



Foreword

In the pages of this Golden Jubilee booklet we have attempted to outline in as simple a way as possible the principal events pertaining to the establishment, growth and activities of Holy Name parish of East Orange.

The subject matter of the booklet will record the highlights in the parish development over the past fifty (50) years. This we have attempted to show by narrative and photography—the Church of 1910 and the Church of 1960; the School of 1910 and the School of 1960; the Convent of 1910 and the Convent of 1960. The brevity of treatment made of presentation precludes the slightest attempt of anything approaching literary form.

The highlights of our parish history are based not only on the existing records but also on information gathered from some of the pioneer families of the parish who are still with us. A perusal of the booklet we feel should bring back many happy memories of the days gone by and at the same time convey to our parishioners of today some idea of our humble beginnings and the many sacrifices made by our zealous priests and loyal parishioners over the past fifty (50) years which made our present parish what it is today.

If the reading of this booklet will help, even in a small way, to revive the memories of days gone by and enkindle in the hearts of our present generation a spirit of loyalty and devotion and a desire to emulate the splendid deeds in upholding its beautiful tradition, the task of compiling these pages will have been amply rewarded.

In the compiling of this booklet we are indebted not only to those who furnished the data and photographs but also to the very active committee of men and women, to our patrons and patronesses, who made this booklet possible.

Church of the Holy Name of Jesus

East Orange, New Jersey - 1910-1960

The cornerstone of the present Church of the Holy Name of Jesus was laid in the Fall of 1929 under the pastorate of Rev. Edward Degen. The architects of the church were Maginnis & Walsh of Boston, Mass., admittedly one of the foremost church architects in the country and the builder of numerous churches, including the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. While there is no comparison between the Shrine Church in Washington and the Holy Name Church in East Orange there is, however, a similarity in the lines of construction but of course on a smaller scale. Maginnis & Walsh consider Holy Name Church one of the most beautiful churches they have built over the number of years they have been in business. This comment, coming from such renowned architects, makes our church stand out most prominently as something every parishioner can be justly proud.

Many of our people have been parishioners long before the erection of our new church! Others have moved into the parish since. All are a part of the parish and all can rightly point to this beautiful edifice and say "this is our church, we have contributed our funds for its erection—we have contributed our funds for the support and maintenance of it and with the help of God we shall continue to do so."

On the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of our parish it would seem appropriate that we review the history of the parish from its beginning in 1910 to the present year of 1960. Some of the highlights and photographs will no doubt be familiar to many. To others who came later they may prove to be a revelation of the wondrous progress our parish has made since its foundation.

The parable of the mustard seed related by Our Lord in the gospels might very fittingly be applied to the foundation and growth of Holy Name Church. Like the mustard seed Holy Name Church had a very humble beginning but thanks to God and the loyalty and co-operation of her people, together with the zeal of her pastors, she has now grown into one of the outstanding parishes of the Archdiocese of Newark. The spiritual needs of the catholics of Doddtown area were originally taken care of by the priests of St. John's Church, Orange. This was of course before the days of modern transportation. Fondly lingering in the memory of some of our parishioners today are the names of Father O'Shea, Father Reilly and Father Marnell.

The number of catholics in the Doddtown area of East Orange, however, was rapidly increasing to the point where Father Fleming, pastor of St. John's for thirty-four years, realized the necessity of establishing "a chapel of ease" - ie - a chapel of mission, not separated from the mother church, but merely a means of greater convenience for those living in the outlying districts to hear mass on Sundays and holydays.

Father Fleming first considered acquiring land at the corner of Springdale and Glenwood Avenues. The trustees of St. John's, however, persuaded him to select another site. The property then decided upon was located at the corner of Brighton Ave. and Everett St., East Orange. This land was purchased from the Soverel family, after whom the present Soverel Field is named. This location was considered more convenient and could be purchased at a moderate cost. Before any definite steps could be taken beyond starting the foundation of the church Father Fleming became seriously ill. Father McDonald was appointed Administrator, succeeding Father Fleming, in 1904 at which time the final decision to establish a mission was made. Under the administration of Father Mc-Donald the chapel, with a seating capacity of approximately 400, was completed and dedicated in the same year.

From that time on it was no longer necessary for the catholics of this section to make the long journey to St. John's in Orange. The priests of St. John's celebrated mass on Sundays and holydays in the new church and continued to administer as before to the spiritual needs of the people of this area.

Due to the steady increase in the catholic population the then Bishop John O'Connor decided to establish definite parish lines and accordingly appointed a permanent pastor. Father Matthew J. Farley, until then a curate at St. Joseph's Church, Jersey City, received the assignment. The announcement was received with great enthusiasm and when the new pastor arrived he was given a warm welcome.

The parish lines, as established by Bishop O'Connor, were as follows:


The Glen Ridge line to Prospect St., Prospect St. to Park Ave., Park Ave to Washington St., Washington St. to Dodd St., Dodd St. to Thomas St., Orange; Thomas St. to Burnside St., Burnside St. to Fair St., and Fair St. to the Glen Ridge line.

Under the Archdiocesan regulations each parish is a corporation consisting of the Archbishop as President; Vicar-General as Vice-President; Pastor as Secretary and Treasurer and two lay trustees. Mr. Thomas Cahill of Hayward St. and Mr. John Finan of North Park St., were elected as the first trustees of the newly organized Church, their appointment having been approved by the late Bishop John O'Connor.

Father Farley immediately set out to organize his new parish. His one outstanding goal was the salvation of the souls committed to his care and the promotion of the honor and glory of God. The first evidence of his extraordinary zeal was his interest in the little ones of his flock. A parochial school must be provided for them and quickly, no matter what the cost. Within a year of his appointment the people of his parish saw a temporary school, such as it was, arise almost overnight in a small building located on North Park St., which was formerly occupied by a combination grocery and butcher shop. Within a short time Father Farley arranged for the building of a wall around the temporary school, while school was in session. While this renovation was going on temporary quarters were provided for the intermediate grades in this building while the upper grades used the sacristy and the babies used the church. This, needless to say, was only a temporary arrangement. Many of the older parishioners will recall that the kneelers in the church were the seats and the pews the desks while this transition was taking place. After the wall was built around the building, his next step was the dismantling of the inside of the temporary quarters in the school and erecting partitions which served as classrooms.

Provision was also made for a social center in this building for the people of Holy Name to take care of card parties, entertainments, graduation exercises, etc. To provide for these activities the classroom partitions were removed and the desks were moved to the rear of the building. The first school for the children of Holy Name was located on the site now occupied by a mattress factory.

The first principal of Holy Name School was Sr. Scholastica, a nun of strong character, whose image is still retained vividly in the memory of her first students who reminisce about her deeds with great glee now. Then, however, she was the feared, as well as the beloved, disciplinarian who brooked no nonsense. Many of our parishioners recall how Sr. Scholastica would stand unseen in the hall, which divided the makeshift classrooms, and ring the bell for silence—the signal for the whole school to join in prayer together. Incidentally, the dinner bell used by Sr. Scholastica, is still in use today in the present Holy Name School.

In addition to Sr. Scholastica the following nuns comprised the school staff for the original school:

Sr. Francis Clare, Sr. Roberta, Sr. Marie Eucharia, Sr. Florentine Sr. Marie Cecelia and Sr. Lucy.

The marvel still is how these seven dedicated nuns were able to provide a full complement of eight grades and a commercial department for 200 pupils registered on the first day that the new school opened. Compare this with our present school enrollment of 800 and a staff of 12 nuns and 5 lay teachers. We have come a long way.

Even after a lapse of 50 years Father Farley's reputation as a disciplinarian has lost nothing of its zest. To quote one parishioner—"He saw to it that we had a social life. Our school and its auditorium was used to the fullest. There were three pool tables and two bowling alleys in the basement. Our team was active in the kegler's league, too, traveling as far as Elizabeth sometimes which meant hours of trolley riding and miles of walking."

Father Farley organized a uniformed baseball team and a Fife and Drum Corps. Some of the men who participated are still parishioners, although most of them have gone to their reward. He also organized a billiard team on which Joseph B. Kenah Sr. was a player. Mr. Kenah is currently a Trustee of the Church.

In order to raise additional revenue for the support of the parish Father Farley organized a Church Debt Society composed of a band of women, many of whom are still parishioners, who called regularly on the parishioners to collect 25 cents weekly.

At the same time the school was built provision was made for a convent by acquiring a building adjoining the school on North Park St. In the meantime the house adjoining the church on Brighton Ave. was obtained as a rectory.




FATHER MATTHEW J. FARLEY Fust Pastor of Holy Name Church - 1910-1925

Father Matthew Farley was born in St. James' parish, Newark, the son of the late Daniel and Margaret Farley. He attended St. John's Parochial school in Newark and St. Benedict's Preparatory School. Upon his graduation in 1890 he entered Seton Hall College and after graduating therefrom entered the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, then located in South Orange. He was ordained to the Holy Priesthood May 27th, 1899.

Father Farley's first assignment as an assistant priest was at St. Agnes' Church in Paterson. After spending some time there he was transferred to St. Mary's Church in Plainfield. St. Joseph's Church, Jersey City, was his next assignment where he spent nine years before taking up the pastorate of Holy Name Church, East Orange, in 1910.

Thus the parish was now definitely established with a church, rectory, school and convent.

Father Farley labored zealously among his new flock for fifteen fruitful years. The great zeal manifested by him still remains as a monument to his memory to this day. Almighty God called him to his well-earned reward on July 4, 1925.



FATHER EDWARD A. DEGEN

Before the year was over Father Edward A. Degen was appointed to succeed Father Farley as Pastor of Holy Name Church.

Father Degen was born in Leuth, Holland on July 21, 1879. He was baptized the day of his birth. His preparatory education was received in Holland from whence he came to St. Mary's in Maryland and completed his Philosophy studies. He then entered Seton Hall Seminary for his Theology and was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Newark, on

May 28th, 1904. After his ordination his first appointment was St. Theresa's, Summit as an assistant. Later he served as an assistant at Immaculate Conception, Montclair, and St. Columba's, Newark. In June 1915 he was appointed Pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes, Paterson, where he remained until Sept. 8, 1925. At this time he was appointed Pastor of Holy Name, East Orange.

By this time it was quite evident that larger facilities had to be provided for the fast growing congregation. Father Degen set about undertaking negotiations to that end as soon as conditions permitted. Several sites in the Doddtown area were considered and Father Degen finally decided upon the property at Midland Ave. and Dodd St. where the present group of buildings now stand.

Interestingly enough, the location now occupied by the Church was an apple orchard owned by the Dodd and later the Wiggins estates. The adjoining properties, owned by the Gruman and Lehman families, were acquired for a new school. All the property necessary for a complete plant was obtained and Father Degen was able to carry out his ambition of consolidating all the church buildings in one location. The buildings located on the Gruman and Lehman properties were moved to Dodd St., adjoining what is now the present Church. These buildings were occupied by the nuns as a Convent.

All this, however, was not as simple of attainment as it may appear from the above. Opposition to Father Degen's plans for the erection of a church was raised by the neighboring property owners on Midland Ave. This made it necessary to conduct transactions through a third party in order to attain the property. The reason for this opposition was their fear that it would depreciate the property in the neighborhood. Time has proven that their fear was unfounded. One of the chief objectors was a prominent business man in East Orange, who before he moved out of the neighborhood made a visit to Father Maloney at which time he acknowledged his error in opposing the erection of the church and stated that "instead of depreciating the values were enhanced."

Two years after Father Degen's appointment, viz: 1927, the cornerstone of the present school was laid—a year later the building was ready for occupancy. The old school on North Park St. was discontinued and the children of the parish moved into their new and modern school. Approximately 300 children were enrolled in the new school.


The old church or. Brighton Ave. was also dismantled and the spacious auditorium of the new school was used for Mass on Sundays and holydays, as well as other parish devotions.

The present rectory for housing the priests of the parish was built at the same time as the school. The estimated cost of the school and rectory was approximately \$267,000.

Despite the already heavy debt, Father Degen, confident of the loyal co-operation and generosity of his people, began negotiations for the erection of a new church. Accordingly in 1929 the cornerstone was laid with appropriate ceremonies, at which the late Bishop Walsh officiated. The late Monsignor Edward Quirk preached the sermon.




MEMBERS OF THE FIRST GRADUATING CLASS, JUNE 1912




FRONT VIEW OF CHURCH FACING DODD STREET

The Church was completed in 1933, at a cost of approximately \$450,000. The Church is considered, as previously remarked, one of the most beautiful in the Archdiocese and will forever stand as a monument to the zeal of Father Degen.

In addition to the furnishings of the church an organ had to be provided. How to raise this money was a big problem due to the market crash which depleted the income of the parishioners! To meet this situation Father Degen organized a "Penny-A-Meal" Club. Each parishioner was provided with a sacrifice bank wherein he deposited coins after each meal. It was in this way that the organ in our church was purchased from a large hotel in New York.

There are many who were familiar with the details who will tell you that the life of the saintly priest was undoubtedly shortened by the strain of the burden he was forced to bear due to a series of unfortunate incidents over which he had no control.

While the church was under construction the nation was suffering a major depression which depleted the parishioners' income thus making it necessary to curtail their contributions to the church. During this period Mr. Whelan, President of the Whelan Drug Co., was a prominent parishioner of Holy Name Church. Through his encouragement and his promise to assist in underwriting the cost of the church, the work was undertaken and completed by Father Degen. To this end the Whelan Drug Co. put on the market a new cigarette called "The Barking Dog." Thousands of "..llars of stock in this cigarètte were donated to Father Degen to mee, the expense of the church building. Unfortunately, however, the new cigarette was a failure, or as one parishioner expressed it, "The barking dog never barked." In the meantime Mr. Whelan's fortune dwindled due to the crash in the market in 1929 and the support which Father Degen had been counting on so heavily proved to be a pillar of straw.

It is interesting to note that this tremendous undertaking was completed by Father Degen within four years—something which is almost incredible.

After faithful service in the Vineyard of the Lord for almost 37 years he was called to his reward January 31, 1941. May he rest in peace! On June 19, 1941 Rev. Patrick J. Maloney was appointed by the then Bishop Thomas J. Walsh to succeed Father Degen as Pastor of Holy Name Church.


Father Maloney was born in Jersey City on Aug. 14, 1893, the son of the late Patrick and Mary Maloney. After graduating from Seton Hall College in 1915 he entered the Seminary in South Orange. He was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Newark, on Dec. 21, 1918.

His first assignment was Our Lady of Grace, Hoboken, as assistant to the late Monsignor Eugene Carroll. Due to the return of the Chaplain from military service, for whom he was substituting, he was reassigned to St. Vincent de Paul's Church, Bayonne, N. J., as assistant to the late Monsignor Joseph Dolan. In 1921 he was assigned as assistant at St. Aedan's Church, Jersey City and served 18 years under the late Monsignor Roger A. McGinley—later Father John A. McGeary and Msgr. John C. McClary. He served as Chaplain to the Jersey City Medical Center while assigned at St Aedan's.

In February 1939 he was named Pastor of both St. Luke's, Hohokus, and the Church of the Guardian Angels, Allendale (a mission to St. Luke's). The education of the children at St. Luke's Grammar and High School was his responsibility. During his two years as pastor he made extensive repairs to the church, school and grounds.

After his appointment to Holy Name one of the first undertakings of Father Maloney was the erection of the mosaic stations of the cross, as a memorial to the late Father Degen. The next major project was the rebuilding of the main arch of the Church which had collapsed. The redecoration of the Church, Rectory, Convent and School were next in order. Since the registry of the school was steadily increasing it was necessary to build additional classrooms. The school has increased from 300 at the time of Father Maloney's appointment to 800 at the present time. A playground for the children and suitable parking space for the parishioners was then completed.




MONSIGNOR PATRICK J. MALONEY Present Pastor, Appointed 1941

OUR NEW CONVENT, COMPLETED IN 1957

Since the need for a new convent for the nuns was necessary Father Maloney negotiated for the purchase of the property adjoining the school. Upon this site the present new convent has been erected at a cost of \$400,000. The exterior of the building is of face brick and stone and designed in keeping with the architectural treatment of the existing group of buildings. The first floor has six parlors for visitors. The Chapel, as designed by Renard Ilario Panzironi, one of the foremost church decorators in the Metropolitan area, has a seating capacity of 35. A large Community room and sun porch is located on the west side of the first floor. The refectory, accommodating 30 persons adjoins the kitchen facilities.

The second floor has 20 bedrooms, together with sick room, Superior's suite, sewing room, linen closets, service and storage space. The laundry, drying room, general storage room, boiler and mechanical equipment rooms are located in the basement.

The first floor of the building is air conditioned. William Neumann & Sons of Jersey City were the architects.

Father Maloney has carried to completion the plans of Father Degen, liquidated the debt which those plans incurred, and effected the necessary repairs and improvements (including the building of the new convent) which were found necessary since he became pastor. This totalled an expenditure of over a million dollars since his assignment.

Father Maloney was raised to the rank of Domestic Prelate by Pope John XXIII on October 30, 1959, with the title of Rt. Rev. Monsignor. Investiture took place in January 1960 in Sacred Heart Cathedral with His Excellency Most Rev. Thomas A. Boland officiating.

In addition to his parochial duties here in Holy Name, Monsignor Maloney has been appointed to the Sites and Building Commission for the Archdiocese of Newark.

It is Monsignor Maloney's ambition that sometime in the near future he will apply to the Archbishop for the consecration of Holy Name Church.







In constitution, definition and establishment of the boundaries of the Parish of the Holy Name of Jesus, East Orange, N. J.

We hereby on this 5th day of June 1942 A.D., in accordance with Canons 1427 and 1428, praeauditis Consultoribus Concilii Nostri Archidiocesanis, *constitute*. *define* and *establish* the boundaries of the Parish of the Holy Name of Jesus, East Orange, N. J., as follows:

Beginning at the juncture of Orange Road and Washington Avenue, Montclair, thence in an easterly direction along the south side of Washington Street and Washington Avenue to Ridgewood Avenue, Glen Ridge, then in a southerly direction along the west side of Ridgewood Avenue to the south side of Linden Avenue, Glen Ridge, then in an easterly direction along the south side of Linden Avenue to Ashland Avenue, Bloomfield, thence in a southerly direction along the west side of Ashland Avenue, Bloomfield, to Evergreen Avenue, thence in an easterly direction along the south side of Evergreen Avenue, Bloomfield, to the juncture of Glenwood Avenue at Prospect Street, Bloomfield, thence in a southeasterly direction along the west side of Prospect Street, Bloomfield, to Myrtle Street, thence in a northeasterly direction along the south side of Myrtle Street to Hinrichs Place, then in a southeasterly direction along an imaginary line through the rear of the residences on the east side of Hinrichs Place to the south side of Dodd Street, thence in a northeasterly direction along Dodd Street and Watsessing Avenue to the juncture of the Montclair Branch of the Lackawanna Railroad and Watsessing Avenue, thence in a southwesterly direction along the Montclair Branch of the Lackawanna Railroad to North Arlington Avenue, thence in a southerly direction along the west side of North Arlington Avenue to an imaginary line at the rear of the residences on the south side of Renshaw Avenue, East Orange, thence in a westerly direction along this imaginary line to Prospect Street, East Orange, thence in a southerly direction along the west side of Prospect Street, East Orange, to Park Avenue, thence in a westerly direction along the north side of Park Avenue to Washington Street, East Orange, thence in a northwesterly direction along the east side of Washington Street, East Orange, to the juncture of Dodd Street, Orange, thence in an easterly direction along the north side of Dodd Street, Orange, to Thomas Street, Orange, thence in a northerly direction along the west

side of Thomas Street to Hayward Street, Orange, thence along the south side of Hayward Street to Burnside Street, Orange, thence in a northerly direction along the east side of Burnside Street to the Rosedale Cemetery, thence continuing in an imaginary line in a northerly direction to Orange Road, thence in an easterly direction along the south side of Orange Road to the juncture of the Montclair-Glen Ridge Line, thence in a northwesterly direction along the east side of Orange Road, Montclair, to the point of beginning at Washington Street, Montclair.

All persons living within the above defined boundaries of the Parish of the Holy Name of Jesus, East Orange, N. J., are respectfully invited to attend and support their own Parish of the Holy Name of Jesus, East Orange, N. J.

The beautiful edifice occupies a very commanding position on the corner of Dodd St. and Midland Ave. The building is related to the elevated site in such a manner as to contribute in a formally picturesque way to the impressiveness of the architecture. In design the building may be classified as of the style of Lombardy Romanesque, a tradition which lends itself gracefully to effects of stateliness and of interesting symbolic sentiment. The tower originally planned over the Baptistry entrance was eliminated but the foundation walls were retained for the erection of a future tower, which was the desire of Father Degen. The exterior ashlor is of Weymouth Seam Face Stone. The facade has a large and distinguished motive in the form of a lofty recessed portal lined with stone in delicately textured ornament, within which is placed the central of the three doorways of the facade. Over the main doorway, which is enframed by delicately carved colonnettes, a sculptured design is introduced in the semi-circular tympanum, the subject of which is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, under which is the inscription—"Which Oblation Do Thou O God Vouchsafe In All Things To Bless." Over this tympanum is the sculptured figure of Christ the King with two flanking angels. Above this and under the arch of the great recess is a circular stone window, whose central motive is the Greek cross executed in the manner characteristic of the style. The entire recess, which is lined with stone, is crowned by a semi-circular vault, flanked by two recessed stone figures of St. Peter and St. Paul. The surmounting gable is articulated by a delicate arcade with peacock design ornament.

Of the other two entrances on the facade, that on the gospel side is distinguished by a sculptured tympanum representing the Holy Family at Nazareth with the following inscription—"Let Us O Lord Ever Follow the Example of the Holy Family,"—the door on the epistle side being marked by a corresponding tympanum representing the Child Jesus in the Temple with the following inscription—"All Who Heard Him Were Astonished At His Wisdom." On the Midland Ave. side of the Church is the entrance to the Baptistry with a carved tympanum of the symbol of the Holy Ghost, under which is the inscription—"Give Place to the Holy Ghost the Paraclete." At the right hand side of this entrance is the corner-stone indicating the year of the building—1929. The entrance doors are of Oak with bands of wrought iron.

The exterior elevations of the Church are marked by an extremely interesting treatment of the clerestory with a reticent distinction of the side aisles. This effect is pleasingly accented by the flat porch-like construction which enframes the entrance from Midland Ave. The Sacristies, moreover, are so situated as to give fine relief to the sweep of the apsidal chancel with its arcaded ornamentation. Marking the presence of the chancel arch beneath, there is a symbolic group of the Crucifixion sculptured in stone.

An exceptionally interesting feature of the exterior of the building is the richly textured effect of the tile roof, which was selected with great care in order to achieve the right variety of coloration. The tile used is what is known as the Mission type.

The interior of the Church is unusually impressive not only in its general proportions but in the character of its detail. One enters through an ample narthex out of which two concealed stairways rise to the organ gallery within the limits of the exterior pylons. The nave is defined by columns of rich color executed in polished monolith terrazzo with capitals and arches of stone rendered ornamentally. The sanctuary, which is unusually deep, frames an altar of striking simplicity constructed of rich Italian marbles. Around the perimeter of the chancel, and separated from it by a series of columns supporting arches, is an ambulatory connecting the boys' sacristy with that of the priests', each with independent approach. Convenient to the boys' sacristy, and accessible from the ambulatory, is provided a work sacristy. The confessionals are placed within shallow transepts separated by two groups of arched openings from the body of the church. On the Midland Avenue side is situated the baptistry in convenient relation to the priests' sacristy. The great barreled vault of the nave has an impressive coffered design with delicate ornament articulating its main lines.

The bases, borders and division strips in aisles, ambulatories and passageways as well as the vestibule and narthex are of marble, the fields throughout being of terrazzo. The doors leading to the narthex have been given interesting architectural treatment. Over the central door is a sculptured tympanum of St. John Capistran preaching. Flanking this at the two aisle entrances are the coats of arms of Pope Pius X and Bishop Walsh of New Jersey. Over the door to the baptistry is a tympanum depicting three fishes of symbolic implication. Other tympana throughout the interior include one depicting the pelican and another the phoenix. Others embody the symbol of the keys with pastoral staff with the legend —"All Power Is Given To Me in Heaven and on Earth." Another symbol contains the Censer with chain or else an Urn with flames associated with the legend—"In the Name of Jesus Every Knee Should Bend." In another is introduced the sacrificial lamb with the legend—"I Have Chosen This Place For A House of Sacrifice."
