SURVEYOR, HE HIMSELF SEVERAL TIMES CARRIED THE CHAINS.

HE SERVED IN THAT CAPACITY SIX MONTHS, BUT HAS LOST HIS COMMISSION AND HAS NO WRITTEN OR DOCUMENTARY PROOF TO SHOW THAT HE HAS SERVED AS HE HAS STATED. IN SEPTEMBER 1777 HE THINKS # IT WAS WELLE HE WAS NEAR THE VALLEY FORGE AFTER THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE, WHEN THE ENEMY WERE CROSSING THE SCHUYLKILL. HE WAS REQUESTED BY HIS FATHER IN LAW, WITH WHOM HE WAS THEN RESIDING TO ACT IN HIS ROOM AS A GUIDE TO A SCOUTING PARTY, WHICH WAS ABOUT TO BE SENT TO OBSERVE THE MOVEMENT OF THE ENEMY. HE WENT WITH THE PARTY WHICH CONSISTED OF SIX OR EIGHT FILES OF CAVALRY AND HAVING CONDUCTED THEM TO THE CROSSING POINT, HE WAS A WITNESS WITH THEM OF THE MOVEMENTS OF THE ENEMY HAVING GROSSED AND FOR SEVERAL MILES ON THEIR WAY TOWARDS PHILADELPHIA, THE PARTY KEPT ON THE FLANK OF THE ENEMY AT A CAUTION DISTANCE UNTIL THEY WERE SURPRISED BY A PARTY OF OUR OWN MEN IN DISGUISE WHO CONDUCTED THEM AS PRISONERS TO WHERE A REGIMENT OF U.S. TROOPS WERE HAULTED, THE COMMANDER OF WHICH RECOGNIZED HIM, HE AND THE SCOUTS WERE DISCHARGED.

SOON AFTER HE REMOVED TO LOUISA CO, VA WHERE IN JANUARY 1778 HE WAS APPOINTED A WAGON MASTER WITH SUPERINTENDENTS OVER TWELVE TEAMS, TWO OF WHICH WERE HIS OWN, THIS APPOINTMENT HE RECEIVED FROM MR. JOHN MOORE OF CHARLOTTSVILLE WHO WAS ACTING AS QUARTERMASTER GENERAL UNDER THE ORDERS OF COL HARVEY AND WAS PREPARING FOR THE RECEPTION OF THE PRISONERS OF BURGOWNE'S ARMY. UNDER THAT APPOINTMENT HE RECEIVED CAPTAIN'S PAY VIZ: \$40. PER MONTH AND FORAGE FROM ONE HORSE WHILE THE TEAMS WERE PREPARING HE WENT TO WILLIAMSBURG BY ORDER OF MR. MOORE FOR A LARGE SUM OF MONEY WHICH HE BROUGHT SAFELY AND DELIVERED OVER TO HIM. HIS OWN TWO TEAMS WERE PRESSED BY MR. WOODSON AND ANOTHER JOINED, HIS

NAME NOT NOW REMEMBERED. HIS TEAMS WERE ENGAGED FOR TWELVE MONTHS, IF THEY SHOULD BE SO LONG WANTED. HE PARADED THE TEAMS IN CHARLOTTSVILLE AND WENT TO BUSINESS IN WHICH POST HE REMAINED 13 MONTHS DURING WHICH TIME HE DREW HIS PAY AS HE WANTED IT, BUT LOST VERY MUCH IN CONSEQUENCE OF THE DEPREDATION OF THE CONTINENTAL CURRENCY IN WHICH HE WAS PAID, HE RESIGNED AFTER SERVING THE TIME ABOVE MENTIONED AND RETURNED HOME WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL A FEW DAYS BEFORE THE SURRENDER OF LORD CORNWALLIS WHERE HE WENT TO YORKTOWN, IT'S VICINITY WITH A TEAM WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL A FEW DAYS BEFORE IT'S SURRENDER WHEN HE AGAIN RETURNED HOME. HE REMAINED A CITIZEN OF LOUIZA CO, UNTIL 1784 WHEN HE REMOVED TO HIS PRESENT RESIDENCE WHERE HE HAS REMAINED EVER SINCE. HE SERVED AS A PRIVATE SOLDIER ABOUT ELEVEN MONTHS AND AS A CAPTAIN OF ARTIFICIER AND SUPERINTENDENT OF A WAGON TRAIN WITH THE RANK AND PAY OF CAPTAIN ABOUT 19 MONTHS. AMONG THE OFFICERS IN COL MEREDITH'S REGIMENT WHOM HE RECOLLECTS WERE MAJOR JAMES, CAPTAIN DABNEY, ALLEN AND THOMPSON COMMISSARIES, JOHN HAWKINS AND SURGEON DR. REED OF RICHMOND. THERE WERE MANY OFFICERS OF VARIOUS GRADES WITH WHOM HE HAD NO PARTICULAR ACQUAINTANCE, BUT SAW AND KNEW THEM DURING HIS CONTINUANCE IN THE SERVICE, SUCH AS GENERAL WASHINGTON, WAYNE, LAFAYETTE, COL WORTH AND GENERAL POTTER, ALSO CAPTAIN CALDERWOOD, WHO WAS KILLED AT BRANDYWINE AND MAJOR STEWART. HE HAS NO WITNESSES WITHIN REACH BY WHOM HE CAN PROVE POSITIVELY HIS VARIOUS SERVICES, BUT HE SENDS HEREWITH SUCH TESTIMONY, CORROBORATING HIS STATEMENT AS HE HAS BEEN ABLE TO PROVE. IN ADDITION THERETO HE REFERS TO THE HONORABLE W.T. BARRY, CAPTAIN JOHN FOWLER, JOSEPH FICKLIN, DANIEL BRADFORD, OLIVER KEEN AND JOHN MCCALLA, WHO HAVE KNOWN HIM PERSONALLY FOR MANY YEARS, FOR TESTIMONY AS TO HIS CHARACTER FOR VARACITY AND THEIR BELIEF AS TO HIS SERVICES AS A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

HE HEREBY RELINQUISHES EVERY CLAIM WHATEVER TO A PENSION AND ANNUITY EXCEPT THE PRESENT AND DECLARES THAT HIS NAME IS NOT ON THE PENSION ROLL OF ANY OTHER STATE.

THOMAS BODLEY, NOW IN HIS 61ST YEAR OF AGE BEING DULY SWORN STATES ON OATH THAT JOHN PARKER, WHO HAS MADE THE FOREGOING DECLARATION IS THE ACKNOWLEDGED BROTHER OF THIS AFFIANT'S MOTHER; THAT HE HAS BEEN WELL ACQUAINTED WITH HIS SAID UNCLE FROM HIS EARLIEST RECOLLECTION AND HAS FREQUENTLY HEARD OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES SET FORTH IN SAID DECLARATION, RELATED BY SAID PARKER AND BY ROBERT PARKER MEGOWAN, MAJOR WILLIAM MEREDITH, SAMUEL MEREDITH LEWIS BULLOCK, THIS AFFIANT'S MOTHER AND OTHERS AND HAS NO DOUBT OF THE CORRECTNESS OF SAID STATEMENT. THIS AFFIANT WAS OLD ENOUGH TO RECOLLECT MANY OCCURANCES THAT TOOK PLACE DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR AND REMEMBERS TO HAVE FREQUENTLY HEARD IT MENTIONED BY ROBERT MEGOWAN AND OTHERS (SINCE DEAD) THAT THE SAID JOHN PARKER SERVED IN THE ARMY AS A CAPTAIN OF ARTIFICIERS AND AS WAGON MASTER AND THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF SAID PARKER GOING AS A GUIDE TO A DETACHMENT AFTER THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE, DRESSED AS A QUAKER, WAS MENTIONED TO GENERAL LAFAYETTE WHEN HE VISITED LEXINGTON AND WAS RECOLLECTED BY HIM. SIGNED THOMAS BODLEY.

AFFIDAVIT OF MARY MEGOWAN ABOUT 75 YEARS OF AGE AND SISTER OF THE SAID JOHN PARKER, STATES UPON OATH THAT SHE WELL REMEMBERS THE TIME THAT HER SAID BROTHER WENT TO VA TO HER UNCLE TODD'S AND THAT SHE HEARD HER FATHER SAY THAT HE HAD JOINED THE ARMY. HER FATHER WENT TO VIRGINIA TO SEE HIM, AT WHICH TIME HER BROTHER WAS AT FORTSMOUTH WITH HIS REGIMENT AND CAME SOME DISTANCE TO SEE HER FATHER AS SHE WAS TOLD BY HIM. SOON AFTER HER BROTHER RETURNED SHE HEARD OF HIS APPOINTMENT AS CAPTAIN OF ARTIFICIERS AND OF HIS BEING ENGAGED IN ERECTING THE TWO FORTS ON THE DELAWARE. THIS SHE HEARD AT THE TIME FROM HER BROTHER AND ALSO FROM HER LATE HUSBAND WHO SUCCEEDED HER BROTHER IN THAT COMMAND. SHE WAS NOT THEN MARRIED. THESE CIRCUMSTANCES WERE MATTERS OF CONVERSATION IN THE FAMILY AND WELL KNOWN TO ALL AT THAT TIME. SHE DOES KNOW ANYTHING OF HIS SERVICES IN VIRGINIA AS WAGON MASTER. SIGNED MARY MEGOWAN. ALSO AFFIDAVIT OF WILLIAM PARKER AGE 66, BEING A BROTHER OF SAID APPLICANT WHO STATES UPON OATH THAT HE CORROBORATED THE STATEMENT

MADE BY HIS SISTER MARY MEGOWAN AS TO HEARING OF HIS BROTHER HAVING ENTERED THE ARMY IN VIRGINIA, WHICH HE OBTAINED FROM HIS FATHER, WHO WENT TO THAT STATE TO SEE HIM. HE RECOLLECTS OF THE RETURN OF HIS BROTHER TO PENNSYLVANIA? PENNSYLVANIA ABOUT THE END OF 1776 AND THAT ABOUT THE MONTH OF FEB 1777, HE COMMENCED RAISING MEN IN HIS VICINITY UNDER HIS APPOINTMENT AS CAPTAIN OF ARTIFICIERS FROM GENERAL BULL AND THAT HE MARCHED FROM HOME WITH THOSE MEN TO ENGAGE IN THE ERECTION OF THE FORTS NAMED IN HIS DECLARATION AND THAT DURING HIS SERVICE HE SOMETIMES CAME HOME TO SEE HIS FRIENDS AND WERE THEN RETURNED TO HIS MEN. THIS DEPONENT THEN RESIDED WITH HIS FATHER IN PHILADELPHIA COUNTY ABOUT 25 MILES ABOVE THE CITY BEAR VALLEY FORGE. HE REMEMBERED THAT HIS BROTHER BEGAN TO RAISE HIS MEN IN FEBRUARY AND THAT HE CAME HOME IN THE FOLLOWING AUGUST IN BAD HEALTH HAVING RESIGNED HIS COMMISSION IN THE YEAR 1795. THIS AFFIANT RESIDED AT THE MOUTH OF THE KENTUCKY WHEN THE LATE MARTIN HAWKINS CAME THERE FROM VA. IN CONVERSING WITH HIM ABOUT JOHN PARKER, SAID HOPKINS INFORMED THIS AFFIANT OF HIS SAID BROTHER HAVING SERVED SOMETIME AS A WAGON-MASTER DURING THE REVOLUTION IN VIRGINIA AND THAT HE HAD A TEAM UNDER HIS COMMAND AND WAS A LONG TIME SERVING IN THE ARMY WITH HIM, AS A COMMISSIONER. SIGNED WILLIAM PARKER.

AFFIDAVIT: CHARLES CLAUD CLERGYMAN AND MICHAEL FISKEL RESIDING IN LEXINGTON. AFFIDAVIT OF WM L TODD OF FAYETTE COUNTY 18 1847 MAY 9TH, SAID THAT HE PERSONALLY KNEW JOHN PARKER, DECEASED, LATE OF FAYETTE CO TO HAVE BEEN A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, AND ETC, AND THAT HE DIED AT HIS RESIDENCE 28TH MAY 1837.

AFFIDAVIT OF - IN FEB 12- 1844, FAYETTE CO, KY, ONE JOHN PARKER MADE DECLARATION AS FOLLOWS; STATES THAT HE IS ONE OF THE SURVIVING SONS OF CAPT. JOHN PARKER, DECD, LATE A PENSIONER OF THE U.S. INSCRIBED ON THE ROLLS OF THE STATE'S PENSIONERS ON THE 15TH JAN 1833, AT THE RATE OF \$290. BOY ON BOARD THE CONTINENTAL FRIGATE THE QUEEN OF FRANCE, CAPTAIN JOHN PECK, RATHBOURN, COMMANDER. AFTER REMAINING FOR SOMETIME ON BOARD, SHE SAILED ON A CRUISE AND IN COMPANY WITH THE PROVIDENCE OF 32 GUNS, COM. WHIPPLE AND RANGER OF 18 GUNS, CAPTAIN SIMPSON. HIS FATHER WAS AT THE SAMETIME ON BOARD THE QUEEN OF FRANCE AFTER A COURSE OF NEARLY TWO MONTHS, WHILST LYING ON THE BANKS OF NEWFOUNDLAND IN A THICK FOG, WHICH CONTINUED NEARLY 3 WEEKS, ABOUT MERIDIAN, THEY WERE SURPRISED AT HEARING GUNS AND BELLS SOUNDING AS IF FROM A LARGE FLEET AND THE FOG JUST THEN CLEARING UP, THE AMERICAN SHIPS WERE FOUND TO BE IN THE MIDST OF A FLEET OF FROM 150 TO 200 SAILORS REPORTED BY THE PRISONERS UNDER CONVOY BY A 74 AND SEVERAL FRIGATES OF THE ENEMY, CAPT. ROTHBORN PASSING HIMSELF AS A CAPT. OF A BRITISH FRIGATE CAPTURED ONE OF THE ENEMIES MERCHANT SHIPS WITHOUT GIVING THE ALARM BY WHICH HE OBTAINED THE PRIVATE SIGNALS OF THE ENEMY. COM WHIPPLE GAVE THE SIGNAL TO STAND OUT OF THE FLEET BEFORE ON THE URGENT APPLICATION OF CAPT RATHBORN HE PERMITTED HIM TO REMAIN AND MAKE AS MANY CAPTURES AS POSSIBLE. ELIZABETH B PECK AGE 74 A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, KY APPEARED IN OCTOBER 25-1856, STATES THAT SHE IS THE WIDOW OF JOHN PECK, ETC, WHO WAS A MARINER IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR AND STATES THAT HIS PENSION NUMBER WAS 26641 AND STATES THAT SHE WAS MARRIED TO THE SAID JOHN PECK IN BROOKLIN, IN THE VICINITY OF BOSTON, MASS BY REV. DR. PARKER, PASTOR OF TRENTY CHURCH ON FEB 2 1801. HER NAME BEFORE MARRIAGE WAS ELIZA B GILMON? AND THAT HER HUSBAND, JOHN PECK DIED IN LEXINGTON, KY MAY 31-1847. SHE MAKES THE DECLAR:

FOR THE PURPOSE OF OBTAINING A LAND WARRANT FOR 160 ACRES. ONE WILLIAM PLUNKETT MADE AFFIDAVIT THAT JOHN AND ELIZA PECK RAISED A LARGE FAMILY OF CHILDREN AND THAT HE NEVER HEARD THEIR MARRIAGE DOUBTED, MOST OF THE CHILDREN LIVED IN LEXINGTON, KY.

HE STATED HE MADE ANOTHER DECLARATION 1828, THAT ABOUT 6 OR 7 YEARS AGO OWING TO THE DEATH OF HIS WIFE AND SOME OTHER CIRCUMSTANCES OF EMBARRASSMENT IN HIS SITUATION AS SECURITY FOR A MAN WHO HAD LEFT THE COUNTRY HE DIVIDED MOST OF HIS PROPERTY AMONGST HIS CHILDREN, TEN IN NUMBER, WHICH CONSISTED OF 110 ACRES OF LAND IN JESSAMINE COUNTY, OF ORDINARY 2ND RATE QUALITY AND 7 SLAVES OLD AND YOUNG, EXPECTING IN HIS OLD AGE TO LIVE A MORE COMFORTABLE WITH THEM, THEY ARE SO SCATTERED IN THIS AND OTHER STATES AND HIS CONDITION IS SO FEEBLE AND HE IS BLIND THAT HE CANNOT TRAVEL TO SEE THEM AND MOST OF THEM ARE TOTALLY UNABLE TO TAKE CARE IF HE COULD TRAVEL TO THEM, HE FINDS HIMSELF DESTITUTE.

JOSIAH PARKER IN THE LINE OF THE STATE OF VA ON THE CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT, THAT HE CONTINUED TO SERVE IN SAID REGIMENT UNTIL HE WAS DISCHARGED AT VALLEY FORGE IN PENNSYLVANIA HAVING SERVED OUT HIS TWO YEARS AND THEN AFTERWARDS SERVED NINE MONTHS IN THE MILITIA, THAT HE WAS IN THE BATTLE OF BRADYWINE AND GERMANTOWN AND SEVERAL SKIRMISHES THAT FROM THE LAPSE OF TIME HE HAS LOST HIS DISCHARGE.

BEFORE CIRCUIT JUDGE, BENJ JOHNSON, 22ND JUNE 1818, HUGH RANKIN DEPOSES; IN 1776 HE ENLISTED IN CAPT. MYERS COMPANY OF 8TH REGT. PENNSYLVANIA LINE AND SERVED 3 YEARS, BEING DISCHARGED BY COL BROADHEAD, AT PITTSBURGH. JUST AFTER BEING DISCHARGED, HE LIVED 4 OR 5 YEARS IN THE PITTSBURGH COUNTRY. THEN MOVED TO BERKLEY COUNTY VA, FOR SOME YEARS, WHENCE HE MOVED TO KENTUCKY, ABOUT 20 YEARS, SINCE, PART OF THE TIME IN HARRISON COUNTY AND PART IN FAYETTE COUNTY, WHERE HE NOW RESIDES. IS NOW IN HIS 64TH YEAR OF AGE. HE WAS IN BATTLES OF GERMANTOWN AND BONBROOK IN NEWJERSEY. HE WAS INSCRIBED ON KENTUCKY PENSION ROLL AT \$8. PER MONTH TO BEGIN JUNE 22ND 1818 CERTIFICATE OF PENSION ISSUED FEBRUARY 11TH 1819..

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ROMAN, ISAAC REJECTED PENSION NUMBER 8973, VIRGINIA.

STATE OF KENTUCKY: FAYETTE COUNTY. ON 12TH DAY OF FEBRUARY 1833, PERSONALLY APPEARED THE ABOVE, WHO WAS A RESIDENT OF JESSAMINE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AGED 77. WHO STATES THAT HE WAS BORN IN JULY 18-1755, THAT HE REMOVED OUT WESTERWARDLY TO THE HOLSTEIN RIVER, WITH ONE OF HIS BROTHERS NOW DEAD IN 1773 AND CONTINUED TO RESIDE THERE NEAR THE 7 MILE FORD ON HOLSTON UNTIL 1797 WHEN HE REMOVED TO JESSAMINE CO, SIX MILES FROM LEXINGTON, WHERE HE HAS RESIDED EVER SINCE, THAT HE WAS ENROLLED IN THE MILITIA SERVICE ON THE BREAKING OUT OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR. HIS COMPANY WAS FIRST COMMANDED BY JOHN CAMPBELL BROTHER TO COL. ARTHUR CAMPBELL AND SAID CAPTAIN JOHN CAMPBELL COMMANDED SAME COMPANY AT THE BATTLE OF LONG ISLAND AGAINST THE CHEROKEES BEFORE HE JOINED SAID COMPANY. WHEN THE COMPANY HE BELONGED TO WAS CALLED OUT AGAINST FERGUSON TO GO TO KINGS MOUNTAIN CAPTAIN ARTHUR BOWEN COMMANDED, WHO FOR SOME REASON UNKNOWN TO HIM DID NOT GO WITH THE COMPANY AND THE MEN WHEN AT KINGS MOUNTAIN WERE COMMANDED BY GENERAL WM CAMPBELL, HIS FAMILY WAS SO SITUATED THAT HE DID NOT GO WITH HIS COMPANY TO KINGS MOUNTAIN BUT HIRED A SUBSTITUTE BY THE NAME OF MILES GOFORTH WHO GOT WOUNDED IN THE KNEE IN THE BATTLE AT KINGS MOUNTAIN TO PROCURE SAID SUBSTITUTE HE HAD TO GIVE A FINE MARE, SADDLE AND BRIDLE WHICH WAS MORE THAN HALF OF HIS PROPERTY, BEING THEN POOR AND JUST BEGINNING IN THE WORLD, NOT WITHSTANDING HE HIRED A SUBSTITUTE PHOPING THEREBY TO BE ABLE TO STAY AT HOME WITH HIS WIFE WHO WAS IN NEED OF HIS ASSISTANCE. IN FOUR OR FIVE DAYS AFTER THE MEN HAD STARTED TO KINGS MOUNTAIN A TORY CAPTAIN BEXXINE

WITH THE TORIES IN SOUTH CAROLINA, WHERE HE CONTINUED THE PRINCIPAL PROOF OF THE TERM FOR WHICH HE HAD ENTERED THE SERVICE WAS THEN MARCHED BACK TO SAID ROWAN CO, N.C. ABOUT THE 25TH MARCH 1775 AND WAS THEN DISCHARGED, RECEIVED A DISCHARGE GIVEING I BELIEVE BY COL RUTHERFORD, BUT WHICH IS LOST. IN THE SPRING OF 1776, THINKS IN MAY THERE WAS ANOTHER CALL FOR MEN FOR A TERM OF 3 MONTHS I WOULD HERE ARE AMERICA THAT IMMEDIATELY AFTER MY FIRST VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT, THE DIFFERENT COMPANIES WERE DIVIDED INTO AND CLASSED INTO 4 CLASSES AND CALLED OUT IN ROTATION, SOMETIMES ONE CLASS AND SOMETIMES MORE FROM EACH COMPANY AS NECESSITY REQUIRED UNDER THE CALL. I AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. UNDER CAPTAIN GEO COWAN, COMMANDED BY COL RUTHERFORD AND LT. COL LOCK, MARCHED TO THE LOWER PART OF NORTH CAROLINA TO A PLACE CALLED CROSS CREEK, AGAINST THE SCOTCH TORIES, WHO HAD COLLECTED IN A CONSIDERABLE BODY AND WERE MARCHING TO JOIN THE BRITISH ARMY AT WILMINGTON. BEFORE WE MET THEM, HOWEVER, THEY WERE MET BY GENERAL CASWELL WHO COMMANDED IN THE LOWER PART OF NORTH CAROLINA AND WERE DEFEATED. WE REMAINED IN THAT SECTION SOMETIME RECONORTERING THE COUNTRY AND WAS AGAIN MARCHED BACK TO ROWAN COUNTY N.C. AND DISCHARGED. I RECEIVED A DISCHARGE BUT FOR THINK IT WAS GIVEN A SHORT TIME BEFORE THE EXPIRATION OF THE SAID 3 MONTHS, BUT CANNOT RECOLLECT PRECISELY HOW LONG. IN THE SUMMER OF THAT YEAR 1776, I THINK IN JULY IMMEDIATELY AFTER MY RETURN FROM CROSS CREEK ANOTHER CALL FOR MEN WAS ORDERED AND I AGAIN ENTERED UNDER THAT CALL FOR A TERM OF 3 MONTHS UNDER CAPTAIN GEO COWAN COMMANDED BY GENERAL RUTHERFORD (THERE PROMOTED) AND COL LOCK AND MARCHED IMMEDIATELY AGAINST THE CHEROKEE NATION OF INDIANS, ARRIVED AT COTHER'S FORT AND LAY THERE ABOUT A MONTH OR UPPERWARDS, FROM THERE TO THE INDIAN TOWNS WHERE WE HAD SEVERAL ENGAGEMENTS, BUT FINALLY DESTROYED THEIR CORN AND POTATOES AND WAS THEN MARCHED TO THE OVER HILL TOWNS ABOUT 40 MILES DISTANCE WHERE WE TOOK SEVERAL PRISONERS AMONG THEM THE WIFE OF ONE SCOTT, A BRITISH TRADER. WE WERE FROM THERE MARCHED TO ROWAN COUNTY, N.C. I THINK IN NOVEMBER AND DISCHARGED. I RECEIVED A DISCHARGE GIVEN AND I THINK BY COL LOCK BEFORE WHICH HAS BEEN LOST OR DESTROYED.

IN FEBRUARY I BELIEVE 1778 ANOTHER CALL FOR MEN WERE MADE FOR A TERM OF 5 MONTHS AND UNDER THAT CALL I AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. IN SAID ROWAN CO, N.C. UNDER CAPTAIN JOHN LOPP UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL RUTHERFORD AND COL LOCK AND LT. COL BREVARD AND MARCHED ON AN ENSIGN OF THAT COMPANY INTO SOUTH CAROLINA TO PETERSBURG? ABOUT 20 MILES, I THINK ABOVE SAVANNAH. THERE WE JOINED GENERAL LINCOLN, A REGULAR OFFICER WHO COMMANDED THE SOUTH CAROLINA TROOPS, AND WHO HAD BEEN A SHORT TIME PREVIOUS DRIVEN BY THE BRITISH AND RETREATED TO PURESBURG? ON THE SEVERNE RIVER AND CONTINUED THE FULL TERM OF THAT ENGAGEMENT, RECONORTERING THE COUNTRY ADJOCENT TO SAID RIVER, WHERE WE HAD FREQUENT, SLIGHT ENGAGEMENTS WITH THE BRITISH WHO THEN HAD POSSESSION OF GEORGIA. WE WERE THEN MARCHED HOME TO ROWAN CO, N.C. AND DISCHARGED. I RECEIVED A DISCHARGE GIVEN TO THE BEST OF MY RECOLLECTION BY LT. COL BREVARD, WHICH IS LOST. IN THE EARLY PART OF THE SUMMER 1779 I WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT AND ENTERED THE SERVICE UNDER CAPTAIN JAMES STINSON, COMMANDED BY COL PACELY FOR A TERM OF 3 MONTHS AND WAS MARCHED TO THE LOWER PART OF N.C. ON DEEP RIVER WHERE WE HAD SEVERAL ENGAGEMENTS WITH THE TORIES AND CONTINUED THERE UNTIL DISMISSED BUT I DO NOT BELIEVE WE SERVED THE FULL TERM OF SAID 3 MONTHS THAT TOUR AND DO NOT RECOLLECT WHETHER I RECEIVED A DISCHARGE

IN MARCH 1780 I WAS AGAIN CALLED OUT AND ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. IN SAID ROWAN CO, N.C. UNDER CAPTAIN LOCK (NEPHEW) OF THE COL LT. J COTHE ENSIGN, THOMAS GILLASPIE AND MARCHED TO S.C. AND JOINED GENERAL EUGE AT MONK'S CORNER, SOME DISTANCE FROM CHARLESTON AND WE WERE AT THAT POINT, MONKS CORNER TAKEN PRISONERS BY THE BRITISH ABOUT THE 14TH APRIL 1780 AND I WITH THE OTHER PRISONERS WAS TAKEN TO STONO RIVER OR FERRY WHERE THE BRITISH SHIPPING LAY AND WAS THEN PUT ON BOARD A PRISON SHIP AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL AFTER THE SURRENDER OF CHARLESTON AND THE MIDDLE OF MAY OF THAT YEAR WHEN A CAPITULATION WAS ENTERED INTO BY EAGE WHICH I AND THE OTHER PRISONERS WERE

PERMITTED TO RETURN HOME AS A PRISONER ON PAROLE AND IN SEPTEMBER I BELIEVE IN 1781 A GENERAL EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS TOOK PLACE AND I WAS INCLUDED AND EXCHANGED. COL. LINCOLN COMMANDED AT CHARLESTON AND MUST HERE REMARK THAT EVEN WHILE THE PRISONER ON PAYROLL, THE VOLUNTEERED INTO THE SERVICE AND MARCHED TO A PLACE IN NORTH CAROLINA, CALLED, I THINK; RAMSOURS OR SOMETHING LIKE THAT, WHERE WE HAD A PRETTY WARM ENGAGEMENT WITH THE TORIES AND WAS OUT AGAINST THE TORIES SEVERAL OTHER TIMES WHILE ON PAYROLL, BEFORE I WAS EXCHANGED IN 1781 AS ABOVE STATED.

OR SIX CAMPAIGNS IN THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. THIS AFFIANT WAS ONE OF THE BR NUMBER TAKEN AS PRISONERS OF WAR BY THE BRITISH AT WORKS CORNER AND KNOWS SAID ROBERSON'S STATEMENT IN RELATION TO THAT MATTER TO BE TRUE.

IN THE NEXT YEAR CAPTAIN EDMONDSON RAISED A COMPANY IN WHICH HE ENTERED AND SERVED AS A PRIVATE, WHICH MARCHED AGAINST THE TORIES WHO HAD ASSEMBLED ON THE BORDERS OF VA AND N.C. AND WHO WERE SUBSEQUENTLY DEFEATED AT RAMBOURS MILLS. THE COMPANY MARCHED UNDER COMMAND OF COL ARTHUR CAMPBELL, WHO WERE 4 OR 500 MEN WAS MOVING TOWARD THE TORIES WHEN THEY WERE ATTACKED AND DEFEATED BY OTHER TROOPS COMMANDED AS HE THINKS BY COL CLEVELAND. COL CAMPBELL'S TROOPS FELL IN WITH CLEVELAND, AFTER THE AFFAIR WHEN THE MILITIA AFTERWARDS WERE EMPLOYED TO ATTACK FERGUSON AT KING'S MOUNTAIN. HE AGAIN JOINED CAPTAIN EDMONDSON COMPANY AS A PRIVATE AND WHILST ON THE MARCH THE REGIMENT BEING UNDER COMMAND OF COL WILLIAM CAMPBELL, HE WAS ATTACHED WITH 12 MEN TO GUARD THE FAMILIES OF THE WHIGS DURING ABSENCE OF THE TROOPS, THEY BEING THREATENED BY THE TORIES THIS TERM WAS MORE THAN ONE MONTH. HIS WHOLE SERVICES WERE OVER 7 MONTHS - HE WAS IN NO BATTLES, NOR EVER WOUNDED. HE REFERS TO THE HONORABLE WM T BARRY, JOHN W HUNT, JOHN FOWLER, RICHARD HIGGINS, WALLER BULLOCK, DR. INNIS, MAJOR MATHEWS FLOURNOY.

COLONEL HE THINKS AT THE VALLEY FORGE IN THE STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA, THAT HE WAS IN THE BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE, GERMANTOWN, MONMOTH; THAT HE IS NOW IN THE 60TH YEAR OF HIS AGE; THAT HE IS IN REDUCED CIRCUMSTANCES.

AFFIDAVIT OF JAMES BALL, ONE OF HIS NEIGHBORS, SAYING HE IS OF GOOD CHARACTER, AND STANDS IN NEED OF SUPPORT FROM THE COUNTRY.

AFFIDAVIT OF JOHN NELSON, STATES THAT HE SERVED AS AN ENSIGN AND AFTERWARDS AS A LIEUT IN THE AFORESAID 7TH REGIMENT; THAT HE KNEW PERSONALLY DURING HIS SERVICE THEREIN THE AFORE MENTIONED, REUBEN STIVERS AND BELIEVES HE SERVED THE PERIOD BY HIM DECLARED. THIS JUNE 1818.

IN ANOTHER DECLARATION 1820, THE DECLARANT SAYS THAT HE WAS UNDER GENERAL WOODFORD BRIGADE, ON CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT, IN CRANGE CO, VA, 1776 AS A MUSICIAN.

HE WAS WOUNDED IN ST CLAIR'S DEFEAT. HIS FAMILY CONSISTED OF HIS WIFE AGE 59, WHO FOR SEVERAL YEARS HAD BEEN ALMOST ENTIRELY HELPLESS. HE WAS VERY POOR, HE SAID THAT CAPTAIN E CRAIG DIED OWING HIM \$16,00 WHICH HE NEVER EXPECTED TO GET, BRIG GEN BEN SOUTH DEC'D, OWING HIM \$20. WHEN HE DIED.

STOUT, ELIJAH AND ANNA PENSION NUMBER: W8751 NEW JERSEY.

STATE OF KENTUCKY: FAYETTE COUNTY. MAY 12-1834. PERSONALLY APPEARED IN OPEN COURT, HELD IN FAYETTE CO, KY, AGE 73, HE WAS A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE COUNTY AND STATES THAT HE ENTERED THE ARMY OF THE U.S. THE DAY AFTER THE BATTLE OF PRINCETON, AS A PRIVATE, AND WAS IN SERVICE THIS TIME, ONE MONTH AND WAS A RESIDENT AT THAT TIME OF HUNTERTON CO, NEW JERSEY AND THE COMPANY THAT HE WAS IN AT THAT TIME REMAINED HALF WAY BETWEEN PRINCETON AND KINGSTON.

HE ENTERED THE SERVICE, A SECOND TIME ~~SOON~~ SOON AFTER THE ABOVE SERVICE AS A VOLUNTEER. THE MAJOR OF HIS COMPANY WAS CORNELIOUS STOUT, THE COL WAS A CHAMBERS, THE COMPANY RENDEZVOUED AT RINGGOLD'S TAVERN IN HUNTINGTON AND MARCHED FROM THERE TO OLD RAITON RIVER SOME 17 MILES FROM BRUNSWICK AS NEAR AS HE CAN NOW REMEMBER AND WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME ONE MONTH AND 4 DAYS. HE ENTERED THE SERVICE AGAIN THE SUMMER AFTERWARDS, VOLUNTEERING AS A PRIVATE IN A COMPANY RAISED IN THE SAME COUNTY, HE HAS FORGOTTEN THE NAMES OF ALL THE OFFICERS OF THE COMPANY, THE COMPANY MARCHED TO GOLDERS CREEK AT THE HOUSE OF WILLIAM AND ROGERS EARISON IN HOPEWELL HE THINKS. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME ONE MONTH. HE AGAIN ENTERED SERVICE SOME SHORT TIME AFTER THE ABOVE SERVICE. HE WAS DRAFTED IN A COMPANY IN HUNTERDON AND THE COMPANY MARCHED TO ELIZABETHTOWN. HE WAS ON SERVICE THIS TIME ONE MONTH. HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE IN THE WINTER AFTER THE ABOVE SERVICE. HE WENT AS A SUBSTITUTE IN THE PLACE OF ROBERT GRANT IN A COMPANY RAISED IN HUNTERTON, HIS COMPANY WAS MARCHED TO ELIZABETHTOWN. HE WAS IN SERVICE THIS TIME ONE MONTH. HE ENTERED AGAIN SOON AFTER AS A DRAFTED MAN IN A COMPANY RAISED IN THE SAME COUNTY, MARCHED TO SPRINGFIELD AND WAS IN SERVICE ONE MONTH. HE AGAIN ENTERED SERVICE JUST BEFORE THE BATTLE OF MONMOTH,, DRAFTED IN THE SAME COUNTY IN CAPTAIN HARPAW'S COMPANY, CORNELIOUS STOUT WAS MAJOR AND CHAMBERS WAS COL. - THE COMPANY MARCHED TO PETERSON MOUNTAIN, FROM THERE TO STEEL'S GAP, THEN TO SCOTCH PLAINS AND THEN HOME, IN SERVICE ABOUT TWO WEEKS. HE WAS OUT AGAIN AS PRIVATE, AND REMEMBERS HE WAS AT TRENTON AND MONMOTH ONE MONTH A SHORT TIME BEFORE THE BATTLE OF MONMOTH. HE WAS BORN IN HUNTERTON COUNTY NEW JERSEY, MARCH 1761 FROM THERE HE MOVED TO FAYETTE CO, KY ABOUT THE TIME OF ST. CLAIR'S DEFEAT AND HAS LIVED HERE EVER SINCE, EXCEPT FOR A SHORT TIME IN WOODFORD CO.

HE LIVED IN THE SAME NEIGHBORHOOD WITH COL H BEARD, JOSEPH BEARD, WILLIAM ATCHISON.

ON THE 8TH OCTOBER 1832, PERSONALLY APPEARED BEFORE HONORABLE THOMAS M HICKEY THE PRESIDING JUDGE OF THE COURT OF FAYETTE COUNTY KENTUCKY, THE ABOVE NAMED SOLDIER A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE CO, AGED 76. STATES THAT HE ENTERED THE MILITIA AT THE BEGINNING OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR UNDER CAPTAIN CAKEY HOGLAND, ---ANDERSON, LT. JOSEPH BURDEN, ENSIGN, JOSEPH BARDER, SR. COL AND SCUDDER MAJOR, HE DOES NOT REMEMBER THE DATE HE ENTERED THE SERVICE, BUT HIS WAS THE FIRST COMPANY THAT WENT OUT FROM BARDENTOWN. HE REMAINED TWO MONTHS IN SERVICE - HE ENTERED THE SERVICE AT BORDENTOWN, NEW JERSEY, FROM WHEN HE MARCHED TO STATEN ISLAND, THROUGH TRETON, PRINCETON, BRUNSWICK, AND AMBOY, HE REMAINED ABOUT TWO MONTHS AT STATEN ISLAND, GUARDING THE STORES, HE ENTERED SERVICE AS A VOLUNTEER, THEY RETURNED TO BARDENTOWN AND RECEIVED THE DISCHARGE.

AGAIN VERY SOON AFTER HIS DISCHARGE, ENTERED THE SERVICE IN THE MILITIA AT BORDENTOWN UNDER CAPTAIN SAMUEL STOUT, JACOB BARRINGER, LT. AND MATHEWS WAS HIS COLONEL, SCUDDER, MAJOR, - HE MARCHED TO PAWLER'S HOOK, OPPOSITE THE CITY OF NEW YORK, THROUGH TRENTON, PRINCETON, BRUNSWICK, ELIZABETHTOWN, NEWARK AND BARRINGER, REMAINED THERE TWO MONTHS, THE DAY AFTER HIS ARRIVAL AT HOOK, HIS REGIMENT, TOGETHER WITH THE BALANCE OF THE ARMY WAS RECEIVED BY GENERAL WASHINGTON. THERE WAS A BRITISH MAN OF WAR LYING BETWEEN THE HOOK AND FIRING UPON THE TROOPS. GENERAL WASHINGTON, ADDED 1500 TROOPS OF WHOM AFFIANT WAS ONE TO BARRINGER POINT TO DRIVE OFF THE VESSELS. THE TROOPS WERE COMMANDED BY COL DURZY OF THE REGULAR ARMY WHO HAD BEEN AN OFFICER AT BUNKER-HILL. THE BRITISH LANDED AT POINT AND ATTEMPTED TO SUMMON THE AMERICANS AN ENGAGEMENT ENSUED THE AMERICANS HAD 2 EIGHTEEN POUND POUNDERS. AFTER AN ENGAGEMENT OF AN HOUR, OUR TROOPS WERE ORDERED TO RETIRE, WHICH THEY DID, AFTER REMAINING TWO MONTHS, HIS COMPANY RETURNED TO BORDENTON AND RECEIVED THE DISCHARGE, HE SAW WHILE AT THE HOOK, GENERAL WASHINGTON, LORD STERLING, COL DURZY OF THE REGULAR ARMY- AFFIANT THE SAME YEAR OF HIS DISCHARGE ENLISTED IN THE REGULAR ARMY AT BORDENTOWN UNDER CAPTAIN JOSEPH VANDYKE AND RECEIVED

\$8. AS A BOUNTY. HE ENLISTED FOR SIX MONTHS. THEY MARCHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK THROUGH TRENTON, PRINCETON, ELIZABETHTOWN, NEWARK AND BARRINGER. THEY PASSED OVER TO LONG ISLAND, WHEN GENERAL WASHINGTON WAS COMMANDING ABOUT 15000 MEN AS AFFIANT UNDERSTOOD BRITISH SHIPPING WAS LYING OFF LONG ISLAND. AFTER REMAINING THERE ABOUT 3 DAYS, THE BRITISH LANDED UNDER THE COMMAND OF LORD HOWE AS AFFIANT THINKS. AFTER AN ACTION OF SEVERAL DAYS, LORD STERLING, GENERAL SULLIVAN AND MANY OF THEIR TROOPS HAVING BEEN TAKEN PRISONERS, THE AMERICANS WERE DRIVEN FROM THE WORKS WHICH THEY HAD THROWN UP, UPON LONG ISLAND, ACROSS INTO NEW YORK, THE BRITISH PURUING THEM UNTIL THEY SEARCHED THE WHITE PLAINS WHERE GENERAL WASHINGTON THREW UP WORKS. HE SENT ABOUT 1500 OF HIS TROOPS UNDER COL. SMALLWOOD OF WHOM AFFIANT WAS ONE AND A MILE IN ADVANCE OF THE WORKS, TO CHECK THE ADVANCE OF THE BRITISH WHO SOON CAME IN SIGHT WHEN A FIGHT ENSUED, WHICH LASTED ABOUT 2 HOURS WHEN THE BRITISH ADVANCED AT A CHARGED BAYONET AND APPROACHED SO NEAR THAT AFFIANT COULD SEE THE BUCKLES IN THEIR SHOES. THE ARMY THEN RETREATED BEHIND THE WORKS. IN THE ACTION MANY WERE CALLED UPON, ~~EMBON~~ SIDE, WHILST BEHIND THE FORTIFICATION WHEN THEY REMAINED TWO OR 3 DAYS AFTERWARDS, THE BRITISH THREW BOMBS AT THEM AND THE AMERICANS RETIRED ACROSS NORTH RIVER TO FORT LEE TO WHICH THE BRITISH ~~PROCEEDED~~ PURSUED THEM AND CONTINUED PURUING THEM THROUGH NEWARK, ELIZABETHTOWN, PRINCETON AND TO TRENTON, WHEN THEY HALTED, WHICH WAS A FEW DAYS BEFORE XMAS, BUT THE YEAR NOT RECOLLECTED, THE AMERICANS CROSSED THE DELAWARE AND CONTINUED ENCAMPED UNTIL THE NIGHT BEFORE XMAS WHEN THEY MARCHED UP THE DELAWARE TO CASSELLS FERRY AND CROSSED. THE CORPSE TO WHICH AFFIANT BELONGED A LITTLE BEFORE SUNDOWN, AND TOOK POSSESSION OF THE HEIGHTS TO PROTECT THE REMAINDER OF THE TROOPS IN THEIR LANDING WHICH WAS NOT CONCLUDED UNTIL BETWEEN 10 & 12 O'CLOCK. THE ARMY WAS THEN DISCHARGED IN THE 3 PARTS AND APPROACHED TRENTON BY THESE DIFFERENT ROADS OF WHICH WAS IN THE MIDDLE AND WAS COMMANDED BY GENERAL MERCER. THE ARMY REACHED TRENTON ABOUT DAY BREAK, IT WAS RAINING AND SHOWING DURING THE WHOLE NIGHT AND WAS VERY COLD AS WE APPROACHED TRENTON, THE LEFT DIVISION THAT ADVANCED UP THE PRINCETON ROAD GAVE THE ALARM TO A BODY OF HESSIANS ENCAMPED BEHIND A PICOT, A SHORT DISTANCE FROM TOWN TO WHICH THE ALARM WAS IMMEDIATELY COMMUNICATED, WHEN THE WHOLE ARMY MARCHED RAPIDLY INTO TRENTON AND COMMANDED THE ATTACK, THE BRITISH DREW OUT THEIR CANNON AND MANY OF THEM ENTERED THE ACTION, WITH NOTHING BUT THEIR SHORTS ON, AFTER AN ENGAGEMENT OF AN HOUR AND ONE-HALF OR TWO HOURS, 500 HESSIANS LAID DOWN THEIR ARMS. THE DRAGOONS ESCAPED OVER TRENTON BRIDGE TO BARDENTOWN WHERE SOME OF THEIR TROOPS WERE STATIONED.

AFTER THE ACTION OF THE PRISONERS WERE SENT ACROSS THE DELAWARE AND AMERICANS CROSSED SAN? POINT? A SMALL CREEK RUNNING THROUGH TRENTON, WHERE THEY CONTINUED, A DAY OR TWO WHEN THE BRITISH ASSEMBLED AT TRENTON FROM BRUNSWICK, PRINCETON AND OTHER PLACES, TO CONTINUE THERE A DAY OR TWO DURING THE NIGHT, GENERAL WASHINGTON, DIRECTED THE FIRES TO BE BUILT UP AND THE ARMY DECAMPED AND MARCHED UP THE SANPOINT TO STORY BROOK WHERE THEY CROSSED AND WERE ATTACKED BY THEIR REGIMENT OF BRITISH, GENERAL MERCER WAS KILLED, BUT THE BRITISH WERE ROUTED, THE ARMY MARCHED ~~OVER THE BRICKS~~ PRINCETON AND TOOK ~~4~~ ABOUT 2 OR 300 PRISONERS AFTER REMAINING ABOUT A YEAR, THE WHOLE ARMY FROM ~~TRENTON~~ AND BRIDGES TO RETARD THEIR ADVANCE UPON US AT AFFIANT WAS DISCHARGED BEING A WRITTEN DISCHARGE, WHICH HE HAS LOST LONG SINCE, HAVING SERVED ABOUT 8 MONTHS AFTER HIS ENLISTMENT.

THE NEXT SPRING THE JERSEY MILITIA WERE CALLED OUT TO ASSEMBLE MORRISTOWN, AFFIANT VOLUNTEERED AT BORDENTOWN UNDER CAPT. EVANS -- HAYNES LT. FINNAN WAS COLONEL, AS LIKEWISE WHILST HE SERVED AS A REGULAR AS ABOVE STATED. AFTER THE ARMY ASSEMBLED AT MORRISTOWN, THEY ADVANCED UPON THE BRITISH AT BRUNSWICK AND DROVE THEM FROM THE PLACE CROSSING THE RIVER. IN CROSSING THEM ENDEAVORED TO SET THE BRIDGE ON FIRE, WHICH WAS PREVENTED BY THE 7th COMMANDING OF THE AMERICANS WHO DROVE THEM TO BOUNM? TOWN WHERE WE ENCAMPED. GENERAL MAXWELL WAS IN COMMAND DURING ALL THIS TIME AFTER OUR ENCAMPEMENT AT BOUNMTOWN.

THE BRITISH CAME UP AND SURRENDERED FIRST, WHEN A FIGHT ENSUED WHICH LASTED TWO HOURS, WHEN GENERAL WASHINGTON CAME UP TO OUR RELIEF, WE HAD LOST SOME OF

OUR CANNON TAKEN AND SOME OF THE REGULAR TROOPS AMONG THE NUMBER WAS CAPT. JAMES LOWERY, RECEIVED HIS DISCHARGE AT BRUNSWICK AFTER SERVING ABOUT TWO MONTHS. SHORTLY AFTER HIS DISCHARGE AFFIANT AGAIN ENTERED THE MILITIA AS A VOLUNTEER IN CAPTAIN HAYNES COMPANY AT MT. HOLLEY NEW JERSEY, LAFAYETTE COMMANDED THE TROOPS AMOUNTING TO ABOUT 800, WE MARCHED THROUGH HATTEN FIELD AND WOODBURY TO THE LONG BRIDGE, WHERE WE ATTACKED BY A PARTY OF HESSIANS AND AFTER A FIGHT OF ABOUT TWO YEARS, WE DROVE THE ENEMY ACROSS THE BRIDGE, WHICH WE PULLED UP, WE THEN RETURNED TO HATTENFIELD, WHERE COL NIXON WAS WITH THE MILITIA. WHEN COL SENT AFFIANT AS AN EXPRESS TO COL GREEN AT RED BANK FORT, THE MESSAGE WAS DELIVERED BUT AFFIANT WAS OBLIGED TO REMAIN AT THE FORT ONE DAY AS IT WAS SURROUNDED AND FIGHT ENSUED IN WHICH ABOUT 500 HESSIANS WERE KILLED AND THE BALANCE RETREATED. COL DONUP WHO COMMANDED THE 500 HESSIANS ROAD UP TO THE WALLS OF THE FORT WITH A FLAG UPON THE RAMPART OF WHICH AFFIANT WAS MAJOR HONEY WENT OUT TO MEET COL DONUP AND ASKED HIM WHAT THE DEMAND WAS, HE REPLIED THAT HE WANTED TO SEE GENERAL GREEN. HONEY SAID HE WOULD ANSWER ANYTHING THEY WANTED TO SAY TO COL GREEN. DONUP DEMANDED A SURRENDER OF THE FORT AND SAID HE WOULD GIVE QUARTERS-HONEY REPLIED THAT GREEN NEITHER LOVED HIM, NOR FRAUD? HIM BUT DEFIED HIM, HE WILL NEVER SURRENDER THE GARRISON WHILE HE HAS A MAN ALIVE, DONUP THEN TOOK OUT HIS WATCH AND SAID HE WOULD GIVE A HALF HOUR TO THINK ABOUT IT AND IF IT WAS NOT THEN SURRENDERED HE WOULD PUT EVERY MAN TO DEATH AND THEIR BLOOD BE UPON THEIR OWN HEADS IN A HALF HOUR AFTERWARDS THE ATTACK COMMENCED. AFTER THE HESSIANS WERE DRIVEN OFF, AFFIANT RETURNED TO HATERFIELD AFTER A SERVICE OF OVER TWO MONTHS. AND WAS DISCHARGED.

AFFIANT RESIDED AT BORDENTOWN NEW JERSEY WHICH TIME HE ENTERED THE SERVICE. AFFIANT WAS BORN IN PHILADELPHIA COUNTY, PA ON THE 30TH DECEMBER 1755. HE HAS NO RECORD OF HIS AGE TO RECOLLECTS IT DISTINCTLY AFTER THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, AFFIANT LIVED IN BURLINGTON COUNTY NEW JERSEY UNTIL THE YEAR 1793 WHEN HE ENLISTED IN PHILADELPHIA UNDER CAPTAIN MELCHER, AND ENTERED UPON THE CAMPAIGN UNDER GENERAL WAYNE AGAINST THE INDIANS IN WHICH HE WAS ENGAGED 3 YEARS. HE THEN CAME TO FAYETTE CO, KY WHERE HE HAS LIVED EVER SINCE. HE, CAPTAIN ANDERSON WHILE IN THE ARMY, LT YARD COL BROLY AND ETC, HE KNEW. HIS NEIGHBORS IN FAYETTE CO, KY ARE GENERAL JAMES DUDLEY, MAJOR SAMUEL SMITH, DANIEL BOYER, JAMES ROGERS, JOHN ROGERS, JOHN C RICHARDSON AND BENJAMIN WARFIELD AND WALTER DUNN.

SAMUEL GAMBLE THIS JUNE 16- 1834 AGAIN CAME INTO SAID FAYETTE CIRCUIT COURT AND MAKES THE FOLLOWING ADDITIONS TO HIS ANNEXED STATEMENT. HE THINKS COL MARSHALL WAS COMMANDANT OF THE MILITIA BUT HIS BROTHER CAPTAIN MARSHALL BELONGED TO THE REGULAR SERVICE STATED AND COL BUTLER'S REGIMENT.

AFFIDAVIT JOHN SHARP STATES THAT HE SERVED DURING THE LATE WAR AND AFTERWARDS WHEN HE FIRST BECAME ACQUAINTED WITH THE ABOVE NAMED SAMUEL GAMBLE, AND THEY TALKED ABOUT THE SUFFERINGS AND PRIVATIONS IN THE ARMY, AND BELIEVES THAT HE ALREADY SERVED AS IS OUTLINED BY HIM.

WAR HE THERE GOT A COLONEL'S COMMISSION AND I WAS UNDER HIM FOR SOMETIME, FROM THENCE I MOVED TO THE STATE OF OHIO, THE YEAR AFTER WAYNE'S TREATY, THE IN THE YEAR 1812 WHEN VOLUNTEERS WERE CALLED FOR AT THE AGE OF 51, I VOLUNTEERED FOR ONE YEAR IN THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN EPHRAIAM BROWN, VANHORN'S BATTALION OF VOLUNTEERS, FINLEY'S REGIMENT, WE WERE MARCHED TO DETROIT. I WAS IN THE BATTLE OF MAGUARGER AND WAS DELIVERED UP AT DETROIT, A PRISONER OF WAR BY GENERAL HULL, THEN PAYROLLED AND LANDED ON THE AMERICAN SIDE OF LAKE ERIE 150 MILES BELOW MALDEN 500 MILES FROM HOME WITHOUT PROVISIONS OR MONEY FROM THE GOVERNMENT.

THAT IN THE YEAR 1781 IN AUGUST HE HIRED GEO COPPAGE OF FAIRFAX CO, VA TO ENTER THE SERVICE OF HIS COUNTRY FOR 3 YEARS UNDER COMMAND OF PETER WAGGONER, COLONEL AND JAMES WAUGH CAPT. HE THE SAID COPPAGE WAS TO BE AT THE COMMAND OF SAID OFFICERS AND OTHERS WHERE THEY CALLED ON FOR WHICH I PAID THE SAID COPPAGE, \$1200. IN CONTINENTAL MONEY, SAID AFFIANT BELIEVES SAID COPPAGE SERVED TO THE END OF THE WAR. AFFIDANT STATES THAT HE MOVED TO KENTUCKY IN MAY 1787 SETTLED IN FAYETTE CO, KY ABOUT 6 MILES FROM LEXINGTON WHERE HE HAS RESIDED ABOUT 47 YEARS, THAT HE IS WELL ACQUAINTED WITH H CLAY, COL R M JOHNSON, WM T BARRY, WHO LATER WILL ALL BE IN THE CITY OF WASHINGTON AND THAT THE ONLY MAN NOW LIVING WHO CAN TESTIFY TO HIS SERVICES IS JOHN GRAHAM? OF BARREN CO, KY THAT HE BELIEVES HE WAS CALLED OUT AT ALL OF THE SEVERAL TIMES THAT HE WAS.

HE RESIDED AND VOLUNTEERED IN FAIRFAX CO, VA, THE MAJOR'S NAME WAS JAMES RENNOR WREN, THE COLONEL'S NAME WAS RUMLEY AND THE LIEUTENANT COL WAS GILPIN. HE WAS NEXT DRAFTED TO GUARD THE RESIDENCES OF GENERAL WASHINGTON WHEN LORD DUNMORE LAY IN THE POTOMAC, HE SERVED AS A PRIVATE ON THIS OCCASION AND CONTINUED IN THE SERVICE 1 MONTH, ABOUT 12 MONTHS, THE NAME OF THE CAPTAIN WAS JAMES DENEALE.

ON ONE OCCASION WAS DRAFTED, SERVED ONE MONTH UNDER DENEALE, IN GUARDING THE LITTLE TOWN AND WARE HOUSE OF COLCHESTER, - THIS WAS ONLY 2 OR 3 WEEKS AFTER HE QUIT THE SERVICE AT WASHINGTON'S HOUSE AND THE SAME MAJOR RAMSEY COMMANDED THERE, BEING NO OFFICER OF HIGH GRADE IN THIS SERVICE.

ON A FOURTH OCCASION WHEN I WAS LIVING WITH GEO WINN AND DRIVING A TEAM IN PARTNERSHIP WITH HIM AND WILLIAM STONE, I WAS MET BY OVAL LINDSEY MAYS MET NEAR ALEXANDRIA AND PRESSED WITH THE WAGON AND TEAM INTO THE SERVICE I WAS ATTACHED TO THE REGULAR TROOPS UNDER LAFAYETTE, THE WAGON MASTER'S NAME WAS JAMES STROT? AFTER HAVING OPENED THIS WAY WASHINGTON CHANGED HIS ROUTE AND CROSSED AT NOLANDS FERRY AND THROUGH PRINCE WILLIAM.

AFFIDAVIT OF GEO WINN STATES THAT MATHEW NOLAND LIVED WITH HIS FATHER GEO WINN IN THE STATE OF VA. WE BOTH CAME TO KENTUCKY ABOUT THE SAMETIME. I WAS YOUNG THEN BUT CAN REMEMBER HIS RETURNING FROM THE SERVICE. WE HAVE LIVED IN KENTUCKY IN THE SAME NEIGHBORHOOD EVER SINCE WE CAME HERE.

THE MOTION OF THE BRITISH AND TORIES IN THAT COUNTRY AS HE BELIEVES. AT THE TIME OF ENTERING THE SERVICE, HE WAS AGE 16. HIS PLACE OF RESIDENCE WAS AT MARTIN TOWN IN 96 DISTRICT S.C. AFTER THE SURRENDER OF CHARLESTON HE AGAIN ENTERED THE SERVICE OF THE U.S. (WITH 3 BROTHERS WHO HAD BEEN AT THE FIRST SEIGE OF AUGUSTA UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL ELIJAH CLARK) IN RUTHERFORD CO, N.C. IN THE VOLUNTEER PARTIES CORPS OF MOUNTED MEN COMMANDED BY CAPT FREDERICK STALLIONS AND JAMES---?STALLIONS, 1ST LT, AND EDMUND MARTIN, 2ND LT, IN THE REGIMENT, COMMANDED BY COL ELIJAH CLARK AND COL CHANDLER. THE REGIMENT WAS COMPOSED PRINCIPALLY OF REFUGES FROM GA AND S.C. WHO REFUSED TO TAKE THE BENEFIT OF BRITISH PROTECTION. HE THINKS HE ENTERED THIS SERVICE ABOUT THE LAST OF SEPTEMBER OR EARLY IN THE MONTH OF OCTOBER 1780. WE WERE ENGAGED SOMETIME IN SCOURING THE COUNTRY ON THE BRITISH LINES AND THEN JOINED GENERAL SUMPTER ON THE WATERS OF BROAD RIVER, THEN MARCHED UNDER SUMPTER, TO SHIRES FERRY, ON BROAD RIVER, WHEN WE EXPECTED TO TAKE A PART OF BRITISH WHEN WE GOT THERE THEY WERE ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE RIVER, THEN TOOK DOWN THE RIVER TO SUMMERS? MILLS, THEN STRUCK OFF AND MADE UP THE COUNTRY, 13 MILES ENCAMPED. HE GOT NO DISCHARGE - NONE WAS NECESSARY. THIS DECLARANT, NEXT IN THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX, HE BELIEVES IN THE MONTH OF FEB. 1781 VOLUNTEERED IN THE IN THE COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPT. BIRD WALL? WERE IN THE VA REGIMENT, COMMANDED BY COL NATHL. COCKE, IN THE BRIGADE COMMANDED BY GENERAL STEPHENS, ENTERED THE SERVICE ON THE NORTH SIDE OF DAN RIVER, NEAR IRVINE FERRY. LAWSON AND N.C. MILITIA UNDER GENERAL BUTLER ACCORDING TO HIS RECOLLECTION, DECLARANT WAS IN THE BATTLE OF GUILFORD, IN WHICH GENERAL STEPHENS WAS WOUNDED, SAW GENERAL GREEN, COL WASHINGTON, LEE AND GREEN IN THAT CAMPAIGN. HE THEN RETURNED TO HALIFAX CO, AND TOOK THE PLACE OF OUR CHARLES EDWARDS, HIS BROTHER IN LAW AS A SUBSTITUTE IN THE COMPANY OF VA MILITIA, COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN

/WITHOUT

RICHARD JONES. WE CONDUCTED UNDER GUARD A SMALL PARTY OF BRITISH PRISONERS FROM PITTSYLVANIA Co, TO WINCHESTER IN VA, WERE THEN MARCHED BACK AND DISCHARGED BY THE CAPTAIN IN HALIFAX Co, - HE BELIEVES HE WAS ENGAGED IN THAT SERVICE 20 DAYS, HE DOES NOT REMEMBER EXACT DATES BUT THINKS IT WAS ABOUT THE TIME THE LEGISLATURE OF VA FLED FROM CHARLOTTESVILLE..

DECLARANT THEN RETURNED TO 96 S.C. AND IN 1781 THE SAME YEAR HE AGAIN VOLUNTEERED AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR ONE JOSEPH DEPUGH IN A COMPANY COMMANDED BY CAPTAIN THOMAS KEY IN THE REGIMENT COMMANDED BY ONE LEROY HAMMONDS, THE LT. COL WAS NAMED JOHN PURVIS, WE JOINED GENERAL ANDREW PICKENS, AND WERE ENGAGED IN SCOURING THE SWAMPS, OF EDISTO? WHERE IT WAS UNDERSTOOD A LARGE PARTY OF TORIES WERE SECRETED.. UPON OUR APPROACH THEY DISPERSED. WE MARCHED TO THE RIDGE HOUSE IN 96 AND DECLARANT WAS DISCHARGED IN THAT PLACE, HAVING SERVED 20 DAYS IN THIS TOUR, AS A MOUNTED GUNMAN. SHORTLY AFTERWARDS HE AGAIN JOINED GENERAL PICKENS AS A MOUNTED VOLUNTEER IN THE COMPANY COMMANDED BY LT. HENRY WARE IN THE REGIMENT COMMANDED BY MAJOR TUTT. WE MARCHED AGAINST THE TO CHEROKEE INDIANS AT A TOWN CALLED CHOTA, SURPRISED THE INDIANS, KILLED THIRTY AND TOOK AS MANY PRSONERS, DESTROYED THEIR TOWNS AND RETURNED WITH THE PRISONERS TO MAJOR TUTTS IN 96 DISTRICT WHERE DECLARANT WAS DISCH RGED, HAVING SERVED TO THE BEST OF HIS RECOLLECTION IN THAT TOUR ONE MONTH.

AS A MILITIAMAN FOR 3 MONTHS, HE DOES NOT REMEMBER THE NAME OF HIS CAPTAIN, HIS LIEUTENANT WERE BARKLEY, MARTIN AND ROBERT BRIANT IN THE REGEMENT, S.C. MILITIA COMMANDED BY COL LEROY HAMMONDS WE MARCHED TO GREEN'S HEADQUARTERS NEAR BACON BRIDGE BEFORE CHARLESTON AND STAYED UNTIL OUR TIME EXPIRED, WHEN WE WERE DISCHARGED - HAVING SERVED 3 MONTHS.

HE WAS A CORPORAL IN THE ARMY OF THE REVOLUTION, IS INSCRIBED ON THE PENSION LIST ROLL OF THE AGENCY OF KY AT THE RATE OF \$8. PER MONTH TO COMMENCE ON THE 31ST DAY OF AUGUST 1818. THE REASON HE DID NOT DRAW HIS PENSION AFTER HE WAS PLACED ON THE PENSION ROLL IN CLARK COUNTY IS THE FACT THAT SHORTLY AFTER HE WAS PLACED ON THE PENSION LIST AND HAD OBTAINED SAID CERTIFICATE HE MOVED FROM THE STATE OF KY TO MISSOURI, BOONE COUNTY, WHERE HE HAS EVER SINCE RESIDED, HE GOT AN RARE OPPORTUNITY IN THE FALL OF THE YEAR 1822. SINCE THAT TIME ONLY ONE OPPORTUNITY HAS OCCURRED BEING ABOUT 19 OR 20 MONTHS TO SEPT 4 1822, WHEN HE AGAIN SENT BY A FRIEND TO WHOM HE GAVE POWER OF ATTORNEY TO DRAW THE MONEY FOR HIM, BUT HIS SAID AGENT HAVING BY SOME CASUALTY LOST HIS POCKET BOOK IN WHICH SAID POWER OF ATTORNEY WAS HAD TO RETURN WITHOUT THE MONEY AND HE ALTHOUGH FROM OLD AGE AND DEBILITY A BADLY QUALIFIED TO TRAVEL, THE DISTANCE HE LIVED FROM LEXINGTON, KY MADE THE ATTEMPT THIS FALL AND HAVING REACHED LEXINGTON ON THE 5TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER 1825, APPLIED AT THE BRANCH BANK OF THE U.S. FOR THE MONEY DUE HIM WHEN HE WAS INFORMED BY THE OFFICERS OF SAID BANK THAT HE HAD BEEN REPORTED TO THE WAR DEPARTMENT AS DEAD, AND COULD NOT GET HIS PENSION WITHOUT MAKING APPLICATION TO THAT DEPARTMENT AND THE REASON ASSIGNED FOR HIS BEING RETURNED AS DEAD WAS INE HIS FAILURE TO APPLY FOR HIS PENSION FOR TWO YEARS IN SUCCESSION.

HE STATES THAT IT WAS IN THIS COURT ON JULY 15-1820 THAT HE IN THIS COURT MADE HIS LAST DECLARATION ON THE SUBJECT OF HIS PENSION.

STATES "I WENT OUT IN CAPTAIN MAXX FRANCIS WILLIS' COMPANY AND WAS MADE CORPORAL WHILE THERE WHEN HE RESIGNED AND WAS PUT INTO A REGIMENT ON THE CONTINENTAL ESTABLISHMENT, COMMANDED BY COL WM GRAYSON, AND WHILE AFTERWARDS, I THINK BY COL GIST. WE BELONGED TO BRIGADIER GENERAL CHARLES SCOTT'S BRIGADE. THE DIVISION WAS COMMANDED BY MAJOR GENERAL STEPHENS FOR A TIME AND AFTERWARDS BY THE MARVIS DELAFAYETTE. I SERVED OUT THE FULL TERM OF 3 YEARS FOR WHICH I ENLISTED. I CONTINUED IN THE OFFICE OF CORPORAL OR ALL THE TIME. AFTER I WAS APPOINTED I ENLISTED IN VA, BUT SERVED THE MOST OF THE TIME IN PENNSYLVANIA AND THE JERSEYS AND NEW YORK. AT THE END OF THE TERM I WAS HONORABLY DISCHARGED. MY ORIGINAL DISCHARGE IS NOW LOST OR OUT OF MY POWER. I GAVE IT TO A NUMBERXOR BROTHER OF MINE WHO NOW LIVES IN THE STATE OF VA, SOMETHING LIKE 30 YEARS AGO. I WAS IN THE BATTLE OF MONMOTH AND ALSO IN THAT OF STONY POINT AND IN SEVERAL OTHER SCOUTS. I AM NOW ABOUT AGE 61 YEARS, AND AM GROWING VERY FEEBLE. I HAVE NO ONE TO ASSIST ME IN SUPPORTING MYSELF AND WIFE. MY CHILDREN HAVE ALL LEFT ME. I AM IN REDUCED CIRCUMSTANCES AND STAND IN NEED OF THE ASSISTANCE OF MY COUNTRY, FOR SUPPORT AND AM DESIROUS OF OBTAINING THE RELIEF PROVIDED BY A LATE ACT OF CONGRESS. THIS AUG 30-1818— SIGNED BENJAMIN ETHELL.

THE CHRISTOPHER TOMPKINS, ONE OF THE CIRCUIT JUDGES FOR THE STATE AFORESAID AND SOLE JUDGE OF BARREN CIRCUIT COURT, DO CERTIFY THAT JOHN MOREHEAD OF BARREN CO AND CHRISTIAN MOREHEAD HIS WIFE THIS DAY APPEARED BEFORE ME AND MADE OATH THAT THEY ARE WELL ACQUAINTED WITH BENJ.  OFF BY THE INDIANS, A GOOD MANY OF THEM COULD NOT BRING THEIR PLUNDER? WITH
 THEM BUT HID IT. JOHN DUNCAN WAS ORDERED OUT WITH A COMPANY OF MILITIA IN
 ORDER TO GUARD THE PEOPLE WHO HAD LEFT THEIR PROPERTY BEHIND THEM TO COLLECT
 IT TOGETHER AND BRING IT IN THE SETTLEMENTS, HE WAS ONE OF DUNCAN'S COMPANY
 AT THIS TIME CAPTAIN JOSEPH MARTIN WAS STATIONED AT THE RYE COVE FORD? OR
 FORT, ON CLINCH RIVER IN ORDER TO GUARD THE FRONTIERS OF VA, FOR IT WAS A

 BUNCH? OR BURK? WHEN WE GOT INTO THE VALLEY WE MET WITH THOSE SPIES, THEY

 - WE TOOK UP AT MARTIN'S STATION, SOMETIME AFTER DAVIS PETITIONED DUNCAN FOR A
 FEW MEN TO GO DOWN TO OWENS WITH HIM TO COLLECT HIS PLUNDER, FIVE MEN WAS
 WERE GRANTED HIM ONE OF WHOM WAS JAMES BURK OR BUNCH? THEY WENT TO THE
 STATION AND COLLECTED THE PLUNDER ACCORDINGLY AND BACK TO CAMP, THE INDIANS
 WAYLAID THE PATH AND FIRED UPON THEM AND WOUNDED BUNCH? KILLED A MAN BY NAME
 OF BOWMAN AT THE PLACE AND WOUNDED ANOTHER BY THE NAME OF JOHNSON AS BUNCH
 RELATED FOR HE RETREATED WITH HIM A PIECE BUT HE NEVER GOT ANY OF THE PARTY
 - GOT IN THAT NIGHT TWO OF WHOM WERE BUNCH AND DAVIS, THE NEXT DAY DUNCAN

THE NEXT EXPEDITION HE WENT WAS TO KENTUCKY, UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL JOHN BOWMAN, OF BEDFORD CO, VA, AS WELL AS I RECOLLECT, HENRY DOULIN? FROM SAID COUNTY AS I ALSO UNDERSTOOD WAS ONE OF HIS CAPTAINS, BOWMAN AS I UNDERSTOOD WAS ORDERED OUT BY THE STATE OF VIRGINIA, TO INFORM THE STATIONS IN KENTUCKY AS THEY CAME ON THEIR THROUGH THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF ABINGDON, VA, A MAN BY THE NAME OF WILLIAM BUSH MET WITH CAPTAIN BAULLIN? AND WAS TOLD AS HE UNDERSTOOD BY HIM IF HE WOULD RAISE A LIEUTENANT'S QUOTA WHICH WAS CALLED 24 MEN, SAID BUSH SHOULD HAVE COMMAND OF THE 2ND LT. IN HIS ROULORS? COMPANY, AT THAT TIME SAID BUSH RESIDED IN OUR NEIGHBORHOOD IN CASTLE WOODS ON CLINCH RIVER, VA, HE THEN DID RECRUIT HIS 24 MEN, TWO OF WHOM WERE MY BROTHER JOSEPH AND MYSELF, BY THE LEAVE OF OUR FATHER WE ENLISTED, HE DOES NOT RECOLLECT AT PRESENT FOR HOW LONG AND MARCHED WITH BUSH AND OVERTOOK BOWMAN AND HIS BATALION ON RICHMOND AT THE FORD OF THE CUMBERLAND RIVER AND JOINED THE COMPANY OF CAPTAIN DAULLIN? AND FROM THENCE MARCHED TO BOONESBORO AND GOT THERE ABOUT THE 1ST OF SEPTEMBER 1777, AT THIS TIME, HE UNDERSTOOD THERE WERE BUT TWO OTHER STATIONS IN THE COUNTRY. LOGAN'S AND HARRODS. HE STATES HE REMAINED THERE TWENTY DAYS, AIDING THE PEOPLE, GETTING IN THEIR CORN, WHICH THEY HAD BEEN PREVENTED THE YEAR BEFORE FROM GETTING INTO FORT. THE INDIANS BEING TROUBLESOME, COL CALLOWAY WHO LIVED WITH HIS FAMILY IN THE FORT, THAT TIME HAD BEEN INTO VIRGINIA AND HAS UNDERSTOOD HAD EXPECTED TO HAVE RETURNED WITH BOWMAN BUT FAILED TO GET U

UP WITH HIM TO WHERE HE RETURNED HOME FROM, HOME TO THE FORT. HE INFORMED US THAT ON THE TRAIL HE HAD TRAVELED OUT, HE FOUND A MAN KILLED BY THE INDIANS AS HE SUPPOSED AND THAT THE INDIANS HAD BROKEN IN UPON THE SETTLERS OF CASTLEWOOD AND HAD KILLED SEVEN OR EIGHT FAMILIES, BUT THIS INFORMATION, MY BROTHER, MYSELF AND OTHERS BECAME UNEASY WE WITH REGRET TO OUR FRIENDS IN CASTLEWOOD AND PETITIONED COL BOWMAN FOR A DISCHARGE IN ORDER THAT WE MIGHT GO TO THEIR RELIEF, HE GRANTED THE DISCHARGE, OBSERVING AT THE SAME-TIME THAT HE HAD NO AUTHORITY TO TAKE MEN FROM FRONTIERS. WE RETURNED HOME AND ON OUR WAY HOME WE FELL IN WITH THE CLINCH SPIES WHO CORROBORATED THE STATEMENT OF CALLOWAY STATION 7, SEVERAL FAMILIES HAD BEEN KILLED AND THE BALANCE WITH ALL IN FORT. WE EVEN FOUND IT SO WHEN WE GOT INTO THE SETTLEMENTS WE WERE AT LEAST 46 OR 50 DAYS OUT.

THE NEXT EXPEDITION WAS TO ILLINOIS UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL JOHN MONTGOMERY FROM VIRGINIA. IT WAS UNDERSTOOD THAT GEO. ROGERS CLARK HAD BEEN SENT BY THE STATE OF VA, TO TAKE POSSESSION OF THE BRITISH GARRISON THAT WAS IN THE ILLINOIS COUNTRY. IT WAS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD BY ME THAT SAID CLARK WAS TO CARRY ON THE EXPEDITION AGAINST DETROIT AND IN ORDER TO ENABLE HIM, THE MORE TO DO SO, THE STATE OF VA SENT TO HIS AND COL JOHN MONTGOMERY WITH ABOUT 130 MEN TO RECRUIT THOSE MEN, THOMAS QUIRK? AND OTHERS WERE EMPLOYED WITH WHOM MY BROTHER JOSEPH KINCAID AND MYSELF ENLISTED FOR ONE YEAR. THIS WAS EARLY IN THE SPRING OF 1779 AND ABOUT THE MIDDLE OF MARCH, RECOLLECT AT THE LONG ISLAND OF HOLSTON, RIVER, IN WHICH PLACE WE WERE MET BY COL EVAN SHELBY SOUTH ABOUT 440 MILITIA. WE EMBARKED IN CANOES AND WENT DOWN TO THE CHICKAMANY TOWNS, THERE WE LANTED HAD A LITTLE SKIRMISH WITH THE INDIANS, KILLED AND TOOK A FEW PRISONERS THE BALANCE FLED. WE LAY THERE ABOUT TWO WEEKS AND COLLECTED A GOOD DEAL OF INDIAN PLUNDER. FROM THENCE SHELBY AND THE MILITIA RETURNED. MONTGOMERY AND HIS HORGE WERE ON THE AID OF CLARK, BUT PREVIOUS TO OUR LANDING AT THE TOWNS AFORESAID I RECEIVED THE APPOINTMENT OF QUARTERMASTER SARGEANT UNDER THE QUARTERMASTER THORN? READ. WE ARRIVED AT KASKASHIA ABOUT THE 1ST OF JUNE AND THEN JOINED COL CLARK. I STAYED THERE A WEEK FEW WEEKS THEN WE WENT TO OPOST, SOME BY WATER AND SOME BY LAND. THERE WE MET 3 SMALL COMPANIES OF MILITIA FROM KENTUCKY, COL CLARK THEN FIRSTING THAT HE COULDN'T GET MEN ENOUGH TO CARRY HIS EXPEDITION AGAINST DETROIT. AFTER STAYING THERE SOMETIME, CLARK, SOME OTHER OFFICER AND A FEW MEN WENT TO THE FALLS OF OHIO

AND I WAS OF THE COMPANY, THE THE OFFICERS AND CLARK WERE CAPT JESSE EVANS
 -CAPT TAYLOR, LT. CROCKET AND AS WELL AS I REMEMBER CAPTAIN TODD. WE ALL ABOUT
 40 BUT BEFORE THIS WHILST AT OPOST, I ENLISTED WITH THE SAID THOMAS QUIRK?
 QUIRK? FOR ANOTHER YEAR, AFTER LAYING THE SAMETIME AT THE FALLS OF OHIO, THERE
 WERE SOME OF THE OFFICERS AND SOLDIERS, PERMITTED TO RETURN HOME ON FURLOUGH.
~~SEE~~ ONE OF WHOM WAS MYSELF. THIS WAS SOMETIME IN THE FALL OF THE YEAR.
 WHILST OUT UPON FURLOUGH, I RETURNED TO VA AND AIDED MY FATHER IN MOVING TO

 TO SERVE AFTER MY FURLOUGH WAS OUT, I HEARD A MAN BY THE NAME OF JOSHUA

GREEN, IN COL SAMUEL FEEBAKER'S REGIMENT; THAT HE ENTERED SAID COMPANY THEY WERE MARCHED TO CUMBERLAND COURT HOUSE, WHERE THEY JOINED CAPTAIN LOVELEY'S AND WILEY'S COMPANY OF MILITIA; THAT THEY WERE THERE UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL MUHLENBERG WHO COMMANDED IN PERSON; THAT THEY REMAINED AT CUMBERLAND COURT HOUSE EIGHT MONTHS AND ENGAGED IN WATCHING THE MOVEMENTS OF THE BRITISH ARMY; THAT FROM CUMBERLAND COURT HOUSE THEY MARCHED TO BEDFORD COURT HOUSE, NEW LONDON WHERE THEY WERE STATIONED AND REMAINED IN ACTUAL SERVICE TEN MONTHS AND WERE STILL UNDER THE COMMAND OF COL BAKER AND GEN. FROM AMELIA CO, HIS FATHER REMOVED TO LUENENBERG CO, WHERE HE RESIDED DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR. GREEN'S COMPANY, THE SAME TO WHICH HIS FATHER WAS ATTACHED, HE WAS THEN ORDERED TO WORK UNDER THE COMMAND OF SURGEANT JAMES BACHELOR OF CAPT. GREEN'S COMPANY IN MAKING CARTRIDGES AND CONTINUED THUS EMPLOYED DURING THE WHOLE PERIOD OF HIS SERVICES, BESIDES CAPTAIN GREEN'S, THERE WERE CAPTAINS WILEY AND LOVELY WITH THEIR COMPANIES STATIONED AT CUMBERLAND UNDER THE IMMEDIATE COMMAND OF COL MOSBY, AFTER CONTINUING AT THIS PLACE EIGHT OR NINE MONTHS, THE DETACHMENT MARCHED TO NEW LONDON IN BEDFORD Co, VA, WHERE THEY WERE UNDER COMMAND OF COL CABELL, HE VOLUNTEERED FOR THE PERIOD OF EIGHTEEN MONTHS AND CONTINUED AT NEW LONDON UNTIL HIS TERM EXPIRED, SERGT. HE STATES IN ANOTHER DECLARATION MADE IN ROCKINGHAM COUNTY, VA IN 1834 THAT HE WAS ONLY 14 YEARS OF AGE WHEN HE ENTERED THE MILITARY SERVICE OF THE U.S. - HE WENT WITH HIS FATHER AND JOINED THE TROOPS STATIONED AT CUMBERLAND COURT HOUSE.

ROCKINGHAM Co, VA. HENRY BOAZ ? OR BOOZ? STATES THAT AS EARLY AS THE YEAR 1808 OR EARLIER HE HAS HEARD HIS FATHER RICHARD BOAZ? SPEAK FREELY OF HIS SERVICES IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, SO FREELY AS HE HEARD HIM SPEAK ABOUT HAVING HAD HIS SHARE IN THE STRUGGLE FOR THE LIBERTY OF THE COUNTRY THAT THE LEADING CITIZENS OF HIS COUNTRY, SINCE HIS CHILDHOOD.

A LETTER IN THE FILES, AS FOLLOWS: I HEREWITH RETURN THE PAPERS IN THE CASE OF RICHARD BOAZ UPON AN APPLICATION FOR A PENSION. IN THE COMMUNICATION TO COL BEALE, OF MARCH 25TH ON THIS SHEET YOU SAY THAT NEITHER HIS NOR HIS FATHER'S NAME IS FOUND UPON THE VA CONTINENTAL ROLLS IN RELATION TO JOHN BOOZ THE FATHER OF RICHARD, THE PRESENT APPLICANT, THE CERTIFICATE HEREWITH SUBMITTED FULL AND SATISFACTORY ESTABLISH HIS SERVICES, AS THEY ARE SET FORTH BY HIS SON. AS TO RICHARD BOAZ OR BOOZ? THE DECLARATION HEREWITH RETURNED, SETS FORTH THAT HE SERVED AS A VOLUNTEER AND NOT AS A REGULAR ENLISTED CONTINENTAL SOLDIER AND OF COURSE HIS NAME WERE WOULD NOT APPEAR ON THE CONTINENTAL ROLLS OF THE VA LINE. ON THE CONTRARY I PRESUME HIS SERVICES WERE IN THE NATURE OF MILITARY SERVICES AND ETC. SIGNED BY THE PENSION COMMISSIONER.

FROM THE BEST RECOLLECTION SHE HAS, SHE BELIEVES THAT HE ENLISTED

IN THE YEAR 1777- SHE CANNOT STATE WHAT MONTH THAT HE ENLISTED. SHE IS UNABLE TO STATE THE REGIMENT IN WHICH HE ENLISTED, BUT SHE KNOWS THAT HER HUSBAND, ROBERT NUTTER WAS ENLISTED IN THE REGULAR ARMY AND WENT IN THE SERVICE AND FROM ALL THE INFORMAT THAT SHE COULD GET HE SERVED 12 MONTHS BEFORE HIS DEATH, SHE REFERS TO A FORMER DECLARATION AND THE AFFIDAVIT OF WM GRIFFITH, SHE STATES THAT SHE KNOWS BR HE WENT IN THE ARMY AND NEVER RETURNED. SHE FURTHER DECLARES THAT SHE IS UNABLE TO STATE FURTHER THAN SHE HAS IN RELATION TO HER MARRIAGES AND THE DEATH OF HER HUSBAND, ROBERT AND THOMAS NUTTER, SHE REFERS TO HER FORMER DECLARATION AND FAMILY RECORDS AND THE AFFIDAVIT OF WILLIAM GRIFFITH. SIGNED SARAH NUTTER.

SARAH NUTTER APPEARED AGE 85, JUNE 1 1844, WHO BEING JUST AND DULY SWORN , MAKES APPLICATION TO OBTAIN PENSION AND STATES THAT SHE MARRIED ROBERT NUTTER WHO WAS A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, IN THE REGULAR ARMY FROM SUSSEX COUNTY DELAWARE, SHE DOES NOT RECOLLECT THE OFFICERS NAME UNDER WHICH HE SERVED BUT RECOLLECTS THAT HE ENLISTED WHEN THEIR FIRST CHILD WAS NEAR ONE YEAR OLD, BUT CANNOT SAY POSITIVE WHETHER IT WAS OVER OR UNDER ONE YEAR OLD SHE BELIEVES IT WAS IN THE YEAR 1777 BUT DOES NOT REMEMBER WHETHER IT WAS IN THE SPRING OR FALL AND SHE SAYS HE SERVED AT LEAST ONE YEAR AND DIED IN THE SERVICE WITH THE CAMP FEEVER AND DOES NOT REMEMBER WHERE THE ARMY WAS STATIONED WHEN HE DIED, BUT RECOLLECTS THAT BEFORE SHE AND HER LAST HUSBAND COULD GET MARRIED SHE HAD TO PROVE THAT HER FIRST HUSBAND WAS DEAD BUT FROM THE GREATH LENGTH OF TIME SHE CANNOT RECOLLECT OF HEARING WHERE HE DIED, SHE FURTHER DECLARES THAT SHE WAS MARRIED TO THE SAID ROBERT NUTTER IN OCT 1775, SHE CANNOT STATE WHAT BR TIME HER HUSBAND ROBERT NUTTER DIED AS SHE IS NOT POSITIVE WHEN HE ENLISTED; THAT SHE WAS AFTERWARDS MARRIED TO THOMAS NUTTER, 3-15-1781 WHO DIED OCT 18-1835 AND THAT SHE WAS A WIDOW ON JULY 4-1836. THE FAMILY RECORDS HEREWITH FILED ARE IN THE HAND WRITING OF HER LAST HUSBAND;

BETTY NUTTER WHO WAS BORN AUG 26-1776, IS THE CHILD SHE HAD BY HER FIRST HUSBAND ROBERT NUTTER. THE LARGE LEAF FILED HEREWITH SHOWS THE MARRIAGE BEFORE TO THOMAS NUTTER AND THE BIRTHS OF THEIR CHILDREN.

I JAMES NUTTER, A RESIDENT OF FAYETTE Co, KY AGE 46, ON MARCH 16 1844, STATE THAT I AM SON OF THOMAS NUTTER AND SARAH HIS WIFE AND BR THAT SHE IS THE IDENTICAL WOMAN WHO WAS LIVING WITH THOMAS NUTTER AS HIS WIFE AT HIS DEATH OCT 18-1835 AND I HAVE ALWAYS UNDERSTOOD THAT MY MOTHER WAS MARRIED TO ROBERT NUTTER BEFORE SHE MARRIED MY FATHER THOMAS NUTTER AND THAT SHE HAD ONE CHILD WHILE MARRIED TO HER FIRST HUSBAND ROBERT NUTTER, WHICH CHILD IS NAMED BETSY.
